★ COWBOYS & CHARGERS ★

Preseason Notables: The Cowboys have lost four straight pre-season games to the Chargers. The last time Dallas defeated the Chargers in the preseason was on Aug. 21, 2010, a 16-14 win at Qualcomm Stadium in San Diego.

Regular Season Notables:

- * Seven of the 12 games were decided by less than a touchdown.
- * The Cowboys are 1-1 in games played at SoFi Stadium.
- * Dallas has only faced three teams - Jacksonville (five), Baltimore (four) and Houston (four) - fewer than the 12 times it has faced the Chargers.

Looking Back: In Week 2 of the 2021 season, the Dallas Cowboys defeated the Los Angeles Chargers 20-17 on a game-winning 56-yard field goal from Greg Zuerlein. Dak Prescott finished the game completing 23 of his 27 passes (85.2%), the fourth-highest completion rate in his career. Tony Pollard rushed for 109 yards on 13 carries (8.4 avg.) with a score, while Micah Parsons started at defensive end for the first time in his career, tallying his first NFL sack in the fourth quarter to stall a Chargers drive in the red zone.

★ Cowboys Summer Training Camp ★



The Dallas Cowboys returned to Oxnard, California to open their 63rd training camp in 2022 at the Residence Inn at River Ridge. The 2022 camp, presented by American Airlines, marks the 43rd year that the team has prepped for the upcoming season in California and the 16th time that the Cowboys have spent all, or a portion of, its camp at the Oxnard location.

Dallas came back to the west coast after training in the Alamodome in San Antonio prior to the 2011 season. Since 2001, the Cowboys have held training camp in Oxnard (2001, 2004-06, 2008, 2010, 2012-19 and 2021-22), and/or Wichita Falls (2001) and/or San Antonio (2007, 2009, 2010 and 2011) and/or Frisco (2017-18, 2020-21).

Training camp in Oxnard will conclude on Tuesday, Aug. 16, as the team will then depart to participate in two joint practice sessions on the road in Los Angeles before taking on the Chargers in a preseason contest on Aug. 20. The team will return to Texas after its last road preseason game and wrap up the final portion of Cowboys training camp at Ford Center at The Star in Frisco, Texas, with selected practices open to the public.

★ Training Camp History ★

June 3, 1960 – The newly formed Dallas Cowboys franchise announced that it will train at Pacific University in Forest Grove, Oregon. Rookies reported on July 9.

May 24, 1961 – Due to its proximity to their first exhibition game against Minnesota in Minneapolis, the Dallas Cowboys moved training camp to St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minn. Camp opened on July 9.

June 8, 1962 – The Dallas Cowboys moved their training camp site to the campus of Northern Michigan College on the shores of Lake Superior in Marquette, Mich. Rookies reported on July 13.

July 12, 1963 – Because the team played three of its first four preseason games on the west coast, the Dallas Cowboys moved training camp to California Lutheran College in Thousand Oaks, Calif. This camp, which was the first of 27 at CLC, opened on July 12.

Dec. 6, 1989 – For the first time in the 30-year history of the team, the Dallas Cowboys trained in Texas as the club announced its 1990 training camp would be held at St. Edward's University in Austin, Texas. This camp, the first of eight at St. Ed's, opened on July 22.

Feb. 17, 1998 – The Cowboys began a four-year stay at Midwestern State University in Wichita Falls, Texas, with their 1998 camp. The first camp at Midwestern State University opened on July 16. In 2001, the Cowboys split camp between Midwestern State and the Residence Inn in Oxnard, Calif., spending two weeks at each location.

May 17, 2002 – The Cowboys continued their commitment to fans in the state of Texas by announcing the 2002 training camp will take place at the Alamodome in San Antonio, Texas. The camp, which ran for four weeks, opened on July 26. The Cowboys returned to the Alamodome again in 2003.

Oct. 24, 2003 – The Cowboys announced a return to California for training camp. For the 2004-06 seasons, the Cowboys conducted their entire training camp in Oxnard, Calif., at the Residence Inn at River Ridge, using practice fields provided by The City of Oxnard. The Cowboys opened their first returned camp on July 30, 2004.

May 4, 2006 – The Dallas Cowboys announced a five-year commitment to once again call the City of San Antonio its summer home beginning in 2007. The Alamodome, which played host to Cowboys training camps in 2002 and 2003 was again the site for the team's summer practice sessions.

Summer, 2010 – The Dallas Cowboys held a split camp, spending the first portion in the Alamodome in San Antonio and the second at the Residence Inn at River Ridge in Oxnard.

July, 2012 – The Dallas Cowboys returned to Oxnard, California for all of training camp at the Residence Inn at River Ridge after spending the 2011 training camp in San Antonio at the Alamodome.

August, 2017 – After spending the first four weeks of training camp in Oxnard, California, the Dallas Cowboys returned home to hold their first ever training camp practices at their new practice facility at The Star in Frisco. Six training camp practices were held inside Ford Center and open to the public.

August, 2020 – For the first time in franchise history, the Cowboys spent all of training camp at The Star in Frisco due to COVID-19 restrictions.

July, 2021 – The Cowboys return to Oxnard, California for training camp after spending 2020 training camp in Frisco.

★ WINNING HEAD COACH ★

The Dallas Cowboys named Mike McCarthy the ninth head coach in franchise history on Jan. 5, 2020. Along with 13 years of head coaching experience and 13 additional years as an assistant coach in the NFL, McCarthy came to Dallas with a 125-77-2 regular season coaching record - all with the Green Bay Packers (2006-18).

After a 6-10 record in 2020 and a 12-5 record in 2021, he owns the sixth-most wins (26th all-time) and eighth-highest winning percentage among qualifying active NFL coaches. His teams have qualified for the postseason 10 times, won six NFC North Division titles and one NFC East title, made four NFC Championship Game appearances and took home a Super Bowl XLV championship.

★ 2022 OPPONENTS ★

By finishing first in the NFC East, the Dallas Cowboys finalized their 2022 opponents. In addition to facing the NFC East, Dallas will take on the NFC North and AFC South. Dallas will also play the first place teams from the NFC South and the NFC West:

Beginning in 2021 each team played 17 regular season games and three preseason games, marking the first change to the season structure since the 1978 campaign ushered in an era of 16 regular season and four preseason games. The 17th game featured teams from opposing conferences that finished in the same place within their division the previous season. The NFC will be the home conference for the 17th game in 2022, meaning the Dallas Cowboys will face the Cincinnati Bengals in AT&T Stadium during Week 2 as their added opponent this season.

★ PERSONNEL BREAKDOWN -- OFFENSE ★

* In Mike McCarthy's second year at the helm, the Cowboys offense led the NFL in points (31.2 avg.) and yards (407.0) while setting club records in total points (530), touchdowns (64), passing touchdowns (40) and first downs (390).

