THIS WEEK'S PREVIEW

Having split their first two pre-season contests, the Cardinals travel to Minnesota this week to practice against the Vikings in preparation for their matchup on Saturday in the preseason finale at U.S. Bank Stadium.

The teams are scheduled to hold joint practices on Wednesday (8/23) and Thursday (8/24) at the Vikings Twin Orthopedics Performance Center

Saturday's game will be the 16th all-time preseason matchup between the Cardinals and Vikings - and the first since 2019. It will also mark the sixth consecutive preseason matchup between the two teams to take place in Minnesota.

The 2023 season is the third straight year - and eighth time in 10 years - Arizona and Minnesota will face each other in either preseason or regular season. The Cardinals are also making their fourth visit to Minnesota in the last six seasons.

This week's trip to Minnesota will see seven Cardinals coaches return to face their former team, a group that includes head coach **Jonathan Gannon**, defensive coordinator **Nick Rallis** and offensive coordinator **Drew Petzing**. All three coached with the Vikings, including from 2014-17 when Gannon and Petzing served on the same staff under then-head coach Mike Zimmer. A Minnesota native, Rallis spent his first three NFL seasons as a coach (2018-20) with the Vikings.

Following this week's games, all teams will reduce their rosters to 53 in preparation for the regular season. Roster cuts must be made by 1:00 PM (MST) on Tuesday, August 29. The following day teams are permitted to build a practice squad consisting of up to 16 players.

After facing the Vikings in the preseason finale, the Cardinals will open the regular season on the road against the Washington Commanders on Sept. 10 at FedEx Field. Minnesota opens the 2023 regular season at home vs. the defending NFC South champion Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

THE HIGHLIGHTS

- The Cardinals and Vikings square off in the preseason finale at U.S. Bank Stadium in Minnesota. Saturday's game will mark Arizona's fifth game at the venue since it opened in 2016: regular season in 2016, 2018, 2022; preseason in 2019 and 2023.
- Cardinals GM **Monti Ossenfort** (Luverne) and DC **Nick Rallis** (Edina) are both Minnesota natives who starred at both the high school and college levels in the state before working with the Vikings (Ossenfort as a training camp intern; Rallis as a defensive coach).
- The 2023 season marks the second consecutive year Arizona has spent the final week of the preseason on the road. In 2022, the Cardinals practiced against the Titans in Tennessee in preparation for their preseason meeting.
- In Saturday's matchup against the Vikings, the Cardinals will wear their new all-white road uniforms for the first time.
- The games this week are the final opportunity for players to earn a spot on opening day rosters across the NFL. Following a rule change approved at the NFL's annual league meetings in March, **there is just one date (Aug. 29) for preseason roster cuts. In previous years teams made multiple roster cuts during the preseason.**

CARDINALS-VIKINGS CONNECTIONS

VIKINGS CONNECTIONS

There are seven members of the Cardinals coaching staff who have coached with the Vikings: Head Coach **Jonathan Gannon** (Asst. Defensive Backs/Quality Control, 2014-17), Defensive Coordinator **Nick Rallis** (Asst. LBs/Quality Control, 2018-20), Offensive Coordinator **Drew Petzing** (Asst. WRs/Asst. QBs/WRs, 2014-19), Head Strength and Conditioning Coach **Evan Marcus** (2014-15), OLs Coach **Rob Rodriguez** (Asst. D-Line, 2015-19), LBs Coach **Sam Siefkes** (Defensive Quality Control/Asst. LBs, 2021-22), and TE Coach **Ben Steele** (Asst. O-Line, 2021).

As an assistant with the Vikings over four seasons, **Gannon** helped the Vikings defense rank 2nd in the NFL in redzone defense (48.6%), 3rd in total defense (319.9 ypg), scoring defense (18.8 ppg), passing defense (214.6 ypg) and third-down defense (35.1%). CB **Xavier Rhodes** (2016-17) and S **Harrison Smith** (2015-17) were selected to multiple Pro Bowls during Gannon's tenure in Minnesota.

During **Petzing's** time with Minnesota, WR **Stefon Diggs** set a then career-high with 1,130 receiving yards, his second consecutive 1,000-yard season. Working with QB **Kirk Cousins** in 2018, the Vikings QB recorded the fourth-highest passer rating (99.7) by a Viking in team history. Petzing also helped develop WR **Adam Thielen**, who in 2017 made his first Pro Bowl and was a second-team All-Pro selection after finishing 5th in the NFL (2nd in NFC) with a then career-high 1,276 receiving yards on 91 receptions.

Cardinals CB **Kris Boyd** was selected by the Vikings in the seventh round (217th overall) of the 2019 NFL Draft and spent his first four NFL seasons (2019-22) in Minnesota. He played in 58 games (six starts) and had 66 tackles, three passes defended and a forced fumble on defense while adding 29 special teams tackles, four fumble recoveries and a forced fumble on special teams in the regular season. Boyd also played in three postseason contests with the Vikings, adding a fumble recovery.

Cardinals Director of Player Personnel **Dru Grigson** signed with the Vikings as an undrafted rookie free agent in 2003.

CARDINALS CONNECTIONS

Vikings LB **Jordan Hicks** played three seasons (2019-21) with the Cardinals. A two-time team captain, Hicks started in 49 games and totaled 384 tackles (246 solo), 29 TFL, 5.5 sacks, 13 QB hits, four interceptions, 15 passes defended, three forced fumbles, and one fumble recovery.

Vikings LB **Tanner Vallejo** played three-plus seasons (2019-22) with the Cardinals, appearing in 45 games (7 starts) and totaling 64 tackles, 2.5 sacks and five TFL on defense and added 17 tackles and a forced fumble on special teams.

Vikings CB **Byron Murphy Jr.** was drafted by the Cardinals in the second round (33rd overall) of the 2019 NFL Draft, and in four seasons (2019-22) he 229 tackles (184 solo), five INTs, 34 passes defended and two TDs. Murphy is also a Arizona native (Scottsdale) and attended Saguaro (Scottsdale) High School, where as a senior (2015) he was named Arizona Cardinals High School Player of the Year.

Vikings DL **Jonathan Bullard** played one season with Arizona in 2019.

Vikings CB **Tay Gowan** was drafted by Arizona in the sixth round (223rd overall) of the 2021 NFL Draft.

Vikings RBs Coach/Run Game Coordinator **Curtis Modkins** served as the Cardinals RBs coach in 2009.

FAMILY CONNECTIONS

Cardinals Director of Player Personnel **Dru Grigson's** brother, **Ryan Grigson**, is the Vikings Senior Vice President of Player Personnel.

ARIZONA CONNECTIONS

Vikings WR **N'Keal Harry** played three seasons (2016-18) at Arizona State where he appeared in 37 games and had 213 receptions for 2,889 yards and 22 touchdowns as well as 23 rushing attempts for 144 yards and three touchdowns. Harry finished his college career third in Arizona State program history in career receptions (213) and receiving yards (2,889).

Vikings Head Athletic Trainer **Uriah Myrie** was an assistant athletic trainer at Arizona State from 2015-17.

Vikings Quality Control coach **Derron Montgomery** was a senior offensive analyst for the University of Arizona during the 2021 season.

PRO/COLLEGE CONNECTIONS

Cardinals DL **Rashard Lawrence** (2016-20) played with Vikings WR **Justin Jefferson** (2017-20) and OL **Ed Ingram** (2017-21) at LSU. The trio all played a key role for the Tigers team that earned the 2020 BCS National Championship.

Cardinals RB **James Conner** (2013-16) and Vikings T **Brian O'Neill** (2015-17) played together at the University of Pittsburgh.

Vikings DL **Jonathan Bullard** (2012-15) played with Cardinals OL **D.J. Humphries** (2012-14) at Florida.

Cardinals QB **Colt McCoy** (2014-19) and Vikings QB **Kirk Cousins** (2012-17) played together for the Washington Commanders.

Cardinals TE **Zach Ertz** (2013-21) and Vikings WR **Jalen Reagor** (2020-21) were teammates for two seasons in Philadelphia.

Cardinals Asst. Head Coach/Special Teams Coordinator **Jeff Rodgers** (2011-14) served as the special teams coordinator with the Denver Broncos while Vikings Offensive Line Coach **Chris Kuper** (2006-13) was a player.

