TEAM ANNOUNCES LAUNCH OF THE ARIZONA CARDINALS FOUNDATION

In July, the Cardinals announced the launch of the **Arizona Cardinals Foundation**, marking a powerful new chapter in the team's legacy of charitable giving.

Replacing what fans and partners have previously known as Cardinals Charities, this new Foundation will be specifically focused on supporting Arizona's special needs community and will serve as the central hub for all of the organization's charitable giving efforts.

"For decades, Cardinals Charities has made a meaningful difference across Arizona," said Cardinals Owner **Michael Bidwill**. "With the creation of the Arizona Cardinals Foundation, we're building on that legacy and taking our commitment to the next level. This strategic shift included the hiring of **Bob Hamer** as the Foundation's Executive Director earlier this year. Hamer and the Foundation team will focus their efforts on supporting families and individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDDs), including autism, down syndrome, traumatic brain injuries, and cerebral palsy.

"An estimated 1 in 20 people in the U.S. lives with an IDD," said Hamer. "As this community grows and ages, more support will be needed – and we aim to lead that effort. This mission is personal for so many people across our football operations, business front office, and fanbase and we're committed to making a lasting, sustainable impact for the IDD community throughout Arizona."

A centerpiece of the Foundation's launch is the announcement of four Cornerstone Beneficiaries, each of which will receive a three-year commitment from the Foundation to fund new and innovative programs that expand services, promote inclusion and create equal opportunities for those living with an IDD.

Those four partners are:

- **SARRC (Southwest Autism Research & Resource Center)**
- **Barrow Neurological Foundation**
- **Special Olympics Arizona**
- **Treasure House**

These partners were selected for their proven track records in the space and visionary ideas. Funding will support bold, innovative programs that bring long-term impact to individuals and families navigating life with special needs.

In addition to these Cornerstone Charitable partners, the Foundation will open its grant application process this fall for other nonprofits in the special needs community. MICHAEL J. BIDWILL

OWNER



NOTECARDS

- After 13 seasons (2007-19) as team president, Bidwill became owner following the 2019 passing of his father, Bill. Michael continues a tradition of Bidwill ownership of the Cardinals that dates back to his grandfather, Hall of Famer Charles Bidwill in 1933. After taking over as team president in 2007, Bidwill's leadership transformed the Cardinals both on and off the field.
- Over the last three years, that transformation has led to the significant and successful restructuring of both the football and business sides of the organization. That has included Bidwill's hiring of GM Monti Ossenfort and Head Coach Jonathan Gannon to lead the football operation and Chief Operating Officer Jeremy Walls to guide a revamped business structure.
- In the last two years, the transformation that Bidwill spearheaded has seen the team open new business offices and hire more than 100 new staff members, mostly in the areas of sales and service. After ranking third in the NFL in new season-ticket sales in 2024, the team has sold over 10,000 new season tickets in 2025, which is on pace to lead the league. That figure also represents the most season tickets sold during an off-season since State Farm Stadium opened in 2006.
- On the whole, Bidwill's most substantial accomplishment in his time leading the Cardinals is the creation of State Farm Stadium itself. The world-class venue has not only been critical for the franchise but has also resulted in over \$6 billion in economic impact for the state of Arizona.
- In response to the devastating wildfires that broke out in Los Angeles County in January of 2025, Bidwill led a remarkable effort to have State Farm Stadium serve as host to the Rams for their Wild Card matchup vs. the Vikings. Despite a short turnaround, State Farm Stadium hosted a sellout crowd in the first postseason game in NFL history to be moved due to a natural disaster.
- In April of 2025 Bidwill was inducted into the Arizona Sports Hall of Fame, which honors athletes, coaches, administrators and others who have made exceptional contributions to sports in Arizona. Michael joined his late father, Bill, as one of six members of the Cardinals organization ever selected for the honor.
- In May of 2025 Bidwill was named the recipient of the McCain Institute's "In The Arena Award". According to the McCain Institute, the honor is given to an individual who reflects the ways in which the late Senator John McCain proudly modeled and espoused the philosophy set forth in Teddy Roosevelt's famous 1910 "Man in the Arena" speech praising those who have the courage and determination to get in the arena and fight for a cause, rather than critiquing from the sidelines.
- Under Michael's direction in 2025, the organization launched Cardinals Premier Travel, a first-of-its-kind, elevated travel experience to give all fans the opportunity to see the team play on the road in unmatched comfort and convenience. The all-inclusive experience includes round-trip private air transportation aboard the team's wide-body Boeing 777-200ER aircraft, two-night hotel accommodations, in-city transportation, a pre-game tailgate experience, game tickets and an immediate return to Phoenix after the game, among many other perks.
- On February 12, 2023 State Farm Stadium hosted its third Super Bowl when a then-record 115.1 million viewers watched Super Bowl LVII. State Farm Stadium also hosted Super Bowls XLII (following 2007 season) and XLIX (following 2014 season).
- In addition to his role in helping Arizona land three Super Bowls, Michael was also instrumental in getting the 2015 Pro Bowl moved to State Farm Stadium; played a week before Super Bowl XLIX, the two events combined to deliver a record economic impact of \$720 million to the region.
- Since State Farm Stadium opened in 2006 the Cardinals have sold out every non-pandemic game played at the venue.
- Bidwill also created the highly-successful Civics Matters Arizona community initiative which sends hundreds of high school students from across the state aboard the Cardinals team plane on an educational trip to Washington D.C. The fourth-annual Civics Matters Arizona trip took place in July of 2025 and saw 275 students visit the nation's capital where they were given a red coat tour of the U.S. Capitol and a private tour of the Supreme Court, where they met with Supreme Court Justice Brett Kavanaugh. They also met with elected representatives and experienced instructor-led visits to monuments, memorials, museums, and government institutions, providing them an opportunity to learn about civics in a way that is both educational and fun.
- Of the franchise's seven all-time postseason wins, five have come during Michael's tenure leading the organization. Arizona has played in 10 postseason contests over the last 18 seasons (2007-24), after having appeared in just seven total playoff games prior.
- Arizona has appeared in the NFC Championship Game twice since 2008 including a victory in the 2008 conference title game that led to the franchise's first-ever Super Bowl appearance (Super Bowl XLIII).

Michael Bidwill practiced law for six years as a federal prosecutor but in 1996 returned to the team for which he had once been a ball boy. He represents his family's third generation of franchise leadership, following in the footsteps of grandfather Charles - a Pro Football Hall of Famer who purchased the team in 1933 - and his dad Bill, who handled day-to-day operations for decades.

CARDINALS LEADERSHIP: After initially serving as Vice President/General Counsel, Michael immediately transformed the franchise when he took over as team president in 2007. Since that time, the Cardinals have posted five double-digit win seasons (none in previous 20 years), including a franchise-record 13 victories in 2015. Of the Cardinals' seven postseason wins, five have come during Bidwill's tenure leading the franchise.



In 2021, Arizona posted an 11-6 record on its way to its fifth postseason berth under Michael's leadership. It marked the third time (13 in 2015; 11 in 2014) during Bidwill's tenure that the Cardinals won 11+ games in a season. The franchise had won 11+ games in a season just three times prior.

Over the last three years in particular, Bidwill has led a transformation involving highly-regarded additions on both the football and business sides of the organization. That effort has included his hiring of general manager Monti Ossenfort and head coach Jonathan Gannon to lead the football operation while bringing in Chief Operating Officer Jeremy Walls to guide a revamped business structure.

In the last two years, the re-making of the organization's front office has seen the team open new business offices and hire more than 100 new staff members, mostly in the areas of sales and service. After ranking third in the NFL in new season-ticket sales last year, the team has sold over 10,000 new season tickets in 2025, which is on pace to lead the league. That figure also represents the most season tickets sold during an off-season since State Farm Stadium opened in 2006.

Most recently, under Michael's direction, the organization launched Cardinals Premier Travel, a first-of-its-kind travel experience to give all fans the opportunity to see the team play on the road in unmatched comfort and convenience starting this season. Cardinals Premier Travel will make its debut with the Cardinals November 3rd Monday Night Football game against the Dallas Cowboys at AT&T Stadium. The all-inclusive experience includes round-trip private air transportation aboard a Boeing 777-200ER aircraft, hotel accommodations, transportation, a pre-game tailgate experience, game tickets and an immediate return to Phoenix after the game, among many other perks.

The Cardinals success under Bidwill has greatly elevated the team's profile both locally and nationally. Michael oversaw the team's appearance in the groundbreaking Amazon Original series 'All or Nothing: A Season with the Arizona Cardinals', which chronicled the 2015 Cardinals season from the NFL Draft through the NFC Championship game. Produced by NFL Films, the eight-episode series was awarded the Sports Emmy for Outstanding Serialized Sports Documentary in May of 2017. In February of

2018, the Cardinals launched 'Cardinals Flight Plan', a first-of-its-kind documentary series available on Facebook Watch and YouTube that takes fans behind the scenes at the team's offseason. The first seven seasons of 'Flight Plan' garnered over 21 million views between Facebook and YouTube.

IF YOU BUILD IT: Among Michael's most significant accomplishments with the Cardinals was leading the effort that led to the creation of State Farm Stadium. The venue has been an integral factor in the transformation of the Cardinals and a catalyst for the franchise's success. Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020 that impacted sporting venues around the world, the team had sold out every game played since the opening of the iconic stadium that has welcomed millions of Cardinals fans. With fans back in attendance the last five seasons, Arizona sold out every game (regular season and preseason) at the venue during that span.

During the 2024 postseason, Bidwill led an effort that resulted in the Wild Card Playoff matchup between the L.A. Rams and Minnesota Vikings being played at State Farm Stadium in response to the devastating wildfires that broke out in Los Angeles County in January. On the Thursday of that week it was announced that the scheduled Monday game would be moved from SoFi Stadium to State Farm Stadium. Despite the short turnaround, the venue hosted a sellout crowd of 64,515 as the Rams defeated the Vikings in the first postseason game in NFL history to be moved due to a natural disaster. Bidwill also arranged for the Cardinals team planes to transport the Rams players, staff and their families to Arizona in preparation for the game.

State Farm Stadium has also given Arizona the opportunity to host three Super Bowls in a 15-year span, something that would not have been possible previously. After hosting Super Bowl XLII in 2008, the stadium staged Super Bowl XLIX in 2015 and Super Bowl LVII on February 12, 2023. Super Bowl XLIX and surrounding events delivered an economic impact of \$720 million, the highest for any Super Bowl on record and the largest for any special event in the state of Arizona.

In addition to those Super Bowls, State Farm Stadium also hosted the second-ever College Football Playoff (CFP) National Championship Game in January of 2015 as well as the NCAA's Men's Basketball Final Four in both 2017 and 2024. The 2017 Final Four was the first since 1995 held west of Texas and capped an unprecedented run of major sporting events at the stadium. That grand slam (Super Bowl XLIX, 2015 Pro Bowl, CFP Championship, and Final Four) poured \$1.3 billion into the Valley's economy according to a study completed by the Seidman Research Institute, W.P. Carey School of Business at Arizona State University.

In the lead-up to Super Bowl LVII, State Farm Stadium underwent \$150 million in improvements including parking infrastructure, a new outdoor dining and entertainment venue, state-of-the-art wi-fi, video boards, sound system upgrades and club-area enhancements.

CONTRIBUTIONS TO ARIZONA AND GREATER PHOENIX: In addition to his prominent role with the Cardinals, Bidwill has established himself as one of the most influential leaders in the greater Phoenix business community where he has been a strong advocate for economic growth and development.

In 2025, he joined forces with former U.S. Senator Kyrsten Sinema to establish Arizona's Business Roundtable and serves as Chairman of the advocacy group that connects 30 of the largest corporations and industries in the state.



He has also been a member of the Arizona Commerce Authority's Board of Directors since it was founded in 2011 and currently serves as Co-Chairman of the group. Since its inception, ACA has landed nearly 1,400 projects that have resulted in 328,207 jobs and \$297.5 billion worth of capital investment.

From 2019-22, Bidwill was Chairman of the Greater Phoenix Leadership (GPL), an organization composed of the region's top business and civic leaders. From 2008-10, Bidwill served back-to-back terms as Chairman of the Greater Phoenix Economic Council (GPEC).

In June of 2022, in partnership with then-Arizona Governor Doug Ducey and State Farm, Bidwill spearheaded the first-ever "Civics Matters Arizona" trip which sent 241 Arizona students mostly from Title I schools and 30 of their teachers on a once-in-a-lifetime trip to Washington, D.C. aboard the Cardinals team plane. "Civics Matters Arizona" returned the last three years in a partnership with Arizona Governor Katie Hobbs and the Close Up Foundation. In 2025, Civics Matters Arizona sent 275 high school students selected by their teachers to Washington, D.C. The students participating in this year's Civics Matters Arizona trip represented 35 schools, 14 school districts, 9 cities, and 6 of the 15 counties across Arizona.

Under Bidwill's leadership, the Cardinals took a lead role in a number of initiatives to assist those in Arizona impacted during the COVID-19 outbreak. That March, the Cardinals made a \$1 million founding donation to the Arizona Coronavirus Relief Fund and shortly thereafter, the team organized three major blood drives at State Farm Stadium to meet the dire need to replenish the Valley's dwindling blood supply. In early April of 2020, at the height of the outbreak when demand for assistance from food banks in Arizona more than doubled, the Cardinals joined State Farm to provide one million meals to five local food banks. To assist local businesses during the crisis, the Cardinals made a \$100,000 donation to Local First Arizona, Arizona's Coronavirus Micro Grant Fund and also helped promote local restaurants through the Cards Carryout initiative. Through the Cards Carryout program, Cardinals players and staff joined fans in helping promote independent, locally-owned restaurants hit hard by the coronavirus crisis while also recognizing those working on the front lines of the pandemic.

HONORS: In May of 2025, Bidwill was named the recipient of the McCain Institute's "In The Arena Award". The honor is given annually to "salute extraordinary, character-driven leaders who conspicuously and bravely fight to defend human rights, foster security and advance freedom through action." The award reflects the ways in which the late Senator John McCain proudly modeled the philosophy set forth in Teddy Roosevelt's famous 1910 "Man in the Arena" speech praising those who have the courage and determination to get In The Arena and fight for a cause, rather than critiquing from the sidelines.

In April of 2025, Bidwill was among eight individuals inducted into the Arizona Sports Hall of Fame, which honors athletes, coaches, administrators and others who have made exceptional contributions to sports in Arizona. He became the sixth member of the Cardinals organization to be elected to the Arizona Sports Hall of Fame, joining his late father, Bill Bidwill, WR Larry Fitzgerald, S Pat Tillman, S Adrian Wilson and QB Jake Plummer.

In January of 2019, Michael received the Paul Tagliabue Award from the Fritz Pollard Alliance for demonstrating integrity and leadership in the area of career development for minorities and advocating for diversity. In May of 2019, the Arizona Lodging and Tourism Association named Bidwill its Honoree of the Year

for his efforts to unify the tourism industry by convening industry leadership throughout the state to advance economic development and increase visitation.

In September of 2018, Bidwill was chosen as the Grand Marshal of the Desert Financial Fiesta Bowl parade joining a notable list of Grand Marshals that includes Diamondbacks Hall of Fame pitcher Randy Johnson, former Cardinals QB and Hall of Famer Kurt Warner and former Suns/Diamondbacks owner Jerry Colangelo.

In November of 2017, Bidwill returned to St. Louis where he was honored at the prestigious Musial Awards after stepping up to fund the city's high school football awards when the previous sponsor pulled out. In January of 2016, Bidwill and Arizona Governor Doug Ducey were inducted into the National Football Foundation (NFF) Hall of Fame for their roles in helping shape the economic future of the state. In March of 2016, Bidwill was chosen to serve as the Grand Marshal of the 33rd annual St. Patrick's Day parade, one of the most popular and longest running such events in Phoenix.

In May of 2015, Michael was presented with the esteemed Vision Award from the Greater Phoenix Convention & Visitors Bureau, an honor bestowed just three times previously: Phoenix mayors Skip Rimsza and Phil Gordon plus former Suns and Diamondbacks owner Jerry Colangelo.

Bidwill received the 2014 Transformational Leader Award from the Arizona Chamber of Commerce & Industry. In November of 2013, he received the "West Valley Regional Advancement Award" from Western Maricopa Coalition, which cited continued positive impact in that community. Bidwill was selected by the Phoenix Business Journal as one of its 25 "Most Admired CEO's" in 2010.