* Finishing with 444 completions on the year, the Dallas offense set a franchise record and ranked third in the league.

* The offense led the NFL with 254 explosive plays (10-plus yards).

* Dallas averaged 6.0 yards-per-play in 2021, good for third in the NFL.

* The Cowboys offense recorded the second-fewest plays that gained negative yardage in 2021 with only 79.

* Dallas had 22 different players score a touchdown in 2021, which were the most players to score a touchdown in a single season in NFL history.

2021 OFFENSIVE REVIEW

* **Dak Prescott** finished the 2021 season with 4,449 passing yards, a franchise record 37 touchdowns and a career-high 68.8 completion rate, the third-highest completion percentage in a season by a Cowboys quarterback. The 29-year-old signal caller threw touchdowns in bunches, tallying eight games with three-or-more touchdown passes, second-most behind Tom Brady in 2021. Prescott's 104.2 passer rating was good for third in the NFL behind Aaron Rodgers (111.9) and Joe Burrow (108.3). Prescott also led his team to a dominant run in the division as Dallas went 6-0 against the NFC East in 2021, which was only the third time in club history (1969 and 1998) that the Cowboys had run the table on their division rivals. Prescott has dominated the NFC East since his rookie season, posting a 25-6 record against the division.

* After missing out on 1,000 yards for the first time in his career in 2020, **Ezekiel Elliott** recorded his fifth career 1,000-yard season in 2021, rushing for 1,002 yards and 10 touchdowns on 237 carries (4.2 avg.). For the year, Elliott totaled 1,289 scrimmage yards to join Hall of Fame running back Ladanian Tomlinson as the only players in NFL history with 1,250 scrimmage yards and eight total touchdowns in each of their first six seasons.

* **CeeDee Lamb** collected his first career 1,000-yard season after hauling in 79 catches for 1,102 yards and six touchdowns. Lamb, who made his first Pro Bowl appearance as an alternate, has more receptions (153) than any other Cowboys wide receiver in the first two years of a career.

* **Dalton Schultz** became a reliable third down and red zone target for Prescott in 2021, as his 13 first down receptions on third down tied for the fifth-most among tight ends. Schultz finished the season with career-bests in receptions (78), yards (808) and touchdowns (eight). He joined Jason Witten as the only Cowboys tight ends to finish with 70 catches and 800 yards in a season.

★ 2022 QUARTERBACK BREAKDOWN ★

DAK PRESCOTT: After suffering a devastating season-ending injury in 2020, Prescott made a statement to the rest of the league in his return to the field in 2021. Prescott completed a career-high 410 passes (second in team history) on 596 attempts for 4,449 yards and a franchise record 37 touchdown passes. His 68.8% completion percentage was the second-highest of his career, fourth in the NFL and third in team history. While throwing only 10 interceptions in 2021, he was third in the NFL with a 104.2 passer rating, the second-highest of his career and fourth in a season in club history. Through six seasons, Prescott owns a 53-32 regular season record as Dallas' starting quarterback, including a 25-6 mark against divisional foes. He is atop the club's rookie quarterback charts for all major passing records and ranks in the top-six of all major club all-time passing figures. After being drafted in the fourth round (135th overall) of the 2016 NFL Draft, Prescott was elevated to the starting role after backup Kellen Moore (leg) and starter Tony Romo (back) were felled with injuries in the preseason. After dropping his NFL debut, Prescott won 11 straight games, helping lead Dallas to a 13-3 record and NFC East Division title while tying Ben Roethlisberger for the NFL's Super Bowl-era record for wins by a rookie and tying Troy Aikman and Tony Romo for single-season wins by a Cowboys quarterback. Prescott earned Pro Bowl berths following the 2016 and 2018 seasons, and as a rookie in 2016, he became the club's first quarterback to win AP Offensive Rookie of the Year honors.

COOPER RUSH: Cooper Rush returns for his fifth season in Dallas after his best campaign as a pro in 2021. Rush appeared in five games and was called upon when Prescott (calf) missed the Week 8 matchup at Minnesota (10/31). Rush earned his first career start and led the team to a 20-16 win over the Vikings on *Sunday Night Football*, throwing for 325 yards on 24-of-40 passing with two touchdowns and an interception. His 325 passing yards were the second-most in a first start by a Dallas quarterback, behind Gary Hogeboom's 343 yards (9/3/85, at LA Rams). Rush originally signed with Dallas following the 2017 NFL Draft as a rookie free agent with the hopes of earning a shot as a backup quarterback. He became the only rookie free agent in 2017 to make the Cowboys active roster out of training camp after dazzling in the preseason, completing 38-of-51 passes (74.5%) for 398 yards and six touchdowns against no interceptions, good for a 135.9 quarterback rating. Rush was one of only 10 NFL quarterbacks since 1999 to pass for at least six touchdowns in a single preseason, and he is only the second quarterback to also complete at least 70% of his passes in the same preseason (Aaron Rodgers, 2009-10). After three years with the Cowboys, Rush spent the early part of 2020 on the N.Y. Giants practice squad before spending the remainder of the season on Dallas' practice unit.

WILL GRIER: The Dallas Cowboys added competition for the backup quarterback spot when they claimed Will Grier off waivers following training camp in 2021. Grier, a former Heisman Trophy Finalist at West Virginia, came to Dallas after spending his first two seasons in Carolina. While with the Panthers, Grier started two games in his rookie season before not seeing any action in 2020. In his first season with Dallas, Grier saw time as the club's third quarterback but did not make any game appearances.

BEN DINUCCI: Dallas selected Ben DiNucci in the seventh round (231st overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft hoping to groom the young quarterback. As a rookie, DiNucci started one game with Andy Dalton (concussion/COVID) sidelined, but spent a majority of the season as the club's third quarterback. DiNucci spent all of the 2021 season on the practice squad, continuing to learn from Prescott, Rush and Grier.

★ 2022 RUNNING BACK BREAKDOWN ★

EZEKIEL ELLIOTT: For just the second time in franchise history, the Dallas Cowboys used a top-five pick to select a running back when the team chose Ezekiel Elliott with the fourth pick of the 2016 NFL Draft. Elliott did not disappoint as a rookie, leading the NFL with 1,631 yards to become only the fifth rookie since the NFL merger to win the NFL rushing title. His 1,631 rushing yards - third by a rookie in NFL history - were aided by seven 100-yard rushing games - tops by a rookie in team history - and he totaled 1,994 yards from scrimmage, which was third by a rookie in league history. Elliott became the fourth rookie in Cowboys history to be named to the Pro Bowl, and only the fifth rookie, second running back, to be named All-Pro in franchise annals. Most recently in 2021, Elliott notched his fifth career 1,000-yard season, finishing with 1,002 yards and 10 touchdowns. For the year, Elliott totaled 1,289 scrimmage yards to join LaDainian Tomlinson as the only players in NFL history with 1,250 scrimmage yards and eight total touchdowns in each of their first six seasons. Elliott will continue to be Dallas' workhorse out of the backfield in 2022 as he continues to cement himself as one of the all-time great backs in club history.

