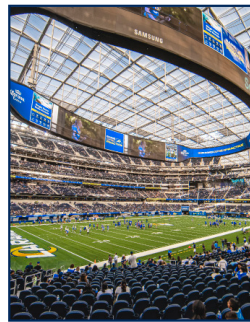

### Rams Face Off Against The Chargers



SoFi Stadium

Thousand Oaks, Calif. - After a late-fourth quarter comeback win over the Dallas Cowboys, the Los Angeles Rams are set to "travel" to play the Los Angeles Chargers for their second preseason game at SoFi Stadium.

After a big performance against the Cowboys, rookie WR Jordan Whittington is currently fifth in receiving yards (74), tied for first in receptions (six), tied for first in receiving first downs (four) and 11th in yards after catch (34).

With 15 rushes for 68 yards in the first half, Rams RB Boston Scott is tied for first in rushing yards and is 12th in yards per rush (4.5) across the NFL.

According to *Pro Football Focus*, WR Jordan Whittington was the highest-graded player overall on offense, leading the team with 74 receiving yards and six catches.

OL Zach Thomas was the Rams' top-graded offensive lineman (84.1) and had an 86.9 pass blocking grade. OL Logan Bruss was not far behind with a 81.5 offensive grade and a 89.5 pass blocking grade.

OLBs Zach VanValkenburg and Nick Hampton led the pass rush combining for 11 pressures, putting both players in the top-five across the NFL. VanValkenburg's six pressures, four hurries and a sack led the Rams defense. OLB Keir Thomas is tied for seventh in the NFL (alongside Hampton and VanValkenburg) with two QB hits. Rams DB Jaylen McCullough had five tackles and finished as the Rams highest-graded defensive back (78.6). LB Omar Speights tallied four tackles and two hurries. Speights finished as the second highest-graded Rams defense player according to *Pro Football Focus* (85.5).

The Rams will head to Houston next week to play the Texans on August 24th at NRG Stadium before heading to Detroit to kickoff the regular season against the Lions on September 8.

# Coaches' Corner



On January 12, 2017, Los Angeles Rams Owner/Chairman E. Stanley Kroenke named Sean McVay the 23rd full-time head coach in franchise history. McVay became the youngest coach in modern NFL history at 30 years old.

McVay has led the Rams to four playoff berths and two Super Bowl appearances in his first six seasons, winning Super Bowl LVI at SoFi Stadium. McVay has a 60-38 regular season record and is 7-3 in the playoffs. He has also led the Rams to five winning seasons with three NFC West titles. McVay currently remains the youngest head coach in the NFL despite entering his seventh season at the helm.

Last season, McVay helped several Rams players receive notable recognitions for their performances on the field. Defensive Tackle Aaron Donald was voted to his ninth career Pro Bowl and former Defensive Back Jalen Ramsey was voted to his sixth Pro Bowl. Donald was also named to the NFLPA All-Pro team. Additionally, in his lone season with the Rams, former Linebacker Bobby Wagner fell three tackles short of breaking the Rams' single-season tackle record (142).

Before sustaining an injury in Week 11, McVay helped Quarterback Matthew Stafford record the highest completion percentage of his career (68.0%). He also supported former Rams Quarterback Baker Mayfield, who led the Rams on a game-winning drive against the Raiders in Week 14 despite joining the team only two days prior. Mayfield and McVay led the Rams on a 98-yard touchdown drive to win the game. According to Elias Sports Bureau, that was the longest go-ahead touchdown drive to begin in the final two minutes of a game in the last 45 years. Mayfield earned Player of the Week honors following the game.

Running Back Cam Akers eclipsed the 100-yard rushing mark in three consecutive games to close out the regular season and became the first Rams running back to have three consecutive 100+ yard rushing performances in the same season since Todd Gurley in 2015. McVay also helped Tyler Higbee break the single-season franchise record for receptions by a tight end (72) and become the team's all-time leader in touchdowns for tight ends (20).

Under the leadership of McVay last season, the Rams' defense ranked among the best in the NFL. The unit finished first in opponent red zone efficiency (44.4%), second in goal-to-go efficiency (53.3%), and fourth in fewest missed tackles (103). The Rams' defense also finished tied for seventh in interceptions (16), and ninth in defensive total rush EPA (42.97). According to PFF, the defense finished with the sixth-best grade (77.5) and was first against the rush (87.0 grade) and second in tackling (88.0 grade).