Jonathan Gannon became an NFL head coach for the first time when hired by Arizona on February 14, 2023. He came to Arizona after spending the past two seasons (2021-22) as the defensive coordinator with the Philadelphia Eagles. Gannon has 15 years of experience in the NFL with the Eagles (2021-22), Colts (2018-20), Vikings (2014-17), Titans (2012-13), Rams (2009-11) and Falcons (2007). Prior to being hired in Arizona, Gannon coached with three different teams (Eagles, Colts, Vikings) who combined for six playoff berths in the last eight seasons (2015-22).

Kevin O'Connell is beginning his 2nd season as an NFL head coach after leading the Vikings to a 13-4 record and NFC North division title in his first season at the helm in 2022. His 13 wins were the most by any first-year head coach in franchise history and the team earned its first division title since 2017. O'Connell had seven players win Player of the Week awards in 2022, the most by a first-year head coach in franchise history, seven notched Pro Bowl berths, and three earned Associated Press All-Pro honors.

AN EXTENDED STAY IN MINNESOTA

This week Arizona embarks on an extended stay in Minnesota as they wrap up preseason play.



For the second consecutive season (Nashville in 2022), the Cardinals will spend part of their preseason practicing on the road as Arizona and Minnesota will hold joint practices at the Vikings' Twin Orthopedics Performance Center on Aug. 23-24. The teams will then face off in a preseason contest on Aug. 26 at U.S. Bank Stadium.

The Cardinals new coaching regime - headlined by head coach **Jonathan Gannon** - features numerous individuals with ties to the Vikings organization.

VIKINGS INTERN - AND LUVERNE'S OWN - RETURNS AS GM

The Cardinals hired **Monti Ossenfort** as the team's new general manager this offseason. That came 22 years after Ossenfort's first-ever hiring in the NFL - as a training camp intern with the Vikings in 2001.

Ossenfort began that internship after graduating from the University of Minnesota-Morris in 2000, where he starred on the football team. A four-year letterman and two-year starter at QB, he completed 411-of-923 pass attempts for 4,263 yards and 21 TDs during his college career. He continues to rank first in program history in pass attempts, fourth in completions and fifth in total passing yards.

Ossenfort is a Minnesota native who grew up in Luverne - a town of fewer than 5,000 residents located just over 200 miles southwest of Minneapolis.



DEEP TIES TO LAND OF 10,000 LAKES

First-year Arizona defensive coordinator **Nick Rallis** makes a return to his home state this week when the Cardinals travel to Minnesota.

A native of Edina, MN, Rallis attended Edina High School - which is located just 24 miles west of the Vikings Twin Orthopedics Training Center - where the Cardinals and Vikings will practice together this week.

Rallis was the #8 recruit in the state of Minnesota as a senior according to Rivals.com prior to playing linebacker collegiately at the University of Minnesota (2012-16). As a Golden Gopher, Rallis appeared in 26 games, including starting three games as a senior. His older brother, Mike, also played LB at Minnesota (2008-12) and is now a star in the WWE known as Riddick Moss.

After beginning his coaching career at Wake Forest in 2017, Rallis joined the NFL coaching ranks with the Vikings in 2018. He spent his first two seasons (2018-19) in Minnesota as a defensive quality control coach and added the title of assistant linebackers in 2020.



CARDINALS TO DEBUT NEW ROAD UNIFORMS IN THIS WEEK'S PRESEASON FINALE



In April, the Cardinals unveiled new uniforms that the team will wear this season. On Saturday in Minnesota the team will debut their new road uniforms for the first time.

The new uniforms were designed in collaboration with Nike in a process that spanned over three years. It began in late 2019 before being interrupted by COVID-19 a short time later and then re-starting. The end result is a product that is world-class in terms of both performance and aesthetics.

The Nike Vapor Field Utility Special Edition (F.U.S.E.) uniforms combine leading edge fabric technology with a precision fit. The stretch woven body fabric of Nike Vapor F.U.S.E. is made with at least 85% recycled nylon. Lightweight with superior breathability and mobility, it is also the first football uniform to meet Nike Dri-FIT standards for thermal regulation and airflow.

In terms of appearance, the sleek, new Cardinals uniforms feature three different styles:

HOME UNIFORM

The team's home uniform consists of red jerseys with matching red pants. The jersey features white, perforated twill numbers accented by silver, kiss cut framis material.

Sewn-in twill lettering spells out the "Arizona" wordmark that spans the front and a white thermoplastic polyurethane (TPU) Cardinals birdhead adorns the upper back. Embroidered in white lettering on the inside back of the red jersey's neckline is the phrase "Protect the Nest."



ALTERNATE BLACK UNIFORM

Also unveiled were the team's alternate uniforms that closely resemble the design of the road ones except that they are black from head to toe rather than white.

Like the white road uniform, the alternate black one also features red perforated numerals - though outlined in silver material - and its sleeves are also adorned with the same red and silver stripes and Cardinals wordmark. Similarly the black pants feature red and silver framis stripes down each side, identical to the white ones.



AWAY UNIFORM

On the road, the Cardinals will sport an all-white look from head to toe. Red perforated twill numerals outlined in black pop from the white jersey. In an homage to past Cardinals uniforms, its sleeves feature a pair of red framis stripes surrounding a single silver one with the Cardinals wordmark printed on it.

The upper back of the jersey features a three-color TPU Cardinals birdhead while the inner back neckline is embroidered with "Bird Gang" in red. The uniform's all-white pants are interrupted only by red and silver framis stripes down each side that mimic the stripes on the jersey's sleeves.



HELMET RE-DESIGN

Capping off the new look for the Cardinals is a re-designed helmet. Its white shell gets a subtle silver sparkle from Large Texas Flakes. This complements a new silver facemask that replaces the previous gray one. The helmets front and rear "bumpers" feature rubberized, 3-D Cardinals wordmarks in red.

The Cardinals logo on each side of the helmet is now larger and updated with digital shading and a metallic sheen. The white helmet accompanies the home and road uniforms while a black helmet is paired with the alternate black uniform.



BY THE NUMBERS

New coaches on the Cardinals staff in 2023, headlined by head coach Jonathan Gannon. Arizona hired Gannon in February after he spent the last two seasons (2021-22) as the defensive coordinator with the Philadelphia Eagles.

Sacks for the Eagles defense last season under Gannon, easily the highest total in the NFL. Philadelphia's 70 sacks were the most by any team in a single season since the 1989 Minnesota Vikings (71).

Yards allowed/game for Gannon's defense in 2022, which ranked second in the NFL. The Eagles also featured the NFL's top-ranked pass defense (179.8 ypg) and the league's eighth ranked scoring defense (20.2 ppg).

NFL seasons for Cardinals GM Monti Ossenfort, who was hired by the Cardinals in January. A longtime personnel staffer for the New England Patriots, Ossenfort came to Arizona following three seasons (2020-22) with the Tennessee Titans.

Baker became just the third player in Cards history to receive at least five Pro Bowl selections in his first six NFL seasons joining Patrick Peterson (6) and Ollie Matson (6).

Tackles for S Jalen Thompson over the last two seasons (2021-22). That ranks second among NFL safeties behind only Chargers All-Pro Derwin James (233).

Scrimmage yards (782 rushing, 300 receiving) for RB James Conner in 2022. It marked his second straight season with 1,000+, after totaling 1,127 yards in his first season with Arizona in 2021.

Receptions for rookie TE Trey McBride in his last four games played in 2022. That is more than he had in his first 12 games played last season (12). McBride had nearly three times as many receiving yards in the last four games (191) as he had in the first 12 (74).

NOTES ON ARIZONA'S 2023 SCHEDULE

• The Cardinals take on the AFC North (Bengals, Browns, Ravens, Steelers) and NFC East (Commanders, Cowboys, Eagles, Giants) in 2023. Those two divisions saw a combined five teams earn a spot in the postseason in 2022.

• Arizona will also host Atlanta, who finished the 2022 season in the same spot in the NFC South. The Cardinals will travel to play the Bears, who finished in the same spot in the NFC North in 2022. Arizona's ninth road game will be played at Houston.

• **The Cardinals 2023 schedule is highlighted by some of its oldest rivalries: Chicago Bears (1st meeting in 1920), NY Giants (1st meeting in 1926), Washington Commanders (1st meeting in 1932), Pittsburgh Steelers (1st meeting in 1933) and Philadelphia Eagles (1st meeting in 1935).**

• **The 2023 season marks the first time since 1993 the Cardinals open with three straight games vs. the NFC East (when the Cardinals were a member of that division).**

• For the second consecutive season, the Cardinals will have nine games against teams that earned a postseason berth in 2022. Arizona will face three of the four teams that played in conference championship games in 2022.

