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## BOLTS PLAY RAIDERS ON THURSDAY NIGHT FOOTBALL

The Los Angeles Chargers take on the Raiders on *Thursday Night Football* for the eighth time, kicking off at 5:20 p.m. PT from Allegiant Stadium. Joe Buck, Troy Aikman, Erin Andrews and Kristina Pink have the call on FOX while Matt "Money" Smith, Daniel Jeremiah and Shannon Farren will broadcast on the Chargers Radio Network airwaves on ALT FM-98.7. Adrian Garcia-Marquez and Francisco Pinto will present the game in Spanish on Que Buena FM 105.5/94.3.

Thursday marks the 122nd matchup in the series between the Chargers and Raiders. The Raiders are winners of the last three contests and hold a 62-54-2 record in the series. The Bolts are 27-32-1 all-time when they travel to play the Raiders. Seven of the last 10 matchups have been one-score games.

Los Angeles' win last week improved its all-time record in the Royal Blue Color Rush uniforms to 4-1. In 99 career games, **Keenan Allen** has hauled in 623 receptions, good for the most through the first 100 games of a career. **Justin Herbert** continued his Offensive Rookie of the Year-worthy campaign by registering his first game-winning drive and tossing a pair of touchdowns in the Week 14 win. He now has 25 passing scores on the season, the fourth-most by a rookie in history, while his 3,467 yards through the air rank No. 10 all-time among rookies.

Las Vegas quarterback Derek Carr has led the team to a 7-6 record this year and is on pace to set a career-high mark with a 102.1 passer rating this season. Josh Jacobs ranks third in the AFC with 831 rushing yards, while Darren Waller is 16 receptions shy of being the sixth tight end in NFL history to post 100 catches in a season.

The Chargers close out the 2020 home slate in Week 16 against Denver. It will be the first time Los Angeles hosts the Broncos in its home finale. Kickoff from SoFi Stadium on Sunday, Dec. 27 is at 1:05 p.m. PT.

- 3** After picking off his third pass of the season last week, Michael Davis is the first undrafted Bolt to intercept three passes in a season since 2008 (Stephen Cooper).
- 623** Keenan Allen reached 623 career receptions in his 99th game played last week, setting an NFL record for catches through the first 100 games of a career.
- 25** With 25 touchdown passes on the year, Justin Herbert is just the fourth rookie in history to reach that mark. He is three passing scores from setting the all-time rookie record of 27 set by Baker Mayfield in 2018.

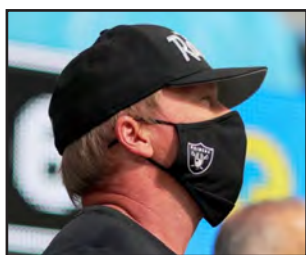

Anthony Lynn was named the 16th head coach in franchise history on Jan. 13, 2017, becoming the first African-American head coach in team annals. Lynn joined the Chargers after spending the 2015-16 seasons with the Buffalo Bills as the assistant head coach, running backs coach, the positions of offensive coordinator and interim head coach. 2020 marks Lynn's fourth season as head coach of the Chargers.

The 2019 season was highlighted by record-setting performances and recognition. Keenan Allen and Melvin Ingram III each went to their third-straight Pro Bowl while Joey Bosa went to his second in three seasons. On offense, Allen set a team record for catches in a season (104) and the unit touted a pair of 1,000-yard receivers (Allen and Mike Williams) while Austin Ekeler finished the year with 92 catches for 993 yards and eight touchdowns. Lynn has compiled a 30-31 regular-season record through four-plus seasons with the Chargers.

A native of Celina, Texas, Lynn was an All-Southwest Conference RB at Texas Tech. He signed with the N.Y. Giants as an undrafted free agent in 1992. Lynn signed with Denver in 1993, then in 1995 joined the San Francisco 49ers before returning to Denver in 1997, winning back-to-back Super Bowls (XXXII and XXXIII) with the Broncos. Lynn hung up his cleats after the '99 season, having played in 83 career games.

Lynn is married to Stacey Bell Lynn. He has two children, son, D'Anton, and daughter, Danielle. Stacey was a news anchor at WNBC in New York City. D'Anton played collegiately at Penn State and professionally with the N.Y. Jets and the Hamilton Tiger-Cats of the CFL. D'Anton is currently the defensive backs coach of the Houston Texans. Danielle is a Process Improvement Specialist at Southwest Hospital in Dallas and serves as the COO of The Lynn Family Foundation.

Jon Gruden returned as head coach of the Raiders on Jan. 9, 2018. Gruden, who was first introduced as head coach of the Raiders over 20 years ago, served four seasons with the Raiders from 1998-2001.

Prior to his return to coaching, Gruden spending nearly a decade in broadcasting, including color analyst duties on the Monday Night Football franchise from 2009-2017. Gruden compiled a 95-81 (.540) regular season mark in 11 seasons as a head coach with the Raiders and the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (2002-08), and a 5-4 record (.556) in postseason contests, which includes a victory in Super Bowl XXXVII.

The youngest head coach in the NFL at age 34 upon his initial hire by Raiders in 1998, Gruden posted a 38-26 record (.594) and led the Silver and Black to back-to-back AFC West titles ('00, '01). He guided the Raiders to an AFC Championship Game appearance in 2000. Gruden was a seven-year NFL assistant, helping his teams qualify for the playoffs five times. Gruden spent three seasons (1995-97) as offensive coordinator for the Philadelphia Eagles. Before joining Philadelphia, Gruden worked for three years at Green Bay from 1992-94.

Born August 17, 1963 in Sandusky, Ohio, Gruden attended South Bend (Ind.) Clay High School and the University of Dayton, graduating in 1985 with a degree in communications. Gruden and his wife, Cindy, have three sons, Deuce, Michael and Jayson. Deuce is an Asst. Strength & Conditioning Coach for the Raiders.

# THE MATCHUP

## WITHIN STRIKING DISTANCE

### WR Keenan Allen

- Will appear in his 100th career game on Thursday. Every reception would build on his NFL-record 623 catches through the first 100 games of a career.
- Needs one reception to reach 100 on the year, which would mark his third 100-catch season to become the 13th player in NFL history with three or more 100-reception campaigns.
- Needs six receptions to reach 105 on the year and break his own single-season team record (104 in 2019).
- Needs 25 yards to reach 1,000 for the season, giving him four consecutive 1,000-yard seasons and five for his career.
  - It would be the longest streak by a Charger in over 50 years and tie for the second-longest active streak.
- Needs a touchdown reception to set a single-season career high with nine.

### DE Joey Bosa

- Needs two sacks to reach 49.5 for his career and pass DE Melvin Ingram III for No. 4 in team history since the sack became an official statistic in 1982.
- Needs 2.5 sacks to reach 50.0 for his career and — at 25 years, 159 days old on game day — would become the second-youngest player in NFL history to eclipse that mark.

### RB Austin Ekeler

- Needs 11 receptions to become the fourth undrafted running back since the 1970 NFL-AFL merger with 210 catches in the first six seasons of a career (Ekeler is in his fourth season).
- Needs one receiving TD to become the youngest undrafted RB in the common draft era (since 1967) to reach 15 career receiving scores — at 25 years, 214 days.
  - He would become just the fourth RB in the Super Bowl era to accomplish the feat before turning 26 — Christian McCaffrey (23 years, 170 days), Chuck Foreman (25 years, 42 days) and Joe Cribbs (25 years, 312 days).
- Needs two receiving TDs to pass LaDainian Tomlinson (15) for the most TD catches by a RB in Chargers history.

### WR Jalen Guyton

- Needs a touchdown catch of 70-plus yards to reach three for the season, which would tie Hall of Fame WR Lance Alworth (1968) for the most in a single season in team history.

### TE Hunter Henry

- Needs one catch to reach a career-high 56 on the year.
- Needs 105 receiving yards to set a single-season career high with 653 on the year.

### QB Justin Herbert

- Needs 233 passing yards to become the third player in NFL history to eclipse 3,700 yards through their first 13 career starts, joining Patrick Mahomes (4,207) and Andrew Luck (3,792).
- Needs 300 passing yards to set the all-time rookie record with seven such performances on the year.
- Needs two touchdown passes to tie Baker Mayfield (27 in 2018) for the most by a rookie in NFL history.
  - The two-touchdown performance would be his ninth of the season, tying for the most multi-touchdown games by a rookie in history.
- Needs three touchdowns to total 28 on the season, which would be the most by a rookie quarterback in NFL history.
  - The three touchdowns would mark his sixth three-touchdown game of the season, joining Dan Fouts and Philip Rivers as the only player in team history to have six or more such performances in a season.
- Needs one rushing touchdown to reach four on the year, tying for the most in a single season by a Chargers quarterback.

**Gruden** also served as an Offensive Assistant for the Green Bay Packers from 1992-94, prior to his first head coaching stint. **Gruden** assisted an offensive unit for the Packers whose starting C through 1993 was current Chargers **OL Coach James Campen**.

Chargers **WR Coach Phil McGeoghan** prepped coached **WR Zay Jones** in Jones' final season at East Carolina in 2016. **Jones** was then selected by the Buffalo Bills in the second round of the 2017 NFL Draft, where he was then tutored again by McGeoghan.

Chargers **Asst. DL Coach La'Roi Glover** appeared in two games as a DT for the Raiders in 1996. In 2015, **Alex G. Spanos Coaching Fellow Tevin McDonald** logged four game appearances in the Raiders' secondary.

Telesko has acquired 10 players since 2013 to win AFC Player of the Week recognition and one to win AFC Player of the Month. **Joey Bosa** twice earned NFL Defensive Rookie of the Month in 2016 (October and December) en route to winning consensus Defensive Rookie of the Year honors.

This season, **Casey Hayward Jr.** kicked off the year by winning AFC Defensive Player of the Week for his Week 1 performance at Cincinnati — 12 solo tackles and two passes defended, becoming the first NFL defensive back since at least 2000 to have more than 10 solo tackles and multiple breakups on Kickoff Weekend.

**Justin Herbert** was named the NFL Offensive Rookie of the Month for October and November, tossing 10-plus touchdowns in both months. He posting a 122.2 passer rating in October — the best by a rookie in the month in NFL history (min. 50 attempts).

## A NOVEMBER TO REMEMBER



Justin Herbert continued his historic rookie campaign with a November to remember, setting rookie records for the month with 11 passing touchdowns, 1,473 passing yards and three performances of 300-plus yards.

The Oregon product completed three passes for 50-plus yards while also throwing six of his touchdowns on third down — both of which led all AFC quarterbacks over the month.

Herbert's two NFL Offensive Rookie of the Month awards made him the first quarterback to win the accolade multiple times in a season since Robert Griffin III in 2012. He also became the first passer to do so in consecutive months since 2010 when Sam Bradford won in October and November. Both Griffin and Bradford went on to win Offensive Rookie of the Year honors from *The Associated Press* in each of their respective seasons.

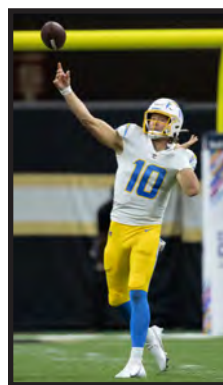

Allen now ranks No. 2 in team annals behind tight end **Antonio Gates** with 605 career receptions. Four of the top six pass catchers in team annals are in the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Gates, the NFL-record holder for most touchdown catches by a tight end, will be eligible for enshrinement in 2023.

But his sportsmanship goes beyond the Chargers locker room. Postgame, Bosa can be found working with players from other teams, helping them with moves or answering questions they may have.

"It's great," Bosa said. "A lot of times, I'll get younger players after the games coming over to me. I talked to Isaac (Rochell) and guys like Jerry (Tillery) all the time that it's still very surreal to me that people look up to me for advice ... It means a lot to me any time an o-lineman even, or a young guy on another team wants to come up to me after a game and ask questions. That's just what I try to do. I try to make it more personal and work one-on-one with guys to help them as much as I can."

Created in 2014 in honor of the late founding owner of the Pittsburgh Steelers and Pro Football Hall of Famer Art Rooney Sr., the award is presented each year to an NFL player who best demonstrates the qualities of on-field sportsmanship, including fair play, respect for the game and opponents, and integrity in competition.

## WALTER PAYTON MAN OF THE YEAR NOMINEE



Isaac Rochell is the Los Angeles Chargers' nominee for the 2020 Walter Payton Man of the Year Award. Presented by Nationwide, the award recognizes a player's excellence both on and off the field.

"I have these goals while I'm in the NFL, 1A and 1B," Rochell said. "1A is to be here and have a great career, and 1B is definitely making a massive impact in the community. Because of the way that I was raised and the kind hearts that both my parents have and my family has, I learned to have that same type of compassion for people. I'm just so thankful for it."

"We are very proud of what Isaac has accomplished in his four years in the NFL, both on and off the field," said John Spanos, Chargers president of football operations. "While remaining completely dedicated to his craft as a player along the defensive line, and having played in every single game since the start of the 2018 season, he's also remained dedicated to making a positive impact in the community."

"From his 'See You on Sunday' campaign, to all the great charitable work his company, Local Human, has been a part of, it is clear Isaac is making a difference. We know this is just the beginning for Isaac, not only as a player but as a philanthropist as well. This is why we are so excited and proud to be able to recognize Isaac Rochell as our 2020 Los Angeles Chargers Walter Payton Man of the Year."



Rochell earned the team's nomination for his dedication to supporting the Chargers' community efforts as well as philanthropic work he does on his own.

He's participated in team events like Bikes for Kids and has visited veterans in the VA hospital while also representing the initials of a fallen hero from the nonprofit organization TAPS (Tragedy Assistance Program For Survivors) during Salute to Service month in November. Rochell has also participated in My Cause My Cleats each year with the team.

But in a year like 2020, he took serving the community to new heights. Whether it was providing \$5,000 worth of groceries for roughly 45 families before Thanksgiving, funding meals to those affected by the COVID-19 pandemic, taking it upon himself to sponsor wishes through local Make-A-Wish chapters, or rallying his teammates to support the continual call for social justice, Rochell led the charge to do work that goes beyond the stat line.

### RECORD-SETTING RECEIVING SCORES

A pair of Chargers made their NFL debuts at Tampa Bay and each caught a touchdown on their first career reception. Wide receiver **Tyron Johnson** hauled in a 53-yard score in the first quarter. It marked the longest-ever receiving score by a Charger in an NFL debut. A quarter later, tight end **Donald Parham Jr.** registered a 19-yard score to cap off a 97-yard drive.

The two became the third pair of teammates in the last 40 seasons to post receiving scores on their first career catch in the same game — and the only set of undrafted teammates to do so over that span.

Three weeks later vs. Jacksonville, **Parham** registered the second catch of his career on a 22-yard score — becoming the first Charger to have touchdowns on each of the first two catches of a career since wide receiver John Jefferson in 1978.

With a pair of stellar seasons in a row **Tyrod Taylor** was just the sixth quarterback in NFL history with back-to-back seasons of 3,000 passing yards and 500 rushing yards.

## 2020 Salute to Service Nominee: James Collins

One season later, he was elevated to assistant athletic trainer.

After stints with the Denver Broncos and Philadelphia Eagles, Collins rejoined the Chargers organization in 1999.

## For Chargers, Jacob Blake shooting hits hard: 'Just looking for accountability'

The Chargers traveled to SoFi Stadium on Thursday to play a scrimmage intended to be a step toward their improvement as a team.

Coach Anthony Lynn said that goal was achieved, even though his players didn't snap the football once.

After a late-morning team meeting centered on the recent shooting of Jacob Blake, Lynn decided to cancel the scrimmage.

"I just felt like this wasn't the time to practice," he said. "I feel like we got a lot more done in that locker room than we ever could have gotten done on the football field."

The Chargers were just one of the teams around the NFL to call off practice Thursday in the wake of the incident involving Blake, who was shot seven times in the back by police on Sunday in Kenosha, Wis.

The shooting led to several sporting events being postponed Wednesday, including games in the NBA, WNBA and MLS.

"This football team is committed to fighting for a championship and social justice."

The Chargers met on a Zoom call Wednesday night to discuss the situation and initially decided to move forward with their planned scrimmage.

That all changed after the players arrived at SoFi Stadium and continued their discussions in the locker room.

It was the first time in training camp that the entire team — offense and defense — was gathered together in one place somewhere other than on the field.

"There were so many different conversations going on that we didn't want to take that to the field," quarterback Tyrod Taylor said. "We wanted to hash it out in the locker room and move forward."

Asked specifically how the meeting Thursday was different than previous ones, Taylor explained that it was a much more real discussion.

"It was different ..." he said. "As far as deep conversations in the locker room, this was probably the first one I've had in years. There was more emotion in this one."

The Chargers were in an ideal situation to voice their concerns since the NFL Network was on-site to preview the scrimmage. Several players were able to speak on national television about a topic dominating the sports world.

"As a team, I feel like we're all just looking for accountability from everyone," defensive tackle Justin Jones said. "We're not looking for you to exactly understand how we're feeling. More so, just to see wrong from right."

The team meeting Thursday featured what Lynn called "an open floor," meaning anyone who wanted to speak was permitted to do so.

A few veterans admitted that not scrimmaging could hurt some of the younger players attempting to make the team, particularly with no preseason games being played because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

But the trade-off, they explained, was necessary because of the importance of this social justice movement.

"There's something to be gained from going out on the field and practicing our craft," defensive lineman Jerry Tillery said on the NFL Network. "But there's nothing more important than this right now."

Lynn made the cancellation announcement on TV while encircled by his players in the corner of one end zone.

"You look at the emotions of our players, our coaches and our support staff," said general manager Tom Telesco, who was among the Chargers wearing sweatshirts that read "Be The Change." "It ranges from anger to just utter frustration. It's powerful and painful at the same time."

As his players began departing SoFi Stadium, Lynn met via videoconference with local reporters.

He spoke with passion about everything that had transpired in the sports world since Wednesday afternoon, when the NBA players in Orlando, Fla., began deciding they would not continue playing.

"We've been fighting this fight and to see something happen like what happened in Wisconsin, it's almost like a slap in the face," Lynn said. "But that's the peaks and valleys that we talk about when you stand for something."

Lynn said he believed the Chargers meeting Thursday was a needed opportunity for his players to share their feelings.

He also voiced his own frustrations about the recent repeated instances of social injustice.

"We just see the ones that are on video," Lynn said. "How many times is this really happening? This police brutality ... there's got to be some reform somewhere. We've got to get a grip on this."

Later, he added: "Overall, I feel good about the movement. But we had a setback. What happened in Wisconsin, it was ridiculous. And to see that white boy walking down the street with a machine gun and nobody does nothing. If that's a Black man, that's a dead Black man, and we all know that. It's blatant. We're going to continue this fight."

# Chargers cancel scrimmage, demand change after 'intense' team meeting

INGLEWOOD, Calif. — Someday, SoFi Stadium will become what it was always meant to be: the NFL's crown jewel, a beacon of fun and entertainment for Los Angeles, a beautiful and awe-inspiring place to play football games, host fans and serve hot dogs and beer.

Someday. But not this day. Not Thursday, Aug. 27, 2020.

Because on this day, SoFi Stadium represented something far more profound — empowerment, frustration, grief, growth, exasperation, raw and unfiltered emotion. It was the meeting place for an unequivocal demand for change.

It was 10 minutes before noon, and the stadium was nearly entirely empty, aside from a couple Chargers players roaming the field. They were supposed to have a scrimmage on that field, starting at 1 p.m. But something more important transpired. There would be no football, and it would be replaced by a unified call for equity and justice.

"Rise Up" by Andra Day blared over the stadium speakers.

And I'll rise up  
I'll rise like the day  
I'll rise up  
I'll rise unafraid  
I'll rise up  
And I'll do it a thousand times again

A quote was plastered in white letters on a black background on The Oculus video board hovering above the field: "I'm not sad. I don't want your pity. I want change."

Those words were spoken two days ago by Letetra Widman, the sister of Jacob Blake, the Black man who was shot seven times in the back by a White police officer on Sunday in Kenosha, Wis. Blake reportedly is now paralyzed.

Blake has been on the minds of Chargers players and coaches all week. So have other Black and Brown people who have died at the hands of police in America, including Philando Castile, Eric Garner, Alonzo Smith and others. Their names appeared on the lower-bowl video board, and they rotated because there were too many to list all at once.

At noon, the Chargers posted a video on Twitter with the hashtag #WeDemandChange. Meanwhile, head coach Anthony Lynn put on a headset while standing behind one of the end zones and began an interview with the NFL Network. His players formed a semicircle behind him.

"We're not going to scrimmage today," Lynn said. "We're going to do something different."

Over the next hour, various players on the roster, Black and White, shared their thoughts on live television — quarterback Tyrod Taylor; defensive linemen Damion Square, Jerry Tillery, Justin Jones and Isaac Rochell; punter Ty Long; and kicker Michael Badgley.

How did the Chargers get here?

Really, it has been a lifetime in the making for each Black member of the Chargers organization, from 62-year-old special teams coach George Stewart to 21-year-old rookie linebacker Kenneth Murray.

"Several things over my childhood happened to me, and it did not feel good," Lynn said of his experiences with racism. "And sometimes it made me feel less than a human."

The specific internal conversations about what the Chargers would do Thursday began late Wednesday afternoon, when news broke that NBA players, in the middle of the league's playoffs, were walking out in response to the Blake shooting.

Lynn saw the news and met with Chargers general manager Tom Telesco to discuss next steps. At that point, the Chargers were still planning on holding Thursday's scrimmage, which, for players fighting for a roster spot, would be essential for their NFL dreams. With no exhibition games, it would be as close to live football as the Chargers were going to get before cutdown day.

The situation developed rapidly over the ensuing hours. Multiple MLB games were postponed Wednesday night, including the Dodgers-Giants game, as players walked out in response to the Blake shooting.

By early Thursday morning, canceling the scrimmage was an option. Lynn knew this as he drove to SoFi Stadium. He felt the swell of outrage among his players after a team Zoom meeting Wednesday night.

"To see something happen like what happened in Wisconsin, it's almost like a slap in the face," Lynn said Thursday.

Taylor said Lynn allowed the players to sleep on their frustrations. When Taylor arrived at the stadium, the emotion was still palpable.

"There were a bunch of conversations going on throughout the locker room," Taylor said. "I talked to guys last night and, of course, this morning when I got to the locker room. And I think that there were so many different conversations going on, we didn't want to take that to the field. If anything, we needed to hash it (out) in the locker room and move forward, if we were going to take the field, and not let that linger onto the field."

"Coach (Lynn) got a wind of the different conversations that were going on in the locker room and felt that it was best that we have that conversation in front of everyone before we hit the field, just to get everyone to talk through their emotions and what was going on."

Lynn called a team meeting at 11:30 a.m., half an hour before the Chargers were supposed to take the field for warmups. He said it was an "open floor." Players and coaches of all races spoke, told stories, opened up and voiced frustrations, including Stewart, who Lynn said is a "father figure" to the players.

Rochell said at one point an assistant coach was crying.

"It was pretty emotional, intense, venting. It was everything," Lynn said. "I just felt like it was a team. We supported one another in there. We were definitely a team. And the White players did an outstanding job of listening, and some even spoke up. I love what they had to say."

"Some of it was uncomfortable for a lot of people," Taylor said. "But it was necessary."

Taylor added that this conversation "was different" than the others he has had about race since joining the Chargers in 2019. He also said this was as deep, moving and productive of a conversation on race as he's had "in years, on any team."

"It was more emotion in this one," said Taylor, who's in his 10th year in the NFL. "It's different age groups throughout the locker room. You have coaches that are older, you have players who are veterans, you have young guys and I think every age group got up and spoke. We all agreed that enough is enough and that we're tired of talking about the same things. But unfortunately, that's our reality. And whether we're tired or not, we have to do whatever it takes to help change that narrative. And that's what our focus is on now."

"The conversation was a great one. But the focus now is 'What can we do to help change?'"

Lynn decided to cancel the scrimmage after the meeting. "As the head coach, I have to have a feel for the football team. And my instincts told me not to take that field today," he said.

The locker-room meeting was the first time the 2020 Chargers were allowed to be together as a full team in one place, as the offense and defense have been divided during training camp — when not on the practice field — due to COVID-19 protocols.

"Sometimes people just need to be heard," Lynn said.

And they were heard, not just in the locker room among themselves but also on national television. The Chargers' message was a simple one: Now is the time for everyone everywhere to acknowledge the problem of systemic racism in this country. Lack of knowledge on the issues is no longer acceptable.

"We need to discuss this," Rochell said, "and we can't move forward until we do."

This was Rochell's first trip to SoFi Stadium. He waited all three of his NFL seasons for the building to open. In an alternate universe, on a different timeline, he would remember this first trip for the Chargers' preseason opener against the Cowboys. Maybe he would have sacked Dallas backup Andy Dalton and celebrated with his teammates.

But now, he will remember it for an entirely different reason.

"For the rest of my life, I'll think back to the first time I came here," Rochell said. "We were discussing social injustices in our country."

# Fed up Chargers demand changes in emotional first trip to SoFi Stadium

INGLEWOOD — Chargers coach Anthony Lynn drove to SoFi Stadium on Thursday undecided if his players were going to practice for the first time at their new home.

His mind was heavy with thoughts surrounding the protests that ensued in Kenosha, Wisconsin, after a police officer shot and paralyzed Jacob Blake, a Black man, on Sunday.

"Sometimes it just seems like it's not getting better," Lynn said about racial injustice and police brutality in the United States, "like it might be getting worse."

Lynn had final say, but he wanted to hear from his players before deciding whether to have an intrasquad scrimmage. There was no cliché-filled speech about making the most of their opportunities on the football field when Lynn gathered his players in their SoFi Stadium locker room.

The leader of the franchise wanted raw emotion at a close distance without logging into Zoom. He wanted his players to pour their hearts in a welcoming environment without judgment. Eighty players and coaches from different backgrounds and age groups took the invitation.

One assistant coach cried, and special teams coordinator George Stewart delivered "inspiring" words.

Running back Justin Jackson saw it as a different opportunity than earning playing time. The Chargers had one hour of airtime reserved on NFL Network to preview their Blue and White scrimmage and first visit to the 70,000-seat venue.

"How can we pass up that opportunity," defensive end Isaac Rochell recalled Jackson saying in the locker room.

Lynn's decision was made after the emotional open forum. He walked out the tunnel and faced the NFL Network camera with his players standing behind him in support.

"We're not going to scrimmage today," Lynn said. "I thought what we did in the locker room in the last hour was 10 times more powerful (than) what we could have done on the football field today."

A social-justice town hall filled the 60 minutes on the league-owned channel. Players spoke in pairs to raise awareness, encourage actions and to register to vote, as the massive oculus video board hung over their heads with the words "I'm not sad. I don't want your pity. I want change," a quote from Letetra Widman, Blake's sister.

Defensive tackles Justin Jones and Jerry Tillery spoke together. Jones wanted police officers to be held accountable, and Tillery said there's nothing more important than this right now.

Football and training camp took a backseat Thursday and likely for days to come. The Chargers demanded change and justice. Enough is enough.

Quarterback Tyrod Taylor is tired of adding more names to the lengthy list of Black people who have died or suffered from police brutality, but he continued to say their names Thursday, like Breonna Taylor, George Floyd, Ahmaud Arbery and Elijah McClain.

"People are just tired," Lynn said. "People are fed up and people want change. I felt these young men needed to talk. Needed to get that off their chest. ... Even though we're frustrated as hell, sick and tired of being sick and tired, we're gonna keep fighting."

Jackson has often used his Twitter account to point to the lack of resources minority communities have compared to white neighborhoods. He pushed for that to change during his interview on NFL Network.

"You're just punishing poverty year after year," Jackson said.

Lynn was asked what can be done to create change, but Thursday was about speaking from the heart to let his players and many watching know that they're not alone with the pain they carry from seeing another needless incident unfold on social media.

"Sometimes I wonder, we just see the ones that are on video, how many times is this really happening?" Lynn asked. "This police brutality ... there's got to be some reform somewhere and we gotta get a grip on this."

Lynn said he's about actions and he's proven that by opening a school in Tanzania, joining protests and inviting city leaders to speak with his team. But he's far from done and wants help from White people.

Lynn has the support of general manager Tom Telesco, who encouraged his players to be the change and stand up for social justice, and team owner Dean Spanos, who had a conversation Thursday with Rochell on how to create change.

"We, the Black and Brown community, we need the help of good White people, no doubt about it," Lynn said.

Lynn was also brutally honest because that might be the best way to get people's attention.

"Overall, I feel good about the (Black Lives Matter) movement," Lynn said. "We had a setback. What happened in Wisconsin was ridiculous. To see that a White boy walking down the street with a machine gun and nobody does nothing. If that's a Black man, that's a dead Black man and we all know that."

Lynn is pleased to see the NFL as a whole having discussions about creating change, the opposite of what occurred four years ago when quarterback Colin Kaepernick first took a knee. But the fight for change is far from over.

Lynn felt helpless seeing his players hurt, but he gained plenty of hope from the open dialogue.

"There's no quit," Lynn said. "If anything, we're gonna double down."

The Chargers got plenty accomplished for their first trip to SoFi Stadium, a lot more than just seeing where the parking lot and locker rooms are located.

"This is the first time I've even been to this stadium," Rochell said. "For the rest of my life, I'll think back to the first time that I came here, we were discussing social injustices in our country."

### SoFi Stadium videoboard: 'Eighth wonder of the world' targets GenZ

INGLEWOOD, Calif. -- It stretches 120 yards, weighs 2.2 million pounds, contains 70,000 square feet of digital LED and houses 268 speakers, a technological marvel befitting its transformative carrier. But the most impressive number attached to the oval, dual-sided videoboard inside SoFi Stadium might be this one:

Eighty.

Under normal circumstances -- when the coronavirus pandemic is over and 70,000 football fans begin to fill the place -- that's the amount of people the Los Angeles Rams and the Los Angeles Chargers will each utilize to create content for their videoboard on game day, a total made up of producers, directors, camera operators and others throughout the control room. Rams and Chargers staff members have spent this entire year planning the operation of that videoboard, a job with no blueprint. The task morphed into the equivalent of creating a six-hour show in multiple ways, every second of it scripted in remarkable detail.

With no fans in attendance, the Chargers will mostly operate the board for the team and the broadcast, playing up the graphics so they resonate on television while also splicing in videos of the players' families. The fan-related aspects will be worked in slowly. The Rams, who debuted the board in front of a national television audience Sunday night, planned to operate it like normal from the onset, which meant incorporating Next Gen Stats, displaying a drive chart on the end zone portions of the inner rim and utilizing three levels of touchdown graphics to account for the situation.

SoFi Stadium, which came with a price tag in the neighborhood of \$5 billion, is as majestic as it is revolutionary. The indoor-outdoor dynamic is unprecedented, helped by a translucent roof, exposed sides and an expansive plaza. The pronounced curves that make up the infrastructure pay homage to the Pacific Ocean's coastline; the landscape throughout is representative of California's indigenous trees. But the hallmark is the videoboard, one SoFi Stadium's chief technology officer, Skarpi Hedinsson, expects to become "the eighth wonder of the sports world."

It is excessive yet necessary.

#### Evolution of the videoboard

The current videoboard did not make its way onto initial renderings for SoFi Stadium. HKS, the architectural firm that has built some of sports' most innovative venues in recent years, captured the design elements rather quickly but went traditional with the entertainment, displaying smaller screens on each of the stadium's four corners. Rams owner Stan Kroenke, who famously vowed to make professional football work in a market that had long baffled the NFL, kept pushing. He didn't want to undershoot Los Angeles, he'd say, and so he demanded a videoboard appropriate for the world's entertainment capital.

"There was a lot of discussion in how you bring the videoboard experience not only to life," Rams COO Kevin Demoff said, "but to push the envelope in the same way everything else in this building had."

The NFL's videoboard craze began, in many ways, with Jerry Jones' Dallas Cowboys, who in September 2009 unveiled a four-sided, center-hung screen that spanned 160 feet and, at the time, stood as the world's largest high-definition video display. Four years later, the Houston Texans displayed two end zone videoboards each 277 feet wide, larger than the wingspan of a 747 jet. The following year it was the Jacksonville Jaguars, showing off two videoboards spanning 362 feet each.

Two years later, in August 2017, the Atlanta Falcons birthed the antecedent of SoFi Stadium's design with the "Halo Board" -- a 360-degree, 63,000-square-foot videoboard that encircled the rooftop opening of Mercedes-Benz Stadium.

Pete Soto, now the Chargers' vice president of fan experience and production, oversaw game presentation, live events and stadium production for the Falcons, Atlanta United and Mercedes-Benz Stadium at the time. Before that, he was with the Florida Marlins and the Florida Panthers in the 1990s, when videoboards exploded as a vessel for sponsorship and fan experience. He watched Sony's JumboTron and Mitsubishi's Diamond Vision pave the way for Daktronics, the company that designed videoboards for the Jaguars and Falcons, then saw Samsung take it to another level.

When the Halo Board went up in Atlanta, Soto wondered what would come next and knew the answer would come quickly.

"It was the first of its kind, the most unique videoboard of its time," Soto said. "And then here at SoFi Stadium, we've created one that's even more intriguing, more complex, and the amount of impact it's gonna have on the fan experience is hard to quantify because it's such a unique environment, it's such a unique offering and presentation."

Kroenke and his people were awed by the way the Cowboys' video display encompassed most of the playing field, but they wanted to account for those in the lower seats who could only see the screen by looking straight up. The Halo Board was already under construction during the initial planning stages, prompting what only seems like a logical question in hindsight:

Why not take the ovalar concept but make it dual-sided, suspend it from the roof and hang it low enough so that a massive video screen basically sits within optimal viewing distance of the entire seating bowl?

"That convergence of ideas really came from Stan's challenge of, 'This has to be the best technological experience,'" Demoff said. "From there it became, 'How do you make sure that the technology is so good that it's not just big, but that it's truly dynamic and better quality than you can get in your house?'"

### Appealing to a younger audience

SoFi Stadium isn't just a football venue; it's the anchor to a mixed-use development the way big-box stores were used to attract customers to shopping malls. The entire site is 298 acres. Eventually there will be a 6,000-seat performance venue attached to the stadium and a 200,000-square-foot space for NFL Media nearby. Soon after that, there will be 3,000 residences, 25 acres of public parks, and 1.5 million square feet dedicated to retail and office space.

Football will be the main attraction but far from the only one, a reminder of the constant need to diversify in this era.

The NFL experienced only a 0.6% decline in attendance from 2010 to 2019, nowhere near the 6.2% drop-off experienced by Major League Baseball over that same stretch. But viewership is skewing older, and attracting young fans to live sporting events is a growing challenge that some fear might eventually threaten professional football's viability as a revenue-generating behemoth. The reason is obvious: Technology is better, attention spans are shorter, sensibilities are different, and so it has become increasingly more difficult for teams to beat the advantages and comforts of in-home viewing.

Imagen, a video-management service that also provides customers with distribution strategies, published a study in November 2019 that revealed vastly different consumption habits among different age groups. Imagen surveyed 1,866 American and Canadian fans of the NFL, NBA, MLB, NHL and MLS divided evenly among four age groups (Baby Boomers, GenX, Millennials and GenZ). The company found two key trends among the two younger demographics, particularly GenZ: they're more willing to consume non-game content and, if watching sports, more prone to split their attention between dual screens.

"The game used to be everything," Imagen director of business development Nick Ashwin said. "Now it's very much just a part of it."

Under normal circumstances, the videoboard will act as the equivalent of a sports bar in the hours before kickoff, displaying all of the East coast games so that fans can keep up with their fantasy teams in a way most of them would not be able to at home. The building is outfitted with Wi-Fi 6, providing incomparable Internet speeds. And because SoFi Stadium will possess nearly 60 cameras, including two SkyCams and 12 pylon cams, fans in attendance will have access to angles that are typically reserved for prime-time television games.

The hope in all of this is to not only keep bringing fans through the door, but to keep them off of their smartphones while they're inside -- and locked in on that shiny new videoboard.

"It's taking advantage of those different technologies, those different ways of engaging audiences, and supplementing what's going on on the field, that will continue to get people to go there," Ashwin said.

"I'm a little bit old school. I kind of miss the terraces and the stadium that kind of rocks with the sound of singing and all that. But that's just not the experience that the GenZ and the younger fans are looking for. They're looking for a very technology-supplemented on-field experience. They want to be able to look at live stats on their phone, connect to WiFi and draw in all kinds of different bits of information and supplement what's going on. It's a completely different ballgame -- excuse the pun."

