CARDS 2021 NFL DRAFT SELECTIONS

The Cardinals currently hold six picks in the 2021 NFL Draft: one selection in rounds one, two, five and six, plus two in the seventh round. Arizona acquired a sixthround pick (223rd overall) from Minnesota and a seventh-rounder (247th overall) from Las Vegas via trades.

THIRD DRAFT FOR KEIM AND KINGSBURY

After the first two drafts produced the 2019 Associated Press Offensive Rookie of the Year (QB Kyler Murray) and 2020 PFWA All-Rookie team honoree (LB Isaiah Simmons), Arizona Cardinals General Manager Steve Keim and Head Coach Kliff Kingsbury will lead their third draft together in 2021.

The 2021 NFL Draft will mark Keim's ninth as General Manager and 22nd with the Cardinals after initially joining the team as a regional scout in 1999.



Keim earned the 2014 Sporting News Executive of the Year award and is a twotime recipient of Pro Football Talk's Executive of the Year (2013 and '14). In his third year at the helm in Arizona, Kingsbury was selected in the sixth round (201st overall) of the 2003 NFL Draft by the New England Patriots.

In his previous eight drafts as GM, Keim has selected 59 players, including numerous key contributors on the current roster (listed alphabetically):


- S Budda Baker (2017, 2nd round, 36th overall) Team captain, first-team All-Pro and three-time Pro Bowler tied for the NFL lead among DBs with 118 tackles in 2020.
- RB Chase Edmonds (2018, 4th round, 134th overall) Posted career highs in scrimmage yards (850) and total TDs (five) for the NFL's sixth-ranked offense in 2020.
- OL D.J. Humphries (2015, 1st round, 24th overall) Fifth-highest graded OT by PFF, who credited him with 3.0 sacks allowed on 695 pass-blocking snaps in 2020.
- WR Christian Kirk (2018, 2nd round, 47th overall) Registered a career high and tied the team lead (WR DeAndre Hopkins) with six receiving TDs in 2020.
- QB Kyler Murray (2019, 1st round, 1st overall) Named a team captain, Pro Bowler and "NFC Offensive Player of the Week" honoree three times in 2020.
- CB Byron Murphy Jr. (2019, 2nd round, 33rd overall) Fourth Cardinals draft pick since 1999 to record at least 18 passes defensed in his first two NFL seasons.
- LB Isaiah Simmons (2020, 1st round, 8th overall) Earned PFWA All-Rookie team honors with 47 tackles, four tackles for loss, 2.0 sacks and one INT in 2020.

2021 NFL DRAFT VITALS

After an entirely virtual draft last year due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the 2021 NFL Draft will be held in Cleveland, OH from April 29-May 1.

For the third consecutive year, the draft will be presented across ABC, ESPN and NFL Network, offering a multi-network presentation during all seven rounds. ESPN will again offer the traditional draft telecast, while ABC will present a distinct, prime-time telecast for rounds 1-3 and NFL Network will present exclusive coverage throughout all three days.

CARDS WITH NO. 16 OVERALL PICK

For the first time since 2008 - and the eighth time in franchise history – Arizona is scheduled to select No. 16 overall in the 2021 NFL Draft. The Cardinals have drafted 16th overall in 2008, 1982, 1967, 1952, 1946, 1940 and 1939.

The last time the Cardinals drafted No. 16 overall, the team selected CB Dominique Rodgers-Cromartie out of Tennessee State in 2008. He played 12 seasons in the NFL (2008-2019), earning two Pro Bowl selections (one with AZ) and finishing his career with 30 INTs, six of which he returned for TDs.



A pair of notable picks made by the Cardinals with the 16th overall selection are Luis Sharpe (1982) and Elmer Angsman (1946). Sharpe spent his entire 13-year NFL career with the Cardinals, earning three-consecutive Pro Bowls (1987-1989) and starting all 189 games he played at LT. Angsman was a key piece of the Cardinals' famed "Million-Dollar Backfield" that helped the team capture the NFL championship in 1947.

FIRST ROUND BREAKDOWN

The Cardinals have drafted 53 players in the first round since 1970, selecting 25 offensive players, 27 defensive players and one specialist.

Offensive line and linebacker have been the positions most frequently selected by the Cardinals in the first round since the merger.

The streaming will begin when the Cardinals are on the clock with their first-round selection, second-round selection and the first of two seventh-round selections.

Each program will include 30-60 minute live shows and feature special guests from the team after the picks are made.