In a season that was anything but normal due to the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, the Rams finished 10-6 and McVay won his third-career postseason contest, this time against a familiar opponent on the road against the Seattle Seahawks in a Wild Card Game before falling to the Green Bay Packers at Lambeau Field in the divisional round.

In McVay's second season guiding the Rams, the 32-year-old leader turned in one of the best seasons in franchise history. The Rams posted a 13-3 record, which tied for the second-best record in franchise history, won a pair of playoff games and advanced to the Rams fourth Super Bowl appearance days after his 33rd birthday, becoming the youngest NFL head coach to ever help his team to a Super Bowl.

The 2018 Los Angeles Rams built on the successful foundation McVay and company laid in their first season in 2017. With the guidance of McVay, the Rams' passing attack finished among the top-10 in passing yards per attempt (8.33, 4th), passing yards per game (295.6, 5th) and touchdowns (32, tied for 8th).

In his first season guiding the Rams, McVay completed one of the greatest offensive turnarounds in NFL history. He helped the Rams move from the 32nd-ranked scoring offense in 2016 to the league's top-scoring team in 2017, marking the first time in league history a team has gone from last to first in scoring. The first-year head coach led the Rams to an 11-5 record and their first NFC West title since the 2003 season, earning the team's first playoff berth since 2004. Following his first season in L.A., McVay was named The Associated Press Coach of the Year, becoming the youngest head coach to ever win the award.

McVay graduated from Miami University (Ohio) where he played wide receiver from 2004-07, earning Miami's Scholar-Athlete Award in 2007. His grandfather, John, served in various roles – including vice president/director of football operations from 1983-94 – for the San Francisco 49ers from 1979-95, overseeing five Super Bowl championship squads and earning induction into the 49ers Hall of Fame in 2013.



Harbaugh brings with him a winning culture, posting a 144-52 record as a collegiate head coach and a 49-22-1 record as an NFL head coach. In four years, he led the San Francisco 49ers to three-straight NFC Championship Games, including an appearance in Super Bowl XLVII.

With a keen eye for talent and an ability to develop players, Harbaugh coached nine eventual first-round selections over his nine-season tenure at Michigan (2015-23). Over the course of his four seasons (2011-14) with San Francisco, Harbaugh coached 17 players to a combined 30 Pro Bowl selections — the second-most Pro Bowlers in the NFL in that time. Eight of those players were also recognized as first-team All-Pro selections from The Associated Press, including linebackers Patrick Willis (twice) and NaVorro Bowman (three times).

One of the most accomplished coaches in football, Harbaugh led Michigan to an 86-25 record in his nine seasons as head coach. His teams topped 10 wins six times and made three consecutive CFP appearances from 2021-23, winning the national title this past season and setting a school record with 15 wins. Since taking over as head coach for the Wolverines in 2015, Harbaugh coached the top defense in the nation, allowing just 291.0 yards per game in that span. Michigan had a top-five defense in the country five times over those nine seasons, including twice as the top-ranked defense in the nation.

Harbaugh was named 2011 NFL Coach of the Year by The Associated Press after his first season with San Francisco when he led the 49ers to an NFC West division crown with a 13-3 record. That season, the defense led the NFL with 38 takeaways and ranked No. 1 in rushing defense, allowing just 77.3 yards per game on the ground. The team made a deep playoff run to its first of three-straight NFC Championship Game appearances, including an appearance in Super Bowl XLVII in 2012. In Harbaugh's four years with San Francisco, the 49ers led the NFL in rushing defense (92.0 yards per game), while ranking No. 2 in scoring defense (17.4 points per game), third in total defense (310.2) and fourth with 122 takeaways.

Prior to being a head coach in the NFL, Harbaugh spent four years at the helm at Stanford University (2007-10) and three at the University of San Diego (2004-06). He turned around a Stanford program that went 1-11 in 2006 and led the Cardinal to 29 wins over his four seasons in Palo Alto, Calif., including a 12-win season that culminated in an Orange Bowl victory in 2010. Harbaugh broke into the head coaching ranks at San Diego, leading the Toreros to a 29-6 record in three years. Harbaugh began his coaching career as the quarterbacks coach for the Oakland Raiders from 2002-03. In his first season with Oakland, the Raiders went to Super Bowl XXXVII, while quarterback Rich Gannon earned MVP honors and was named a Pro Bowler and an AP first-team All-Pro.