### How it works

Hedinsson is a Formula One fan who summons one of the sport's edicts to describe the realities of operating this new videoboard -- there's no way to train for it; you just have to go in there and do it.

Hedinsson has spent most of his professional life in digital technology, which helped him navigate a 3.1-million-square-foot stadium that is entirely digital. A decade ago, he built ABC and Disney applications for the iPad before the device was released, an experience he applied to the task of planning content for an unprecedented board that remained under construction. Nothing, however, could truly prepare him for an undertaking of this magnitude.

"There are certain things that you can do in simulation and so on and so forth that allow you to prepare for that," Hedinsson said of the content-planning stages for the videoboard, "but it's a certain mindset that you have to have."

The videoboard consists of 69,000 LED cards organized into 1,338 cabinets, all of which were built out of a fabrication facility in Logan, Utah. It contains 80 million LED pixels that can be controlled individually by 36 rendering computers, allowing a single animation to seamlessly occupy the entire board. The XPression Tessera system, a graphics machine from Ross Video that was first utilized at Mercedes-Benz Stadium, stretches the video for the board, which is separated into eight primary sections.

Most of the content planning was done through a virtual-reality system while the board was built, a major advantage that was not available in Atlanta. Before the start of training camp, the Rams and Chargers were each meeting weekly with SoFi Stadium staff members to discuss content and best practices. The first step, for both teams, was establishing where the ad space would go. Next was building out templates (for pregame, introductions, game in progress, instant replay, touchdowns, etc). Then came the process of dressing them up and ironing out the details.

"Like I tell my staff -- your imagination is your limitation on this," Soto said. "You can do anything you want. If you can dream it, you can make it happen. It's just a matter of figuring out how to make it happen."

And therein lie the difficulties.

In Atlanta, the circular board is one-sided and uniform. In L.A., the videoboard panels are four stories tall around midfield and half that size in both end zones. Because of the speakers, the video display on the outer rim is smaller than that of the inner rim. Visually, the outer rim goes away from the viewer, which tends to distort the image. Planning content for the board required constant changes in perspective.

"It's like in Atlanta in a lot of ways operationally," Hedinsson said, "but it's completely its own thing and it's completely a new world here in Los Angeles."

### The COVID-19 curveball

Demoff has spent the past half-decade immersed in the build-up to SoFi Stadium's grand opening, serving as the principal point person tasked with delivering on Kroenke's grand ambition. As the process endured, Demoff envisioned practically every scenario -- except for a global pandemic that would cripple the economy, halt American business and prevent people from gathering en masse. The Rams now own arguably the most impressive, cutting-edge live venue in the history of civilization, but only a select few can actually experience it.

"Part of you is so amazed and so proud," Demoff said of completing such a complex project in this environment, "and part of you is truly pissed. I've managed, for the most part, to block it out, but it's just a bummer."

The Rams and Chargers announced on Aug. 25 that fans would not be allowed at SoFi Stadium "until further notice." Three months earlier, during an interview with ESPN, Demoff was already bracing for that possibility. He maintained faint hope for an unforeseen stroke of luck but began to view 2021 as the true grand opening and started to believe that hosting fans in a limited capacity before then would be impractical, unfair and, given the ways it might dampen the overall experience, counterintuitive.

Eventually stadiums will open at full capacity, of course. But identifying what that might look like, and how customer sensibilities might change by then, is an uncertainty that befuddles the live entertainment industry. Just thinking about all the mundane, everyday tasks that might be altered over COVID-19 concerns can be an exhaustive exercise.



Are buffets, a hallmark of prime seating, suddenly extinct? What about fountain drinks and beers on tap? Or paper tickets? Does everything involve contactless payment moving forward? Are grab-and-go meals more prominent? What about -- Demoff's suggestion - something as simple as spreading mustard on a hot dog?

"Stadiums are going to learn just as much from other hospitality venues -- restaurants, hotels, casinos, resorts -- as much as we are going to learn from other stadiums," Demoff said.

Terry Lefton, a reporter for Sports Business Daily who has spent a long time covering sports marketing, imagines companies like Clorox and Lysol emerging as prominent sponsors. Cleanliness will be of utmost importance when stadiums return to full capacity; safety must encompass the overriding theme. Lefton alluded to the congestion of stadium entry, already a problem because of tailgates that habitually run too close to kickoff, and how the process might get bogged down further with temperature checks.

Then there's that whole thing about disposable income amid the worst economic crisis since the Great Depression and how that might impact season-ticket sales in a market like, say, Los Angeles, which has grown so accustomed to Sundays without live football and might not be willing to allocate money for, you know, a really expensive stadium.

Adaptation will be crucial; unique, exclusive offerings will be more important than ever.

"All venues are gonna have to evolve to meet changing consumer expectation and demand," Demoff said. "Usually with great upheaval comes great opportunity, and we just have to view it as that."

## How SoFi Stadium makes a revolutionary design promise: A place for all to play

In less than two weeks, if the NFL moves forward as planned, SoFi Stadium will open in Inglewood after more than five years of design and construction.

Finally, the Rams will no longer have to play in the sun-baked L.A. Coliseum. Finally, the Chargers will no longer have to be squatters in the tiny Dignity Health Sports Park (formerly the StubHub Center and the Home Depot Center). Finally, owner Stan Kroenke will see his dream of a \$2 billion (well, make that more than \$5 billion now) sports and entertainment park begin to come true.

But here's the more important news: From a design and urban planning standpoint, SoFi is, potentially, revolutionary.

That's because, in many ways, this stadium is not really a stadium. It's not a solid concrete and steel bowl where fans park cars and push their way in and out eight times a year. And it's not a themed shopping mall and mini amusement park grafted onto a sports facility.

SoFi Stadium is a porous, indoor-outdoor, year-round complex featuring, yes, a 70,000-seat stadium and lots of parking, but also a 2.5-acre public plaza, an adjacent 6,000-seat performance space and a layered landscape filled with hills, trees, places to pause and sit and eat — all connected to a vibrant 25-acre community park surrounding a 5.5-acre lake.

SoFi Stadium's landscape design includes an arroyo and a Mediterranean biome plant palette. (Studio-MLA) The 300-acre complex, to be called Hollywood Park, is slated to phase in over many years more than 1.5 million square feet of retail, restaurant and office space (including the almost-complete NFL Network headquarters and studios), at least 2,500 townhomes and apartments and a hotel.

The idea of a stadium as the focal point for a mixed-use project is not new. So-called sports-anchored developments are becoming the norm nationwide, from Patriot Place in New England to the Arlington Entertainment District in Texas. But more than any of those developments (including downtown Los Angeles' L.A. Live), this complex — its stadium's façade curving like the sweep of the coast — is authentically inspired by, and caters to, its setting.

"We were trying to create an expression of Southern California," said Lance Evans, principal with HKS Architects. "Something that would resonate with this climate and with this place."

This is something that only Dodger Stadium — embedded into the earth, obsessed with the future and surrounded by palm trees, the landscapes of Elysian Park and, alas, a heroically scaled parking lot — has managed to accomplish in terms of local sports venues.

Workers have been putting the finishing touches on SoFi despite the risk of COVID-19 infection (more than 50 have tested positive) and two deaths on the site, including one caused by a fall from the roof.

Citing the pandemic, the Rams, Chargers and SoFi jointly announced Aug. 25 that games will be played without fans "until further notice." Once fans are allowed to come, they will approach a stadium whose field level is embedded 100 feet into the earth, reducing the building's bulk as seen from the rest of the neighborhood and making a trip inside reminiscent of a trek down bluffs to a beach in, say, Malibu. Along the way they will proceed via a fractured landscape of textured pathways, gardens, patios and food stalls, descending through what the project's landscape architect, Studio-MLA, calls "canyons" — terraced trails filled with earthen mounds and plants and trees from around California, weaving in and out of the stadium.

"It's all about how the stadium is part of the landscape and the landscape is part of the stadium," said Studio-MLA founder Mia Lehrer, who has designed green spaces for Dodger Stadium and for Banc of California Stadium in Exposition Park. She also is imagining the surroundings for the forthcoming Lucas Museum of Narrative Art.

In classic SoCal fashion, the stadium, its edges open to the outdoors along the sides, blurs the line between interior and exterior, inviting visitors, and views, inside. It pulls in ocean breezes through its aerodynamic shape, its permeable flanks, the lifting of its seating bowl above the ground-level concourse and massive (60 feet by 60 feet) adjustable openings in its roof that can slide like sunroofs on cars. These openings can "tune" the wind flow, according to HKS, which designed recent stadiums for the Minnesota Vikings, Indianapolis Colts and Dallas Cowboys.

The roof, which covers and unifies the stadium bowl, plaza and adjacent arena, is clad in ethylene tetrafluoroethylene, or ETFE, a tough, translucent plastic that, thanks to its dotted frit pattern, shades fans from about half of the sun's heat. (If you've roasted at the Coliseum or at Dodger Stadium, you will appreciate that.) The ETFE also will allow concerts, community gatherings, e-sports, the Super Bowl and the Olympics to carry on in the rare case of rain.

One bummer: The roof's tempering of the sun means that the field had to be made of artificial turf, although such surfaces have progressed light-years since the days of AstroTurf.

The seating bowl itself is not revolutionary, but its proximity to the field is as close as the NFL will allow — a good thing for fans. A massive, oval-shaped screen hangs from steel rafters, projecting images on both sides, which makes it readable from a wider range of sightlines and seat locations. It weighs more than 1,000 tons and traces the circumference of the field level, making SoFi the new champion of the NFL's Jumbotron wars.

The stadium sits under a major LAX flight path, and as seen from above that roof bears an uncanny resemblance to the Rams former shield-shaped logo. (Attempts to confirm this connection were rebuffed by both the designers and the developers, perhaps to protect the Chargers' feelings?) But where the roof bends down, meeting the ground at a few distinct points, you can see its lightweight aluminum façade panels, consisting of thousands of unique triangles, perforated with millions of holes to admit breezes and create intricate dappled light patterns.

Connected to the stadium via textured pathways and a grove of palm trees is Lake Park, the other focal point of the development. The park has the potential to be a profound amenity for Inglewood.

An artificial lake — which collects water runoff from around the complex — was inspired by the lake at Hollywood Park Racetrack, which used to stand on the site. It's surrounded by a mix of flora that's even more robust than what is along the stadium's edge, including some plants that are quite exotic. Lehrer calls them Dr. Seuss plants, including the strangely fractured monkey puzzle tree and the jug-shaped bootle tree. All are part of the Mediterranean biome, an effort by Studio-MLA to connect Southern California to similar environments worldwide, including the Mediterranean region, the Cape of Africa and Chile.

Visitors can experience, among other things, long allées of trees edging the water, undulating arroyos, seats built into angled planters, impressive views across the lake to the stadium and a deck projecting over the water.

The park, and much of the stadium's periphery, will be open to the public every day, not just on game days, making the landscape part of the neighborhood. The complex's ability to host almost any type of event should help energize the site most of the year. It has the potential to become a real civic place, not just a sports-fueled fan zone. But just how civic is up to Kroenke and his team.

Despite many positive signs, much of the 300-acre site remains a question mark. The landscaping, as fantastic as it seems, is so young it's hard to tell just how effective it will be. And it's still unclear how much of the immediate stadium area will remain open when events aren't taking place. Parking lots dominate the site's future development areas, and because of the incredibly uncertain economy, there's no guarantee that all of these elements ever will come. (Nor is it a sure thing that this development, if it does come, will be welcoming.)

Football is a sure thing, and the Super Bowl and the College Football National Championship seem likely, as do the Olympics. But many other events — like those catering to the local community — are a long way from being programmed. How will the place interact with the neighborhood around it, including the Forum to the north and a planned complex for the Clippers to the south? Also: Can a stadium with 260 luxury suites and 13,000 premium suites really be considered civic?

For now, public transit connections to the stadium are problematic. A so-called transportation hub along the site's west edge, amassing buses from nearby neighborhoods and the Metro Crenshaw Line's Downtown Inglewood light rail station (delayed until late 2021), is just a parking lot. (The Inglewood Transit Connector, an elevated tram running from the Metro station to SoFi, the Forum and other destinations, is still just a plan.)

Thanks to COVID-19, we probably won't know for more than a year how the whole complex performs. Not until a game day with actual fans, actual concessions, actual crowd noise, actual traffic.

So, like everything else in our current state of suspended animation, we'll have to wait and see whether SoFi Stadium and Hollywood Park are a success, for fans, for the region, and for the concept that a stadium can become a true community asset. We'll have to keep a close eye. What's been achieved so far is impressive, but it's just the beginning.

## Playing in new SoFi Stadium should spark Chargers, says experienced Linval Joseph

Most of the Chargers will experience something once-in-a-lifetime this season when they play at SoFi Stadium.

For Linval Joseph, it instead will be third-time-in-barely-a-decade.

Joseph was a member of the New York Giants when they moved into New Meadowlands Stadium in 2010 and the Minnesota Vikings when they moved into U.S. Bank Stadium six years later.

The Chargers and Rams will share SoFi Stadium beginning next month, with the Chargers set to make their debut in the \$5-billion facility Thursday with a scrimmage.

"When you have a new stadium ... you want to protect it," Joseph said. "You want to make sure it's your home. You want to instill in all the guys, 'We gotta win at home. We got to start off right.' It's like another urge to get the job done."

After relocating to Los Angeles in 2017, the Chargers played three seasons at what is now called Dignity Health Sports Park. They lost their first three and final three games there, finishing 12-12 overall.

Now, they're readying to upgrade into a venue coach Anthony Lynn called "the best place to play football in the world."

"I'm excited to get there," Joseph said. "See it, feel it and hopefully make some magic this year."

The Chargers signed Joseph as a free agent in March, bringing in the veteran defensive tackle with hopes he can provide pressure up the middle to aid pass-rushing ends Joey Bosa and Melvin Ingram.

Joseph has 24 sacks and 525 tackles in a career that includes two Pro Bowl appearances. He also won a Super Bowl with the 2011 Giants.

At 6 feet 4, 329 pounds, Joseph began making an impression on his new teammates the moment he walked through the door of the Chargers' training facility in Costa Mesa.

He did this by simply filling that doorway.

Safety Rayshawn Jenkins said Joseph is built "like a mobile home." Cornerback Casey Hayward called him "a truck." Left tackle Sam Tevi likened Joseph to "a walking refrigerator" and "a running Coke machine."

"He's literally like a house in there," Jenkins said. "You have to throw it over a house, if you're the quarterback. We're going to get a lot of batted balls and altered throws with him in there."

Along with Joseph's size, the Chargers have been taken by his power, Bosa calling Joseph "probably the strongest human I've come across."

In high school, he was a champion weightlifter and has been known to bench press 500 pounds.

"I have a combination of a lot of things," Joseph said. "But as everybody's saying, it's my power, my quick twitch."

At 31, he is the oldest player on a defense that mixes experience with youth and features depth throughout.

The defense is expected to be the backbone of a team transitioning to a new offensive scheme after being built around quarterback Philip Rivers the last 14 years.

"We have some home-run hitters ..." Joseph said. "Once they put everything together, it's going to be scary. I'd say it that way. It will be scary if everything's put together right."

## TOM TELESCO

### Chargers GM Tom Telesco Prepared for Unconventional Training Camp

Chargers veterans reported for training camp on Tuesday, and general manager Tom Telesco couldn't have laid it out any clearer.

"The number one priority is safety," he said. "The second priority is winning a championship. Luckily those basically go hand-in-hand."

In what will be an unconventional 2020 NFL season, Telesco met with the media virtually on Monday to discuss the balance of keeping the team's health paramount, while adjusting to a much different-looking training camp. With the preseason cancelled, Los Angeles' first game in 2020 will be on the road against the Cincinnati Bengals in Week 1.

"We have two opponents, really," Telesco said. "We've got to fight this virus and then whoever our opponent is on Sunday."

According to Telesco, everyone in the organization has bought into "doing things the right way." Between what several members of the Chargers staff have been able to accomplish this summer coupled with the NFL's doctors and detailed protocols, Telesco said he feels optimistic about minimizing the risk of COVID-19.

He also noted that complacency must be avoided.

"I will say [head coach] Anthony [Lynn] and I, we feel a real responsibility to keep everybody here safe," Telesco said. "It's players and coaches and a very large support staff of people, and we're attacking that enthusiastically."

One of the challenges in a training camp that includes no preseason games or joint practices is properly evaluating players. Telesco said members of the Chargers coaching staff have reached out to those in the college game in an effort to glean insight about how to best handle this time of year.

Telesco also admitted that certain rookies, undrafted free agents and players with limited NFL experience simply won't have the same opportunities they'd be afforded in any other year.

That said, there will be chances to make an impression. Telesco said that Lynn's open-mindedness and ability to "think outside the box" will help towards putting players in competitive practice situations.

First order of business, though: getting players into football shape.

"Everyone that's coming into here is coming from different areas of the country where there are different restrictions; all different levels of physical fitness," Telesco said. "So, we need to gently ramp these players [up]. That's what [head strength and conditioning coach] John Lott started [Monday] and we'll continue to do that." The first eight to ten days of camp will largely mimic the strength and conditioning phase of organized team activities (OTAs), according to Telesco. The team won't put pads on until approximately the third week of August.

Even then, it may not feel like a true training camp with so much to accomplish before Week 1. In addition to evaluating the roster, Telesco explained that the team will need to adjust to a different style of offense and defense, all while integrating the 2020 rookie and free agent class.

"We do have to work with players and we want to try to develop young players, but we have to get players ready to play a regular-season game against the Cincinnati Bengals," he said.

## ANTHONY LYNN

### Chargers coach Anthony Lynn isn't new to creating impactful change

Ruth Thompson recalled being star-struck when she first met Chargers coach Anthony Lynn at the annual "Red, White and Boom" Fourth of July parade in McKinney, Texas, six years ago.

At the time, Thompson was preparing to open Hugs Cafe, a nonprofit organization that trains and employs adults with special needs. Lynn's niece, Marty Cole, was training to work at the cafe.

Lynn attended the parade in his hometown because Cole was riding the Hugs Cafe's float. Thompson, a Denver native and rabid Broncos fan, was eager to meet Lynn because he played running back for the Broncos when they won back-to-back Super Bowls in the late 1990s.

After some pleasant Broncos chatter, Lynn told Thompson he had doubts about Hugs Cafe being successful.

"He was asking me a lot of questions about how we were going to employ adults with special needs," Thompson said in a phone interview Thursday. "It was something that was new to him. He wasn't real sure it was going to work, and he was asking me lots of great questions about how we were going to do this. I think I had good answers for him and we just really struck up a really great conversation."

The Chargers are familiar with Lynn's blunt honesty and "Hard Knocks" viewers were introduced to his straightforward personality this summer.

Most people wouldn't dare cast doubt at an idea that has potential to create plenty of good, but Lynn is about proper execution, and when his beloved niece is involved, he's gonna make sure it's done correctly.

"He asked all of the questions, and even more than many of our initial donors were asking, and rightfully so," Thompson said. "They don't want to donate to something that's going to fail."

Hugs Cafe didn't fail. It will celebrate its fifth-year anniversary next month and there's talk of opening a second cafe. Cole remains an employee there and has had many roles, from greeter, server and working in the kitchen.

Thompson declined to say she proved Lynn wrong because her responses at the parade got him onboard with her vision. Lynn has donated to Hugs Cafe and raised money through his Lynn Family Foundation.

Lynn's knack for asking tough questions and long-term visions for success are reasons why the Chargers are fond of their fourth-year head coach.

General manager Tom Telesco and team owner Dean Spanos have said this summer they follow Lynn's lead. He's become the face of the franchise, and surged this offseason as one of the most notable head coaches in the league by simply being himself, a man of actions and empathy — and as a Black man.

Lynn, one of three Black head coaches in the NFL, was at the forefront in the fight against systemic racism and police brutality amid the nationwide protests that occurred this offseason. He shared personal encounters with racism, attended protests, pushed for change, encouraged people to vote and invited city leaders to speak at his team meetings.

Lynn has the Chargers more than prepared for a football game heading into Sunday's season opener in Cincinnati.

What happens before kickoff on the sidelines and during the national anthem will have the same spotlight as the game, at least for Week 1, because many are expecting protests against systemic racism and police brutality.

But Lynn occasionally shrugged when asked this week what he and his team have planned to protest social injustice. Lynn likely doesn't want this to be a one-week trend with people forgetting for Week 2. He wants solutions that will have a lasting impact, nothing forced or rushed.

"Sometimes it's hard to listen to those young men pour their hearts out and I can't help them immediately, and this is something that's going to take some time," Lynn said last month after his team had an emotional discussion and decided to cancel their SoFi Stadium scrimmage as a way to protest. "I'm in it for the long haul. This organization is in it for the long haul."

Jason Hill isn't surprised to see Lynn make an impact in the NFL community. He's well aware of his nonstop actions for creating change.

Before Lynn coached a game for the Chargers, he was already looking for ways to help the Los Angeles community in 2017. Lynn's realtor suggested he attend Hill's event.

Hill is the founder of Young Warriors, a mentoring program for boys between the ages of 8 and 18. Many of the boys are Black and Latinos who are raised by single mothers.

Lynn had a connection with Hill's purpose because he was raised by his single mother, Betty Jackson, in Texas.

"Anthony grew up in a similar situation, but had an amazing mom to guide him through things," Hill said. "So we just connected on a foundation level, a deep level. We had several conversations after that and he just jumped in with us and we're grateful to have him."

Hill answered the same kinds of tough questions Thompson received. Lynn has donated and raised money for Young Warriors. Lynn and the Chargers have met with boys from Young Warriors and visited schools that are partnered with the program. Hill said Lynn plans to meet more kids through Zoom conversations.

Hill and Lynn have developed a friendship. They went to Lynn's vacation home in Puerto Vallarta, Mexico, last year to play golf.

"He wants unity between everybody," Hill said about Lynn. "We were in Mexico together. The way he treated the people over there, he was just giving extra tips, extra kind, and so loving. I remember telling him, 'You're a good dude, Anthony.'"

Lynn and Hill are hoping to one day open a Young Warriors program in McKinney. Thompson is hopeful about the next Hugs Cafe opening near Lynn in Los Angeles.

It's always a long-term vision with Lynn and those closest to him. The rest of the country is starting to realize how Lynn and the Chargers operate.

"That's him authentically," Hill said about Lynn. "It's not a show. He's not trying to look good. That's just who he is."

### Chargers Coach Anthony Lynn on Systemic Racism in the NFL and Why He's 1 of Only 3 Black Head Coaches

When Anthony Lynn, head coach of the Los Angeles Chargers, was in third grade, his world changed. He grew up in Celina, Texas—the son of a single mother, and one of the few Black kids in what was then a small town north of Dallas. A girl—Lynn thought she was cute—was handing out invitations to her birthday party one day, when Lynn noticed she skipped him and a Black girl in the class. When Lynn asked why, the response left him devastated. It's because you're Black and my parents won't allow you to come to my place.

"After that moment, I never saw things the same," Lynn, now 51, tells TIME in a video call from his office in Costa Mesa, Calif., where the Chargers are headquartered and holding training camp. "That's when I knew the world was different. There's a difference being Black and white. Then I started seeing color." Lynn says this, and other experiences with racism throughout his life, helped motivated him to reach the top ranks of the NFL, where he is now one of just three Black head coaches. "I didn't didn't like the fact that people didn't think I was equal, or thought they were better than me," says

Lynn. "I can't say race wasn't a big part of why I'm where I'm at. Because it pushed me."

Now, the realities that Lynn confronted head-on in his life are at the forefront of his job as head coach. He sees systemic racism in the NFL, a league in which Black men are 60% of the players, but less than 10% of head coaches. He sees it in the streets, with the killing of George Floyd and the shooting of Jacob Blake. "I was like, wow, again?" Lynn says of watching the video of police shooting Blake in Kenosha, Wis. "It's always unarmed Black men. And seven times? That just made me sad, man. I got emotional." On Aug. 26 the Milwaukee Bucks declined to take the court for a playoff game against the Orlando Magic; other teams across sports also staged strikes, effectively shutting down the games. The Chargers were supposed to hold a scrimmage at their new home, the \$5 billion SoFi Stadium, the next day. Lynn called a team meeting, and let players express their frustrations. "After that, no way could we take the field and practice," says Lynn. "Because something was more important than football at that time." The scrimmage was cancelled.

Lynn's Chargers will kick off an NFL season like no other this weekend. In the midst of a pandemic and national reckoning on race, L.A. travels to Cincinnati to take on the Bengals and the No. 1 pick in the 2020 draft, quarterback Joe Burrow, on Sunday. While Lynn says he would have supported a player walkout in Week 1, he did not encourage it. "If I thought not playing Week 1 would make a major change, I'd give these boys the whole week off," says Lynn. "I wouldn't show up. But we're football players, we're not politicians."

Still, don't expect silence. In the past, Lynn says he's tried to keep talk of controversial social issues—like Colin Kaepernick's kneeling during the National Anthem—out of the locker room, lest it become a dreaded "distraction." "We can talk about that s—t in February, in late February hopefully," says Lynn, explaining his prior philosophy. Not so this year. "If I was to suppress this, I think it would hurt their passion and I don't think they would play the game that they love well," he says.

After Los Angeles made the playoffs in 2018, his second season as Chargers coach, Lynn's team finished 5-11 last year. He's under pressure to correct the course as the Chargers move into a new home. Lynn's team will share SoFi Stadium with the Los Angeles Rams while desperately fighting for fans in an L.A. market that has greeted them mostly with indifference since moving from San Diego in 2017. Still, Lynn says his focus is not just victory on the field. "We have committed to winning the championship," he says, "and fighting for social justice."

A bunch of plays are diagrammed on a white board behind his Lynn's desk; he's wearing a Chargers cap and jacket during our interview, and some gray stubble is peppered on his chin. Lynn's no typically programmed football coach. He talks in a real, conversational manner, which is all-too-rare in his ranks.

As a kid he played quarterback on youth teams in football-crazed Celina. In seventh grade, however, a coach informed Lynn he'd be moving to running back. "He goes, 'Black kids can't play quarterback,'" Lynn says. Lynn asked why. "Well, they're not smart enough," the coach responded.

These accumulated experiences with racism "made me more aggressive," says Lynn; he got into fights in school, but he also channelled his anger onto the football field, eventually earning a scholarship to Texas Tech University and playing in the NFL for the San Francisco 49ers and Denver Broncos; he won a pair of Super Bowl rings with Denver in 1997 and 1998.

Tensions boiled over during Lynn's senior year at Texas Tech. Lynn says police were gathered at an apartment building where two teammates were staying; when he went to see what was happening, the cops "just jacked me up against a wall." They asked if he was a drug dealer. "And I just lost it, man," Lynn says. "The next thing I know I'm fighting with his cop and I'm on top of him and I get hit in the back of the head with a billy club and they got me tied down on the ground and they're taking me to jail and the one officer kicked me inside my head." Thanks to Lynn's football connections, the cops eventually let him go. "Today, I would have been shot," says Lynn. "I mean, think about that. I said, 'I would have been shot.' I was dead wrong going off on that cop. But it was just years of accumulation of this and that. I can't go to the birthday party. I can't play quarterback."

Lynn stresses that he has great respect for police officers. In 2005, after he was struck by a drunk driver while crossing the street in Ventura, Calif., police officers helped save his life. The near-fatal incident left Lynn with temporary paralysis and injuries that required four surgeries. He has remained friends with one of the officers who rescued him. Still, he tires of the constant stings of racism. Just last year, he was pulled over for what he calls a "bogus reason." Before a white officer asked him for license and registration, Lynn says, he asked if he had been in jail or on probation. "I'm afraid for some people that might not be as strong minded, if they hear something like that too many times, they start to believe it," says Lynn. "That they're not better. That they're not equal. That's my biggest fear. But for me, it just pisses me off. It always has."

Lynn's also irked that only three of the NFL's 32 head coaches—Lynn, Brian Flores of the Miami Dolphins, and Pittsburgh's Mike Tomlin—are Black. "I'm not comfortable with that number," Lynn says. As recently as 2017, there were seven Black head coaches in the league. (Washington Football Team coach Ron Rivera, who's Latino, is the NFL's only other minority head coach). The Rooney Rule, which was implemented in 2003 to guarantee that at least one minority candidate is interviewed for open head coaching positions, seems broken. Is this the product of systemic racism? Lynn agrees that's a fair assessment. "I played in this league for eight years, and a player knows a head coach when he sees one," says Lynn. "There were African-American coaches that could have been head coaches but just never got the opportunity."

How do you fix this? Lynn believes reforming the head coach feeder system will help. Between 2009 and 2019, according to a recent study from Arizona State University, offensive coordinator was the most frequent former position for head coaches: 40% of NFL head coaches were hired from offensive coordinator spots (NFL defensive coordinator, and NFL head coach, were the next most frequent positions). During same period, however, 91% of offensive coordinator hires were white.

"I've seen so many play callers get head jobs that have no personality, no leadership whatsoever," says Lynn, who during his 17 years as an assistant coach in the NFL never entered a season holding a coordinator position (a few weeks into the 2016 season he was named offensive coordinator in Buffalo; that year he took over as interim head coach for one game after Rex Ryan was fired). His coaching career previously saw him as mostly a running backs coach and assistant head coach. Broadening the feeder system would result in a more diverse—and talented—candidate pool. "And then you wonder why every year in the National Football League we are firing anywhere from six to eight head coaches?" says Lynn. "If we open this thing up to position coaches, assistant head coaches, then you're going to have more African-American applicants."

He also believes Black coaches have to win faster than their white counterparts to keep their jobs secure. "I'm not happy with the leash that African-American coaches get," says Lynn. "I had my first losing season last year. And I come home one day and my wife is like, 'Honey, are you okay?' And I'm like, 'Why wouldn't I be? I'm fine'. And she's like, 'Well, do you not know half the country wants you fired?'

When he entered coaching, Lynn understood the hurdles. The memories of being told he couldn't attend a birthday party because he's Black, or being asked if he was a drug dealer, were never too far from his mind. Lynn's grandfather once told him he'd always have to be better because of his skin color. He's never forgotten those words. "It's a shame, but I know that going into it," says Lynn. "I know I've got to turn this damn thing around, soon. But at the same time, I'm going to stand up for what's right. I'm going to speak out when I have to. I'm not going to let that scare me from doing that as a human being."

To wit: he's unafraid to say that Kaepernick got a raw deal. Lynn is happy with this current quarterback, but did express some interest in Kaepernick earlier in the summer. "I do think there's a possibility that Kaep could come on somebody's roster this year because you can hold roster spots for veteran players now because of injuries and because maybe of COVID," says Lynn. "There's still a possibility there. But Colin's busy doing things to help make a change and he's signing big deals, he might not have the time to come back and play NFL football. But I know over the years he should have been given an opportunity. There's no doubt about that. We've had those discussions. I can say that. We've had those discussions."

Lynn is facing unprecedented challenges in carrying out his team's turnaround plan. Start with his own bout with COVID-19; he was diagnosed while on a trip to Dallas, to visit his mother, in late June. "You always say, well, it's really only killing 1%," says Lynn. "But when you get it, start thinking about that 1%." He's not sure how he got infected. "I mean no one was more paranoid about this than me," Lynn says. "You're talking about a guy that has hand sanitizer in his front belt loop everywhere he goes. Wears gloves, masks." Lynn's lungs collapsed during the car accident 15 years go, which he feared would make him even more vulnerable. "And so it was some anxiety there for a little while," says Lynn. "For me it was a really, really bad flu for about three or four days."

In training camp, Lynn believes COVID-19 has affected team chemistry. "A big part of football is camaraderie," he says. "When you have to social distance, it's hard to build a team." The first full in-person, locker room team meeting Lynn had was on Aug. 27, at SoFi Stadium, to discuss the Blake shooting. "I could just feel the people craving that community, that fellowship," he says. "We haven't had it. It's going to be difficult to build tight teams and trust with new players when you don't have that. The longer we do without it, the more of us see it. I mean, this is Zoom all year. Are you kidding me? It's going to be different. But we knew that it was going to be a challenge and we've got to figure out a way to still make it work."

The Chargers enter this season with veteran Tyrod Taylor starting at quarterback. A potential franchise QB, Justin Herbert—the sixth overall pick in this year's draft, out of Oregon—will be the backup. (Quarterback Philip Rivers, who started every game for the Chargers the last 14 seasons, signed with Indianapolis in the offseason). Preseason games were cancelled this year; in some ways, this made Lynn's training camp smoother. Because if Herbert shined in preseason games, screams to start him right away would have been pronounced.

In sticking with Taylor as the starter, Lynn cites John Elway and Peyton Manning, two legends who started their rookie years; each threw more interceptions than TDs (Manning threw a rookie-record 28 interceptions in 1998, tops in the NFL that year). "But those guys are two real strong-minded individuals, Hall of Famers," he says. "Not everybody's wired that way, man. It's not everybody that can overcome that. So I don't expect [Herbert] to come in and play right away. I think sitting him for a year would do nothing but benefit him."

Does Herbert seem to have the Elway-Manning mentality, or is it too early to tell? "He is a leader in his own way," says Lynn. "He's more of an introvert. He quieter, but he communicates when he has to with his teammates. And people try to say that was a knock with him coming out. Said he has all the tools but wasn't much of a leader. Introverts get labeled that way. I just know these players react well to him."

The Chargers spent the last three seasons playing in a Carson, Calif. soccer stadium that held just 27,000 fans, by far the smallest capacity in the NFL. Now, they will move into a shiny \$5 billion palace playing in front of zero fans, due to the pandemic, making the team's effort to win the hearts and minds of Los Angeles even more difficult. "L.A. is a hard city," says Lynn. "You have to be successful here, bro. You've got to win. And if you don't, people just do other things. And there are other sports franchises here that people are attached to. So it's no doubt a hard market. But people respect that hard work, young men of high character that are helping their communities and doing things that we're doing. It's just a matter of time before we have a strong fan base here. But we knew when we moved here it wasn't going to happen overnight. Just like social justice. It isn't going to happen overnight."

More than ever, social justice will be a major theme of the NFL season. An Alicia Keys rendition of "Lift Every Voice And Sing," a song known as the Black National Anthem, was played before Thursday night's season-opening Kansas City Chiefs-Houston Texans game. At least some players are likely to kneel during the National Anthem or utilize some other form of protest when the NFL kicks off this weekend. Lynn recalls the reaction of his players after Blake's shooting. "I've been dealing with this s—t since I was nine years old," says Lynn. "I was more sad that day for how they felt. We've got to move beyond it. We're certainly not going to forget about it. But I wish I could do something to make them feel better in moments like that."

Still, the Chargers coach remains confident that his recent powerful wave of sports activism will bring change, both inside and outside the NFL. "I've got to tell you, I've never seen so many people from all different backgrounds and colors come together and want change," says Lynn. "So man, I'm hopeful. I'm very hopeful."

## Anthony Lynn's devotion to life, equality and football endears him to Chargers

His career as a full-time head coach began with an audible thud, the sort of depressing sound made by most massive first-quarter deficits.

Anthony Lynn's maiden Chargers team started 0-4, one of those defeats coming on a last-second blocked field-goal attempt and another on a last-minute 54-yard successful field goal by the opposition.

Then, in a U-turn violent enough to produce G-forces, those Chargers won nine of their remaining 12 games and next season evolved into a team that would go 12-4 and advance to the AFC divisional round of the playoffs.

Now, entering his fourth year, Lynn and the Chargers are trying to bounce back again, from an even louder thud, under conditions even more stressed and less predictable.

The 2019 Chargers finished a stunning 5-11, their underwhelming performance marred by injuries, turnovers and a maddening inability to win close games.

Yet, in February, the team signed Lynn to an extension, providing at least a bit of security to a coach who — in a way as clear as his signature on that new contract — still has the trust of his bosses.

"He's special," Chargers Chairman Dean Spanos said. "Anthony's special. He's unique. He's his own man, and he has the respect of the players but also the organization and ownership."

All of which is encouraging but none of which lessens the lofty expectations for a talented roster, even as the franchise transitions from longtime starting quarterback Philip Rivers.

Lynn needs to win and will try to do so with a revamped offensive scheme and a rebuilt offensive line amid a pandemic and ongoing national social unrest that has presented American sports with challenges heretofore unforeseen.

The burden is squarely on the Chargers' head coach and, therefore, on the Chargers themselves.

"At the end of the day, you can say this about a coach or that about a coach but we're on the field," right tackle Bryan Bulaga said. "We have to execute and get the job done. ... The pieces are there on this team."

And so is the leader. Lynn has emerged as few coaches have across all sports during protests that have flared over the past several months.

