THIS WEEK'S PREVIEW

For the first time since 1998 the Cardinals have a postseason "play-in" game in the final week of the regular season as they travel to Los Angeles to face the Rams in Week 17.

Arizona is looking for its first playoff berth since 2015. In order to achieve that they will have to go through a Rams team that is also fighting for a spot in the postseason. The Cardinals are in the playoffs with a win over Los Angeles while the Rams can earn a spot in the postseason with a win or a Chicago loss vs. Green Bay.

The 84th all-time regular season meeting between the Cardinals and Rams will also mark Arizona's first-ever visit to newly-opened SoFi Stadium in Los Angeles. The Rams are 5-2 at SoFi Stadium in the venue's inaugural season while the Cardinals hold a 4-3 record on the road in 2020.

Arizona has held its own on the road in this series, with the teams splitting the 42 games played on the Rams home field 21-21-0.

Adding to the storyline on Sunday is the fact that Arizona will need to defeat a Rams squad that has won seven straight in this series. In the last two meetings, the Cardinals have shown the ability to score on a stingy Rams defense. Arizona has 52 points in the last two games vs. Los Angeles, including 28 points in the Week 13 matchup this season. Only Buffalo (35 in Week 3) scored more vs. the Rams in a game this season.

In the final regular season game of his 17th NFL campaign, WR **Larry Fitzgerald** will face the same team he faced in his NFL debut. Sunday's game will be Fitzgerald's 33rd career outing against the Rams in games that will have covered six different stadiums in three states and in two different countries. Fitzgerald has 195 receptions for 2,199 yards and 18 TDs against Los Angeles. He has more receptions against the Rams (195), Seahawks (195) and 49ers (192) than any other player in NFL history has vs. a single opponent.

Another veteran to this series is CB **Patrick Peterson**, who has seven INTs and three TDs (2 PR, 1 INT) 18 career games vs. the Rams.

#AZvsLAR - WEEK 17 HIGHLIGHTS

- On Sunday in Los Angeles the Cardinals will have their first playoff "play-in" game on the final day of the regular season since 1998. That year the Cardinals defeated the San Diego Chargers 16-13 on a 52-yard FG as time expired to earn the NFC's final playoff berth. The following week they upset the Dallas Cowboys 20-7 in the Wild Card round.
- Arizona has scored 52 points in its last two games against the Rams, including 28 in Week 13 earlier this season. Only Buffalo (35 in Week 3) scored more points vs. the Rams #3 ranked scoring defense this season.
- On Sunday WR **Larry Fitzgerald** will play his 33rd career game against the Rams. Those games will have taken place in six different stadiums that cover three states and two different countries.
- QB **Kyler Murray** established an NFL record with 716 completions in his first two seasons. He surpassed the previous mark of 698 (Derek Carr, 2014-15).
- According to the Elias Sports Bureau, LB **Haason Reddick** is the only NFL player in at least the last 21 seasons (2000-20) with at least 7.5 sacks and 6 forced fumbles in a three-game span.
- Over the last three games the Cardinals defense has accumulated 17.0 sacks, 14 tackles for loss, eight forced fumbles and 24 QB hits.

CARDINALS-RAMS ALL-TIME SERIES

This week's matchup is the 84th all-time regular season meeting between the Cardinals and Rams. Los Angeles hold a 43-38-2 lead in the series. The rivalry between the Cardinals and Rams dates back to 1937 when the Cardinals were located in Chicago and the Rams were based in Cleveland.



Between 2006-17 the Cardinals won 15-of-22 games against the Rams, including a nine-game winning streak that is the longest in the history of the series for either team. However, Los Angeles enters this week's regular season finale having won seven in a row. The Cardinals are looking for their first win in the series since the 2016 season finale.

Arizona has held its own on the road in this series, with the teams splitting the 42 games played on the Rams home field 21-21-0.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE WEEK 13 MATCHUP

- After scoring 32 points against the Rams in the previous five meetings, the Cardinals have scored 52 points vs. Los Angeles in the last two matchups (24 in Week 17 in 2019; 28 in Week 13 in 2020). QB **Kyler Murray** (5 passing) and RB **Kenyan Drake** (2 rushing) have accounted for seven TDs in the last two games against Los Angeles.



- When the Cardinals faced Los Angeles in Week 13, Arizona scored three second-half TDs against a Rams team that had allowed just two second-half TDs in their first 11 games. Arizona's three TDs are the most allowed by the Rams in the second half of a game this season.
- Only Buffalo (35 in Week 3) scored more points vs. the Rams in a game this season than Arizona scored in Week 13 (28).
- QB **Kyler Murray** threw three TD passes against the Rams in Week 13, giving him five TD passes in his last two games against Los Angeles. Murray (3) and Tampa Bay's Tom Brady (2 in Week 11) are the only QBs to throw multiple TD passes against the Rams in their last nine games.
- TE **Dan Arnold** hauled in a career-high two TD catches against Los Angeles, including a 59-yard TD reception in the first quarter. It was the longest TD catch by a Cardinals TE since Hall of Famer Jackie Smith had a 68-yarder from Gary Cuzzo on 11/12/72 at Dallas.
- S **Budda Baker** recorded 12 tackles (10 solo) against the Rams in Week 13. Baker now has 37 tackles in his last three games against Los Angeles and had 12+ tackles in all three contests.
- RB **Kenyan Drake** had 60 rushing yards and a TD on just 12 carries (5.0 avg.) against the Rams in Week 13. In his last two games vs. Los Angeles, Drake has 141 total yards (109 rushing, 32 receiving) and two TDs on just 27 touches. He averaged 5.0 rushing yards per attempt in those two contests.

FITZGERALD'S CAREER VS. THE RAMS

Nearly 16 years and four months after playing his first-ever NFL game against the St. Louis Rams at the Edward Jones Dome, WR **Larry Fitzgerald** will play his 264th career game against those same Rams at SoFi Stadium on Sunday.



When the Cardinals face L.A. at newly-opened SoFi Stadium on Sunday, it will be the sixth different stadium in which Fitzgerald has faced the Rams.

CARDS-RAMS ON CBS

The Cardinals-Rams Week 17 matchup will air on CBS with the network's top broadcast crew of **Jim Nantz** (play-by-play), **Tony Romo** (analyst) and **Tracy Wolfson** (side-line) calling the action.



Sunday's game represents the first time that the team of Nantz, Romo and Wolfson will call a Cardinals game - regular season or postseason.

