THIS WEEK'S PREVIEW

In their fourth and final regular season trip to the East Coast, Arizona travels to New Jersey to face the Giants in the Cardinals second visit to MetLife Stadium this season. Arizona defeated the Jets 30-10 at the venue in Week 5.

A victory this week would give the Cardinals road wins over the Giants and Jets in a single season for just the second time (1975). That feat won't be easy, as Arizona squares off against a Giants team that has won four straight while allowing just six offensive TDs in that stretch. Their most recent win came last week when they knocked off the Seahawks 17-12 in Seattle. The 12 points represented a season-low for Seattle.

Sunday's game between the Cardinals and Giants is the 128th all-time meeting between the teams in a series that dates back to 1926. It is Arizona's third-oldest rivalry (Chicago - 1920; Green Bay - 1921) and the Cardinals have faced the Giants more times than any other NFL franchise.

Arizona has had success on the road against the Giants of late. The Cardinals have won three in a row dating back to 2009 and have won both games against the Giants at MetLife Stadium since the venue opened in 2010. In the 94-year history of the series, the Cardinals have never won four consecutive road games against the Giants.

This weekend's game could represent the second meeting between a pair of second-year signal-callers in Arizona QB **Kyler Murray** and Giants QB Daniel Jones. Murray - the #1 overall pick in the 2019 NFL Draft - was selected by Arizona just an hour before the Giants drafted Jones with the #6 overall pick. They were the first two QBs drafted in 2019 and they squared off as rookies last season when the Cardinals defeated the Giants 27-21 at MetLife Stadium.

Looking to put pressure on Jones this week will be a pair of former Giants: LBs **Markus Golden** and **Devon Kennard**. Just 52 days after being traded from New York to Arizona, Golden will face his former team - and teammate - for the first time. Kennard was drafted by New York in the fifth round (174th overall) of the 2014 NFL Draft and spent his first four seasons (2014-17) with the Giants.

A key factor for the Cardinals on Sunday will be the continued success of WR **DeAndre Hopkins** and RB **Chase Edmonds** while playing at MetLife Stadium. Hopkins has 417 receiving yards and three TDs in three games at the venue and posted 100+ receiving yards in all three contests. Edmonds - a record-setting RB at Fordham who played his home games at Jack Coffey Field in the Bronx - has four of his seven career rushing TDs at MetLife Stadium. All four of those TDs covered 20+ yards.

Following this week's game against the Giants, the Cardinals return home to face another NFC East opponent in the Philadelphia Eagles. Arizona then plays its final two regular season games against division foes (vs. 49ers in Week 16; at Rams in Week 17). The Giants remain home as they host the Browns.

#AZvsNYG - WEEK 14 HIGHLIGHTS

- The Cardinals head to New York to face the Giants in Week 14 in the 128th all-time meeting between the teams dating back to 1926. It is the Cardinals third-oldest rivalry (Chicago, Green Bay) and Arizona has faced the Giants more times than any other NFL franchise.
- Last week Arizona scored three second-half TDs against a Rams team that hadn't allowed more than one second-half TD in their previous 11 games - and just two all season. On Sunday, the Cardinals will face a Giants team that has won four straight while allowing just six total offensive TDs in that stretch.
- After throwing three TD passes last week against the Rams, QB **Kyler Murray** now has 22 passing TDs and 10 rushing TDs in 2020. He is just the third different player in NFL history with 20+ passing TDs and 10+ rushing TDs in a season and **first player in league history to have done so in the first 12 games of a season.**
- TE **Dan Arnold** hauled in two TD catches last week, including a 59-yard TD reception in the first quarter. It was the longest TD catch by a Cardinals TE since Hall of Famer Jackie Smith had a 68-yarder from Gary Cuzzo on 11/12/72 at Dallas.
- WR **DeAndre Hopkins** has 85 receptions for 1,019 yards and five TDs in 2020. It marks his sixth career 1,000-yard campaign and fourth in a row. Hopkins' 85 receptions rank third in the NFL behind WRs Keenan Allen (90) and Stefon Diggs (90).
- LB **Dennis Gardeck** posted his third sack of the season last week when he took down Rams QB Jared Goff. Gardeck played just three defensive snaps in the contest. The third-year special teams standout recorded his 3.0 sacks in two games (2 @ NYJ; 1 vs. LAR) in which he played a combined 13 defensive snaps.
- RB **Chase Edmonds** has played two career games at MetLife Stadium and had four TD runs of 20+ yards in those outings. Edmonds has four TDs in two games at MetLife Stadium and seven TDs in his other 39 career games.
- After posting 12 tackles last week, S **Budda Baker** leads the Cardinals with 94 tackles in 2020. That ranks second among NFL DBs (Bills S Jordan Poyer - 96).

GIANTS CONNECTIONS

Cardinals LB **Markus Golden** played seven games for the Giants this season before being traded to the Cardinals in Week 7.

Cardinals LB **Devon Kennard** was selected by the Giants in the fifth round (174th overall) of the 2014 NFL Draft and played 52 games (35 starts) in four years (2014-17) for New York.

Cardinals OL **Justin Pugh** was drafted by the Giants in the first round (19th overall) of the 2013 NFL Draft and started all 63 games played in five seasons (2013-17) with the team.

Cardinals LBs coach **Bill Davis** held the same position for the Giants in 2004.

Cardinals Offensive Assistant **Don Shumpert** spent the 2018 season with the Giants in the same role.

Cardinals CBs coach **Greg Williams** spent training camp with the Giants in 1999.

Cardinals TE **Maxx Williams'** father, Brian, played on the Giants offensive line from 1989-99.

Cardinals Director of Player Personnel **Quentin Harris** spent the 2006 training camp with the Giants. Harris was a four-year starter at free safety for Syracuse from 1998-2001.

Cardinals Director of Football Administration **Matt Harriss** spent 10 seasons (2006-2015) in the Giants football operations department.

CARDINALS CONNECTIONS

Giants RB **Alfred Morris** appeared in one game for the Cardinals in 2019.

Giants RB **Elijhaa Penny** played all 16 games for the Cardinals during the 2017 season.

Giants TEs coach **Freddie Kitchens** served on the Arizona offensive coaching staff from 2007-17. Kitchens spent more seasons with the Cardinals (11) than any other assistant coach in franchise history. Hired as a TEs coach in 2007, he spent six seasons in that position before taking over as QBs coach in 2013. During his final season with Arizona in 2017, Kitchens was the Cardinals RBs coach.

Giants CB **Brandon Williams** played for Arizona from 2016-18.

Giants Asst. DBs coach **Anthony Blevins** was a coaching assistant/special teams for the Cardinals from 2013-17.

Giants Asst. Coach - Special Projects and Situations **Amos Jones** was the Cardinals Special Teams Coordinator from 2013-17.

Giants WRs coach **Tyke Tolbert** served in the same capacity for the Cardinals during the 2003 season.

NEW YORK/NEW JERSEY CONNECTIONS

Cardinals RB **Chase Edmonds** was a college standout at Fordham (2014-17). A three-time consensus All-American, he closed out his career as the Patriot League all-time leading rusher and ranked fifth in NCAA FCS history with 5,862 career rushing yards.

Cardinals OL **Justin Pugh** played at Syracuse and hails from Holland, PA, about 80 miles from East Rutherford, NJ.

Cardinals LB **Haason Reddick** is a native of Camden, NJ and was awarded a Key to the City in a ceremony aboard the Battleship New Jersey the week he was drafted (2017).

Cardinals LB **Kylie Fitts'** father, Matt, pitched in the New York Mets system.

Cardinals Bill Bidwill Fellowship/QBs coach **Jordan Hogan** is from Lockport, NY and was a WR at the College of Brockport.

Cardinals Offensive Quality Control coach **Jim Dray** is a Paramus, NJ native and starred at Bergen Catholic (Oradell, NJ) High School where he was an All-State selection in his junior and senior seasons.

Cardinals VP of Football Operations and Facilities **Matt Caracciolo** is from Oceanside, NY and attended Ithaca College. He earned a master's degree from Syracuse University while serving as an administrative graduate assistant.