TONY POLLARD: Right behind Ezekiel Elliott is Tony Pollard, Dallas' fourth round (128th overall) selection in 2019. Pollard has evolved into a versatile change-of-pace back over the course of the last three seasons, rushing for 1,609 yards and eight touchdowns on 317 attempts (5.1 avg.). Pollard is coming off his best pro season, rushing for a career-high 719 yards and two touchdowns on 130 carries to average 5.5 yards-per-clip - good for third in a single-season in club history and second among league running backs in 2021. He also displayed an ability to catch the ball out of the back field and in the slot in 2021, reeling in 39 passes for 337 yards to tally 1,056 scrimmage yards - his first 1,000 scrimmage yard season. Dallas will look to exploit the skills of its top-two backs, keeping defenses guessing as Pollard looks to evolve his role in the Dallas' offense.

★ 2022 RUNNING BACK BREAKDOWN, cont. ★

RICO DOWDLE: Rico Dowdle was one of just three rookie free agents to make the squad out of 2020 training camp, and he played in 15 games, mainly on special teams. As a running back, he rushed seven times for 24 yards while returning four kickoffs 152 yards (38.0 avg.) and made three stops on special teams. Dowdle suffered a hip injury in the 2021 preseason and landed on Reserve/Injured for the entire year. He will work through the 2022 preseason to again prove himself as a capable backup and special teams player.

MALIK DAVIS and AARON SHAMPKLIN: Malik Davis and Aaron Shampklin both signed with Dallas as rookie free agents following the 2022 NFL Draft. Davis prepped at Florida and finished his career rushing 284 times for 1,470 yards (5.2 avg.) with eight touchdowns while also catching 70 passes for 726 yards and two scores. Shampklin spent four seasons at Harvard, rushing for 2,251 yards and 23 touchdowns on 402 carries (5.6 avg.).

★ 2022 WIDE RECEIVER BREAKDOWN ★

CeeDee LAMB: The Dallas Cowboys saw fortune fall their way when CeeDee Lamb was still on the board with Dallas' 17th selection in the 2020 NFL Draft. One of the top wide receivers in his draft class, Lamb added more explosion and athleticism to an already talented receiving corps. A rookie season that saw Dak Prescott limited to just five games and starts from three other quarterbacks, Lamb still displayed the skills of a first round talent, hauling in a club rookie record 74 catches for 935 yards and five touchdowns. His dazzling ability helped on special teams, as Lamb served as the club's primary punt returner - 24 returns for 172 yards (7.2) - while also returning an onside kick attempt 47 yards for a touchdown. Lamb made a vast improvement in his second NFL season, as he led the team with 79 receptions and 1,102 yards while tying for second with six touchdowns and earned his first trip to the Pro Bowl. Lamb's 2,037 career receiving yards are the second-most by a Cowboys wide receiver through his first two seasons, trailing only Bob Hayes (2,235). With the departure of Amari Cooper, Lamb will be tabbed as Dallas' top receiver going into 2022.

MICHAEL GALLUP: Drafted in the third round (81st overall) of the 2018 NFL Draft, Michael Gallup has established himself as a reliable, sure-handed target from the wide receiver spot. In four pro seasons, Gallup has caught 193 passes for 2,902 yards with 15 touchdowns. Gallup battled multiple injuries in 2021, suffering a calf injury in Week 1 that landed him on IR for seven weeks, then a torn ACL in Week 17 put an end to his season. Despite the adversity, Gallup started eight-of-nine games played and caught 35 passes for 445 yards and two touchdowns. He underwent surgery for the torn ACL and is expected to make a full recovery for 2022. Before he became a free agent this offseason, Gallup signed a five-year extension with Dallas that will keep him a Cowboy long-term, as he looks to take on an elevated role in the passing game moving forward.

JAMES WASHINGTON: The Dallas Cowboys signed James Washington as an unrestricted free agent in 2022 free agency, adding a versatile weapon who has experience in both the slot and out wide. Washington, originally a second round pick (60th overall) by the Pittsburgh Steelers, showed signs of being a deep ball threat in his four years with the Steelers, catching 114 passes for 1,629 yards and 11 touchdowns. Washington, a Stamford, Texas native, returns to his Lone Star roots looking to compete for a spot in the starting lineup.

NOAH BROWN: When the Dallas Cowboys selected Noah Brown in the seventh round (239th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, the club was getting size and strength from the receiver position. Brown has proven his skill as a blocker in short yardage situations while also giving the Cowboys another option out wide and as a viable special teams coverage man. Brown will continue to work through the preseason to maintain his role on the unit.

JALEN TOLBERT: The Dallas Cowboys added a versatile weapon to their receiving corps when drafting Jalen Tolbert in the third round (88th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft. Tolbert, who did not play football until his junior year in high school, joins the Cowboys as the most decorated offensive player at South Alabama football history, setting program records in receptions (178), receiving yards (3,140) and touchdown catches (22). Tolbert has an opportunity to immediately impact the Cowboys aerial attack as a rookie.

SIMI FEHOKO: The Dallas Cowboys added a tall (6'4") deep-threat receiver when they drafted Simi Fehoko in the fifth round (179th overall) of the 2021 NFL Draft. Fehoko, out of Stanford, saw time in five games, mainly on special teams, in his first season. Fehoko will continue to learn from a talented Dallas receiving corps as he works for a spot in the lineup.

KaVONTAE TURPIN: Turpin signed his first NFL contract at the beginning of training camp in 2022 after spending the previous spring playing in the inaugural season of the USFL re-launch. While with the New Jersey Generals, Turpin earned USFL Most Valuable Player honors after leading the league in receiving yards (540) and yards after the catch (316) on 44 receptions with four touchdowns. He also added a punt return for a touchdown and a league-best 15.3 yards-per-return. Originally out of TCU, Turpin had a four-year stint with the Horned Frogs before his dismissal from the team in October 2018. As a junior in 2017, he was named first-team All-Big 12 as an all-purpose player after hauling in 41 catches for 394 receiving yards, 86 rushing yards and 722 return yards for a total of 1,202 all-purpose yards.

BRANDON SMITH and T.J. VASHER: First-year players Brandon Smith and T.J. Vasher will all work to show coaches why they deserve a shot on Dallas' roster. Smith, who was signed as a rookie free agent out of Iowa following the 2021 NFL Draft, spent the 2021 season on Dallas' practice squad. Vasher was also signed as a rookie free agent following the 2021 NFL Draft but spent all of his first pro season on the Reserve/Non-Football Injury list after suffering a knee injury in his final collegiate season at Texas Tech.

