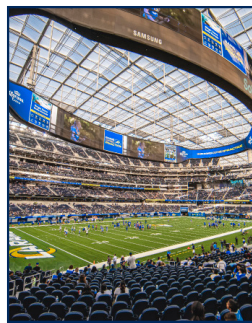

## Rams Hit the "Road" to Face Chargers



SoFi Stadium

Thousand Oaks, Calif. - The Los Angeles Rams are set to kickoff the 2022 preseason slate with a "road" contest against the Los Angeles Chargers at SoFi Stadium.

Entering camp, the Rams welcomed many new faces including 21 rookies to their roster. The Rams had an abbreviated offseason, following their Super Bowl LVI victory, highlighted by acquisitions for All-Pro LB Bobby Wagner and WR Allen Robinson.

Wagner spent the first 10 years of his career with the Seahawks before returning to Southern California this offseason to play for the Rams. Wagner, who has the most tackles of any active player in the NFL, grew up approximately 35 miles from Los Angeles in Ontario, and attended Colony High School.

Allen Robinson is entering his 9th NFL season after signing a 3-year deal with the Rams this offseason, joining an offense with Matthew Stafford and triple crown winner, Cooper Kupp. The former Pro Bowl selection was a steady red zone threat for the Chicago Bears from 2018-2021, hauling in 29 catches for 224 yards and 13 touchdowns in the red zone.

The Rams will host the Houston Texans next week for their one and only home preseason contest at SoFi Stadium on August 19 before they head to Cincinnati for a Super Bowl rematch against the Bengals on August 27.

# Coaches' Corner



On January 12, 2017, Los Angeles Rams Owner/Chairman E. Stanley Kroenke named Sean McVay the 23rd full-time head coach in franchise history. McVay became the youngest coach in modern NFL history at 30 years old.

During the 2021 season, McVay produced his fifth-straight winning season with the Rams, the longest consecutive winning season streak since the Rams posted four-consecutive winning seasons from 1983-1986. The 12-5 record earned L.A. its fourth postseason appearance and second Super Bowl appearance in McVay's first five seasons leading the franchise and was capped off by a Super Bowl LVI victory in the team's home stadium. McVay became the youngest head coach in NFL history to win a Super Bowl at the age of 36.

The Rams offense thrived during the 2021 season and in Matthew Stafford's first year under center. Under McVay's guidance, the Rams' offense ranked in the top 10 in total offense and fifth in passing offense. Stafford threw for almost 5,000 yards and Receiver Cooper Kupp won the Triple Crown, leading the league in receptions, receiving yards and receiving touchdowns.

The Rams would have sent four starters to the 2021 Pro Bowl had they not been preparing for Super Bowl LVI at SoFi Stadium. On offense, Kupp was selected to his first Pro Bowl. On defense, DB Jalen Ramsey earned his fifth straight Pro Bowl nod and DT Aaron Donald for his eighth-straight Pro Bowl nod. K Matt Gay also was selected as the starter in his first Pro Bowl selection. The Rams also had four players selected as alternates including QB Matthew Stafford, former OT Andrew Whitworth, OLB Leonard Floyd and C Brian Allen. Kupp, Ramsey and Donald also were All-Pro selections.

In a season that was anything but normal due to the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, the Rams defense flourished earning the league's No. 1 ranked unit across, dominating in three different categories. The Rams defense held opposing offenses to only 16.8 points per game, 281.9 yards per game, 190.7 passing yards per game and held each opposing quarterback to under 300 net yards passing. As a team, L.A. held opponents to only 18.5 points per game. McVay won his third-career postseason contest, this time against a familiar opponent on the road against the Seattle Seahawks in a Wild Card game before falling to the Green Bay Packers at Lambeau Field in the Divisional Round.