In 15 years as an NFL quarterback (1987-2001), Harbaugh played for five organizations, including with the Chargers from 1999-2000. He got his start in coaching while he was still playing in the NFL, working as an unpaid assistant at Western Kentucky from 1994-2001, where his father, Jack, was the head coach. Harbaugh was selected with the 25th overall pick in the 1987 NFL Draft by Chicago and went on to start 140-of-177 career games played, throwing for 26,288 yards and 129 touchdowns. He led the NFL in passer rating in 1995, earning Comeback Player of the Year recognition and a Pro Bowl selection after leading the Colts to an AFC Championship Game appearance. Harbaugh eventually went to the Chargers for two seasons and is one of four Bolts quarterbacks to throw for 400 yards in a single game.

Harbaugh played quarterback at the University of Michigan, finishing his career as one of the most efficient passers in college football history. He posted a 21-3-1 record as a starter for the Wolverines, earning first-team All-American honors and finishing third in voting for the Heisman Trophy in 1986. Harbaugh paced the nation in 1985 in passing efficiency rating, while his career passing efficiency rating ranked as the best in NCAA history for more than 12 years following his time at Michigan.





# 2023 Team Awards



## Rams 2024 Pro-Bowlers



The Los Angeles Rams had four players selected for the 2024 Pro Bowl Game. The team's four Pro Bowl selections were QB Matthew Stafford, former DT Aaron Donald, WR Puka Nacua, and RB Kyren Williams. This year will mark the third Pro Bowl selection for Stafford, and the first selection for Nacua and Williams. Donald ends his playing career with the ten consecutive selections for the Pro Bowl.



## Carroll Rosenbloom Memorial Award



Given to the team's Rookie of the Year, the award was established following the passing of former owner Carroll Rosenbloom in 1979. Rosenbloom became the owner of the Rams when he orchestrated an unprecedented franchise trade in 1972. Rosenbloom traded the Baltimore Colts to Robert Irsay for the Rams. The Rams won an NFL record seven consecutive NFC West titles from 1973-79 under Rosenbloom's leadership. Last year's Carroll Rosenbloom Memorial Award winner was **WR Puka Nacua**.

Nacua led the team in receptions (105), receiving yards (1,486), and receiving touchdowns (six). He ended the regular season ranked fourth in the NFL in receiving yards, ninth in receiving yards, and sixth in yards after the catch (639). Nacua made history in Week 18 and recorded the most receptions and the most receiving yards by a rookie in a single season in NFL history.



## Carl Ekern Spirit of the Game Award



Established in 1990, the award is given to the player who best exemplifies sportsmanship, ethic, and commitment to his teammates. Those traits were displayed by former Rams linebacker Carl Ekern, killed in an automobile accident in 1990. Ekern was a starter for the Rams from 1982-88 and earned an invitation to the Pro Bowl in 1986. Last year's Carl Ekern Spirit of the Game Award winner was **WR Cooper Kupp**.

Despite missing four games due to injury and sitting out in Week 18, Kupp recorded 59 catches for 737 yards and five receiving touchdowns. Off the field, Kupp has engaged in numerous community efforts including his year-long mentorship initiative with a local high school football team and his continued work to combat food insecurity in Los Angeles through the team's Annual Taste of the Rams event in partnership with the Los Angeles Regional Food Bank. He was the team's Walter Payton Man of the Year nominee this season and has been praised by coaches and teammates throughout the year for his on-field performance, toughness, and mentorship of young players such as Nacua and others.



## Ed Block Courage Award



Rams **Offensive Lineman Joe Noteboom** was voted by his teammates as the Ed Block Courage Award recipient, given to a player who is a role model of inspiration, sportsmanship, and courage. During his sixth NFL season, Noteboom battled adversity and injuries, yet he only missed two games and showed up daily for his teammates and coaches. On display again this year was Noteboom's versatility, playing a variety of different positions along the offensive line throughout the year. Noteboom played nearly 550 snaps in 2023 and saw significant action at spots such as right guard, left tackle, and right tackle. His career continues to be defined by his ability to fill gaps wherever needed and he's considered a starting-caliber talent with tremendous position flexibility. Aside from an injury that sidelined him for two games, he battled through other injuries and was someone the offensive line could count on. Noteboom is regarded a silent leader who young players have been able to lean on. Whether it's through his on-field performance or his undeniable toughness, Noteboom continues to model the way for the offensive line room. Coaches and teammates have praised him for his steadiness, toughness, versatility, and consistency throughout the season and during his entire NFL career to date.