NFL LEADERSHIP: Within the National Football League, Bidwill's considerable influence is illustrated by his appointment to numerous and notable league committees, including two of the most prestigious – the Compensation Committee as well as the Management Council Executive Committee that represents the league in labor discussions with the NFLPA. He also chairs the league's Security and Conduct Committee and serves on four others: Business Ventures, Social Justice, Health and Safety, and Diversity.

BACKGROUND: Bidwill earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Finance from St. Louis University in 1987 and in 1990 earned a law degree from Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C. In May of 2015 – 25 years after his own graduation from the school – Michael delivered the commencement address at Catholic University's School of Law and was also awarded an honorary Doctorate of Humane Letters.

A flying enthusiast and licensed pilot since he was a teenager, Bidwill regularly flies himself to road games as well as other team and league business. In 2020, the Cardinals became the second NFL franchise with its own aircraft following the team's purchase of a Boeing 777-200ER wide body jet.

Michael is an emeritus member of the board for the Pat Tillman Foundation, which carries on the legacy of the former Cardinals safety killed in Afghanistan in 2004. Bidwill has also previously served as a member of the Air Force Chief of Staff Civic Leader Program whose membership "comprises respected community leaders (who) provide ideas and feedback to advise the secretary of the Air Force, the Air Force chief of staff and Air Force senior leaders."

NOTE CARDS

- Ossenfort enters his third season with the Cardinals after being hired as the team's General Manager on January 16, 2023. He was hired in Arizona following three seasons (2020-22) as the Director of Player Personnel for the Tennessee Titans.
- In his second season as GM in 2024 Arizona finished the year with eight wins, doubling its total from 2023 (4) despite facing the NFL's fifth-toughest schedule based on opponent winning percentage. Of the teams who faced the top-five toughest schedules in 2024 (AZ, San Francisco, Chicago, Las Vegas and NY Giants) only the Cardinals finished with more than six wins.
- Over the span of just five months in 2024, Ossenfort signed four of the Cardinals core players to contract extensions: S Budda Baker (12/28), RB James Conner (11/30), OL Hjalte Froholdt (8/21) and LB Zaven Collins (8/3). In April of 2025, Ossenfort signed Pro Bowl TE Trey McBride to a four-year contract extension.
- In his first three drafts as the Cardinals GM, he executed seven draft-day trades that resulted in the team selecting 28 total players – including 14 who were taken in the first three rounds. Only the Packers (31), Jaguars (30), Patriots (30) and Rams (29) had more total draft picks over the last three years (2023-25).
- Since being hired as GM in 2023, Ossenfort has completely re-shaped the Cardinals roster through the draft, trades and free agency. Arizona's 90-man roster heading into training camp in 2025 featured just 11 players who were with the team prior to Ossenfort's arrival.
- Arizona's 2025 free agency period was Ossenfort's busiest one yet and included the signings of DL Calais Campbell, LB Josh Sweat and DL Dalvin Tomlinson among others.
- The Cardinals 2024 NFL Draft class featured a league-high 12 total picks and seven selections in the top-90. Arizona's 12 picks were the most in a single draft for the team since 1992 (12), when the draft consisted of 10 rounds. The Cardinals became the first team since the 1991 Dallas Cowboys (7) to have at least seven picks in the top-90 of a single draft.
- In 2023, Ossenfort built a rookie class that led the NFL in combined starts (64) and combined snaps on offense and defense (4,654). The Cardinals were the only team in the NFL to have rookies combine for 2,000+ snaps on offense and 2,000+ snaps on defense that season.
- Ossenfort's tenure in Arizona follows a highly successful three-year run in Tennessee. During that stretch, the Titans tied for fifth in the NFL in total wins (30), won a pair of AFC South titles and had two seasons of 11+ wins.
- Prior to Tennessee, Ossenfort had a 14-year run with the Patriots (2006-19) and worked his way up from Area Scout to Director of College Scouting. During those 14 seasons, New England won an NFL-high 199 games in the regular season, made 13 playoff appearances, played in 10 AFC Championship games and won three Super Bowls (XLIX, LI, LIII).

Monti Ossenfort was hired as the Cardinals General Manager on January 16, 2023 following three seasons (2020-22) as Director of Player Personnel with the Tennessee Titans.

During his two-plus season as GM, the 47-year old Ossenfort has re-shaped and solidified the Cardinals roster, signing core veterans to contract extensions and utilizing the draft, free agency and trades to add new talent. Since being hired in Arizona, Ossenfort and his staff have orchestrated over 450 roster moves and 14 trades (including seven draft day trades) while accumulating 28 total draft picks and signing key veterans TE Trey McBride, S Budda Baker, RB James Conner, OL Hjalte Froholdt and LB Zaven Collins to contract extensions.

Arizona's 2025 free agency period was Ossenfort's busiest one yet and included the signings of DL Calais Campbell, LB Josh Sweat, DL Dalvin Tomlinson and LB Akeem Davis-Gaither among others.

The defense remained a focus during the 2025 NFL Draft, which saw Arizona use each of its first five picks on defensive players for just the third time (1991, 1983) in the Modern Era Draft (since 1967). The Cardinals 2025 draft class was highlighted by the selection of 2024 consensus first-team All-American DL Walter Nolen III in the first round and the players named Defensive MVP of the last two CFP National Championship Games in CB Will Johnson (2nd round) and LB Cody Simon (4th round).



Ossenfort spent the '25 offseason building on the momentum of 2024 when Arizona won eight games, doubling its win total from 2023 (4). The Cardinals did so despite, for the second straight year, facing one of the NFL's toughest schedules based on opponent winning percentage. Arizona also had to overcome an injury-filled season, with 33 different players missing a combined 197 games due to injury and 18 players landing on injured



reserve. Despite the obstacles, Arizona outscored its opponents 400-379 last season and finished with the best point differential among NFC West teams.

The Cardinals 2024 campaign was set up by a historic draft haul that featured an NFL-high 12 total players being selected by Arizona. Included in that group was WR Marvin Harrison Jr., who the Cardinals selected #4 overall. In his debut season in 2024, Harrison tied the franchise rookie record for TD receptions (8) matching the totals of WRs Anquan Boldin and Larry Fitzgerald.

The 2024 season marked the second straight year in which Arizona fielded one of the NFL's youngest rosters. Entering the final week of the season the average age of a player on the Cardinals roster was 26.51 years old, giving Arizona the league's eighth-youngest roster. In 2023 the average age of a player on the final roster was 26.26 years, giving the Cardinals the third-youngest roster.

In 2023, Ossenfort put together a rookie class – which in the final weeks of the season numbered 14 – that was one of the most productive in the NFL, with Arizona getting an NFL-high 4,654 combined snaps from rookies on offense and defense that season. The Cardinals were the only team in the NFL to have rookies combine for 2,000+ snaps on offense and 2,000+ snaps on defense. Arizona also led the NFL in total starts by rookies (64) and had a league-high 11 different rookies start at least one game that season. Arizona's rookie class in 2023 finished the year with 151 games played, 7 TDs, 73 receptions, 847 receiving yards, 314 rushing yards, 206 tackles, 7.5 sacks, 15 tackles for loss, 13 passes defended, a fumble recovery and an INT.

Ossenfort came to Arizona with 21 years of experience in the NFL (2002-22). That includes his three seasons in Tennessee and 15 years (2003; 2006-19) with the New England Patriots. During his time in New England, Ossenfort helped the Patriots win four Super Bowl titles (XXXVIII, XLIX, LI, LIII) and advance to seven Super Bowls overall. In Ossenfort's 23 total NFL seasons, his teams have earned a postseason berth 16 times.

His tenure in Arizona follows a highly successful three-year run in Tennessee. During that stretch, the Titans tied for fifth in the NFL in total wins (30), won a pair of AFC South titles and had two seasons of 11+ wins. Ossenfort's first season with Tennessee in 2020 saw the team win 11 games and earn its first AFC South

title since 2008. The Titans followed that up with a 12-5 record and second straight AFC South crown in 2021. It marked the first time the franchise won back-to-back division titles since the 1970 merger.

Over the course of his 15 seasons with New England, Ossenfort served as the Director of College Scouting (2014-19), Assistant Director of College Scouting (2011-13), National Scout (2008-10), Area Scout (2006-07) and a Personnel Assistant (2003). In between his two tenures with the Patriots, Ossenfort worked with the Houston Texans as a pro and college scouting assistant in 2004 prior to being promoted to a college scout in 2005.

Ossenfort started his career in the NFL with the Minnesota Vikings as a training camp intern in 2001 and worked with the Texans during their inaugural season in 2002 as a pro personnel intern under general manager Charley Casserly.

His first full-time job in the NFL came with New England as a personnel assistant under then head coach Bill Belichick in 2003, a year that concluded with a Patriots victory over Carolina in Super Bowl XXXVIII. He returned to New England in 2006, beginning a 14-year run with the Patriots that saw him work his way up from Area Scout to Director of College Scouting. During those 14 seasons New England won an NFL-high 199 games during the regular season, made 13 playoff appearances, played in 10 AFC Championship games and won three Super Bowls.

Ossenfort was a four-year letterman and two-year starter at quarterback for the University of Minnesota-Morris, where he completed 411-of-923 pass attempts for 4,263 yards and 21 TDs. He continues to rank first in program history in pass attempts, fourth in completions and fifth in total passing yards.

He graduated from Minnesota-Morris in 2000 with a degree in Economics and Management. Ossenfort earned a master's degree in Business Administration and Sports Management from Ohio University in 2002. In May of 2025, Ossenfort was invited to serve as the commencement speaker at Minnesota-Morris' 62nd commencement ceremony.

A native of Luverne, MN, Ossenfort and his wife, Shannon, have three daughters, Emery, Finley and Landry.

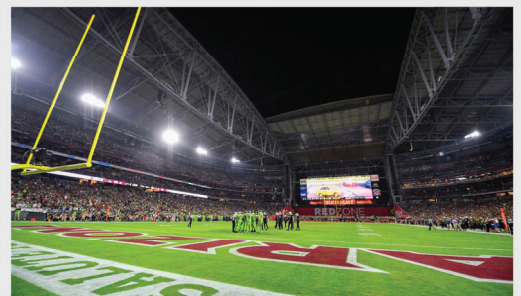
ARIZONA AND DAYLIGHT SAVING TIME

Every year people across the country turn their clocks ahead in the spring and back in the fall, except in Arizona.

Although Arizona stays on standard time throughout the year, never changing its clock forward or back, the time change, or lack thereof, does affect the Cardinals local kickoff times during the season.

In 2025, daylight saving time was observed on the second Sunday in March (March 9) and ends on the first Sunday in November (November 2). When daylight saving time is in effect, Arizona is three hours behind the east coast, making a 4:00 p.m. kickoff in New York a 1:00 p.m. kickoff in Arizona. However, when daylight saving time ends, Arizona is only two hours behind the east coast, making a 4:00 p.m. kickoff in New York a 2:00 p.m. kickoff in Arizona.

In 1967, the Uniform Time Act was instituted, putting the entire country on daylight saving time. After one year, states could opt out, and Arizona went back to standard time and stayed there. Residents and lawmakers of Arizona knew there was an abundance of sunshine and did not see the need to move their clocks ahead in order to save any. The only other state that does not observe Daylight Saving Time is Hawaii.

Hired as the team's Chief Operating Officer in August of 2023, Jeremy Walls oversees the Cardinals business operations.

In collaboration with team owner Michael Bidwill, since joining the organization Walls has led a substantial restructuring of the Cardinals business practices to strategically realign and refocus the team's various business departments. This has included a reorganization of the business departments, hiring over 100+ new staff members – many in senior leadership positions – to best serve Cardinals fans and business partners, building out a new business intelligence team, implementing a strategic business planning process, and moving the entire business staff into a new open concept office down the street from the Dignity Health Arizona Cardinals Training Center.

Among the more significant of these efforts over the last two seasons has been the creation of three innovative, new seating options at State Farm Stadium that provide some of the most unique and luxurious experiences available across the sports landscape. These offerings allow fans to view Cardinals games from first-of-their-kind luxury endzone casitas and field-level seats and suites that were introduced in 2024, along with the Casita Garden Club and the Morgan Athletic Club, a 1920's style supper club hosted by The Global Ambassador. Adding to those exclusive options where guests can enjoy hand-crafted cocktails and high-end menu options, in 2025 the team unveiled Casa Roja at the Fifty, offering both an unparalleled midfield view of the game as well as access to a Spanish-inspired dining experience featuring exceptional food and beverage selections.

Since joining the Cardinals, Walls has assisted in leading several initiatives to re-imagine the game day experience at State Farm Stadium. This has included the implementation of 12 new local restaurant concepts, a reimagination of the game entertainment experience, replacing new LED ribbon boards and rebranding the concession areas throughout the venue. In addition, the Cardinals developed the Cardinals Flag Football Campus on site at State Farm Stadium and partnered with Arizona's Family to broadcast a high school girls flag football game of the week, both NFL firsts.

In August of 2025, the organization announced the launch of the Cardinals Foundation, specifically focused on supporting Arizona's special needs community and marking a powerful new

chapter in the team's legacy of charitable giving.

Walls' efforts to significantly expand the Cardinals ticket sales and service department have also achieved remarkable results with enthusiasm reaching historic levels in 2025. After ranking third in the NFL in new season-ticket sales last year, the team has sold over 10,000 new season tickets in 2025, which is on pace to again finish top three in the NFL. That figure also represents the most season tickets sold during an offseason since State Farm Stadium opened in 2006. Additionally, the team's season ticket renewal rate of over 90% in the 2025 offseason is its highest in over a decade. On the corporate partnership side, the Cardinals have seen their largest year-over year growth since the stadium's opening, welcoming 16 new corporate partners, including five new entitlement partners.

The 46-year-old Walls joined the Cardinals after spending the previous 10 seasons (2013-22) with the Miami Dolphins, most recently as the organization's Senior Vice President, Chief Revenue Officer (2020-22). In that role, Walls led the team's corporate partnerships, marketing, ticket sales and operations, member services, suites and food/beverage operations. He also led the commercial and marketing teams for the Formula 1 Miami Grand Prix and along with IMG co-led the Miami Open tennis tournament. Walls previously served in the role of Senior Vice President & Chief Marketing Officer with Miami.

Before joining the Dolphins, Walls worked with the San Diego Padres as Vice President of Ticket Sales, Service & Operations (2012-13). He also held roles as the Director of Team Marketing and Business Operations (TMB0) for the National Basketball Association (2009-11), Director of Groups, Suites and Inside Sales for the Arizona Diamondbacks (2007-09) and as Group Sales Manager with the Phoenix Suns (2002-06).

Walls earned a degree in Sports Management from Mount Vernon Nazarene University. In 2017, he was honored by the Sports Business Journal as a member of its 40-Under-40 Class, which recognizes the best and brightest industry executives under the age of 40.

Jeremy and his wife, Maile - an Arizona native - have two children - Kaelin (16) and Kostner (12) and reside in south Tempe.

- Became an NFL head coach when he was hired by the Cardinals on February 14, 2023. Gannon came to Arizona after spending two seasons (2021-22) as the defensive coordinator with Philadelphia where he helped the Eagles advance to Super Bowl LVII.
- Gannon has 17 years of experience in the NFL with the Cardinals (2023-24), Eagles (2021-22), Colts (2018-20), Vikings (2014-17), Titans (2012-13), Rams (2009-11) and Falcons (2007).
- In Gannon's second season with Arizona in 2024, the Cardinals finished with eight wins, doubling their win total from 2023 (4). Arizona did so despite facing one of the NFL toughest schedules for the second straight season (8 games vs. playoff teams in '23; 9 games in '24).
- Arizona had a 6-3 record at home in 2024, winning five of its last six games at State Farm Stadium. Four of the Cardinals six home wins were decided by 20+ points. That is the most such home wins in a season in team history.
- Under Gannon's guidance, the Cardinals have been one of the NFL's best in protecting the football (fifth in the NFL with 12 games of zero turnovers between 2023-24). Arizona also finished last season with just 92 penalties, the 2nd fewest in the NFL (LAR - 91).
- The Cardinals defense was one of the NFL's best in the second half of the 2024 season. Over the final 11 games, Arizona allowed an average of just 19.6 points per game (only three teams allowed fewer points per game between Weeks 7-18). The Cards defense allowed the fewest total TDs (20) and passing TDs (10) in the NFL during that span.
- In his first season with Arizona in 2023, Gannon led the NFL's 3rd-youngest team that relied heavily on rookies but was also highly competitive. Despite playing the league's 2nd-toughest schedule with eight games vs. playoff teams, the Cardinals held a lead in 14-of-17 games played.
- In 2023, the Cardinals rookie class, which led the NFL in combined starts (64) and combined snaps on offense and defense (4,654) in 2023. The Cardinals were the only team in the NFL to have rookies combine for 2,000+ snaps on offense and 2,000+ snaps on defense in 2023.
- In each of Gannon's two seasons (2021-22) as defensive coordinator in Philadelphia, the Eagles had a top-10 defense, ranking 2nd in total defense in 2022 (301.5 ypg) and 10th in the NFL in 2021 (328.8 ypg). In 2022 the Eagles also featured the NFL's top-ranked pass defense (179.8 ypg) and the league's 8th ranked scoring defense (20.2 ppg).
- Between 2021-22, the Eagles defense led the NFL with 99 sacks, ranked 3rd in total defense (315.1 ypg), 3rd in pass defense (200.4 ypg), 6th in tackles for loss (168) and tied for 4th in total return TDs (7) and INT return TDs (4).
- In 2022, the Eagles easily led the NFL with a franchise single-season record 70 sacks in the regular season. Philadelphia became the first team ever to have four different players with 10.0+ sacks in a single season.

