CHARGERS VS. SAINTS

The Los Angeles Chargers open their preseason home slate against the New Orleans Saints on Sunday, Aug. 18. Kickoff is scheduled for 1 p.m., from Dignity Health Sports Park. Ian Eagle, Hall of Fame quarterback Dan Fouts and Evan Washburn will be on the national broadcast for CBS while Matt "Money" Smith, Daniel Jeremiah and Shannon Farren will bring the action on KFI-AM 640. Mario Solis and Jorge Villanueva will present the game in Spanish on KFWB-AM 980.

The Chargers are 7-5 all-time against the Saints and are 4-4 in preseason contests. Sunday's game will mark the third straight preseason that the two teams meet, and the third year in a row the two teams share the practice fields at Jack Hammett. Last year, the Saints won the preseason matchup, 36-7.

The Bolts opened the preseason schedule at Arizona with 17-13 loss. Quarterback Tyrod Taylor passed for 72 yards, completing all six of his passes while rookie Easton Stick rushed for 51 yards, including a 31-yard score to lead the team in rushing. Rookie linebacker Drue Tranquill totaled four tackles and an interception.

The Los Angeles Chargers took another step forward under the direction of second-year head coach Anthony Lynn in 2018. The Bolts made their first playoff appearance since 2013 and with a regular season mark of 12-4, posted their best record since 2009.

The Chargers showed their resolve all season long with memorable come-from-behind victories and an impressive road record that demonstrated the chemistry of the 2018 squad. For their efforts, an NFL-best seven Chargers were selected to the 2019 Pro Bowl.

Of the 13 total wins on the year, eight were played outside of the Los Angeles area, including a 20-19 win against the Tennessee Titans in London, England. The Bolts went on a roll on the road, winning all eight consecutively, before falling to the New England Patriots in the Divisional Round.

The Chargers will continue their preseason home slate against the Seattle Seahawks on Saturday, Aug. 24 at Dignity Health Sports Park in Carson, Calif.

TRAINING CAMP

The Los Angeles Chargers are in the midst of their third straight training camp at Jack Hammett Sports Complex in Costa Mesa, Calif. There are 13 practices open to the public. The Chargers once again will have joint practices with the New Orleans Saints, scheduled for Aug. 15-16. For more information visit chargers.com/schedule/training-camp. New for 2019, the Chargers will offer fans attending training camp a sneak preview of the team's new LA Stadium at Hollywood Park home - be it a virtual reality tour of the stadium, the ability to preview previously unreleased renderings or the opportunity to sample new food offerings scheduled to be available at the new stadium in 2020. As in years past, training camp at Jack Hammett Sports Complex offers fans of any age the opportunity to watch the Bolts practice in person, cheer for their favorite players within feet of the field and participate in a variety of exciting activities for the entire family.

BREAKING DOWN THE 2019 SCHEDULE

The Chargers opponents in 2019 posted a **105-101-3 (.510)** regular season record in 2018. Four of the teams on the schedule made the postseason and seven of the teams had a .500 or better record. The Chargers finished second in the AFC West and were 4-2 against divisional foes. The Bolts made their first playoff appearance since 2013.

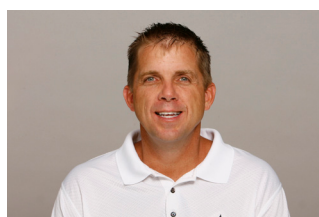


THE HEAD COACHES



Anthony Lynn is in his third season as a head coach in the National Football League after serving as Buffalo's interim in Week 17 of the 2016 season. In just his second season, Lynn led the Chargers to their first playoff appearance since 2013 and their best record since 2009 by posting a 12-4 mark. The Chargers led the NFL with