## Passing

- QB Stetson Bennett is second in the NFL in completions (24), eighth in completion % (63.2%), first in passing first downs (13), and first in passing yards (224).

## Rushing

- RB Boston Scott is tied for first in rushing yards (68) and 12th in yards per rush (4.5) after the Rams win in preseason Week 1 against the Cowboys

## Receiving

- Rookie WR Jordan Whittington is fifth in receiving yards (74), tied for first in receptions (six), 11th in YAC (34), and tied for first in receiving first downs (four). He is also second amongst rookies in receiving yards, trailing Bengals WR Jermaine Burton (82).

## Defense

- The Rams have two players who rank in the top five in pressures. OLB Zach VanValkenburg had six pressures and OLB Nick Hampton had five. VanValkenburg also had a sack against the Cowboys.
- VanValkenburg is tied for second in hurries (four) and Hampton is t-ninth with (three).
- DL Keir Thomas, along with VanValkenburg and Hampton, are all T-7th in QB hits (two).

## Special Teams

- K Joshua Karty is second among rookie kickers with two made field goals and tied for third across the NFL.







# Player Accolades



## Pro Football Writers of America Selections

The Rams were one of four teams to have two players selected to the All-NFL team.

Former DT Aaron Donald was selected to the All-NFL team for the eighth time overall (2015-2021, 2023), which broke a tie with Pro Football Hall of Famer Randy White for the most PFWA first-team All-NFL selections by a defensive tackle.

RB Kyren Williams was named to the All-NFL first-team for the first time in his career.

Both Williams and Donald were also named to the 2023 PFWA All-NFC Team.

WR Puka Nacua, OL Steve Avila, NT Kobie Turner, and OLB Byron Young were named to the PFWA All-Rookie team. This is the most players the Rams have had named in a single-season.



## NFLPA Selections

With the second annual NFLPA all-team selections, DT Aaron Donald was named to the NFLPA All-Pro first team.

## Associated Press All-Pro Selections

Aaron Donald was named to the AP All-Pro first-team for the eighth time, tied for most by a defensive player and for fifth-most overall.

Kyren Williams was selected to the AP All-Pro second-team for the first time in his career.

WR Puka Nacua was named to the AP All-Pro second-team.





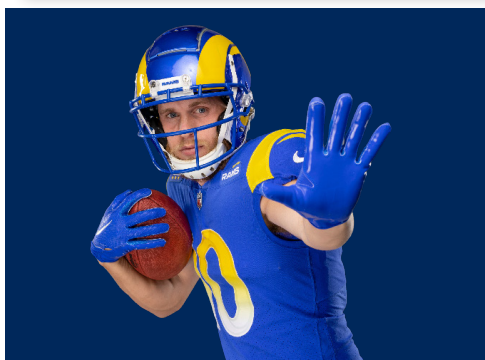
# Milestones Achieved Last Season

- Stafford (75) passed Vince Ferragamo and moved to fifth all-time in franchise history for passing touchdowns.
- He passed Fran Tarkenton for 11th all-time in NFL history for passing touchdowns.
- He finished the season with 3,965 passing yards placing him in the top-10 for best passing yard seasons in franchise history.



- Tyler Higbee (3,602) passed Harold Jackson and moved to 14th in franchise history in receiving yards.
- He passed Jack Snow and Elroy Hirsch and moved to ninth all-time in franchise history in receptions (353).
- Higbee (22) passed Preston Dennard in touchdown receptions and moved to 15th in team history.



- Cooper Kupp (51) passed Henry Ellard for fourth-most receiving touchdowns in franchise history.
- He became the franchise leader in postseason receptions (50).



- With 130 career starts, Rob Havenstein passed Tom Newberry and tied Dave Elmendorf for 12th-most in franchise history.



- Puka Nacua set the franchise record for most receptions as a rookie and passed Cooper Kupp who had 62 catches in 2017.

Sean McVay coached his 100th career regular season game (in Week 2, 2023). He had a record of 61-39 and the fifth-highest winning percentage amongst active head coaches in their first 100 regular season games.