While many teams and individuals have offered prepared statements of support, Lynn has shared in detail his experiences. He has spoken on panels, podcasts and national television shows.

He attended a protest in Huntington Beach, announced live on the NFL Network that the Chargers were canceling a scrimmage in the wake of the Jacob Blake shooting and never has stopped encouraging his players who feel compelled to participate to do so.

"That says a lot about coach Lynn because, at the end of the day, we're not just football players," safety Rayshawn Jenkins said. "We're human beings who just happen to put on a football helmet to work."

"I'm very grateful to be playing for a coach who's aware of everything, on and off the field. Coach Lynn, he just understands, know what I mean? It's been a blessing for all of us."

Spanos said he and Lynn have spoken often over the past several months about the issues currently facing society.

The two regularly played golf together in the summer and spent hours discussing more than just birdie putts.

At one point, Spanos said he asked Lynn what, as team owner, he could do regarding the players. Spanos explained that Lynn told him this movement requires patience, the sort of unified front that defines team and strong direction.

That's precisely what Lynn provided in late August, when, before a planned scrimmage at SoFi Stadium, he called for a team meeting as emotions over the Blake shooting refused to pass.

Sensing his players just needed to talk, Lynn began a group discussion that would become so deep that one player said he saw an assistant coach crying.

Afterward, general manager Tom Telesco told the NFL Network, "We follow Anthony's lead."

Said tight end Virgil Green: "Coach Lynn is a very confident person. When he talks to you, you look him in the eye. It's tough to not see the kind of man coach Lynn is because his actions speak."

At least three NFL head coaches have tested positive for the coronavirus.

New Orleans' Sean Payton and Philadelphia's Doug Pederson shared their experiences through the media.

No one outside the Chargers organization or Lynn's family and close friends knew he had tested positive until the first episode of "Hard Knocks."

Were the Chargers not a featured team on the HBO show this year, it's likely no one on the outside would have known.

"He's played in the league, man," cornerback Chris Harris Jr. said. "He's won Super Bowls here. He has the respect of being a player."

"That goes a long ways when you got a coach who has experience doing this and can understand the pain and what goes into being an NFL player."

But now, Lynn is a coach and most certainly needs to coach this fall. Another five-win season is not what's expected of this team.

In looking to rebound in 2020, the Chargers can reflect on that 0-4 start to the 2017 season and what came next: a rookie head coach suddenly and emphatically announcing his arrival.

"He really came to the surface in that very difficult time," Spanos said. "He's the right guy to bring it all together."

## Anthony Lynn: 'I'm pissed off and I don't want to just put out a pretty statement'

Chargers coach Anthony Lynn is one of my favorite people. Not favorite coach or favorite former player, but people. When I got a call that he'd like to talk about the death of George Floyd and the fallout, I dropped everything to drive to his home.

Lynn and I get along so well because we share a lot of the same values, particularly spiritually. He told me that when the world goes crazy — as it is right now — he gets on his knees and prays. "I don't have all of the answers," he told me, "but I know who does."

He had not made any public statements about the events that have unfolded across the nation. On Monday we spent a couple of hours talking about the protests, criminal justice reform and what the NFL did to Colin Kaepernick for trying to get the word out.

Why not just release a statement?

I've read some good statements. I read Brian Flores from the Dolphins and I agree 100% with him. I read Doc Rivers' statement and those guys spoke from the heart. I think statements are needed to bring awareness to the situation. But I want to do something too. I don't want to just put [a statement] out there because it's the right thing to do. I want change . . . so I guess it starts with having this conversation and talking things out. In 1992 I remember watching L.A. burn and here we are in 2020 and I'm watching it again and it just hit me, nothing has changed.

I haven't done anything to make this a better place for my son. I remember having the talk with him when he was 16 about how to handle police and then at age 30 I called him up and just had the talk with him again because I'm so scared. I want to do something but to be honest with you, I don't know what that is.

You said you want to do something, but why? Maybe if you can identify the why, then you can identify what the next step should be.

I'm glad you asked me that. I want to make this a better world for the next generation and not just for minorities, but for everybody. I believe in diversity, I believe in inclusion and if you believe in that, you can't just stand silent. You can't just stand on the sidelines and just watch. You got to say something, man. The thing that bothered me the most about [the] George Floyd murder was the three officers that said nothing. The guy who did it, yeah, he's a [expletive], but the three who stood by and did absolutely nothing . . . I'm just stunned by that. I see that going on in every organization. I see good people saying nothing and doing nothing, allowing this to happen.

You mentioned 1992 and the Rodney King video; how did you feel viewing that?

I was in shock. There was video evidence of them doing what we always knew they were doing. And then when they didn't find them guilty despite that evidence it made you sick. It was like, do they really care? Do we really matter? It was not a good feeling and I felt that way all over again watching George Floyd. We haven't gotten better at all and in some cases, hell, it might have gotten worse.

Why do you say that?

Because the evidence could not be any better. We have so many videos of unarmed black men dying over the last decade and there's no accountability, there are not consequences, like it's OK. I just didn't expect that at this point in time. What we've been doing is obviously not working and so we need to do something different. If it's radical, then it's radical. And I want to be a part of that.

The conversation about police brutality and criminal justice reform used to be something bubbling underneath. Now it's talked about more in the mainstream. When you hear that phrase, what specifically about the criminal justice system would you like to see changed most?

First, there are so many good officers. I did a first responders commercial a couple of years ago because I respect the first responders so much. They deserve so much more than what they get. They put their lives on line for us. Two of them helped saved my life after I was hit by that car in 2005. My son's godfather is a police officer. So I've always had a great relationship with the first responders. But I also know it's a club like a football team and they stick together like a football team. And the good ones get a bad rap because of the bad ones. I would challenge the good ones to speak up and not be silent anymore. That's what I take away from all of this. George Floyd died with three officers right there who watched him die. It's time for good officers to speak up and not accept that anymore.

I have a lot of good white friends and I've said to them that sometimes I feel our biggest enemy in this fight is good white people because they don't believe people can do the things they do and be this evil. They just don't believe it. And I'm like, "Guys, you are so naïve and you're so naïve because you're really good people. I don't mean that in a derogatory way, but your naïveté is hindering the cause."

To piggyback off of what you said, one of the things I've been really focused in on are the good apples getting a bad name from the bad ones and I equate it to this analogy: If you're thirsty and I offer you a glass of water, you likely will drink it with no problem. But if you're thirsty and I pour you a glass of water and then spit in it, you wouldn't want to drink that water. Even though the vast majority of the glass is refreshing, cold water, that spit ruins the entire glass. In the real world, that drop of spit is racism, so all those good things that you do — go to church, treat your wife with respect, donate to good causes — all those things get ruined because you tolerated that drop of spit in the glass. What would you like to see the NFL, government do to get rid of that drop of spit that's ruining all of the good water?

I would say one thing and it's one of the things my mother raised me on: Treat people the way you want to be treated. Treat everyone fairly. You wouldn't want someone to spit in your glass; why in the hell would you want to spit in someone else's? To me it's not that hard, but obviously it must be because we can't do it. It seems simple, right?

Yeah, it seems simple but 400-plus years we still have spit in our glass. Speaking of: The NFL did something I found highly offensive and intellectually dishonest. I saw a statement after this weekend and I didn't see the words "black," "white," "race," "racism" or the name "Colin Kaepernick." How difficult is it to know what he was trying to fight for and how the NFL responded and treated him, and yet continue to work for the NFL?

People completely misunderstood Colin and what he was trying to do. People talked about disrespecting the flag . . . the flag covers a lot — patriotism and civil rights and other things. And Colin was speaking out against the injustice and a lot of people didn't catch on to that because it was happening during the national anthem. They thought it was disrespectful to the flag. I was surprised by the number of people who didn't know why he was protesting. I got letters from people. I had people walk up to me and ask, "Coach, what are you going to do if someone on your team protests?" And I had to explain to them that Colin is taking a knee for criminal justice [reform] and police brutality and once you broke it down, they were like, "Oh, we didn't know that. We thought he was protesting the flag." And that was the case for a lot of people I came across.

Whose fault was it that the message got diluted or lost? Was it his? The media?

A lot of people for their own political reasons pushed out the wrong narrative. A lot of people didn't catch on as to why he took a knee. I understood and applauded him for it. At the same time, I'm never going to take a knee during the national anthem because I have an uncle that was a Marine and a father that is a vet. When I stand for the national anthem, I think of them. I think of the people who died for the rights and liberties I have right now and I give them that respect. That's how I think toward the national

anthem. Now some people may look at that and think of social justice and how jacked up that is. I'll take a knee before and after the national anthem all day long, but I'm not going to tell someone else how they should protest. I thought it was a shame that Colin's message got lost because people kept bringing up patriotism. It was brave for him to do that. I have a lot of respect for that young man standing up for something outside of the "Big 3" — God, family, football — and I have to say social justice right now is challenging my priorities. Right now I can't think of anything besides social justice.

So knowing he essentially lost his career over it, how does that make you feel?

I didn't like it. I know when you look at 32 quarterbacks in the National Football League, Colin could have been one of the 32. If not, he could have been a quality backup. For me being an African American head coach, this is tough.

Let's talk about solutions. You said you wanted to make the world a better place; what does that look like and how do we get there?

First thing I had to do is get out there. I've been sitting here in the house and was just consumed with these protests and the coverage. I felt there was a game going on and I wasn't in. Reminds me of the time when I was a young coach and the head coach came to me and said "You need to buy a ticket." I was like, "What do you mean I need to buy a ticket?" And he said "You're coaching like a damn spectator right now," and so that was the last time a coach called me a spectator, because my head was always in the game. So with the protests, I felt like a spectator. So I went out and joined the protesters in Huntington Beach. I wanted to be a part of it. I wanted to see what it was like to experience it and it was pretty intense. I saw a lot of passionate people and it felt as if I was marching for the right reasons.

After an hour or so I sought out the leader and we had a conversation and we talked about what was the endgame. After the protests, what is this going to lead to? That's when I got a little disappointed because there was no plan. The protest was there to help people express themselves but there was no endgame, no plan. All of the sacrifice and protest, I wanted to know at the end of this, if something was going to be done. I don't want to be doing this again 20 years from now, and so I'm looking for ways to sit at the table and have a conversation about this broken system.

The Chargers have done more in the community than just about any organization I've been with. I've been out in the community, talking with Mayor [Eric] Garcetti and I've been to the juvenile detention centers to encourage young men to do something positive with their life when they get out, and City Council people about making L.A. a better place. But this stuff that's taking place with police brutality and unarmed black men dying and white people feeling like they can use their privilege to threaten black people like that white woman did in Central Park, that's ridiculous. How do we effect that type of change? Where's the accountability for that kind of [expletive]? That's where I'm at right now. I'm angry, I'm pissed off and I don't want to just put out a pretty statement.

This entire conversation was started by minorities interacting with police. You ever been pulled over?

Oh yeah. In fact, I was pulled over not too long ago. The lights come on, I pull over and the first thing the police officer asked [was] if I was on parole or if I had ever been to jail.

Before license and registration?

Yes, before license and registration. Before he told me why he was pulling me over he asked if I was on parole or had I been to jail. It was a Friday and the reason why I know this is because we had to play Baltimore that weekend and I was worried if I went to jail, I wouldn't get out in time. If I didn't have the game, I would have gone off.

Did he eventually recognize you?

I don't know. He took my information and everything and I was let go without a ticket because the reason he pulled me over in the first place was bogus, but I don't know if he knew I was a football coach. But does it matter?

Last question — what does it say about this country if 20 years from now, I'm sitting across from you like this and we're having this same conversation?

That's why we're here. . . to make it so we don't have to.

## GUS BRADLEY

### Gus Bradley says Chargers need to be in rush to fix defense

Only five teams allowed fewer total yards last season than the Chargers and just four were stingier against the pass.

Yet, defensive coordinator Gus Bradley admitted Wednesday those facts rang hollow in the aftermath of the team's 5-11 finish.

"I think to all of us as a defense and defensive coaches," he said, "it didn't feel like that."

Instead, Bradley noted the areas in which the Chargers struggled and how those facts better detailed why a promising season dissolved into an underachieving one.

Bradley's unit was 21st in red-zone defense, 29th on third down and 32nd in takeaways.

The Chargers finished tied for last with a minus-17 turnover differential, which is why, when asked recently what the defense needs to improve upon in 2020, safety Derwin James blurted, "Takeaways."

James then added: "We gotta get the ball. It's all about the ball."

To that end, Bradley said an emphasis will be placed on pressuring quarterbacks this season, the idea being that offenses are more susceptible to game-changing mistakes when hurried.

Even with Pro Bowlers Joey Bosa and Melvin Ingram on the edges, the Chargers lacked reliable pressure in 2019. After Bosa and Ingram, no one had as many as three sacks.

League-leading Pittsburgh had six players with at least three sacks.

"Yes, you've got to stop the run," Bradley said. "Yes, you've got to eliminate explosive plays. But you have to find ways to affect the quarterback ... We didn't do a good enough job last year in doing that."

In 2019, eight of the top 10 defenses in passer rating made the playoffs. The Chargers finished 23rd, one spot behind two-win Cincinnati. Chargers tight end Hunter Henry hauls in a touchdown pass over Redskins safety Deshaun Evans during the first quarter.

So, this offseason they've added nose tackle Linval Joseph, a 329-pound former power lifter who's expected to bring a new level of athleticism.

Joseph is replacing Brandon Mebane, who is four years older and an ex-team captain. On Wednesday, Bradley praised Mebane, particularly for his leadership. But the Chargers understand they need to find a push in the middle.

"We'll see if he can bring some more explosiveness, more of a penetrating-type mentality to that position," Bradley said of Joseph.

They also are counting on the continued development of defensive tackle Jerry Tillery, their first-round pick in 2019. Tillery was added in part because of the belief he could pressure the quarterback from inside.

Instead, his rookie season was mostly a difficult transition, especially in dealing with double teams, something Bradley said Tillery is attempting to combat by increasing his strength and size.

The Chargers also signed veteran cornerback Chris Harris Jr. and veteran linebacker Nick Vigil and used draft picks on linebacker Kenneth Murray Jr. (first round) and safety Alohi Gilman (sixth round).

Those moves should provide increased positional versatility and play-making among the defense's back seven spots.

After he joined the team, Harris said he was told the Chargers planned to shake up their defensive plans, which Bradley confirmed Wednesday.

Bradley said, if things fall into place, his defense will be able to play more man-to-man pass coverage, a sharp departure from recent seasons.

"We need to mix it up more," Bradley said. "[Playing man] I think lowers the quarterback rating. Generally, when you look at them [man-to-man statistics] over the course of a year, if you don't overdo it, they have better numbers than zone."

## PHIL McGEOGHAN

### Chargers' Phil McGeoghan brings fight for racial justice to hometown with new program

If there's one certainty about the popular HBO docuseries *Hard Knocks*, which chronicles the daily activities of NFL clubs during training camp, it is that the camera will always find colorful personalities like Chargers wide receivers coach Phil McGeoghan.

His presence jumped off the screen this summer, grabbing your attention the way a hammer does when it lands against glass. Intense and commanding during meetings with his players, he made his points with language often found in the dim, smoke-filled halls of a late-night comedy club.

The words, which would draw the ire of the FCC if reprinted here, were salty enough to get him called out during the post-show. It was all in good fun, so McGeoghan -- who has coached at either the pro or college level for the past 14 years after a four-year career as an NFL receiver -- played along. He apologized to his children on social media for his potty mouth and pledged to donate an unspecified amount to a charity of his followers' choice for every bad word that was broadcast. Later, the Chargers organization joined in and committed matching donations to St. Jude Children's Research Hospital in what came to be known as Curses for a Cause.

It would not be the only time McGeoghan sought to turn a negative into a positive this August. Only days after watching replays of Jacob Blake, an unarmed Black man, being shot in the back multiple times by a Kenosha, Wisconsin, police officer, McGeoghan, who is biracial, fumed at another example of lethal force replacing due process in a situation involving police and someone of color.

Never one to run from a fight, he confronted some on Twitter who appeared to condone the actions of the officer, but quickly realized there was no "win" in that. He wanted to help produce positive change, but how?

Nearly three decades earlier, as an impressionable 14-year-old, he'd had his own bad experience with police, who stopped him and some friends for possession of alcohol as minors. Things took a turn for the worst and, McGeoghan says, he was beaten and demeaned by one officer, a memory written in bold ink in his mental diary, never to be erased or forgotten.

The Blake shooting made that moment fresh again. Something needed to be done, but what? He spoke to friends in western Massachusetts, where he grew up, then took to Facebook and posted a call to action to bridge the divide between police and the youth in communities around his hometown of Agawam, roughly 95 miles west of Boston.

"In an effort to develop and renew our relationships between our community and our law enforcement, I am pleased to announce we have begun initial discussions about a program named ALLY (Acknowledge, Listen, Learn, Youth)," he wrote. "I care deeply for our nation's youth and have dozens of close friends and family who are GOOD cops. We will bring our community together and be an example of what education, empathy and respect look like. This is a two-way street, and I will be working closely with both the Agawam High School Football team and the Agawam Police Department on a number of topics."

Then he spelled out the areas of focus:

1. Race relations and inclusion.
2. What to do if you are pulled over.
3. De-escalation training.
4. Increasing (not defunding) our situational training, education and relationships in our community between Black and Brown people and law enforcement.
5. Continue to demand justice and push for reforms that improve public safety and address systemic racism.
6. Fight for due process for all people.
7. Show our children what great cops of all races are doing for us daily.
8. Holding adults in positions of power accountable for these steps.
9. Provide ride-along and career days.
10. Have uncomfortable conversations.

"My heart will always be with you all in Western Mass," he continued. "To my family in Agawam and Springfield, I have not forgotten about you, I love you and I want to help. I was the victim of extreme police brutality, racism and undue process at the hands of one terrible, evil, racist, cowardly officer from the Agawam Police Dept. This encounter scarred me figuratively and literally. Although this happened in 1993, it still is in the forefront of my mind when I see Black and Brown people killed without due process.

"I can compartmentalize that as an isolated incident and accept that 99 percent of the police would never do that to another person of color. The problem is a lot of people are scared of the good cops, too. I am a man of action and I only know one way to live: be a person that makes your community better. I have friends and family that have been mistreated by police, I have friends and family who are GREAT policemen and women that would NEVER mistreat anyone. We are going to set an example of what a community can do with initiative, empathy, resolve and understanding. Seek solutions, be the change and treat everyone -- regardless of race, religion or sexual orientation -- the SAME!"

John Benjamin is the head football coach at Agawam High. He has seen and heard a lot over the years, but the phone call he received at 11 p.m. on a Friday last month will never leave him. McGeoghan was on the other end of the line, and it wasn't long before his passion had turned to tears as he explained not only what he wanted to do to bring about social change, but why he needed to do it.

Slowly, he began recounting the time he and a group of teenage friends, wanting to be cool and hang with the older kids, pulled up to a convenience store and slipped a few dollars to someone outside to buy them some beer. They didn't think twice about it. It was just something young people sometimes do when parents are out of town and a party is going down.

McGeoghan knew it was wrong, but young boys will be young boys. He planned to drink only two beers because that was all he could tolerate without throwing up. But he never got the chance because police pulled over the car. Things went from zero to 100 in the short walk from the patrol car to the boys' car. As McGeoghan remembers it, a gun was drawn on the driver and the boys were told to get out of the car.

McGeoghan said he was thrown against the car and handcuffed so firmly it broke his skin. Racial slurs followed. Frightened, McGeoghan didn't know if the officer was trying to scare him straight or was an actual threat. The answer came when they got to the precinct and the cop, according to McGeoghan, roughed him up in a cell.

"Honestly, it was one of the most powerful conversations I've ever had," Benjamin said. "It was the first time I had heard of it. I never expected that something like that could have happened in Agawam, but it did. And especially couldn't imagine it happening to a kid like Phil. He was a fantastic young man when he was in high school."

McGeoghan then began explaining what he wanted to do and asked if Benjamin could work with him to bring his players and their families together with police. He wasn't looking to place blame or pick a side. He wanted everyone to be willing to open their hearts and minds in an effort to see the situation from the other's vantage point.

Benjamin phoned the local police chief the next day -- the two are friends -- as well as some police officers he knows. They were all onboard. McGeoghan then used his hometown connections to arrange a call with Valdamar Brower, the head football coach at Springfield Central High. If he could get the two biggest football programs from the area to buy in, there was reason for hope.

Brower didn't hesitate. He found somewhat of a kindred spirit in McGeoghan. They shared a similar past in that both are biracial, both were local football stars who earned college scholarships and both went into coaching when their playing careers were over. And yet, McGeoghan also expanded Brower's understanding of how the unrest in the streets was weighing on young boys and men, particularly those of color.

"As a coach, I'm running a year-round football program and just kind of really focused on getting the guys to college, giving them a better situation and just making sure they're staying out of trouble and getting their bodies better with strength and conditioning," Brower said. "We were able to be with them and deflect a lot of that stuff, but this COVID situation really opened up a lot of things because we weren't able to be with the guys (in person) every day."

They communicated primarily over computers, and what Brower realized is that his players were more emotionally affected by what was taking place in the streets than he realized.

"They're angry. They're upset. Scared. There's a lack of trust," he said of his players. "All those kinds of emotions are taking place. It's very discouraging and upsetting to me because I really believe it's just the minority (of officers)."



With both coaches onboard, McGeoghan then turned to law enforcement. He had the group speak with Joe Gentile, president of the International Brotherhood of Police Officers in Springfield. What McGeoghan found is that local law enforcement had been attempting to build that bridge for years.

"But obviously with someone like Phil behind it, it's helpful to us and it will be helpful to the kids," Gentile said. "I only learned recently about his back story. I think it will lend a lot of credibility to what he's talking about and trying to do. I love his perspective in that as much as he had a negative interaction (with an officer), he has had a lot of tremendously good interactions and doesn't want to make it about one thing."

The thing about McGeoghan is that he applies that same passion we saw on Hard Knocks to his own life. When he tells his receivers, "No block, no rock" -- meaning, you had better block in the run game or there won't be any passes coming your way -- what he's really telling them is they have to go above and beyond. Which is why he didn't stop with contacting the police union. His next call was to the chief law enforcement officer in the region, Hampden County district attorney Anthony Gulluni.

Agawam has a population of just under 30,000 residents, while neighboring Springfield has just over 150,000. The area is big enough to be considered urban, but small enough that everyone seems to know each other, which is why McGeoghan didn't need to introduce himself when he reached out to Gulluni.

"We're about the same age -- he's about two or three years older than I am -- so I recalled his athletic successes from high school on," said Gulluni, who grew up in Springfield. "Initially our discussions were philosophical. We had two or three good, long conversations where we aligned on some important stuff that he's trying to do. (And) I'm trying to change things, trying to do some things differently, trying to provide opportunities to young people and certainly bridge a gap that has always existed between young people -- particularly young people of color and people in inner-city environments -- and the police. We're both trying to change the paradigm between young people and people of color in general for the betterment of our communities."

The goal is to create opportunities where police and youth can interact, whether that's through ride-alongs, community functions or school events, with parents functioning as the glue that holds it together. Deepen the relationship. Amplify the conversations. Learn about each other rather than looking past each other. No one knows if it will work, but everyone agrees that doing nothing is not the solution. So McGeoghan continues to fight for change, his passion sometimes coated by his salty language.

"I think he can have a pretty profound impact," Gulluni said. "We understand that the messenger is important, so what we've tried to do is have young people talking to younger people. Have high school kids talking to middle-school kids. The message, as it's conveyed by someone with whom they can relate, resonates better when it's delivered. Now you bring the NFL shield to this discussion. Phil's got a profile here with a lot of people who remember his exploits as a high school athlete and going to the NFL. He brings that status. People are going to listen, and young people are going to listen. This guy's got some credibility because that NFL shield comes with what Phil is trying to do. And he's got some experiences that are going to resonate. With what he's trying to do, it's not one side or the other -- which has been problematic in some conversations. ... He's saying we're not going to stand on one side and look over at the other side. We're going to bring the sides together and show we can relate in many ways."

## NASIR ADDERLEY

### With Derwin James out, Nasir Adderley is ready to go

The word that can best describe the Los Angeles Chargers as a team even before the 2020 NFL season gets underway could be resilience. That may be considered a little bit of hyperbole or high praise since the team has not even played a single down in the regular season.

But there is something to be said about the manner the Chargers has gone about their business in the middle of the COVID-19 pandemic, losing a future Hall of Fame quarterback, and having to speak out against the social injustice atrocities that have speed-dialed massive protests around the world.

Then there is the matter of moving into their new home (SoFi Stadium) in Inglewood. Throughout all of this, Chargers players and coaches have tackled each day with resolve. Instead of panic in the wake of multiple crises, the organization has been a consistent model of measuredness.

That determined outlook to overcome all hiccups and bumps in the road was challenged when Derwin James, the Chargers All-Pro free safety went down with a knee injury on Aug. 31.

"I think it's an incredibly unfortunate situation," Chargers second-year safety Nasir Adderley said. "I mean, DJ's my guy... You don't want to see injuries happen to nobody, but especially seeing it happen to a person like him. Everyone knows what type of player he is. But the person he is, the leader, mentor, and all that it was really hard to see, especially come off his injury last year. So, we're supporting him and being there for him any way that we can. The game is better when he's out there."

Life can be cruel at times. Sometimes there is simply no rhyme or reason to explain what life offers up. In the NFL, that mantra holds true as well.

As a player on the top of the food chain when it comes to being a dominant force on the football field, James has seen the good as well as the bad.

The third-year defensive stalwart has ridden the high of a breakthrough season as a rookie and he has gone through a series of unfortunate events that have forced him to the sidelines and off the playing field.

After tearing up the league on his way to becoming an All-Pro safety in 2018, James was saddled with an injury that caused him to miss 11 of the 16 games played in the 2019 season. Speed-dial it to the 2020 season, and James was expected to be the same ferocious force on a very talented defense as he was back in his first season with the Chargers.

The chance for James to re-capture his on-field magic has come and went for this season. James, the Chargers announced, underwent successful surgery to repair a meniscus tear in his right knee.

James is expected to make a full recovery and be ready for the 2021 season. That's good news. However, the absence of James will be profoundly felt. Because he plays such an integral part in the Chargers' defense the news that James will miss the season before it even gets started is not something he nor the Chargers were prepared to hear.

"I'm sure everybody has heard the news about DJ (Derwin James). I spoke with him last night, late last night. He's home recovering. He's doing fine. Yeah, we're going to miss that young man," Chargers coach Anthony Lynn told reporters in a Zoom conference call. "We're going to miss for the season most likely. We have other guys on the team that's got to step up. But it's hard to step up and replace a young man like him with his intangibles. He's just as dynamic off the field as he is on the field. It's just unfortunate. We don't know why these things happen. The only thing that I can go back to is Proverbs 3:5 and 6: Lean not on your own understanding but trust the Lord in all your ways. That's always gotten me by, and I shared that with DJ. He's a man of faith, and if you pray, just keep him in your prayers."

The blow of losing James cannot be understated. But the Chargers may have already found their ram in the bush in the form of Adderley, whose football pedigree spells greatness. If he plays anywhere near the level that his cousin Pro Football Hall of Fame inductee Herb Adderley played at during his NFL heyday, the former Delaware star should be more than capable of handling his business.

Herb Adderley played nine of his 12 seasons in the NFL with the Green Bay Packers, played in four Super Bowls and earned five Pro Bowl nods. Listed at 6 feet and 206 pounds, Nasir Adderley is right at the playing weight of his older cousin which could work out well for him.

Now that doesn't mean the Chargers' draftee (No. 60) in the second round in the 2019 NFL Draft will have a bust in Canton, Ohio someday. It only means that the apple from the family tree didn't fall too far. With that said, Adderley could be the one to step into James' shoes. Those are some really big shoes to fill.

Lynn believes Adderley is capable of stepping up if he is called on to be the one to take James' place as the team's starting free safety.

"Whether he's ready or not, if that's the direction that we go he's going to have to be ready," Lynn said. "I have a lot of confidence in our secondary coaches to get him ready to play."

It's not a given yet that Adderley will be given the starting nod, not will free-agent free safety Earl Thomas looking for a home during the 2020 season.

"We're going to look at all options," Lynn said. "We'll take a look at all options."

Once the smoke clears from all the rosters cuts Lynn and the team will be making on their way to solidifying a 53-man roster, Adderley should be standing with the rest of the secondary talent the Chargers already have in place. That includes shutdown cornerbacks in Casey Hayward Jr. and Chris Harris Jr. Throw in veterans Rayshawn Jenkins, Desmond King, Michael Davis, as well as rookie Alohi Gilman (Notre Dame).

But with training camp, nothing is really for certain until that last roster spot has been claimed. In the case of Adderley, he is confident that his offseason preparation has put him in a position to have a great season.

"As far as me being ready for my opportunity, I've prepared and I trust my preparation," Adderley said. "I'm confident wherever they want to put me, whether that's free safety, strong safety, nickel. Coach (defensive backs coach Ron) Milus does a great job of making sure we're versatile and learning every single position."

One reason why Adderley feels he's ready to take on all-comers this season is the fact that he is doesn't have any nagging injuries weighing on him.

"It's really a blessing just being out here," Adderley said. "I haven't been healthy, fully healthy for a while, just going back to my Grade 3 ankle sprain I had in college right into the hamstring that kept lingering and lingering and getting worse. I'm just thankful to be out here and I'm just not taking any day for granted."

## Nasir Adderley on Opportunities and "Not Taking Any Day for Granted" in 2020

The Bolts announced on Wednesday that Derwin James had successful knee surgery and will be placed on Injured Reserve.

While the situation is tough, and head coach Anthony Lynn said it'll be hard to replace James given his intangibles, it's an opportunity for younger players to step up.

One of those younger guys is Nasir Adderley.

The former second-round pick of the Bolts is feeling confident in approaching whatever comes his way in 2020.

"I'm prepared and I trust my preparation," Adderley said. "I'm confident wherever they want to put me, whether that's free safety, strong safety, nickel. Coach Milo (defensive backs coach Ron Milus) does a great job making sure we're versatile and learning every single position."

The former Blue Hen had a standout career at Delaware amassing 64 tackles, 22 passes defended, 11 interceptions and four forced fumbles in four years. Additionally, he led the team in interceptions (four) and passes defended (seven) his senior season.

Unfortunately, a nagging hamstring injury bothered Adderley his rookie year with the Chargers and he was placed on injured reserve in Week 8.

But it's been a long journey back and now fully healthy, he's appreciative of being able to play the game he loves without limitations.

"I was just telling some of the coaches, it's really a blessing just being out here after how long because I haven't been fully healthy for a while just going back to my grade-three ankle sprain I had in college and right into the hamstring that kept lingering and lingering and getting worse," he said. "I'm just thankful to be out here and I'm not taking any day for granted."

Back at the 2020 NFL Scouting Combine, Lynn called 2019 a "redshirt year" for Adderley and was hopeful that sitting out gave him a chance to learn from the veterans. Ask Adderley about 2019 and he'll tell you that the mental reps he took coupled with the veteran guidance he gained helped him tremendously.

"Being off the field was really hard for me 'cause I didn't miss any games my college career. One of my teammates from back in college he told me, when you're off the field, it's a great time to engage mentally and those mental reps could be crucial. I see them benefitting me on the field now ... Especially last year just being around guys like DJ (Derwin James,) Rayshawn (Jenkins,) Desmond (King,) those guys can play anywhere and they taught me a whole lot and I love playing with these guys."

Even defensive coordinator Gus Bradley noted a shift. As it goes, the biggest jump a player should take in the NFL is from year one to year two, and with Adderley saying that the game has "slowed down a lot," it seems 2020 will be predicated more on doing and not as much on thinking.

"Nas, he's done a really good job," Bradley reflected. "Just his mindset is changed, how he approaches the game. Those things that he's doing and he's showing up on the field in a consistent effort, he's caught our eye. We're fortunate to have a guy like that (who has) really taken a big step from where he was last year to this year."

## 'Better than I've ever been': A Q&A with Chargers safety Nasir Adderley

Chargers safety Nasir Adderley went nearly two years without feeling fully healthy. It started with a high ankle sprain in his senior season at Delaware in the fall of 2018. Then came a hamstring injury he suffered while running the 40-yard dash at his Pro Day in spring of 2019 — an ailment that lingered and worsened throughout the early stages of his rookie year with the Chargers before he was placed on injured reserve in late October.

It was a nightmare of a debut season for the Chargers' 2019 second-round pick, one mostly spent searching for answers. But he has returned for Year 2 with a clear head — confident and ready to prove, finally, that he can play in this league.

I caught up with Adderley to discuss his frustrating 2019, the hamstring injury that derailed it and why he is so excited about his future with the Chargers.

What were your primary goals heading into this offseason?

Coming into this offseason, my goal was just to be healthy. I had a pretty tough two years, just with the high ankle sprain I had and then finally recovering from that, and then just dealing with that hamstring ever since. Pretty much, I just wanted to learn and understand what was really going on, so I've done my own research, reached out to many different doctors and stuff like that, just to figure out what was going on. I just wanted to truly learn about my body.

And so what did you find out through all that research?

So following the season, I actually learned — they told me I had a split in my tendon. So it's not like a traditional hamstring strain. Because I had a hamstring strain before in college, and I was back in like two to three days. So I understood that this was different, and it was hard. I'm not going to lie to you and act like it wasn't extremely frustrating. So basically, I had a split in my hamstring tendon, and it was called hamstring tendinosis, and it's pretty much when your tendons are overworked. Just given the type of person I am, I kept pushing it and and pushing it trying to be out there, and it ultimately ended with me going to IR.

Just how frustrating was last season for you?

The biggest thing that was the frustrating part for me was people not knowing the type of person I am. Like, if I can be out there, I'm going to be out there. I understand soreness. I understand all that. I played through a whole bunch of different stuff. But I think the most frustrating thing was people thinking it was a normal hamstring strain, but in reality that wasn't what it was. So I think that was the biggest thing I had to deal with. But I've moved on, and it's a new year. I feel healthy and better than I've ever been, even in college. So I'm just excited to move forward and get better each day.

What was the process like getting healthy in the offseason? Was it just a matter of giving yourself some rest, or was there more to it?

That was the determining factor, because I tried a whole bunch of different stuff while I'd been dealing with it. And once I was actually able to sit down and let it heal, I felt a lot better. And I got a PRP (platelet-rich plasma injection) done. So pretty much, in your tendon, you don't have a lot of blood flow in that area, and that's why it takes longer for it to heal than a normal hamstring strain. So the PRP pretty much takes your blood and then puts your blood into that area to stimulate the healing process. So we did that, and that actually felt really good. It was really sore and stuff like that, and was still giving me a bunch of pain. It got to a point where I couldn't even squat comfortably. It was hard because I'd never really dealt with injuries to that extent. I would even say that was worse than my Grade 3

high ankle sprain. But I'm grateful I was able to overcome that. It feels good to be back out here. It's been a long time since I've been healthy and able to actually be myself on the field.

Just to get into that a little more, how exciting is it to finally be on the field and healthy? You seem like a different player, just from watching you in practice.

Man, it's an incredible feeling. Even just stepping out here is a blessing. Just being around the guys I'm with, getting coached by these coaches, I'm learning a lot, I'm getting a lot better each day. I'm not satisfied, but I'm comfortable in the sense of, I feel like I can be myself on the field. You know what I mean?

Obviously, there are a lot of moving pieces in this secondary. You've been in that free safety role with the second team. You've been playing a little bit of nickel with the first team. Where do you see yourself fitting in? And also, how big is having that versatility?

I learned versatility is key. I learned that at an early, early age, like in college, just being able to even start off as a corner and even having the background as a safety and even playing nickel, that helped me get to where I am now. Even guys like (former Chargers defensive backs) Adrian Phillips and Jaylen Watkins, guys that moved around, you see the type of production and the stuff they do. So that's one of the biggest things I took from last year. I'm confident in my ability to play wherever, so wherever the team needs me, that's what I'm going to be willing to do. We got a lot of dogs back there, and I know we can make a bunch of plays. And so I'm excited to play alongside those guys, wherever that may be.

How comfortable would you be, hypothetically, at outside corner? I know you haven't gotten any reps there in camp, but you did play there in college.

I'm confident playing anywhere. Obviously, it's going to take some additional learning and just diving into the playbook. That's something, going into Year 2 especially, I'm just trying to focus on other positions and knowing where my help is and what this guy is doing and why we're doing it. That's the biggest thing I learned from just going in from Year 1 to Year 2, just to promote that versatility. If you looked at last year, we had a lot of guys move around and play different positions, and that's only going to make us a better unit.