ARIZONA CONNECTIONS

Giants Asst. Special Teams coach **Tom Quinn** played college football at the University of Arizona from 1986-90.

Giants LB **Blake Martinez** is a Tucson, AZ native and attended Mountain View (Mesa), Santa Rita (Tucson) and Canyon Del Oro (Oro Valley) High Schools. Martinez was a two-time Southern Arizona Player of the Year and PrepStar All-West Region.

Giants WR **Golden Tate** was drafted by the Arizona Diamondbacks in the 42nd round of the 2007 MLB Draft.

PRO/COLLEGE CONNECTIONS

Giants WR **Golden Tate** played for the Eagles with Cardinals LB **Jordan Hicks** in 2018 and played for Seattle with Cardinals OL **J.R. Sweezy** from 2012-13.

Giants RBs coach **Burton Burns** (2007-17) served as the RBs coach at Alabama while Cardinals RB **Kenyan Drake** (2012-15) played for the Crimson Tide. The program won two BCS National Championship during their time together.

Cardinals LB **Isaiah Simmons** played at Clemson with Giants RB **Wayne Gallman** in 2016 and Giants DL **Dexter Lawrence** from 2016-18.

Cardinals OL **Kelvin Beachum** (2017-19) and Giants DL **Leonard Williams** (2015-19) played together for the Jets.

Giants WR **Dante Pettis** (2014-17) played alongside Cardinals S **Budda Baker** (2014-16), CB **Byron Murphy Jr** (2017-18) and LB **Ezekiel Turner** (2015-17) at Washington.

CARDS VS. GIANTS - SERIES BREAKDOWN

Sunday's game between the Cardinals and Giants is the 128th all-time meeting between the two teams in a series that dates back to 1926. It is the Cardinals third-oldest rivalry (Chicago, Green Bay) and the Cardinals have faced the Giants more times than any other NFL franchise.



Between 1950 and 2001, the Cardinals and Giants played twice a year (except in 1968 and 1982) as members of the NFC East before the Cardinals joined the NFC West in the division realignment in 2002.

This week's meeting marks the 10th time the two teams have faced off since the Cardinals joined the NFC West in 2002, with Arizona holding a 6-3 advantage in the previous nine matchups. The Cardinals have won four of the last five games against the Giants.

Arizona has won its last three road games against the Giants, including a 27-21 victory in Week 7 last season. Arizona is 3-1 all-time at MetLife Stadium, with a 2-0 record against the Giants and a 1-1 record against the Jets.

ANOTHER VISIT TO METLIFE

This week's matchup vs. the Giants marks the Cardinals second game at MetLife Stadium in a span of 10 weeks: @ NY Jets in Week 5.



Prior to 2020, the last time the Cardinals played two road games at the same venue in a regular season was in 1999 at Giants Stadium, also against the Jets and Giants.

Combined with their Week 7 trip to face the Giants last season, it represents the Cardinals third game at MetLife Stadium in the last two seasons.

Having defeated the Jets 30-10 in Week 5 earlier this season, a victory over the Giants this week would give the Cardinals road wins against both the Giants and Jets for just the second time (1975).

Arizona has victories over both New York teams it has faced this season. In addition to the win over the Jets, the Cardinals also defeated the Bills 32-30 in Week 10. With a win over the Giants on Sunday, Arizona would have a win against all three New York teams in a single season for just the second time ever (1971).

MURRAY VS. JONES - ROUND 2

Sunday's game could serve as the second meeting between Cardinals QB **Kyler Murray** and Giants QB Daniel Jones in the last two seasons.

Murray - the #1 overall pick in the 2019 NFL Draft - was selected by Arizona just an hour before the Giants drafted Jones with the #6 overall pick. They were the first two QBs drafted in 2019 and they squared off as rookies last season when the Cardinals defeated the Giants 27-21 in Week 7 at MetLife Stadium.

ROOKIE SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

- Murray started all 16 games as a rookie last season, completing 349-of-542 pass attempts (64.4%) for 3,722 yards, 20 TDs, 12 INTs and an 87.4 passer rating. He also rushed for 544 yards and 4 TDs on 93 carries. He established franchise rookie records for passing yards, TD passes, completions and attempts on his way to winning NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year honors.
- Jones played in 13 games in 2019 and set franchise rookie records with 459 pass attempts, 284 completions, 3,027 yards and 24 TDs. The former records had all stood since Charley Conerly set them in 1948.
- Both Murray and Jones posted five games with 300+ passing yards in 2019. They are two of just four rookies in NFL history to have at least five 300-yard outings, joining Justin Herbert (6) and Andrew Luck (6).

PUGH INVESTS IN HIS NY/NJ ROOTS

Cardinals OL **Justin Pugh** grew up in Holland, PA, located just 80 miles from East Rutherford where the Giants play their home games at MetLife Stadium. After attending Syracuse - where he earned All-American honors - Pugh was drafted by the Giants in the first round (19th overall) of the 2013 NFL Draft.

Upon entering the league, Pugh moved to Hoboken on the New Jersey side of the Hudson River where he discovered **Tony Boloney's**, a local restaurant chain that features creative pizzas and sandwiches. He became a fan of the unique menu and was approached about investing in the company. Pugh, a finance major at Syracuse, initially declined, but in 2018, he reconsidered and now owns a 5 percent stake in the restaurant's holding company as well as a piece of two of the four brick-and-mortar stores in New Jersey.

"When I was in New Jersey, I used to have this pizza place all the time - Tony Boloney's." He said, "I had a chance to invest when they were expanding and putting one in Jersey City right near where I lived, so I had to jump at the opportunity."

It was the first investment outside of traditional bonds for the self-proclaimed "carboholic," who knows the product and industry well. "I love the product, so I think anytime you can get behind product and you actually love it, it's a no-brainer," Pugh told ESPN in 2019.

AN UNLIKELY FRIENDSHIP

Having spent much of his life in the New York/New Jersey area, Pugh holds many strong ties in the region. One long-lasting friendship that caught national attention for its unusual origins is with an elderly widower who lived next door in an apartment complex during Pugh's time with the Giants.

The two met when William "Bill" Brown - the neighbor - struggling with health issues and unable to pay the rent on the apartment he had lived in for over 30 years, wrote Pugh a letter asking for help.

"I guess it was kind of crazy, like this guy left a note on my back gate and then literally within an hour I was writing him a check to pay his rent," Pugh said in a video documenting their friendship. "It wasn't going to hurt me and set me back and I was able to help someone stay in their home who's been there for nearly 30 years; I thought it was just a no brainer. Something you don't even think about twice."

From that time forward, the two became close friends and remain so to this day - despite the 40-year age gap between them. "Right now I would probably be homeless if it wasn't for him," Brown claimed.



LIGHTING IT UP IN THE APPLE

In three career games at MetLife Stadium, WR **DeAndre Hopkins** has 22 receptions for 417 yards and three TDs. He posted 100+ receiving yards in all three games.

In Week 5 against the Jets earlier this season, Hopkins had six catches for 131 yards, including a 37-yard TD reception.

In two career games against the Giants, he has 12 receptions for 202 yards, including a 116-yard performance at MetLife Stadium in 2014.

With 100+ receiving yards against the Giants on Sunday, Hopkins would become the first Cardinals player since Mel Gray in 1975 to have 100+ receiving yards in a road stadium multiple times in a single season. Gray had 187 receiving yards against the Giants (Week 6) and 116 yards against the Jets (Week 10) at Shea Stadium that season.

EDMONDS' SUCCESS AT METLIFE STADIUM

RB **Chase Edmonds** had a record-setting career at Fordham, playing his home games at Jack Coffey Field in the Bronx, just 18 miles from MetLife Stadium. Since coming to the NFL in 2018, Edmonds has twice played at MetLife Stadium and he recorded four TD runs of 20+ yards in those two contests.

In his first return to the area as a pro - in Week 7 of the 2019 season against the Giants - he posted career-highs in scrimmage yards (150), rushing yards (126) and TDs (3). His three rushing TDs covered 20, 20 and 22 yards, becoming the just the sixth player in NFL history with three rushing TDs of 20+ yards in a game.