seven Pro Bowl selections and were a resilient squad, winning eight-straight road contests. For his efforts in 2018, Lynn was recognized by the Fritz Pollard Alliance with the Paul "Tank" Younger Award and was later tabbed the Coach of the Year by the Los Angeles Sports Council. In his first season at the helm in Los Angeles, Lynn rallied the team after an 0-4 start to win nine of the final 12 games, including six of the last seven contests. The Chargers finished 9-7 and just missed out on a playoff berth due to a tiebreaker. The nine wins over the 12-game span was the best mark since the team won the last 11 games of the 2009 season. The five-straight home wins were also the best run on home turf since that 2009 season. Lynn put his imprint on the team in year one. The Bolts turned the ball over just 15 times in 2017 to rank tied for fourth in the NFL after a season in which they were dead last with 35 turnovers. The offensive line led the league in the least amount of sacks allowed with 18. The Chargers haven't led the league in the least amount of sacks allowed since in the AFL in 1968. In two seasons in Los Angeles, Lynn has compiled a 21-11 regular season record.



Since he was hired as head coach of the New Orleans Saints in 2006, **Sean Payton** has established himself as one of the most successful coaches in the NFL. Payton has led the Saints to seven playoff berths, five NFC South division titles and in 2009 captured the franchise's first World Championship with a 31-17 win over the

Indianapolis Colts in Super Bowl XLIV. Payton's 126 combined regular season and postseason wins in his NFL head coaching career are tied for the 31st most in NFL history. He has a 126-80 overall record (.611), including an 8-6 postseason mark (.571) after the franchise had won only one playoff game prior to his arrival. Payton holds the club's top win total and winning percentage for a head coach. In all, Payton-led teams have claimed five division championships and have recorded seven seasons with ten-or-more wins. As Payton enters the 2019 campaign he continues to represent the Saints as the model of stability not only within the NFC South, as he is the longest tenured head coach within the division, but also within the NFL as only New England's Bill Belichick (2000) has been with his team longer. Payton is also one of just seven active coaches to lead a team to a Super Bowl victory. The others are Belichick, Seattle's Pete Carroll, Oakland's Jon Gruden (with Tampa Bay in 2002), Baltimore's John Harbaugh, Philadelphia's Doug Pederson and Pittsburgh's Mike Tomlin.

Los Angeles Chargers

With a playoff berth, the Chargers will have appeared in the postseason 20 times since being founded in 1960.

With nine wins, the Chargers will reach 160 total wins since realignment in 2002. Only New England, Pittsburgh, Indianapolis and Green Bay have eclipsed that mark over that span.

WR Keenan Allen

Needs 80 receptions to be the fifth player in history to reach 500 career catches in a Chargers uniform.

Needs 794 receiving yards to become the seventh player to reach 6,000 career receiving yards in team history.

With five 100-yard receiving games, would reach 25 for his career to move into second in Chargers history.

K Michael Badgley

Made 93.8 percent (15-of-16) of his field goal attempts as a rookie, and could set an NFL record for best field goal percentage by a kicker with at least 25 attempts over the first two seasons of a career (Baltimore's Justin Tucker, 91.9 percent).

DE Joey Bosa

Needs 10.0 sacks to reach 39.5 for his career, which would move him into sole possession of No. 8 in Chargers history.

Needs 11.5 sacks to become the eighth player in team annals to reach 40 sacks for his career.

LB Thomas Davis Sr.

Can build on his 1,077 press box tackles for his career to extend as the most tackles since entering the league in 2005 among active NFL linebackers.

RB Austin Ekeler

Needs 597 rushing yards to reach 1,411, which would give him the most by a running back that signed with the Chargers as an undrafted free agent (Mike Tolbert had 1,410).

TE Hunter Henry

Needs 737 receiving yards to pass Eric Sievers (1,793) for No. 8 among tight ends in team history.

With eight touchdown catches, would become the sixth tight end in Chargers history to reach 20 for his career.

DE Melvin Ingram III

Needs 67 total press box defensive tackles to pass S Jahleel Addae (356) for No. 8 in team history.

Needs 8.0 sacks to become the fourth Charger in history to reach 50 career sacks with the club.

S Derwin James

Can become the fifth Charger in history and first since 2007 to be named to the Pro Bowl in each of his first two seasons.

