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CHARGERS FACE RAMS TO CLOSE OUT PRESEASON

The Los Angeles Chargers play the final contest of 2026 preseason against the Los Angeles Rams on Thurs., Aug. 27. Kickoff from SoFi Stadium is at 7:00 p.m. PT. Noah Eagle, Dan Fouts and Jaime Maggio have the call on CBS LA, while Matt “Money” Smith, Daniel Jeremiah and Shannon Farren will broadcast on the Chargers Radio Network airwaves on KFI AM-640. Adrian Garcia-Marquez and Francisco Pinto will present the game in Spanish on Latino Mix 103.9/89.3 FM and TUDN Los Angeles 101.9 FM-HD3.

The Chargers enter the third season with Head Coach **Jim Harbaugh**, who continued his winning track record with the team in 2025, leading the Bolts to a second-straight year with an 11-6 record and a postseason berth. Quarterback **Justin Herbert** continued to set records, this time for completions through the first six seasons of a career (2,285). In the passing game, wide receiver **Quentin Johnston** led the team with eight touchdowns for the second consecutive season. The team had five players — Herbert, **Joe Alt**, **Cameron Dicker**, **Derwin James Jr.**, and **Tuli Tuipulotu** — named to the 2026 Pro Bowl Games, while James was also named a second-team All-Pro selection by *The Associated Press* at slot cornerback and linebacker **Del’Shawn Phillips** was an AP second-team All-Pro at special teamer.

The Rams are led by Head Coach Sean McVay, who enters his 10th season at the helm. The offense features quarterback Matthew Stafford, who is the reigning Most Valuable Player, along with wide receiver Davante Adams. The defense showcases a pair of new acquisitions in defensive end Myles Garrett, who is the NFL’s reigning Defensive Player of the Year, and cornerback Trent McDuffie.

The Chargers begin the regular season with a pair of home games at SoFi Stadium, playing Week 1 against the Arizona Cardinals and Week 2 against the Las Vegas Raiders.

BY THE NUMBERS

18.9 Over the last two seasons under Head Coach Jim Harbaugh, the Los Angeles defense has been among the NFL’s most dominant, allowing an average of 18.9 points per game over that span, ranked No. 3 in the league.

5 Last season, the Chargers went 5-0 in prime-time games en route to an 11-6 record. The five victories in primetime were the most in a single season in franchise history.

93.5 Pro Bowl K Cameron Dicker continued to be among the NFL’s best in 2025, ending the year as the NFL’s most accurate kicker in history among qualified kickers with a 93.5 career field goal percentage (129-of-138).

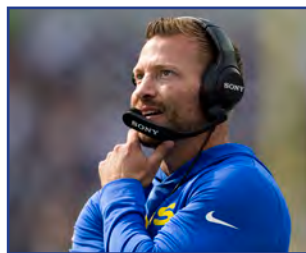

The Los Angeles Chargers hired Jim Harbaugh as the 19th head coach in franchise history, returning the former Bolts quarterback from the 1999 and 2000 seasons to Southern California. Harbaugh posted a 144-52 record as a collegiate head coach and has a 71-36-1 record as an NFL head coach. As head coach, Harbaugh led the Michigan Wolverines to a National Championship, while previously coaching the San Francisco 49ers to three-straight NFC Championship Games, including an appearance in Super Bowl XLVII.

In six seasons as an NFL head coach, Harbaugh has coached 25 players to a combined 39 Pro Bowl appearances. Among coaches with at least 60 games coached, his .679 winning percentage in the regular season (66-31-1 record) is the ninth-best in NFL history. Harbaugh's teams have allowed just 17.9 points per game in those six seasons, the eighth-best mark for any NFL head coach with at least 80 games coached since the 1970 NFL-AFL Merger.

Harbaugh began his tenure as the Bolts' head coach with back-to-back 11-win seasons and a pair of playoff appearances, continuing his renowned reputation as a winner. Over his two years at the helm, Harbaugh coached eight different Chargers to a combined nine Pro Bowl selections. In that span, the Bolts have had the NFL's fourth-ranked defense (304.8 total net yards allowed per game) the No. 3 scoring defense (18.9 points allowed per game) and the fifth-best passing defense (193.4 net passing yards allowed per game).

A native of Toledo, Ohio, Harbaugh and his wife, Sarah, have two daughters — Addison and Katherine — and two sons — Jack and John. He also has three adult children — Jay, James Jr., and Grace. Harbaugh's son, Jay, is the special teams coordinator for the Seattle Seahawks. He is also the younger brother of New York Giants Head Coach John Harbaugh, and the two are sons of Jack and Jackie Harbaugh.

On January 12, 2017, Los Angeles Rams Owner/Chairman E. Stanley Kroenke named Sean McVay the 23rd full-time head coach in franchise history. McVay became the youngest coach in modern NFL history at 30 years old.

He has led the Rams to seven playoff berths and two Super Bowl appearances in his first nine seasons, winning Super Bowl LVI at SoFi Stadium. McVay, who turned 39 in January, has a 92-57 regular season record and is 10-5 in the playoffs. This past season, McVay joined Hall of Famers Curly Lambeau and George Halas as the only head coaches in NFL history with 100 combined wins prior to turning 40. He also became the winningest head coach in franchise history, passing John Robinson during the 2025 season.

McVay has led the Rams to eight winning seasons with four NFC West titles. He is currently the fifth-youngest head coach in the NFL despite entering his tenth season at the helm, making him the second-longest tenured coach in the NFL behind Andy Reid.

McVay graduated from Miami University (Ohio) where he played wide receiver from 2004-07, earning Miami's Scholar-Athlete Award in 2007. McVay's statue was unveiled in the university's "Cradle of Coaches". His grandfather, John, served in various roles — including vice president/director of football operations from 1983-94 — for the San Francisco 49ers from 1979-95, overseeing five Super Bowl championship squads and earning induction into the 49ers Hall of Fame in 2013.

WITHIN STRIKING DISTANCE

K Cameron Dicker

- Needs 137 points scored to be one of just five kickers since the 1970 NFL-AFL Merger to reach 650 points through the first five seasons of a career.
- Needs 21 made field goals to be the second kicker since the 1970 NFL-AFL Merger to make at least 150 field goal attempts through the first five seasons of a career.
- Needs 25 made field goals to set the NFL record for most made field goals by a player before turning 27-years old (Justin Tucker; 153).
- Needs 30 made field goals to be the third player in NFL history with at least 30 made field goals in four consecutive seasons.

LB Daiyan Henley

- Needs at least 100 tackles to be the first Charger with three 100-tackle campaigns within the first four seasons of a career since tackles began being tracked in 2000.

QB Justin Herbert

- Needs 224 pass completions to set the NFL record for most pass completions in a quarterback's first seven seasons in NFL history (Matt Ryan; 2,508).
- Needs 350 pass completions to set the NFL record for the most completions by a player before turning 29-years old (Matthew Stafford; 2,634).
- Needs 4,623 passing yards to set the NFL record for most passing yards in a quarterback's first seven seasons in NFL history (Hall of Famer Peyton Manning; 29,442).
- Needs 5,180 passing yards to reach 30,000 career passing yards. If reached before Dec. 30, he would become the youngest player in NFL history to reach 30,000 career passing yards (Matthew Stafford; 28 years, 324 days).
- Needs nine 300-yard passing performances to be the second player in NFL history with at least 40 games with 300-plus yards passing in a quarterback's first seven seasons, joining Patrick Mahomes (45).
- Needs 3,000-plus passing yards to become the sixth quarterback in history to begin their career with seven-straight seasons with at least 3,000 passing yards.
- Needs 20 passing touchdowns to be the fourth player in NFL history with 20-plus touchdown passes in each of the first seven seasons of a career, joining Hall of Famer Dan Marino, Hall of Famer Peyton Manning and Russell Wilson.
- Needs 37 passing touchdowns to be the fourth player in NFL history with 200 within the first seven seasons of a career, joining Hall of Famer Dan Marino (220), Patrick Mahomes (219) and Hall of Famer Peyton Manning (216).
- Needs eight games with multiple touchdown passes to be the sixth player in NFL history to have 60 multi-touchdown games within the first seven seasons of a career, joining Patrick Mahomes (67), Hall of Famer Dan Marino (65), Josh Allen (64), Hall of Famer Peyton Manning (64) and Russell Wilson (62).

S Derwin James Jr.

- Needs 16 tackles to reach 700 for his career.
- Needs 16 tackles, a sack and three interceptions to be the second NFL player and first defensive back since at least 2000 to have 700 tackles, 20.0 sacks and 15 interceptions within their first nine pro seasons (Hall of Famer Brian Urlacher).

WR Quentin Johnston

- Needs eight touchdown catches to be the first Charger with eight-plus receiving scores in three consecutive seasons since Hall of Famer Antonio Gates' seven-straight seasons (2004-10).
- Needs eight touchdown catches to be one of three players to have an active streak of at least three consecutive seasons with eight-plus receiving scores.

OLB Khalil Mack

- Needs 2.0 sacks to reach 115.0 for his career and become the third player to do so since he entered the NFL in 2014.
- Needs 7.0 sacks to reach 120.0 for his career and become the 25th player since sacks became an official statistic in 1982 and just the second active player to hit that mark.
- Needs 15.0 sacks to be the 10th player since sacks became an official statistic in 1982 to have three seasons of at least 15.0 sacks.

WR Ladd McConkey

- Needs 91 receptions to reach 239 for his career, the most ever by a Charger through the first three seasons of a career.
- Needs 1,062 receiving yards to be the second Charger ever to have 3,000 receiving yards through the first three seasons of a career.
- Needs 1,494 receiving yards to reach 3,432 for his career, the most ever by a Charger through the first three seasons of a career.

NOTEWORTHY BONDS

Chargers Head Coach **Jim Harbaugh** crossed paths with Rams Special Teams Coordinator **Bubba Ventrone** in San Francisco in 2013-14, when Ventrone played safety for the 49ers.

Chargers Offensive Coordinator **Mike McDaniel** (2011-13) and Quarterback Coach **Shane Day** (2014-15) overlapped with Rams Head Coach **Sean McVay** (2010-16) in Washington. McVay served as the Redskins' tight ends coach from 2011-13, while McDaniel manned the wide receivers (2013) after being an offensive assistant from 2011-12.

Rams Run Game Coordinator/Defensive Line Coach **Giff Smith** was a member of the Chargers coaching staff from 2016-23. He spent time leading the defensive line and outside linebackers before serving as the Bolts' interim head coach for the final three games of the 2023 season. Additionally, Rams Defensive Coordinator **Chris Shula**'s first NFL job was as the Chargers' defensive quality control coach from 2015-16.

The only player on the Rams roster to represent the Chargers is **NT Poona Ford**, who started all 17 games for the Bolts in 2024, finishing with 24 total tackles, three sacks and one interception. Conversely, Chargers Wide Receivers Coach **Sanjay Lal** was a free agent signing of the Rams during his playing days ahead of the 1998 season.

Chargers Head Coach **Jim Harbaugh**, Defensive Backs Coach **Steve Clinkscale**, Defensive Line Coach **Mike Elston**, Executive Director of Player Performance **Ben Herbert**, Offensive Assistant **Kirk Campbell**, Director of Performance Analytics **Ben Rabe**, Outside Linebackers Coach **Dylan Roney**, Head Strength and Conditioning Coach **Devin Woodhouse**, LB **Junior Colson**, spent time with Rams RB **Blake Corum**, OLB **Josiah Stewart**, ILB **Nikhai Hill-Green**, TE **Dan Villari** and CB **Josh Wallace** at Michigan to put together three straight College Football Playoff Appearances (2021-23). Clinkscale worked with Wallace as Michigan's Defensive Backs Coach during the 2023 season.

The Bolts WR **Ladd McConkey**, and Rams QB **Stetson Bennett IV**, ILB **Monty Rice**, DL **Bill Norton**, OL **Austin Blaske** and OL **Warren McClendon Jr.** were teammates at Georgia. McConkey, Bennett, Norton, Blaske and McClendon were on both National Championship seasons in 2021 and 2022.

Chargers Outside Linebackers Coach **Dylan Roney** and Rams LS **Joe Cardona** were teammates on the 2014 Navy football team.

PLAYER OF THE WEEK HONORS

One of the NFL's top talent evaluators for the last quarter century, **Joe Hortiz** brought his shrewd eye for talent and roster construction to the Chargers in his first season as General Manager — as the Bolts featured a pair of players acquired or extended by Hortiz that earned AFC Player of the Week recognition.

In his first draft as GM, Hortiz selected **CB Tarheeb Still** in the fifth round. The Maryland product turned in a breakout performance in Los Angeles' Week 13 victory over Atlanta, becoming the first Chargers rookie to win AFC Defensive Player of the Week since 2007. He led all NFL players in Week 13 with two interceptions, including one that he returned 61 yards for a touchdown that proved to be the winning score.

Hortiz extended **K Cameron Dicker** right before the 2024 season, locking in the most accurate kicker in NFL history for the Bolts for the foreseeable future. Dicker capped his 2024 campaign with back-to-back AFC Special Teams Player of the Week awards in Weeks 17 and 18. He was the only player in 2024 to win any Player of the Week honor in back-to-back weeks. Over those two games, Dicker led all NFL players with 30 points scored and eight field goals made.

In 2025, Dicker continued his excellence by making each of his first 15 field goals and all 14 extra point attempts. He was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week after a Week 6 victory in Miami that saw him nail all five field goals, including a 33-yard game-winner in the game's waning seconds. Dicker earned a second Player of the Week honor for his Week 15 performance that saw him total 10 of the team's 16 points in the victory against Kansas City, making all three field goals and an extra point.

A PROVEN WINNER

Fresh off coaching his alma mater, the University of Michigan, to a 15-0 season and CFP National Championship in 2023, **Jim Harbaugh** continued his culture of winning with the Bolts, leading the Chargers to an 11-6 record in each of his first two seasons as head coach of the Bolts. Harbaugh now has six consecutive victories on Kickoff Weekend, the longest winning streak on Kickoff Weekend among active NFL head coaches.

He has a 66-31-1 record (.679 pct.) as an NFL head coach, the ninth-best winning percentage in history among NFL head coaches with at least 60 games coached.

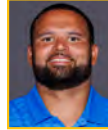

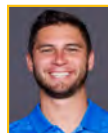

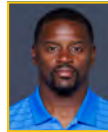

THREADING THE NEEDLE ON THIRD DOWN

In his 95 career starts, **Justin Herbert** has been the one of the best passers in the NFL at moving the chains on third down. He has completed 544 passes on 896 attempts (60.7 pct.) for 6,532 yards and 58 touchdowns with 26 interceptions (92.5 passer rating). Herbert's 544 completions lead the NFL, while his 6,532 passing yards rank second on third down since 2020.

Herbert tied for the league lead with 14 touchdown passes on third down in 2020, good for the most by a rookie in the last 40 seasons. He has added 44 since then, giving him 58 third-down passing scores since entering the professional ranks, which is good for No. 2 over that span.

Herbert's 92.5 passer rating on third down ranks eighth in the NFL over the last six years among players with at least 500 passing attempts on third down.

Herbert recorded his first career comeback win in the fourth quarter or overtime as a rookie in 2020 in Week 15 at Las Vegas, leading the Bolts to a 30-27 overtime victory. He finished the game with 314 passing yards and two touchdowns on 22-of-32 passing (68.8 pct.) for a 121.1 passer rating. Herbert added a rushing touchdown in overtime to secure the victory.

MACK DROPS SIX SACKS IN VICTORY



Khalil Mack had a historic performance in the team's 2023 Week 4 win over the Raiders. He set a single-game team record and career high with six sacks, including a pair of strip-sacks. It was the first six-sack performance by any NFL player since 2017 and just the sixth since the stat began being tracked in 1982.

