## ARIZONA CARDINALS (6-3) VS. SEATTLE SEAHAWKS (6-3) CenturyLink Field | November 19, 2020 | 6:20 PM



### THIS WEEK'S PREVIEW

Following a month-long three-game home stand the Cardinals are back on the road this week as they head west to face the Seahawks on Thursday Night Football. This will be the second primetime matchup between the division rivals in a span of five weeks (SNF in Week 7).

The Cardinals earned a 37-34 OT victory in the first matchup this season, snapping a seven-game winless streak at home against the Seahawks. Much more favorable to Arizona in recent years has been CenturyLink Field, where the Cardinals are 4-1 in their last five visits. Arizona has twice as many wins at CenturyLink Field (8) as any other visiting team since the venue opened in 2002. The Cardinals earned a 27-13 victory in their last trip to Seattle in Week 16 last season.

A win this week - coupled with the victory over Seattle in Week 7 - would give Arizona its first season sweep of the Seahawks since 2016. With the Cardinals, Rams and Seahawks all currently sitting at 6-3, a win would also guarantee Arizona at least a share of the NFC West lead heading into Week 12. The Rams will be taking on the Buccaneers on Monday Night Football in Week 11.

The Cardinals continue to be led by second-year QB **Kyler Murray**, who is having a record-breaking season on the ground and through the air. One of his most memorable performances of the season came in AZ's win over Seattle on SNF when he became the first player in NFL history to throw for 350+ yards and 3+ TDs while also rushing for 50+ yards and a TD in a single game.

Murray is at the helm of a Cardinals offense that ranks #1 in the NFL in both total offense and rushing offense in 2020. Arizona is averaging 425.4 total yards and 168.9 rushing yards per game this season. The Cardinals leading rusher this season is RB **Kenyan Drake**, who this week makes his return to CenturyLink Field where he had a career-best 166 rushing yards in Week 16 last season.

As it was able to do in the second half of their first meeting, the Cardinals defense will be tasked with trying to slow down the NFL's #1 ranked scoring offense and QB **Russell Wilson**, who leads all NFL QBs with 29 total TDs (rushing & passing) this season. Murray is right behind him, however, tied for second with 27 total TDs. Arizona's Week 7 win over Seattle marked just the fourth time in Wilson's 137 career starts that he threw at least three INTs in a game. Two of those three INTs came in the second half as the Cardinals held Seattle to just seven points in the final two quarters and OT.

Following this week's game, Arizona heads to the opposite side of the country to face the Patriots in New England.

### PRIMETIME BATTLE OUT WEST

Currently in a three-way tie for first place in the NFC West, the Cardinals travel to Seattle in Week 11 for a Thursday night showdown with the Seahawks.

Arizona heads to Seattle looking to improve to 3-0 in the division and to secure a season-sweep of the Seahawks.

### #AZvsSEA - WEEK 11 HIGHLIGHTS

- The Cardinals earned a thrilling and unforgettable come-from-behind 32-30 victory over the Bills last Sunday. With the win, Arizona improved to 6-3 on the season and is off to its best start through nine games since going 7-2 in 2015. With seven games remaining in 2020, the Cardinals have already eclipsed their win total from last season (5).
- Arizona enters Week 11 with the NFL's #1 ranked offense (425.4 yards/game), #1 ranked rushing attack (168.9 yards/game) and tied for #6 in the NFL in scoring offense (29.6 points/game).
- The Cardinals and Seahawks are two of four teams in the NFL this season averaging 400+ total yards of offense per game. Arizona ranks #1 averaging 425.5 yards/game and Seattle ranks #3 averaging 405.9 yards/game.
- Arizona is one of just five teams in the NFL that ranks in the top-10 in points scored/game and points allowed/game this season: Pittsburgh, Miami, Kansas City and Tampa Bay. Those five teams have a combined 36-10 record. The Cardinals are tied for #6 in the NFL in points/game (29.6) and rank #9 in points allowed/game (23.3).
- With 2,375 passing yards and 604 rushing yards, QB **Kyler Murray** is on pace to become the first player in NFL history with 4,000 passing yards and 1,000 rushing yards in a season. Murray is on pace to finish with 4,222 & 1,074.
- Prior to last week's win over the Bills, the Cardinals had gone 133 consecutive games without a win when trailing by 14+ points in the second half. Arizona came back to beat Buffalo despite trailing 23-9 as late as 6:00 remaining in the third quarter. The Cardinals began their game-winning drive trailing by four with 0:34 left in regulation.

## CARDINALS-SEAHAWKS CONNECTIONS

Cardinals Pro Bowl S **Budda Baker** – named a team captain in Week 6 – has been one of the NFL's best defenders this season. The NFC Defensive Player of the Month for October ranks second among NFL DBs with 73 tackles this year, and since the start of last season, he leads all DBs by a wide margin with 220 total tackles and 146 solo stops.



This week, Arizona travels to Baker's home state of Washington, where the Cardinals standout earned countless accolades for his performance in both high school (Bellevue) and college (Univ. of Washington). Baker's hometown of Bellevue is just 10 miles from CenturyLink Field.

In three seasons with the Huskies, Baker appeared in 40 games and totaled 200 tackles, 13.5 tackles for loss, 4.0 sacks, five INTs, 24 passes defended and three forced fumbles. During his junior season in 2016, Baker totaled 70 tackles, 9.5 tackles for loss, 3.0 sacks and two INTs.

## UNCOMMON SUCCESS AT CENTURYLINK

CenturyLink Field has a well-earned reputation as one of the toughest venues in the NFL for visiting teams. Over the last eight seasons (2013-20), Seattle has the third-best home winning percentage in the NFL (.733).



They have a 44-16 record at home during that stretch, including a 4-0 record in 2020. The Cardinals, however, have been responsible for nearly a third of those losses (5). Arizona has a 5-2 record at CenturyLink Field dating back to 2013, including a 4-1 record in its last five visits. Seattle is 42-11 at home against the rest of the NFL since '13.

Arizona has eight wins at CenturyLink Field, twice as many as any other visiting team since the venue opened in 2002.

Although both teams have traditionally enjoyed a significant home field advantage, the series between the Cardinals and Seahawks has been an exception. Dating back to 2013, Arizona is 5-2 playing at Seattle and 1-6-1 at home vs. the Seahawks. The Cardinals were winless at home in seven straight games vs. Seattle before winning 37-34 in OT in Week 7 earlier this season.

### THE LAST VISIT TO CENTURYLINK

The Cardinals earned a 27-13 win over the Seahawks in Week 16 last season. It remains tied for the biggest point differential in a home loss for the Seahawks in the last nine seasons (2012-20).

## ALL-TIME SERIES

The matchup between the Cardinals and Seahawks this week represents the 44<sup>th</sup> meeting between the division rivals.

The first 43 games in his series were split evenly, with the all-time series tied 21-21-1. The Cardinals are 11-11-0 on the road at Seattle and 10-10-1 at home vs. the Seahawks.

Having earned a 37-34 OT victory over the Seahawks in Week 7, the Cardinals are aiming for their fourth season sweep of Seattle since the teams became division foes in 2002.