DENNIS HOUSTON and JAQUARII ROBERSON: Considered long shots to make most teams, rookie free agents Dennis Houston and Jaquarii Roberson are all vying for a chance to join a young Cowboys receiving corps in 2022. Houston started his collegiate career at Houston Baptist before transferring to Fullerton College as a sophomore. Houston wound up transferring to Western Illinois in his third collegiate season, where he spent three years with the Leathernecks (2019-21) and became a two-time first-team All-Missouri Valley Conference selection after finishing his career with 169 receptions for 2,031 yards and 11 touchdowns in 25 games at Western Illinois. Roberson finished his career at Wake Forest as a two-time second-team All-ACC selection, playing in 40 games and catching 146 passes for 2,158 yards and 17 touchdowns.

★ 2022 TIGHT END BREAKDOWN ★

DALTON SCHULTZ: After being selected in the fourth round (137th overall) of the 2018 NFL Draft, Dalton Schultz (out of Stanford) was quietly working as a blocking tight end through his first two seasons. In those two years, he played in 27 games and caught 13 passes for 122 yards. The 2020 season saw him preparing to be the number two tight end, but an injury to Blake Jarwin thrust Schultz into the starting role. Schultz made the most of his opportunity the last two years, ranking fourth in receptions (141) and seventh in yards (1,423) among tight ends in that span. Schultz's play the last two seasons made him a sought after free agent in 2022 free agency, as he signed the franchise tag offered by Dallas and will remain a Cowboy for at least one more year as he looks to earn a long-term deal with another big season.

SEAN MCKEON: Sean McKeon joined Rico Dowdle and Terence Steele as the only rookie free agents to make Dallas' roster out of 2020 training camp. After gaining experience as a rookie, McKeon saw extended playing time on offense in 2021 with Jarwin spending time on the injured list. He caught four passes for 27 yards and his first career touchdown as he looks to continue to develop into a key part of the Cowboys offense.

JEREMY SPRINKLE: The Dallas Cowboys signed Jeremy Sprinkle as an unrestricted free agent from Washington in 2021, adding a proven blocker from the outside edge. Originally a fifth round selection (154th overall) by Washington in 2017, Sprinkle has played in every game he's been available since the start of the 2018 season, earning starts in 37 of his 76 career games as a blocking tight end and core special teams player.

JAKE FERGUSON: The Dallas Cowboys chose Wisconsin tight end Jake Ferguson in the fourth round (129th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft. At Wisconsin, Ferguson established himself as a solid run blocker known for his reliable set of hands after catching a pass in all 47 collegiate appearances, a school record. With the departure of Blake Jarwin in the 2022 offseason, Ferguson will compete for the backup tight end spot.

PEYTON HENDERSHOT: Peyton Hendershot will look to compete for the reserve tight end spot and a special teams role this preseason. Hendershot signed as a rookie free agent following the 2022 NFL Draft and finished his collegiate career at Indiana as the school's all-time leader in receptions (136) and yardage (1,479) by a tight end.

★ 2022 OFFENSIVE LINE BREAKDOWN ★

TYRON SMITH: The Dallas Cowboys selected an offensive lineman in the first round of the 2011 NFL Draft when they chose Tyron Smith with the ninth overall pick. He also became the second-highest offensive lineman drafted in Cowboys history behind John Niland, who was selected fifth in the 1966 Draft. Smith stepped in and immediately took over the starting right tackle spot as a rookie, starting all 16 games to become the first Cowboys rookie to start all 16 games along the offensive line since Rob Petitti in 2005 and the third overall to do so. In his second season, Smith manned the blind side, moving to left tackle - a spot he never relinquished. Since his move to the left side, Smith has earned eight Pro Bowl selections - second all-time among Dallas offensive lineman. After undergoing neck surgery in the 2020 season, Smith started all 11 games he played in 2021, missing five with an ankle injury. He will return in 2022 as the most tenured member of Dallas' offense, looking to continue dominating opposing teams' top pass rushers.

ZACK MARTIN: Zack Martin has been a mainstay on the offensive line in all of his eight seasons after the Dallas Cowboys selected him from Notre Dame with the 16th overall pick. Martin joined Cowboys first round picks Tyron Smith (2011) and Travis Frederick (2013) as the building blocks for the future of the franchise. In his first season, Martin did not disappoint and was a key part in the league's second-ranked rushing attack. Martin became the first rookie in club history to start all 16 games at right guard and the fourth rookie on the offensive line to start all 16, and he earned a Pro Bowl spot - the only offensive rookie in the NFL in 2014 and the first Cowboys rookie lineman to make the game. He also earned All-Pro honors, becoming only the third rookie in team history to do so. Overall, Martin has earned seven Pro Bowl nods while also being named to five All-Pro teams, the most by an NFL guard since he was drafted in 2014.

TYLER BIADASZ: Drafted in the fourth round (146th overall) in 2020 to compete for the starting center spot vacated by the retirement of Travis Frederick, Tyler Biadasz - like Frederick - played center at Wisconsin. Biadasz himself also fought through injuries but managed to start four of the 12 games he played, giving him the experience he needed to settle in as the starting center in his second season. During 2021 as the full-time starter, Biadasz started all 17 games and the lone playoff contest. He looks to build off his experience and solidify the starting center role.

TERENCE STEELE: Terence Steele was one-of-three rookie free agents to make Dallas' roster out of 2020 training camp, and the former Texas Tech Red Raider went on to start 14 of the 16 games at right tackle as a rookie after La'el Collins missed the season with an injury. His experience as a rookie, as well as a focused offseason conditioning program, paid dividends for Steele in his second season, as he started 13 of the 16 games he played in 2021 - seeing time at both tackle spots. With the departure of Collins, Steele is the front-runner for the starting right tackle position.

CONNOR MCGOVERN: The Dallas Cowboys added to a position of strength with the team's third round selection (90th overall) of Connor McGovern in the 2019 NFL Draft. A three-year starter at Penn State, McGovern saw action at both guard and center throughout his collegiate campaign. McGovern suffered a torn pectoral muscle in training camp of his rookie season and landed on Reserve/Injured for the season. He returned to full health in 2020, and with a number of injuries to the offensive line, McGovern gained valuable experience, starting eight of the 14 games he played. He saw most of his time in 2021 as a reserve lineman, earning the start at left guard for five games, with one additional start at fullback, and was utilized as an extra blocker. McGovern will compete for the starting left guard spot in 2022.