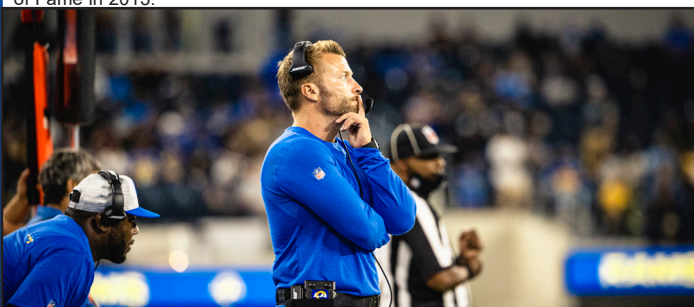
McVay's third season as head coach in Los Angeles produced his third-consecutive winning season, as the team finished with a 9-7 record in 2019. Three-consecutive winning seasons had not been accomplished by a Rams team since 1999-2001, and it was only the third time since 1980 the franchise accomplished the feat. Additionally, McVay became the first head coach since 2016 and the fourth coach in Rams history to have a winning record in each of their first three seasons as a head coach and became the fourth Rams head coach to have a winning record in three-consecutive seasons.

In McVay's second season guiding the Rams, the 32-year-old leader turned in one of the best seasons in franchise history. The Rams posted a 13-3 record, which tied for the second-best record in franchise history, won a pair of playoff games and advanced to the Rams fourth Super Bowl appearance days after his 33rd birthday, becoming the youngest NFL head coach to ever help his team to a Super Bowl.

The 2018 Los Angeles Rams built on the successful foundation McVay and company laid in their first season in 2017. With the guidance of McVay, the Rams' passing attack finished among the top-10 in passing yards per attempt (8.33, 4th), passing yards per game (295.6, 5th) and touchdowns (32, tied for 8th).

In his first season guiding the Rams, McVay completed one of the greatest offensive turnarounds in NFL history. He helped the Rams move from the 32nd-ranked scoring offense in 2016 to the league's top-scoring team in 2017, marking the first time in league history a team has gone from last to first in scoring. The first-year head coach led the Rams to an 11-5 record and their first NFC West title since the 2003 season, earning the team's first playoff berth since 2004. Following his first season in L.A., McVay was named The Associated Press Coach of the Year, becoming the youngest head coach to ever win the award.

McVay graduated from Miami University (Ohio) where he played wide receiver from 2004-07, earning Miami's Scholar-Athlete Award in 2007. His grandfather, John, served in various roles – including vice president/director of football operations from 1983-94 – for the San Francisco 49ers from 1979-95, overseeing five Super Bowl championship squads and earning induction into the 49ers Hall of Fame in 2013.



The Los Angeles Chargers hired Brandon Staley as the 17th head coach in franchise history, becoming the first Bolts head coach with a defensive background in over a decade. One of the most progressive minds in football, Staley brought an aggressive approach to the Chargers in his first season.

In his first season at the helm, Los Angeles offense set single-season team records for first downs (401), passing touchdowns (38) and fewest fumbles (10). The offensive unit also scored 181 fourth-quarter points, good for the second-most in a season in NFL history. Staley called a defense that led the NFL with 11 strip-sacks and paced the AFC with 19 forced fumbles. Six Chargers were selected to the Pro Bowl, including five that were tabbed as starters.

The first-year head coach helped develop quarterback Justin Herbert to his first all-star game as the second-year passer set numerous single-season franchise records, including completions (443), passing yards (5,014), passing touchdowns (38) and games with 300-plus passing yards (nine). He led the AFC in 2021 in each of those categories and was named AFC Offensive Player of the Week three times. Herbert became the third-youngest player to throw for 5,000 yards in a single season (23 years, 305 days) and is the only player to throw for 5,000 yards and rush for 300 yards in the same season. In the team's Sunday Night Football victory over Pittsburgh in Week 11, Herbert threw for 382 yards and ran for 90, becoming the only player ever to top 350 passing yards and 90 rushing yards in a single game. Staley also coached wide receivers Keenan Allen and Mike Williams to record-setting seasons. Allen was named to his fifth-straight Pro Bowl after the California product hauled in a franchise-record 106 catches on the year. 2021 marked Allen's fifth-straight season with at least 95 catches, good for the second-longest streak in NFL history. Meanwhile, Williams registered five go-ahead touchdowns in the fourth quarter or overtime, the most by any player in a single season in NFL history. In the running game, Staley's efforts helped running back Austin Ekeler tie for the league lead with 20 touchdowns, tying for the second-most by a Charger in a single season. Ekeler scored nine of his touchdowns in primetime games, tying Hall of Fame running back Emmitt Smith (1995) for the second-most by any player in a single season in NFL history, training only Hall of Fame wide receiver Randy Moss' 11 in 2007 with New England. Staley and his staff coached center Corey Linsley and rookie tackle Rashawn Slater to be named starters for the Pro Bowl and earn second-team All-Pro honors from The Associated Press. Slater was also recognized by the Professional Football Writers of America as an All-AFC and All-Rookie selection. As an offense, Bolts led the NFL with 22 fourth-down conversions and seven two-point conversions.

