THIS WEEK'S PREVIEW

The Cardinals and Raiders square off at State Farm Stadium this week in a game that will air to a national audience on ESPN.

This marks the second of back-to-back home games to begin the preseason for Arizona. Last week, the Cardinals earned a 17-13 victory over the visiting Los Angeles Chargers in the preseason opener in the NFL debut of head coach Kliff Kingsbury and rookie QB Kyler Murray.

Last week's win over the Chargers also represented the beginning of the Cardinals 14th season at State Farm Stadium and marked the team's 135th consecutive sellout at the venue.

Thursday's matchup marks the 17th all-time preseason meeting between the Cardinals and Raiders and the fourth in the last five years. Including regular season, it will be the ninth meeting between the two teams in the last 10 seasons.

The 2019 season also represents the fourth consecutive year the Cardinals are hosting the Raiders at State Farm Stadium. Oakland visited during the preseason in 2016 and 2017 and during the regular season in 2018.

In last week's season-opening victory over the Chargers, the Cardinals came back from a 7-0 deficit to score 17 consecutive points between the second and fourth quarters to earn the win. A total of 44 players made their Cardinals debut in the victory, including 2019 #1 overall pick QB Kyler Murray, who started the contest and finished 6-of-7 for 44 yards. Chandler, AZ native QB Brett Hundley threw for 104 yards and a TD while undrafted rookie RB Wes Hills scored on a seven-yard run.

On defense, LB Jordan Hicks - signed as a free agent from Philadelphia in the offseason - totaled four tackles, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery in his lone series as a starter at ILB. Undrafted rookie S Tyler Sigler had three tackles and set up the Cardinals final TD when he intercepted a pass near the end of the third quarter and returned it 52 yards to position Arizona at the Chargers 28-yard line. Second-year LB Dennis Gardeck led all players with seven total tackles.

Next week the Cardinals embark on their first road trip of the season when they travel to Minnesota to face the Vikings at U.S. Bank Stadium next Saturday (8/24). The game will be available locally to fans on NBC and nationally on NFL Network. After facing the Vikings the Cardinals will wrap up preseason play against the Broncos in Denver on August 29.

MURRAY MAKES HIS DEBUT

Making his NFL debut a day after his 22nd birthday, 2019 #1 overall pick QB **Kyler Murray** played one series in the Cardinals preseason opener vs. the Chargers and finished 6-of-7 for 44 yards and a passer rating of 92.9.

His only "incompletion" was a completed pass to a receiver who had stepped out of bounds prior to the catch.

"I think it's natural as rookies just to kind of have expectations about how it's going to be, overthink and stuff like that, but for me, I was just going out there and being myself, like always," Murray said. "Trusting my abilities, trust what coach calls and just trying to go out there and execute what he calls. It was fun."

Head coach **Kliff Kingsbury** liked what he saw from his rookie signal caller. "He made quick decisions, that's what we were looking for. He operated well and took care of the football."

CARDS vs. RAIDERS PRESEASON SERIES

The Cardinals and Raiders square off this week in the 17th all-time preseason matchup between the two teams. Thursday's game will mark the fourth preseason matchup between Arizona and Oakland in the last five years.

Including the regular season, this week's game marks the ninth meeting between Cardinals and Raiders in the last 10 seasons.

The 2019 season also represents the fourth consecutive year the Cardinals are hosting the Raiders at State Farm Stadium. Oakland visited during the preseason in 2016 and 2017 and during the regular season in 2018.

The preseason series between the Cards and Raiders - which is currently knotted at eight wins apiece - dates back to 1976, a game that was played in Tempe, AZ while the Cards were still based in St. Louis. The Cardinals have won six of the last eight preseason matchups against the Raiders.

Jon Gruden



Kliff Kingsbury became an NFL head coach for the first time when he was hired by the Cardinals on January 11, 2019, coming to Arizona after spending the last six seasons (2013-18) as the head coach at his alma mater, Texas Tech. While with the Red Raiders, Kingsbury served as the play-caller for one of the college football's most explosive and productive offenses. Tech featured a passing attack that ranked in the top-10 in the country in all six seasons during his tenure, ranked in the top-20 nationally for total offense in all six seasons and finished in the top-25 in scoring five times. A former star QB at Texas Tech, Kingsbury was drafted by the Patriots in the sixth round of the 2003 NFL Draft and also spent time with the Saints and Jets during his playing career.

After returning as head coach of the Raiders when he was hired on January 9, 2018, **Jon Gruden** is in his 13th season as a head coach in the NFL. Gruden returned to coaching in 2018 after spending nearly a decade in broadcasting, including analyst duties on Monday Night Football. Gruden was the head coach in Oakland from 1998-2001 before going on to coach the Tampa Bay Buccaneers from 2002-2008. Gruden posted a 38-26 record during his first tenure with the Raiders, leading the team to back-to-back AFC West titles in 2000 and 2001. He spent seven seasons as head coach in Tampa Bay, leaving as the winningest head coach in franchise history. His time with the Buccaneers included a victory in Super Bowl XXXVII.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE OPENER

• Cardinals first-year head coach **Kliff Kingsbury** won his NFL preseason debut after leading Arizona over the Chargers last week. After earning the victory on Thursday night, Kingsbury celebrated his 40th birthday on Friday (8/9).

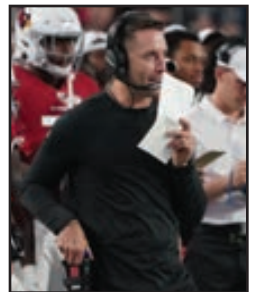
• LB **Jordan Hicks** posted four tackles, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery in his one series as starter. The Chargers reached the AZ 2-yard line on their opening possession and on a first down carry by RB Austin Ekeler, Hicks forced a fumble and recovered the ball to end the scoring threat.

• In relief of Murray in the first half, QB **Brett Hundley** - a Chandler, AZ native - completed 10-of-14 pass attempts for 104 yards, a TD and a passer rating of 116.4.

• WR **Trent Sherfield** led all players in receptions (4) and receiving yards (44) in the win over Los Angeles, including a 22-yard TD catch in the final minute of the second quarter. Sherfield also stood out on special teams, adding an open-field tackle on a first quarter Chargers punt return.

• K **Zane Gonzalez** connected on his only FG attempt against the Chargers, hitting from 55 yards in the third quarter. Going back to the 2018 season finale in Seattle, Gonzalez's last three FG attempts have been from 50, 55 and 55 yards - and he made all three.

• A pair of undrafted free agents made a strong impression in their NFL debut. RB **Wes Hills** led the Cardinals with 37 rushing yards and a TD on eight attempts (5.6 avg.). S **Tyler Sigler** intercepted a pass in the third quarter and returned it 52 yards to set up Arizona's final TD.

Selection the Cardinals had in the first round of the 2019 NFL Draft. They used the pick to acquire 2018 Heisman Trophy-winning QB Kyler Murray out of Oklahoma. He was the first player taken by the Cardinals #1 overall since 1958 (QB King Hill out of Rice).

Record for Murray as a starting QB dating back to his time at powerhouse Allen (TX) High School. Murray posted a perfect 43-0 record at Allen High while leading the team to three consecutive state championships.

Career receptions for WR Larry Fitzgerald. He has more receptions with the Cardinals than any player in NFL history has with a single team, surpassing the previous record of 1,281 (with 49ers) held by Hall of Fame WR Jerry Rice. Fitzgerald enters 2019 needing just 23 catches to pass Hall of Fame TE Tony Gonzalez (1,325) for second place on the NFL's all-time receptions list.

234

Career games played for Fitzgerald. That is tied with K Jim Bakken (1962-78) for the most games played in franchise history. With his first game played in 2019, Fitzgerald would hold the new franchise mark.

43

Career TDs (31 rushing, 11 receiving, 1 KOR) for RB David Johnson. That is nine more than any other player in franchise history through their first four NFL seasons. Despite missing 15 games in 2017 due to injury, Johnson joins Rams RB Todd Gurley (56) and Raiders WR Antonio Brown (47) as the only players in the NFL with 40+ TDs in the last four seasons (2015-18).

41.0

Sacks for LB Chandler Jones in 48 career games with the Cardinals. Since being acquired by Arizona in a trade with New England in 2016, Jones leads the NFL in sacks (41.0) and is tied for the league lead in tackles for loss (57).

132.5

Career sacks for LB Terrell Suggs, who the Cardinals acquired in free agency. Suggs is the active NFL sacks leader and enters the 2019 season tied for 13th place on the NFL's all-time sacks list.

72

Total number of QBs Suggs has sacked in his NFL career. Suggs has at least one sack against 30 of the 32 current NFL franchises (Philadelphia and Baltimore being the exceptions).

INTs for Cards S.D.J. Swearingin in the last three seasons (2016-18). Among NFL safeties, only Tennessee's Kevin Byard (12) has more during that span.

14TH SEASON AT STATE FARM STADIUM

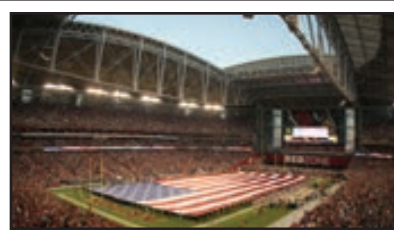
The Cardinals began their 14th season at State Farm Stadium last week when they hosted the L.A. Chargers in the preseason opener for both teams.

After selling out last week's preseason win over the Chargers, the Cardinals have now sold out all 135 games played at the world-class venue since it opened in 2006. A sellout of this week's contest against the Raiders would make it 136 straight.

There were only 12 games total that sold out in time to be televised locally in 18 years at Sun Devil Stadium.

