THIS WEEK'S PREVIEW

Arizona returns from its bye week to host the Miami Dolphins at State Farm Stadium. Both teams enter the contest with a three-game winning streak on the line.

With a 5-2 record the Cardinals have the NFL's #1 ranked offense (419.1 ypg) and #8 ranked scoring offense (29.0 ppg) and they will face a Dolphins team that features the NFL's #1 ranked scoring defense (18.6 ppg).

The Cardinals enter Sunday's game having scored 30+ points in each of the last three games while Miami has allowed 17 or fewer in each of its last three outings.

Sunday's game marks just the 13th all-time matchup between the two teams dating back to 1972. Miami holds a 9-3 advantage in the series but Arizona has taken three of the last four.

Four of the last five games in this series have been decided by three points or fewer. In the last meeting (Week 14 of 2016), the Dolphins won 26-23 on a FG as time expired in regulation on a rainy afternoon in Miami.

This week's game marks the Dolphins fourth-ever visit to Arizona and first since 2012. Arizona is 2-0 at home against Miami at State Farm Stadium.

As part of the league's long-standing support of America's armed forces, the Cardinals are honoring current and former military by taking part in the NFL's *Salute to Service* campaign at this Sunday's game. Since 2011, the NFL's *Salute to Service* campaign has raised more than \$44 million for military and veteran nonprofit organizations. Cardinals coaches and staff will wear special NFL-issued *Salute to Service* branding and gameday apparel. Cardinals Cheerleaders, the drumline, and flag teams will all be dressed in *Salute to Service* themed uniforms.

Each Cardinals player will wear a #40 sticker on his helmet to honor former Cardinals safety **Pat Tillman** and will also use camouflage towels, hats and gloves on the sidelines.

Sunday's game will also serve as the second head-to-head matchup between QBs who piloted two of the top college programs in the country before being selected in the top-5 of the NFL Draft: Arizona's **Kyler Murray** and Miami's **Tua Tagovailoa**. The pair first met in the Orange Bowl/CFP Semifinal matchup between Alabama and Oklahoma on 12/29/18 at Hard Rock Stadium in Miami. Murray - the reigning NFL Rookie of the Year - will face Tagovailoa in just his second career NFL start. Murray and Tagovailoa finished #1 and #2 in Heisman voting following the 2018 season.

#MIAvsAZ - WEEK 9 HIGHLIGHTS

- The Cardinals and Dolphins meet for just the 13th time in a series Miami leads 9-3. Arizona has won three of the last four games between the two teams, and is 2-0 at State Farm Stadium against the Dolphins.
- Both teams have won three straight - and have done so in different ways. Arizona has scored 30+ points in each of its last three games while the Dolphins have allowed 17 points or fewer in each of their last three outings.
- The Cardinals have the NFL's #1 ranked offense (419.1 ypg) and face a Dolphins team that features the NFL's #1 ranked scoring defense (18.6 ppg).
- Arizona's **Kyler Murray** and Miami's **Tua Tagovailoa** square off for the second time. The pair first met in the Orange Bowl/CFP Semifinal matchup between Alabama and Oklahoma on 12/29/18 at Hard Rock Stadium in Miami. That was the same year they finished #1 and #2 in Heisman voting.
- With a 5-2 record in 2020, the Cardinals have already matched their win total from all of last season. The '20 campaign marks just the third time since 1988 (6-1 in 2014; 5-2 in 2015) Arizona has at least five wins in the first seven games of a season.
- WR **DeAndre Hopkins** leads the NFL in both receptions (57) and receiving yards (706) in 2020 and is tied for the NFL lead with 36 first down catches. He is the only player in the NFL with 700+ receiving yards this season.
- Last week, QB **Kyler Murray** was named "NFC Offensive Player of the Week" for the second time in three games while S **Budda Baker** was named "NFC Defensive Player of the Month" for October despite playing in just three games last month.
- With his first reception in the Cardinals Week 7 win vs. Seattle, WR **Larry Fitzgerald** joined Hall of Famer Jerry Rice as the only players in NFL history to reach 1,400 receptions in their career.

PAT TILLMAN'S LEGACY

THE TILLMAN MEMORIAL

On November 12, 2006, the Pat Tillman Memorial at State Farm Stadium was unveiled. Located on the northwest side of the plaza, the memorial includes a large bronze sculpture of Tillman and a circular reflection pond.

The sculpture is approximately eight-feet tall, weighs more than 500 pounds, and took nearly nine months to complete. After an extensive search, the Cardinals selected artists Omri Amrany and Gary Tillery to create the sculpture.



The sculptors consulted with the team and Pat's wife, Marie, who selected the image of Tillman that best conveys his character and spirit. Serving as a backdrop to the sculpture is a nine-foot concrete wall that measures 42 feet across, symbolic of Tillman's jersey number at Arizona State.

The brimming pool of water on the western side consists of a 60-foot circular pond made of black concrete and stainless steel. To the west of the memorial is a grove of 40 Oak trees that symbolizes the jersey number Tillman wore as an Arizona Cardinal, and the entire area is surrounded by a grove of Ash and Oak trees.

TILLMAN'S LOCKER

On September 11, 2015, the 14th anniversary of the 9/11 terrorist attacks, the Cardinals unveiled the locker of S **Pat Tillman** at the Dignity Health Arizona Cardinals Training Center.

A new locker room was built as part of a two-year, \$15 million renovation of the facility, but Tillman's locker was preserved to display in a glass enclosure between the weight room and cafeteria. Included in the locker are Tillman's jersey, helmet, shoulder pads and draft card, along with a description of his life and career.



"We've decided to preserve Pat Tillman's locker, and tell his story," Cardinals Owner **Michael Bidwill** said at the unveiling ceremony. "Many of our future players, and even current players, may not know the stories of the Cardinals. But we wanted to tell the stories and talk about the history, the history of our organization and the history of Pat Tillman."

After a decorated career at ASU, Tillman was selected in the seventh round (226th overall) of the 1998 NFL Draft by the Cardinals. He played for Arizona from 1998-2001 before enlisting in the U.S. Army in 2002. Tillman's No. 40 is retired by the Cardinals and he is a member of the team's Ring of Honor.

The plaza surrounding State Farm Stadium is known as the Pat Tillman Freedom Plaza, in honor of the former Cardinal who was killed in action on April 22, 2004 while serving his country as a member of the elite Army Ranger unit.

TILLMAN'S IMPACT ON PUGH

Cards OL **Justin Pugh** grew up outside Philadelphia, played at Syracuse and spent the first five years of his NFL career with the Giants.

Before signing with Arizona, however, a Cardinals jersey already hung in his brother's home in Holland, PA, more than 2,000 miles from Phoenix.



"We have a Pat Tillman jersey at my (brother's) house," Pugh said during his introductory press conference in 2018. "That's the only jersey we have hanging in our house – my brother's house, I should say – back in Holland."

Tillman and his brother, Kevin, left behind professional sports careers to join the Army Rangers after the 9/11 terrorist attacks. In 2004, Tillman was killed in action while serving a tour in Afghanistan. He would have celebrated his 44th birthday on Friday (11/6).

"He made the ultimate sacrifice for this country with everything that he did. You wish you could be half the man that he was," Pugh said.

SALUTE TO SERVICE

As part of the league's long-standing support of America's Armed Forces, the Cardinals are honoring current and former military by taking part in the NFL's *Salute to Service* campaign at this Sunday's game. Since 2011, the NFL's *Salute to Service* campaign has raised more than \$44 million for military and veteran nonprofit organizations.



Salute to Service is a year-round effort to Honor, Empower, and Connect our nation's service members, veterans, and their families. It is grounded in deep partnership with nonprofits and organizations that support the military community in the United States and across the world.

At Sunday's game, retired U.S. Navy Petty Officer First Class **Steven Powell** will sing the National Anthem. The colors will be presented by the 56th Fighter Wing out of Luke Air Force Base.

The video boards at Sunday's game will feature a "fan mosaic" via Zoom with members of the Armed Services. To help support the Cardinals throughout the game, members of the military will appear on the videoboards to celebrate TDs and cheer on the team.

Cardinals coaches and staff will wear special NFL-issued *Salute to Service* branding and gameday apparel. Cardinals Cheerleaders, the drumline, and flag teams will all be dressed in *Salute to Service* themed uniforms.

Each Cardinals player will wear a #40 sticker on their helmet to honor former Cardinals safety **Pat Tillman** and will also use camouflage towels, hats and gloves on the sidelines.

All proceeds from the NFL's *Salute to Service* campaign are donated to the NFL's military nonprofit partners: The *Bob Woodruff Foundation*, the *Pat Tillman Foundation*, *TAPS*, the *USO* and *Wounded Warrior Project*.

PUGH IS TEAM'S USAA SALUTE TO SERVICE NOMINEE

OL **Justin Pugh** was named the Cardinals and USAA *Salute To Service Award* nominee in 2020. The brother of an active duty United States Air Force service member, supporting the military and first responders has always been close to Pugh's heart.



As part of the NFL's "My Cause, My Cleats" campaign the past four years, he has partnered with Merging Vets and Players (MVP), a program that was designed to address the challenge of transitioning from the battlefield to home by creating an environment where veterans and athletes can share their strength and experience. MVP was created by Fox News NFL Insider and Unbreakable Performance Center founder Jay Glazer and former Green Beret Nate Boyer. Pugh has long supported the organization, traveling to the Unbreakable gym to speak with the men and women taking part in the program.

In 2018, he joined Cardinals teammates to visit Luke Air Force base as part of the NFL's *Salute to Service* month in November. The group from the Cardinals got an up-close look at F-35's and F-16's from the 61st Fight Squadron and visited various personnel stationed on the base.

During the 2017 NFL Draft, Pugh visited Joint Base McGuire-Dix-Lakehurst in New Jersey to thank members of the military for their service, host a youth football event for their kids and announce the Giants 5th-round pick on television with his brother, **Michael**, who was stationed at the base.

