In one of the most dramatic eras of ownership in professional sports, Jerry Jones' stewardship of the Dallas Cowboys has brought unprecedented results and success to one of the world's most popular sports entities. His more than three-decade long journey reached a rare pinnacle with his induction into the Pro Football Hall of Fame as a member of the 2017 class of enshrinees, as Jones became just the 15th owner in history to earn a bust in Canton.

Aside from being one of just three current owners to guide their franchises to at least three Super Bowl titles, Jones' efforts and innovations in the areas of sports marketing, promotion, broadcasting, team operations and the development of AT&T Stadium and The Star have created a vivid imprint on the landscape of the NFL, the professional sports business equation, fan engagement and the American sports culture.

On the heels of his Hall of Fame selection, Jones was selected as one of the 100 Greatest Living Business Minds in commemoration of *Forbes* magazine's 100th year anniversary in 2017. In that same year, he was also recognized for his career contributions to sports in America by being named the 2017 recipient of the Sports Business Journal's Lifetime Achievement Award. Prior to his enshrinement in Canton, USA Today designated Jones as No. 1 on its list of the 100 Most Important People in the NFL in July of 2016.

In 2023 *Forbes* magazine and leading sports business media platform *Sportico* both recognized the Cowboys as the most valuable sports franchise in the world and the first to be valued at over \$9 billion (\$9.2B).

Highlighted by Super Bowl victories following the 1992, 1993 and 1995 seasons, Jones became the first owner in NFL history to lead his team to three league championships in his first seven years of ownership. In 1995 Dallas also became the first team in NFL history to win three Super Bowls in four seasons while tying the then NFL record for most Super Bowl victories by an organization with five.

The first decade of Jones' ownership closed with eight playoff appearances, six division titles, four conference championship game appearances and three world crowns as the Cowboys were named the NFL's Team of the 1990s. More recently, the Cowboys have won NFC East Division titles in 2007, 2009, 2014, 2016, 2018, 2021 and 2023, while the '23 club secured the 18th playoff appearance in Jones' 35 years of leadership. Dallas also established the club record for regular season wins (13) in 1992 and equaled that mark with 13 victories in 2007 and 2016.

Following the 2014 season, a year when the Cowboys posted a 12-4 record and won a home playoff game, Jones was named the NFL Executive of the Year by the Pro Football Writers Association of America.

Along with the success of the Cowboys on the field, Jones' vision and leadership provided the driving influence behind the concept, design and construction of AT&T Stadium in Arlington, Texas - a venue that is recognized internationally as perhaps the most spectacular and state-of-the-art sports stadium in the world.

Opened to the public in May 2009, the stadium's dramatic first season of operation resulted in the ven-

ue being named the Sports Facility of the Year by the Sports Business Journal. Along with that achievement for the team's new home, Jones was also named the 2009 Sports Executive of the Year by the SBJ.

The 100,000-plus capacity stadium set the attendance record for an NFL regular season game as 105,121 witnessed the Sept. 20, 2009 home opener, while the 108,713 who attended the NBA All-Star Game in 2010 became the largest crowd to witness a basketball game in the history of the sport. On May 8, 2021, the championship boxing match featuring Canelo Alvarez and Billy Joe Saunders drew 73,126 spectators to AT&T Stadium, marking the largest indoor crowd to ever witness a prizefight in U.S. history.

During the pandemic season of 2020, the Cowboys and AT&T Stadium safely hosted the most fans for NFL games throughout the league with a total attendance figure of 219,021 fans for Dallas' eight home games, an average of 27,378 per game.

In over 14 years of operation, more than 14 million fans have attended events that included high school and collegiate football, major college basketball, international soccer, professional bull riding, Supercross, world championship boxing and concerts featuring world-renowned recording artists. More than 6.5 million visitors have passed through the 12-story high doors of the stadium for daily public tours of the venue.

With its architectural versatility and cutting-edge media capabilities, AT&T Stadium has become a visible beacon establishing North Texas as a focal point on the sports and entertainment canvas of North America.