SIMMONS MAKES ALL-ROOKIE TEAM

Selected with the No. 8 pick in the 2020 NFL Draft, Cardinals LB Isaiah Simmons made the PFWA All-Rookie team with 47 tackles, four tackles for loss, 2.0 sacks, one INT, two passes defensed, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery in 16 games (seven starts) last season.

He turned in perhaps the two best performances of his young career in a pair of primetime matchups against division rival Seattle. In Week 7, Simmons intercepted a Russell Wilson pass with 1:04 remaining in OT, leading to the game-winning drive on SNF in Arizona. Four weeks later, he had a team-high 10 tackles, two tackles for loss, 1.0 sack and a QB hit on TNF in Seattle.



The Clemson product became the 35th player in franchise history to receive the honor and the seventh since Steve Keim was named General Manager in 2013. Arizona has had five different players make the All-Rookie squad in the last four seasons.

ANOTHER AP OFFENSIVE ROOKIE OF THE YEAR IN AZ
The No. 1 overall pick in the 2019 NFL Draft, QB Kyler Murray was named AP
Offensive Rookie of the Year following a record-breaking campaign.

He became the third player in franchise history to be named *AP* Offensive Rookie of the Year, joining WR **Anquan Boldin** (2003) and RB **Ottis Anderson** (1979). DE **Simeon Rice** was named *AP* Defensive Rookie of the Year in 1996.

Highlights from Murray's Rookie Season:

- Became just the sixth QB in NFL history with 3,500+ passing and 500+ rushing yards in a season, joining Cam Newton (2011) as the only rookies to accomplish the feat.
- Set franchise rookie records for wins by a QB (5), passing yards (3,722), TD passes (20), completions (349), attempts (542), games with multiple TD passes (8) and rushing yards by a QB (544).

AWARD-WINNING DRAFT PICKS

The Cardinals have drafted 118 players who have gone on to earn Pro Bowl or NFL All-Star (1938-42) honors. Among the team's all-time draft picks, 44 have garnered first-team All-Pro accolades, and eight had Hall of Fame careers.

Since GM Steve Keim's first draft with the Cardinals in 2000, Arizona has picked 15 players who have been selected to the Pro Bowl as Cardinals, and seven of those players also earned first-team All-Pro recognition during their time in Arizona. Four draft picks during Keim's tenure were also named to the NFL's 2010-19 All-Decade Team: WR Larry Fitzgerald, DE Calais Campbell, CB Patrick Peterson and S Tyrann Mathieu.

DRAFT-A-THON TO SUPPORT COVID-19 RELIEF

The 2021 NFL Draft will again host Drafta-Thon, a fundraiser that drives awareness and action to close critical gaps at the intersection of pandemic recovery and our hardest hit communities. Drafta-Thon will raise funds on behalf of four national nonprofit organizations that are supporting underserved communities in



four areas: the Digital Divide in education, health disparities, food insecurity and mental health.

Similar to last year, the Draft-a-Thon will be featured across the live Draft coverage on ABC, ESPN, ESPN Deportes, ESPN Radio and NFL Network April 29-May 1 and will showcase the efforts of the four nonprofit organizations that support pandemic recovery in these areas:

- Health Disparities CDC Foundation: Communities of color, indigenous communities, older and rural Americans have long faced health disparities. This has been exacerbated by the pandemic, where COVID-19 has disproportionately impacted those already experiencing health disparities.
- The Digital Divide The Education Trust: Over this past year, the digital divide – a growing chasm between those who have access to computers and reliable, high-speed Internet and those who do not – has widened due to the pandemic when students needed to work from home without proper resources to do so.
- Food Insecurity Feeding America: Feeding America estimates nearly 42 million people, including 13 million children, could face food insecurity in 2021 due to the ongoing economic fallout from COVID-19. This equates to 1 in 8 people and 1 in 6 children. Feeding America's mission is to feed people facing food insecurity through a nationwide network of member food banks and engage our country in the fight to end hunger.
- Mental Health Mental Health America: Throughout the ongoing pandemic, 4 out of 5 people who took an anxiety or depression screening with Mental Health America reported moderate to severe symptoms. The pandemic has made it clear to everyone that there is a huge need for more mental health services and support, especially in our hardest hit communities.

PROSPECTS TO PARTICIPATE IN PERSON

This year, the draft will return to a more familiar format with some of college football's top prospects participating in-person following an entirely virtual event in 2020.

The league announced that 10 prospects have already accepted their invitations to attend the 2021 NFL Draft in Cleveland, and more are expected to be announced in the coming days. In addition to the in-person participants, some of the top prospects will be involved in the broadcast virtually.

