The New England Patriots begin a stretch of two straight road games this week when they travel to face the Los Angeles Chargers on Sunday at SoFi Stadium. Following the Chargers game, the Patriots visit the Carolina Panthers in Charlotte. It is the only two-game road trip the Patriots will have in 2021. Last season, the Patriots had a two-game and a three-game road streak.

The Patriots will attempt to even their record at 4-4 this week. Last season, the Patriots traveled to Los Angeles to face the Chargers with a 5-6 record and evened their record at 6-6 behind a 45-0 victory in their first ever visit to SoFi Stadium.

BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be broadcast by **CBS** and can be seen locally on **WBZ-TV Channel 4**. **Ian Eagle** will handle play-by-play duties with **Charles Davis** as the color analyst. **Evan Washburn** will work from the sidelines. The game will be produced by **Mark Wolff** and directed by **Bob Fishman**.

NATIONAL RADIO: Sunday's game will be broadcast to a national audience on **Sports USA**. **Larry Kahn** will call the game with **Hank Bauer** providing analysis.

LOCAL RADIO: **98.5 The Sports Hub** is the flagship station for the Patriots Radio Network. A complete listing of the network's 35 stations can be found on page 60. Play-by-play broadcaster **Bob Socci** will call the action along with former Patriots quarterback **Scott Zolak**, who will provide color analysis. The games are produced by **Marc Cappello**.

PATRIOTS OFFENSE PRODUCES 500 YARDS

In their 54-13 victory over the Jets in Week 7, the Patriots offense generated 551 total yards, the seventh highest total in team history and the most since 555 total yards at New Orleans on Sept. 17, 2017.

PATRIOTS AT LOS ANGELES CHARGERS

SERIES HISTORY

The New England Patriots and the Los Angeles Chargers will meet for the second straight season. Last season, the Patriots had their most convincing win of the year with a 45-0 victory in their debut at SoFi Stadium on Dec. 6, 2021. It was New England's first road game against the Chargers since their move from San Diego to Los Angeles in 2017. It was also the first of two consecutive games for the Patriots at SoFi Stadium, as the team played against the Rams in a Thursday Night game a few days later. The Patriots enter this week's game having won the last six games overall.

New England leads the regular season by a 23-14-2 margin. The teams have met four times in the postseason with the Patriots holding a 3-1 edge.

The New England Patriots and the Los Angeles Chargers are an old AFL rivalry as part the original eight teams from the American Football League. The Patriots and Chargers met in the 1963 AFL Championship Game played on Jan. 5, 1964 in San Diego with the Chargers taking a 51-10 decision.

The series dates back to 1960, the inaugural season for each team. Bill Belichick is 8-5 in his career against the Chargers in the regular season, including a 7-3 record as Patriots head coach. He is 3-0 against the Chargers in the postseason.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR...

- Mac Jones has completed over 70 percent of his passes in five of his first seven NFL games, the only rookie quarterback to ever do so. The rookie record is nine games by Dak Prescott. The NFL record is 13 games by Drew Brees in 2017.
- Mac Jones has passed for 1,779 yards during the first seven games and is on pace for 4,170 passing yards . He leads all rookie quarterbacks in passing yards (1,472) and completions (174). Only three rookie quarterbacks have ever passed for at least 4,000 yards.
- After seven games, Jones' completion percentage is 70.4. The best completion percentage for a season by a rookie quarterback is Dak Prescott at 67.7 percent in 2016.
- Jones has 174 completions this season and joins Joe Burrow (195 completions in 2020) and Justin Herbert (181 in 2020) as the only rookie quarterbacks with at least 170 completions in their first seven starts.

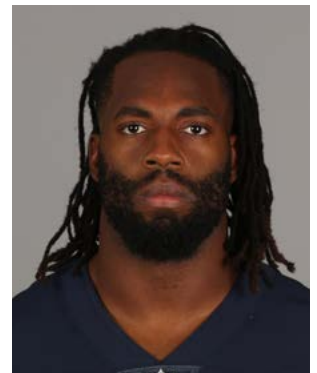

WR KENDRICK BOURNE

WHAT TO LOOK FOR...

- WR Kendrick Bourne completed his first NFL pass attempt for a 25-yard touchdown pass to WR Nelson Agholor in the first quarter of the win against the New York Jets on Oct. 24. The last non-quarterback with a pass completion in consecutive games was WR Jarvis Landry of Cleveland in 2020 when he completed passes on Dec. 6 at Tennessee and Dec. 14 vs. Baltimore.
- Jakobi Meyers threw touchdown passes in Weeks 10 and 17 in 2020, to become the fourth wide receiver with two touchdown passes in a single season in the Super Bowl era, joining Rod Gardner (2003), Antwaan Randle El (2010) and Odell Beckham Jr. (2018). With one more touchdown pass, Bourne can join the list.



WR JAKOBI MEYERS

WHAT TO LOOK FOR...

- WR Jakobi Meyers completed two passes for 45 yards in Week 4 against Tampa Bay. He is now 4-of-4 for 88 yards with two touchdowns and a perfect 158.3 passer rating in his career. The Patriots have never had a wide receiver complete more than two passes in a single season. Julian Edelman completed two passes in 2018, 2019 and 2020, and Harold Jackson completed two passes in 1980. In addition to the Tampa Bay game, Meyers completed two passes, both for touchdowns, in 2020.
- The most passes thrown by a non quarterback in a single season for the Patriots were by RB Andy Johnson, who was 7-of-9 for 194 yards with four touchdowns in 1981 and RB Dick Christy, who was 6-of-11 for 94 yards with two touchdowns in 1960.



DB DEVIN MCCOURTY

WHAT TO LOOK FOR...

- Devin McCourty has 29 career regular season interceptions, tied for third all-time in team history, behind Ty Law and Raymond Clayborn, with 36 interceptions. He needs one more interception to become the third Patriots player with 30 career interceptions.
- McCourty has 35 career takeaways in the regular season and is tied with Mike Haynes for fifth all-time in team history. He needs one more takeaway to tie Roland James at 36 for fourth in team history.