Sunday's regular season finale won't be the first time Nantz and Romo have worked together calling a Cardinals game, however. Before they called their first regular season game together in 2017, Nantz and Romo did a "shadow" broadcast of the Cardinals preseason Hall of Fame Game matchup vs. Dallas. While the live broadcast aired on NBC, Romo and Nantz went through a practice broadcast for CBS, calling the game from the makeshift booth 10 feet above the stands just behind one of the end zones at Tom Benson Hall of Fame Stadium in Canton, OH.

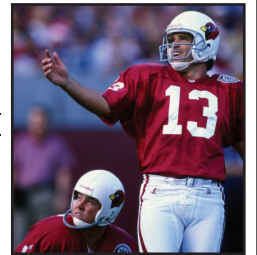
In Week 1 of the 2017 season Nantz, Romo and Wolfson called their first regular season game when the Raiders played the Titans in Tennessee.

CARDINALS PLAY-IN FLASHBACK

There are a host of games around the NFC in Week 17 that have implications for both postseason berths and playoff seeding. For the Cardinals the most crucial scenario is this: win and they are in.

With a victory over the Rams at SoFi Stadium on Sunday, Arizona would earn its first playoff berth since 2015.

Although they have made the postseason four times in the previous 12 seasons (2008-19), the Cardinals have not had a "play-in" game in the final week of the regular season since 1998.



That year, Arizona entered its pivotal Week 17 matchup vs. the San Diego Chargers with an 8-7 record and needed a win to secure the NFC's final playoff spot.

The game started off well for the Cardinals, who took a 10-0 lead early in the second quarter. The Chargers came back, however, scoring 13 of the next 16 points including 30-yard FG that tied the game at 13 with 16 seconds remaining in regulation.

The game looked destined for overtime but Cardinals return specialist Eric Metcalf returned the ensuing kickoff 46 yards to the SD 44-yard line. QB Jake Plummer hit WR Frank Sanders for 10 yards on the next play, setting up a game-winning 52-yard FG by Chris Jacke as time expired in the fourth quarter and fans stormed the field.

AZ GOES FOR FIFTH ROAD WIN OF 2020

Playing their regular season finale at Los Angeles on Sunday, the Cardinals will be looking for their fifth road win of the season. Should they defeat the Rams, Arizona would have at least five road wins in a season for just the ninth time in franchise history.

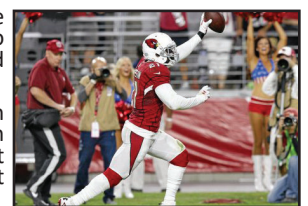

A HORN IN THE RAMS SIDE

On Sunday, CB **Patrick Peterson** will play the Rams for the 19th time and the eight-time Pro Bowler enters the game with seven INTs and three TDs (2 PR, 1 INT) against Los Angeles.

Peterson has more INTs against the Rams than he does any other opponent in his career. In fact, no active NFL player has more INTs against a single opponent than Peterson has against the Rams.

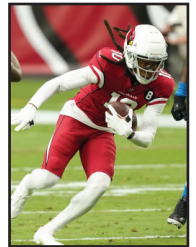

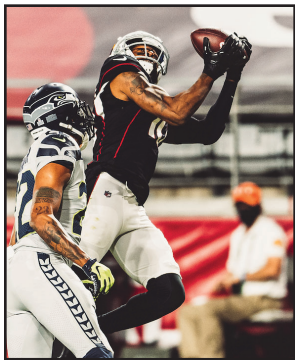

"HAIL MURRAY" NOT THE ONLY GAME-WINNER

Hopkins provided what may be the most exciting play of the 2020 season with his game-winning 43-yard "Hail Murray" TD grab against the Buffalo Bills in Week 10.

In Week 15 against Philadelphia, Hopkins posted his second game-winning TD reception this season. With the game tied at 26 midway through the fourth quarter, QB Kyle Murray hit Hopkins on a 20-yard TD pass on 3rd-n-2 to give the Cardinals the lead for good.

Hopkins now has five career game-winning TD receptions in the 4th quarter/OT - including two in his last six games this season. His "Hail Murray" grab against the Bills was the only one to come with under a minute left on the clock.

HOPKINS BRINGS IT DOWN IN SPECTACULAR FASHION

Hopkins caught seven passes for 127 yards in the victory over the Bills, **including the 43-yard game-winning TD with just 0:02 remaining in regulation in which he out-jumped three Buffalo defenders to come down with the ball.**

Hopkins' 43-yard game-winner against the Bills was the first go-ahead Hail Mary in the 4th quarter since 12/3/15 when Green Bay QB Aaron Rodgers threw a game-winning 61-yard TD to TE Richard Rodgers as time expired to give the Packers a 27-23 victory over Detroit.

It also marked the first time the Cardinals won a game on a TD pass on the final scrimmage play of regulation since Josh McCown's 28-yard TD pass to WR Nate Poole as time expired on 12/29/03 vs. Minnesota. That TD gave the Cards an 18-17 win and knocked the Vikings out of postseason contention on the final day of the regular season.



REDDICK CONTINUES SACK SPREE

Fourth-year LB **Haason Reddick** has been on an unprecedented streak in the last three games, in which he has totaled 12 tackles, 7.5 sacks, 6 forced fumbles, 7 QB hits and 3 tackles for loss. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, Reddick is the first player in at least the last 21 years (2000-20) with at least 7.5 sacks and 6 forced fumbles in a three-game span.

Reddick's 7.5 sacks in the last three games are the most in franchise history in any three-game span.

His sack, forced fumble, QB hit and tackle for loss totals are all team highs and also represent career highs for Reddick. He has more QB hits in 2020 (16) than he had in his first three NFL seasons combined (15).

Reddick is now the only player in the NFL that ranks in the top-5 in sacks (#3), tackles for loss (#5) and forced fumbles (#2) in 2020.

THREE CARDINALS NAMED TO PRO BOWL

Last week, Cardinals S **Budda Baker** and WR **DeAndre Hopkins** were selected as starters for the NFC squad at the 2021 Pro Bowl while **Kyler Murray** was one of three QBs named to the NFC team joining Aaron Rodgers and Russell Wilson.

Under this year's Pro Bowl format, there are no alternates. Below are notes on Baker, Hopkins and Murray:

S BUDDA BAKER



- Baker was selected to his third Pro Bowl, including his second in a row at safety. He earned Pro Bowl honors as a special teamer as a rookie in 2017.

- Baker (3) and CB Patrick Peterson (4) are the only players in Cardinals history to earn at least three Pro Bowl selections before their 25th birthday.

