ARIZONA CARDINALS VS. TENNESSEE TITANS

Nissan Stadium | September 12, 2021 | 10:00 AM



THIS WEEK'S PREVIEW

The Cardinals begin the 2021 campaign with a rare Week 1 road game against an AFC opponent.



Arizona's trip to Tennessee this week marks the team's first Week 1 road game against an AFC opponent in 24 years (1997 @ Cincinnati). It also marks just the second time in the last 16 years (2006-21) the Cardinals opened a season playing on the road against a non-division opponent (2017 @ Detroit).

Sunday's opener will mark the 12th meeting in the series between Arizona and Tennessee, which dates back to 1970 when the Cardinals were based in St. Louis and the Titans were known as the Houston Oilers.

Arizona enters this week's game holding a 7-4 advantage in the all-time series, having won two straight and three of the last four contests. Of the Cardinals seven wins in the series, four have come on the road.

After falling just one win shy of a playoff berth in 2020, the Cardinals begin their 2021 campaign against a Titans team coming off back-to-back seasons in which they earned a spot in the postseason. Although Arizona and Tennessee are infrequent opponents, two of the Cardinals biggest names - WR **DeAndre Hopkins** and DL **J.J. Watt** - have long rivalries with the Titans dating back to their time in Houston. Hopkins faced the Titans 13 times in his seven seasons (2013-19) with the Texans while Watt played against them 15 times in 10 seasons (2011-20).

Sunday's game will be the debut of the Cardinals pass-rushing duo of Watt and LB **Chandler Jones**, who have combined for 198.0 sacks and 451 QB hits. The duo leads an Arizona defense that blends veteran All-Pro's (Watt, Jones, S **Budda Baker**) with a host of young talent including the linebacker tandem of **Isaiah Simmons** and **Zaven Collins** - the Cardinals most recent two first round picks. Collins, taken #16 overall in the 2021 NFL Draft, makes his NFL debut on Sunday alongside fellow rookie defender CB **Marco Wilson** (4th round in 2021).

On offense, the Cardinals have past Pro Bowl selections in nearly every position group, including at WR (Hopkins and **A.J. Green**), QB (**Kyler Murray**), OL (**Rodney Hudson**) and RB (**James Conner**). Added to that mix is dynamic rookie WR **Rondale Moore**, Arizona's second round pick who is also set to make his NFL debut in Tennessee.

THIS WEEK'S HIGHLIGHTS

- The 2021 regular season begins this week as the Cardinals face the Titans at Nissan Stadium in Nashville on Sunday. This marks Arizona's first Week 1 road game against an AFC opponent in 24 years (1997 @ Cincinnati).
- Arizona travels to Tennessee this week looking to improve to 8-4 all-time vs. the Titans and 5-2 on the road in the series.
- Sunday's game marks just the 12th all-time matchup between the Cardinals and Titans. However, two of the Cardinals biggest names have significantly more experience vs. Tennessee. DL **J.J. Watt** will be playing his 16th game vs. the Titans and WR **DeAndre Hopkins** will be playing his 14th.
- Watt has been nearly unstoppable vs. the Titans. In 15 games vs. his former divisional rival, he has 64 tackles, 18.0 sacks, 25 tackles for loss, 38 QB hits, 9 forced fumbles, 2 fumble recoveries and 9 passes defended.
- When they take the field together on Sunday, **Hopkins** (10,009) and **A.J. Green** (9,430) will become just the eighth WR duo in NFL history - and first since Andre Johnson and Derrick Mason with Houston in 2011 - to enter a season each having 9,000+ career receiving yards.
- LB **Chandler Jones** has 4.0 sacks in three career games against the Titans. He has at least one sack in all three games, including one in Week 1 of the 2012 season at Tennessee in his NFL debut.
- Jones has at least one sack in all five season-openers he has played with the Cardinals.
- Cardinals RB **Chase Edmonds** (5) and Titans RB **Derrick Henry** (7) are the only two RBs in the NFL with at least five TD runs of 20+ yards over the last two seasons (2019-20).

TITANS CONNECTIONS

Cardinals DBs coach **Marcus Robertson** played S for the Titans from 1991-00 after being selected by the franchise in the fourth round (102nd overall) of the 1991 NFL Draft. He played 135 games (117 starts) and posted 24 INTs while twice earning All-Pro honors (1993, '97). He returned to the team to coach the secondary from 2007-11.

Cardinals WRs coach **Shawn Jefferson** held the same post in Tennessee from 2013-15.

Cardinals Asst. O-line coach **Brian Natkin** played TE for the Titans during the 2001 season, appearing in three games.

CARDINALS CONNECTIONS

Titans WRs coach **Rob Moore** spent the final seven seasons (1995-01) of his played career with the Cardinals and earned 1st team All-Pro honors in 1997 when he led the NFL with 1,584 receiving yards.

Titans S **Matthias Farley** originally signed with Arizona as an undrafted rookie free agent in 2016.

Titans C **Daniel Munyer** played for the Cardinals from 2016-18.

TENNESSEE CONNECTIONS

Area Scout **Alfonza Knight** is a Nashville native and played ball collegiately at Sewanee (TN): The University of the South.

Cardinals Area Scout **Keegan Leyrer** is a Nashville native and attended the University of Tennessee.

ARIZONA CONNECTIONS

Titans OT **Taylor Lewan** is a native of Cave Creek, AZ. He attended Chaparral (Scottsdale) High School as a senior (2009) after spending three years at Cactus Shadows (Phoenix) High School. As a senior, started every game and helped lead his team to the 2008 Class 4A-I State Championship Game. Lewan was a SuperPrep All-American and earned the Frank Kush Award as the state of Arizona's top interior offensive lineman.

Titans DB **Dane Cruikshank** played two seasons (2016-17) at the University of Arizona, starting all 25 games played.

Titans RBs coach **Tony Dews** coached WRs at the University of Arizona from 2012-16.

Titans TE **Tommy Hudson** attended Arizona State, where he appeared in four games between 2016-19.

Cardinals head coach **Kliff Kingsbury** and Titans head coach **Mike Vrabel** were teammates with the Patriots in 2003.

Titans ILBs coach **Jim Haslett** served as the Saints head coach in 2004 while **Kingsbury** was on the New Orleans practice squad.

Titans General Manager **Jon Robinson** was serving as a scout with the Patriots during **Kingsbury's** season in New England.

Titans T **Kendall Lamm** (2015-18), OL **David Quessenberry** (2013-18), Cardinals WR **DeAndre Hopkins** (2013-19) and DL **J.J. Watt** (2011-20) played together in Houston.