• AZ has 10 games vs. teams that finished last season with a winning record.

• Of Arizona's eight home games in 2023, six will come against teams that earned a playoff berth in 2022. The teams the Cardinals will face at home in 2023 finished the 2022 season with a combined 77-57-1 record (.574) during the regular season.

CARDINALS TO PLAY NINE ON THE ROAD IN 2023

The 2023 season will be the NFL's third to feature 17 regular season games, and mark the second time that teams from the NFC will play a ninth road game. **In 2021 Arizona went 8-1 on the road, setting a franchise record for road wins and becoming just the 10th team in NFL history with win 8+ road games in a single season.**

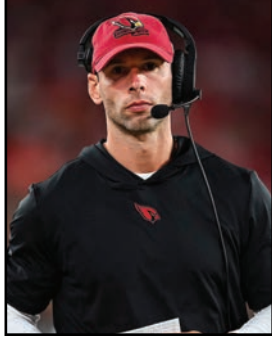

NEW CARDS HAVE FRANCHISE TIES

Two of Arizona's 2023 NFL Draft picks - OL **Paris Johnson Jr.** and QB **Clayton Tune** - are not the only members of their families to be drafted by the Cardinals.

JOHNSON HOPES TO BUILD ON FATHER'S LEGACY WITH CARDINALS

Exactly 8,776 days (24 years, 10 days) after his father - Paris Sr. - was selected by Arizona in the 5th round (155th overall) of the 1999 NFL Draft - Paris Jr. became the newest Cardinals draft pick when he was taken 6th overall in the 2023 NFL Draft.

Although the eldest Johnson spent just one season in Arizona and never played in an NFL game, Paris Jr. talked of using that as motivation. "I wanted to be a Cardinal," Johnson said following the draft. "(I) told the coaches I want to finish what my Dad couldn't. I want to finish what he started originally as the original Paris Johnson. So to be able to carry that legacy with the Cardinals is everything."

TUNE A RELATIVE OF CARDS FIRST-EVER DRAFT PICK

QB Clayton Tune was drafted by the Cardinals in the fifth round (139th overall).

His selection came exactly 87 years, 2 months and 22 days after his great-great uncle Jimmy Lawrence was the Cardinals first-ever draft pick.

During the inaugural NFL Draft held at the Ritz Carlton in Philadelphia in 1936, the Cardinals selected Lawrence in the first round (5th overall) out of TCU.



Jimmy Lawrence carries the ball vs. the NY Giants on October 6, 1938.

Lawrence went on to play four seasons (1936-39) with the Cardinals (1936-39) and Green Bay Packers (1939). He played one game with the Cardinals and three with the Packers during the '39 season.

OTHER CARDINALS PLAYERS WITH NFL FAMILY TIES

LB **BJ Ojulari** - Brother is N.Y. Giants second-year LB **Azeez Ojulari**. The duo will face off when Arizona hosts the Giants in Week 2 of the regular season.

DL **Dante Stills** - Has numerous NFL family connections: father, **Gary Stills**, played 10 years (1999-08) in the NFL with the Chiefs, Ravens and Rams; uncle, **Ken Stills**, played six years (1985-90) with the Packers and Vikings; cousin, **Kenny Stills**, played nine years (2013-21) with the Saints, Dolphins and Texans.

LB **Kyzir White** - Brother current free agent WR **Kevin White**, who was drafted by the Chicago Bears with the 7th overall pick in the 2015 NFL Draft and spent the 2019 offseason and training camp with the Cardinals.

QB **David Blough** - Brother-in-law is Patriots rookie CB **Christian Gonzalez**, who was selected by New England 17th overall in the 2023 NFL Draft. Blough is married to Gonzalez's sister, Olympic hurdler Melissa Gonzalez.

GANNON TAKES THE REINS

On Tuesday, February 14, the Cardinals announced **Jonathan Gannon** as the team's new head coach.

The 40-year old Gannon came to the Cardinals after spending the past two seasons (2021-22) as the defensive coordinator for the Philadelphia Eagles.

Under Gannon, the Eagles boasted a top-10 defense in each of the past two seasons, ranking 2nd in total defense in 2022 (301.5 ypg) and 10th in the NFL in 2021 (328.8 ypg). Last season the Eagles also featured the NFL's top-ranked pass defense (179.8 ypg) and the league's 8th ranked scoring defense (20.2 ppg).

Just two days prior to being hired in Arizona, Philadelphia played in Super Bowl LVII at State Farm Stadium after finishing the regular season as the #1 seed in the NFC with a 14-3 record. The Eagles made the postseason in each year Gannon was the defensive coordinator.

Has coached with three different teams (Eagles, Colts, Vikings) who have combined for six playoff berths in the last eight seasons.

MORE HIGHLIGHTS FROM PHILADELPHIA

In 2022, the Eagles easily led the NFL with a franchise single-season record 70 sacks in the regular season. No other team in the NFL had more than 55.

Philadelphia's 70 sacks in 2022 were the most by any team in a single season since the 1989 Minnesota Vikings (71). Combined with their eight sacks in the postseason, the Eagles 78 total sacks in 2022 were the third-most in NFL history behind only the 1984 (82 sacks) and 1985 Chicago Bears (80 sacks).

Since individual sacks became an official stat in 1982, Philadelphia became the first team ever to have four different players with 10.0+ sacks in a single season when they did so in 2022: Haason Reddick (16.0), Brandon Graham (11.0), Javon Hargrave (11.0) and Josh Sweat (11.0).

Between 2021-22, the Eagles defense led the NFL with 99 sacks, ranked 3rd in total defense (315.1 ypg), 3rd in pass defense (200.4 ypg), 6th in tackles for loss (168), tied for 4th in total return TDs (7) and interception return TDs (4) and tied for 10th in interceptions (29).

In his first season with the Eagles in 2021, directed the NFL's 10th-ranked defense (328.8 ypg). Philadelphia had the 2nd-most defensive TDs (5) and allowed the 5th-fewest explosive plays (117) in the league, also finished 9th in opponent rushing yards per game (107.9) and opponent three-and-out percentage (33.1%).

GANNON'S BACKGROUND

A Cleveland, OH native, Gannon has 15 years of experience in the NFL. Prior to working with the Eagles, he was the DBs/CBs coach with the Colts (2018-20) and the assistant DBs/quality control coach with the Vikings (2014-17) after working as a defensive assistant with the Titans (2012-13).

Spent three seasons (2009-11) as a scout with the St. Louis Rams after beginning his NFL coaching career as a defensive assistant with the Atlanta Falcons in 2007.

Played collegiately as a safety at Louisville and appeared in nine games as a red-shirt freshman in 2002 before suffering a career-ending hip injury in his first career start at Cincinnati.



ARIZONA'S COORDINATORS

PETZING LEADS THE OFFENSE

Drew Petzing is in his first season with the Cardinals and 10th in the NFL after being hired as Arizona's offensive coordinator in February. Prior to coming to AZ, Petzing spent three seasons (2020-22) with Cleveland, including last year as QBs coach.



With the Browns in 2022, QB Jacoby Brissett started 11 games and completed 236-of-369 passes for 2,608 yards, 12 TDs and an 88.9 QB rating. Brissett's 63.9 completion percentage and 88.9 passer rating were both career highs.

Prior to Cleveland, he spent six seasons (2014-19) coaching with Minnesota. As the Vikings WRs coach in 2019, WR Stefon Diggs set a then career-high with 1,130 receiving yards and finished 4th in the league that season with a 17.9-yard average on 63 receptions.

Working with Kirk Cousins in 2018, the Vikings QB set a team record for completions (425), threw for the third-most passing yards (4,298), had the second-highest completion percentage (70.1) and recorded the fourth-highest passer rating (99.7) by a Viking in team history.

RALLIS TAKES THE REINS ON DEFENSE

Nick Rallis was hired as Arizona's defensive coordinator in February after spending the past two seasons (2021-22) coaching LBs in Philadelphia. Prior to working with the Eagles, Rallis spent three seasons (2018-20) with the Minnesota Vikings as defensive quality control/assistant linebackers coach.



Having turned 30 on July 13th, he is the youngest coordinator in the NFL.