PATRIOTS SCORE 50

The Patriots finished with 54 points, the 14th time in team history that the team has scored at least 50 points. It is the 9th time scoring at least 50 points under Bill Belichick and the first since a 51-17 win vs Jacksonville on Sept. 27, 2015. The 54 points are the 7th most points scored in team history.

PATRIOTS SCORE 50 AGAINST THE JETS FOR THE THIRD TIME IN TEAM HISTORY

The 50-point output marks the third 50-point game the Patriots have produced against the Jets. The Patriots scored a 56-3 win vs. the Jets on Sept. 9, 1979 and a 55-21 victory vs. the Jets on Oct. 29, 1978.

SUNDAY DRIVES

The Patriots scored on 9-of-10 offensive drives (not including the final drive when they ran out the clock), including their first six offensive drives.

PATRIOTS EXPLODE FOR 31 POINTS IN THE FIRST HALF

The Patriots scored 31 points in the first half against the Jets. It is the 12th time in team history that they have had a 30-point first half, the 10th time under Bill Belichick and the first since a 30-13 halftime lead in a 36-20 win at New Orleans on Sept. 17, 2017.

PATRIOTS TIE TEAM RECORD WITH FOUR RUSHING TDS

The Patriots tied a team record with four rushing touchdowns. The Patriots have had four rushing touchdowns in a game 10 times overall. They have accomplished the mark four times against the Jets – Sept. 8, 1963, Oct. 18, 1976, Oct. 29, 1978 and today.

PATRIOTS OFFENSE PRODUCES 32 FIRST DOWNS

The Patriots offense produced 32 first downs, the 12th time in team history that they have had at least 32 first downs. It is the most since tying a team record with 35 first downs in the win vs. Jacksonville on Sept. 27, 2015.

PATRIOTS OFFENSE GAINS 551 TOTAL YARDS

The Patriots offense generated 551 total yards, the 7th highest total in team history and the most since 555 total yards at New Orleans on Sept. 17, 2017.

DIVISION RECORD

The New England Patriots own a 96-29 (.768) record in regular season AFC East games since the beginning of the 2001 season, compiling the best intra-division record of any team in the NFL.

PATRIOTS EXTEND NFL RECORD TO 93 STRAIGHT GAMES SCORING IN FIRST HALF

The Patriots have gone 93 straight games (regular season and postseason) scoring in the first half, to extend an NFL record, following WR Kendrick Bourne's 25-yard touchdown pass to WR Nelson Agholor in the first quarter. The Patriots also own the second-longest streak at 82 games with a first half score (2006-11). The last time the Patriots failed to score in the first half was a 16-0 loss at home against Buffalo on Oct. 2, 2016.

PATRIOTS RECEIVERS HAVE NOW COMPLETED THREE PASSES IN 2020

Kendrick Bourne's 25-yard touchdown pass to Nelson Agholor was the third pass completion by a Patriots wide receiver in 2021. Jakobi Meyers completed two passes vs. Tampa Bay on Oct. 3. The 2020 Patriots had four completions by wide receivers. The most passes completed by a New England team by non-quarterbacks was seven in 1981.

INDIVIDUAL NOTES

NICK FOLK CONNECTS ON HIS 300TH CAREER FIELD GOAL

Nick Folk became the 35th NFL player to reach 300 career field goals following his 39-yard field goal in the second quarter. He became the fifth active kicker to reach 300 career field goals, joining Robbie Gould (403), Mason Crosby (357), Matt Prater (333) and Justin Tucker (305).

FOLK MAKES THIRD 50-YARD FIELD GOAL OF THE 2021 SEASON

Folk connected on a 50-yard field goal in the third quarter. He made two 52-yard field goals at Houston on Oct. 10 and now has three 50-yard field goals for the season. Stephen Gostkowski (5 in 2013), (4 in 2017) and (4 in 2015) is the only New England player with more than two 50-yard field goals in a single season.



LAST GAME PATRIOTS VS. JETS

HUNTER HENRY HAS A TOUCHDOWN IN FOURTH STRAIGHT GAME

TE Hunter Henry caught a 1-yard touchdown pass from QB Mac Jones late in the second quarter and has now caught a touchdown pass in four straight games. He had a three-game stretch with touchdowns as a rookie in 2016 with the Chargers. The last New England tight end to register a stretch of four straight games with a touchdown reception was Rob Gronkowski in 2013. The Patriots record for most consecutive touchdowns by a tight end is Gronkowski with six games in 2011. The NFL record for most consecutive touchdowns receptions by a tight end is nine by Antonio Gates (2009-10).

WR KENDRICK BOURNE COMPLETES FIRST NFL PASS FOR A TOUCHDOWN

WR Kendrick Bourne completed his first NFL pass attempt for a 25-yard touchdown pass to WR Nelson Agholor in the first quarter, giving him a perfect passer rating of 158.3.

DB MYLES BRYANT REGISTERS FIRST NFL SACK; FORCED FIRST FUMBLE

DB Myles Bryant sacked Jets QB Zach Wilson for an 8-yard on a third-down play to force a punt on the Jets first offensive drive. He was the first career sack for Bryant. He forced a fumble on a tackle of Jets RB Michael Carter in the fourth quarter that was recovered by LB Josh Uche.

RB DAMIEN HARRIS HAS BACK-TO-BACK 100-YARD RUSHING GAMES

RB Damien Harris went over 100 yards rushing for the second straight week after finishing with 106 rushing yards on 14 carries for a 7.6-yard average. He is the first Patriots player with back-to-back games with 100 yards rushing since RB LeGarrett Blount had back-to-back 100-yard games in 2016 with 123 yards vs. Miami on Sept. 18 followed by a 105-yard effort vs. Houston on Sept. 22. It is his third 100-yard game of the 2021 season.