We got to talk to defensive coordinator Gus Bradley, and he specifically mentioned how you seem more mature this year. What went into that maturation? How much of it was just enduring what you did in 2019?

I just moved on. It was incredibly frustrating. So I pretty much just came in and said, last year is last year, and I'm going to leave that at that. And I'm just going to focus on this year and being the best I can be and be the best teammate I can and just helping out in any way I can. I've been diving in the playbook a lot, too, especially during the offseason. I just wanted to make sure that whenever my opportunity does come, I'm going to be ready, for sure.

## JOEY BOSA

### Chargers' Joey Bosa more concerned with getting wins than setting records

Rest assured, this has been a couple of tough days for Los Angeles Chargers DE Joey Bosa.

Not because of aftershocks from the concussion he suffered in the Chargers' stunning 31-30 loss to Denver Nov. 1, one of many heartbreaking, one-score losses the Chargers have suffered. Those were bad enough that he wore special glasses to block out the sunlight.

No, these were aftershocks from the best game he played all season -- a career-high three sacks, six total tackles for loss, five quarterback hits, a pass defended and a fumble recovery. Bosa was the first to record such a stat line since tackles for loss were first tracked in 2008.

He became one of three players in NFL history to record three sacks, five QB hits, a pass breakup and a fumble recovery in the same game, joining James Harrison (2007) and Justin Houston (2013).

But Bosa's heroics weren't enough to get the victory, as the Chargers fell 27-17 to the Buffalo Bills to drop to 3-8 on the season. That record -- not his historic day and not passing Hall of Famer Junior Seau for fifth on the Chargers' all-time sack list with 47.5 -- is what was eating at him in his postgame Zoom interview. He twitched, he stretched, he looked agitated even as he politely answered questions from reporters.

"It sucks," he said simply.

And he knew the nearly five-hour flight back to Los Angeles was going to be even worse and then some.

"I know I'm going to wake up tomorrow and feel like s---," he said. But he also said being miserable is not an option, nor is it for his team, which has lost seven one-score games this season and lost four times after holding a double-digit lead.

"Not gonna happen on my watch," he added.

Bosa is the heart and soul of the Chargers' defense. When he was out against the Las Vegas Raiders and Miami Dolphins due to being in the concussion protocol, the defense lacked the big-play spark.

"He works hard," Chargers coach Anthony Lynn said. "Joey was playing early on with 2-3 different injuries we didn't even know about. He was playing through it, wants to be out there with his teammates and help us win. I love how professional he is; he gets his body right and gets back out there. He makes a difference."

That responsibility a lot to lay on a 25-year-old out of Ohio State, who has 7.5 sacks, 14 tackles for loss and 23 QB hits in nine games. Bosa was the third overall pick in the 2016 draft and was named AP defensive rookie of the year that season.

He has been a bright spot on a defense in sore need of one. And he's been a bright spot for his 23-year-old brother, Nick, who tore his ACL in week two this season after a banner rookie season of his own in 2019 after being drafted No. 2 overall by the San Francisco 49ers. Nick Bosa has been bunking at Joey's Orange County home with frequent visits from Mom, Cheryl, and Dad, John -- a first-round draft pick by the Dolphins in 1987 -- complete with home cooking.

But this week is different. This week is hard. Especially with Pro Bowl teammate Melvin Ingram III out with a knee injury. The two make up a dynamic force, but have only been on the field together in five games this season.

"I really, really wanted to pull that one out," Joey Bosa said of the Buffalo loss. It's just hard to feel excited about a tough game like that."

Bosa said he thought the game would turn once the defense forced three turnovers in seven minutes spanning the end of the third quarter and start of the fourth. But the Chargers were only able to get three points off those takeaways.

"Everyone is pretty upset," he said. "We knew it was a big game if we were to make a big push at the end of the season."

Bosa signed a five-year, \$135 million contract extension over the summer after recording 19 sacks in his first 20 career games. Life is not so tough.

If only the Chargers could win.

"We can't be depressed, hang your head," he said. "It should hurt, it should suck. But guys aren't going to mope around ... we will pull together ... It could be a long rest of the season of guys start shutting down."

With a home game against the New England Patriots next (4:25 p.m. ET Sunday, CBS) followed by games at home against the Atlanta Falcons, at Las Vegas, at home against the Denver Broncos and at the Kansas City Chiefs, they can't afford to shut down. Bosa said he won't allow it.

"It starts with me having a good attitude tomorrow," he said on Sunday.

After a long plane ride home to mull everything over.

# For Joey Bosa, 'It Means the World' to Stay in Powder Blue

Joey Bosa waited for his phone to ring from the team hotel parking lot last Tuesday, his bright blue car out of sight from those who would notice it.

The deadline for Chargers veterans to report to 2020 training camp was drawing closer, but Bosa's agent was about to deliver him big news: The Pro Bowl defensive end would be staying in powder blue for the foreseeable future.

"It was hard to contain my emotions coming in there getting [tested with] the swab," he said. "It helped that I had a mask on, probably, because I had a smirk underneath my mask walking in there."

It became official last Saturday: Bosa signed a multi-year extension with the Chargers, a reward for being one of the elite pass rushers in the NFL over the last four years. The 25-year-old will anchor a talented Los Angeles defense for the next several seasons. He'll also have a big say in the team's quest for a Super Bowl championship.

"For them just to believe in me and to want me to be a part of their team and to be kind of the face of the team for the next six years, it means the world," he said.

In four seasons with the Chargers, Bosa has 40 sacks, 53 tackles for loss and 82 quarterback hits – top ten in each category since 2016. Only Rams defensive tackle Aaron Donald (1.98) has hit the quarterback more on a per-game basis than Bosa (1.60) during that time.

Together with fellow defensive end Melvin Ingram, the two have combined for 72.5 sacks since 2016. Only the Vikings' duo of Danielle Hunter and Everson Griffen have had more sacks (83). The Chargers also added to the defense this offseason with the free-agent acquisitions of cornerback Chris Harris Jr. and defensive tackle Linval Joseph.

Perhaps most intriguing, though, is what Bosa and 24-year-old All-Pro safety Derwin James are capable of together for an entire season. The two have only shared the field for 12 regular-season games the past two years.

"I'm just excited to see what these guys can do," Bosa said. "We missed Derwin a hell of a lot last year for a big part of the season. So, hopefully knock on wood we all stay healthy out there, and I think if we get that group out there together it's going to be dangerous."

For the next five months, at least, Bosa will spend nearly every day with his football family, knowing he won't be leaving the franchise he was drafted to any time soon. It's what made last Tuesday's phone call with his immediate family so special.

"I think the best moment for me was when I got that call from my dad," Bosa said. "A lot of screaming. A lot of colorful language, but it was a great moment. ... Really that's what means the most to me, to make my family so proud."

## Joey Bosa went from stressful car wait to long-lasting Charger

Joey Bosa was under stress last week when his agent and the Chargers were approaching the final hours for striking a deal in time for the first day of training camp. Bosa's father, John, felt the brunt of the jitters.

"All right, calm down," the Chargers' star pass rusher recalled telling his father. "We'll have a good conversation later, hopefully."

The younger Bosa was right. He agreed to terms on a five-year, \$135 million contract extension, but instead of calling his father to deliver the life-changing news, he jumped out of his blue car and hustled to the Irvine hotel where the Chargers were having their training-camp check-ins and coronavirus testing.

Bosa made it with a few minutes to spare and hid a story-telling smirk underneath his black face covering.

The real story transpired outside the hotel where Bosa's car was parked. He waited there for about 10 minutes before his agent Brian Ayrault told him it was OK to go inside. Besides the hidden smirk, Bosa contained the emotions that came from receiving a record-setting contract and was tested for the first time this season.

"Got the swab and walked out," Bosa, who has since signed his contract, told reporters Monday in a Zoom news conference. "After that, a rush kinda came over me and made the calls to my parents."

"Best moment was when I got that call from my dad. A lot of screaming. A lot of colorful language. It was a great moment in the car. I was telling him, 'Stop, you're making me cry,' driving home. I was gonna crash, but it was just a great moment."

It's unknown if Bosa would have entered the hotel parking lot without the good-news call from his agent, but luckily for him and the Chargers, the worst-case scenario of a contract holdout didn't transpire.

"I don't have to worry about that," Bosa said.

John Bosa, a former Miami Dolphins defensive end, can now exhale until his younger son, Nick, is eligible for a contract extension in two years. Nick Bosa is already recognized as one of the best defensive ends in the NFL after a memorable rookie season with the San Francisco 49ers in 2019.

"He has his sights set on breaking that (contract) record very soon, which is awesome to be able to say that's even possible," Joey Bosa said about his brother.

Bosa knows his record-setting contract, which includes \$102 million in total guarantees, the most ever for a defensive player, won't stand for long, but he's just happy to reset the edge-rusher contract market and did it without the mess that came from his rookie-contract negotiations.

In 2016, Bosa missed his first training camp and didn't join a practice until Aug. 30 after a tedious contract dispute with the Chargers regarding guaranteed money.

"I think my holdout my rookie year could also have a part to play in it," Bosa said for why there was an emphasis in getting his extension done before training camp. "They know that I know what I bring to the team and I know my own value. ... I think they've seen the body of work I put in, and I don't think either of us wanted to butt heads, and I certainly didn't want to go anywhere else."

"I'm super happy here and I'm super happy with this team. (I'm) pumped for the coaches that I have."

Bosa, however, had his doubts about agreeing to an extension before the fifth and final year of his rookie contract. He said there wasn't a lot of dialogue between his agent and the team this offseason because of the uncertainty surrounding the season. Once the league and the NFL Players Association agreed on a deal for playing this season amid a pandemic, that's when negotiations heated up.

"Probably a few days before that, I would have said no way," Bosa said about getting a deal done, "but (last) Tuesday, things were moving pretty fast, and I think we both just wanted to get a deal done. We wanted to focus on the season ahead of us. Until the last few hours, I really didn't know. Even until the last 30 minutes, I didn't know."

"But just to be able to get it done before the season and not have any of that hang over my head or worried ... for it to be such a great contract and record breaking in all aspects, it's pretty shocking."

Bosa thanked the Spanos family for making him the defensive face of the franchise for the next six seasons and credited general manager Tom Telesco for being influential in striking a new deal before training camp.

Now, one of the premier edge rushers in the NFL can focus on helping his star-studded defense, which includes Derwin James, Chris Harris Jr., Casey Hayward and Melvin Ingram, dethrone the defending AFC West and Super Bowl champions, the Kansas City Chiefs.

Chiefs star quarterback Patrick Mahomes recently signed a massive contract that will keep him tied with the Chargers' division rival through the 2031 season. Telesco and the Spanos family can now take some comfort in knowing Bosa will be around for at least six of those years to chase him around.

It's been a strange offseason, but Bosa was on the field Monday for the team's first full workout of training camp. He was reminiscing with rookie defensive end Joe Gaziano about his first game with the Chargers in 2016 against the then-Oakland Raiders.

Many more games to come for Bosa and the Chargers.

# The Chargers gave Joey Bosa exactly what he deserved

As of 4:50 p.m. Tuesday, Joey Bosa was nowhere to be found. The Chargers' COVID-19 testing window for veteran players, at their team hotel in Irvine, Calif., was closing in 10 minutes. It was no secret that Bosa was in search of a new contract, so his absence in that moment, with the clock ticking, seemed to speak volumes.

Two minutes later, Bosa arrived for his test at the Irvine Marriott. He spoke three words into the camera of the Chargers' social media team: "I made it."

He could have been speaking literally — as in, he made it to training camp. Or he could have been speaking figuratively — as in, he made it as the highest-paid non-quarterback in the history of the NFL.

Because less than two hours after Bosa reported, news broke that he had agreed to a gargantuan contract extension with the Chargers. The agreement was first reported by ESPN and was confirmed later Tuesday by the Chargers. ESPN reported that the extension is worth \$135 million over five new years, including \$78 million fully guaranteed at signing.

The contract has an average annual value of \$27 million. That is a record for a defensive player, beating out Myles Garrett, who signed a five-year, \$125 million extension with Cleveland this month. That is also important because Bosa has proven, through his production, to be at least as good a player as Garrett, if not better. He deserved at least a contract that valuable.

The money guaranteed at signing — \$78 million — also is eye-opening because it means Bosa will be receiving a sizable signing bonus, or money up front, in a time of substantial financial uncertainty, not just in the NFL but around the country and world. Still, we have to wait for the particulars of the deal to surface before we can determine how it affects future salary-cap hits and how much cash Bosa is actually receiving upon signing. For now, it appears Bosa will play the 2020 season on his fifth-year option — \$14.36 million — and his extension will start in 2021.

The important thing, for now, is this was a deal the Chargers absolutely had to get done. They passed on giving Melvin Gordon the contract extension he was looking for last offseason, largely with Bosa's extension in mind. Not paying a running back is one thing. Not paying a 25-year-old player at a premium position — edge rusher — is another.

I've detailed the statistics over and over again this offseason to show just how good Bosa has been in his first four seasons. He is one of only 11 players since the NFL started keeping sacks as an official stat in 1982 to total 40 sacks in his first 51 games. Four of those 11 players are in the Hall of Fame. Von Miller is a fifth who will get to Canton when he retires. Bosa is in elite company.

Perhaps more importantly to this contract, Bosa proved himself this past season as a fully rounded player. He missed more than half the season in 2018, but he returned in 2019 to put up huge numbers — 11.5 sacks, 20 TFL, 31 QB hits — in 16 games. He was remarkable both as a pass rusher and a run defender and often was the best player on the field for either team.

Bosa, on more than one Sunday, single-handedly kept the Chargers in games.

He is worthy of this contract in every way, shape and form. The Chargers, to their credit, gave him exactly what he was looking for — and, frankly, what he had earned based on Garrett's market-setting deal.

In classic Tom Telesco fashion, the Chargers general manager kept this close to the vest on a Monday Zoom call with reporters. He claimed to have not heard from Bosa's camp. Several times, he told reporters he did not want to discuss any contract negotiations. He didn't appear like a personnel decision-maker on the verge of inking a career-defining contract.

Credit to him, really.

Telesco did provide a hint, though, when he said he felt the Chargers were "set up pretty well for 2021 no matter what happens." That's even with some lingering uncertainty over what the salary cap will be next season, after COVID-related lost revenues.

Telesco has the ability to finagle his cap sheet — despite the possibility of the cap ceiling dropping to \$175 million next season — because of how many players are slated to come off the books after this season, including Melvin Ingram, Keenan Allen, Hunter Henry, Mike Pouncey, Tyrod Taylor and Denzel Perryman, who account for six of the nine highest cap hits in 2020, according to Over The Cap.

Telesco also has his hopeful 2021 quarterback starter, Justin Herbert, on a rookie deal, adding to the space he has to work with, even in a worst-case scenario. All that made this Bosa extension possible. At the same time, the deal will make it more difficult for the Chargers to keep all of those previously mentioned free agents next season.

But that's that nature of the NFL.

It comes down to this: The Chargers were in a position to get this done. They did. And now they will keep Bosa with the team for six more years.

A win for everyone involved.

## BRYAN BULAGA

### For Bryan Bulaga, a fresh start with Chargers — and, he insists, no hard feelings toward Packers

GREEN BAY — Bryan Bulaga will not be taking up surfing. As excited as he and his wife, Abbie, and the couple's two children are about their impending California adventure — whenever that actually begins — and his new job as the Los Angeles Chargers' starting right tackle, he has no intention of riding the waves of the Pacific Ocean or learning how to keep his 6-foot-5, 314-pound frame balanced atop a JS or O'Neill board.

"There's no way. No way," the now ex-Green Bay Packers tackle said with a laugh during an interview Tuesday on ESPN Wisconsin. "I'll still golf, but I don't know about the surfing. I don't think those two things would mix well — me and surfing."

Bulaga does believe he and the Chargers will be an excellent fit, however, even though he's a tried-and-true Midwestern guy who grew up outside of Chicago, went to college at Iowa and spent his first 10 NFL seasons in Green Bay. And he's excited about a new challenge with a new team — but with a familiar offensive line coach — after the Packers made it clear to him they were going to go in a different direction at his position.

That same day, Bulaga said the Packers reached out and let him know they appreciated all he'd done during his decade with the team — from helping the Packers win Super Bowl XLV as the youngest player ever to start a Super Bowl, to overcoming a myriad of injuries to anchor the line, to becoming an elder statesman and mentor as other veterans moved on — but had decided not to bring him back.

The Packers then quickly moved to sign ex-University of Wisconsin lineman Ricky Wagner, who'd been cut by the Detroit Lions, to a far less pricey two-year, \$11 million deal (\$3.5 million signing bonus) to serve as Bulaga's replacement in the lineup.

"There was some communication on the first day of the tampering period. I think from that point, we both kind of knew we were going to be going separate ways," Bulaga said. "I don't want anything to come off negative towards Green Bay because it really wasn't that at all. It was moreso that, 'Hey, this is our situation, and this is kind of the direction we're going to go. The organization made a decision and that's what they went with. Obviously, the move they made Monday early during the tampering period showed which direction they were going to go."

"I think we had a pretty good idea this could be the direction it was going to go early on. I wasn't shell-shocked or totally caught off guard. I wasn't blindsided by it. I wish everyone there well. I hope (the Packers) have a great year this year. I still have a lot of really good friends that I want to see do well and succeed and have good success."

Bulaga had an inkling he wasn't in the Packers' plans when Condon didn't hear from the club after the team's season-ending loss to the San Francisco 49ers in the NFC Championship Game on Jan. 19.

"That's the way this thing goes. Business decisions get made," Bulaga said. "That's life in the NFL."

For Bulaga, the transition to a new team will be helped by reuniting with offensive line coach James Campen, who joined Chargers head coach Anthony Lynn's staff earlier this offseason after spending the 2019 season with the Cleveland Browns. Campen was Bulaga's line coach in Green Bay from his rookie season in 2010 through the 2018 season before new coach Matt LaFleur opted to hire Adam Stenavich and part ways with Campen.

Not only was Campen vital to Bulaga's development, but he also understands what the now 31-year-old needs in terms of his practice schedule to stay healthy and sharp with limited work during the week.

"Personally, for me, from a football standpoint, and in my career, that was a big sell to me," Bulaga said of playing for Campen again. "Because of the relationship I have with Coach Campen and being under his tutelage for nine years, and the relationship that we've built, and him understanding the type of player and the type of guy I am. But also, where I'm at (in my career), the maintenance we need to do and what I'll need day-in and day-out in practice."

"That was a big sell to me. Obviously, going to an unfamiliar place and having a familiar face there was a big deal for me. Abbie is really good friends with Coach Campen's wife, so it's a good situation, for sure."

Bulaga said experiencing the transition from ex-coach Mike McCarthy and his staff to LaFleur and a new offensive system — including a different run-blocking system that relied more heavily on zone schemes — will benefit him as he starts over with a new team.

"I'm excited about it — getting to know a whole new set of guys and building new relationships, experiencing that," Bulaga said. "I've had the same locker for 10 years in Green Bay. It's been the same thing for the last 10 years, so being able to get into a new locker room and get to know new people, yeah, it's a little nerve-racking. You want to make sure you fit into the culture that coach Lynn has built out there. But also, for me, just making sure I perform at the highest level I can. When you do that, you'll fit into the culture fine."

"Everyone likes to win. That's the whole point of this thing. With Coach Campen in his first year there too, him and I will be getting to know the pulse of that o-line room together. It's a matter of getting there and getting to know these guys and trying to get on the same page as them as quickly as possible. I kind of felt that way this last year with Coach LaFleur coming in and bringing in a new scheme. Yeah, the guys were the same, but it was a whole new experience learning a new offense and getting comfortable with that. I do have a little experience and the transition in Green Bay to bring out to L.A."

With Bulaga moving on and veteran defensive back Tramon Williams still unsigned, it's possible the Packers will enter the 2020 season with only two holdovers from their Super Bowl XLV-winning 2010 team: quarterback Aaron Rodgers and kicker Mason Crosby. Bulaga mentioned them, as well as left tackle David Bakhtiari, center Corey Linsley, fellow offensive linemen Billy Turner, Elgton Jenkins and Lucas Patrick, and a host of support staffers (equipment staffer Tim Odea, athletic trainers Bryan Engel and Nate Weir) as those he'll miss from his time in Green Bay.

At the same time, he's eager to get started with the Chargers — despite the uncertainty created by the COVID-19 pandemic that has him staying at his offseason home in Florida for the foreseeable future.

"There's absolutely no hard feelings. I had a great 10 years in Green Bay. I loved my time there. Met a lot of great people. A lot of great friendships I'll have for a lifetime," Bulaga said. "That's the way it goes. My wife and I are pretty excited about this new chapter. Heading out west — whenever we get to head out west — we're excited about it. This is going to be something totally different than what we're used to. A definite change of pace but it's something we're definitely looking forward to and I'm ready to experience what the West Coast has to offer."

"But those guys that you're with day in and day out and they're pretty much family because you see them more than you see your family, those are the types of things you miss. Those relationships, it's not that I'm going to replace them, I'm just going to build some new ones. I won't forget my guys in Green Bay."

### Chargers' Tevaughn Campbell makes Canadian history with pick-six

Chargers cornerback Tevaughn Campbell had a short walk into the end zone on Sunday against the New York Jets, but there was nothing brief or easy about his path to the NFL.

Campbell only needed to waltz 6 yards after he intercepted quarterback Joe Flacco's pass intended for Jamison Crowder in the first quarter of the Chargers' 34-28 win at SoFi Stadium.

"It looked easy," Campbell said, "but it was definitely something we practiced all week. I seen the look in practice, so I kinda anticipated it."

Campbell, 27, spent four seasons in the Canadian Football League dreaming about making those kinds of plays in the NFL. It was Campbell's first career interception and touchdown in the NFL — and he did it against his former team.

Campbell joined the Jets in 2019 on a reserve/future contract after leaving the Canadian Football League. But he didn't play his first NFL regular-season game until Week 3 of this season against the Carolina Panthers.

"I definitely had a dream and that was to get to the NFL," said Campbell, a native of Scarborough, Canada, near Toronto. "I spent four years in the CFL trying to pursue that dream and thank God I made it here."

The Chargers signed Campbell to their practice squad after he was released by the Jets last season. He was waived a handful of times by the Chargers before making his debut in Week 3.

Campbell worked his way from practice squad player to backup defensive back to starting slot cornerback for the Chargers this season. He became the starter because the Chargers traded Desmond King to the Tennessee Titans and Chris Harris Jr. is nursing a foot injury while on injured reserve.

But Chargers coach Anthony Lynn said Campbell earned his starting role by improving every week since seeing a surge in snaps in Week 8 against the Denver Broncos. Campbell had a season-high 57 defensive snaps against the Jets.

"This young man is just getting better every single game," Lynn said. "He hadn't played a lot of American football, so I like what he's doing and I like how (defensive backs coach) Ron Milus is developing this young man."

"The more football he plays, the better his football instincts is going to be. And you're going to see him make more of those plays."

Campbell became the first Canadian-born defensive player to score a touchdown for the Chargers, according to Elias Sports Bureau. Overall, he was the first Canadian to score a touchdown for the Chargers since wide receiver Ryan Thelwell in 1998.

Campbell is only the second Canadian to play cornerback in an NFL game in the past 50 years, according to the Toronto Sun. The other Canadian cornerback was Davis Sanchez, who played for the Chargers in 2001 and 2002.

Campbell said he hadn't played slot cornerback in his career before this season. He played college football at the University of Regina in Saskatchewan and was drafted by the Calgary Stampeders in the third round of the 2015 CFL Draft.

"It was definitely different," Campbell said of playing slot corner. "It was definitely a different position, but we worked on it in training camp. We worked on it all year, so I kinda filled in where I needed to."

Lynn said Campbell will remain in the defensive backs rotation after Harris returns from injured reserve. Harris is close to returning to the active roster, according to Lynn.

"Chris will play the nickel," Lynn said Monday, "but Tevaughn will be on the field at some point."

# Toronto's Tevaughn Campbell presses closer to NFL history as a Chargers cornerback

The most difficult position to master in all of sports, many say, is quarterback in the NFL.

Whether or not that's true, the next most difficult in the NFL is cornerback. That's the position on defence where muscular, average-sized but supremely athletic speedsters cover opposing team's wide receivers.

While dozens of born-and-raised Canadians have played in an NFL game over the past half-century — most frequently along the offensive or defensive line, or as kicker — Tevaughn Campbell of the Los Angeles Chargers on Sunday might have his best chance yet at becoming only the second Canadian since the '60s to take NFL snaps at 'corner.'

"This is something I've been trying to get to my entire life," Campbell, a native Torontonion, told Postmedia on Thursday in a phone interview from Los Angeles.

If he does dress for the Chargers' game at the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, and does get some reps at cornerback, you know which quarterback Campbell would face, right?

Yup. Tom Brady. Welcome to the NFL.

The only other Canadian to crack an NFL roster at corner since the '60s is Davis Sanchez, with the then-San Diego Chargers in 2001 and 2002. (Pro-Football-Reference.com lists Concordia speedster Mark Montreuil as a cornerback drafted by the Chargers in 1995, but he played safety in three NFL seasons.)

The six-foot, 200-pound Campbell is a former University of Regina football and track star, and an ex-CFLer.

Now 27, Campbell was born and raised in east-end Toronto. Specifically, in Scarborough Village. He attended St. Boniface Catholic School through Grade 8, Jean Vanier Catholic Secondary School from Grades 9-11 and Sir Wilfrid Laurier Collegiate Institute in Grade 12.

He played only club football, with Scarborough Minor Football Association and Toronto Thunder of the Ontario Varsity Football League.

From there, in 2011, Campbell was off to the University of Regina. He played on a Rams defence that featured future NFL defensive linemen Akiem Hicks (a native Californian now starring with the Chicago Bears) and fellow Torontonion Stefan Charles, who from 2013-16 played with the Buffalo Bills and Detroit Lions and now is under contract with the CFL's Edmonton Eskimos.

Charles was Campbell's first roommate at U of R, and the mild-mannered big man proved a helpful mentor.

Campbell not only played defensive back with the Rams through 2014, but returned punts and kickoffs too. He turned pro in early 2015.

Despite setting a new electronically timed record in the 40-yard dash at the CFL National Combine — in a crazy-fast 4.36 seconds — the CFL Scouting Bureau rated Campbell as only the No. 15 Canadian prospect in its final 2015 pre-draft rankings. It's uncommon for any Canadian prospect not ranked in that bureau's Top 10 to score an NFL rookie-camp tryout after not being drafted south of the border, but Campbell did — twice. Neither the New York Giants nor Washington offered him a contract.

Instead, Campbell opted to both launch a career in the CFL and, in the 2016 and 2017 off-seasons, return to U of R in winter semester to run track. Campbell won a slew of Western Canada and national-university sprint medals for the Rams, including a CIS gold in 2016 in the indoor 60-metre dash, in a school-record 6.67 seconds.

In four years as a CFL cornerback, Campbell hop-scotched from the Calgary Stampeders (2015), to the Saskatchewan Roughriders (2016-17), to the Montreal Alouettes (2017-18).

"In my first year, I was just trying to crack the roster," Campbell said. "The second year, I was trying to get a starting job. And in my third and fourth years I felt like I deserved better, for lack of a better term."

In that regard, Campbell is a cornerback to the marrow; without such overflowing self-confidence, one cannot possibly succeed at that position.

Indeed, by early 2019 Campbell felt he needed "to chase something bigger, and I had a lot of coaches and players tell me that I had the skills to play at the NFL level."

The New York Jets signed him, and kept him through spring and summer training-camp practices, before cutting him on the eve of the regular season. Campbell did get to play in Jets preseason games.

Chargers pro scouts took notice, and that club signed him to its practice squad in September 2019, then rotated him between that roster-support unit and the active roster for the remainder of the season. Campbell never dressed for a game, however.

"I was just trying to contribute to the team in any way possible," he said. "I know it's difficult when it comes to roster management for teams. I wasn't complaining. I was just waiting for my shot."

The only other Canadian corner in the NFL in the past half-century, Sanchez, is now a CFL and NFL analyst for TSN. He played in 22 NFL games and started twice for the Chargers from 2001-02, in between starring stints in the CFL with four teams from 1999 to 2011.

In a phone interview this week, Sanchez raved about what Campbell has done.

"He wasn't a star in the CFL by any means," Sanchez said, "even as a Canadian, where you definitely would get more attention and publicity if you're playing a position mostly played by Americans. That, to me, even speaks louder as to just how great his physical gifts are, to jump from there to the NFL."

For Sanchez, even if that were the only NFL taste Campbell ever got, it'd have been "truly phenomenal."

"Tevaughn is an athletic phenom," he said. "Obviously a world-class athlete. I mean, to be able to come from where he did and have really little experience in the CFL, and then go down and make two NFL rosters?"

"I haven't talked to anybody on the Chargers staff, but I can promise you they realize how special his gifts are, and they see that they can maybe make a player out of him."

On cut-downs weekend a month ago, the Chargers kept Campbell on the active 53-man roster. He did not dress in L.A.'s first two games (teams may dress a maximum of 48 players) but he made his NFL debut last Sunday, in jersey No. 37, in the Chargers' home-field loss to Carolina.

While he did not play at cornerback on defence, Campbell did get in for eight special-teams plays — which included gunner on punt coverage. Plus, he was backup punt returner and kickoff returner.

Did Campbell return kicks in the CFL?

"Surprisingly, no," he said. "I did all through college. But I guess they felt like I wasn't a good enough returner in the CFL."

"But it was just great to get out there last week. It had been a long time since I played in a football game, in last year's preseason games with the Jets. It was definitely good to get out there and re-establish my footing, and prepare for this week."

And this week the Chargers placed veteran cornerback Chris Harris Jr. on injured reserve, with a foot injury, which might increase Campbell's chances to get his first NFL snaps at corner.

While Campbell is officially listed by the Chargers this week as third-string right cornerback on the active roster, he says he backs up Desmond King II at slot corner.

"Right now I'm dressing — starting on special teams. But in terms of defensive back, I think we have to play by ear and see where it goes."

Here are the two gargantuan hurdles Campbell has had to clear to work himself into this unlikely position.

First, speed.

One of the biggest differences between top Canadian and American cornerback prospects is that the latter, in high school and college, are constantly implored to develop more speed by running competitive sprint races.

"Cornerback is all about speed," said Sanchez, a three-time CFL all-star who grew up in Vancouver. "There's no ifs, ands or buts. If you can't really, really run then you can't play corner. The fact is, up here, up north, especially back in the day, track has never been a big focus in Canadian high schools. Me being one of the fastest kids in my province (British Columbia), I never even ran track in high school."

"In the States, that's what up-and-coming corners do. They play football and they run track. Especially in the hotbeds for talent, in Florida, Texas and California. That's the biggest thing — the lack of speed in most Canadian defensive backs, because track wasn't a big thing for us growing up."

Campbell was a notable, shining exception. And he had to fight to do it.

"I ran track and field all through grade school, and in Grade 12. Then in Regina," he said. "Not doing that definitely is a big factor against a Canadian corner crossing the border. Just because down here, they promote that kind of stuff. They tell their corners in college, 'Hey, in the off-season we want you to be on the university track team.'"

"(At the University of Regina), in the off-season they didn't want me to be on the track team. And they made that clear. And I made it clear that I don't care. It got me here, so yeah."

The other big hurdle Campbell has had to clear — and what many would point to as the principal reason for the modern dearth of Canadian corners in the NFL — is the lack of opportunities in the Canadian game to play press-man coverage.

Before discussing that, let's define some cornerback terms.

Traditionally, American football teams field two true cornerbacks on any play, and nowadays usually field a third — a 'nickelback' or 'slot corner' who possesses both top-shelf speed and agility even for corners, in order to cover often speedier, more agile, smurfy receivers who often line up between a wideout and the line, in the 'slot.'

A corner generally is employed in one of three manners: (1) in 'press-man' (when he lines up directly in front of a receiver, to press him at the start, then follows him anywhere); (2) in 'off-man' (when he lines up a few yards off the receiver, but still follows him anywhere); or (3) in some type of zone (when he is responsible for a defined coverage area, and picks up any receiver that runs into it).

Dane Brugler of TheAthletic.com, a leading NFL Draft analyst, in an email to Postmedia underscored why cornerback might indeed be the toughest position to play in American football, after QB.

"Not only do you have to be the best athlete on the field, but you also have to be one of the most competitive, resilient and instinctive," Brugler said. "Playing cornerback is like a dance. You have to be extremely coordinated, but the technical aspects are paramount. Other positions can get by with their size or speed, but a cornerback must be disciplined and dialed in, or it doesn't matter. It's also the toughest position to mask mistakes. There's a reason the top corners around the league are among the highest paid."

On that point, 2020 has seen record contract extensions for several of the NFL's top corners, led by the \$100-million deal scored by Jalen Ramsey of the Los Angeles Rams (with \$71.2 million guaranteed), and the \$97.5-million deal (with \$66 million guaranteed) given to Baltimore's Marlon Humphrey just this week.

Thing is, Sanchez points out that whereas a CFL cornerback might line up in press-man coverage "a quarter or a third of the time," an NFL corner now does so "seven or eight times out of 10 — a heck of a lot more."

In other words, it takes a CFL cornerback about three seasons to get as many reps in press-man as his NFL counterpart does in one. And that disparity probably is even more pronounced for a Canadian in high school and in college.

Sanchez said he used to buy into what legendary CFL head coach Mike Riley once said, that if you can cover on the CFL's bigger field you can cover everywhere. Not anymore.

"NFL quarterbacks are so accurate, and the timing is so precise between a quarterback and a receiver, that if you're only close, it's a completion," Sanchez said. "That's the biggest difference, and that's why you have to play press. In the CFL, if I was right there and right on the receiver's hip in off-man coverage, and the quarterback threw the ball, I was probably either going to pick it off or break it up."

"But in the NFL, if you have really great off-coverage, it's a completion. The precision and timing are that good. If you don't disrupt the receiver and get him off the route in press-man, it's a completion regardless of how good your coverage is. That's the difference."

Added Campbell: "In Regina we didn't play much press-man. We played man, but typically it was off. But I was a fast guy so I trusted my speed. Every time I got the opportunity I pressed. Even in the CFL I pressed. If it was 3rd-and-15, man coverage, I'm pressing — because what's the point of playing off if I can just press you?"

Campbell is on a one-year contract with the Chargers that pays him the NFL minimum salary for players without an accrued season of experience: \$610,000 US, according to Spotrac.com.

Contrasting his low-buzz college and CFL careers to where he is now, one can't help but conclude Campbell must possess an unwavering, almost arrogant self-confidence. All those times he was told he just wasn't good enough merely bounced off him.

"You hit it on the head," Campbell said. "That's where I come from all the time. I always try to get better at what I do, and I feel like I really didn't get the shots that I deserved in the past, but that didn't stop me from trying to go for bigger things."

### Newly extended Chargers RB Austin Ekeler reflects on undrafted past

IRVINE, Calif. — Austin Ekeler was nervous.

In the spring of 2017, the last day of Los Angeles Chargers OTAs, the undrafted rookie out of Western Colorado was sitting in the office of newly minted Chargers head coach Anthony Lynn. His mind was racing. But he had no idea what to say.

He knew he hadn't had the strongest performance, but not because of lack of effort on his part. Ekeler is a self-described gym rat. Growing up in rural Briggsdale, Colorado, he spent his summers pitching fences for his then-stepfather's fencing company from sunrise until sundown. Work ethic has never been an issue. He just wasn't getting reps.

"I wanted to get on the field and show I'm a great athlete. I can run, I can catch, I can tackle. I could do whatever you need me to do," Ekeler recalled recently from his home in Irvine. "And so, I remember going to my running back coach and asking, 'Hey, man, what do I need to do to get more reps?'"

It's hard to imagine Ekeler being in that place, considering what he accomplished in his breakout 2019 season. His 92 receptions for 993 yards were behind only Carolina's Christian McCaffrey and his eight touchdown receptions topped all running backs and were the most in one season by an undrafted running back. He also added 557 yards and three touchdowns rushing.

On March 6, the tireless hard work — ingrained in him from those miserable Colorado summers — earned him a four-year, \$24.5 million contract extension, with \$15 million guaranteed.

But as one of six running backs in camp in 2017, Ekeler's reps were limited. He would get six or fewer on some days during an entire practice. The team's starting running back was getting almost all of them.

"Melvin Gordon was the No. 1 guy and [former running backs coach Alfredo Roberts] was like, 'I need to get him as many looks as he can get because he's our guy right now.' And that was a little discouraging because I didn't know that going in," Ekeler said.