Helped Eagles LB T.J. Edwards to a career season in 2022 as he finished with 159 tackles, 2.0 sacks, seven passes defended, 10 tackles for loss and a fumble recovery. His 159 tackles ranked 7th in the NFL in 2022 and represented the highest single-season total for an Eagles defender since Byron Evans (175) in 1992.

With the Vikings, Rallis coached LB Eric Kendricks who was selected to his first Pro Bowl and was named first-team All-Pro in 2019 after having a career-high and team-leading 110 tackles to go along with 12 passes defended, tied for the most among NFL linebackers.

RODGERS STILL IN CHARGE OF SPECIAL TEAMS

Jeff Rodgers is in his sixth season with the Cardinals and fifth as the team's assistant head coach/special teams coordinator. He came to Arizona in January, 2018 as the team's special teams coordinator and added the title of assistant head coach in 2019.



Rodgers is in his 20th NFL season after previously coaching special teams with Chicago (2015-17), Denver (2011-14), Carolina (2009-10) and San Francisco (2003-07).

K Matt Prater had 137 points in 2021, the second-highest total in franchise history and tied for the fourth-highest total in the NFL that season. In just 30 games over two seasons (2021-22) under Rodgers, Prater connected on 12 FGs of 50+ yards, the second-most for any player in team history.

P Andy Lee finished in the top-five in the NFL in punting average three times over the past five seasons (2018-22), including leading the league with a 48.6-yard average in 2018.

TERRELL COORINATES PASS GAME

Drew Terrell is in his sixth season in the NFL and first with the Cardinals as passing game coordinator/WRs. He came to AZ after coaching WRs in Washington the past three years (2020-22).



During his three-year (2020-22) tenure coaching receivers with the Commanders, guided WR Terry McLaurin to three consecutive 1,000+ yard receiving seasons and his first Pro Bowl selection in 2022.

A Chandler, AZ native, Terrell attended Hamilton High School and received All-State honors as both a WR and punt returner. He helped the Huskies win three regional championships and two 5A Division I state titles.

PHILLY "D" AMONG NFL'S BEST UNDER GANNON

One of the main factors in the Eagles reaching the Super Bowl last season was the performance of the team's defense under then-second year coordinator **Jonathan Gannon**.

- 4th season with AZ and 5th NFL season, after joining the team in 2020.

- 1st season with AZ and 1st NFL season, joined the Cardinals following 12 years at the college level.
- Coached TEs last season at the Univ. of Florida following two seasons (2020-21) as RBs coach at Michigan State.

- 2nd season with AZ and 2nd NFL season, after spending last year as assistant to the head coach.

- 1st season with AZ and 1st NFL season. Joined the Cardinals following five years (2018-22) as RBs coach at Eastern Michigan.
- Two-year starter at Northern Colorado (2006-10) at TE, appearing in 31 games on special teams.

SHEA THOMPSON - DIR. FOOTBALL PERFORMANCE

- 8th NFL season is his 1st with the Cardinals. Came to AZ following four years (2019-22) with the 49ers.
- Prior to entering the NFL with Cincinnati (2016), spent nine seasons (2007-15) at the college level with Nebraska, N. Illinois and Minnesota.



PATRICK TONEY - DEFENSIVE BACKS

- Following 11 seasons (2012-22) at the college level, begins his 1st season in AZ and 1st in the NFL.
- During his time in the college ranks coached the secondary, safeties, OLBs and also spent time as a defensive coordinator.



SPENCER WHIPPLE - PASS GAME SPECIALIST

- 5th season with AZ and 5th NFL season, after joining the team in 2019 as an offensive quality control coach.
- Began career on the college level, spending seven seasons (2012-18) at Pitt and UMass.



ISRAEL WOOLFORK - QUARTERBACKS

- 1st season with AZ and 2nd NFL season. Spent last season in Cleveland as asst. QBs coach under Drew Petzing.
- Three-year starter at Grand Valley State (2008-12) at WR, earning all-conference honors as a senior and was voted a team captain.

ELEVATING A FRANCHISE

Owner **Michael Bidwill** has been steering the Cardinals organization for nearly two decades. His leadership during that time has been instrumental in transforming the franchise both on and off the field.

Highlights of Bidwill's tenure:

- Michael continues a tradition of Bidwill ownership of the Cardinals that dates back to his grandfather, Hall of Famer Charles Bidwill, who purchased the team in 1933.
- Of the franchise's seven all-time postseason wins, five have come during Michael's tenure leading the organization. Arizona has played in 10 postseason contests over the last 16 seasons, after having appeared in just seven total playoff games prior.
- Arizona has appeared in the NFC Championship Game twice since 2008 including a victory in the 2008 conference title game that led to the franchise's first-ever Super Bowl appearance (Super Bowl XLIII).
- With an 11-6 record in 2021, the Cardinals reached 11+ wins in a season for the sixth time in franchise history. Three of those six 11-win campaigns came with Michael leading the team: 13 in 2015, 11 in 2014, 11 in 2021.
- Among Bidwill's most substantial accomplishments with the Cardinals is the creation of State Farm Stadium. The world-class venue has proved a critical turning point for the franchise, an economic engine for the state of Arizona, and a crucial resource in the battle against the COVID-19 pandemic.
- On February 12, 2023, State Farm Stadium hosted Super Bowl LVII – the third Super Bowl held at the venue since it opened in 2006. State Farm Stadium also hosted Super Bowls XLII (following 2007 season) and XLIX (following 2014 season).
- In addition to his role in helping Arizona land three Super Bowls, Michael was also instrumental in getting the 2015 Pro Bowl moved to State Farm Stadium; played a week before Super Bowl XLIX, the two events combined to deliver a record economic impact of \$720 million to the region.
- Since State Farm Stadium opened in 2006, the Cardinals have sold out 163 games at the venue (every non-pandemic game played there).
- In 2022, the Cardinals made their first-ever appearance on *Hard Knocks*, television's most acclaimed sports reality franchise. Arizona was the second team to be featured on *Hard Knocks In Season*, which documented the second half of the Cardinals 2022 campaign in real time.
- In January of 2016, the National Football Foundation (NFF) and College Hall of Fame inducted Bidwill and Governor Doug Ducey into the NFF Leadership Hall of Fame.

A NEW GM IN THE DESERT

On January 16, the Cardinals announced the hiring of **Monti Ossenfort** as the team's general manager.

Ossenfort came to Arizona with 21 years of NFL experience (2002-22). That includes 15 with the New England Patriots and the past three as Director of Player Personnel with the Tennessee Titans.

During his time in New England, Ossenfort helped the Patriots win four Super Bowl titles and earn seven Super Bowl appearances overall. In 21 total NFL seasons, his teams earned postseason berths 16 times.



"It was critically-important for us to find the right person to lead us as General Manager and there is no doubt in my mind that we have that in Monti Ossenfort," said Cardinals owner **Michael Bidwill**. *"He possesses every attribute of a successful GM – passion, leadership, intelligence, work ethic – and his extensive experience has clearly prepared him for this role. We could not be more thrilled to have Monti and his family joining the Cardinals."*

Over the course of his 15 seasons with New England, Ossenfort served as the Director of College Scouting (2014-19), Assistant Director of College Scouting (2011-13), National Scout (2008-10), Area Scout (2006-07) and a Personnel Assistant (2003).

The 44-year old Ossenfort started his tenure in the NFL with Minnesota as a training camp intern in 2001 and worked with the Texans as a pro personnel intern in 2002. After spending 2003 with the Patriots, Ossenfort returned to Houston where he spent two seasons (2004-05) with the Texans as a pro and college scouting assistant. He rejoined the Patriots in 2006 where remained through the 2019 season.

Ossenfort was a four-year letterman and two-year starter at quarterback for the University of Minnesota-Morris and graduated from the school in 2000 with a degree in Economics and Management. He later earned a master's degree in Business Administration and Sports Management from Ohio University.

A native of Luverne, MN, Ossenfort and his wife, Shannon, have three daughters, Emery, Finley and Landry.

TRADES HIGHLIGHT OSSENFORT'S FIRST DRAFT

"I'm not going to lie, it was exciting. Man, it was awesome." - Monti Ossenfort on first draft as GM.

Ossenfort kept busy during the 2023 NFL Draft in his first season as the Cardinals GM, earning rave reviews for his work.

That included executing four trades in the first three rounds.