HARRIS HAS FIRST TWO-TOUCHDOWN GAME

Harris had his first career two-touchdown game after scoring on a 1-yard run in the first quarter and a 3-yard run in the fourth quarter.

HARRIS SETS FIRST HALF RUSHING HIGH

Harris set a personal best with 83 yards rushing on 8 carries in the first half. His previous first half-high was 79 yards on 11 carries in the 2021 season-opener vs. Miami (9/12).

HARRIS HAS 32-YARD RUN IN FIRST QUARTER

DL DANIEL EKUALE REGISTERS FIRST SACK WITH THE PATRIOTS; SECOND SACK OVERALL

DL Daniel Ekuale was elevated to the active roster and saw action in his first game with New England. He recorded his first sack with the Patriots and second sack overall in the NFL when he sacked QB Mike White for an 8-yard loss in the second quarter. He had his first sack at Minnesota on Dec. 6, 2020 while with the Jaguars.

DUGGER HAS A PICK IN SECOND STRAIGHT GAME

DB Kyle Dugger recorded an interception for the second straight game when he intercepted a Mike White pass in the third quarter. He had his first career pick a week earlier against Dallas.

J.J. TAYLOR GETS IN THE END ZONE TWO TIMES

RB J.J. Taylor scored his first two NFL touchdowns in the fourth quarter on a pair of 1-yard touchdown runs.

MAC JONES HAS FIRST 300-YARD GAME

QB Mac Jones had his first 300-yard passing game after finishing 24-of-36 for 307 yards with two touchdowns.

JACKSON PICKS OFF JETS FOR FOURTH STRAIGHT GAME

DB J.C. Jackson recorded an interception against the Jets for the fourth straight game with his third quarter pick. He is the first NFL player to record an interception against an opponent in four straight games since Baltimore's S Eric Weddle had four straight against Cleveland (2016-17).

FB JAKOB JOHNSON HAS FIRST RECEPTIONS OF THE SEASON

FB Jakob Johnson caught his first pass of the 2021 season on a 3-yard pass from Mac Jones in the second quarter. He caught a career-long 29-yard pass from Brian Hoyer in the fourth quarter. His previous long was a 12-yard pass vs. Baltimore on Nov. 15, 2020.

Under Kraft's leadership since he purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports.

Kraft has led the two most dominant decades in NFL history in terms of overall wins – 141 (2010-19) and 126 (2000-09).

Kraft is the most successful owner since he purchased the team in 1994 in terms of wins (334), division titles (19), winning percentage (.686), playoff wins (33) and playoff seasons (21).



Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. In his 27 seasons of ownership, he has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what many observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.238 pct.), the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (19), conference crowns (10) and Super Bowl championships (6) than any other NFL team. Additionally, the Patriots have achieved the most winning seasons (23) and are tied with Pittsburgh for the fewest losing seasons (3) since Kraft assumed ownership beginning in 1994. Super Bowl LIII was the 10th Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has appeared in more than four Super Bowls. In Kraft's 27 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 21 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons, and finished with a winning record 23 times.

A WINNING TRADITION I

KRAFT PASSES OTHER OWNERS

The Patriots have 334 wins overall under Robert Kraft. He has produced more victories than every other Patriots owner combined. Under Kraft, the Patriots are 334-153 overall since he purchased the team in 1994. Kraft's predecessors in the owner's office went 225-276-9 in the 34 years prior to his purchase of the team.

CONTINUITY BREEDS SUCCESS

New England is the first team in NFL history to win six Super Bowls with the same owner (Robert Kraft), head coach (Bill Belichick) and quarterback (Tom Brady).

PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 27 times in their 61-year history. Twenty-one of those playoff berths have come in the 27 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. The Patriots have won 22 division crowns, including 17 in the last 20 seasons and 19 of which have come since Robert Kraft's purchase in 1994.

- The New England Patriots are tied with the Pittsburgh Steelers for the most Super Bowl wins in the NFL with six.
- The Patriots have played in 11 Super Bowls, the most by any team in NFL history. Dallas, Denver and Pittsburgh have played in eight.
- The Patriots are third in NFL history with 15 Conference Championship Game appearances, one behind the 16 by Pittsburgh and San Francisco.
- The New England Patriots have 37 postseason victories, the most in NFL history. Pittsburgh is second with 36 playoff wins all-time.
- The New England Patriots earned seven No. 1 seeds, behind Denver (8) and San Francisco (9) since playoff seeding began in 1975.
- The Patriots earned a first-round playoff bye an NFL-best 14 times since the current playoff format was instituted in 1990. Pittsburgh and San Francisco are second with nine byes since 1990. New England is the only team in NFL history with nine straight first-round byes (2010-18).
- The Patriots have played in 58 postseason games, fourth-most in NFL history behind Dallas (63), Pittsburgh (62) and Green Bay (60).
- The Patriots need to play in two more postseason games in 2021 to become the fourth NFL team to play in 60 postseason games.
- The Patriots are second with 13 seasons of 12 wins since 1970, behind San Francisco's 14 seasons with 12 victories



- New England has won 13 games in a single season seven times in franchise history. Only San Francisco has more 13-win seasons with 10.
- The New England Patriots have won 14 or more games in a season five times, most in NFL history. San Francisco is second with four 14-win seasons.
- New England has 27 undefeated months since 2000, most in the NFL over that span. Indianapolis is second with 17 undefeated months during that time.
- The Patriots have 34 winning seasons since 1970, second all-time behind Pittsburgh's 37.
- The Patriots have 559 total victories, the fourth-most wins since 1960, behind the 571 wins by Pittsburgh and the 566 wins by Dallas and the 560 wins by Green Bay.
- New England has played in 997 games in franchise history (regular season and playoffs combined) and will play game No. 1,000 in Week 10. They will become the first original AFL team to play in 1,000 games.
- With rookie free agent K Quinn Nordin making the initial 53-man roster in 2021, the Patriots have now had a rookie free agent make the opening day roster for the 18th straight season, the third-longest streak in the NFL. The L.A. Chargers have had a rookie free agent make their opening day roster for 25 straight seasons and Indianapolis has had a rookie free agent make their opening day roster for 23 straight seasons.
- The Patriots have finished in the top 10 for fewest points allowed in each of the last nine seasons (2012-2020) and need to accomplish the feat in 2021 to tie Tampa Bay, who became the last team to reach 10 straight seasons (1996-2005) for the fewest points allowed.