Can become the first Charger since the merger to be named a first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* in each of his first two seasons and the first Charger since CB Dick Harris and T Ron Mix were each named first-team All-AFL for the 1960-61 seasons. James would be the first defensive player to accomplish this feat since Hall of Fame LB Lawrence Taylor did so in the 1981-82 seasons.

Needs 69 total press box defensive tackles to pass S Eric Weddle (173) for the most by a Chargers defender over the first two seasons of his career.

Needs 4.5 sacks to reach 8.0 for his career, which would be good for the second-most by a Chargers defensive back in history.

DB Desmond King II

An interception return for a touchdown would mark the third of his career to tie S Eric Weddle and DB Joe Beauchamp for No. 4 in team annals. It would make him the ninth player in NFL history with a pick-six in each of his first three seasons, and the first since CB Dominique Rodgers-Cromartie did so from 2008-10.

Needs 4.0 sacks to reach 8.0 for his career, which would be good for the second-most by a Chargers defensive back in history.

A punt return for a touchdown would be the second of his career, making him the eighth player in history with multiple punt return touchdowns while with the Bolts.

NT Brandon Mebane

Can build on his 57 career press box tackles for loss, already the most among active nose tackles.

S Adrian Phillips

An interception would mark his fourth since the start of the 2017 season. Coupled with his 21 press box special teams tackles the past two seasons, he would become the only player with more than 15 special teams tackles and at least four interceptions over that span.

QB Philip Rivers

Needs to 251 attempts to pass Hall of Fame QB John Elway for seventh in NFL history.

With 344 yards, will become the eighth player in NFL history with at least 55,000 career passing yards.

Needs to throw 26 touchdown passes to reach 400 for his career to become the sixth player in league annals to eclipse that mark.

With one 300-yard passing game, can tie Hall of Fame QB Dan Marino (63) for the fourth-most in NFL history.

Two 300-yard passing games will be 64 for his career and move him into sole possession of No. 4 in NFL history.

Needs four games with at least three-plus touchdowns to become the seventh player in NFL history to have at least 60 for his career.

WR Mike Williams

Needs 10 receiving touchdowns to reach 20 for his career, tying WR Anthony Miller for the fourth-most by a Charger in his first three seasons.



Los Angeles Chargers

Posted a regular-season record of 12-4, the sixth season in team history with 12-plus wins, to clinch the team's 19th playoff berth and 28th winning season.

Eclipsed 20,000 all-time points, becoming the 14th-ever franchise to do so. Los Angeles joined New England and Dallas (both founded in 1960) as the only teams founded in 1960 or more recently to reach 20,000 points.

The defense allowed less than 320 net yards seven times in 2018, giving them a total of 14 times doing so under defensive coordinator Gus Bradley. The Bolts are 13-1 in those games.

With QB Philip Rivers finding WR Tyrell Williams for a 75-yard catch-and-run on the Chargers' first play from scrimmage against Tennessee, it marked the first touchdown on the team's first offensive play following a kickoff since Nov. 18, 2001 at Oakland (Curis Conway 67-yard touchdown run on a reverse).

Scored 45 unanswered points vs. Arizona (Nov. 25), the most by the team since also posting 45-straight on Dec. 14, 1969 in a 45-6 win over Buffalo.

Recorded 246 rushing yards as a team at Cleveland (Oct. 14), good for the most by a Chargers offense since posting 289 on Dec. 28, 2008 at Denver.

Scored on five-straight drives vs. Arizona (Nov. 25), the most by a Chargers team since Nov. 12, 2006 at Cincinnati.

Against the Cardinals (Nov. 25) allowed just 149 yards of offense, the best single-game defensive performance since allowing 67 yards against Kansas City on Dec. 12, 2010.

The Bolts posted three sacks in the first quarter at Cleveland (Oct. 14), tying a team mark for the most first quarter sacks (Sept. 28, 2008 at Oak.).

WR Keenan Allen

Selected to the second Pro Bowl of his career, becoming the first Chargers WR to start in a Pro Bowl since Tony Martin did so in the 1997 Pro Bowl.

Became the first Charger to post back-to-back 1,000-yard receiving seasons since WR Vincent Jackson in 2008-09.