ARIZONA: In Gannon's second season with Arizona in 2024, the Cardinals finished with eight wins, doubling their win total from 2023 (4). Arizona did so despite facing one of the NFL toughest schedules for the second straight season (8 games vs. playoff teams in '23; 9 games in '24).

Arizona finished the 2024 season with a 6-3 record at home, winning five of its last six games at State Farm Stadium. It marked the first time since 2015 that the Cardinals had at least six home wins in a season. Four of Arizona's six home wins were decided by 20+ points, the most such home wins in a season in team history.

Under Gannon, the Cardinals totaled eight wins in 2024 despite ending the season with 18 players on injured reserve, including seven Week 1 starters. Arizona had 33 different players miss a combined 196 games due to injury.

Gannon presided over a historic season by the Cardinals offense in 2024. Arizona finished the year with 6,090 total net yards, marking just the 5th time in franchise history the Cardinals accumulated 6,000+ total net yards in a season. Arizona had a 3,000-yard passer (Kyler Murray), 1,000-yard rusher (James Conner) and 1,000-yard receiver (Trey McBride) in a single season for just the 5th time in franchise history.



For the 2nd consecutive season, Gannon oversaw one of the NFL's best rushing attacks in 2024. Arizona rushed for 2,451 rushing yards and 18 TDs on 463 carries (5.29 avg.) in 2024. The Cardinals 2,451 rushing yards represent the 3rd-highest single-season total in franchise history – and the highest since the team ran for a franchise record 2,582 yards in 1979.



Arizona's 5.29 rushing yards per attempt in 2024 is easily the highest single-season rushing average in franchise history, shattering the previous record of 5.03 yards per attempt in 2019. In 2023, Arizona ranked 4th in the NFL in rushing yards (2,365) and 2nd in rushing average (5.02) while leading the league with four games of 200+ rushing yards.

Defensively, the Cardinals had one of the NFL's best units in the second half of the 2024 season. Over the final 11 games, the Cards ranked 4th in the NFL allowing an average of just 19.6 points per game. Arizona's defense allowed the fewest total TDs (20) and passing TDs (10) in the NFL during that span. Between Weeks 7-18, Arizona's defense was also among the top 10 in the NFL in sacks (30), forced fumbles (13), first downs allowed (206), total defense (325.7 ypg) and pass defense (213.8 ypg).

Under Gannon in 2024, the Cardinals were one of the league's most disciplined teams. Arizona was penalized just 92 times last season, with only the Rams (91) being called for fewer penalties. The Cardinals were penalized five times or fewer in an NFL-high 12 games in 2024, including two games in which it was penalized just once.

In his first season with Arizona in 2023, Gannon led the NFL's 3rd-youngest team that relied heavily on rookies but was also highly competitive. Despite playing the league's 2nd-toughest schedule with eight games vs. playoff teams, the Cardinals held a lead in 14-of-17 games played.

Gannon's debut NFL season saw him help to develop the Cardinals rookie class, which led the NFL in combined starts (64) and combined snaps on offense and defense (4,654) in 2023. The 2023 rookie class combined for: 151 games played, 7 TDs, 73 receptions, 847 receiving yards, 314 rushing yards, 206 tackles, 7.5 sacks, 15 tackles for loss, 13 passes defended, a fumble recovery and an INT in 2023.



PHILADELPHIA: Prior to being hired in Arizona, Gannon spent two seasons (2021-22) as the defensive coordinator with the Philadelphia Eagles. Under his direction, the Eagles boasted a top-10 defense in each season, ranking 2nd in total defense in 2022 (301.5 ypg) and 10th in the NFL in 2021 (328.8 ypg). In 2022 the Eagles also featured the NFL's top-ranked pass defense (179.8 ypg) and the league's 8th ranked scoring defense (20.2 ppg).

Philadelphia advanced to Super Bowl LVII at State Farm Stadium after beating San Francisco in the NFC Championship and won the NFC East in 2022. The Eagles qualified for the postseason in both years Gannon was the defensive coordinator.

In 2022, the Eagles easily led the NFL with a franchise single-

season record 70 sacks in the regular season. No other team in the NFL had more than 55. Philadelphia's 70 sacks in 2022 were the most by any team in a single season since the 1989 Minnesota Vikings (71). Combined with their eight sacks in the postseason, the Eagles 78 total sacks in 2022 were the third-most in NFL history behind only the 1984 (82 sacks) and 1985 Chicago Bears (80 sacks). Philadelphia also tied for 4th in the NFL in both total takeaways (27) and INTs during the regular season.

In his two seasons as defensive coordinator with Philadelphia, four different Eagles players combined for five Pro Bowl selections: Darius Slay (2), Haason Reddick (1), Javon Hargrave (1) and current Cardinal Josh Sweat (1). Reddick, Hargrave and Sweat all earned their first career Pro Bowl selections playing in Gannon's defense. Reddick and CB James Bradberry were each named second-team All-Pro in 2022.

Under Gannon's tutelage, Reddick ranked 2nd in the NFL with a career-high 16.0 sacks in 2022. He also led the NFL with five strip-sacks and tied for the NFL lead with five forced fumbles. At age 34, Graham had double-digit sacks for the first time in his career in 2022. He became the oldest player with 11.0+ sacks since Julius Peppers (37) and Terrell Suggs (35) in 2017.

Another player who had a career year under Gannon in 2022 was LB T.J. Edwards, who finished the regular season with 159 tackles, 2.0 sacks, seven passes defended, 10 tackles for loss and a fumble recovery. His 159 tackles were a career high and also were the highest single-season total for an Eagles defender since Byron Evans (175) in 1992.

Following three seasons in New Orleans, S C.J. Gardner-Johnson established a career high and tied for the NFL lead with six INTs in his first season with the Eagles in 2022. Playing in Gannon's defense, Gardner-Johnson had more INTs in 2022 (6) than he had in his first three NFL seasons combined (5). Bradberry (3 INTs, 17 PD) and Slay (3 INTs, 14 PD) finished the 2022 season as the only cornerback tandem in the NFL each with 14+ passes defended and 3+ interceptions. Bradberry's 17 passes defended ranked 3rd in the NFL.

Philadelphia (7 points allowed vs. NYG; 7 points allowed vs. SF) became the first team to allow seven points or fewer in multiple postseason games since the 2010 Baltimore Ravens (3 times). Prior to 2022, the last time Philadelphia gave up seven points or fewer in consecutive postseason games was during the 1948 and 1949 NFL Championships.

In his first season with the Eagles in 2021, Gannon directed the NFL's 10th-ranked defense (328.8 ypg). Philadelphia had the 2nd-most defensive TDs (5), allowed the 5th-fewest explosive plays (117) in the league and finished 9th in opponent rushing yards per game (107.9) and opponent three-and-out percentage (33.1%). Slay led the team with five takeaways and had an NFL-best three defensive TDs that season.

OTHER NFL EXPERIENCE: Prior to working with the Cardinals and Eagles, he was the defensive backs/cornerbacks coach with the Indianapolis Colts (2018-20) and the assistant defensive backs/quality control coach with the Minnesota Vikings (2014-17) after working as a defensive assistant with the Tennessee Titans (2012-13). He spent three seasons (2009-11) as a scout with the St. Louis Rams after beginning his NFL coaching career as a defensive assistant with the Atlanta Falcons in 2007.

During his three seasons with Indianapolis (2018-20), Gannon oversaw a secondary that helped the Colts rank 6th in the NFL in INTs (45, tied), 9th in scoring defense (22.5 ppg) and 10th in total defense (339.5 ypg) and red zone defense (55.9%, tied)



during that span. In Gannon's final season with Indianapolis in 2020, the Colts defense had the 5th-most takeaways (25) in the NFL and ranked 7th in INTs (15, tied), 8th in total yards allowed per game (332.1) and 10th in points allowed per game (22.6, tied). CB Kenny Moore (79 tackles, 13 PD, 4 INTs and 2.0 sacks) was the only defensive back in the NFL in 2020 with at least four INTs and 2.0 sacks that season.

In 2019, the Colts had the 7th-most INTs (15) and 10th-most takeaways (23, tied) in the NFL. The previous year, Gannon assisted a defense that amassed the 9th-most INTs (15, tied) in the league and ranked 10th in takeaways (26, tied) and points allowed per game (21.5).

As an assistant with the Vikings for four seasons (2014-17), Gannon helped Minnesota's defense rank 2nd in the NFL in redzone defense (48.6%), 3rd in total defense (319.9 ypg), scoring defense (18.8 ppg), passing defense (214.6 ypg) and third-down defense (35.1%). CB Xavier Rhodes (2016-17) and S Harrison Smith (2015-17) were selected to multiple Pro Bowls during Gannon's tenure in Minnesota.

Gannon got his start in the NFL with the Falcons as a defensive

assistant under head coach Bobby Petrino who was his head coach while he was a student at Louisville.

LOUISVILLE: Gannon played collegiately as a safety at Louisville and appeared in nine games as a redshirt freshman in 2002 before suffering a career-ending hip injury in his first career start at Cincinnati. As a true freshman in 2001, he was named the Cardinals defensive scout team player of the year. Following the injury, he worked as a student assistant at Louisville for three seasons (2003-05) and one season as a graduate assistant (2006) under Petrino.

PERSONAL: Gannon attended Saint Ignatius (Cleveland, OH) High School where he was an All-State defensive back and a standout in basketball and track & field. As a senior in 2001, he helped lead the basketball team to the school's first state championship and starred in the long jump and 110-meter hurdles, helping Saint Ignatius to their first track & field state championship that same year. Gannon was inducted into the Saint Ignatius Sports Hall of Fame in 2011.

He and his wife, Gina, have three children – Rocco, Lola and Angelo.

Ryland connecting on 28-of-32 FG attempts and 26-of-27 PATs for a team-high 110 total points in just 13 games played after joining the team in October. Dallas became the first player in the NFL to return one of the new “dynamic kickoffs” for a TD with his 96-yard return at Buffalo in Week 1.
- Over the past two seasons, P Blake Gillikin has put up the top-two single-season punting averages in franchise history: 50.6 in 2023 and 49.7 in 2024. His 50.6 average in '23 also ranked third in the NFL that season.
- K Matt Prater set a Cardinals franchise single-season record with 9 FGs of 50+ yards in 2023, including an NFL single-season record 6 FGs of 55+ yards. He holds a Cardinals franchise record for made FGs of 50+ yards with 22 in just 51 games over four seasons (2021-24) under Rodgers and has the longest FG in franchise history (62 yards, twice).
- Prater had 137 points in 2021, the second-highest total in franchise history and tied for the fourth-highest total in the NFL.
- P Andy Lee finished in the top-five in the NFL in punting average three times over five seasons (2018-22) working with Rodgers on the Cardinals, including leading the league with a 48.6-yard average in 2018.
- Denver returned six kicks for TDs during Rodgers tenure with the Broncos (2011-14), tied for the second most in the NFL in that span. In 2012, Trindon Holliday became the first player in NFL history to record multiple return TDs in a playoff game when he scored on a 90-yard punt return and a 104-yard kickoff return in a 38-35 double-overtime loss to the Ravens.
- In Denver, Prater was named to the Pro Bowl in 2013 after setting franchise records in field goal percentage (96.2%; 25-of-26) and points scored (150). Prater's 64-yard field goal in 2013 was the longest in NFL history, until it was eclipsed by Justin Tucker (66 yards) in 2021. In 2014, Connor Barth's 93.8 field-goal percentage (15-of-16) was the second-highest in team history.

Jeff Rodgers is in his eighth season with the Cardinals and seventh as the team's assistant head coach/special teams coordinator. He came to Arizona in January, 2018 as the team's special teams coordinator and added the title of assistant head coach in 2019. Rodgers is in his 22nd NFL season after previously coaching special teams with Chicago (2015-17), Denver (2011-14), Carolina (2009-10) and San Francisco (2003-07).

With the Cardinals in 2024, K Chad Ryland was selected as a Pro Bowl alternate after connecting on 28-of-32 FG attempts and 26-of-27 PATs for a team-high 110 total points in just 13 games played. Ryland joined the team in October and became just the third player in NFL history to have three-game winning FGs in the 4th quarter/OT in his first four games with a team. P Blake Gillikin punted 38 times for 1,887 yards (49.7 avg.) in 13 games and had 19 punts landed inside the 20-yard line with just one touchback. He was the only punter in the NFL last season to have at least 30 punts with one or fewer touchbacks. In 2023, he set a franchise single-season record with a 50.6-yard punting average, which also ranked 3rd in the NFL that season.

Both Gillikin (NFC Special Teams Player of the Week--Week 9) and Ryland (NFC Special Teams Player of the Month--October) were honored in 2024. KR DeeJay Dallas had a 96-yard kickoff return for a TD in the season opener, becoming the first player in the NFL to return a new dynamic kickoff for a TD.

Long-time veteran K Matt Prater had a lot of success under Rodgers with the Cardinals. He totaled 106 points in 2023, his 12th career season with 100+ points. Only six players in NFL history have more seasons of 100+ points. Prater also set a

franchise single-season record (and a career-high) with nine FGs of 50+ yards in 2023, including an NFL single-season record of six FGs of 55+ yards. His 62-yard FG against Dallas in Week 3 of 2023 tied his own franchise record that he originally set in 2021. The 62-yarder was the longest FG in the NFL in 2023.

In four seasons working with Rodgers on the Cardinals, Prater holds the team record for made FGs of 50+ yards with 22 in 51 games. In his first season with Arizona in 2021, Prater had 137 points, the second-highest total in franchise history and tied for the fourth-highest total in the NFL. He was also named the NFC Special Teams Player of the Week three times with the Cardinals.

Veteran P Andy Lee punted for five seasons under the guidance of Rodgers and finished in the top-five in the NFL in punting average three times over those five years, including leading the league with a 48.6-yard average in 2018. Lee finished 2nd in the NFL with a 47.8-yard punting average in 2019, the second consecutive season working with Rodgers that he finished in the top-two in the NFL in punting average. In 2021, he finished 3rd in the NFL and established a then franchise single-season record with a 49.0-yard punting average and in 2022, Lee averaged 47.1 yards per punt.

In 2020, the Cardinals special teams unit featured three players who all entered the NFL as undrafted rookies in 2018: LB Dennis Gardeck, WR Trent Sherfield and LB Zeke Turner. Gardeck served as a special teams captain four straight seasons (2020-23) and was selected as a Pro Bowl alternate in both 2019 and 2022. Turner tied for the team lead with 15 special teams tackles in 2020 to go along with two blocked punts and a reception on a



fake punt. Sherfield had a career-high 10 special teams tackles and two fumble recoveries.

K Zane Gonzalez set career highs and ranked 4th in the NFL in 2019 in both total points (127) and made FGs (31). His 31 FGs remain the third-most in a single season in team history while his 127 points are tied for the fourth-best single-season total in franchise history.

In 2018, Arizona's special teams developed into one of the league's best. The Cardinals finished the season with the NFL's #5 ranked unit after finishing #30 in 2017. Turner led the NFL with 13 solo special teams tackles while Gardeck led all NFL rookies with 388 special teams snaps. In the Cardinals season finale at Seattle, Gardeck had a deflected punt and recovered a Cameron Malveaux blocked punt in the end zone for a touchdown. It was Arizona's first blocked punt for a touchdown since 2008.

While working with Chicago, the Bears had three special teams TDs in 2017 (two punt returns, one fake punt), tied with the Rams for the most in the NFL. Rookie PR Tarik Cohen averaged 9.4 yards per punt return in 2017 (9th in the NFL) and had a 61-yard return for a TD while KR Deonte Thompson ranked 2nd in the NFL in 2016 in kickoff return yards (804). P Pat O'Donnell allowed just 22 punt returns in 2016, tied for the third fewest in the NFL among punters who appeared in all 16 games.