Mack added 10 tackles (eight solo), five tackles for loss, four quarterback hits and a pass defended. He was the only player since at least 2000 to have six sacks and at least 10 tackles in a single game. He was recognized as AFC Defensive Player of the Week for his performance, the fourth weekly award of his career.

Along with his five-sack performance in 2015, Mack joined Hall of Fame LB Derrick Thomas as the only players with multiple games of five or more sacks since the stat started being tracked in 1982.

DICKER MAKES HISTORY

One season after making NFL history, **Cameron Dicker** tied his career long and franchise record with a 59-yard field goal in the Week 10 win over Pittsburgh on *Sunday Night Football*. He made a 56-yader in Week 13 and now has seven made field goals of 55-plus yards, accounting for seven of the 10 longest made field goals in franchise history.

Dicker's 2024 season saw him make history in the Week 16 home victory over Denver on *Thursday Night Football*. At the end of the first half, Dicker attempted a fair catch free kick field goal after a fair catch on the previous play and drilled the 57-yard attempt.

The kick is believed to be the longest fair catch free kick field goal in NFL history and first make since K Ray Wersching, who made a 45-yard attempt for the Bolts in 1976. The last confirmed fair catch free kick field goal attempt was in 2019.

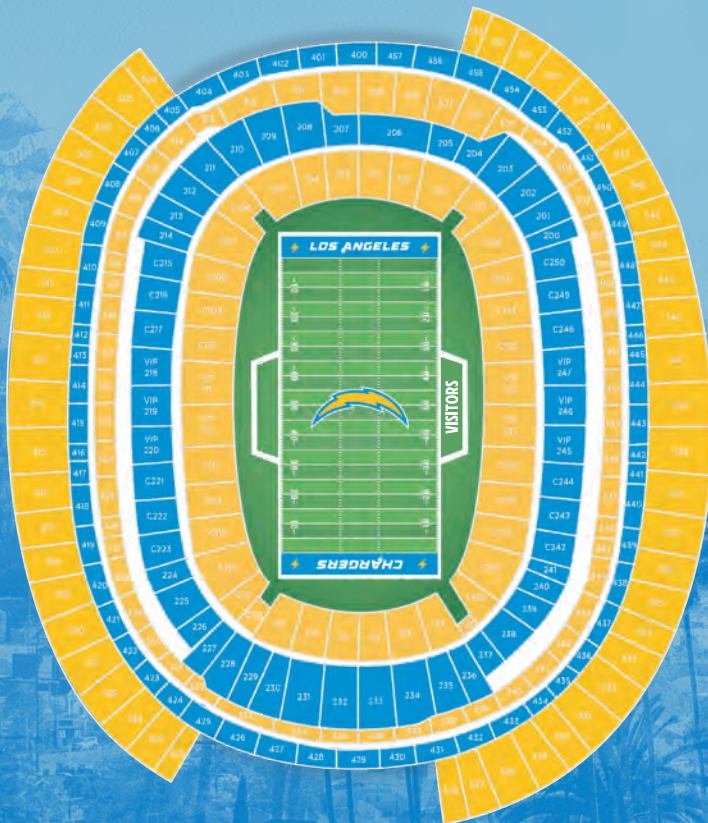

Lulu's Place, a 34-acre academic and athletic campus funded entirely through private donations, is slated to open in May of 2027 in Westchester near LAX.

The transformational project features a partnership with the Chargers and the TGR Foundation that will impact youth in multiple avenues, including in the classroom with comprehensive science, technology, engineering, arts, and math (STEAM) educational programming.

Lulu's Place will also unveil a new sports-themed career readiness curriculum, exposing students to diverse career pathways within the sports industry.

"This partnership shows what's possible when you combine the power of education and sports. When kids are exposed to careers aligned with their passions they are inspired to dream big. Then providing opportunities to learn alongside leaders in their community empowers them to reach those dreams. What we're creating with the Chargers and our partners at Lulu's Place will be truly special for young people across LA and beyond," said Tiger Woods, founder of TGR Foundation.

The Impact Fund's multi-million dollar gift will also lead to the creation of the Alex and Faye Spanos Legacy Field, which will support Chargers youth football initiatives — including the Snoop & Housh Flag Football League, Snoop Youth Football League and Girls Flag Football.

Adriana Cox, the Special Advisor for the Chargers Impact Fund, said she is filled with immense pride at her grandparents' lasting impact.

"The vision for the Alex and Faye Legacy Field is really about community," Cox said. "It's an opportunity for families and youth to come together and it's a place that hopefully fills them with joy, kindness and a sense of belonging."

Heather Birdsall, the Chargers Vice President of Community Relations, added: "Youth sports is the cornerstone of how we give back in the community. It's incredibly important for us to be a part of this. We see it all the time on Sundays, but this is a chance to have something in the community that's going to bring neighbors together."

The historic collaboration was unveiled Wednesday at a special Careers in Sports Media event for local youth during The Genesis Invitational, hosted by TGR Foundation at Riviera Country Club in Pacific Palisades.

Lulu's Place is rooted in the passion and generosity of Carol "Lulu" Kimmelman, a Southern California native, former public elementary school teacher and lifelong tennis player who passed away in 2017 after a courageous battle with ovarian cancer.

"We are deeply grateful for the Chargers Impact Fund's transformative investment in Lulu's Place, our partnership with TGR Foundation, and their shared commitment to changing lives through athletics and education," said Doug Kimmelman, Carol's husband and the founder of Lulu's Place. "The Alex & Faye Spanos Legacy Field will become a beacon of opportunity for young people in our underserved communities.

"This project was created in memory of my late wife, Carol, a proud LAUSD educator and lifelong tennis player, who dreamed of creating a place where youth could develop not just as athletes, but as students, leaders, and engaged citizens. This partnership brings us closer to realizing that vision every single day," Kimmelman added.

Carol Kimmelman was an accomplished tennis player and won the 1983 NCAA women's team title with USC. She later became a schoolteacher at Raymond Avenue Elementary School in South Central Los Angeles.

Carol Kimmelman passed away in January 2017 after a courageous battle with ovarian cancer at the age of 53.

Her family decided to spearhead the Lulu's Place project soon after her passing.

"She was such a strong woman, a strong personality, such a force of good with everyone around her that it was important to us to honor that legacy and to hit on the things that were important to her in her life," Doug Kimmelman said.

He later added: "It had to be LA. She's from here, loved everything about LA, loved the kids of LA."

In just over 12 months, Lulu's Place will begin to impact thousands of kids each year.

Just as Alex and Faye Spanos envisioned.

"I call it the gold standard — the Spanos family — their values so aligned with our values of what they are trying to like impact youth and so it was a perfect alignment," Doug Kimmelman said.

"To take a large chunk of our campus and have flag football and have the Chargers associated with it and get kids active and healthy and moving and giving back, we just clicked almost immediately," Kimmelman added.

Cox added: "We couldn't be prouder and we're so happy to be able to show up for our community in kind of a symbolic way with this field."

Jim Harbaugh

The many quirks of Jim Harbaugh: From saving a life to saving his pants

Jim Harbaugh's life plan has always been pretty simple.

He detailed it succinctly in February 2024 while standing on a theater stage inside SoFi Stadium. That day, Harbaugh was introduced as head coach of the Los Angeles Chargers, a team he had quarterbacked in the twilight seasons of his 14-year NFL playing career. Harbaugh was reminiscing about his playing days in San Diego, and he provided a window into his mentality.

"I'm going to play as long as I can," Harbaugh remembers thinking, "then coach, then die."

Harbaugh played until he was 38 years old, from Palo Alto High School to the University of Michigan to the Chicago Bears, Indianapolis Colts, Baltimore Ravens, Chargers and, in 2001, the Carolina Panthers. He transitioned into Phase 2 right away. In 2002, he joined the Oakland Raiders staff as Al Davis' quarterbacks coach. It was Harbaugh's first coaching job. He made \$50,000 a year. Harbaugh spent two years with the Raiders, whom the Chargers face in Las Vegas on Monday night. He compared his Raiders years to "working on a master's degree or a PhD" in football.

Harbaugh's coaching career is now in its 24th season. As he always hoped, his life has been devoted to football. The plan is simple to speak. The process of living out that plan has been anything but.

That is because Harbaugh is one of one, a unique and authentic character who has left a mountain of unique and authentic stories in his wake.

Here are some of those stories.

'I was wetting my pants ... Jim was just laughing at them'

If the whole football thing hadn't worked out, Harbaugh would have fit well with the rugged NBA of the 1990s. He averaged about 20 points and 10 rebounds and flashed his "Bad Boy" potential as a high school hoopster willing to fight an entire opposing crowd.

Consider the melee at a road game in 1982, when tensions ran high from the moment Palo Alto High arrived. A menacing throng at Santa Clara High gave Harbaugh and company a hostile welcome as players stepped out of the team bus.

David Feldman, a prep teammate of Harbaugh's who grew up to become an ESPN broadcaster, remembers the reception well.

"I was wetting my pants," he said, "and Jim was just laughing at them."

Soon after tipoff, there were so many cheap shots and hard fouls that Jack Harbaugh — Jim's father and Stanford's defensive coordinator at the time — approached the opposing coach with a warning: Get this under control or you're going to have a problem.

But things continued to unravel. And when a blindside elbow knocked a Palo Alto player to the hardwood, the player sprang up ready to throw haymakers. From there, it was on. Fans ran down from the stands eager to join the saloon-style brawl, including a quartet of angry strangers making a beeline for Jim Harbaugh.

"Just mayhem," Harbaugh told me in 2012. "I remember being backed into the wall on the baseline. There were four people there — not players, but people who had come out of the stands. They were all coming at me (with raised fists). And I'm squared up getting ready to defend myself and throw."

But Jack Harbaugh, as promised, was at the ready.

"My dad comes in — whoosh! — just like that and cleared everybody out like a wrecking ball," Jim said. "It was like a superhero moment. Jack Harbaugh, legendary status." — Daniel Brown, staff writer / editor

'Mike Tyson came roaring out'

A few hours remained before the ball would drop at Times Square, but across the country, as 1995's last gasp played out in a since-demolished stadium, Jim Harbaugh was getting a jump start on the happiest new year of them all.

Harbaugh, at 32, had found new life with the Indianapolis Colts after some tumultuous years with the Chicago Bears and was in the process of reinventing himself as "Captain Comeback." Having just quarterbacked the underdog Colts to a first-round playoff upset of the San Diego Chargers, Harbaugh couldn't stop smiling when I saw him after the game in the visitors' locker room at Qualcomm Stadium.

"I've never had so much fun," Harbaugh said. "Good stuff like this never happens to me. I'm just so lucky to be able to play football, and I'm enjoying every moment."

Two weeks later, after another shocking road playoff upset (over the Kansas City Chiefs), I traveled to Pittsburgh for Sports Illustrated and saw Captain Comeback add to his legend. Trailing the favored Steelers by four points in the final minutes of the AFC Championship Game, Harbaugh habitually bought time by scrambling away from defenders, fired a clutch fourth-down completion, dislocated the index finger on his throwing hand, popped it back into place between plays and reached the Pittsburgh 29-yard-line with six seconds to go. He then unleashed a glorious Hail Mary that hung between three Steelers defenders — and came within inches of ending up in the hands of Colts receiver Aaron Bailey.

The storybook ending didn't quite happen, but Harbaugh's defiant grin remained. Afterward, citing a recent heavyweight title matchup between an indomitable champion and an overmatched opponent, Harbaugh lauded the way his teammates had silenced their skeptics by taking the fight to the home team: "A lot of people expected Peter McNeeley," he said

proudly. "But Mike Tyson came roaring out of the locker room." — Michael Silver, NFL senior writer

'We got laaaaaahts of peanut butter'

My first real interaction with Jim Harbaugh came during his first year coaching at Stanford. His brother-in-law, Tom Crean, had become a huge advocate for my recruiting book, "Meat Market," that had just been published. Crean was the basketball coach at Marquette at the time and reached out to me through a colleague of mine at ESPN, Pat Forde. Crean ended up helping me promote the book even more than the publisher did.

At one point, he suggested I go up to Stanford and spend some time with Jim and his staff. I set it up with someone I think Tom connected me to at Stanford.

I got up there for spring ball. When I walked into the staff room, Jim didn't seem to recall that I was coming. Or know who I was. After a few minutes of me explaining my visit, Harbaugh had this look on his face. It's that same expression that some of his co-workers later told me they've referred to as the "Shark" — this kind of blank stare with his mouth slightly agape.

I suspect because he heard that Tom had told me to come, Jim tried to be hospitable. He walked me over to their kitchenette area and asked if I like peanut butter. (I do.)

"We got laaaaaahts of peanut butter," he said, opening up a cabinet where they had some Costco-sized vats of it. He motioned over to a few loaves of white bread.

"Make as much as you like."

'He just saved my life'

Some vintage Harbaugh moments came at the Holiday Inn in Boardman, Ohio, in 2011, Harbaugh's first year with the San Francisco 49ers. The 49ers were staying there — it's right outside the team owners' hometown of Youngstown — between games in Cincinnati and Philadelphia.

The area wasn't exactly replete with resources. Harbaugh even held a walk-through practice in the hotel's parking lot, making sure to have the team buses help form a barrier between the team and any nosy citizens. Harbaugh, always, is in constant fear of enemy spies learning his plays and plans.

It was decidedly un-fancy and Harbaugh loved it.

"That big slab of cement even had lines and tall trees around it," he gushed at the time. "That was one of the finer walk-through spots I've been associated with."

The real action came during a team meal held in one of the hotel's crowded conference rooms. Steak was on the menu and guard Adam Snyder started choking on a piece.

"It's happened before where it just goes down the wrong pipe," Snyder recalled years later. "And panic sets in real quick. And when you're panicking, you're not breathing. There was something lodged in my throat. I couldn't even drink water."

Harbaugh was seated and in mid-conversation on the other side of the conference room.

He saw the commotion and immediately popped up and began making his way to his choking guard, pushing through groups of people and knocking aside tables like a Secret Service agent rushing to aid the president.

The other offensive linemen had risen to try to help Snyder, but Harbaugh pushed through them, too. Then he began beating on the 300-pound lineman's back.

"And it's like — boom! — he punches him in the back so hard you could hear it," tackle Joe Staley said.

Said Snyder: "He was just smacking the heck out of me, just smashing my back. At one point, he picked me up and it was like — blewp! — it went down (my throat). And it was, 'Oh my God! He just saved my life!'"

And as soon as the event was over? Harbaugh calmly walked back to where he was sitting and finished his meal, like it was something that happened every day.

"He pushed through guys to get to Adam and then he literally saved his life," center Daniel Kilgore said. "And then he just went back to his conversation." — Matt Barrows, 49ers beat writer

'Is Jim Kelly in town?'

Harbaugh once spoke to the San Jose State football team, which practices a few miles from the 49ers' facility. The college stadium is near my home, so I rushed over to get some offseason quotes. When I got there, I saw Harbaugh had a massive gash across his forehead.

I couldn't resist.

"Is Jim Kelly in town?" I asked, a reference to the former Buffalo Bills quarterback whom Harbaugh once punched — breaking his hand in the process — during a pregame production meeting after Kelly, then in broadcasting, had questioned his toughness on a pregame show.

"You're not the first person to say that this morning," Harbaugh replied. — Barrows

No sleep needed in Rome

I was actually on Harbaugh's flight to Italy when he took Michigan to Rome in 2017.

Michigan flew commercial and most of the team was on the one direct flight from Detroit, which got to Rome at around 8 a.m. local time. If Harbaugh wasn't the last person to board, he was in the final five. I walked off the 10-hour flight, six hours into a new time zone, barely able to stand. I don't know if Harbaugh slept more than a few minutes. Though when I saw him in the customs line, he looked exactly the same as he always does. His cap was straight, his shirt was tucked, his lip was packed and he was somehow effortlessly hauling the luggage of his entire family as if the previous 10 hours hadn't happened.

