



ARIZONA CARDINALS NOTE CARDS

- 10** Games in which WR Larry Fitzgerald has posted 100+ receiving yards against the 49ers. In NFL history, only Jerry Rice (11 vs. the Falcons) had more 100-yard performances against a single team. No active player has more career 100-yard receiving performances than Fitzgerald (46).
- 16** Receptions for rookie WR Christian Kirk so far this season, a team high. Kirk leads all rookie WRs in receptions in 2018 and has 15 total catches in his last three games.
- 5** TDs for RB David Johnson in his last three games against San Francisco. Johnson has multiple TDs in each of his last two games played against the 49ers. The last time Johnson played at Levi's Stadium (10/6/16) he posted 185 total yards (157 rushing, 28 receiving) and two TDs.
- 87.1** Grade given to rookie QB Josh Rosen by ProFootballFocus.com following his first career NFL start last week. It was the best starting debut for a rookie QB since the site began grading in 2006.

WITH A WIN...

- The Cardinals would extend their winning streak against the 49ers to seven straight. Arizona's current six-game win streak is the longest in its history against San Francisco.
- Arizona would have a four-game winning streak and improve to 4-1 all-time at Levi's Stadium.

MILESTONES WITHIN REACH...

WR LARRY FITZGERALD

- With a catch, Fitzgerald would have at least one reception in 216 consecutive games, the second-longest streak in NFL history behind only Jerry Rice (274). He would have at least one catch in 222 of 223 career games.
- With a TD reception, Fitzgerald would have 111 TD catches in his career. That would tie Tony Gonzalez for seventh place on the NFL's all-time list for career receiving TDs.
- With seven catches, Fitzgerald would become the first player in NFL history with 170+ receptions against multiple opponents. Fitzgerald has 179 career receptions vs. the Rams.
- With 100 receiving yards, Fitzgerald would have 11 career 100-yard games against the 49ers. That would tie Jerry Rice (11 vs. the Falcons) for the most in NFL history against a single opponent.

RB DAVID JOHNSON

- With a TD (of any kind), Johnson would have six TDs in his last four games against the 49ers. It would also give Johnson 31 TDs in his last 29 games played dating back to the 2015 season.
- With a rushing TD, Johnson would have 27 career rushing TDs. That would tie Johnny Roland and Elmer Angsman for fifth place on the Cardinals all-time list. It would also give Johnson 19 rushing TDs in his last 22 games.
- With two TDs (of any kind), Johnson would have 38 total TDs in 38 career games played. Only eight players in NFL history - including five Hall of Famers - would have more through their first 38 games.

DE CHANDLER JONES

- With a sack, Jones would have at least one sack in 26 of 37 games with the Cardinals. Jones would also have four sacks in his last four games played against the 49ers.

CB PATRICK PETERSON

- With an INT, Peterson would have 23 INTs in his career. Only seven players in team history would have more.

WR CHRISTIAN KIRK

- With a TD (of any kind), Kirk would become just the fifth Arizona native ever to score a TD for the Cardinals - and the first since TE Todd Heap in 2011.
- With four receptions, Kirk would become just the fourth rookie in franchise history with 20+ receptions through his first five career games, joining Anquan Boldin (33 in 2003), Larry Fitzgerald (22 in 2004) and Gern Nagler (26 in 1953).

K PHIL DAWSON

- Against the 49ers on Sunday, Dawson will appear in his 300th career game. He will become just the 11th player in NFL history to reach 300 games.

TE RICKY SEALS-JONES

- With a TD reception, Jones would have five TD catches in his career. Only two TEs in franchise history would have more in their first two NFL seasons: Rob Awalt (10, 1987-88) and Jackie Smith (6, 1963-64).

S TRE BOSTON

- With an INT, Boston would have 10 career INTs, seven of which would have come in his last 21 games played dating back to last season.

GOING FOR 7 IN A ROW

The Cardinals enter Sunday's game with a six-game winning streak against the 49ers, having swept the season series between the division rivals in each of the last three seasons (2015-17). Only three teams have longer active win streaks against division opponents.

The Cardinals six straight victories over the 49ers represent the team's longest winning streak in the history of the series.

In the previous 16 seasons they have been division rivals (2002-17), the Cardinals have won the season series eight times. Arizona hasn't lost the season series vs. the 49ers since 2010.

RECORDS FROM SAN FRANCISCO TO ARIZONA

There aren't many NFL players who can claim to hold franchise records for multiple teams. Current Cardinals - and former 49ers - P **Andy Lee** is one of them. He owns the franchise single-season record for punting average for both the Cardinals (47.3 yards in 2017) and 49ers (50.9 yards in 2011).



Originally selected by San Francisco in the sixth round (188th overall) out of Pittsburgh in 2004, Lee was one of best punters in the NFL during his 11 seasons with the 49ers. He set virtually every franchise career and single-season punting record while playing for the team from 2004-14.

Six years after establishing the 49ers single-season record for punting average, Lee set the Cardinals franchise record during his first season with Arizona in 2017.

Now in his 15th NFL season in 2018, Lee is having one of his best years as a pro. *He currently ranks second in the NFL with a 51.0-yard gross punting average.*

Lee is the only punter in the NFL this season that has averaged 50.0+ yards per punt in each of the season's first four games.

DOESN'T PAY TO THROW AT PETERSON

In 2017, Cardinals All-Pro CB **Patrick Peterson** saw the fewest number of targets (60) and allowed the fewest receptions (21) among all NFL CBs with 500+ snaps, according to ProFootballFocus.com.

This season, Peterson has forced opposing QBs into a 30.1 passer rating when throwing in his direction. That is the lowest in the NFL among CBs with at least 100 snaps in 2018. Also among the top-5 is San Francisco's Richard Sherman.

According to PFF.com, Peterson has allowed two receptions or fewer in three of Arizona's four games this season, allowing no receptions in Week 1 (vs. Was) and just one catch for five yards last week (vs. Sea).