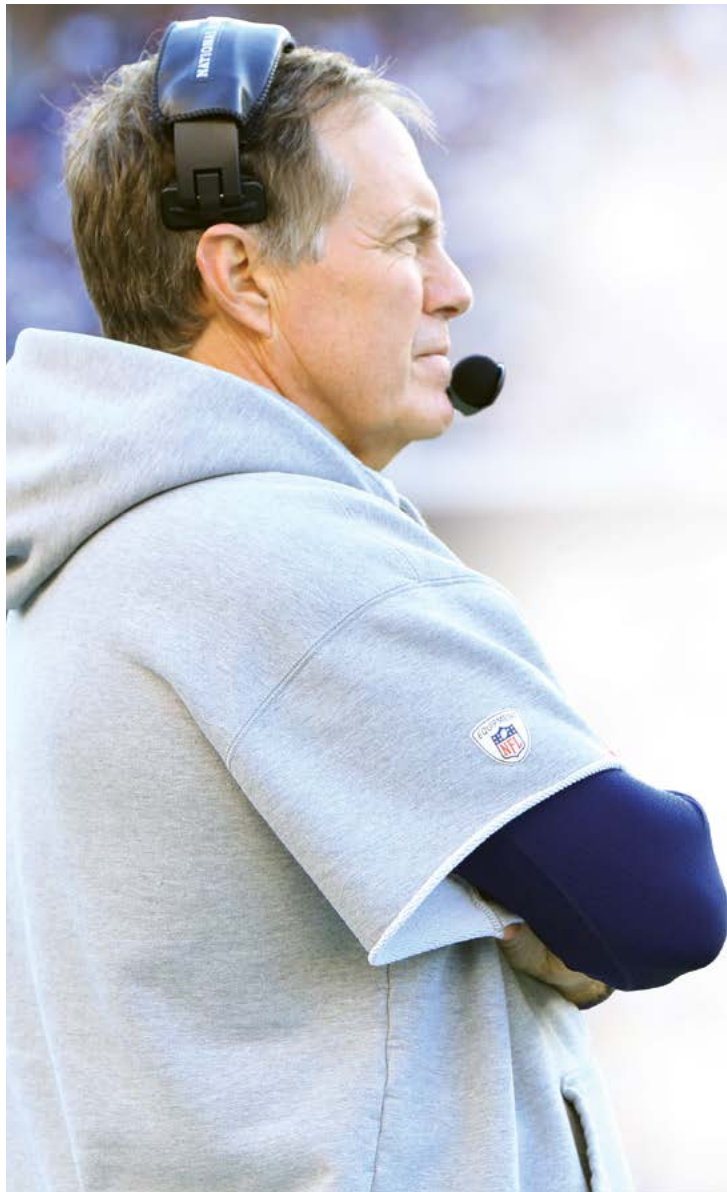

Bill Belichick is the only head coach in NFL history to win six Super Bowl titles. He won more games overall (141) during a 10-year stretch (2010-19) than any other coach in NFL history. In 2007, Belichick led the Patriots to the fourth undefeated and untied regular season in NFL history and the first since the NFL established a 16-game schedule in 1978. His 47 consecutive years as an NFL coach are most in NFL history, passing the 45 by Dick LeBeau. The only other NFL coach with at least 40 consecutive NFL coaching seasons is Tom Moore with 41.

The streak of 19 consecutive completions is the most by a rookie in at least the last 40 years.

Mac Jones tied Joe Burrow (135 completions in 2020) for the most completions by a rookie quarterback in his first five starts in NFL history.

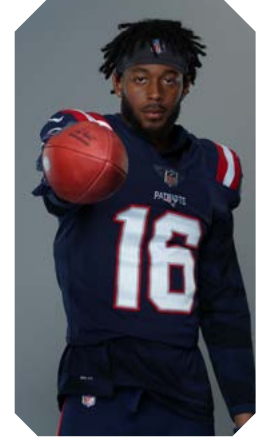

• WR Jakobi Meyers (126 receptions for 1,478 yards) has the most career receptions and receiving yards by any undrafted Patriots receiver that began his career with the team. His 59 receptions for 729 yards in 2020 were also the most in a single season by a rookie free agent that was originally signed by the team. He will look to add to that total during the 2021 season.



A SPECIAL BIRTHDAY PERFORMANCE

• Meyers set career highs on his 24th birthday (11/09/20) with 12 receptions for 169 yards in a win over the New York Jets. The 12 receptions were the most by a Patriot since Julian Edelman caught 13 passes at Miami on Dec. 15, 2013.

MEYERS MAKES HIS MARK

• Meyers has the most receptions and receiving yards for any undrafted player who signed with the Patriots as an undrafted free agent.

MEYERS USING HIS ARM

• Meyers threw two touchdown passes in 2020. He completed a 24-yard touchdown pass to RB Rex Burkhead vs. Baltimore (11/15) and a 19-yard touchdown pass to QB Cam Newton vs. N.Y. Jets (1/3). Overall, Patriots wide receivers completed four passes in 2020. WR Julian Edelman also completed two passes. The four pass completions by wide receivers are the most in team history. They have three so far in 2021.

MULTIPLE TDS FROM JAKOBI

• Meyers (two touchdown passes) became the third Patriots wide receiver to throw a touchdown pass under head coach Bill Belichick. David Patten threw a 60-yard touchdown pass on Oct. 21, 2001, at Indianapolis and WR Julian Edelman threw a 15-yard touchdown pass to WR Phillip Dorsett at Philadelphia on Nov. 17, 2019. Kendrick Bourne became the fourth to do so with a 25-yard touchdown to WR Nelson Agholor vs. N.Y. Jets on Oct. 24, 2021.