In the first 18 seasons (2002-19) as division rivals, the Cardinals and Seahawks split the season series nine times, including in six of the last nine seasons. Arizona has won the season series three times (most recently in 2016) and Seattle four times (most recently in 2018).

## FITZGERALD'S CAREER VS. SEATTLE

On Thursday, WR **Larry Fitzgerald** will play his 33<sup>rd</sup> career game against the Seahawks. In his first 32 games vs. Seattle, the 11-time Pro Bowl selection recorded 187 receptions for 2,179 yards and 13 TDs.

Fitzgerald has more career receptions and receiving yards against the Seahawks than any other player in NFL history.

Fitzgerald's reception totals against the Seahawks (187), Rams (195), 49ers (186) are the three highest in NFL history against a single opponent.

### FITZGERALD GOES FOR ROAD STADIUM RECEPTIONS RECORD

Fitzgerald has 660 career receptions at State Farm Stadium, the most in NFL history in a single stadium. With 82 career receptions at CenturyLink Field, he needs just two catches to pass Reggie Wayne (83 receptions at IIAA Bank Field while playing for Indianapolis) for the most receptions in NFL history in a road venue.

## A PRIMETIME PERFORMER

In three career primetime starts, QB **Kyler Murray** has accounted for 964 yards and 9 TDs.

He has completed 60-of-96 pass attempts (62.5%) for 789 yards, 7 TDs, 1 INT and a 108.4 passer rating in primetime games. He also rushed for 175 yards and 2 TDs.

After leading the Cardinals to back-to-back primetime wins over the Cowboys (Week 6) and Seahawks (Week 7), Murray is 2-1 in primetime games in his career.

## CARDS WIN THRILLER IN LAST MATCHUP

The Cardinals defeated the previously unbeaten Seahawks 37-34 in OT at State Farm Stadium on Sunday Night Football in Week 7. Arizona came out on top in a wild affair in which the Cardinals never led in regulation or OT until kicking the game-winning FG with 0:15 remaining in OT.



- Seattle entered the game with a 30-0 record when leading by 10+ points at halftime in the regular season with Russell Wilson as the starter.
- The contest marked just the fourth time in Wilson's 137 career starts that he threw at least three INTs in a game. Arizona became the first team to record at least three INTs off Wilson since the Jaguars had three on 12/10/17.
- Wilson entered the game having thrown just three INTs on 169 pass attempts in Seattle's first five games in 2020 - all wins.
- With the victory, the Cardinals snapped a seven-game winless streak at home against the Seahawks and earned their first win over Seattle at State Farm Stadium since 2012.
- Arizona handed the Seahawks just their eighth loss in 40 primetime games under Pete Carroll. Seattle entered the game with a 31-7-1 record in primetime and their .808 winning percentage was the best in the NFL.

## ARIZONA BACK UNDER THE BRIGHT LIGHTS

Arizona returns to primetime when they travel to Seattle for a divisional showdown against the Seahawks at CenturyLink Field.

Thursday's game marks the second primetime matchup between the Cardinals and Seahawks in 2020. Arizona defeated Seattle 37-34 in OT on Sunday Night Football in Week 7.

This will mark the third all-time Thursday night meeting between Seattle and Arizona and the seventh prime time matchup between the Cardinals and Seahawks in the last eight seasons.

When they travel to Seattle this week, the Cardinals will be looking for their third primetime win in 2020. Only once in franchise history has Arizona won at least three primetime games in a single season (5 in 2015).



### CARDS SHINE IN PRIMETIME IN 2020

The Cardinals played back-to-back games in primetime in a six-day stretch that saw the team earn victories over Dallas (Monday Night Football) and Seattle (Sunday Night Football) in Weeks 6-7.

The win over Seattle on Sunday Night Football in Week 7 was the Cardinals 14<sup>th</sup> primetime victory dating back to 2008. In 38 seasons between 1970-2007, the Cardinals had 10 total primetime wins.

The 2020 season marks the first time in franchise history the Cardinals have won on Monday Night Football and Sunday Night Football in consecutive weeks.

With the victories over Dallas and Seattle, Arizona won primetime games in consecutive weeks for just the fourth time in franchise history – and for the first time since 2016 (Week 5 @ SF on TNF; Week 6 vs. NYJ on MNF).

The victory over Dallas was the Cardinals third-ever road win on Monday Night Football and first since 1977. Arizona is 4-1 in its last five appearances on MNF. The Cardinals have as many wins in their last five MNF appearances (4) as they had in their previous 20 (4).

Arizona will wear its "Color Rush" uniforms on Thursday Night Football this week.

It will be Arizona's fourth time wearing its "Color Rush" uniform. The team unveiled them for the first time in 2017 when they faced the Seahawks on TNF.

The "Color Rush" alternate jersey for all 32 teams was introduced in 2016, when each team had an alternate uniform specially designed for their appearance on Thursday Night Football.

For every Color Rush jersey purchased by fans, 100% of the proceeds go to the NFL Foundation to support youth football and health and wellness programs across the country.

## WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN WEEK 11

### WITH A WIN THIS WEEK...

- Arizona would improve to 3-0 in primetime games in 2020. It would mark just the second time in franchise history (5 in 2015) the Cardinals won at least three primetime games in a single season.
- The Cardinals would earn a season sweep of the Seahawks for first time since 2016. Arizona would also improve to 3-0 in the division in 2020.
- Arizona would earn their ninth victory at CenturyLink Field and would improve to 5-1 in its last six visits to the Seahawks home field.

### MILESTONES WITHIN REACH

#### QB Kyle Murray

- With a rushing TD, Murray would establish a franchise record for consecutive games with a rushing TD (6). He would join Chicago's Johnny Lujack (6 in 1950) as the only QBs in NFL history to rush for a TD in six straight games.
- With a rushing TD, Murray would have 11 rushing TDs in 2020. Among all QBs, only Cam Newton (14 in 2011) and Steve Grogan (12 in 1976) would have more rushing TDs in a single season.
- With both a rushing and passing TD, Murray would establish an NFL single-season record for games with a passing and rushing TD (9). He would also extend his own NFL record for consecutive games with a passing and rushing TD to six straight.

- With one reception, Hopkins (28 years, 166 days) would become the youngest player in NFL history to reach 700 career receptions. He would break the current record held by Larry Fitzgerald (29 years, 23 days).
- With eight catches, Hopkins (75) would establish a franchise record for receptions in the first 10 games of a season. Larry Fitzgerald (74 in 2016) holds the current mark.

#### WR Christian Kirk

- With a TD reception, Kirk would have six TD catches in his last five games. In his first 29 career games, Kirk had seven TD receptions.

According to the Elias Sports Bureau, the Cardinals victory over the Bills last Sunday marks just the second time in the last 60 years that a game featured multiple go-ahead passing TDs in the final 0:40 seconds of regulation. Bills WR Stefon Diggs had a 21-yard TD catch with 0:34 remaining that gave the Bills a 30-26 lead. **Four plays later Cardinals WR DeAndre Hopkins brought down a 43-yard TD on a Hail Mary pass from QB Kyler Murray with just 0:02 remaining.**

**Murray's 43-yard TD pass to Hopkins on Sunday was the first go-ahead Hail Mary in the 4th quarter since 12/3/15 when Green Bay QB Aaron Rodgers threw a game-winning 61-yard TD to TE Richard Rodgers as time expired to give the Packers a 27-23 victory over Detroit.**

Last Sunday's game marked the first time the Cardinals won a game on a TD pass on the final scrimmage play of regulation since Josh McCown's 28-yard TD pass to WR Nate Poole as time expired on 12/29/03 vs. Minnesota. That TD gave the Cards an 18-17 win and knocked the Vikings out of postseason contention on the final day of the regular season.