Prior to Chicago, Rodgers spent four seasons as the special teams coordinator with the Broncos. During his time in Denver, the Broncos ranked 10th in the NFL in gross punting average (45.6 yards per punt) and 11th in net punting average (39.6 yards per punt). Denver's six total kick return TDs (four punt/two kickoff) were tied for the second most in the NFL during Rodgers tenure.

Prater, who kicked with the Broncos under Rodgers, was named to the Pro Bowl following the 2013 season after setting franchise records in FG percentage (96.2%, 25-of-26) and points scored

(150). His 64-yard field goal on December 8, 2013 is the second-longest FG in NFL history. In 2014, K Connor Barth's 93.8 field goal percentage (15-of-16) was the second-highest season total in team history. In Rodgers' second season in Denver in 2012, the Broncos special teams allowed the 2nd-lowest punt return average (6.2 ypr) and the 7th-lowest kickoff return average (22.1 ypr) in the NFL. During the Divisional Playoffs that season, Trindon Holliday became the first player in NFL history to record a punt return TD (90 yards) and kickoff return TD (104 yards) in a postseason game. In 2011, Denver ranked 3rd in the NFL in punt return average (12.7 ypr) and one of just three teams in the league with multiple punt return TDs: Arizona (4), Denver (2), Chicago (2). P Britton Colquitt set single-season franchise records for gross (47.4) and net punting (40.2) averages and broke his own team record the following year with a 42.1-yard net average.

Rodgers began his coaching career at the University of Arizona in 2001, spending two seasons as a graduate assistant working with the secondary and linebackers under head coach John Mackovic. He entered the NFL coaching ranks with San Francisco in 2003 as a special teams quality control coach for two seasons before being elevated to assistant special teams coach (2005-07). During his five seasons with the 49ers, LS Brian Jennings (2004) and P Andy Lee (2007) both earned Pro Bowl selections. Lee set an NFL single-season record with 42 punts inside the 20-yard line (since broken) and ranked 2nd in the NFL with a 41.0 net punting average in 2007. After leaving the 49ers, Rodgers served as the special teams coordinator for one season at Kansas State in 2008.

Following Kansas State, Rodgers spent two seasons in Carolina, first as the Panthers special teams assistant (2009) before serving as special teams coordinator in 2010. He played linebacker at North Texas (1996-2000) where he earned a degree in Business, specializing in Entrepreneurship and Strategic Management. A St. Paul, MN native, Rodgers attended Westlake (Austin, TX) High School.

NOTE CARDS

- Hired as the Cardinals offensive coordinator in 2023 following three seasons (2020-22) with Cleveland, including in 2022 serving as the Browns quarterbacks coach.
- In 2024, the Cardinals rushed for 2,451 yards and 18 TDs with a 5.29 yard per carry average. The 2,451 rushing yards were the 3rd most in team history and the highest total since 1979. Arizona's 5.29 yards per carry average was the highest in team history and the 16th best average in NFL history.
- The Cardinals finished the 2024 campaign with 6,090 total net yards, marking just the 5th time in team history the team had 6,000+ yards in a season. Arizona had a 3,000-yard passer (QB Kyler Murray), 1,000-yard receiver (TE Trey McBride) and 1,000-yard rusher (RB James Conner) in a season for just the fifth time in franchise history.
- Cardinals TE Trey McBride made his first Pro Bowl in 2024 after putting up 111 receptions for 1,146 yards, shattering his own franchise record for receptions by a TE (81 in 2023). His 111 receptions are the 4th most in NFL history by a TE.
- RB James Conner had his second consecutive 1,000-yard rushing season (1,094 yards) in 2024 after doing so for the first time in 2023 (1,040 yards). QB Kyler Murray started all 17 games and threw for 3,851 yards and 21 TDs with a 93.5 rating. It was his 4th season with 3,000+ passing yards and 20+ TDs, tying him with Neil Lomax for the most seasons in team history for each metric.
- In his first season with Arizona in 2023, the Cardinals offense finished 4th in the NFL in rushing (2,365 yards) and 2nd in rushing average (5.02). It was just the second time since 1970 the Cardinals had a top-five rushing offense in the NFL (3rd in 1979).
- Prior to Cleveland, Petzing spent six seasons (2014-19) coaching with Minnesota. As the Vikings wide receivers coach in 2019, WR Stefon Diggs set a then career-high with 1,130 receiving yards and finished 4th in the league that season with a 17.9-yard average on 63 receptions.
- Working with Kirk Cousins in 2018, the Vikings QB set a team record for completions (425), threw for the third-most passing yards (4,298), had the second-highest completion percentage (70.1%) and recorded the fourth-highest passer rating (99.7) by a Viking in team history.

Drew Petzing is in his third season with the Cardinals and 13th in the NFL after being hired as Arizona's offensive coordinator on 2/21/23. He came to the Cardinals after spending the previous three years (2020-22) with Cleveland, including as the Browns quarterbacks coach in 2022.

Petzing coached Cleveland's tight ends for two years (2020-21) after spending six seasons (2014-19) as an assistant with the Minnesota Vikings. He was the Vikings wide receivers coach in 2019 after working as the assistant quarterbacks coach (2018) and assistant wide receivers coach (2014-17) with Minnesota. Petzing and Cardinals head coach Jonathan Gannon coached together in Minnesota for four seasons (2014-17).

In his first two seasons leading the Cardinals offense, Arizona has put up two of the top-five single-season rushing yardage totals in franchise history: 2,365 in 2023 and 2,451 in 2024. The Cardinals 4,816 total rushing yards over the last two seasons (2023-2024) ranked third in the NFL behind only Baltimore (5,850) and Philadelphia (5,238). In that same span, Arizona (5.16) joined Baltimore (5.34) as the only teams in the NFL to average at least five yards per carry.

In 2024, Petzing coordinated an offense that ran for 2,451 yards and 18 TDs on 463 carries (5.29 avg.). The 2,451 rushing yards represent the 3rd-best single-season total in franchise history and the most in a season since 1979. Arizona's 5.29 yards per carry average is the highest in team history, shattering the previous mark of 5.09 in 2019, and is also the 16th-best single season average in NFL history. Arizona featured one of the

league's explosive rushing attacks again last season, with the Cardinals (4) joining the Ravens (4), Bills (4) and Eagles (4) as the only teams in the NFL with at least four TD runs of 40+ yards.

Petzing coordinated an Arizona offense that piled up 6,090 total net yards in 2024, marking just the 5th time in franchise history the team had 6,000+ total net yards in a season. Arizona featured a 3,000-yard passer (QB Kyler Murray), a 1,000-yard rusher (RB James Conner) and a 1,000-yard receiver (TE Trey McBride) in a single season for just the 5th-time in team history.

TE Trey McBride was selected to his first Pro Bowl after catching 111 passes for 1,146 yards and four total TDs. He shattered his own franchise single-season record for receptions by a tight end (81 in 2023) and joined Hall of Famer Jackie Smith as the only TEs in franchise history with 1,000+ receiving yards in a season. McBride's 111 receptions are the second-most in franchise history by a player at any position and also marked the 4th-best total in NFL history by a TE. McBride had three outings with 12 receptions last season, becoming the first TE in NFL history to have at least three games of 12+ receptions in a single season. He also became the first TE in league annals to have 12+ catches in back-to-back games. McBride's performance last season followed a breakout campaign under Petzing in 2023, one which saw the second-year TE lead the team with 81 receptions for 825 yards.

RB James Conner had his second consecutive 1,000-yard season (1,094 yards) after doing so for the first time in 2023 (1,040). He also had a career-high 1,508 scrimmage yards in 2024, his



fifth-career season with 1,000+ scrimmage yards and fourth in a row with Arizona. Conner became just the third player in team history (Ottis Anderson, Edgerrin James) with multiple 1,000-yard seasons.

QB Kyler Murray started all 17 games in 2024 and completed 372-of-541 passes (68.8%) for 3,851 yards, 21 TDs and a 93.5 passer rating. He also ran for 572 yards and five TDs on 78 carries (7.3 yard avg.). It was Murray's 4th season with 20+ TD passes and his 4th with 3,000+ passing yards. He tied Neil Lomax for the most seasons in franchise history with 3,000+ passing and the most seasons with 20+ TD passes. In 2024, Murray became the third-youngest player in NFL history to reach 19,000+ passing yards and 3,000+ rushing yards in his career. In 2023, Murray started the final eight games of the season after returning from a serious knee injury that kept him out of action for 335 days. Murray threw for 1,799 yards and 10 TDs that season while rushing for 244 yards and three TDs. With Murray in the lineup, Arizona had the 9th ranked offense in the NFL.

Arizona had one of the top rushing attacks in 2023 after finishing the season 4th in the NFL in rushing (2,365 yards) and 2nd in rushing average (5.02) while leading the league with four games of 200+ rushing yards. The 2023 season marked just the second time since 1970 – and first time in 44 years – the Cardinals finished a season ranked in the top-5 in the league in rushing yards (3rd in 1979). The Cardinals led the NFL with 23 runs of 20+ yards in 2023, becoming one of only three teams in a 10-year span to have at least 23 runs of 20+ yards.

As QBs coach with the Browns in 2022, QB Jacoby Brissett started 11 games and completed 236-of-369 passes for 2,608 yards, 12 TDs, six INTs and an 88.9 QB rating. Brissett's 63.9 completion percentage and 88.9 passer rating were both career highs. QB Deshaun Watson started the final six games of the season and threw for 1,102 yards, seven TDs and five INTs. Both QBs combined to run for 418 yards and three TDs in 2022.

As tight ends coach with Cleveland for two seasons, Petzing's group helped the Browns become the only team in the league in 2021 to have at least three different tight ends each record at least three TDs as TE David Njoku led the team with four TDs. They also helped the Browns lead the NFL in rushing average (5.09-yard avg.) in 2021, the highest rushing average for the team since 1966.

In 2020, the Browns had three tight ends record multiple TDs, led by TE Austin Hooper who tied for second on the team with

four TDs. Rookie TE Harrison Bryant led all rookie tight ends with three receiving TDs while Njoku had two TD receptions. Cleveland finished 3rd in the league in rushing (148.4 ypg) in 2020, the best average for the Browns since 1978.

During his tenure with Minnesota, Petzing helped the Vikings win two NFC North division titles (2015 & 2017) while also qualifying for the postseason as a Wild Card team in 2019. The 2017 Vikings went 13-3 and advanced to the NFC Championship. As Vikings wide receivers coach in 2019, WR Stefon Diggs set a then career-high with 1,130 receiving yards, his second consecutive 1,000-yard season. He finished 4th in the league that season with a 17.9-yard average on 63 receptions. Working with Kirk Cousins in 2018, the Vikings QB set a team record for completions (425), threw for the third-most passing yards (4,298), had the second-highest completion percentage (70.1) and recorded the fourth-highest passer rating (99.7) by a Viking in team history. He became the first quarterback in NFL history to throw for at least 4,000 yards, at least 30 passing TDs, 10 or fewer INTs and complete at least 70% of his passes in a season.

Petzing helped develop WR Adam Thielen, who began his career as an undrafted rookie free agent. In 2017, Thielen made his first Pro Bowl and was a second-team All-Pro selection after finishing 5th in the NFL (2nd in NFC) with a then career-high 1,276 receiving yards on 91 receptions. Diggs reached 200 career catches in 40 games, the fastest in team history to reach that milestone (record has since been eclipsed by Justin Jefferson). In addition to working with wide receivers in his first season in Minnesota, Petzing also helped coach Vikings running backs in 2014. As a rookie, RB Jerick McKinnon tied for 5th in the NFL with a 4.8-yard average (min 100 carries).

Petzing served as a graduate assistant at Boston College for two years (2010-11) after working as a volunteer assistant coach at Harvard in 2009. He then worked for one season (2012) as the outside linebackers coach at Yale before spending the 2013 season with the Browns as a football operations intern where he assisted the offense.

As a player, Petzing spent his first two years (2005-06) at Middlebury College as a defensive back before injuries cut short his playing career. A Wellesley, MA native, Petzing then served as a student assistant the next two years before graduating in 2009 with a degree in Economics and minors in Math and Philosophy. His brother, Dean, is an offensive assistant coach with the Carolina Panthers. He and his wife, Louisa, have a daughter, Emilia and son, Owen.

- Hired as the Cardinals defensive coordinator in 2023 after spending two seasons (2021-22) as the linebackers coach with the Philadelphia Eagles.
- Coached Cardinals S Budda Baker as he was selected to the Pro Bowl in both 2023 and 2024 as a starter at safety. It was his 7th Pro Bowl following the 2024 season and his 6th consecutive selection as a starter.
- Baker led all NFL defensive backs with a career-high 164 tackles in 2024, a total that ranked second among all NFL players behind only Colts LB Zaire Franklin (173).
- Helped Eagles LB T.J. Edwards to a career season in 2022 as he finished with 159 tackles, 2.0 sacks, seven passes defended, 10 tackles for loss and a fumble recovery. His 159 tackles ranked 7th in the NFL in 2022 and represented the highest single-season total for an Eagles defender since Byron Evans (175) in 1992.
- With the Vikings, coached LB Eric Kendricks who was selected to his first Pro Bowl and was named first-team All-Pro in 2019 after having a career-high and team-leading 110 tackles to go along with 12 passes defended, tied for the most among NFL linebackers.

Nick Rallis was hired as Arizona's defensive coordinator on 2/21/23 after spending two seasons (2021-22) coaching linebackers with the Philadelphia Eagles. Prior to working in Philadelphia, Rallis spent three seasons (2018-20) with the Minnesota Vikings as a defensive quality control/assistant linebackers coach.

Last season with the Cardinals, Rallis helped direct a defense that was one of the best in the NFL in the second half of the season. Over the final 11 games, the Cardinals were 4th in the league allowing an average of just 19.6 points per game. They also allowed the fewest total TDs (20) and passing TDs (10) in the NFL during that span. Between Weeks 7-18, Arizona's defense was also among the top 10 in the NFL in sacks (30), forced fumbles (13), first downs allowed (206), total defense (325.7 ypg) and pass defense (213.8 ypg).

Arizona had an NFL-high 12 different players record 2.0 or more sacks in 2024 and also tied for the NFL lead with 17 different players who had at least 1.0 sack.

S Budda Baker made his 7th Pro Bowl and his 6th consecutive selection at safety. He also earned 2nd team All-Pro honors last season after establishing a career-high with 164 tackles and 10 tackles for loss to go along with 2.0 sacks, five passes defended, three QB hits and a forced fumble. His 164 tackles led all NFL defensive backs and ranked 2nd in the NFL among all defenders (Zaire Franklin-173). LB Kyzir White started all 17 games and had 137 tackles while also setting career highs in sacks (2.5) and QB hits (eight). White also added nine tackles for loss, an INT, three passes defended and his first career fumble recovery.

In his first season with the Cardinals in 2023, Rallis worked with Baker who was selected to his 6th Pro Bowl and earned his 5th selection as a starter. Despite missing five games due to injury, Baker finished second on the team with 87 tackles and had a team-high four games with double-digit tackles. Fellow S Jalen Thompson set career-highs with four INTs, nine passes defended and five tackles for loss while also collecting his first career sack and forced fumble. White led the Cardinals with 90 tackles despite missing the final six games of the season due to

injury. He also had 2.0 sacks, two QB hits, three passes defended and the game-sealing INT in Arizona's win vs. Dallas.

Working under current Cardinals head coach Jonathan Gannon for two years in Philadelphia, Rallis helped the Eagles advance to Super Bowl LVII at State Farm Stadium after beating San Francisco in the NFC Championship, win the NFC East in 2022 and earn the #1 seed in the NFC with a 14-3 record. The Eagles made the postseason in both seasons Rallis coached with Philadelphia.

LB T.J. Edwards had a career-season with the Eagles in 2022 after finishing the regular season with 159 tackles, 2.0 sacks, seven passes defended, 10 tackles for loss and a fumble recovery. His 159 tackles ranked 7th in the NFL in 2022 and represented the highest single-season total for an Eagles defender since Byron Evans (175) in 1992. Kyzir White had 110 tackles, the second-most on the team, to go along with 1.5 sacks, seven passes defended and five QB pressures in 2022.