The brilliant home of the Cowboys is a powerful catalyst in attracting a wide range of national and international events that will define the future of the region for generations to come. The stadium has already played host to Super Bowl XLV (February 2011), the NCAA Final Four in men's basketball (April 2014), the inaugural College Football Playoff Championship Game (January 2015), the Big 12 Championship game and the Cotton Bowl Classic, and in 2018 became the first NFL stadium to host the NFL Draft. AT&T Stadium also remains the only venue in the world to host an NBA All-Star Game, a Super Bowl, the Men's NCAA Final Four and the College Football Playoff Championship Game. Most recently, the city of Dallas was named one-of-16 host cities for FIFA World Cup 2026, with a tournament-high nine international soccer matches to be played at AT&T Stadium, and the stadium will once again host the NCAA Men's Final Four in 2030.

Jones recently turned his football development and marketing expertise to the World Headquarters and training facility of the Dallas Cowboys, as The Star in Frisco, Texas opened its doors for operation in the summer of 2016. Located in a rapidly growing community of more than 200,000 residents, The Star is a partnership with the City of Frisco and The Frisco Independent School District that places a strong focus on inspiring a solid future for high school football, youth sports and the next generation of players and fans by uniquely engaging them at the place where the Cowboys live, work and practice.

The Star is the only NFL training facility that is shared with a public high school athletic program. All

12 Frisco ISD high schools play sporting events in Ford Center at The Star, a state-of-the-art, 510,000-square-foot indoor athletic facility. With a capacity of 12,000 seats, Ford Center hosts a variety of events in addition to football games, such as concerts, collegiate basketball, professional boxing, soccer matches and meetings, to name a few. The Star and Ford Center have also been home to the Academy of Country Music Awards show and events from 2023-24, "Country Music's Party of the Year," celebrating the industry and honoring the top recording stars, songwriters and legends.

The Star includes a 91-acre mixed-use development located on the Dallas Tollway. In addition to the team's headquarters, the project is a vibrant destination that features shopping, dining, nightlife, athletics, fitness, event, hotel and residential options.

Since he took over as general manager in 1989, 46 different players drafted by Dallas have gone on to appear in a combined total of 150 Pro Bowls as Cowboys - 50 players and 166 Pro Bowls, including selections after leaving Dallas. Dallas has also signed 18 free agent players who have made 43 Pro Bowls while representing the Cowboys. Additionally, Dallas traded for three different players who made five Pro Bowls. Since 1989 the Cowboys have made 169 trades, the most celebrated of which was the 1989 deal that sent Herschel Walker to the Minnesota Vikings and provided the personnel foundation for three Super Bowl titles.

His recent efforts to stock the Dallas roster have resulted in some of the NFL's most productive drafts in recent history. Over the last decade, Dallas has selected 15 players who have become Pro Bowlers: Zack Martin and DeMarcus Lawrence (2014), Byron Jones (2015), Ezekiel Elliott, Jaylon Smith and Dak Prescott (2016), Leighton Vander Esch (2018), Tony Pollard (2019), Tyler Biadasz, Trevon Diggs and CeeDee Lamb (2020), Micah Parsons (2021) and DaRon Bland, Jake Ferguson and Tyler Smith (2022). The 15 Pro Bowl draft picks are the most by any team over that span, and that group has gone on to earn a combined total of 35 Pro Bowl selections. Since 2010, Dallas has drafted nine players who have also been named to at least one All-Pro team since their selection - most in the NFL.

The foundation for the future success of the team has been secured through savvy draft maneuvers and key free agent acquisitions, starting up front on the offensive line. Martin earned his ninth Pro Bowl following the 2023 season and was joined by Tyler Smith, who earned his first Pro Bowl nod. Prescott and Elliott - Dallas' duo of young offensive backfield weapons - became the first pair of Cowboys rookies to ever be selected to the Pro Bowl in 2016. Prescott opened his career by becoming the first rookie quarterback in Cowboys history to be named to the Pro Bowl and the first to win AP Offensive Rookie of the Year, while Elliott won NFL rushing titles in two (2016 and 2018) of his first three years in the League. Prescott was also named the NFL's Walter Payton Man of the Year for 2022, becoming the fourth Cowboy to earn that special recognition (Troy Aikman, Roger Staubach, Jason Witten). Lamb is another in the line of great Cowboys receivers to don the famed number 88 jersey, establishing a team rookie record with 74 catches in his first season, then surpassing the 1,000-yard mark in his second year before becoming the only Cowboys receiver with multiple 100-catch campaigns, eventually establishing a franchise record with 135 catches and 1,749 receiving yards in 2023.