Edmonds is one of just four players from a visiting team to score at least three rushing TDs in a game at MetLife Stadium.

When Edmonds and the Cardinals returned to MetLife Stadium earlier this season - to face the Jets in Week 5 - Edmonds recorded 92 yards (36 rushing; 56 receiving) and a TD on eight touches. His TD came on a 29-yard run in the fourth quarter.

Edmonds has four TDs in two career games at MetLife Stadium and 7 TDs in 39 career games played away from the venue. Of his five career TD runs of 20+ yards, four have come at MetLife Stadium.

GOLDEN AND KENNARD RETURN TO NEW YORK

On Sunday two former Giants LBs return to face their former team. Just 52 days after being traded from New York to Arizona, **Markus Golden** will face his former team for the first time in his career - while playing for another of his former teams.

A second round pick (58th overall) by the Cardinals in the 2015 NFL Draft, Golden spent his first four seasons (2015-18) in Arizona before signing with the Giants as a free agent in 2019. He returned to New York in the offseason and played seven games with the Giants in 2020 before being traded back to Arizona in October. In his first season with New York in 2019, Golden set single-season career highs in tackles (72) and QB hits (27) and led the Giants with 10.0 sacks.

Devon Kennard was selected by New York in the fifth round (174th overall) of the 2014 NFL Draft and played in 52 games (35 starts) in four seasons (2014-17) with the Giants. He registered 203 tackles, 23 tackles for loss, 9.5 sacks, 3 forced fumbles and 2 fumble recoveries during his time in New York.

RUSHING AVERAGE NEAR A RECORD PACE

After finishing #32 in the NFL in both rushing yards and rushing average in 2018 the Cardinals finished the 2019 season having averaged over 5.0 yards per rush attempt as a team for the first time in franchise history. Arizona averaged a franchise-record 5.03 yards per rush attempt last season.

Through 12 games the Cardinals are averaging 5.01 yards per rush attempt, putting them on pace to surpass 5.0 yards per carry for the second straight year.

A RARE NINE IN A ROW WITH 100+ RUSHING YARDS

Arizona has rushed for 100+ yards in 10 of 12 games this season and started the year with 100+ rushing yards in each of the first nine games. The 2020 season marked just the second time (1984) in the last 60 years (1961-20) that the Cardinals rushed for 100+ yards in each of the first nine games of a season.

RUNNING FOR 150 & 200 UNDER KINGSBURY

The Cardinals have rushed for 150+ yards in 11 of 28 games under Kingsbury. Arizona had seven such games in the three seasons (2016-18) prior to his arrival. The Cardinals are 9-2 when rushing for 150+ yards over the last two seasons.

Arizona has rushed for 200+ yards in a game five times under Kingsbury, including twice this season. The Cardinals had 200+ rushing yards in a game just five times in the previous 15 seasons combined (2004-18) prior to Kingsbury's arrival.

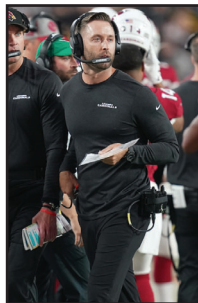

Signed to a four-year contract extension during training camp, S **Budda Baker** is delivering quite the encore performance this year after a breakout campaign in 2019.

In Week 7 vs. Seattle, Baker posted a game-high 14 tackles, his second INT of the season, a tackle for loss and a pass defended in the win over Seattle. **It was a fitting end to a remarkable six-day stretch on the national stage in which the All-Pro was named a team captain, totaled 21 tackles, 2 INTs (one returned 90 yards), 1.0 sack, 2 passes defended, 2 tackles for loss, 2 QB hits, a forced fumble and an NFC "Defensive Player of the Week" award (Week 6).** The performance earned him NFC "Defensive Player of the Month" honors for October.



Baker has registered 94 tackles, 2.0 sacks, 6 tackles for loss, 2 INTs, 4 passes defended and a forced fumble in 2020. His 94 tackles lead the team. **Baker's 94 tackles also rank second among all NFL DBs behind only Buffalo S Jordan Poyer (96).**

KIRKPATRICK TIES HIS CAREER HIGH

CB Dre Kirkpatrick has three INTs in 2020, the most recent coming in the fourth quarter at New England in Week 12. His three INTs tie his career high for a single season (also had 3 in 2013, 2014, 2016). Prior to 2020, Kirkpatrick had four total INTs in his previous five seasons (2015-19) combined.

SIMMONS' FIRST INT WAS A GAME-WINNER

In the Cardinals thrilling victory over Seattle in Week 7, rookie LB **Isaiah Simmons** came up with the play that led to Arizona's game-winning FG in OT. Seattle had the ball with just over a minute remaining in OT and faced a 3rd-n-14. That is when Simmons intercepted a Russell Wilson pass and returned 12 yards to the SEA 49-yard line. Six plays later - with just 0:15 remaining - the Cardinals kicked the game-winning 48-yard FG.

• Earned "NFC Offensive Player of the Week" honors twice in a three-week span - at NY Jets (Week 5) and vs. Seattle (Week 7). First Cardinals QB since Kurt Warner (2x in 2009) to earn the honor multiple times in the same season.

• In Week 7 vs. Seattle, became the first player in NFL history to throw for 350+ yards and 3+ TDs while also rushing for 50+ yards and a TD in a single game. Also became the first player in team history with 300+ passing yards and 50+ rushing yards in a game.

• In 2019, became just the 6th different QB in NFL history with 3,500+ passing yards and 500+ rushing yards in a season - and just the second rookie (Cam Newton, 2011).

• In franchise history, only Kurt Warner (3x) had a better completion percentage in a season than Murray had in 2019 (64.39).

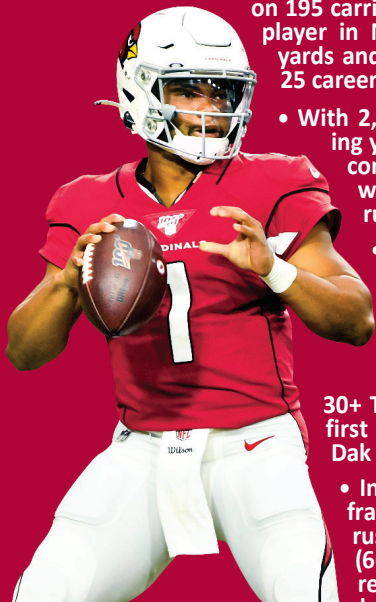

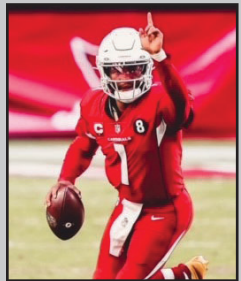

In the victory over Buffalo in Week 10, Murray completed 22-of-32 pass attempts (68.8%) for 245 yards and a TD, while also rushing for 61 yards and two TDs on 11 carries. It was a milestone performance for a number of reasons.

It was his eighth outing this season with both a passing and rushing TD in 2020. That is tied for the most in a single season in NFL history.

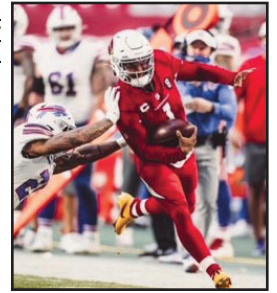

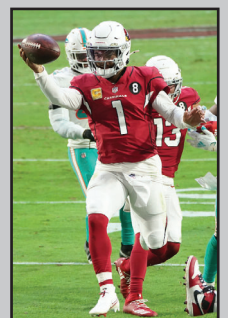

WR **DeAndre Hopkins** has been as good as advertised in his first season with the Cardinals, who acquired the three-time 1st-team All-Pro in the offseason in a trade with Houston.

Through 12 games, Hopkins has 85 receptions for 1,019 yards and five TDs.

He is currently on pace for 113 receptions and 1,359 receiving yards in 2020. The reception total would establish a new franchise single-season record while the receiving yardage total would rank 10th in team history.

His current career highs for both receptions (115) and receiving yards (1,572) came in 2018.