State Farm Stadium has proven to be a catalyst for the Cardinals success in the last decade-plus. Below is a look at the results at State Farm Stadium compared to 18 seasons at Sun Devil Stadium.

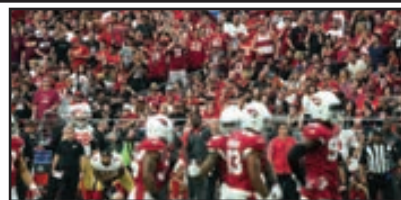

IT GETS LOUD IN THERE

Having a sellout crowd on hand has given the Cardinals one of the NFL's most distinct home field advantages.

Dating back to the inaugural year at State Farm Stadium in 2006, Cards opponents have accumulated 170 accepted false start penalties in the regular season. That is the most for any home team in the NFL during that span.

PALMER GOING INTO RING OF HONOR IN 2019

The Cardinals will induct QB **Carson Palmer** into its Ring of Honor at halftime of the game vs. Seattle on September 29th at State Farm Stadium.

Palmer played five seasons in Arizona (2013-17) and his .642 winning percentage is the best for a starting QB in team history. Acquired by the Cardinals in a trade with Oakland prior to the 2013 season, Palmer holds the franchise's single-season records for passing yards (4,671), TDs (35) and passer rating (104.6), all of which he set in 2015.

A five-time team captain in Arizona, Palmer posted a 38-21-1 record during his time with the Cardinals and led the team to a franchise single-season record 13 wins in 2015 and an appearance in the NFC Championship game. He started 60 games, completing 1,373-of-2,197 pass attempts (62.5%) for 16,782 yards, 105 TDs, 57 INTs and a 91.1 passer rating.

Palmer holds the franchise record for 300-yard passing games (25) and 400-yard passing performances (3). On the franchise career list, Palmer ranks 4th in team history in passing yards (16,782), 4th in pass attempts (2,197), 5th in completions (1,373), 2nd in completion percentage (62.5%), 1st in yards per attempt (7.64), 4th in TD passes (105), 2nd in TD percentage (4.8) and 2nd in passer rating (91.1).

With Palmer under center during the 2015 campaign, the Cardinals finished the year with the #1 offense in the NFL for the first time in team history and set team single-season records for wins (13), road wins (7), points (489) and total TDs (59) while earning the first postseason bye in team history.

Palmer will become the 18th member of the Cardinals Ring of Honor, the creation of which coincided with the opening of State Farm Stadium in 2006.



THE NEW FACES IN 2019

SUPPLEMENTAL PICK IN '19

In addition to their 11 picks in the 2019 NFL Draft, Arizona also selected DB **Jalen Thompson** in the fifth round of the 2019 NFL Supplemental Draft.

He became just the third player selected by the Cards in the supplemental draft and the first since 1990 (LSU T Willie Williams).

A TOP-10 TRIO AT WIDE RECEIVER

Arizona drafted three wide receivers in 2019, the most in a single draft for the team since 1990 (also three). The three wideouts selected by the Cardinals this year all have a particular distinction. All three - **Andy Isabella**, **Hakeem Butler** and **KeeSean Johnson** - were in the top-10 in receiving yards among FBS players last season.

WR Christian Kirk

The Cardinals 2018 second-round draft pick, Kirk was an All-American and the 2014 Arizona Gatorade Player of the Year at Saguaro. As a senior, he surpassed 3,000 all-purpose yards and scored 46 totaled TDs, leading the Sabercats to victory in the Division III state title game. During his time at Saguaro, Kirk was a teammate of both Murphy (2014) and Foster (2011).

CB Byron Murphy

After two seasons at Marcos de Niza (Tempe) High School he played his final two prep seasons (2014-15) at Saguaro. Helped lead the Sabercats to state titles during both his junior and senior seasons. As a senior in 2015, earned Arizona Division II Player of the Year and All-Arizona first team and was one of four finalists for the Lockheed Martin Air Defender Of the Year (top defensive back in the nation).

RB D.J. Foster

Foster led Saguaro (Scottsdale) High School to the Arizona Division III State Championship and set a single-season state record with 60 total TDs as a senior before a four-year career at Arizona State, where he was a two-time All-Pac-12 honoree and 2012 freshman All-American. He totaled 2,355 yards and 18 TDs on 444 carries and 2,458 yards and 14 TDs on 222 receptions for the Sun Devils.

LB Terrell Suggs

Attended Hamilton (Chandler) High School where he was a Parade All-American and Gatorade Arizona Player of the Year as a senior in 2000. He was also named to the All-American team and as the Arizona Player of the Year by USA Today as a senior after rushing for 2,274 yards and 26 TDs on 297 carries. Went on to become one of the most dominant pass rushers in college football history during his three-year run at Arizona State, where the consensus first-team All-American amassed 163 tackles (109 solo), 44 sacks, 65.5 tackles for loss, 14 forced fumbles.

QB Brett Hundley

Attended Chandler High School where he was named a SuperPrep All-American as a senior in 2010 after completing 139-of-225 pass attempts (61.8%) for 2,348 yards, 20 TDs and just two INTs and adding a team-high 856 rushing yards (7.0 avg.) and nine TDs. Hundley was named Arizona's Gatorade Player of the Year as a junior in 2009 after completing 107-of-170 pass attempts (62.9%) for 1,517 yards, 16 TDs and just two INTs.

LB Brooks Reed

A native of Tucson, Reed attended Sabino High School where he earned Tucson Citizen first-team All-3A-4A and Arizona Daily Star first-team All-Southern Arizona honors as a senior defensive lineman in 2005. Reed went on to attend the University of Arizona, where he was named first-team All-Pac-12 after collecting 47 tackles, 6.5 sacks and 10 tackles for loss as a senior in 2010.

CARDINALS HAVE EYE FOR LOCAL TALENT

Of the six local high school products on the Cardinals roster, four earned special recognition from the team during their prep career:

Murphy was named the Arizona Cardinals High School Player of the Year following his senior season at Saguaro in 2015.

Foster was named High School Player of the Week (week 2) and also Player of the Year in 2011 as a senior at Saguaro.

Kirk was named High School Player of the Week (week 1) as a senior at Saguaro in 2014.

Hundley was named High School Player of the Week (week 9) as a senior at Chandler in 2010.



CARDS TAKE MURRAY #1 OVERALL

Holding the #1 overall selection in the NFL Draft for just the fifth time in franchise history - and first time since 1958 - the Cardinals took Oklahoma QB **Kyler Murray** with the top pick in the 2019 NFL Draft.

A STAR IS BORN IN OKLAHOMA

After starting his college career at Texas A&M in 2015, Murray played two seasons at Oklahoma (2017-18). In his first season with the Sooners in 2017, Murray backed up Heisman Trophy winner and 2018 #1 overall pick Baker Mayfield.

Murray took over as the starter in 2018, starting 13 of 14 games and completing 260-of-377 pass attempts (69.0%) for 4,361 yards, 42 TDs and just seven INTs while also rushing for 1,001 yards and 12 TDs on 140 carries (7.2 avg.).



Below is a look at what Murray accomplished with the Sooners in 2018:

- Became the first FBS player ever to average at least 300 passing yards (311.5) and at least 60 rushing yards (71.5) per game for a full season.
- Joined Clemson's Deshaun Watson (2015) as the only FBS players to ever record at least 4,000 passing yards and at least 1,000 rushing yards in a season.
- Led the nation in total yards (school-record 5,362), points responsible for (324), yards/completion (16.8) and yards/pass attempt (single-season FBS record of 11.6).
- Only player in school history to throw for 300 yards and rush for 100 in a game and did so three times.
- Threw at least two TD passes in all but one game and threw at least three TD passes in 10 of 14 contests.
- Set school and Big 12 records with at least three TD passes in eight straight games.

MURRAY DOES A LOT OF WINNING

Dating back to his time at Allen (TX) High School, Murray has a 57-3 record as a starting quarterback. Murray had a perfect 43-0 record in high school, winning three consecutive state titles while totaling 14,515 yards and scoring 186 total TDs.

HEISMAN WINNER COMES TO AZ

The winner of the 2018 Heisman Trophy, **Kyler Murray** became just the third Heisman honoree ever drafted by the Cardinals.

Murray was the 22nd former Heisman winner to be selected #1 overall in the NFL Draft, dating back to the University of Chicago's Jay Berwanger in 1936.

--With the selection of Mayfield (2018) and Murray (2019) at #1 overall in the last two drafts, it marks the first time since 2010-11 (Bradford/Newton) that a Heisman winner was taken #1 overall in consecutive drafts.

--When Murray takes the field with AZ for the first time, he will become the fifth Heisman Trophy winner to play for the Cardinals: Bradford, Palmer, Leinart and Crow.

CARDS JOIN NFL TO CELEBRATE 100TH SEASON

The NFL is celebrating its 100th season in 2019. As the United States' oldest professional football franchise still in existence, the Cardinals hold a unique place in league history.

The Cardinals were founded in 1898 as the Morgan Athletic Club, predating the formation of the NFL by over 20 years. By the time the NFL was founded in 1920 as the American Professional Football Association (APFA), the team was known as the Racine Cardinals when it became one of the 14 charter members of the upstart league after paying a \$100 franchise fee. Today, the Cardinals and Chicago Bears remain the only two charter members of the NFL still in existence.

In 1932, Hall of Fame owner Charles W. Bidwill, Sr., then a vice president of the Bears, purchased the Cardinals. After divesting himself of his Bears' holdings, that began a period of family ownership that continues today with current owner **William V. Bidwill** and team president **Michael Bidwill**.

In 2019, the Cardinals will join the NFL in celebrating 100 years of play with a year-long series of "NFL 100" events, initiatives and programs celebrating fans, players and communities.