Arizona entered the 2023 NFL Draft with eight selections. The Cardinals used only three of those original picks (#168, #180, #213) - including one (#168) - that was traded to Detroit in round one only to be acquired back by Arizona in day two.

CORYELL JOINS THE HALL OF FAME

Former Cardinals head coach Don Coryell was among the nine individuals inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame Class of 2023 at the Hall's enshrinement ceremony on Saturday (8/5) in Canton, OH.



Coryell served as the Cardinals head coach from 1973-77, compiling a 42-29-1 record with the team. His 42 wins as head coach rank as the third-highest total in franchise history and Coryell was the first coach in team history to lead the Cardinals to 10+ wins in three consecutive seasons. Coryell led the Cardinals to back-to-back division titles in 1974-75. After leading the Cardinals to a 10-4 record and an NFC Eastern Division title in 1974, Coryell was named the Associated Press NFL Coach of the Year.

"Don Coryell was a leader, an innovator and truly deserving of enshrinement in the Pro Football Hall of Fame," said Cardinals owner **Michael Bidwill**. "His impact on the sport was profound, particularly in revolutionizing the passing game that is so prolific today. As head coach, he led one of the most successful and exciting periods of Cardinals football. Coach Coryell will always have a special place in our organization's history and now he will forever have a place in Canton among the game's all-time greats as well."

Under Coryell, the Cardinals became known as the "Cardiac Cards" for their thrilling brand of football. In 1975 the team won five games in the final minute and the next season, eight of the team's 10 wins were decided by seven points or fewer.

Known for his innovative "Air Coryell" passing attack which produced some of the top passing offenses in NFL history, Coryell spent 14 seasons as a head coach in the NFL with the Cardinals (1973-77) and Chargers (1978-86) and compiled a 111-83-1 record (.572) while earning five division titles.

In a coaching career that spanned 36 years, Coryell was the first coach ever to win more than 100 games at both the college and NFL level. A former defensive back at the University of Washington, he was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1999. Coryell passed away in 2010 at the age of 85.

WR MICHAEL WILSON

Father, **Orville**, was born and raised in Jamaica while his mom, **Ngairé**, was born and raised in New Zealand. His aunt, **Maureen Jacobson**, played soccer for the New Zealand World Cup team and was the first women's player inducted into the Wellington Football Hall of Fame.

LB BJ OJULARI

A descendant of Nigerian royalty. His maternal grandfather was **Olaniyi Osuntoki**, who later changed his name to *Prince Twins Seven-Seven* (he was the sole survivor of his parents' seven sets of twins). A world-renowned artist, singer and dancer, Seven Seven had multiple hit records as a musician and his artwork was featured in the National Museum of African American Art at the Smithsonian. In the late 1890s, Prince Twins Seven-Sevens' grandfather was the King of Ibadan, a city in southwestern Nigeria.

OL BADARA TRAORE

His parents hail from Africa; father, **Bakary**, was born in Bamako, the capital and largest city in Mali; mother, **Rougiatou Kaba**, grew up in Conakry, Guinea.

OL WILL HERNANDEZ

His parents, **Robert Hernandez** and **Angelica Lemus**, moved to the United States from Mexico prior to his birth. His grandparents hail from Mexico City. Hernandez's father was a professional soccer player in Mexico.

DL LEKI FOTU

Both his parents - late father, **Likiliki**, and mother, **Toa**, were born and raised on the Pacific island nation of Tonga.

QB KYLER MURRAY

When the Cardinals selected him the #1 overall pick in the 2019 NFL Draft, Murray became the first Asian-American ever selected #1 overall; Murray is one quarter Korean; his father is African American and his mother, **Missy**, is half Korean; Kyler's maternal grandmother is from South Korea.

OL PARIS JOHNSON JR. - ROUND 1 (6TH) - OHIO STATE

• **First offensive lineman taken in the draft and the fourth offensive player behind QBs Bryce Young, C.J. Stroud and Anthony Richardson.**

• Taken #6 overall by the Cardinals, **became the highest-drafted offensive lineman out of Ohio State since Orlando Pace was picked #1 overall by the Rams in 1997.**

• **Graduated from Ohio State in less than three years, earning a degree in Journalism.** An All-American on the field, he was also a credentialed member of the media while working for the school newspaper, The Lantern. Johnson has also learned to speak Mandarin Chinese and Portuguese.

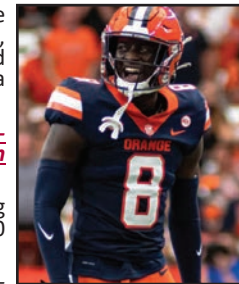
CB GARRETT WILLIAMS - ROUND 3a (72ND) - SYRACUSE

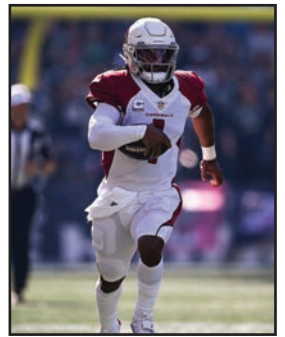

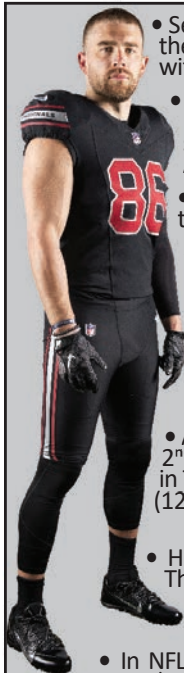

ZACH ERTZ - AT A GLANCE



- Selected by Philadelphia in the 2nd round (35th overall) of the 2013 NFL Draft and was acquired by Arizona in a trade with the Eagles in Week 6 of the 2021 season.
- A three-time Pro Bowl selection (2017-19), has appeared in 144 games (106 starts) during the regular season with 682 receptions for 7,247 yards and 45 TDs. Also has 12 games with 100+ receiving yards.
- In eight career playoff games (six starts), has 36 receptions for 381 yards and two TDs.
- Caught game-winning TD in Super Bowl LII that gave the Eagles a 38-33 lead with just over two minutes left in regulation.

- Playing his first game with Arizona in Week 7 vs. Houston, caught a 47-yard TD reception. Combined with his five-yard TD catch in Week 6 in his final game with Philly, became the first player in NFL history with a TD reception in back-to-back games in a season for two different teams.
- Ertz (6) joins Tony Gonzalez (14), Jason Witten (9), Travis Kelce (8) and Antonio Gates (6) as the only TEs in NFL history with at least six seasons of 70+ receptions.
- Ertz (7) joins Tony Gonzalez (14), Jason Witten (12), Antonio Gates (10), Shannon Sharpe (9) and Travis Kelce (9) as the only TEs in NFL history with at least seven seasons of 700+ receiving yards.

AMONG NFL'S MOST PROLIFIC TIGHT ENDS

Since entering the NFL as a second round (35th overall) pick by the Eagles in the 2013 NFL Draft, Ertz has developed into one of the most prolific TEs in NFL history.

TE Zach Ertz was among the Cardinals top offensive weapons in 11 games with the team in 2021 - after he was acquired in an October trade with the Philadelphia Eagles.

He was even better in 2022 before a knee injury cut his season short after 10 games. At the time of his injury, Ertz ranked second in the NFL among TEs with 47 receptions.

JAMES CONNER - AT A GLANCE



- Signed a one-year contract with the Cardinals on 4/13/21 as an unrestricted free agent following four seasons (2017-20) with Pittsburgh. Re-signed with Arizona in March of 2022, agreeing to a three-year contract.
- He is a two-time Pro Bowl selection (2018, '21), two-time Player of the Week (Week 8 of 2018; Week 8 of 2019) and one-time Player of the Month (October of 2018) selection.