JAKOBI JOINS ELITE CLUB

• Meyers, who threw touchdown passes in Weeks 10 and 17 in 2020, became the fourth wide receiver with two touchdown passes in a single season in the Super Bowl era, joining Rod Gardner (2003), Antwaan Randle El (2010) and Odell Beckham Jr. (2018).

JAKOBI MEYERS COMPLETES TWO PASSES IN ONE GAME

• Meyers completed two passes vs. Tampa Bay on Oct. 3, 2021. He caught a backwards pass from QB Mac Jones and then threw across the field to RB Brandon Bolden, who managed a 15-yard gain in the second quarter. He completed a 30-yard pass to WR Nelson Agholor in the fourth quarter on a flea flicker. The only other wide receiver to complete two passes in single game for New England was Julian Edelman vs. Denver on Oct. 18, 2020. The only other non-quarterbacks to complete two passes in a game for New England were running backs – Dick Christy on Nov. 18, 1960 vs. Dallas Texans and Andy Johnson on Sept. 6, 1981 vs. Baltimore Colts.

• Meyers has completed 4-of-4 passes for 88 yards with two touchdown passes for a perfect 158.3 passer rating in his career.

• Jakobi Meyers and Cam Newton were teammates in 2020, but the wide receiver and former quarterback looked up to Newton and had a chance meeting with him while at an impressionable age. “When I was younger in high school, I made [Newton’s] 7-on-7 team – his all-star team – and we traveled to Florida to play in a league,” Meyers said. “We ended up losing, but it was still a great experience. It was a good experience to meet Cam when I was very young. A lot of guys where I come from look up to him, so that was definitely a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for me.”

A FAMOUS NAMESAKE

• A noted sports fan and basketball enthusiast, Shaq’s mother, Alicia McGuire, named her son Shaquille Olajuwon Mason in 1993 after her two favorite NBA stars at the time, Shaquille O’Neal and Hakeem Olajuwon. The Tennessee native had the opportunity to meet one of his namesakes at a Memphis Grizzlies game while O’Neal was a member of the Miami Heat, receiving a special meet-and-greet and having his jersey signed.

LB JA'WHAUN BENTLEY

2020 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- LB Ja'Whaun Bentley set single-season career-highs with 91 tackles and 1½ sacks in 2020.



Ja'Whaun and his family were homeless starting his freshman year of high school, living with one set of grandparents, then the other, then an aunt. Ja'Whaun and his brother slept on couches and floors at times over the course of several years. Once Ja'Whaun entered the NFL, he was able to secure permanent housing for his family.

LB JAMIE COLLINS SR.

PATH TO THE NFL

- The road to the NFL was anything but easy for linebacker and 2013 second-round draft pick Jamie Collins Sr. The youngest of five siblings growing up in Quentin, Miss., Collins Sr. lost both of his parents when he was six years old and was raised by one of his sisters. Collins Sr. turned to football as an outlet to help him through the tough times.
- "It means a lot. It's my living," Collins Sr. told the Boston Herald. "It kept me on track." Collins Sr.'s resiliency in dealing with adversity has made a lasting impact on fellow Mississippi native and former Patriots teammate Stevan Ridley, who grew up 30 miles west of Meadville in Natchez, Miss., and got to know Collins through a family friend.
- "What I've known about him, he really has been a strong person," Ridley told the Herald in 2013. "Anybody that's gone through the things that he's gone through and still finds a way to be successful on the football field, you have to be mentally tough. That's what he's kind of done as a teammate here. He's come in here and accepted his role and done a pretty good job as a rookie."

SACKS AND PICKS

- Since entering the NFL in 2013, Collins is the player in the NFL with at least 25 sacks and 10 interceptions. Collins has accumulated 25 ½ sacks and 11 picks during his career. He is the first player to accomplish the feat within his first 100 career games.

LB DONT'A HIGHTOWER

WINNER ON MULTIPLE LEVELS

- Dont'a Hightower (three Super Bowl championships and two national titles at Alabama) and Russell Maryland (two national championships at Miami and three Super Bowl Championships with Dallas) are the only two players in NFL history with at least two national championships and two Super Bowl wins.

MR. FEBRUARY

- Hightower has made two Super-Bowl altering plays during his career and was part of a record-setting performance in another. Head coach Bill Belichick referred to Hightower as "Mr. February" at the team's Super Bowl LIII ring ceremony.
- In Super Bowl XLIX vs. Seattle, Hightower made a crucial tackle on Seahawks RB Marshawn Lynch at the 1-yard line the play before CB Malcolm Butler intercepted Seattle QB Russell Wilson to seal the victory in the waning moments.
- New England trailed the Atlanta Falcons, 28-12, midway through the fourth quarter when Hightower strip-sacked Falcons QB Matt Ryan at the Atlanta 25-yard line. The fumble was recovered by the Patriots and the turnover led to a touchdown that helped spark the record comeback in Super Bowl LI.
- Led a defensive unit in the Super Bowl LIII win over the L.A. Rams (2/3/19). Hightower recorded two sacks and a pass defensed as part of a stifling defense that became the second team in Super Bowl history to hold its opponent to just three points.

DB J.C. JACKSON

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2021

- J.C. Jackson led the Patriots with nine interceptions in 2020. Asante Samuel set the team record for most interceptions in consecutive seasons with 16. Samuel picked off 10 passes in 2006 and six in 2007.
- Jackson has 20 interceptions since 2018, tied for the most in the NFL over that span with the Miami's Xavien Howard.
- Jackson led the NFL with 11 takeaways in 2020. From 2019-20, Jackson had a total of 16 takeaways, tied with Ron Hall (1963-64) and Asante Samuel (2006-07) for the best two-year total in New England. The Patriots record for most takeaways in a three-year span is 22 by Ron Hall (1964-66 - (20 interceptions in two fumble recoveries).