The historic and unprecedented celebration is a salute to the millions of fans who love the game; highlighting the unifying nature of football and its positive impact in communities; bringing together generations of past, present and future players; and looking ahead to the NFL's next 100 years.



A HISTORY OF BEING THE FIRST

In addition to being the oldest professional football team in the country, the Cardinals also have a long history of being a pioneer in the sport - both on and off the playing field.

DIVERSITY

1st Female Owner in NFL History: Following the 1947 death of Cardinals owner and Pro Football Hall of Fame Charles Bidwill, his wife Violet oversaw operations of the franchise for the next 15 years. As such, she became the first female to serve as principal owner in NFL history.

1st African American Female Executive in NFL History:

Adele Harris spent 26 seasons with the franchise before retiring in 2001. She holds the distinction of being the first African American female to hold a front office position with an NFL team. Harris first worked as a secretary for the St. Louis Football Cardinals from 1971-74. She left the club to pursue a degree in business management and returned to the team in 1978 as a publicity assistant. By 1980, Harris became the team's director of community relations, and was instrumental in the team's civic efforts when it relocated to Arizona in 1988. Harris passed away in November of 2007, at the age of 65.

1st African American to Handle Contract Negotiations for NFL Team: In 1981, the team hired attorney Bob Wallace, making him the first African American to handle contract negotiations for an NFL club.

1st African American Head Coach/General Manager Tandem: In 2004, the Cardinals hired Dennis Green as the team's head coach. Joining General Manager Rod Graves, they became the first African American general manager/head coach pairing. Hired by Arizona in 1997 as Assistant to the President, Graves spent 16 seasons with the organization, including the last six years at the team's GM.

1st Female Coach in NFL History: In 2015, the Cardinals hired Jen Welter as a coaching intern for training camp and the preseason to work with inside linebackers, making her the first female coach of any kind in NFL history.

INTERNATIONAL PLAY

1st NFL Game Outside of North America: The most popular sport in the United States played before an international audience for the first time ever when the Cardinals and San Diego Chargers met for a preseason matchup at Korakuen Stadium in Tokyo, Japan. On August 16, 1976 the Cardinals defeated the Chargers 20-10 before an estimated crowd of 38,000.

1st NFL Game in Europe: On August 6, 1983 the Cardinals faced the Minnesota Vikings in a preseason matchup at Wembley Stadium in London. The Vikings defeated by the Cardinals 28-10 in front of 32,847 fans at the landmark event.

1st NFL Regular Season Game Played Outside United States: On October 2, 2005 the Cardinals earned a 17-point come-from-behind victory over the San Francisco 49ers in a game played in front of a then-record crowd of 103,467 at Mexico City's Estadio Azteca. It was the first NFL regular season game ever played outside of the US.

FOOTBALL FIRSTS

1st Night Game in NFL History:

On November 6, 1929 the Providence Steamrollers became the first team to host a game at night using floodlights - in a matchup against the Cardinals. That night contest also featured the first use of a football painted white during an actual game. With fan attendance crucial to generate revenue, the game was played in the evening rather than during the workday. The minor league baseball field of Kinsley Park was adorned with floodlights and fans witnessed the Cardinals 16-0 victory over the Steamrollers.

1st Out of Town Training Camp: Prior to the 1929 season, the Cardinals conducted what is believed to be the NFL's first extended out-of-town training camp when the team spent the summer at Waterworks Park in Coldwater, Michigan.

1st Indoor NFL Game: With the country struggling through the Great Depression in late 1930, the Chicago Cardinals challenged the cross-town Bears to play a game to raise money for the governor's fund for unemployment relief. To battle the freezing temperatures the teams agreed to play at Chicago Stadium, then the largest indoor arena in the world. On December 15, 1930 the Bears earned a 9-7 victory in front of 10,000 fans. Six inches of dirt were hauled in and rolled for a playing surface, forcing the teams to use a white ball to increase visibility for both the players and fans. In addition to raising thousands of dollars for charity, it was a precursor to the 1932 championship when the Bears played for the NFL title in the same venue.

1st Retractable Grass Field in NFL History: When the Cardinals opened their new stadium in 2006, the venue broke the mold in terms of design and architecture. Among its most unique features is a fully retractable grass playing surface that resides outside the stadium for 300+ days a year and rolls in when needed. The first of its kind in NFL history - the Raiders stadium currently being built in Las Vegas will utilize similar technology - the stadium's grass playing surface has consistently ranked #1 in surveys of the league's players.

CARDS A MEMBER OF NFL'S TWO OLDEST RIVALRIES

Having met twice during the NFL's inaugural season in 1920, the Cardinals and Bears represent the oldest rivalry in league history. The Cardinals and Packers - who joined the league in 1921 - are the NFL's second-oldest rivalry. The Packers were formed in 1919 by Earl (Curly) Lambeau and George Calhoun but did not gain entry into the APFA until 1921.



1920 Racine Cardinals

- The Cards and Bears have faced each other 90 times during the regular season, dating back to 1920.
- The first-ever meeting between the Cardinals and Bears - then known as the Racine Cardinals and Decatur Staleys - occurred at Normal Park in Chicago on November 28th, 1920, exactly 72 days after the league was conceived as the APFA during a meeting in Canton, OH. In that game, the Cardinals defeated the Staleys 7-6 at Normal Park.
- The first meeting between the Cardinals and Packers (a 3-3 tie) occurred on November 20, 1921 at Normal Park in Chicago. The following week (November 27, 1921), the Packers and Bears met for the first time.

FRIENDSHIP OF THE HALL OF FAME OWNERS

Cardinals Hall of Fame owner **Charles Bidwill** and Bears Hall of Fame owner **George Halas** had a friendship that endured even as their team's were cross-town rivals during their shared time in Chicago.

At one point during the Great Depression, that friendship helped save Halas' ownership of the Bears.

In 1931, Halas' co-owner Edward "Dutch" Sternaman proposed being bought out of his stake in the Bears for \$38,000, which was to be paid in installments. After suffering \$18,000 in losses during the 1932 season, Halas was \$15,000 short when the final payment was due in 1933. Defaulting on the payment meant ownership would revert to Sternaman.

"It was a case of finding \$15,000 in a hurry, or losing everything I'd worked for since moving the Staleys from Decatur to Chicago in 1921," Halas wrote in 1967 in a history of the Bears published in the Chicago Tribune. "From this desperate situation, I was rescued by the joint efforts of my mother and my good friend Charley Bidwill. Mother bought \$5,000 worth of stock from her savings, Bidwill purchased \$5,000 in stock and also arranged a bank loan for the remaining \$5,000 needed. But it was a mighty close call. As I remember, I finally got all the money together at 11:10 a.m. on the day the final note came due. Forfeit time was 12 o'clock noon."

CARDINALS 2019 SCHEDULE NOTES

– This year will mark the ninth time in 14 seasons at State Farm Stadium that the Cards will open the regular season at home. In 18 seasons at Sun Devil Stadium, the Cards never played a Week 1 home game.

– For the second straight season, the Cardinals open with three of their first four regular season games at home. Since the NFL moved to a 16-game season in 1978, that has happened just five times prior to 2018: 1979 in St. Louis and then four times since State Farm Stadium opened (2009, '12, '15 and '16). Of their initial six regular season games, the Cards will play four at home.

– The Cardinals will play east of Arizona just once in the final nine weeks of the regular season.

– The Cardinals take on the AFC North (Baltimore, Cincinnati, Cleveland, Pittsburgh) and the NFC South (Atlanta, Carolina, New Orleans, Tampa Bay) in 2019.

– In addition to facing the AFC North and NFC South in 2019, Arizona will host Detroit, who finished the 2018 season in fourth place in the NFC North. The Cardinals will travel to face the Giants, who finished fourth in the NFC East in 2018.

– The Cards have six games against teams that finished the 2018 season with at least 10 wins, including the LA Rams (13) twice, Seattle (10) twice, Baltimore (10) and New Orleans (13).

"FLIGHT PLAN" RETURNS FOR SEASON 2

For the second consecutive year, the Cardinals gave fans a behind the scenes look at the team's offseason with a multi-episode *Cardinals Flight Plan* series on Facebook Watch and YouTube.

The second season of the Emmy Award winning docuseries *Cardinals Flight Plan* debuted in February. The first season of the show in 2018 garnered over 14 million views on Facebook Watch.

The season two debut – *Episode One: Sudden Change* – aired on February 7 and chronicled the end of the Cardinals 2018 season and the changes that followed, including the hiring of new Head Coach **Kliff Kingsbury**.

Cardinals Flight Plan provided an in-depth look at the busy offseason, with exclusive access to free agency, along with the process leading up to the 2019 NFL Draft and the Cardinals' #1 overall pick. Season two featured eight episodes:

Episode 1: Sudden Change – Inside the hiring of head coach Kliff Kingsbury, WR **Larry Fitzgerald**'s return, and catching up with some of the team's top players during their offseason.

And for the third consecutive week, the Cardinals will be available to a national audience as the NFL Network will broadcast next week's game at Minnesota (8/24).



CARDINALS BROADCAST TO PRODUCE FINAL TWO PRESEASON MATCHUPS

Following this week's nationally televised matchup against the Raiders on ESPN, the Emmy award winning Cardinals Broadcast Network will produce the final two preseason games that can be seen locally on 12 News KPNX-TV (NBC).

The preseason broadcasts airing on 12 News include next week's contest at Minnesota and the preseason finale at Denver on August 29.

The Cardinals regular radio team of **Dave Pasch** (play-by-play) and **Ron Wolfley** (analyst) will be joined by Cardinals reporter/producer **Lisa Matthews** (sideline reporter) to call the action in Minnesota. Cardinals reporter **Paul Calvisi** will join Wolfley and Matthews for the Denver broadcast on August 29.