The Eagles had a top-10 defense in each season Rallis coached there, ranking 2nd in total defense in 2022 (301.5 ypg) and 10th in the NFL in 2021 (328.8 ypg). In 2022, Philadelphia also featured the NFL's top-ranked pass defense (179.8 ypg) and the league's 8th ranked scoring defense (20.2 ppg). Between 2021-22, the Eagles defense led the NFL with 99 sacks, ranked 3rd in total defense (315.1 ypg), 3rd in pass defense (200.4 ypg), 6th in tackles for loss (168), tied for 4th in total return TDs (7) and interception return TDs (4) and tied for 10th in INTs (29).

In 2022, the Eagles easily led the NFL with a franchise single-season record 70 sacks in the regular season. No other team in the NFL had more than 55. Philadelphia's 70 sacks in 2022 were the most by any team in a single season since the 1989 Minnesota Vikings (71). Combined with their eight sacks in the postseason, the Eagles 78 total sacks in 2022 were the third-most in NFL history behind only the 1984 (82 sacks) and 1985

Chicago Bears (80 sacks). Philadelphia also tied for 4th in the NFL in both total takeaways (27) and INTs during the regular season.



Since individual sacks became an official stat in 1982, Philadelphia became the first team ever to have four different players with 10.0+ sacks in a single season when they did so in 2022: LB Haason Reddick (16.0), DE Brandon Graham (11.0), DT Javon Hargrave (11.0) and DE Josh Sweat (11.0).

In his first season with the Eagles in 2021, Rallis helped Philadelphia to the NFL's 10th-ranked defense (328.8 ypg) in addition to having the 2nd-most defensive TDs (5) and allowing the 5th-fewest explosive plays (117) in the league while also finishing 9th in opponent rushing yards per game (107.9) and opponent three-and-out percentage (33.1%). Under his guidance, LB Alex Singleton had a team-high 130 tackles and Edwards had 125 tackles in 2021. The duo finished as two of five NFL players to have 125+ tackles, one interception and one fumble recovery in the regular season.

He spent his first two seasons (2018-19) with the Vikings as a defensive quality control coach and added the title of assistant linebackers in 2020. He helped Eric Kendricks and Eric Wilson

become the only pair of linebackers in the league in 2020 to have 100+ tackles and 3+ INTs that season. In 2019, Kendricks was selected to his first Pro Bowl and was named first-team All-Pro after having a career-high and team-leading 110 tackles to go along with 12 passes defended, tied for the most among NFL linebackers. Pro Football Focus named Kendricks as the league's highest-graded linebacker in 2019.

Rallis (RAW-liss) started his coaching career as a quality control coach at Wake Forest in 2017. He played at Edina (MN) High School and was the #8 recruit in the state of Minnesota as a senior according to Rivals.com prior to playing linebacker collegiately at the University of Minnesota (2012-16). As a Golden Gopher, Rallis appeared in 26 games, including starting three games as a senior. His older brother, Mike, also played linebacker at Minnesota (2008-12).

He graduated with a degree in Business Marketing from Minnesota and earned his master's in Sport and Exercise Science. Rallis and his wife, Devin, have two sons, Kendrick and Dominick.

Drew Terrell is in his eighth season in the NFL and third with the Cardinals as passing game coordinator/wide receivers. He came to Arizona in 2023 after coaching wide receivers in Washington the previous three years (2020-22).

Last year, rookie WR Marvin Harrison Jr. had 62 receptions for 885 yards and 8 TDs. His 8 TDs tied the franchise rookie record (Anquan Boldin & Larry Fitzgerald) while he finished second in team history in receptions and receiving yards by a rookie (Boldin). Arizona finished the year with over 6,000 total yards (6,090) for just the fifth time in team history and the Cardinals had a 3,000-yard passer (Kyler Murray), a 1,000-yard receiver (Trey McBride) and a 1,000-yard rusher (James Conner) in a single-season for just the fifth-time in team annals.

Third-year TE Trey McBride finished with 111 receptions for 1,146 yards in 2024, shattering his own franchise single-season record for receptions by a tight end (81 in 2023) and joining Hall of Famer Jackie Smith as the only TEs in franchise history with 1,000+ receiving yards in a season. That followed up his 2023 season as he led the team with 81 receptions for 825 yards.

During his three seasons in Washington, Terrell helped guide the development of standout WR Terry McLaurin – one of just eight players in the NFL with 1,000+ receiving yards in each of the three previous seasons (2020-22). In 2022, McLaurin set single-season career highs in receiving yards (1,191) and scrimmage yards (1,220) while joining Gary Clark (1989-91), Art Monk (1984-86) and Henry Ellard (1994-96) as the only players in franchise history with three consecutive seasons of 1,000+ receiving yards. His performance in 2022 earned McLaurin his first Pro Bowl selection. Working with Terrell for the first time in 2020, McLaurin established a career high with 87 receptions while becoming the first Commanders players with a 1,000-yard receiving season (1,118) since 2016.

Terrell also worked with Washington rookie WR Jahan Dotson in 2022. The Commanders first-round pick in the 2022 NFL Draft, Dotson finished his debut season with 35 receptions for 523

yards and a team-high seven TD receptions. His seven TD catches tied Green Bay's Christian Watson for the most among NFL rookies that season and was just one shy of tying Washington's franchise rookie record (8).

Prior to the Commanders, Terrell was an offensive quality control coach in Carolina for two seasons (2018-19). In 2018, the Panthers had 5,972 offensive yards, the second highest total in franchise history.

He joined the Panthers following three seasons (2015-17) as a graduate assistant at the University of Michigan. In his first two years, Terrell worked with wide receivers and returners and tutored cornerbacks and returners in his final season. While with the Wolverines, Terrell worked with two receivers who were selected in the 2017 NFL Draft—Amara Darboh by Seattle in the third round and Jehu Chesson by Kansas City in the fourth round.

In his final season at Michigan in 2017, Terrell helped coach future professionals CB David Long and CB Lavert Hill who were named by Pro Football Focus as one of the top cornerback duos in the country with Long posting the nation's lowest passer rating when targeted at 17.6. Terrell began his coaching career in 2014 as an offensive graduate assistant working with wide receivers at Virginia Tech. While with the Hokies, he assisted in the development of wideouts Cam Phillips and Isaiah Ford, who finished their collegiate careers ranked first and second respectively for the most receptions in school history.

Terrell played four seasons as a wide receiver and punt returner at Stanford (2009-12), earning honorable mention All-Pac 12 honors as a returner three times (2010-12). He posted a breakout season as a senior, leading the team with 33 receptions for 463 yards and four TDs while adding 291 return yards. Stanford finished the 2012 season with a 12-2 record and won both the Pac-12 Championship and the Rose Bowl. He graduated from Stanford with a degree in Political Science.

A Chandler, AZ native, Terrell (tuh-RELL) attended Stanford



following a decorated career at Hamilton (Chandler, AZ) High School. An All-State selection as both a wide receiver and punt returner as a senior in 2008, he was rated as the top wide

receiver recruit in the state of Arizona and the 10th rated overall prospect by Rivals.com. Terrell helped the Huskies win three regional championships and two 5A Division I state titles.

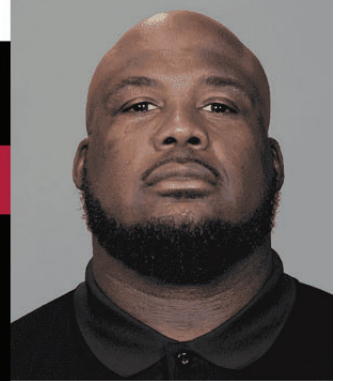

Chris Cook is in his fourth season in the NFL and third with Arizona as assistant offensive line coach. He came to the Cardinals in 2023 from Duke University where he spent the 2022 season as an offensive analyst after serving as an offensive quality control coach with the Denver Broncos in 2021.

Last season, the Cardinals had 2,451 rushing yards and 18 TDs on 463 carries (5.29 avg.). The 2,451 rushing yards represent the 3rd-highest single-season total in franchise history and the most rushing yards in a season since 1979. Arizona's 5.29 yards per carry average is the highest in team history, breaking the mark of 5.09 in 2019, and is the 16th-best single season average in NFL history. Only four teams allowed fewer sacks (30) than the Cardinals in 2024.

In Cook's first season with the Cardinals in 2023, Arizona finished 4th in the NFL in rushing yards (2,365) and 2nd in rushing average (5.02) while leading the league with four games of 200+ rushing yards. It was the fourth-most rushing yards in a single-season in Cardinals history and the second-best rushing average in team annals. The 2023 season marked just the second time since 1970 – and first time in 44 years – the Cardinals finished a season ranked in the top-5 in the league in rushing yards (3rd in 1979). The Cardinals led the NFL with 23 runs of 20+ yards in 2023, becoming one of only three teams to have at least 23 runs of 20+ yards in the last 10 years. First-round pick Paris Johnson Jr. started all 17 games at RT as a rookie.

In the 2024 offseason, Cook was selected to serve as the offensive line coach for the National team at the Senior Bowl.

While working with the Broncos, Cook assisted Denver's offensive line and helped T Garrett Bolles get selected as a Pro Bowl alternate in 2021. He was part of the Bill Walsh Diversity Coaching Fellowship for three consecutive training camps with the Atlanta Falcons (2018-19) and the Cleveland Browns (2020).

Prior to his time in Denver, Cook spent two years at the University of Akron (2019-20) as tight ends coach while also working as the director of player development and engagement. Cook coached at his alma mater, the University of Tennessee-Chattanooga, for two seasons (2017-18) as the tight ends and offensive tackles coach and added the title of recruiting coordinator in 2018. While with the Mocs, he guided TE Bailey Lenior to All-Southern Conference honors in 2017.

In 2016, Cook worked as the offensive quality control coordinator and assistant offensive line coach at East Carolina. Prior his time with the Pirates, he spent one season (2015) as the defensive line coach at Independence (Charlotte, NC) High School.

He was a two-year starter at center at UT-Chattanooga (2001-03) and was an All-American selection in 2002. Cook was named the team's offensive MVP in 2002 and was selected as a team captain in 2003. Following his college career, Cook played three seasons in the Arena Football League with the Kansas City Brigade (2007-09).

A native of Wingate, NC, Cook graduated from UT-Chattanooga with a bachelor's degree in Communications. He and his wife, Mandisa, have a son, Mayor and daughter, Paige.

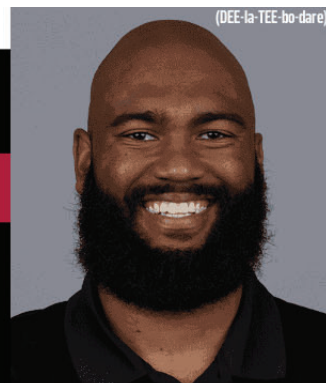

Winston DeLattiboudere III (DEE-lat-TEE-bo-DARE) joined the Cardinals as defensive line coach on 2/12/25 after spending the past two seasons (2023-24) coaching at his alma mater, the University of Minnesota.

He has previous experience working in the NFL as a two-time participant of the Bill Walsh Diversity Coaching Fellowship during training camps with the Green Bay Packers (2023) and Jacksonville Jaguars (2022).

DeLattiboudere joined Minnesota's coaching staff in 2023 as the team's defensive line coach and added the title of assistant head coach in 2024. Last year, he helped the Golden Gophers finish 5th nationally in total defense (285.7 ypg), 9th in scoring defense (16.9 ppg) and 12th in rushing defense (109.6 ypg).

Minnesota increased their sack total from 19 in 2022 before he arrived to 26 in 2023 and 28 in 2024. The Golden Gophers defensive line had 20 sacks in 2023 and 17.5 sacks in 2024 after only having 10.5 sacks the year prior to his arrival. DeLattiboudere was college teammates with Cardinals defensive coordinator Nick Rallis while the pair played together at Minnesota (2015-16).

DE Jah Joyner finished his Golden Gophers career with 10.5 sacks, the 10th most in school history and was a two-time All-Big Ten selection. In 2024, he was second on the team in sacks (4.5), tied for the lead in QB hurries (9) and led the team in forced fumbles (2). In 2023, Joyner had a team-leading 7.5 sacks while DE Danny Striggow had 6.0 sacks and 51 tackles en route to being named all-conference. Minnesota's defensive line forced six fumbles, had three fumble recoveries and had seven passes defended with one interception in 2023.

In 2024, DeLattiboudere was selected to the American Football Coaches Association's 35 Under 35 Coaches Leadership Institute which is aimed at identifying and developing premier, future

leaders in the football coaching profession. In his first season with Minnesota, he also held the title of newcomer coordinator and assisted in the transition for freshman and transfers entering the program.

DeLattiboudere returned to coach at his alma mater after one season (2022) as the defensive line coach at Akron. While at Akron, he tutored DL Victor Jones, who led the Zips in sacks (5.5) and tackles for loss (11.5). Akron improved their run defense by nearly 85 yards from the previous season and improved their sack total and tackles for loss total as well.

Prior to Akron, DeLattiboudere spent the 2021 season as a graduate assistant at Oregon where he assisted with the Ducks defensive line. During that season, he helped coach future first-round pick DE Kayvon Thibodeaux as he was a unanimous first-team All-American and a finalist for the Bronko Nagurski Trophy and Chuck Bednarik Award after having 7.0 sacks. He also coached DT Popo Aumavae and DE Brandon Dorius who were both first-team All-Pac 12 selections.

DeLattiboudere began his coaching career in 2020 as a graduate assistant working with the defensive line at Charlotte. At Charlotte, he worked with three defensive linemen --- DE Romeo McKnight, DE Tyriq Harris & DT Timmy Horne --- who all earned All-Conference USA honors.

He played five seasons (2015-19) as a defensive lineman at Minnesota and appeared in 51 games (36 starts), finishing his career with 83 tackles (43 solo), 13.5 tackles for loss and 5.0 sacks. DeLattiboudere earned academic All-Big Ten honors as a senior in 2019 while also earning the Big Ten Sportsmanship Award and the team's Tony Dungy Award for character and community service that same year. As a true freshman, he won the Golden Gophers Defensive Scout Team Award.

A former running back who played collegiately at Notre Dame and holds the school record for rushing yards (4,318) and ranks second in both rushing TDs (43) and all-purpose yards (5,327), Autry Denson is in his third season as the Cardinals running backs coach after joining the team on 3/1/23. He came to Arizona with 12 years of collegiate coaching experience, including four seasons (2019-22) as the head coach at Charleston Southern University.

Cardinals RB James Conner ran for a career-high 1,094 yards and eight TDs on 236 carries (4.6 avg.) in 2024 while adding 414 receiving yards and a TD on 47 receptions. He finished last year with a career-best 1,508 scrimmage yards. It was Conner's second consecutive 1,000-yard season, joining Ottis Anderson and Edgerrin James as the only players in team history with multiple seasons of 1,000+ rushing yards. Conner also became the first player in franchise history to have 1,000+ scrimmage yards in each of his first four seasons with the team. He had six games of 100+ rushing yards in 2024, the most for a Cardinals player since Ottis Anderson (7) in 1983.

In 2024, the Cardinals had 2,451 rushing yards and 18 TDs on 463 carries (5.29 avg.). The 2,451 rushing yards represent the 3rd-highest single-season total in franchise history and the most rushing yards in a season since 1979. Arizona's 5.29 yards per carry average is the highest in team history, breaking the mark of 5.09 in 2019, and is the 16th-best single season average in NFL history.

Conner had his first 1,000-yard season (1,040) in 2023 and had his third consecutive year with the Cardinals of 1,000+ scrimmage yards (1,205). He led the NFL in runs of 20+ yards (11), ranked 2nd in rushing yards/game (80.0) and 3rd in runs of 10+ yards. The Cardinals led the NFL with 23 runs of 20+ yards, becoming one of only three teams to have at least 23 runs of 20+ yards in the last 10 years. Arizona finished the season 4th in the NFL in rushing yards (2,365) and 2nd in rushing average (5.02) while leading the league with four games of 200+ rushing yards. The 2023 season marked just the second time since 1970 – and first time in 44 years – the Cardinals finished a season ranked in the top-5 in the league in rushing yards (3rd in 1979).

In the 2024 offseason, Denson was selected to serve as the running backs coach for the American team at the Senior Bowl.

Before coming to the NFL, Denson coached running backs at his alma mater, Notre Dame, for four seasons (2015-18) prior to taking the job at Charleston Southern. Denson also was a two-time participant of the NFL's Bill Walsh Diversity Coaching Fellowship (Indianapolis 2012-13). As head coach at Charleston Southern, Denson had a 6-6 record in his first season (2019) and had 12 players on the Big South All-Conference team that season, including All-American S Cody Cline. After a shortened season in 2020 due to COVID, the Buccaneers finished the next two seasons with a combined 6-14 record.