The players were exhausted. Harbaugh was invigorated. When he saw me, he didn't really say hello as much as he immediately went into a comment about something random I'd said on the radio he agreed with several weeks prior. Then, almost without blinking, he rounded up his family (toddler-heavy back then) and pulled up

one of those side ropes toward the outside of the customs line. He told the whole crew to follow him and wandered off in search those lines that let people with kids through first. If that didn't exist, he'd make his own.

Waiting isn't his thing.

Nobody from the team went to a hotel after we landed. Harbaugh, his coaches and players immediately got on shuttles and drove to Villa Borghese — almost the direct middle of Rome — to eat in the park before spending the entire rest of that day walking the streets of the city. Still on zero sleep. He never slowed down. The players did! I did! He did not. Not even after tipping a street musician on a park bridge who had absolutely no idea who he was.

Apart from getting to sit near the pope, Harbaugh's celebrity was irrelevant in Italy. Most of the randoms we met on the street thought Michigan was some sort of gigantic high school soccer team. Harbaugh loved it. I've never seen a person gain more energy from those in his orbit the way he does. He played paintball with the team over there — at nearly 55 years old — for probably four hours. If he limped the rest of the week, it was in private. I don't know if he slept that entire trip. Not sure he needed it.

People think he's a gimmick. He's not. He's easily one of the most authentic (for good and bad) people I've ever met. — Nick Baumgardner, NFL Draft analyst

'Those are pretty expensive pants'

In 2021, Michigan was playing at Penn State on a cold, windy November day. An important detail is that, by that time, Harbaugh had stopped wearing Walmart khakis and switched to blue athleisure pants from Lululemon, which are significantly nicer and more expensive but apparently not flame-resistant. The gist of the story is that Harbaugh was so engrossed in the game that he stood too close to a space heater and caught his pants on fire. Daylen Baldwin, one of Michigan's wide receivers, was the first person to notice. Harbaugh was able to extinguish the flames, but not before they burned through the outer layer of his pants.

When he recounted the incident to a local TV station, Harbaugh said Baldwin was so nonchalant about the flaming pants that it took him a moment to realize what was happening.

"Maybe a little coaching point to Daylen Baldwin: If somebody's on fire, man, (be) like, 'Hey, Coach!'" Harbaugh said. "Maybe just grab me, get me out of the way or something. Be a little more emphatic about the fact that somebody's on fire."

Harbaugh said he planned to keep the pants, cut off the legs and convert them into shorts.

"Those are pretty expensive pants, those Lululemons," he said. — Austin Meek, Michigan beat writer

'Alas, I did not go to law school'

It's impossible to talk about Harbaugh's final season at Michigan without mentioning his battles with the NCAA and the Big Ten. Michigan was being investigated for hosting recruits on campus during the COVID-19 dead period and the school imposed a three-game suspension on Harbaugh to open the season. The suspension turned into a weekly game of "Where's Jim

Harbaugh now?" He mowed his lawn, went to McDonald's, worked the chains for his son's youth football team and attended a funeral for one of his former players at Stanford.

There was no levity to the second suspension, handed down by the Big Ten in response to the Connor Stallions sign-stealing investigation, which eventually led to a 10-year show-cause penalty for Harbaugh on top of an earlier four-year show-cause penalty. Michigan went to court seeking a temporary restraining order that would have allowed Harbaugh to coach while the school challenged the suspension. Right up to kickoff of Michigan's next game against Penn State, the school was hoping a judge would intervene on Harbaugh's behalf. Instead, the judge scheduled a hearing for the following week. For a moment, it appeared that Harbaugh might end up on the witness stand in a Washtenaw County courtroom, testifying about why the Big Ten's suspension was misguided.

"I'm not an attorney, but I always wanted to be," Harbaugh said. "I watched a lot of shows, watched 'Judge Judy.' I always felt like it would be cool to get up there and thunder away at a jury like Tom Cruise in 'A Few Good Men' or be a judge like Judge Judy. Alas, I did not go to law school."

Harbaugh's moment in court never happened. Michigan dropped its legal challenge, and Harbaugh missed the final three regular-season games before returning for Michigan's postseason run. — Meek

'Multiple championships'

Covering Jim Harbaugh is a fascinating experience. Every day presents an opportunity to observe or uncover something as outrageous as it is meaningful.

And that is an important point to remember with Harbaugh: No matter how silly it may seem in the moment, every action and every word has a purpose.

"Multiple championships," Harbaugh said at his introductory news conference last year. "We're going to be humble and hungry, but that's our goal."

When he first moved back to Southern California in the early months of 2024, Harbaugh lived in an RV alongside offensive coordinator Greg Roman at the Waterfront RV Park in Huntington Beach. He was channeling Jim Rockford, one of his favorite television characters from the 1970s show "The Rockford Files." Harbaugh is an avid consumer of TV and movies. During his playing days, he guest-starred on the sitcom "Saved By The Bell" as Screech's cousin.

On the day before he was introduced as Chargers head coach, Harbaugh drove to Home Depot with Ben Herbert, the team's executive director of player performance, and bought a Shop-Vac. Harbaugh and Herbert used that Shop-Vac to vacuum out the weight room at the Chargers' former facility in Costa Mesa.

When the Chargers got on the practice field in spring of 2024, players were shocked to see Harbaugh, wearing black Jordan cleats, participating in strength and conditioning drills. "You got to be on your stuff because coach is doing it right there with you," safety Alohi Gilman told me last season.

Harbaugh continued this through training camp, when the strength and conditioning drills were held at the end of the practice. Harbaugh calls these "fourth-quarter finishers."

One day last year, Harbaugh had a media engagement right after a training camp practice, so he could not participate with the players. After the media appearance, Harbaugh walked back onto the empty field and, by himself, flipped a weighted sled back and forth for several minutes. A young Chargers fan was standing in a tent on the sideline yelling to Harbaugh. "Coach! Coach! Can you sign an autograph?" Harbaugh paid him no mind until he was done with his sets. It might seem comical or even performative, but players notice the commitment.

Harbaugh's meetings are now the stuff of legend in the Chargers' locker room. On the night before a Week 10 win over the Tennessee Titans last season, Harbaugh read the lyrics to the 1976 song "The Wreck of the Edmund Fitzgerald" by Gordon Lightfoot. The song tells the story of a shipwreck in Lake Superior, and the Sunday the Chargers played the Titans was the 49th anniversary of the disaster. In another meeting last season, Harbaugh read the lyrics to the 2009 hit "I Gotta Feeling" by the Black Eyed Peas. Before the season finale against the Raiders last year, Harbaugh reached into his pants during a team meeting and pulled out a back-scratcher.

"You need to have your own back sometimes," Harbaugh said to the players. "There's not always going to be somebody there to scratch your back for you, so you do it yourself."

He then gifted a personalized back-scratcher to each player emblazoned with their name and number.

Harbaugh often talks about waking up in the early-morning hours thinking about the team, the team, the team. He targets his idiosyncrasies toward the ultimate goal in his life right now. "The Lombardi Trophy, that's my mission," Harbaugh said.

He had a chance in the 2012 season when his San Francisco 49ers lost to the Baltimore Ravens in the Super Bowl. Harbaugh faced his brother John in that game. Last season, the Chargers played the Ravens on "Monday Night Football." In the lead-up to another brotherly rematch, Harbaugh recalled what he was thinking after that Super Bowl loss.

"Walking off the field at that Super Bowl, it was like, there will be another day," Harbaugh said. "And then there wasn't for many years, and it looked like I wouldn't have a chance for another day. But by the grace of God ... we're back in it and back on a team that has a chance to do that."

It is perhaps the only accomplishment still missing from what has been a monumental football life.

"We're going for the Super Bowl," Harbaugh said. "That's our goal, and we're gonna do it or die trying." — Daniel Popper, Chargers beat writer

Jim Harbaugh's coaching evolution, from NCAA to the NFL

Former San Francisco 49ers tight end Delanie Walker remembers a 2012 training camp practice beginning as practice always had -- until coach Jim Harbaugh called the team to midfield.

"We thinking, 'Oh yeah, he's about to cancel practice,'" Walker said. "'We going to go to a water park or something.'"

Harbaugh began speaking to the team about its NFC West rivals. The Seattle Seahawks were at an amusement park, Harbaugh told the team. The St. Louis Rams and Arizona Cardinals were also enjoying a day off, he said. "Guess what the 49ers are going to do today?" Harbaugh asked.

They would practice -- intensely. At least a hundred plays: "Everybody else takes breaks, the 49ers don't," Harbaugh said.

"Everybody was kind of pissed that day," Walker said while laughing.

This was the Jim Harbaugh way: working his players to the brink of exhaustion and then some. The method was effective -- until it infuriated everyone. But Harbaugh ushered in a period of renaissance for the 49ers; that season, San Francisco reached Super Bowl XLVII.

"There won't be any magic formulas," Harbaugh promised Los Angeles Chargers fans at his introductory news conference in 2024. "The only ones that I know are just good, old-fashioned hard work."

While Harbaugh largely operates in the same fashion, the Chargers' version of the coach has evolved. He's traded in the khakis for gray trousers. His training camp practices have gone from the intensity of a game day to what his former players see as nearing a version of flag football that prioritizes keeping the team healthy.

"That's where he's different. Now it's like, 'Yeah, let's take that break.' It's like, damn, 'Who is this dude?'" said Walker, who was a volunteer coach with the Chargers during last year's training camp. "This Jim Harbaugh, he got nicer for sure. So when people say he changed, I would say he changed for the better of the game."

The old Harbaugh upset some players, coaches and execs. This Harbaugh, now 61 years old, hardened by the failures and lessons of his first NFL stint and early struggles in the college ranks, is approaching the job differently. It could be the difference in whether Harbaugh reaches the goal of winning a Super Bowl -- and how long the Chargers can tolerate him. The second year of Harbaugh in Los Angeles begins Friday, when the Chargers face the Kansas City Chiefs in São Paulo (8 p.m. ET, YouTube).

"You don't want things to get stale," Harbaugh said. "That's like overripe fruit, stale bread, burnt meat, you got to change things up."

OVER HIS TWO decades of coaching, there are two factions of Harbaugh's former players and coaches: those who despise him -- often publicly -- and those who are staunch supporters. The

words "insane" or "crazy" to describe Harbaugh are commonplace among both groups, but the meaning depends on who is talking.

Look no further than San Francisco. Despite three straight NFC Championship Games and a Super Bowl appearance, Harbaugh's approach incensed the front office. And players were tired of Harbaugh, too.

"He just pushed guys too far," former 49ers offensive lineman Alex Boone said on HBO's "Real Sports with Bryant Gumbel" in April. "He wanted too much, demanded too much, expected too much. ... And you'd be like, 'This guy might be clinically insane. He's crazy.'"

The amount Harbaugh asks from his players now is his most significant shift. That's been clear with the Chargers' practices. This season, the NFL selected the Chargers for the Hall of Fame Game, giving them an additional preseason matchup and added practice time. Because of that, Harbaugh reduced the required time at the facility to avoid fatigue.

Harbaugh communicates strict tempos to players ahead of each practice. It's commonplace to see defensive backs raising both hands instead of trying to deflect a pass or linemen stopping in the middle of a pass rush, obeying Harbaugh's rules. There are loud yells and reprimands from coaches and players alike when players stray from the tempo.

Veterans, who have played elsewhere, routinely praise Harbaugh for his current approach to practice: "It's not super common around the league, it's different, I like it," cornerback Donte Jackson said.

But that doesn't mean Harbaugh's practices are easy.

"Six days a week and every day's just intense," safety Elijah Molden said.

J.T. Rogan, who worked for Harbaugh as director of communications/operations for two years at Michigan, has perhaps the best vantage point for Harbaugh's evolution. Rogan was an All-American running back for Harbaugh at the University of San Diego, worked for him at Stanford and tried out for him as a player in San Francisco.

Rogan said Harbaugh's time at Michigan was transformative, pointing to Harbaugh's struggles to beat rival Ohio State and his use of analytics, which altered his coaching style and helped Michigan win the 2023 national championship in Harbaugh's final season.

The legitimacy of that championship, however, will forever be roiled in controversy after various NCAA sanctions were levied against Harbaugh for breaking rules.

"He's taken that feedback, and he's got really high emotional intelligence, even though you might not call him emotional," Rogan said.

He continued: "For people who are like, 'Who wears the same clothes every day all the time?' Or 'Who wears cleats on the airplane?' As if that would cheapen his intellect and his ability to take feedback and then evolve, but he has."

HARBAUGH'S FIRST YEAR in Los Angeles was about changing the culture of a franchise synonymous with disappointment. The

Chargers' Week 11 matchup with the Cincinnati Bengals seemed to be a turning point.

L.A. had built a 27-6 lead over the Bengals early in the third quarter, then the game began to unravel in a way Chargers fans are accustomed to. (The fan base has an adverb for this recurring dread called "Charger-ing"). The Bengals scored 21 unanswered points, as quarterback Joe Burrow found wide receiver Ja'Marr Chase for a touchdown to tie the score at 27 with 12:12 left.

But the Chargers won the game, thanks to two 27-yard-plus catches from wide receiver Ladd McConkey and a touchdown by running back J.K. Dobbins on the final drive. The victory appeared to be a watershed moment for the franchise, and the first clear stamp of Harbaugh's impact in L.A.

"There's been a lot of games through the years where we've been put in that position and came up short," said former Chargers edge rusher Joey Bosa, who developed into a star as the No. 3 pick in 2016 but was released after a disappointing 2024 season and is now with the Buffalo Bills. "There was kind of a lack of belief in being able to pull off in situations before."

But there were the Chargers eight weeks later against the Houston Texans -- in their first playoff appearance since one of the most embarrassing playoff losses in team history in 2023 -- looking like the Chargers of old.

Star quarterback Justin Herbert, who threw a league-low three interceptions during the regular season, tossed four that day. He became the first NFL player to throw more picks in a playoff game than in the regular season. The Texans pressured Herbert on 50% of his dropbacks, and the Chargers suffered a 32-12 beatdown -- another playoff embarrassment.

Los Angeles is hopeful, however, that Houston was an anomaly and Cincinnati was the standard.

"We didn't achieve the ultimate success that's reserved for the world champion," Harbaugh said earlier this offseason. "But [there's] so much good to build on, that creates a lot of excitement for me and [general manager] Joe [Hortiz] as we build version 2.0."

Increased win totals and postseason success have historically defined second years under Harbaugh-led teams. He went from 7-4 in his first season at the University of San Diego to 11-1 the following year, winning the Pioneer Football League. After taking over a 1-11 Stanford team in 2007, the Cardinal were 5-7 in his second season, narrowly missing out on a bowl game. Harbaugh's 49ers went to the Super Bowl in his second season. (In his first two seasons at Michigan, Harbaugh led the Wolverines to back-to-back 10-3 seasons.)

But Harbaugh already has an uphill battle to replicate that second-year jump in L.A. Pro Bowl left tackle Rashawn Slater suffered a season-ending patellar tendon tear. Running back Najee Harris missed all of training camp after a July 4th fireworks mishap damaged his eye. L.A. travels the most miles in the NFL this season, beginning with the Chiefs in Brazil, followed by two divisional matchups against the Raiders and Broncos.

Regardless of how difficult the outlook seems for this season, the Chargers appear confident, believing in Harbaugh's process.

But that's how it always begins for Harbaugh's teams, before tension, frustration, and at Michigan, sanctions happen. The Chargers hope this version of Harbaugh keeps them in the honeymoon phase long term.