Cardinals RB **James Conner** (2017-20), Titans LB **Ola Adeniyi** (2020) and LB **Bud Dupree** (2015-20) played together in Pittsburgh.

Titans CB **Elijah Molden** (2017-20) played alongside Cardinals CB **Byron Murphy Jr.** (2016-18) and LB **Ezekiel Turner** (2015-17) at the University of Washington.

Cardinals WR **Christian Kirk** (2015-17) and Titans WR **Josh Reynolds** (2014-16) played alongside one another at Texas A&M.

Titans LB **Rashaan Evans** (2014-17), RB **Derrick Henry** (2013-15) and Cardinals S **Deionte Thompson** (2015-18) played together at Alabama. During this time, the school claimed the 2015 and 2017 BCS National Championships.

Cardinals WR **Antoine Wesley** (2016-18) and Titans WR **Cameron Batson** (2014-17) played together on Cardinals Head Coach **Kliff Kingsbury's** (2013-18) Texas Tech teams.

Cardinals OL **Kelvin Beachum** (2017-19), OL **Brian Winters** (2013-19), Titans S **Matthias Farley** (2019-20) and K **Sam Ficken** (2019-20) played together with the Jets.

Titans CB **Jackrabbit Jenkins** (2016-19) played alongside Cardinals LB **Markus Golden** (2019-20), LB **Devon Kennard** (2014-17) and OL **Justin Pugh** (2013-17) with the Giants.

Titans WR **Marcus Johnson** (2016-17) and LB **Jordan Hicks** (2015-18) played together in Philadelphia.

Cardinals DT **Rashard Lawrence** (2016-20) and Titans CB **Kristian Fulton** (2016-20) played together at LSU and won the 2020 BCS National Championship.

CARDINALS-TITANS ALL-TIME SERIES

The Cardinals and the Titans meet this week for the 12th time in the history of the series, which dates back to 1970 when the Cardinals were based in St. Louis and the Titans were known as the Houston Oilers.



Arizona enters this week's game holding a 7-4 advantage in the all-time series, having won two straight and three of the last four contests. Of the Cardinals seven wins in the series, four have come on the road. That includes Arizona's last visit to Tennessee in 2013 when the Cardinals defeated the Titans 37-34 in an overtime thriller.

The last time the teams met - in Week 14 of the 2017 season at State Farm Stadium - the Cardinals earned a 12-7 victory. That continued a trend of close games when these two teams meet. The last three games were decided by a combined 11 points and none were decided by more than five points.

Sunday's season-opener marks just the sixth meeting between the two teams dating back to 1997. It also represents just the Cardinals third-ever regular season visit to Nashville.

Kliff Kingsbury became an NFL head coach for the first time when he was hired by the Cardinals on January 11, 2019, coming to Arizona after spending the previous six seasons (2013-18) as the head coach at his alma mater, Texas Tech. In his first two seasons with the Cardinals, Kingsbury helped lead a turnaround that resulted in a two-win improvement following his first year in 2019 and a three-win improvement after his second season in 2020. Arizona went from the NFL's 32nd ranked offense in 2018 to 16th in 2019 and then to 6th in 2020. A former star QB at Texas Tech, Kingsbury was drafted by the Patriots in the sixth round of the 2003 NFL Draft.

The Titans named **Mike Vrabel** the 19th head coach in franchise history on January 20, 2018. He enters the 2021 season - his fourth in Tennessee - with a 29-19 record during the regular season and Vrabel has led the team to the postseason in each of the last two seasons. Including postseason, Vrabel's 31 wins tied for the most in franchise history for a head coach in his first three seasons. The Titans are coming off a 2020 campaign in which they posted an 11-5 record and earned their first AFC South title since 2008. In 2019 the Titans made their first appearance in the AFC Championship Game since 2002. A former All-American defensive lineman at Ohio State, Vrabel played 14 seasons in the NFL and was part of three Super Bowl Championship squads.

18 SACKS AND COUNTING VS. TENNESSEE

After 10 seasons of battling Tennessee during his time with the Texans in the AFC South, the Titans become the first team DL **J.J. Watt** will face as a member of the Cardinals.

Watt has put up remarkable numbers against Tennessee. **In 15 games vs. his former divisional rival, the All-Pro totaled 64 tackles, 18.0 sacks, 25 tackles for loss, 38 QB hits, 9 forced fumbles, 2 fumble recoveries and 9 passes defended.**



His sack, tackle for loss, QB hits and forced fumble totals against the Titans are more than he has against any other opponent in his career. Since individual sacks became an official statistic in 1982, no player has more sacks vs. the Titans than Watt.

HOP'S BIG NUMBERS VS. THE TITANS

WR **DeAndre Hopkins** faced the Titans 13 times during his seven seasons (2013-19) with the Texans. In those contests, he totaled 83 receptions for 1,313 yards and seven TDs. His 83 receptions and 1,313 receiving yards are more than he has against any other opponent in his career. His seven TD catches are tied (Chiefs) for the most against any opponent.

Hopkins has four 100-yard receiving performances in his last six games against the Titans, and his seven-career 100-yard outings against Tennessee rank third by an active player against a single opponent – Julio Jones (9 vs. Tampa Bay) and T.Y. Hilton (8 vs. Houston).

His 238 yards vs. Tennessee in 2014 remain a career single-game high. Hopkins has four 100-yard performances at Nissan Stadium, including in each of his last two visits to the venue: 2019 (119) and 2018 (110).

CARDINALS VS. TITANS CHEAT SHEET

AN ALL-TIME TRIO OF RECEIVERS

Three of the NFL's top-5 active receiving leaders will share the field Sunday when the Cardinals visit the Titans.

The league's leading receiver among active players, **Julio Jones** (12,896 receiving yards), will make his Tennessee debut, while **DeAndre Hopkins** (10,009) and **A.J. Green** (9,430) – who rank 4th and 5th respectively – will line up together for the first time as teammates.

ADDING AN ALL-PRO ON THE OFFENSIVE LINE

Arizona acquired **Hudson** and a 7th-round selection in the 2021 NFL Draft from Las Vegas in exchange for the Cardinals 3rd-round selection. He is a 10-year NFL veteran who played the past six seasons (2015-20) with the Raiders where he started at center in all 92 games he appeared in.

Recent Success: All three of Hudson's Pro Bowl selections (2016-17, 2019) have come in the last 5 seasons. He was named to the Pro Bowl and earned 2nd-team All-Pro honors in 2019.

A Reliable Player: In the last eight seasons, Hudson played 124 of a possible 128 games - missing just one game in the last five years. Hudson has played at least 800 snaps each of the last eight seasons, including six years playing 1,000+ snaps.