Since coming to Arizona in 2018, Pugh has also participated in the Pro's vs. GI Joe's event where players competed in video games against military veterans through the Wounded Warrior Project, which works to provide services and programs for wounded service members.

RB D.J. FOSTER: Aunt, **Shelia Wiggins**, served in the Army; uncle, **Lee Davis Jr.**, served in the Navy; grandfather, **Lee Davis Sr.**, served in the Marines; and uncle, **Joseph Wayne**, served in the Coast Guard.

K ZANE GONZALEZ: Grandfather, **Lino Gonzalez**, is an Army veteran, and best friend, **Carlos Rivas**, currently serves in the Army.

WR DEANDRE HOPKINS: Uncle, **Larry Greenlee Sr.**, served in the military and is a Purple Heart recipient.

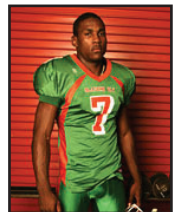
Kliff Kingsbury became an NFL head coach for the first time when he was hired by the Cardinals on January 11, 2019, coming to Arizona after six seasons (2013-18) as the head coach at his alma mater, Texas Tech. Now in his second season in Arizona, Kingsbury has the Cardinals off to a 5-2 start, their best since 2015. The team also features the NFL's #1 ranked offense and second-year QB **Kyler Murray** has entered the MVP conversation. While at Texas Tech, Kingsbury served as the play-caller for one of college football's most explosive offenses that ranked in the top-20 in total offense all six seasons. A former star QB at Texas Tech, Kingsbury was drafted by the Patriots in the sixth round of the 2003 NFL Draft.

Named the 13th head coach in Dolphins history on February 4, 2019, **Brian Flores** is in his second season in Miami in 2020. He joined the Dolphins after spending 15 seasons with the New England Patriots where he served in a variety of different roles and helped the franchise win four Super Bowls – XXXIX, XLIX, LI and LIII – and seven AFC championships. He came to Miami having coached all three phases of the game - offense, defense and special teams - after beginning his professional career as a scout. After finishing his playing career at Boston College (1999-2003), Flores joined the Patriots as a scouting assistant in 2004 and was promoted to pro scout in 2006.

POMPAÑO'S PREP STAR

CB **Patrick Peterson** was one of the most highly-prized recruits in the country playing at Blanche Ely High School in Pompano Beach, FL, roughly 35 miles north of Miami.

Peterson was named the USA Today Defensive Player of the Year as a senior in 2007 and was named to the Parade All-America team and the USA Today All-America Team. He was also selected to play in the U.S. Army All-American Bowl and was one of six finalists for the U.S. Army Player of the Year Award.

15TH SEASON AT STATE FARM STADIUM

The Cardinals began the 15th season at State Farm Stadium with a 30-15 victory over Washington in Week 2.

Arizona earned its second home win of the 2020 season with its thrilling come-from-behind OT victory over the Seattle Seahawks on Sunday Night Football in Week 7.



The Cardinals will now look to improve to 3-1 at home this season when they host the Dolphins on Sunday.

Opened in 2006, State Farm Stadium has proved a catalyst for the Cardinals success in the last decade-plus.

The Cardinals have posted a winning record at home in eight of 14 full seasons at State Farm Stadium, earning four playoff berths and three NFC West titles during that time. The Cardinals finished .500 or better just twice and made the playoffs only one time in 18 seasons prior.

Below is a look at the results at State Farm Stadium compared to 18 seasons at Sun Devil Stadium.

WR Larry Fitzgerald had a milestone performance in the Cardinals Week 7 win over Seattle at State Farm Stadium.

He caught eight passes for 62 yards vs. the Seahawks. **With his first reception of the game, Fitzgerald became just the second player in NFL history to reach 1,400 receptions in his career.** Now with 1,407 catches, Fitzgerald joins Jerry Rice – the NFL's all-time receptions leader with 1,549 – as the only players in league history to reach the milestone.

Fitzgerald reached 1,400 receptions at 37 years, 55 days old while playing in his 257th career game. Rice reached 1,400 receptions at 40 years, 7 days old while playing in his 260th career game.

Fitzgerald's 1,407 catches are nearly 2.5 times more than the second-place total on the franchise all-time receptions list – Anquan Boldin (586).

654 CATCHES AT STATE FARM STADIUM A NEW NFL RECORD

Fitzgerald's first reception against Seattle was also his 647th career catch at State Farm Stadium. He has more receptions at State Farm Stadium than any other player in NFL history at a single venue. He surpassed the previous record held by Rice (646 at Candlestick Park).

KYLER AND TUA - ROUND 2

Sunday's game between the Cardinals and Dolphins will serve as the second head-to-head matchup between QBs who piloted two of the top college programs in the country before being selected in the top-5 of the NFL Draft: Arizona's **Kyler Murray** and Miami's **Tua Tagovailoa**.



The pair first met in the Orange Bowl/CFP Semifinal matchup between Alabama and Oklahoma on 12/29/18 at Hard Rock Stadium in Miami. The Crimson Tide came out on top, 45-34, as both signal-callers put up impressive numbers. Murray finished with 417 total yards (308 passing, 109 rushing) and 3 total TDs (2 passing, 1 rushing) while Tagovailoa finished with 318 passing yards and 4 TDs.

The two captivated the country with historic performances during the 2018 season which saw Murray and Tagovailoa finish first and second, respectively, in Heisman Trophy voting. Tagovailoa's 199.4 passing efficiency rating led the country, while Murray led the nation in total yards (5,362), total TDs (54) and yards-per-pass attempt (11.6).

A VISIT FROM HIS FORMER TEAM

This week the Cardinals host the Miami Dolphins, the team that traded RB **Kenyan Drake** to Arizona in Week 9 last season.

Drake played his first three-plus NFL seasons (2016-19) in Miami, who selected him in the third round (73rd overall) of the 2016 NFL Draft.

With Miami, Drake rushed for 1,532 yards and 9 TDs on 333 carries (4.6 avg.) in 54 games. Since coming to Arizona last season, he has rushed for 1,155 yards and 12 TDs on 242 carries (4.8 avg.) in 15 games.



Since the Cardinals acquired him in Week 9 last season, Drake ranks fifth in the NFL with 1,155 rushing yards.

His 12 rushing TDs during that span are tied for fifth in the NFL.

MILESTONES WITHIN REACH

QB Kyler Murray

• With both a rushing and passing TD, Murray would have 7 such games in 2020. In NFL history, only Cam Newton (8 in 2011), Daunte Culpepper (8 in 2002) and Steve Grogan (8 in 1976) would have more games with both a passing and rushing TD in a single season.

WR Larry Fitzgerald

• With a reception, Fitzgerald would have at least one catch in 251 consecutive games, extending the second-longest streak in NFL history (Jerry Rice - 274).

• With 100+ receiving yards, Fitzgerald would have 50 career 100-yard games to extend his franchise record. He would have more than the players in second and third place on the franchise all-time list combined (49).

• With a sack, Reddick would extend his career high in sacks to 6.0 and would also have at least one sack in three straight games for the first time in his career.

REMINDER OF THE TIME CHANGE

Although Arizona stays on standard time throughout the year, the time change, or lack thereof, does affect the Cardinals local kickoff times. With daylight saving time ending last Sunday, that change will first affect the Cardinals this week.

In 2020, daylight saving time was observed on the second Sunday in March (3/8) and ended last Sunday. When daylight saving is in effect, Arizona is three hours behind the east coast making a 4 p.m. kickoff in the East a 1 p.m. kickoff in Arizona.

Beginning with the Cards Week 9 matchup vs. Miami this Sunday, Arizona will be only two hours behind the east coast, making a 4 p.m. kickoff in New York a 2 p.m. kickoff in Arizona.

CARDINALS WIN OT THRILLER VS. SEATTLE IN WEEK 7

The Cardinals defeated the previously unbeaten Seattle Seahawks 37-34 in overtime at State Farm Stadium on Sunday Night Football in Week 7. *Arizona came out on top in a wild affair in which the Cardinals never led in regulation or OT until kicking the game-winning FG with 0:15 remaining in OT.*

Some Facts About Arizona's Come-From-Behind Win

• *Seattle entered the game with a 30-0 record when leading by 10+ points at halftime in the regular season with Russell Wilson as the starter.*

• The contest marked just the fourth time in Wilson's 136 career starts that he threw at least three INTs in a game. Arizona became the first team to record at least three INTs off Wilson since the Jaguars had three on 12/10/17.

• Wilson entered the game having thrown just three INTs on 169 pass attempts in Seattle's first five games in 2020 - all wins.

• In his first 8 career games against the Cardinals at State Farm Stadium, Wilson threw 12 TDs and just 1 INT on 245 pass attempts. He hadn't thrown an INT against the Cardinals at State Farm Stadium since his rookie season in 2012 - the first game of his NFL career.

• *Wilson had attempted 251 consecutive pass attempts without an INT against the Cardinals at State Farm Stadium before he was picked off by Budda Baker in the second quarter in Week 7. He threw 3 INTs in his final 33 pass attempts vs. Arizona.*

• *With the victory, the Cardinals snapped a seven-game winless streak at home against the Seahawks and earned their first win over Seattle at State Farm Stadium since 2012.*

• *Arizona handed the Seahawks just their eighth loss in 40 primetime games under Pete Carroll.* Seattle entered the game with a 31-7-1 record in primetime and their .808 winning percentage was the best in the NFL.

CARDINALS SHINE IN PRIMETIME

The Cardinals played back-to-back games in primetime in a six-day stretch that saw the team earn victories over Dallas (Monday Night Football) and Seattle (Sunday Night Football) in Weeks 6-7.

The win over Seattle on Sunday Night Football in Week 7 was the Cardinals' 14th primetime victory dating back to 2008. In 38 seasons between 1970-2007, the Cardinals had 10 total primetime wins.