"We're going for the Super Bowl," Harbaugh said. "That's our goal. We're going to do it or die trying."

Mike McDaniel

Mike McDaniel wants to help Justin Herbert to reach his full potential in his Chargers offense

EL SEGUNDO, Calif. (AP) — Just like his famously inventive offenses, Mike McDaniel had many options.

He interviewed for several head coaching jobs after his four-year tenure in charge of the Miami Dolphins ended this month, and he could have been an offensive coordinator pretty much anywhere he pleased.

McDaniel still wants to be a head coach again someday, but he chose to join the Los Angeles Chargers alongside Jim Harbaugh and Justin Herbert because the combination of time, place and personnel seemed perfect for this idiosyncratic coach who also happens to be one of the top offensive minds in football.

"It didn't take long for me to feel this is what I was looking for," the Bolts' new offensive coordinator said Tuesday. "You just want to be a part of a hungry organization with like-minded football people that are doing anything and everything to win. And for me, the opportunity to work with Coach Harbaugh was too good to pass up. It felt like I was extremely fortunate to be afforded this opportunity."

Harbaugh and the Chargers seem equally fortunate to land McDaniel, an ideal candidate for the crucial job of directing Herbert's career into something worthy of his prodigious talent.

In his introductory news conference, McDaniel immediately went into great detail about what he wants to do for Herbert, who has thrown for 24,820 yards and 163 touchdowns while emerging as one of the NFL's top passers in his six seasons with the Chargers.

"You have a competitive player that each and every year is trying to get better at his craft, (but) I think he hasn't neared the ceiling to what he's capable of," McDaniel said.

Herbert has consistently shined despite playing with three permanent head coaches, four offensive coordinators and a changing collection of playmakers and linemen around him.

Despite playing in some offensive schemes perceived to be relatively primitive by modern NFL standards, particularly in the past two years under Harbaugh and fired coordinator Greg Roman, Herbert has frequently carried the Chargers through his improvisation, arm strength and sheer competitive will.

Essentially, McDaniel doesn't want Herbert to have to work so hard.

"There's a lot of incredible plays Justin has made," McDaniel said. "He's firmly capable, and sometimes as a coach you can rely upon that a little too much. ... It can be taxing over time for a player to necessitate an incredible play too

often, so you try to take it off of him by creating some low-cost, high-reward offense that he's firmly capable of doing, but maybe a player of lesser talent would be capable of doing as well."

McDaniel said the Dolphins' struggles when Tua Tagovailoa was out with injuries reinforced his determination to keep Herbert safer. The Chargers quarterback took 96 sacks in the past two seasons.

"He has an incredible ability to do off-schedule (throws)," McDaniel said. "I think I'll be firmly coaching away from the off-schedule stuff at the front end, because he can always go back to that comfort zone as you work out other things. I think a primary focus on how to have offense without putting him in a vulnerable position will be a starting point, and we'll extrapolate from there."

McDaniel and Herbert spoke last week, and the quarterback is ready to work.

"He was in high spirits and just excited about attacking something," McDaniel said. "You lose in the playoffs in the first round, it's a lot of work that you feel kind of like (left you with) an empty stomach. So that hunger, I could hear in his voice."

McDaniel is joining a good team that needed a spark after consecutive 11-6 seasons followed by two playoff losses under Harbaugh. The Chargers have needed that spark to join the NFL's upper echelon ever since they moved north from San Diego, posting six winning records over nine years with just one postseason victory.

McDaniel could be the ingredient to put the Bolts into championship contention if this partnership with Harbaugh flourishes. The 42-year-old coordinator hit it off immediately with his famously square-looking new boss.

"I feel like we're the same guy," McDaniel said while Harbaugh laughed at the back of the room. "He's just taller. No, I think one thing we share is that Jim has never patterned himself after somebody. He's his own person, and I would say that hopefully I would be described in a similar fashion. Who knows? I might be a 100% Dockers coach now."

The fashion-forward McDaniel's line was even funnier because he delivered it while wearing what appeared to be a \$12,000 Bottega Veneta woven leather jacket.

The chance to learn from Harbaugh was important in his decision, but McDaniel also paid his respect to past Chargers coaches Sid Gillman and Don Coryell, two offensive innovators who changed football forever.

"There was a lot that I found very attractive," McDaniel said. "I was fortunate to have some opportunities, but it started with Coach Harbaugh. To be a part of an organization that has the legacy of Sid and Air Coryell, I was super attracted to. Got a quarterback who I've always admired, and just a lot of young players. A great situation for my family and me to go to the next chapter."

Chargers' Mike McDaniel lays out vision for Justin Herbert: 'Be elite at everything'

EL SEGUNDO, Calif. — The Los Angeles Chargers opened rookie minicamp Friday at The Bolt, the team's facility. It was an eventful day both on the field and at the lectern.

All eight of the Chargers' 2026 draft picks participated in their first NFL practice, including edge rusher Akheem Mesidor and offensive lineman Jake Slaughter. The offense wore white jerseys. The defense wore blue jerseys. The Chargers spent most of the practice on positional work.

In total, 47 players participated in Friday's minicamp practice — eight draft picks, 17 undrafted free agent signings, 20 tryout players and two under-contract veterans. Quarterback DJ Uiagalelei, who spent last season on the Chargers' practice squad, participated. So did long snapper Peter Bowden, who signed a futures contract in January. Undrafted free agent tackle Isaiah World, who had ACL surgery in February, was not on the field.

At the lectern, all three Chargers coordinators answered questions — special teams coordinator Ryan Ficken, offensive coordinator Mike McDaniel and defensive coordinator Chris O'Leary.

For McDaniel, it was his first time speaking with local media since his introductory news conference in January. There was a lot of cover.

Let's dive into what McDaniel said and what it means for the 2026 season.

The 'vision' for Herbert

As McDaniel himself said Friday, "It's been a long time since I last stood at this podium." More than three months, to be a little more specific. And in that span, he has been working with coach Jim Harbaugh and general manager Joe Hortiz to construct a new Chargers offense, both in terms of scheme and personnel.

Chargers players returned to the facility in April for Phase 1, a two-week period during which on-field activities are pretty limited. For instance, only strength and conditioning coaches are allowed on the field with players during Phase 1. All coaches are allowed on the field for Phase 2, which began for the Chargers on Monday.

"As it stands, I think the players have digested the core pocket of the playbook and how it needs to look," McDaniel said. "We do have a Chargers offense that's unique and only Chargers, and I'm pretty excited about it. It's been some of the most fun months of my career in that process, and I think the players are gravitating to it."

Of course, that group of players includes quarterback Justin Herbert. McDaniel said he and Herbert have been meeting for about three weeks since the start of Phase 1. This week, they got on the field together, and McDaniel

said he has been very impressed with how fast Herbert has learned new coaching points.

McDaniel said there were certain elements he thought would take three to four weeks, or even all spring, for Herbert to master. Herbert, according to McDaniel, has mastered those elements “in the span of three days to four days.”

McDaniel said he has been particularly intrigued by how bold Herbert can be when trying new things. McDaniel acknowledged that “elite performers” are sometimes averse to change. He said he has not experienced that mentality with Herbert.

“He’s dropped the burden of any sort of something that could hold him back,” McDaniel said. “He’s really let go, been all in, tried new things. From a performer such as himself, it’s been very impressive that he’s worked through it and been able to find the beginning level of something that he can master very, very fast.”

When asked for an example of a new thing he has asked of Herbert, McDaniel referenced footwork on short-area throws. This was one of the more interesting segments of the news conference.

McDaniel said the first task he performed as Chargers offensive coordinator was watching “every pass play that (Herbert’s) ever had in the National Football League.” Studying Herbert’s play eventually led McDaniel to a statistical finding based on time to throw, or the amount of time between when the ball is snapped and when a quarterback releases a pass or gets sacked.

McDaniel said Herbert has enjoyed “a ton of success” on both outer bounds of the time-to-throw spectrum. Herbert is very accurate when he releases the ball in less than 2.4 seconds. He is very explosive when his time to throw is extra long. Those are the plays in which Herbert is extending and creating off-script.

The numbers substantiate McDaniel’s claims. When Herbert had a time to throw under 2.4 seconds in 2025, he completed 77.4 percent of his passes, according to TruMedia. That was the seventh-highest completion percentage among 33 qualified quarterbacks on such throws. When Herbert had a time to throw of 3.5 seconds or more, he threw nine touchdowns. That led the league. He also completed 22 passes of more than 15 yards, tied for the fourth-most among qualified quarterbacks on such throws.

McDaniel believes there is untapped potential on Herbert’s quick-game throws. The numbers back this up, too. Despite his high completion percentage, Herbert only averaged 6.4 yards per attempt when his time to throw was under 2.4 seconds, according to TruMedia. That ranked 22nd among qualified quarterbacks on such throws. So seventh in completion percentage, and 22nd in yards per attempt. The potential exists in that discrepancy.

In theory, the scheme should make those two rates more equitable. In four years playing for McDaniel from 2022 to ’25, Tua Tagovailoa averaged 7.8 yards per attempt when his time to throw was under 2.4 seconds, according to TruMedia. That ranked second among qualified QBs on such throws. We are talking about an increase of 1.4 yards per attempt.

In order to get there, Herbert must take on some of these new coaching points. Just a few that McDaniel mentioned: throwing with a quicker rhythm, adjusting his eyes, trusting his feet to lead him through the progression, and dropping back more quickly to allow access to two routes at the same time.

“All those nuanced things through our pass game is what we’re diving into as we speak,” McDaniel said.

And according to McDaniel, the early returns have been outstanding.

“We’re looking to master and be elite at everything that we do, and being able to own the position in a new way,” McDaniel said. “For him to own the position in a way he never has and ultimately for it to be obvious to everyone around he’s playing the best football of his career, and that’s kind of how we’ve approached it. That’s been our vision and expectations.”

High expectations for WR room

Within the passing offense, the Chargers are also expecting significant development from their receivers. Ladd McConkey, Tre’ Harris, KeAndre Lambert-Smith and Derius Davis all return. The Chargers added fourth-round pick Brenen Thompson, whose speed was on display while running routes during Friday’s practice.

McDaniel is setting the bar high for this group.

“It’s a reasonable expectation to exceed whatever their career highs are across the board in that room,” McDaniel said. “I think there’s a lot of untapped potential just in a lot of their skill sets across the board.”

McConkey set his career highs — 1,149 receiving yards and seven touchdowns — in his rookie season in 2024. McDaniel said he thought McConkey was a “perfect fit” in the scheme when the receiver was coming out of Georgia in the 2024 draft.

“The multitude of ways you can get him the ball and how he takes low-risk throws and completions and turns them into long gains and his ability to separate versus man coverage, all that,” McDaniel said.

Quentin Johnston set his career high in receiving last year with 753 yards. He caught eight touchdowns, his career high in a season, in 2024 and 2025.

“He’s a guy that has some traits in his game that are similar to some very powerful, explosive, productive receivers that I’ve had in the past,” McDaniel said of Johnston. “Namely, like Julio and Andre.”

That would be Hall of Famer Andre Johnson, whom McDaniel coached in Houston. And that would be future Hall of Famer Julio Jones, whom McDaniel coached in Atlanta.

“It’s easy for me to challenge them,” McDaniel said, “and they’ve risen to the challenge of having the expectation that the Chargers receiving corps and that room is thought of differently in a year than it is this year.”

Insight on OL turnover

The Chargers have 16 offensive linemen on their roster. Rather remarkably, nine of those players were not on the roster in 2025, including three free-agent signings and four draft picks. The turnover in this group is evidence of the Chargers’ shift from a gap scheme under Greg Roman to a zone scheme under McDaniel.

We’ve discussed this shift quite a bit through free agency and the draft — specifically, the different body types the Chargers were seeking and will be seeking at guard. They signed Cole Strange in free agency to play right guard. Left guard will be a competition, but if all goes according to plan, Slaughter will be starting there.

McDaniel was asked to explain what skill set he wants in his guards.

“We want to play a certain style of ball that is convicted, that dictates the terms, so there is a level of quickness,” he said. “We’re looking for guys that can block people in space, where a lot of the big plays and the things that change games and scoring opportunities, where those occur.”

Interestingly, McDaniel acknowledged offenses have an “inherent disadvantage in all known-pass situations.” In other words, downs and distances in which the defense knows the offense must pass. So third-and-long, fourth-and-long, etc.

The follow-up: How does he balance the need for quickness with the need for solid protection in known-passing situations?

“What we’ve found is that there’s a bucket of good enough that you can mold into high standards, and then there’s a line, a threshold, where regardless of what they do in the run game, it’s not going to matter because we’d have to sub them out in known-passing situations,” McDaniel said.

It is a fascinating give and take. What is clear is that McDaniel has a defined vision of what that threshold is and how to make it functional within his scheme.

New Chargers DC Chris O'Leary is the first branch of Jesse Minter's coaching tree

EL SEGUNDO, Calif. — The Los Angeles Chargers introduced Chris O'Leary as their defensive coordinator Tuesday, and with that, they unveiled the first NFL play-calling branch of the Jesse Minter coaching tree.

Minter, who spent the past two seasons as the Chargers' defensive coordinator, took the Baltimore Ravens' head-coaching job last month. As the Chargers embarked on their D-coordinator search, they clearly were interested in scheme continuity.

The Chargers announced eight interviews, including O'Leary. Three of those were with internal candidates: secondary coach Steve Clinkscale, safeties coach Adam Fuller and edge rushers coach Dylan Roney. They interviewed Zach Orr, who coached with Minter in Baltimore from 2017 to 2020. They interviewed Dennard Wilson, who coached under Mike Macdonald in Baltimore in 2023. Macdonald and Minter coached together for four seasons in Baltimore. The Chargers interviewed only two candidates without apparent ties to Minter: Jim Leonhard and Aubrey Pleasant.

In the end, they hired O'Leary. He is a true Minter disciple. When Minter was hired as Chargers defensive coordinator in 2024, he brought O'Leary on staff as safeties coach. That was just the latest chapter in a longstanding relationship. O'Leary and Minter met in 2010 when O'Leary was a redshirt freshman player at Indiana State and Minter was the secondary coach there. Minter gave O'Leary his first coaching job at Georgia State as a graduate assistant.

"I've seen him as a mentor of mine for my entire coaching career," O'Leary said Tuesday of Minter.

At the end of 2024, after a successful season coaching the safeties with the Chargers, O'Leary left the NFL to take a play-calling defensive coordinator job at Western Michigan. O'Leary said there were "a lot of factors at play" in the decision. The first reason he listed was "family." According to O'Leary, he leaned on Minter for advice in this process.

"There was just a set of things that happened," O'Leary said, "and that's where it took me."

At Western Michigan, O'Leary reunited with head coach Lance Taylor. O'Leary and Taylor had coached together for three seasons at Notre Dame. In his one season at Western Michigan, O'Leary built a top-10 scoring defense. More importantly, he showed who he wanted to be defensively, and it was the spitting image of Minter's Chargers scheme, from pre-snap structure to post-snap rotations.

"There was a lot of crossover," O'Leary said. "From leaving L.A., stepping foot in Kalamazoo,

we implemented a defense that was very similar."

O'Leary said he would send "novels" to Minter each week breaking down what happened in that week's Western Michigan game. On Wednesdays, O'Leary said, he would watch the Chargers game from the previous week.

"I would tag plays, and then we'd show our guys Thursday, Friday," O'Leary said. "Hey, this is what we're doing, watch the guys at the highest level do it."

O'Leary sprinkled in some of the elements he learned in six seasons at Notre Dame while coaching under defensive minds such as Marcus Freeman and Clark Lea.

"But the core philosophy and the fundamentals," O'Leary said, "are what I picked up here in L.A."

That included one of the hallmarks of Minter's culture, what he calls "separators."

