Rams Face Off Against The Chargers



Sofi Stadium

Woodland Hills, Calif. - After a convincing 31-21 win over the Dallas Cowboys, the Los Angeles Rams are set to host the Los Angeles Chargers for their second preseason game at SoFi Stadium.

QB Stetson Bennett wrangled the Cowboys finishing with a passer rating above 100.0. Bennett ranks fifth in passing yards (188), fourth in passing first downs (10) and tied for second in passing touchdowns (two) through the first slate of preseason games.

WR Xavier Smith connected with Bennett on the opening drive against the Cowboys, catching a 39-yard pass. Smith ranks 18th in receiving yds (55) through the first week of preseason play.

The Rams jumped out to an early 14-0 lead with two touchdown runs by RB Blake Corum on each of the first two drives. Corum is tied for first overall in rushing TDs (two) in the preseason. RBs Cody Schrader (59), Jarquez Hunter (41) and Corum (32) rushed for a combined 132 total yards.

On the defensive side, LB Tony Fields and S Nate Valcarcel are tied for third in the NFL in tackles (nine) through the first week of preseason action. CB A.J. Green is tied for first in PBUs (two). The Rams rank third in the NFL in rushing yards through Week 1 of the preseason.

The Rams will head to Cleveland next week to play the Browns on August 23 before returning to Los Angeles to kick off the regular season against the Houston Texans on September 9.

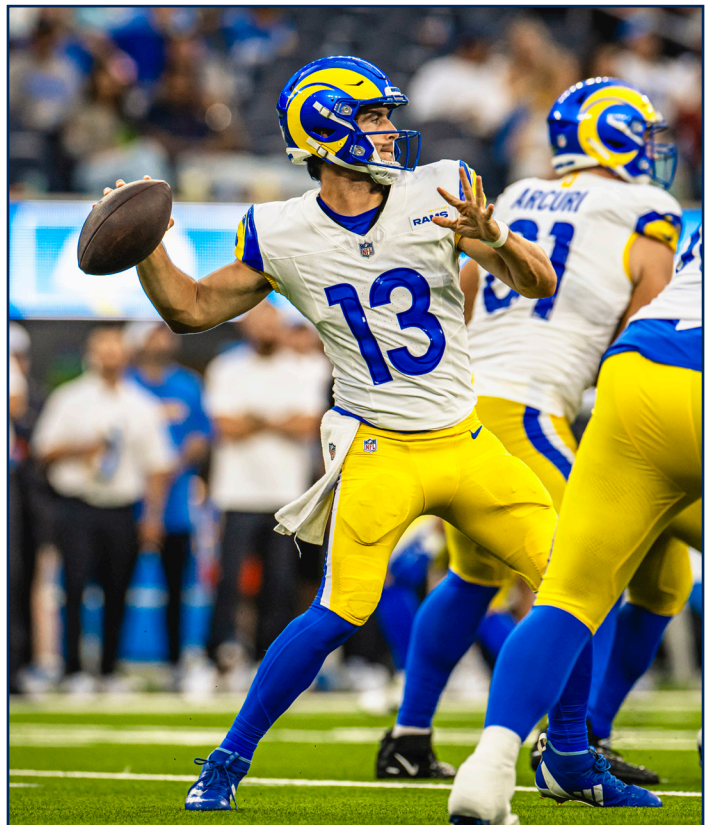

Coaches' Corner



On January 12, 2017, Los Angeles Rams Owner/Chairman E. Stanley Kroenke named Sean McVay the 23rd full-time head coach in franchise history. McVay became the youngest coach in modern NFL history at 30 years old.

He has led the Rams to five playoff berths and two Super Bowl appearances in his first seven seasons, winning Super Bowl LVI at SoFi Stadium. McVay has a 80-52 regular season record and is 8-5 in the playoffs. He has also led the Rams to six winning seasons with three NFC West titles. McVay is currently the second-youngest head coach in the NFL despite entering his ninth season at the helm, making him the fourth-longest tenured coach in the NFL behind Mike Tomlin, Andy Reid and John Harbaugh.

The Rams finished the 2024 season with a 10-7 record and took home their fourth NFC West Division title under McVay. Quarterback Matthew Stafford finished the season completing 340-of-517 passes for 3,803 yards and 20 touchdowns. He ranked 11th in the NFL in completions, 12th in passing first downs (176) and 13th in passing yards. Running back Kyren Williams ranked second in rushing first downs (85), tied for fifth in rushing touchdowns (14) and seventh in rushing yards (1,299). He recorded single-season career-highs in rushing yards (1,299) and rushing touchdowns (14). Rookies on the defensive side of the football were the difference makers for the Rams led by linebacker Jared Verse. He led all rookies in pressures (77), hurries (56) and quarterback hits (18). He tied for second in tackles for loss (1) and fifth in sacks (4.5). Across the NFL, Verse tied for second in hurries (56), fourth in pressures (77), tied for seventh in fumble recoveries (two), and tied for 32nd in tackles for loss (11). Verse was the lone Ram to be named to the NFC Pro Bowl roster and became the second Rams rookie to accomplish the feat in the past two seasons, joining Nacua.

During the 2023 season, McVay coached his 100th career regular season game and his 0.64 winning percentage became the fifth-highest among active head coaches in their first 100 regular season games.

Quarterback Matthew Stafford was voted to the Pro Bowl and finished 11th in passing yards (3,965), which ranks among the top-10 most in a single season in franchise history.

Second-year Running Back Kyren Williams emerged into a Second-Team All-Pro and Pro Bowl selection in 2023, finishing third in rushing yards (1,144), sixth in yards per rush (5.0), and tied for seventh in rushing touchdowns (12). McVay also guided Receiver Puka Nacua to set the record for most receptions and receiving yards by a rookie in a single season in NFL history. Aaron Donald became an eight-time All-Pro selection, which tied for the most by a defensive player and tied for the fifth-most overall.

In 2022, McVay helped Defensive Tackle Aaron Donald to his ninth career Pro Bowl and former Defensive Back Jalen Ramsey was voted to his sixth Pro Bowl. Donald was also named to the NFLPA All-Pro team. The Rams' defense ranked among the best in the NFL and finished first in opponent red zone efficiency (44.4%), second in goal-to-go efficiency (53.3%), and fourth in fewest missed tackles (103).

McVay produced his fifth-straight winning season with the Rams in 2021, which was the longest consecutive winning season streak since the Rams posted four-consecutive winning seasons from 1983-1986. The 12-5 record earned L.A. its fourth postseason appearance and second Super Bowl appearance in McVay's first five seasons leading the franchise which was capped off by a Super Bowl LVI victory in the Rams' home stadium. McVay became the youngest head coach in NFL history to win a Super Bowl at the age of 36.

In a season that was anything but normal due to the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, the Rams finished 10-6 and McVay won his third-career postseason contest, this time against a familiar opponent on the road against the Seattle Seahawks in a Wild Card Game before falling to the Green Bay Packers at Lambeau Field in the divisional round.

McVay's third season as head coach in 2019 produced his third-consecutive winning season with a 9-7 record. Three consecutive winning seasons had not been accomplished by a Rams team since 1999-2001, and it was only the third time since 1980 the franchise accomplished the feat. McVay helped Quarterback Jared Goff throw for over 4,000 yards for the second consecutive season, becoming the first quarterback in franchise history to do so.

In McVay's second season guiding the Rams, the 32-year-old leader turned in one of the best seasons in franchise history. The Rams posted a 13-3 record, which tied for the second-best record in franchise history, won a pair of playoff games and advanced to the Rams fourth Super Bowl appearance days after his 33rd birthday, becoming the youngest NFL head coach to ever help his team to a Super Bowl.

In his first season guiding the Rams, McVay completed one of the greatest offensive turnarounds in NFL history. He helped the Rams move from the 32nd-ranked scoring offense in 2016 to the league's top-scoring team in 2017, marking the first time in league history a team has gone from last to first in scoring. The first-year head coach led the Rams to an 11-5 record and their first NFC West title since the 2003 season, earning the team's first playoff berth since 2004. Following his first season in L.A., McVay was named The Associated Press Coach of the Year, becoming the youngest head coach to ever win the award.

McVay graduated from Miami University (Ohio) where he played wide receiver from 2004-07, earning Miami's Scholar-Athlete Award in 2007. His grandfather, John, served in various roles – including vice president/director of football operations from 1983-94 – for the San Francisco 49ers from 1979-95, overseeing five Super Bowl championship squads and earning induction into the 49ers Hall of Fame in 2013.

Harbaugh brings with him a winning culture, posting a 144-52 record as a collegiate head coach and a 55-22-1 record as an NFL head coach. In four years, he led the San Francisco 49ers to three-straight NFC Championship Games, including an appearance in Super Bowl XLVII.