The two remaining games produced by the Cardinals will be preceded by a half-hour pregame show hosted by NBC reporter **Paul Gerke**. The Cardinals-Vikings game on August 24 will start with the pregame show at 9:30 a.m. and then kick-off at 10:00 a.m. and the Cardinals-Broncos preseason finale on August 29 will start with the pregame show at 5:30 p.m. followed by the game at 6:00 p.m.

In addition, the pregame and game broadcasts will be shown in the Tucson market on KTTU-TV (MY 18), in the Albuquerque market on KOAT-TV (ABC 7) and in the Las Vegas market on KSNV-TV (News 3). The two remaining Cardinals produced broadcasts will be replayed on Fox Sports Arizona during the week following each game.

On the radio side, Paul Calvisi (play-by-play) will be joined by former Cardinals **DE Bertrand Berry** (analyst) and *azcardinals.com* writer **Darren Urban** (sideline reporter) on the call for the Vikings and Broncos games. Cardinals digital correspondent and Cover 2 host **Craig Grialou** will handle the play-by-play for the Broncos contest. Each game can be heard on Arizona Sports 98.7 FM.

OFF-THE-FIELD ACCOLADES FOR #11

The week before the Cardinals reported to training camp in 2019, WR **Larry Fitzgerald** added to his long list of accolades for the charity work he undertakes around the world.

Fitzgerald was honored with the *Caring Award* from the Starkey Hearing Foundation at their Summer Sounds Annual Benefit on July 20th.

"Larry has been an incredible supporter of our work for years," Starkey Hearing Foundation President and Board Chair Richard Brown said in a statement. "It is because of dedicated sponsors and volunteers like him that we are able to bring the gift of hearing to so many more people around the world. We are so thankful for Larry's tireless commitment to serve others and help change the world."

Husband and wife team **Bill and Tani Austin** - neighbors of Fitzgerald's in Minnesota - co-founded the Starkey Hearing Foundation, an organization that distributing hearing aids to patients around the world who normally could not receiving them. Since meeting the Austin's 10 years ago, Fitzgerald has participated in over 15 missions with the foundation.

Fitzgerald has fitted children with hearing aids in numerous countries such as the Congo, the Philippines, Malaysia, Thailand, India, Uganda and Rwanda among others. The Starkey trips have always been important to Fitzgerald, who is heading into his 16th NFL season.

"Starkey brought me in as family and showed me globally how to have a profound impact on humanity just by being in touch with the basic needs of humanity," Fitzgerald said. "From the first time having a person sitting in my chair who couldn't hear to seeing the reaction after they were fit with hearing aids was profound. It touched me deeply."

A co-winner of the 2016 Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year in 2016, Fitzgerald has also been recognized as the Arthur S. Arkush Humanitarian Award by Pro Football Weekly (2012), the Georgetown Lombardi Award from the NFL Players Association (2013) and the first-ever Art Rooney Sportmanship Award (2014) in a vote of his NFL peers.



THE KINGSBURY ERA BEGINS IN ARIZONA

TAKING THE REINS

On January 8, 2019 the Cardinals announced the hiring of **Kliff Kingsbury** as the team's head coach.

The 39-year old Kingsbury spent the past six seasons (2013-18) as the head coach at his alma mater, Texas Tech, and was hired as USC's offensive coordinator in December. The New Braunfels, TX native is an 11-year coaching veteran who has also worked at Texas A&M (2012) and at the University of Houston (2008-11) where he began his coaching career.

Recognized as one of the profession's brightest and most-innovative offensive minds, Kingsbury has tutored six future NFL QBs, including first-round selections Patrick Mahomes, Baker Mayfield and Johnny Manziel as well as Case Keenum, Davis Webb and Nic Shimonek. Under Kingsbury's guidance, Mahomes (2016) and Keenum (2009, '11) both led the nation in passing.



Highlights from Kingsbury's Coaching Career

- While at Texas Tech, Kingsbury served as the play-caller for one of college football's most explosive and productive offenses. The Red Raiders featured a passing attack that ranked in the top-10 in the country in all six seasons of his tenure, ranked in the top-20 nationally for total offense in all six seasons and finished in the top-25 in scoring five times.
- Under Kingsbury, Texas Tech averaged at least 30 points per game, 470 total yards per game and 300 passing yards per game in all six seasons. The Red Raiders averaged more than 500 yards of offense in four seasons and over 450 passing yards twice. They also averaged at least 140 rushing yards per game four times in six seasons under Kingsbury and averaged more than 40 points per game twice.
- At both Houston (2011) and Texas Tech (2016) Kingsbury's offenses led the nation in total offense and passing offense.
- Dating back to his first offensive coordinator job at Houston in 2011, a Kingsbury-led offense never finished outside the top-20 in the nation in total offense and never finished outside the top-15 in passing offense.
- In 2016, Texas Tech led the nation in total offense (566.6 ypg) and passing offense (463.0 ypg) while finishing #5 in scoring (43.7 ppg). It was the sixth consecutive season a Kingsbury-led unit finished in the top-10 in total offense dating back to his time at both Houston and Texas A&M.
- In 2015, the Red Raiders finished #2 in the nation in total offense (579.5 ypg), #2 in scoring offense (45.1 ppg) and had the nation's second ranked passing offense (388.2 ypg). The 45.1 points per game average established a school single-season record and Texas Tech was one of just two schools in the nation to score at least 25 points in every game. The Red Raiders featured a 4,000-yard passer, 1,000-yard receiver and a 1,000-yard rusher for the first time in school history.
- With Kingsbury serving as co-offensive coordinator in 2011, Houston led the nation in total offense (599.1 ypg), passing offense (450.1 ypg) and scoring (49.3 ppg) as quarterback Case Keenum finished his collegiate career as the most prolific passer in NCAA FBS history.

Kingsbury spent the 2012 season at Texas A&M as offensive coordinator/QBs coach working under current University of Arizona head coach Kevin Sumlin. Texas A&M finished third nationally in total offense (558.5 ypg) with an attack that finished 13th nationally in rushing (242.1 ypg) and 14th in passing (316.5 ypg). The Aggies beat #1 Alabama on the road and #11 Oklahoma in the Cotton Bowl.

Kingsbury began his coaching career at the University of Houston under Sumlin as the offensive quality control coach (2008-09) prior to being elevated to QBs coach (2010) and then co-offensive coordinator in 2011.

Kingsbury played QB at Texas Tech (1999-2002) where he set 39 school records, 16 Big 12 marks and 17 NCAA records during his collegiate career while throwing for 12,423 yards and 95 TDs. As a senior in 2012, he was awarded the Sammy Baugh Trophy as the nation's top college QB and was also named the Associated Press Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year while finishing ninth in Heisman Trophy voting.

He was drafted in the sixth round of the NFL Draft by New England in 2003 and spent his rookie season on the Patriots injured reserve list before spending the 2004 season on the Saints practice squad. Kingsbury played in one game with the Jets in 2005 and attended training camp with the Bills in 2006. He also played with the Cologne Centurions of NFL Europe in 2006 before playing with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League in 2007.

In 2018, Kingsbury was inducted into the Texas High School Football Hall of Fame. He played high school football under his father, Tim, at New Braunfels (TX) High School where he threw for more than 3,000 yards and 34 TDs as a senior.

COACHING QUARTERBACKS

Since joining the coaching ranks with the University of Houston in 2008, **Kliff Kingsbury** has mentored six future NFL QBs during his coaching tenure: *Patrick Mahomes, Baker Mayfield, Johnny Manziel, Case Keenum, Davis Webb* and *Nic Shimonek*. Mahomes, Mayfield and Manziel were all selected in the 1st round of the NFL Draft.

Mahomes (Texas Tech)

Under Kingsbury's tutelage, Mahomes spent two full seasons (2015-16) as the starter at Texas Tech. In those two years the Red Raiders finished #2 (2015) and #1 (2016) in the nation in total offense while Mahomes threw for a combined 9,705 yards and 77 TDs in 25 starts.

As a sophomore in 2015, Mahomes became the youngest QB in NCAA history to amass 5,000 yards of total offense. He eclipsed the 5,000-yard mark again in 2016, becoming just the third quarterback ever to record 5,000+ yards of total offense in back-to-back seasons.

Keenum (Univ. of Houston)

Kingsbury began his coaching career at the University of Houston where he was a quality control coach from 2008-09 before being promoted to QBs coach in 2010 and co-offensive coordinator in 2011. The Cougars led the nation in total offense, passing offense and scoring in 2011, while Keenum completed his record-setting career by placing seventh in the Heisman Trophy voting and winning the Sammy Baugh Award.

With Kingsbury calling plays, the Cougars averaged 599.1 total yards per game, including 450.1 through the air, while scoring over 49 points per game. Keenum wrapped up his career as the most prolific passer in NCAA FBS history. In his one season with Kingsbury as his QBs coach, Keenum completed 428-of-604 passes for 5,631 yards and 48 TDs, all of which led the NCAA FBS.

Manziel (Texas A&M)

Prior to taking over at Texas Tech, Kingsbury spent one season (2012) as the offensive coordinator at Texas A&M. In his lone season with the Aggies, Kingsbury played a crucial role in Manziel becoming the first freshman ever to win the Heisman Trophy.

Webb and Shimonek (Texas Tech)

Two other Kingsbury quarterbacks have also moved on to the league in recent years as Webb was selected by the New York Giants in the third round of the 2017 draft while Shimonek signed an undrafted free agent agreement with the Los Angeles Chargers in 2018.



HIGH-POWERED OFFENSE

Dating back to his first season as an offensive coordinator at the college level (2011 with Houston), **Kingsbury's** offenses have averaged 40.3 points/game. During his six seasons at Texas Tech (2013-18), the Red Raiders averaged 37.8 points/game.