Minter established five separators when he arrived with the Chargers in 2024: ball disruption, tackling, effort and angles, communication and block destruction. Minter views these as the five non-negotiable fundamental components to any good defense. With the Chargers, he assigned one separator to each position coach. And each week, that position coach would present to the entire defense on his separator. In 2024, for instance, O'Leary presented weekly on ball disruption.

The separators gave agency to the position coaches. They established lines of communication from position coaches to players outside of their position groups. They reinforced how the defensive players needed to play — which, to Minter, was just as important as what the Chargers played schematically.

O'Leary brought the separators to Western Michigan, and he said he maintained the same structure as far as position coaches presenting to the defense.

"We tailored some things so it became a little bit more concise," O'Leary said. "But 100 percent, it's fundamental defensive football. Wherever you go, that's Step 1 of creating an elite defense."

Western Michigan allowed 17.4 points per game in 2025, and O'Leary experienced how to build and call a defense for the first time.

"The experience to call plays was incredible because what you learn is there's a flow state to calling plays," O'Leary said. "You have to have a plan for field zone, situations, the style of play from the offense, how the (opposing offensive) coordinator likes to call the game. And so just being able to do that, it's almost like you're in a lab as you're going through that."

O'Leary gained a defined understanding of how an emphasis on fundamentals impacts game-day performance.

"The standards that you demand, that separators that we apply, all of those things show up in the game, and you can't get it back," O'Leary said. "You can't just all of a sudden flip a switch and say, 'Hey, we want to be violent and fast, and we want to play square, and we want to get off blocks,' because you have to have built that in through the week of prep and

through fall camp and all those things. So that was a big learning point for me, and that constant demand that we applied as coaches to the players."

Here is how Minter described the impetus for the separators when he spoke with The Athletic over the summer: "Just being demanding of how we wanted to play."

O'Leary was initially recruited to Indiana State as a quarterback. During a redshirt year in 2010, O'Leary was the scout team quarterback. Minter was coaching the defensive backs. His father, Rick, was the defensive play caller.

"They knew I was going to be a coach when I would talk back to them in scout team when I would throw a couple touchdowns," O'Leary said. "I would be talking trash to Rick and Jesse, and so that's kind of where they saw the competitive fire."

Minter was promoted to defensive coordinator in 2011, a position he held for two seasons. In 2013, Minter left to be defensive coordinator at Georgia State. O'Leary graduated in 2014. In 2015, Minter hired him as a defensive line graduate assistant at Georgia State. In 2016, O'Leary moved to defensive backs GA. That year, Rick Minter reunited with his son and O'Leary, coaching Georgia State's defensive line.

"Fell in love with defense there," O'Leary said.

The staff got fired after the 2016 season. Minter went to the Ravens as a defensive assistant. Rick took the D-coordinator job at Florida Tech, and O'Leary got his first non-GA job as Rick's safeties coach. O'Leary then joined Notre Dame in 2018.

"I knew they were great defensive coaches," O'Leary said of the Minters. "I knew they had the competitive insanity that I have."

O'Leary now returns to the Chargers, and he has been identified as the best coach to continue what Jesse Minter started in Los Angeles.

O'Leary was paramount in building Derwin James Jr.'s role in 2024. That year, James played more nickel, and he returned to All-Pro form. O'Leary said the role was rooted in "clarity equals velocity."

"So if we give him more clarity, he's going to play faster," O'Leary said.

This is evidence of O'Leary's vision, relationship-building and interpersonal skills. James took a step back under the previous regime because there was too much on his plate. Minter and O'Leary changed the trajectory of James' career by tailoring a role to his strengths.

Hiring a coordinator with O'Leary's minimal experience is a gamble. But it is a logical gamble.

The Chargers lost Jesse Minter. To replace him, they went to Jesse Minter's tree.

"I have the confidence in myself that the foundation of this defense, what makes this defense special and different, I own those areas," O'Leary said. "I feel I have a mastery of those areas, just through my relationship with

Coach Minter, through being in this building, through working with Derwin. The things that separate us, I feel really strongly about those and what it takes to evolve those and really elevate those."

Max McCaffery

Chargers assistant coach Max McCaffrey is making a name for himself

SAN DIEGO — High on the to-do list for the Chargers offense is juicing up the ground game, a pressing priority for a franchise whose last 1,000-yard rusher was Melvin Gordon in 2017.

Max McCaffrey is the team's new running backs coach, and his last name should be familiar. His younger brother is Christian McCaffrey, All-Pro running back for the San Francisco 49ers and reigning comeback player of the year. Their father is longtime NFL receiver Ed McCaffrey, a favorite target of John Elway in Denver.

So Max knows his stuff about building a running attack, even though he was a receiver at Duke and had only fleeting stints with five NFL franchises, more often on the practice squads than the active rosters.

Chargers offensive coordinator Mike McDaniels noted with a half-smile that because Max is "definitely not the most athletic in his family," his work ethic is "astronomically higher" than most.

Max, 32, chuckled Wednesday when informed of that wisecrack, conceding that he's got some pretty stiff competition in his family. His dad has three Super Bowl rings — one with San Francisco, two with Denver — and mom, Lisa, was a standout soccer player at Stanford. In addition to Christian, 30, Max has brothers Dylan, 27, a former quarterback at Michigan and Northern Colorado; and Luke, a receiver and return specialist for the Washington Commanders.

They might not be quite as prominent as the Mannings or Kelces, but when it comes to football's royal families, the McCaffreys are in the conversation.

"I love my brothers," Max said. "I'll do anything for them, and I just want to see them succeed and chase what they're passionate about."

That certainly doesn't quell his competitive nature, however, and he'll have more than one chance in his current role to see brother Christian up close. The Chargers and 49ers will hold a joint practice at the Bolt on Aug. 18, and the teams will meet again in a Thursday night game on Dec. 17 at SoFi Stadium.

"My brother's been my best friend and one of my biggest mentors my entire life," Christian told The Times Wednesday. "We're always bouncing ideas off each other. Obviously, he played receiver, but he has such a massive knowledge for football in general. He's been a coordinator. He's coached different position groups. Now that he's got the running back job, it's so fun just bouncing ideas off of each other."

"I never think I have it all figured out, so getting tips from him feels very familiar."

Likewise, Max said that while Christian doesn't share trade secrets with him, he does tap into

the running back know-how of his younger brother, collecting tidbits on how best to train and prepare players for the rigorous job.

The eldest McCaffrey son called the 49ers star "the most intentional person I know."

"He wakes up with a purpose," Max said. "His day is planned from the second he wakes up to the minute he goes to sleep."

That's the kind of laser focus that can help a young running back such as Omarion Hampton, selected 22nd overall by the Chargers in the 2025 draft.

Ed McCaffrey was head coach at Northern Colorado from 2020-22 and had Max on his staff all three seasons, first as receivers coach, then as offensive coordinator for the final two seasons.

"I think it's tremendous," Ed said of his son's play-calling experience. "It's tremendous for the whole process because it allows you to set your vision as to how much you need to own at the NFL level running an offense."

"He got to really invest into the details across all positions, getting a firm, tangible example of what he needs from position coaches. So to be prepared to be a position coach, I think it directly helped him in that process."

When McDaniels was head coach of the Miami Dolphins, he brought on Max as an offensive assistant from 2023-25. When McDaniels got the Chargers job, he brought Max with him, giving him a key position to oversee.

Joked McDaniels: "For fantasy owners out there, if you're not liking your output, you have Max to blame."

Max got his name from a since-closed restaurant at the Stanford mall called Max's Opera Cafe, where Ed and Lisa had their first date.

Since, he has worked hard to make a name for himself, and the spotlight is only growing.

Noah Avinger

Noah Avinger tackles his Why Moment

EL SEGUNDO—It's another hot day at the Bolt, the Chargers home training facility and it is also another day of Noah Avinger living out his dream as a member of the Los Angeles Chargers.

Avinger recalls the watershed moment when it all happened.

"I was in Buena Park at my parents' house. We were watching the (NFL) draft, just looking at all of the picks go by and just kind of waiting for my family to see when my name was gonna get called or I was gonna get a call," Avinger told the South Bay Black Journal.

Avinger's family did not get to see his name scroll across the screen, but he did get a call.

After going undrafted Avinger got that call from the Chargers veteran Safety Coach Adam Fuller.

"I talked to coach Fuller and I ultimately decided to sign here, and it was an exciting moment. I am very blessed and thankful for the opportunity."

And it is a long-shot opportunity, one that comes with a NFL minimum contract of only \$8,000 guaranteed, but a million bucks annually if he sticks with the team as one of four to six at the position.

"I just put my best foot forward each day. Being a sponge, you know, learn a lot. We have a lot of great vets and great coaches around here to talk and learn from," he added.

This has been quite a journey for the 24-year old Anaheim Servite High School graduate who started his collegiate career at San Diego State, a stop at New Mexico before landing at Utah State where on Pro Day all of the work he put in training in Texas paid off.

Avinger ran a 4.62 40, performed a 42 inch vertical and board jumped 11 feet 4 inches. He also benched pressed 17 reps, drawing rave reviews from scouts throughout the league

Seven players from that Utah State Pro Day landed in NFL camps.

"That's how we were at Utah State. We brought out the best in each other and we ultimately performed that day and were able to put up numbers like that. So, it was exciting to see," he elaborated.

On this day, it was the first day of practice in shells and next is with the pads on, in of all places, San Diego, where it all began for Avinger.

"I'm exciting, you know. I love playing. That's real football. So, you know at the end of the day when you put the pads on that's where you can really show what you can do. I am ultimately excited, especially on this level, you know, you

dream of it as a kid, growing up to be actually playing at this level."

Avinger is playing behind a half dozen other guys, including superstar Derwin James at safety. It is a daunting task in front of him. He doesn't have the positional speed which is about 4.57 at the slowest, not to mentioned Ohio State's Lorenzo Styles lightening combine record 4.27 and he wasn't drafted until the 5th round.

The good news for Noah is the Chargers record in signing undrafted Free Agents. All time Charger great ,and NFL Hall of Fame Antonio Gates was not drafted.

"I am absolutely inspired by that. You know , it's a little harder, but at the end of the day you got to keep that chip on your shoulder. regardless of where you were picked or where you came from, got that chip on my shoulder, because ultimately it's football and you want to play at your best level."

For Noah Avinger, football may just be the easiest part of this chapter in his life.

In the spring he lost his most treasured supporter when his grandmother passed, something he has expressed the pain he endures, but relishes valuable lessons he learned from her.

"My Nana was like a second mother. We grew up together, all in the same household, so losing her was like extra fuel to my fire. Extra purpose. It was my Why moment. Like yeah at the end of the day you want to play this game for your why, and that just made my why a little bit bigger. I am just here. blessed and thankful for the opportunity because that's what she would want me to do, and have fun out here, and just be present in the moment because that's what My Nana always ways talk about with me. So it just fuels my fire even more."

Omarion Hampton

'Nobody wants to tackle that guy.' Chargers' Omarion Hampton is primed for a breakout

Chargers running back Omarion Hampton is a serious breakout candidate entering his second season in Los Angeles.

"I would say he has, from the first day that we've gotten on the field ... had as much, if not the most, growth as any player," offensive coordinator Mike McDaniel said earlier in training camp. "And that's because ... this guy's completely obsessed and focused. His tracks and the urgency in which we're trying to get him to start the play has been phenomenal.

"Nobody wants to tackle that guy. That is a massive human moving very fast. The less we can get him to stop his feet and do what we call 'slash' and pick edges of defenders and shoulder-punch them, the better. I'm very confident, and it's very exciting, what he's doing each and every day."

Hampton, the No. 22 overall pick in the 2025 draft, flashed his skills as a rookie. The 6-foot, 220-pound North Carolina product gained 737 yards from scrimmage and had five touchdowns in 156 touches — 124 rushes and 32 receptions.

Hampton would've done more if not for deflating injuries that limited him to 10 games. He fractured his left ankle in a Week 5 loss to the Washington Commanders and injured his other ankle in a Week 17 loss to the Houston Texans.

The past is the past, though.

"Looking forward to next season, putting everything I can into treatment, everything I can to get back to 110%," Hampton said of his offseason regimen. "I feel like I did that well. Couldn't be more excited for next season."

Entering the final week of preseason play, Hampton has looked better than ever.

His speed and agility remain electric despite the ankle injuries. The hands are still reliable. And, maybe most importantly, picking up the playbook hasn't been a problem.

"All the running backs, really, I feel like it's going to benefit us a lot," Hampton said of the offense. "We know [McDaniel] loves to run the ball, so we couldn't be more excited."

Added head coach Jim Harbaugh: "Man of few words. [Hampton's] got places to be and things to do. When I do have a conversation with him, I see a smile. And when I watch the tape, I smile. I think [McDaniel's offense] fits him great. ... Big year for Omarion."

Where Hampton has really stood out, though, is with his ability — in the words of the iconic Marshawn Lynch — to run through faces.

"[McDaniel's] just saying, if I run full speed, it's going to be hard for [defenders] to tackle me," Hampton said.

Although Hampton, a certified starter, only played in the Chargers' opening series in Thursday's preseason loss to San Francisco, he made waves in the two teams' joint practice on Tuesday by bulldozing several 49ers defenders.

Hampton arguably made the play of the day when putting 49ers safety Ji'Ayir Brown on his back during a big run.

"He's incredibly tough," Chargers quarterback Justin Herbert said of Hampton after that joint practice. "He leads by example. He doesn't say much, but what he does on the field is so loud, and guys respect him.

"It's so cool to hand him the ball and see what he's able to do because he's an incredible athlete and an incredible competitor. I'm glad he's on my side of the ball."

The Chargers' running back corps, led by Hampton, also features trustworthy options in veterans Keaton Mitchell and Kimani Vidal.

Although McDaniel's offenses usually feature eye-popping aerial attacks, he also loves to run the ball. The trio of running backs should see plenty of carries, particularly with opportunities for big-chunk gains.

"Top to bottom, guys are legit," Vidal said. "Everyone's here for a reason. ... Everyone knows about Omarion and Keaton. I think all guys can contribute at some point during the season."

McDaniel teased reporters when asked about Hampton's expected usage, apologizing to fantasy owners for his inability to declare the running back the bell cow because of their other options he has to work with.

Make no mistake, though, Hampton's the guy.

He'll be a critical part of the Chargers' offense and a major factor in determining whether the franchise can get over the playoff hump.

"There's a lot of small things that go into it," Hampton said. "But I feel like the more you do it, the more you get comfortable with it. I feel like now, I'm at a more comfortable place with it."

Alec Ingold

An NFL player thought he knew pressure. Then his mentor was diagnosed with cancer.

Alec Ingold is a fullback for the Los Angeles Chargers. He is in his eighth season in the NFL.

My offseason has been filled with change.

After being released by the Miami Dolphins and signing with the Los Angeles Chargers in March, my wife and I had to pack up our life, move across the country and walk into a completely new environment. It's pretty easy to let your entire identity become tied to production in the NFL when facing this type of change — your body fat percentage, your film grade, your yards per carry. If you don't perform, the machine moves on without you.

I thought I understood the limits of that pressure.

Then I hopped on a running series of morning phone calls with Tony Noel.

Tony was my first business manager, a veteran executive who spent more than three decades building teams, hitting metrics and navigating the hyper-competitive landscape of corporate America. I want to teach others the life lessons learned through sports, and Tony helped me. He was the guy who looked at the mindset framework I built for locker rooms — what I call in my book *The 7 Crucibles* — and told me I was thinking too small.

"Corporate America needs this more than the athletes do," he would tell me over the phone. "Executives don't know how to endure adversity; they only know how to manage stress."

We were actively working on a project to scale those athletic principles into the corporate world when Tony went to an emergency room for a routine scan. The diagnosis was swift, brutal and seemingly final: stage III, potentially inoperable liver cancer.