As he sat in the spotless yet sparsely furnished kitchen of his new home — which he moved into this spring just as the coronavirus pandemic halted everything, including furniture deliveries — the details from that spring and summer came back easily. For Ekeler, a relentless perfectionist, his disappointing performance was at the forefront.

"I didn't have a perfect camp by any means," he said. "I was making mistakes left and right. I was playing really slow just because I was thinking so much."



The realization of his place in the pecking order was sobering for Ekeler, but it didn't dissuade him. Minicamp and training camp were still ahead; then, there was a month and a half before the regular season began. He had time. He also had nothing to lose.

It's a lesson from Ekeler's journey: It never hurts to ask.

"So when it came to the end of camp," he said, "I was thinking, 'OK, I gave everything I could.' I wanted to make sure that I went and talked to my coaches to see what I needed to work on. I went straight to Coach Lynn. I had never talked to him before."

Ekeler was nervous. Sweaty and shook, with Lynn staring at him, Ekeler struggled to find the words to explain his intentions. Stumbling, he finally settled on: "I like the way you coach!" Even now, three years later, Ekeler can't help but look down, shake his head and laugh about that.

"And then I remember asking, 'What do I have to do to make the team?'" Ekeler said.

Lynn didn't waste any time, giving Ekeler a brief to-do list. "Protect the quarterback. Hang on to the ball. Go talk to Coach Stew."

Confused, but without losing that youthful, rookie optimism, Ekeler obliged.

"OK, well that doesn't really give me anything," he recalled thinking. "So hopefully I can get something from Coach Stew."

George Stewart, the Chargers' special teams coordinator, has been an NFL coach since 1989; he spent 17 years as a wide receivers coach for the San Francisco 49ers, Atlanta Falcons and Minnesota Vikings. But that isn't why Lynn sent Ekeler his way.

"They'll come to me, but he wasn't passing them off," Stewart said from his office in Costa Mesa. "He just knows that for a young player to have ability to make an impact early on the football team, [it] is through special teams."

Stewart remembers Ekeler's approach vividly.

"When I first saw him," he said, "I thought he was a ball boy coming up to ask me questions about the balls at practice.

"I know what it's like. I was an undrafted free agent coming to league in 1981 [as a guard from Arkansas]. I love my draft choices, but I'm always partial to those guys because it's like they don't get a fair shake sometimes."

The meeting lasted more than 40 minutes, with Stewart laying out in detail his vision for Ekeler that summer.

"He was telling me, 'I could see you on kickoffs, on punt, make sure you're doing this, you need to work on that.'" Ekeler said. "And so I was writing all this stuff down, and I told my running back coach, I said, 'Look, I'm making this team.' He chuckled and was like, 'Yeah, we got a lot of work to do.'"

"He was a pest," Stewart said, laughing. "I'm just being real. He wanted to make our team so bad. I heard the old saying, 'Hungry mouth always gets fed.' And he was the guy who had a hungry mouth."

Ekeler emerged from the Chargers' complex free from the nerves that had plagued him the entire afternoon. But as he walked, he read over the notes he made from those meetings: his to-do list. Suddenly, he felt lost.

"I had a little bit of an uneasy feeling," he said. "I understood that it was a long shot for me, but I was willing to do anything it took. I was all-in."

For the following weeks, Ekeler -- the gym rat, the pest -- proved it. He embraced special teams.

"I knew I needed to stand out somehow," Ekeler explained. "People were emphasizing how important special teams were for backups. And so, that caught my focus. I wasn't even on special teams. I was on scout-team special teams."

Word of Ekeler's physical abilities and on-field demeanor quickly began to catch on.

"He's making plays in the punt team and he's heckling people on kickoffs," Stewart recalled. "He's doing a great job returning kicks. I remember talking to Coach Lynn, and I'm saying, 'Coach, we have a guy here that's pretty doggone good. We can't block him. He's a little pest. You think I'm kidding, but this Austin Ekeler's going to make our football team.'"

At the end of summer 2017, back at Chargers Park in San Diego, the Chargers held their first official team meeting. Lynn took a moment to congratulate the players who made the team. He then singled out Ekeler, the undrafted rookie out of Western Colorado, and signaled for him to stand up.

After a long applause, Lynn looked at Ekeler, who still remembers exactly how his coach introduced him.

"Ekeler came to me and asked me how he could make the team," Lynn shared with the room. "And I didn't even know his name."

On July 28, Ekeler, sporting a powder-blue medical-grade face mask, walked into the Chargers' training facility with the self-assurance of someone who belongs, someone with \$15 million in the bank. The poise to approach coaches as an undrafted rookie, the anxiety and uncertainty that followed and, eventually, the clarity of what he needed to do all contributed to the growth and maturity of his character in only three seasons.

"Looking back, I feel like I did most of the right steps," Ekeler said. "Maybe I could have done something different here and there, but now I try to share that experience with all the young guys coming in. It's about trying to get yourself an opportunity to get on the field, to show coaches that they can trust you, that you can make plays."

"It was just one of those situations that he wanted to make a change for himself as a pro football player, wanted to have opportunities to make something happen," Stewart said. "And he didn't say, 'Running back.' He didn't say, 'I want to be a kicker.' He said, 'I want to play pro football.'"

Ekeler doesn't like to dwell on those impromptu meetings three years ago. But he looks back at that day fondly, knowing he made his intentions clear, and his intuition was right:

It never hurts to ask.

## ALOHI GILMAN

### The Chargers' Alohi Gilman's tiny Hawaiian hometown is a football factory

Close your eyes, take a deep breath and join me on a vacation to the north shore of Oahu. We are in the tiny coastal town of Laie. It's 83 degrees.

You are resting on the beach, feet buried in the glistening sand. You can hear the crash of the waves. The water is so clear you can see fish swimming and seaweed milling about. The sun magnifies the vibrant tropical colors around you. The Hawaiian breeze hits your face, and as it blows past you, you can feel, viscerally, your stress being carried along with it.

You sense an unavoidable connection to the island and to this town. You think you know it. The beauty creates that illusion.

But you have to travel inland to truly understand this place. You have to find a grass field with two goalposts and white hashmarks. And you have to see the children of this community — of Laie, a town with a population of 6,111 — running and training, throwing and catching, doing the one thing they were always destined to do.

Playing football.

This is where new Chargers safety Alohi Gilman, a sixth-round pick in last month's draft out of Notre Dame, was born and raised, down the street from his friend and mentor Manti Te'o, whom the Chargers drafted in the second round in 2013 also out of Notre Dame.

"Everybody would always ask me, when I tell them I'm from Hawaii, they would ask, 'Oh, do you surf?'" Te'o said. "But in our town, we grew up playing football."

Gilman is merely the latest example in what Te'o calls a "lineage of excellence in football" among the people of Laie. Utah linebacker Bradlee Anae, who is also from Laie and played at the same high school as Gilman, was also drafted last month in the fifth round by the Cowboys.

"It's not a big town," said Te'o, who played seven NFL seasons and is currently a free agent. "But there's a lot of talent in that little town."

Gilman and Anae are the sixth and seventh players from Laie to make it to the NFL since 2005, according to Pro football Reference. Dozens more have played Division I.

"It runs in the blood," Te'o said. "My grandfather played football. His father played football. Everybody just plays football. So when we're born, it's not like we're going to be baseball players. You're going to play ball."

"We take pride in our football," said Gilman, who is residing in Laie during quarantine. "Everyone out here, we don't really have much, but football is a way for us to escape. We're a culture of a lot of passion."

Gilman was introduced to the game through his father, Asai, a prominent football figure in Laie.

Asai Gilman, who played at Southern Utah, was one of the first people in Hawaii to organize football camps where college coaches could come and get looks at local players.

With his wife and Alohi's mother Keawe, Asai Gilman founded Edu-1st, a non-profit "committed to helping Hawaii's youth better prepare themselves for college and career success." They used the football camps, run by his DB Tech Academy training group, as a vehicle to create higher-education opportunities for the youth of Laie.

"They're one of those families that went out of their way to give a lot of student athletes in our area exposure with some of the camps they used to run back in the day," Te'o said.

"Alohi's father is one of those people who helped to add to the movement, add value and give us young kids a vision of what could be," Te'o added. "We all were told, 'You need to make it to college.' That was the main thing. You need to make it to college. We can't afford to pay for your college, so you're going to play football so that you can get a scholarship so you can go to college. That was the main goal. And his dad was one of those guys who went and sacrificed the things he needed to sacrifice so that he could give his kids the best opportunity and the best chances to go to college."

Alohi Gilman was at those camps, looking on initially because he is six years younger than Te'o.

"I was able to see, at a young age, college coaches coaching high school guys and how that whole dynamic worked," Gilman said.

These camps are simply a byproduct of a rich football culture, one with significant history.

Te'o believes there are two main factors that have allowed such a small town to produce so much talent.

"One is that the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (the Mormon church) is huge in that town, so with that there is a family dynamic that is second to none," Te'o said. "The family dynamic that is built in that town is that anchor for that town. Everybody is family oriented. Everybody grows up knowing everybody. I know my neighbor. My auntie lives down the street. My other uncle lives two blocks over. So we all grew up that way, and we all are connected in that way."

"Two is who we call the kapunas," Te'o said. "The kapunas are the OGs. Those are those people that kind of blazed the trail for us."

Kapuna literally translates to "grandpa." But for the youngsters of Laie, it refers to those football players who achieved success before it was commonplace.

The patriarch of this group is Junior Ah You — or "Uncle Junior Ah You" as Te'o calls him. Ah You was born in American Samoa before moving to Hawaii and starring in football at Kahuku High, the public school where both Alohi Gilman and Anae played, and where Asai Gilman coached.

Ah You went on to play for Arizona State, leading the Sun Devils to a Peach Bowl victory in 1970 and a Fiesta Bowl victory in 1971. He then spent a decade in the CFL before finishing his professional career in the USFL.

"That is what makes Laie special," Te'o said. "The kapunas in our community."

"You have this melting pot of cultures and this religious background that kind of brings them altogether," he added. "And then you combine that with the natural abilities that come with being Polynesian and all of the standards and the protocol that comes with being Polynesian, and you mesh that into a huge pot. You get what everybody would consider a pretty good football player. You just stick a pigskin in their hand and teach them fundamentals, and they've already had that foundation of what it takes to play the game. You just have to lead them."

Alohi Gilman is tasked with upholding this esteemed heritage.

"It means a lot," he said. "Being able to represent my community, represent who we are, not only on the field, but off the field. Being able to inspire the kids in my state and show that sense of pride of our community and where we're from and how we hold ourselves. Hopefully in this next step, I'll be able to inspire some more youth and represent this state to the best of my ability."

## CHRIS HARRIS JR.

### Chargers happy to have former Broncos nemesis Chris Harris Jr. on their side

His team had trailed 24-0 at halftime, but now he was sprinting uncontested toward the end zone to cap a run of 35 unanswered points and the most unlikely of victories.

By the time Chris Harris Jr. scored, Philip Rivers could be seen in the background growling with anger about the exclamation-point interception he had just thrown.

"I remember at one point in that game he said something like, 'Go back to Arkansas,' " Harris recently recalled, laughing. "Philip had no idea where I was from."

Undrafted out of Kansas, Harris established himself in the NFL in that game. Eight years ago. On "Monday Night Football." In his second season. Against the Chargers, his new team in 2020.

He had shown himself to be a potential full-time starter the year before, as a rookie on a Denver team that was building toward making two Super Bowl appearances in three years.

But, on Oct. 15, 2012, in the Broncos' stirring 35-24 win at Qualcomm Stadium, Harris cemented his future with a pair of interceptions, the second of which ended the scoring in the final three minutes.

"That was the game that showed I should be a regular starter," Harris said. "It was a big game for everyone to see. I think it really proved I didn't have a fluke rookie year."

Entering the 2020 season, through the whims of free agency, Rivers is gone and Harris is a Charger as the team transitions into a new era.

This will be Harris' 10th year in the league, with the veteran cornerback expected to boost a secondary and a defense both forecast to be among the NFL's finest.

"I feel like he still has a lot in the tank," Chargers safety Derwin James said. "Adding him will allow the defense to be very multiple. ... His tape speaks for itself. There's a lot you can learn from a guy like that."

Harris, who just turned 31, was the catalyst behind Denver's "No-Fly Zone," which once dominated opposing passing games.

He is a four-time Pro Bowler and was named All-Pro after the 2016 season. He has won awards for his toughness and for his professionalism. He was the Broncos' Walter Payton Man of the Year nominee three years ago.

"I'm hungry. My mindset now is like I've got to reinvent myself, reprove everything."

With Harris, Denver was routinely a top-five defense against the pass until sliding to the middle the rankings the past two seasons. He can play outside and has lined up at safety but is considered a premiere slot corner.

"My story's not done," Harris said. "I've got a lot of goals I still want to accomplish, starting this year. I'm hungry. My mindset now is like I've got to reinvent myself, reprove everything. That gives me a lot of motivation."

Yes, Harris brings plenty to the Chargers, including the sort of perseverance that enabled him to become a star after being listed as a fourth-stringer for his first NFL exhibition game.

During his four years at Kansas, he went from playing on a team that won 12 games to one that won three. He endured a position switch and a coaching change and, while accumulating nearly 300 tackles, had only three interceptions.

In the 2011 draft, all 32 teams repeatedly passed on Harris — 254 draft selections and no phone call. He was deemed unfit while 53 other defensive backs were taken.

When the Broncos finally signed Harris, they gave him a three-year deal worth up to \$1.3 million but with only his \$2,000 signing bonus guaranteed. He used part of that bonus to treat himself to the newest PlayStation.

Five years ago, in a story for The Players' Tribune, Harris detailed the relentless motivation he gained from not being drafted, noting, "Every play is an opportunity to prove wrong everyone who did not recognize my talent."

He concluded the story by writing, "I know there is only one way to make sure that people never forget my name. Win the Super Bowl." Six months later, Denver beat Carolina in Super Bowl 50.

"That was the goal, man," Harris said. "I actually had forgot about that story. But we had such a talented team that it was like, 'We gotta win it this year or we might not ever win it.' "

Harris also brings to the Chargers a notable nickname. He explained that it was his cousin who first called him "Strap." The Broncos were gathered in a tunnel before a game a few years ago when his cousin shouted the nickname from the stands nearby.

"It's like I'm strapping you in and locking you up," Harris said. "A couple cats heard him and from there everyone sort of picked up on it and it stuck."

At the urging of his wife, Leah, Harris has added to his "Strap" persona by occasionally incorporating a celebration where he mimics using a seat belt.

His wild ride in Denver, from undrafted to unparalleled, is over. Now Harris hopes to continue to roll as a reborn, incoming veteran.

"It's a new and uncomfortable situation," he said. "I was a Bronco for so long. I'm going somewhere new and doing something different. But when you're in uncomfortable situations, that's when you can get great growth."

## CASEY HAYWARD JR.

### Casey Hayward Named AFC Defensive Player of the Week

Los Angeles Chargers cornerback Casey Hayward Jr. today was named the AFC Defensive Player of the Week by the league office. Previously an AFC Defensive Player of the Month recipient, the weekly honor is the first of Hayward's career.

Hayward, voted a captain for the first time in his career, led by example on Sunday, finishing with 12 tackles (all solo) and a pair of passes defended. The performance made him the first defensive back since at least 2000 to have more than 10 solo tackles and two passes defended on Kickoff Weekend.

The Vanderbilt product broke up a would-be touchdown pass to A.J. Green in the third quarter and his last tackle prevented a touchdown with less than 20 seconds remaining, preserving Los Angeles' three-point victory. Hayward is 10th player acquired by General Manager Tom Telesco to win player of the week honors.

Los Angeles opens its new SoFi Stadium home on Sunday, Sept. 20, against the Kansas City Chiefs.

## JUSTIN HERBERT

### The Real-Life Diet of Chargers Quarterback Justin Herbert, Who Lives on Subway Sandwiches

The 2-7 Los Angeles Chargers are not having an amazing season. That having been said, their rookie quarterback Justin Herbert is doing an impressive job under center. He's being touted as the front-runner for offensive rookie of the year, and if you've got him on your fantasy team, you're probably doing a little dance every Sunday. The issue seems to be on the other side of the ball—the Chargers are excelling at blowing leads. Still, the former Oregon Duck says he's just grateful to be doing what he loves every single day.

"I'm honored to be playing for a great organization," he says. "Every week is another opportunity to play the game and I'm ready to get after it." GQ caught up with him recently to chat about his diet, which involves lots of team-catered meals and a steady rotation of fast-food sub sandwiches.

GQ: When are you up in the morning?

Justin Herbert: The day starts out pretty early. I wake up at about 5 a.m., immediately brush my teeth and head out the door. I live about 15 to 20 minutes away from the facility, and I really look forward to the drive because it gives me a chance to just listen to music and unwind.

I can't eat very much in the morning. I kind of have a weak stomach, so maybe I'll reach for a Gatorade protein bar or two. I usually stick with the chocolate peanut butter flavor. We lift at 6 a.m. for about an hour, and then we'll have a couple of meetings. I usually have just the right amount of energy to get through all of this, and then at 9:00 or 10:00, I'll have two slices of bacon, three eggs over easy, and two slices of wheat toast.

Are you big on hydrating?

Definitely. I drink a lot of water throughout the day. Normally it's about five or six bottles. I try to drink at least one right when I wake up. I think hydration is really important, and we've done a good job of integrating that.

When you say "we've done a good job," who is the "we" that you mention?

Well, we have a team nutritionist, but I really just mean the team. We make it a point to drink plenty of water.

Have you ever worked one-on-one with anyone to chat about your nutrition?

When I was training prior to the draft, I used a couple of food services that catered meals and had prepackaged meals ready to go for the day. When I did that, I was focused on low-dairy, low carb diets. It was a lot of protein. Now, since we're in season, I try to maintain my weight, and in that process I need to kick up the carbs a little bit.

What's for lunch?

We'll have whatever the team normally caters. So maybe it's a sandwich or it's rice and chicken—something along those lines. In the afternoon, I'll usually stop by the smoothie station that we have at the facility. In my smoothie, I put in strawberries, banana, mango, pineapple, Greek yogurt, and vanilla whey isolate protein powder.

So you're a fruit smoothie but a peanut butter chocolate protein bar guy?

I like to mix it up, you know?

And dinner?

At night after we get off, I normally just honestly stop at Subway. That's kind of what I've been living off for the past couple of weeks. Normally I'll get two sandwiches. One is a steak and cheese and then the other is the chicken bacon ranch, both on their Italian herbs and cheese bread. It's been working for me. It's a good thing to pick up on the way home.

When you're not grabbing Subway, what are some other things you may do for dinner?

If I have enough time, I'm definitely barbecuing. I've got a Traeger grill in my backyard and a bunch of Snake River Farms meats. Any time I get a chance to throw some of those on the grill, it's pretty great.

Do you have a sweet tooth?

I'm a big fan of mint chocolate chip ice cream and peanut butter cookies. But I've done a pretty good job over the past couple of months of staying away from that. Probably because I call it a night pretty soon after dinner, like at 8:10 or so. I get home at about 7:45. So I'll have dinner for like 15 or 20 minutes, and then it's always right around 8:10 that I turn the lights off.

That's pretty impressive.

I'm normally a night person and waking up early in the morning is not easy for me by any means. But it kind of comes with the job. It's something I have to do. So it's something that I've had to practice and it got easier over time. But it's still not easy at all.

### Chargers' Herbert attracts attention for new haircut

COSTA MESA, Calif. (AP) — When Justin Herbert looks back at his rookie season with the Los Angeles Chargers, his biggest mistake might not be any of the interceptions or a fourth-quarter play he would like to have back. It could very well be allowing a strength and conditioning coach to cut his hair.

Herbert displayed a new haircut during his weekly availability Wednesday, shedding his wavy locks for a buzzcut. It didn't take long for the reviews to flow in on social media.

In a year in which Herbert hasn't made many missteps, the quarterback's new look attracted plenty of attention. Comments ranged from people posting their worst haircut pictures to how much younger it made the 22-year old Herbert look.

"I wasn't looking for anything fancy. I was just looking for someone to trim it down," he said.

Herbert said he isn't superstitious and it wasn't done in hopes of snapping the Chargers' three-game losing streak Sunday against the winless New York Jets. Instead, he said it was simply time after letting it grow for at least two years.

"It might look like I am doing it out of superstition, but honestly it was getting too long," he said.

Instead of opting for a barber, John Lott was at the clippers after Lott said he was pretty good at cutting hair.

One person who understood using Lott instead of a barber, especially with the league's strict COVID-19 protocols, is Jets coach Adam Gase.

"I know there's a lot of us that are a little shaggy right now," he said. "But, you know, you're doing what you got to do to push through this and kind of stay within the guidelines."

The Chargers are hoping that the haircut doesn't have a Samson-type effect on Herbert, who is one of the leading contenders for Offensive Rookie of the Year. He is the first rookie quarterback to throw for multiple touchdowns in six straight games and is averaging 291.6 yards passing per game, fifth in the league.

No one will complain though if Herbert can bounce back from Sunday's 29-21 loss at Miami, where he looked very much like a rookie. Herbert had his worst performance to date, going 20 for 32 for 187 yards with two touchdowns and an interception. It was the first time in eight starts that Herbert had passed for less than 250 yards.

If Herbert can throw for a touchdown on Sunday, he would tie George Ratterman as the fourth-fastest player to throw 20 TD passes in NFL history. Patrick Mahomes, Deshaun Watson and Kurt Warner did it in eight games.

The Jets defense is ranked 29th against the pass, but coordinator Gregg Williams likes bringing plenty of pressure packages. New York rushes five or more on 36.6% of its defensive snaps, which is eighth in the league.

Herbert and the Chargers offense struggled last week in recognizing when the Dolphins disguised coverages.

"We've got to be better at finding the check downs and being prepared," Herbert said. "We have to learn from it and get better having gone through it."

## Killer handshake: How Chargers rookie Justin Herbert learned to cope with losing

COSTA MESA, Calif. -- Los Angeles Chargers rookie quarterback Justin Herbert was an 18-year-old freshman the year his college team, the Oregon Ducks, were en route to their worst season in 25 years. He would become the starter after the fifth game that season, but the team finished 4-8 and was left out of a bowl game for the first time in more than a decade.

The losses ate at him. In a big way.

"It was really hard on him," his father, Mark Herbert, said.

Oregon's offensive coordinator at the time, Marcus Arroyo, saw Justin's slumping body language and sulking and decided to take action.

"[Arroyo] said 'Come over here, let's talk and figure out how to work things out,'" Mark said.

And the killer handshake was born.

"I told Justin anytime he gets mad or down about something, to come over and shake my hand as hard as he can and let the anger out," Arroyo said.

Arroyo might have regretted those words at times. Justin has huge hands, his dad, Mark said. "And Coach Arroyo paid the price."

But the tactic worked. Justin was asked about the handshake but said he didn't remember it; although Arroyo still winces when he thinks about it. That Justin says he doesn't remember is a typical teenage move, according to his dad, who said. "You don't know what they remember and what they don't."

But being able to move on past the bad stuff was a huge lesson for Justin which he says has served him well, especially this year with the Chargers, who are 2-7 with all seven of losses coming by one score.

"It's remarkably similar to what he went through at Oregon," Mark said. "And it's the same with [Justin's] attitude and mindset. He believes with all his heart and soul, that we've got to figure this out together and we will."

Justin now has thrown for 2,333 yards with 19 touchdowns and six interceptions while completing 66.8% of his passes (201-for-301). He has become a favorite to win NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year. And he believes his team will get better, win some of these close games, and he will improve in the process.

The sky is not falling. But it's the seven losses that hurt.

He's trying not to think about them, to push forward, look ahead. There was a time when Justin would be "so pissed off in practice" Arroyo worried he would "throw a ball or punch a wall."

Marcus and his wife, Kelly, a psychologist, were quick to provide a family influence for Justin, helping him compartmentalize his on-field frustrations and channel them more constructively. It was just football, after all.

"Not life and death," Mark Herbert said.

"Family has always been important to [Justin]," Arroyo said. "The first time I met his grandfather, I went over to his house and had a beer."

## Rookie QBs were expected to struggle this year. Instead they're setting a record pace.

Some of the first plays Justin Herbert ran as a professional happened in his backyard. As the league conducted its spring remotely, the meticulous development of rookie quarterbacks required necessary improvisation. Los Angeles Chargers coaches would send him a script of plays and instruct him over video. Herbert would then walk through them outside his house, or maybe at a nearby park if he could find socially distant receivers.

"You have to find a way," Herbert said. "It wasn't easy for anyone. You have to find a way to get time with your guys to throw, get a way to run through the offense. It wasn't normal for anyone."

The 2020 NFL season, supposedly inhospitable to rookie quarterbacks with its irregular offseason and absence of preseason games as a result of the coronavirus pandemic, is staging perhaps the greatest season of rookie quarterbacking in NFL history. Joe Burrow, Tua Tagovailoa and Herbert — chosen first, fifth and sixth in April's draft — have collectively provided one of the year's most cheerful subplots and individually delivered optimism for the Cincinnati Bengals, Miami Dolphins and Chargers, franchises profoundly in need of hope.

Burrow has continued the remarkable ascent he began last year at LSU, announcing himself as a ready-made, top-shelf NFL quarterback. Herbert had to be rushed into his first start after a team doctor punctured starter Tyrod Taylor's lung with an ill-aimed painkilling injection, and he has responded with some of the most thrilling football anyone has played all season. In his second career start Sunday, Tagovailoa moved to 2-0 and outdueled Arizona's Kyler Murray in a 34-31 ode to the sport's future.

The trio has fortified the quarterback wave taking over the NFL, which includes consecutive MVPs who won the award in their second seasons. Their success may also preview another swell of quarterbacks to come.

"This class was a special class," Bengals offensive coordinator Brian Callahan said. "It's going to be talked about for a long time. I certainly don't think it's going to be the last one."

"The NFL game has adapted very well" For 2020 rookies, the limited offseason may have created an unexpected benefit. In normal times, quarterbacks would receive a playbook and start executing it at rookie minicamp. Their first time trying a new offense came immediately after learning it.

"You go from Install 1 to 'On the field in 30 minutes; let's see what you got,' " Bengals quarterbacks coach Dan Pitcher said.

This year, there was no rookie minicamp and no other in-person team activity until training camp. In the allowable time, coaches could install and explain the entire system, watch film of their own and even study the way defenses reacted to similar schemes of other teams. (The Bengals, Pitcher said, even started the process in the time they were permitted to spend with Burrow before the draft, once they decided on taking him.) When Burrow ran through plays on his own, he could text Callahan and Pitcher questions about concepts, such as why certain route combinations ran together. It slowed down the process of learning the offense.

"That urgency didn't exist," Callahan said. "We got to have long and in-depth discussions. ... I think these guys are all mentally ahead more than they would have been normally. ... You got to take your time with no pressure. I think that plays a large role. ... I think it was a unique quarterback class on top of it."

The NFL's new quarterback prototype? There isn't one.

Burrow is on pace for 4,544 passing yards, which would break Andrew Luck's rookie record of 4,374. His 67 percent completion rate would finish second all-time among rookies to Dak Prescott's 67.8 — unless you count Herbert, who this season has completed 67.3 percent of his passes.

Herbert started a week later than Burrow, but he has statistically been just as impressive. Herbert has thrown 17 touchdown passes, which will allow him to challenge the record of 27, set by Baker Mayfield in 2018. His quarterback rating sits at 104.7, a whisker behind Prescott's rookie record of 104.9. Herbert is on pace to throw for 4,599 yards, a handful more than Burrow, even accounting for starting one less game.

All three have played thrilling football without the crushing mistakes that are typical of rookie quarterbacks. Burrow and Herbert currently rank fourth and fifth all-time among rookie quarterbacks in interception percentage. Tagovailoa has not thrown a pick in his first 52 pass attempts.

All three have arrived during an explosion of young quarterbacking talent in the league. The perceived NFL quarterback crisis from the mid-2010s has been replaced by a glut. Patrick Mahomes and Lamar Jackson won MVP honors in their second seasons. Murray, another second-year quarterback, is on the periphery of contention for this year's award.

The NFL is benefiting from how the sport has changed at all levels. Youth league quarterbacks, once resigned to handing off out of the veer or I-formation, now start lining up in the shotgun in Pop Warner. Quarterbacks grow up passing constantly, including in year-round seven-on-seven leagues.

"The passing game preparedness of young quarterbacks is probably much better than it was 10 years ago or 15 years ago," Callahan said.

"These guys come up in the world of throwing the football. That's all they do. They watch all these mobile quarterbacks, and they emulate them. You see young guys who are trying to play like Lamar Jackson and Patrick Mahomes. You're going to see more guys come in ready to play. ... Throwing the football is not new for these guys."

Former Dolphins and Jets front-office executive Mike Tannenbaum, now an ESPN analyst, said: "They're coming into college with a much higher IQ, and they're playing earlier. The NFL game has adapted very well to that."

Marrying the coach to the quarterback

During the offseason, Bengals coaches watched Burrow's film from his time at LSU. Their system shared fundamental similarities with that of the New Orleans Saints, which Burrow understood because his wunderkind offensive coordinator at LSU, Joe Brady, had come from an apprenticeship under Saints Coach Sean Payton. Callahan asked Burrow what plays and concepts he liked best in their playbook.

"How do we make this like Year 3 at LSU for you instead of Year 1 in the NFL for you?" Callahan asked.

Callahan is certain Chargers and Dolphins coaches have had similar conversations with Herbert and Tagovailoa. The mind-set represents a shift within the NFL that has contributed to early success for quarterbacks. For years, coaches insisted on cramming a quarterback into their system regardless of fit. Younger offensive coaches have grown more flexible in studying and incorporating concepts from college offenses.

Last year, Oklahoma Coach Lincoln Riley pointed out that, even as a rookie, Murray had played in a spread offense almost his entire life, back to his preteen years, which meant he had spent more time playing in Kliff Kingsbury's style of offense than most NFL quarterbacks had been playing in their coaches' systems.

"There's a lot of guys that are a lot more open to what the rest of football is doing," Callahan said.

The recent success of young quarterbacks may influence this year's draft. Clemson's Trevor Lawrence and Ohio State's Justin Fields have long been prized by NFL teams and may be the first two players chosen; their talent and intangibles would make them locks to be chosen early in any era.

But the diversity of styles among ascendant quarterbacks, and NFL coaches' willingness to adapt, has broadened the way front offices evaluate quarterbacks. Another tier of passers — North Dakota State's Trey Lance, BYU's Zach Wilson, Florida's Kyle Trask and possibly Alabama's Mac Jones — could move into the top half of the first round as teams search for not only a long-term franchise anchor but a quarterback capable of injecting immediate excitement.

"It's really marrying the coach to the quarterback, is what's important," Tannenbaum said. "Clearly the success these players are having, you're seeing what I think is really good coaching. It's about taking what you have and maximizing strengths and minimizing weaknesses."

'We gave the keys to him early'

The quarterbacks of this class are part of a trend, but they are extraordinary within it. As Callahan noted, all three entered the league as top-six picks with uncommon experience. Burrow spent five years in college and played 28 games at LSU, including a 15-0, Heisman Trophy-winning senior season. Herbert made 42 starts at Oregon, and Tagovailoa played in 32 games, starting 24.

Coaches talk about Burrow as though he is a football savant for the way he processes a play against a specific defense and how to take advantage of it.

"He has a supernatural sense of where everybody is on a football field," Callahan said.

Tagovailoa is making it easy to forget his mere presence is an accomplishment. Monday will mark the first anniversary of the catastrophic hip injury Tagovailoa suffered on his final collegiate play, which Tagovailoa said threatened his career. Chargers Coach Anthony Lynn studied and met with Tagovailoa during the draft process and came away convinced he would be a 10-year star, based on his instincts and leadership.

"He has a tremendous feel for the game," Dolphins offensive coordinator Chan Gailey said. "That allows him to see some things and do some things and throw the ball in some spots that other people might not do."

Callahan coached Herbert at the Senior Bowl before the draft. He left the week thinking, "This guy is going to be a really good player." Part of that belief came from Herbert being "wired the right way," Callahan said. Part of it came from the belief that his deep passing and play-action ability, which Oregon's offense rarely used, would translate to the NFL.

In another era, the rookie quarterbacks who are excelling now may have been on the bench. Those timelines are relics. In Cincinnati, the Bengals released longtime franchise pillar Andy Dalton, even though he seemed like an ideal mentor for a rookie, the kind of veteran who could hand over the reins. But the Bengals knew immediately that Burrow would be their Day 1 starter. They knew that, in today's NFL, quarterbacks no longer need to wait.

"We gave the keys to him early and kind of said, 'You're going to handle it,'" Callahan said. "We never once thought twice about it. We never once backed off how we wanted to play football. He's only reinforced that."

## Justin Herbert's misinterpreted personality becomes Chargers' gain

Jana Prikryl, the director of general science at the University of Oregon, didn't realize she had helped Justin Herbert change his major until a peer advisor identified him with a scream.

"Oh, my God, that was Justin Herbert," Prikryl recalled hearing when the 6-foot-6 Oregon quarterback left the office.

Herbert, now a star quarterback for the Chargers, submitted his change-of-major form to switch from biology to general science. Herbert was the second future NFL quarterback that Prikryl had assisted. Marcus Mariota was a general science major at Oregon a few years before Herbert.

"Embarrassingly, I did not know that he was Justin Herbert," Prikryl said in a phone interview last week. "I knew we had Justin Herbert and I knew he was fantastic, but I didn't put the face to the name."

Prikryl shouldn't be embarrassed. Not many knew of Herbert before he became a star at Oregon and the latest NFL rookie sensation.

Even now, as more become familiar with the name, not many truly know Herbert. Although, there were many guesses about his personality in the lead up to the 2020 NFL Draft.

Herbert was described as an introvert, also known as a shy person, and few NFL teams want a shy quarterback. But that didn't stop the Chargers from selecting Herbert with the No. 6 overall pick in April's draft.

They were well aware of Herbert's physical gifts, just like the other 31 teams, but perhaps the Chargers dug deeper in getting to know Herbert as a person.

"I think a lot of introverts get labeled with that word shy, lack of leadership," Chargers coach Anthony Lynn said. "My son is an introvert, so I raised one. I know what the tags are, but you just look at how people respond to them. That's all you need to know."

The Chargers did their personality research on Herbert and are now getting rewarded for it with weekly touchdown passes from his rocket right arm.

"Ultimately, this guy is just very talented," said Denver Broncos coach Vic Fangio, whose team hosts Herbert and the Chargers on Sunday. "Looks to me like he's made up of the right stuff to be a quarterback in the NFL, and fortunate for (the Chargers) and unfortunate for us, I think they found their quarterback for the next 10 to 15 years."

Herbert has only started five games, but he's played so well that questions are now being asked. How did a quarterback who is enjoying a historic NFL start that rivals Patrick Mahomes and Dan Marino become available at No. 6 for the Chargers?

Why didn't the Washington Football Team take Herbert second overall and why didn't other quarterback-needy teams leapfrog the Chargers in the draft order to take him?

Many draft experts described Herbert as having all the physical tools, but somehow that wasn't enough to shake the introvert label that hung like a dark cloud.

Of course, it wasn't all because of Herbert's quiet demeanor, but it likely played a part in why teams were skeptical, and it goes to show that swagger isn't everything. Sometimes saying less means there's more of other leadership qualities.

Herbert won't say teams got it wrong by passing on him and making him the third quarterback selected – that's not his personality – but he did say the introvert tag was incorrect.

"I wouldn't say that's fairly accurate," Herbert said. "I think on the surface it might appear that way, but when I really get to know people and the team, I think a lot of the guys on the team would tell you differently."

Many draft experts and talking heads have said they got it wrong with Herbert, but the Chargers should thank them because all the personality speculation they provided before the draft became their gain.

Herbert celebrated his first NFL victory against the Jacksonville Jaguars last week by giving star wide receiver Keenan Allen an enthusiastic slap on the behind.

"Yes, sir!" Herbert shouted at Allen.

That doesn't sound like a shy quarterback.

Here's how family members, teammates and former professors described Herbert as a person and leader:

## THE REAL HERBERT

College recruiters also got it wrong with Herbert.

Herbert was a three-star high school recruit with no Division I FBS scholarship offers heading into his senior year at Sheldon High in Eugene, Ore. Herbert was set on attending Montana State to play with his older brother, Mitchell, before Oregon made an offer.

"He did not go to (football) camps because he practiced with his high school team," said Mark Herbert, Justin's father. "When other guys were looking for exposure to go to colleges, Justin was practicing with the little kid down the street that he'd grown up with or another kid he played middle school football with or somebody else because that was going to be their team in the fall."