Set a team record with a 65-game multi-catch streak.

Registered three 100-yard contests to reach 21 for his career, moving into a tie with TE Antonio Gates for the fifth-most in Chargers history.

Reached 420 receptions for his career, moving to sixth in Chargers history.

Increased his career total to 5,206 receiving yards for ninth in team annals.

Moved to 12th in Chargers history with 28 career touchdown catches.

K Michael Badgley

Named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week in Week 14 (vs. Cin.).

Made 93.8 percent of his field goal attempts (15-of-16), setting a franchise mark for single-season field goal percentage with at least 15 makes.

Made a 59-yard field goal in Week 14 vs. Cincinnati to set a Chargers record for the longest field goal in franchise history.

Set a team record for the most points by a kicker through seven career games (62), five career games (43) and four career games (34).

Became the first Chargers kicker in history to make eight field goals through the first four games of his career.

Set a Chargers record for the most points by a kicker without a missed kick over his first three career games (24) and through his first two career games (16).

In the first game of his career, made five PATs to tie Steve DeLine (1988) for the most in a player's first career game in Chargers history.

DE Joey Bosa

Moved to 10th on the team's all-time sacks list, ending the year with 28.5.

Passed DE Chris Mims for the second-most sacks by a Charger over the first three seasons of his career (28.5).

RB Austin Ekeler

Passed Hank Bauer for the second-most scrimmage touchdowns by an undrafted running back through the first two seasons of his career in team history, reaching 11 career scores in the regular-season finale.

With six career receiving touchdowns, is just the sixth-ever undrafted running back to do so in his first two seasons.

Became the first undrafted running back with five-plus touchdown catches in his first two seasons since 1966 (Dan Reeves had nine receiving scores from 1965-66).

Tied Mike Tolbert for the third-most receiving touchdowns by an undrafted running back in Chargers history.

Was the first undrafted Charger ever to record a rushing and a receiving touchdown in each of his first two seasons.

G Dan Feeney

Is the one Charger that played on all 995 offensive snaps in the season.

CB Casey Hayward Jr.

Picked off a two-point conversion attempt in the regular-season finale, returning it 102 yards for two points to become the first Charger and eighth player in NFL history with a defensive conversion.

DE Melvin Ingram III

Selected to the second Pro Bowl of his career.

In the first matchup against Oakland, became the second player in NFL history to have a sack, an interception and a rushing attempt in the same game, joining N.Y. Jets LB Mo Lewis (2000).

Moved into sole possession of No. 7 on the team's all-time sacks list with 42 for his career.



S Derwin James

Selected to the first Pro Bowl of his career as the top-voted FS in the AFC. Was the first Chargers rookie selected to start the Pro Bowl since LB Shawne Merriman in 2006.

Named a first-team All-Pro (S) and a second-team All-Pro (DB) by *The Associated Press*, joining CB Desmond King II (2018 season) as the first Chargers in history to be named an AP All-Pro at two positions.

Recognized as the S on the All-NFL, All-AFC and All-Rookie teams for the *Professional Football Writers of America*.

Became the first rookie in Chargers history with at least 100 tackles (coaches totals).

Finished the season with 3.5 sacks, good for the third-most by a rookie DB in NFL history and joined Desmond King (4.0 in 2017) as the only DBs to have 3.5 as a rookie since 1997.

With three sacks in the first four weeks, became the first DB in NFL history to do so over the first four games of his professional career.

Became the first DB in a non-strike year since 1983 to have two sacks and an interception in his first three career games.

Was the first defensive rookie since OLB Zach Brown in 2012 (then with Tennessee) to have multiple interceptions and at least 3.5 sacks.

DB Desmond King II

Named a first-team All-Pro (DB) and a second-team All-Pro (PR) by *The Associated Press*, joining S Derwin James (2018 season) as the first Chargers in history to be named an AP All-Pro at two positions.

Named AFC Defensive Player of the Week in Week 9 (at Sea.).

Named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week in Week 13 (at Pit.).

Was the first player since 2011 (CB Lardarius Webb) and seventh since 2000 to have a punt return touchdown and a pick-six in the same season.