It was Hopkins' fourth career game-winning TD catch in the 4th quarter/OT and the first to come with under a minute left on the clock.

Hopkins' 43-yard game-winner against the Bills was the first go-ahead Hail Mary in the 4th quarter since 12/3/15 when Green Bay QB Aaron Rodgers threw a game-winning 61-yard TD to TE Richard Rodgers as time expired to give the Packers a 27-23 victory over Detroit.

It also marked the first time the Cardinals won a game on a TD pass on the final scrimmage play of regulation since Josh McCown's 28-yard TD pass to WR Nate Poole as time expired on 12/29/03 vs. Minnesota. That TD gave the Cards an 18-17 win and knocked the Vikings out of postseason contention on the final day of the regular season.

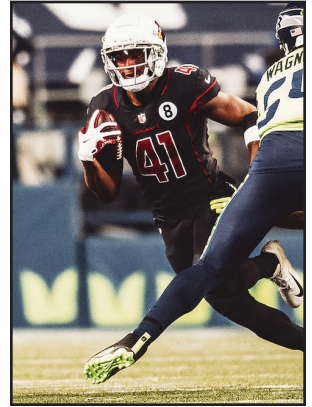

UNDER THE RADAR SEASON

With much of the attention focused on All-Pro wideouts Larry Fitzgerald and DeAndre Hopkins - Kirk is quietly posting a productive season in 2020, in which he leads the team with six TD catches.

But for anyone who saw Kirk play in his first two NFL seasons, it was easy to see the talent the local product possessed. In his first two seasons after being drafted by Arizona, Kirk piled up 111 receptions for 1,299 yards and six TDs despite missing seven games due to injury.

ONLY ANQUAN WAS FASTER TO 100

Playing in his 22nd career game in Week 14 vs. Pittsburgh last season, Kirk reached 100 receptions for his career. *In franchise history, the only player to have 100 catches in fewer games was Anquan Boldin (16).*

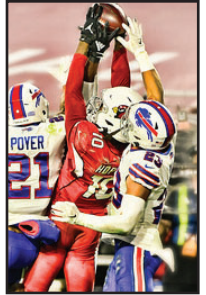
AWARDS COME POURING IN

WR **DeAndre Hopkins** was named the "NFC Offensive Player of the Week" following his 43-yard Hail Mary TD grab over three Bills defenders in the Cardinals 32-30 win vs. Buffalo in Week 10.

It was just the second "Player of the Week" award for Hopkins, who also earned the honor in 2015 (Week 6) with Houston.

In the win over the Bills, Hopkins caught seven passes for 127 yards, including a 43-yard game-winning TD with just 0:02 remaining in regulation. It was Hopkins fourth career game-winning TD catch in the fourth quarter/OT and the first to come with under a minute left on the clock.

It was the Cardinals fourth "Player of the Week" selection this season and third "Offensive Player of the Week" award. The three "Offensive Player of the Week" awards are the most the Cardinals have had in a single season since 1996 (four).

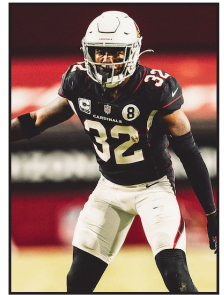


MURRAY AND BAKER CLEAN UP IN OCTOBER

The Cardinals piled up the awards in the month of October. S **Budda Baker** was named "NFC Defensive Player of the Month" for October, and QB **Kyler Murray** was named "NFC Offensive Player of the Week" in Weeks 5 and 7.

Between Murray and Baker, the duo combined for three consecutive "Player of the Week" awards (Weeks 5-7) and one "Player of the Month" award - all of which came in October.

It is just the fourth time (2015, Weeks 14-16; 2014, Weeks 8-10; 1998, Weeks 15-17) in team history that the Cardinals have had "Player of the Week" winners in three straight weeks.



DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE MONTH (OCTOBER) - S BUDDA BAKER

Baker was named the "NFC Defensive Player of the Month" for his performance in October, marking the first time in his career he has earned the honor.

He finished the month of October with 31 tackles, 2.0 sacks, 2 INTs (90 return yards), 3 TFL, 3 QB hits, 2 PD and a FF in three games played - all Arizona victories. He played all three games with a cast on his thumb after having surgery which forced him to miss Arizona's Week 4 game at Carolina.

Baker became the first NFL player in the last seven seasons (2014-20) to record at least 30 tackles, 2.0 sacks, 2 INTs and a FF in a single calendar month.

He was the only player in the NFL with multiple sacks and multiple INTs in October and his 31 tackles ranked second among all NFL DBs.

OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK - KYLER MURRAY (WEEKS 5 & 7)

Murray was named the "NFC Offensive Player of the Week" for his performance against the Jets in Week 5 and vs. the Seahawks in Week 7. With his two "Offensive Player of the Week" selections in 2020, he has now earned the honor three times in his career. He joins Kurt Warner (5x) and Neil Lomax (4x) as the only QBs in team history with at least three "Offensive Player of the Week" selections.

Murray also became the first Cardinals QB to be named "Player of the Week" twice in the same season since Warner in 2009.

WEEK 7 VS. SEATTLE: Murray completed a career-high 34-of-48 pass attempts (70.8%) for 360 yards, 3 TDs and a 104.5 passer rating. He also added 67 rushing yards and a TD on 14 carries. He became the first player in NFL history to throw for 350+ yards and 3+ TDs while also rushing for 50+ yards and a TD in a single game.

WEEK 5 AT NY JETS: Murray completed 27-of-37 pass attempts (72.9%) for a career-high 380 yards, a TD and a passer rating of 103.4. He also ran for 31 yards and a TD on nine carries. His 380 passing yards led the NFL in Week 5 and were also the most passing yards by a Cardinals QB in a win since Carson Palmer threw for 419 yards in a 27-14 victory at Jacksonville in 2013.



DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK - S BUDDA BAKER (WEEK 6 AT DALLAS)

Baker earned his first career "Defensive Player of the Week" after recording 7 tackles, a sack, his first career INT, a tackle for loss, two QB hits, a pass defensed and a forced fumble in the Monday night victory over the Cowboys.

He became the first Cardinals player since 2003 (Renaldo Hill on 11/2 vs. Cincinnati) to record a sack, an INT and a forced fumble in the same game.

EDMONDS CHASES 1,000

RB **Chase Edmonds** has 372 rushing yards on 76 carries (4.9 avg.) and 326 receiving yards on 42 receptions (7.8 avg.) so far in 2020. He also has four total TDs (1 rushing; 3 receiving).

With 698 yards in 2020, Edmonds has already established a career high for scrimmage yards in a season. He needs 302 yards over the final four games (75.0 ypg) to reach 1,000 scrimmage yards for the first time in his career.



LARRY FITZGERALD - AT A GLANCE

• An 11-time Pro Bowl selection, ranks second in NFL history in receptions (1,421) and receiving yards (17,419) and sixth in league annals with 120 TD receptions.

• Named a team captain in 2020, marking the 10th time in his career he has earned the honor.

• Selected by the Cardinals 3rd overall in the 2004 NFL Draft, is in his 17th season in Arizona in 2020. In team history, only QB Jim Hart (18) played more seasons with the team.

• At #69 on the NFL Networks Top-100 Players of 2020, has now made the All-100 Team in all 10 years of its existence. He is the only non-QB to accomplish that feat.

• The 2019 season marked the 13th time in 16 seasons he led the Cards in receiving yards. In NFL history, only Jerry Rice (15 times) led his team in receiving yards more times.

• Has caught at least one pass in all 42 different stadiums he has played in during his NFL career and has at least one TD reception in 27 different stadiums.

• In February of 2018, joined PGA pro Kevin Streelman in winning the Pebble Beach Pro-Am golf tournament. Became the first African-American amateur to win the event – which dates back to 1937 – and the first professional athlete to win the title since Dan Marino in 1988.

253 STRAIGHT WITH A CATCH

With a team-high eight receptions against Seattle in Week 11, Fitzgerald has at least one catch in 253 consecutive games played. That is the second-longest streak in NFL history behind Jerry Rice (274 straight).