ACTION JACKSON

- J.C. Jackson is tied with Miami's Xavien Howard for the most interceptions since he entered the NFL as a rookie free agent in 2018 with a total of 20 interceptions. He has three games with two interceptions, most recently at the New York Jets on Sept. 19, 2021. Jackson led the NFL in 2020 with 11 total takeaways (nine interceptions and two fumble recoveries).

J.C. JACKSON HAS A PICK AGAINST JETS FOR FOURTH STRAIGHT GAME

J.C. Jackson registered his first interception of the 2021 season when he intercepted a Zach Wilson pass in the first quarter to give the Patriots a first down at the Jets 35-yard line at the NY Jets (9/19). It was his third straight pick against the Jets after intercepting a pass in both Jets games in 2020. He also picked off a pass in the second Jets game (10/24) for his fourth straight game against the Jets with a pick to join Baltimore's Eric Waddle, who had four interceptions against Cleveland (2016-17) as the last player to accomplish the feat.

JACKSON HAD TWO PICKS IN A GAME FOR THIRD TIME IN HIS CAREER

Jackson had a second pick later in the second quarter against the Jets (9/19). It is the third time in his career that he has had two interceptions in a game. He had two picks at Buffalo on Sept. 29, 2019 and two picks at Cincinnati on Dec. 15, 2019.

• LB Matt Judon had two sacks in a three-play sequence in the second quarter at Houston (10/10/21) to run his total to 6 ½ sacks for the season. It is the 8th time in his career that he has had a multi-sack game and second time in 2021. He had 2 ½ sacks vs. New Orleans on Sept. 26. His career-best is 3 sacks vs. Oakland on Nov. 25, 2018, when he played for Baltimore. His best season total is 9 ½ sacks in 2019. In 2020, DL Chase Winovich led the team with 5 ½ sacks.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2021

- Devin McCourty is sixth all-time in New England history with 35 total takeaways. He needs five total takeaways to join Raymond Clayborn (44), Fred Marion (42) and Ty Law (40) as the only players in team history with 40 total takeaways.
- McCourty enters 2021 tied with Ty Law for second-most Pro Bowl invitations as a Patriots defensive back with four. Only CB Mike Haynes (6) had more Pro Bowl nods as a Patriots defensive back.
- McCourty tied for fourth in the NFL with five interceptions in 2019, his third career season with five-plus interceptions. That mark tied Marcus Peters and Earl Thomas for most seasons with five-plus interception seasons since 2010. Additionally, McCourty's 28 regular season interceptions since he entered the league in 2010 are tied for the sixth-most in the NFL over that span.
- McCourty has played in 178 career regular season games. If he plays in all 16 games in 2021 he will have played in the 10th-most games in New England history.

2021 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- McCourty had his first pick of the season at the NY Jets (9/19) and moved into a tie for third place on the Patriots all-time interception list with Ron Hall, Roland James and Fred Marion with 29, behind Ty Law (36) and Raymond Clayborn (36).
- McCourty now has 515 interception return yards in his regular season career and became the third Patriot with 500 return yards at the NY Jets (9/19).

THE MOST IMPORTANT ABILITY IS AVAILABILITY

- McCourty has played the most defensive snaps since he entered the NFL in 2010 with 10,875 defensive snaps. Malcolm Jenkins (New Orleans and Philadelphia) is second with 10,788 defensive snaps.

McCOUR-TD

- McCourty has four career touchdowns following return of a blocked field goal for a touchdown at L.A. Chargers (12/6/20) and his 43-yard interception return for a touchdown at Seattle (9/20/20). McCourty also had an 84-yard interception return for a touchdown at Buffalo in 2018 and a 104-yard kickoff return vs. N.Y. Jets in 2012.

DOUBLE TROUBLE

- After being selected by the Patriots in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, Devin McCourty became part of a select group in league history. McCourty's identical twin brother, Jason, joined the Patriots in 2018 (now with Miami). The two became the 12th set of twins to play in the NFL. In the 2018 season opener, Devin and Jason became the first set of twins to play together on the same NFL team since 1926 when Gene and Tom Golsen suited up together for the Louisville Colonels.

- Devin became the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998-2000. His twin brother, Jason, played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 1999-2001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox.

IN GOOD COMPANY

- Devin McCourty earned Associated Press All-Pro Second Team honors at safety in 2013 and 2016. He also earned Second Team All-Pro Honors as a rookie in 2010 when he played cornerback. McCourty joined Pro Football Hall of Famers Rod Woodson and Ronnie Lott as the only NFL players to earn All-Pro honors at both safety and cornerback.

BROTHERS IN ARMS

- Devin and Jason McCourty have seen first-hand the effects of sickle cell disease. Both their aunt and uncle lived with the disease while their father carried the trait. Devin and Jason partnered with Embrace Kids Foundation to form their own "Tackle Sickle Cell" campaign aiming to educate the public, increase blood donations and raise money and awareness for the fight against sickle cell disease. Devin's work with the local Boston Children's Hospital has helped advance research of the disease with doctors now as close as they've ever been to a cure.

- "I'm one of the guys that when you ask me what position I play, I say 'defense.' I want to be able to line up everywhere, and most importantly, I want to be able to produce everywhere."



- Began his career in 2014 in San Diego focusing on special teams and was selected to his first Pro Bowl in 2018 as a special teamer.

- Started all 16 games at safety last year for the Patriots and led the team in tackles with a career-high 107.

- Of his 746 snaps last season, Phillips saw 473 snaps in the box and 163 snaps off the edges.

- Jake Bailey finished first in the NFL with 45.6 net yards per punt in 2020, a new single-season team record. The previous record was 41.5 by Zoltan Mesko in 2011. His gross punt average of 48.7 is also a team record, besting the 46.5 gross average by Mesko in 2011. His 45.6 net yards per punt is second all-time in NFL history in a single season to the 46.0 net average by Johnny Hekker in 2016 with the Rams.