## Winning Big



Since **Head Coach Sean McVay** took over prior to the start of the 2017 season, the Rams have won eight regular season games by at least 29 points. L.A. is one of five franchises to record at least six wins of 29 or more points in that timeframe. The Rams big wins have come twice against the Cardinals and once against the 49ers, Seahawks, Giants, Jaguars, Colts and the Broncos.

The Ravens have a league-best 11 big wins. The Patriots have 10, the Bills have nine, and the Rams and the Saints are tied for fourth with eight.

## Fabulous 50



Head Coach Sean McVay won 70 percent of his first 50 games (35-15 record) as a head coach. McVay's winning percentage was the sixth-best winning percentage all-time among coaches with at least 50 games.

McVay trailed only Guy Chamberlin (58-16-7, 78%), John Madden (103-32-7, 76%), Vince Lombardi (96-34-6, 74%), Ray Flaherty (54-21-3, 72%), and George Allen (116-47-5, 71%). All five coaches ahead of McVay are enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

## Coach 'Em Up



Rams Head Coach Sean McVay took over a team that was coming off of a 4-12 season and ranked 32nd in scoring. McVay helped transform it into the No. 1 scoring team in the league and helped secure the franchise's first NFC West title since 2003.



Due to his excellent first season and his instrumental part in revamping the Rams offense, McVay was chosen as the Associated Press Coach of the Year for 2017. He is the fourth head coach in franchise history to achieve this honor.

The last Rams head coach to win the award was Dick Vermeil in HC Sean McVay 1999. Vermeil helped guide the Rams to a 13-3 record, winning the NFC West and culminating with the franchise's lone Super Bowl victory over the Titans, 23-16, in Super Bowl XXXIV. Chuck Knox was the only other rookie head coach in franchise history to win the award.

McVay became the youngest coach in NFL history to win the Associated Press Coach of the Year award. McVay was 31 years old during the team's final game of the season. Previously, Don Shula (34 years old) was the youngest coach to win the award.

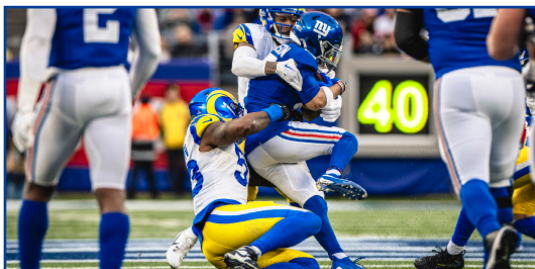


## Offense

## Success In The West



Under Head Coach Sean McVay, the Rams are 22-14 in the regular season against NFC West opponents. The Rams finished 6-0 in the NFC West during the 2018 season. The last time an NFC West team accomplished the feat was the Cardinals in 2008. It marked the first time the Rams swept the NFC West since 1999.

The Rams are 11-5 in NFC West road contests since the start of the 2017 season. The most recent road win was against the San Francisco 49ers, 21-20, at Levi Stadium in Week 18. The Rams' record in the NFC West this season was 5-1, sweeping the Seahawks and the Cardinals. In Week 18 of the 2023 season, the Rams defeated the 49ers in the regular season for the first time since 2019.

Coach Sean McVay has 13 victories over the Arizona Cardinals since 2017, the most for any coach against an NFC opponent during that span.

The Rams outscored their divisional opponents, 171-112, during the 2017 season, which was a 59-point differential. It was the highest positive point differential in the division for the Rams since 2001, when the Rams outscored their divisional opponents, 274-160, for a 114-point differential. The 2001 Rams played in a five team division and therefore had eight divisional games that season.