The initial prognosis gave him six months to two years to live.

Every morning on my commute to "The Bolt," the Chargers' training facility, Tony's voice filled my car speakers. On one end was an active athlete driving to practice; on the other was a veteran leader battling a terminal illness. Those introspective conversations — sometimes as short as 15 minutes, other times as long as 45 — reshaped my perspective.

These are the five lessons Tony and I figured out on those morning drives, and how a man looking death in the face ultimately rejuvenated my mindset and my purpose on the field.

1. The Marriott illusion

In the high-stakes world of elite performance, whether you are running routes or running a supply chain, there is a dangerous lie we all tell ourselves: Identity is tied to production.

Tony was a master of production. In our phone conversations detailing his three decades in business, he described a life built on relentless output. He accumulated over 500 nights in Marriott hotels, leaving his wife, Angie, to anchor the household as he chased performance plaques defining his identity as a corporate "star."

"I looked back at those plaques on my wall recently," Tony told me over the phone, his voice heavy but clear. "And I thought, 'This is bullshit.' You spend literally years of your life on the road to be looked at as a high performer, and you can never get that time back. The plaques don't sit with you in this room. What I did with my kids, the moments I missed — that's the stuff that actually matters."

When the diagnosis hit, the corporate machinery did exactly what it always does: It kept moving. Tony went on medical disability. The torrential downpour of daily corporate emails slowed to a drizzle, then stopped completely. The meetings he used to lead were scheduled without him.

This is the hidden crisis facing thousands of corporate executives and athletes alike. We build our entire psyche around being indispensable to an organization, but organizations are built to last. When injury or illness sidelines you, you are forced to confront a terrifying reality: Who am I when I am no longer on the team?

It's a terrifying question, yes — but it is also the only point in life where you are finally free to define yourself by who you are, rather than what you produce.

2. Trading the telescope for the microscope

When elite performers face a crisis, their default reflex is to outwork it. They extend their horizons. They look through a telescope, map out a five-year plan, and try to force the universe into compliance through sheer volume of effort. I'm guilty of putting together a vision board or two.

But when you are facing terminal liver cancer, you lose control of the telescope. You cannot control the long-term outcome. You cannot out-hustle cellular mutation.

Tony realized that to survive, he had to change his optical tool: He had to let go of his telescope and pick up a microscope.

"As a young professional, the goal is always to be unstoppable by keeping the end in mind," Tony told me. "But right now, I don't know what the end in mind is. The end is completely unknown. So the macro doesn't matter anymore. We have to take one single day at a time and simply control the inches in front of us. The magic happens entirely in the microscope."

Under the microscope, high performance looks completely different to Tony now. It isn't about quarterly revenue or winning a championship ring. It is the discipline required to drink 100 ounces of water a day when his body rejects it. It is the mental warfare of forcing himself to walk slowly, shaking as he walks laps around a fourth-floor hospital hallway in a gown while tethered to an IV pole. It is choosing to eat a clean piece of fish and fresh vegetables when chemotherapy has stripped away his appetite entirely.

Athletes call this the "grindset." It is the radical commitment to upholding a standard when there are no cameras, no fans clapping and your body is begging you to give up.

Tony didn't surrender to his prognosis; he chose to compete.

He treated his oncologists as offensive coordinators designing an attack plan. He treated chemotherapy as his defensive line. He took ownership of his data, conducting his own medical "film study" on every blood report and biopsy. More importantly, he found a victory that no championship ring could match: the quiet, steady peace of being fully present for the people who mattered most.

3. The reversal of support

Perhaps the hardest crucible for any high-achieving individual is not the output of energy, but the receiving of care. Leaders are hardwired to provide, to protect and to carry others. Asking for help feels like an admission of a cracked mask.

Tony's daughter, Josie, told me that her dad had always been "horrible" at asking for or receiving support. He was the anchor; anchors don't lean on the ship.

In fact, when the reality of the diagnosis settled, Tony did exactly what every elite manager does: He tried to organize his new game plan on a whiteboard. He sat down and mapped out a meticulous bucket list of 10 specific people he needed to help, protect or professionally stabilize before his time ran out.

"I wanted to check those boxes so I could look at the list and say, 'OK, I can die now,'" Tony told me.

The irony was staggering. Here was a man facing an existential storm, entirely focused on executing a strategy to carry everyone else, missing the truth that resilience requires the

vulnerability to let others support you when you need it.

The breakthrough didn't happen because Tony checked a box on his list; it happened when he was forced to sit still. During a grueling chemotherapy session, the door to his sterile treatment room creaked open. Standing in the doorway was his lifelong friend, Mike. Mike hadn't called ahead; he hadn't asked for permission to help. He had simply driven 40 minutes across state lines to surprise Tony and stand silently next to his chemo bag.

"I looked up and saw Mike standing there, and I just started bawling my eyes out," Tony whispered, the emotion in his voice raw.

For those few hours, the 10-person list evaporated. The strongest people aren't the ones who carry the world alone; they're the ones who realize their team is ready to help get the next first down.

4. The full growth spurt

As the days passed and our phone calls continued to dive deeper into Tony's story, I became fascinated with his new perspective on life.

While playing for the Dolphins, I'd heard the phrase "memento mori" in team meetings. It's a stoic philosophy calling us to maximize each and every day as we get one day closer to death. Now I was experiencing that with Tony in a profound way."

I spoke with Tony's mother, Lois. She described a kid who, at 16 years old, stood just 4 foot 8 and weighed barely 80 pounds because of a severe, unchecked battle with Crohn's disease. He was so small that he had to take his physical education classes at the very end of the day just to avoid being ridiculed by the bigger kids in the hallways.

Lois recalled driving Tony through the winding back roads of Harmony, Minn., on their way to the Mayo Clinic decades ago, begging doctors to find a way to help her son grow. A team of clinicians performed an aggressive bowel resection surgery, removing the diseased tissue and unlocking a massive, delayed growth spurt that eventually shot him up to a commanding 6-1.

Forty years later, Tony is walking through the exact same hallways of the Mayo Clinic, tracking cancer markers instead of growth plates.

The parallel is unmistakable.

So, for me, was the lesson: We're all better because of the adversity we endure, not in avoidance of it.

5. Turning off the scoreboard

We live in a culture obsessed with optimization, longevity and winning. We measure our lives by the numbers on our contract, the balance in our bank accounts or the speed of our ascent up the corporate ladder.

Tony's journey is a reminder that the scoreboard is an illusion.

"I no longer measure wealth in money, titles, or quotas," Tony told me on our most recent

phone call as I pulled into the Chargers' parking lot. "I measure it entirely in moments, in peace, and in the people I love.

"I don't know how much time I have left on this contract, but I know this: A meaningful life is never measured by how long you play the game. It's measured by how deeply you love, how hard you fight, and how willing you are to keep walking through the fire for the people next to you."

As I prepare for another NFL season, I carry Tony's microscope with me. The stadium lights will eventually fade, the playbook will change, and the machinery of sports will substitute my jersey number for someone else's. But the character forged in the invisible fights? That's the real victory.

The scoreboard might turn off, but the life you build and the people you impact begins to mean everything.

Derwin James Jr.

Chargers didn't just pay Derwin James the player — they rewarded the man

El SEGUNDO, Calif. -- Right before the first practice of OTAs, the Chargers decided to lock in their franchise safety, Derwin James, with a three-year contract extension.

It is rare for a player to become the highest-paid player at his position twice with the same team, especially when that player is not a quarterback. James accomplished exactly that with his new extension.

"It meant the world to me," James said. "Since Day 1, the organization believed in me, drafted me in 2018 and then making me the highest paid safety for the second time."

On Tuesday, James was doing recovery work at home in an Epsom salt bath when he received a call from his agent, David Mulugheta of Athletes First. For a second, James was puzzled about why his agent was calling.

Mulugheta informed James that the extension was finalized and that he would remain a Charger for years to come, news that made him extremely happy.

"I was very excited, so he surprised me yesterday," James said. "It was very exciting to hear the news. Shout out to him, man, he's best in the game, man. Nothing but respect for him."

Since being drafted by the Chargers, James has had two goals: winning a Super Bowl and spending his entire career with the organization.

On Wednesday afternoon, James reflected on growing up playing football for free in the backyard and said that same passion and intensity still fuels him every day.

"When I play football, when I wake up in the morning, that's all I think about," James said. "So yeah, man, it definitely feels different, man."

During the first day of OTA practice, there was no sign of James taking it easy after signing the extension. The secondary was running drills with defensive backs coach Steve Clinkscale, and James was first in line.

When it came time to hit the sled, James flew through the drill before quickly turning around to cheer on teammates or stop younger players to give advice on how to approach the drill differently.

The amount of "well deserved" and "no one better" comments from former teammates and current players under the Chargers' Instagram post announcing the extension was not surprising.

The respect for Derwin James the player is obviously through the roof, but the love for Derwin James the person is what made so many people around the building happy to see him receive the extension.

"It's a dope thing to see a guy like not just the football player, but just the man that he is off the field," Mack said. "One of the greatest teammates I've ever played with, just from a standpoint of the man."

Mack is a player who has flirted with retirement in the past, and James has consistently tried to convince him to keep playing. The two are entering their fifth season together, and for Mack to call James his "greatest teammate," it carries significant weight.

The veteran edge rusher is not known for casually throwing around praise. If he says something, he means it.

"You want to keep a guy like Derwin in any building," Mack said. "I'm sure any team around the NFL would want to keep him for a lifetime."

One player who instantly felt James' support after being drafted in the third round in 2023 was linebacker Daiyan Henley.

The two share Mulugheta as an agent, but they have also developed a clear big brother-little brother relationship. On Wednesday, Henley spoke from the heart about his teammate.

"I'm just proud of him, because I mean, ever since I've been in this building, he took me right in his wing and became my big bro," Henley said. "He's everything that I aspire to be as a player, and not only that, but like as a man amongst people. He treats everyone the same, and so just truly appreciate him."

Before his second season, Henley hosted a youth camp and said the first player he asked to attend was James. Numerous players have talked about how willing James is to offer advice or show up to support their events.

"I want to make sure that I have that same effort, that same mentality, and it can be seen, and someone else can talk about me in the same light one day," Henley said.

The veteran safety has spoken in the past about how short an NFL career can be and how important it is to make the most of every moment.

Now that the extension is complete, James has his sights set on playing at SoFi Stadium at least 13 times this season: twice in the preseason, eight regular-season home games, once as the away team against the Rams, and once in the Super Bowl.

"I want to win the Super Bowl so bad, man," James said.

That is the one major accomplishment still missing from his career.

The Chargers have been "close" in the past, but the closest James came to a Super Bowl appearance was during his rookie season in 2018, when the team was routed by the New England Patriots in what became Tom Brady's final Super Bowl run with New England.

Since then, it has been playoff disappointment after playoff disappointment, but this year feels different for the Chargers. The players appear tired of talking about potential and seem ready to prove it on the field.

The Chargers are entering Year 3 under Jim Harbaugh and Joe Hortiz, and the roster is

beginning to fully reflect their vision, with only 11 players remaining from the Tom Telesco era.

The defense has consistently been one of the team's strengths under Harbaugh, and the biggest missing piece has been the offense. The addition of offensive coordinator Mike McDaniel could make a major difference.

"Being the last team playing, especially in Sofi, bro, this year, so man, I definitely want to be through that," James said.

The contract extension was well deserved for James, who has been the heart and soul of the Chargers organization since Philip Rivers left in 2020.

"Best player meets combination of best human being," Harbaugh said. "You can't say that anybody more than Derwin fits that, and I've worked with a lot of people, just incredible."

James is the Chargers' go-to player for meet-and-greets, autograph signings, and community events. Rarely, if ever, does he say no because he understands the importance of every aspect of the game and the organization. He also hosts a Thanksgiving event where he hands out turkeys and provides meals for numerous families.

Derwin James the player deserved this extension, but more than anything, this moment was about Derwin James the person and everything he has meant to the Chargers organization since 2018.

"That's what you dream of," James said.

'Unc' Gets His Day: Chargers safety Tony Jefferson Honored by Chula Vista

SAN DIEGO, Calif. --Tony Jefferson stood at the 40-yard line of his alma mater, Eastlake High School, with his four children on one side and Chula Vista Mayor John McCann on the other.

McCann announced that June 13th would officially be known as "Tony Jefferson II Day" in the city of Chula Vista. After thanking the mayor, Jefferson hugged his children and then his parents.

"When you get recognition like that, you gotta uphold your name and who you are, your character," Jefferson said. "It's just another role I believe that I want to keep ascending on that day. I want to make sure that I'm doing something on that day that's still giving back."

It was moments before Jefferson began his annual football camp, which he started before the pandemic and has continued to grow each year. He said that even if the camp does not always fall on June 13, he plans to continue finding ways to give back to the community because it is now a day that carries special meaning for him.

When he announced this year's camp on Instagram on April 25, it sold out in less than 24 hours. More than 500 campers signed up, something that excited him.

"I see the same familiar faces every year," Jefferson said. "I see them growing as well, too. So it's kind of cool to see the growth of the kids, and them just being excited year after year, coming and doing this. It's all about the kids at the end of the day, and about the future, so you want to try and teach competition and competing with coming out and going against your peers, and this is just another opportunity."

June 13th was a perfect day for the Chargers safety for multiple reasons. Typically, his camp takes place after minicamp, when most of his teammates have already returned home.

This year was different because the NFL calendar was pushed back a week due to Super Bowl LXI being played on Feb. 14. The league is believed to be experimenting with the possibility of an 18-game season, which contributed to the schedule shift.

The Chargers begin minicamp on June 16, meaning Jefferson's teammates were still in town and able to attend the camp. Safeties Derwin James, RJ Mickens and Genesis Smith; cornerbacks Cam Hart, Tarheeb Still and Donte Jackson; linebacker Daiyan Henley; and tight end Oronde Gadsden were all on hand to help the campers learn.

"I am just really thankful they came," Jefferson said.

It was a hot afternoon, so coaches made sure the campers took multiple water breaks. During those breaks, however, they encouraged the kids to approach the NFL players, ask questions and seek advice. The goal was for the campers to absorb as much information as possible.

Each of Jefferson's teammates has a unique journey. James was projected as a top-five player in the 2018 NFL Draft before falling to No. 17 overall. Gadsden arrived at Syracuse as a wide receiver before converting to tight end. Jefferson himself starred at Oklahoma but went undrafted.

"My journey has been up and down and all over the place, so the more I could get in their ear and just share my experiences, that's happened, and the flows of how not everything's going to go your way, persevering through stuff," Jefferson explained. "I think it's a great message and story to be able to pass out to the younger generation."

One thing Jefferson noticed immediately while walking around the camp was how often he heard his nickname, "Unc," being shouted in his direction.

"I'm like this is this is insane, it's passed down to these kids," Jefferson said laughing.

Jefferson is the oldest player in the Chargers secondary. Younger teammates first started calling him "Unc" when he signed with the Chargers in 2024 after coming out of retirement.

The nickname quickly caught on. Fans use it on social media, the Chargers use it in team content and now even young campers refer to him that way.

"Fully embraced," Jefferson said. "It's who I am at this point."

There were plenty of reasons for fans to embrace the nickname last season. Jefferson recorded a career-high four interceptions.

The most important came in Week 14 against the Eagles. With the Chargers leading 22-19 in overtime, Philadelphia had a first-and-10 at the Chargers' 17-yard line and was driving for a potential game-winning score. Eagles quarterback Jalen Hurts rolled to his right as Khalil Mack pressured him into an off-balance throw. Hart tipped the pass into the air, and Jefferson secured it with a one-handed interception to seal the victory.

Despite that success, Jefferson believes there is more to accomplish in 2026.