Last season, Harbaugh helped the Chargers improve their record from 5-12 to 11-6 and playoff berth in his first season as head coach. Harbaugh helped several Chargers players receive recognition for their play on the field. Four Chargers were named to the Pro Bowl, Safety Derwin James, Outside Linebacker Khalil Mack, Outside Linebacker Joey Bosa and Offensive Tackle Rashawn Slater. James was also named to second team AP All-Pro team. Under Harbaugh's leadership last season, the Chargers were tied for sixth in sacks (46) and ranked first in opponent points per game (17.7). Quarterback Justin Herbert finished the 2024 regular season completing 332-504 passes for 3,870 yards and 23 touchdowns. Herbert ranked ninth in the NFL in passing yards and twelfth in passing touchdowns. Rookie wide receiver Ladd McConkey caught 82 passes for 1,149 receiving yards ranking him tenth in the NFL and fourth among all rookies.

With a keen eye for talent and an ability to develop players, Harbaugh coached nine eventual first-round selections over his nine-season tenure at Michigan (2015-23). Over the course of his four seasons (2011-14) with San Francisco, Harbaugh coached 17 players to a combined 30 Pro Bowl selections — the second-most Pro Bowlers in the NFL in that time. Eight of those players were also recognized as first-team All-Pro selections from The Associated Press, including linebackers Patrick Willis (twice) and NaVorro Bowman (three times).

One of the most accomplished coaches in football, Harbaugh led Michigan to an 86-25 record in his nine seasons as head coach. His teams topped 10 wins six times and made three consecutive CFP appearances from 2021-23, winning the national title this past season and setting a school record with 15 wins. Since taking over as head coach for the Wolverines in 2015, Harbaugh coached the top defense in the nation, allowing just 291.0 yards per game in that span. Michigan had a top-five defense in the country five times over those nine seasons, including twice as the top-ranked defense in the nation.

Harbaugh was named 2011 NFL Coach of the Year by The Associated Press after his first season with San Francisco when he led the 49ers to an NFC West division crown with a 13-3 record. That season, the defense led the NFL with 38 takeaways and ranked No. 1 in rushing defense, allowing just 77.3 yards per game on the ground. The team made a deep playoff run to its first of three-straight NFC Championship Game appearances, including an appearance in Super Bowl XLVII in 2012. In Harbaugh's four years with San Francisco, the 49ers led the NFL in rushing defense (92.0 yards per game), while ranking No. 2 in scoring defense (17.4 points per game), third in total defense (310.2) and fourth with 122 takeaways.

Prior to being a head coach in the NFL, Harbaugh spent four years at the helm at Stanford University (2007-10) and three at the University of San Diego (2004-06). He turned around a Stanford program that went 1-11 in 2006 and led the Cardinal to 29 wins over his four seasons in Palo Alto, Calif., including a 12-win season that culminated in an Orange Bowl victory in 2010. Harbaugh broke into the head coaching ranks at San Diego, leading the Toreros to a 29-6 record in three years.

Harbaugh began his coaching career as the quarterbacks coach for the Oakland Raiders from 2002-03. In his first season with Oakland, the Raiders went to Super Bowl XXXVII, while quarterback Rich Gannon earned MVP honors and was named a Pro Bowler and an AP first-team All-Pro.

In 15 years as an NFL quarterback (1987-2001), Harbaugh played for five organizations, including with the Chargers from 1999-2000. He got his start in coaching while he was still playing in the NFL, working as an unpaid assistant at Western Kentucky from 1994-2001, where his father, Jack, was the head coach. Harbaugh was selected with the 25th overall pick in the 1987 NFL Draft by Chicago and went on to start 140-of-177 career games played, throwing for 26,288 yards and 129 touchdowns. He led the NFL in passer rating in 1995, earning Comeback Player of the Year recognition and a Pro Bowl selection after leading the Colts to an AFC Championship Game appearance. Harbaugh eventually went to the Chargers for two seasons and is one of four Bolts quarterbacks to throw for 400 yards in a single game.

Harbaugh played quarterback at the University of Michigan, finishing his career as one of the most efficient passers in college football history. He posted a 21-3-1 record as a starter for the Wolverines, earning first-team All-American honors and finishing third in voting for the Heisman Trophy in 1986. Harbaugh paced the nation in 1985 in passing efficiency rating, while his career passing efficiency rating ranked as the best in NCAA history for more than 12 years following his time at Michigan.

- RB Cody Schrader is seventh in the NFL in rushing yard (59) and eighth in yards per carry with (11.8) entering preseason Week 2.
- RB Blake Corum is tied for first in the NFL in rushing touchdowns (two).

- WR Xavier Smith led the way for the Rams and is currently 18th in receiving yards (55).

Defense

- The Rams have two players who are tied for the third-most total tackles in the NFL. ILB Tony Fields II and rookie S Nate Valcarcel had nine in the Rams win against the Cowboys.

- P Ethan Evans is first in the NFL with the longest punt (81) and the highest punt average (72.5) in the preseason.

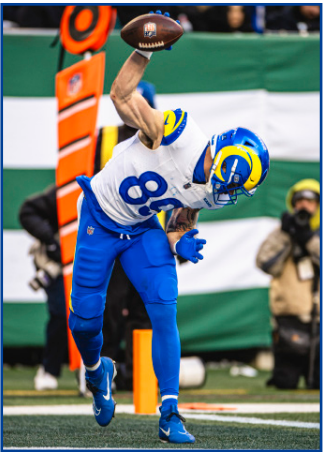


Carroll Rosenbloom Memorial Award



Given to the team's Rookie of the Year, the award was established following the passing of former owner Carroll Rosenbloom in 1979. Rosenbloom became the owner of the Rams when he orchestrated an unprecedented franchise trade in 1972. Rosenbloom traded the Baltimore Colts to Robert Irsay for the Rams. The Rams won an NFL record seven consecutive NFC West titles from 1973-79 under Rosenbloom's leadership. This year's Carroll Rosenbloom Memorial Award winner is **OLB Jared Verse**.

Verse led all rookies in pressures (77), hurries (56) and quarterback hits (18). He tied for second in tackles for loss (11) and fifth in sacks (4.5). Across the NFL, Verse tied for second in hurries (56), fourth in pressures (77), tied for seventh in fumble recoveries (two) and tied for 32nd in tackles for loss (11). In Week 16, Verse joined teammate Braden Fiske as the only rookies in franchise history to record at least 4.5 sacks, two forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries in their first season.



Carl Ekern Spirit of the Game Award/Ed Block Courage Award



Established in 1990, the award is given to the player who best exemplifies sportsmanship, ethic, and commitment to his teammates. Those traits were displayed by former Rams linebacker Carl Ekern, killed in an automobile accident in 1990. Ekern was a starter for the Rams from 1982-88 and earned an invitation to the Pro Bowl in 1986. This year's Carl Ekern Spirit of the Game Award winner is **TE Tyler Higbee**. Higbee was also voted by his teammates as the Ed Block Courage Award recipient, given to a player who is a role model of inspiration, sportsmanship, and courage.

Despite missing 14 games due to a significant knee injury sustained during the Wild Card Round of the 2023 season, Higbee has been praised by coaches and teammates for his steadiness, toughness, resilience, and commitment throughout the rehabilitation process. In Week 16 vs. the New York Jets, Higbee recorded his first reception of the 2024 season and scored on an 11-yard touchdown. Despite missing most of the season, Higbee served as a leader and a valuable contributor to the team. Off the field, Higbee purchased gifts for two families served by the Watts-Willowbrook Boys & Girls Club this holiday season. He also purchased items on holiday wish lists for two families in need including grocery gift cards, Visa gift cards to help pay bills, furniture, toys for children, electronics, as well as clothing items for members of each family.



Daniel F. Reeves Memorial Award



Given to the team's Most Valuable Player, the award was established in honor of former owner Daniel F. Reeves in 1969. Reeves purchased a stake in the Rams in 1941 and became the sole owner in 1943 while serving stateside in the U.S. Army Air Forces. He played a pivotal role in resolving the team's financial difficulties and helped lead the team to a Western Division title in 1945 and secured the championship later that season. Following the 1945 season, he orchestrated the team's relocation to Los Angeles. Reeves restored the franchise to its winning ways and played a key role in designing the "Fearsome Foursome" defensive line consisting of Rosey Grier, Merlin Olsen, Deacon Jones and Lamar Lundy. This year's Daniel F. Reeves Memorial Award winner is **QB Matthew Stafford**.

The three-time Pro Bowl selection has completed 340-of-517 pass attempts for 3,762 yards and 20 touchdowns last season. He finished the season ranked 11th in the NFL in completions, 12th in passing first downs (176), 13th in passing yards and 15th in passer rating (93.7). Last season, Stafford passed Eli Manning (366) and moved into sole possession of 10th on the NFL's all-time passing touchdowns list with 377. He also passed Dan Marino (4,967) for ninth on the NFL's all-time completions list with 5,174 and moved into 10th on the NFL's all-time passing yards list with 59,809 career passing yards.



Player Accolades



Pro Football Writers of America Selections

The Rams had three players selected to the All-Rookie team, the most in the NFL.