TYLER SMITH: The Dallas Cowboys addressed an immediate need while also looking to the future when they drafted Tyler Smith in the first round (24th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft. Smith will be asked to compete for the starting left guard spot as a rookie while also providing the club with a potential successor to Tyron Smith at left tackle. Smith comes to Dallas after three seasons at Tulsa, where he made 23 starts in 25 career games. He prepped down the road from the Cowboys facility at North Crowley High School in Fort Worth before his three-year career at Tulsa.

MATT WALETZKO: Matt Waletzko was drafted in the fifth round (155th overall) by Dallas in the 2022 NFL Draft, giving the Cowboys a solid option at swing tackle. With his combination of size, strength and length, coaches are enthusiastic about his ability to switch sides after playing left tackle through his time at North Dakota.

AVIANTE COLLINS: Aviante Collins signed to the Dallas Cowboys practice squad prior to Week 1 of the 2021 season to help add an option at tackle should the need arise. Collins spent the entire season on the Cowboys practice squad, gaining valuable experience. He came into the league with the Minnesota Vikings as a rookie free agent out of TCU following the 2017 NFL Draft and played in three games and two playoff contests before landing on Reserve/Injured in his second season. He returned to the Vikings for Year 3 in 2019 to play three games before spending 2020 on the Minnesota practice squad. He spent the 2021 offseason and training camp at Pittsburgh prior to signing with Dallas.

ISAAC ALARCON: Isaac Alarcon came to Dallas in 2020 as part of the NFL's International Player Pathway Program. Hailing from Monterrey, Mexico, Alarcon gained valuable experience on Dallas' practice squad in 2020 and 2021, and he returns in 2022 in his final year of the program. He will look to gain some live-action playing time in the preseason for the second consecutive season.

JOSH BALL: Dallas selected Josh Ball in the fourth round (138th overall) of the 2021 Draft in the hopes the club has found a tackle for the future. With the ability to play both tackle spots, and standing at 6'8", Ball is the tallest man on the roster. As a rookie in Dallas, Ball suffered an ankle injury in training camp and spent the entire season on Reserve/Injured.

★ 2022 OFFENSIVE LINE BREAKDOWN, cont. ★

MATT FARNIOK: With their final selection in the 2021 NFL Draft (238th overall), the Dallas Cowboys drafted Matt Farniok, a guard out of Nebraska. As he eased into the pro game, Farniok played in 12 contests, mainly on special teams, but did gain late-game experience at center and guard. Farniok is making the full transition to center heading into 2022 and will compete for the reserve center spot in the preseason.

BRAYLON JONES: Braylon Jones signed as a rookie free agent out of Houston after the 2021 NFL Draft. Jones spent the season on Dallas' practice squad, and in 2022 he will move to guard as he looks to gain valuable playing time in the preseason.

JAMES EMPEY, ALEC LINDSTROM and AMON SIMON: James Empey, Alec Lindstrom and Amon Simon all signed with Dallas as rookie free agents following the 2022 NFL Draft. Empey, a center out of BYU, started all 41 games played for the Cougars and blocked for an offense that scored 33.0 points-per-game and averaged 452.0 yards-per-game. Empey was current N.Y. Jets quarterback Zach Wilson's center at BYU in 2019 and 2020. Lindstrom started 36-of-47 games played at Boston College, earning All-ACC first-team honors in his final two seasons as the starting center for the Eagles. Simon appeared in 37 career games in a four-year career at Texas A&M-Commerce, where he primarily played left tackle.

★ PERSONNEL BREAKDOWN -- DEFENSE ★

- * The Dallas defense led the NFL with 34 takeaways in 2021, an 11-takeaway improvement from 2020 and the most by a Dallas team since 1987 (43).
- * The Cowboys finished with an NFL-best 26 interceptions, the most picks by a Dallas team since the 1985 team had 33 interceptions.
- * Dallas held opponents to 66-of-223 on third downs, which at 34.1% ranked second in the league behind Buffalo (30.8%).
- * The Dallas defense yielded 21.1 points-per-game, good for seventh in the NFL.
- * The Cowboys posted an NFL-best five pick-sixes in 2021 - two by Trevon Diggs and one each by Anthony Brown, Carlos Watkins and DeMarcus Lawrence - the most in a single season in team history.

2021 DEFENSIVE REVIEW

- * **Micah Parsons** established the Cowboys rookie sack record with 13.0 sacks, which also tied Dwight Freeney and Reggie White for the third-most sacks by a rookie in team history. In addition to 13.0 sacks, Parsons had 20 tackles for loss to join Freeney as the only players since 1999 to have at least 12.0 sacks and 20 tackles for loss in a rookie campaign.
- * Second-year cornerback **Trevon Diggs** led the NFL and tied a franchise record with 11 interceptions, becoming the first Cowboy to lead the league in picks since Everson Walls in 1981. He also finished second in the league with 21 pass breakups and tied for an NFL-best two pick-sixes.
- * **Jayron Kearse** was a valuable free agent addition prior to the 2021 season, as he led the Cowboys with a career-high 92 tackles, the most tackles by a Cowboys safety since Barry Church's 93 stops in 2014. Kearse also added two interceptions on the year.

★ 2022 DEFENSIVE LINE BREAKDOWN ★

DeMARCUS LAWRENCE: The Dallas Cowboys packaged their original second (47th overall) and third round (78th overall) draft choices and moved up in the second round of the 2014 NFL Draft in a trade with Washington to select DeMarcus Lawrence with the 34th overall pick. Lawrence really came into his own in 2017, starting all 16 games for the first time in his career and earning his first career Pro Bowl selection after tying for second in the NFL with a career-high 14.5 sacks. He also finished the year with 52 hurries - the most by a Cowboy since Charles Haley's 52 in 1994. After only missing one game from 2017-20, Lawrence suffered a broken foot during practice leading up to Week 2 in 2021, forcing the Cowboys primary edge player to miss 10 games on Reserve/Injured. He returned for the final six games of the season, tallying 18 tackles, 3.0 sacks, 16 hurries, two forced fumbles and an interception that he returned for 40 yards for a touchdown. Lawrence signed a one-year extension to keep him in Dallas through 2024.

CARLOS WATKINS: Carlos Watkins came to Dallas via free agency in 2021 as an unrestricted free agent from Houston. The sixth-year pro was drafted in the fourth round (142nd overall) by the Texans in 2017 and has started 32 of the 57 games he played, posting 106 tackles, 5.0 sacks and nine tackles for losses. In his first year with Dallas, Watkins started a career-high 14 games, seeing action in 15, and set a personal best with 32 tackles and four tackles for loss while adding a sack and an interception he returned 29 yards for a touchdown at New Orleans (12/2/21). He will compete for one of the starting interior linemen spots in 2022.