Justin Herbert has a reputation for not looking ahead. He prioritizes the present and enjoyed it by playing baseball, basketball and forming a fishing club in high school.

In college, it wasn't all about making it to the NFL. It was also about improving as a biology student. Herbert agreed to be a biology professor's assistant even though it took time away from football.

But helping the little kid down the street and having extracurricular activities didn't help Herbert in the college recruiting process and it was probably ignored by some NFL teams.

Multi-sport prep athletes have become a thing of the past. It's now about specializing in one sport and getting as much exposure as possible by participating in 7-on-7 tournaments, creating Youtube highlight videos and announcing every college offer received on Twitter.

You can't find Herbert on Twitter, although he does have an Instagram account.

"He didn't enroll early (at Oregon) because he wanted to play his senior year of baseball with his buddies," Mark Herbert said.

Justin Herbert stayed in one place before the NFL called, never leaving Oregon while the university's coaching staff changed twice in four years.

Mark Herbert recalled being asked by a local reporter if Herbert would consider transferring if he lost the quarterback job when Willie Taggart replaced Mark Helfrich as head coach in 2017.

"What are you talking about?" the older Herbert remembered asking. "I don't understand the line of question. What's Justin going to do? Get his degree in biology, he's gonna play football and he's gonna go to medical school or he's going to go to the NFL."

"I don't know what he's going to do, but he's not leaving. That's not what Justin does."

Justin Herbert also didn't leave when Mario Cristobal took over in 2018 and then stayed for his senior season, despite being projected as a first-round selection.

Sticking around for an extra year to play with friends gave pundits more time to analyze Herbert as armchair psychologists.

He wasn't viewed as the committed teammate who wanted to help win a Pac-12 championship. Instead, he was the quarterback who struggled against Arizona State and lacked the alpha-male personality to lead an NFL locker room.

But Herbert proved in high school and college that he doesn't run from adversity and makes it work with what he has. Those are the leadership traits that went unnoticed, and he's showing it again in the NFL by elevating undrafted players such as Jalen Guyton, Tyron Johnson and Donald Parham and doing it without his top offensive linemen, Bryan Bulaga and Trai Turner.

Herbert gets everyone involved and is not afraid to ask for advice. But all of that was lost during the lead up to the draft and it became the Herbert family's gain.

Mark and his wife, Holly, were rooting for their son to play for the Chargers. They have family ties to Southern California.

Justin Herbert's paternal grandfather, Roger, played football and ran track for Fullerton College before transferring to Oregon State. Herbert's maternal grandfather, Rich Schwab, grew up in San Diego before playing football at Oregon.

"We looked at (the draft order), 'Hey, Los Angeles all the way.'" Mark Herbert said. "Oh my goodness, travel-wise, and family-wise, team-wise ... a lot of things pointing to the Chargers."

Mark Herbert credited the grandfathers for Justin's professionalism and said his son got plenty of good qualities from his mother Holly.

"I'd say Justin is fiercely loyal and fiercely focused and dedicated and definitely gets that from her," Mark said.

Justin Herbert's love for science likely came from his father, who was a science and biology teacher for middle school and high school students.

## HERBERT, THE COMEDIAN

Chargers defensive tackle Linval Joseph played four seasons with recently retired Giants quarterback Eli Manning. The two-time Super Bowl champion was also described as an introvert.

Joseph sees similarities between Manning and Herbert.

"I felt like there was two different types of Elis," Joseph said. "You have funny Eli and then you have 'get the job done' Eli. Two minutes in the quarter, fourth quarter, need this drive and he woke up, and when he woke up, he made those big throws, made those big plays, and I see that in Herbert. I really do.

"I feel like he's going to have a great career and once we put everything in order, he's going to be elite. He's going to be great."

Chargers rookie wide receiver K.J. Hill can attest to Herbert's comedic side. Hill explained why Herbert was shown in a scene of "Hard Knocks" doing a lengthy "whassup" from the popular Budweiser commercials.

"I told him you gotta say the 'whassup' in the huddle," Hill said. "I told him to say it in the huddle before he called a play or something like that. It was something silly like that. He was practicing basically before he did it to get my OK if it was good or not."

Herbert and Hill texted each other after being drafted by the Chargers and have become close friends.

"Inside the locker room, (he's) making jokes, talking," Hill said about Herbert. "He has not been a quiet guy since I've been around him. We're always talking about anything and everything, so I feel like he got a great personality and great competitor side that I love about him, too."

Hill said he's a better "Call of Duty" player than Herbert, but he gave his quarterback the edge in golf.

"Justin likes to golf," Hill said. "I told him the only close thing I get to golf is Top Golf."

## HERBERT, THE TUTOR

Mark Carrier, a professor at Oregon, was in need of a teacher's assistant for his Biology 212 course. Herbert was one of his best students, but Carrier assumed he didn't have time to teach the material to other students for the upcoming quarter.

"I figured no way a football player is going to have the time to do that, but in passing one day, I told him, 'Hey, you know if you weren't so busy being the quarterback of the football team I would definitely offer you this role,'" Carrier recalled.

Without hesitation, Herbert took the offer and assisted the class of about 200 students.

"It's a pretty interactive class time," Carrier said. "You can tell if people are going to hide what they know or help others along. Justin was the kind of guy who helped the people around him.

"It was clear to the people around him he understood the material more quickly than most.

He didn't struggle as much as people tend to do. It's a very challenging course. He was very helpful to the people around him."

At the time, it wasn't certain that Herbert would be a top NFL draft pick. Carrier said Herbert expressed interest in a career in medicine or becoming a researcher.

"I was just really interested with how everything worked out (in biology) and science and kinda how your body processes things and kinda explaining the natural phenomena that happened around us," Herbert said.

Biology sounds as complex as breaking down NFL defenses. Herbert being able to grasp intricate material at a fast pace while also teaching it is perhaps another leadership sign (and an indicator of future success) that went unnoticed.

"That might be a reach, but it's a good analogy," Herbert said about comparing football to biology. "Having a good understanding of defenses, coverages and things like that. It definitely helps."

Herbert said his top passion has always been football. He'd said he would likely be a coach right now if he wasn't an NFL quarterback.

"Hopefully I'd be coaching the game or somewhere involved in the game," Herbert said. "I just love football too much to not be around it."

That's the real Justin Herbert. Passionate about football, but with other interests. Not the loudest, but a quiet genius with an occasional comedic side.

"I think he's more outgoing than what people give him credit for, but that's OK," Lynn said.

The Chargers said that's OK to Herbert's personality and now, as Fangio mused, they stand to reap the rewards for years to come.

## What do Chargers have in Justin Herbert? QB testing his risk vs. reward limits

The Chargers had 14 seasons of Philip Rivers' on-field bravado, 235 consecutive starts by a quarterback who rarely saw a throwing window too small and eagerly accepted any risk for whatever reward.

After four starts, what do they have in Justin Herbert?

"I think it's too early to decide that," Herbert said. "Obviously, I'd love to complete every pass that I throw. But it's not going to happen. I'm going to make mistakes."

Rivers never shied from taking chances when he saw opportunity. He often shrugged off interceptions, particularly those thrown in desperation late in first halves or at the end of games.

That attitude, buttressed by his unending belief in his right arm, shaped Rivers into the quarterback that he was with the Chargers — a playmaker who also could make crushing mistakes.

The style clashed with the preferences of coach Anthony Lynn, who preaches, above all else, limiting turnovers. The Chargers have dropped their past nine games when losing the turnover battle.

"I think I should always be alert and prepared to take care of the football ... make smart decisions," Herbert said. "It should never feel easy or anything like that out there."

Just before the two-minute warning in the second quarter Monday, Herbert was faced with weighing the risk against a potential reward he spied deep down the middle of the field.

On third and 12 from the Chargers' 16-yard line, he scrambled from pressure to the left sideline and, rather than step out of bounds, fired toward a well-covered Jalen Guyton.

The one thing the Chargers didn't need at that point was a turnover to set up New Orleans with a short field. A fumble near the end of the first half already cost them a game-changing touchdown in Week 4 at Tampa Bay.

This time, Herbert threw long enough that the ball sailed over the head of Guyton and the two Saints defenders and fell to the turf just beyond midfield.

The Chargers then punted but gave up a 14-yard return, and New Orleans took over at its 49 anyway. Eight plays later, the Saints scored to cut a 17-point deficit to 10 entering halftime.

So Herbert avoided giving away the ball, but the Chargers still couldn't avoid giving up another crucial last-second score.

"I gave him a chance to go make a play," Herbert said. "Yeah, I could have made a better ball. But that's a decision I stuck with. ... Yeah, I could have been more cautious. But I really believe in that guy."

Entering Week 6, Herbert was ninth in the NFL in passer rating at 107.1, just two-tenths of a point behind Patrick Mahomes.

Only Dak Prescott (sidelined for season), Aaron Rodgers and Derek Carr had more completions for 40 or more yards, confirmation that Herbert possesses the ability for the quick strike.

He has an interception rate of 2.1%, which ranked 17th out of the 32 quarterbacks with enough attempts to qualify.

In four years at Oregon, Herbert hardly was reckless. He was picked off 23 times in 1,293 attempts (1.8%). He never had more than eight interceptions in a season or two in a game.

History suggests he'll take care of the ball over attempting to squeeze passes into areas where overriding danger lurks.

But, ultimately, Herbert's precision won't just involve keeping the ball out of the hands of defenders. He'll also need to fine-tune his game to meet what the NFL requires of quarterbacks trying to take over franchises — an exactness he lacked on the final two plays Monday.

Facing third and seven, Herbert missed an open K.J. Hill, throwing well behind the rookie wide receiver on a play that would have gained at least 12 yards.

Herbert then connected with Mike Williams, but his pass was right on Williams rather than slightly ahead of him. Lynn said better ball placement would have secured a first down. Instead, Williams was stopped inches short.

"We did some great things and we did some not-so-great things," Herbert said, speaking of the offense in general. "It's all about fixing those not-so-great things."

For the third time in his four games, Herbert won a rookie of the week honor Friday. So he's 3-1 in personal recognition but 0-4 in the NFL standings.

He has struggled for wins before. During his freshman year at Oregon, Herbert lost four of his first five starts. By the end of his senior season, the Ducks were going 12-2 and winning the Rose Bowl.

"That freshman year was tough," Herbert recalled. "People kind of splintered off. But, over the course of the years, we stuck together. ... That's what it's all about, sticking together and riding with your guys."

The Chargers are riding with Herbert, both the team and the player still figuring what they have in one another.

## Chargers' Justin Herbert learning he can't let the perils of running in the NFL slide

Justin Herbert, with his smooth throwing motion and surgical precision, has proven he's already a top-notch NFL passer.

Now, the 6-foot-6 Chargers rookie needs to work on his going-to-the-ground game.

He took off running in his first career game and clobbered Kansas City linebacker Damien Wilson when they collided near the sideline. Whereas Herbert nonchalantly popped to his feet, Wilson appeared knocked out cold.

Two weeks later, Herbert tore off a five-yard run against Tampa Bay and lowered his shoulder on Buccaneers safety Jordan Whitehead. This time, the defensive player got the better of the crash, as Herbert needed a few moments with his hands on his knees to compose himself. Whitehead was flagged for unnecessary roughness.

"Feet-first sliding is probably the best option I should go with," Herbert conceded later. "I grew up playing baseball so I feel like I'm pretty comfortable with sliding. It's a little tough on the grass, your cleats get stuck a little bit, but it's definitely something I've been practicing. Moving forward, I'll be better about it."

Chargers coach Anthony Lynn hopes so. He could be forgiven for watching replays of those collisions through his fingers while covering his eyes.

"Bad coaching by me right there, bad coaching," Lynn said. "I don't want him taking hits like that, like he did from the Chiefs. ... I want him to get down. I don't want him to take those hits in the National Football League."

Theoretically, Herbert could look across town for pointers from another young quarterback. The Rams' Jared Goff, the son of a former Major League Baseball player, has had sliding issues of his own.

In the two years since the NFL made a rule change — stipulating a quarterback doesn't have to slide feet first to be considered giving himself up, and instead is afforded the same defenseless-player protections when he dives forward — Goff has found himself getting "caught in between sometimes."

"I'm used to going feet first, and I have my whole career," Goff said. "And then in the last year or two, I want to go head first. I don't want to lose those three yards. But at the same time, you're kind of trying to figure out where your momentum is."

His father, Jerry Goff, who played catcher in the majors for six years, wishes his son would hit the deck more often, yet understands why he doesn't always do so.

"Do I encourage him to slide? Yeah, 100%," the elder Goff said. "But there are times, like he did in the playoffs against Dallas, and a few times in college, where you've just got to deal with it and go get that first down. You're not going to slide short in that situation. But I would say 90% or more, you're just going to slide and play the next down."

The dilemma is older than Red Grange. Should a quarterback risk injury by fighting for that extra yard, either by dropping a shoulder and delivering a blow, or by diving forward as a human missile?

Or should he sacrifice that extra yard or two and safely slide feet first?

"We've got to coach these quarterbacks out of the macho-man approach," said Hall of Fame personnel executive Bill Polian, who thinks all NFL teams should build sliding pits at their facilities to teach quarterbacks. "Playoffs are one thing; that's a different cat altogether. But in terms of the regular season, never lower your shoulder. Don't take those kinds of blows. The rule is there to protect you: Go slide."

Sometimes, even sliding feet first is unsafe. Last Saturday, Clemson quarterback Trevor Lawrence, the overwhelming favorite to go No. 1 in next spring's NFL draft, took a shot to the helmet from University of Miami safety Amari Carter while sliding. Officials ejected Carter for targeting.

In 2006, Kansas City quarterback Trent Green absorbed a brutal hit to the head from Cincinnati defensive end Robert Geathers while sliding feet first. Green suffered a serious concussion and the replay reverberated throughout the league.

"I remember being like, 'Yeah, see? I don't want that to happen. I would rather dive head first, I'm in control of my head,'" recalled former Seattle Seahawks quarterback Matt Hasselbeck, who took a ribbing from his coaches about his aversion to sliding. "I sort of remember being made fun of by Mike Holmgren and Jim Zorn about how I didn't slide, like I couldn't slide."

So Zorn, the former Seahawks quarterback who later coached the position for the team, unfurled a Slip 'n Slide at practice in hopes of teaching his passers how to avoid big hits by gracefully going to the ground. He even brought in Seattle Mariners first baseman John Olerud as a sliding tutor.

"The thing was, we knew how to slide," Hasselbeck said. "It wasn't like we didn't know. We just preferred to dive."

According to NFL rules, a defender must pull up when a runner gives himself up with a feet-first slide. If a defender already has committed himself and makes unavoidable contact with the sliding runner, it is not a foul unless the defender makes forcible contact to the head or neck area of the runner with the helmet, shoulder or forearm, or commits some other act that is unnecessarily rough.

But the runner bears the responsibility of starting his slide with ample time for the defender to pull up and avoid the hit.

"Pursuing a guy, I would give him the benefit of the doubt that he was going to slide," former Rams defensive tackle D'Marco Farr said. "But you'd better start that slide within two or three steps of me. Make it obvious. If not, I'm going to treat you as a runner that's attacking my goal line, which means I'm going to try to knock your teeth out."

The notion of sliding never appealed to Hall of Fame quarterback Steve Young, but not because he sought those extra yards at all costs. He just didn't feel that sliding provided him enough protection.

"My own philosophy was sliding was a nightmare," Young said. "Sliding is saying, 'Just hit me in the face.' I always thought it was much safer to go forward, find a soft spot forward."

What's more, Young said, officials routinely get the placement of the ball wrong when a player slides feet first.

"Inevitably, the referee gives you a spot farther back than you thought it would be, or than it should be," he said. "It's a weird thing. I don't know what sliding does that creates this image that the ball's downed earlier than it was."

"I always thought I got a better spot when I was going forward. It's like an optical illusion for them. When I slid, nine times out of 10 I'd turn around and say, 'Where are you marking that? That's not right.'"

Not surprisingly, some of the quarterbacks who had the option of playing pro baseball — notably Seattle's Russell Wilson and Arizona's Kyler Murray — are the most graceful sliders.



"I think playing multiple sports is a very big thing in terms of getting those extra yards, also being smart, getting down," Wilson, selected in two different MLB drafts, told reporters in 2017. "The ability to quickly slide, too. When you hit a ball in the gap, you've got to get to second base and get there fast. You've got to know where to slide, how to get around the tag, and everything else."

"I don't really like sliding head first, never did when I was playing baseball. But sometimes it's necessary. ... You've got to be smart in how you do it."

Not everyone is a pretty slider. Peyton Manning got an earful from his Denver teammates in 2012 when he clomped downfield against Carolina, then executed a hideous slide — think Evel Knievel at Caesars Palace — that excavated a sizeable divot when his left knee brace burrowed into the turf.

"It's not even worth explaining what happened," Manning told reporters at the time. "It looked bad, and the fact that my knee brace got caught, nobody wants to hear that. It is what it is, as they say, and it's right there on film. I'm very aware that it's fair game for criticism and ridicule."

In those hold-your-breath bashes of bodies, it's frequently the quarterback who comes away staggering. There's a reason for that.

"Justin Herbert does not tackling. None," Young said. "And then he's running into people where that's all they do is tackle."

"I used to see smaller guys in the defensive backfield, and I was like, 'OK, I can take that guy on.' But you've got to remember, even those guys, that's all they do is tackle."

When and whether a quarterback should slide often depends on where you're standing, as in, which sideline.

"When it's your own guy, you want him to get down," Farr said. "When Kurt Warner scrambled, I'd be the first one yelling, 'Get down!' And I would tell him, 'Your body doesn't belong to you, it belongs to us.' If he gets tagged, it affects us all."

Young's philosophy: Your most important play is your next one.

"Risks just to show your manhood don't help you get to the next play," he said. "The truth is, if you've still got the ball in your hand, there's been a general failure anyway. Don't compound it by trying to run over somebody to impress someone."

After Herbert's debut, while the Chargers and Chiefs were mingling on the field, Kansas City's Patrick Mahomes offered him some words of advice: "Protect yourself on some of those runs."

Sometimes, staying up requires getting down.

## Reel talk: Chargers rookie Justin Herbert quietly goes about business, unless it's fishing

COSTA MESA, Calif. -- By now, it's fairly clear what Los Angeles Chargers rookie quarterback Justin Herbert can do with a football. If you want to see him smile, ask him to launch it 70 yards into the waiting hands of a teammate in the end zone or sling a slant to a guy crossing the field.

But if you want to see Herbert beam -- really beam -- have him cast a line in the ocean and reel in a 22-inch halibut. Then he's just like a little kid, with a grin from ear to ear. He's certainly happy about the touchdown pass, but he's downright giddy when it comes to the halibut.

Herbert was named the Chargers' permanent starter on Thursday after impressing coach Anthony Lynn with his poise, quick thinking and production (77-of-107 passing for 931 yards, five touchdowns, three interceptions) through his first three games. Lynn also likes Herbert's patience, something he learned by throwing line after line into the pond behind Albertsons on Coburg Road in his hometown of Eugene, Oregon.

It was so much a part of Herbert's happiness routine that he formed a fishing club at his high school along with a former teammate, Ryan Phillips, whose father, Les, was one of the football coaches.

Herbert played three sports, "but people were kind of more interested in the fishing club than anything else," Les told the Daily Emerald, the University of Oregon's student newspaper, in 2016. They even made T-shirts.

Before the country shut down in March because of the coronavirus pandemic, former adversary Michael Pittman Jr. (who played for USC and is now a wide receiver with the Indianapolis Colts) and his girlfriend, Kianna Galli, took Herbert to the Huntington Beach Pier in Huntington Beach, California, where they spent an hour hooking bait while Galli filmed their YouTube TV show.

Chargers tight end Hunter Henry hasn't heard the quiet Herbert discuss his fishing prowess, though noted that "he's always got some sort of fishing glove on."

He had a "Toes to the Nose" hat -- a Laguna Beach surfer favorite -- on in February as Pittman tried to play his role as the sophisticated Cali kid to Herbert's more reserved persona. At one point he badgered the chit-chat-challenged Herbert with questions as unknowing fishermen cast lines in between guys who would go on to be the No. 6 and No. 34 picks, respectively, in the 2020 NFL draft.

"So Justin," Pittman said in his not-so-shy outside voice, "how was it winning that ROSE BOWL?"

Silence.

Pittman: "You know the Rose Bowl? When you guys beat Wisconsin, like a month ago?"

Silence.

Pittman: "And then you went to the Senior Bowl and had the MVP honors?"

Silence

Pittman: "Top-10 draft pick?"

Herbert: "WILL YOU SHUT UP?"

Pittman: "Yes, yes sir."

As loud and chatty as Pittman can be (they were taping for his YouTube channel, Michael and Kianna, which now has more than 296,000 followers) Herbert is the nearly the exact opposite -- at least in public -- and always makes sure to say the right thing

"Over the past couple of months," he said a few weeks ago, "I've come to realize that there's nothing else that I'd rather be doing. Playing football for the Chargers is something that I've dreamed about. If I go out there and do everything right, study and work hard, good things will happen."

It's part of the way he was raised, the middle child of three boys, one of whom is in school to become a doctor, the other a tight end at Oregon. They are sons of a former athlete and grandsons of another Duck.

They live a stone's throw from Autzen Stadium, where they went to as many Ducks games as possible growing up, marveling at quarterbacks such as Joey Harrington and Marcus Mariota.

Herbert was a 4.01 biology major and a teaching assistant for one of the toughest biology classes -- Bio 212, organisms -- and came back to school his senior year to finish what he set out to do when he was named the starting quarterback as a freshman in 2016: win a Rose Bowl and avenge a 4-8 freshman season.

But Herbert has never been one for small talk. Yes, he's a rookie, and rookies have to be wary. Whenever Herbert talks to the media these days, it's always honest and with a deference most aren't used to.

Herbert is already beloved in Los Angeles and by a fan base starving for a star, a process that started earlier than almost everyone expected.

Herbert was the backup quarterback in Week 1 and was expected to fill that role again in Week 2 as the Chargers prepared for their SoFi Stadium opener against the defending Super Bowl champion Kansas City Chiefs.

Suddenly, starter Tyrod Taylor was the victim of a pregame "blind" injection, causing his lung to collapse, and Herbert was thrown into the starting spotlight. It was so sudden that Lynn didn't know about Taylor's injury until after the coin flip. Herbert's mother, Holly, missed the first few plays because she was sure that her son wasn't going to see action.

Herbert barely blinked, leading the Chargers to a touchdown on his first NFL drive (which he ran in) and throwing for 311 yards and another score as L.A. took the Chiefs to overtime.

He got stronger the next week, nearly leading a come-from-behind victory over the Carolina Panthers with a final play he says "they practice every day," the hook-and-ladder that Austin Ekeler wasn't able to secure from Keenan Allen.

He improved even more in Week 4, staking his team to a 24-7 first-half lead against the Tampa Bay Buccaneers and Tom Brady. Herbert went 20-for-25 for 290 yards and three touchdown passes against the Bucs -- including 53- and 7-yarders, respectively -- before throwing a late interception to Carlton Davis as he was trying to lead the Chargers to a game-tying score.

"Despite the loss it was an awesome experience," Herbert said. "Just to be out there playing in Tampa Bay alongside my teammates, it doesn't get any better than that. Yeah, we lost, but we're going to learn from it, and I know I'm going to get better from it."

And now it's on to New Orleans to face another legend, the Saints' Drew Brees, on Monday Night Football.

Maybe the Chargers will get over the hump this time and get Herbert his first NFL win as a starter. Just don't ask him to talk too much about it.

But he did speak up after catching the halibut with Pittman, the biggest of the day.

"Gonna need some help with this one," he said to Pittman as he lay the fish on the sand.

Not that Herbert is a weakling -- just the opposite. But halibut have teeth. That's all he needs -- teeth chomping into his million-dollar fingers.

That wouldn't be good at all.

## Is Justin Herbert the next Philip Rivers for Chargers? 'He doesn't play like a rookie'

He was asked about the Chargers' new offense this season, an offense that is expected to be more ground-bound.

Defensive end Joey Bosa did not hesitate before launching into an answer that offered a counterpoint.

"Who knows?" he said. "Maybe Herbert's going to be an absolute beast out there, throwing dimes left and right, and we could end up relying on his arm more and more throughout the year."

At this point, Bosa was reminded that Justin Herbert isn't the Chargers' current starting quarterback.

The NFL's highest-paid defensive player of all time then went on the offensive, apologizing to Tyrod Taylor and trying to laugh off a funny yet awkward moment.

Here was a normally charging defensive end, a celebrated pass-rushing machine, suddenly backpedaling like a frantic free safety.

That's where the Chargers stand at football's most important position as the 2020 season opener approaches.

They are in full transition, from one franchise icon in Philip Rivers to potentially their next franchise icon in Herbert.

In between is Taylor, a 10th-year veteran who backed up Rivers last season and will be given the chance to lead a team many observers project as a playoff contender.

If Taylor succeeds and the Chargers win, Herbert might not play a meaningful snap all season. If Taylor and the Chargers fail, Herbert and the franchise's future could arrive sooner than scheduled.

"We're trying to develop a quarterback, but a lot of these young guys are trying to develop," coach Anthony Lynn said. "Yes, we want to win at the same time. I understand that we can't rush this process."

"It's going to come to Justin. He's an extremely hard-working young man. I like where he's at right now with his development. ... If he continues this way, then he's going to be just fine."

In April, Herbert was the sixth overall pick in the NFL draft, a lofty position that brought with it a guaranteed \$26.5-million investment and all the expectations attached to that sort of dollar figure. Soon after, he was so eager to begin his professional career that Herbert drove from his family's home in Oregon to Orange County to work with a local quarterback coach during a pandemic that, at times, threatened to shut down all of society.

He traveled a great distance to work on many things, not the least of which was something as basic as the football itself: receiving a snap from center.

In four years at Oregon, Herbert threw 1,293 passes. Every one of them originated from the shotgun formation.

Of the first 10 snaps in Herbert's first practice of his first NFL training camp, eight came from under center. Each exchange was flawless.

"He has surpassed my expectations in fundamentally acclimating to the pro game," Chargers quarterbacks coach Pep Hamilton said. "He did an excellent job over the summer of working on things that would be expected once he got here."

In college, Herbert was known for his strong arm and fleet feet. At 6 feet 6 and 236 pounds, he is one inch taller and a few pounds lighter than Cam Newton, a quarterback so large that former NFL defensive tackle Gerald McCoy once said Newton should be ruled illegal for the position.

Appearance-wise, Hamilton said Herbert reminds him of Vinny Testaverde, who is 6-5 and spent two decades as an NFL quarterback. As with Testaverde, Herbert possesses what Hamilton called "a very efficient throwing process."

"You hardly ever see Justin throw a ball that's not a tight spiral," Hamilton said. "He has the ability to attack the entire field with the arm talent that he has."

That talent will be on display at some point for Chargers fans, though no one can be certain when that point will arrive.

Rivers sat for two years before he started. Patrick Mahomes started one game as a rookie. Dak Prescott, Carson Wentz, Russell Wilson and Matt Ryan all started from the first snaps of their first seasons.

Herbert had his moments during his initial NFL training camp, hitting tight end Stephen Anderson on a streaking seam route one day and another day zipping a ball to fellow rookie Joe Reed through the slightest of windows.

"He does a heck of a job of staying in the pocket when the pressure's coming," offensive coordinator Shane Steichen said. "He hasn't flinched yet. So that's a big sign of success down the road as he continues to grow in the system and in this league."

Said defensive coordinator Gus Bradley, "He doesn't play like a rookie quarterback."

Oftentimes after practice, Herbert and fellow backup Easton Stick would remain on the field, tossing passes into nets and attempting to perfect their footwork.

These sorts of quiet moments are a long way from Sunday afternoons at SoFi Stadium but also necessary steps to get there.

For now, it's Taylor starting and Herbert waiting in a Chargers quarterback room where the present and the future must coexist.

"It's all love," Taylor said. "We're on the same team. We're trying to accomplish the same goal ... just natural competition and everyone bringing their best game. That's good for our room, good for our offense and good for our team."

## Justin Herbert Finding Guidance in A Familiar Face

Being a rookie in 2020 is virtually -- no pun intended -- uncharted territory.

Whereas training camp would usually be a checked box in their offseason program schedule, it's become the first time they've gotten to take the field as members of their newest team.

For Justin Herbert, despite having no OTAs or minicamp, he did get an opportunity to work out with some of his teammates before camp began. But in order to further his development, he also turned to someone who came before him for advice on being a pro.

That person Herbert named was former Chargers and Oregon QB, Kellen Clemens.

"One of the guys that I actually ended up talking with was Kellen Clemens who played here a couple years ago," Herbert said. "He's one of those Oregon guys that has been so helpful and is a mentor of mine and I've really looked up to him. He had some great things to offer, a bunch of advice to give, so it was really good to speak with him."

As for that advice?

"He told me your career is never going to be always uphill," Herbert reflected. "There are going to be ups and downs and at the end of the day, you need to get better. You're going to make mistakes along the way. It's not about how high it gets or how low it gets. It's always about climbing back up and doing better the next day, and never letting your past mistakes affect your future. So he really helped me with that."

As a Duck alum and Oregon native and resident, Clemens had a front row seat to Herbert's college career. Back in the spring, he discussed what the Bolts were getting in the player now donning No. 10.

"I'm excited for the Chargers because I think they're getting a really good, solid player," Clemens said. "Obviously, he's got the size, he's got the athleticism. He's obviously smart enough when you look at his GPA. I'm excited for the Chargers because I think he's going to be a good fit."

"(Herbert) just does it the right way. You're never going to read his name in the papers for something like (if he) was out at 2:00 a.m. or in the wrong place at the wrong time. You're not going to do that with him. I've got a 10-year-old son, and when he starts to ask me, 'Dad, is this guy a good role model?' I'm trying to steer him in the direction of guys he can emulate both on the field and off the field. Justin was just one of those guys. You watch him in an interview, he's well-spoken. I still am in touch with people at the university and you ask (questions like,) what type of guy he is, is he a good leader? Is he a good teammate? How is he in the community? And Justin was unanimous and checked all the boxes of all of those (questions.)"

Herbert's taken the advice Clemens gave him to heart.

With camp now in full swing, he discussed the biggest thing he's learned so far and how it's a lesson he'll keep with him as his career progresses.

"Being a good quarterback does not come down to every single little play," Herbert said. "It's much bigger than that. It's always about putting your team in a position to win. You might throw an incompletion, you might throw an interception, but it's always about coming back on the next one and putting your team back in a position and making up for it and never getting down on a bad play or negative play. But it's always about limiting those and refocusing."

## Johnny Unitas, Dan Fouts and Justin Herbert's Chargers destiny

In the summer of 1973, Dan Fouts was a wide-eyed 22-year-old rookie quarterback embarking on what would become a Hall of Fame career.

Earlier that year, the San Diego Chargers drafted Fouts out of Oregon in the third round, 64th overall. He joined a roster that included a 40-year-old Johnny Unitas, who, at that juncture, was unquestionably the greatest quarterback ever. The Chargers traded for Unitas after he spent the first 17 years of his career with the Baltimore Colts, for whom he threw for 39,768 yards and won three titles, including Super Bowl V.

Unitas was well past his prime in 1973. But his quarterbacking knowledge was virtually unparalleled.

And that year, Fouts found himself at a bar with Unitas, and the two chatted about football over beers.

"Just a lot of nuances of playing the position," Fouts recalled of that drinking session with Unitas in an interview with The Athletic. "About reading coverages and getting a pre-snap read. It's like in a poker game where you're looking for a tell, and you find the tell through your film study and your scouting reports, and then by watching a guy and what you might know about his background. All of that goes into where you're going to throw the damn ball."

Unitas spilled the secrets. Fouts soaked them up. He still remembers that evening nearly 50 years later.

"I had to buy a lot of beer," Fouts quipped. "But it was fun. I learned a lot."

Now Fouts is anxious to pay those lessons forward to the new face of the Chargers — a wide-eyed 22-year-old rookie quarterback, drafted out of Oregon, now ready to embark on his own NFL career.

Yes, that would be Justin Herbert.

Fouts had planned to be a part of the broadcast team for the Chargers' preseason games, but those have been canceled because of the pandemic. Fouts laments the missed time. He wants to do for Herbert what Unitas did for him, and to be the through-line from one of the game's most iconic players to the future of the organization he represented so admirably for 15 seasons.

"I was hoping to spend a lot of time with him. But that's all gone," Fouts said of Herbert. "I missed out there, and I feel bad about that, because there's a lot I want to share with him about just playing the position."

Publicly, the organization has branded 2020 as A New Era Of Chargers Football. And to some degree, that rings true. Philip Rivers, the team's starting quarterback for the past 14 seasons — and a player just as synonymous with the Chargers as Fouts — is gone, having signed with the Colts as a free agent. The Chargers are moving into a new stadium, finally cementing their transition from San Diego to Los Angeles. And now here is Herbert, with his flowing golden locks and West Coast vibes, to carry the Chargers into this self-proclaimed new era.

And yet the ties to the past are undeniable. The young man tasked with starting this next chapter in franchise history is inseparable from that history, so much so that Herbert, in many ways, has always been destined to be in this spot, with this franchise, writing this future.

Fouts was close friends with Herbert's grandfather, Rich Schwab, an Oregon legend who played receiver for the Ducks in the early 1960s. Schwab died unexpectedly in January 2018.

"Just a fucking great guy," Fouts said of Herbert's grandfather. "You say the word 'Schwabby' around Oregon, everybody knows who you're talking about."

So Fouts always had an eye on Herbert, even if he didn't officially meet him until a "couple years ago" when Herbert was at Oregon.

"Just watching Justin through the years from high school on through his years at Oregon," Fouts said, "there's been a real interest obviously and a connection there."

The connection has only deepened now that Herbert is following Fouts' footsteps even further into life and into the NFL.

"I'm a proud Duck," Fouts said. "And I'm really excited to watch Justin play."

"Mr. Fouts is an incredible person," Herbert said after the draft. "To know that he was such a great man and such a great football player, it's really cool. It's a really special opportunity."

The Chargers ties run even deeper, though.

Growing up in Eugene, Ore., Herbert and his two brothers had no NFL team to root for. So they settled on the Chargers. Herbert specifically mentioned LaDainian Tomlinson as a reason why they gravitated toward the San Diego team.

Herbert would often wear a Chargers T-shirt when he was a kid. And after Herbert was drafted, a Reddit user who claimed to have gone to elementary school with Herbert posted a photo of the new Chargers QB wearing the shirt. Herbert later confirmed it was him in the photo.

"I actually wore that shirt a lot," Herbert said in May. "Kind of funny how it worked out."

It is kind of funny, isn't it?

Or destiny, depending on your perspective.

Herbert grew up a Chargers fan.

In an elementary school worksheet, Herbert predicted he would be playing professional football in Los Angeles.

Herbert went to Oregon, same as Fouts, the Chargers' first homegrown Hall of Fame quarterback.

And same as Fouts, Herbert got drafted by the Chargers at age 22.

It all seems meant to be.

The last link to complete the full circle is that conversation with Fouts — for the Chargers wisdom of yesteryear to find a new home in the mind of the team's bright future.

"There's a lot that I have to share, and I'm anxious to do that," Fouts said. "At some point, I will."

## Justin Herbert's journey from Oregon to NFL has SoCal roots

With the sixth pick in the 2020 NFL draft, the Chargers selected Justin Herbert.

Or was he the one who selected them?

"This is the greatest thing that could have happened," Herbert's father, Mark, said. "It's perfect for Justin. I don't know that I've ever seen him as excited, as focused, as ready as he is now. We couldn't have handpicked anything better."

Shortly after the Chargers drafted the former Oregon standout Thursday, a photo surfaced on the internet of Herbert as a child wearing a Chargers T-shirt. That's just the beginning.

Growing up in Eugene, Ore., where there is no NFL team, Justin and brothers Mitchell and Patrick were Chargers fans. Each had a jersey. There was a David Boston, a Drew Brees and a LaDainian Tomlinson.

There are family roots in Southern California, one grandfather being from San Diego and the other from Fullerton. One set of great-grandparents was from Orange County.

The family has vacationed here plenty and visited more often.

"Justin would go to the moon to play," Mark said. "He didn't care. But, if you did have a say, this just made so much sense."

After a pause, the father added: "I don't want this to be corny. But, you know, the story does sound kind of corny."

That's just how things are today for this newest Charger, a small-town kid and multi-sport prep star who grew up close enough to Autzen Stadium to practically hear the roars and eventually caused those roars himself as Oregon's quarterback.