OLB Jared Verse was named the PFWA Defensive Rookie of the Year. He is the second player in franchise history to be selected as the Defensive Rookie of the Year by the PFWA, joining Former DT Aaron Donald (2014).

DE Braden Fiske made the All-Rookie team as a member of the defensive line and WR Jordan Whittington was selected as a kick returner.

The Rams have had seven players named to the All-Rookie team in the past two seasons, the most by any team since 2000.



NFL Weekly/Monthly Awards

The Rams had seven different players, including four rookies honored by the NFL last season.

OLB Jared Verse was nominated twice for Pepsi Rookie of the Week in Week 2 and Week 10. He was named the NFL's Defensive Rookie of the Month for his dominating performance in the month of September when he led rookies in pressures (17), tackles for loss (five) and forced fumbles (one).

DE Braden Fiske was named the NFL's Defensive Rookie of the Month in November after leading all rookies in tackles for loss (six), sacks (5.0), and tied for first in forced fumbles (one).

Verse and Fiske were just the third defensive rookie duo to each win the award in the same season joining Dee Milliner/Sheldon Richardson (2013) and Erik Coleman/Jonathan Vilma (2004).

S Kamren Kinchens became the first rookie defensive back to win the Defensive Player of the Week award multiple times during his first season in the NFL.

CB Cobie Durant was named NFC Defensive Player of the Week after his performance in Week 7 against Las Vegas when he became the first defensive back to record an interception, sack and forced fumble in a game last season.





Milestones Achieved Last Season



- WR Puka Nacua became the second player in NFL history to record at least 150 receptions, 2,000 receiving yards, and nine receiving touchdowns in his first 25 career games, joining Odell Beckham Jr.
- In Week 16, Nacua recorded his eighth game with at least eight receptions and 100-or-more receiving yards, tied for the third-most in NFL history through a player's first 28 career games. He tied with Isaac Bruce for the most by a Rams player in the same span.
- Nacua (1,521 yards) recorded over 1,500+ receiving yards in his career, becoming the fastest receiver to do so in NFL history (18 games).
- Nacua surpassed 2,000 career receiving yards in his 24th game played in Week 13 and tied Justin Jefferson and Ja'Marr Chase as the second-fastest players to reach 2,000 receiving yards since the 1970 merger. Odell Beckham Jr. accomplished the feat in 21 games.
- Nacua became the first player in franchise history and 16th player in NFL history to record 150+ receiving yards, one receiving touchdown and one rushing touchdown in a game. He also became just the second player to accomplish the feat in the last decade, joining CeeDee Lamb in Week 10 of 2023 vs. the New York Giants.
- Nacua recorded his third game with 160-or-more yards in his first 25 career games, tied for the second-most in NFL history, trailing Victor Cruz (four), Lance Alworth (four) and Mark Duper (four).
- His third game with 160+ receiving yards tied for the fifth-most in franchise history. He also tied Isaac Bruce for the most by a player in their first 25 career games in franchise history.
- Nacua joined Hall of Famers Jerry Rice (twice) and Lance Alworth (1964) as the only wide receivers with at least 160 receiving yards, one receiving touchdown and one rushing touchdown in a single game.
- Week 14 marked the fifth game in Nacua's career in which he amassed at least 150 yards from scrimmage, tying Randy Moss and Jerry Rice for the most by a wide receiver in his first two seasons in the Super Bowl era.
- Nacua passed Michael Thomas (157) for the second-most receptions by a player in their first 25 career games with 159, trailing Odell Beckham Jr (176).
- Nacua also passed Justin Jefferson (2,175) for the second-most receiving yards through a player's first 25 career games with 2,194 yards.
- Nacua also passed Justin Jefferson for the second-most games with 100 or more receiving yards in his first 25 career games.
- Nacua surpassed Stefon Diggs, Alshon Jeffery, Austin Collie, Marcus Robinson, Isaac Bruce, and Gary Clark (two games) for the most games with at least nine receptions and 160 receiving yards through a player's first 25 career games with three.
- Nacua's four receptions in Week 1 brought his career total to 109, tied for fourth most in NFL history through a player's first 18 career games (Michael Thomas, 109). Only Odell Beckham Jr. (129), Jaylen Waddle (119) and Anquan Bolden (110) had more.
- Nacua recorded his eighth-career 100-yard game in Week 8, tying Justin Jefferson for the second-most games with at least 100 receiving yards through a player's first 19 career games, trailing only Odell Beckham Jr. (nine).
- With seven receptions and 106 receiving yards in Week 8, Nacua (six) surpassed Keenan Allen (five) for the third-most games with at least seven receptions and 100+ receiving yards through a player's first 19 career games trailing Odell Beckham Jr. (nine) and Justin Jefferson (seven).
- He became only the fourth player in NFL history to record at least 1,600+ receiving yards through a player's first 19 career games, joining Odell Beckham Jr. (1,829), Justin Jefferson (1,654) and Ja'Marr Chase (1,638).
- In Week 11, Nacua recorded his first touchdown reception of the season in the second quarter and became the seventh Rams player to score seven receiving touchdowns in their first 22 career games. He is the first player to accomplish the feat since Cooper Kupp.
- He recorded 117 yards in the first half against New England in Week 11, the most in a half during his career. It's the most receiving yards by a Rams player in a half since Deshaun Jackson recorded 120 receiving yards in the second half of Week 3 of 2021 vs. Tampa Bay.



- Stafford surpassed 3,000 passing yards in a season for the 12th time in his career, becoming the 13th-different quarterback to accomplish the feat in NFL history.
- In Week 14, Stafford passed for 320 yards and two touchdowns, marking the 47th time in his career that he has passed for at least 300 yards and two touchdowns in a game, passing Ben Roethlisberger (46) for the ninth-most in NFL history. It was also his 64th game with 300-or-more passing yards, passing Dan Marino for sole possession of eighth-most in NFL history.
- In Week 14, Stafford defeated the Bills for the first time in his career. They are the 30th different team he's defeated, becoming the 15th quarterback in NFL history to defeat at least 30 different teams.
- Stafford recorded four-consecutive games with multiple touchdown passes and no interceptions for the second time in his Rams career (Week 13-16 in 2023) and became the only Rams quarterback to accomplish the feat in franchise history.
- In Week 11, QB Matthew Stafford (367) passed Eli Manning (366) and moved into sole possession of 10th on the NFL's all-time passing touchdowns list.
- In Week 4, QB Matthew Stafford moved into 10th on the NFL's all-time passing yards list surpassing former Giants QB Eli Manning (57,023).
- After Week 8 in 2024, Stafford moved into 9th place on the NFL's all-time completed passes leaderboard, passing QB Dan Marino (4,967).
- Stafford moved into seventh on the Rams all-time passing yards list, surpassing former Rams QB Bob Waterfield (11,849).
- Stafford moved into fifth on the Rams all-time completed passes list, surpassing former Rams QB Kurt Warner (1,121).
- Stafford reached 1,000 career completions (1,005) with the Rams. He became the eighth quarterback in franchise history with at least 1,000+ completions. He is also the 13th quarterback in NFL history to have at least 1,000+ completions with multiple franchises.
- With four touchdown passes in Week 8, Stafford surpassed Ben Roethlisberger (16) for the seventh-most games with at least four touchdown passes in NFL history, tying Patrick Mahomes, Russell Wilson and Johnny Unitas with 17. It's also tied for the second-most among all active quarterbacks, trailing only Aaron Rodgers with 33.
- Stafford has 112 career games with multiple touchdown passes, the 10th-most in NFL history.
- Stafford orchestrated his 47th game-winning drive in Week 13 and tied Dan Marino (47) for the fifth-most in NFL history.
- He became the fourth player in NFL history to record at least 200 passing yards and multiple touchdown passes in seven consecutive postseason games, joining Aaron Rodgers (nine consecutive games), Pro Football Hall of Famer Terry Bradshaw (seven) and Joe Flacco (seven).



Milestones Achieved Last Season



- McVay passed John Robinson (79 wins) for the most wins by a head coach in franchise history.
- The Rams have posted a winning record in seven of his eight seasons, the most winning seasons by a Head Coach in franchise history.
- He led the team to their fourth division title in his tenure, the second-most by a head coach in franchise history behind Chuck Knox (five).
- 2024 marked McVay's sixth playoff berth in eight seasons, tied with John Robinson for the most by a head coach in franchise history.
- The Rams became the first team in NFL history to enter their bye week with a losing record and make the playoffs in consecutive seasons.
- The Rams have won eight playoff games in eight seasons under McVay, the same number of playoff wins that the franchise totaled in its previous 31 seasons combined prior to his arrival.