- Baker (2) now joins Larry Wilson (8), Adrian Wilson (5), Jerry Norton (3) and Tim McDonald (3) as the only Cardinals selected to multiple Pro Bowls at safety. He joins Larry Wilson (2) as the only Cardinals safeties named to multiple Pro Bowls in their first four seasons.

- Through 15 games in 2020, Baker has recorded 113 tackles (86 solo), 2.0 sacks, 2 INTs, 7 tackles for loss, 3 QB hits, 4 passes defended and a forced fumble.

- Baker has become just the seventh Cardinals player to earn at least three Pro Bowl selections in their first four seasons: HB Ollie Matson (4), CB Patrick Peterson (4), S Justin Bethel (3), G Bill Fischer (3), WR Sonny Randle (3) and FB Ron Wolfley (3).

WR DEANDRE HOPKINS



- Hopkins was selected to his fifth Pro Bowl and fourth in a row. He joins Davante Adams, Keenan Allen and Tyreek Hill as the four receivers selected to the Pro Bowl in each of the last four seasons.

- Hopkins has a franchise record 11 catches for 1,372 yards and 6 TDs in 2020. He ranks second in the NFL in receptions behind only Buffalo's Stefon Diggs (12) and ranks third in the NFL in receiving yards. His seven 100-yard receiving performances are tied for second in the NFL. He is on pace for 117 receptions in 2020, which would also set a career-high for the three-time All-Pro.

- With 111 receptions in 2020, Hopkins became the fourth Cardinals player to reach 100 catches in a season. It marks his fourth career 100-catch campaign and third in the last four years. He is one of just nine players in NFL history with at least four seasons of 100+ receptions.

- This is the 16th time that a Cardinals wide receiver has been selected to the Pro Bowl in the past 20 seasons (Fitzgerald-11, Boldin-3, Boston-1).

- Hopkins is the 20th different wide receiver in franchise history to earn a Pro Bowl selection. His selection marks the 39th all-time Pro Bowl nod for a Cardinals wide receiver.

- He joins Amari Cooper (Las Vegas, Dallas) as the only active wide receivers in the NFL to be named to the Pro Bowl in both the NFC and AFC.

QB KYLER MURRAY



- A Pro Bowl alternate as a rookie last year, Murray earns his first Pro Bowl selection this year. He becomes the eighth quarterback in franchise history to be named to the Pro Bowl and first since Carson Palmer in 2015.

- Murray is the first quarterback in franchise history to be named to the Pro Bowl within his first two NFL seasons and – at 23 years old – he is the youngest quarterback to earn a Pro Bowl selection for the Cardinals.

- Through 15 games Murray has completed 367-of-547 pass attempts (67.1%) for 3,884 yards and 26 TDs while adding 816 yards and 11 TDs rushing. His 816 rushing yards and 11 rushing TDs are franchise records for a QB.

- With 37 total TDs (passing & rushing) in 2020, Murray set the franchise record for the most total TDs in a season. Only five quarterbacks in the NFL have accounted for more TDs (passing & rushing) than Murray this season: Aaron Rodgers (47), Josh Allen (42), Russell Wilson (40), Patrick Mahomes (40) and Tom Brady (39).

- With 26 passing TDs and 11 rushing TDs in 2020, Murray has become just the second player in NFL history to post 25+ passing TDs and 10+ rushing TDs in a season, joining Cam Newton (35 TD passes; 10 TD runs in 2015).

- With 3,884 passing yards and 816 rushing yards in 2020, Murray is making a run at becoming the first player in NFL history with 4,000+ passing yards and 800+ rushing yards in a single season.

The 2021 Pro Bowl is an all-new virtual Pro Bowl experience within Madden NFL 21. Roster selections are determined by the consensus votes of fans, players and coaches. Each group's vote counts one-third toward determining the 88 All-Star players.

AWARDS KEEP COMING

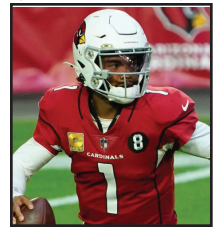
Cardinals QB **Kyler Murray** (3), WR **DeAndre Hopkins** (1), S **Budda Baker** (1) and LB **Haason Reddick** (1) have combined for six "NFC Player of the Week" awards in 2020. Baker also earned "NFC Defensive Player of the Month" honors for October.

The last time the Cardinals had more than six "Player of the Week" selections in a season was 2009 (seven).

OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK - KYLER MURRAY (WEEKS 5, 7 & 15)

Murray was named the "NFC Offensive Player of the Week" for his performance against the Jets in Week 5, vs. the Seahawks in Week 7 and vs. the Eagles in Week 15.

Murray's most recent honor - which he received following his performance against the Eagles - was his fourth career "Offensive Player of the Week" award and third this season. He is the first player in team history to be named "Player of the Week" three times in a single season



WEEK 15 VS. PHILADELPHIA: Murray completed 27-of-36 pass attempts (75.0%) for a career-high 406 yards, three TDs and a 127.8 passer rating, adding 29 yards and a rushing TD on eight carries. His 406 passing yards led the NFL in Week 15 while his three TD passes tied for the league lead.

WEEK 7 VS. SEATTLE: Murray completed a career-high 34-of-48 pass attempts (70.8%) for 360 yards, 3 TDs and a 104.5 passer rating. He also added 67 rushing yards and a TD on 14 carries. He became the first player in NFL history to throw for 350+ yards and 3+ TDs while also rushing for 50+ yards and a TD in a game.

WEEK 5 AT NY JETS: Murray completed 27-of-37 pass attempts (72.9%) for a career-high 380 yards, a TD and a passer rating of 103.4. He also ran for 31 yards and a TD on nine carries. His 380 passing yards led the NFL in Week 5 and were also the most passing yards by a Cardinals QB in a win since Carson Palmer threw for 419 yards in a 27-14 victory at Jacksonville in 2013.

DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK - LB HAASON REDDICK (WEEK 14)

LB Haason Reddick was named the "NFC Defensive Player of the Week" for his performance in the Cardinals 26-7 win over the Giants. Reddick set a franchise single-game record with 5.0 sacks while also finishing the game with five tackles and three forced fumbles. He became the first NFL player with at least 5.0 sacks and three forced fumbles in a game since Green Bay's Vonnie Holliday had 5.0 sacks and three forced fumbles in 2002.



It was Reddick's first career Player of the Week selection.

OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK - DEANDRE HOPKINS (WEEK 10)

WR DeAndre Hopkins was named the "NFC Offensive Player of the Week" following his now-famous 43-yard Hail Mary TD grab over three Bills defenders in the Cardinals 32-30 win vs. Buffalo in Week 10.

It was just the second "Player of the Week" award for Hopkins: 2015 (Week 6) with Houston.

In the win over the Bills, Hopkins caught seven passes for 127 yards, including a 43-yard game-winning TD with just 0:02 remaining in regulation. It was Hopkins fourth career game-winning TD catch in the fourth quarter/OT and the first to come with under a minute left on the clock.



MURRAY AND BAKER CLEAN UP IN OCTOBER

The Cardinals piled up the awards in the month of October. S **Budda Baker** was named "NFC Defensive Player of the Month" for October and QB **Kyler Murray** was named "NFC Offensive Player of the Week" for his Week 7 performance vs. Seattle.

Between Murray and Baker, the duo combined for three consecutive "Player of the Week" awards (Weeks 5-7) and one "Player of the Month" award.

It is just the fourth time (2015, Weeks 14-16; 2014, Weeks 8-10; 1998, Weeks 15-17) in team history that the Cardinals have had "Player of the Week" winners in three straight weeks.



DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE MONTH (OCTOBER) - S BUDDA BAKER

Baker was named the "NFC Defensive Player of the Month" for his performance in October, marking the first time in his career he has earned the honor.

He finished the month of October with 31 tackles, 2.0 sacks, 2 INTs (90 return yards), 3 TFL, 3 QB hits, 2 PD and a FF in three games played - all Arizona victories. He forced all three games with a cast on his thumb after having surgery which forced him to miss Arizona's Week 4 game at Carolina.

Baker became the first NFL player in the last seven seasons (2014-20) to record at least 30 tackles, 2.0, 2 INTs and a FF in a single calendar month.

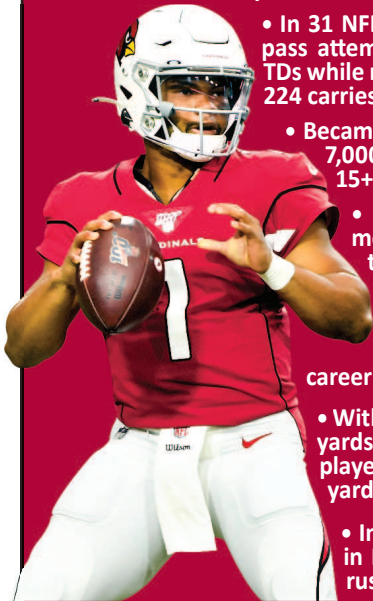
DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK - S BUDDA BAKER (WEEK 6 AT DALLAS)

Baker earned his first career "Defensive Player of the Week" after recording 7 tackles, a sack, his first career INT, a tackle for loss, two QB hits, a pass defended and a forced fumble in the Monday night victory over the Cowboys.

He became the first Cardinals player since 2003 (Renaldo Hill on 11/2 vs. Cincinnati) to record a sack, an INT and a forced fumble in the same game.

KYLER MURRAY - AT A GLANCE

- Set an NFL record for the most games with a passing and rushing TD in a season with nine in 2020. Has 10 such performances in 31 career games, trailing only Jim Hart for the team record (11 in 199 games).

- Joined Lamar Jackson (2018-19), Cam Newton (2011-12) and Josh Allen (2018-19) as the only QBs in NFL history with 500+ rushing yards in each of their first two NFL seasons.

- In Week 7 vs. Seattle, became the first player in NFL history to throw for 350+ yards and 3+ TDs while also rushing for 50+ yards and a TD in a single game. Also became the first player in team history with 300+ passing yards and 50+ rushing yards in a game.

- In Week 9 vs. Miami, rushed for 106 yards, joining Charley Trippi (145 @ Chicago on 12/16/51) as the only QBs in franchise history to rush for 100+ yards in a game. He also established single-game career highs for passer rating (150.5) and completion percentage (80.8) vs. the Dolphins.

- In 2019, became just the 6th different QB in NFL history with 3,500+ passing yards and 500+ rushing yards in a season - and just the second rookie (Cam Newton, 2011).

- Set franchise rookie records for wins by a QB (5), passing yards (3,722), TD passes (20), completions (349), attempts (542), and games with multiple TD passes (8).

- In franchise history, only Kurt Warner (3x) had a better completion percentage in a season than Murray had in 2019 (64.39).

- Became the first rookie QB in team history to start all 16 games in a season and was only rookie QB to start all 16 games in 2019 (NFL's first since 2016).

- First QB in team history to throw for 3,000+ yards and run for 500+ yards in a season.

- One of three rookies in NFL history with at least five 300-yard passing performances: Andrew Luck (6 in 2012) and Daniel Jones (5 in 2019).

- Between Weeks 4-10 last season, set an NFL rookie record with 211 consecutive pass attempts without an INT.

- Joined Cam Newton (2011) as the only QBs in NFL history to throw for 300+ yards in each of their first two career games.

- Became the first Cardinals rookie QB to start a season opener since Lamar McHan in 1954.

- Selected #1 overall by the Cardinals in the 2019 NFL Draft. Fifth player ever taken by Arizona #1 overall and first since 1958.

MURRAY PUTTING UP RARE NUMBERS

In his first 31 career games, **Murray** has completed 716-of-1,089 pass attempts (65.7%) for 7,606 yards, 46 TDs and a 90.9 passer rating. He has also rushed for 1,360 yards and 15 TDs on 224 carries (6.1 avg.).

Murray is the first player in NFL history with 7,000+ passing yards, 45+ TD passes and 15+ TD runs in his first two NFL seasons.

ARNOLD A WEAPON AT TIGHT END

TE **Dan Arnold** had the best game of his young career against the Rams in Week 13, hauling in two receptions for 61 yards - with both catches resulting in TDs. It was his first career game with multiple TD receptions.

Dating back to Week 7, Arnold has 19 receptions for 295 yards and four TDs in nine games. He has at least 50 receiving yards in three of the last nine contests.

Over the last four games Arnold has 10 receptions for 166 yards, with three of those catches resulting in TDs. After going without a TD catch in the first nine games, Arnold has four TD receptions in his last six games.

Claimed off waivers by the Cardinals in December of last season, Arnold has played in 18 games with Arizona and has 34 receptions for 494 yards (14.5 avg.) and six TDs.