Fitzgerald's streak of 253 consecutive games with a catch is the longest in NFL history with a single team, and he has at least one catch in 259 of 260 career games played.

Fitzgerald missed the Cardinals last two games (Weeks 12-13), but his streak was not affected by the absence.

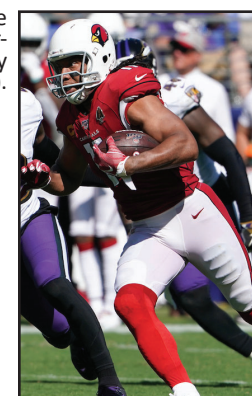

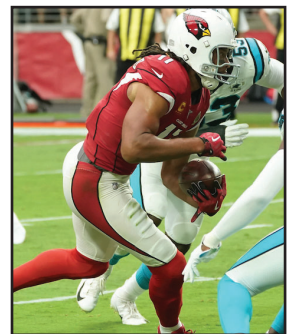

In fact, Fitzgerald's career numbers already surpass all but one receiver currently in the HOF (Rice). He has more career receptions than 28 of the 29 receivers in the HOF: Swann (336), Hayes (371), Pihos (373), Lavelli (386), Hirsch (387), Fears (400), Warfield (427), McDonald (495), Mitchell (521), Stallworth (537), Alworth (542), Biletnikoff (589), Carmichael (590), Berry (631), Maynard (633), Taylor (649), Irvin (750), Joiner (750), Lofton (764), Largent (819), Monk (940), Reed (951), Moss (982), Owens (1,078), Bruce (1,024), Brown (1,094), Carter (1,101) and Harrison (1,102).

He has more career receiving yards than 28 of the 29 receivers in the HOF: Fears (5,397), Swann (5,462), Pihos (5,619), Lavelli (6,488), Hirsch (7,029), Hayes (7,414), Mitchell (7,954), McDonald (8,410), Warfield (8,565), Stallworth (8,723), Biletnikoff (8,974), Carmichael (8,985), Taylor (9,110), Berry (9,275), Alworth (10,266), Maynard (11,834), Irvin (11,904), Joiner (12,146), Monk (12,721), Largent (13,089), Reed (13,198), Carter (13,899), Lofton (14,004), Brown (14,934), Harrison (14,580), Bruce (15,208), Moss (15,292) and Owens (15,934).

A Career Full of Accomplishments:

- Franchise career leader in receptions (1,421), receiving yards (17,419), receiving TDs (120), total TDs (120) and 100-yard receiving games (49). His nine 1,000-yard seasons are also a franchise record. His reception and receiving yardage totals both rank second in NFL history behind Jerry Rice while his 120 receiving TDs rank sixth in league annals.
- Led the NFL with 107 receptions in 2016, marking the second time in his career (103 in 2005; tied with Steve Smith) he had done so. He became the first player in NFL history to lead the NFL in receptions at least 11 years apart. Prior to Fitzgerald, the longest span between leading the league in receptions was six by Jerry Rice (1990, 1996).
- Led the NFL in receiving TDs in both the 2008 (12) and 2009 (13) seasons. In addition to his 10 receiving TDs in 2007, he became the first player in franchise history to record at least 10 TDs in three consecutive seasons.

Leading the Cardinals receiving corps this season are two of the NFL's best in crucial-down situations: **Hopkins** and **Larry Fitzgerald**.

Since entering the league in 2013, Hopkins leads the NFL with 167 first down receptions on third and fourth down. In that same span, Fitzgerald ranks seventh with 128 first down catches.

Overall, Hopkins has caught 196 passes for 2,564 yards (13.1 avg.) and 16 TDs on third and fourth down in his NFL career (2013-20). Fitzgerald has caught 358 passes for 4,359 yards (12.2 avg.) and 31 TDs on third and fourth down in his career (2004-20).



23 STRAIGHT WITH 5+ CATCHES

With six receptions for 131 yards in Week 5 against the Jets, Hopkins pushed his streak of consecutive games with five-or-more receptions to 23. The streak ended in the Week 6 win over the Cowboys when he had two catches for 73 yards, **but in NFL history, Hopkins and Antonio Brown (36 straight) are the only players with 5+ receptions in at least 23 consecutive games.**

ANOTHER 1,000-YARD CAMPAIGN

With 52 yards on eight receptions in Week 13 against the Rams, WR **DeAndre Hopkins** surpassed 1,000 receiving yards on the season, marking his sixth career 1,000-yard campaign and fourth in a row.

Hopkins has the NFL's second-longest active streak of 1,000-yard seasons, trailing only Chiefs TE Travis Kelce who has reached the milestone in each of the last five seasons (2016-20).

Hopkins is the 14th different player in franchise history to reach 1,000 receiving yards in a season and the first since WR Larry Fitzgerald had 1,156 yards on a franchise-record 109 receptions in 2017. He became the second player in franchise history to reach 1,000 receiving yards in his debut season with the team (Anquan Boldin as a rookie in 2003).



ELEVATING A FRANCHISE

The 2020 season is the 14th since owner **Michael Bidwill** began leading the organization. His leadership during that time has been instrumental in transforming the franchise both on and off the field.

Highlights of Bidwill's tenure:

- Leading the list of Bidwill's accomplishments with the Cardinals is the creation of State Farm Stadium. In the first 14 seasons after opened in 2006, the team sold out all 144 games (preseason and postseason included) played at the world-class venue that has been awarded three Super Bowls.



- In addition to his role in helping Arizona land Super Bowls XLII and XLIX, he led the effort to land Super Bowl LVII (2023) in the spring of 2018. Michael was instrumental in getting the 2015 Pro Bowl moved to Arizona, which was played a week before Super Bowl XLIX, and the two events combined to deliver a record economic impact of \$720 million to the region.

- By the time it hosts Super Bowl LVII, State Farm Stadium will have undergone \$100 million in improvements including parking infrastructure, state-of-the-art wifi, video boards, sound system upgrades and club-area enhancements since it staged Super Bowl XLIX.

- Of the Cardinals seven all-time postseason wins, five have come with Bidwill leading the team. Arizona has played in nine postseason contests over the last 13 seasons, after playing just seven prior to his tenure as team president.

- AZ has appeared in the NFC Championship Game twice since 2008, including a victory in the 2008 conference title game that led to the team's first-ever Super Bowl appearance (Super Bowl XLIII).

- In January of 2018, Michael was one of five owners named to the NFL's Player-Owner Committee focused on social and racial justice initiatives. In December of 2014, Commissioner Roger Goodell tapped Bidwill to chair the league's Conduct Committee.

- In January of 2019, Michael received the Paul Tagliabue Award from the Fritz Pollard Alliance for demonstrating integrity and leadership in the area of career development for minorities and advocating for diversity.

KEIM HAS BUILT SOME OF THE BEST

Steve Keim was promoted to GM on January 8, 2013 after 14 seasons in the Cardinals organization. The team has experienced unprecedented success during his tenure as GM. The teams put together by Keim have been some of the most successful in franchise history.



- In 2014, the Cardinals tied the franchise record for wins in a season (11) before setting a new mark in 2015 when Arizona won 13 games and earned its first-ever postseason bye.

- During Keim's tenure, Arizona has established franchise records for wins in a season (13 in 2015), points in a season (489 in 2015), led the NFL in total offense for the first time in team history (#1 in 2015) and led the NFL in sacks for the second time ever (48.0 in 2016).

- Selected QB **Kyler Murray** with the #1 overall pick in the 2019 NFL Draft. Murray was named the NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year following a record-setting season.

- Among the trades negotiated by Keim during his tenure as GM are the acquisition of QB **Carson Palmer** from Oakland in 2013, acquiring LB **Chandler Jones** from New England in 2016 and the trade that landed WR **DeAndre Hopkins** from Houston in 2020. During the 2019 season, Keim also orchestrated a trade with Miami for RB **Kenyan Drake**.

- Arizona has featured a top-10 defense four times and a top-10 offense twice dating back to Keim's first season as GM. The Cardinals had a top-10 defense in three consecutive seasons (2015-17) for the first time since the 1970 merger.