Not Slowing Down Against Ranked Opponents

Under Kingsbury, the Tech Tech offenses averaged 502 yards/game in 24 contests against ranked opponents from 2013-18. The Red Raiders posted 600+ yards of offense in six of those games.



TOM CLEMENTS - PASS GAME COORDINATOR/QBS

Entering his first season as the Cardinals Pass Game Coordinator/QBs coach, veteran assistant **Tom Clements** (CLEM-ents) is a 24-year coaching veteran who has spent 20 seasons as an assistant coach in the NFL, including five seasons as an offensive coordinator.



- Named Cardinals pass game coordinator/QBs coach on 1/22/19.
- Coached for 11 seasons with the Packers (2006-16). In his 11 seasons with Green Bay, the Packers finished top-10 in the NFL in total offense nine times, made the postseason nine times and won Super Bowl XLV following the 2010 season.
- During his tenure with the Packers, Clements helped with the development of QB Aaron Rodgers who was selected to six Pro Bowls and earned NFL MVP honors in 2011 and 2014.
- In three seasons as offensive coordinator with Green Bay (2012-14), the Packers ranked #3 in the NFL in scoring (27.8 ppg), #5 in total offense (381.9 ypg), #3 in giveaways (54) and #5 in first downs (1,048).
- The Packers finished top-10 in the NFL in scoring in each season Clements worked as offensive coordinator, including in 2014 when the Packers led the NFL with 486 points.
- Also coached QB Brett Favre, who in 2007 was selected to the Pro Bowl after throwing for more than 4,000 yards for the fifth time in his career and led the Packers to the NFC Championship game.
- Has coached 13 different offensive players to a total of 21 Pro Bowls and tutored five quarterbacks who had 13 total 3,000-yard passing seasons, including eight 4,000-yard campaigns.

Prior to joining Green Bay, Clements spent two seasons (2004-05) as the offensive coordinator in Buffalo. He spent the previous seven years as a QBs coach with Pittsburgh, Kansas City and New Orleans. Clements helped Elvis Grbac (Chiefs in 2000) and Kordell Stewart (Steelers in 2001) earn Pro Bowl selections while Tommy Maddox (Pittsburgh) was named NFL Comeback Player of the Year in 2002.

Clements got his start in coaching at his alma mater, Notre Dame, spending four seasons (1992-95) working under Lou Holtz. He played 12 years in the Canadian Football League as a QB and was a seven-time divisional All-Star, 1987 CFL MVP, 1975 CFL Rookie of the Year and two-time Gray Cup Champion with Ottawa (1976) and Winnipeg (1984), earning the Outstanding Offensive Player award in each game.

JEFF RODGERS - ASST. HEAD COACH/SPECIAL TEAMS

Jeff Rodgers is in his second season with Arizona and first as the team's assistant head coach/special teams coordinator.

He came to Cardinals in January, 2018 as the team's special teams coordinator and added the title of assistant head coach in 2019.



- Hired as Cardinals special teams coordinator in 2018 after working in the same capacity for three seasons (2015-17) with the Chicago Bears.
- Has 18 years of coaching experience, including 15 seasons coaching special teams in the NFL with Arizona, Chicago (2015-17), Denver (2011-14), Carolina (2009-10) and San Francisco (2003-07).
- Helped the Cardinals rank 5th in the NFL in special teams last season after the team finished 30th in 2017. P Andy Lee led the NFL and set a franchise single-season record with a 48.6-yard punting average and rookie LB Zeke Turner led the NFL with 13 solo special teams tackles in 2018.
- The Broncos returned six kicks for TDs during Rodgers tenure in Denver (2011-14), tied for the second most in the NFL in that span. In 2012, Trindon Holliday became the first player in NFL history to record multiple return TDs in a playoff game when he scored on a 90-yard punt return and a 104-yard kickoff return in a 38-35 double-overtime loss to the Ravens.
- Under Rodgers tutelage, Broncos K Matt Prater was named to the Pro Bowl in 2013 after setting franchise records in field goal percentage (96.2%; 25-of-26) and points scored (150). Prater's 64-yard field goal in 2013 is the longest in NFL history. In 2014, K Connor Barth's 93.8 field-goal percentage (15-of-16) was the second-highest in team history.

Rodgers began his coaching career at the University of Arizona in 2001, spending two seasons as a graduate assistant working with the secondary and LBs under head coach John Mackovic. He entered the NFL coaching ranks with San Francisco in 2003 as a special teams quality control coach for two seasons.

VANCE JOSEPH - DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

Vance Joseph was hired as Arizona's Defensive Coordinator this offseason and joins the Cardinals after two years (2017-18) as head coach of the Denver Broncos.



He is a 20-year coaching veteran, including 14 seasons in the NFL with San Francisco (2005-10), Houston (2011-13), Cincinnati (2014-15), Miami (2016) and Denver (2017-18).

- Hired as Cardinals defensive coordinator on 1/11/19.
- Joseph has 12 years of coaching experience on the defensive side of the ball in the NFL, including as defensive coordinator with Miami in 2016.
- In Joseph's initial season with the Broncos in 2017, Denver had the NFL's #3 ranked defense and joined Minnesota as the only teams in the NFL that season to rank in the top-five in both run defense and pass defense. The Broncos ranked #5 in run defense in '17 after finishing the previous year ranked #28 in that category.
- In 2018, the Broncos defense ranked in the top-10 in the NFL in INTs (17), takeaways (28) and sacks (44). Rookie LB Bradley Chubb – Denver's first-round selection in the 2018 NFL Draft – led all NFL rookies with 12.0 sacks last season. Pro Bowl LB Von Miller had 14.5 sacks, tied for fourth in the NFL last season. Denver was one of three teams (Seattle, Kansas City) to have two players record double digit sacks in 2018.
- In a stretch from 2011-16, which spanned jobs in Houston, Cincinnati and Miami, Joseph's teams made the postseason five times in six seasons.
- Joseph's teams have ranked in the top-10 in INTs in four of the past five seasons.
- Four different DBs earned a combined five Pro Bowl selections – Johnathan Joseph (2), Reggie Nelson (1), Adam Jones (1) and Walt Harris (1) – during Joseph's time coaching defensive backs in Cincinnati, Houston and San Francisco.

Prior to his tenure in Miami, Joseph coached DBs for two seasons (2014-15) with Cincinnati, helping the Bengals to back-to-back postseason appearances. During his two seasons with Cincinnati, the Bengals led the NFL with 41 INTs. Cincinnati was the only team to post more INTs than TDs allowed (36) during that two-year stretch while holding opposing QBs to the lowest combined passer rating (77.4) in the NFL.

Prior to beginning his coaching career as a grad assistant at the University of Colorado in 2000, Joseph appeared in 30 games for the Buffaloes (1990-94), playing QB, RB and on special teams, and was a member of the Buffaloes 1990 National Championship team. He served as a backup to All-American QBs Darian Hagan and Kordell Stewart and completed 34-of-61 passes for 454 yards and four TDs to go along with 50 carries for 237 yards and one TD in his college career.

He converted to CB in the NFL and signed with the Jets as an undrafted rookie free agent in 1995. As a rookie, Joseph played in 13 games and had 21 tackles (17 solo), two INTs and five passes defended. He played in four games with the Colts in 1996 before spending the preseason with Denver in 1997.

COACHING STAFF HIGHLIGHTS

- Of the 23 coaches on the Cards staff, 16 are new to the organization. The seven returning coaches are **Chris Achuff** (Defensive Line), **Steve Heiden** (Tight Ends), **Randall McCray** (Asst. Special Teams), **Buddy Morris** (Strength & Conditioning), **Jeff Rodgers** (Asst. Head Coach/Special Teams Coordinator), **Vernon Stephens** (Asst. Strength & Conditioning) and **Cam Turner** (Offensive Asst./Asst. Quarterbacks).



- The Cards coaching staff enters the 2019 season with a combined 347 years of coaching experience at the college and NFL levels: 174 in the NFL; 173 in college. Of the 23 coaches on staff, 19 enter the season with NFL coaching experience.
- In addition to their experience on the sidelines, the Cardinals staff features seven coaches who played a combined 38 years in the NFL: **Kliff Kingsbury** (3), **Vance Joseph** (2), **Tom Clements** (1), **Steve Heiden** (11), **Brian Natkin** (1), **Marcus Robertson** (12) and **James Saxon** (8).
- Eight members of the Arizona staff enter the year having coached at least 10 seasons in the NFL: **Bill Davis** (24), **Tom Clements** (20), **James Saxon** (19), **Jeff Rodgers** (15), **Vance Joseph** (14), **Sean Kugler** (12), **Marcus Robertson** (12) and **Greg Williams** (10).
- Three members of the staff - Kingsbury (Texas Tech), Joseph (Denver Broncos) and Sean Kugler (Texas-El Paso) - have previously served as a head coach either at the college or NFL level.

CHRIS ACHUFF - Defensive Line



Last name pronounced "A-cuff" ... long-time college assistant enters his second season with the Cardinals and first as the D-Line coach ... joined the Cardinals in 2018 after 19 years coaching at the collegiate level, coaching the D-line at Baylor (2008-16), Tennessee-Martin (2006-07), Charleston Southern (2005) and Tennessee-Chattanooga (2004).

BUDDY MORRIS - Strength & Conditioning



Now in his fifth season as the Cards strength and conditioning coach ... previously with the Browns (2002-04), returned to the NFL in 2014 with the Cardinals following stints at the Univ. of Buffalo and the Univ. of Pittsburgh ... in 2009, Muscle & Fitness Magazine named his private gym (New York Sports Center) one of the 10 toughest in America.