On the defensive side of the ball, outside linebacker Joey Bosa was named to his fourth Pro Bowl after leading the NFL with seven strip-sacks in 2021. He finished with 10.5 sacks and his seven forced fumbles ranked second in the league. Meanwhile, safety Derwin James Jr., returned from missing the 2020 season due to injury to be named an all-star after totaling 118 tackles, two interceptions, two sacks and three forced fumbles — becoming just the fourth defensive back in the last 20 seasons to post 100 tackles, multiple sacks and multiple interceptions and force at least three fumbles in the same season. James also became the first defensive back in at least 20 years to total 100 tackles after missing the entire previous season due to injury. Staley coached four Pro Bowlers before joining the Chargers, some of the most dominant defensive NFL players in recent memory — Khalil Mack in 2018, Von Miller in 2019 and Aaron Donald and Jalen Ramsey in 2020. Three of those players (Mack, Donald and Ramsey) were also recognized as AP first-team All-Pro selections. As one of the most progressive defensive minds in football, Staley overhauled a Rams defense to become the best defense in football in 2020. The unit ranked No. 1 in total defense, passing defense and scoring defense while finishing as the third-best rushing defense. The Rams defensive unit improved by more than four points per game in scoring defense from 2019 to post the best single-season average allowed by the team in nearly two decades. Staley brought innovation on defense from college to the NFL, serving as outside linebackers coach in Chicago (2017-18) and Denver (2019). He served on Vic Fangio's staff in Denver after following the former defensive coordinator from Chicago. The 2019 Broncos defense led the NFL in red zone scoring, allowing a touchdown on just 39.1 percent of red zone drives — the second-lowest allowed by any NFL defense in the last five seasons. In his two years with Chicago, the Bears led the NFL in takeaways (58) while tying for No. 2 with 92 sacks. Staley was part of a staff in 2018 that coached the top-ranked scoring defense in football (17.7 points per game).

Prior to coaching in the NFL, Staley spent three seasons (2013, '15-16) at John Carroll as defensive coordinator/secondary coach and the 2014 season as defensive coordinator/linebackers at James Madison. In his final season as a collegiate coach, Staley earned National Coordinator of the Year honors for Division III by leading the John Carroll unit to rank third in the nation in total defense (218.0 yards per game) and fourth in scoring defense (12.6 points per game).

Before his stints at John Carroll and James Madison, Staley was a graduate assistant in 2012 at Tennessee. Staley held his first coordinator job as associate head coach/defensive coordinator at Hutchinson (Kan.) Community College from 2010-11. Over those two seasons, he helped develop Cordarrelle Patterson, Markus Golden and DeVondre Campbell into NFL Draft picks. Staley began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Northern Illinois (2006-08) before coaching the defensive line and special teams in 2009 at the University of St. Thomas. He played quarterback at the University of Dayton, serving as a team captain and was a two-year starter from 2003-04, helping the Flyers post a 16-5 record as the starter. He ended his playing career at Mercyhurst College, playing there in 2005 with his twin brother, Jason. A native of Perry, Ohio, Staley and his wife, Amy, have three sons — Colin, Will and Grant.



# 2021 Los Angeles Rams Team Awards



## Rams 2021 Pro-Bowlers



The Rams would have sent four starters to the 2021 Pro Bowl at Allegiant Stadium in Las Vegas on February 6, 2022 had they not been preparing for Super Bowl LVI in Los Angeles.