- Named *Sporting News* 2014 NFL Executive of the Year and earned back-to-back NFL Executive of the Year honors from Pro Football Talk (2013-14).

CARDINALS TAKE PART IN PUSH FOR JUSTICE

Throughout the 2020 season, Cardinals players and coaches are joining the rest of the NFL in honoring and memorializing victims of systemic racism and showing their support for Social Justice efforts by displaying names or phrases as decals on the back of their helmets and patches on their caps.



The season-long effort highlights the actions being taken to reach solutions, engages fans to act and gives players and coaches a platform on gameday to share their voice and efforts to inspire change. Together, the NFL is joining its players and coaches in building awareness, educating fans and paying homage to those who deserve to have their legacies live on.

CARDINALS SPEAKING UP

Numerous Cardinals players spoke up about their own experiences and the importance of making meaningful change a reality in the United States.

OL Kelvin Beachum - 11/20/20

OL **Kelvin Beachum** participated in an NFL-produced video "Say Their Stories" and discussed Breonna Taylor specifically:

"Saying her name is not just a slogan that we're putting on the back of our helmets. It's more than that. It's a rallying cry for Black women all across America, to realize how special she is and how special she was."

DL Corey Peters - 8/28/20

DL **Corey Peters** spoke about how important it is that everyone engage in the conversations and understand other viewpoints:

"One thing we want to do is be sensitive to one another, have compassion for one another, and we can disagree with certain things peacefully and all work towards the same goal of not only winning but make this a better country for everybody."

OL D.J. Humphries - 8/28/20

OL **D.J. Humphries** spoke about his children being a major motivator in trying to help bring about change:

"I know how to accept what the world has for you. I know how to maneuver in this world. But for my children, that's not what I want. I want my children to grow up in a fair world and grow up in a world where what the Constitution says is how it really is."

Head Coach Kliff Kingsbury - 8/27/2020

Kingsbury talked about what the Cardinals players and coaches have been discussing and learning from each other during recent events across the country:

"I had a great conversation with my dad over the summer, and his perspective on things that was really valuable as we get closer to the season – the anthem, discussions and things of that nature."

"My dad was a longtime football coach but also a Marine. He served in Vietnam, received a Purple Heart. Talking to him, there were two words that really stood out. One was respect, and the second thing was understanding. Respect viewpoints people have on this topic. They're very personal and very passionate. And respect their right to express themselves."

"You've got to understand, at its core, what this is really about. It's always been about drawing attention to the social injustice that continues to take place. We saw it again this week with Jacob Blake. It's about increasing awareness that racism exists, police brutality against people of color continues to happen, and let's not confuse it with something else and make the narrative different."

"My biggest takeaway from talking to my dad is that kneeling doesn't reflect a lack of patriotism or respect for the military in any way, just like standing during the anthem doesn't mean you're OK with racism or social injustice. It's important to respect and understand that. These are important issues that need to be addressed, and important conversations that need to be had. I'm grateful that I've been able to be around a great group of guys that have enlightened me – hearing their stories and their struggles. Those conversations will continue throughout the year. I just hope we can all continue to push in the right direction."

QB Kyler Murray - 6/17/20

Following the death of George Floyd and the resulting protests around the country, Murray spoke the change he saw happening in real time:

"There is a lot of hate in this world, but at the same time, what's happening and what we're seeing right now, it's huge. I don't condone rioting and stuff like that, but the peaceful protests, I think they're great, they're amazing. Whether it takes years, I feel like we're getting there. At least we're making a step towards it."

- Six-time team captain (2013, 2015-18, 2020) has totaled 471 tackles, 28 INTs (one returned for a TD) and 113 passes defended in 150 games (all starts) during his first 10 NFL seasons. Only five players in Cardinals history – including four Pro Football Hall of Fame inductees – have had more INTs than Peterson (28).

- Started all 128 games during his first eight NFL seasons, becoming the first Cardinal since at least the 1970 NFL-AFL merger to start 100+ straight games to begin a career.

- In April of 2020, named to the 2010-19 All-Decade Team by the Pro Football Hall of Fame's 48-member selection committee.

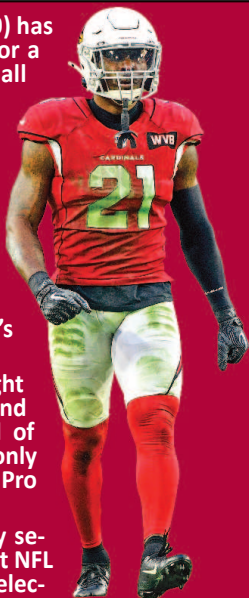
- Voted to the Pro Bowl in each of his first eight NFL seasons – seven times at CB (2012-18) and once as a kick returner (2011). Joined Hall of Famers Jim Brown and Barry Sanders as the only players in NFL history to be chosen to eight Pro Bowls before their 29th birthday.

- Peterson is the only player in team history selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his first eight NFL seasons, and his eight consecutive Pro Bowl selections are a franchise record.

- Earned first-team All-Pro honors three times with two selections at CB (2013, 2015) and one as a kick returner (2011).

- Named NFC Defensive Player of the Week three times (Week 15, 2019; Week 10, 2014; Week 4, 2013), NFC Special Teams Player of the Week twice (Week 9, 2011; Week 12, 2011) and Special Teams Player of the Month once (November 2011).

- Became the first NFL defender since at least the 1970 NFL-AFL merger to have a reception and a completion in the same game vs. Det (9/15/13). Peterson's gloves and the football used on the pass completion were sent to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, OH.



21 NOW WITH 28 INTERCEPTIONS

The Cardinals selected CB **Patrick Peterson** with the fifth pick in the 2011 NFL Draft, and in his first nine seasons, he earned eight Pro Bowl selections and was named first-team All-Pro three times. Considered one of the game's best cover corners, he has proven to be one of the most unique talents in NFL history. Since his rookie season in 2011, only three NFL players have more INTs than Peterson.

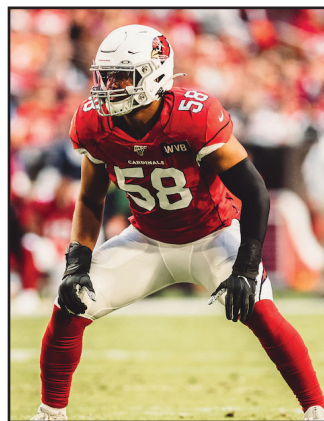
LB **Jordan Hicks** – signed as a free agent in 2019 after four years with the Eagles – put together a breakout campaign in his first season with the Cardinals.

KIRKPATRICK HAS THREE PICKS FOR THE CARDS

Through 11 games with the Cardinals, CB **Dre Kirkpatrick** has a team-high three INTs, matching a single-season career best that he posted in 2013, '14 and '16. In Week 12 against New England, he intercepted a Cam Newton pass near midfield with 4:37 remaining in the game.

Prior to 2020, Kirkpatrick had four total INTs in his previous five seasons (2015-19) combined. His INT of Cam Newton last week was Kirkpatrick's third in his last five games.

His first pick as a Cardinal came against his former Bengals teammate, QB Andy Dalton, in the Monday Night Football win over Dallas in Week 6. It was his fourth INT in eight career MNF appearances. Among active players, only New England CB Devin McCourty (5 in 12 games) has more INTs while playing on MNF.

ACCOMPLISHED VET JOINS THE SECONDARY

In Week 10, the Cardinals signed CB **Johnathan Joseph**, a two-time Pro Bowl selection who is in his 15th NFL season in 2020.

In his career, Joseph has played 211 games (192 starts) and has 781 tackles (664 solo), 32 INTs, 8 forced fumbles, 5 fumble recoveries and 200 passes defended. He has scored 8 TDs in his career (7 INT return; 1 fumble return).

The 36-year old Joseph entered the league with Cincinnati as a first-round selection (24th overall) in the 2006 NFL Draft out of South Carolina and spent his first five seasons in the league with the Bengals before signing as a free agent with Houston in 2011 where he played the next nine seasons.

Now with the Cardinals, Joseph reunites with defensive coordinator **Vance Joseph** who was his position coach in Houston between 2011-13.