The 2020 season marks the first time in franchise history the Cardinals have won on Monday Night Football and Sunday Night Football in consecutive weeks.

With the victories over Dallas and Seattle, Arizona won primetime games in consecutive weeks for just the fourth time in franchise history - and for the first time since 2016 (Week 5 @ SF on TNF; Week 6 vs. NYJ on MNF).

The victory over Dallas was the Cardinals' third-ever road win on Monday Night Football and first since 1977. *Arizona is 4-1 in its last five appearances on MNF. The Cardinals have as many wins in their last five MNF appearances (4) as they had in their previous 20 (4).*



WINNING - AND WINNING BIG - IN 2020

With a 5-2 record in 2020, the Cardinals have already matched their win total from all of last season. The '20 campaign marks just the third time since 1988 (6-1 in 2014; 5-2 in 2015) Arizona has at least five wins in the first seven games of a season.

Arizona's .714 winning percentage is tied for the third-best in the NFC and sixth-best in the NFL in 2020.

AWARDS COME POURING IN

Last week, S **Budda Baker** was named "NFC Defensive Player of the Month" for October and QB **Kyler Murray** was named "NFC Offensive Player of the Week" for his Week 7 performance vs. Seattle.

Between Murray and Baker, the duo have combined for three consecutive "Player of the Week" awards (Weeks 5-7) and one "Player of the Month" award - all of which came in October.

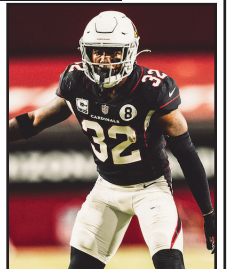
It is just the fourth time (2015, Weeks 14-16; 2014, Weeks 8-10; 1998, Weeks 15-17) in team history that the Cardinals have had "Player of the Week" winners in three straight weeks.

DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE MONTH (OCTOBER) - S BUDDA BAKER

Baker was named the "NFC Defensive Player of the Month" for his performance in October, marking the first time in his career he has earned the honor.

He finished the month of October with 31 tackles, 2.0 sacks, 2 INTs (90 return yards), 3 TFL, 3 QB hits, 2 PD and a FF in three games played - all Arizona victories. He played all three games with a cast on his thumb after having surgery which forced him to miss Arizona's Week 4 game at Carolina.

Baker became the first NFL player in the last seven seasons (2014-20) to record at least 30 tackles, 2.0 INTs and a FF in a single calendar month.



He was the only player in the NFL with multiple sacks and multiple INTs in October and his 31 tackles ranked second among all NFL DBs.

OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK - KYLER MURRAY (WEEKS 5 & 7)

Murray was named the "NFC Offensive Player of the Week" for his performance against the Jets in Week 5 and vs. the Seahawks in Week 7. With his two "Offensive Player of the Week" selections in 2020, he has now earned the honor three times in his career. He joins Kurt Warner (5x) and Neil Lomax (4x) as the only QBs in team history with at least three "Offensive Player of the Week" selections.

Murray also became the first Cardinals QB to be named "Player of the Week" twice in the same season since Warner in 2009.

WEEK 7 VS. SEATTLE: Murray completed a career-high 34-of-48 pass attempts (70.8%) for 360 yards, 3 TDs and a 104.5 passer rating. He also added 67 rushing yards and a TD on 14 carries. He became the first player in NFL history to throw for 350+ yards and 3+ TDs while also rushing for 50+ yards and a TD in a single game.

WEEK 5 AT NY JETS: Murray completed 27-of-37 pass attempts (72.9%) for a career-high 380 yards, a TD and a passer rating of 103.4. He also ran for 31 yards and a TD on nine carries. His 380 passing yards led the NFL in Week 5 and were also the most passing yards by a Cardinals QB in a win since Carson Palmer threw for 419 yards in a 27-14 victory at Jacksonville in 2013.

DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK - S BUDDA BAKER (WEEK 6 AT DALLAS)

Baker earned his first career "Defensive Player of the Week" after recording 7 tackles, a sack, his first career INT, a tackle for loss, two QB hits, a pass defensed and a forced fumble in the Monday night victory over the Cowboys.

He became the first Cardinals player since 2003 (Renaldo Hill on 11/2 vs. Cincinnati) to record a sack, an INT and a forced fumble in the same game.

A TOP-FLIGHT OFFENSE IN 2020

Six days after scoring 38 points in a win over the Cowboys on Monday Night Football, the Cardinals piled up a season-high 519 total net yards (360 passing; 159 rushing) and 37 points vs. Seattle in Week 7.

After posting 400+ total yards and 30+ points in each of the last three games, the Cardinals rank #1 in the NFL in total offense (419.1 ypg) and #8 in scoring (29.0 ppg) in 2020.

PILING UP 400+ YARDS OFTEN UNDER KINGSBURY

Arizona's Week 7 win over the Seahawks (519 total yards) **marked the ninth time – and fifth time this season – Arizona reached 400+ total yards in 23 games under head coach Kliff Kingsbury.** Arizona reached 400+ yards just once in 32 games over the two seasons combined (2017-18) prior to his arrival.

In a span of 20 years between 1999-2018, the Cardinals had 500+ total yards in a game just three times. Arizona has now posted 500+ yards twice in 23 games under Kingsbury (10/6/19 at Cincinnati – 514).

10 STRAIGHT WITH 21+ POINTS

The Sunday Night Football victory over the Seahawks (37 points) marked the 10th consecutive game the Cardinals have scored at least 21 points. Only two teams have longer active streaks than Arizona.

SCORING 21+ UNDER KINGSBURY

The Cardinals have scored 21+ points in 17 of 23 games under Kingsbury. Arizona scored 21+ points in an NFL-low 9 games in the two seasons prior to his arrival (2017-18).

BETTER THAN AVERAGE GROUND GAME

The Cardinals ran for 159 yards and a TD on 33 carries (4.8 avg.) in the victory over Seattle in Week 7. **Arizona has rushed for 100+ yards in all seven games this season – and in 17 of 23 games under head coach Kliff Kingsbury.**

The 2020 season marks just the second time (1984) in the last 47 years (1974-20) that the Cardinals rushed for 100+ yards in each of the first seven games of a season.

The Cardinals have now rushed for 1,125 yards and 12 TDs on 216 carries (5.2 avg.) in 2020. **Arizona's 1,125 rushing yards are the most through the first seven games of a season since the team had 1,188 rushing yards in 1976.**

Arizona ranks second in the NFL averaging 160.7 rushing yards per game in 2020.

RUSHING AVERAGE ABOVE RECORD PACE

After finishing #32 in the NFL in both rushing yards and rushing average in 2018, the Cardinals finished the 2019 season having averaged over 5.0 yards per rush attempt as a team for the first time in franchise history. Arizona averaged a franchise-record 5.03 yards per rush attempt last season.

Through seven games in 2020, the Cardinals are averaging 5.21 yards per rush attempt, putting them on pace to break the franchise record set in 2019.

Arizona's 5.21 rushing yards per attempt in 2020 ranks second in the NFL.

RUNNING FOR 150+ UNDER KINGSBURY

The Cardinals have rushed for 150+ yards in nine of 23 games under Kingsbury. Arizona had seven such games in the three seasons (2016-18) prior to his arrival. The Cardinals are 8-1 when rushing for 150+ yards under Kingsbury.

LONG DISTANCE RUSHING TOUCHDOWNS

RB Kenyan Drake had a 69-yard rushing TD in Week 6 at Dallas, giving Arizona four rushing TDs of 20+ yards in 2020 (QB Kyler Murray - 2; RB Chase Edmonds - 1). That is the most in the NFL this season.

GIVING CREDIT TO THE O-LINE

Despite 48 pass attempts against the Seahawks in Week 7, QB Kyler Murray was not sacked once by Seattle. **The Seahawks also did not register a single QB hit in the game.**



The win over Seattle marked the first time since 12/23/07 (Kurt Warner at QB - 52) that the Cardinals allowed no sacks in a game they had at least 45 pass attempts.

Below is a look at what the Cardinals have been able to accomplish this season behind the offensive line.

Keeping Kyler Clean in the Passing Game

Murray has been well-protected behind the line of scrimmage this season. In 2020, the Cardinals rank:

- t-5th in the NFL in total QB pressures (42)
- 5th in the NFL in sack percentage (3.4)
- t-2nd in the NFL in sacks allowed (9)
- 1st in the NFL in sack yardage (38)

Helping the Run Game Succeed

The Cardinals have one of the NFL's top run games in 2020. Arizona ranks:

- t-3rd in runs of 10+ yards (33)
- 3rd in runs of 20+ yards (10)
- 2nd in rushing average (5.21)
- 2nd in rushing yards per game (160.7)
- 2nd in rushing TDs (12)
- 1st in rushing average before contact (4.12)

The Cardinals are 6-3 over the last two seasons (2019-20) in games they allow one sack or fewer. Arizona has won three such games in a row. The Cardinals are 3-0 during that stretch when they don't allow a sack.

VANCE'S DEFENSE GETS IT DONE

The Cardinals last two opponents - Dallas and Seattle - entered their game against Arizona with the NFL's #3 ranked and #2 ranked scoring offenses. The Cardinals emerged 2-0 in those contests and despite all the firepower Arizona has faced recently, the team features the NFL's #9 ranked scoring defense.

ALLOWING 20 POINTS OR FEWER

The Cardinals (4) are one of eight teams in the NFL that has held opponents to 20 points or fewer in at least four games, joining Kansas City (7), LA Rams (5), Tampa Bay (5), Chicago (4), Baltimore (4), Miami (4) and San Francisco (4).

Arizona is 4-0 in games it allows 20 points or fewer this season.