Defensively, Diggs, Parsons and Bland anchor an ascending young group of players. Diggs tied the club record with 11 interceptions in 2021, while Parsons earned AP Defensive Rookie of the Year honors by establishing a Cowboys rookie record with 13.0 sacks and followed that up with 13.5 sacks in 2022 and a second straight AP first-team All-Pro selection - the first Cowboys defender to earn first-team All-Pro honors in each of his first two seasons and only the second NFL defender since the 1970 Merger, joining Lawrence

Taylor in 1981-82. Parsons finished his third season with 14.0 sacks in 2023, becoming the second NFL player since 1982 with at least 12.0 sacks in each of his first three seasons, joining Hall of Famer Reggie White. Bland set an NFL-record with five pick-sixes in his second pro season and led all defenders with nine interceptions in 2023, providing another ball-hawking, first-team All-Pro defender.

In selecting the on-the-field leadership for the Cowboys, Jones hired a pair of coaches who won a combined three Super Bowls in Dallas: Jimmy Johnson (1992-1993) and Barry Switzer (1995). Chan Gailey followed with a division title and playoff appearances from 1998-99. In 2003 Jones successfully recruited two-time Super Bowl winner Bill Parcells to Dallas, and Parcells led the team to three winning seasons and two playoff trips in four years. In February 2007, Jones added another successful NFL head coach in Wade Phillips, who guided the club to a pair of division titles in his first three years (2007 and 2009) and a playoff victory in 2009.

In 2011 Jones named Jason Garrett as the team's eighth head coach after the former Cowboys quarterback guided the club to a 5-3 record as the interim coach in the second half of the 2010 season. Garrett added three division titles in 2014, 2016 and 2018, and his 79 career wins represent the second-most victories by a head coach in club history. In 2020 Jones hired Super Bowl XLV winning head coach Mike McCarthy as the newest head coach of the Dallas Cowboys, marking the fourth coach that Jones has selected who had either previously won a Super Bowl or would go on to lead the Cowboys to a world championship. In four seasons, McCarthy has led the Cowboys to three consecutive 12-win campaigns, two division titles and three playoff appearances in consecutive years - both firsts since the 1992-95 Cowboys teams.

In the last 44 years, 39 different owners have entered the NFL. Of that group, only Jerry Jones, former Denver Broncos owner Pat Bowlen, Clark Hunt (Kansas City) and Robert Kraft (New England) have guided their franchises to more than two Super Bowl championships. Moreover, Jones joins Art Rooney, Jack Kent Cooke, Al Davis, Eddie DeBartolo, Kraft, Bowlen and Hunt as the only men to win at least three Super Bowls as NFL owners.

On the league front, Jones actively contributes his vision and enthusiasm to enhancing the NFL's status as the world's premier professional sports league by serving on a wide range of league committees. In his 35-year career, Jones has worked on 15 different NFL ownership committees for a combined total of 136 years. As a member of the Management Council Executive Committee, he was very involved in the 2011 and 2020 labor negotiations that resulted in the most recent Collective Bargaining Agreement between the NFL and its players. In addition to the CEC, Jones is currently the Chairman of the NFL Media O&O Committee, Chairman of the Pro Football Hall of Fame Committee and is a member of the NFL Media Committee. Jones also served on the committee that was charged with overseeing the search for a successor to retired NFL Commissioner Paul Tagliabue, a process that successfully landed current NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell in September 2006. In addition, Jones has served two prior terms as a member of the NFL's Competition Committee as well as prior stints on the Business Ventures Committee and the Health and Safety Committee.