#99 COMES OUT OF RETIREMENT

DL J.J. Watt has been wearing the #99 jersey since his college days at Wisconsin. When the Cardinals acquired him in free agency, a number change seemed inevitable since the digits were retired by the Cardinals in tribute to **Marshall Goldberg**, a star on the 1947 championship team.

However, #99 was unretired for Watt after he received permission to wear it from Goldberg's daughter, **Ellen Goldberg Tullos**. Watt was prepared to select a new number after learning of Goldberg's impressive legacy, but then read an article saying Tullos would be fine with him taking over #99. Watt gave her a call to confirm and indeed had her blessing.

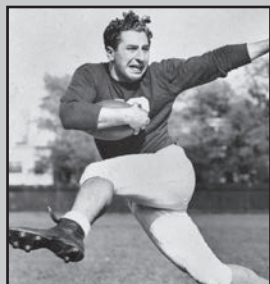
Remembering Marshall Goldberg

- Goldberg played eight seasons (1939-43, '46-48) for the Cardinals after a being selected in the 1939 NFL Draft.

- Was a member of the 1947 NFL Championship team, and his late INT in the title game vs. the Eagles sealed the victory.

- A six-time All-Pro defensive back, Goldberg also played halfback/fullback and was a return specialist. During the 1941 season Goldberg rushed for 427 yards and 3 TDs and had 313 receiving yards on offense. He also led the NFL with 7 INTs, 12 kick-off returns, 290 kickoff return yards and 1,236 all-purpose yards.

- Goldberg's playing career was interrupted by his service during World War II. He joined the Navy in 1943 and spent two years in the South Pacific rising to the rank of lieutenant. In preparation for his service Goldberg underwent rigorous Scout and Ranger training in a unit that was a forerunner of the Navy Seals.



HIGHLY ACCOMPLISHED TEAMMATES

A TRIO WITH 13 SEASONS OF DOUBLE-DIGIT SACKS

DL J.J. Watt and LB Chandler Jones aren't the only accomplished pass rushers on the Cardinals defense. Add in LB **Markus Golden** and Arizona has a trio of defenders who have each posted 10.0+ sacks in multiple seasons in their careers. The three players have combined for 13 seasons with double-digit sacks in their careers, including nine seasons with at least 12.5 sacks.

DEBUT OF THE 17-GAME REGULAR SEASON

For the first time ever, the NFL will have a 17-game regular season beginning in 2021. Teams have played a 16-game regular season since 1978. The league had a 14-game regular season between 1961-77.

To accommodate the 17th game, teams went from a four-game preseason to three games.

HOW THE EXTRA MATCHUP IS DECIDED

The additional game is an interconference matchup between AFC and NFC divisions two years removed from their last meeting, going against the team that finished in the same spot in their respective divisions. The site of a team's 17th game will rotate each year, with the AFC getting a 9th home game in 2021. That will give Arizona a 9th road game this season.



For the Cardinals - who finished 3rd in the NFC West in 2020 - the extra game means a trip to Cleveland to face the Browns, who finished 3rd in the AFC North last season. That game will take place in Week 6.

- The Cardinals join the Ravens and Seahawks as the only three teams that start the season with three of their first four games on the road.

- The Cardinals take on the AFC South (Houston, Indianapolis, Jacksonville, Tennessee) and the NFC North (Chicago, Detroit, Green Bay, Minnesota).

- The Cardinals will play nine games against teams that earned a spot in the postseason in '20 - Seattle (twice), the L.A. Rams (twice), Green Bay, Chicago, Cleveland, Indianapolis and Tennessee. Five of those games will be played on the road and four will be played at State Farm Stadium.

CARDS MAKE BIG CLIMB IN NFL TOP-100

Last month, NFL Network released its annual list of the *Top 100 Players* and four Arizona players were featured: **WR DeAndre Hopkins** (#8), **S Budda Baker** (#19), **QB Kyler Murray** (#39) and **DL J.J. Watt** (#66).

BAKER MAKES ONE OF THE BIGGEST JUMPS UP THE LIST

Baker made his debut on the *NFL Network Top 100* list in 2020 when he came in at #97. Following a season in which he was named first-team All-Pro and tied for the lead among NFL DBs in tackles, Baker jumped all the way up to #19 in 2021.

Baker is the highest-ranking safety on the Top 100.

He also jumped 78 spots from 2020 to 2021. The only NFL player with a greater year-to-year jump is Dolphins CB Xavien Howard (unranked to #17).

MURRAY UP ALL THE WAY TO #39

Following a 2019 campaign in which he earned NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year honors, **Murray** made the *Top 100* list for the first time in 2020 when he came in at #90.

After earning Pro Bowl honors last season, Murray jumped 51 spots to #39 on this year's list.

HOPKINS LANDS IN TOP-10 FOR SECOND STRAIGHT YEAR

After coming in at #66 in 2021, Watt made the Top 100 for the ninth consecutive year. He is the only non-QB to accomplish that feat, joining Tom Brady, Aaron Rodgers and Russell Wilson.



5 DRAFT PICKS MAKE THE ROSTER

ZAVEN COLLINS - ROUND 1 (16TH) - TULSA

• Was the second linebacker selected in the 2021 draft (Micah Parsons, 12th to Cowboys) and the fourth defender selected.

• A three-year starter (2018-20) at Tulsa, played in 32 career games and totaled 236 tackles, 29 tackles for loss, 7.5 sacks, 8 passes defended, 5 INTs, 3 fumble recoveries and 3 forced fumbles. Recipient of the Lombardi Award, Bronko Nagurski Trophy and the Chuck Bednarik Award in 2020. Was also a unanimous 1st-team All-American selection.

• Hails from Hominy, Oklahoma which has a population of 3,500. Did not receive a single DI scholarship offer until his mom, Haley, took money from her 401K and drove him to 12 camps across the region. Tulsa was his sole DI offer.

• Has a rare combination of size and speed - even at the linebacker position. At 6-4 and 260 pounds, the All-American clocked a 4.67 40-yard dash time at his pro day. Athleticism was on display in 2020 when - despite playing just eight games - he recorded 4 INTs and 152 return yards, with TD returns of 38 and 96 yards.



RONDALE MOORE - ROUND 2 (49TH) - PURDUE

• In three seasons (2018-20) at Purdue, appeared in 20 games and recorded 178 receptions for 1,915 yards and 14 TDs. Also rushed for 248 yards and three TDs on 30 carries, returned 42 kickoffs for 813 yards and 17 punts for 118 yards.

• Earned a Business degree from Purdue in just 2.5 years. To do so, he averaged 21 hours a semester majoring in Selling and Sales Management. Took 27 hours during 2020 Fall semester and graduated with 3.5 GPA.