DEFENSE COMES THROUGH IN THE SECOND HALF VS. SEATTLE

Arizona's unforgettable comeback vs. Seattle on Sunday Night Football in Week 7 wouldn't have been possible without the efforts of the defense in the second half. The Cardinals outscored Seattle 20-7 in the second half/OT as the defense held the Seahawks high-powered offense to just one TD on their final six possessions, which went as follows:

-- Punt / INT / TD / Punt / Punt / INT --

The Cardinals defense was at its best in the most crucial time – the OT period. On the Seahawks two OT possessions, Arizona's defense recorded 2.0 sacks, 4 tackles for loss, 2 QB hits, an INT and held Seattle to minus-6 rushing yards.

GOLDEN RETURNS TO AZ

On October 23, the Cardinals sent a 2021 sixth-round pick to the Giants in exchange for LB Markus Golden, who played the first four years (2015-18) of his career in Arizona.

Originally a second-round selection by the Cardinals in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Missouri, Golden had 19 sacks, 119 tackles, 6 forced fumbles and a fumble recovery in 46 games with Arizona.

GOLDEN'S BREAKOUT CAMPAIGN

During his second year in the NFL, Golden set single-season career highs with 12.5 sacks (tied for third in the league), 16 tackles for loss and 4 forced fumbles during a breakout campaign.

His 12.5 sacks were the most in franchise history for a LB at the time - and currently rank as the 10th-best single season total in franchise history. He became the 10th different player in team history, regardless of position, with 10.0+ sacks in a season.

JOINING ELITE COMPANY IN THE BIG APPLE

During his first season with New York in 2019, Golden set single-season career highs in tackles (72) and QB hits (27) and led the Giants with 10.0 sacks.

He became the first Giants player with double-digit sacks since Jason Pierre-Paul (12.5 in 2014), and joined Hall of Famer Lawrence Taylor (7x) as the only LBs in franchise history with 10+ sacks in a season.



CAPTAIN BAKER - CARDINALS HEART & SOUL

"The guy is a human eraser. He makes a ton of tackles, he brings energy, he brings juice, he's physical. He's our leader and our heart and soul on defense." - GM Steve Keim

"Nobody means more to this football team than Budda Baker, and you can take that to the bank." - WR Larry Fitzgerald

Signed to a four-year contract extension during training camp, S Budda Baker is delivering quite the encore performance this year after a breakout campaign in 2019.

Fresh off being named "NFC Defensive Player of the Month" for October, Baker has vaulted himself into the conversation for Defensive Player of the Year with his performance so far in 2020.

In Week 7 vs. Seattle, Baker posted a game-high 14 tackles, his second INT of the season, a tackle for loss and a pass defensed in the win over Seattle. **It was a fitting end to a remarkable six-day stretch on the national stage in which the All-Pro was named a team captain, totaled 21 tackles, 2 INTs (one returned 90 yards), 1.0 sack, 2 passes defensed, 2 tackles for loss, 2 QB hits, a forced fumble and an NFC "Defensive Player of the Week" award (Week 6).**

Despite playing the last three games with a cast on his thumb from a surgery that forced him to miss the Week 4 at Carolina, Baker has registered 59 tackles, 2.0 sacks, 4 tackles for loss, 2 INTs, 3 passes defensed and a forced fumble in 2020. His 59 tackles are tied for the team lead (Jordan Hicks), as are his 2 INTs (Patrick Peterson).

Baker's 59 tackles rank third among all NFL DBs in 2020, despite him having played two fewer games than any other player in the top-5 on the list.

FIRST 50 GAMES, 0 INTS - LAST 2 GAMES, 2 INTS

After going without an INT in his first 50 career games, Baker now has an INT in each of the last two games. He tallied his first career INT off Cowboys QB Andy Dalton on Monday Night Football in Week 6. Prior to the last two-game stretch, the last time Baker had an INT in consecutive games was in his sophomore year at the University of Washington in 2015 when he had an INT at Stanford (10/24) and vs. Arizona (10/31).

REDDICK SACKS & SIMMONS STEPS UP

SEVEN GAMES IN, A CAREER HIGH IN SACKS FOR REDDICK

Fourth-year LB Haason Reddick continued his breakout performance this season with one of the most productive games of his career in the victory over Seattle in Week 7. He finished with 11 tackles, a sack, 3 tackles for loss and 3 QB hits - with his 3 QB hits and 3 tackles for loss setting career highs for a single game.

Reddick came up with a big sack on the Seahawks opening possession of the OT period, taking down Russell Wilson for a six-yard loss.

He now has 5.0 sacks in 2020, a new career high. All 5.0 sacks have come in the last six games, including 3.0 in the last two games.

Reddick now joins Chandler Jones and Terrell Suggs as the only Cardinals defenders in the last three seasons (2018-20) to post at least 5.0 sacks in a season.

SIMMONS MAKES PLAY OF THE GAME IN CARDINALS WIN

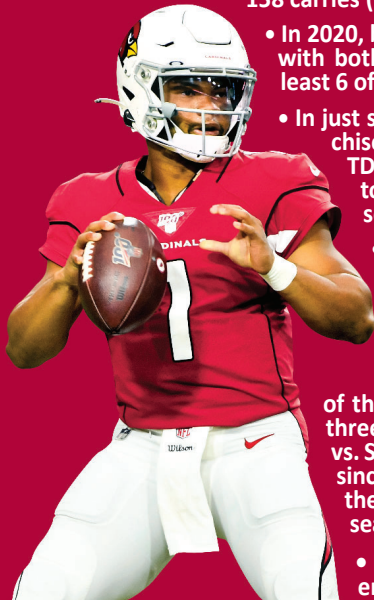
Rookie LB Isaiah Simmons - the #8 overall pick in the 2020 NFL Draft out of Clemson - only played five defensive snaps in the win vs. Seattle but that's all it took for him to make with the play that led to the Cardinals game-winning FG in OT.

With Arizona having just missed a potential game-winning FG, Seattle took over on the ensuing possession and with just over a minute remaining in OT they faced a 3rd-n-14 at their own 48-yard line. Russell Wilson attempted a pass over the middle to Tyler Lockett that Simmons intercepted and returned 12 yards to the SEA 49-yard line. Six plays later - with just 0:15 remaining - the Cardinals kicked the game-winning 48-yard FG.

A PRIMETIME PERFORMER

After leading the Cardinals to back-to-back primetime wins over the Cowboys (Week 6) and Seahawks (Week 7), **Murray** is now 2-1 in primetime games in his career and has put up some impressive numbers in those contests.

In three career primetime starts, Murray has completed 60-of-96 pass attempts (62.5%) for 789 yards, 7 TDs, 1 INT and a 108.4 passer rating. He also rushed for 175 yards and 2 TDs in those contests.

NOTHING LIKE NUMBERS MURRAY IS PUTTING UP

Murray has completed 169-of-253 pass attempts (66.8%) for 1,847 yards and 13 TDs this season, while also rushing for 437 yards and seven TDs on 65 carries.

His current pace has him finishing with 4,222 passing yards and 999 rushing yards this season. No player in NFL history has ever thrown for 4,000+ yards and rushed for 1,000+ yards in a season.

RARE NUMBERS IN FIRST 23 CAREER GAMES

Murray has completed 518-of-795 pass attempts (65.2%) for 5,569 yards and 33 TDs while rushing for 981 yards and 11 TDs on 158 carries (6.2 avg.).

Despite being just seven games into his second season, Murray has become just the third player in NFL history with 5,500+ passing yards, 30+ passing TDs and 10+ rushing TDs in their first two NFL seasons.

ONE-OF-A-KIND OUTING EARNS MURRY SECOND POW AWARD OF 2020

Murray was named NFL "Offensive Player of the Week" for the second time in three games for his performance against the Seahawks on Sunday Night Football. It was a one-of-a-kind outing.

Murray completed 34-of-48 pass attempts (70.8%) for 360 yards, 3 TDs and a 104.5 passer rating. He also added 67 rushing yards and a TD on 14 carries.

He became the first player in NFL history to throw for 350+ yards and 3+ TDs while also rushing for 50+ yards and a TD in a single game.

Murray also became the first player in franchise history with 300+ passing yards and 50+ rushing yards in a game.



THROUGH THE AIR AND ON THE GROUND

Murray threw for three TDs and also had a five-yard TD run in the victory over Seattle in Week 7.

It was his seventh career game with both a passing and rushing TD, including his sixth such performance in seven games this season. He is the first player in NFL history to accomplish the feat six times in the first seven games of a season.

The NFL record for most games with both a passing and rushing TD in a single season is eight.

HOPKINS' RECORD-SETTING START

WR **DeAndre Hopkins** has been as good as advertised in his first season with the Cardinals, who acquired the three-time 1st-team All-Pro in the offseason in a trade with Houston.

Most recently, he caught 10 passes for 103 yards and a TD in the Cardinals victory over the Seahawks in Week 7. It was his fourth game with 100+ receiving yards in 2020 and his third game with 10+ receptions.

Through seven games, Hopkins has 57 receptions for 704 yards and three TDs.

He is currently on pace for 130 receptions and 1,609 receiving yards in 2020. Both of those totals would represent franchise single-season records. They would also represent career highs. His current career highs for both receptions (115) and receiving yards (1,572) came in 2018.

Hopkins leads the NFL in both receptions and receiving yards in 2020, and is tied for the NFL lead with 36 first down catches.

CHANGE OF PACE CHASE

Drafted by the Cardinals in the fourth round (134th overall) of the 2018 NFL Draft out of Fordham – RB **Chase Edmonds** is in his third NFL season in 2020. Complementing Kenyan Drake, Edmonds has shined in 2020, rushing for 176 yards and a TD on just 29 carries (6.1 avg) and added 26 receptions for 222 yards and two TDs.

EDMONDS CLUTCH IN SUNDAY NIGHT WIN

Edmonds had his best outing of the season in the Cardinals win over Seattle in Week 7. He finished the game with 145 scrimmage yards (87 receiving; 58 rushing) on 12 total touches, setting career highs for receptions (7) and receiving yards (87).