Arnold hauled in two TD catches against the Rams in Week 13, including a 59-yard TD reception in the first quarter. It was the longest TD catch by a Cardinals TE since Hall of Famer Jackie Smith had a 68-yarder from Gary Cuozzo on 11/12/72 at Dallas.

In two games vs. the Rams since coming to Arizona last season, Arnold has six receptions for 137 yards (22.8 avg.) and three TDs.

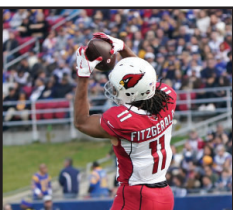

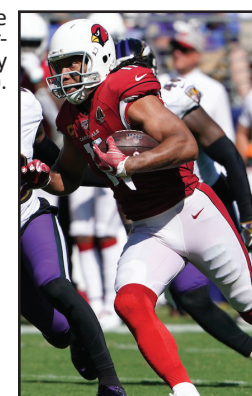

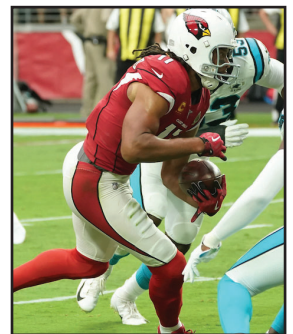

A Career Full of Accomplishments:

- Franchise career leader in receptions (1,432), receiving yards (17,492), receiving TDs (121), total TDs (121) and 100-yard receiving games (49). His nine 1,000-yard seasons are also a franchise record. His reception and receiving yardage totals both rank second in NFL history behind Jerry Rice while his 121 receiving TDs rank sixth in league annals.
- His 1,432 receptions are more than any other player in NFL history has had with a single team.
- Has 54 receptions in 2020. It marks Fitzgerald's 17th consecutive season with 50+ receptions, the longest streak in NFL history. Tony Gonzalez (16; 1998-2013) held the previous record. Fitzgerald's 17 seasons with 50+ receptions tie Jerry Rice for the most in NFL history.
- Has more receptions against the Rams (195), Seahawks (195) and 49ers (192) than any other player in NFL history vs. a single opponent.
- Led the NFL with 107 receptions in 2016, marking the second time in his career (103 in 2005; tied with Steve Smith) he had done so. He became the first player in NFL history to lead the NFL in receptions at least 11 years apart. Prior to Fitzgerald, the longest span between leading the league in receptions was six by Jerry Rice (1990, 1996).
- Led the NFL in receiving TDs in both the 2008 (12) and 2009 (13) seasons. In addition to his 10 receiving TDs in 2007, he became the first player in franchise history to record at least 10 TDs in three consecutive seasons.
- Fitzgerald (11) joins Hall of Famer Jerry Rice (13) as the only wide receivers in NFL history to be named to the Pro Bowl at least 11 times.
- Fitzgerald had more receptions in his first 200 career games (1,116) than any player in NFL history.
- One of just seven players in NFL history to record at least 1,400 receiving yards in a season four times in their career: Jerry Rice (6), Julio Jones (5), Randy Moss (4), Marvin Harrison (4), Antonio Brown (4) and Andre Johnson (4).

- Dating back to 2017, his 637 total targets, 426 receptions, 5,487 receiving yards and 291 receiving 1st downs lead the NFL. In the same span, ranks third in TD receptions (37).

- Has appeared in 125 of a possible 127 games in his NFL career and has missed just one game (in 2017) due to injury.

- Has at least one reception in all 125 career games played during the regular season, the fifth-longest active streak in the NFL.

- In 2019, had 104 receptions for 1,165 yards and seven TDs while being named to the Pro Bowl for the third consecutive year and being named 1st-team All-Pro for the third straight season.

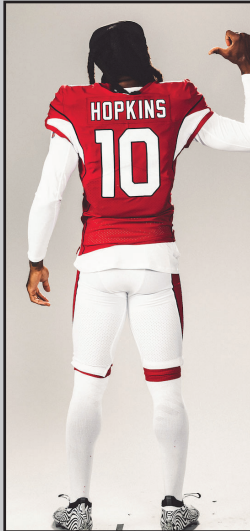

ANOTHER 1,000-YARD CAMPAIGN

With 52 yards on eight receptions in Week 13 against the Rams, WR **DeAndre Hopkins** surpassed 1,000 receiving yards on the season, marking his sixth career 1,000-yard campaign and fourth in a row.

Hopkins has the NFL's second-longest active streak of 1,000-yard seasons, trailing only Chiefs TE Travis Kelce who has reached the milestone in each of the last five seasons (2016-20).

Hopkins is the 14th different player in franchise history to reach 1,000 receiving yards in a season and the first since WR Larry Fitzgerald had 1,156 yards on a franchise-record 109 receptions in 2017. He became the second player in franchise history to reach 1,000 receiving yards in his debut season with the team (Anquan Boldin as a rookie in 2003).



21 NOW WITH 28 INTERCEPTIONS

Arizona selected CB **Patrick Peterson** with the 5th overall pick in the 2011 NFL Draft and the eight-time Pro Bowl selection has recorded 28 INTs in his career. That includes three INTs this season, putting Peterson in some elite company among all-time Cardinals defenders.

Only five players in franchise history, including four Pro Football Hall of Fame inductees, have more INTs than Peterson.

Signed to a four-year contract extension during training camp, Pro Bowl S **Budda Baker** is delivering quite the encore performance this year after a breakout campaign in 2019.

In Week 7 vs. Seattle, Baker posted a game-high 14 tackles, his second INT of the season, a tackle for loss and a pass defended in the win over Seattle. **It was a fitting end to a remarkable six-day stretch on the national stage in which the All-Pro was named a team captain, totaled 21 tackles, 2 INTs (one returned 90 yards), 1.0 sack, 2 passes defended, 2 tackles for loss, 2 QB hits, a forced fumble and an NFC "Defensive Player of the Week" award (Week 6).** The performance earn him NFC "Defensive Player of the Month" honors for October.

Baker has registered 113 tackles, 2.0 sacks, 7 tackles for loss, 2 INTs, 4 passes defended and a forced fumble in 2020. **Baker's 113 tackles rank second among all NFL DBs behind only Buffalo S Jordan Poyer (???)**.

He tallied his first career INT off Cowboys QB Andy Dalton on Monday Night Football in Week 6. Prior to that two-game stretch, the last time Baker had an INT in consecutive games was in his sophomore year at the University of Washington in 2015 when he had an INT at Stanford (10/24) and vs. Arizona (10/31).