Being drafted into the NFL might be as big a dream as playing in the league, the made-for-television production poignantly capturing the Herbert family and all their emotions when the Chargers — their Chargers — called.

It was a very real version of fantasy football.

"I'm just so happy for the family," said Lane Johnson, Herbert's high school football coach. "I'm telling you, this Herbert family is off the charts. They're as humble and kind as you can get."

Sheldon High was where Herbert, in the months leading up to his senior season, began to emerge as a quarterback.

He already had been an ace pitcher on the state-title-winning baseball team and soon enough would be averaging a double-double on the basketball court.

But his football prowess had been delayed, especially after Herbert broke his leg early in his junior season.

He had the talent and the arm, Herbert whistling passes with the sort of zip that, later in college, would result in teammates complaining about their palms smarting.

But it wasn't until after the broken leg, after a few months without football, that Herbert began to realize what he really wanted.

Johnson, a math teacher at the time, remembers Herbert coming to his room regularly to share disappointments he was feeling.

"It was still really emotional for him," Johnson said. "He felt like — and this is typical Justin Herbert — he let the team down when he got hurt. I told him, 'Justin, you got hurt. You didn't get kicked off the team for smoking dope.'"

"I think he just needed to grow up a little bit and he certainly did. He used to tell me, 'Coach, I like those other sports, but I love football.' That was a big factor, him being injured and the game being taken away from him."

Herbert's only scholarship offer was from Nevada before Oregon became interested. One day in October of his senior season, the Ducks offered and Herbert committed that night.

There was no place he wanted to go other than Oregon, where Herbert's grandfather Rich Schwab had played.

As kids, he and his brothers discovered the Ducks from Section 12 of Autzen Stadium, Rows 32 and 33 — the location of Schwab's four season tickets.

But when he arrived on campus as a Duck, Herbert was buried on the depth chart. Wanting to play his senior baseball season at Sheldon, he wasn't an early enrollee.

But he hardly was unprepared for the chance. Despite his limited time around the football program, Herbert's grasp of the playbook was so thorough that he was able to take over as starter midway through his freshman season.

This is a student-athlete who, while earning his degree, was a three-time Academic All-America first teamer and received A's in every class but one. Without football, Herbert probably would be bound for medical school.

He is an admitted perfectionist, Oregon coach Mario Cristobal calling Herbert "a detailed machine." His handwriting is said to be strikingly precise. Cristobal joked that Herbert's note-taking appears to be "laser printed."

But, in his first shot as a college quarterback, he and the Ducks fell woefully short of perfection, going 4-8 and hearing boos in their home stadium.

"It wasn't the Oregon football I was used to," Herbert said, before noting that he went through three head coaches and three offenses with the Ducks. "We fought through and dealt with adversity."

By his senior season, Oregon was going 12-2 and winning the Pac-12 and the Rose Bowl, a championship secured when Herbert overcame a so-so passing day to rush for three touchdowns and earn MVP honors.

Throughout his time at Oregon, he even managed to answer doubts about his leadership ability, doubts that resurfaced again during the pre-draft process and continue as a discussion point.

This despite Herbert winning the William V. Campbell Trophy — which recognizes academic success, football performance and exemplary leadership — in December.

Willie Taggart, Herbert's second coach at Oregon, was among those who publicly prodded him to become a more obvious, more vocal leader. One of his closest friends among the Ducks, center Jake Hanson, once called Herbert "the shiest dude I've ever met."

As for the Chargers, general manager Tom Telesco expressed zero concerns about Herbert's leadership, instead praising the resolve he routinely displayed in leading Oregon back from 4-8 and the Autzen boos.

"No matter what your personality is, you can lead," Telesco said. "We've seen him lead. I've seen him lead on the field with my own eyes. Our scouts have seen him lead."

So, when will Herbert have a chance to lead the Chargers? Veteran Tyrod Taylor is the projected Week 1 starter for 2020, with Herbert expected to be groomed as his eventual replacement and possible long-term franchise quarterback.

In the meantime, this somewhat corny sounding story will be allowed to continue. Because of the COVID-19 restrictions, all five Herberts shared Justin's selection together at the family's home in Eugene.

There was no trip to Las Vegas, no loud NFL-sponsored draft party right off the Strip. There was only a quarterback with his parents and two brothers, watching his dream unfold in the most vivid colors possible.

When Herbert's phone buzzed Thursday, he glanced down to notice Telesco's name. One brother, Mitchell, grabbed his arm as his father noticed the caller ID too.

"You go back to getting married, having three boys ... wow, this might be right up there," Mark said. "Winning a Rose Bowl is awesome. Pac-12 championships and state champions, those are great. But this is something else."

"This is an incredible situation, and it's not lost on us or him. I'm just so excited for him because of this opportunity. Hope and opportunity, if you've got those, you're going to be OK."

## Receiver K.J. Hill gets chance to catch Chargers' eyes as rookies report to camp

He prides himself on his route-running. K.J. Hill calls the skill “the biggest thing in my game.”

That ability will be tested immediately as the rookie wide receiver attempts to navigate a less-than-traditional route to the start of an NFL career.

First, he had to wait until the third day, the seventh round and the 220th overall pick in April for the Chargers to draft him.

There were 33 receivers selected before Hill, and that's not counting Antonio Gibson, who mostly played wide receiver at Memphis but was drafted by Washington to be primarily a running back.

“It was really hard, seeing other receivers go before you,” Hill said. “But I got my name called, and that's the most important thing.”

Now, Hill is part of a first-year class of players facing the most uphill, against-the-wind challenge to survive in the NFL. Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, rookies across the league missed an offseason of critical on-field work. Rookies report to training camp Tuesday, with veterans scheduled to arrive on July 28.

In the spring, the Chargers recruited Austin Ekeler, their No. 1 running back and one of the NFL's top underdog stories, to address the rookies about the importance of mastering the playbook.

“If you're a great athlete and you can do amazing things, that's great,” Ekeler said. “But if you can't be trusted on the field to protect the team, the ball, you're not going to see much playing time.” In 2017, Ekeler made the Chargers late in the preseason as an undrafted long shot out of tiny Western State in Colorado. He didn't clinch a roster spot until the fourth exhibition.

The expectation is that at least two preseason games will be eliminated this year as a further concession to the coronavirus. Those lost snaps will affect the rookies, as well as others.

“I hate to say it, but I think you kind of saw it with Melvin last year,” Ekeler said, referring to former Chargers running back Melvin Gordon, who held out into late September and then struggled upon returning. “He sat out and he just missed so much time, and that time is so valuable.”

Hill joins the Chargers as the all-time receptions leader at Ohio State, an impressive achievement, certainly, but one that was possible because he decided it was better to return for a fourth college season rather than jump early to the NFL.

Despite his production with the Buckeyes, Hill was buried in one of the deepest wide receiver draft classes in recent memory. His 4.6-second speed in the 40-yard dash was an oft-repeated knock.

“He's super smart and instinctive and has a great feel for how to get open, which a lot of inside receivers need to have,” Chargers general manager Tom Telesco said. “Excellent hands.”

Before Hill was drafted, Las Vegas and Philadelphia each took three wide receivers, and seven other teams selected two players at the position. Even the Chargers picked up Virginia receiver Joe Reed two rounds before adding Hill.

In fact, he was no better than the third wide receiver named K.J. to be taken, coming after KJ Hamler (second round, Denver) and K.J. Osborn (fifth round, Minnesota).

Still, the Chargers were encouraged by what they were able to add, particularly so late in the draft.

“He's a very crafty route-runner,” offensive coordinator Shane Steichen said. “You can get matchups inside with him on linebackers. I mean, he was the all-time leading receiver in Ohio State history and that says a lot.”

The Chargers, a team generally recognized as possessing a depth of talent, are in need of a receiver they can trust after Keenan Allen and Mike Williams, both of whom topped 1,000 yards in 2019.

The wideout with the third-most catches last year was Dontrelle Inman, who had only eight and appeared in just four games before finishing the season in Indianapolis. Other than Allen and Williams, no Chargers wide receiver reached the end zone.

Hill has a chance to establish himself as the team's third option at the position — an accomplished route-runner trying to find a path that this year keeps winding.

“We had him on our board as a playmaker,” coach Anthony Lynn said. “He's had a lot of production. He didn't run extremely fast, but I like the fact that he plays fast. All he does is make plays when he's on the football field.”

## ‘I ain't going to forget’ — 33 receivers will fuel Chargers rookie K.J. Hill

A month ago, the number 33 meant nothing to K.J. Hill.

Now?

“That's a number I ain't going to forget,” he said.

The pain is evident in Hill's voice — not the type of pain that overtakes a man and keeps him down, but the type of pain that festers just long enough to turn into anger, then to motivation.

This pain can lift someone to places they never imagined.

A month ago, Hill, like hundreds of other college football players, was preparing to hear his name called in the NFL Draft. The receiver finished his career with the most catches in Ohio State history, 201, more than David Boston and Hall of Famer Cris Carter, a mentor of his.

Hill was overshadowed in one of the deepest and most talented wide receiver classes in recent memory. He was not the biggest, strongest or fastest in the group. Far from it. But his college production, reliable hands and knack for getting open led to relatively favorable projections from draft prognosticators. Dane Brugler of The Athletic had him pegged as a third-round pick with potential as a starting possession slot receiver.

The third round came and went, though, and Hill did not get a call. A day later, the fourth round passed, too. Then the fifth. Then the sixth.

It wasn't that teams didn't want receivers. They were picking them in droves.

They just didn't want Hill.

Finally, the Chargers selected Hill with the 220th pick in the seventh round.

“I was the 34th-picked receiver,” Hill said.

In a matter of days, the number 33 took on a massive role in Hill's life.

The league thinks there are 33 rookie receivers better than Hill.

He begs to differ. “A lot of people skipped on me. A lot of people doubted me,” Hill said. “I'm not fast enough. My hands are not big enough. They want to blow up my attributes. They was questioning it.

“All I can do is go out there and prove them wrong.”

One of those 33 receivers will be in the same room with him this coming season. The Chargers took Virginia wide receiver Joe Reed in the fifth round. He was the 18th receiver taken.

Reed is on the list.

“I felt it watching the draft,” Hill said of his disappointment. “Every receiver that got picked before me, watching it, seeing it happen. I'm just taking that as fuel and putting that in the back of my head and remembering it every time I'm on the field, and remembering where I got picked and the guys that got picked before me.”

Hill was already motivated by his family and his city, Little Rock, Ark., where he grew up and is staying during quarantine.

“My family always took care of me, made sacrifices and kept me on the right path,” he said.

“A lot of people don't make it from Arkansas,” Hill added. “A lot of people don't make it from Little Rock, especially. So just having the whole town behind me, the whole city behind me, it means a lot. Growing up here, there have been challenges I've had to face. But I feel like those challenges got me to the point where I was able to be drafted. I give a lot of credit to my city.”

Hill's Instagram bio is as simple as they come.

“Little Rock 501,” it reads, referencing his hometown area code, another important number in his life.

"It's rough here," Hill said. "Growing up with people that went down the wrong path. My friends went down the wrong path, and I stayed on the right path. Seeing people struggle. But it just gave me that hunger to make it out."

He didn't need more fuel. But NFL teams delivered it to him, 33 gallons worth.

"A team gave me a chance, and that was the Chargers," Hill said. "They believed in me and drafted me. All I can do is take advantage of the opportunity and make the most of it and prove the doubters wrong."

There were famously six quarterbacks drafted ahead of Tom Brady in the 2000 draft. They became known as the Brady 6.

Brady had it easy, though. He only needed to remember six names.

Hill has to memorize 33.

That's a lot.

"I know," Hill conceded. "But I'll remember that number 33."

## RAYSHAWN JENKINS

### Chargers like idea of moving safety Rayshawn Jenkins all over the field

He finally emerged last year, Rayshawn Jenkins becoming the Chargers' starting free safety in his third NFL season.

Coach Anthony Lynn credited Jenkins for playing at an "elite" level at one point and then, on a recent podcast, said Jenkins finished the season among the league's top five at the position.

A fourth-round pick out of Miami in 2017, Jenkins promised Thursday that he isn't done climbing.

"I haven't hit my ceiling yet," he said. "I'm still going up."

To aid in his continued ascension, Jenkins said he spent the offseason adjusting his diet, and eliminating fried foods, pasta and rice. He said he dropped his body fat percentage into single digits.

Not that it was easy, particularly for someone born and raised in Florida.

"I'm a Southern guy," Jenkins said. "So, any time you threw some rice with gravy in front of my face, it was over with. That was going down."

Defensive coordinator Gus Bradley has suggested the Chargers could increase Jenkins' responsibilities this season, positioning him at times closer to the line of scrimmage in part to take advantage of his skill set.

Bradley said the adjustment, which would happen only in certain sub packages, also would allow Jenkins to combat the repetitive nature of backpedaling on every snap.

"The biggest battle he has to fight back there is getting bored, just doing the same thing over and over again," Bradley said. "It can get monotonous. We're trying to do some different things with him just to keep him on edge."

Said Jenkins: "It can get, I wouldn't say boring sometimes, but boring sometimes. At the end of the day, you can't get bored with it because you got some elite players in this league ...

"I'm excited about it, just getting to move out of the post, that stationary post position. I should be able to show more of my ability. It will be cool to see how it evolves."

## TYRON JOHNSON

### Chargers WR Tyron Johnson, ex-Warren Easton standout, returns to Superdome after dazzling NFL debut

It was just the fourth play of the game.

But for Los Angeles Chargers receiver Tyron Johnson, it was so much more than that.

It was the first play of his NFL career.

When you spent the previous year bouncing around from one practice squad to another, moments like this mean everything.

Especially for a kid who grew up in the Callopie Projects of New Orleans, where many didn't make it out to even get these chances.

And you just never know when or if the opportunity will come again.

So Johnson made the most of his on Sunday, when he lined up on the right side of the formation and darted right up the middle of the field past the Tampa Bay Buccaneers' secondary to haul in a perfectly thrown Justin Herbert strike for a 53-yard touchdown on his very first NFL reception.

"I waited all my life for that moment," Johnson said. "That's crazy. The route I took and the hard work I had to put in, it was an unbelievable feeling."

It was Johnson's only reception of the day, coming about 24 hours after Chargers' general manager Tom Telesco pulled him to the side and told him he was going to be on the active roster. He'll be active again Monday night, Chargers coach Anthony Lynn said Friday.

"He's come a long way since he arrived here last year," Lynn said. "We just had a real honest conversation that a young man with his size and speed and skill set should not be bouncing around this league. He took it to heart. He's done some things in practice that really impressed. As soon as I got a chance to bring him up, I wanted to, and he produced."

As special as that first game was for Johnson, it likely won't compare to the second one.

The Chargers come to New Orleans on Monday night to play the Saints in the Mercedes-Benz Superdome, just a five-minute drive from Warren Easton High School where Johnson starred.

Johnson played his last high school game in the Dome in 2014, leading Easton to the state championship game for the first time since 1958. Easton lost that game to Neville, but that game and season helped lay the foundation for a school that has become a football powerhouse.

"I remember not holding up that trophy that day," Johnson said, "but I remember a lot of kids on our team signing to go to college. Then more kids after us started signing. That's the upside. Now Easton is pumping out D-I players. That doesn't happen if that team doesn't happen. To have been a part of that is special."

Johnson's long-winding football journey was just beginning. He was rated by some as the best wide receiver in the country when he signed with LSU. He played one season for the Tigers in Les Miles' run-heavy offense before transferring to Oklahoma State. His first reception at Oklahoma State, just like his first one in the NFL, went for a touchdown.

"It was just knowing where it was headed as far as them passing the ball," Johnson said about leaving LSU. "I felt like I couldn't waste my years, so I went to Oklahoma State. It worked out for me. I didn't put up the numbers at Oklahoma State I'm capable of putting up, and that wasn't in my control. But I just controlled what I could control. If I couldn't control it, I didn't stress myself about it. I could control my attitude. I could control my grades. Being on time. How hard I practiced. How I worked. Everything else like me getting targets, I couldn't focus on that. That's when I grew and really knew I could play. My numbers don't reflect the way I play, but I knew I could play. So let's bet on myself."

He did. With a year of eligibility left, Johnson opted to turn pro in 2019. But he didn't hear his name called in last year's draft.

He wasn't discouraged.

Adversity, you see, is nothing new to Johnson.

Johnson was in the eighth grade in 2010 when his big brother, Elie Billy, was killed, the victim of another senseless act of violence in New Orleans.

He knows big brother would be proud of how far he's come. So Johnson is just as thankful now as he was in his senior year of high school, when he had this to say about the people who helped keep him focused and on the right track.

"I'm very thankful," he said. "You know in New Orleans, you can be here one minute and gone the next. Especially when you look at what I went through."

So if he made it through losing a brother, he surely wasn't going to be discouraged by not getting drafted. The people close to him wouldn't let him anyway.

"He knew he could play," said his father, Tyrone Johnson. "I just told him to be patient and keep working. Your time is going to come."

Johnson signed as an undrafted free agent with the Houston Texans after the 2019 draft but was waived in August of that year. He then signed to the Buffalo Bills practice squad and lasted two weeks before heading back to the Texans for just two days. From there, he signed with the Carolina Panthers' practice squad, another stint that lasted just two weeks. Then he went almost two months without a team. He flew around for workouts with the Browns, Titans and Raiders to no avail.

On a trip to Denver to work out for the Broncos, he got a call from the Chargers saying they wanted to sign him.

He has been with them ever since.

"It was really just about staying positive," Johnson said. "I just tried to do stuff different and learn from the teams I was on and try not to make the same mistakes. Just learning the playbook and just staying at it. The Chargers were the first team that really gave me a shot. I was just on all those other teams, but I felt like I never had a shot on them. But now this is a team where I have a lot of opportunity."

His first real opportunity came Sunday.

His second will come in his hometown with the nation watching.

"That's an amazing feeling to be back home for a Monday night game," Johnson said. "That's something you dreamed of as a kid."

## JOSHUA KELLEY

### The persistent phone calls that saved Joshua Kelley's football career

People told Joshua Kelley he was crazy. They warned him, said he was making a colossal mistake and doubted his skill, his conviction, his plan.

Really, it's hard to blame them. But they didn't know. They didn't see his vision. They didn't believe. They didn't understand or grasp the determination inside him that burned like a flame.

It was early 2017. Kelley had just finished his sophomore season as a running back at UC Davis, where he had a full scholarship. The Aggies, an FCS program, were undergoing a regime change, with new head coach Dan Hawkins taking over.

Kelley had his sights on greater heights. This was his moment.

"I've always had this internal drive, this competitive desire," Kelley said in a phone interview last week. "I always wanted to be playing among the Power 5 conferences."

Kelley was a two-star recruit coming out of Eastside High School in Lancaster, California. UC Davis was his only offer. If he didn't try to make the jump now, he never would.

So he did the unthinkable: He gave up his full ride and stepped into this new chapter, one full of blank pages.

"I just threw myself into this unknown," Kelley said.

The only problem? He had zero interest from any Power 5 programs. The situation was an unknown because he, largely, was an unknown.

"I wasn't a player who had a lot of hype," Kelley said.

So he had to create his own.

He looked up the phone number for UCLA running backs coach DeShaun Foster, a six-year NFL veteran, and called him.

Every day. For weeks.

This is what you need to understand about Josh Kelley.

"He's not going to be denied," Foster said.

In life. And on the football field.

"I called him Monday through Friday," Kelley recalled, chuckling, as he often does. "The five business days of the week, I was calling him. Some days he would answer. Some days he wouldn't. But he knew who I was. He got a clue because of the consistent times: 'Ah, this kid's calling again.'"

It wasn't just Foster who started identifying Kelley.

"The people in the office, the front-desk girls, they got to know his voice," Foster said. "So it was like, 'Josh Kelley for Coach Foster!'"

The conversations went about the same each day.

Kelley: "Coach, anything change? I want to walk on. Is there anything I can do?"

Foster: "I got nothing for you today."

Click.

Wait 24 hours. Do it all over again.

"He would message me on Twitter," Foster said. "He was calling the football office, and then we would call my personal office, too. So it was just how persistent he was about it."

Kelley, meanwhile, started questioning the path he chose — in between phone calls, of course.

"I was just sitting there like, 'Man, did I make the right decision?'" Kelley said. "You do doubt some things."

Kelley leaned on his mother, Jacqueline, during this time. She raised Kelley and his brother, Daniel, as a single parent. Kelley said he learned "discipline, hard work and accountability" from his mom, and this was one of those teaching moments.

"People were telling me, 'You're crazy. It's not something you should do. It's not smart,'" Kelley said. "But she supported me. She didn't tell me those things. She said, 'If this is really what you want to do, make sure you pray about it, put your faith in God, and go after it. You can't just dip your toe in there.' I had her."

So he persevered.

"The only other time I was getting recruited was when I was coming out of high school," Foster said. "And that's basically what Josh was doing. He was recruiting me, because Josh was calling every day."

Eventually Foster invited Kelley to a tryout camp over the summer.

"He just came out there and performed," Foster said. "The rest is history."

Kelley walked onto the UCLA squad, then coached by Jim Mora, but was forced to sit out in 2017 because of transfer rules.

He spent that season as the scout-team running back in practice.

Foster took notice.

"That's when you saw, 'OK, Josh is probably the best running back in our program right now,'" Foster said. "He sat that season, and then ran off two years of 1,000 yards."

Kelley rushed for 1,243 yards in his debut season of 2018 for the Bruins, including 289 yards and two touchdowns in an upset win over USC at the Rose Bowl. He followed that up with 1,060 yards and 12 touchdowns as a senior.

Then he heard his name called in the fourth round of April's NFL Draft, pick No. 112 to the Chargers.

Kelley was born in Inglewood, where the Chargers' new stadium soon will open. He moved to Lancaster when he was 4 years old, but made frequent trips to Venice to see his extended family. He's an L.A. kid through and through.

If circumstances allow it, Jacqueline will be in the stands at SoFi Stadium to watch him play this season.

"I'm so juiced about it," Kelley said.

Foster will be there, too.

"The one thing Josh has is consistency," Foster said. "He's going to be the same guy every day. That's huge in the NFL because you're always on display. That's one thing that he's going to do. He's going to show up every day."

Or call you every day.

Whatever is necessary.

### Ty Long's Leadership Has the Attention of Teammates, Coaches

Ty Long was kicking and punting for the BC Lions of the CFL in 2018 – a long way from Los Angeles.

A scouting trip to Canada by general manager Tom Telesco led to Long joining the Chargers. He's quickly become one of the best punters in the league, with a booming kickoff leg to boot.

But it's Long's combination of toughness and leadership – both on and off the field – that prompted his teammates to vote him as a 2020 team captain.

"Ty's a leader," head coach Anthony Lynn said. "And guys will follow Ty. He will hold people accountable and that is unusual for a punter."

Long has been at the forefront of the social justice conversation within the team. When the Chargers cancelled their scrimmage at SoFi Stadium on Aug. 27, Long spoke to NFL Network alongside running back Justin Jackson about what he believes needs to change in society.

"We need less followers and more leaders," he said. "It's time to step up. When you know something's wrong, let's point it out and be better."

Since that day, Long said he's in weekly meetings with Lynn and several of his teammates to discuss how they can enact positive change. He's also doing his part to enhance the lives of children with special needs.

For every punt that's downed inside the 20-yard line this season, Long is pledging \$50 to Special Olympics.

## KENNETH MURRAY JR.

### Kenneth Murray is more than just the 'next man up' for the Chargers

"Next man up" is a common phrase heard around the NFL but for a Chargers squad that finished last season with the third most injuries in the league, it's damn near the team slogan. Unfortunately for coach Anthony Lynn, this season started with more of the same as another preseason injury to a key player forced him to lean on a rookie more than expected.

But so far, the kid has risen to the challenge and, no, I'm not talking about quarterback sensation Justin Herbert.

I'm referring to linebacker Kenneth Murray, who is shouldering more than originally planned because of the season-ending knee injury to defensive star Derwin James. And just as fellow first-round pick Herbert has given fans hope for the future, Murray also has shown promising flashes.

"My main focus is to get better every week and as long as I keep doing that, I think I can reach the goals I have for myself and the goals we have as a team," said Murray, the Chargers' second-leading tackler. "It was a blessing [knowing the Chargers traded up to draft him]."

"I didn't really communicate a lot with them during the draft process, so when I got that phone call it was definitely a bit of a surprise. But it's one I was so grateful for knowing they believe in me that much. I owe them my all ... to go out there and play elite defense and be that guy in the middle."

Lynn credited Murray for his ability "to pick up all of the little integral parts of the defense and being able to stand in front of the group and call the play" despite a lack of a preseason.

"We ask a lot of our linebackers ... he has a lot on his plate but I like the way he handles that," Lynn said, adding the enthusiastic Murray occasionally beats him to the facility in the morning. "He hasn't been as impactful as his skill set may say he would have been, but he's just touching the surface right now. And despite being all of that he's still the second-leading tackler on the team. He's going to be an outstanding player."

With four consecutive losses — all by a single score, including two in overtime — this off week could not have come at a better time for Lynn and company, especially mentally. The disappointment of blowing back-to-back 17-point leads to future Hall of Famers Tom Brady and Drew Brees can be taxing. And then there's the heartbreaker against Kansas City, a game they didn't trail in until Harrison Butker's game-winning 58-yard field goal with 1:55 remaining in overtime. Even for someone as optimistic as Murray, a string of those kind of losses can follow you long after the final whistle.

"We came in there with a really good game plan," he said about the matchup against the champs. "We had the right mentality. We just got to be able to get that win late in the fourth quarter. It was good to go out there and compete against those guys, but we're definitely not satisfied with just competing. We want to win those games."

Lynn agrees.

"It's frustrating because we knew this stretch was going to be a little rough, but I do believe we should at least get two out of three," he said. "So I spend a lot of time self-scouting, looking at us and what we can do differently."

"And [Murray] is one of those players we're looking at to help get us over the hump."

That's a lot of pressure. But as the saying goes, pressure will either grind you into dust or turn you into a diamond, and for Murray — more often than not — it's been the latter.

For example in July 2019, while driving home from church one night, he came across a woman who was lying on the sidewalk unconscious, not breathing and bleeding from the head. A friend of the woman arrived shortly before Murray did and was desperately trying to wake her up. That's when Murray, who had received CPR training at church, sprung into action. He was able to revive her. And then as with any unassuming hero, he left once paramedics arrived.

"I thought I got away without anyone seeing me," he said. "Three days later I was sitting at my locker after practice and our media relations guy came up to me after practice and asked if I had given anyone CPR lately. It just so happens a kid from the student newspaper was driving by while all of it was going on."

It wasn't just one budding journalist, but a car full from the OU Daily. They were driving home from dinner and stumbled upon the scene.

"Our design editor immediately spots Kenneth's girlfriend, which makes me think that means Kenneth is around too," according to Caleb McCourry, the paper's sports editor. "Sure enough [Kenneth] was performing CPR on an unconscious woman. I knew it was him right away. Hard to miss a varsity linebacker of his size."

"He just took off when the lady was put in an ambulance and OK. He's a real humble guy and didn't want anyone seeing him there. This was right outside the Duck Pond parking lot next to Gaylord Stadium."

Being there for others is something his parents — father a pastor, mother a retired police officer — instilled in him early. His three adopted siblings are all special needs and he was relied upon for help.

"It definitely makes you grow up fast," he said. "That turned out to be a good thing because you have to be a mature player in order to be someone the coaching staff and your teammates can depend on."

And as far as having a mother who was in law enforcement during this unique time in American sports ...



"There are good cops out there, but there are also bad cops out there," he said. "That's one of the biggest things I've seen from having my mom be a police officer. In fact, she struggles with it herself and she gets angry when she sees some of the things police officers do that are not right."

"I'm a guy who stands for what is right and stands against what is wrong. I'm going to fight against social injustice and join with my brothers and sisters around the country in the fight for equality."

Considering he's still about a month away from turning 22, Murray is similar in age to many grass-roots leaders I spoke with who are organizing protests around the city. So it makes sense he would care about these issues as passionately as he does.

Just as his impact on the team makes sense.

The Chargers moved up 14 spots to get him. NFL draft expert Mel Kiper listed him as one of his instant impact players after the draft, following a career at Oklahoma where he collected 335 tackles and nine sacks in three seasons. Now the Missouri City, Texas, native hopes to continue that success for a team that is high on moral victories but only has one actual one.

"When I first came in, [James] kind of took me under his wing and let me know different things about the team and how to be a great player," he said. "So when he got hurt that was definitely a blow. He's a difference maker. But you always know [getting hurt] is part of the game. So, it's next man up."

Yes it is, Kenneth ... yes it is.

## Kenneth Murray Jr., 'glossy' legs and all, is the Chargers' new man in the middle

The Chargers enter the 2020 season deep at linebacker. Deep, and descriptive.

Though official NFL records are sketchy regarding such matters, this is believed to be the only team in training camp that featured one linebacker referring to another linebacker as "glossy."

That's the word Drue Tranquill said he used with teammate Derwin James in a conversation about Kenneth Murray Jr.

"This guy looks like he could be a bodybuilder with those legs, huh?" Tranquill said he told James during a walk-through. "Just all glossy, man, those things are massive, like redwood trees."

Murray made a first impression a memorable one for the Chargers, the team that in April traded into the first round to draft the former Oklahoma linebacker 23rd overall.

Back in the spring, he promised to bring size and speed to a defense trending toward younger contributors and more athleticism. And that's precisely what Murray — all 6 feet 2, 241 pounds of him — delivered when summer arrived.

"I've seen potential of a great player," defensive end Melvin Ingram said. "He's got instincts. He's physical. He can run. He's going to be a special player in this league, in due time."

Murray amassed 335 tackles — 37 of them for lost yardage — in three years at Oklahoma. He built his game and his name on being able to run from one sideline to the other in pursuit of the football.

The Chargers were so excited to have the opportunity to add Murray that coach Anthony Lynn's voice was audibly heightened during a session with reporters on the first night of the draft.

"He's definitely going to be a physical presence out there," defensive coordinator Gus Bradley said. "He's a run-and-hit guy. Things come natural to him. He understands leverage. The speed of the game ... I think he's adjusting well to that. He's progressing nicely."

Murray was with the No. 1 defense in late August when the Chargers staged their main full-team scrimmage. He started in place of returning veteran Denzel Perryman, who was dealing with a physical issue.

Regardless of how he gets on the field, Murray figures to play plenty as the franchise's most anticipated defensive rookie since James, who emerged in 2018 to become an All-Pro and one of the game's most versatile safeties.

"Things come pretty easy to him," Bradley said of Murray. "If he makes a mistake, he understands that pretty quickly, what he did wrong and what he needs to do to fix it."

The Chargers have become known for building positional versatility on defense, from linemen who can play inside and outside to cornerbacks who can line up on the perimeter or in the slot.

But with Murray, they decided to have him concentrate on middle linebacker during his first NFL training camp, as several fellow linebackers shuffled around.

The idea was to allow Murray to attempt to master one position, and also putting him in a spot where he could most influence the game.

"I think it's smart on their part to just allow me to focus on one position ... " Murray said. "I feel myself playing extremely fast. I think there's definitely a level I can get up to even more. I'm focused on getting to that point."

Turns out, the spot Murray can have his greatest impact — not surprisingly — is directly in the middle of the field, the middle of the defense, the middle of everything.

Bradley explained that starting Murray there permits him to run either right or left, based on what he reads up front. He can first use his speed and then his size to disrupt the offense.

"It appears that he has both," Bradley said. "Now, it's just putting it together and recognizing things."

As a middle linebacker, Murray also often will be responsible for calling signals on the field. The assignment asks for a maturity some rookies might not possess. But Murray is the sort of rookie who took part of the first money he earned as a professional to buy his parents a house.

"You got to be mature because ... you run the huddle, you run the defense really," Ingram said. "You get us lined up. You tell us what the call is. So you have to be mature."

Said Lynn: "I have no problem with him and his maturity and handling that role. He definitely has a presence. He's been a captain. He's been a leader his whole life."

Murray certainly has the body of a grownup and the game to match. His addition is one reason Bradley called this group of linebackers "the strongest" he has had in his four seasons with the Chargers.

In recent years, injuries have decimated the group, particularly in 2018 when Bradley was forced to rely heavily on defensive backs, often employing seven at once.

That shouldn't be an issue in 2020, thanks in part to Murray, who dealt with a minor injury in training camp but appears healthy now after missing some time.

"I hate being out," he said. "I hate being away from the guys. I feel out of place when I'm not in the game. Not being able to participate and standing in the back ... It hurts me. It hurts me because I'm all ball."

## 'It drove me' — How Kenneth Murray turned his bold prediction into reality

On Jan. 10, 2017, Kenneth Murray tweeted a bold proclamation.

At the time, Murray was a three-star linebacker recruit who had committed to Oklahoma a few months prior. Bob Stoops' coaching staff, including Tim Kish, the inside linebackers coach who recruited Murray out of Houston, knew Murray had significant potential. But he was raw. He had plenty of work to do to simply earn a starting job in Norman. Reaching the NFL? As a first-round pick? No one was predicting that kind of leap this early.

Except for Murray, that is.

People learn quickly when they spend time with him.

"He's very strong-minded," Kish said this week in a phone interview with The Athletic. "He's very strong-willed."

A little more than three years after that tweet, Murray's prophecy came true. The Chargers traded back into the first round in April to draft Murray 23rd overall.

Murray's only mistake was the position he forecasted. The Oklahoma staff saw pass-rushing potential in Murray, but they felt like playing him at the line of scrimmage would detract from his greatest attribute: his relentless and violent pursuit of the football.

"You don't want to slow a guy down who has that type of mentality," Kish said.

When NFL commissioner Roger Goodell announced Murray's name during the virtual draft, he became the first Oklahoma linebacker to be drafted in the first round since Jackie Shipp in 1984.

That's an interesting nugget in its own right. But the more telling aspect is that Murray not only knew who Shipp was but also used Shipp's place in OU history as motivation during this college career — motivation to make his 2017 tweet become a reality.

"It drove me every day," Murray said the night he was drafted. "I wanted to be that guy to get OU back on the map defensively."

Shipp and Murray have never met, but they are inextricably linked. Shipp coached the defensive line at Oklahoma from 1999 to 2012. He groomed Gerald McCoy, who, before Murray, was the last OU defensive player to be drafted in the first round, in 2010.

"It would be more of a spiritual connection," Shipp, who now coaches at Nevada, said of Murray in a phone interview with The Athletic. "But he played at Oklahoma. So that's a brotherhood right there."

Murray has never tempered his hopes. He has always gazed farther than other players, dreamed bigger and expected more.

Kish remembers the first time he met with Murray, before the 2017 season when Murray was a freshman who had yet to play a collegiate down.

"He came in with very lofty goals," Kish said with a laugh. "He wanted to be first-team All-Big 12. He wanted to be an All-American. And he did mention the fact that he wanted to play in the NFL."

"I smiled and I said, 'Well, we got a lot of work to do,'" Kish added. "But I never, ever want anybody to shortchange their goals. He was all about football. He loved the game."

Pretty much every Division I player has those goals and wants to reach the pinnacle of the sport. But to say it out loud, in the very first meeting with his position coach? That is what set Murray apart.

"That is unique," Kish said. "He was going to set that bar as high as he could set it. That's one of the beauties of the whole thing, is when you have that kind of mentality, the sky is the limit. And we just rolled with him."

"He had a list of goals that he was going to chase, and more power to him," Kish added. "I just wish I had all those guys thinking that way."

Murray earned a starting job at MIKE linebacker as a freshman, beating out several upperclassmen with playing experience. He finished with 68 tackles that season. The following year, he arrived on the national stage, totaling 155 tackles, including 12.5 for losses, and 4.5 sacks.

"It really came into fruition his sophomore year, about halfway through the season, and he just took off," Kish said. "We knew we had something special in him."

The Chargers feel the same way. Head coach Anthony Lynn called him "one of my favorite players in the draft."

For Murray, this is one dream achieved. You can be sure he has compiled a new set of goals. With a spotlight on him now, he likely won't tweet them out. But they are there, pushing him further, lifting him to excellence, resting, always, on the horizon — in sight, but far enough away to make clear the effort necessary to get there.

Shipp paved the way for Murray when he was drafted in the first round in 1984.

The last OU linebacker to make a Pro Bowl was Jerry Tubbs in 1962.

There is more history to be made.

"You never know who might be watching you and what might come of it," Shipp said. "I hope he has a great, outstanding career."