His contributions and innovations in the areas of marketing, corporate sponsorships, television, stadium management, stadium development, labor negotiations and community service have made a visible imprint on the ever-evolving face of professional sports in America. Since becoming involved with the Cowboys, Jones' accomplishments have been recognized through his induction into the Boys & Girls Clubs of America Hall of Fame, the Texas Sports Hall of Fame (2007), the Texas Business Hall of Fame (2005), the Arkansas Sports Hall

of Fame (1999) and the Missouri Sports Hall of Fame (1998). In July 2012, Jones was recognized with the Lifetime Achievement Award by the Arkansas Sports-casters and Sportswriters Hall of Fame. In August 2007, he served as the presenter for Michael Irvin's induction into the Pro Football Hall of Fame, a recognition he was also named by Emmitt Smith in Canton in August 2010, Larry Allen in 2013, Gil Brandt in 2019 and DeMarcus Ware in 2023. Jones was also selected for induction into the Cotton Bowl Hall of Fame in 2020.

In April 2014 Jones received the prestigious Horatio Alger Award in Washington, D.C. and was inducted as a lifetime member into the Horatio Alger Association of Distinguished Americans. In May 2014, Jones was also recognized with the Lifetime Achievement Award presented by Pop Warner Little Scholars, Inc. On October 3, 2013, Jones was inducted into the National Football Foundation's Leadership Hall of Fame, an award which celebrates leadership of a lifetime of success on the field, in the boardroom and in the community. In 2017 Jones was honored with the SEAL Legacy Award. In 2018 he was inducted into the North Texas Commercial Association of Realtors Hall of Fame for his contributions to the Dallas-Fort Worth real estate landscape with the construction of AT&T Stadium and The Star. Also in 2018, Jones was given the Governor's EMMY for long-time contributions to Texas television broadcasting by the Lone Star Chapter of the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences.

In 2022, Jones was honored as an MD Anderson Living Legend, and earned the Walter Camp Football Foundation's "Distinguished American" award.

As a co-captain of the 1964 National Championship Arkansas Razorbacks, Jones is one of a small number of NFL owners who actually earned a significant level of success as a football player. He is the only man in the history of the NFL to play for a collegiate national championship football team and own a Super Bowl winner. In addition, Jones and the legendary George Halas are the only two men to become NFL owners after playing in a major college football bowl game. His current ties to the college game include membership on the Board of Directors for the National Football Foundation and College Football Hall of Fame.

A man of varied interests who will not rest on yesterday's achievements, he is a dedicated businessman and family man, sharing a vivid enthusiasm for both. Although Jones and his family are very involved in numerous civic and charitable causes, the Joneses have left an indelible local and national impression on the philanthropic landscape with their love and dedication to The Salvation Army.

For the past 27 seasons, the Jones family has dedicated the Cowboys Thanksgiving Day halftime show as a national showcase to kick off The Salvation Army's annual Red Kettle Campaign. Through the donation of national television airtime, the event has created a holiday tradition while helping to increase donations to The Salvation Army's annual fundraising efforts by more than \$3.67 billion dollars. Reba McEntire, Destiny's Child, Sheryl Crow, Carrie Underwood and Kenny Chesney are just a few of the distinguished artists who have provided entertainment for the holiday extravaganza.

The Salvation Army points to the annual Cowboys kickoff event as one of the most effective, creative and important innovations that has been developed in the long and storied history of the organization.

The Joneses received the Evangeline Booth Award in 1999, one of The Army's highest national community service awards, and have been selected for membership into the prestigious Salvation Army William Booth Society. Jerry and his wife, Gene, were also named to The Army's National Advisory Board in April 1998 shortly after being named the organization's Partners of the Year in 1997. In April 2007, the Joneses served as the honorary chairpersons for The Salvation Army's National Advisory Organizations Conference (NAOC) that was held in Dallas.

For 10 years, Gene and Jerry Jones served as hosts and underwrote the costs for the Super Lunch, a fundraising event for The Salvation Army Irving Corps Community Center. In 1998 the Gene and Jerry Jones Family Center for Children opened in conjunction with The Army.