BAKER'S CAREER THROUGH 60 GAMES

In his first four NFL seasons, Baker has started 50-of-60 games played and has posted 418 tackles (312 solo), 25 tackles for loss, 5.5 sacks, 2 INTs, 10 QB hits, five forced fumbles, four fumble recoveries and 18 passes defended.

NUGENT STEPS UP FOR THE CARDS

Veteran K **Mike Nugent** signed to the Cardinals practice squad in Week 2 as an emergency option in the event K **Zane Gonzalez** missed time due to the league's COVID-19 protocols.

With Gonzalez placed on injured reserve, Nugent was pressed into action in Week 14, and he has been perfect on all seven FGAs and six PATs in three games since being elevated. Including his two-game stint with Arizona in 2009, Nugent hasn't missed on 23 combined kicks (nine FGs and 14 PATs) as a Cardinal.

In his first appearance of the 2020 season, Nugent led the NFL in Week 14 with four FGs and scored 14 of Arizona's 26 points in the win over the Giants. It was his first NFL action in 413 days when he last played for New England.

ELEVATING A FRANCHISE

The 2020 season is the 14th since owner **Michael Bidwill** began leading the organization. His leadership during that time has been instrumental in transforming the franchise both on and off the field.

Highlights of Bidwill's tenure:

- Leading the list of Bidwill's accomplishments with the Cardinals is the creation of State Farm Stadium. In the first 14 seasons after opened in 2006, the team sold out all 144 games (preseason and postseason included) played at the world-class venue that has been awarded three Super Bowls.



- In addition to his role in helping Arizona land Super Bowls XLII and XLIX, he led the effort to land Super Bowl LVII (2023) in the spring of 2018. Michael was instrumental in getting the 2015 Pro Bowl moved to Arizona, which was played a week before Super Bowl XLIX, and the two events combined to deliver a record economic impact of \$720 million to the region.

- By the time it hosts Super Bowl LVII, State Farm Stadium will have undergone \$100 million in improvements including parking infrastructure, state-of-the-art wifi, video boards, sound system upgrades and club-area enhancements since it staged Super Bowl XLIX.

- Of the Cardinals seven all-time postseason wins, five have come with Bidwill leading the team. Arizona has played in nine postseason contests over the last 13 seasons, after playing just seven prior to his tenure as team president.

- AZ has appeared in the NFC Championship Game twice since 2008, including a victory in the 2008 conference title game that led to the team's first-ever Super Bowl appearance (Super Bowl XLIII).

- In January of 2018, Michael was one of five owners named to the NFL's Player-Owner Committee focused on social and racial justice initiatives. In December of 2014, Commissioner Roger Goodell tapped Bidwill to chair the league's Conduct Committee.

- In January of 2019, Michael received the Paul Tagliabue Award from the Fritz Pollard Alliance for demonstrating integrity and leadership in the area of career development for minorities and advocating for diversity.

Steve Keim was promoted to GM on January 8, 2013 after 14 seasons in the Cardinals organization. The team has experienced unprecedented success during his tenure as GM. The teams put together by Keim have been some of the most successful in franchise history.



- In 2014, the Cardinals tied the franchise record for wins in a season (11) before setting a new mark in 2015 when Arizona won 13 games and earned its first-ever postseason bye.

- During Keim's tenure, Arizona has established franchise records for wins in a season (13 in 2015), points in a season (489 in 2015), led the NFL in total offense for the first time in team history (#1 in 2015) and led the NFL in sacks for the second time ever (48.0 in 2016).

- Selected QB **Kyler Murray** with the #1 overall pick in the 2019 NFL Draft. Murray was named the NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year following a record-setting season.

- Among the trades negotiated by Keim during his tenure as GM are the acquisition of QB **Carson Palmer** from Oakland in 2013, acquiring LB **Chandler Jones** from New England in 2016 and the trade that landed WR **DeAndre Hopkins** from Houston in 2020. During the 2019 season, Keim also orchestrated a trade with Miami for RB **Kenyan Drake**.

- Arizona has featured a top-10 defense four times and a top-10 offense twice dating back to Keim's first season as GM. The Cardinals had a top-10 defense in three consecutive seasons (2015-17) for the first time since the 1970 merger.

- Named *Sporting News* 2014 NFL Executive of the Year and earned back-to-back NFL Executive of the Year honors from *Pro Football Talk* (2013-14).

CARDINALS TAKE PART IN PUSH FOR JUSTICE

Throughout the 2020 season, Cardinals players and coaches are joining the rest of the NFL in honoring and memorializing victims of systemic racism and showing their support for Social Justice efforts by displaying names or phrases as decals on the back of their helmets and patches on their caps.



The season-long effort highlights the actions being taken to reach solutions, engages fans to act and gives players and coaches a platform on gameday to share their voice and efforts to inspire change. Together, the NFL is joining its players and coaches in building awareness, educating fans and paying homage to those who deserve to have their legacies live on.

CARDINALS SPEAKING UP

Numerous Cardinals players spoke up about their own experiences and the importance of making meaningful change a reality in the United States.

OL Kelvin Beachum - 11/20/20

OL **Kelvin Beachum** participated in an NFL-produced video "Say Their Stories" and discussed Breonna Taylor specifically:

"Saying her name is not just a slogan that we're putting on the back of our helmets. It's more than that. It's a rallying cry for Black women all across America, to realize how special she is and how special she was."

DL Corey Peters - 8/28/20

DL **Corey Peters** spoke about how important it is that everyone engage in the conversations and understand other viewpoints:

"One thing we want to do is be sensitive to one another, have compassion for one another, and we can disagree with certain things peacefully and all work towards the same goal of not only winning but make this a better country for everybody."

OL D.J. Humphries - 8/28/20

OL **D.J. Humphries** spoke about his children being a major motivator in trying to help bring about change:

"I know how to accept what the world has for you. I know how to maneuver in this world. But for my children, that's not what I want. I want my children to grow up in a fair world and grow up in a world where what the Constitution says is how it really is."

Head Coach Kliff Kingsbury - 8/27/2020

Kingsbury talked about what the Cardinals players and coaches have been discussing and learning from each other during recent events across the country:

"I had a great conversation with my dad over the summer, and his perspective on things that was really valuable as we get closer to the season – the anthem, discussions and things of that nature."

"My dad was a longtime football coach but also a Marine. He served in Vietnam, received a Purple Heart. Talking to him, there were two words that really stood out. One was respect, and the second thing was understanding. Respect viewpoints people have on this topic. They're very personal and very passionate. And respect their right to express themselves."