• Won the Paul Hornung Award in both high school (best player in state of Kentucky) and college (most versatile player in the nation) in back-to-back years (2017 & 2018).

• Ran the fastest 40-yard dash in the nation coming out of high school (4.33) and ran the 40 in 4.29 seconds at his Pro Day.



MARCO WILSON - ROUND 4 (136TH) - FLORIDA

• Arizona traded into the fourth-round to acquire Wilson, who started 35-of-36 games played at Florida (2017-20) and recorded 103 tackles, 3 INTs and 17 passes defended.

• Showed up at Florida and became an immediate starter. Joined an exclusive list of Gators who started at CB in a season-opener as a freshman (Joe Haden, Janoris Jenkins, Marcus Roberson).

• Had a record-setting performance at Pro Day: his 43.5-inch vertical was 5th-best ever by a college CB and his 136-inch broad jump tied for 3rd-best ever by a corner.

• USA Today All-American at Plantation High School, where he played alongside fellow 2021 draft picks CB Patrick Surtain II (9th overall to Denver) and CB Tyson Campbell (33rd overall to Jacksonville).



VICTOR DIMUKEJE - ROUND 6a (210TH) - DUKE

• Hails from Lagos, Nigeria, and moved to the U.S. with his family when he was 8 years old.

• Started all 49 games at Duke after becoming starter as a true freshman. Recorded 166 tackles, 36 tackles for loss, 21.5 sacks, 28 QB pressures, 5 forced fumbles and 3 fumble recoveries. Freshman All-America selection in 2017.

• His 21.5 career sacks are the 2nd-most in Duke history.

• Graduated from Duke a semester early with a degree in Evolutionary Anthropology. Also earned a Marketing and Management Certificate.



TAY GOWAN - ROUND 6b (223RD) - CEN. FLORIDA

• Became the first UCF player ever drafted by the Cardinals.

• Opted out of 2020 season to protect the health of his newborn daughter, Skylar, who was born prematurely and with health complications.

• As a junior in 2019, Pro Football Focus gave him an 80.1 coverage grade after he gave up just 20 receptions on 50 targets. According to the site, his 26.6 passer rating allowed in single coverage since 2019 was the best in the nation.

• Transferred to UCF in 2019 from Butler (El Dorado, KS) Community College and had a breakout season, appeared in 12 games (9 starts) with 31 tackles, 2 INTs and 8 passes defended. Gave up just 20 receptions on 50 targets that season.

LB CHANDLER JONES

• Needs just 3.0 sacks to reach 100.0 sacks for his career. Would become one of 17 players in NFL history to reach 100.0 career sacks in their first 10 seasons.

• Needs 6.0 sacks to pass Freddie Joe Nunn (66.5) as the franchise all-time leader.

• With 17.0 sacks, would join Reggie White (3) and current teammate J.J. Watt (3) as the only players in NFL history with at least three seasons of 17.0 sacks.



WR DEANDRE HOPKINS

• Needs 800 receiving yards to become the third player in NFL history with 800+ receiving yards in each of his first nine seasons: Jerry Rice (12) and Gary Clark (9).

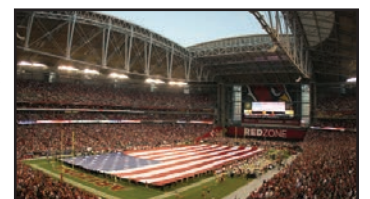

WELCOMING BACK THE RED SEA IN 2021

Following a 2020 campaign in which the majority of NFL teams played in mostly empty stadiums due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Cardinals welcomed fans back to State Farm Stadium as the team opened its 16th season at the venue during the preseason. The Cardinals will have their regular season home-opener in Week 2 vs. Minnesota.



Of Arizona's 16 regular season games last year, just five were played with the general public in attendance. Those five contests saw a total of just 39,894 fans on hand. A combined total of 116,225 fans were in attendance for the Cardinals two home preseason contests vs. Dallas and Kansas City.

After State Farm Stadium opened in 2006 the Cardinals sold out every pre-pandemic game played there.

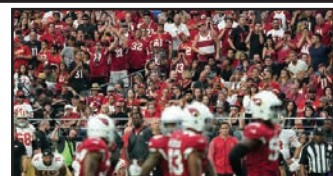

IT GETS LOUD IN THERE

With fans back in NFL stadiums across the country in 2021, the Cardinals return to one of the league's best home field advantages.

From the inaugural year at State Farm Stadium in 2006 through 2019, Cardinals opponents accumulated 170 accepted false start penalties in the regular season. That was the most for any home team in the NFL during that span.

ELEVATING A FRANCHISE

The 2021 season marks the 15th since owner **Michael Bidwill** began leading the organization. His leadership during that time has been instrumental in transforming the franchise both on and off the field.

Highlights of Bidwill's tenure:

- Michael continues a tradition of Bidwill ownership of the Cardinals that dates back to his grandfather, Hall of Famer Charles Bidwill, in 1933.
- Of the franchise's seven all-time postseason wins, five have come with Michael leading the organization. Arizona has played in nine postseason contests over the last 14 seasons, after having appeared in just seven total playoff games prior.
- Arizona has appeared in the NFC Championship Game twice since 2008 including a victory in the 2008 conference title game that led to the franchise's first-ever Super Bowl appearance (Super Bowl XLIII).
- Among Bidwill's most substantial accomplishments with the Cardinals is the creation of State Farm Stadium. The world-class venue has proved a critical turning point for the franchise, an economic engine for the state of Arizona, and most recently, a crucial resource in the battle against the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Since State Farm Stadium opened in 2006 it has hosted two Super Bowls (with a third – Super Bowl LVII – set to cap the 2022 season) and the Cardinals sold out every pre-pandemic game played there.
- In addition to his role in helping Arizona land Super Bowls XLII, XLIX and LVII Michael was also instrumental in getting the 2015 Pro Bowl moved to State Farm Stadium; played a week before Super Bowl XLIX, the two events combined to deliver a record economic impact of \$720 million to the region.
- State Farm Stadium served as a critical site since the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020. The venue hosted three blood drives at the beginning of the outbreak and in 2021 it became one of the first - and most successful - mass vaccination site in the nation.
- In January of 2018, Michael was one of five owners named to the NFL's Player-Owner Committee focused on social and racial justice initiatives. In December of 2014, Commissioner Roger Goodell tapped Bidwill to chair the league's Conduct Committee. The committee reviews the league's Personal Conduct Policy at least annually and recommends appropriate changes with advice from outside experts.