## NFL'S MOST PRODUCTIVE RUN GAME

The Cardinals ran for 217 yards and two TDs on 35 carries (6.2 avg.) in the win over Buffalo last Sunday. Through nine games, Arizona has rushed for 1,520 yards and 15 TDs on 288 carries (5.3 avg.). **In addition to having the NFL's #1 ranked offense, the Cardinals also have the NFL's #1 ranked rushing attack. Arizona leads the NFL averaging 168.9 rushing yards per game in 2020.**

### RUSHING AVERAGE ABOVE RECORD PACE

**After finishing #32 in the NFL in both rushing yards and rushing average in 2018, the Cardinals finished the 2019 season having averaged over 5.0 yards per rush attempt as a team for the first time in franchise history. Arizona averaged a franchise-record 5.03 yards per rush attempt last season.**

**Through nine games in 2020, the Cardinals are averaging 5.28 yards per rush attempt, putting them on pace to break the franchise record set in 2019.**

### NINE IN A ROW WITH 100+ RUSHING YARDS

The Cardinals have rushed for 100+ yards in all nine games this season. **The 2020 season marks just the second time (1984) in the last 60 years (1961-20) that the Cardinals rushed for 100+ yards in each of the first nine games of a season.**

**Last week's game was the second time this season - and fifth time under Kingsbury - that the Cardinals have rushed for 200+ yards in a game. Arizona had 200+ rushing yards in a game just five times in the previous 15 seasons combined (2004-18) prior to Kingsbury's arrival.**

### RUNNING FOR 150+ UNDER KINGSBURY

**The Cardinals have rushed for 150+ yards in 11 of 25 games under Kingsbury. Arizona had seven such games in the three seasons (2016-18) prior to his arrival. The Cardinals are 9-2 when rushing for 150+ yards over the last two seasons.**

### ALLOWING 20 POINTS OR FEWER

### DEFENSE COMES THROUGH IN THE SECOND HALF

#### Week 7 vs. Seattle

Arizona's unforgettable comeback vs. Seattle on Sunday Night Football in Week 7 wouldn't have been possible without the efforts of the defense in the second half. The Cardinals outscored Seattle 20-7 in the second half/OT as the defense held the Seahawks high-powered offense to just one TD on their final six possessions, which went as follows:

-- Punt / INT / TD / Punt / Punt / INT --

The Cardinals defense was at its best in the most crucial time – the OT period. On the Seahawks two OT possessions, Arizona's defense recorded 2.0 sacks, 4 tackles for loss, 2 QB hits, an INT and held Seattle to minus-6 rushing yards.

#### Week 10 vs. Buffalo

After the Bills scored on each of their four first half possessions last week (TD, 3 FG), the Cardinals defense held Buffalo scoreless on six of their eight drives in the second half. Arizona's defense recorded a pair of INTs and also forced four Buffalo punts in the second half to help the team overcome a 14-point deficit.

Of Buffalo's six scoring drives (3 TD; 3 FG) last Sunday, just two covered more than 40 yards. Only one of the Bills' eight second half drives covered 45+ yards.

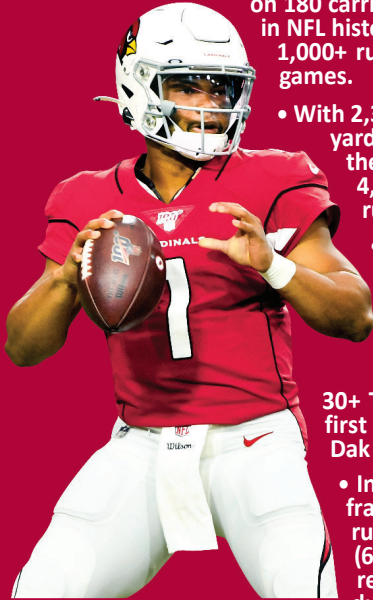

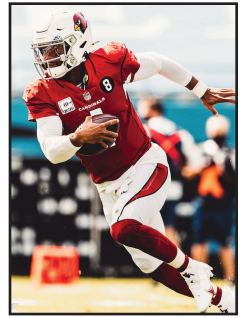

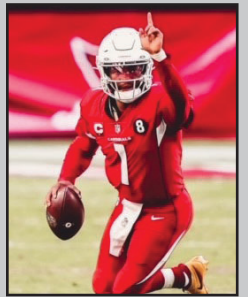

## CAPTAIN BAKER - CARDINALS HEART & SOUL

Signed to a four-year contract extension during training camp, **S Budda Baker** is delivering quite the encore performance this year after a breakout campaign in 2019.

**Fresh off being named "NFC Defensive Player of the Month" for October**, Baker has vaulted himself into the conversation for Defensive Player of the Year with his performance so far in 2020.

In Week 7 vs. Seattle, Baker posted a game-high 14 tackles, his second INT of the season, a tackle for loss and a pass defended in the win over Seattle. **It was a fitting end to a remarkable six-day stretch on the national stage in which the All-Pro was named a team captain, totaled 21 tackles, 2 INTs (one returned 90 yards), 1.0 sack, 2 passes defended, 2 tackles for loss, 2 QB hits, a forced fumble and an NFC "Defensive Player of the Week" award (Week 6).**

## KIRK HEATING UP IN THE DESERT

After posting 11 receptions for 154 yards and a TD in his first four games this season, third-year WR Christian Kirk has 16 catches for 273 yards and five TDs in the last four games.

Kirk's most recent TD catch was a 56-yarder against Miami in Week 9. It was his sixth TD reception of 2020, giving him as many TD catches in eight games played this season (missed Week 3 due to injury) as he had in his first two NFL seasons (2018-19) combined (6).

Of Kirk's 12 career TD receptions, five have covered 50+ yards. Most recently, Kirk had an 80-yard TD catch against the Cowboys on Monday Night Football in Week 6 and the 56-yard TD reception vs. Miami.

### UNDER THE RADAR BREAKOUT SEASON

With much of the attention focused on All-Pro wideouts Larry Fitzgerald and DeAndre Hopkins - Kirk is quietly posting a breakout season in 2020, in which he leads the team with six TD catches.

But for anyone who saw Kirk play in his first two NFL seasons, it was easy to see the talent the local product possessed. In his first two seasons after being drafted by Arizona, Kirk piled up 111 receptions for 1,299 yards and six TDs despite missing seven games due to injury.

### ONLY ANQUAN WAS FASTER TO 100

Playing in his 22<sup>nd</sup> career game in Week 14 vs. Pittsburgh last season, Kirk reached 100 receptions for his career. In franchise history, the only player to have 100 catches in fewer games was Anquan Boldin (16).