CARDINALS HIGHLIGHTS

- Earned Pro Bowl honors for the second time in his career during his inaugural season with Arizona in 2021, becoming just the fifth Cardinals RB to be named to the Pro Bowl during his first season with the team: Ollie Matson (1952), Johnny Roland (1966), Ottis Anderson (1979) and Johnny Johnson (1990).
- Has scored 26 TDs in his first 28 games with the Cardinals. In franchise history only RB David Johnson (28) had more TDs in his first 28 games with the team. Conner's 26 TDs rank second in the NFL (Austin Ekeler - 38) over the last two seasons (2021-22). His 22 rushing TDs are tied for the most in franchise history in a player's first 28 games with the team.
- Finished the 2022 season with 1,082 scrimmage yards and eight TDs in 13 games. It marked his second consecutive season with 1,000+ scrimmage yards in Arizona, after posting just one 1,000-yard campaign in four years with Pittsburgh.
- Earned Pro Bowl honors in 2021 after playing in 15 games (six starts) during the regular season, finishing the year with 752 yards and 15 rushing TDs on 202 rushing attempts while adding 37 receptions for 375 yards and three TDs. Also scored the Cardinals lone TD in the Wild Card matchup.
- His 18 total TDs in 2021 marked the second-highest single-season total in Cardinals history and ranked third in the NFL that year. His 15 rushing TDs also represented the second-highest single-season total in team annals and ranked second in the NFL.
- All 18 of his TDs during the 2021 regular season came in his final 13 games played. Had six games with multiple TDs in '21, joining RB David Johnson (8 in 2016) as the only players in franchise history to have at least six such performances in a single season.
- Had at least one TD (rushing or receiving) in seven consecutive games (Games 7-13) in 2021, tied for the longest streak in franchise history. Included in that stretch was a streak of five straight games with a rushing TD, tying the longest such streak in team history.
- Rushed for two TDs in a Week 10 win at the Los Angeles Rams in 2022, marking the 13th game of his career with two-or-more TDs. Since entering the NFL in 2017, his 13 games with two-or-more TDs is tied for the sixth-most league-wide among RBs.

- In 2022 had a streak of six consecutive games with a TD (Games 10-15), tying the third longest streak in team history. In the Cardinals first 101 seasons (1920-20) as an NFL franchise, a player had a streak of six consecutive games with a TD in a single season just twice. Conner has had a streak of 6+ games in each of the last two seasons.

CAREER/PERSONAL HIGHLIGHTS

- Earned his first career Pro Bowl selection with the Steelers in 2018, when he rushed for 12 TDs (third in the NFL) and 973 yards on 215 carries (4.5 avg.) while catching 55 passes for 497 yards a TD in just 13 games.
- With the Steelers, appeared in 50 games (33 starts) and ran for 2,302 yards and 22 TDs on 532 carries (4.3-yard avg.) along with 124 receptions for 963 yards and four TDs.
- After tearing his MCL during the first game of his junior year at the University of Pittsburgh (2015), attended rehab and began experiencing excessive fatigue and other concerning symptoms, leading doctors to perform a chest X-ray that revealed Hodgkin's Lymphoma. He endured 12 rounds of chemotherapy and completed his last chemo appointment on May 9, 2016. On May 23, 2016, he announced that he was cancer free.
- The doctor who treated Conner, Dr. Stanley Marks, started the Stanley M. Marks Blood Cancer Research Fund and at his annual fundraiser gives out the "James Conner Courage Award." Conner was on hand in 2022 to present the award to Carrie Richards, one of the nurses who helped in his treatment and later went through the same diagnosis.
- Played in 39 games in four seasons at Pitt (2013-16), and left ranked second in school history in rushing yards (3,733), total TDs (56) and rushing TDs (52), trailing only Tony Dorsett in all three.

#6 EXCEEDS 1,000 FOR SECOND STRAIGHT YEAR

RB James Conner finished the 2022 season with 1,082 scrimmage yards in 13 games played.

After posting 1,000+ scrimmage yards just once in his first four NFL seasons (2017-20) with Pittsburgh, Conner surpassed 1,000 scrimmage yards in both seasons with the Cardinals (1,127 in 2021).

Conner rushed for 782 yards and seven TDs on 183 carries (4.3 avg.) in 2022. His 782 rushing yards represent the second-best single-season total of his career (973 in 2018).

A STRONG FINISH IN 2022

Conner had his six best rushing yardage totals of the season in his last seven games played.

In that seven-game stretch, Conner rushed for 537 yards and six TDs on 122 carries (4.4 avg.).

After posting 75+ rushing yards just twice in his first 23 games with the Cardinals, Conner had 75+ rushing yards in four of his last five games played in 2022.

Against the Chargers in Week 12, Conner rushed for 120 yards on 25 carries (4.8 avg.). **It was his first 100-yard outing as a member of the Cardinals.**



CONNER UPS THE SCORING IN ARIZONA

After scoring one TD in his first six games played last season, RB **James Conner** had seven TDs in his last seven games played.

Conner signed with the Cardinals as a free agent in 2021 and has 26 TDs since then. Only Chargers RB Austin Ekeler (38) had more TDs over the last two seasons (2021-22).

DORTCH MAKES MOST OF OPPORTUNITIES IN 2022

During his first four seasons (2018-21) in the NFL, WR Greg Dortch spent time with five teams (Jets, Panthers, Rams, Falcons and Cardinals) and was released six different times.

He appeared in just seven games and had three receptions for 15 yards during that span. In his second season with Arizona in 2022, Dortch developed into a key contributor for the Cardinals.

In 16 games (4 starts) in 2022, Dortch had:

- **52 receptions for 467 yards and 2 TDs**
- **7 rush attempts for 44 yards**
- **26 punt returns for 172 yards**
- **11 kickoff returns for 218 yards**

He joined DeAndre Hopkins and Rondale Moore as the only Cardinals players with multiple games of 90+ receiving yards in 2022 - including his first-ever 100-yard game (103) vs. San Francisco in Week 11 on Monday Night Football.

DORTCH HIGHLIGHTS IN 2022

WEEK 16 VS. TAMPA BAY: Against the Buccaneers on Sunday Night Football, Dortch finished with a career-high 123 scrimmage yards. He had 98 receiving yards on a career-high 10 receptions while also finishing with a career-high 25 rushing yards on three carries.

WEEK 11 VS. SAN FRANCISCO: Against the 49ers in Mexico City on Monday Night Football, Dortch hauled in 9 receptions for 103 yards. It was the first 100-yard receiving performance of his career.

WEEK 2 AT LAS VEGAS: Dortch scored his first career TD in the OT win over the Raiders, hauling in a five-yard catch in the third quarter. It was Dortch's first TD catch since in his sophomore year at Wake Forest in 2018.



HOLLYWOOD LEADS THE WAY IN 2022

Acquired via trade during the first round of the 2022 NFL Draft, WR Marquise Brown played 12 games (10 starts) in his first season with the Cardinals and led the team in receptions (67) and ranked second in receiving yards (709) while adding three TD catches.

Brown was off to the best start of his career in 2022 before suffering a foot injury in Week 6 that forced him to IR. He missed five games before returning in Week 12 vs. the Chargers.

In his first six games played prior to the injury, Brown led the team in receptions (43), receiving yards (485) and TD receptions (3).

Only two players in franchise history had more receptions through the first six games of a season than Brown had in 2022 (43).

MOORE STAYS HOT DESPITE INJURIES

Second-year WR Rondale Moore struggled with injuries at the beginning and the end of the 2022 season, but his performance in the eight games he did appear in showed the type of explosive talent he can be.

In eight games played (which includes one in which he played just two snaps), Moore totaled 41 receptions for 414 yards and a TD.

Moore was playing the best football of his NFL career when he suffered a season-ending injury early in the Week 11 matchup vs. San Francisco.

In his final three full games played in 2022, Moore had 24 receptions for 255 yards and a TD. A look at how good Moore was over that stretch:

- **Of his 3 career outings with 90+ receiving yards, 2 came in those last 3 games: 92 @ Min & 94 @ LAR**
- **Of his 6 career outings with 7+ receptions, 3 came in those last 3 games: 7 @ Min; 8 vs. Sea; 9 @ LAR**
- **In his first 18 career games Moore had 60+ receiving yards 3 times; he had 60+ in each of the last 3 full games he played in 2022**

Moore's last full game played was the Week 10 win over the Rams in Los Angeles when he finished with nine receptions for 94 yards. Of those 94 yards, 26 came on a spectacular one-handed catch along the sideline on a 4th-n-3, extending a drive that resulted in a TD two plays later.



AZ FEATURES A DEEP THREAT IN BROWN

On the first day of the 2022 NFL Draft, the Cardinals sent their first-round pick (#23 overall) to the Baltimore Ravens in exchange for WR Marquise "Hollywood" Brown and the Ravens '22 third-round pick (#100 overall).