DIMINISHING [PUNT] RETURNS

- Bailey's punting in 2020 allowed a total of just 71 punt return yards on 12 returns. It is the fewest punt return yards allowed by the Patriots in team history and the sixth-fewest punt return yards allowed in a season in NFL history. The 12 punt returns allowed are second in NFL history and team history to the 11 by New England in 2008.

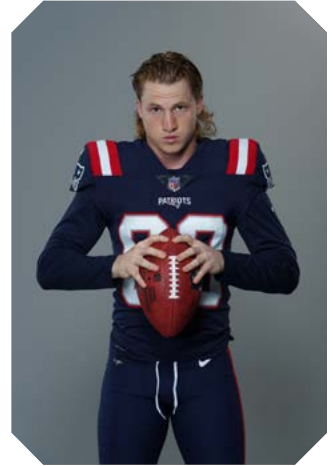
- Justin Bethel has reached double-digit special teams tackles in each of his nine NFL seasons, and will try to reach 10 straight in 2021. Bethel led the team with 14 special teams tackles in 2020.

WR GUNNER OLSZEWSKI

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2021

- Gunner Olszewski will attempt to become the first New England player to lead the NFL in two straight years in punt return average and the first NFL player to do so since Devin Hester led the NFL in 2010 and 2011.

- Olszewski will look to become the first NFL player to average 17.0-yards per punt return or more in back-to-back seasons. Devin Hester owns the best mark with a 17.1-yard average in 2010 followed by 16.2-yard average in 2011. He is currently third in the NFL with an 11.1-yard punt return average so far in 2021.



PUNT RETURN RECORD

- WR Gunner Olszewski finished first in the NFL with a 17.3-yard punt return average (20 returns for 346 yards and one touchdown) in 2020. It is the highest return average in Patriots history and the second-highest in the NFL since 1970. Julian Edelman had the highest average in a season at 15.5 in 2012. Olszewski is the fourth Patriots player to lead the league in punt return average. Danny Amendola led the NFL with a 12.0-yard average in 2015, Troy Brown led in 2001 with a 14.2-yard average and Irving Fryar tied for the NFL lead with a 14.1-yard average in 1985.

OLSZEWSKI SCORES FIRST NFL TD ON A PUNT RETURN

- WR Gunner Olszewski scored his first NFL touchdown on a 70-yard punt return at the L.A. Chargers on Dec. 6, 2020. It was the first punt return for a touchdown for New England since WR Julian Edelman returned a punt 84 yards vs. Denver on Nov. 2, 2014. Olszewski's return came on the heels of an 82-yard punt return for a touchdown that was called back due to a penalty in the previous game.

- Olszewski finished with 145 punt return yards in the win at the L.A. Chargers (12/6/20), the second-most ever by a Patriot in a single game.

GUNNER GOES LONG TWICE

- Olszewski scored on a 70-yard punt return touchdown and had a 61-yard return in the Patriots win at the L.A. Chargers on Dec. 6, 2020. He is the first player in Patriots history with two punt returns of at least 60 yards in a single game and the first NFL player to do so since Indianapolis RB Nyheim Hines had 84 and 71-yard punt return touchdowns vs. Carolina on Dec. 22, 2019. Before Olszewski, the two longest punt returns in a single game for the Patriots was Julian Edelman on Nov. 18, 2012, vs. Indianapolis with a 68-yard punt returned for a touchdown and a 49-yard return.

Olszewski scored his first touchdown reception on a career-long 38-yard pass in the win at the L.A. Chargers on Dec. 6, 2020. Olszewski joined Julian Edelman (vs. Denver in 2014 and vs. Indianapolis in 2012), Stanley Morgan (vs. Baltimore in 1979) and Irving Fryar (vs. Indianapolis in 1985) as the only Patriots with a punt returned touchdown and a touchdown reception in the same game.

WR MATTHEW SLATER

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2021

- Matthew Slater has earned an NFL record nine special teams Pro Bowl invitations and will look to add to that in 2021.
- Slater entered his 14th season with the Patriots in 2021, tied with Stephen Gostkowski, Bruce Armstrong and Steve Nelson for the fourth-most in team history, behind the 15 by Troy Brown and Julius Adams, the 16 by Steve Grogan and the 20 by Tom Brady.



Slater has played in 196 regular season games. If he plays in all 16 games in 2021 he will reach 205, the fourth-most in team history and will be one of five players to play in 200 regular season games for the Patriots.

2020 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Slater earned his ninth Pro Bowl invitation in 2020, extending his NFL record for most Pro Bowl selections as a special teamer. Slater is now tied with John Hannah (1976, 78-85) for second-most Pro Bowl selections as a Patriot with nine. Tom Brady holds the franchise record with 14.

Slater is one of 10 sons of Hall of Fame members to be drafted in NFL history.

Slater has earned nine Pro Bowl invitations (2011-17, 19-20) as a special teams player. He passed Steve Tasker (1987, 90-95) for the most special teams Pro Bowl honors in NFL history last year. Slater is also the only special teams player to earn seven consecutive Pro Bowls, which he did from 2011-17.



ALL-STAR COMBINATION

Slater was voted to the Pro Bowl for seven straight seasons from 2011-17 and two more from 2019-20. Those nine selections are two more than the seven that his father earned with the L.A. Rams. The Slater family's 16 combined Pro Bowls are the second-most among father-son contingents to have been voted to at least one Pro Bowl each.

ELECTED TEAM LEADER

Slater has been named to nine Pro Bowls (2011-17, 19-20) for his special teams work, but perhaps more revealing of his value to New England is the fact that he was elected a captain by his teammates for the 11th straight season in 2021.