CARDS HONOR ADELE HARRIS WITH SCHOLARSHIP

In May, the Cardinals announced the creation of the "**Adele Harris Scholarship**" to commemorate the 50th anniversary of Harris becoming the first African American female to hold a front office position in the NFL.

Harris spent 26 years in a variety of public and community relations roles within the Cardinals organization before retiring in 2001. A Chicago native, she was raised in St. Louis and joined the Cardinals in 1971 as an assistant in the PR department. She left the club to pursue a degree in business management and returned in 1978 as a publicity assistant.

By 1980, Harris became Director of Community Relations and was instrumental in the team's civic efforts when it relocated to Arizona in 1988. She played a key role in the formation of Cardinals Charities, which was launched in 1990 as a vehicle to support programs designed to improve the quality of life and enhance opportunities for children, women and minorities in Arizona. Adele passed away in 2007 at the age of 65.

The \$10,000 "Adele Harris Scholarship" will be awarded annually to assist a graduating high school student in the state of Arizona who is pursuing a career in sports.

"This scholarship serves two main purposes," said Cardinals owner **Michael Bidwill**. "It recognizes the valuable role that Adele played within our organization for more than a quarter of a century and also connects her to future generations who aspire to follow in her footsteps. We are grateful for the opportunity to do both of those things."



SUPER BOWL COMING BACK TO AZ

Valley Will Host 4th Super Bowl When Game Returns in 2023

In June, the National Football League and the Arizona Super Bowl Host Committee announced that Super Bowl LVII will be played at State Farm Stadium on Sunday, February 12, 2023.

"The selection of the date for Super Bowl LVII means we are getting closer to the event all of Arizona is anticipating," said David Rousseau, Chairman of the Arizona Super Bowl Host Committee. "The exposure and economic impact it brings to our region is unmatched and so is the level of community support required to execute such a massive undertaking."



Arizona was selected to host Super Bowl LVII in May of 2018, marking the fourth time that a Super Bowl was awarded to the state. It is the third time the nation's most popular sporting event will be played at State Farm Stadium and first since Super Bowl XLIX following the 2014 season.

Arizona joins South Florida, New Orleans, Los Angeles and Tampa Bay as the only sites selected to host the Super Bowl at least four times.

ECONOMIC IMPACT: The last time the game was staged in Arizona, it produced a record economic impact for the state. A 2015 study by the Seidman Research Institute, W.P. Carey School of Business at Arizona State University determined that Super Bowl XLIX, the 2015 Pro Bowl and related events produced a gross economic impact of \$719.4 million for the region. That was the largest economic impact of any special event ever held in Arizona. In addition to the games played in Glendale, more than 1 million people visited Verizon Super Bowl Central in downtown Phoenix and more than 500,000 people enjoyed events in downtown Scottsdale.

In a span of just over 26 months in 2015-17, State Farm Stadium hosted a Pro Bowl, Super Bowl, College Football National Championship Game and the NCAA Men's Final Four.

KEIM HAS BUILT SOME OF THE BEST

After 14 seasons working within the Cardinals personnel department, **Steve Keim** was elevated to GM on January 8, 2013. The teams put together by Keim have been some of the most successful in franchise history.



- In 2014, the Cardinals tied the franchise record for wins in a season (11) before setting a new mark in 2015 when Arizona won 13 games and earned its first-ever postseason bye.

- During Keim's tenure, Arizona has established franchise records for wins in a season (13 in 2015), points in a season (489 in 2015), led the NFL in total offense for the first time in team history (#1 in 2015) and led the NFL in sacks for the second time ever (48.0 in 2016).

- Arizona has featured a top-10 defense four times and a top-10 offense three times dating back to Keim's first season as GM. The Cardinals had a top-10 defense in three consecutive seasons (2015-17) for the first time since the 1970 merger. In 2020, Arizona offense ranked #6 overall after posting 6,153 total yards, the third-most in franchise history.

- Selected QB **Kyler Murray** with the #1 overall pick in the 2019 NFL Draft. Murray was named the 2019 NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year and followed up in 2020 by becoming the youngest QB in franchise history (23) to earn a Pro Bowl nod.

- Among the trades negotiated by Keim during his tenure as GM are the acquisition of QB **Carson Palmer** from Oakland in 2013, acquiring LB **Chandler Jones** from New England in 2016, the trade that landed WR **DeAndre Hopkins** from Houston in 2020 and the trade with Las Vegas to acquire OL **Rodney Hudson** in 2021.

- The 2021 free agency period was one of Keim's busiest as GM. The players the Cardinals acquired have a combined 20 Pro Bowl selections and 11 All-Pro nods. Arizona brought in six different Pro Bowlers in the offseason: DL **J.J. Watt**, WR **A.J. Green**, OL **Rodney Hudson**, K **Matt Prater** and RB **James Conner**.

- Named Sporting News 2014 NFL Executive of the Year and earned back-to-back NFL Executive of the Year honors from the editors of Pro Football Talk (2013-14).

A TOP-10 OFFENSE IN 2020

For the first time since 2015 - and just the third time in 12 seasons - Arizona finished with a top-10 offense in 2020. The Cardinals finished with the NFL's #6 ranked offense last season, averaging 384.6 yards per game.

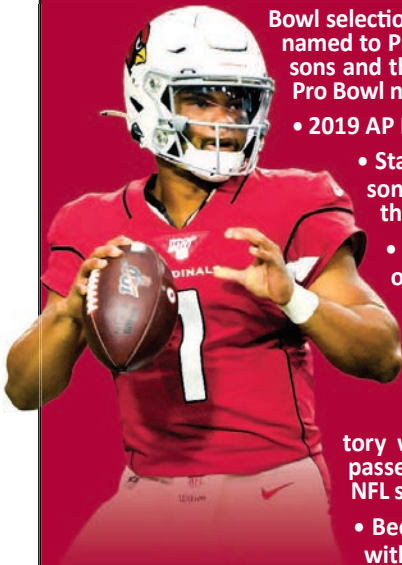

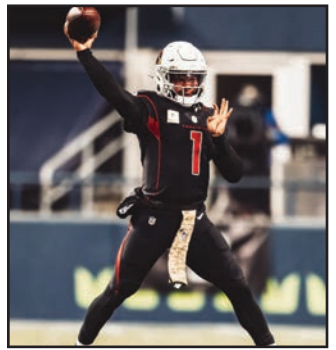

CHASING A MILESTONE WITH 3,500 & 500

As a rookie in 2019, Murray threw for 3,722 yards and rushed for 544 yards. Last season he surpassed both of those totals, throwing for 3,971 yards and rushing for 819 yards.