## Kenneth Murray Jr. faced childhood challenges that made him a man on the field

Kenneth Murray Jr. used his combination of size, speed, athleticism, instincts and tenacity to develop into a 6-foot-2, 241-pound tackling machine at Oklahoma and one of the top two inside linebackers, along with Louisiana State's Patrick Queen, in the upcoming NFL draft.

Murray does not take any of his attributes for granted. When Kenneth was 11 years old in Missouri City, Tex., his parents — Kenneth Sr., a Baptist pastor, and Dianne, a retired police officer — adopted three children with chromosomal disorders.

Nyia, now 19, can speak and is relatively independent, but she reads at an elementary school level. Lenny, now 14, and James, now 11, are non-verbal and significantly undersized for their age. Lenny is confined to a wheelchair.

"One of the big lessons I learned is to be grateful for life, for the ability I have, for being able to function properly, to be able to speak," Murray, who also has a younger biological sister, said at the NFL combine in February.

"It makes me want to go out there and give my best every time, because literally, on an everyday basis, I see my two little brothers who can't do what everybody else can do. So I try to take advantage of every opportunity."

Murray, a three-year starter at Oklahoma, accumulated 78 tackles and earned co-Big 12 defensive freshman of the year honors in 2017. He racked up 155 tackles, including a school-record 28 in an overtime win over triple-option-running Army, and garnered second-team all-conference honors in 2018.

He was a first-team All-Big 12 pick and third-team All-American last year, when he had 102 tackles, 17 for lost yardage, four sacks and four pass-breakups for the Sooners, who went 12-2 and lost to LSU in the national semifinals.

Murray was one of Oklahoma's most diligent and hardest-working players. He watched five or six hours of film a day and arrived at the school's football facility at 5:45 a.m. Monday through Thursday.

"The only reason why I'm not there on Friday is because we practice on the mornings on Friday," Murray said. "I think my passion for the game is something you're going to see a lot when you watch me play ball."

That Murray is a natural leader, a player who made defensive calls and checks in all three college seasons, and has a reputation as a good teammate is no surprise.

The oldest of five children in his family, Murray assumed many care-giving responsibilities for his adopted siblings, shuttling them to and from doctor's appointments and helping with household chores. As a teenager, he worked as a counselor for kids at a church community center.

"I tell people all the time that I feel like I raised three kids already," Murray said. "That's pretty much how I came up, who I am. It was a very unique situation. I think that's one of the biggest things I learned, just how to be truly selfless and to be able to help."

## DONALD PARHAM JR.

### Tight End Donald Parham Jr. Looks to Bring Big-Play Ability to Bolts

In an abbreviated 2020 XFL season, Donald Parham Jr. was among the league's dominant players.

In five games with the Dallas Renegades, the 6-foot-8, 260-pound tight end was tied for fourth in receptions (24), second in targets (43), third in receiving yards (307) and tied for second in touchdowns (4). After a couple of stints on NFL practice squads in 2019, Parham Jr. is back in the league looking to recreate some of that XFL magic with the Chargers.

"It definitely set me up with the confidence to play with higher-level guys," he said of the XFL. "Especially because a lot of the people in the XFL were either ex-NFL players or a lot of guys from bigger schools that didn't quite get the opportunity, but they got that opportunity."

Parham Jr. played college football at Stetson University in DeLand, Fla. — an enrollment of just over 4,000 students. In 30 games, he finished his career as the school's all-time leader in catches (180), receiving yards (2,591), and receiving touchdowns (20). Those eye-popping stats earned him an invite to the 2019 Senior Bowl.

"I was really surprised Donald didn't get drafted a couple of years ago just because he has rare traits," Senior Bowl Executive Director Jim Nagy said. "When you're a scout, you're always looking for things that differentiate you from other players."

Nagy said that Parham Jr. has the wingspan of someone who is approximately 7 foot 1 coupled with a 36-inch vertical jump. That makes for what he called a "rare" and "unusual" catch radius.

Hunter Henry praised Parham Jr. last week for his play so far in training camp, adding that "he has a lot of talent" and "can move really well, too, for how big he is." That encouragement from the Chargers starting tight end hasn't gone unnoticed.

"Hunter Henry's definitely been a great mentor to me," Parham Jr. said. "He's always keeping me uplifted during practice and making sure that I get it in my head that I can do this. He's definitely helped me along the way throughout this whole camp experience."

At 23, Parham Jr.'s early football journey has been filled twists and turns. When asked if he ever thinks about the trajectory of his career and where it can go, he quickly responded.

"Yes, I absolutely do," he said. "Because I never want to plateau. I always want to keep on the steady increase in terms of leveling up my game as well as my career. So, I'm definitely focused on not stepping back, but always taking a step forward."

## JOE REED

### Reed makes his NFL debut

Sunday, Sept. 13, was a momentous day for Joe Reed, his family, friends and all of Charlotte County.

Reed, who grew up in Charlotte County, made his debut in the National Football League.

It was an occasion that had been intensely anticipated ever since Reed was drafted in the fifth round by the Los Angeles Chargers back in April.

And likely to no one's surprise in Charlotte County, Reed did not simply show up for his first NFL game. He made a play that proved key to helping the Chargers win.

With L.A. trailing 13-7 to the host Cincinnati Bengals late in the third quarter, Reed, with his signature, assured stride, took his first-ever kickoff return 46 yards to give the Chargers offense excellent field position. It set up L.A.'s only touchdown of the game — a 5-yard run by rookie running back Joshua Kelley.

The extra point tied the game at 13-13, and the Chargers went on to win 16-13 at Paul Brown Stadium in Cincinnati.

Sunday's game was unusual because due to safety regulations related to the COVID19 pandemic, the Chargers and Bengals had to play in an empty stadium. Additionally, it was the first playing time either team had seen since last season because the 2020 preseason was canceled due to the pandemic.

However, none of this changed the fact that the game in Cincinnati was a genuine NFL game, Reed's first, and he described what it was like being out there.

"Man, it was definitely a dream come true," he said. "I got off the bus thankful, just thinking about my journey getting to this point. Regardless of not having a preseason and not having fans (in the stands), I just let my drive and hard work take over to get me to this point. So, I'm definitely thankful (for) being in this situation and excited moving forward."

He said his first time on the field in Sunday's game was as a member of the Chargers' special teams for a punt in the first quarter. He estimated that for the game, he had eight on-field appearances with special teams and about the same amount with the offense.

Not lost on Reed is the significance of his football journey that has gone from Charlotte County youth league play, to Randolph-Henry High School, to the University of Virginia to now the highest professional level possible.

"That's something I think about every day, especially talking to former teammates and talking to my friends back at home," he said. "We actually talk about that a lot. I was actually just talking to one of my old teammates about practicing behind the (Early Learning Center) ELC, playing for the (Charlotte County) Patriots."

Reed heard a good bit from his friends back home in Charlotte County after Sunday's game.

"I have a great, great amount of support back home, especially from my former classmates," he said. "They text me before and after the games, and that really helps me a lot, just them reaching out to me."

Reed's family members were not at Sunday's game in person due to the COVID-19 regulations, but they were definitely tuned in back at home, and he talked to his parents right after the game.

"I sent them a couple pictures of me in the uniform, and they're super proud of me too," he said.

His father, Carlton Reed, described Sunday and seeing Joe out on the NFL gridiron for the first time as overwhelming.

"It was a day off for me, but I actually went to work to keep my mind occupied till game time," he said. "I know when the boys were home, that was the thing on Sundays — we'd get to church and be looking at our clock, because (we) can't wait till service is over to go watch the games. I've got a child that's in the NFL now, so the anticipation was overwhelming."

"And as far as watching the game, I watched it like if it was anyone else out there," he said. "I'm not much of an outside cheerer, but I expressed myself inside. I was very happy. I'm very pleased to watch him out there doing something that he dreamed of. Everything's coming together for him." During his press conference Monday, Chargers Head Coach Anthony Lynn gave his appraisal of Joe Reed's first performance, showing some tough love but dwelling more on Reed's positives and promise.

"I don't like the fact that he ran out of bounds on his own and he created a penalty on special teams," Lynn said. "But the one kick return that he had, that's what Joe can do. We needed that field position, and he put the offense in great shape to put points on the board."

The coach noted Reed is a threat on special teams.

"We want to get him more involved as he grows in this offense, doing some special things," Lynn said. "We love Joe as an athlete, but right now, his primary role is going to be three core special teams guy and backup receiver, and the guy can play some running back as well. Love his versatility."

## Chargers hope fifth-round pick Joe Reed will break their kick return TD drought

Ricky Brumfield was hired as Virginia's special-teams coach in January 2018, and his first order of business was watching every special-teams snap from the previous season. He took notes on his new players and began to mold a plan for the future. During this film marathon, a kickoff return from the Cavaliers' 40-36 win over Georgia Tech popped up on the screen.

A jolt of excitement hit Brumfield as he saw No. 2, Joe Reed, then a sophomore, field the kick at his own 8-yard line, surge through a hole, keep his balance as he collided with one of his blockers, cut to his left, explode down the sideline and win a race to the goal line.

"Yeah," Brumfield remembered thinking to himself. "We got somebody."

He was correct. That was the first kickoff-return touchdown of Reed's college career. He added another later in that 2017 season in a bowl-game loss to Navy, and he took three more kickoffs to the house in his two seasons playing for Brumfield, including a 100-yarder against William and Mary in September.

Reed's five total kickoff-return touchdowns are tied for the ninth most in college football history. He also ranks 10th all-time in kickoff return average at 28.7 yards per return.

He was one of the most prolific kickoff returners the college game has ever seen. And this specific skill appealed to the Chargers as they decided to spend their fifth-round pick, 151st overall, on Reed in last month's NFL Draft.

"It's really just the combination of my size, my speed and my vision," Reed said. "Just being fearless when I'm back there. Catching the ball and going. Not trying to make too much happen or make too many guys miss. Try to break tackles and hit the seam and go."

Consider this: The Chargers haven't returned a kickoff for a touchdown since Tom Telesco took over as general manager in 2013. They are one of five teams without a kickoff return TD during that span. The Chiefs have five.

Desmond King, of course, has provided some juice on punt returns, taking two back for touchdowns, one in each of the last two seasons. But the Chargers haven't recently featured a genuine difference-maker on kickoffs.

Reed, they hope, will be that player. He certainly fits the prototype at 6-foot and 224 pounds with 4.47 speed.

"He is more powerful than people expect, and he's faster than people think he is," Brumfield said. "Being a kick returner, you have to make somebody miss, and he did that on a consistent basis. The first person very, very rarely tackled him. He always ran through arm tackles, and if he ever got in the open, he never got caught. It was always bye-bye."

Reed has been saying so long to kickoff coverage defenders since he was in Pop Warner.

"I honestly don't remember my first one," Reed said. "There's been so many."

One does stick out in his mind, though. He was in eighth grade and playing for the junior varsity team at Randolph-Henry High School in his hometown of Charlotte Court House, Virginia.

On the opening kickoff of the first game of the season, Reed scored.

"Oh man, it's really hard to describe. Just all the adrenaline and, man, running the length of the field," Reed said. "Truly, it's so fun, and turning around and seeing your boys behind you celebrating. It really helps the momentum for your team, and that's really my favorite part about returning kicks, whether it's a touchdown or just a really good return."

Reed said the Bears' Cordarrelle Patterson (6-2, 238 pounds) and former Washington return specialist Brian Mitchell (5-11, 225 pounds) are two players he looks up to and watches their film.

Mitchell returned four kickoffs for touchdowns during his 14-year NFL career from 1990 to 2003. Patterson's seven kickoff return TDs are the third most in NFL history, trailing only Josh Cribbs and Leon Washington, both of whom have eight.

"We really like him in that position with his size," Telesco said of Reed. "(He is) 225 pounds, but he still runs very well and has a great feel for kickoff returning."

Anthony Lynn compared Reed to Cribbs and Brad Smith. He coached both while with the Jets. Smith, a college QB, had four kick-return touchdowns in his nine-year career and also filled a jack-of-all-trades role on offense.

The Chargers believe Reed has the versatility to be a running back/wide receiver hybrid in their revamped offense — with big-play potential.

"He fits that role where you can have a package for this young man each and every week that can extend two or three drives, or put points on the board," Lynn said. "Defensive coordinators, they have to be prepared for stuff like that. We needed a multi-threat like that. I felt like he was the guy."

The Chargers believe in patience with young players. There is a process, a rite of passage, to earning snaps. Start on special teams, prove your worth there, then graduate to offensive or defensive snaps.

That works just fine for Reed, who should make an immediate impact both as a returner and a coverage player.

He'll bring his "fearless" mindset to whatever the Chargers ask of him.

"It's just in my nature," Reed said.

As for the award, all 32 team nominees will be highlighted and recognized for their important work leading up to Super Bowl LV. The 2020 Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year will be announced during NFL Honors.

### Isaac Rochell sees his obligation as a pro athlete extend beyond the gridiron

He's up at 6 a.m. most days, pushing his 6-foot-4, 280-pound body through a lifting regimen inside a gym he has pieced together in his apartment complex.

And Isaac Rochell, defensive lineman with the Chargers, usually has a training partner, one who might seem unlikely: the team's placekicker, Michael Badgley.

"Obviously, I double the weight he's doing in everything," Rochell joked. "Despite him being a kicker, whatever that means, he's actually a really, really good person to work out with."

Badgley mans one of the most niche positions in all of sports, but he's known for his athletic ability. Growing up, he played lacrosse at a high level and also played hockey.

He and Rochell are good friends and neighbors in Huntington Beach, the two teammates spending more time together now given the restrictions of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The past several weeks have been a continuous series of adjustments for athletes all over the world. Rochell also moved to host a few of his fellow Chargers for workouts on the beach.

Defensive linemen Justin Jones and Jerry Tillery, linebacker Uchenna Nwosu and offensive lineman Trent Scott have joined him at different times for the twice-a-week sessions.

"Yeah, we do stand out," Rochell said. "It's funny because random people will come by and try to get in our workouts. We're like, 'Look, we're here to train, not to hang out.'"

With a notable increase in free time these days, Rochell has expanded in areas away from football too.

He recently started "Local Human," an apparel company designed to support various charities and serve the community.

For each T-shirt sold, the company sends a T-shirt to a local foster center. They also donate \$10 per shirt to a designated organization of the month. May's recipient is the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention.

"It started from quarantine," Rochell said. "We had tons of extra time. We also had this want to help people. I think a lot of people in the midst of this feel that way. We said, 'Let's start something to give people a chance to give back.'"

So he partnered with another neighbor, Trevor Beck. The two met because both are dog owners.

"When you're in quarantine and you have a dog and you're at the dog park all the time, those people sort of become your quarantine crew," Rochell said. "We spent so much time together that we decided to do something about it."

They originally planned to call the company "Six Feet Away," a nod to the guidelines of social distancing. But Rochell said they changed their minds because they didn't want to be forever linked to COVID-19.

Instead, he suggested "Local Human" since the name purposely excludes no one.

"Everybody's local to somewhere and everybody's human," Rochell explained. "It's just a very inclusive name."

This isn't Rochell's first venture into promoting a cause. After being a seventh-round pick out of Notre Dame in 2017, he started a campaign called "See You on Sunday."

That movement is designed to encourage people to stay off social media on Saturdays. The program grew from Rochell's own obsession with platforms like Twitter.

"I think I have an obligation," he said. "As a professional athlete, I have a voice. I have enough of a following to share a message. And I like to think I have the education and the mind to do these things."

"With all those things put together it seems like a no-brainer for me to be doing stuff like this. Some athletes would disagree. But, you know, I was fortunate enough to be put in this situation."

## Chargers' Isaac Rochell lends helping hand while in quarantine

Isaac Rochell entered the NFL determined to use his platform to help people in need.

The Chargers' defensive end isn't a star player with a massive social media following, but that didn't stop Rochell from thinking big. He's an advocate for mental health and has devoted time for community work during his three seasons with the Chargers.

Rochell was ready to take the next step, but he didn't have direction until he met with leaders at Orangewood Foundation, a non-profit organization that provides services to former and current foster youth in Orange County.

The topic of donating used clothes was discussed and that stuck with Rochell.

"They told us they don't accept used clothes for foster youth," Rochell recalled. "Everybody deserves to have a new shirt and the lady said, 'Just because you have less resources and you're underprivileged that doesn't mean you should just always have used clothing.'"

Then it finally clicked for Rochell while in quarantine because of the coronavirus pandemic. He figured out how to help during a crisis and for the future.

Rochell co-founded Local Human last month with the intention of providing new shirts and funding for many organizations. The group of four had their employer identification number on April 4 and launched their first campaign a week later.

Rochell partnered with Meals on Wheels for the month of April. They sold shirts on the Local Human website, and for each shirt sold, \$10 went to Meals on Wheels, which amounted to three meals for elderly in need in Los Angeles County during the pandemic. Also, with each shirt purchased, a new shirt was donated to the Orangewood Foundation.

"They're packaged, printed on and they are brand new shirts," Rochell said. "I think that's really important to point out because everybody deserves to have a new shirt. ... We fell in love with what they were doing (at Orangewood Foundation), and we said, 'You know what, let's start right here in Orange County by supporting the Orangewood Foundation and hopefully we give them so many shirts that they can't even handle them.' Then we'll move on to the next one and then we can hopefully support on a more national basis for foster centers around the country."

One month after forming Local Human, Rochell assisted with 600 shirts sold and \$6,000 raised for Meals on Wheels. That amounted to 600 wellness checks and more than 1,500 meals. As of Friday, Local Human had funded \$10,510, according to its website.

Local Human partnered with the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention for the month of May. They're following the same model of \$10 donated along with a new shirt. They'll do the same in June with a different organization.

Rochell is in charge of outreach and planning, and his girlfriend, Alli Kucharczyk, is the designer for the shirts. Rochell also got his next door neighbor and teammate involved. Chargers kicker Michael Badgley helps with packaging the shirts.

"(Badgley) kinda got stuck doing that, but he loves it and supports it," Rochell said.

Rochell has played in every game for the Chargers the past two seasons. He has plenty of responsibilities on the football field, but he doesn't view his community outreach as extra work.

"It's fun for us," Rochell said. "It's sort of a challenge. I spend three hours a day lifting and stretching and taking care of my body, and then I have a whole lot of extra time to do things. So it was kind of the perfect storm for us to be able to sit down, figure out a game plan and organize everything. It's been really fun. There's been no stress. It's just been an enjoyable process where we can give back."

Last year, Rochell started his "See You on Sunday" initiative, a campaign to promote mental health while taking a social media detox.

Rochell is constantly looking for ways to help because he feels it's an obligation as an NFL player. But it's become more than an obligation. He's found a passion.

"This is definitely a long term thing," Rochell said.

"I think what we've done, because we've had so much time, we've built a really good infrastructure, and we feel good about that and we think it's going to help us a lot moving forward."

## TYROD TAYLOR

### Tyrod Taylor ready to start Chargers' hopeful march to playoff spot

He signed a two-year contract in March of 2019 to join a team with a starting quarterback expected to last at least two more years.

Tyrod Taylor walked into his introductory news conference two days later and announced he would do whatever was asked of him to help make the Chargers better.

"I didn't think too much into the future when I made that decision," Taylor recalled Wednesday. "I just thought about what was right for me. ... I felt that coming out here to L.A. was the best fit in my career at the time."

That notion of "best fit" takes on added meaning as the Chargers turn their offense over to Taylor, who, on Sunday, will end Philip Rivers' streak of consecutive starts for the franchise.

But everything changed when the Chargers stumbled to a 5-11 finish, Rivers struggling mightily en route to throwing 20 interceptions.

In February, he and the team decided to end their relationship, opening an opportunity for Taylor to start for the first time since early in the 2018 season, when he was with Cleveland.

"I'm very hungry," Taylor said. "I'm excited to lead this group of men but, at the same time, be able to show what I can do. I know what I'm capable of doing. My teammates know."

Taylor, 31 and entering his 10th season, started three games for the Browns before suffering a concussion and being replaced by Baker Mayfield. He has thrown only seven passes in NFL games since.

His teams are 24-21-1 in his 46 career starts, the first 43 coming with Buffalo, where he was paired with Chargers head coach Anthony Lynn, who was then a Bills assistant.

"I'm excited to see him play," Lynn said. "Our guys really trust and believe in him. I'm just excited for the young man because he's very persistent. He's very patient. He's waited for his turn."

Rivers was the Chargers starter from the 2006 opener, a string of 224 games in the regular season, 235 counting the playoffs. When the streak began, Morten Andersen was still in the NFL. Today, Andersen is 60 years old.

On Sunday in Cincinnati, Taylor will become the first quarterback other than Rivers to start for the franchise since Drew Brees in the 2005 finale.

The game will mark the latest awaited opportunity for a 2011 sixth-round pick who spent four years with Baltimore before being given a chance to start in Buffalo.

"When it comes to my football career," Taylor said, "I've just had to work for everything, like a lot of guys in that locker room and across the league."

Against the Bengals, he'll be backed up by Justin Herbert, the No. 6 overall draft pick in April. With the preseason canceled because of the COVID-19 pandemic, Herbert's only action as a pro has come in practice.

Still, the Chargers are ready to enter the regular season with the rookie on their game-day roster over Easton Stick, a 2019 fifth-round pick who never has been active for a game.

"He's our No. 2," Lynn said of Herbert. "If something happens, he's in."

But for now, this is Taylor's job and his team, the long-recognized leader officially named a team captain Wednesday.

Just like two years ago, Taylor will open the season as the starter as his team's first-round rookie quarterback preps just off stage.

"It doesn't add any extra pressure," Taylor said. "Me and Justin, as well as Easton and the whole quarterback room, we have a great relationship. We all teach each other."

## Tyrod Taylor eager to prove he's more than a bridge quarterback for Chargers

He completed only four of 14 passes, was sacked three times and — on the play before being knocked out of the game because of a concussion — drew a penalty for intentional grounding.

The performance was so epically awful that, nearly two years later, Tyrod Taylor is still trying to bounce back, this career-long underdog again driven to prove he really can be a dawg.

"It was just such an abysmal performance that I think people have him figured all wrong now," ESPN analyst Rex Ryan said. "Everybody has bad games. It's just that nobody forgives Tyrod for that game."

This is the Chargers' new projected starting quarterback and that was his most recent start. On Sept. 20, 2018, on a Thursday night against the New York Jets, Taylor helped sink the Cleveland Browns into a 14-0 hole just before halftime.

The franchise hadn't won in 19 games and 635 days, and five months earlier had invested the No. 1 overall pick in Baker Mayfield.

Just a couple hours later, Mayfield had lifted Cleveland — and the success-starved Browns masses — to a stirring 21-17 victory sealed in the final two minutes. That buried Taylor in Bakermania, a fate from which he finally is poised to emerge.

But it took changing teams in free agency in 2019 and the shockingly sudden breaking of the once-forever bond between the Chargers and icon Philip Rivers to make it possible.

With the team set for training camp practice this week, Taylor is back as a starter ... and the man who gave him his first NFL start is convinced everything will work out this time.

"People are going to be stunned at how well Tyrod plays," said Ryan, who coached Taylor for two seasons in Buffalo. "I think he's a starting NFL quarterback, period. And they're going to win. They're just going to do it differently than Chargers fans are used to."

Before looking at where Taylor and the Chargers might be heading, let's examine how the 31-year-old quarterback arrived here.

Taylor has started 46 games in a career that began with him sitting on the bench behind Joe Flacco in Baltimore for four seasons. As a rookie, he threw as many passes (one) for the Ravens as Ray Rice did. Rice played running back.

Cam Newton was the first quarterback drafted in 2011; Taylor was the next to last, going to Baltimore in the sixth round with the 180th overall pick.

The quarterbacks selected before him included Ryan Mallett, Ricky Stanzani and Nathan Enderle.

"I've felt that I've been underappreciated in the past," Taylor acknowledged. "But that has never moved my focus from going out and leading each and every week. ... Yes, playing with something to prove definitely motivates me, but it's not the only thing. I enjoy going out and leading the guys and doing whatever it takes to help the team."

Ryan said he first tried to acquire Taylor in a trade when he was coaching the Jets but was overruled by management. So it wasn't until March 2015 that the two teamed up, Taylor signing with the Bills as a free agent.

He would go 23-20 in his three years as their starter, helping the franchise end a 17-year playoff drought in 2017, the season after Ryan had been fired in favor of Sean McDermott.

Taylor proved himself to be an efficient passer and effective runner, something that will be a marked departure in 2020 for the Chargers, who, for nearly a decade and a half, knew Rivers wasn't running anywhere.

Taylor did all that, and did even more.

"I knew his skills, but what I didn't know about him is the kind of character he has," Ryan said. "This is a phenomenal person, a phenomenal teammate. He's willing to do whatever it takes for the team."

"I think he's so nice and such a good team guy that it hurts him a little bit. A lot of quarterbacks have that mentality like they're going into an old-fashioned western gun fight. Tyrod's got that inside, but he doesn't have it outside."

Taylor didn't allow himself to become a distraction after losing the starting job to Mayfield in Cleveland. When McDermott benched the Bill for a start in 2017, he said nothing that made screaming headlines.

But to understand how much the latter move stung — the Bills started Nathan Peterman instead, leading to his historically miserable five-interception game against the Chargers — Taylor still prefers not to discuss the episode.

His team-first attitude is as ingrained as his work ethic, and this is an athlete who, among other things, rises before the sun to work out, follows a demanding diet and watches video by the hour — all year long.

"It's refreshing to see someone so committed, who takes so much pride in not letting his teammates down," said Jeff Christensen, a quarterback coach who works with Taylor in the offseason. "It leaves you almost speechless. And all of it with Tyrod is genuine."

Rivers, who started every game for this franchise over the last 14 seasons, won 123 of those 224 consecutive starts. He also led the Chargers to five postseason victories, but only one since 2013.

He is a classic drop-back quarterback, known for daring to sling passes into narrowing windows that can offer big payoffs and massive pitfalls. Behind an injured and often-struggling offensive line last season, Rivers threw 20 interceptions.

In his three seasons as a starter with the Bills, Taylor never threw more than six. During 2019, Rivers threw six in December. This was after he threw seven over back-to-back games in November.

"He takes care of the football," Chargers coach Anthony Lynn said of Taylor. "That's the thing I like about him the most. ... I really believe you lose more games than you win. If you take care of the football, your chances are a lot better. At least that's what the analytics say."

Taylor's career interception percentage is 1.5. The list of other active quarterbacks with percentages below 2.0 includes Dak Prescott, Russell Wilson and Tom Brady.

Right tackle Bryan Bulaga spent nine seasons with Green Bay before signing with the Chargers in March. He said it was so rare for Packers quarterback Aaron Rodgers to turn the ball over that, when it did happen, the sight was jarring.

Rodgers, in 6,061 pass attempts, has a career interception percentage of 1.4.

"He knows what to do with the football," Bulaga said, speaking of Taylor. "That's a positive thing. To be quite frank, the biggest thing that kills teams in this league is turnovers. You turn over the football, bad things are going to happen." While Rivers is more apt to make mistakes, he's also more likely to produce results. Taylor never has thrown for more than 20 touchdowns in a single season; Rivers, as a starter, never has thrown for fewer than 21.

Rivers also has 70 career games with at least 300 yards passing. Taylor has one.

But with wide receivers Keenan Allen and Mike Williams, tight end Hunter Henry and running back Austin Ekeler, Taylor said this Chargers offense is more talented and experienced than any he had in Buffalo.

"There's going to be games and there's going to be situations where you have to take those risks and you push the ball down the field," Taylor said. "But there's also going to be times when you have to manage the game and understand you have a defense that's going to get you the ball back."

Among the talents Taylor does possess is an ability to throw the ball deep with precision. Lynn said he first noticed the skill when he was the running backs coach in Buffalo with Taylor under center.

Lynn explained that Taylor's touch on long passes is simply better than most quarterbacks. Particularly with Williams, the threat of firing deep at any moment should be very real for the 2020 Chargers.

Last season, Rivers frequently lofted high-arching hopes in the direction of the 6-foot-4, 218-pound Williams. The frequency with which those hopes connected was reflected in Williams' 20.4-yard-per-catch average, tops in the NFL.

"With the receivers that we have, 50/50 balls ... it's not on the 50/50 side if you're throwing it to Mike," Taylor said. "It's more on the 70/30 side or 80/20. And even with Keenan. Most of the time, he's going to win his match-ups."

That long-ball option plus protecting the football plus the ability to take off and run complete the snapshot of Taylor's game.

As for greater detail on that last quality, Taylor has rushed for 107 first downs in his career. Rivers has rushed for 74.

"Just hold the defense accountable for all 11 guys on the field," Taylor explained. "I think we have enough weapons on the offensive side of the ball for sure to be able to have a bunch of explosive plays."

So now it begins anew for a veteran quarterback again starting in front of a prospect in whom the team has invested a first-round pick.

As with Mayfield in Cleveland, Justin Herbert is expected to eventually take over the starting job.

Until then — and who knows when then might be ... a month from now, a year, somewhere in between — Taylor will be out to prove there's a dawg inside him and that dawg still has its teeth.

"I can't say I've been through it all on this journey of mine, but I think I've been through a lot," he said. "And I think those moments have definitely prepared me for the opportunity that I have now."

## How Tyrod Taylor's Journey "Built Him for This Moment"

2020 marks quarterback Tyrod Taylor's tenth season in the NFL.

Though he hasn't started since 2018, he's going to get the opportunity to do so this year with the Bolts, one year after the team acquired him in free agency.

Having been in the system for a season, Taylor said the opportunity to get to start under head coach Anthony Lynn "means everything" as the two spent three years together in Buffalo.

"I respect coach," Taylor said of Lynn. "Of course, I worked with him in Buffalo and I was here last year. I respect him and I respect his leadership. I told guys on my first day out here that they have the right person for the job. I'm excited for the opportunity. I know what I'm capable of as well as my teammates. It's only a matter of time before we get to show the rest of the country what we're capable of as a team."

While he said there are similarities between the Chargers offense and the one he played in with the Bills, what excites Taylor is the talent surrounding him. His year in the system working with those guys certainly helps his rapport with them as does the opportunity he had to work out with them during the offseason. After all, building that camaraderie throughout the month of August is of the utmost importance given the absence of preseason games.

"We were able to keep some of the things in the passing game with the Chargers we were successful at last year and (in) years before," he said. "Of course, we have tremendous wide receiver ability and talent, so you want to keep some of the same things. Not to compare teams, the Buffalo team is very different from this Chargers team across the board. We have a tremendous group at the wide receiver position, tight end position and running backs. Just exciting. It's very similar, but different at the same time."

"You have a veteran receiver in Keenan Allen and an up and coming star in Mike Williams. Two tight ends that have experience. Of course, Hunter (Henry), being the guy who's very versatile. (Austin) Ekeler with a bunch of experience as well and JJ (Justin Jackson) who's bouncing back as well."

Tyrod Taylor: "I Know What I'm Capable Of" Throughout his time in the league, Taylor's had his share of peaks and valleys, but he credits all the experience he's had for making him into the quarterback and person he is today.

He views 2020 and this opportunity as a fresh start, and is eager to take everything he's learned and experienced and mold it into his play as a Charger.

"I can't say I've been through it all in this journey of mine since I've been in the NFL, but I think I've been through a lot. I think those moments definitely have prepared me for the opportunity I have now. Backing up Joe (Flacco) in Baltimore, to also being on a Super Bowl-winning team. How that played out that year, and the leadership it took to get to that goal, to not making the playoffs the following year. To going to Buffalo to break a 17-year playoff (drought,) to getting traded (to Cleveland) the next year, and (then) ending up out here in L.A. I think a lot of those things have built me for this moment and I take those into consideration."

"It's a new year, it's a new beginning. But at the same time, you can learn from the past and continue to push forward and let it make you a better player. I think I've learned a lot from the people I've played with and the coaches I've been around, and I just add it all to my game."

### Jerry Tillery's sophomore surge bolsters Chargers defensive line

COSTA MESA —The Chargers were often mentioned in recent seasons for having one of the best defensive lines in the NFL because of Pro Bowl pass rushers Joey Bosa and Melvin Ingram. But it wasn't known as the best, like the 2017 Philadelphia Eagles or last season's San Francisco 49ers.

Those memorable defensive lines led their teams to the Super Bowl because of depth. The Chargers haven't had that, but they were aware of the lack of production from interior defensive linemen and backup pass rushers.

The Chargers drafted defensive tackles Justin Jones (2018) and Jerry Tillery (2019) and this offseason signed two-time Pro Bowl nose tackle Linval Joseph. They also made former linebacker Uchenna Nwosu a full-time pass rusher.

The plan for depth took longer than expected, but the results are starting to show. The Chargers made Chiefs quarterback Patrick Mahomes look ordinary for three-plus quarters last week and gave Bengals rookie quarterback Joe Burrow a rough debut in Week 1.

Defensive end Isaac Rochell is thinking big after the early results.

"I just think we got extreme depth," Rochell said Thursday. "We have great players with great depth. ... I think having that much depth is rare and I think that much depth can lead to championships."

Two games into the season, the Chargers ranked second in quarterback hurries (19) and quarterback pressures (29). The Pittsburgh Steelers ranked first in both categories with 20 quarterback hurries and 40 quarterback pressures.

The emergence of Tillery this season has allowed Chargers defensive line coach Giff Smith to get creative with his in-game rotations. Tillery's versatility was supposed to give the Chargers depth last season, but the 2019 first-round pick struggled in his rookie season.

Tillery has had a sophomore surge, and he's producing in multiple positions with the starters and second rotation. Tillery has five quarterback pressures, three quarterbacks knockdowns, one sack and one blocked extra-point attempt.

"He's a scary, scary man," Joseph said Wednesday about Tillery.

The Chargers haven't missed a beat with their second defensive line unit of Tillery, Nwosu, Rochell and defensive tackle Damion Square.

Last week, Tillery saw many snaps with the starting unit. He might be asked to start Sunday against the Carolina Panthers if Jones isn't fully recovered from his shoulder injury.

Tillery struggled in his three starts last season. The Chargers aren't worried about him anymore.

"Super proud of Jerry," Rochell said. "He's a guy I've known now for years and he's just matured a lot. You continue to see that process here. The guy is killing it. ... I know he's going to continue to get better."

### Pro Bowl Guard Trai Turner Ready For 'Fresh Start' with Chargers

A 26-year-old offensive lineman with 80 starts, five straight Pro Bowl nods and a Super Bowl appearance on his NFL resume is switching teams – and coasts.

On Wednesday, the Chargers acquired guard Trai Turner from the Carolina Panthers in exchange for offensive tackle Russell Okung. A combination of youth and experience, Turner becomes a major piece to a new-look offensive line led by position coach James Campen.

"It's kind of like a fresh start," Turner said. "I get to be in a new facility, new teammates, new coaches, new city. I'm looking at it as like a rejuvenation of my football career."

Turner's credentials are as impressive as any O-lineman in the league. A third-round draft pick in 2014, the former LSU standout entered the NFL at 20 years old and started nine games his rookie season.

In 2015, Turner played 98 percent of Carolina's offensive snaps. The Panthers owned the league's highest-scoring offense (31.3 points per game) that season and went 15-1 before losing to the Denver Broncos in Super Bowl 50.

Leadership comes in multiple forms. Turner's accolades bring instant credibility to a unit that features several young players across the line, including Trey Pipkins, Trent Scott, Dan Feeney, Forrest Lamp and Scott Quessenberry.

"I firmly believe you lead by actions first," Turner said. "I plan to do that by leading with my actions first and foremost, and then see where it goes from there. I just want to come in and lead by example – do what I'm supposed to do in workouts, do what I'm supposed to do in the classroom, and most importantly, do what I'm supposed to do on the field."

Turner said he expects to start at right guard for the Chargers, the position he largely played during his six seasons in Carolina. He's already had a "good conversation" with Campen, who spent 11 seasons as the Green Bay Packers' offensive line coach before joining the Cleveland Browns in 2019.

"I'm excited about getting coached up by him," Turner said.

Sharing the field with explosive offensive weapons isn't new to Turner, either. He blocked for Panthers quarterback Cam Newton, helping him to win MVP in 2015. Last season, Christian McCaffrey had 2,392 yards from scrimmage and broke his own NFL record for catches by a running back (116).

Turner said he likes what he's seen from a Chargers offense that includes wide receivers Keenan Allen and Mike Williams, tight end Hunter Henry, and running back Austin Ekeler. He added that he's also heard positive things about quarterback Tyrod Taylor.

Still, with free agency in its early stages and the draft over a month away, the roster continues to evolve.

"Whoever may be back there, I'm just ready to do my job so everyone around me can shine – because when they look good, I look better."