"I could have had way more interceptions. I could have had seven or eight, in my opinion," Jefferson said after a recent press conference. "That's what I'm chasing this year. Shock the world and shock everybody ... I don't think that's something that is far-fetched for me with the positions I put myself in."

It was a special day for Jefferson at Stan Canaris Stadium, where he made countless explosive plays as a running back and created numerous turnovers on defense. He also helped deliver Eastlake's first CIF football championship in 2009.

Now, he wants similar glory in the NFL.

As an undrafted free agent, Jefferson was never supposed to make it this far. Even before his first retirement, few expected him to build the career he had. Fewer still expected him to return and produce at the level he has over the last two seasons with the Chargers.

Jefferson came within one game of the Super Bowl in 2015 but has yet to make it to the big dance.

The Chargers' offense has often been the team's Achilles' heel in recent seasons, particularly in the playoffs. However, the addition of Mike McDaniel as offensive coordinator has many around the NFL believing this could be the franchise's best opportunity yet.

Jefferson plans to do everything possible to help ensure the Chargers are playing at SoFi Stadium on Valentine's Day 2027.

"I want to win a ring," Jefferson said at the press conference. "The Super Bowl is in LA, at our home stadium, so I'm trying to do whatever I can as far as being a leader and my playmaking ability to put my best foot forward on the field."

Khalil Mack

Chargers veteran Khalil Mack continues to chase his football dreams

EL SEGUNDO — It's a daily balancing act, no question, a daily work-life balancing act that

makes Chargers outside linebacker Khalil Mack very much like the average 35-year-old attempting to be the best father and spouse possible while also trying to maintain a lofty status as a reliable and productive employee.

It's not easy.

It's why Mack acknowledged Thursday, on the second day of training camp, that he's thought of retiring and devoting himself fully to his family. He has managed over 13 seasons in the NFL, including the past five with the Chargers, to juggle his private and professional lives.

It might have been easy to walk away after the 2025 season, after nine Pro Bowl selections and a Hall of Fame-caliber career, after being named the NFL Defensive Player of the Year in 2016, after having tormented so many quarterbacks with his relentless pass-rushing ability over so many games over so many seasons.

One thing brought him back to the Chargers for this season, though.

"I want to win a championship," he said.

Mack is 0-6 in playoff games in his career, including 0-3 with the Chargers.

It stings. How could it not?

So, the upcoming season represents another opportunity for Mack to win. He signed a one-season contract with the Chargers worth a guaranteed \$18 million, similar to the deal he and the team reached the previous offseason as well. He was willing to continue his work-life balancing act for another season.

"I was leaning toward coming back the whole time," Mack said. "It's considering this stage of life, my kids, you know what I mean? It's that balance of being a dad and a husband and still trying to follow your dreams. You know what I mean? I still don't feel like I'm in a position to do both. I still spend time with my kids and my wife, but that's the balance of football. I feel like you still get to spend time, but it takes time to figure that part out, you know what I'm saying?"

"So, yeah, I don't want to give up on my dream."

So many of Mack's friends and rivals have abandoned the game to focus on other things, including family. Mack only needs to look around the practice field or the locker room to see how many young players have replaced the ones who he once knew all those years ago. He is the elder statesman.

It's not necessarily a new role, but it's one he's come to embrace more fully.

No question, it's one the Chargers have embraced, too.

"Priceless, priceless," Chargers defensive coordinator Chris O'Leary said when asked what it meant to have Mack back in the fold for another season. "I've said it before, but he's the flag-bearer of our culture on defense. He leads the way with his actions. When it's time for him to say something, he'll say something."

"You've got a group of young edge rushers in that room that all they're doing is watching everything he does and listening to everything he says. So, it's more valuable than anything I could say or do. So, having him here is priceless."

For example, two years ago, when then-rookie cornerback Tarheeb Still said goodbye after a workout on a Thursday during the offseason, Mack asked why Still wasn't coming in on Friday. Still showed up the next day, and by Mack's reckoning hasn't missed a Friday ever since.

For another, offensive lineman Joe Alt went to Mack repeatedly for advice and counsel during his rookie training camp after the Chargers picked him fifth overall in the 2024 draft. Mack was eager to give up his secrets and Alt became a Pro Bowl pick after the '25 season despite a season-ending injury.

For one more, edge rusher Akheem Mesidor said not long after the Chargers made him the 22nd pick in the draft this past April that he intended to quiz Mack in order to learn all he could about being a pro football player on and off the field. Again, Mack was only too happy to oblige.

"Just trying to pick his brain as much as possible," Mesidor said in April.

And so it goes for Mack. He could still recall who assisted him as a rookie with the then-Oakland Raiders, who answered his questions after he had been drafted fifth overall from the University of Buffalo in 2014, who helped guide him to the remarkable career he has had since then.

Charles Woodson was one of them, a Hall of Fame defensive back after 18 years in the NFL, including 11 with the Raiders.

"Just having those voices on the field and off the field with advice, just having those examples around me early on, it was the catalyst for my career," Mack said. "I had them to lean on and I was very fortunate to have those guys early on and sprinkled in the world ... and pretty soon I was probably the oldest guy on the team."

Akheem Mesidor

Chargers rookie Akheem Mesidor paving way for Ottawa NFL players

VICTOR TEDONDO WOKE Akheem Mesidor out of his sleep.

It was around 2015 when Tedondo, the coach of the Gridiron Academy, was taking Mesidor and some other players in his minivan on an over 800-mile drive from their hometown of Ottawa, Canada, to a high school football camp at the University of Indiana.

Tedondo began training Mesidor at the football academy when he was 8 years old, becoming one of the most impactful coaches in Mesidor's development. "These car rides were always the worst," Mesidor said, because it was when Tedondo critiqued players. And they were particularly bad for whomever was sitting exactly where Mesidor was: in the passenger seat next to Tedondo.

"Akheem, you're about to go play against some real dogs. You think you're good?" Tedondo asked.

"Yeah."

"Does your mom tell you you're good?"

"Yeah."

"You f---ing suck," Tedondo said.

"I did not like him," Mesidor laughed. "A lot of people didn't like him but once you started doing better and performing, he started easing off. The more of a dog you were, the less you heard."

At that camp in Indiana, Mesidor, then 14, was playing inside linebacker, but he lost in three consecutive one-on-one reps, and Tedondo pulled him and forced him to play defensive line. From that point on, Mesidor has played defensive line, evolving into one of college football's best outside linebackers at the University of Miami and a first-round pick (No. 22) by the Los Angeles Chargers in this year's draft.

Mesidor is Ottawa's first first-round NFL draft pick, a feat he credits in part to the many uncomfortable minivan rides and grueling training sessions with Tedondo. Defensive end Brian Belway became the first Ottawa-born player to appear in an NFL regular-season game in 1987, and it took 30 years for the next.

Now, Mesidor is the latest of an influx of NFL players to come from Canada's capital. Among active players, Mesidor joins New England Patriots linebacker Jesse Luketa, Chicago Bears defensive tackle Neville Gallimore, Rams outside linebacker Wesley Bailey and Miami Dolphins defensive tackle Rene Konga. They believe they're only scratching the surface of the talent back home.

"I take a lot of pride in coming from Ottawa because a lot of people don't do it," Mesidor told ESPN. "... We have dogs in Ottawa. The kids just need guidance, and they need people who believe in them."

IT'S JUST BEFORE 9:30 a.m. at the Chargers facility on the 11th day of training camp, and Mesidor is the only player on the team's practice field. Practice doesn't begin for another half hour, but he's already in a deep sweat and going through swipe-rip pass-rush moves. Mesidor is one of the first players on the field each day, maintaining a pre-practice routine since he was drafted that has impressed his teammates and coaches.

The extra work is something Mesidor has grown accustomed to. He also swims as a part of his training, a routine that began at Miami to help shed weight after transferring there from West Virginia in part because he wanted to shift from the interior defensive line to edge rusher, where he feels most comfortable.

"He's the first one on the field every time. He goes about it like a pro," Chargers outside linebacker Tuli Tuipulotu said. "He's very locked in. He knows what he needs, what he wants, and that's what we love."

Mesidor's time at different positions on the defensive line made him attractive in the draft process for his versatility, and his six years in

college helped him develop a refined tool of pass-rush moves.

"When he puts his hand down on the ground at the defensive end, the five technique, there's flashes of elite," Chargers coach Jim Harbaugh said. "The initial quickness, the strength, very polished in his arsenal of what he can do."

This version of Mesidor seemed impossible back at Gridiron Academy. "When it came down to physical training, he was not really about it," Tedondo reflected, "but he loved football."

That love for football brought Mesidor and Tedondo together. Tedondo introduced himself to Mesidor when Mesidor was in elementary school. At that time, Mesidor was playing for the youth football club North Gloucester Giants, and Tedondo was coaching the Orléans Bengals. Tedondo recalls blowing out the Giants in a game. But Mesidor caught Tedondo's attention.

"It was his tenacity. He just kept fighting," Tedondo said. "A lot of young kids just gave up because they didn't have that mental toughness, that resiliency at that age to keep fighting. And Akheem just kept fighting."

After that game, Tedondo, then 22 years old, asked Mesidor to train at his academy. Over the next decade, Tedondo became a father figure to Mesidor, who had grown up without one present in his life. But the relationship wasn't always smooth sailing.

Mesidor evolved into a good football player, but he had fallen behind his peers who had begun receiving Division I offers as freshmen and sophomores. Tedondo said that Mesidor trailed his peers because he hadn't committed to the work outside of football -- lifting, conditioning and his diet.

After attending a camp at the University of Michigan before his sophomore year, Mesidor watched how coach Harbaugh -- who coincidentally is now Mesidor's pro coach in L.A. -- offered another Gridiron player, Kenny Mestidor, a scholarship to play football at Michigan.

Already frustrated by his progress and peers seemingly passing him by, Mesidor decided he wanted to quit football. He got a job at Domino's Pizza and stopped training for a few weeks at the academy. At the same time, Mesidor's personal life was in turmoil: He struggled in school, his single mother struggled to make ends meet, his brother was in a drug-induced coma, and he had a sister dealing with legal troubles.

But after a conversation with Tedondo, Mesidor learned that the most realistic way to change his situation was through football.

"He used to run away from struggle," Tedondo said. "He used to run away from his life in a sense because he was dealt with a lot at home. But from that moment, everything started clicking."

Soon, Tedondo began finding Mesidor training at the academy before he got there. It was there that Mesidor began doing many of the things he does now -- arriving early to practice, staying late, doing extra work in the weight room -- and as a junior, he received his first Division I offer from Syracuse. For his senior season in 2019, Mesidor transferred to Clearwater Academy

International in Florida, hoping to gain more exposure.

In that year he dominated, finishing with 18 tackles for loss, 92 tackles and 10 sacks, while cementing himself as a four-star recruit and receiving 20 Division I offers.

Mesidor eventually committed to the University of West Virginia, but Tedondo continued to push him from afar. Starting during his freshman year in 2020, Tedondo would call Mesidor before games to remind him that he belonged. The calls continued when Mesidor transferred to Miami as a junior.

Then one night Mesidor didn't answer.

"He didn't need it anymore," Tedondo said.

Mesidor laughs now when he hears this story. He doesn't remember ignoring Tedondo, but admits that his process, which began in college, is to ignore whomever is calling his phone the night before a game.

"I don't answer him. I don't answer my mom. I don't answer my girl," Mesidor said with a smile. "I just don't like really talking to anybody, being on the phone. It's my quiet time. It's time for me to relax before the game."

Over three seasons at Miami, Mesidor evolved into Ottawa's highest drafted prospect. In his final season at Miami in 2025, he led the team with 17.5 tackles for loss and 12.5 sacks as the Hurricanes made it to the College Football Playoff National Championship game. His production and work ethic made the Chargers fall in love with him in the draft process.

"We interviewed him and you just felt that in the room," Chargers general manager Joe Hortiz said. "He's a football player -- mature, driven, intelligent and just wants to work. And he's going to fit right in here."

His journey from pizza delivery man to first-round pick was aided by a program and coach back home that poured into him. It's why he believes with more infrastructure and opportunity there will be many more like him to jump from Ottawa to the NFL.

IN 1987, BELWAY, the defensive end, became the first Ottawa-born player to appear in an NFL regular-season game, playing once for the Los Angeles Raiders as a replacement during the NFL strike.

Ottawa -- Canada's fifth-largest city with just over one million people -- would go 30 years before producing its next NFL player.

In 2017, defensive tackle Eli Ankou ended the streak when he made the Jacksonville Jaguars roster as an undrafted free agent. Ankou went on to play eight seasons in the NFL, with his last year in 2024 with the Buffalo Bills.

"I think when a young man starts seeing others being successful in this space, it truly allows them to dream," Tedondo said.

That was the case for Luketa, the Patriots linebacker, who grew up playing for the South Ottawa Mustangs youth football club. His age group played games before the older teams, so he would often stick around after to watch the older groups. One of the players he kept a close eye on was Gallimore, who went on to become

Ottawa's first drafted player when the Dallas Cowboys selected him in the third round of the 2020 NFL draft.

Two years later, the Arizona Cardinals drafted Luketa, turning the dreams he began believing while watching Gallimore into reality. This summer, there are five Ottawa-bred players on training camp rosters.

The recent influx of talent after a 30-year drought comes for two reasons, players say: Young players can see a proven path that previous generations couldn't, and more coaches and training academies are investing in football.

"We had a tremendous amount of talent in the city," Luketa told ESPN. "But we just lacked the resources."

According to a 2022 study by the Canadian Fitness and Lifestyle Research Institute, among children ages 5 to 17 who participated in sports, football/rugby accounted for just 5% of youth participation, compared with soccer at 28%, basketball at 17% and hockey/ringette at 16%. Football ranked second to last on the identified sports list, one percentage point above ice skating.

Luketa and Mesidor said that football attracted mainly lower-income kids because of the cost barrier to entry for other sports, but that the sport's infrastructure pales in comparison to that of the United States.

For example, the North Gloucester Giants -- where Mesidor played -- charges CA\$350 (about \$251.11 US Dollars) plus membership fees a season, according to the registration site. By comparison, Ottawa Centre Minor Hockey, for example, charges CA\$730 to \$830 (about \$525.38 to \$598.06 USD) for most youth age groups just for house-league registration.

Still, for players seeking extra training and exposure, that cost increases. Gridiron Academy -- which today lists its training packages at CA\$480 (\$348.11 USD) for ages 8 to 11, and CA\$1,020 (\$739.66 USD) for ages 12 to 18 -- was out of the budget for Luketa, one of eight children raised by a single mother.

"I was fortunate enough to have a coach who really took me in and started training me on his own because he just saw how passionate and how hungry I was," Luketa said.

Gallimore echoed that sentiment and noted that the differences became evident when he moved to the U.S.

"When you look at these [American] high schools, the high schools are bigger than the colleges and universities back home [in Ottawa]," he told ESPN. "These kids are getting \$50 million stadiums and weight rooms and stuff like that."

There's also an uphill recruiting battle because of the perceived talent level in Canada. It's why Tedondo lugged Mesidor and other players to camps across the United States and why Mesidor eventually moved to Florida to play his final year of high school. Luketa did the same, playing his final three years of high school at Mercyhurst Preparatory in Pennsylvania.

"People look down on the Canadian competition," Mesidor said. "I could have the

best high school tape in the world, but then they'd be like, 'Ah, he's playing against Canadians.'"

ANDRE BRUNET GAVE his 11-year-old son, Aaron, two options: Disneyland or Chargers training camp.

The Brunet family, from Ottawa, was vacationing in Southern California when Andre discovered tickets were still available for Chargers practice in San Diego. Aaron didn't hesitate. Mickey Mouse became an easy afterthought. Andre's wife and two daughters went to Disneyland. He and Aaron took the roughly 90-mile-drive to the University of San Diego to watch Mesidor.