NEVILLE GALLIMORE: In the third round (82nd overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft, the Cowboys selected interior lineman Neville Gallimore. The Canadian-born Oklahoma Sooner worked his way to a starting role in his rookie season, playing in 14 games with nine starts to tally 26 tackles, four for losses and 12 pressures. Due to an elbow injury suffered in the 2021 preseason, Gallimore was limited to four starts in five games but made the most of his playing time with 10 tackles, 1.5 sacks and two tackles for loss. He will return in 2022 vying for a starting spot in the trenches.

DANTE FOWLER: The Dallas Cowboys added a talented veteran to their defensive line rotation when they signed Dante Fowler during 2022 free agency. The former third overall pick of Jacksonville in 2015 has a knack for jarring the ball loose, forcing 10 career fumbles to go along with 35.0 sacks and 44 tackles for loss. Fowler primarily played outside linebacker in a 3-4 defensive scheme with Atlanta in 2021, and he is expected to move back to his primary position at defensive end with Dallas and compete for a starting spot on the edge opposite of Lawrence.

DORANCE ARMSTRONG: Dorance Armstrong had a breakout year in 2021 as Dan Quinn came to Dallas and revitalized the Cowboys defense. In 2021 Armstrong set career-highs in tackles (37), sacks (5.0) and pressures (22). Through his first four seasons, Dallas' fourth round selection (116th overall) from 2018 has seen quality time as a reserve and steadily improved. After playing in 59 games with eight starts over four seasons, Armstrong signed a two-year contract with Dallas in 2022 and looks to compete for a starting spot on the defensive line.

TARELL BASHAM: The Dallas Cowboys tabbed Tarell Basham (unrestricted free agent from the N.Y. Jets) as an additional piece of the puzzle to help improve the defense in 2021 free agency. The former linebacker in the Jets 3-4 defense, Basham saw time as an edge lineman in Dallas' scheme in 2021, starting six of the 17 games he played and logged 38 tackles, 3.5 sacks and a career-high 32 hurries. After being drafted in the third round (80th overall) by the Indianapolis Colts in 2017, Basham played in 15 games for the Colts as a rookie. He returned to Indianapolis, was waived after Week 1, then signed with the Jets, where he played in 42 games with 12 starts from 2018-20.

OSA ODIGHIZUWA: Osa Odighizuwa made an immediate impact on the Dallas Cowboys defense as a rookie, starting 12 of the 16 games he played in 2021. By the end of the year, Odighizuwa garnered 34 tackles, four for losses, 2.0 sacks and 12 hurries. Odighizuwa, the former third round pick (75th overall) out of UCLA, will look to retain his starting role in the defensive line rotation.

TRYSTEN HILL: Coming off an ACL injury that ended his 2020 season, Dallas' second round (58th overall) pick from 2019, Trysten Hill, spent the first 11 games of the 2021 season on Reserve/PUP as he recovered from his ACL injury. Hill played the final six games last season, tallying 10 tackles, a half sack and five hurries.

★ 2022 DEFENSIVE LINE BREAKDOWN, CONT. ★

CHAUNCEY GOLSTON: The Dallas Cowboys drafted Chauncey Golston out of Iowa in the third round (84th overall) of the 2021 NFL Draft. As a rookie in 2021, Golston played in 15 games as a reserve lineman and on special teams. With the departure of Randy Gregory in free agency, the Cowboys are expecting Golston to play a vital reserve role in his second pro season.

QUINTON BOHANNA: The Dallas Cowboys added a big-bodied space-eater to their defensive front when they drafted Quinton Bohanna in the sixth round (192nd overall) of the 2021 NFL Draft. Bohanna, a prototypical nose tackle, saw time in 14 games with one start and notched 12 tackles and a hurry.

JOSIAH BRONSON: The Dallas Cowboys added Josiah Bronson to the practice squad late in 2021 to add depth to the defensive front for the postseason. Bronson signed with the New Orleans Saints as a rookie free agent following the 2021 NFL Draft and played in six games for the Saints, before being released by New Orleans and claimed off waivers by Cleveland for one contest.

SAM WILLIAMS and JOHN RIDGEWAY: In the second round (56th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft, the Dallas Cowboys selected talented edge rusher Sam Williams out of Mississippi. A favorite of the coaching staff leading up to the draft process, Williams collected 134 tackles, 22.5 sacks - including a school record 12.5 in 2021 - 33.5 tackles for loss and six forced fumbles in three seasons with the Rebels. Williams transferred to Ole Miss from Northeast Mississippi Community College, where he was a first-team NJCAA All-American in 2018. Ridgeway, a big and physical nose tackle out of Arkansas, was a fifth round selection (178th overall) by the Cowboys in the 2022 NFL Draft. He led all Arkansas defensive linemen with 39 tackles, four for loss, and 2.0 sacks. Ridgeway started 29 games at Illinois State before transferring to Arkansas.

MARKAVIEST BRYANT and MIKA TAFUA: The Dallas Cowboys bolstered their defensive line depth for training camp with the rookie free agent signings of Markaviest Bryant and Mika Tafua, while retaining 2021 practice squad member Austin Faoliu. Bryant started all 13 games as a grad transfer for UCF in 2021, earning first-team All-AAC honors with 6.0 sacks and 14 tackles for loss. Tafua spent his collegiate career at Utah and received the 2021 Pac-12 Morris Trophy as the conference's best defensive linemen.

★ 2022 LINEBACKERS BREAKDOWN ★

MICAH PARSONS: Micah Parsons was regarded as one of the top overall athletes in the 2021 NFL Draft, and the Dallas Cowboys were able to land the former Big Ten Linebacker of the Year when they traded out of the 10th spot - dropping to 12 and adding an extra third round pick - to select him. The selection of Parsons did not disappoint, as the versatile all-around talent put together one of the most dynamic seasons by a rookie in club history. Besides earning a spot on the NFC Pro Bowl roster - the second Dallas rookie linebacker, fourth rookie defender and 12th overall rookie to earn a trip to the Pro Bowl - Parsons was honored as the first Cowboy to earn AP Defensive Rookie of the Year honors. He also became the first Cowboy defensive rookie to be named to the AP All-Pro Team. Parsons displayed his versatility as a defender by being the only NFL player in 2021 to play at least 250 snaps of run defense, pass rush and pass coverage, according to *Pro Football Focus*. Parsons led the team with a club rookie record 13.0 sacks (tied for third by a rookie in NFL history and sixth overall in the NFL in 2021). He was also atop club defensive charts for hurries (42) and tackles for loss (12) while finishing fifth with 64 tackles.

LEIGHTON VANDER ESCH: After a couple of seasons riddled by injuries, Leighton Vander Esch returned to form in 2021 as the Cowboys primary outside linebacker. In Dan Quinn's first season leading the defense, Vander Esch finished 2021 second on the team with 86 tackles to go along with one sack, three tackles for loss, five pressures and an interception. He signed a one-year contract with Dallas for 2022 and will be counted on to lead the linebacker unit.