As part of the Jones Family and the Dallas Cowboys commitment to Arlington, Texas, the home of the club's stadium, Gene and Jerry Jones Family Charities will donate a total of \$16.5 million to non-profit organizations serving youth in Arlington from 2009-2041.

In 2001 the Joneses were awarded the Chairman's Award by The Boys & Girls Clubs of America. In June 2002, Gene and Jerry Jones were recognized as the recipients of the Children's Champion Award for Philanthropy that was presented by the Dallas for Children organization. In 2003 the Family Gateway organization of Dallas presented Gene and Jerry with the Annette G. Strauss Humanitarian Award. In April 2005, Gene and Jerry were recipients of the Hope Award, the highest community service recognition awarded by the Lone Star Chapter of the National Multiple Sclerosis Society. In 2010 the Jones Family and the Cowboys were selected by The Boys & Girls Clubs of America to receive the prestigious Chairman's Award that recognized the Cowboys long and dedicated history of support.

The Jones family has been very involved with several other community-related organizations, including Children's Medical Center of Dallas, Happy Hill Farm Academy/Home, the National Board for The Boys & Girls Clubs of America, the Kent Waldrep Paralysis Foundation, The Rise School of Dallas, The Family Place and The Family Gateway. In 2010 the Jones family endowed the North Texas Youth Education Town with a \$1 million grant. Created as a lasting legacy of Super Bowl XLV, the North Texas YET is administered by The Salvation Army and provides North Texas youth with education, mentoring, fitness and character enrichment programs. In May of 2019, ground was broken on the Gene and Jerry Jones Family Hope Lodge in recognition of their lead gift on a project associated with the American Cancer Society that will provide housing to families of cancer patients on property located adjacent to the Baylor University Medical Center campus in Dallas.

In March 2021, the Jones family made a historic \$20 million gift to the National Medal of Honor Museum Foundation. As Co-Chairs of the Foundation's National Leadership Council, Gene and Jerry Jones are actively engaged in leading the capital campaign to design and construct the National Medal of Honor Museum and Leadership Institute in Arlington, Texas, and the National Medal of Honor Monument in Washington, D.C. Together, these national treasures will stand in enduring recognition of the American heroes who have received our country's highest recognition for valor in combat - The Medal of Honor.

Jerry (10/13/42) and Gene live in Dallas. They have three children, Stephen, Charlotte and Jerry Jr., nine grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Stephen is a graduate of the University of Arkansas and serves as the Cowboys Chief Operating Officer/Co-Owner. Charlotte is a Stanford graduate and serves as the Cowboys Chief Brand Office/Co-Owner. Jerry Jr., a graduate of Georgetown University, who earned his law degree from Southern Methodist University, is the Cowboys Chief Sales and Marketing Officer/Co-Owner.

Jerry Jones graduated from Arkansas in 1965 with a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration, and earned a Master of Arts degree from the university that same year.

February 25, 1989 – Jones purchases the Dallas Cowboys and the lease to manage Texas Stadium from H.R. "Bum" Bright. Jerry Jones names Jimmy Johnson as the new head coach.

April 20, 1989 – Jones completes negotiations on Troy Aikman's contract – a six-year deal that is completed four days before Aikman is the top overall selection in the 1989 NFL Draft.

October 12, 1989 – Herschel Walker is traded to Minnesota for five players, six conditional draft choices and a 1992 first round draft choice. Among the players who actually came to Dallas as a result of the trade include Emmitt Smith, Russell Maryland, Kevin Smith and Darren Woodson.

August 10, 1990 – The Cowboys first-ever in-state training camp concludes at St. Edward's University in Austin. Over 100,000 fans attend workouts, while more than 400 media credentials are issued. Austin officials estimate the camp brought an additional \$3.2 million of income into the Austin area.

September 5, 1990 – The Cowboys trade Steve Walsh to the New Orleans Saints for a first and third round draft choice in 1991 and a conditional second round pick in 1992.