The Brunets already had somewhat of a relationship with Mesidor. Aaron began playing football last summer in a local Ottawa league, and after a scrimmage against the Cumberland Panthers, Mesidor showed up. Aaron got a picture and some advice.

Ahead of his trip to California, Brunet sent Mesidor a direct message on Instagram. He never really expected a reply but wanted to see if Mesidor would meet up with them while they were in California for 11 days.

To Brunet's surprise, Mesidor responded, inviting them to meet up in Manhattan Beach when Mesidor returned from San Diego. Instead of just meeting him in Manhattan Beach, they attended the practice in San Diego and screamed his name until Mesidor recognized them.

When they met later that day in Manhattan Beach, Mesidor gave Aaron some Chargers gear and told them to keep in touch whenever Mesidor was back in Ottawa. "Ten years ago, I was in their shoes, and I loved it when someone else would come," Brunet remembered Mesidor saying.

Days later, Aaron got an autograph from his favorite quarterback, Dak Prescott, at Cowboys training camp in Oxnard, California. His father said that meeting Mesidor meant more to his son.

"Now, when I asked my son what he wants to do in life, he says he wants to be a professional football player," Brunet said.

Mesidor recognizes the impact that his presence can have on kids in Ottawa. Growing up in Canada, the NFL felt distant, partly because there weren't many players from Ottawa he could watch or speak with. Now Mesidor, Luketa, Gallimore, Bailey and Konga are becoming that for the next generation.

Long before Aaron was watching Mesidor, Mesidor was looking up to NFL stars -- a dream that felt a world away. One of them was his new teammate, Khalil Mack.

On the field and in the meeting room, Mesidor peppers Mack with questions as detailed as the things he is looking for at the line of scrimmage to what he was thinking during the season he won NFL Defensive Player of The Year in 2016.

"I can tell he has his mindset on the pinnacle," Mack said. "He's looking at the awards and the sack titles and all those different things. It's impressive. He takes it very seriously."

On one of his first days at the Chargers facility, Mesidor took a picture with Mack and sent it to a friend. "I'm like, 'Bro, high school me, middle school me, I'd be s---ting my pants if I seen this.'"

The Inside Story of How the Chargers Drafted Akheem Mesidor

Kevin Weidl had his choice of games to go to in Week 1 of the 2025 college football season.

And while there were certainly plenty of juicy matchups for Weidl to see in person, the Chargers national scout circled a Monday night tilt featuring Notre Dame at Miami in a battle of Top 10 teams.

"When you're there, you feel the moment, feel the environment," Weidl said. "It was a big game, right? It's Catholics vs. Convicts and there was a who's who on that sideline. Ray Lewis, Michael Irvin, they all came back.

"A lot of legends, so you could feel the vibe and intensity. And it was Monday night," Weidl added. "It was the last game of the weekend, and it was the only show in town."

The Hurricanes raced out to a double-digit lead only for the Fighting Irish to tie the game in the final minutes.

But when Miami kicked a go-ahead field goal with just over a minute left, the home team needed one final stop to secure the win.

And on a night where five future 2026 first-round draft picks took the field, it was Miami edge rusher Akheem Mesidor who took matters into his own hands.

"The thing that stood out to me was the way he closed out the game. And that's what you want, for guys to step up in the biggest moments of the game," Weidl said. "The NFL is always close, almost always comes down to the final drive.

"We want closers. That's what we talked about in the room. This guy has it," Weidl continued.

Weidl later added: "I flew down from Charlotte because I wanted to see him play live. A lot of good players on that field but he was one that stood out."

Mesidor did just that, sacking quarterback CJ Carr on Notre Dame's final possession as he ripped past the Notre Dame tackle.

A play later, Mesidor split a sack with teammate Rueben Bain, Jr. by rushing from the interior on the opposite side of the formation as the previous play.

Donovan Beidelschies, a Chargers area scout whose region includes Florida, was also in attendance for the highly anticipated Miami-Notre Dame game.

"He closed it out," Beidelschies said of Mesidor's performance in Miami's 27-24 win.

"A player who shines when the lights are brightest, that's a great trait to have," Beidelschies added. "It means you're talented

and can handle pressure and make plays when it counts."

Chargers assistant general manager Chad Alexander added: "He's a closer. That was one of the most anticipated games of Week 1, so everyone was watching. For a guy to perform like that, you just know that he's up for the challenge and that it's not going to be too big for him."

Almost eight months after Mesidor's clutch performance, the Chargers were on the clock with Pick No. 22 in the 2026 NFL Draft.

When the edge rusher didn't get picked in the mid-teens, the Bolts draft room perked up a bit.

That meant it was a no brainer for the Chargers to draft Mesidor when they were on the clock.

"Really excited to get the chance to add a talented pass rusher in Akheem," said Chargers General Manager Joe Hortiz. "A guy, honestly, we didn't think would make it to us. Just fired up."

Chargers Head Coach Jim Harbaugh added: "He's a man. He's polished and ready to roll."

From West Virginia to Miami

Mike Jasinski is a national scout for the Chargers after previously serving as an area scout.

Jasinski was the area scout in Texas and helped the Bolts draft Quentin Johnston back in 2023. But he also scouted the Northeast in 2020 and 2021 and began hearing about this young defensive lineman at West Virginia.

Mesidor grew up in Ottawa, Canada and began playing football at age 8 with the North Gloucester Giants. He played along the offensive line in his first year but later moved to the defensive line while also playing linebacker, quarterback and running back.

He played football at multiple schools to try and maximize his exposure, including a season at Royal Imperial Collegiate of Canada, before transferring to Clearwater Academy International in Florida in 2019.

A former three-star recruit, Mesidor landed in Morgantown, West Virginia and played 23 games for the Mountaineers while racking up 9.5 sacks over two seasons.

While Jasinski was generally focused on more draft-eligible players, he couldn't help but notice Mesidor at practice or during games. Mesidor's time with West Virginia included a Freshman All-America honor in 2020.

"Man, this young kid — No. 90. — is really good," Jasinski recalled. "I asked their pro liaison about him and was told that he was only a freshman but had looked good. That was way back when and then he transferred to Miami."

Wanting to further his development, Mesidor entered the transfer portal and headed to Miami as an ascending defensive lineman.

He earned Honorable Mention All-ACC accolades in 2022 after a 7.0-sack campaign but was limited to three games the following season due to injuries.

Mesidor responded with 5.5 sacks as an interior rusher in 2024 to once again garner Honorable Mention All-ACC honors.

After multiple seasons at Miami, Mesidor had caught the eye of Beidelschies, who first studied him in the summer of 2023.

"OK, let me put this guy on the radar," Beidelschies noted. "You put a little highlight or asterisk next to a guy in case he decides to come out or has an amazing year in 2024."

But with Mesidor set to enter his final season at Miami in 2025, the Hurricanes unlocked his full potential by moving him outside as an edge rusher. Miami's defensive ends coach is Jason Taylor, a Pro Football Hall of Famer with 139.5 career NFL sacks.

"He benefitted greatly from learning from a Hall of Famer in Jason Taylor," Alexander said.

Mesidor helped make the transition by taking up swimming, an activity he joked burns "hella calories." All in all, Mesidor went from roughly 285 pounds to 265, making him a leaner and more agile to deal primarily with offensive tackles.

"It's one of the most impressive transitions I've seen," said Chargers outside linebackers coach Dylan Roney. "It's never easy to play a new position, and to play it as dominantly as he did was so impressive.

"I think the big thing for him was cutting some weight, getting to a weight he felt his best at in terms of movement ability," Roney continued. "From there, he'd already developed the hands, the strike, technique.

"Then just difference of rushing the edge, there's a little more space there," Roney added. "But when you move him back inside, it's so easy for him because he's done it so much."

As Miami's 2025 season began, the Hurricanes had aspirations of a deep playoff run led by Bain, who ended up being the 15th overall pick to the Buccaneers.

But Mesidor was a key catalyst, too, as he would soon produce a dominant senior season.

A relentless motor

Week 1 against Notre Dame wasn't Mesidor's only statement game of the 2025 campaign.

Through the Miami's first 11 games, Mesidor tallied 7.0 sacks 12.0 tackles for loss. The Hurricanes went 9-2 and earned a spot in the College Football Playoff.

As Miami prepared for a Round 1 game at Texas A&M on December 20, the Chargers were slated to play the Cowboys on the road the following day.

The Bolts Week 16 game in Dallas was the annual scouts' trip, meaning Jasinski and others headed to the Lone Star State.

Jasinski had already studied Texas A&M's offensive line up close and had come away impressed. It was for good reason, too, as the Aggies had 10 players get drafted, including four across their stout offensive line.

Jasinski watched the Miami-Texas A&M game live on the flight to Dallas as Mesidor tallied 1.5 sacks in an upset win. And when Jasinski flew home to Southern California, the film from that game was already loaded into the system,

meaning he watched Mesidor's performance a second time.

"I watched him and was like, 'Damn, this guy is really good,'" Jasinski said. "A&M ended up having four linemen drafted, so it was kind of an eye-opening experience because I was familiar with the A&M offensive line being really good. That really opened my eyes with his skill level.

"It seemed like play-in and play-out that he was just having an effect on the quarterback in some way," Jasinski added. "And he could do it in a multitude of ways. He just felt like a seasoned veteran and that really stood out to me when watching him."

Mesidor's breakout season wasn't over yet.

He then added 2.0 sacks in a quarterfinal win over Ohio State at the Cotton Bowl before ending his season with a pair of sacks on Indiana quarterback Fernando Mendoza as Miami lost 27-21 in the National Championship.

"He was on a heater all year and played some of his best ball down the stretch in the playoffs," Hortiz said.

Mesidor's incredible season included 12.5 sacks, good for the second-most in the country, while his 18.0 tackles for loss were tied for fourth most.

"You just keep checking off boxes and superlatives next to a guy's name," Beidelschies said. "He had a whole line of checkmarks and plus signs next to his evaluation. That tells you that he's a pretty good player."

Chargers.com talked to more than a half-dozen people inside the Bolts front office about Mesidor and how he ended up becoming a first-round pick.

When asked what immediately stood out about Mesidor's game, everyone gave their version of a similar answer.

Hortiz raved his "relentless motor" while Weidl mentioned "how hard he plays."

Roney did, too.

"His No. 1 thing? I would say motor," Roney said. "Always around the ball, always attacking the ball."

Beidelschies and Alexander also went on and on about Mesidor's play style.

"It's his motor and his effort. He's the same versus the run or the pass. He's the same from the beginning of the game to the end of the game," Beidelschies said. "All great pass rushers that I've evaluated over the years are relentless. They create things, they make it happen with their effort. And he has that."

Alexander added: "He played a ton of snaps. It felt like he was never off the field. But I never saw him take a second off or take a play off or look like he was winded. It was a heavy workload so that was a credit to his conditioning, his want-to, his overall grit. He was never coasting. He was the same player in the first quarter as the third quarter and then to close it out."

Hmmm. That sounds exactly like a player Harbaugh would want on his team, no?

"Akheem is a worker and he's going to come right in and fit into our culture, our team. Good person, good player," Harbaugh said. "A guy that's not afraid to put in the work. He has proven that through his college journey and is going to fit well."

Teaming up with Tuli & Khalil

In the immediate aftermath of the Chargers drafting Mesidor, Harbaugh and Roney couldn't help but daydream.

Adding Mesidor to a group that already includes Khalil Mack and Tuli Tuipulotu?

"Just thinking of, not even pairing, but tripling him with K-Mack and Tuli," Harbaugh said. "That's fire, as the young people would say."

Roney added: "Just excitement. My mind just started going immediately to all the ways we can use him, all the things it opens up for us as a defense, having more edge rushers that are great pass rushers. Just gives us more opportunities to put them in different positions. My mind immediately went to scheme and all the fun ways we'll be able to use these guys."

In the two years that Harbaugh has been with the Chargers, the Bolts defense has generally tried to roll out a trio of pass rushers to affect quarterbacks.

We saw that in the second half of last season as Mack, Tuipulotu and Odafe Oweh constantly harassed opposing offenses.

The expectation is that trend will continue in 2026 as the Chargers transition under new Defensive Coordinator Chris O'Leary.

"His pass rush technique," O'Leary said about what stands out about Mesidor. "You talk about how he uses his hands, the leverage he plays with, how he attacks different tackles in different ways, his timing, his get-off, how he can move into the interior in his pass rush.

"For me, that's what stands out. He's an exceptional pass rusher," O'Leary added. "We'll try to continue to develop that and continue to develop the other areas of his game as well."

Roney said there are "endless opportunities" for what the trio of Mack, Tuipulotu and Mesidor could look like.

"Without getting too much into scheme," Roney added with a smile.

But when you have three pass rushers on the field, someone has to kick inside.

Mesidor's multiple seasons playing at 3-technique along the interior — Jasinski called him a "twitched up D-tackle" — should give the Chargers defensive coaching staff plenty of options on passing downs.

"You want speed on the field, especially the way the game is changing. It's all about evolving and adapting," Roney said. "The game is getting faster, pass rush is getting more important in terms of getting to the quarterback faster cause the ball is getting out quicker.

"How do you do that? You get more speed on the field. Guys like Mesidor, Tuli, you don't get afraid to bump them inside," Roney added. "You get more speed off the edges. I see us using that

[third] edge probably even more than we did last year. A lot of great opportunities."

Mesidor won't just be a pass-rush specialist, however, as the Chargers praised his run defense, too.

"Really polished. His instincts and block recognition against the run stood out. He can set the edge against the run," Weidl said. "Maybe not a hammer, but he's a physical run stopper. He's firm on the edge and also has the effort to chase and pursue."

Roney added: "He's very powerful, got a great strike and quick hands. I think there are some things to maybe clean up in terms of his eyes and progression from his man to the ball carrier, but his technique is further along than most college guys coming out. And he's got the power and a serious willingness for contact and physicality."

Roney said he doesn't expect Mesidor to take long to catch on after spending time with Mack and Tuipulotu.

"Being around Tuli, being around Khalil ... he won't even need me in the room," Roney joked with a laugh. "Just let Khalil talk and he'll be a better run defender in a week."

The perfect fit

In the short term, the Chargers have visions of teaming Mesidor up with Mack and Tuipulotu.

That could be in a rotation or when the three are all on the field together at the same time.

But if we take a 30,000-foot view of the roster, Mack is entering his age 35 season and has contemplated retirement the past two offseasons. Bud Dupree, who is 33, is slated to be a free agent next offseason.

Simply put, the duo of Tuipulotu — who is eligible for an extension — and Mesidor might be the future of the Chargers pass rush.

The Bolts clearly believe the 25-year-old Mesidor is the right player and person to potentially fill that role.

"We feel like we're getting this guy who is ready to roll. He feels like a veteran-type player," Jasinski said. "It was a really strong edge class, but I don't know if any of them have as deep of a bag of rush moves as he has.

"Hopefully he can come in and hit the floor running because he's coming into a great room," Jasinski added. "Tuli and Khalil are great players but also just good dudes and awesome leaders."

Hortiz said: "He got an education in football at Miami and it's paid off. You watch the film and he's a great player who can help us. Age is just a number."

Alexander offered the final word on the Chargers 2026 first-round draft pick.

"You can't question his production. You can't question his effort. You can't question his desire. You can't question his knack for showing up in big games," Alexander said. "He just checked a lot of boxes. That, combined with the confidence we have in our staff and our coaches, it was a great feeling when a plan like that comes together."

He later added: "You can never have enough edges. We look at edge as a premium position ... that was something that really stood out for us. He'll have some development, but we think he's going to help us right away. At that spot [No. 22], we were looking for impact and fit. He gave us both."