Murray and Cam Newton (2011-12) are the only players in NFL history to record 3,500+ passing yards and 500+ rushing yards in each of their first two seasons.

No player has put up those numbers in each of their first three seasons, giving Murray a chance to make NFL history in 2021.

In 2020, Murray fell just 29 passing yards shy of becoming the first player in history with 4,000+ passing yards and 800+ rushing yards in a season.

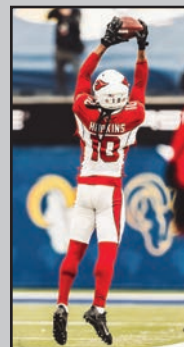

EDMONDS READY FOR BIGGER ROLE

Entering his fourth NFL season in 2021, RB **Chase Edmonds** is poised to take on a much bigger role in the Cardinals offense.

The former Fordham All-American is coming off the most productive year of his career in 2020 - one that saw him establish career highs for scrimmage yards (850), rushing attempts (97), rushing yards (448), receptions (53), receiving yards (402), receiving TDs (4) and total TDs (5).

Edmonds 2020 Highlights:

- Averaged 4.6 yards per carry on a career-high 97 rushing attempts.
- Had more scrimmage yards (850) than he had in his first two seasons combined (719).
- His 448 receiving yards nearly doubled the total from his first two seasons combined (208).
- Had 4 receiving TDs in 2020, after posting one TD reception in his first two seasons combined. The only RBs in franchise history with more receiving TDs in a single season were Larry Centers (7 in 1996) and Charley Trippi (6 in 1949).



MAKING A HABIT OF LONG TOUCHDOWN RUNS

Edmonds has 157 rushing attempts over the last two seasons (2109-20) and has averaged 4.8 yards per carry. One of the main reasons for his high rushing average was his penchant for long TD runs. Edmonds has five TD runs of 20+ yards in that span.

Among all NFL players, only Titans RB Derrick Henry (7) had more TD runs of 20+ yards over the last two seasons (2019-20) than Edmonds.

PRO BOWLER IN THE BACKFIELD

The newest addition to the Cardinals backfield is Pro Bowl RB **James Conner**, who signed with Arizona as a free agent in April following four seasons (2017-20) with the Steelers.

During his time in Pittsburgh, Conner appeared in 50 games (33 starts) and ran for 2,302 yards and 22 TDs on 532 carries (4.3 avg.) to along with 124 receptions for 963 yards and four TDs.

He had his best season in 2018, when he was selected to the Pro Bowl after rushing for 12 TDs and 973 yards while catching 55 passes for 497 yards a TD in 13 games.

PRODUCTIVE AS A RUNNER AND RECEIVER

Over the last three seasons (2018-20), Conner totaled 3,121 scrimmage yards and 26 TDs in 36 games. He is one of just 10 players in the NFL with 2,000+ rushing yards and 900+ receiving yards in that span.

Of the Cardinals five starting offensive linemen, four were full-time starters in 2020 - including three (**D.J. Humphries**, **Justin Pugh**, **Kelvin Beachum**) who started for Arizona. **Rodney Hudson** was the Raiders starting center in 2020.

Those four linemen have played a combined 423 games - with 402 starts - in their NFL careers.

LT D.J. HUMPHRIES

Started all 59 games he played during his first six NFL seasons, including the first 10 at RT before moving to LT full-time prior to the 2017 season.

LG JUSTIN PUGH

Started all 101 games played during his first eight NFL seasons at left guard (55), right tackle (38), right guard (7) and left tackle (1) for the Giants (2013-17) and Cardinals (2018-20).

C RODNEY HUDSON

A three-time Pro Bowler (2016-17, '19) and 2019 second-team All-Pro selection at center, has started 127 of 143 games played in his first 10 NFL seasons with the Chiefs (2011-14) and Raiders (2015-20). Started all 92 games played at center in six seasons with the Raiders.

RT KELVIN BEACHUM

Has started 115 of 120 games played with the Steelers (2012-15), Jaguars (2016), Jets (2017-19) and Cardinals (2020) during his first nine seasons. Of his 115 career starts, 93 came at LT, 21 at RT and one at TE.

The Cardinals fifth starter - RG **Josh Jones** - was selected by the Cardinals in the third round (72nd overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft and played in 13 games last season as a rookie. A left tackle coming out of the University of Houston, Jones moved to guard during training camp.

• After spending his first 10 seasons with the Texans - who selected him in the first round (11th overall) in the 2011 NFL Draft - signed a two-year contract with the Cardinals on 3/2/21 as a free agent.

• Has been named NFL Defensive Player of the Year three times (2012, '14-15), tied with Rams DT Aaron Donald and Giants LB Lawrence Taylor for the most in NFL history.

• Wife, Kealia, plays for the Chicago Red Stars of the NWSL and his brothers, Derek (FB) and T.J. (LB), play for the Pittsburgh Steelers.

• In response to the devastation in Houston as the result of Hurricane Harvey in 2017, organized what would become the largest crowd-sourced fundraiser in history. Originally set an ambitious goal of \$200,000 but within 19 days, more than 200,000 individuals collectively donated \$37 million to the cause. Contributions continued, and the final tally reached \$41.6 million, which significantly benefited a large variety of relief efforts throughout the months following the storm.



#99 SURPASSES 100 CAREER SACKS

One of the NFL's most dominant defenders since entering the league in 2011, **Watt** surpassed 100.0 career sacks last season with Houston to become just the 35th player in NFL history to reach the milestone.

Watt (101.0) and Denver's Von Miller (106.0) are the only active players in the NFL who have reached 100.0 career sacks. Cardinals LB Chandler Jones enters the '21 season with 97.0 career sacks and needs just three to join the list.

A WATT OF ACCOMPLISHMENTS

In 10 NFL seasons, **Watt** has accumulated 531 tackles, 101.0 sacks, 25 forced fumbles, 16 fumble recoveries, 282 QB hits, 172 tackles for loss, 61 passes defensed and two INTs during the regular season.

His list of accomplishments is long. Those accolades include being one of just three players in league history to be named AP NFL Defensive Player of the Year at least three times.

There have been eight players in league history that have earned multiple DPOY Awards. Six are enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame. The other two are Watt and Rams DT Aaron Donald.

Watt and White are the only players in NFL history to record 100+ sacks and be named NFL Defensive Player of the Year before turning 32 and then switching teams.

CHANDLER JONES - AT A GLANCE



- Three-time Pro Bowl selection (2015, '17 and '19) and two-time 1st-team All-Pro (2017 and '19) had 465 tackles, 97.0 sacks, 175 QB hits, 27 forced fumbles, nine fumble recoveries, one INT and 25 passes defended in 124 games (121 starts) during his first nine NFL seasons.