- RB Kyren Williams recorded single-season career-highs in rushing yards (1,299) and rushing touchdowns (14).
- In Week 16, he became the sixth Rams running back to record 14 rushing touchdowns in a season and the first since Todd Gurley in 2018. Williams joined Marshall Faulk (18 in 2000) and Todd Gurley II (17 in 2018) as the only Rams players since 2000 to record 14 rushing touchdowns in a season.
- In Week 15, Williams rushed for at least 60 yards in his 12th-consecutive game, passing Eric Dickerson (11 games) for the longest streak in franchise history.
- With two touchdowns in Week 14, RB Kyren Williams passed Eric Dickerson for the most scrimmage touchdowns by a Rams player through their first 25 career starts.
- With 87 rushing yards against Buffalo, Williams passed Steven Jackson (10 games) and tied Eric Dickerson (11 games) for the longest streak of 60+ rushing yards in franchise history.
- Williams eclipsed the 1,000 rushing yard mark vs Buffalo with 1,013 yards through Week 14. He's recorded 1,000-or-more rushing yards in consecutive seasons, becoming the first Rams running back since Todd Gurley (2017-18) to accomplish the feat.
- Williams became the fifth player in Rams history to record at least 12 rushing touchdowns in consecutive seasons, joining Eric Dickerson (1983-85), Todd Gurley II (2017-19), Greg Bell (1988-89) and Marshall Faulk (2000-01).
- Williams recorded a rushing touchdown nine consecutive games to start last season. He passed Marshall Faulk (six games in 2001) for the second-longest streak in franchise history and fell one game short of Greg Bell who recorded 10 consecutive games with a rushing touchdown in 1988-89.
- Williams has recorded 29 scrimmage touchdowns since Week 1 of 2023, the most across the NFL over that span.
- Williams became the 10th player in franchise history to record at least two rushing touchdowns and one receiving touchdown in a game and he was the first to accomplish the feat since Todd Gurley in Week 7 of 2018 vs. San Francisco.
- Williams recorded his second-career game (Week 2 of 2023 vs SF) with at least one rushing and one receiving touchdown, becoming the fifth Rams running back since 2000 to accomplish the feat at least twice.
- Williams became the fifth player in Rams history to record a touchdown in each of the first three games of a season and the first since Cooper Kupp in 2022.
- Williams also recorded his fifth game with 100+ scrimmage yards and at least two touchdowns since the start of last season, most in the NFL over that time span.
- Williams (20) passed Jon Arnett (19) and moved to 18th in franchise history in rushing touchdowns.
- In Week 8, Williams passed Eric Dickerson (22) for the most scrimmage touchdowns by a Rams player in their first 20 career starts with 23, accomplishing the feat in 18 career starts.
- Williams recorded 2,000+ scrimmage yards and 20+ scrimmage touchdowns through 28 career games. The only other Rams player since 1967 to achieve those marks in 28-or-fewer games was Eric Dickerson (14 games).
- With two scrimmage touchdowns in Week 7, Williams (22) passed Eric Dickerson (21) for the most touchdowns by a Rams player in their first 17 career starts. It is also the second-most by a player in their first 17 starts in NFL history (Larry Johnson, 27).
- Williams scored a rushing touchdown in each of the first six games of the season, becoming the first Rams running back to do so since Greg Bell in 1988. He also became only the fourth running back since 2000 to accomplish the feat, joining LaDainian Tomlinson (2005), Dalvin Cook (2020) and Derrick Henry (2024).
- Williams surpassed 2,000 rushing yards in his career in Week 11. He is the 22nd player in franchise history to accomplish the feat and the first since Todd Gurley II in 2017.
- Williams became the third Rams player aged 24-or-younger to have at least 27 scrimmage touchdowns over a two-year span. He joins Todd Gurley II (40 from 2017-2018) and Eric Dickerson (34 from 1983-1984).
- Williams (27 TD) recorded the fourth-most scrimmage touchdowns by a Rams player before turning 25 years old. He trails Todd Gurley II (56), Steven Jackson (36) and Eric Dickerson (34).



Milestones Achieved Last Season



- Jared Verse recorded the second-most pressures by a rookie in their first season with 89, trailing Khalil Mack's 102 in 2014.
- He became the first rookie with at least two sacks in a postseason game since Nick Bosa in the 2018 Divisional Round vs. Minnesota.
- Verse also became the second player in franchise history to record at least three tackles for loss in a postseason game in franchise history, joining Von Miller in 2021.
- His 17.2% pressure rate last season was the second-highest by a rookie in the Next Gen Stats era behind Micah Parson's 19.5% pressure rate in 2021.
- Verse is one of two rookies (Fiske) in franchise history to record at least 4.5 sacks, two forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries in their rookie season.



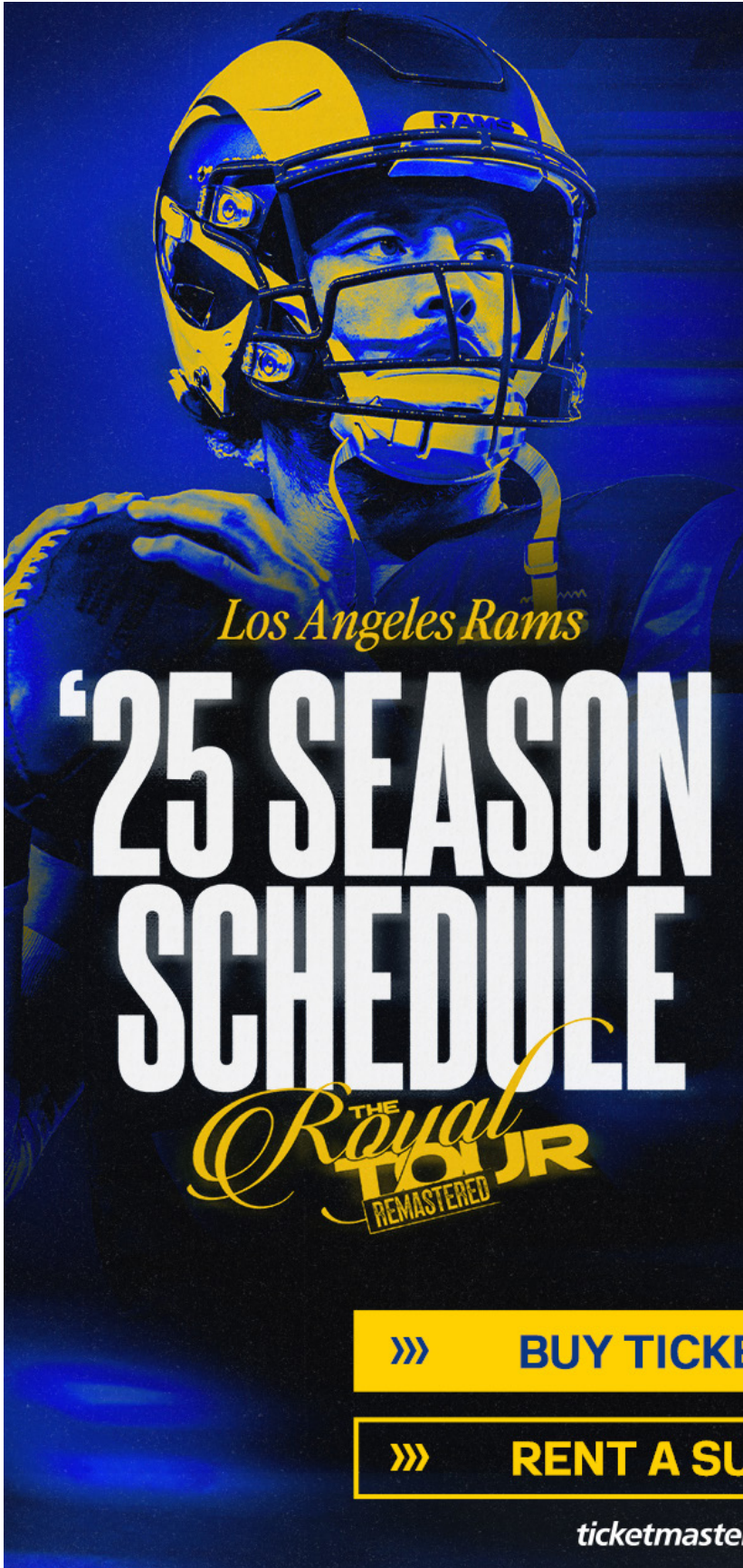

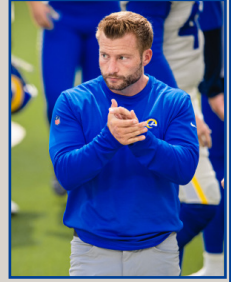

Rams Head Coach Sean McVay took over a team that was coming off of a 4-12 season and ranked 32nd in scoring. McVay helped transform it into the No. 1 scoring team in the league and helped secure the franchise's first NFC West title since 2003.



Due to his excellent first season and his instrumental part in revamping the Rams offense, McVay was chosen as the Associated Press Coach of the Year for 2017. He is the fourth head coach in franchise history to achieve this honor.

The last Rams head coach to win the award was Dick Vermeil in 1999. Vermeil helped guide the Rams to a 13-3 record, winning the NFC West and culminating with the franchise's lone Super Bowl victory over the Titans, 23-16, in Super Bowl XXXIV. Chuck Knox was the only other rookie head coach in franchise history to win the award.