As a Notre Dame assistant, Denson helped the Fighting Irish to an undefeated regular season in 2018 and a spot in the College Football Playoff semifinals at the Cotton Bowl. Notre Dame ran for 2,695 yards that year, paced by RB Dexter Williams' team-leading 995 rushing yards and 12 TDs. In 2017, the Irish ran for 3,503 yards as a team, the 7th best rushing offense (269.3 ypg) in the FBS. RB Josh Adams had 1,430 rushing yards and RB Brandon Wimbush had 14 TDs that season. As a team, Notre Dame ran for 1,471 yards and 10 TDs in 2016, gaining an average of 5.3 yards per carry.

In his first year with the Fighting Irish in 2015, the team had a 6.5-yard rushing average as Denson tutored RB C.J. Prosise who ran for 1,032 yards. Prosise, who was drafted by Seattle in the third-round of the 2016 NFL Draft, eclipsed 1,000 rushing yards faster than any Irish running back in school history outside of All-American Reggie Brooks (1992). Adams rushed for a freshman school record 835 yards in 2015, including a freshman program single-game record 168 yards at Stanford. Notre Dame averaged 207.6 rushing yards per game that season.

Denson returned to Notre Dame as an assistant in 2015 after coaching running backs at Miami (OH) University (2014) and Bethune-Cookman (2011-13). While at Bethune-Cookman, Denson helped the Wildcats to a 10-3 record and berth in the FCS playoffs in 2013. In 2012, RB Isidore Jackson ran for 1,069 yards, becoming the first Wildcat to eclipse 1,000 rushing yards since 1997. His running back group that season ran for 2,928 yards and 28 TDs, helping Bethune-Cookman lead the conference and rank 10th nationally in rushing (244.4 ypg). The previous year, the Wildcats ran for 2,058 yards and finished 5th in the FCS in rushing offense (259.3 ypg). Denson started his coaching career as the head coach at Pope John Paul II High School (Boca Raton, FL) in 2010.

He was selected by Tampa Bay in the seventh-round of 1999 NFL Draft and spent time with the Buccaneers (1999), Dolphins (1999-2000), Bears (2001), Colts (2002) and Lions (2002) prior to playing the 2004 season with the Montreal Alouettes of the CFL. Denson appeared in 34 career NFL games (one start) and had 212 rushing yards and 133 receiving yards while also returning 45 kickoffs for 1,067 yards (23.7-yard avg.) and collecting 12 special teams tackles. While in the CFL in 2004, he finished 8th in the league with 772 rushing yards and nine TDs.

Denson finished his record-setting Notre Dame playing career with MVP honors at the 1999 Gator Bowl and was a two-time team MVP (1997-98). A three-year starter, he had 100+ rushing yards in 21 games in his four years with the Irish, had three consecutive 1,000-yard rushing seasons and was an All-American selection as a senior in 1998.

Away from the field, Denson formed a youth program called POISE (Perseverance, Opportunity, Intelligence, Sacrifice, and Effort) that worked with teenage athletes throughout Broward County (FL) in education, on the field, and in Bible study. He was also the inaugural commissioner of the Run for Your Goal



Youth (RFYG) Flag Football League which provided a safe place for the youth of South Florida to learn the game of football. Denson and his family formed the Denson Family Legacy Foundation with the mission of allowing our faith in God to be the foundation of our family. For more information, visit

Denson and his wife, Elaine, have four children: Ashley, Autry, Elijah and Asia along with twin grandchildren, Ace and Aubrey.

Matt Feeney is in his fourth NFL season and first with the Cardinals after joining Arizona's coaching staff as outside linebackers coach on 2/12/25.

Feeney came to the Cardinals after spending the previous three seasons (2022-24) as a defensive assistant with the Las Vegas Raiders where he worked with the outside and inside linebackers in addition to the defensive backs. He was the Raiders assistant defensive backs coach in 2024 and under his guidance, S Isaiah Pola-Mao was named the AFC Defensive Player of the Week (Week 16), making him just the seventh defensive back in team history and the first since 2020 to win the award.

In 2023, the Raiders featured a defense that was 9th in the NFL for fewest points allowed per game (19.5) and 12th for fewest passing yards allowed per game (212.4).

Following the promotion of Antonio Pierce to interim head coach in Week 9 of the 2023 season, Feeney was promoted to interim linebackers coach. Under his tutelage, LB Robert Spillane won his first ever AFC Defensive Player of the Week in Week 10 and set single season career-highs in tackles (148), sacks (3.5) and interceptions (3). LB Divine Deablo had a career-high 106 tackles (55 solo), the first 100+ tackle season of his career.

In his first season with the Raiders in 2022, Feeney assisted the linebackers and helped develop undrafted rookie free agent LB Luke Masterson who finished that season ranked third in the NFL in tackles (50) amongst all undrafted rookies and second in team history for tackles by an undrafted rookie.

Prior to coaching with the Raiders, Feeney spent three seasons (2019-21) at the University of Akron as defensive coordinator

and inside linebackers coach. Under his tutelage, LB John Lako and CB Alvin Davis Jr. received all-conference accolades in 2019.

Lako earned first-team All-MAC honors after finishing the season as the team leader with 138 tackles and double-digit tackles in nine games. Davis, the Zips' top defensive back, earned All-MAC recognition for the third consecutive season after being named a first-team selection in 2018 and second-team in 2017.

Feeney went to Akron after spending two seasons (2017-18) at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga where he served as defensive coordinator in 2018 after coaching linebackers in 2017. In 2018, Feeney's defense was #1 in the Southern Conference in pass defense (172.0), scoring defense (18.5) and fumble recoveries (20). LB Isaiah Mack earned Southern Conference Defensive Player of the Year accolades after he finished second in the conference and 19th in the FCS with 8.5 sacks. A total of six players from his defensive unit earned All-Conference honors in 2018.

In 2017, the Mocs' had the top total defense (326.4 ypg) in the conference and was ranked 25th in the FCS. LB Tae Davis, who converted from safety, finished his senior season with 74 tackles over nine games and was signed by the New York Giants as an undrafted free agent.

Feeney entered the coaching ranks at his alma mater, John Carroll University, where he spent three seasons (2014-16) coaching linebackers. Throughout his tenure, the Blue Streaks defense finished each year ranked in the top-15 of all Division III schools. In his final season with the Blue Streaks in 2016, LB Mason McKenrick was an All-American selection in addition to earning first-team All-Ohio Athletic Conference honors. In 2015, LB Andy Bryan received first team All-OAC recognition and in



2014 he guided LB Kevin Cope to All-American honors and LB Jimmy King to second team all-conference accolades.

He played linebacker at John Carroll University for four seasons (2010-13) and appeared in 24 games, finishing his career with 117 tackles (46 solo), 11.5 tackles for loss, 5.5 sacks, three interceptions, five passes defended, two forced fumbles and one

fumble recovery. Feeney earned first team All-Conference honors as a senior in 2013 and was named the Gene Slaughter Most Outstanding Linebacker by the Ohio Athletic Conference. He earned his degree in Marketing in 2014.

A Dublin, OH native, Feeney and his wife, Katie, have three daughters.

Justin Frye is in his first season with the Cardinals and the NFL after being hired as the team's offensive line coach on 2/12/25. An 18-year coaching veteran, Frye came to Arizona after spending the previous three seasons (2022-24) at Ohio State, including the past two seasons as the Buckeyes run game coordinator/offensive line coach.

Frye helped the Buckeyes win the College Football National Championship in 2024 as he had two players selected as All-Americans and first-team All-Big Ten (C Seth McLaughlin & G Donovan Jackson). Ohio State had two running backs each go over 1,000 yards and 10 rushing TDs (Quinshon Judkins-1,060 & 14 TDs, TreVeyon Henderson-1,016 & 10 TDs) for only the second time in school history (2013). McLaughlin won the 2024 Rimington Trophy, given to the top center in Division I football.

He added the title of run game coordinator in 2023 and helped three Ohio State offensive linemen get named all-conference. Jackson was a first-team selection while G Matt Jones was second-team and T Josh Fryar was third-team. Frye joined the Buckeyes in 2022 as the associate head coach for offensive/offensive line coach and tutored current Cardinals T Paris Johnson Jr. as he was named a first-team All-American and first-team All-Big Ten. Frye helped five players earn All-Big Ten

honors in 2022 as the Buckeyes ranked 11th in the nation and second in the Big Ten in rushing yards per carry (5.37). The Buckeyes offensive line also helped protect QB C.J. Stroud as Ohio State was one of just two Power 5 schools nationally to finish in the top 10 in both fewest sacks allowed (7th) and fewest tackles for loss allowed (6th).

Prior to Ohio State, Frye spent four seasons (2018-21) at UCLA where he worked as the Bruins offensive line coach and also the team's offensive coordinator for his final three years in Westwood. UCLA ranked top-15 nationally in both 2021 and 2020 after averaging over 200 rushing yards per game each year. It

was only the fourth and fifth seasons since 1990 where the Bruins averaged more than 200 yards per game.

In 2021, UCLA finished 14th nationally and second in the Pac-12 conference with an average of 215.1 rushing yards per game. Current Seahawks RB Zach Charbonnet led the conference with seven 100-yard rushing games and was third in rushing yards (1,137 yards) while RB Brittain Brown topped the conference by averaging 6.03 yards per carry. The Bruins led the conference in scoring (36.5 ppg) and were second in total offense (441.2 ypg). QB Dorian Thompson-Robinson was first in the conference in passing efficiency (153.9) while WR Kyle Phillips led all Pac-12 receivers with 10 receiving TDs. TE Greg Dulcich was a semifinalist for the John Mackey Award as the nation's top tight end and T Sean Rhyan was a first-team all-conference selection.

The 2020 season featured the Bruins highest per carry rushing average (5.1 ypc) since 1976 while UCLA ranked 12th nationally by averaging 230.6 rushing yards per game. They were second in the Pac-12 and 21st nationally in total offense (455.0 ypg) and second in the league in passing efficiency (154.68). UCLA's 31 TDs that season led the league and their scoring offense (35.4 ppg) was 20th nationally. RB Demetric Felton Jr. led the Pac-12 and ranked 6th nationally in all-purpose yards (165.8 ypg). UCLA improved its rushing average per game by more than 70 yards from the previous year.

In 2019, RB Joshua Kelly had his second-straight 1,000-yard rushing season and UCLA had five straight games of 200+ rushing yards for the first time since 1978. Felton set school records for a running back with 55 receptions and four scoring plays of 75+ yards. UCLA improved its rushing average per game by 40 yards from 2018 and T Sean Rhyan was named a consensus freshman All-American selection. Kelley ran for 1,243 yards in 2018, the 10th highest total in school history, and ranked 9th in the FBS



in rushing yards per game that season.

Frye spent five years (2013-17) at Boston College as the team's run game coordinator/offensive line coach where he helped the Eagles make four bowl games in five seasons. In 2013, RB Andre Williams was a Heisman Trophy finalist and the ACC's first Doak Walker Award winner after rushing for 2,177 yards, the fifth-highest total FBS history. He shattered every school single-season record including the most rushing yards in a game (339) and rushing TDs in a game (5). BC's rushing offense ranked 20th nationally (212.5 ypg) which was a 121-yard increase from 2012 Williams' 167.5 rushing average per game led the nation. Three of Frye's offensive linemen (T Matt Patchan, C Andy Gallik and T Ian White) each earned all-conference honors.

In 2014, Boston College averaged 254.7 yards per game, ranking 14th nationally, and allowed just 21 sacks. Four linemen (Gallik, T Seth Betancourt, T Ian Silberman, G Bobby Vardaro) earned all-ACC honors. In 2017, BC ranked 25th in the nation in rushing offense (220.4 ypg) and RB AJ Dillon was 7th in the country in rushing (1,589 yards) while adding 14 TDs. Dillon averaged 122.2 yards per game, the 12th best mark in the nation that year.

Frye went to Boston College after working as the offensive line coach at Temple for two seasons (2011-12). He coached an offensive line that had the top rushing offense in the Big East conference in 2012 as the Owls averaged 201.2 yards per game (31st in NCAA). RB Montel Harris was an All-Big East first-team selection after leading the conference by averaging 105.4

rushing yards per game. In 2011, Temple set school records for the most rushing yards (3,335) and rushing touchdowns (38) in a single-season while ranking 7th in the country in rushing offense (256.5 ypg). RB Bernard Pierce finished 6th in the NCAA in rushing average per game (123.4 ypg) and OL Pat Boyle and OL Wayne Tribue earned all-conference honors.

He began his coaching career at his alma mater, Indiana University, as an offensive graduate assistant for two years (2007-08) where he worked with the offensive line and tight ends and helped the Hoosiers play in the 2007 Insight Bowl at Sun Devil Stadium in Tempe, AZ. Frye then spent two seasons (2009-10) as a graduate assistant at Florida where he worked with the Gators offensive line. In 2009, the Gators led the SEC in rushing and total offense and featured future NFL draft picks Maurkice Pouncey, Mike Pouncey, Marcus Gilbert and Maurice Hurt. Maurkice Pouncey won the 2009 Rimington Award as the college football's most outstanding center.

Frye played on the offensive line at Indiana (2002-06) and set a school record with 45 consecutive starts to finish his career. As a senior in 2006, he was a team captain and was voted the team's most outstanding offensive lineman. Frye was an all-state performer at Elwood High School. His late father, Kevin, was a fullback and tight end for the Hoosiers from 1977-81 and played in the 1979 Holiday Bowl.

He earned his degree in 2006 from Indiana in Sports Communications and Broadcasting. Frye and his wife, Lauren, have four children: Kevin, Zoe, Max and Welles.

Cristian Garcia is in his first season with the Cardinals as linebackers coach after joining the team on 2/12/25. He came to Arizona after spending the 2024 season with the Dallas Cowboys where he was an assistant defensive backs/quality control coach.

Last season with Dallas, Garcia helped the Cowboys rank third in the NFL in sacks (52) and tied for fifth in the league with 16 forced fumbles (Arizona). Pro Bowl CB Trevon Diggs had a team-high 11 passes defended in just 11 games played.

Prior to Dallas, Garcia was with the Washington Commanders for three seasons where he got his start in the NFL. He began in Washington as a defensive assistant in 2021 and was promoted to defensive quality control coach in 2022. Garcia then worked as the Commanders assistant defensive backs/nickels coach in 2023. Garcia was elevated to interim defensive backs coach during the 2023 season. During his time in Washington, the Commanders defense had four Pro Bowl selections.

Blaine Gautier is in his third season with the Cardinals and first as an offensive quality control coach after getting promoted on 2/12/25. He spent his first two seasons with Arizona as the Bill Bidwill Fellowship coach after joining the Cardinals staff on 3/16/23.

In the 2025 offseason, Gautier was selected to serve as the quarterbacks coach for the American team at the Senior Bowl.

Gautier was the sixth individual to participate in the Bill Bidwill Coaching Fellowship, which was established prior to the 2015 season and designed to increase diversity and create additional opportunities for coaching experience at the highest level.

He came to the Cardinals from Baylor University where he was the associate director of player personnel with the Bears in 2022. Gautier spent the 2022 offseason as an offensive analyst at Michigan State after coaching wide receivers at McNeese State for two years (2020-21).

Following the postponement of his first season at McNeese State until the spring of 2021 due to COVID-19, Gautier coached all-conference WR Josh Matthews who led the team and ranked 2nd in the Southland Conference in both receptions (32) and receiving yards (458) while also ranking 4th in the league with four TD receptions. Matthews had 36 receptions for 463 yards and three TDs in the fall of 2021 while WR Pierce Mason led the Cowboys with five TD receptions that season.

Prior to working at McNeese State, Gautier started his coaching career at LSU as an offensive analyst for five seasons (2015-19). He assisted with the wide receivers while at LSU and was a part of the 2019 National Championship team that went 15-0.

Gautier played quarterback collegiately at the University of Louisiana (2009-12) and threw for 4,159 yards and 32 TDs while rushing for 883 yards and 12 TDs. After a record-setting junior season in 2011, he ranks second in the school's single-season record book for passing yards (2,958), passing TDs (23), passing efficiency (153.6), total offense (3,444 yards) and total touchdowns (26). Gautier set a single-game school record with 492 yards of total offense vs. San Diego State in the New Orleans Bowl while his 470 passing yards in that game rank 2nd in program history. He earned second-team All-Sun Belt Conference honors in 2011 along with first-team All-Louisiana and Louisiana Offensive Player of the Year accolades from the Louisiana Sports Writers Association.