- Named to the 2010-19 All-Decade Team by the Pro Football Hall of Fame's 48-member selection committee.

- One of six NFL defenders to earn multiple 1st-team All-Pro selections from 2017-19 and became the fifth defender – and first LB – in Cardinals history to be named a 1st-team All-Pro multiple times.

- Leads the NFL in sacks (97.0) and forced fumbles (27 - tied) since entering the league in 2012; just 10 players in NFL history had more sacks in their first nine seasons than Jones.

- Had 10.0+ sacks in five consecutive seasons (2015-19) before a season-ending injury in 2020, joining Von Miller (2014-18) as the only active NFL players to accomplish the feat. Also became the first player in Cardinals history with at least four 10.0+ sack campaigns (2016-19).

- Earned Pro Bowl, 1st-team All-Pro and NFC Defensive Player of the Year (NFL Committee of 101) honors after establishing a single-season franchise record with 19.0 sacks (second in the NFL) and setting career highs with eight forced fumbles (tied for first) and seven strip-sacks (first) in 2019. Also became the third NFL player - first since Reggie White (1986) - to post 4.0+ sacks in multiple games in a season.

- Earned a Pro Bowl selection and 1st-team All-Pro (AP, PFWA, Sporting News) honors after leading the NFL with 17.0 sacks in 2017. Jones, who became the first Cardinal to ever lead the league in sacks, also led the NFL in tackles for loss (28) and QB hits (38) that season.

GAME-AFTER-GAME JONES GETS A SACK

Jones has 61.0 sacks as a member of the Cardinals, leaving him just 6.0 sacks shy of becoming the franchise all-time leader. That is despite the All-Pro having played just 69 games with Arizona.

Jones has been remarkably consistent since joining the Cardinals in 2016. He has at least one sack in 43 of 69 games with the team. Over the last five seasons (2016-20) - and despite Jones missing 11 games in 2020 due to injury - no player in the NFL has more games with at least one sack.

CAPTAIN BAKER - CARDINALS HEART & SOUL

"The guy is a human eraser. He makes a ton of tackles, he brings energy, he brings juice, he's physical. He's our leader and our heart and soul on defense." - GM Steve Keim

S Budda Baker had a breakout season in 2019 and after signing a four-year extension prior to the start of the 2020 campaign, he delivered quite an encore performance in a career year.

After being named a team captain for the first time, he finished the 2020 season with 118 tackles, 2.0 sacks, 7 tackles for loss, 2 INTs, 6 passes defended and a forced fumble on his way to 1st-team All-Pro and Pro Bowl honors.

IN RARIFIED AIR AMONG CARDS PRO BOWLERS

Baker was selected to his third Pro Bowl (second straight at safety) in 2020, joining CB Patrick Peterson (4) as the only players in Cardinals history to earn at least three Pro Bowl selections before their 25th birthday.

Baker is also the only player in franchise history selected to the Pro Bowl as a special teamer and as a position player: 2017 (special teams), 2019-20 (safety).

SETTING THE STANDARD AT DEFENSIVE BACK

Baker's 118 tackles in 2020 matched a team high (LB Jordan Hicks) and tied for first among NFL DBs (Buffalo S Jordan Poyer). It marked the second consecutive season Baker led or tied for the league lead for tackles among NFL DBs.

Baker played his two first NFL seasons (2017-18) wearing jersey #36. Then from 2019-20 he wore #32. Baker switched numbers again prior to the 2021 season and will now wear #3.

FIRST 50 GAMES, 0 INTS - LAST 11 GAMES, 2 INTS

After going without an INT in his first 50 career games, Baker had an INT in back-to-back games in Weeks 6-7 last season. He had his first career INT vs. the Cowboys on Monday Night Football in Week 6 and had another in Week 7 vs. Seattle.

BUDDA'S CAREER THROUGH 61 GAMES

In his first four NFL seasons, Baker has started 51-of-61 games played and has 442 tackles (332 solo), 25 tackles for loss, 5.5 sacks, 2 INTs, 11 QB hits, five forced fumbles, four fumble recoveries and 20 passes defended.

AWARDS PILED UP IN 2020

All-Pro and Pro Bowl honors weren't the only awards Baker earned in 2020. He was named NFC Defensive Player of the Month for October and also earned NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors in Week 6.

Defensive Player of the Month (October): Became just the fourth player in franchise history to earn NFC Player of the Month honors. He finished the month of October with 31 tackles, 2.0 sacks, 2 INTs (90 return yards), 3 TFL, 3 QB hits, 2 PD and a FF in three games played - all Arizona victories. Baker became the first NFL player in seven seasons (2014-20) to record at least 30 tackles, 2.0, 2 INTs and a FF in a single calendar month.

Defensive Player of the Week (Week 6): Recorded 7 tackles, a sack, his first career INT, 1 TFL, 2 QB hits, 1 PD and 1 FF in a victory over the Cowboys. He became the first Cardinals player since 2003 (Renaldo Hill on 11/2 vs. Cincinnati) to record a sack, an INT and a forced fumble in the same game.

A STAR AS SOON AS HE STEPPED ON THE FIELD

In his first career NFL start - in Week 11 of the 2017 season at Houston - Baker recorded 12 tackles, a sack, two forced fumbles and a fumble recovery. Became the first NFL rookie in 20 years and the first Cardinals player ever to register 10+ tackles, a sack and two forced fumbles in a game.



ALFORD'S AGGRESSIVE STYLE

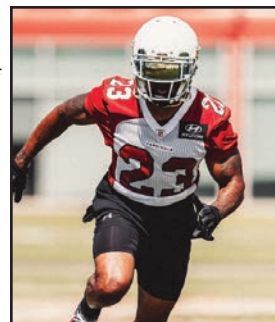
The Cardinals signed CB **Robert Alford** to a three-year contract as a free agent in February of 2019 following six seasons in Atlanta. However, season-ending injuries during training camp kept him out of action the last two seasons.

Now back in the lineup, the Cardinals are counting on a player whose aggressive style of play made him an extraordinarily productive presence in the defensive secondary.

In his first six NFL seasons, Alford recorded 291 tackles (243 solo), 10 INTs and 85 passes defended in 88 games (76 starts). In that six-year stretch prior to the injuries that kept him out of the lineup in Arizona, only CB Darius Slay (91) had more passes defended than Alford (85).

Now that's he's on the field I know he's excited and looks like the great Robert Alford, a fresh Robert Alford and I'm excited to see him play."