On offense, **WR Cooper Kupp** was selected to his first Pro Bowl alongside Packers WR Davante Adams. Kupp led the NFL in three categories during the regular season: receiving yards with 1,947 yards, receiving TDs with 16, and catches with 145. He became the first receiving "triple crown" winner in the NFL since WR Steve Smith Jr. in 2005 and the fourth overall in the Super Bowl era, joining Jerry Rice (1990), and Sterling Sharpe (1992). Kupp earned two NFC Offensive Player of the Month awards (September and October), and he broke an NFL record with 13-straight games of 90 or more receiving yards. Earlier this season he became the first player in the Super Bowl era with 800 yards and nine touchdowns through seven games, then a week later became the first player with 900 or more receiving yards and 10 or more receiving touchdowns through the first eight games. He also became the fifth player in NFL history to reach 100 receptions through a player's first 12 games of a season.

On defense, the Rams had two players selected. **DB Jalen Ramsey** earned his fifth straight Pro Bowl start alongside Cowboys DB Trevon Diggs. Ramsey has made the Pro Bowl every year of his career after his rookie season. The sixth-year pro had 77 total tackles, four interceptions and 16 pass breakups in 17 regular season games this season. **DL Aaron Donald** was selected alongside Washington DL Jonathan Allen. For Donald, it's his eighth-consecutive Pro Bowl nod, which means he's earned the distinction every year of his NFL career so far. Donald won NFC Defensive Player of the Week performance in Week 14 that included three sacks, five total tackles (three for loss), three QB hits and a pass breakup that led directly to an interception in the Rams' *Monday Night Football* win over the Cardinals in Arizona. He had 12.5 sacks on the season, his fifth-consecutive year with double-digit sacks. Donald also set the new franchise record for career sacks earlier this season when he reached 88.5 against the Seahawks in Week 5; he currently sits at 98.0 regular season sacks.

Rams **K Matt Gay** was selected as the starter in his first career Pro Bowl. In this third NFL season and second with the Rams, he converted 32 of 34 field goal attempts – including a long of 55 yards – for a 94.1 field goal percentage, the highest in the NFL. Gay also made 47 of 48 extra point attempts and finished second in the NFL in points scored with 143.

The Rams also had four players selected as alternates: **QB Matthew Stafford**, **OL Andrew Whitworth**, **OLB Leonard Floyd**, and **OL Brian Allen**.

## Rams 2021 All-Pro Players

The Associated Press announced its annual All-Pro team and **WR Cooper Kupp**, **DL Aaron Donald** and **DB Jalen Ramsey** made the list among the league's elite group this season. Donald and Kupp were unanimous selections. There were just five unanimous picks altogether, joining Colts RB Jonathan Taylor, Steelers LB T.J. Watt and Packers WR Davante Adams as the other three players to receive a vote from all 50 voters.

Donald is no stranger to this honor, as last year marked his seventh time in eight seasons to be named an All-Pro. At the age of 30, Donald has shown no signs of slowing down, tallying 84 tackles, 19 TFLs, 12.5 sacks, 25 quarterback hits, four forced fumbles and four pass breakups.

Ramsey became an All-Pro for the second time since joining the Rams in 2019 and his third time throughout his six-year career. Ramsey's versatility last season has been more prevalent than in years past, showing he can line up on the outside playing boundary cornerback, inside at the nickel position and provide stout efforts against the run when being utilized towards the line of scrimmage. Ramsey totaled 77 tackles, nine TFLs, four interceptions, 16 pass breakups and one forced fumble during the 2021 season.

Kupp picked up his first All-Pro honor. He's put together solid seasons in previous years, but none to the magnitude of his 2021 campaign, leading the league in receptions (145), receiving yards (1,947) and receiving touchdowns (16) during the regular season.