Became just the sixth player in NFL history and second DB ever to post multiple pick-sixes and at least four sacks over the first two seasons of his career (S Roy Williams, 2002-03).

Was the first defensive rookie since OLB Zach Brown in 2012 (then with Tennessee) to have multiple interceptions and at least 3.5 sacks.

S Adrian Phillips

Selected to the first Pro Bowl of his career as the special teamer.

Named a first-team All-Pro (special teamer) by *The Associated Press*.

Recognized as the special teamer on the All-NFL and All-AFC teams for the *Professional Football Writers of America*.

C Mike Pouncey

Selected to the fourth Pro Bowl of his career.

QB Philip Rivers

Selected to the eighth Pro Bowl of his career.

Named AFC Offensive Player of the Week in Week 12 (vs. Ari.).

Voted FedEx Air Player of the Week in Week 13 (at Pit.).

Voted FedEx Air Player of the Week in Week 15 (at K.C.).

Against Arizona, posted the most efficient game in NFL history, setting all-time marks for single-game consecutive completions (25) and single-game completion percentage with at least 20 pass attempts (96.6).

Finished the season with 208 consecutive starts, tying Peyton Manning for the third-most by a QB in NFL history.

Reached 118 career regular-season victories, tying Hall of Fame QB Johnny Unitas for 10th all-time.

Led the team to a victory at Pittsburgh after trailing by 16 points, giving him seven career comeback wins from at least a 16-point deficit to tie Peyton Manning for the most all-time.

Moved to sole possession of No. 6 all-time in passing touchdowns and No. 8 in passing yards.

Reached 30 TD passes for the sixth time, tying Green Bay QB Aaron Rodgers for the fifth-most in history.

Posted 4,000-plus passing yards for the 10th season of his career, the third-most 4,000-yard campaigns in NFL history.

Eclipsed 300-plus yards in five games, giving him 62 career 300-yard games to tie Hall of Fame QB Brett Favre for No. 5 all-time.

Extended his streaks for seasons with 25-plus TD passes (11 seasons), 3,000 passing yards (13 seasons) and 3,500 passing yards (11 seasons), good for the second-longest, fourth-longest and third-longest, respectively, in NFL history.

Threw multiple TD passes in each of the first 12 games of the season, only the fourth QB ever to do so (Aaron Rodgers in 2011, Peyton Manning in 2004 and Johnny Unitas in 1959).

Registered a passer rating of at least 90 in each of the first 13 games this season, becoming the third QB in NFL history to do so in each of the first 13 contests to a season.

Became just the third QB in NFL history to throw multiple TD passes and register a passer rating of at least 95.0 in each of the first nine games of a season (Tom Brady in 2007 and Aaron Rodgers in 2011).

Set a team mark with 13-straight multi-TD contests dating back to 2017, tying for the second-longest streak in history.

WR Mike Williams

Named AFC Offensive Player of the Week in Week 15 (at K.C.).

Became the first Charger WR since Tony Martin in 1996 to have 10 scrimmage touchdowns in a single season.

With two receiving scores and a rushing touchdown in the second game against Kansas City, became the third WR in team annals with a rushing and receiving score in the same game.



Los Angeles Chargers

Allowed 229 yards in the AFC Wild Card, the fewest allowed in a postseason game in Chargers history. The 139 yards passing allowed was good for the fourth-best single-game mark in team postseason annals.

In the AFC Wild Card, the defense allowed just 69 total net yards in the first half, the fewest allowed in the first half of a postseason game in team history and the fewest allowed in an opening half of a playoff game since the 2006 postseason (Ind. allowed 16 yards against K.C. in the AFC Wild Card).

With seven sacks in the AFC Wild Card, the Chargers defense tied a team mark for the most single-game sacks in the postseason since the 1992 postseason (seven in a 17-0 victory in AFC Wild Card vs. K.C.).

K Michael Badgley

Set marks in the AFC Wild Card for the most made field goals (five) and points (15) in a postseason contest in Chargers history.