YOUNG GUYS IN THE MIDDLE

In the middle of the Cardinals defense is a pair of young linebackers that the team selected in the first round of the last two NFL Drafts: 22-year old rookie LB **Zaven Collins** and 23-year old second-year LB **Isaiah Simmons**.

Collins was taken 16th overall in the 2021 NFL Draft out of Tulsa and Simmons was taken 8th overall in 2020 out of Clemson.

It marked just the second time in team history (1985-86) the Cardinals selected a LB in the first round of back-to-back drafts.

COLLINS & SIMMONS - THE COLLEGE NUMBERS

Simmons was the 2019 Butkus Award Winner and Collins was the recipient of the Lombardi Award, Bronko Nagurski Trophy and the Chuck Bednarik Award in 2020. Both were unanimous 1st-team All-American selections in their final college season.

RARE ATHLETIC TALENTS

Both Simmons and Collins possess a rare combination of size and speed for the linebacker position.

Collins: At 6-4, 260, he clocked a 4.67 40-yard dash time at his pro day. In 2020, despite playing just eight games, he recorded 4 INTs with TD returns of 38 and 96 yards.

Simmons: At the 2020 NFL Combine, Simmons ran a 4.39 40-yard dash, tied for the 7th-best total among all prospects at any position.

SIMMONS EARNS ALL-ROOKIE HONORS IN 2020.

Simmons earned PFWA All-Rookie honors for the Cardinals last season after posting 47 tackles, four tackles for loss, 2.0 sacks, an INT, two passes defended, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery in 16 games (seven starts).



18 YEARS IN, STILL AMONG THE NFL'S BEST

Now in his 18th NFL season - and fifth with the Cardinals - P **Andy Lee** is remains one of the league's most productive punters.

Lee has finished in the top-10 in punting average in 14 of his 17 NFL seasons. That includes ranking 7th (2017), 1st (2018) and 2nd (2019) in punting average in his first three seasons with the Cardinals.

For his career, Lee has appeared in 264 games with 1,348 punts for 62,747 yards (46.5-yard avg.) and 446 punts landed inside the 20-yard line.

His 46.5-yard career punting average ranks sixth in NFL history.

After never playing a snap on defense in his first 34 career games, Gardeck totaled 7.0 sacks in his last 11 games before a knee injury suffered in Week 15 ended his season. He had 5.0 sacks in his final three games played in 2020.

Gardeck finished the 2020 season with nine tackles, 7.0 sacks, seven tackles for loss and a fumble recovery - all while playing just 93 defensive snaps.

He recorded his 7.0 sacks in four games (2 @ NYJ; 1 vs. LAR; 2 @ NYG; 2 vs. PHI) in which he played a combined 45 plays on defense.

ENTERING 2021 SEASON WITH A SACK STREAK

Gardeck had at least one sack in each of his final three games played in 2020. That includes 2.0 sacks in his final two games - @ NYG (Week 14) and vs. Phi (Week 15).

He became the first Cardinals player with 2.0+ sacks in back-to-back games since Chandler Jones had 2.0 each in Games 9-10 in 2018.

GARDECK HAS BEEN A SUCCESS STORY

Gardeck's expanded role on defense in 2020 was not his first taste of success in the NFL. A special teams standout in his first two seasons, Gardeck was named a Pro Bowl alternate in 2019 after posting a team-high 10 tackles and a fumble recovery. In 44 career games, he has 27 special teams tackles, three punt deflections, a fumble recovery on a fake punt and a TD on a blocked punt.

PRATER AMONG ACTIVE SCORING LEADERS

Signed as a free agent this offseason, K **Matt Prater** has been one of the most productive kickers in NFL history since he made his debut in 2007. He enters the 2021 season having made 321-of-386 FG attempts (83.2%) and 491-of-503 PATs (97.6%).

In 203 career games, Prater has accumulated 1,454 total points. That total ranks third among active NFL players.

When it comes to kicking from long distance, there has been no player in league history as successful as **Prater**. The 37-year old owns NFL records for the longest FG (64 yards vs. Tennessee in 2013), most career FGs of 50+ yards (59), consecutive made FGs of 50+ yards (14) and consecutive FG conversions of 55+ yards (seven).

Prater's five career FGs of 59+ yards are the most in NFL history as are his seven seasons with at least five made FGs of 50+ yards.

He also holds the franchise record for longest FG with both Denver (64 yards) and Detroit (59 yards, twice).



GUY YOU WANT WITH GAME ON THE LINE

Prater is one of the top clutch kickers in NFL history, having connected on all 16 game-winning FG attempts with two minutes or less remaining in the fourth quarter and OT (11-of-11 in regulation and 5-of-5 in OT).

Prater's most recent game-winner came with Detroit when he connected on a 59-yarder as time expired to give the Lions a 30-27 victory vs. Washington in Week 10 of the 2020 season.

Kyler Murray – Won the 2018 Heisman Trophy, selected ninth overall in the 2018 MLB Draft, first overall in the 2019 NFL Draft, earned 2019 AP NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year honors and selected to his first-career Pro Bowl in 2020.

Chris Streveler – Played 35 games with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the CFL where he threw for 2,698 yards and 19 TDs and ran for 1,167 yards and 22 TDs from 2018-19. Played five games as the Cards backup QB in 2020.

Eno Benjamin – Inactive for all 16 games during his rookie campaign after being selected by the Cardinals in the seventh round (222nd overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft out of Arizona State.

James Conner – Pro Bowler who signed with Arizona after four seasons (2017-20) with Pittsburgh, where he ran for 2,302 yards and 22 TDs on 532 carries plus 124 catches for 963 yards and four TDs in 50 games (33 starts).

Chase Edmonds – Cardinals fourth-round pick (134th overall) in the 2018 NFL Draft out of Fordham has 2,034 all-purpose yards in 45 career games for Arizona. Five of his seven-career rushing TDs have been 20+ yards.

Jonathan Ward – Played 14 games for the Cardinals during his rookie season after joining Arizona as an undrafted free agent out of Central Michigan where he had 2,539 yards and 28 TDs on 473 carries in 42 games.

Rodney Hudson – A 10-year NFL veteran, three-time Pro Bowler (2016-17, '19) and 2019 second-team All-Pro selection was acquired by the Cardinals in a trade with the Las Vegas Raiders in March.

D.J. Humphries – Cardinals first-round pick (24th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Florida, re-signed a three-year contract with Arizona in 2020. Has started all 59 NFL games played, including all 32 at LT since 2019.

Josh Jones – Arizona's 2020 third-round pick (72nd overall) out of Houston where he started all 45 games he played at LT in four seasons (2016-19) for the Cougars. Played 13 games for the Cardinals during his rookie season.