April 19, 1991 – A deal is made to bring the first overall selection in the 1991 NFL Draft to Dallas in exchange for a first and second round selection and three veteran players. Dallas selected Outland Trophy winner Russell Maryland with the top pick.

April 21-22, 1991 – In an unprecedented action among NFL clubs, Dallas signs their top three draft picks on draft day, also drafting a club-record 17 players.

July 16, 1991 – The Cowboys open training camp in Austin with all 17 of their draft choices under contract. Dallas concludes its second training camp at St. Edward's University with over 75,000 fans attending the Cowboys practices.

November 24, 1991 – The Cowboys end Washington's 1991 undefeated streak at 11 games with a 24-21 victory at RFK Stadium.

December 15, 1991 – Dallas defeats Philadelphia, 25-13, at Veterans Stadium to secure a wild card playoff spot. The victory marks the team's first trip to the playoffs since 1985.

December 22, 1991 – Dallas closes the 1991 season with a 31-27 win over Atlanta, marking the team's best record (11-5) since 1983.

January 5, 1992 – Dallas defeats Chicago by a 17-13 score in an opening round playoff game at Soldier Field. The victory marks the Cowboys first playoff win since 1982.

May 1, 1992 – Jerry Jones is appointed to the NFL's Competition Committee by Commissioner Paul Tagliabue. Jones becomes the first owner to serve on the prestigious committee since the death of Cincinnati's Paul Brown.

December 21, 1992 – Before a national television audience on ABC's Monday Night Football, the Cowboys defeat the Atlanta Falcons (41-17) at the Georgia Dome to claim the NFC Eastern Division Championship. The victory marks the Cowboys first divisional title since 1985. It is the 14th divisional title in club history.

December 23, 1992 – Six players from the Cowboys offense are selected to play in the Pro Bowl. The six players establish a Dallas Cowboys record for most offensive players selected to the Pro Bowl.

December 27, 1992 – Dallas defeats Chicago by a 27-14 score at Texas Stadium. The victory is the 13th of the year for Dallas, establishing a club record for wins in a season. Emmitt Smith finishes the season with 1,713 rushing yards, becoming the first player to win back-to-back NFL rushing titles since Eric Dickerson (1983-84).

December, 1992 – The Cowboys set a team record for road attendance by averaging 72,523 fans-per-road game. The team also played before a sold-out stadium in all 16 regular season games.

January 10, 1993 – In their first home playoff game since 1983, Dallas hands NFC East rival Philadelphia a 34-10 defeat in an NFC Divisional Playoff Game.

January 17, 1993 – In their first NFC Championship Game since 1982, the Cowboys defeat San Francisco by a 30-20 score at Candlestick Park. The victory sends Dallas to Super Bowl XXVII in Pasadena, marking the Cowboys first Super Bowl trip since 1978.

January 31, 1993 – While making an NFL-record sixth Super Bowl appearance, the Cowboys defeat Buffalo 52-17 in Super Bowl XXVII at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena. Troy Aikman was named the game's MVP after throwing four touchdown passes. The Super Bowl crowd of 98,374 becomes the largest crowd to ever witness a Cowboys game. The game was witnessed by 133.4 million television viewers, making Super Bowl XXVII the most watched event in television history.

March 5, 1993 – The Super Bowl Champion Dallas Cowboys become the first athletic team to visit the White House under President Bill Clinton's administration. The visit to the White House is the first in club history.

December 28, 1993 – An NFL-record 11 Dallas players are selected to the Pro Bowl. That group includes a club-record eight offensive selections (seven Pro Bowl starters).

January 2, 1994 – The Cowboys defeat the N.Y. Giants 16-13 in overtime at the Meadowlands. The win clinches the Cowboys second straight NFC East title and the 15th division crown in club history.

January 2, 1994 – Emmitt Smith finishes the season with 1,486 yards to earn his third straight NFL rushing crown. He becomes just the fourth man in NFL history to win three consecutive rushing titles. He is also named Associated Press NFL Player of the Year, the first Cowboy so honored.

January 23, 1994 – Dallas defeats San Francisco 38-21 in the NFC Championship Game at Texas Stadium. The victory gives the Cowboys an NFL-record seventh conference championship in the first conference title game to be played at Texas Stadium since Jan. 1, 1978.