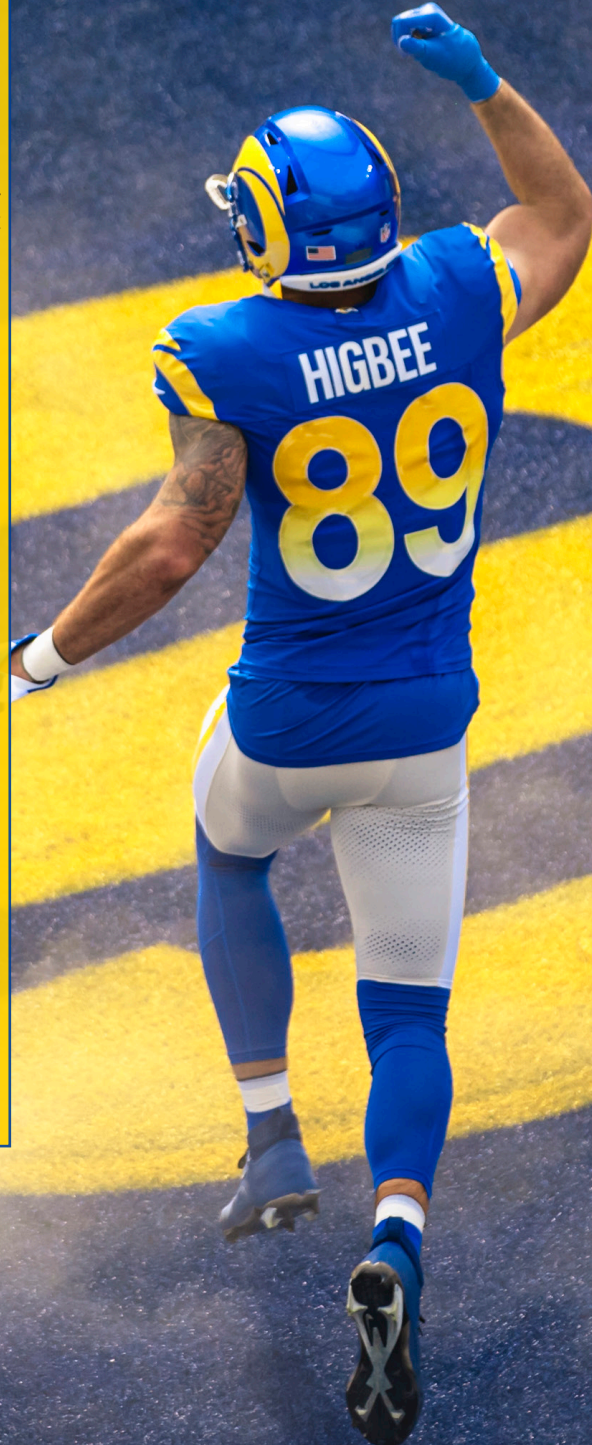

The Los Angeles Rams offensive line did not allow a single sack in Week 1 versus the Seattle Seahawks, Week 12 against the Cardinals, and Week 13 against the Browns. Additionally, 1.0 sack was allowed in Week 2 versus the San Francisco 49ers and in Week 16 against the New Orleans Saints.

The offensive line propeled the run game significantly through the season. The Rams offense rushed for a total of 2,045 yards with 18 rushing touchdowns.

In Week 12, the Rams offense finished with the most rushing yards (228) since Week 7 of the 2002 season.

The Rams finished the season ranked seventh in the NFL in QB sack rate (5.5%).

# Kyren Williams Notes



## Ky(RUN) Williams



**RB Kyren Williams** became the first-ever Rams player with multiple touchdowns in the first two games of a season. In Week 6, Williams rushed for 100+ yards for the second time in three weeks and the second time of his career. He became the first Rams' running back to rush for 150+ yards since Cam Akers in Week 14 of 2020 against the Patriots. In Week 6 against the Cardinals, of his 158 rushing yards, 154 yards were in the second half, becoming the first Rams player since Marshall Faulk in 2001 to have at least 150 rushing yards in a half, according to *ESPN Stats and Information*. After his career day in Week 6, Williams was nominated for the FedEx Ground Player of the Week. His 158 rushing yards is the fifth-most of any player this season.

With 198 total yards, he recorded a single-game career-best in Week 12 against the Cardinals. Additionally, with a 56-yard run in the third quarter Williams recorded the longest rush of his career. This was the third 100+ rushing yard performance of his career. He became the first player with 125+ rushing yards, 50+ receiving yards, and two receiving touchdowns in a game since Week 1 of the 2017 season.

Williams became the first Rams player with 200 scrimmage yards and two touchdowns in a game since Todd Gurley in 2018, according to *ESPN Stats & Information Research*. He also was just the fourth player in Rams history with 100+ rushing yards and two receiving touchdowns in a game, joining Todd Gurley (2017), Cleveland Gary (1992), and Eric Dickerson (1983).

In Week 13 against the Browns, he recorded his fifth 100+ scrimmage yard game of the season. He recorded 100+ total yards of offense in the last three games.

In Week 14 versus the Ravens, he recorded his fourth 100+ rushing yard game of his career. He was nominated for FedEx Ground Player of the Week.