DE Melvin Ingram III

With two sacks in the AFC Wild Card, became the first Charger with two-plus sacks in a postseason game since DE Raylee Johnson did so in Super Bowl XXIX against San Francisco.

DT Justin Jones

With a sack in the postseason, he passed LB Shaun Phillips (0.5 sacks in 2004 postseason) for the most postseason sacks by a rookie in team history.

DB Desmond King II

Posted a kickoff return of 72 yards and a 33-yard punt return, with the latter setting a team postseason mark.

LB Uchenna Nwosu

With a sack in the postseason, he passed LB Shaun Phillips (0.5 sacks in 2004 postseason) for the most postseason sacks by a rookie in team history.

S Adrian Phillips

Became the first player since Atlanta CB Robert Alford in Super Bowl LI to have an interception and a fumble recovery in a postseason game, doing so in the AFC Wild Card win at Baltimore.

QB Philip Rivers

Reached 14 career postseason touchdown passes, eclipsing the previous team mark of 12 by Hall of Fame QB Dan Fouts.

Posted a postseason single-game career-high 331 passing yards in the AFC Divisional for his second career postseason 300-yard performance.



PLAYER NOTES

MULTI-CATCH MACHINE

Keenan Allen had two-plus catches in 65-straight games to pass Hall of Fame TE Kellen Winslow in the 2018 season opener for the most in Chargers history. Allen only has two games without multiple receptions: The second game of his career (one catch) and Week 15 at Kansas City (exited with zero due to a hip injury).

SHIFTING GEARS

Austin Ekeler has been effective from the very first run of his NFL career, taking the handoff 35 yards for a TD against Philadelphia last season. Since then, he has shown his ability to provide a spark on the ground for the Bolts, carrying the ball 153 times. Ekeler is fourth among NFL running backs in rushing average since the start of 2017 (min. 100 carries).

HANDS TEAM

In the Week 4 victory over San Francisco, Austin Ekeler hauled in the fifth TD pass of his career. The five receiving scores over his first two years made him the first undrafted RB to do so in his first two seasons since 1966. Ekeler added a sixth TD reception in Week 5. Ekeler is also tied for the third-most TD catches by an undrafted RB in Chargers history.

Ekeler reached 525 career receiving yards in the team's Week 9 win over Seattle, the most by a Chargers undrafted running back in the first two seasons of his career. Ekeler's 683 receiving yards are the most by an undrafted running back through his first two seasons since Arian Foster registered 697 from 2009-10.

In the Week 9 win over Seattle, CB Desmond King II returned an INT 42 yards for a score, his second career pick-six (90-yard INT return at Dallas in 2017). Coupled with his four sacks as a rookie, for former fifth-round selection became the sixth player in NFL history and second DB ever to post at least four sacks and multiple pick-sixes in the first two seasons of his career.

Badgley brought consistency to the Bolts' kicking game. In his 10 games played, he made 15-of-16 field goals (93.8 pct.) and 27-of-28 extra points (96.4 pct.) for 72 total points scored. Rivers' **25 consecutive completions** are the most by a quarterback in a single game in **NFL history** and are tied with Ryan Tannehill (25 consecutive completions from Weeks 6-7 in 2015) for the most consecutive passes completed at any point in league history. Washington's Mark Brunell previously held the record for the most consecutive completions to begin a game, completing his first 22 passes against Houston on September 24, 2006.

Rivers' **96.6 completion percentage** is the highest by a quarterback in a single game in league annals (minimum 20 attempts), surpassing the previous high of 92.3 percent (24 of 26 passing) set by Pro Football Hall of Famer Kurt Warner against Jacksonville on September 20, 2009.





HEAD COACH ANTHONY LYNN

On Jan. 13, 2017, the Los Angeles Chargers named Anthony Lynn the 16th head coach in franchise history and the first African-American head coach in team annals. Lynn joined the Chargers after spending the 2015-16 seasons with the Buffalo Bills as the assistant head coach, running backs coach and holding the positions of offensive coordinator and interim head coach.