As a senior at Lutchter (LA) High School, Gautier earned first-team All-State honors after throwing for 2,743 yards and 30 TDs, becoming the first-ever recipient of the Warrick Dunn Player of the Year Award. He also earned All-State honors as a junior after throwing for 2,785 yards and 31 TDs while leading the school to a Class 3A state title.

Gautier (GO-chay) earned his bachelor's degree from the University of Louisiana in Sports Management in 2012.

DJ Gillins is in his first season with the Cardinals as the Bill Bidwill Fellowship coach after joining Arizona's staff on 2/14/25.

Gillins is the seventh individual to participate in the Bill Bidwill Coaching Fellowship, which was established prior to the 2015 season and designed to increase diversity and create additional opportunities for coaching experience at the highest level.

He came to the Cardinals from Stony Brook University where he was the running backs coach with the Seawolves last season. Under Gillins' mentorship, RB Roland Dempster had a record-breaking season in 2024, leading Stony Brook in rushing yards (1,332), rushing attempts (268), rushing yards per game (111.0) and all-purpose yards per game (138.9) and was a finalist for Walter Payton Award, known as the Heisman of the FCS.

Prior to Stony Brook, Gillins spent two seasons (2022-23) at Long Island University where he was the wide receivers coach. He also made previous coaching stops as a graduate assistant at

Utah State (2019) as well Arkansas (2019) and Utah (2020) working with wide receivers before landing his first full-time role at Iowa Western Community College as the wide receivers coach.

Gillins played quarterback collegiately at four different schools, appearing in 11 total games. He played at Wisconsin (2014-15), Pearl River (MS) Community College (2016), SMU (2017) and UTSA (2018) in his college career.

He attended Jean Ribault (Jacksonville, FL) High School where he was a four star recruit by ESPN, Rivals and ranked as the #4 dual threat quarterback nationally by 247Sports. Gillins was a four-time captain and four-time MVP, throwing for 7,221 yards and 76 TDs. He also excelled in basketball at Jean Ribault H.S. where he was teammates with current Phoenix Sun Grayson Allen.

He earned his bachelor's degree in Sociology from SMU in 2018. Gillins is married to his wife, Megan.

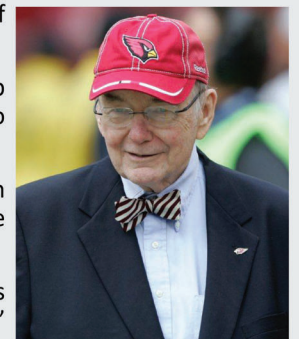

ABOUT THE BILL BIDWILL COACHING FELLOWSHIP: The Cardinals established the Bill Bidwill Coaching Fellowship prior to the 2015 season. Gillins is the seventh individual to participate in the program, which is designed to increase diversity and create additional opportunities for coaching experience at the highest level.

The four most recent participants advanced from the fellowship to full-time assistant coach positions – three on the Cardinals coaching staff and one at the NCAA level. This offseason, Connor Senger was promoted to pass game specialist and Blaine Gautier was promoted to offensive quality control with the Cardinals.

Long-time Cardinals owner Bill Bidwill, who passed away in 2019, was at the forefront of providing opportunities to individuals regardless of race or gender. In 2010, he was honored with the Fritz Pollard Alliance's Paul "Tank" Younger Award for promoting diversity in the NFL. In 1978, Adele Harris became the first African American female executive in the NFL when she was hired as the Cardinals director of community relations. In 1981, Bidwill hired attorney Bob Wallace, making him the first African American to handle contract negotiations for an NFL club. In 2004, the Cardinals became the first NFL team to have an African American general manager/head coach duo in Graves and Dennis Green.

Cardinals owner Michael Bidwill was honored by the Fritz Pollard Alliance with the organization's 2019 "Paul J. Tagliabue Award," given to a league or team executive who demonstrates the integrity and leadership Tagliabue exhibited in career development opportunities for minority candidates and advocacy for diversity on the league and club level.

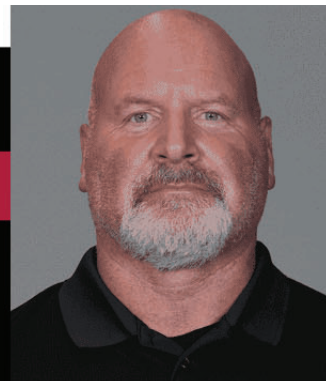

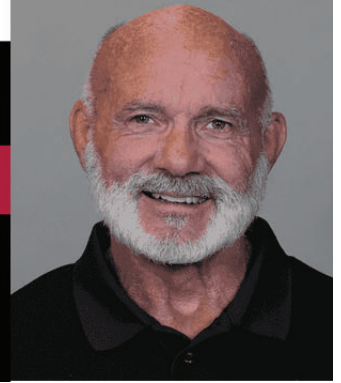

Buddy Morris is in his 12th season with the Cardinals and third as Senior Reconditioning Coordinator. He originally joined the Cardinals strength and conditioning staff in 2014 after previously working in the league with the Cleveland Browns (2002-04). Morris has 20 years of experience at the collegiate level in addition to his 14 years in the NFL.

The 2021 NFL Strength Coach of the Year, Morris has an extensive background in strength and conditioning dating back to his first job at his alma mater, the University of Pittsburgh, where he began his career in 1980 in the first of his three stints with the Panthers. He worked at Pittsburgh from 1980-89 and aided in the development of future Pro Football Hall of Famers Dan Marino, Rickey Jackson, Chris Doleman and Russ Grimm. During that period, Morris worked with 13 first round NFL draft picks and 15 first-team All-Americans.

After working as the wellness director for the Horizon Hospital System in Sharon, PA (1989-97), Morris returned to Pittsburgh from 1997-2001. During his second tenure at Pitt, the Panthers made three bowl appearances: the 1997 Liberty Bowl, the 2000 Insight.com Bowl and the 2001 Tangerine Bowl. Morris also developed the moniker for the Panthers strength and conditioning program, "The Pitt Iron Works." In 2009, Muscle & Fitness Magazine named Morris' gym one of the 10 toughest in

America.

Morris then joined Butch Davis and the Cleveland Browns for three seasons before working at the University of Buffalo in 2006 as its Director of Sports Performance. After one season in Buffalo, he went back for his third stint at Pittsburgh under head coach Dave Wannstedt from 2007-10. The Panthers made the 2008 Sun Bowl and the 2009 Meineke Car Care Bowl during that period.

Following his third stop at Pitt, Morris and his family opened a private gym in Buffalo called the New York Sports Center where he worked with athletes at all levels through personal training, group fitness classes and injury rehabilitation.

Morris worked with Roger Kingdom, a 1984 and 1988 Olympic gold medalist in 110-meter hurdles and also helped develop Pro Football Hall of Fame RB Curtis Martin and Pro Bowl G Ruben Brown while they were at Pittsburgh.

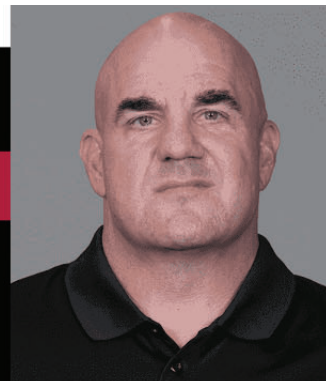

Connor Senger is in his fourth season with the Cardinals and first as pass game specialist after he was promoted on 2/12/25. It is the third straight year he was promoted after serving as assistant quarterbacks coach in 2024 and an offensive quality control coach in 2023. He originally joined Arizona's staff on 3/30/22 as part of the Bill Bidwill Coaching Fellowship assisting with Cardinals quarterbacks.

Cardinals QB Kyler Murray started all 17 games in 2024 and threw for 3,851 yards and 21 TDs with a 93.5 passer rating. He also ran for 572 yards and five TDs. It was his 4th season with 20+ TDs and his 4th with 3,000+ passing yards, tying Neil Lomax for the most seasons in franchise history with 3,000+ passing yards and 20+ TDs. Murray became the third-youngest player in NFL history to reach 19,000 passing yards and 3,000 rushing yards in his career.

Murray returned from a serious knee injury suffered in 2022 and started the final eight games in 2023, throwing for 1,799 yards and 10 TDs while rushing for 244 yards and 3 TDs. With Murray

under center, the Cardinals had the 9th ranked offense in the NFL (362.8 ypg) and averaged 22.4 points per game.

Over the past two years, Senger was selected to serve as the wide receivers coach for the West team at the Shrine Bowl in 2025 and for the American team at the Senior Bowl in 2024.

The Cardinals established the Bill Bidwill Coaching Fellowship prior to the 2015 season. It was designed to increase diversity and create additional opportunities to gain coaching experience at the highest level. Senger was the program's fifth participant.

Senger came to the Cardinals after working as an offensive quality control coordinator for two seasons (2020-21) at North Dakota State, including in 2021 when the Bison won the FCS National Championship. While at NDSU, Senger assisted with opponent breakdowns while helping to run quarterback meetings and overall quarterback development. He also worked with the Bison special teams units, assisted with the play calling process and contributed to recruiting.



Prior to coming to the Cardinals, Senger was the offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach at Central Washington where he was hired in February, 2022.

Senger served as the quarterbacks coach at Carroll University in Wisconsin in 2018 and worked as the running backs coach for Wisconsin-Whitewater in 2019. The Warhawks were the Division III national runner-up during Senger's one year at the school.

A former collegiate quarterback at the University of Wisconsin (2013-14), Senger played his final two seasons at Wisconsin-Oshkosh before beginning his coaching career at the school as

the team's quarterbacks coach in 2017. He was a part of two conference championships at UW-Oshkosh as both a player and a coach and helped quarterback Brett Kasper win the 2017 Gagliardi Trophy as the top player in Division III in 2017.

While at Wisconsin, Senger was named the team's Offensive Scout Team Player of the Year in each of his two seasons at the school. Prior to walking on at Wisconsin, Senger was a three-year captain at Pius XI (Milwaukee, WI) High School and threw for 4,564 passing yards and 37 TDs while also running for 2,190 yards with 39 TDs in his career. He earned his bachelor's degree from UW-Oshkosh in Political Science.

Sam Sewell is in his third season with the Cardinals after being hired as assistant special teams coach on 3/1/23. He came to Arizona from Eastern Michigan where he coached running backs for four years (2019-22) and added the title of special teams coordinator in 2022. Sewell has 13 years of coaching experience at the college level, including eight coaching special teams.

The Cardinals 2024 special teams featured K Chad Ryland who was selected as a Pro Bowl alternate after connecting on 28-of-32 FG attempts and 26-of-27 PATs for a team-high 110 total points in 13 games played. Ryland joined the team in October and became just the third player in NFL history to have three-game winning FGs in the 4th quarter/OT in his first four games with a team. P Blake Gillikin punted 38 times for 1,887 yards (49.7 avg.) in 13 games and had 19 punts landed inside the 20-yard line with just one touchback. He was the only punter in the NFL last season to have at least 30 punts with one or fewer touchbacks. Both Gillikin (NFC Special Teams Player of the Week--Week 9) and Ryland (NFC Special Teams Player of the Month--October) were honored in 2024. KR DeeJay Dallas had a 96-yard kickoff return TD in the season opener, becoming the first player in the NFL to return a new dynamic kickoff for a TD.

With Arizona in 2023, K Matt Prater set a franchise record with nine FGs of 50+ yards, including an NFL single-season record six FGs of 55+ yards. Prater connected on a 62-yard FG in Week 3 vs. Dallas, tying his own franchise record for the longest FG. Gillikin set a new franchise single-season record with a 50.6-yard punting average, the third best average in the NFL in 2023.

During his first season as special teams coordinator at Eastern Michigan in 2022, K Jesus Gomez was named the Mid-American Conference Kicker of the Year after connecting on 14-of-17 FGs and scoring 89 points. KR Jaylon Jackson was named the conference's Specialist of the Year and earned first-team All-MAC honors after returning 23 kickoffs for 571 yards (24.8-yard avg.) and one TD and P Mitchell Tomasek led the conference with a 44.3-yard punting average. Sewell also helped RB Samson Evans rush for 1,166 yards and 15 TDs and earn second-team All-MAC honors in 2022.

In 2021, the Eagles offense averaged 31.0 points per game and converted 42.4 percent (67-of-158) of its third down attempts, finishing as one of the top units in the conference. Evans ranked 4th in the conference with 13 rushing TDs while adding three passing TDs and 19 receptions for 107 yards. In 2020, Sewell helped the Eagles offense amass 2,438 total yards (406.3 ypg), the 4th best finish in school history. EMU also added 23 TDs, the 2nd best mark in program history, and averaged 22.3 first downs per game (134 total) which ranked 6th in program history.

In his first season with the Eagles in 2019, EMU had 5,271 total yards and scored 49 TDs, the most in program history, earning a trip to the Quick Lane Bowl in Detroit. Their 285 first downs, 379 points scored and 5,271 yards of total offense were the 2nd most in school history. RB Shaq Vann finished his career ranked 6th in school history with 24 career TDs and 7th all-time with 2,577 rushing yards.

Prior to Eastern Michigan, Sewell spent two seasons (2017-18) as



the running backs coach at Indiana State. Following an 0-11 record in his first season, the Sycamores completed the biggest turnaround in college football after going 7-4 in 2018 and finishing ranked #22 in the FCS. RB Ja'Quan Keys earned first-team All-MVFC honors after rushing for a league-best 13 TDs and led the team with 135.4 rushing yards per game.

Sewell spent seven seasons coaching in Division II with stops at Colorado State-Pueblo (2010-12, 2015-16) and McKendree University (2013-14). In his first stint at Colorado State-Pueblo, Sewell coached tight ends/special teams (2010-12) before returning to the program in 2015 as running backs coach/co-special teams coordinator. During his first stint at CSU-Pueblo, the ThunderWolves won two consecutive RMAC Championships and combined for a 23-2 record. In 2015, the ThunderWolves ranked 6th nationally in rushing (291.0 ypg). Brothers Cameron and Bernard McDondle combined for 3,674 rushing yards, establishing a new NCAA record for rushing yards by two RBs on

the same team. Cameron finished third for the Harlon Hill Trophy, given to the top player in Division II, after finishing 2nd nationally in rushing yards, rushing yards per game and rushing TDs. Bernard led Division II in rushing yards per carry that season. The pair helped CSU-Pueblo become just the 4th team in NCAA Division II history to produce both a 2,000-yard rusher and a 1,000-yard rusher in the same season.

While at McKendree, Sewell served as running backs coach and special teams coordinator. Sewell helped improve the special teams unit in nearly every statistical category, with the team finishing second in the nation in punt return average. He also served as the recruiting coordinator for the 2013 class.

Sewell was a two-year starter at the University of Northern Colorado (2006-10) and appeared in 31 games at tight end and on special teams. He earned a bachelor's degree in Recreation Tourism & Hospitality in 2010.

Ryan Smith is in his third season with the Cardinals after he was hired to coach cornerbacks on 3/1/23. He came to Arizona from Northwestern University where he spent the 2022 season in the same role with the Wildcats.

In 2024, Arizona's defense was one of the best in the NFL in the second half of the season. Over the final 11 games, the Cardinals were 4th in the league allowing an average of just 19.6 points per game. They allowed the fewest total TDs (20) and passing TDs (10) in the NFL during that span. Second-year CB Garrett Williams was named a second-team All-Pro by PFF after having two INTs, nine passes defended and 58 tackles.

In his first season with the Cardinals in 2023, Smith mentored veteran CB Antonio Hamilton Sr. to a career year with 36 tackles, an INT and a team-leading 11 passes defended.

While at Northwestern, Smith tutored CB Cam Mitchell who was a 2023 fifth-round pick of the Cleveland Browns. Prior to working at Northwestern, Smith spent two seasons (2020-21) at Virginia Tech coaching cornerbacks and added the title of defensive pass game coordinator in 2021. He was named to the 24/7Sports.com College Football Rising Stars list in 2020.

In his first season at Virginia Tech in 2020, Smith mentored future Titans first-round pick CB Caleb Farley while also tutoring freshman All-American CB Dorian Strong. In 2021, he helped CB Jermaine Walker to All-ACC second-team honors after finishing with a league-best four INTs.

Smith coached safeties and was a pro scout liaison at James Madison in 2019, helping the Dukes finish 1st in the FCS in total defense (264.7 ypg and 3rd in scoring defense (14.9 ppg) on the way to an appearance in the FCS National Championship Game. James Madison tied for 7th in the FCS with 17 INTs, 11 of which came from Smith's safeties. Under his tutelage, safeties Adam Smith and D'Angelo Amos both earned first-team all-conference honors. Smith led the team with six INTs and was a third-team All-American selection while Amos had two INTs and three blocked kicks.