## AWARDS COME POURING IN

The Cardinals piled up the awards in the month of October. Most recently, **S Budda Baker** was named "NFC Defensive Player of the Month" for October and QB **Kyler Murray** was named "NFC Offensive Player of the Week" for his Week 7 performance vs. Seattle.

Between Murray and Baker, the duo have combined for three consecutive "Player of the Week" awards (Weeks 5-7) and one "Player of the Month" award - all of which came in October.

It is just the fourth time (2015, Weeks 14-16; 2014, Weeks 8-10; 1998, Weeks 15-17) in team history that the Cardinals have had "Player of the Week" winners in three straight weeks.

### DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE MONTH (OCTOBER) - S BUDDA BAKER

Baker was named the "NFC Defensive Player of the Month" for his performance in October, marking the first time in his career he has earned the honor.

He finished the month of October with 31 tackles, 2.0 sacks, 2 INTs (90 return yards), 3 TFL, 3 QB hits, 2 PD and a FF in three games played - all Arizona victories. He played all three games with a cast on his thumb after having surgery which forced him to miss Arizona's Week 4 game at Carolina.

Baker became the first NFL player in the last seven seasons (2014-20) to record at least 30 tackles, 2.0, 2 INTs and a FF in a single calendar month.



He was the only player in the NFL with multiple sacks and multiple INTs in October and his 31 tackles ranked second among all NFL DBs.

### OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK - KYLER MURRAY (WEEKS 5 & 7)

Murray was named the "NFC Offensive Player of the Week" for his performance against the Jets in Week 5 and vs. the Seahawks in Week 7. With his two "Offensive Player of the Week" selections in 2020, he has now earned the honor three times in his career. He joins Kurt Warner (5x) and Neil Lomax (4x) as the only QBs in team history with at least three "Offensive Player of the Week" selections.

Murray also became the first Cardinals QB to be named "Player of the Week" twice in the same season since Warner in 2009.

**WEEK 7 VS. SEATTLE:** Murray completed a career-high 34-of-48 pass attempts (70.8%) for 360 yards, 3 TDs and a 104.5 passer rating. He also added 67 rushing yards and a TD on 14 carries. He became the first player in NFL history to throw for 350+ yards and 3+ TDs while also rushing for 50+ yards and a TD in a single game.

**WEEK 5 AT NY JETS:** Murray completed 27-of-37 pass attempts (72.9%) for a career-high 380 yards, a TD and a passer rating of 103.4. He also ran for 31 yards and a TD on nine carries. His 380 passing yards led the NFL in Week 5 and were also the most passing yards by a Cardinals QB in a win since Carson Palmer threw for 419 yards in a 27-14 victory at Jacksonville in 2013.

### DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK - S BUDDA BAKER (WEEK 6 AT DALLAS)

Baker earned his first career "Defensive Player of the Week" after recording 7 tackles, a sack, his first career INT, a tackle for loss, two QB hits, a pass defensed and a forced fumble in the Monday night victory over the Cowboys.

He became the first Cardinals player since 2003 (Renaldo Hill on 11/2 vs. Cincinnati) to record a sack, an INT and a forced fumble in the same game.

## TALENT FROM STATE 48

The Cardinals roster includes six players who played either high school or college football in the state of Arizona. That includes 2020 seventh round pick RB **Eno Benjamin** - who had a record-breaking career at Arizona State.

The selection of Benjamin in 2020 marked the third consecutive year that the Cards drafted a player who played high school or college football in Arizona. In 2018 the team drafted WR **Christian Kirk** and in 2019 it was CB **Byron Murphy, Jr.**

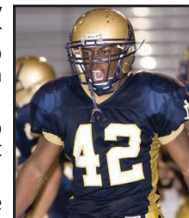

### A LOCAL KID RETURNS TO AZ, FOLLOWS IN FATHER'S CARDINALS FOOTSTEPS

One of the Cardinals top signings of the 2020 free agency period was LB **Devon Kennard**. He is the son of former Cardinals offensive lineman Derek Kennard Sr., who also played for the Los Angeles Express of the USFL in addition to the Saints and Cowboys.

Following his playing career, Derek returned to Arizona to raise his family. Devon grew up in Phoenix and starred at Desert Vista High School before attending USC.

When Devon took the field in Week 1 at San Francisco, the Kennards became the third father-son duo to play for the Cardinals, joining the Butlers (Kevin and Drew) and the Metcalfs (Terry and Eric).

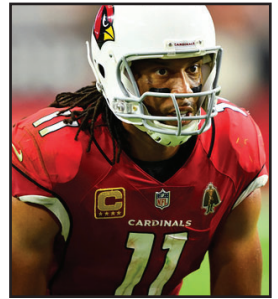

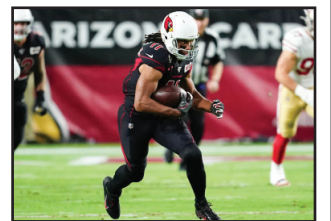
## ACTIVE STARTS STREAK LEADS ALL WRs

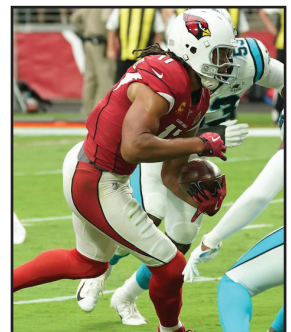
Fitzgerald hauled in a 21-yard TD reception in the second quarter of the Cardinals Week 16 victory at Seattle last year.

It was the 120<sup>th</sup> TD catch of his career, which ranks sixth on the NFL's all-time list for career TD catches. His 120 career TD catches are 39 more than any other active player (Buccaneers TE Rob Gronkowski ranks 2<sup>nd</sup> with 82).

## 10 MORE IN THE POSTSEASON

In addition to his 120 career TD catches in the regular season, Fitzgerald has 10 TD catches in nine career postseason games.

Fitzgerald is one of just eight players in NFL history with 10+ TD receptions in the postseason. Of those eight, only Fitzgerald (9) has played in fewer than 15 career playoff games. Only Hall of Fame WRs Jerry Rice (22 in 29 games) and John Stallworth (12 in 17 games) plus Bucs TE Rob Gronkowski (12 in 16 games) have more TD receptions in the postseason.

In fact, Fitzgerald's career numbers already surpass all but one receiver currently in the HOF (Rice). He has more career receptions than 28 of the 29 receivers in the HOF: Swann (336), Hayes (371), Pihos (373), Lavelli (386), Hirsch (387), Fears (400), Warfield (427), McDonald (495), Mitchell (521), Stallworth (537), Alworth (542), Biletnikoff (589), Carmichael (590), Berry (631), Maynard (633), Taylor (649), Irvin (750), Joiner (750), Lofton (764), Largent (819), Monk (940), Reed (951), Moss (982), Owens (1,078), Bruce (1,024), Brown (1,094), Carter (1,101) and Harrison (1,102).

He has more career receiving yards than 28 of the 29 receivers in the HOF: Fears (5,397), Swann (5,462), Pihos (5,619), Lavelli (6,488), Hirsch (7,029), Hayes (7,414), Mitchell (7,954), McDonald (8,410), Warfield (8,565), Stallworth (8,723), Biletnikoff (8,974), Carmichael (8,985), Taylor (9,110), Berry (9,275), Alworth (10,266), Maynard (11,834), Irvin (11,904), Joiner (12,146), Monk (12,721), Largent (13,089), Reed (13,198), Carter (13,899), Lofton (14,004), Brown (14,934), Harrison (14,580), Bruce (15,208), Moss (15,292) and Owens (15,934).