PRO DAYS MAP PATH TO THE DRAFT

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the traditional week-long NFL Scouting Combine held annually in Indianapolis, IN was replaced with a college pro day circuit. Beginning March 5 with the University of Kansas, approximately 112 pro days over the course of 35 calendar days were held on campuses across the country.

In early March, the league released the list of 323 prospects invited to participate in the reformatted combine process, including four from in-state programs - Arizona RB Gary Brightwell, Arizona CB Lorenzo Burns, ASU S Aashari Crosswell and ASU WR Frank Darby.

In accordance with health and safety guidelines, teams were limited to three representatives at any pro day, and unlike previous years, draft prospects were prohibited from visiting NFL facilities. Teams are allowed to conduct phone or video interviews with prospects until April 28, the day before the draft.

TRANSACTION SEASON

The Cardinals have been busy this offseason with the acquisition of nine notable veterans through free agency or trade – highlighted by the signing of All-Pro DL J.J. Watt.









FACTS ABOUT THE FREE AGENCY ADDITIONS

- The players the Cardinals acquired during free agency have a combined 20 Pro Bowl selections and 11 All-Pro nods. Arizona added six different Pro Bowlers: Watt, WR A.J. Green, OL Rodney Hudson, K Matt Prater, CB Malcolm Butler and RB James Conner. Watt (5), Green (7), Hudson (3), Prater (2) and Butler (2) have all been named to multiple Pro Bowls.
- Of the nine players acquired by the Cardinals in free agency, eight served as team captains in the NFL or college. Watt, Green, Prater, Hudson and S Shawn Williams have all served as team captains in the NFL. QB Colt McCoy, OL Brian Winters and Conner were captains in college.
- The two defensive backs acquired by Arizona (Butler and Williams) have a combined 145 starts in the NFL. The pair have accumulated 31 INTs and 118 passes defensed.
- Six of the Cardinals new acquisitions played all 16 games last season. Watt, Butler, Hudson, Green and Winters all played 16 games on either offense or defense and made a combined 71 starts.

PRO BOWLERS ACQUIRED IN FREE AGENCY

- •DL J.J. WATT A five-time 1st-team All-Pro and five-time Pro Bowl selection, was also named the 2017 Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year. Has been named NFL Defensive Player of the Year three times (2012, '14-15), tied with Rams DT Aaron Donald and Giants LB Lawrence Taylor for the most in NFL history.
- •WR A.J. GREEN Seven-time Pro Bowl selection (2011-17) and two-time 2nd-team All-Pro designee (2012-13) who played the past 10 years with Cincinnati and appeared in 127 games (125 starts). Since entering the league as a first-round selection (4th overall) in the 2011 NFL Draft, ranks 5th in the NFL in receiving yards, 6th in TD receptions, 8th in receptions, 5th in 100-yard receiving games and 8th in receiving yards per game.
- •OL RODNEY HUDSON Acquired in a trade with the Raiders, Hudson is a three-time Pro Bowl selection (2016-17, '19) and was named 2nd-team All-Pro in 2019. According to Pro Football Focus, he ranks first among all NFL centers with a 93.6 pass-blocking grade dating back to 2015. The site credits him with just 3 sacks allowed in 3,445 pass-blocking snaps in the last six seasons.
- •K MATT PRATER A two-time Pro Bowl selection (2013, '16), Prater is one of the top long-distance kickers in league history. He holds NFL records for the longest FG (64 yards), most career FGs of 50+ yards (59), consecutive made FGs of 50+ yards (14) and consecutive FG conversions of 55+ yards (7). In his career, has connected on all 22 game-winning FG attempts with two minutes or less remaining in the fourth quarter and OT (16-of-16 in regulation and 6-of-6 in OT).
- •CB MALCOLM BUTLER A two-time Pro Bowl selection, he was responsible for one of the most memorable plays in Super Bowl history when he intercepted Seahawks QB Russell Wilson in the endzone to seal the Patriots SB XLIX win at State Farm Stadium. He joins Janoris Jenkins and Marcus Peters as the only players in the NFL with multiple INTs in each of the last six seasons (2015-20) and was the only player in the NFL in 2020 who recorded 100+ tackles and 4+ INTs.
- •RB JAMES CONNER Selected to the Pro Bowl in 2018 after rushing for 12 TDs and 973 yards while catching 55 passes for 497 yards a TD in 13 games with Pittsburgh. With the Steelers, he appeared in 50 games (33 starts) and ran for 2,302 yards and 22 TDs on 532 carries (4.3-yard avg.) along with 124 receptions for 963 yards and four TDs.