January 30, 1994 – Dallas becomes one of just three NFL teams to win four Super Bowls by defeating Buffalo (30-13) in Super Bowl XXVIII at the Georgia Dome in Atlanta. The victory enables the Cowboys to become the only franchise in NFL history to win more than one Super Bowl under two different owners. The game featured two rushing touchdowns by Super Bowl MVP Emmitt Smith.

March 30, 1994 – Barry Switzer is named the head coach of the Dallas Cowboys – and the third head coach in team history. Switzer replaces Jimmy Johnson, who stepped down as the Cowboys head coach the previous day.

December, 1994 – For the second straight season, the Cowboys send a club and NFC-record 11 players to the Pro Bowl.

January, 1995 – The Cowboys set a Texas Stadium record for home attendance with an average crowd of 64,579, the first time Dallas has averaged over 64,000 fans-per-game at Texas Stadium. The previous record was 63,943 set in 1981.

January 15, 1995 – The Cowboys play in their third NFC Championship Game of the decade. The Cowboys are the only NFL team to play in multiple conference championship games in each decade of the team's existence.

December 24, 1995 – Dallas wraps up its fourth straight NFC Eastern Division title – a feat no other NFC East team had accomplished other than the Cowboys teams from 1976 to 1979.

December 25, 1995 – Emmitt Smith closes the season with a team-record 1,773 rushing yards and an NFL-record 25 rushing scores. Smith led the NFL in rushing for the fourth time in five years, becoming the fifth player in NFL history to win at least four rushing titles.

December, 1995 – Ten Cowboys are selected to the NFC Pro Bowl squad. Since 1993 Dallas has earned 32 Pro Bowl selections – the most ever by one team over a three-year period.

January 14, 1996 – The Cowboys win an NFL record eighth conference championship game by defeating the Green Bay Packers 38-27 at Texas Stadium. The victory marked the Cowboys third NFC title in four years.

January 28, 1996 – Dallas becomes the first team in NFL history to win three Super Bowls in a four-year period by defeating the Pittsburgh Steelers 27-17 in Super Bowl XXX at Sun Devil Stadium in Tempe, Ariz. The game is witnessed by 138.4 million television viewers, making Super Bowl XXX the most watched event in television history. The victory enables Dallas to earn its fifth Super Bowl title – joining the San Francisco 49ers as the second NFL franchise to win five Super Bowls. Dallas also became the first NFL franchise to win Super Bowls with three different head coaches.

December 15, 1996 – The Cowboys clinch a fifth straight division title with a 12-6 win over the New England Patriots at Texas Stadium. The championship enables the Cowboys to become the first team in NFL history to win five straight NFC Eastern Division crowns.

January 5, 1997 – Dallas closes the postseason with a divisional playoff loss at Carolina. The loss marks the first time since the 1991 season that the Cowboys were unable to reach the NFC title game.

December, 1997 – The Cowboys close the 1997 season with a 6-10 record, marking the team's first non-playoff season since 1990.

February 12, 1998 – Jerry Jones names Chan Gailey as the fourth head coach in the history of the Dallas Cowboys franchise. Gailey, who had previously served as the Pittsburgh Steelers offensive coordinator, replaces Barry Switzer, who resigned on January 9.

July 15, 1998 – The Cowboys open training camp at Midwestern State University in Wichita Falls, Texas. Attendance figures for the four-week camp exceed 100,000.

November 8, 1998 – With 163 yards on 29 carries in a 16-6 win over the New York Giants, Emmitt Smith becomes the Dallas Cowboys all-time leading rusher. Smith's performance against New York pushes him past Tony Dorsett (12,036).

December 20, 1998 – After a one-year absence from postseason play, the Cowboys clinch their sixth NFC Eastern Division title in the last seven years with a 13-9 win over Philadelphia at Texas Stadium. The 1998 division crown is the 19th division championship (15th NFC East title) in the club's 39-year history.