### A Career Full of Accomplishments:

- Franchise career leader in receptions (1,413), receiving yards (17,357), receiving TDs (120), total TDs (120) and 100-yard receiving games (49). His nine 1,000-yard seasons are also a franchise record. His reception and receiving yardage totals both rank second in NFL history behind Jerry Rice while his 120 receiving TDs rank sixth in league annals.
- Led the NFL with 107 receptions in 2016, marking the second time in his career (103 in 2005; tied with Steve Smith) he had done so. He became the first player in NFL history to lead the NFL in receptions at least 11 years apart. Prior to Fitzgerald, the longest span between leading the league in receptions was six by Jerry Rice (1990, 1996).
- Led the NFL in receiving TDs in both the 2008 (12) and 2009 (13) seasons. In addition to his 10 receiving TDs in 2007, he became the first player in franchise history to record at least 10 TDs in three consecutive seasons.
- Fitzgerald (11) joins Hall of Famer Jerry Rice (13) as the only wide receivers in NFL history to be named to the Pro Bowl at least 11 times.
- Fitzgerald had more receptions in his first 200 career games (1,116) than any player in NFL history.

- At 29 years, 44 days old, joined Randy Moss (28 years, 314 days) as the only players in NFL history to reach 10,000 career receiving yards before the age of 30.

## ELEVATING A FRANCHISE

The 2020 season is the 14<sup>th</sup> since owner **Michael Bidwill** began leading the organization. His leadership during that time has been instrumental in transforming the franchise both on and off the field.

### Highlights of Bidwill's tenure:

- Leading the list of Bidwill's accomplishments with the Cardinals is the creation of State Farm Stadium. In the first 14 seasons after opened in 2006, the team sold out all 144 games (preseason and postseason included) played at the world-class venue that has been awarded three Super Bowls.



- In addition to his role in helping Arizona land Super Bowls XLII and XLIX, he led the effort to land Super Bowl LVII (2023) in the spring of 2018. Michael was instrumental in getting the 2015 Pro Bowl moved to Arizona, which was played a week before Super Bowl XLIX, and the two events combined to deliver a record economic impact of \$720 million to the region.

- By the time it hosts Super Bowl LVII, State Farm Stadium will have undergone \$100 million in improvements including parking infrastructure, state-of-the-art wifi, video boards, sound system upgrades and club-area enhancements since it staged Super Bowl XLIX.

- Of the Cardinals seven all-time postseason wins, five have come with Bidwill leading the team. Arizona has played in nine postseason contests over the last 13 seasons, after playing just seven prior to his tenure as team president.

- AZ has appeared in the NFC Championship Game twice since 2008, including a victory in the 2008 conference title game that led to the team's first-ever Super Bowl appearance (Super Bowl XLIII).

- In January of 2018, Michael was one of five owners named to the NFL's Player-Owner Committee focused on social and racial justice initiatives. In December of 2014, Commissioner Roger Goodell tapped Bidwill to chair the league's Conduct Committee.

- In January of 2019, Michael received the Paul Tagliabue Award from the Fritz Pollard Alliance for demonstrating integrity and leadership in the area of career development for minorities and advocating for diversity.

## KEIM HAS BUILT SOME OF THE BEST

**Steve Keim** was promoted to GM on January 8, 2013 after 14 seasons in the Cardinals organization. The team has experienced unprecedented success during his tenure as GM. The teams put together by Keim have been some of the most successful in franchise history.



- In 2014, the Cardinals tied the franchise record for wins in a season (11) before setting a new mark in 2015 when Arizona won 13 games and earned its first-ever postseason bye.

- During Keim's tenure, Arizona has established franchise records for wins in a season (13 in 2015), points in a season (489 in 2015), led the NFL in total offense for the first time in team history (#1 in 2015) and led the NFL in sacks for the second time ever (48.0 in 2016).

- Selected QB **Kyler Murray** with the #1 overall pick in the 2019 NFL Draft. Murray was named the NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year following a record-setting season.

- Among the trades negotiated by Keim during his tenure as GM are the acquisition of QB Carson Palmer from Oakland in 2013, acquiring LB **Chandler Jones** from New England in 2016 and the trade that landed WR **DeAndre Hopkins** from Houston in 2020. During the 2019 season, Keim also orchestrated a trade with Miami for RB **Kenyan Drake**.

- Arizona has featured a top-10 defense four times and a top-10 offense twice dating back to Keim's first season as GM. The Cardinals had a top-10 defense in three consecutive seasons (2015-17) for the first time since the 1970 merger.

- Named *Sporting News* 2014 NFL Executive of the Year and earned back-to-back NFL Executive of the Year honors from Pro Football Talk (2013-14).

## CARDINALS TAKE PART IN PUSH FOR JUSTICE

Throughout the 2020 season, Cardinals players and coaches are joining the rest of the NFL in honoring and memorializing victims of systemic racism and showing their support for Social Justice efforts by displaying names or phrases as decals on the back of their helmets and patches on their caps.



The season-long effort highlights the actions being taken to reach solutions, engages fans to act and gives players and coaches a platform on gameday to share their voice and efforts to inspire change. Together, the NFL is joining its players and coaches in building awareness, educating fans and paying homage to those who deserve to have their legacies live on.

### CARDINALS SPEAKING UP

Throughout the offseason, numerous Cardinals players spoke up about their own experiences and the importance of coming together to make meaningful change a reality in the United States.

#### DL Corey Peters - 8/28/20

DL **Corey Peters** spoke about how important it is that everyone engage in the conversations and understand other viewpoints:

*"One thing we want to do is be sensitive to one another, have compassion for one another, and we can disagree with certain things peacefully and all work towards the same goal of not only winning but make this a better country for everybody."*

#### OL D.J. Humphries - 8/28/20

OL **D.J. Humphries** spoke about his children being a major motivator in trying to help bring about change:

*"I know how to accept what the world has for you. I know how to maneuver in this world. But for my children, that's not what I want. I want my children to grow up in a fair world and grow up in a world where what the Constitution says is how it really is."*

#### Head Coach Kliff Kingsbury - 8/27/2020

Kingsbury talked about what the Cardinals players and coaches have been discussing and learning from each other during recent events across the country:

*"I had a great conversation with my dad over the summer, and his perspective on things that was really valuable as we get closer to the season – the anthem, discussions and things of that nature."*

*"My dad was a longtime football coach but also a Marine. He served in Vietnam, received a Purple Heart. Talking to him, there were two words that really stood out. One was respect, and the second thing was understanding. Respect viewpoints people have on this topic. They're very personal and very passionate. And respect their right to express themselves."*

*"You've got to understand, at its core, what this is really about. It's always been about drawing attention to the social injustice that continues to take place. We saw it again this week with Jacob Blake. It's about increasing awareness that racism exists, police brutality against people of color continues to happen, and let's not confuse it with something else and make the narrative different."*