RE-SIGNING SOME ON THEIR OWN

Another 8 players from Arizona's 2020 roster agreed to new deals to remain with the team – S Chris Banjo, OL Kelvin Beachum, TE Darrell Daniels, OL Max Garcia, LB Markus Golden, P Andy Lee, LB Tanner Vallejo and S Charles Washington.

DRAFT TRADES

Arizona has made 10 draft-day trades under GM **Steve Keim**, and two current Cardinals – S **Budda Baker** and WR **Andy Isabella** – were acquired in those deals.

DEALING BEFORE THE DRAFT

In March, the Cardinals acquired three-time Pro Bowl OL **Rodney Hudson** and a seventh-round selection (247th overall) in the 2021 NFL Draft from the Las Vegas Raiders in exchange for Arizona's third-round pick (80th overall) in 2021.

Later that month, the Cardinals sent OL Mason Cole to the Minnesota Vikings in exchange for Minnesota's sixth-round selection (223rd overall) in the 2021 NFL Draft.

In addition, two trades made by Arizona in 2020 included picks in the 2021 NFL Draft. The Cardinals trade for WR DeAndre Hopkins sent their '21 fourth-round selection (#122) to Houston and the mid-season trade for LB Markus Golden sent a '21 sixth-round pick (#201) to the Giants.

TRANSACTION OF THE YEAR

The Cardinals acquisition of All-Pro wide receiver **De-Andre Hopkins** received the Alpha Award for "Best Sports Transaction of the Year" from the MIT Sloan Sports Analytics Conference.

In March of last year, the Cardinals agreed to a trade with the Houston Texans that brought Hopkins and a 2020 fourth-round pick to Arizona in exchange for running back David Johnson, a 2020 second-round pick and a 2021 fourth-round pick.

During his first season with the Cardinals in 2020, Hopkins was voted to his fifth Pro Bowl, earned second-team All-Pro honors and established a single-season franchise record with 115 receptions. He tied for second in the NFL in both catches and 100-yard games (seven) while his 1,407 receiving yards ranked third in the league last season. His game-winning TD catch in the closing seconds vs. Buffalo – the unforgettable "Hail Murray" play – was also selected as the 2020 Bridgestone Clutch Performance Play of the Year at NFL Honors in February.

The Alpha Award is presented annually for the previous year's best transaction across all sports as voted upon by the Sloan Sports Conference Board of Directors.

CARDS COACHES IN THE DRAFT

Seven of the Cardinals coaches were selected in the NFL Draft, including head coach **Kliff Kingsbury**, who was picked in the sixth round (201st overall) of the 2003 NFL Draft by the New England Patriots.

D-Line coach **Brentson Buckner** (12 years), Offensive Quality Control coach **Jim Dray** (seven), TEs coach **Steve Heiden** (11), WRs coach **Shawn Jefferson** (13), DBs coach **Marcus Robertson** (12) and RBs coach **James Saxon** (eight) enjoyed long NFL playing careers prior to joining the coaching ranks.



ROOKIE FREE AGENTS PRODUCE IN AZ

The Cardinals had 22 players who entered the NFL as undrafted rookie free agents combine to play 199 games (31 starts) in 2020. Among them was LB **Dennis Gardeck**, who was named a team captain for the first time in his career and had 7.0 sacks, seven tackles for loss and 10 QB hits in just 93 defensive snaps last season.

In his limited action on defense, the Sioux Falls product established a single-season franchise record for the most sacks by a player who entered the league undrafted.

Also on the Cardinals roster for all 16 games last year was QB **Chris Streveler**, who signed with Arizona after two seasons (2018-19) with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League. He became the 28th undrafted free agent to make the Cardinals Week 1 roster since 2004.

SMALL-SCHOOL SUCCESS

Since 2010, the Cardinals have selected 16 players from schools outside of the NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision, including seven in the last five years.

In 2018, the Cardinals drafted RB **Chase Edmonds** in the fourth round (134th) out of Fordham, and in three NFL seasons, he has scored 12 TDs and totaled 2,034 all-purpose yards on 217 carries (959 yards), 85 receptions (610) and 21 kickoff returns (465) in 45 games.

Edmonds was one of the most accomplished players in Patriot League and NCAA FCS history as a three-time consensus All-American (2014-16) who closed out his career as the league's all-time leader in career rushing yards (5,862), total TDs (74) and rushing TDs (67).

Edmonds became just the second Fordham player selected in the NFL Draft in the last 50 years (1969-2018) joining Cardinals 2010 fifth round pick (155th overall) QB John Skelton.