McVay became the youngest coach in NFL history to win the Associated Press Coach of the Year award. McVay was 31 years old during the team's final game of the season. Previously, Don Shula (34 years old) was the youngest coach to win the award.

Since Head Coach Sean McVay took over prior to the start of the 2017 season, the Rams have won eight regular season games by at least 29 points. L.A. is one of five franchises to record at least six wins of 29 or more points in that timeframe. The Rams big wins have come twice against the Cardinals and once against the 49ers, Seahawks, Giants, Jaguars, Colts and the Broncos.

The Ravens have a league-best 11 big wins. The Patriots have 10, the Bills have nine, and the Rams and the Saints are tied for fourth with eight.

The Rams G.O.A.T. Coach



In Week 8, Sean McVay became the winningest head coach in franchise history (including postseason) with 80 wins, passing John Robinson (79 wins). He accomplished the feat during his eighth season, while Robinson needed nine seasons to become the winningest coach for the Rams.

According to ESPN Research, McVay, 38, is the second man since the 1970 merger to be the winningest coach of a franchise before turning 40. He joins John Madden, who became the Raiders' all-time wins leader at age 36 in 1972.

In Week 13, McVay recorded his 76th regular season win, passing John Robinson for the most by a Head Coach in franchise history.

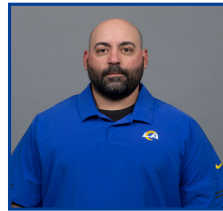

I'm Honored



In 2024, OLB Jared Verse was named NFL Defensive Rookie of the Month for his performance in the month of September. He was also nominated for Pepsi Rookie of the Week after his Week 2 performance. S Kamren Kinchens became the first rookie defensive back to win the Defensive Player of the Week award multiple times during his first season in the NFL. DE Braden Fiske was named the NFL Defensive Rookie of the month for the month of November.

CB Cobie Durant was named NFC Defensive Player of the Week after his performance in Week 7 against Las Vegas. He became the first defensive back to record an interception, sack and forced fumble in a game last season. This was Durant's first-career Player of the Week award and he became the third Rams defensive back to win Defensive Player of the Week in the past 10 seasons. He also became the second player from South Carolina State to win a Player of the Week award since 2000, joining Darius Leonard (four-time winner).

Success In The West



Under Head Coach Sean McVay, the Rams are 26-16 in the regular season against NFC West opponents. The Rams finished 6-0 in the NFC West during the 2018 season. The last time an NFC West team accomplished the feat was the Cardinals in 2008. It marked the first time the Rams swept the NFC West since 1999.

The Rams are 14-7 in NFC West road contests since the start of the 2017 season. The most recent road win was against the San Francisco 49ers, 12-6, at Levi's Stadium in Week 15. The Rams' record in the NFC West last season was 5-1, sweeping the Seahawks and the Cardinals.

The Rams overcame a 14-point deficit in Week 3 to defeat San Francisco which was the second-largest comeback win over the 49ers in franchise history. It was also McVay's first win when trailing by 14+ points at any time during a game.

Coach Sean McVay has 14 victories over the Arizona Cardinals since 2017, the most for any coach against an NFC opponent during that span.

The Rams outscored their divisional opponents, 171-112, during the 2017 season, which was a 59-point differential. It was the highest positive point differential in the division for the Rams since 2001, when the Rams outscored their divisional opponents, 274-160, for a 114-point differential. The 2001 Rams played in a five team division and therefore had eight divisional games that season.

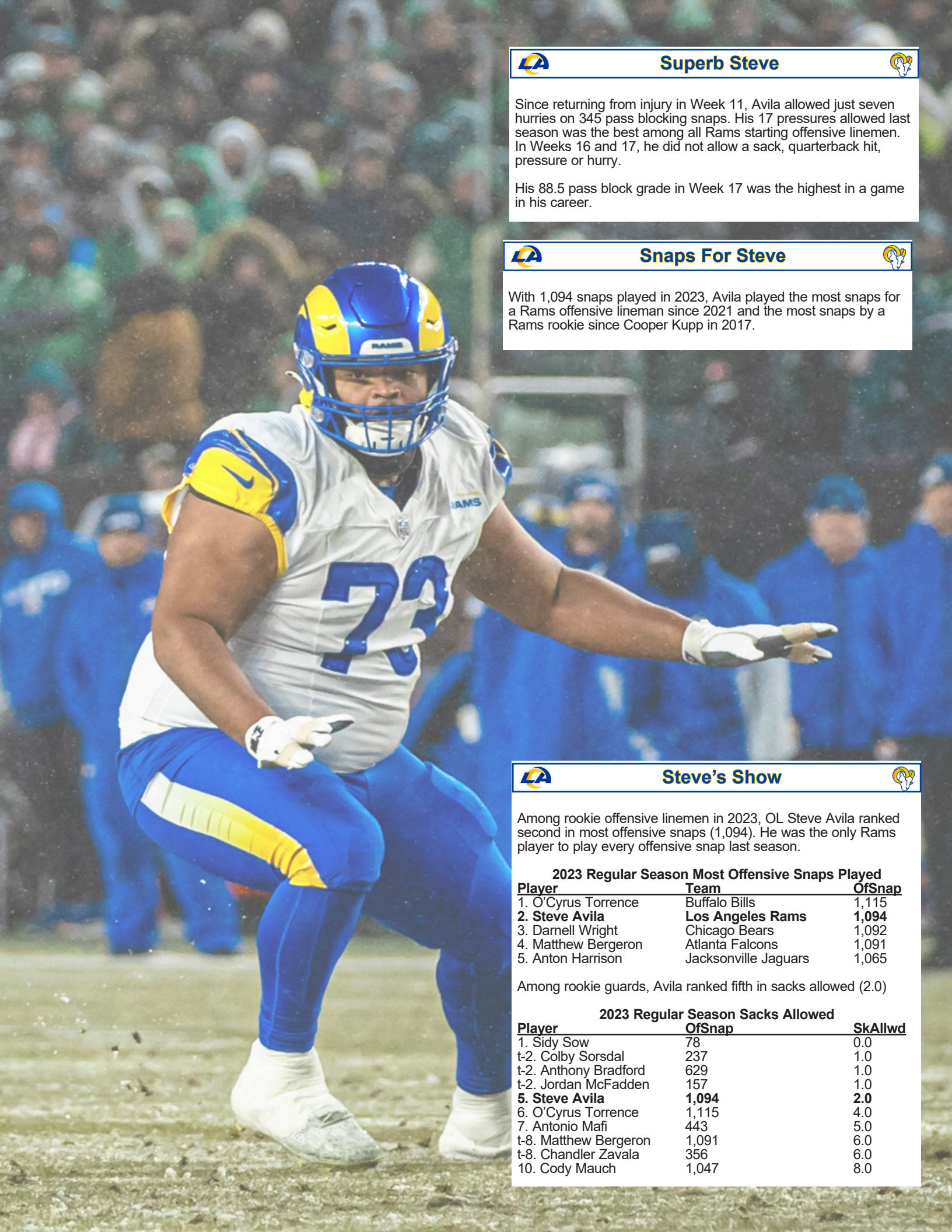

Rob Leads the Way

OT Rob Havenstein has been a staple of the Rams offensive line since he was drafted in 2015. He has started every game that he has appeared in and is the player to have been with the team before the Rams moved back to Los Angeles.

With his start at right tackle in Week 16, Havenstein (141) tied Henry Ellard (141) for the ninth-most starts by a player in franchise history.

According to *PFF*, Havenstein posted his best offensive grade (85.6) and run blocking grade (90.5) in Week 14 vs. Buffalo. He did not allow a pressure, hurry or quarterback hit in Week 16 vs. New York Jets.

Last season, he allowed just 12 hurries, five quarterback hits, and three sacks.



Offensive Line Notes



Hold The Line



Last season, the **Los Angeles Rams offensive line** allowed 31 sacks last season, the sixth-best mark across the league. From Weeks 7-17, they allowed just 12 sacks and didn't allow a sack in seven of those 11 games (Week 8,9,11,14,15,16,17). The offensive line did not allow a sack in four consecutive weeks (Week 14-17), tied for the longest streak in franchise history and the first time they've accomplished the feat since 2013.

After dealing with a significant amount of injuries on the offensive line early in the season, they bounced back and their current five starters (A. Jackson, Avila, Limmer, Dotson and Havenstein) allowed a combined 14 sacks and 68 pressures. In Week 14, the Rams offensive line held the Bills to a 22% pressure rate, the Bills lowest pressure rate last season.

The Rams finished the season tied for seventh in hurries allowed (132).

Ky(RUN) Williams



Last season, **RB Kyren Williams** became the first-ever Rams player with multiple touchdowns in the first two games of a season. In Week 6, Williams rushed for 100+ yards for the second time in three weeks and the second time of his career. He became the first Rams' running back to rush for 150+ yards since Cam Akers in Week 14 of 2020 against the Patriots. In Week 6 against the Cardinals, of his 158 rushing yards, 154 yards were in the second half, becoming the first Rams player since Marshall Faulk in 2001 to have at least 150 rushing yards in a half, according to *ESPN Stats and Information*.