"You've got to understand, at its core, what this is really about. It's always been about drawing attention to the social injustice that continues to take place. We saw it again this week with Jacob Blake. It's about increasing awareness that racism exists, police brutality against people of color continues to happen, and let's not confuse it with something else and make the narrative different."

"My biggest takeaway from talking to my dad is that kneeling doesn't reflect a lack of patriotism or respect for the military in any way, just like standing during the anthem doesn't mean you're OK with racism or social injustice. It's important to respect and understand that. These are important issues that need to be addressed, and important conversations that need to be had. I'm grateful that I've been able to be around a great group of guys that have enlightened me – hearing their stories and their struggles. Those conversations will continue throughout the year. I just hope we can all continue to push in the right direction."

QB Kyler Murray - 6/17/20

Following the death of George Floyd and the resulting protests around the country, Murray spoke the change he saw happening in real time:

"There is a lot of hate in this world, but at the same time, what's happening and what we're seeing right now, it's huge. I don't condone rioting and stuff like that, but the peaceful protests, I think they're great, they're amazing. Whether it takes years, I feel like we're getting there. At least we're making a step towards it."

CARDINALS COVID-19 RELIEF EFFORTS (TEAM INITIATIVES)

Since the COVID-19 pandemic hit the country earlier this year the effects of the outbreak have reached every corner of the U.S. and has had a devastating impact on citizens and businesses across the nation. The Cardinals organization – along with the players and staff – immediately mobilized to donate time, money and other resources throughout Arizona to assist the individuals, businesses, schools, frontline health care personnel and other organizations that have been so greatly affected by the crisis.

\$1 MILLION FOUNDING CONTRIBUTION TO THE AZ CORONAVIRUS RELIEF FUND

On March 24, the Cardinals made a \$1 million founding contribution to the AZ Coronavirus Relief Fund. As part of the Arizona Together initiative launched earlier that day by Governor Doug Ducey, the fund was set up established to provide financial support to organizations working to mitigate the impacts of COVID-19 in Arizona. Initially, it focused on the following immediate needs:

- Funding of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) for frontline medical personnel.
- Non-profit organizations that support the most vulnerable Arizonans through food banks, homeless shelters, domestic violence facilities, and other services.
- Providing disadvantaged students with the technology necessary to transition to online learning.

“Like so many in our community, this unprecedented crisis has us asking what we can do to help and what might have the greatest impact,” said Cardinals Owner **Michael Bidwill** said of the donation. “We are grateful for the creation of this relief fund, and proud to support its critically important mission and hope that others throughout the community can join this effort in whatever way that they are able. As a team, we will continue to work on additional ways to make a difference and know that as a community we will get through this challenging time together.”

To assist local businesses during the crisis, the Cardinals made a \$100,000 donation to Local First Arizona, Arizona’s Coronavirus Micro Grant Fund

MILLION MEALS DONATION TO LOCAL FOOD BANKS



In early April, the Cardinals and State Farm partnered on an historic initiative to address a pressing local need arising from the COVID-19 pandemic. The number of people seeking assistance from local food banks more than doubled as a result of the unparalleled crisis. Unfortunately, the number of donations to them decreased just as dramatically.

As part of their on-going commitment to improve the local community, State Farm and the Cardinals helped tackle the issue by donating over a million 1,000,000 meals that were distributed to five non-profit organizations throughout the Valley. The five groups involved in the “Million Meal” donation were:

- St. Mary’s Food Bank
- St. Vincent DePaul
- United Food Bank
- Phoenix Rescue Mission
- Midwest Food Bank

ORGANIZATION LAUNCHES “CARDINALS CARRY-OUT” INITIATIVE TO ASSIST INDEPENDENT, LOCALLY OWNED RESTAURANTS



On April 13 the team launched “Cardinals Carry-out” - an unprecedented initiative with a dual purpose: assist independent, locally-owned restaurants hit hard by the coronavirus crisis and recognize those working on the front lines of the pandemic in the medical community, law enforcement and emergency services.

Cardinals players and fans nominated their favorite establishments for inclusion on the team’s interactive statewide map and supported them with take-out business.

In the spirit of the NFL Draft, the team selected establishments from the map each day and purchased meals which were delivered to nurses, doctors, first responders and others who work daily to combat the impact of COVID-19.

When it was launched, the first 47 establishments on the map reflected the favorites of Cardinals players and staff as well as those near area hospitals suggested by Local First Arizona. Within the first week, over 800 restaurants throughout the state have been added based on recommendations from fans.

“It’s great that a major sports team would put together such a thing that is community driven and helps restaurants navigate these tough times...we’re kind of in survival mode but we’re going to make it out,” said **Chris Hove**, owner of Perfect Pear Bistro in Chandler which was recommended by defensive lineman **Zach Allen**.

HOSTING CRITICAL BLOOD DRIVES, DRIVE-THROUGH TESTING AND PPE DRIVES AT STATE FARM STADIUM

One area hit particularly hard by the COVID-19 crisis was the local blood donation community, where the supply reached critically low levels during a crucial time in March. In a seven-day span between March 19 and March 26, nearly 200 blood drives in Arizona were cancelled, resulting in the loss of more than 5,000 blood donations for hospital patients.

To assist in meeting this direly pressing need, the Cardinals partnered with Dignity Health and Cigna to host a major one-day blood drive at State Farm Stadium. In conjunction with Scottsdale-based Vitalant (pronounced “vye-TAL-ent” and formerly known as United Blood Services) the event took place at State Farm Stadium on March 31. All donation slots for the drive were filled within hours of the event being announced.

The outpouring of support from the community resulted in two additional blood drives being scheduled at State Farm Stadium. On back-to-backs on April 7-8, in conjunction with the American Red Cross, the Cardinals partnered with Anheuser-Busch to host blood drives at State Farm Stadium and all donation slots were again filled.

On April 15, the Cardinals and Project C.U.R.E hosted a Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) drive at State Farm Stadium. The event was to help collect equipment for use by those in the local healthcare community, including eye protection, face shields, surgical masks, N95 masks, gloves, shoe covers and hand sanitizer.

In May, the Cardinals and Dignity Health partnered to participate in the state’s drive-through COVID-19 testing blitz by hosting events open to the public at State Farm Stadium.