Baltimore's first round pick (25th overall) in the 2019 NFL Draft, **Brown has 262 receptions for 3,070 yards and 24 TDs in 58 games (51 starts) in his career.**

Since he entered the league in 2019, only five players in the NFL have more TD receptions of 20+ yards than Brown (13). Only five have more TD catches of 40+ yards than Brown (7).

THE RELATIONSHIP RUNS DEEP

WR Marquise Brown received his nickname "Hollywood" during his time at the University of Oklahoma. It was with the Sooners that Brown met - and became best friends with - Cardinals QB **Kyler Murray**.

Brown and Murray played together with the Sooners for two seasons (2017-18), including in 2018 when Brown had 75 receptions for 1,318 yards and 10 TDs. That season, Brown led the nation in receptions of 40+ yards (11), 50+ yards (7) and 60+ yards (4) and Murray won the Heisman Trophy.

They were both selected in the first round of the 2019 NFL Draft - Murray #1 overall to Arizona and Brown #25 overall to Baltimore. Even though they were not playing together, the two continued to work out together in the offseason.

"In college you go through more with your quarterback than in the NFL," Brown said of the tight bond. "Me and Kyler, we got in together, we were on the 'B' squad against the starting defense (at Oklahoma) to all the way to both of us playing."



MCCOY GETS PLAYING TIME IN ARIZONA

QB **Colt McCoy** has received significant playing time as **Kyler Murray's** backup over the last two seasons. Some highlights of his time in Arizona:

• Appeared in more games in two seasons (2021-22) with the Cardinals (12) than he did in the previous six seasons (2015-20) combined with the Commanders and Giants (11).

• Made more starts in two seasons with the Cardinals (6) than he did in the previous six seasons combined (5).

• In 6 starts with the Cardinals, McCoy posted a 3-3 record. In those contests he completed 131-of-182 pass attempts (72.0%) for 1,218 yards, 4 TDs, 3 INTs and a 90.4 passer rating. McCoy was credited with a loss at Denver in Week 15 of 2022 despite Arizona leading 6-3 when he left in the 3rd quarter due to a concussion.

• McCoy has more wins in six games as a starter with the Cardinals (3) than he had in his previous nine seasons (2012-20) combined (2) with the Browns, 49ers, Commanders and Giants.



BUDDA BAKER - AT A GLANCE

• Selected by the Cardinals in the second round (36th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft out of Washington, Baker has appeared in 93 games (83 starts) during the regular season.

• A five-time Pro Bowl selection, three-time All-Pro honoree, one-time NFC Defensive Player of the Month (Oct. 2020) and one-time NFC Defensive Player of the Week (Week 6 in 2020).

NFL LEADER

• The 2022 season marked his fourth season with 100+ tackles. Dating back to his first season as a starter in 2018, Baker is the only DB in the NFL with at least four seasons of 100+ tackles.

• Over the last five seasons (2018-22), leads all NFL DBs in total tackles (574) and solo tackles (409). His 574 total tackles are 97 more than the player who ranks second on the list (Jessie Bates III - 477).

CARDINALS HISTORY

• Voted a team captain for the third consecutive year (2020-22) and earned his fifth Pro Bowl selection as a starter (fourth consecutive at safety) in 2022.

• Became just the third player in Cardinals history to receive at least five Pro Bowl selections in his first six NFL seasons joining Patrick Peterson (6) and Ollie Matson (6).

• Led the team with 111 tackles in just 15 games in 2022, adding seven passes defended, two INTs, two QB hits and a fumble recovery.

• In 2021, was named a team captain and earned Pro Bowl and second-team All-Pro honors after posting 98 tackles and establishing career-best marks in INTs (three) and passes defended (seven). Also added a fumble recovery, six tackles for loss and three QB hits.

• Named a team captain for the first time, earned first-team All-Pro honors and was selected to his third Pro Bowl (second consecutive at safety) in 2020, joining CB Patrick Peterson (4) as the only players in Cardinals history to earn at least three Pro Bowl selections before their 25th birthday. Matched a team high and tied for the NFL lead among DBs with 118 tackles while adding seven tackles for loss, 2.0 sacks, three QB hits, two INTs, six passes defended and a forced fumble over 15 games.

• Earned his second Pro Bowl nod (first at safety) in 2019 becoming the first player in franchise history selected to the Pro Bowl as a special teamer and as a position player. Started all 16 games and led all NFL DBs with a career-high 147 tackles (including a league-high 104 solo tackles) and posted seven tackles for loss, six passes defended, six QB hits, a half-sack, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery.

• In 2018, appeared in 14 games (13 starts) and totaled 107 tackles, eight tackles for loss, 2.0 sacks, three QB pressures, four QB hits, two passes defended, a forced fumble and two fumble recoveries (one returned 36 yards for his first career TD); one of just three NFL safeties with 100+ tackles, 2.0+ sacks and 8+ tackles for loss in 2018, according to league statistics.

• Named first-team All-Pro and was voted to the Pro Bowl for his work on special teams as a rookie in 2017 after he led the Cardinals and ranked third in the NFL with 16 special teams tackles. One of just four rookies named to the Pro Bowl in 2017 and became just the fifth Cardinals rookie since the 1970 merger to be named to the Pro Bowl.

• Became the fourth player in Cardinals history to be voted "NFC Defensive Player" of the Month (October, 2020) with 31 tackles, 2.0 sacks, two INTs (90 return yards), three tackles for loss, three QB hits, two passes defended and a forced fumble in three games.

PERSONAL

• During a remarkable prep career at Bellevue High School, won five team state titles (three in football, two in track & field) and eight individual state titles in track & field. In football, he played safety, running back and return specialist on a team that won 42 consecutive games and three consecutive 3A Washington State Championships. Won both the Seattle Times State Football Player of the Year and Male Athlete of the Year as a senior in 2013.

• Rushed for 101 yards and a score in the 2013 state title game. Scored on a 61-yard run and a 71-yard punt return in the 2012 state championship game. Scored on an 89-yard kickoff return in Bellevue's 2011 state title victory.

• Given first name is Bishard. Nicknamed "Budda" by his mother and aunt when he was a child and the name stuck.



BAKER REACHES 100 FOR THE FOURTH TIME

Pro Bowl S Budda Baker posted 111 tackles in 15 games played in 2022 before a shoulder injury forced him to miss the final two games of the season. Through Week 16, his 111 tackles ranked fourth among NFL DBs.

Baker recorded his second INT of 2022 when he picked off a Brett Rypien pass at the AZ 1-yard line late in the third quarter at Denver in Week 15.

After going without an INT in his first 50 career games, Baker has seven INTs in his last 43 games played.



BAKER EARNS 5TH PRO BOWL SELECTION

S Budda Baker was selected as a starter for the NFC squad in the Pro Bowl in 2022.

• Named to his 5th Pro Bowl and 4th consecutive selection at safety after being chosen as a special teamer during his rookie campaign in 2017.

• Became just the third player in Cardinals history to receive at least five Pro Bowl nods in his first six NFL seasons joining Patrick Peterson (6) and Ollie Matson (6).

• Became just the third player in franchise history named to the Pro Bowl as a safety at least four times joining Hall of Famer Larry Wilson (8) and Adrian Wilson (5).

• Is the only safety in the NFL named to the Pro Bowl each of the last four seasons (2019-22).

• Only two other active DBs have earned at least five Pro Bowl selections in their first six NFL seasons - CBs Patrick Peterson (6) and Jalen Ramsey (5). Just two active NFL DBs have more career Pro Bowls than Baker: Peterson (8) and S Harrison Smith (6).



TWO SAFETIES TOP 105 IN 2022

S Budda Baker (111) and S Jalen Thompson (109) both totaled over 105 tackles during the 2022 campaign. Some highlights of the duo's significant season in the secondary:

• Among DBs, Baker and Thompson were one of two sets of teammates to each register 105+ tackles in 2022 (S Jalen Pitre & S Jonathan Owens, Hou).

• Baker (7th) and Thompson (8th) both finished in the top 10 in tackles among DBs in 2022.

• It marked Thompson's second consecutive season with 105+ tackles (121 in 2021) and Baker's third time accomplishing the feat (147 in 2019 and 118 in 2020).

• Baker and Thompson are the first pair of Cardinals DBs since at least 2000 to each register 105+ tackles in a single season.

• Arizona has had a DB register 105+ tackles in each of the past five seasons.



WHITE FOLLOWS GANNON & RALLIS TO AZ

New to the Cardinals defense in 2023 is LB **Kyzir White** - signed by Arizona as a free agent in the offseason.