*"My biggest takeaway from talking to my dad is that kneeling doesn't reflect a lack of patriotism or respect for the military in any way, just like standing during the anthem doesn't mean you're OK with racism or social injustice. It's important to respect and understand that. These are important issues that need to be addressed, and important conversations that need to be had. I'm grateful that I've been able to be around a great group of guys that have enlightened me – hearing their stories and their struggles. Those conversations will continue throughout the year. I just hope we can all continue to push in the right direction."*

#### QB Kyler Murray - 6/17/20

Following the death of George Floyd and the resulting protests around the country, Murray spoke the change he saw happening in real time:

*"There is a lot of hate in this world, but at the same time, what's happening and what we're seeing right now, it's huge. I don't condone rioting and stuff like that, but the peaceful protests, I think they're great, they're amazing. Whether it takes years, I feel like we're getting there. At least we're making a step towards it."*

## P2 IN YEAR #10

- Six-time team captain (2013, 2015-18, 2020) has totaled 456 tackles, 28 INTs (one returned for a TD) and 113 passes defended in 147 games (all starts) during his first 10 NFL seasons. Only five players in Cardinals history – including four Pro Football Hall of Fame inductees – have had more INTs than Peterson (28).

- Started all 128 games during his first eight NFL seasons, becoming the first Cardinal since at least the 1970 NFL-AFL merger to start 100+ straight games to begin a career.

- In April of 2020, named to the 2010-19 All-Decade Team by the Pro Football Hall of Fame's 48-member selection committee.

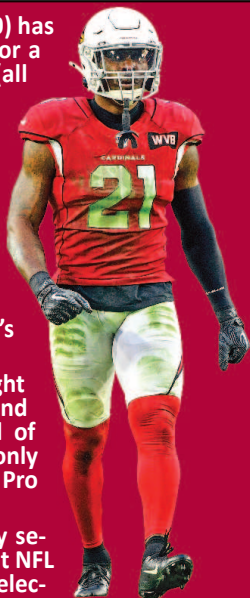
- Voted to the Pro Bowl in each of his first eight NFL seasons – seven times at CB (2012-18) and once as a kick returner (2011). Joined Hall of Famers Jim Brown and Barry Sanders as the only players in NFL history to be chosen to eight Pro Bowls before their 29th birthday.

- Peterson is the only player in team history selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his first eight NFL seasons, and his eight consecutive Pro Bowl selections are a franchise record.

- Earned first-team All-Pro honors three times with two selections at CB (2013, 2015) and one as a kick returner (2011).

- Named NFC Defensive Player of the Week three times (Week 15, 2019; Week 10, 2014; Week 4, 2013), NFC Special Teams Player of the Week twice (Week 9, 2011; Week 12, 2011) and Special Teams Player of the Month once (November 2011).

- Became the first NFL defender since at least the 1970 NFL-AFL merger to have a reception and a completion in the same game vs. Det (9/15/13). Peterson's gloves and the football used on the pass completion were sent to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, OH.



## 21 NOW WITH 28 INTERCEPTIONS

The Cardinals selected CB **Patrick Peterson** with the fifth pick in the 2011 NFL Draft, and in his first nine seasons, he earned eight Pro Bowl selections and was named first-team All-Pro three times. Considered one of the game's best cover corners, he has proven to be one of the most unique talents in NFL history. Since his rookie season in 2011, only three NFL players have more INTs than Peterson.

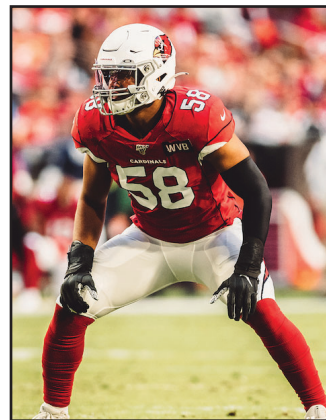
LB **Jordan Hicks** – signed as a free agent in 2019 after four years with the Eagles – put together a breakout campaign in his first season with the Cardinals.

## KIRKPATRICK HAS TWO PICKS FOR THE CARDS

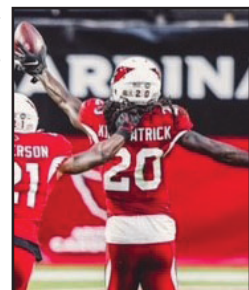
Through eight games with the Cardinals, CB **Dre Kirkpatrick** has two INTs, his most in a single season since the 2016 campaign when he had three. In the Week 10 game against Buffalo, he stepped in front of a Josh Allen throw with 4:38 remaining in the fourth quarter.

His first pick as a Cardinal came against his former Bengals teammate, QB Andy Dalton, in the Monday Night Football win over Dallas in Week 6.

It was his fourth INT in eight career MNF appearances. Among active players, only New England CB Devin McCourty (5 in 12 games) has more INTs while playing on MNF.

Kirkpatrick signed with the Cardinals soon after the start of training camp, joining the team after eight seasons in Cincinnati, where DC Vance Joseph was his position coach during the 2014-15 seasons.

## ACCOMPLISHED VET JOINS THE SECONDARY

Last Wednesday (11/11), the Cardinals signed CB **Johnathan Joseph**, a two-time Pro Bowl selection who is in his 15<sup>th</sup> NFL season in 2020.

In his career, Joseph has played in 208 games (192 starts) and has 785 tackles (668 solo), 32 INTs, 8 forced fumbles, 6 fumble recoveries and 199 passes defended. He has scored 8 TDs in his career (7 INT return; 1 fumble return).

The 36-year old Joseph entered the league with Cincinnati as a first-round selection (24<sup>th</sup> overall) in the 2006 NFL Draft out of South Carolina and spent his first five seasons in the league with the Bengals before signing as a free agent with Houston in 2011 where he played the next nine seasons.

Now with the Cardinals, Joseph reunites with defensive coordinator **Vance Joseph** who was his position coach in Houston between 2011-13.

Below are a few facts about Joseph's career:

- His 32 career INTs rank 3<sup>rd</sup> among active players behind only Richard Sherman (35) and Tramon Williams (34).

## TRADING THE DEEP FRYER FOR A GAME BALL

The only game ball given out following the Cardinals Week 5 victory over the Jets went to third-year LB **Dennis Gardeck** – adding a new chapter in the inspiring story the former undrafted rookie authored on his way to the NFL playing field.

*Playing the first defensive snaps of his career, Gardeck – a special teams captain who signed with the Cardinals as a rookie free agent out of the University of Sioux Falls in 2018 – finished the game against the Jets with 2.0 sacks in just 10 defensive snaps.*

His second quarter sack of Jets QB Joe Flacco was his first sack since his senior year at Sioux Falls in 2017.

It was a big performance for the Lake of the Hills, IL native but it wasn't the first success he has experienced in the NFL.

A special teams standout in his first two seasons, Gardeck was named a Pro Bowl alternate in 2019 after posting a team-high 10 tackles and a fumble recovery. In 39 career games, he has 25 special teams tackles, three punt deflections, a fumble recovery on a fake punt and a TD on a blocked punt. In 2018, he led all NFL rookies with 388 total snaps on special teams.