## Rams 2021 Players of the Week/Month

The Rams won seven NFC Player of the Week/Month awards last season. It began with **QB Matthew Stafford** taking home NFC Offensive Player of the Week in Week 1, after he threw for 321 yards on 20 of 26 passing attempts. He had three TDs, 0 interceptions and a near perfect passer rating of 156.1 in the win. Then in Week 3 Stafford won the award again. This time Stafford threw for 343 yards, four TDs, 0 interceptions on 27 of 38 passing, as the Rams outdueled QB Tom Brady and the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Stafford's two NFC Off. Player of the Week awards in September were largely thanks to **WR Cooper Kupp's** play during the month. Kupp led the NFL in receptions (25), yards (367), TDs (5), and yards per game (122.3). Kupp was recognized for his production and awarded NFC Off. Player of the Month for September 2021. Kupp kept up his pace in October, recording 38 catches for 557 yards and five TDs and was recognized as NFC Off. Player of the Month for the second straight month.

On the other side of the ball, **S Taylor Rapp** showed out during a Week 6 victory in New York. Rapp made four tackles, two interceptions, three pass break-ups and one QB hit, and was awarded Week 6 NFC Defensive Player of the Week. Then in Week 14 **DL Aaron Donald** was awarded NFC Defensive POW after he collected five tackles, three TFLs, three sacks, three quarterback hits and a pass breakup. Donald also recorded 14 quarterback pressures, according to Pro Football Focus, the most by any player this season. In Week 16 **WR Brandon Powell** had a 61-yard punt return for a touchdown in the Rams' 30-23 win over the Vikings, a play that Head Coach Sean McVay said postgame was "huge" after the Vikings had appeared to regain momentum.

### Passing

- During the 2021 preseason, Rams QB Bryce Perkins completed 56 of 91 passes for 451 yards, three touchdowns and one interception. He finished the preseason with an 80.4 passer rating.

### Rushing

- QB Bryce Perkins also rushed the ball 22 times for 114 yards in three preseason matchups last season. He ran nine times for 50 yards on the road in Denver. Additionally, Rams RB Jake Funk carried the ball 12 times for 68 yards (5.67yds/rush) in two preseason contests. His longest rush of the preseason was 19 yards against the Las Vegas Raiders.

### Receiving

- Rams WR Tutu Atwell led the team during the 2021 preseason with 18 catches for 129 yards with eight catches in the final two preseason contests. Rams WR J.J. Koski also hauled in 12 catches for 102 receiving yards during the preseason last year. He tied the team-lead with eight receptions for a team-high 61 yards in the Week 2 preseason contest against the Raiders. Rams WR Jacob Harris was playing TE last preseason and managed to catch five passes for 45 yards and one touchdown.

### Defense

- Rams DT Michael Hoecht tallied four tackles (two solo), 1.0 sack, one quarterback hit, one tackle for loss, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery in the Rams' final 2021 preseason contest against the Broncos. Rams LB Christian Rozeboom also registered three tackles (two solo), one interception, one pass breakup and one tackle for loss in the same game. Rams OLB Chris Garrett recorded four tackles (two solo), 1.5 sacks, three quarterback hits, one tackle for loss, two pass breakups and one forced fumble in the Rams' Week 2 preseason matchup against the Raiders in 2021. Rams DT Bobby Brown III also tallied one tackle for loss.

### Special Teams

- Rams RB Raymond Calais had a 46-yard kickoff return in the last preseason contest against the Chargers at SoFi Stadium. Rams K Matt Gay made all five of his field goals and even punted four times for 168 yards (42.0 yards/punt) in the preseason matchup against the Raiders. Rams WR Tutu Atwell also saw action returning punts throughout the preseason.

### Kupp Wins Fourth Receiving Triple Crown in NFL History



Rams WR Cooper Kupp became the fourth player in NFL history to win the receiving Triple Crown by leading the NFL in receptions, receiving yards, and receiving TDs. He led the second place receivers in all three categories by some of the widest margins of any receiving Triple Crown winner. Kupp was 22 catches, 331 receiving yards, and two receiving TDs ahead of second place in each stat. The only other NFL players to have accomplished this feat are Hall of Fame WR Jerry Rice (1990), WR Sterling Sharpe (1992), and WR Steve Smith Sr. (2005), and none of those three led any category by a margin as large as Kupp led in each.