PETER BEDOVINAC - Asst. Wide Receivers



Last name pronounced "buh-DOE-vuh-nack" ... spent the last six seasons (2013-18) at the college level ... a former QB at Michigan State (2010-12), spent the 2018 season as a defensive graduate assistant at Ohio State ... spent the previous three seasons (2015-17) coaching LBs at Missouri State after beginning his coaching career at Missouri in 2013.

BRIAN NATKIN - Asst. Offensive Line



Joins the Cardinals in 2019 after spending the last 15 seasons at the college level ... a consensus All-American TE as a player at the University of Texas-El Paso, spent the 2018 season as run-game coordinator/O-Line coach at Hutchinson (KS) Community College ... worked the previous six seasons (2012-17) at his alma mater, UTEP.

CHARLIE BULLEN - Asst. Linebackers



Enters his first season with Arizona and eighth in the NFL ... spent the last seven seasons (2012-18) with Miami, including the past three seasons as the Dolphins assistant LBs coach ... prior to working with the Dolphins, coached for three seasons (2009-11) as a graduate assistant, working with defensive backs at his alma mater, the University of Iowa.

DAVID RAIH - Wide Receivers



Last name pronounced "RYE" ... spent the last five seasons with Green Bay as WRs coach (2018), offensive perimeter coach (2017), asst. O-Line coach (2016) and coaching administrator (2014-15) ... played QB at Iowa (1999-2003) and helped the Hawkeyes to a 2002 Big Ten Conference Championship and a berth in the 2003 FedEx Orange Bowl.

BILL DAVIS - Linebackers



Returns to the Cardinals for his second tenure with the team after previously working as Arizona's defensive coordinator (2009-10) and LBs coach (2007-08) ... has 24 years of coaching experience in the NFL, including seven seasons as a defensive coordinator with Arizona, Philadelphia and San Francisco ... spent the past two seasons (2017-18) as LBs coach at Ohio State.

MARCUS ROBERTSON - Defensive Backs



A former NFL DB, enters his first season as Arizona's DBs coach after spending the past two seasons (2017-18) in the same role with the Broncos ... has spent the last 28 seasons in the NFL as a player, coach, and administrator and has coached DBs for the past 12 seasons with Tennessee (2007-11), Detroit (2012-13), Oakland (2014-16) and Denver.

ROB GROSSO - Defensive Quality Control



Begins his first season in Arizona after working as the assistant to the head coach under Vance Joseph in Denver in 2018 ... previously served as an operations intern with the Broncos in 2017 ... a former WR at John Carroll University (2011-13), worked with the Arizona Rattlers of the IFL during the 2017 season as a coaching/player personnel intern.

JAMES SAXON - Running Backs



Has 19 seasons of experience as a RBs coach (2000-18) in the NFL after an eight-year playing career in the league with the Chiefs (1988-91), Dolphins (1992-94) and Eagles (1995) ... came to AZ after coaching Pittsburgh's RBs the past five seasons (2014-18) ... has coached for four different franchises that had eight total postseason appearances.

STEVE HEIDEN - Tight Ends



Veteran NFL tight end enters his seventh season with the Cardinals and first as TEs coach after working the past six seasons as asst. O-Line coach (2018) and asst. special teams/asst. TEs coach (2013-17) ... after playing in the NFL for 11 seasons (1999-2009), entered the coaching ranks in 2012 as TEs coach at Concordia University in St. Paul, MN.

DON SHUMPERT - Bill Bidwill Fellowship/RBs



Comes to the Cardinals after spending last season with the NY Giants as an offensive assistant ... former WR who attended rookie mini-camp with the Chicago Bears and Kansas City Chiefs ... served as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, the University of Iowa, for two seasons (2016-17), assisting the Hawkeyes WRs and special teams.

SEAN KUGLER - Offensive Line



Last name pronounced "KOOG-ler" ... a 29-year coaching veteran, has spent 12 seasons as an assistant in the NFL having previously coached with Detroit (2001-05), Buffalo (2007-09) and Pittsburgh (2010-12) in addition to last season with Denver as the Broncos O-Line/guards/centers coach ... was the head coach at his alma mater, Texas-El Paso, for five seasons (2013-17).

A former WR and QB at The Citadel, now in his second year with Arizona's coaching staff in '19 ... spent three seasons (2015-17) in Carolina, where he assisted WRs for two years before serving as the assistant QBs coach in 2017 ... prior to Carolina, spent two seasons (2013-14) as the QBs and WRs coach at Florida International.

RANDALL McCRAY - Asst. Special Teams



Enters his second year with the Cardinals in '19 ... a college assistant coach for 26 seasons, was hired by the Cardinals in 2018 ... came to Arizona after spending two years as Texas State's assistant head coach, defensive coordinator and LBs coach ... began his coaching career as a grad assistant at South Carolina in 1991.

SPENCER WHIPPLE - Offensive Quality Control



In his first NFL season after spending the past seven years at the college level ... coached the last five seasons (2014-18) at the Univ. of Massachusetts where he served as the passing game coordinator/QBs coach in '18 ... joined the UMass staff in 2014 as TEs coach before working the following three seasons (2015-17) as passing game coordinator/WRs coach.

RUSTY MCKINNEY - Defensive Asst.



In his first season with the Cardinals - and sixth in the NFL - after spending the past three seasons as a defensive quality control coach with Miami, including working under Cardinals defensive coordinator Vance Joseph in 2016 ... started in the NFL with Cleveland as a coaching intern for two seasons (2014-15) after five seasons (2009-13) at Bentley University.

GREG WILLIAMS - Cornerbacks



Came to Arizona after spending last season coaching DBs with the Broncos ... has 15 years of coaching experience, including 10 seasons in the NFL ... a former WR and DB at the University of North Carolina (1994-97), spent time in training camp with the Bears and Giants ... began his coaching career at Arizona State as an intern in 2003.

ELEVATING A FRANCHISE

The 2019 season will be the 13th since **Michael Bidwill** took over as team President in 2007. His leadership during that time has gone a long way in transforming the franchise – both on and off the field.

Highlights of Bidwill's tenure:

- Leading the list of Bidwill's accomplishments with the Cardinals is the creation of State Farm Stadium. Since it opened in 2006, the team has sold out all 134 games (preseason and postseason included) played at the venue, which has also hosted a pair of Super Bowls.



- In addition to his role in helping Arizona land Super Bowls XLII and XLIX, he led the effort to land Super Bowl LVII (2023) in the spring of 2018. Michael was instrumental in getting the 2015 Pro Bowl moved to Arizona; played a week before Super Bowl XLIX and the 2015 Pro Bowl combined to deliver a record economic impact of \$720 million to the region.

- By the time it hosts Super Bowl LVII, State Farm Stadium will have undergone \$100 million in improvements including parking infrastructure, state-of-the-art wifi, video boards, sound system upgrades and club-area enhancements since it staged Super Bowl XLIX.

- Of the Cardinals seven all-time postseason wins, five have come during Bidwill's 12 years as team president. Arizona has played in nine postseason contests since Bidwill took over in 2007. The Cardinals played just seven total playoff games in their entire history prior to his tenure.

- Arizona has appeared in the NFC Championship Game twice during Bidwill's time as president (2008, 2015), including a victory in the 2008 conference title game that led to the franchise's first-ever Super Bowl appearance (Super Bowl XLIII).

- Arizona's 50 wins between 2013-17 were the most in any five-year span in franchise history.

- Oversaw the team's appearance in the groundbreaking Amazon Original series All or Nothing: A Season with the Arizona Cardinals. Produced by NFL Films, the eight-episode series was awarded the Sports Emmy for Outstanding Serialized Sports Documentary in May of 2017.

- In January of 2016, the National Football Foundation (NFF) and College Hall of Fame inducted Bidwill and Arizona Governor Doug Ducey into the NFF Leadership Hall of Fame.

- In January of 2018, Michael was one of five owners named to the NFL's Player-Owner Committee focused on social and racial justice initiatives. In December of 2014, Commissioner Roger Goodell tapped Bidwill to chair the league's Conduct Committee. The committee reviews the league's Personal Conduct Policy at least annually and recommends appropriate changes with advice from outside experts.

- In January of 2019, Michael received the Paul Tagliabue Award from the Fritz Pollard Alliance for demonstrating integrity and leadership in the area of career development for minorities and advocating for diversity. In May of 2019, the Arizona Lodging and Tourism Association named Bidwill its Honoree of the Year for his efforts to unify the tourism industry by convening industry leadership throughout the state to advance economic development and increase visitation.

YEAR SEVEN AT THE HELM FOR KEIM

Steve Keim was promoted to GM on January 8, 2013 after 14 seasons in the Cardinals organization. In guiding the team to an unprecedented run of success in his first five years as GM, Keim earned contract extensions in February of 2015 and February of 2018 that will keep him with the franchise through 2022.



Since his promotion in 2013, the Cardinals have posted a 52-43-1 regular season record, and Keim has developed into one of the league's most highly respected GMs.

Named the 2014 Sporting News NFL Executive of the Year in a vote of NFL coaches and team executives, Keim also earned back-to-back NFL Executive of the Year honors from Pro Football Talk (2013-14).

The teams put together by Keim during his time as GM have been some of the most successful in franchise history. In 2014 the team tied the franchise record for wins in a season (11) before setting a new mark in 2015 when the Cardinals won 13 games and earned its first-ever postseason bye.

KEIM'S WINNING CULTURE

Since being named Arizona's GM on January 8, 2013, only seven of his NFL counterparts have won more regular season games than Keim (52).

PUTTING TOGETHER AN ACCOMPLISHED ROSTER

- The rosters Keim put together produced one of the NFL's top-10 defenses four times and one of the top-10 offenses twice. *Arizona had a top-10 defense in three consecutive seasons (2015-17) for the first time since the 1970 merger.*

- During Keim's tenure, Arizona has established franchise records for wins in a season (13 in 2015), points in a season (489 in 2015), led the NFL in total offense for the first time in team history (#1 in 2015) and led the NFL in sacks for the second time ever (48.0 in 2016).