### A SMALL SCHOOL STANDOUT AND FAST FOOD STAR

Gardeck's path to the NFL didn't run through a blue-chip college. Following high school, he attended Division II West Virginia State University for three seasons before spending his final college season at Sioux Falls as a graduate transfer. He was a standout in college though.

He recorded 345 tackles, 32.0 sacks, 57.5 tackles for loss, nine forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries in four seasons and was named to five Division II All-America teams as a senior in 2017.

He kept himself busy off the field during his college days as well. He earned a degree from West Virginia State (Gardeck is currently studying for a Masters of Business Administration degree) while also working at McDonald's. He started out on the grill crew but "worked his way up" to the assembly table and fryers. "It feels weird saying it was a good fit, but I had a blast there," he said. "I loved it. I loved my coworkers."

### ALL-PRO HOPKINS HAPPY FOR HIS TRAINING PARTNER

Following the win over the Jets, WR **DeAndre Hopkins** spoke of how happy he was to see Gardeck's hard work paying off. "I rehabbed and trained with Dennis this offseason before I came here and I saw the work that he put in. I got to see the work he put in behind the scenes and for him to go in and do what he did today, I knew he was going to give his all and it resulted in two sacks. That is what you look for in a guy like that. It gives the team motivation."



## KICKING HIS WAY TO THE TOP

Since joining the Cardinals in 2018, K **Zane Gonzalez** has connected on 53-of-63 FG attempts, including 20 consecutive FGs between Weeks 5-16 of the 2019 season.

The ASU product matched a career high with four made FGs in the Week 10 win over Buffalo and made three-of-four FG attempts in the Week 7 win over the Seahawks on SNF.

He connected on a 44-yarder as time expired in regulation to send the Seahawks game into OT and a 48-yarder to win it in OT, marking the third game-winning kick of his career and the first to come in OT. He also had game-winners at Green Bay in 2018 and in Cincinnati in 2019.

### ZANE FROM LONG RANGE

He has converted two-of-three from beyond 50 yards this season, including a 54-yard FG in Week 3 against the Lions and a career-long 56-yarder in Week 1 against the 49ers.

*In franchise history, just three made FGs have covered more ground than his 56-yard FG against San Francisco.*

### A CAREER YEAR FOR GONZALEZ

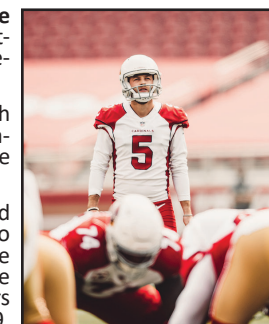

## CARDINALS COVID-19 RELIEF EFFORTS (TEAM INITIATIVES)

Since the COVID-19 pandemic hit the country earlier this year the effects of the outbreak have reached every corner of the U.S. and has had a devastating impact on citizens and businesses across the nation. The Cardinals organization – along with the players and staff – immediately mobilized to donate time, money and other resources throughout Arizona to assist the individuals, businesses, schools, frontline health care personnel and other organizations that have been so greatly affected by the crisis.

### \$1 MILLION FOUNDING CONTRIBUTION TO THE AZ CORONAVIRUS RELIEF FUND

On March 24, the Cardinals made a \$1 million founding contribution to the AZ Coronavirus Relief Fund. As part of the Arizona Together initiative launched earlier that day by Governor Doug Ducey, the fund was set up established to provide financial support to organizations working to mitigate the impacts of COVID-19 in Arizona. Initially, it focused on the following immediate needs:

- Funding of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) for frontline medical personnel.
- Non-profit organizations that support the most vulnerable Arizonans through food banks, homeless shelters, domestic violence facilities, and other services.
- Providing disadvantaged students with the technology necessary to transition to online learning.

“Like so many in our community, this unprecedented crisis has us asking what we can do to help and what might have the greatest impact,” said Cardinals Owner **Michael Bidwill** said of the donation. “We are grateful for the creation of this relief fund, and proud to support its critically important mission and hope that others throughout the community can join this effort in whatever way that they are able. As a team, we will continue to work on additional ways to make a difference and know that as a community we will get through this challenging time together.”

To assist local businesses during the crisis, the Cardinals made a \$100,000 donation to Local First Arizona, Arizona’s Coronavirus Micro Grant Fund

### MILLION MEALS DONATION TO LOCAL FOOD BANKS



In early April, the Cardinals and State Farm partnered on an historic initiative to address a pressing local need arising from the COVID-19 pandemic. The number of people seeking assistance from local food banks more than doubled as a result of the unparalleled crisis. Unfortunately, the number of donations to them decreased just as dramatically.

As part of their on-going commitment to improve the local community, State Farm and the Cardinals helped tackle the issue by donating over a million 1,000,000 meals that were distributed to five non-profit organizations throughout the Valley. The five groups involved in the “Million Meal” donation were:

- St. Vincent DePaul
- United Food Bank
- Phoenix Rescue Mission
- Midwest Food Bank

### ORGANIZATION LAUNCHES “CARDINALS CARRY-OUT” INITIATIVE TO ASSIST INDEPENDENT, LOCALLY OWNED RESTAURANTS



On April 13 the team launched “Cardinals Carry-out” - an unprecedented initiative with a dual purpose: assist independent, locally-owned restaurants hit hard by the coronavirus crisis and recognize those working on the front lines of the pandemic in the medical community, law enforcement and emergency services.

Cardinals players and fans nominated their favorite establishments for inclusion on the team’s interactive statewide map and supported them with take-out business.

In the spirit of the NFL Draft, the team selected establishments from the map each day and purchased meals which were delivered to nurses, doctors, first responders and others who work daily to combat the impact of COVID-19.

When it was launched, the first 47 establishments on the map reflected the favorites of Cardinals players and staff as well as those near area hospitals suggested by Local First Arizona. Within the first week, over 800 restaurants throughout the state have been added based on recommendations from fans.

“It’s great that a major sports team would put together such a thing that is community driven and helps restaurants navigate these tough times...we’re kind of in survival mode but we’re going to make it out,” said **Chris Hove**, owner of Perfect Pear Bistro in Chandler which was recommended by defensive lineman **Zach Allen**.

### HOSTING CRITICAL BLOOD DRIVES, DRIVE-THROUGH TESTING AND PPE DRIVES AT STATE FARM STADIUM

One area hit particularly hard by the COVID-19 crisis was the local blood donation community, where the supply reached critically low levels during a crucial time in March. In a seven-day span between March 19 and March 26, nearly 200 blood drives in Arizona were cancelled, resulting in the loss of more than 5,000 blood donations for hospital patients.

To assist in meeting this direly pressing need, the Cardinals partnered with Dignity Health and Cigna to host a major one-day blood drive at State Farm Stadium. In conjunction with Scottsdale-based Vitalant (pronounced “vye-TAL-ent” and formerly known as United Blood Services) the event took place at State Farm Stadium on March 31. All donation slots for the drive were filled within hours of the event being announced.

The outpouring of support from the community resulted in two additional blood drives being scheduled at State Farm Stadium. On back-to-backs on April 7-8, in conjunction with the American Red Cross, the Cardinals partnered with Anheuser-Busch to host blood drives at State Farm Stadium and all donation slots were again filled.