After spending his first four NFL seasons (2018-21) with the Chargers, White played last season in Philadelphia under then-defensive coordinator **Jonathan Gannon** and LBs coach **Nick Rallis**.

WHITE CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Has played in 65 games (45 starts) during the regular season and has 387 tackles (243 solo), 16 tackles for loss, 3.0 sacks, four INTs, 17 passes defended and two forced fumbles.

- Appeared in all 17 regular season games (eight starts) last season with Philadelphia and had 110 tackles (66 solo), three tackles for loss, 1.5 sacks, seven passes defended and five QB pressures.

- With the Chargers in 2021, set career highs in games started (17), tackles (144), solo tackles (90), tackles for loss (7), INTs (2) and forced fumbles (2). He ranked third in the AFC in tackles in 2021 and had seven double-digit tackle games, the most for a Chargers player since 2008.



SIMMONS A PLAYMAKER FOR CARDS "D"

In his third year playing LB in 2022, **Isaiah Simmons** was one of the Cardinals top defenders. **He has now transitioned to safety heading into the 2023 season.**

In his last 11 games in 2022, Simmons recorded 75 tackles, two INTs (one returned for a TD), 4.0 sacks, seven passes defended, five tackles for loss, three QB hits, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery.

Simmons' stat sheet in 2022 highlighted - yet again - his ability to make plays all over the field, whether it be in the opponents backfield or in the secondary.

He had 99 tackles, 4.0 sacks, 5 tackles for loss, 4 QB hits, 2 INTs, 7 passes defended, 2 forced fumbles and a fumble recovery in 2022.

Simmons posted yet another solid season following a breakout campaign in 2021 when he totaled 103 tackles, 7 passes defended, an INT, 4 forced fumbles, 4 tackles for loss, 4 QB hits and 1.5 sacks. **He joined Colts All-Pro LB Shaquille Leonard as the only players in the NFL in 2021 with 100+ tackles, 4+ forced fumbles and 7+ passes defended.**



COLLINS BLOSSOMS IN YEAR TWO

In 2022, second-year LB **Zaven Collins** made an enormous leap. **In 16 games played, he finished third on the team with 100 tackles (63 solo) while adding 2.0 sacks, an INT (returned for a TD), 11 tackles for loss, four QB hits, a forced fumble and six passes defended.**

He had four-times as many tackles in 2022 as he had in his rookie campaign in 2021 (25).

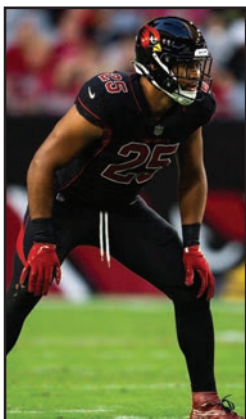

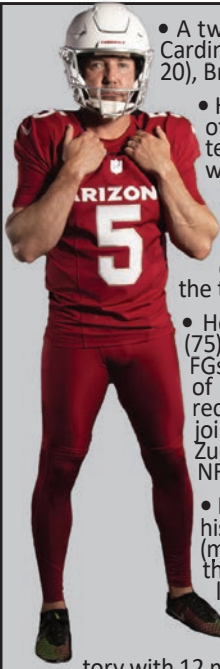

Started the last two games of the 2022 season for the Cardinals where he completed 38-of-58 passes (65.5%) for 402 yards and two TDs, including a 77-yard TD pass in Week 18.

Jeff Driskel – Has spent time with San Francisco (2016), Cincinnati (2016-19), Detroit (2019), Denver (2020), Houston (2021-22) and Arizona (2023). Has appeared in 23 games (11 starts) over the course of his career and completed 216-of-365 passes for 2,228 yards and 14 TDs.

Colt McCoy – Has completed 764-of-1,220 passes (62.6%) for 7,975 yards and 34 TDs in 56 career games (36 starts). Has played for Cleveland (2010-12), San Francisco (2013), Washington (2014-19), New York Giants (2020) and Arizona (2021-23) during his 14-year NFL career.

Corey Clement – Undrafted, the seven-year veteran has appeared in 71 games for the Eagles (2017-2020), Cowboys (2021) and Cardinals (2022-23). Registered 100 receiving yards in Super Bowl LII victory as a member of the Eagles.

James Conner – Two-time Pro Bowler (2018, 2021) who signed with Arizona in 2021 after four seasons (2017-20) with Pittsburgh. Has scored 26 TDs in 28 games with the Cardinals.

Emari Demercado – Undrafted rookie out of Texas Christian where he finished his career with 338 carries for 1,615 yards and 10 TDs.

Keaontay Ingram – Selected by Arizona in the sixth round (201st overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft out of USC. Scored his first career TD (three-yard run) last season in a win vs. New Orleans.

Stevie Scott – Most recently played in the USFL with the Michigan Panthers where he had 78 carries for 295 yards. Originally entered the NFL as a rookie free agent with the New Orleans Saints in 2021 out of Indiana University.

Pat Elflein – Eight-year NFL veteran who has started all but one of the 65 games he has appeared in with the Vikings (2017-20), Jets (2020) and Panthers (2021-22). Has seen substantial time at all three spots on the interior. Named to the PFWA All-Rookie Team after making 14 starts in 2017.

Lecitus Smith – Arizona's second pick in the sixth-round (215th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft out of Virginia Tech, where he appeared in 45 games at guard and left tackle. Appeared in 10 games and made two starts as a rookie.

Badara Traore – Originally entered the NFL as an undrafted free agent with Chicago. Has spent the majority of his career on practice squad with Chicago (2020), Jacksonville (2021) and Arizona (2022). Made his NFL debut in 2021 with the Jaguars. Appeared in one game in 2022 with the Cardinals.

Elijah Wilkinson – Has appeared in 66 games (36 starts) with Denver (2017-20), Chicago (2021) and Atlanta (2022). Helped block for a 1,000-yard rusher in four of his six seasons in the NFL, including each of his first three years.

Eric Banks – Originally entered the NFL as an undrafted free agent with the Rams in 2020. Spent his rookie season on the Rams practice squad. Appeared in four games and posted two tackles over the last two years with the Chargers (2021) and Cardinals (2022).

L.J. Collier – Was selected 29th overall by Seattle in the 2019 NFL Draft out of Texas Christian. Appeared in 45 games (16 starts) and tallied 40 tackles, five passes defended and 3.0 sacks in four seasons in Seattle (2019-22).

Leki Fotu – Selected by the Cardinals in the fourth round (114th overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft. Has appeared in 45 games (12 starts) for Arizona. Family hails from the island of Tonga.

Scored his first career TD after intercepting a Taysom Hill pass and returning it 29 yards in a win at New Orleans in 2021.

LINEBACKERS

David Anenih – Signed with Arizona on 7/29. Spent his rookie season in 2022 with Tennessee, Pittsburgh and Atlanta on both the practice squad and active roster. Earned All-American Conference honors as a senior at Houston in 2021.

Krys Barnes – Began his career as an undrafted free agent with Green Bay in 2020. Appeared in 35 games (24 starts) and totaled 186 tackles over three seasons with the Packers (2020-22). Joined Arizona during the 2023 offseason.

Zaven Collins – Selected by the Cardinals in the first round (16th overall) of the 2021 NFL Draft out of Tulsa. Posted career highs with 100 tackles, 2.0 sacks, 11.0 TFLs, a forced fumble, six passes defended and an INT returned for a TD in 2022.

BJ Ojulari – Cardinals second-round pick (41st overall) in the 2023 NFL Draft out of Louisiana State. Saw action in 34 games (24 starts) in three years at LSU (2020-22). Totaled 129 tackles and 16.5 sacks in his time as a Tiger. Brother is New York Giants LB Azeez Ojulari. At 21 years old, he is the youngest player on roster.

Owen Pappoe – Cardinals fifth-round pick (168th overall) in the 2023 NFL Draft out of Auburn. Started all 41 games he appeared in at Auburn and racked up 256 tackles, 15 for loss, in four seasons with the Tigers (2019-22). Was just the fourth player in program history to serve as a captain for multiple seasons. Earned third-team All-SEC honors in 2022.

Myjai Sanders – Selected by Arizona in the third round (100th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft out of Cincinnati. Saw action in the final 13 games of the season, including four starts. Produced 23 tackles and 3.0 sacks as a rookie.