ANTHONY BARR: The Dallas Cowboys signed a proven veteran presence in linebacker Anthony Barr midway through training camp in 2022, giving the team a versatile and experienced athlete who can also help bring along the younger players on the defense. Barr, originally a first round (ninth overall) pick in the 2014 NFL Draft, has started all 98 games played in his pro career, totaling 613 tackles, 17.5 sacks, five interceptions, 39 tackles for loss, 35 pass breakups, eight forced fumbles and seven fumble recoveries. He joins a linebacker rotation coached by his former defensive coordinator in Minnesota, George Edwards, and should compete immediately for playing time in multiple defensive packages.

LUKE GIFFORD: After landing with Dallas in 2019 as a rookie free agent, Luke Gifford will continue to work toward an increased role on Dallas' defense and continue to improve his skills as a solid special teams coverage man. In his three pro seasons, Gifford has taken most of his snaps on special teams, totaling 18 special teams tackles through 30 games played and blocking one punt.

JABRIL COX: After starting out his rookie season continuing to see a rise in playing time at linebacker while playing valuable snaps on special teams, a torn ACL ended his rookie campaign after just seven games in 2021. Cox was tabbed as one of the best coverage linebackers for the 2021 draft class and is expected to take a larger role for the defense in his second pro season.

MALIK JEFFERSON: The Dallas Cowboys bolstered their linebacker depth prior to 2022 training camp when they signed Malik Jefferson as a free agent. Jefferson, who is entering his fifth year in the NFL, has played in 34 career games, mostly on special teams, with four different teams and has compiled three tackles and 13 special teams stops.

DAMONE CLARK, DEVIN HARPER, STOREY JACKSON and CHRISTIAN SAM: Damone Clark was projected to be a high pick out of LSU before he had spinal fusion surgery to correct a herniated disc discovered in the pre-draft process. However, the Cowboys still drafted Clark, a player with big-time potential, when they selected him in the fifth round (176th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft. Clark is on the Active/PUP list to start training camp as he recovers from his injury and looks to get back on the field. The Cowboys also drafted Devin Harper with their last selection in 2022 (sixth round, 193rd overall). Harper spent four years as a special teams standout at Oklahoma State before becoming a starter in his sixth and final season with the Pokes. Storey Jackson signed as a rookie free agent following the 2022 NFL Draft and had a breakout season in his last year at Liberty, leading the Flames in tackles (102), tackles for loss (13) and sacks (7.0). Christian Sam signed with Dallas prior to 2022 training camp after spending the most recent spring in the USFL, where he started in nine games and totaled 54 tackles, eight for loss, and an interception. Sam was originally drafted by the New England Patriots in the sixth round (178th overall) of the 2018 NFL Draft but spent the entire season on Reserve/Injured after suffering an injury in preseason action.

★ 2022 SECONDARY BREAKDOWN ★

ANTHONY BROWN: The longest-tenured member of Dallas' secondary is Anthony Brown. Brown has shown consistency in his six-year tenure with the Cowboys, but the former sixth round (189th overall) draft pick had a quiet breakout year in the 2021 season. He started 16 contests in 2021, 15 on the outside and one in the slot, while he tallied career-highs in tackles (79), breakups (17) and interceptions (three). Brown has cemented his spot as a key contributor on a Dallas defense that led the league in takeaways (34) and interceptions (26) in 2021.

TREVON DIGGS: The Dallas Cowboys struck gold by selecting a dominant, shutdown corner in Trevon Diggs in the second round (51st overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft. Diggs came in as a rookie and earned the starting job, opening 11 of the 12 games he played, and became the first Cowboys rookie to record three interceptions since Terence Newman in 2003. Diggs really splashed on the scene and became one of the top defensive backs in the league in 2021, when he led the NFL and tied a franchise record with 11 interceptions. He returned two of those picks for touchdowns and became the first Cowboys player to lead the league in interceptions since Everson Walls in 1981. Diggs was named a Pro Bowl starter and first-team All-Pro for his efforts. Starting all 16 games he played while primarily shadowing the top opposing receivers, Diggs also led the defense with 21 breakups and finished seventh with 56 tackles - becoming the only player in NFL history with 11 interceptions and 20-plus breakups in a season since pass breakups became an official stat.

JOURDAN LEWIS: The Dallas Cowboys added a talented and driven cornerback with their third round draft pick (92nd overall) in the 2017 draft when they selected Jourdan Lewis out of Michigan. Lewis has settled into his role as a slot corner, totaling 176 tackles, four interceptions and four fumble recoveries as he heads into his sixth season. Lewis has also become a factor in corner blitz situations, posting 7.5 sacks in the last three seasons - second in the NFL by a defensive back in that span behind Jamal Adams' 16.0 sacks.

JAYRON KEARSE: Jayron Kearse was primarily a reserve defensive back and core special teams player with Minnesota and Detroit before he arrived in Dallas in 2021. In his first season under Dan Quinn, Kearse battled and earned a starting safety spot with Dallas coming out of the preseason. Kearse had his best season to date, leading the Cowboys defense with a career-high 92 tackles - the most by a Dallas safety since Barry Church's 93 tackles in 2014 - and finished second on the team with seven tackles for loss. He added a pair of interceptions and 10 breakups while becoming the defensive signal caller for the second half of the season. He re-signed with Dallas for two years in the offseason.

DONOVAN WILSON: Donovan Wilson was drafted in the sixth round (213th overall) of the 2019 NFL Draft, and after seeing time as a reserve special teamer as a rookie, earned a starting safety spot in 2020, starting 10-of-14 games played. Wilson, who had a breakout second half of the season, has established himself as a heavy hitter with the ability to separate the ball carrier from the ball. Wilson was limited to starts in three-of-nine contests in 2021, suffering multiple injuries through the season. He will be competing for a starting spot in Dallas' secondary in 2022.

MALIK HOOKER: The Dallas Cowboys were in need of secondary help during 2021 training camp when they signed Malik Hooker. Hooker, the former 15th overall pick from the 2017 NFL Draft, spent his first four seasons with the Indianapolis Colts. Those years did not come without struggle, as he missed more than half of his rookie season with a torn ACL and MCL and 14 games in 2020 with a torn Achilles. In his first year coming off the Achilles injury while with Dallas, Hooker played in 15 games with three starts and notched 44 tackles, one interception and two breakups.

KELVIN JOSEPH: In the second round (44th overall) in the 2021 NFL Draft, the Dallas Cowboys selected Kelvin Joseph out of Kentucky. As a rookie, Joseph suffered a groin injury in the preseason and landed on Reserve/Injured for the first six games of the season. He finished the season playing in 10 games with two starts, seeing most of his time on special teams, and recorded 13 tackles and two breakups.