SUPER BOWL COMING BACK TO AZ

Valley Will Host 4th Super Bowl When Game Returns in 2023

The biggest event in American sports is returning to Arizona as State Farm Stadium was selected to host Super Bowl LVII that will cap the 2022 NFL season.



Super Bowl LVII will be the fourth Super Bowl played in Arizona and the third in 15 years at State Farm Stadium. The Valley last hosted Super Bowl XLIX following the 2014 season. With Super Bowl LVII being held at State Farm Stadium, Arizona will join South Florida, New Orleans, Los Angeles and Tampa Bay as the only sites selected to host the Super Bowl at least four times.

The nation's most popular sporting event and most widely-viewed television program, the Super Bowl provides an immense boost to the local economy. The last time the game was staged in Arizona it produced a record economic impact for the state. A 2015 study by the W.P. Carey School of Business at ASU determined that Super Bowl XLIX, the 2015 Pro Bowl and related events produced a gross economic impact of \$719.4 million for the region. That was the largest economic impact of any special event ever held in Arizona.

In a span of just over 26 months in 2015-17, the stadium hosted a Pro Bowl, Super Bowl, College Football National Championship Game and the NCAA Men's Final Four. It was an unprecedented stretch for a stadium that generated \$1.3 billion for the state during that span.

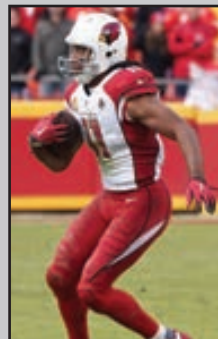

Fitzgerald broke the franchise record for receptions in 2010 and since then has more than doubled the previous record. With 1,303 career receptions, Fitzgerald has over 700 more than any other player in team history.

A Look at Fitzgerald's Reception Streak

—Fitzgerald has at least one catch in 233 of 234 career games played. His streak began in Week 9 of his rookie season in 2004 at Miami. That is seven weeks after Rice's 274-game streak — the longest in NFL history — ended.

—Included in his 227-game streak is an active streak of 77 consecutive games with multiple receptions. Only Oakland's Antonio Brown (115) and Cleveland's Jarvis Landry (79) have longer active streaks.

—Fitzgerald has at least one reception in all 42 different stadiums he has played in during his NFL career. In Week 15 of 2018 against the Falcons, the Cardinals played at Mercedes-Benz Stadium for the first time, which became the 42nd different venue in which Fitzgerald has at least one catch.

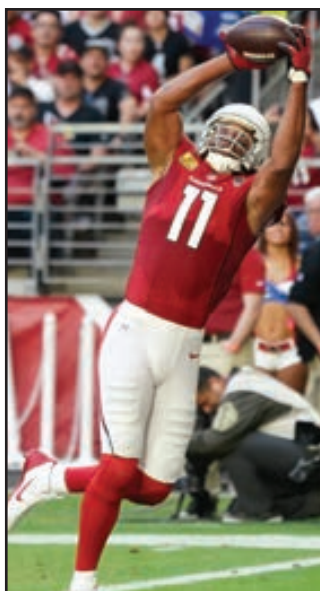

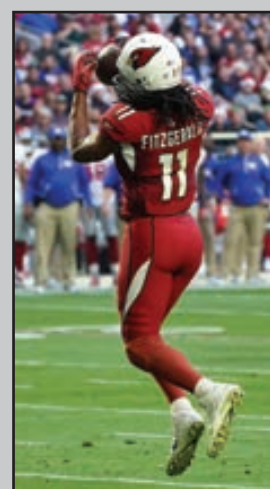
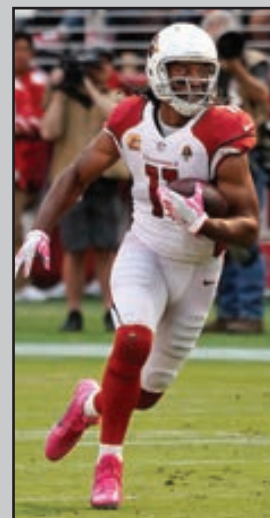

Prior to Fitzgerald, the longest span between leading the league in receptions was six by Jerry Rice (1990, 1996).
- Fitzgerald (11) joins Hall of Famer Jerry Rice (13) as the only wide receivers in NFL history to be named to the Pro Bowl at least 11 times.
- Fitzgerald had more receptions in his first 200 career games (1,116) than any player in NFL history.
- One of just seven players in NFL history to record at least 1,400 receiving yards in a season four times in their career: Jerry Rice (6), Julio Jones (5), Randy Moss (4), Marvin Harrison (4), Antonio Brown (4) and Andre Johnson (4).
- At 28 years, 74 days old, he became the third-youngest player in NFL history to reach 70 career receiving TDs behind only Randy Moss (26 years, 269 days old) and Hall of Famer Jerry Rice (28 years, one day old).
- At 32 years, 97 days old, he became the youngest player in NFL history to reach 1,000 career receptions.
- At 31 years, 102 days old, he became the youngest player in NFL history to reach 900 career receptions.
- At 30 years, 57 days old, he became the youngest player in NFL history to reach 800 career receptions.
- At 30 years, 85 days old, he became the youngest player in NFL history to reach 11,000 receiving yards.
- In 2010, he became the first player in NFL history to record 90+ receptions five times in their first seven seasons.
- During the 2008 postseason, he broke virtually every major playoff receiving record, establishing new single-season marks for receptions (30), receiving yards (546) and TDs (7). His four 100-yard receiving games in the postseason established a new NFL record for consecutive games with 100 yards receiving.
- His 10 TD receptions in nine career postseason games are an NFL record for a player in their first nine career playoff contests.
- With a then franchise-record 103 receptions during the 2005 season, he became the youngest player in NFL history to record a 100-catch campaign when he reached the mark at 22 years, 123 days old.
- Led the NFL in receiving TDs in both the 2008 (12) and 2009 (13) seasons. In addition to his 10 receiving TDs in 2007, he became the first player in franchise history to record at least 10 TDs in three consecutive seasons.
- At 29 years, 44 days old, joined Randy Moss (28 years, 314 days) as the only players in NFL history to reach 10,000 career receiving yards before the age of 30.
- One of just five players in NFL history to record 15,000+ receiving yards and 100+ TD receptions in their career.

A PRODUCTIVE FOUR SEASONS

Although RB **David Johnson** was in his fourth NFL season in 2018 - he has only played 49 career games - which equals out to just over three full 16 game seasons in the NFL.

Nonetheless, Johnson has been able to pile up 43 career TDs (31 rushing, 11 receiving, 1 KOR). *His 43 TDs are nine more than any other player in franchise history through their first four seasons.*

A PROMISING START AS A ROOKIE IN 2018

WR **Christian Kirk** - Arizona's second round selection in the 2018 NFL Draft - put up impressive numbers in his rookie campaign before an injury suffered in Week 13 at Green Bay ended his season.

In 12 games (7 starts), Kirk had 43 receptions for 590 yards and three TDs. He returned 21 punts for 164 yards and rushed three times for 35 yards.

Through Week 13 last season, Kirk ranked second among rookie WRs in receptions and third in receiving yards.

Kirk Rookie Highlights

GAME WINNER VS. SAN FRANCISCO: In Arizona's Week 8 victory over San Francisco, Kirk caught three passes for 42 yards - *while also hauling in his second career TD reception when he caught a nine-yard game-winning TD with 34 seconds remaining in the fourth quarter.*

LONGEST TD OF THE SEASON AT SAN FRANCISCO: On the Cardinals first offensive play of the game in Week 5 vs. the 49ers, Kirk hauled in a 75-yard TD pass. It was the longest offensive play of the season for Arizona and it tied for the longest TD reception by a rookie in the NFL.

EAGERLY LOOKING TOWARDS YEAR TWO

RB **Chase Edmonds** - the Cardinals fourth round selection (134th overall) in the 2018 NFL Draft - played all 16 games for Arizona last season and finished second on the team in carries (60), rushing yards (208) and rushing TDs (2).



His best outing came in Arizona's Week 13 win over the Packers in Green Bay last year. Edmonds finished the contest with season highs in scrimmage yards (66) and rushing yards (53), while scoring both of the Cardinals TDs in the victory. They were the first to TDs of his career.

Edmonds, though, feels like bigger things are ahead of him in 2019 and he looks forward to showing how much he has learned going into his second NFL season. "That's one thing that's changed with me from my rookie year - my confidence in my ability," Edmonds said in the lead up to training camp. "Last year I was kind of walking on eggshells, just worrying about not messing up. This year, I'm all about making plays."

MIXING THE FAMILIAR AND THE NEW ON THE O-LINE

The Cardinals entire roster was plagued by injuries during the 2018 season as the team saw 17 different players land on IR and 77 different players appear in at least one game.

But the group hit hardest by injuries was the offensive line. In last year's season finale at Seattle in Week 17, Arizona started its 10th different O-Line combination of the 2018 season. It also represented the eighth different O-Line combination in the final 10 games.



Seven members of the O-Line landed on IR last season. *Of the five starters who entered training camp with the Cards last year, none were on the active roster at the end of the year. Four of the five (Humphries, Lupati, Pugh and Shipley) landed on IR.*

Entering the 2019 season, Arizona's O-Line has been rebuilt and the results mix new faces with those who return with the Cardinals.

A More Experienced Group

By the end of last season, the Cardinals had three rookies starting on the O-Line. Arizona's expected starters on the line heading into the 2019 preseason opener vs. the Chargers are significantly more experienced. That group - consisting of LT **D.J. Humphries**, LG **Justin Pugh**, C **A.Q. Shipley**/Mason Cole, RG **J.R. Sweezy** and RT **Marcus Gilbert** - have combined for 33 total NFL seasons, 378 games played and 332 starts heading into '19.