Williams became the first Rams player with 200 scrimmage yards and two touchdowns in a game since Todd Gurley in 2018. He also was just the fourth player in Rams history with 100+ rushing yards and two receiving touchdowns in a game, joining Todd Gurley (2017), Cleveland Gary (1992), and Eric Dickerson (1983). In Week 16 of 2023 against the Saints, he recorded the sixth 100+ yard rushing game of his career and of the season, tying Todd Gurley who had six 100+ yard rushing contests in 2018. Williams recorded 100+ yards rushing in three consecutive games for the first time in his career. With 47 yards rushing in the first half, he hit the 1,000-yard rushing mark on the season and for the first time in his career. He became the first Rams running back to do so since Todd Gurley in 2018.

Last season in Week 11, Williams surpassed 2,000 rushing yards in his career. He is the 22nd player in franchise history to accomplish the feat and the first since Todd Gurley II in 2017. He has rushed for at least 60 yards in each of the Rams' last eight games, matching Todd Gurley II (2018) for the longest such streak in the last 15 years.

In Week 13, Williams recorded his eighth game last season with at least one rushing touchdown, tied for the third-most in the NFL (Jalen Hurts and Joe Mixon), trailing only Derrick Henry (10 games) and David Montgomery (nine games). He became the third Rams player aged 24-or-younger to have at least 27 scrimmage touchdowns over a two-year span. He joins Todd Gurley II (40 from 2017-2018) and Eric Dickerson (34 from 1983-1984).

Williams (31 touchdowns) has the fourth-most scrimmage touchdowns by a Rams player before turning 25 years old. He trails Todd Gurley II (56), Steven Jackson (36) and Eric Dickerson (34). He became the fifth Rams player in franchise history to record 10-or-more rushing touchdowns in consecutive seasons, joining Eric Dickerson (1983-86), Greg Bell (1988-89), Marshall Faulk (2000-01) and Todd Gurley II (2017-19).

Williams recorded at least one rushing touchdown in 17 games since the start of last season. Only David Montgomery (21) and Derrick Henry (19) have more games with a rushing touchdown over that span.

In Week 14, he became the first running back since Adrian Peterson (2007-09) to post consecutive 1,000+ yard and 12+ touchdown seasons within their first three seasons.

In Week 16, he recorded single-season career-highs in rushing yards (1,243) and rushing touchdowns (13). He recorded a season-high 122 rushing yards on 23 attempts vs. New York Jets. Williams also tied Derrick Henry, Jalen Hurts and David Montgomery for the most games with at least one rushing touchdown last season with 10. He scored 14 of the Rams' 15 rushing touchdowns last season (92.8%), marking the highest percentage of a team's rushing touchdowns by one player in the NFL last season.

In Week 17, Williams recorded his 14th rushing touchdown of the season, tied for the most in the NFL. He is the sixth Rams running back to record 14 rushing touchdowns in a season and the first since Todd Gurley in 2018. Williams joined Marshall Faulk (18 in 2000) and Todd Gurley II (17 in 2018) as the only Rams players since 2000 to record 14 rushing touchdowns in a season. It was also his 14th consecutive game with at least 50 rushing yards, tied for the second-longest streak in a single season in franchise history. Eric Dickerson accomplished the feat in all 16 games of the 1986 season and Steven Jackson did so in the first 14 games of the 2010 season.



Ky(RUNNING) Up The Rankings



Williams finished the season ranked second in rushing first downs (85), tied for fifth in rushing touchdowns (14), seventh in rushing yards (1,299), and 12th in rushes per touchdown (22.57). Since entering the league in 2022, Williams recorded eight games with two-or-more scrimmage touchdowns, tied for the third-most across the NFL, trailing Derrick Henry (10), Jalen Hurts (10), and Saquon Barkley (nine).

Williams scored a rushing touchdown in each of the first six games of the season, becoming the first Rams running back to do so since Greg Bell in 1988. He also became only the fourth running back since 2000 to accomplish the feat, joining LaDainian Tomlinson (2005), Dalvin Cook (2020) and Derrick Henry (2024). He now has 2,000+ scrimmage yards and 20+ scrimmage touchdowns through 28 career games. The only other Rams player since 1967 to achieve those marks in 28-or-fewer games was Eric Dickerson (14 games).

Williams scored a touchdown for a ninth-consecutive game in Week 7, the longest streak across the NFL since 2022 (Ezekiel Elliott). He tied Shaun Alexander (2005) and Ezekiel Elliott (2022) for the fourth-longest streak of games with a rushing touchdown since 2000.

In Historic Company



In Week 2 of the 2023 season, **QB Matthew Stafford** passed Peyton Manning for the most passing yards by a player in his first 200 regular season games (52,723 yards in 193 games).

He has accumulated 58,847 regular season passing yards over his illustrious 14-year career, which ranks 10th most all-time. He is one spot ahead of former Giants QB Eli Manning (57,023) and sits behind Jets Quarterback Aaron Rodgers (61,313).

His 372 passing touchdowns ranks tied for 10th all-time with Eli Manning and are more than Warren Moon (291), John Elway (300) and other Hall of Famers like Johnny Unitas (290) and Joe Montana (273). He also ranks second among active quarterbacks.

After Week 3 in 2024, Stafford moved into 10th place on the NFL's all-time completed passes leaderboard, passing QB Eli Manning (4,895). He needs two completed passes to pass Dan Marino (4,967) for 9th. He finished the 2023 regular season with a completion rate above 60%, making that his 10th consecutive season.

Stafford was the third QB to win a Super Bowl in the first season with team. Trent Dilfer was the first in 2000 and Tom Brady the second in 2020.

Additionally, he ranks second in most passing yards per game in NFL history in a minimum of 100 games (271.8). He sits behind Drew Brees (280) and above Peyton Manning (270.5).



Fastest To 60K



In his first 200 career regular season and playoff games, **QB Matthew Stafford** accumulated 54,819 passing yards. He was the fastest QB to reach 50,000 passing yards in NFL history. One other active QB has reached this threshold. Stafford ranks second amongst active QBs in passing yards (according to TruMedia).

QB Matthew Stafford passed 50,000 regular season passing yards against the Bills Week 1 of 2022. Stafford was the fourth active QB and 12th all-time to reach this mark. He became the fastest QB to reach 50,000 passing yards in NFL history.



Ageless Wonder



Stafford was one of four QBs to complete at least 10 passes of 30-plus air yards in 2023. Stafford's 63-yard pass to Tyler Johnson in Week 1 was his 12th completion of 60+ yards since joining the Rams in 2021. Only Dolphins QB Tua Tagovailoa (14) has more 60-yard completions over that time span.

Stafford passed for over 300+ yards for the ninth time in regular season openers, which is the second-most in NFL history trailing only Drew Brees (10). He also has 4,709 career passing yards in Week 1 games which now places him fourth on the NFL's all-time list, surpassing Matt Ryan (4,486).

After Week 3, Stafford reached 1,000 career completions (1,005) with the Rams. He's the eighth quarterback in franchise history with at least 1,000+ completions. He is also the 13th quarterback in NFL history to have at least 1,000+ completions with multiple franchises.



Optimus Nine



In Week 8, Stafford completed his 4,968th pass of his career which moved him into ninth place on the NFL's all-time completed passes leaderboard. Stafford (5,141) needs 119 completed passes to pass Philip Rivers for eighth all-time.

Nacua's 266 receiving yards are the second-most by any pass catcher through two career games in NFL history, trailing only Anquan Boldin's 279 in 2003.

Through two weeks, he gained 270 yards, nearly one-third of the Rams' total. He had 43.1% of the Rams' catches, the highest for any player through two games since Vincent Jackson had 50% of Tampa Bay's catches in the first two games of the 2013 season.

Record Breaker

In his NFL debut in Week 1 (2023) against the Seahawks, **WR Puka Nacua** recorded 10 receptions for 119 receiving yards, the most receiving yards in a rookie debut in Rams history. He is the second player drafted in the fifth round or later with 100+ receiving yards in his NFL debut.

Nacua became the first rookie in his NFL debut to have 100+ yards league wide since Ja'Marr Chase in 2021 and the first rookie to have 10 catches in his debut league wide since 1948.

After Week 4 (2023), Nacua totaled 39 receptions which is the most in a player's first four career games in NFL history and 501 receiving yards which is the most in a player's first four career games in NFL history.

He had over 100 yards in three of his first four games making him the second player in NFL history with 100+ receiving yards in three of his first four games.

With his 39 receptions, he surpassed Anquan Boldin and his 30 receptions in 2003 for the most receptions ever by a player in their first four NFL games. Nacua also surpassed Reggie Bush, who had 34 catches in 2006, for the most receptions by a player in their first five NFL games.

In Week 7, he totaled 92 yards after the catch, the most since WR Cooper Kupp recorded 101 yards after the catch in Week 2 of 2021. Nacua had 146 receiving yards through three quarters of play and recorded his fourth 100+ receiving yard performance of the season.