Below are a few facts about Joseph's career:

- His 32 career INTs rank 3rd among active players behind only Richard Sherman (36) and Tramon Williams (34).

- His 8 defensive TDs and 7 INT return TDs both rank 2nd among active players behind only Janoris Jenkins (9 TD; 7 INT).



LEE STILL ON TOP OF HIS GAME

Now in his 17th NFL season – and fourth with the Cardinals – P **Andy Lee** is still one of the league's most productive punters. Since joining the Cardinals in 2017, Lee is tied for fourth in the NFL with a 47.4-yard gross punting average.

Lee has finished in the top-10 in punting average in 13 of his first 16 NFL seasons. That includes ranking seventh (2017), first (2018) and second (2019) in punting average while with the Cardinals.

His first three seasons in Arizona resulted in the three highest single-season punting averages in franchise history. In 2018, he led the NFL with a single-season franchise-record 48.6-yard gross punting average.

TRADING THE DEEP FRYER FOR A GAME BALL

The only game ball given out following the Cardinals Week 5 victory over the Jets went to third-year LB **Dennis Gardeck** – adding a new chapter in the inspiring story the former undrafted rookie authored on his way to the NFL.

Playing the first defensive snaps of his career, Gardeck – a special teams captain who signed with the Cardinals as a rookie free agent out of the University of Sioux Falls in 2018 – finished the game against the Jets with 2.0 sacks in just 10 defensive snaps.

His second quarter sack of Jets QB Joe Flacco was his first sack since his senior year at Sioux Falls in 2017. He added his third-career NFL sack in Week 13 against the Rams, a game in which he played just three defensive snaps.

It was a big performance for the Lake of the Hills, IL native but it wasn't the first success he has experienced in the NFL.

A special teams standout in his first two seasons, Gardeck was named a Pro Bowl alternate in 2019 after posting a team-high 10 tackles and a fumble recovery. In 42 career games, he has 25 special teams tackles, three punt deflections, a fumble recovery on a fake punt and a TD on a blocked punt. In 2018, he led all NFL rookies with 388 total snaps on special teams.

A SMALL SCHOOL STANDOUT AND FAST FOOD STAR

Gardeck's path to the NFL didn't run through a blue-chip college. Following high school, he attended Division II West Virginia State University for three seasons before spending his final college season at Sioux Falls as a graduate transfer. He was a standout in college though.

He recorded 345 tackles, 32.0 sacks, 57.5 tackles for loss, nine forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries in four seasons and was named to five Division II All-America teams as a senior in 2017.

He kept himself busy off the field during his college days as well. He earned a degree from West Virginia State (Gardeck is currently studying for a Masters of Business Administration degree) while also working at McDonald's. He started out on the grill crew but "worked his way up" to the assembly table and fryers. "It feels weird saying it was a good fit, but I had a blast there," he said. "I loved it. I loved my coworkers."

ALL-PRO HOPKINS HAPPY FOR HIS TRAINING PARTNER

Following the win over the Jets, WR **DeAndre Hopkins** spoke of how happy he was to see Gardeck's hard work paying off. "I rehabbed and trained with Dennis this offseason before I came here and I saw the work that he put in. I got to see the work he put in behind the scenes and for him to go in and do what he did today, I knew he was going to give his all and it resulted in two sacks. That is what you look for in a guy like that. It gives the team motivation."



KICKING HIS WAY TO THE TOP

Since joining the Cardinals in 2018, K **Zane Gonzalez** has connected on 54-of-66 FG attempts, including 20 consecutive FGs between Weeks 5-16 of the 2019 season.

The ASU product matched a career high with four made FGs in the Week 10 win over Buffalo and made three-of-four FG attempts in the Week 7 win over the Seahawks on SNF.

He connected on a 44-yarder as time expired in regulation to send the Seahawks game into OT and a 48-yarder to win it in OT, marking the third game-winning kick of his career and the first to come in OT. He also had game-winners at Green Bay in 2018 and in Cincinnati in 2019.

ZANE FROM LONG RANGE

He has converted two-of-three from beyond 50 yards this season, including a 54-yard FG in Week 3 against the Lions and a career-long 56-yarder in Week 1 against the 49ers.

In franchise history, just three made FGs have covered more ground than his 56-yard FG against San Francisco.

In 2019, Gonzalez had the best year of his career – and one of the best seasons by a kicker in team history – earning Pro Bowl alternate status. The NFC "Special Teams Player of the Month" for October, *Gonzalez made 31 FGs, which ranked fourth in the NFL last season and marked the third-highest total in team history.*

CARDINALS COVID-19 RELIEF EFFORTS (TEAM INITIATIVES)

Since the COVID-19 pandemic hit the country earlier this year the effects of the outbreak have reached every corner of the U.S. and has had a devastating impact on citizens and businesses across the nation. The Cardinals organization – along with the players and staff – immediately mobilized to donate time, money and other resources throughout Arizona to assist the individuals, businesses, schools, frontline health care personnel and other organizations that have been so greatly affected by the crisis.

\$1 MILLION FOUNDING CONTRIBUTION TO THE AZ CORONAVIRUS RELIEF FUND

On March 24, the Cardinals made a \$1 million founding contribution to the AZ Coronavirus Relief Fund. As part of the Arizona Together initiative launched earlier that day by Governor Doug Ducey, the fund was set up established to provide financial support to organizations working to mitigate the impacts of COVID-19 in Arizona. Initially, it focused on the following immediate needs:

- Funding of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) for frontline medical personnel.
- Non-profit organizations that support the most vulnerable Arizonans through food banks, homeless shelters, domestic violence facilities, and other services.
- Providing disadvantaged students with the technology necessary to transition to online learning.

“Like so many in our community, this unprecedented crisis has us asking what we can do to help and what might have the greatest impact,” said Cardinals Owner **Michael Bidwill** said of the donation. “We are grateful for the creation of this relief fund, and proud to support its critically important mission and hope that others throughout the community can join this effort in whatever way that they are able. As a team, we will continue to work on additional ways to make a difference and know that as a community we will get through this challenging time together.”

To assist local businesses during the crisis, the Cardinals made a \$100,000 donation to Local First Arizona, Arizona’s Coronavirus Micro Grant Fund

MILLION MEALS DONATION TO LOCAL FOOD BANKS



In early April, the Cardinals and State Farm partnered on an historic initiative to address a pressing local need arising from the COVID-19 pandemic. The number of people seeking assistance from local food banks more than doubled as a result of the unparalleled crisis. Unfortunately, the number of donations to them decreased just as dramatically.

As part of their on-going commitment to improve the local community, State Farm and the Cardinals helped tackle the issue by donating over a million 1,000,000 meals that were distributed to five non-profit organizations throughout the Valley. The five groups involved in the “Million Meal” donation were:

ORGANIZATION LAUNCHES “CARDINALS CARRY-OUT” INITIATIVE TO ASSIST INDEPENDENT, LOCALLY OWNED RESTAURANTS



On April 13 the team launched “Cardinals Carry-out” - an unprecedented initiative with a dual purpose: assist independent, locally-owned restaurants hit hard by the coronavirus crisis and recognize those working on the front lines of the pandemic in the medical community, law enforcement and emergency services.

Cardinals players and fans nominated their favorite establishments for inclusion on the team’s interactive statewide map and supported them with take-out business.

In the spirit of the NFL Draft, the team selected establishments from the map each day and purchased meals which were delivered to nurses, doctors, first responders and others who work daily to combat the impact of COVID-19.

When it was launched, the first 47 establishments on the map reflected the favorites of Cardinals players and staff as well as those near area hospitals suggested by Local First Arizona. Within the first week, over 800 restaurants throughout the state have been added based on recommendations from fans.

“It’s great that a major sports team would put together such a thing that is community driven and helps restaurants navigate these tough times...we’re kind of in survival mode but we’re going to make it out,” said **Chris Hove**, owner of Perfect Pear Bistro in Chandler which was recommended by defensive lineman **Zach Allen**.