Entering his fifth NFL season, Humphries is the least experienced of the bunch. Pugh is entering his seventh NFL season in 2019, Shipley and Sweezy their eighth and Gilbert his ninth. Cole is in his second NFL season in 2019.

Acquiring Starters In The Offseason

Both starters on the right side of the Cardinals O-Line (Sweezy and Gilbert) were acquired in the offseason. Arizona picked up Gilbert on 3/13 in a trade with the Steelers and two days later (3/15) Sweezy signed as a free agent.

JONES MAKES HISTORY IN 2018

Cardinals All-Pro LB **Chandler Jones** recorded **13.0 sacks in 2018**. Combined with his **11.0 sacks in 2016 and 17.0 sacks in 2017**, he became the **first player in franchise history with 10+ sacks in three consecutive seasons**.

Jones is the only player in franchise history with at least 11.0+ sacks in three different seasons. He joined Washington's Ryan Kerrigan also the only players in the NFL with 11.0+ sacks in each of the last three years.

WHEN JONES ARRIVED, SO DID THE SACKS

During **Jones'** first season in Arizona in 2016, the Cardinals led the NFL in sacks (48) for just the second time in franchise history (59 in 1983).

The following year (2017), Jones established a franchise record with 17.0 sacks, and became the first player in team history to lead the NFL in the category.

In Jones' three seasons with the Cardinals (2016-18) the team has ranked in the top-5 in sacks twice (5th in 2018; 1st in 2016). The team never ranked in the top-5 in the 10 seasons prior to his arrival - and broke the top-10 just twice.

PETERSON STOOD OUT IN 2018

Despite playing in a new system in 2018, Cardinals All-Pro CB **Patrick Peterson** not only maintained his status among the NFL's most elite pass defenders last season – he posted one of the best years of his career.

Peterson ranked near the top in several key coverage categories among NFL CBs with at least 700 snaps in 2018, according to *ProFootballFocus.com*.

In 1,107 plays last season, Peterson was targeted 52 times and allowed just 30 receptions for 364 yards and three TDs. His 30 receptions allowed ranked first among NFL CBs who played at least 80% of defense snaps, according to *PFF*.

Peterson "shadowed" six other receivers in 2018 – Vikings WR Stefon Diggs, 49ers WR Marquise Goodwin, Chiefs WR Tyreek Hill, Lions WR Kenny Golladay, Falcons WR Julio Jones and Rams WR Brandin Cooks – and allowed just 194 yards and two TDs on 10 receptions.

Peterson's performance in 2018 earned him the second highest coverage grade (83.7) of his career by *ProFootballFocus.com*. He faced the fewest targets of any season in his eight-year career, while allowing the second-fewest receptions, the fewest receiving yards and the fewest TD catches.

BUDDA'S EXPANDED ROLE IN 2018

S Budda Baker – the team's 2017 second-round pick (36th overall) – earned Pro Bowl and first-team All-Pro honors as a special teamer in 2017. He also finished the season as a starter at safety.

In 2018, Baker appeared in 14 games (13 starts) and totaled 107 tackles, eight tackles for loss, 2.0 sacks, three QB pressures, four QB hits, two passes defended, a forced fumble and two fumble recoveries (one returned 36 yards for his first career TD).

According to league statistics, the 195-pound Baker was one of just three NFL safeties with 100+ tackles, 2.0+ sacks and 8+ tackles for loss in 2018.

SWEARINGER RETURNS TO ROAM THE DESERT

S D.J. Swearinger had a breakout season with the Cardinals in 2016 and made his return to Arizona in the final week of the '18 season when the team acquired him off waivers from Washington.

Swearinger's first stint with the Cardinals was a successful run from 2015-16. After Arizona acquired him late in the 2015 season, he went on to appear in 20 games (13 starts) for the Cardinals, totaling 71 tackles, three INTs, nine passes defended, 2.0 sacks, five tackles for loss, forced fumble and a fumble recovery in those contests.

He left for Washington in free agency in 2017 and in two seasons (2017-18) with the Redskins started all 31 games he appeared in, recording 132 tackles, 1.5 sacks, eight INTs, 20 passes defended, four forced fumbles and a fumble recovery.

Over the last three seasons – covering his time in Arizona and Washington, Swearinger has 11 INTs. Among active NFL safeties, only Tennessee's Kevin Byard (12) has more INTs during that span (2016-18). Swearinger is one of just four NFL defenders (S Ha Ha Clinton-Dix; CB Marcus Peters; S Damarious Randall) who registered at least three INTs in each of the last three seasons.

ALFORD'S AGGRESSIVE STYLE PAYS OFF

Selected by the Falcons in the second round (60th overall) of the 2013 NFL Draft, CB **Robert Alford** has 291 tackles (243 solo), 10 INTs and 85 passes defended in 88 games (76 starts) in six NFL seasons.

Since entering the league out of Southeastern Louisiana in 2013, only Lions CB Darius Slay (91) has more passes defended than Alford (85).

Alford has returned three INTs for TDs in his NFL career (two regular season and one postseason). Since his first INT-TD in 2015, only Aqib Talib (4) has more than Alford.

Alford has made a quick impression on those who have seen him in training camp with the Cardinals, primarily for his aggressive style of play.

"That's my game," Alford said. "I came from a small school (Southeastern Louisiana) and to make it out of that environment, you have to play with a chip on your shoulder. That's something I've always had and that's something that won't go away until I hang these cleats up."



TWO SEASONS IN AZ, TWO TEAM RECORDS

The Cardinals signed P **Andy Lee** just prior to the start of the 2017 season and during his first year in Arizona, he set a new franchise single-season record with a 47.3-yard punting average. In 2018, Lee topped himself, breaking his own record with an NFL-high 48.6-yard average last season.

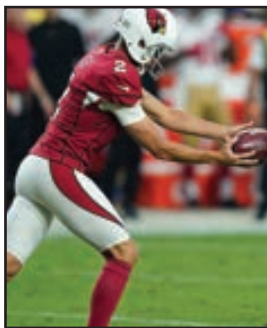

SUN DEVIL RETURNS A CARDINAL

Arizona State product and 2016 Lou Groza Award winner **Zane Gonzalez** signed to the Cardinals practice squad on November 20th last year and was promoted to the active roster the following Monday (11/26) after Phil Dawson (hip) was placed on IR.

Playing in his first game for the Cardinals in Week 13 at Green Bay, Gonzalez connected on both FG attempts and both PATs in the win over the Packers. Gonzalez kicked the game-winning 44-yard FG with just 1:41 remaining in the fourth quarter.

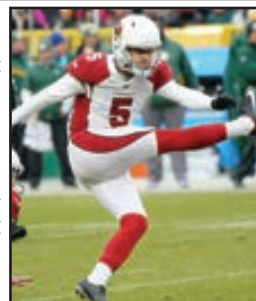
Gonzalez entered the NFL with Cleveland in 2017. The Browns were 0-17-1 in Gonzalez's tenure with the team. He earned the first victory of his career by kicking Arizona's game-winning FG against the Packers last year.

A STRONG FINISH TO 2018

Gonzalez played in the final five games for the Cardinals in 2018, connecting on seven-of-nine FG attempts and five-of-six PATs.

He finished the season with perhaps the best performance of his young career in the Cardinals season finale at Seattle. Gonzalez made all three FG attempts in the game, including kicks of 36, 50 and 55 yards.

He became the first Cardinals kicker to connect on multiple FGs of 50+ yards in a game since Neil Rackers (54 and 50 yards) on 9/25/05 at Seattle.



UNDRAFTED BUT SPECIAL

Two of the rookies who had the biggest impact for the Cardinals in 2018 made their mark on special teams - and both return for Arizona in 2019.

LB Ezekiel Turner (Rookie Free Agent)

Turner led the NFL with 13 solo special teams tackles last season. He finished second in the NFL with 15 total special teams tackles.

Turner, who appeared in all 16 games in 2018 (1 start) was named Special Teams Player of the Month (September) by ProFootballFocus.com.

LB Dennis Gardeck (Rookie Free Agent)

Appeared in all 16 games and led all NFL rookies with 388 total snaps on special teams in 2018. Among all NFL players last season, only Jets WR Terrence Brooks (395) played more snaps on special teams than Gardeck.

In the season finale at Seattle, Gardeck posted a deflected punt, a blocked punt recovery for a TD and a special teams tackle. Late in the third quarter, with Arizona trailing 21-13, Gardeck recovered a blocked punt in the Seahawks endzone for his first career TD. It was the Cardinals first blocked punt returned for a TD since 10/12/08 vs. Dallas. For Gardeck, it was his first TD since his senior year at Crystal Lake (IL) South High School in 2012 (80-yard fumble return).

LEE AMONG THE BEST THERE IS

Now entering his 16th NFL season in 2019, **Lee** has appeared in 233 games with 1,229 punts for 57,234 yards (46.6-yard avg.) and has a 39.8 net average and 402 punts landed inside the 20-yard line.

After leading the NFL in punting average for the second time in his career in 2019, Lee has now finished in the top-10 in punting average in 12 of his 15 NFL seasons.

His 46.6 career punting average ranks sixth in NFL history. He has averaged 48+ yards per punt in a season five times in his career and led the NFL in gross punting average (50.9) for the first time in 2011 while with the 49ers.

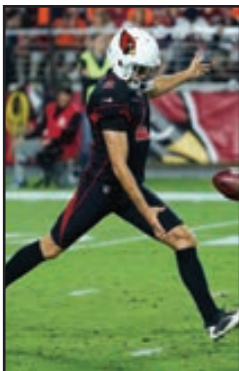
