LOS ANGELES CHARGERS vs. KANSAS CITY CHIEFS

CHARGERS WIN IN SÃO PAULO

The Los Angeles Chargers defeated the Kansas City Chiefs, 27-21, to open the season in São Paulo, Brazil.

The Friday-night win marks the second-consecutive NFL Kickoff Weekend win under Head Coach Jim Harbaugh. Harbaugh has won six consecutive games on Kickoff Weekend, the longest streak among active head coaches.

Defensively, the Bolts held the Chiefs to five-of-14 (35.7 pct.) on third down while limiting Kansas City to 98 net rushing yards. Offensively, the Bolts had four receivers with 50 yards.

QB Justin Herbert completed 25-of-34 passes (73.5 pct.) for 318 and three touchdowns with zero interceptions for a passer rating of 131.7. The sixth-year quarterback also added 32 rushing yards on seven carries (4.2 avg.), including a 19-yard scramble in the fourth quarter to seal the game.

WR Keenan Allen, in his first game back with the Bolts, led the team in receiving with seven receptions for 68 yards (9.7 avg.) and a touchdown. **WR Quentin Johnston** caught five passes for 79 yards (15.68 avg.) and a pair of scores — the second multi-score game of his career. **WR Ladd McConkey** hauled in six receptions for 74 yards (12.3 avg.) and **TE Tyler Conklin**, in his Chargers debut, caught a pair of passes for 50 yards (25.0 avg.).

S Alohi Gilman led the Bolts with nine tackles (seven solo) and a forced fumble. **LB Daiyan Henley**, **DL Da'Shawn Hand** each recorded a sack on Friday night. **DL Teair Dart** added a pair of passes defended.

K Cameron Dicker was two-for-two from the field while **LB Del'Shawn Phillips** recorded three special teams tackles.

HERBERT TOPS 300

QB Justin Herbert opened the 2025 campaign completing 25-of-34 passes (73.5 pct.) for 318 and three touchdowns with zero interceptions for a passer rating of 131.7.

Through six seasons, Herbert has topped 300 passing yards in 28 games — good for the fourth most by a player in his first six seasons.

Friday night marked Herbert's 14th career game with three passing touchdowns and zero interceptions — the third most by a player through their first 80 games played.

With **WR Keenan Allen** (68), **TE Tyler Conklin** (50) **WR Quentin Johnston** (79) and **WR Lad McConkey** (74) each recording 50 receiving yards, it marks the fifth game in his career that four receivers have recorded 50 or more receiving yards.

IN ELITE COMPANY

WR Keenan Allen caught seven passes in São Paulo to have hauled in 375 passes from **QB Justin Herbert**. With his 520 catches from former **QB Philip Rivers**, Allen became just the third player in NFL history with 375 receptions from multiple passers. He joined a pair of Hall of Famers — WR Jerry Rice and TE Tony Gonzalez. Rice caught 386 passes from Hall of Fame QB Joe Montana and 568 passes from Hall of Fame QB Steve Young. Gonzalez caught 419 passes from QB Trent Green and 383 passes from QB Matt Ryan.