In just his second season, Lynn led the Chargers to their first playoff appearance since 2013 and their best record since 2009 by posting a 12-4 mark. The Chargers led the NFL with seven Pro Bowl selections and were a resilient squad, winning eight-straight road contests. For his efforts in 2018, Lynn was recognized by the Fritz Pollard Alliance with the Paul "Tank" Younger Award and was later tabbed the Coach of the Year by the Los Angeles Sports Council.

In his first season at the helm in Los Angeles, Lynn rallied the team after an 0-4 start to win nine of the final 12 games, including six of the last seven contests. The Chargers finished 9-7 and just missed out on a playoff berth due to a tiebreaker. The nine wins over the 12-game span was the best mark since the team won the last 11 games of the 2009 season. The five-straight home wins were also the best run on home turf since that 2009 season.

Lynn put his imprint on the team in year one. The Bolts turned the ball over just 15 times in 2017 to rank tied for fourth in the NFL after a season in which they were dead last with 35 turnovers. The offensive line led the league in the least amount of sacks allowed with 18. The Chargers haven't led the league in the least amount of sacks allowed since in the AFL in 1968. In two seasons in Los Angeles, Lynn has compiled a 21-11 regular season record.

A native of Celina, Texas, some 40 miles north of Dallas, Lynn was an All-Southwest Conference running back as a collegian at Texas Tech, where he rushed for 1,911 yards and 17 touchdowns on 481 carries. That helped him earn a ticket to the NFL where he signed with the New York Giants as an undrafted free agent in 1992. After being released by the Giants, Lynn signed with Denver in 1993 and appeared in 13 games for the Broncos. In 1994, he suffered a broken leg and spent the year on injured reserve. Lynn moved on to the Bay Area in 1995, spending two seasons with the San Francisco 49ers (1995-96) before concluding his career in Denver (1997-99) where he won back-to-back Super Bowl championships (XXXII and XXXIII) with the Broncos. Lynn hung up his cleats after the '99 season, having played in 83 career games.

Lynn jumped right into the coaching ranks in 2000, spending three seasons (2000-02) with the Broncos as an offensive assistant and assistant to special teams. In 2003, he landed his first full-time position gig as the running backs coach for the Jacksonville Jaguars (2003-04). That was followed by similar positions with the Dallas Cowboys (2005-06), Cleveland Browns (2007-08), New York Jets (2009-14) and Bills (2015-16). Lynn carried the additional title of assistant head coach in New York in 2014 and with the Bills for his two seasons there.

Lynn spent the last two seasons (2015-16) with the Bills, including the final 14 games of the 2016 season as their offensive coordinator and the final game of the year as their interim head coach. The Bills led the NFL in both of Lynn's seasons in both rushing yards (2,630 in 2016 and 2,432 in 2015) and rushing touchdowns (29 in 2016 and 19, tie in 2015). The Bills also led the League in average yards per carry (5.3 in 2016 and 4.8, tie in 2015) in each of his two seasons in Upstate New York. More impressively, at his last two coaching stops (New York and Buffalo), his teams combined to rush for 18,218 yards during that span (2009-16), the most combined yards in the NFL over that time period. Also in Week 16 of the 2016 season, as offensive coordinator for the Bills, Lynn led the offense to a franchise-record 589 total yards. The 589 total yards were the second-most in a single game in the NFL that season.

Lynn is married to Stacey Bell Lynn. He has two children, son, D'Anton, and daughter, Danielle. Stacey is a news anchor at WNBC in New York City. D'Anton played football collegiately at Penn State and professionally with the New York Jets and the Canadian Football League's Hamilton Tiger-Cats and currently is the assistant defensive backs coach for the Houston Texans. Danielle studied at the University of Oklahoma and earned her master's degree at the University of North Texas. She currently is the COO of The Lynn Family Foundation and the Process Improvement Specialist at Southwest Hospital in Dallas.

In the spring of 2018, Lynn completed his college degree after leaving school for the NFL. Despite being in his first year as a head coach, Lynn received his degree in interdisciplinary studies from UNLV.

GENERAL MANAGER TOM TELESKO

With a keen eye for acquiring talented players, Tom Telesco serves his seventh season as General Manager of the Chargers in 2019.