In Week 15 against the Commanders, Williams recorded his fifth 100+ yard rushing game of his career and of the season, one shy of Todd Gurley who had six 100+ yard rushing contests in 2018. With a touchdown in the second quarter, he recorded his eighth of the season, the most single-season rushing touchdowns for the Rams since Todd Gurley (12) in 2019. With a 27-yard rush in the first quarter, he recorded 1,000 scrimmage yards. He is the first Rams running back to do so since Todd Gurley (1,064) in 2019.

In Week 16 against the Saints, he recorded the sixth 100+ yard rushing game of his career and of the season, tying Todd Gurley who had six 100+ yard rushing contests in 2018. Williams recorded 100+ yards rushing in three consecutive games for the first time in his career. With 47 yards rushing in the first half, he hit the 1,000-yard rushing mark on the season and for the first time in his career. He became the first Rams running back to do so since Todd Gurley in 2018.

In Week 17 against the Giants, he recorded a single-game career-high of three rushing touchdowns. He recorded a rushing touchdown in three consecutive games for the first time in his career. Williams recorded the ninth-most rushing touchdowns in a single-season in franchise history (12).

In every game that Williams played this season he led the team in rushing.

## In Historic Company



In Week 2 of the 2023 season, **QB Matthew Stafford** passed Peyton Manning for the most passing yards by a player in his first 200 regular season games (52,723 yards in 193 games).

He has accumulated 56,047 regular season passing yards over his illustrious 13-year career, which ranks 11th most all-time. He is one spot ahead of Hall of Famer John Elway (51,475) and sits behind former Giants QB Eli Manning (57,023).

His 357 passing touchdowns ranks 11th all-time and are more than Warren Moon (291), John Elway (300) and other Hall of Famers like Johnny Unitas (290) and Joe Montana (273). He also ranks second among active quarterbacks.

Stafford finished the 2023 regular season with a completion rate above 60%, making that his 10th consecutive season. In 2022, Stafford finished with a 68.0% completion percentage, which ranked fourth-best in the NFL.

Stafford was the third QB to win a Super Bowl in the first season with team. Trent Dilfer was the first in 2000 and Tom Brady the second in 2020.

Additionally, he ranks second in most passing yards per game in NFL history in a minimum of 100 games (272.1). He sits behind Drew Brees (280) and above Peyton Manning (270.5).



## Fastest To 50K



In his first 200 career regular season and playoff games, **QB Matthew Stafford** accumulated 54,819 passing yards. He was the fastest QB to reach 50,000 passing yards in NFL history. One other active QB has reached this threshold. Stafford ranks second amongst active QBs in passing yards (according to TruMedia).

## Konnecting With Kupp



Since coming to the Rams, **QB Matthew Stafford** quickly found a reliable target in **WR Cooper Kupp**. This connection grew so strong that Kupp became the fourth player in NFL to win the receiving triple-crown in 2021.

Last season, when quarterback Stafford targeted Kupp, he had a 77.4 percent completion rate, 8.74 yards per attempt (YPA), 45.2% first down rate, 58.1% success rate and a 106.6 passer rating.

Through Week 9 of 2022, and among receivers with at least 75 targets, Stafford and Kupp ranked first in completion percentage, fourth in the NFL in yards per attempt, and fourth in first down rate.

Through Week 7 of 2023, the Stafford to Kupp connection had the highest rating when targeting a receiver since 2021 (121.4).

## Kupp Wins Fourth Receiving Triple Crown in NFL History



Rams WR Cooper Kupp became the fourth player in NFL history to win the receiving Triple Crown by leading the NFL in receptions, receiving yards, and receiving TDs. He led the second place receivers in all three categories by some of the widest margins of any receiving Triple Crown winner. Kupp was 22 catches, 331 receiving yards, and two receiving TDs ahead of second place in each stat. The only other NFL players to have accomplished this feat are Hall of Fame WR Jerry Rice (1990), WR Sterling Sharpe (1992), and WR Steve Smith Sr. (2005), and none of them led any category by a margin as large as Kupp led in each. Kupp has the chance to become the fourth player since 1970 to lead or tie the league in touchdown receptions in back-to-back seasons. Only three receivers in NFL history have ever done that, Jerry Rice, Terrell Owens and Larry Fitzgerald.

Nacua's 266 receiving yards are the second-most by any pass catcher through two career games in NFL history, trailing only Anquan Boldin's 279 in 2003.