With three catches in Week 9, he passed Kupp (62) to set the franchise record for most receptions in their first NFL season.

With a 12-yard reception in the first quarter of Week 13, Nacua passed Eddie Kennison (924) for the most receiving yards by a rookie in franchise history. He completed this in three less games than Kennison. With a 70-yard touchdown reception, he recorded the longest of his career. Nacua finished the first half with 105 yards, making that his fifth 100+ receiving yard game of his career. With a 31-yard rush, he also recorded the longest of his career.

Through his first 13 games, Nacua had 82 receptions and 1,113 receiving yards. He joins Odell Beckham Jr., Anquan Boldin, and Randy Moss as the only players in the Super Bowl era with 1,100-plus receiving yards in their first 13 career games.

With a touchdown in Week 16 against the New Orleans Saints, Nacua recorded his fifth of the season. With nine receptions, he passed Michael Thomas (92) for third-most by a rookie in NFL history. He recorded his sixth 100+ yards receiving game of the season which is the most for a Rams receiver since WR Cooper Kupp in 2021 (11). This was Nacua's third 150+ yard receiving game of his career.

With an 80-yard reception in Week 17, Nacua recorded a career-long. He finished the game with five receptions for 118 yards. This was his seventh 100+ yard receiving yard game of the season. Additionally, he recorded 100+ receiving yards in back-to-back games for the second time last season.

Puka's Pace



Nacua recorded his 13th career game with 100 receiving yards in Week 17. It is his fifth game with 100-or-more yards since Week 8, the most in the NFL. The only other player with more than three such games in that span is Justin Jefferson (four).



One of a Kind



Nacua (2,077) surpassed 2,000 scrimmage yards in his 23rd career game. He became the fifth wide receiver in NFL history to reach at least 2,000 scrimmage yards in 23 games-or-fewer, joining Charley Taylor (20), Bill Groman (21), Odell Beckham Jr. (21) and Charlie Hennigan (22). He is also the fifth Rams player and first wide receiver to reach 2,000 career scrimmage yards in 23 games-or-fewer.

Nacua surpassed 2,000 career receiving yards in his 24th game played today, tying Justin Jefferson and Ja'Marr Chase as the second-fastest players to reach 2,000 receiving yards since the 1970 merger. Odell Beckham Jr. accomplished the feat in 21 games.

In his 25th game against Buffalo, He became the second player in NFL history to record at least 150 receptions, 2,000 receiving yards, and nine receiving touchdowns in his first 25 career games, joining Odell Beckham Jr.

In Week 14, he recorded 12 receptions for 162 yards including a rushing and receiving touchdown. He joined Hall of Famers Jerry Rice (twice) and Lance Alworth (1964) as the only wide receivers with at least 160 receiving yards, one receiving touchdown and one rushing touchdown in a single game. It was the fifth game in Nacua's career in which he amassed at least 150 yards from scrimmage, tying Randy Moss and Jerry Rice for the most by a wide receiver in his first two seasons in the Super Bowl era.

His 184 career receptions made him the seventh player in NFL history to record at least 180 receptions through a player's first two seasons.



History In The Making



Nacua's five games with 100-or-more receiving yards in 2024 were tied with five players for the most such games last season. He accomplished the feat despite missing five games due to injury.



Exceeding Expectations



According to *NFL.com*, Nacua became just the second rookie in NFL history to have at least 1,000 yards receiving after being drafted outside the top 100. The only other player to do this was Marques Colston of the Saints, who had 1,038 yards in his rookie season in 2006.



Fast On and Off the Field



With 35 receiving yards against the Lions in Week 1, WR Puka Nacua (1,521 yards) recorded over 1,500+ receiving yards in his career, becoming the fastest receiver to do so in NFL history (18 games).



Puka Leads The Way



Among the 2023 draft class, Nacua leads all players in receptions, receiving yards, yards after the catch, and receiving first downs despite missing five games due to injury in 2024. He is the lowest draft pick among rookie leaders in each category.

Age Is Just A Number



In Week 1 of 2023, **WR Puka Nacua** and **WR Tutu Atwell** became the first Rams duo aged 23 or younger with 100+ receiving yards each since 1958. The last time the Rams had two WRs with over 100 yards in a season-opener was 2003.

RB Kyren Williams (112.5) and **Nacua** (92.6) became the first teammates age 23 or younger to each average 90+ scrimmage yards per game in league history.





Rams Defensive Team Notes



Oh Captain, My Captain



S Quentin Lake became the fourth Rams defensive back in franchise history to record 10+ tackles in consecutive games, joining Craig Dahl (2010), T.J. McDonald (2014) and John Johnson III (2018). He also became the first Rams player to accomplish the feat in the first two weeks to start a season. Lake is the first Rams defensive back to lead the team in total tackles in consecutive games to start the season since Adam Archuleta did so in 2002.

He recorded nine tackles against the Raiders in Week 7 bringing his season total to 52, the most by a Rams defensive back through the first six games of a season. It was his sixth straight game with six-or-more tackles, the second-longest streak across the NFL in 2024 among defensive backs.

In Week 11, he tied a single-game career-high with 11 tackles. It was his fourth game with 10+ tackles last season. Lake (four games) now has the third-most games among Rams defensive backs with 10+ tackles, trailing John Johnson III (nine) and Taylor Rapp (seven).

In Week 16, Lake became the 11th Rams defensive back to record 100 tackles in a season and the first since Jordan Fuller in 2021. He is the second Rams defensive back to record 100 tackles in their first 15 games of a season, joining Taylor Rapp (2019). Lake finished the season ranked sixth in total tackles (111) among defensive backs. His 111 tackles are the fifth-most by a defensive back in franchise history.

He played 100% of the Rams defensive snaps through the first 17 weeks of the season, one of three defenders (Panthers S Xavier Woods and Colts LB Zaire Franklin) in the NFL to accomplish the feat last season.



Don't Mess with Darious



After Week 7 of the 2023 season, CB Darious Williams did not allow a single touchdown and recorded 11 forced incompletions/interceptions on 316 coverage snaps.

According to Pro Football Focus, Williams finished the season tied for fifth in coverage grade (85.3) and was the second-most valuable cornerback in the NFL according to PFF War.

Over the course of the 2022-23 seasons, Williams proved to be one the premier cornerbacks in the NFL ranking second in pass breakup percentage (16.4%), tied for fourth in defensive passer efficiency (111.3), seventh in passer rating against (as the primary defender) (55.7) and tied for 10th in completion percentage against (55%).

Williams recorded a career high 19 passes defended last season en route to a 21.6% ballhawk rate, the second-highest in the NFL (min. 50 targets). No Rams cornerback recorded a ball hawk rate higher than 16.0% last season (min. 15 targets).



Ball Hawks



The Rams were one of five teams (Texans, Lions, Steelers, Eagles) to have multiple players (S Jaylen McCollough and Kamren Kinchens) rank in the top-10 in interceptions last season. They are also the only team to have two rookies rank in the top-10.



Watch Out for the Land Shark



CB Cobie Durant became the sixth player since 2000 to record two passes defended, 1.0 sack, one interception, one tackle for loss and one forced fumble in a game and the first since Fred Warner in Week 2 of 2024 vs Minnesota. Prior to that, the last player to accomplish the feat was Telvin Smith in Week 7 of 2014 vs Cleveland. Durant's interception marked the third of his career and first since Week 16 of 2022 vs Denver and it marked it his second-career game with at least one sack and one interception (Week 2 of 2022 vs. Atlanta).

In Week 11, Durant tied a single-game career-high with two passes defended. In Week 13, he recorded a single-game career-high two tackles for loss. He has now recorded four tackles for loss in the 2024 season and is tied for the fourth-most among cornerbacks. He became the 11th cornerback last season to record at least six tackles and two tackles for loss.



Wither-Lock



CB Ankello Witherspoon finished last season recording at least one pass defended in four consecutive games, tied for the second-longest active streak and tied for the sixth-longest streak in the NFL last season. It is also the most he has recorded over a four-game period in his career. He recorded his first interception of the season with 37 seconds remaining in the fourth quarter to seal a Rams victory. It also marks his 12th-career interception and fourth since joining the Rams in 2023.



Watch Out



The Rams are the only team to have multiple players record nine or more pressures in a single game during their rookie season since pressures have been officially tracked (2017). Seven rookies have accomplished the feat, most recently, **OLB Jared Verse** against Las Vegas in Week 7. **DE Kobie Turner** recorded 10 pressures as a rookie in 2023 in Week 17 against the New York Giants and **OLB Byron Young** recorded nine pressures in his third career game in Week 3 of 2023 against Cincinnati.



Bringing The Heat



The Rams tallied 28.0 sacks from players drafted over the last two years: Kobie Turner (8.0), Braden Fiske (8.0), Byron Young (7.0), Jared Verse (4.5), and Tyler Davis (0.5). That is 13.5 more sacks than the next closest team (Buccaneers, 14.5).