S Taylor Rapp was named NFC Defensive Player of the Week after hauling in two interceptions to go along with four tackles (three solo) and two passes breakups during a Week 6 matchup on the road against the Giants in 2021.

DT Aaron Donald earned NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors after a three-sack performance against the Cardinals during the 2021 season. He also tallied 14 QB pressures and five tackles in the game.

QB Matthew Stafford kicked off the 2021 regular season completing 20 of 26 passes for 321 yards and three touchdowns on *Sunday Night Football* against the Chicago Bears in the first regular season game with fans in attendance at SoFi Stadium.

RB Cam Akers recorded a career-high 171 yards rushing in the team's *Thursday Night Football* win over the New England Patriots in a 2020 Week 14 contest. Akers was named the NFC Offensive Player of the Week for his efforts, marking the first time in his career receiving the award.

DL Aaron Donald became the second Rams defender to earn Player of the Week accolades after matching a career-high 4.0 sacks in a Week 5 win at Washington.

OLB Leonard Floyd earned his first-career NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors after posting a career-best 3.0 sacks and one fumble recovery in a Week 10 divisional win over Seattle.

Donald brought home the first award of the 2019 season. The reigning two-time Defensive Player of the Year was named the Defensive Player of the Week following a solid outing against the Bears in the Rams win. QB Jared Goff earned the first Offensive Player of the Week honors following the Week 13 win over the Cardinals and P Johnny Hekker brought home Special Teams Player of the Week accolades in Week 17.

Donald received his first Player of the Week accolades in 2018 after establishing a career-high 4.0 sacks against the 49ers in a Week 7 win. Donald earned his first-career Player of the Month accolades for October 2018 and again for December 2018. Donald was named 2018 Week 16 POW for a 3.0-sack performance against the Cardinals.

## Success In The West



Under Head Coach Sean McVay, the Rams are 16-8 in the regular season against NFC West opponents. L.A. is a perfect 8-0 against the Arizona Cardinals and have outscored them 251-91. L.A. has outscored NFC West foes, 676-470, through McVay's first 24 regular season divisional games. The Rams finished 6-0 in the NFC West during the 2018 season. The last time an NFC West team accomplished the feat was the Cardinals in 2008. It marked the first time the Rams swept the NFC West since 1999.

The Rams are 8-4 in NFC West road contests since the start of the 2017 season. The most recent road win was against the Arizona Cardinals, 38-28, at State Farm Stadium in Week 13. L.A. is 2-2 under McVay at CenturyLink Field. The Rams swept the Seahawks in 2018, marking the first time since 2015 L.A. has swept the Seahawks.

The Rams entered Week 17 of the 2017 season with a two-game lead in the NFC West and an 11-4 record when they decided to rest their starters against the 49ers.

The Rams outscored their divisional opponents, 171-112, during the 2017 season, which was a 59-point differential. It was the highest positive point differential in the division for the Rams since 2001, when the Rams outscored their divisional opponents, 274-160, for a 114-point differential. The 2001 Rams played in a five team division and therefore had eight divisional games that season.

The Rams also posted 30-plus points against all three of their divisional opponents during the 2018 season. The 2002 Rams were previously the last team to accomplish that feat.

## Fabulous 50



Head Coach Sean McVay won 70 percent of his first 50 games (35-15 record) as a head coach. McVay's winning percentage was the sixth-best winning percentage all-time among coaches with at least 50 games.

McVay trailed only Guy Chamberlin (58-16-7, 78%), John Madden (103-32-7, 76%), Vince Lombardi (96-34-6, 74%), Ray Flaherty (54-21-3, 72%), and George Allen (116-47-5, 71%). All five coaches ahead of McVay are enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame.



## Follow Our Lead



The Rams opened up the 2021 season by never trailing the Chicago Bears in Week 1. The Rams held a lead for 55:10 of the 60:00 minutes. In Week 3 they once again never trailed, this time against Tampa Bay. During Week 8 they jumped out to a 38-0 lead over Houston without ever trailing. Against Jacksonville in SoFi Stadium Week 13, they were tied for just under three minutes then led the remaining 57:20 of the game. Then in Minnesota during Week 16 the team led 52:47 after going up 7-0 in the first quarter of the game.