The special teams ace shared what it means to be a captain with high school football players in a story published by *The Boston Globe*. "You have to be able to put others before yourself. Being a captain and leadership is about serving, and to me, that means a great deal of sacrifice – putting aside personal agendas for the greater common goal. Leadership is equated with sacrifice. I think you have to be willing to do whatever it takes for the unit to succeed. I think you need to lead by example. A lot of times, it's about what you do, not what you say."

SLATER'S EMERGENCE WAS SPECIAL

Bill Belichick acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eight-man rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there – fourth-and-short, where they're trying to protect the box – but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts."

SLATER'S SCORE

During a 2007 game against Arizona State, UCLA's Matthew Slater returned a kickoff 89 yards for the final touchdown of his collegiate career. In the Patriots 16-10 win over Buffalo on Sept. 29, 2019, DB J.C. Jackson blocked a punt, which Slater returned 11 yards for his first NFL touchdown, 12 seasons after his last touchdown.

LOCAL LINEAGE

Nick Folk's mother is a direct descendant of William Bradford, a founder, settler and long-time governor of the Plymouth Colony settlement. Bradford was also a passenger on the *Mayflower's* original voyage to America.

FOLK HERO

Folk kicked his second game-winning field goal as time expired in 2020, connecting on a 50-yard field goal against Arizona (11/29/20)

to give the Patriots a 20-17 win. He had a 51-yard game-winning field goal as time expired at the New York Jets on Nov. 9, 2020 to give the Patriots a 30-27 victory. He is the first NFL kicker with two game-winning field goals as time expired in a single season. Overall, he has three game-winning field goals as time expired. He also kicked a 53-yard field game-winning field goal as time expired at Buffalo on Oct. 8, 2007, when he was a rookie with the Dallas Cowboys.

FOLK DIGS THE LONG BALL

Folk's 50-yard game-winning field goal vs. Arizona (11/29/20) was the second-longest game-winning field goal with no time left in Patriots history, behind the 51-yarder he hit at N.Y. Jets (11/9). The previous long was 48 yards by Adam Vinatieri in Super Bowl XXXVI vs. the St. Louis Rams.

NICK FOLK SETS TEAM RECORD FOR CONSECUTIVE FIELD GOALS

K Nick Folk set the team record with 33 consecutive field goals after connecting on field goals of 46, 49, 32 and 26 yards at the New York (9/19/21) and extended that mark to 36 straight field with a 27-yarder vs. Tampa Bay before missing a 56-yarder in the fourth quarter. He passed Stephen Gostkowski, who connected on 31 straight field goals. After missing his first two field goals of the 2020 season, he kicked 36 straight field goals. Folk's previous longest streak was 23 straight field goals in 2013 when he played for the New York Jets. The NFL record is 44 straight field goals by Adam Vinatieri.

K Nick Folk drilled a 52-yard field goal in the second quarter and 52-yard field goal in the third quarter at Houston (10/10/21), his longest field goals as a member of the Patriots. He had a 51-yard field goal on Dec. 21, 2019 vs. Buffalo and a 51-yard field goal at the New York Jets on Nov. 9, 2020. His career-long is a 56-yard field goal on Oct. 17, 2010 at Denver when he played for the New York Jets.

FOLK HAS SECOND NFL GAME WITH TWO 50-YARD FIELD GOALS

Folk had his second NFL game with two 50-yard field goals at Houston (10/10/21) He had two 51-yard field goals on Nov. 18, 2012 t St. Louis as a member of the New York Jets.



FOLK BECOMES SECOND PATS PLAYER TO CONNECT ON TWO 50-YARD FIELD GOALS IN ONE GAME

Folk is the second Patriots player to have two 50-yard field goals in one game after he drilled two 52-yard field goals at Houston on Oct. 10, 2021. K Stephen Gostkowski accomplished the feat three times with the most recent happening against Oakland on Nov. 19, 2017 in Mexico City.

FOLK FINISHES 4-FOR-4 ON FIELD GOALS

Folk connected on all four field goals (52, 52, 32 and 21) at Houston on Oct. 10, 201 and was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week. It is the 11th time in his career that he has had at least four field goals in a game, his third as a member of the Patriots and his second time in 2021. He connected on four field goal at the NY Jets (9/19). He has connected on five field goals in a game twice.

PLAYOFF BERTHS UNDER KRAFT

New England has qualified for the playoffs 27 times in the team's 61-year history. The Patriots have earned 21 of those playoff berths in the 27 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994. New England has won 22 division crowns overall (21 AFC East crowns) and has qualified as a Wild Card team on four occasions (1976, '85, '94 and '98). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 as part of a 16-team tournament following a players' strike.



ANNUAL ACHIEVEMENT

SCORING FLURRY

- After the Patriots defense forced a three-and-out, a 42-yard Julian Edelman punt return gave New England possession at the Chicago 9-yard line, and Brady found Brandon LaFell for a 9-yard touchdown on the next play to give the Patriots a 31-7 lead with 1:07 left in the first half.
- On the Bears first play following the LaFell touchdown, Zach Moore forced a Jay Cutler fumble that was recovered by Rob Ninkovich and returned for a 15-yard touchdown that gave the Patriots a 38-7 Patriots lead with 55 seconds left in the first half.

COMEBACKS FOR THE AGES

The Patriots have staged two historic come-from-behind victories over the past several seasons:

Belichick coached the Patriots back from a 25-point deficit to win Super Bowl LI. A comeback of that magnitude is extremely rare. There had been 2,656 games in which a team led by 25 points or more in NFL history, including the postseason. Teams leading by 25 had recorded 2,647 wins, seven losses and two ties, a winning percentage of .997.

New England came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos, 34-31, in overtime in a Sunday Night Football matchup on Nov. 24, 2013, marking the largest regular season comeback win in team history, after trailing 24-0 at halftime.

New England's previous best comeback win was from a 23-0 deficit to win, 38-23, vs. Seattle (09/16/84). The Patriots also came back from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, 23-22 (12/21/96). The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently vs. Buffalo (01/01/12).