In the second half/OT, Edmonds had 10 total touches (5 rushes; 5 receptions) for 124 yards (66 receiving; 58 rushing). Of those 10 touches, seven went for first downs and six covered at least 10 yards.

EDMONDS IS A HOME RUN THREAT

One of the reasons the Cardinals are so high on Edmonds is his big-play ability. **His 29-yard TD run vs. the Jets in Week 5 was his fifth career TD run of 20+ yards. Only three players in franchise history had more TD runs of 20+ yards in their career.**

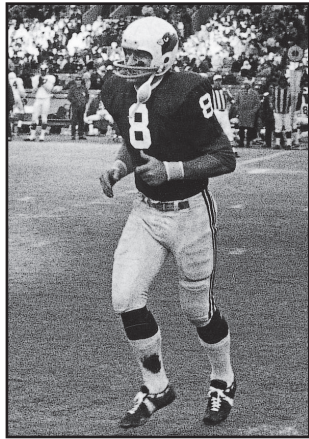

THE PASSING OF A LEGEND

On September 17th, Hall of Fame safety **Larry Wilson** passed away at the age of 82.

A legendary figure in NFL history, Wilson spent more than 43 years with the Cardinals organization. Some of those highlights:

- A seventh-round selection in the 1960 Draft out of Utah, he played 13 seasons for the Cardinals
- Earned 8 Pro Bowl selections and was named 1st-team All-Pro 5 times
- Was named to both the NFL's 75th and 100th Anniversary teams
- Enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1978
- Held a variety of roles in the Cardinals front office from 1973-2002 including VP & General Manager from 1988-93



- Inducted into the Cardinals Ring of Honor at State Farm Stadium in 2006, his #8 jersey was retired at the end of his playing career - and is one just five retired jersey numbers in franchise history

Wilson played in 169 games and his toughness and versatility as a player have come to define the safety position. During his career, he is credited with originating the safety blitz, a tactic that was originally named "Wildcat" after Wilson's nickname.

To celebrate the NFL's 100th season last year, Wilson was one of six safeties (Jack Christiansen, Ken Houston, Ronnie Lott, Emlen Tunnell, Ed Reed) selected to the NFL 100 All-Time team after previously being named to the All-NFL team in 1994 to commemorate the league's 75th anniversary.

His 52 INTs are a Cardinals franchise record as are his 800 career INT return yards. Wilson led the NFL with 10 INTs in 1966, a year in which he established a franchise record with INTs in seven straight games, which also is tied for the second-longest streak in NFL history.

Regarded as one of the toughest players in NFL history, Wilson once intercepted a pass in a 1965 game against the Steelers with casts on both hands to protect broken fingers. He returned the INT 35 yards for a TD, giving the Cardinals a 21-17 victory.

Following his playing days, Wilson embarked on a 30-year career as a team executive with the Cardinals. He worked as the team's director of pro scouting (1973-76), director of pro personnel (1977-78) and also served as interim head coach for the final three games of the 1979 season, earning victories over the San Francisco 49ers and New York Giants.

Wilson was appointed to Vice President and General Manager with the team during the Cardinals inaugural season in Arizona in 1988, a position he served through 1993. Wilson continued his role as the team's Vice President until his retirement in 2003.

Larry Wilson was born on March 24, 1938 in Rigby, ID. He is survived by Nancy, his wife of 40 years, as well as daughter Christie, son Larry, Jr. and numerous grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

REMEMBERING LARRY IN THEIR OWN WORDS

Nancy Wilson (Larry's wife of 40 years)

"Larry Wilson was the kindest, most humble person that I will ever know. To most, he was this ferocious and fierce football player who some described as pound for pound the toughest player of his generation. To me, he was the most generous and gentle soul you would ever meet. For Larry, it was always about everyone else and what he could do for them. And especially in the times we live, that's something that that we could use more of today."

Michael Bidwill (Cardinals Owner)

"Besides my father, Larry Wilson was the most influential male figure in my life. He was someone who truly lived his faith and demonstrated it daily in the kindness he showed every single person he met. Any of us lucky enough to be in his orbit - whether that was for a few minutes or four decades - was always better off from the experience. I will remember Larry Wilson first as a fantastic person but then obviously as one of the greatest players the National Football League has ever seen. It's fitting that his passing coincides with the league's 100th birthday because his toughness and the way he revolutionized his position make him one of our game's most unforgettable figures. Whether on the field playing with casts on both hands or brightening the lives of every person he knew, Larry's selflessness defined who he was and how we will all remember him."

"For more than 40 years, Larry Wilson played a remarkable role in the history of the Cardinals and National Football League as a Hall of Fame player and team executive. While he will be recognized for his toughness and excellence on the field and his many contributions to the Cardinals organization, we will also remember Larry as loyal, humble and kind to everyone he met. Larry enriched the lives of many players and colleagues around the league.

Larry helped revolutionize the safety position in his 13 years as the versatile anchor of the Cardinals' defense. His toughness and football instincts earned him recognition as one of the greatest to ever play the game."

In defeating the Seahawks in OT on Sunday Night Football in Week 7, the Cardinals earned their 27th all-time OT victory. In NFL history, only Denver (28) has more OT wins than Arizona (27).

GREAT THINGS ACCOMPLISHED AT A YOUNGE AGE

With a 131-yard performance against the Jets in Week 5, Hopkins eclipsed 9,000 receiving yards for his career. Only three players in NFL history reached the milestone at a younger age than Hopkins (28 years, 127 days).

ELEVATING A FRANCHISE

The 2020 season is the 14th since owner **Michael Bidwill** began leading the organization. His leadership during that time has been instrumental in transforming the franchise both on and off the field.

Highlights of Bidwill's tenure:

- Leading the list of Bidwill's accomplishments with the Cardinals is the creation of State Farm Stadium. In the first 14 seasons after opened in 2006, the team sold out all 144 games (preseason and postseason included) played at the world-class venue that has been awarded three Super Bowls.



- In addition to his role in helping Arizona land Super Bowls XLII and XLIX, he led the effort to land Super Bowl LVII (2023) in the spring of 2018. Michael was instrumental in getting the 2015 Pro Bowl moved to Arizona; played a week before Super Bowl XLIX and the 2015 Pro Bowl combined to deliver a record economic impact of \$720 million to the region.

- By the time it hosts Super Bowl LVII, State Farm Stadium will have undergone \$100 million in improvements including parking infrastructure, state-of-the-art wifi, video boards, sound system upgrades and club-area enhancements since it staged Super Bowl XLIX.

- Of the Cardinals seven all-time postseason wins, five have come with Bidwill's leading the team. Arizona has played in nine postseason contests over the last 13 seasons, after playing just seven prior to his tenure as team president.

- AZ has appeared in the NFC Championship Game twice since 2008, including a victory in the 2008 conference title game that led to the team's first-ever Super Bowl appearance (Super Bowl XLIII).

- In January of 2018, Michael was one of five owners named to the NFL's Player-Owner Committee focused on social and racial justice initiatives. In December of 2014, Commissioner Roger Goodell tapped Bidwill to chair the league's Conduct Committee.

- In January of 2019, Michael received the Paul Tagliabue Award from the Fritz Pollard Alliance for demonstrating integrity and leadership in the area of career development for minorities and advocating for diversity.

KEIM HAS BUILT SOME OF THE BEST

Steve Keim was promoted to GM on January 8, 2013 after 14 seasons in the Cardinals organization. The team has experienced unprecedented success during his tenure as GM. The teams put together by Keim have been some of the most successful in franchise history.



- In 2014, the Cardinals tied the franchise record for wins in a season (11) before setting a new mark in 2015 when Arizona won 13 games and earned its first-ever postseason bye.

- During Keim's tenure, Arizona has established franchise records for wins in a season (13 in 2015), points in a season (489 in 2015), led the NFL in total offense for the first time in team history (#1 in 2015) and led the NFL in sacks for the second time ever (48.0 in 2016).

- Selected QB **Kyler Murray** with the #1 overall pick in the 2019 NFL Draft. Murray was named the NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year following a record-setting season.

- Among the trades negotiated by Keim during his tenure as GM are the acquisition of QB Carson Palmer from Oakland in 2013, acquiring LB **Chandler Jones** from New England in 2016 and the trade that landed WR **DeAndre Hopkins** from Houston in 2020. During the 2019 season, Keim also orchestrated a trade with Miami for RB **Kenyan Drake**.

- Arizona has featured a top-10 defense four times and a top-10 offense twice dating back to Keim's first season as GM. The Cardinals had a top-10 defense in three consecutive seasons (2015-17) for the first time since the 1970 merger.

- Named *Sporting News* 2014 NFL Executive of the Year and earned back-to-back NFL Executive of the Year honors from Pro Football Talk (2013-14).

CARDINALS TAKE PART IN PUSH FOR JUSTICE

Throughout the 2020 season, Cardinals players and coaches are joining the rest of the NFL in honoring and memorializing victims of systemic racism and showing their support for Social Justice efforts by displaying names or phrases as decals on the back of their helmets and patches on their caps.

CARDINALS SPEAKING UP

Throughout the offseason, numerous Cardinals players spoke up about their own experiences and the importance of coming together to make meaningful change a reality in the United States.

DL Corey Peters - 8/28/20

DL **Corey Peters** spoke about how important it is that everyone engage in the conversations and understand other viewpoints:

"One thing we want to do is be sensitive to one another, have compassion for one another and you know, we can disagree with certain things peacefully and all work towards the same goal of not only winning but make this a better country for everybody."

OL D.J. Humphries - 8/28/20

OL **D.J. Humphries** spoke about his children being a major motivator in trying to help bring about change:

"I know how to accept what the world has for you. I know how to maneuver in this world. But for my children, that's not what I want. I want my children to grow up in a fair world and grow up in a world where what the Constitution says is how it really is."