Telesco was hired by the Chargers in January 2013. Forty-years-old at the time of his hiring, he became the youngest general manager in team history. Telesco immediately helped the Chargers return to the playoffs in 2013 with a roster that featured 25 players who joined the team prior to or during the season.

His first draft featured 2013 Pepsi Next NFL Rookie of the Year Keenan Allen. In 2017, Allen went on to break the Chargers' single-season receptions record and posted the second-most receiving yards in team history en route to being named the NFL Comeback Player of the Year and earning his first Pro Bowl nod.

Over his six years with the organization, Telesco has drafted four pro bowlers in the first round in Jason Verrett, Melvin Gordon, Joey Bosa and Derwin James.

Telesco also has a proven track record with undrafted free agents. His finds have been highlighted by running back Austin Ekeler out of Western State, Pro Bowl special teamer Adrian Phillips, deep-threat and 1,000-yard receiver Tyrell Williams out of Western Oregon and special teams stalwart Nick Dzubnar from Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo.

On top of his draft choices, Telesco has brought in some of the top free agent talents in the NFL. Casey Hayward has blossomed into one of the top corners in the league, making back-to-back Pro Bowls in 2016-17 while offensive tackle Russell Okung and center Mike Pouncey made the Pro Bowl in their first seasons with the team. His signings also include defensive tackle Brandon Mebane, wide receiver/punt returner Travis Benjamin and his latest being three-time Pro Bowl linebacker Thomas Davis in 2019.

A native of Buffalo, N.Y., Telesco prepped at St. Francis High School in Athol Springs, N.Y. Days prior to Super Bowl XLVIII in January 2014, which was co-hosted by New York and New Jersey, Telesco was recognized for their accomplishments on the floor of the New York State Senate by Senator Timothy Kennedy.

After graduating from St. Francis, Telesco played wide receiver at John Carroll University in Ohio. He was a starter on the Blue Streaks' 1994 Ohio Athletic Conference Championship team, and two of his teammates at John Carroll were Chris and Brian Polian, sons of Bill Polian, a 2015 inductee into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

While attending John Carroll, Telesco spent four summers (1991-94) as a training camp intern with the Buffalo Bills. At that time, the elder Polian was the Bills' general manager. Polian left Buffalo for Carolina in 1994 and after Telesco graduated from John Carroll with a degree in business management in 1995, Polian hired him to work in the Panthers' scouting department. In 1998, Telesco and Polian moved on to Indianapolis, where Telesco would spend his next 15 NFL seasons as a college scout, pro scout, director of pro scouting, director of player personnel and vice president of football operations. He worked in Indianapolis during Peyton Manning's entire career with the Colts and later part of the team that brought Andrew Luck to the Colts with the first pick of the 2012 NFL Draft. Telesco also was involved in Colts drafts that featured four-time Pro Bowl running back Edgerrin James, five-time Pro Bowl wide receiver Reggie Wayne, Dwight Freeney, a seven-time Pro Bowler as a Colt and two-time Pro Bowl selection, and 2007 NFL Defensive Player of the Year Bob Sanders.

Telesco's tenure in Indianapolis was one of the most successful eras in Colts history. They played in two Super Bowls, including a victory over Chicago in Super Bowl XLI. From 1998-2012, the Colts won 154 regular-season games, eight division titles and they appeared in the playoffs 12 times. Indianapolis set an NFL record with 12 or more wins in seven consecutive seasons and they won an NFL-record 23-straight regular-season games during the 2008-09 seasons. Their 115 regular-season wins from 2000-09 set an NFL record for wins in a decade.

In 2015 and this past year in 2018, Telesco was invited to be a speaker at the NFL's Career Development Symposium in Arizona. The program, attended by nearly 70 coaches and front office executives, was designed to engage aspiring head coach and general manager candidates. Telesco was one of only two active general managers invited to address participants at the symposium. He is also the co-chairman of the NFL General Manager Advisory Committee.

Telesco and his wife, Larah, have a daughter, Elena, and two sons, Thomas and Nicholas.