HOSTING CRITICAL BLOOD DRIVES, DRIVE-THROUGH TESTING AND PPE DRIVES AT STATE FARM STADIUM

One area hit particularly hard by the COVID-19 crisis was the local blood donation community, where the supply reached critically low levels during a crucial time in March. In a seven-day span between March 19 and March 26, nearly 200 blood drives in Arizona were cancelled, resulting in the loss of more than 5,000 blood donations for hospital patients.

To assist in meeting this direly pressing need, the Cardinals partnered with Dignity Health and Cigna to host a major one-day blood drive at State Farm Stadium. In conjunction with Scottsdale-based Vitalant (pronounced “vye-TAL-ent” and formerly known as United Blood Services) the event took place at State Farm Stadium on March 31. All donation slots for the drive were filled within hours of the event being announced.

The outpouring of support from the community resulted in two additional blood drives being scheduled at State Farm Stadium. On back-to-backs on April 7-8, in conjunction with the American Red Cross, the Cardinals partnered with Anheuser-Busch to host blood drives at State Farm Stadium and all donation slots were again filled.

On April 15, the Cardinals and Project C.U.R.E hosted a Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) drive at State Farm Stadium. The event was to help collect equipment for use by those in the local healthcare community, including eye protection, face shields, surgical masks, N95 masks, gloves, shoe covers and hand sanitizer.

In May, the Cardinals and Dignity Health partnered to participate in the state’s drive-through COVID-19 testing blitz by hosting events open to the public at State Farm Stadium.



CARDINALS COVID-19 RELIEF EFFORTS (PLAYER INITIATIVES)

KLIFF KINGSBURY – \$50,000 DONATION TO THE NAVAJO RELIEF FUND (NRF)

The Native American population in Arizona was hit particularly hard by the COVID-19 outbreak and the Cardinals head coach was among the many who stepped up to help. In April, Kingsbury donated \$50,000 to the Navajo Relief Fund to assist one of the communities that was most affected – the Navajo Nation. The NRF was established to help with the shortage of healthy food, safe drinking water, healthcare and supply stores in remote reservation communities. During the pandemic, the fund served as urgent need in making available food, water and other basic supplies.

DEANDRE HOPKINS – \$150,000 DONATION TO THE ARIZONA CORONAVIRUS RELIEF FUND; #THEREALHEROES PROJECT

It didn't take long for the All-Pro wideout to make a significant impact in Arizona. On March 27, 2020 - just a week after being acquired by the Cardinals — Hopkins announced a \$150,000 donation to the AZ Coronavirus Relief Fund, which was established to provide financial support to multiple organizations trying to deal with the impact of COVID-19. Money raised by Arizona Relief Fund goes to purchasing Personal Protective Equipment for medical personnel working with the coronavirus patients; supporting non-profits that aid the most vulnerable such as food banks, homeless shelters and domestic violence facilities; and providing technology for disadvantaged students needed for online learning.

Hopkins was among the sports stars who participated in a national project to recognize and celebrate health care workers for their efforts on the front lines of the coronavirus pandemic. "The Real Heroes Project" was a collaboration involving Hopkins and athletes from a combined 14 leagues. Others include New Orleans Saints QB Drew Brees, New York Yankees All-Star outfielder Aaron Judge, U.S. women's soccer stars Carli Lloyd and Alex Morgan, and Hockey Hall of Famer Wayne Gretzky. In the PSA – which was released on National Nurses Day - Hopkins recognized local nurse Tracy Thomas, an RN at Dignity Health St. Joseph's Hospital and Medical Center. She was selected in recognition of the incredible work she has done leading the COVID-19 Response



CHANDLER JONES – DONATED 150,000 MEALS TO FOOD BANKS IN ARIZONA AND NEW YORK

In late March, the Cardinals All-Pro LB donated over 150,000 meals to food banks in both Arizona and his hometown of Endicott, NY to assist with families affected by the Coronavirus outbreak. Jones provided meals to St. Mary's Food Bank and Midwest Food Bank of Arizona while also donating to Mother Teresa's Cupboard through the Catholic Charities of Broome County in New York.

JORDAN HICKS – \$100,000 TO IMPACT CHURCH COVID-19 RELIEF EFFORTS; ANIMAL ADOPTION INITIATIVE

Following a career year on the field in his first season with Arizona, Hicks joined his wife, Ivana, to announce in April that they would match and donate up to \$100,000 to their church in Scottsdale – Impact Church – to assist single mothers during the pandemic. Those efforts included providing meals and helping cover rent and mortgage payments. Hicks' donation also helped facilitate a COVID-19 drive-through testing initiative at the church that saw over 500 people receive free tests.

Hicks and his wife also organized an animal adoption campaign in Austin that saw 260 animals adopted in under a week. The couple partnered with Austin (TX) Pets Alive to provide new pet owners with a care package that included a crate, pet food, treats, a leash and a toy.

KYLER MURRAY – \$25,000 DONATION TO GENYOUth FOR ITS COVID-19 EMERGENCY SCHOOL NUTRITION FUND

With schools across the country closed because of the coronavirus, the reigning NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year stepped up in April to help children who counted on school meals to be fed on a daily basis. He donated \$25,000 to GENYOUth for its COVID-19 Emergency School Nutrition Fund, which was established to provide resources that allowed school meal programs to continue despite school closures.

ISAIAH SIMMONS – DONATED 60,000 MEALS TO HARVEST COMPASSION CENTERS IN ARIZONA

Within a week of becoming the #8 overall pick in the 2020 NFL Draft, the former Clemson star was already reaching out to help people in Arizona struggling as a result of the pandemic. Simmons teamed up with the Cardinals and Bose to donate 60,000 meals to the Harvest Compassion Center for its facilities in Phoenix, Maryvale and Chandler. Harvest Compassion Center is a food and clothing bank dedicated to providing a hope-filled environment to the underserved in the greater Phoenix area. HCC locations offer free food, hygiene, baby, home and clothing items to the many Arizonans living below the poverty line.

LARRY FITZGERALD – DELIVERING MEALS TO HEALTHCARE WORKERS AND FRONTLINE STAFF

One of the most prolific WRs in NFL history, Fitzgerald long ago set the standard for making an impact in the community – and those efforts continued during the COVID-19 outbreak. In late April, he teamed with Steak 44, Ocean 44 and Dominick's to deliver meals to healthcare workers all over the Valley. In addition to helping those who have gone above-and-beyond to serve the community during the pandemic, it also served as a very personal cause for Fitzgerald, who's late mother, Carol, was a nurse.

COREY PETERS – STARTED VIRTUAL BOOK CLUB FOR ARIZONA HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

A passionate advocate for reading, the Cardinals starting DT set up an in-person book club a few years ago. When the pandemic hit, forcing the closure of schools and the enforcement of social distancing, Peters saw an opportunity to make the book club virtual. So in May, he launched the virtual book club "The Corey Peterson Playbook" to help provide an educational outlet for all Arizona high school students during the COVID-19 crisis.

PATRICK PETERSON – DONATED TO ARIZONA FIRST RESPONDERS ON MEMORIAL DAY WEEKEND

With Memorial Day occurring in the middle of the pandemic, the Cardinals All-Pro helped keep the spirit of the holiday when he teamed with Pit Boss Grills to donate grill products and gift cards to Arizona first responders. Peterson had his followers on social media nominate a first responder of their choice and he selected three winners on Memorial Day who each received a new top-of-the-line grill, grilling products and a gift card from Bashas supermarket.

DEVON KENNARD – DELIVERED MEALS TO FOUR VALLEY FIRE DEPARTMENTS; VIRTUAL HOSPITAL VISITS

In May, Arizona native – and Cardinals 2020 free agent signing – Kennard gave back to his hometown when he teamed with Salad and Go to provide dinner for firefighters at four different fire stations in the Ahwatukee area.

Every year Cardinals players and staff make numerous visits to Phoenix Children's Hospital to lift the spirits of the children and their families in pediatric units. Due to COVID-19 and the resulting safety restrictions, those visits have taken a new form. In late August, Kennard became the first Cardinals player to take the controls of a telepresence robot in order to spend time with children at PCH. While Kennard was at training camp at State Farm Stadium, he was able to drive the robot through the halls of PCH and interact with children through a video monitor.