Head Coach Kliff Kingsbury - 8/27/2020

Kingsbury talked about what the Cardinals players and coaches have been discussing and learning from each other during recent events across the country:

"I had a great conversation with my dad over the summer, and his perspective on things that was really valuable as we get closer to the season – the anthem, discussions and things of that nature."

"My dad was a longtime football coach but also a Marine. He served in Vietnam, received a Purple Heart. Talking to him, there were two words that really stood out. One was respect, and the second thing was understanding. Respect viewpoints people have on this topic. They're very personal and very passionate. And respect their right to express themselves."

"You've got to understand, at its core, what this is really about. It's always been about drawing attention to the social injustice that continues to take place. We saw it again this week with Jacob Blake. It's about increasing awareness that racism exists, police brutality against people of color continues to happen, and let's not confuse it with something else and make the narrative different."

"My biggest takeaway from talking to my dad is that kneeling doesn't reflect a lack of patriotism or respect for the military in any way, just like standing during the anthem doesn't mean you're OK with racism or social injustice. It's important to respect and understand that. These are important issues that need to be addressed, and important conversations that need to be had. I'm grateful that I've been able to be around a great group of guys that have enlightened me – hearing their stories and their struggles. Those conversations will continue throughout the year. I just hope we can all continue to push in the right direction."

QB Kyler Murray - 6/17/20

Following the death of George Floyd and the resulting protests around the country, Murray spoke the change he saw happening in real time:

"There is a lot of hate in this world, but at the same time, what's happening and what we're seeing right now, it's huge. I don't condone rioting and stuff like that, but the peaceful protests, I think they're great, they're amazing. Whether it takes years, I feel like we're getting there. At least we're making a step towards it."

LARRY FITZGERALD - AT A GLANCE

- An 11-time Pro Bowl selection, ranks second in NFL history in receptions (1,407) and receiving yards (17,290) and sixth in league annals with 120 TD receptions.

- Named a team captain in 2020, marking the 10th time in his career he has earned the honor.

- Selected by the Cardinals 3rd overall in the 2004 NFL Draft, is in his 17th season in Arizona in 2020. In team history, only QB Jim Hart (18) played more seasons with the team.

- Has played more games with the Cardinals (257) than any other WR in NFL history has played with a single team. The only offensive players in NFL history to appear in more games with a single team are OL Bruce Matthews (296 w/Titans), QB Tom Brady (285 w/Patriots) and OL Jackie Slater (259 w/Rams).

- Has an active streak of 91 consecutive starts, the longest active streak among NFL WRs.

- One of 10 WRs named to the NFL 100 All-Time Team in December 2019, joining nine Pro Football Hall of Famers as the only active player in the group.

- In April of 2020, named to the 2010-19 All-Decade Team by the Pro Football Hall of Fame's 48-member selection committee.

- Selected to a franchise-record 11 Pro Bowls, joining Hall of Fame WR Jerry Rice (13) as the only WRs in NFL history selected to the Pro Bowl at least 11 times.

- His streak of 250 consecutive games with a reception is the second-longest in NFL history. Has a catch in 256 of 257 career games played.

- His 1,407 career receptions are the most for any player in NFL history with a single team, surpassing the previous record held by Rice (1,281 with SF).

- Named a co-winner (along with QB Eli Manning) of the 2016 Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year award.

- At #69 on the NFL Networks Top-100 Players of 2020, has now made the All-100 Team in all 10 years of its existence. He is the only non-QB to accomplish that feat.

- The 2019 season marked the 13th time in 16 seasons he led the Cards in receiving yards. In NFL history, only Jerry Rice (15 times) led his team in receiving yards more times.

- Has caught at least one pass in all 42 different stadiums he has played in during his NFL career and has at least one TD reception in 27 different stadiums.

- In February of 2018, joined PGA pro Kevin Streelman in winning the Pebble Beach Pro-Am golf tournament. Became the first African-American amateur to win the event – which dates back to 1937 – and the first professional athlete to win the title since Dan Marino in 1988.

Fitzgerald is in his 17th NFL season in 2020 – all of which have come in a Cardinals uniform.

No active player has spent more seasons with just one team than Arizona's 2004 first round pick.

In the 2019 season-opener against the Lions, Fitzgerald appeared in his 235th career game, establishing a new franchise record for career games played. He surpassed the previous record for games played held by former K Jim Bakken (234).



250 STRAIGHT WITH A CATCH

After catching eight passes in the win over the Seahawks, Fitzgerald has at least one catch in 250 consecutive games. That is the second-longest streak in NFL history behind Jerry Rice (274 straight).

Fitzgerald's streak of 250 consecutive games with a catch is the longest in NFL history with a single team.

Fitzgerald has at least one catch in 256 of 257 career games played. His streak began in Week 9 of his rookie season in 2004 at Miami.

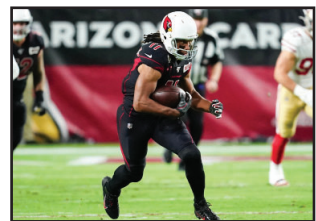
ACTIVE STARTS STREAK LEADS ALL WRs

Fitzgerald made his 91st consecutive start in the win over the Seahawks in Week 7 – a streak that dates back to Week 14 of the 2014 season.

The 37-year old Fitzgerald entered 2020 having started all 16 games in each of the last five seasons (2015-19). *His 91 consecutive starts represent the longest streak among active NFL receivers* and is the 5th-longest streak among all active offensive players.

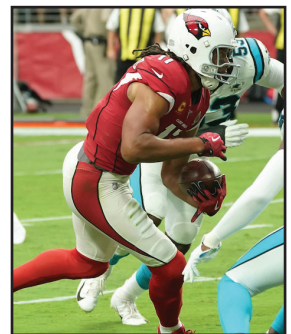

In fact, Fitzgerald's career numbers already surpass all but one receiver currently in the HOF (Rice). He has more career receptions than 28 of the 29 receivers in the HOF: Swann (336), Hayes (371), Pihos (373), Lavelli (386), Hirsch (387), Fears (400), Warfield (427), McDonald (495), Mitchell (521), Stallworth (537), Alworth (542), Biletnikoff (589), Carmichael (590), Berry (631), Maynard (633), Taylor (649), Irvin (750), Joiner (750), Lofton (764), Largent (819), Monk (940), Reed (951), Moss (982), Owens (1,078), Bruce (1,024), Brown (1,094), Carter (1,101) and Harrison (1,102).

He has more career receiving yards than 28 of the 29 receivers in the HOF: Fears (5,397), Swann (5,462), Pihos (5,619), Lavelli (6,488), Hirsch (7,029), Hayes (7,414), Mitchell (7,954), McDonald (8,410), Warfield (8,565), Stallworth (8,723), Biletnikoff (8,974), Carmichael (8,985), Taylor (9,110), Berry (9,275), Alworth (10,266), Maynard (11,834), Irvin (11,904), Joiner (12,146), Monk (12,721), Largent (13,089), Reed (13,198), Carter (13,899), Lofton (14,004), Brown (14,934), Harrison (14,580), Bruce (15,208), Moss (15,292) and Owens (15,934).

A Career Full of Accomplishments:

- Franchise career leader in receptions (1,407), receiving yards (17,290), receiving TDs (120), total TDs (120) and 100-yard receiving games (49). His nine 1,000-yard seasons are also a franchise record. His reception and receiving yardage totals both rank second in NFL history behind Jerry Rice while his 120 receiving TDs rank sixth in league annals.
- Led the NFL with 107 receptions in 2016, marking the second time in his career (103 in 2005; tied with Steve Smith) he had done so. He became the first player in NFL history to lead the NFL in receptions at least 11 years apart. Prior to Fitzgerald, the longest span between leading the league in receptions was six by Jerry Rice (1990, 1996).
- Led the NFL in receiving TDs in both the 2008 (12) and 2009 (13) seasons. In addition to his 10 receiving TDs in 2007, he became the first player in franchise history to record at least 10 TDs in three consecutive seasons.

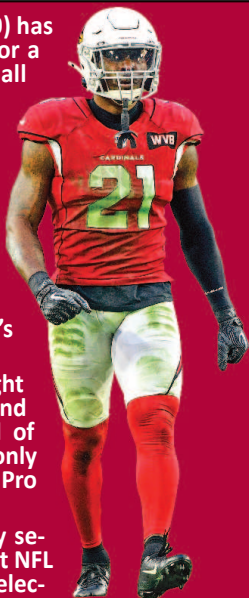

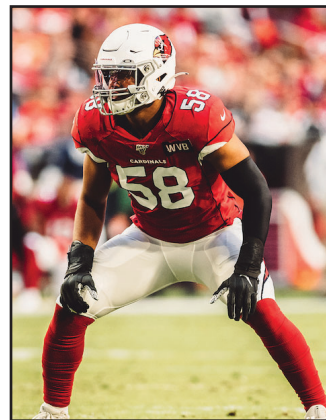
LB **Jordan Hicks** – signed as a free agent in 2019 after four years with the Eagles – put together a breakout campaign in his first season with the Cardinals.

CB **Dre Kirkpatrick** recorded his 11th career INT when he picked off a pass from former Bengals teammate QB Andy Dalton that was intended for WR CeeDee Lamb in the Monday night win over Dallas in Week 6.

It was his fourth INT in eight career MNF appearances. Among active players, only New England CB Devin McCourty (5 in 12 games) has more INTs while playing on MNF.

Kirkpatrick signed with the Cardinals soon after the start of training camp, joining the team after eight seasons in Cincinnati, where DC Vance Joseph was his position coach during the 2014-15 seasons.



The former first-rounder had 288 tackles, 10 INTs (two returned for TDs), 65 passes defended, a forced fumble and two fumble recoveries in 99 games with the Bengals before signing a one-year contract with Arizona.