NAHSHON WRIGHT: The Cowboys added a long, athletic ball-hawking cornerback with the selection of Nahshon Wright in the third round (99th overall) of the 2021 NFL Draft. As a rookie, Wright played in 13 games, mainly on special teams. Wright recovered a Dorance Armstrong blocked punt in the end zone for a touchdown in the win over Atlanta (11/14). He returns looking to build upon his experiences among a deep secondary.

ISRAEL MUKUAMU: Israel Mukuamu was drafted in the sixth round (227th overall) of the 2021 NFL Draft, the third defensive back that the Cowboys took in the 2021 draft. Mukuamu saw action in four games on special teams as a rookie while breaking into the pro game.

DaRON BLAND, QUANDRE MOSELY and ISAAC TAYLOR-STUART: The Dallas Cowboys added three rookie cornerbacks to their roster in 2022. DaRon Bland, a tall and athletic player who fits the traits that the organization seeks in its defensive backs, was a fifth round (167th overall) selection out of Fresno State. Bland transferred to Fresno State from Sacramento State prior to the 2021 season and finished his collegiate career with 137 tackles, 10.5 for a loss, 18 pass breakups and five interceptions. Quandre Mosely signed as a rookie free agent after playing in 36 games in a three-year stint with Kentucky, totaling 69 tackles, three for losses, three interceptions and 10 pass breakups. Isaac Taylor-Stuart is also a rookie free agent who started 19-of-32 games in a four-year career at Southern California, notching 80 tackles, two interceptions and seven pass breakups.

TYLER COYLE, MARKQUESE BELL AND JUANYEH THOMAS: Tyler Coyle returns to Dallas as a first-year player after spending the 2021 season on the practice squad. Coyle was elevated twice as a COVID-19 replacement - at New Orleans (12/2) and at Philadelphia (1/8/22) - where he logged two tackles on defense and one special teams stop in the win against the Eagles. Markquese Bell signed as a rookie free agent following the 2022 NFL Draft after spending his last two collegiate seasons with Florida A&M, where he was first-team All-SWAC and FCS first-team All American in 2021 after leading his defense with 95 tackles, 6.5 for a loss, 2.0 sacks, one interception and five forced fumbles. Rounding out the secondary roster is rookie free agent Juanyeh Thomas, who played in 47 games with 33 starts at Georgia Tech and recorded 215 tackles, eight tackles for loss, five forced fumbles, four interceptions and 16 pass breakups. Thomas was also a dynamic return man, earning true freshman All-America honors as a kick returner by *247Sports* in 2018. He scored three non-offensive touchdowns in the form of a 95-yard interception return and two kick return touchdowns while setting five school records for kickoff returns in his first collegiate season.

★ PERSONNEL BREAKDOWN -- SPECIAL TEAMS ★

- * The Dallas Cowboys blocked three punts in 2021, tying the second-most in a single season in franchise history.
- * In averaging 24.1 yards-per-kick return, Dallas was fifth in the league. By giving up 26.0, the Cowboys were 27th.
- * Dallas forced its opponents to drive the field in 2021, pinning them back to an average start position of the 27.1-yard line - sixth in the league.
- * With a net punting average of 44.6, the Cowboys were first in the NFL and the punt return unit was fifth, allowing a 38.6-yard net.

2021 SPECIAL TEAMS REVIEW

- * **Bryan Anger** had the best year of his 10-year career, as his 44.6 net average led the NFL, set a single-season club record and ranked fourth in NFL history. He also tallied a career-high and franchise record 48.4 gross punting average, all of which earned him his first trip to the Pro Bowl.
- * For the third consecutive season, **C.J. Goodwin** led the team in special teams tackles with a career-high tying 10, becoming the first player in club history to lead the team in special teams stops for three straight years.

★ 2022 SPECIAL TEAMS BREAKDOWN ★

JAKE McQUAIDE: Jake McQuaide came to Dallas in 2021 to reunite with longtime special teams coach John Fassel, who has coached McQuaide for nine of his 11 pro seasons. McQuaide earned Pro Bowl selections following the 2016 and 2017 seasons and also appeared in Super Bowl LII. Through his career, McQuaide has provided 1,624 clean snaps (including 45 in the postseason).

BRYAN ANGER: The Dallas Cowboys signed tested veteran Bryan Anger in April 2021, bringing a big leg and savvy veteran presence to the special teams unit. Anger, a 10-year vet, had a record breaking season in his first year with the Cowboys. Anger led the NFL with a team-record 44.6 net average, which was also good for fourth in NFL history. He also set a personal best with a 48.4 gross average and was honored with his first career Pro Bowl selection. Anger signed a three-year contract with the Cowboys during 2022 free agency.

C.J. GOODWIN: The Dallas Cowboys rewarded C.J. Goodwin, considered by many the top special teams coverage man in the league, when they signed the sixth-year pro to a two-year extension in 2021. Beginning his fifth season in Dallas, Goodwin led all Cowboys in special teams tackles over the previous three seasons, the first Cowboy to ever lead the team in special teams tackles for three consecutive seasons. Goodwin has tied his career-high with 10 special teams stops each year. Despite seeing limited time on defense, his speed and athleticism is an asset as a reserve defender and top special teams ace.

LIRIM HAJRULLAHU: Lirim Hajrullahu was signed prior to training camp in 2022 to compete for the kicker position. Hajrullahu spent time on Dallas' practice squad in 2021 and was elevated for the Atlanta game (11/14) due to Zuerlein going on the Reserve/COVID-19 list. Hajrullahu made all seven of his PAT attempts for the Cowboys before being released several weeks later. He joined Carolina for the final three games of 2021 and made four-of-five field goals with a long of 35 yards and all three extra point attempts for the Panthers. Prior to the NFL, Hajrullahu spent six years in the Canadian Football League, converting 239-of-287 field goals (83.3%).

BRETT MAHER: The Dallas Cowboys brought in a familiar face to provide training camp competition to Lirim Hajrullahu when they signed Brett Maher. Maher, who kicked for Dallas from 2018-19, spent the 2021 season with the New Orleans Saints, where he made 16 of his 18 field goal attempts for a career-high 88.9% field goal percentage. Following his departure from Dallas toward the end of the 2019 season, Maher spent time with four other teams in 2020 - N.Y. Jets, Washington, Houston and Arizona - before landing in New Orleans at the beginning of the 2021 season. He was released two weeks into the season before signing to the Saints practice squad and activated for the final eight games of the season.

Maher, who kicked for Dallas from 2018-19, spent the 2021 season with the New Orleans Saints, where he made 16-of-18 field goal attempts for a career-high 88.9% field goal percentage.