The Los Angeles Rams have had 27 games since the start of the 2017 where they never trailed their opponents, including five in 2021. The last two times they played the Chicago Bears they have never trailed.

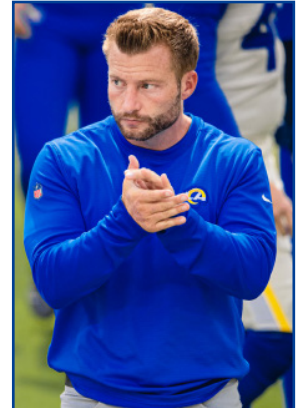

## Coach 'Em Up



Rams Head Coach Sean McVay took over a team that was coming off of a 4-12 season and ranked 32nd in scoring. McVay helped transform it into the No. 1 scoring team in the league and helped secure the franchise's first NFC West title since 2003.



Due to his excellent first season and his instrumental part in revamping the Rams offense, McVay was chosen as the Associated Press Coach of the Year for 2017. He is the fourth head coach in franchise history to achieve this honor.

The last Rams head coach to win the award was Dick Vermeil in 1999.

HC Sean McVay

Vermeil helped guide the Rams to a 13-3 record, winning the NFC West and culminating with the franchise's lone Super Bowl victory over the Titans, 23-16, in Super Bowl XXXIV. Chuck Knox was the only other rookie head coach in franchise history to win the award.

McVay became the youngest coach in NFL history to win the Associated Press Coach of the Year award. McVay was 31 years old during the team's final game of the season. Previously, Don Shula (34 years old) was the youngest coach to win the award.

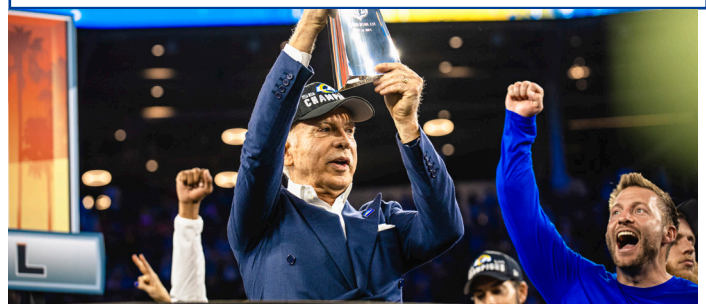

## Air It Out



On August 12, 2021 before this season began, **Head Coach Sean McVay** spoke about his comfort with the current roster's ability to stretch the field saying, "Our team has a lot of players that can make plays downfield."

The addition of **QB Matthew Stafford** to the existing Rams offense has the Rams aimed for a high frequency of passes. Through 17 games Stafford had the Rams third in the NFL with 65 completions of over 20-yards, to eight different receivers.



The Rams finished third in the NFL in total completions of 20 or more yards with 65 through 18 weeks. They were tied for third in receptions of 25 or more yards with 41. They also are second in the NFL in receptions of 50 or more yards with 10.

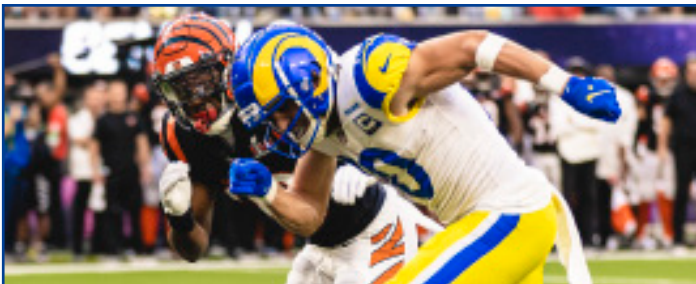

## Second to One



During the 2021 season, TE Tyler Higbee was second on the team in receptions (61) and third in receiving yards (560). He hauled in six catches for 55 yards and two touchdowns in the NFC Championship Game against the 49ers last postseason and became the 13th tight end in franchise history to record over 1,000 receiving yards in their career. Higbee also recorded back to back seasons with at least five touchdown receptions in during the 2021 campaign.