CARDINALS COVID-19 RELIEF EFFORTS (PLAYER INITIATIVES)

KLIFF KINGSBURY – \$50,000 DONATION TO THE NAVAJO RELIEF FUND (NRF)

The Native American population in Arizona was hit particularly hard by the COVID-19 outbreak and the Cardinals head coach was among the many who stepped up to help. In April, Kingsbury donated \$50,000 to the Navajo Relief Fund to assist one of the communities that was most affected – the Navajo Nation. The NRF was established to help with the shortage of healthy food, safe drinking water, healthcare and supply stores in remote reservation communities. During the pandemic, the fund served as urgent need in making available food, water and other basic supplies.

DEANDRE HOPKINS – \$150,000 DONATION TO THE ARIZONA CORONAVIRUS RELIEF FUND; #THEREALHEROES PROJECT

It didn't take long for the All-Pro wideout to make a significant impact in Arizona. On March 27, 2020 - just a week after being acquired by the Cardinals — Hopkins announced a \$150,000 donation to the AZ Coronavirus Relief Fund, which was established to provide financial support to multiple organizations trying to deal with the impact of COVID-19. Money raised by Arizona Relief Fund goes to purchasing Personal Protective Equipment for medical personnel working with the coronavirus patients; supporting non-profits that aid the most vulnerable such as food banks, homeless shelters and domestic violence facilities; and providing technology for disadvantaged students needed for online learning.

Hopkins was among the sports stars who participated in a national project to recognize and celebrate health care workers for their efforts on the front lines of the coronavirus pandemic. "The Real Heroes Project" was a collaboration involving Hopkins and athletes from a combined 14 leagues. Others include New Orleans Saints QB Drew Brees, New York Yankees All-Star outfielder Aaron Judge, U.S. women's soccer stars Carli Lloyd and Alex Morgan, and Hockey Hall of Famer Wayne Gretzky. In the PSA – which was released on National Nurses Day - Hopkins recognized local nurse Tracy Thomas, an RN at Dignity Health St. Joseph's Hospital and Medical Center. She was selected in recognition of the incredible work she has done leading the COVID-19 Response



CHANDLER JONES – DONATED 150,000 MEALS TO FOOD BANKS IN ARIZONA AND NEW YORK

In late March, the Cardinals All-Pro LB donated over 150,000 meals to food banks in both Arizona and his hometown of Endicott, NY to assist with families affected by the Coronavirus outbreak. Jones provided meals to St. Mary's Food Bank and Midwest Food Bank of Arizona while also donating to Mother Teresa's Cupboard through the Catholic Charities of Broome County in New York.

JORDAN HICKS – \$100,000 TO IMPACT CHURCH COVID-19 RELIEF EFFORTS; ANIMAL ADOPTION INITIATIVE

Following a career year on the field in his first season with Arizona, Hicks joined his wife, Ivana, to announce in April that they would match and donate up to \$100,000 to their church in Scottsdale – Impact Church – to assist single mothers during the pandemic. Those efforts included providing meals and helping cover rent and mortgage payments. Hicks' donation also helped facilitate a COVID-19 drive-through testing initiative at the church that saw over 500 people receive free tests.

Hicks and his wife also organized an animal adoption campaign in Austin that saw 260 animals adopted in under a week. The couple partnered with Austin (TX) Pets Alive to provide new pet owners with a care package that included a crate, pet food, treats, a leash and a toy.

KYLER MURRAY – \$25,000 DONATION TO GENYOUth FOR ITS COVID-19 EMERGENCY SCHOOL NUTRITION FUND

With schools across the country closed because of the coronavirus, the reigning NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year stepped up in April to help children who counted on school meals to be fed on a daily basis. He donated \$25,000 to GENYOUth for its COVID-19 Emergency School Nutrition Fund, which was established to provide resources that allowed school meal programs to continue despite school closures.

ISAIAH SIMMONS – DONATED 60,000 MEALS TO HARVEST COMPASSION CENTERS IN ARIZONA

Within a week of becoming the #8 overall pick in the 2020 NFL Draft, the former Clemson star was already reaching out to help people in Arizona struggling as a result of the pandemic. Simmons teamed up with the Cardinals and Bose to donate 60,000 meals to the Harvest Compassion Center for its facilities in Phoenix, Maryvale and Chandler. Harvest Compassion Center is a food and clothing bank dedicated to providing a hope-filled environment to the underserved in the greater Phoenix area. HCC locations offer free food, hygiene, baby, home and clothing items to the many Arizonans living below the poverty line.

LARRY FITZGERALD – DELIVERING MEALS TO HEALTHCARE WORKERS AND FRONTLINE STAFF

One of the most prolific WRs in NFL history, Fitzgerald long ago set the standard for making an impact in the community – and those efforts continued during the COVID-19 outbreak. In late April, he teamed with Steak 44, Ocean 44 and Dominick's to deliver meals to healthcare workers all over the Valley. In addition to helping those who have gone above-and-beyond to serve the community during the pandemic, it also served as a very personal cause for Fitzgerald, who's late mother, Carol, was a nurse.

COREY PETERS – STARTED VIRTUAL BOOK CLUB FOR ARIZONA HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

A passionate advocate for reading, the Cardinals starting DT set up an in-person book club a few years ago. When the pandemic hit, forcing the closure of schools and the enforcement of social distancing, Peters saw an opportunity to make the book club virtual. So in May, he launched the virtual book club "The Corey Peterson Playbook" to help provide an educational outlet for all Arizona high school students during the COVID-19 crisis.

PATRICK PETERSON – DONATED TO ARIZONA FIRST RESPONDERS ON MEMORIAL DAY WEEKEND

With Memorial Day occurring in the middle of the pandemic, the Cardinals All-Pro helped keep the spirit of the holiday when he teamed with Pit Boss Grills to donate grill products and gift cards to Arizona first responders. Peterson had his followers on social media nominate a first responder of their choice and he selected three winners on Memorial Day who each received a new top-of-the-line grill, grilling products and a gift card from Bashas supermarket.

DEVON KENNARD – DELIVERED MEALS TO FOUR VALLEY FIRE DEPARTMENTS; VIRTUAL HOSPITAL VISITS

In May, Arizona native – and Cardinals 2020 free agent signing – Kennard gave back to his hometown when he teamed with Salad and Go to provide dinner for firefighters at four different fire stations in the Ahwatukee area.

Every year Cardinals players and staff make numerous visits to Phoenix Children's Hospital to lift the spirits of the children and their families in pediatric units. Due to COVID-19 and the resulting safety restrictions, those visits have taken a new form. In late August, Kennard became the first Cardinals player to take the controls of a telepresence robot in order to spend time with children at PCH. While Kennard was at training camp at State Farm Stadium, he was able to drive the robot through the halls of PCH and interact with children through a video monitor.