TRADING THE DEEP FRYER FOR A GAME BALL

The only game ball given out following the Cardinals Week 5 victory over the Jets went to third-year LB **Dennis Gardeck** – adding a new chapter in the inspiring story the former undrafted rookie authored on his way to the NFL playing field.

Playing the first defensive snaps of his career, Gardeck – a special teams captain who signed with the Cardinals as a rookie free agent out of the University of Sioux Falls in 2018 – finished the game against the Jets with 2.0 sacks in just 10 defensive snaps.

His second quarter sack of Jets QB Joe Flacco was his first sack since his senior year at Sioux Falls in 2017.

It was a big performance for the Lake of the Hills, IL native but it wasn't the first success he has experienced in the NFL.

A special teams standout in his first two seasons, Gardeck was named a Pro Bowl alternate in 2019 after posting a team-high 10 tackles and a fumble recovery. In 37 career games, he has 24 special teams tackles, three punt deflections, a fumble recovery on a fake punt and a TD on a blocked punt. In 2018, he led all NFL rookies with 388 total snaps on special teams.

A SMALL SCHOOL STANDOUT AND FAST FOOD STAR

Gardeck's path to the NFL didn't run through a blue-chip college. Following high school, he attended Division II West Virginia State University for three seasons before spending his final college season at Sioux Falls as a graduate transfer. He was a standout in college though.

He recorded 345 tackles, 32.0 sacks, 57.5 tackles for loss, nine forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries in four seasons and was named to five Division II All-America teams as a senior in 2017.

He kept himself busy off the field during his college days as well. He earned a degree from West Virginia State (Gardeck is currently studying for a Masters of Business Administration degree) while also working at McDonald's. He started out on the grill crew but "worked his way up" to the assembly table and fryers. "It feels weird saying it was a good fit, but I had a blast there," he said. "I loved it. I loved my coworkers."

ALL-PRO HOPKINS HAPPY FOR HIS TRAINING PARTNER

Following the win over the Jets, WR **DeAndre Hopkins** spoke of how happy he was to see Gardeck's hard work paying off. "I rehabbed and trained with Dennis this offseason before I came here and I saw the work that he put in. I got to see the work he put in behind the scenes and for him to go in do what he did today, I knew he was going to give his all and it resulted in two sacks. That is what you look for in a guy like that. It gives the team motivation."

FOLLOWING UP WITH ANOTHER STRONG SHOWING IN WEEK 6

In the Week 6 Monday night victory at Dallas, Gardeck again saw limited action on defense but - again - he made his presence felt when he was in. In 16 defensive snaps, he had a tackle, a QB pressure and a QB hit. He nearly took down Andy Dalton in the Dallas end zone for a sack but the QB got the ball out just before going down. In 26 total defensive snaps between Weeks 5-6, Gardeck had three tackles, 2.0 sacks, three QB hits and two tackles for loss.



KICKING HIS WAY TO THE TOP

Through seven games this season, **K Zane Gonzalez** has connected on 10-of-13 FG attempts with his three misses coming from 52, 49 and 41 yards.

Gonzalez made three-of-four FG attempts in the Week 7 win over the Seahawks on Sunday Night Football, including a 44-yarder as time expired in regulation to send the game into OT and a 48-yarder to win it in OT.

His 48-yard FG in OT was the third game-winning kick of his career and the first to come in OT. He had game-winners at Green Bay in 2018 and in Cincinnati in 2019.

ZANE FROM LONG RANGE

He has converted two-of-three beyond 50 yards this season, including a 54-yard FG in Week 3 against the Lions and a career-long 56-yarder in Week 1 against the 49ers.

In franchise history, just three made FGs have covered more ground than his 56-yard FG against San Francisco.

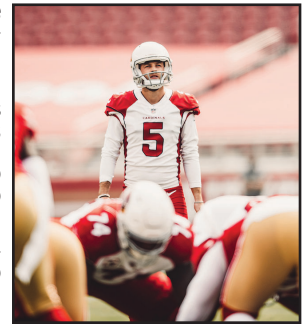

SPECIAL TEAMS COMES UP BIG IN 2020

In their first seven games this season, the Cardinals have benefitted from big plays on special teams:

- Third-year LB **Ezekiel Turner** set up the Cardinals first TD of the game in the first quarter when he blocked a 49ers punt, which was recovered by LB **Dennis Gardeck** and returned to the SF 10-yard line.
- **K Zane Gonzalez** connected on a 56-yard FG just prior to halftime against San Francisco. It was the longest FG of his career and tied for the fourth-longest FG in franchise history.
- LS **Aaron Brewer** – now in his ninth NFL season and playing in his 119th career game in Week 2 – recovered the first fumble of his career in the first quarter. Covering a punt return, Brewer jumped on a ball forced loose by TE Darrell Daniels at the Washington 40-yard line. Six plays later QB Kyler Murray scored on a 14-yard TD run to give Arizona a 14-0 lead.
- In the fourth quarter of the Cardinals Week 5 games against the Jets, CB **Kevin Peterson** recovered a muffed punt near the Cardinals goal line, setting up a six-play, 96-yard TD drive on Arizona's next possession.
- **Gonzalez** made three-of-four FG attempts in the Week 7 win over the Seahawks on SNF, including a 44-yarder as time expired in regulation to send the game into OT and a 48-yarder to win it in OT. The 48-yard FG in OT was the third game-winning kick of his career and the first to come in OT.

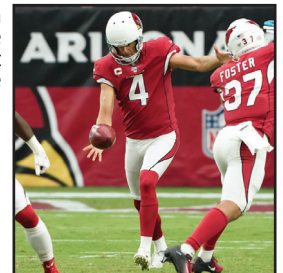


LEE STILL ON TOP OF HIS GAME

KINGSBURY TURNS OFFENSE AROUND IN 2019

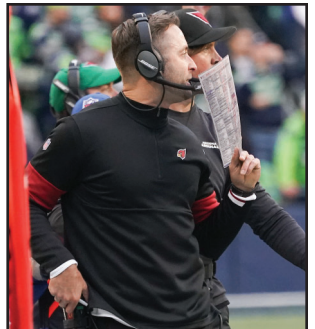

KINGSBURY'S RECORD-BREAKING RUN GAME

When Arizona hired **Kingsbury** in 2019, much of the talk surrounding the hire involved the former Texas-Tech head coach implementing a pass-heavy "Air-Raid" system in the desert.

Although the passing offense made significant strides in 2019, it was the rushing attack that showed the biggest improvement last season.

After finishing #32 in the NFL in both rushing yards and rushing average in 2018, the Cardinals finished the 2019 season having averaged over 5.0 yards per rush attempt as a team for the first time in franchise history. Arizona averaged a franchise-record 5.03 yards per rush attempt last season (1,990 yards & 18 TDs on 396 attempts).



The previous record for team rushing average (4.87) was established in 1960.

The Cardinals 1,990 rushing yards in 2019 represent the team's highest total since rushing for 2,027 yards in 1988, the year the team moved to Arizona.

The 2019 season marked the first time since 1984 (2,008 yards; 21 TDs) that the Cardinals rushed for at least 1,900 yards and 18 TDs in a season.

After having the #32 ranked rushing attack in 2018, the Cardinals had the #10 ranked rushing attack in 2019, averaging 124.4 yards per game. It marked just the second time in the last 35 years (#8 in 2015) that the Cardinals ranked in the top-10 in rushing yards per game.

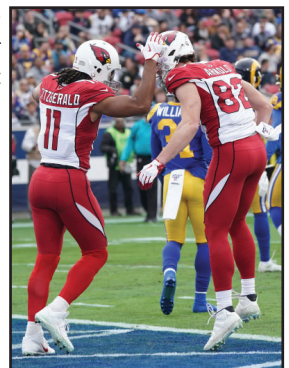

Over the final three months of last season (Weeks 5-17), only New Orleans (10), San Francisco (9) and Baltimore (9) scored 25+ points in more games than the Cardinals (8).

CARDINALS COVID-19 RELIEF EFFORTS (TEAM INITIATIVES)

Since the COVID-19 pandemic hit the country earlier this year the effects of the outbreak have reached every corner of the U.S. and has had a devastating impact on citizens and businesses across the nation. The Cardinals organization – along with the players and staff – immediately mobilized to donate time, money and other resources throughout Arizona to assist the individuals, businesses, schools, frontline health care personnel and other organizations that have been so greatly affected by the crisis.

\$1 MILLION FOUNDING CONTRIBUTION TO THE AZ CORONAVIRUS RELIEF FUND

On March 24, the Cardinals made a \$1 million founding contribution to the AZ Coronavirus Relief Fund. As part of the Arizona Together initiative launched earlier that day by Governor Doug Ducey, the fund was set up established to provide financial support to organizations working to mitigate the impacts of COVID-19 in Arizona. Initially, it focused on the following immediate needs:

- Funding of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) for frontline medical personnel.
- Non-profit organizations that support the most vulnerable Arizonans through food banks, homeless shelters, domestic violence facilities, and other services.
- Providing disadvantaged students with the technology necessary to transition to online learning.

“Like so many in our community, this unprecedented crisis has us asking what we can do to help and what might have the greatest impact,” said Cardinals Owner **Michael Bidwill** said of the donation. “We are grateful for the creation of this relief fund, and proud to support its critically important mission and hope that others throughout the community can join this effort in whatever way that they are able. As a team, we will continue to work on additional ways to make a difference and know that as a community we will get through this challenging time together.”

To assist local businesses during the crisis, the Cardinals made a \$100,000 donation to Local First Arizona, Arizona’s Coronavirus Micro Grant Fund

MILLION MEALS DONATION TO LOCAL FOOD BANKS



In early April, the Cardinals and State Farm partnered on an historic initiative to address a pressing local need arising from the COVID-19 pandemic. The number of people seeking assistance from local food banks more than doubled as a result of the unparalleled crisis. Unfortunately, the number of donations to them decreased just as dramatically.