## Hat Trick Higbee



In a Week 2 win over the Eagles, TE Tyler Higbee posted his first multi-touchdown game, finishing the contest with three receiving touchdowns and brought his career total to 10.

It marked the first time a Ram pass catcher has posted three receiving touchdowns since Torry Holt in 2006, and the first time the feat was achieved by a Rams tight end since 1988.



## Streaking Receivers



TE Tyler Higbee made his presence known for the Rams at the end of the 2019 season. He posted four-straight 100-plus yard receiving games in Weeks 13-16, the first four triple-digit receiving outputs of his career.

WR Cooper Kupp recorded at least 100 yards receiving in four of the Rams' first five games of the 2019 season. Kupp's four-game streak is tied for the fourth-longest streak in franchise history. Kupp's 1,062 receiving yards currently ranked 17th in the NFL during the 2019 season.

## First Quarter Focus



With the addition of Defensive Coordinator Raheem Morris this past offseason, the Rams adopted a new defensive code. Morris measures the success of his defense with "Make-A-Difference" (M.A.D.) plays. M.A.D. plays are measured by making interceptions, forcing and recovering fumbles, and other momentum-shifting plays. Winning the turnover battle through M.A.D. plays is the Rams' code to success.

The Rams averaged 1.5 turnovers a game, leaving them with 25 turnovers in the 2021 regular season.

The Rams allowed only 66 first quarter points during the 2020 regular season, including a shutout of the Dallas Cowboys in Week 1, the New York Giants in Week 4, the Chicago Bears in Week 7, the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in Week 11, the New England Patriots in Week 14, and the Seattle Seahawks in Week 16. In 2020, the Rams had an eight-game regular season streak where the team did not allow more than three points in the first quarter of the game.

The team stayed focused in the first quarter during the 2021 regular season. Through 17 games, only the Lions (10) and 49ers (14) have scored more than seven points in the first quarter against the Rams. A redzone interception on the first drive of the season kept the Chicago Bears scoreless. The following two drives for the Bears ended after failed conversions on fourth-and-four each time. Week 2 was another scoreless first quarter for the Rams D. In Week 3, the Buccaneers were forced to punt three straight times. Week 4, the defense finally allowed a second drive touchdown to Cardinals QB Kyle Murray and the Arizona Cardinals, breaking the season-long first quarter scoreless streak for the Rams. Week 5 in Seattle both teams were shutout in the first quarter. When the Rams traveled to New York for Week 6, the Giants were able to get a field goal to start the game, but no points followed. Week 7 saw the Lions get a first drive TD after Lions RB D'Andre Swift broke off a screen for a 63-yard score. Then after a recovered onside kick a Lions FG followed on the second drive. Week 8 saw the Rams shutout Houston until the fourth quarter. In Week 9, Tennessee was shutout in the first quarter. In Week 10, San Francisco scored two first-quarter touchdowns. After the bye, Green Bay scored one TD in the first quarter. The Rams kept Jacksonville scoreless in the first quarter during Week 13. While in Arizona, the Rams held the Cardinals to three points in the first quarter. After being postponed until Tuesday, the Rams dialed in and did not allow the Seahawks to score in the first quarter in Week 15. In a Week 16 victory over the Vikings, the Rams held their opponent to zero points in the first quarter. Week 17 brought a Ravens interception returned for a touchdown in the first 15 minutes of play. In the season finale, the Rams held the 49ers to zero points in the first quarter.

S Taylor Rapp set a career-high of four interceptions during the 2021 season, which is tied for the team lead. He had one interception in 2020 and two his rookie year in 2019. In the six games that Rapp has had an interception, the Rams were victorious in five of them.

Rapp's first two interceptions of the 2021 season came in Week 6 when the Rams were on the road in New York playing the Giants. Both of those interceptions created touchdown opportunities for the Rams offense. His second interception of the game came near the two-minute mark of the third quarter.