On April 15, the Cardinals and Project C.U.R.E hosted a Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) drive at State Farm Stadium. The event was to help collect equipment for use by those in the local healthcare community, including eye protection, face shields, surgical masks, N95 masks, gloves, shoe covers and hand sanitizer.

In May, the Cardinals and Dignity Health partnered to participate in the state’s drive-through COVID-19 testing blitz by hosting events open to the public at State Farm Stadium.



## CARDINALS COVID-19 RELIEF EFFORTS (PLAYER INITIATIVES)

### **KLIFF KINGSBURY – \$50,000 DONATION TO THE NAVAJO RELIEF FUND (NRF)**

The Native American population in Arizona was hit particularly hard by the COVID-19 outbreak and the Cardinals head coach was among the many who stepped up to help. In April, Kingsbury donated \$50,000 to the Navajo Relief Fund to assist one of the communities that was most affected – the Navajo Nation. The NRF was established to help with the shortage of healthy food, safe drinking water, healthcare and supply stores in remote reservation communities. During the pandemic, the fund served as urgent need in making available food, water and other basic supplies.

### **DEANDRE HOPKINS – \$150,000 DONATION TO THE ARIZONA CORONAVIRUS RELIEF FUND; #THEREALHEROES PROJECT**

It didn't take long for the All-Pro wideout to make a significant impact in Arizona. On March 27, 2020 - just a week after being acquired by the Cardinals — Hopkins announced a \$150,000 donation to the AZ Coronavirus Relief Fund, which was established to provide financial support to multiple organizations trying to deal with the impact of COVID-19. Money raised by Arizona Relief Fund goes to purchasing Personal Protective Equipment for medical personnel working with the coronavirus patients; supporting non-profits that aid the most vulnerable such as food banks, homeless shelters and domestic violence facilities; and providing technology for disadvantaged students needed for online learning.

Hopkins was among the sports stars who participated in a national project to recognize and celebrate health care workers for their efforts on the front lines of the coronavirus pandemic. "The Real Heroes Project" was a collaboration involving Hopkins and athletes from a combined 14 leagues. Others include New Orleans Saints QB Drew Brees, New York Yankees All-Star outfielder Aaron Judge, U.S. women's soccer stars Carli Lloyd and Alex Morgan, and Hockey Hall of Famer Wayne Gretzky. In the PSA – which was released on National Nurses Day - Hopkins recognized local nurse Tracy Thomas, an RN at Dignity Health St. Joseph's Hospital and Medical Center. She was selected in recognition of the incredible work she has done leading the COVID-19 Response



### **CHANDLER JONES – DONATED 150,000 MEALS TO FOOD BANKS IN ARIZONA AND NEW YORK**

In late March, the Cardinals All-Pro LB donated over 150,000 meals to food banks in both Arizona and his hometown of Endicott, NY to assist with families affected by the Coronavirus outbreak. Jones provided meals to St. Mary's Food Bank and Midwest Food Bank of Arizona while also donating to Mother Teresa's Cupboard through the Catholic Charities of Broome County in New York.

### **JORDAN HICKS – \$100,000 TO IMPACT CHURCH COVID-19 RELIEF EFFORTS; ANIMAL ADOPTION INITIATIVE**

Following a career year on the field in his first season with Arizona, Hicks joined his wife, Ivana, to announce in April that they would match and donate up to \$100,000 to their church in Scottsdale – Impact Church – to assist single mothers during the pandemic. Those efforts included providing meals and helping cover rent and mortgage payments. Hicks' donation also helped facilitate a COVID-19 drive-through testing initiative at the church that saw over 500 people receive free tests.

Hicks and his wife also organized an animal adoption campaign in Austin that saw 260 animals adopted in under a week. The couple partnered with Austin (TX) Pets Alive to provide new pet owners with a care package that included a crate, pet food, treats, a leash and a toy.

### **KYLER MURRAY – \$25,000 DONATION TO GENYOUth FOR ITS COVID-19 EMERGENCY SCHOOL NUTRITION FUND**

With schools across the country closed because of the coronavirus, the reigning NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year stepped up in April to help children who counted on school meals to be fed on a daily basis. He donated \$25,000 to GENYOUth for its COVID-19 Emergency School Nutrition Fund, which was established to provide resources that allowed school meal programs to continue despite school closures.

### **ISAIAH SIMMONS – DONATED 60,000 MEALS TO HARVEST COMPASSION CENTERS IN ARIZONA**

Within a week of becoming the #8 overall pick in the 2020 NFL Draft, the former Clemson star was already reaching out to help people in Arizona struggling as a result of the pandemic. Simmons teamed up with the Cardinals and Bose to donate 60,000 meals to the Harvest Compassion Center for its facilities in Phoenix, Maryvale and Chandler. Harvest Compassion Center is a food and clothing bank dedicated to providing a hope-filled environment to the underserved in the greater Phoenix area. HCC locations offer free food, hygiene, baby, home and clothing items to the many Arizonans living below the poverty line.

### **LARRY FITZGERALD – DELIVERING MEALS TO HEALTHCARE WORKERS AND FRONTLINE STAFF**

One of the most prolific WRs in NFL history, Fitzgerald long ago set the standard for making an impact in the community – and those efforts continued during the COVID-19 outbreak. In late April, he teamed with Steak 44, Ocean 44 and Dominick's to deliver meals to healthcare workers all over the Valley. In addition to helping those who have gone above-and-beyond to serve the community during the pandemic, it also served as a very personal cause for Fitzgerald, who's late mother, Carol, was a nurse.

### **COREY PETERS – STARTED VIRTUAL BOOK CLUB FOR ARIZONA HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS**

A passionate advocate for reading, the Cardinals starting DT set up an in-person book club a few years ago. When the pandemic hit, forcing the closure of schools and the enforcement of social distancing, Peters saw an opportunity to make the book club virtual. So in May, he launched the virtual book club "The Corey Peterson Playbook" to help provide an educational outlet for all Arizona high school students during the COVID-19 crisis.

### **PATRICK PETERSON – DONATED TO ARIZONA FIRST RESPONDERS ON MEMORIAL DAY WEEKEND**

With Memorial Day occurring in the middle of the pandemic, the Cardinals All-Pro helped keep the spirit of the holiday when he teamed with Pit Boss Grills to donate grill products and gift cards to Arizona first responders. Peterson had his followers on social media nominate a first responder of their choice and he selected three winners on Memorial Day who each received a new top-of-the-line grill, grilling products and a gift card from Bashas supermarket.

### **DEVON KENNARD – DELIVERED MEALS TO FOUR VALLEY FIRE DEPARTMENTS; VIRTUAL HOSPITAL VISITS**

In May, Arizona native – and Cardinals 2020 free agent signing – Kennard gave back to his hometown when he teamed with Salad and Go to provide dinner for firefighters at four different fire stations in the Ahwatukee area.

Every year Cardinals players and staff make numerous visits to Phoenix Children's Hospital to lift the spirits of the children and their families in pediatric units. Due to COVID-19 and the resulting safety restrictions, those visits have taken a new form. In late August, Kennard became the first Cardinals player to take the controls of a telepresence robot in order to spend time with children at PCH. While Kennard was at training camp at State Farm Stadium, he was able to drive the robot through the halls of PCH and interact with children through a video monitor.