As part of their on-going commitment to improve the local community, State Farm and the Cardinals helped tackle the issue by donating over a million 1,000,000 meals that were distributed to five non-profit organizations throughout the Valley. The five groups involved in the “Million Meal” donation were:

- St. Mary’s Food Bank
- St. Vincent DePaul
- United Food Bank
- Phoenix Rescue Mission
- Midwest Food Bank

ORGANIZATION LAUNCHES “CARDINALS CARRY-OUT” INITIATIVE TO ASSIST INDEPENDENT, LOCALLY OWNED RESTAURANTS



On April 13 the team launched “Cardinals Carry-out” - an unprecedented initiative with a dual purpose: assist independent, locally-owned restaurants hit hard by the coronavirus crisis and recognize those working on the front lines of the pandemic in the medical community, law enforcement and emergency services.

Cardinals players and fans nominated their favorite establishments for inclusion on the team’s interactive statewide map and supported them with take-out business.

In the spirit of the NFL Draft, the team selected establishments from the map each day and purchased meals which were delivered to nurses, doctors, first responders and others who work daily to combat the impact of COVID-19.

When it was launched, the first 47 establishments on the map reflected the favorites of Cardinals players and staff as well as those near area hospitals suggested by Local First Arizona. Within the first week, over 800 restaurants throughout the state have been added based on recommendations from fans.

“It’s great that a major sports team would put together such a thing that is community driven and helps restaurants navigate these tough times...we’re kind of in survival mode but we’re going to make it out,” said **Chris Hove**, owner of Perfect Pear Bistro in Chandler which was recommended by defensive lineman **Zach Allen**.

HOSTING CRITICAL BLOOD DRIVES, DRIVE-THROUGH TESTING AND PPE DRIVES AT STATE FARM STADIUM

One area hit particularly hard by the COVID-19 crisis was the local blood donation community, where the supply reached critically low levels during a crucial time in March. In a seven-day span between March 19 and March 26, nearly 200 blood drives in Arizona were cancelled, resulting in the loss of more than 5,000 blood donations for hospital patients.

To assist in meeting this direly pressing need, the Cardinals partnered with Dignity Health and Cigna to host a major one-day blood drive at State Farm Stadium. In conjunction with Scottsdale-based Vitalant (pronounced “vye-TAL-ent” and formerly known as United Blood Services) the event took place at State Farm Stadium on March 31. All donation slots for the drive were filled within hours of the event being announced.

The outpouring of support from the community resulted in two additional blood drives being scheduled at State Farm Stadium. On back-to-backs on April 7-8, in conjunction with the American Red Cross, the Cardinals partnered with Anheuser-Busch to host blood drives at State Farm Stadium and all donation slots were again filled.

On April 15, the Cardinals and Project C.U.R.E hosted a Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) drive at State Farm Stadium. The event was to help collect equipment for use by those in the local healthcare community, including eye protection, face shields, surgical masks, N95 masks, gloves, shoe covers and hand sanitizer.

In May, the Cardinals and Dignity Health partnered to participate in the state’s drive-through COVID-19 testing blitz by hosting events open to the public at State Farm Stadium.



CARDINALS COVID-19 RELIEF EFFORTS (PLAYER INITIATIVES)

KLIFF KINGSBURY – \$50,000 DONATION TO THE NAVAJO RELIEF FUND (NRF)

The Native American population in Arizona was hit particularly hard by the COVID-19 outbreak and the Cardinals head coach was among the many who stepped up to help. In April, Kingsbury donated \$50,000 to the Navajo Relief Fund to assist one of the communities that was most affected – the Navajo Nation. The NRF was established to help with the shortage of healthy food, safe drinking water, healthcare and supply stores in remote reservation communities. During the pandemic, the fund served as urgent need in making available food, water and other basic supplies.

DEANDRE HOPKINS – \$150,000 DONATION TO THE ARIZONA CORONAVIRUS RELIEF FUND; #THEREALHEROES PROJECT

It didn't take long for the All-Pro wideout to make a significant impact in Arizona. On March 27, 2020 - just a week after being acquired by the Cardinals — Hopkins announced a \$150,000 donation to the AZ Coronavirus Relief Fund, which was established to provide financial support to multiple organizations trying to deal with the impact of COVID-19. Money raised by Arizona Relief Fund goes to purchasing Personal Protective Equipment for medical personnel working with the coronavirus patients; supporting non-profits that aid the most vulnerable such as food banks, homeless shelters and domestic violence facilities; and providing technology for disadvantaged students needed for online learning.

Hopkins was among the sports stars who participated in a national project to recognize and celebrate health care workers for their efforts on the front lines of the coronavirus pandemic. "The Real Heroes Project" was a collaboration involving Hopkins and athletes from a combined 14 leagues. Others include New Orleans Saints QB Drew Brees, New York Yankees All-Star outfielder Aaron Judge, U.S. women's soccer stars Carli Lloyd and Alex Morgan, and Hockey Hall of Famer Wayne Gretzky. In the PSA – which was released on National Nurses Day - Hopkins recognized local nurse Tracy Thomas, an RN at Dignity Health St. Joseph's Hospital and Medical Center. She was selected in recognition of the incredible work she has done leading the COVID-19 Response



CHANDLER JONES – DONATED 150,000 MEALS TO FOOD BANKS IN ARIZONA AND NEW YORK

In late March, the Cardinals All-Pro LB donated over 150,000 meals to food banks in both Arizona and his hometown of Endicott, NY to assist with families affected by the Coronavirus outbreak. Jones provided meals to St. Mary's Food Bank and Midwest Food Bank of Arizona while also donating to Mother Teresa's Cupboard through the Catholic Charities of Broome County in New York.

JORDAN HICKS – \$100,000 TO IMPACT CHURCH COVID-19 RELIEF EFFORTS; ANIMAL ADOPTION INITIATIVE

Following a career year on the field in his first season with Arizona, Hicks joined his wife, Ivana, to announce in April that they would match and donate up to \$100,000 to their church in Scottsdale – Impact Church – to assist single mothers during the pandemic. Those efforts included providing meals and helping cover rent and mortgage payments. Hicks' donation also helped facilitate a COVID-19 drive-through testing initiative at the church that saw over 500 people receive free tests.

Hicks and his wife also organized an animal adoption campaign in Austin that saw 260 animals adopted in under a week. The couple partnered with Austin (TX) Pets Alive to provide new pet owners with a care package that included a crate, pet food, treats, a leash and a toy.

KYLER MURRAY – \$25,000 DONATION TO GENYOUth FOR ITS COVID-19 EMERGENCY SCHOOL NUTRITION FUND

With schools across the country closed because of the coronavirus, the reigning NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year stepped up in April to help children who counted on school meals to be fed on a daily basis. He donated \$25,000 to GENYOUth for its COVID-19 Emergency School Nutrition Fund, which was established to provide resources that allowed school meal programs to continue despite school closures.

ISAIAH SIMMONS – DONATED 60,000 MEALS TO HARVEST COMPASSION CENTERS IN ARIZONA

Within a week of becoming the #8 overall pick in the 2020 NFL Draft, the former Clemson star was already reaching out to help people in Arizona struggling as a result of the pandemic. Simmons teamed up with the Cardinals and Bose to donate 60,000 meals to the Harvest Compassion Center for its facilities in Phoenix, Maryvale and Chandler. Harvest Compassion Center is a food and clothing bank dedicated to providing a hope-filled environment to the underserved in the greater Phoenix area. HCC locations offer free food, hygiene, baby, home and clothing items to the many Arizonans living below the poverty line.

LARRY FITZGERALD – DELIVERING MEALS TO HEALTHCARE WORKERS AND FRONTLINE STAFF

One of the most prolific WRs in NFL history, Fitzgerald long ago set the standard for making an impact in the community – and those efforts continued during the COVID-19 outbreak. In late April, he teamed with Steak 44, Ocean 44 and Dominick's to deliver meals to healthcare workers all over the Valley. In addition to helping those who have gone above-and-beyond to serve the community during the pandemic, it also served as a very personal cause for Fitzgerald, who's late mother, Carol, was a nurse.

COREY PETERS – STARTED VIRTUAL BOOK CLUB FOR ARIZONA HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

A passionate advocate for reading, the Cardinals starting DT set up an in-person book club a few years ago. When the pandemic hit, forcing the closure of schools and the enforcement of social distancing, Peters saw an opportunity to make the book club virtual. So in May, he launched the virtual book club "The Corey Peterson Playbook" to help provide an educational outlet for all Arizona high school students during the COVID-19 crisis.

PATRICK PETERSON – DONATED TO ARIZONA FIRST RESPONDERS ON MEMORIAL DAY WEEKEND

With Memorial Day occurring in the middle of the pandemic, the Cardinals All-Pro helped keep the spirit of the holiday when he teamed with Pit Boss Grills to donate grill products and gift cards to Arizona first responders. Peterson had his followers on social media nominate a first responder of their choice and he selected three winners on Memorial Day who each received a new top-of-the-line grill, grilling products and a gift card from Bashas supermarket.

DEVON KENNARD – DELIVERED MEALS TO FOUR VALLEY FIRE DEPARTMENTS; VIRTUAL HOSPITAL VISITS

In May, Arizona native – and Cardinals 2020 free agent signing – Kennard gave back to his hometown when he teamed with Salad and Go to provide dinner for firefighters at four different fire stations in the Ahwatukee area.

Every year Cardinals players and staff make numerous visits to Phoenix Children's Hospital to lift the spirits of the children and their families in pediatric units. Due to COVID-19 and the resulting safety restrictions, those visits have taken a new form. In late August, Kennard became the first Cardinals player to take the controls of a telepresence robot in order to spend time with children at PCH. While Kennard was at training camp at State Farm Stadium, he was able to drive the robot through the halls of PCH and interact with children through a video monitor.