Hurry Up



The Rams were one of two teams (Saints) to have two players rank inside the top-13 in hurries last season. Jared Verse tied for second with 56 and Kobie Turner ranked 13th with 43. They were also the only team to have three players rank in the top-17 (Verse, Turner and DE Braden Fiske tied for 17th with 40).

Generating Pressure

DE Kobie Turner generated a league-high 23 pressures when he was double teamed last season. According to Next Gen Stats, he was double teamed on 52.4% of his pass rushes, the fourth-highest rate in the NFL (min. 200 pass rushes).

Kobie's Turn

DE Kobie Turner became only the second player in franchise history to record at least 10.0 sacks in his first 19 career games, joining Aaron Donald (12.5 sacks).

In Week 10, he recorded his second game with at least 1.0 sack and one pass defended last season, tied for the second-most, trailing only Giants OLB Brian Burns (three).

In Week 11, he recorded his first career fumble recovery in the second quarter. Turner recorded a tackle for loss and a pass defended in back-to-back games this season, becoming the ninth player to accomplish the feat in 2024. He is the first Ram to accomplish the feat since Ernest Jones IV in Week 15 and 16 of 2023. He also became the fourth Ram to record at least five tackles, one tackle for loss, one pass defended and one fumble recovery in a game and the first since Alec Ogletree in Week 2 of 2016 vs. Seattle. He is the third player to accomplish the feat last season and the only defensive lineman to do so.

In Week 14, DE Kobie Turner passed Myles Garrett and Vic Beasley (64) for the 13th-most hurries through a player's first 30 career games played with 65.

Stopping the Run

DE Kobie Turner generated the fifth-highest run stop rate (16.3%) among all defensive tackles in 2023 (minimum. 100 snaps).

Coming B.Y. You



In Week 3, **OLB Byron Young** also became the sixth player in franchise history to record at least 2.0 tackles for loss, 1.0 sack, one forced fumble, and one pass defended in a game and the first since Dante Fowler in Week 16 of 2019 vs. San Francisco.

In Week 9, he tied a single-game career-high three quarterback hits.

In Week 10, Young recorded four tackles (two solo), two tackles for loss, two quarterback hits and 1.0 sack. It marked his ninth tackle for loss in the 2024 season, surpassing his season total in 2023 (eight). It also marked his seventh game with at least one tackle for loss last season, only Denver's Nik Bonitto and Zach Allen have more in 2024 (each with eight games).

In Week 11, Young recorded his fourth-consecutive game with a sack, the longest-streak by a Rams defender since Von Miller in Weeks 15-18 of 2021. He has now recorded 14.0 sacks, tied with Kobie Turner for the second-most by a Rams defender through 26 career games.



Sack Specialist



OLB Byron Young recorded 1.0 sack in three consecutive regular season games dating back to last season (2023, Week 16 - 2024, Week 1), becoming the second Ram to accomplish the feat since 2022.

Young also recorded a sack in four consecutive weeks (Week 8 to 11).



Young Rookie, Veteran Moves



Rookie **OLB Byron Young** made an immediate impact in his rookie season in 2023. He was the first rookie in franchise history to be in the sack column in his first three NFL games. He recorded 50 pressures, 61 tackles (42 solo), 8.0 sacks, 29 hurries, and 21 quarterback hits on the season.

In Week 18, Young recorded his first fumble recovery of his career.

After his dominate Week 6 performance, Young won the Pepsi Zero Sugar Rookie Of The Week Award. He was also nominated for the award in Week 9 when he recorded a single-game career best of 2.0 sacks.

Well-Versed



Rookie **OLB Jared Verse** recorded his first-career sack against the Detroit Lions in Week 1. He became the fourth Rams rookie to record a sack in his debut, joining Kyle Borland (1987), Kevin Carter (1995) and Robert Quinn (2011).

He had a 33% pass rush win rate which was tied for the sixth-best in Week 1.

In Week 2, Verse became the fourth Rams rookie to record three tackles for loss in a game (Chris Long – 2008, Michael Brockers – 2012 and Aaron Donald – 2014), tied for the most by a Rams rookie in a single game.

Verse also became the first Rams player since 2021 (Aaron Donald, Week 16) to record three tackles for loss and a forced fumble in the same game. He is the ninth rookie since 2000 to accomplish the feat and first since Kayvon Thibodeaux in Week 15 of 2022.

Verse became the sixth player to record at least five quarterback hits in a game last season vs. Las Vegas. He is one-of-nine rookies since 2000 to accomplish the feat and the first to do so since Kayvon Thibodeaux in Week 12 of 2022 vs. Dallas.

With four tackles against Las Vegas, Verse became the second rookie in Rams history to record four-or-more tackles in five of his first six career games.

According to Next Gen Stats, Verse recorded a career-high nine pressures against the Raiders in Week 7, tied for the most pressures by a rookie in a game last season.

In Week 8, he became the second rookie to record at least 1.5 sacks, one tackle for loss and three quarterback hits in a game last season (Broncos OLB Dontrea Tillman).

Verse recorded six pressures in Week 9 and became the first rookie since 2000 to record three or more pressures in each of their first eight career games. He tied Myles Garrett (2017) for the longest streak of games with three or more pressures during a rookie season.

In Week 10, Verse finished with four tackles (three solo), two tackles for loss, 1.0 sack, one quarterback hit and one forced fumble. He recorded his first-career strip sack in the second quarter of tonight's game. He also recovered the fumble, marking his second fumble recovery last season. Verse recorded his third-consecutive game with a sack, becoming the first rookie to record three-consecutive games with a sack since James Houston in 2022. He is also the second Rams rookie to have a sack in three-or-more consecutive games (Aaron Donald recorded a five game streak in 2014). With two tackles for loss vs. Miami, he tied Von Miller and Micah Parsons for the second-most tackles for loss (11) through a player's first nine-career games since tackles for loss became an official stat in 1999.

In Week 13, Verse passed Carl Lawson (33) for the third-most hurries by a player in their first 12 career games with 35. With 19 quarterback hits, he also tied Leonard Williams, Von Miller and Josh Hines-Allen for the fourth-most quarterback hits through a player's first 12 career games, passing Carl Lawson (18). Verse recorded his third game last season with at least three quarterback hits, tied for the second-most in the NFL and he is the only rookie to have multiple games with three-or-more quarterback hits in the 2024 season. He is the first rookie since Micah Parsons in 2021 to have three-or-more games with at least three quarterback hits. Verse became the fourth Rams rookie in franchise history to record five-or-more tackles and three quarterback hits in a single game, joining Byron Young (2023), Kobie Turner (2023) and Michael Brockers (2012).

In Week 16, Verse joined Fiske as the only rookies in franchise history to record at least 4.5 sacks, two forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries in their first season.

In his rookie season, Verse led all rookies in quarterback hits (18), pressures (77) and hurries (56). He ranked second in tackles for loss (11) and fifth in sacks (4.5) behind teammate Braden Fiske (8.5), Miami OLB Chop Robinson (6.0) and Denver's OLB Jonah Ellis (5.0) and OLB Dontrea Tillman (5.0).

Across the NFL, Verse tied for second in hurries (56), fourth in pressures (77), and tied for 32nd in tackles for loss (11).

Kardiac Karty



In Week 3, K Joshua Karty (22-years-old) became the youngest kicker in franchise history to make a game-winning field goal in the fourth quarter. He is also just the second rookie in franchise history to make a game-winning field goal (Greg Zuerlein in 2012). Karty is the second rookie kicker in franchise history (Greg Zuerlein in 2012) to start his career converting five-of-five field goal attempts.

In Week 10, Karty became the first Rams kicker to make at least five field goals in a game since Greg Zuerlein made seven against Dallas in Week 4 of 2017. He notched a career-long 55-yard field goal to end the first half and became the second rookie to make two 50+-yard field goals in a game last season. He is the first Rams rookie kicker to accomplish the feat since Greg Zuerlein in 2012.

In Week 15, he connected on 4-of-4 field goal attempts, his third-career game with at least four made field goals and first since Week 10 vs. Miami. He also tied Frank Corral (1978) for the most games with at least four made field goals by a Rams rookie kicker.

In Week 18, he recorded a career-long 58-yard field goal to end the first half, tied for the second-longest made field goal by a rookie last season. It's also the second-longest made field goal by a Rams rookie behind Greg Zuerlein's 60-yard field goal (twice in 2012).

Karty passed Frank Corral (118) for the most points scored by a Rams kicker in their rookie season with 119 points. It is also the second-most points scored by a rookie in franchise history, behind Eric Dickerson's 120. He also tied Frank Corral (29) for the most made field goals by a rookie kicker in franchise history.

He tied Greg Zuerlein (2012) for the most games by a rookie with two-or-more made field goals of 50+ yards in franchise history with two. Karty also became the second player in Rams history to make two field goals of at least 55 yards in the same game. Greg Zuerlein recorded a 58-yard and a 60-yard field goal in a 19-13 win over the Seahawks in Week 4 of 2012.