Through two weeks, he gained 270 yards, nearly one-third of the Rams' total. He had 43.1% of the Rams' catches, the highest for any player through two games since Vincent Jackson had 50% of Tampa Bay's catches in the first two games of the 2013 season.



## Record Breaker



After Week 4 (2023), Nacua totaled 39 receptions which is the most in a player's first four career games in NFL history and 501 receiving yards which is the most in a player's first four career games in NFL history.

He had over 100 yards in three of his first four games making him the second player in NFL history with 100+ receiving yards in three of his first four games.

With his 39 receptions, he surpassed Anquan Boldin and his 30 receptions in 2003 for the most receptions ever by a player in their first four NFL games. Nacua also surpassed Reggie Bush, who had 34 catches in 2006, for the most receptions by a player in their first five NFL games.

In Week 7, he totaled 92 yards after the catch, the most since WR Cooper Kupp recorded 101 yards after the catch in Week 2 of 2021. Nacua had 146 receiving yards through three quarters of play and recorded his fourth 100+ receiving yard performance of the season.

With three catches in Week 9, he passed Kupp (62) to set the franchise record for most receptions in their first NFL season.

With a 12-yard reception in the first quarter of Week 13, Nacua passed Eddie Kennison (924) for the most receiving yards by a rookie in franchise history. He completed this in three less games than Kennison. With a 70-yard touchdown reception, he recorded the longest of his career. Nacua finished the first half with 105 yards, making that his fifth 100+ receiving yard game of his career. With a 31-yard rush, he also recorded the longest of his career.

Through his first 13 games, Nacua had 82 receptions and 1,113 receiving yards. He joins Odell Beckham Jr., Anquan Boldin, and Randy Moss as the only players in the Super Bowl era with 1,100-plus receiving yards in their first 13 career games.

With a touchdown in Week 16 against the New Orleans Saints, Nacua recorded his fifth of the season. With nine receptions, he passed Michael Thomas (92) for third-most by a rookie in NFL history. He recorded his sixth 100+ yards receiving game of the season which is the most for a Rams receiver since WR Cooper Kupp in 2021 (11). This was Nacua's third 150+ yard receiving game of his career.

With an 80-yard reception in Week 17, Nacua recorded a career-long. He finished the game with five receptions for 118 yards. This was his seventh 100+ yard receiving yard game of the season. Additionally, he recorded 100+ receiving yards in back-to-back games for the second time this season.



## Rookie Show



In his NFL debut in Week 1 (2023) against the Seahawks, **WR Puka Nacua** recorded 10 receptions for 119 receiving yards, the most receiving yards in a rookie debut in Rams history. He is the second player drafted in the fifth round or later with 100+ receiving yards in his NFL debut.

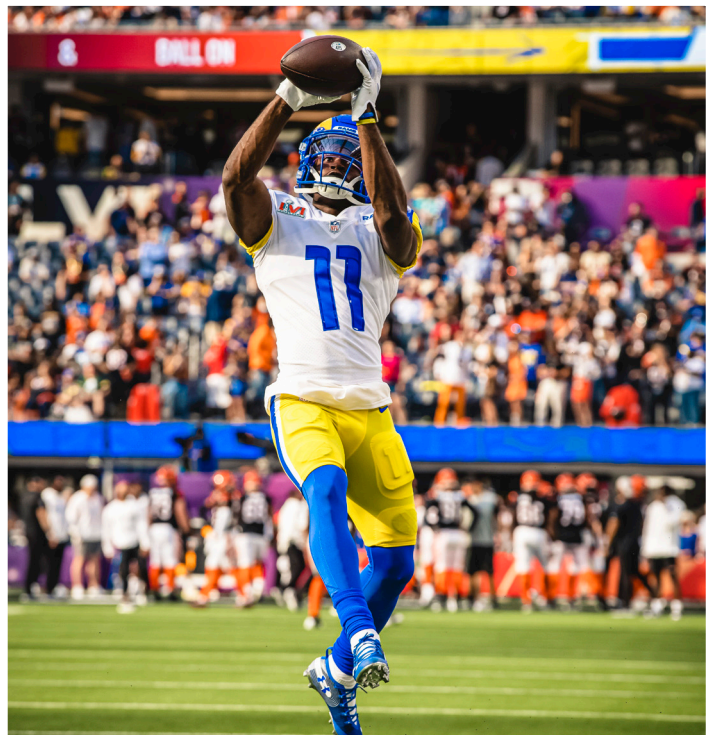