Prior to his time at James Madison, Smith spent two seasons (2017-18) coaching the secondary at Elon University where he had multiple players earn All-Conference honors. Defensive backs Greg Liggs Jr. (2nd) and Tyler Campbell (3rd) were all-conference selections in 2018. Liggs Jr. and DB Connor Christiansen tied for 3rd in the conference that season after each had four INTs.



Smith went to Elon after spending two seasons (2015-16) at Penn State as a defensive graduate assistant where he was part of a 2016 team that won the Big Ten Championship and played in the Rose Bowl, finishing with an 11-3 record. The Nittany Lions had 10 INTs and broke up 60 passes in 2015. He helped develop four future NFL defensive backs in Marcus Allen, Troy Apke, Trevor Williams and Jordan Lucas. Smith started his coaching career as a defensive graduate assistant at the University of Texas-San Antonio in 2014.

He played cornerback collegiately at William & Mary (2010-13)

and helped the Tribe to the 2009 FCS semifinals. As a senior, Smith started all 12 games and finished the season with 47 tackles, two tackles for loss, a sack, 10 passes defended and an interception. He played 22 games at William & Mary and was a two-time CAA Academic All-Conference selection (2012-13).

A native of King George, VA, Smith graduated from William & Mary in 2014 with a bachelor's degree in Process Management and received his master's degree in Educational Leadership from Penn State. He and his wife, Kristina, have two daughters, Leila Michele and Soleil.

Ben Steele is in his 18th season coaching and 12th in the NFL after joining Arizona's staff on 3/1/23 as tight ends coach. He came to the Cardinals from Denver after working as the Broncos assistant offensive line coach in 2022.

Over the past two seasons, TE Trey McBride has re-written the Cardinals record books for a tight end. In 2024, he was named to his first Pro Bowl after catching 111 passes for 1,146 yards and four total TDs. He shattered his own franchise single-season record for receptions by a tight end (81 in 2023) and joined Hall of Famer Jackie Smith as the only TEs in franchise history with 1,000+ receiving yards in a season.

McBride's 111 receptions are the second-most in franchise history by a player at any position and also marked the 4th-best total in NFL history by a TE. His 221 career receptions are the most by a TE in their first three seasons in NFL history (216, George Kittle; 2017-19). He finished second in the league last season in receptions and receiving yards by a TE (Brock Bowers). McBride also had three games in 2024 with double-digit receptions, tied for the second-most in a single-season in team history. He has five total games with double-digit receptions in his career, tied for the fifth-most in franchise history.

In 2023, McBride led the team in receptions (81) and receiving yards (825) while also adding three TDs. He also had two games of 100+ receiving yards that season after it hadn't been done by a Cardinals TE in the past 34 years and had two games with 10+ receptions, a first in team history for a TE.

In 2024, the Cardinals had 2,451 rushing yards and 18 TDs on

463 carries (5.29 avg.). The 2,451 rushing yards represent the 3rd-highest single-season total in franchise history and the most rushing yards in a season since 1979. Arizona's 5.29 yards per carry average is the highest in team history, breaking the mark of 5.09 in 2019, and is the 16th-best single season average in NFL history. Arizona finished the 2023 season 4th in the NFL in rushing yards (2,365) and 2nd in rushing average (5.02) while leading the league with four games of 200+ rushing yards. The 2023 season marked just the second time since 1970 – and first time in 44 years – the Cardinals finished a season ranked in the top-5 in the league in rushing yards (3rd in 1979). It was the fourth-most rushing yards in a single-season in Cardinals history and the second-best rushing average in team annals.

Prior to coaching in Denver in 2022, Steele spent one season (2021) as the assistant offensive line coach with the Minnesota Vikings following two seasons with the Atlanta Falcons where he was an offensive assistant (2019) and tight ends coach (2020). Steele entered the NFL with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers and worked for three seasons (2014-16) as an offensive quality control coach before coaching tight ends for two years (2017-18).

During his time in Minnesota, Steele helped mentor an offensive line that paved the way for RB Dalvin Cook and WR Justin Jefferson to produce 1,000-yard rushing and receiving seasons and QB Kirk Cousins to throw for over 4,000 yards and 33 TDs. All three were named to the Pro Bowl in 2021, as was Vikings RT Brian O'Neill, who earned his first career Pro Bowl selection that season. Behind an offensive line that allowed the fifth-fewest sacks in the NFL (30), the Vikings offense was one of just three

(Dallas, Cincinnati) to feature a 4,000-yard passer, a 1,000-yard receiver and a 1,000-yard rusher.

During his tenure in Atlanta, Steele coached TE Austin Hooper to his second Pro Bowl after catching 75 passes for 787 yards and six TDs in 2019. TE Hayden Hurst had a career-high 56 receptions for 571 yards (10.2-yard avg.) and six TDs in 2020.

In 2021, the Falcons were 6th in the NFL passing attempts, 2nd in passing yards and 3rd in total TDs while the team ranked 4th in passing attempts and 5th in passing yards in 2020. Steele entered the NFL with the Buccaneers where he spent five seasons (2014-18), including his final two years overseeing tight ends. While coaching tight ends in 2018, he helped TEs Cameron Brate and O.J. Howard combine for 64 receptions, 865 receiving yards and 11 TDs.

Before entering the NFL coaching ranks, Steele spent six seasons at the collegiate level. He worked at the University of California-Davis as the tight ends coach/recruiting coordinator (2013) and as an offensive assistant at the University of California from 2011-12. Steele spent two years at the University of Colorado as

an operations & recruiting assistant (2009) and as a graduate assistant (2010). He began his coaching career at his alma mater, Mesa State, as an offensive assistant in 2008.

Steele played tight end in the NFL after entering the league as an undrafted rookie free agent with San Francisco in 2001. Following a stint with the Frankfurt Galaxy NFL Europe in 2002, he spent time with the Vikings during training camp in 2003 and 2004 before appearing in 17 career regular season games and one postseason contest with Green Bay (2004-05) where he had four receptions for 42 yards and a fumble recovery.

He played two seasons collegiately at Fort Lewis College (1997-98) before finishing his career at Mesa State University (1999-2000). As a senior at Mesa State, Steele received All-Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference honors.

A native of Palisade, CO, Steele graduated from Mesa State with a bachelor's degree in Communications with an emphasis in Broadcasting. He and his wife, Rachel, have three daughters: Cora, Theresa and Elise; and two sons: Creed and Luke.

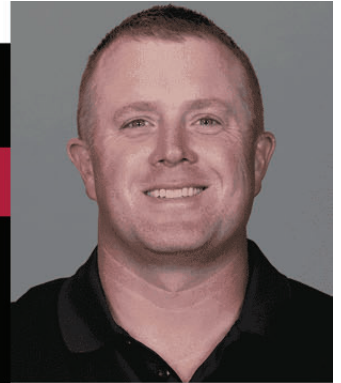

Shea Thompson is in his third season with the Cardinals after joining the team as Director, Football Performance on 3/1/23.

He came to Arizona in 2023 from the San Francisco 49ers where he spent four years (2019-22) as the director of performance monitoring/assistant strength & conditioning. During his four years with San Francisco, the 49ers played in three NFC Championship games (2021-22, '19) and advanced to Super Bowl LIV following his first season with the team in 2019.

Prior to working with the 49ers, Thompson spent three seasons (2016-18) with the Cincinnati Bengals strength & conditioning department as a sports scientist. During his time in Cincinnati, he also served as a sports science specialist with Ignition Athletic Performance Group.

Patrick Toney is in his third season with Arizona after being hired to coach Cardinals defensive backs on 3/1/23.

He worked with All-Pro safety Budda Baker the past two seasons including in 2024 as Baker was named to his 7th Pro Bowl and his 6th consecutive selection at safety. Baker also earned 2nd team All-Pro honors last season after establishing a career-high with 164 tackles and 10 tackles for loss to go along with 2.0 sacks, five passes defended, three QB hits and a forced fumble. His 164 tackles led all NFL defensive backs and ranked 2nd in the NFL among all defenders (Zaire Franklin-173).

Arizona's defense was one of the best in the NFL in the second half of last season. Over the final 11 games, the Cardinals were 4th in the league allowing an average of just 19.6 points per game. They also allowed the fewest total TDs (20) and passing TDs (10) in the NFL during that span.

In 2023, Baker was selected to his 6th Pro Bowl in 2023 and finished 2nd on the team with 87 tackles and had a team-high four games with double-digit tackles despite missing five games due to injury. Fellow safety Jalen Thompson set career-highs in 2023 with four INTs (team-high), 9 passes defended and 5 tackles for loss while also recording his first career sack and forced fumble.

Toney came to the Cardinals in 2023 after working at the collegiate level the previous 11 years, including in 2022 at the University of Florida where he was the Gators co-defensive coordinator/safeties coach. He went to Florida after four seasons (2018-21) at the University of Louisiana where he served as the defensive coordinator for his final two seasons in addition to coaching safeties and outside linebackers.

During his two seasons (2020-21) as the defensive coordinator at Louisiana, the Ragin Cajuns went 23-2 and won two Sun Belt Championships, giving up the fewest points (501) and yards per play (5.02) in the conference while forcing the most takeaways (46). The team's 16 INTs in 2020 tied for the most in the conference and the 3rd most in the nation.

In 2021, Louisiana finished 1st in the Sun Belt Conference in scoring defense (18.3 ppg) and tied for 9th nationally. The year

before, they ranked 4th in the conference and 31st in the country in scoring defense (22.0 ppg) while also ranking 4th in the league and 33rd nationally in total defense (355.4 ypg). He coached four players who earned all-conference honors in 2020 (Zi'Yon Hill & Bralen Trahan-2nd team; Eric Garror & Lorenzo McCaskill-3rd team) and also S Percy Butler who was selected by Washington in the fourth round of the 2022 NFL Draft. In 2019, Louisiana led the conference in scoring defense (19.7 ppg) and pass defense (197.7 ypg).

Prior to working at Louisiana, Toney coached safeties for two seasons (2016-17) at the University of Texas at San Antonio (UTSA), helping the Roadrunners defense finish 7th in the country in 2017 after allowing 287.8 yards per game. They were 8th in scoring defense (17.0 ppg), 2nd in first downs allowed (166) and 19th in pass efficiency (112.2). In 2016, UTSA appeared in the school's first-ever bowl game (Gildan New Mexico Bowl). S Michael Egwuagu earned 2nd team All-Conference USA honors in 2016.

Toney was the secondary coach at Sam Houston State in 2015, helping the Bearkats to an 11-4 record while making it to the semifinals of the FCS playoffs. The defense forced 24 turnovers, including 17 interceptions that season. He started his college coaching career at his alma mater, Southeastern Louisiana, in 2012 as a defensive assistant/secondary coach for two seasons before being promoted to safeties coach/special teams coordinator in 2014. During his tenure at Southeastern Louisiana, the Lions ranked 1st in the FCS in pass efficiency defense, 2nd in interceptions, 5th redzone defense, 7th in total defense and 8th in scoring defense. He also coached two future Cardinals in CB Robert Alford and S Harlan Miller. Coaching special teams, the Lions topped the nation in kickoff return average and were 6th in blocked kicks.

He spent two seasons as the offensive coordinator at La Costa Canyon (CA) High School (2010-11) after working as the wide receivers coach at Palomar Community College in 2009 and as the defensive line coach at Fallbrook (CA) High School in 2008.

A native of Poway, CA, Toney graduated from Southeastern Louisiana in 2012 with a degree in General Studies. He and his wife, Courtney, live in Chandler, AZ with their daughter, Peyton and dog, Scooch.

Israel Woolfork is in his third season with the Cardinals after being hired to coach quarterbacks on 3/1/23.

Arizona QB Kyler Murray started all 17 games in 2024 and completed 372-of-541 passes (68.8%) for 3,851 yards, 21 TDs and a 93.5 passer rating. He also ran for 572 yards and five TDs on 78 carries (7.3 yard avg.). It was Murray's 4th season with 20+ TD passes and his 4th with 3,000+ passing yards. He tied Neil Lomax for the most seasons in franchise history with 3,000+ passing and the most seasons with 20+ TD passes. In 2024, Murray became the third-youngest player in NFL history to reach 19,000+ passing yards and 3,000+ rushing yards in his career.

The Cardinals had over 6,000 yards (6,090) of offense for the fifth time in team history and had a 3,000-yard passer (Kyler Murray), a 1,000-yard receiver (Trey McBride) and a 1,000-yard rusher (James Conner) in a single-season for just the fifth-time in team history. Murray was also named NFC Offensive Player of the Week following Week 10, his sixth career NFC Offensive POW award, the most in team history.

In 2023, Murray returned from a serious knee injury suffered in 2022 and started the final eight games that season, throwing for 1,799 yards and 10 TDs while rushing for 244 yards and 3 TDs. With Murray under center, the Cardinals had the 9th ranked offense in the NFL (362.8 ypg) and averaged 22.4 points per game.

In the 2024 offseason, Woolfork was selected to serve as the quarterbacks coach for the American team at the Senior Bowl. He was also selected to participate in the NFL's Coach Accelerator program in May of 2024 at the NFL's spring meeting in Nashville. The program was created to help promote greater diversity across the league.

Woolfork came to the Cardinals from Cleveland where he assisted Browns quarterbacks in 2022 under current Cardinals offensive coordinator Drew Petzing. He spent the 2022 season with Cleveland as the recipient of the team's Bill Willis Coaching

Fellowship.

The Bill Willis Coaching Fellowship was created by the Browns as an opportunity for rising minority coaches with a focus on the offensive side of the ball. The fellowship was named after Willis, who along with Browns teammate Marion Motley, were two of the first African-American professional football players in the modern era. Willis played with the Browns from 1946-53 and was enshrined into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1977. Woolfork started with the Browns in the 2021 offseason as part of the NFL's Bill Walsh Diversity Coaching Fellowship and worked with Cleveland's tight ends.

Woolfork began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Miami (OH) University from 2013-14. He then coached running backs (2015-17) and wide receivers (2018-21) with the RedHawks prior to joining the Browns. RBs Alonzo Smith and Kenny Young broke multiple school records under Woolfork's tutelage. Smith finished his career ranked 8th all-time with 2,613 rushing yards and Young was 10th in school history with 3,259 all-purpose yards, 13th with 1,989 rushing yards and was one of only two players in school history with 1,900+ rushing yards and at least 100 receptions in his career.

Miami WR Jack Sorensen earned All-Mid-American Conference honors in both 2018 (third-team) and 2020 (second-team) while working with Woolfork. He was named the Offensive Player of the Game in the MAC Championship in 2019 after catching eight passes for 123 yards and a TD.

Woolfork played wide receiver at Grand Valley State University (2008-12). A three-year starter, he was a team captain as a senior in addition to earning all-conference honors. As a sophomore, Woolfork helped lead the Lakers to the D-II National Championship.

He graduated from Grand Valley State with a degree in Sports Leadership in 2013.

Dave Sears is in his third season with the Cardinals and 29th in the NFL after being hired as Arizona's Assistant General Manager in January, 2023.

Sears came to Arizona after spending 16 seasons with Detroit, including the last four years (2019-22) as the Lions director of college scouting. He joined the Lions in May, 2007 as a regional scout and spent 10 years in that role until he was elevated to assistant director of college in 2017 where he spent the following two seasons (2017-18).

In his current role with the Cardinals, Sears' duties include evaluating the top college prospects nationally as well as the organization and implementation of the draft process. Sears oversees the pro personnel department which includes player acquisition, evaluation and assisting with player contract negotiations.

Before working with the Lions, Sears spent seven seasons (2000-06) as a scout with the Houston Texans where he worked with Cardinals GM Monti Ossenfort for three seasons (2002; 2004-05).

Prior to his time in Houston, Sears worked three seasons (1997-99) with the Washington Commanders scouting department. He started with Washington as an intern in January, 1997 and was hired as a scouting administrator before being promoted as the Commanders BLESTO scout in May, 1998. Sears also spent time as an intern with the Springfield Falcons in the American Hockey League.

Krueger and his wife, Jenna, have a son, Rein.

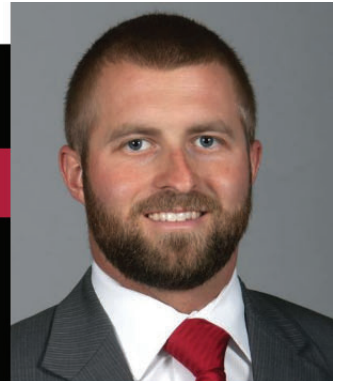
JEFF SCHWIMMER