December 27, 1998 – After scoring a first half touchdown on a one-yard run against Washington at

Texas Stadium, Emmitt Smith becomes the NFL's all-time leader in rushing touchdowns, moving ahead of Marcus Allen (123). Smith would later add a 26-yard touchdown run in the second quarter to bring his league record total to 125 by season's end. The Cowboys closed the year with a 23-7 victory over Washington and a 10-6 record, enabling Dallas to become the first team in the history of the NFC East to post an 8-0 record in division play.

December 24, 1999 – The Dallas Cowboys NFL-record of consecutive games in front of sold out stadiums came to an end in a Christmas Eve game against the New Orleans Saints in the Louisiana Superdome. The streak, which included home and away games, came to a halt after 160 games. It began on Dec. 23, 1990 at Philadelphia's Veterans Stadium and included 79 straight sell-outs at Texas Stadium (including playoffs) and 81 straight sell-outs on the road (including playoffs).

January 2, 2000 – The Cowboys close the century as the NFL's most successful team in the decade of the 1990s. From 1990 to 1999, Dallas qualified for the playoffs eight times, won six division titles, made four trips to the conference championship game and won three Super Bowls. The 1999 season ends with an 8-8 regular season record and a wild card playoff loss at Minnesota on Jan. 9, 2000.

January 26, 2000 – Jerry Jones names Cowboys defensive coordinator Dave Campo as the fifth head coach in franchise history. Campo was an assistant coach for the previous 11 years and was the defensive coordinator for the 1995 team that won Super Bowl XXX.

August 27, 2001 – Dallas defeats Oakland in a preseason American Bowl game in Mexico City that marks the Cowboys ninth international game. With stops in England (2), Japan (2), Mexico (4) and Canada (1), the Cowboys have played more international games than any other team in the NFL.

October 27, 2002 – In a 17-14 loss to the Seattle Seahawks at Texas Stadium, Emmitt Smith moved past Walter Payton to become the all-time NFL rushing leader. Smith finished the 2002 season, and his Dallas Cowboys career, with 17,162 yards, 436 more than Payton's previous career mark of 16,726.

January 2, 2003 – Jerry Jones names Bill Parcells as the sixth head coach in Dallas Cowboys franchise history. Parcells, a two-time Super Bowl winner with the New York Giants, replaces Dave Campo.

December 21, 2003 – The Cowboys topped the N.Y. Giants to record their 10th win of the season, securing a wild card berth in the playoffs. It was the club's 27th postseason appearance, extending their NFL record. It was also the 24th season in team history that Dallas posted at least 10 wins, also a league record.

November 2, 2004 – With 55% of the vote, the citizens of Arlington, Texas overwhelmingly support a stadium referendum at the polls. The public-private partnership between the City of Arlington and the Dallas Cowboys will fund a retractable roof stadium with capacity for up to 100,000 people in the heart of Arlington's entertainment district. With over \$400 million committed by the team and stadium users, it was the largest private investment in a stadium in NFL history, and the stadium gives North Texas the ability to bring major events like the Super Bowl and the NCAA Final Four to the region.

September 19, 2005 – Troy Aikman, Michael Irvin and Emmitt Smith, the cornerstone players of the 1990s, became the 15th, 16th and 17th members of the club's Ring of Honor. The trio finished their Cowboys career holding almost every major passing, receiving and rushing record while helping the organization become the NFL's Team of the Decade for the '90s.

December 24, 2005 – With a 24-20 win at Carolina, the Cowboys clinch the 29th winning season in the franchise's 46 years in operation. Dallas finished the year 9-7.

January 1, 2006 – The Cowboys played in front of 63,131 fans in the regular season finale at Texas Stadium on Jan. 1, 2006, pushing the club's all-time home attendance figure past the 20 million mark. Dating back to the 1960 franchise opener at the Cotton Bowl, 20,002,761 fans have now seen the Dallas Cowboys in person at the Cotton Bowl and Texas Stadium.

April 10, 2006 – Ground was broken on the new Dallas Cowboys stadium in Arlington, Texas. The state-of-the-art venue is scheduled for completion by the start of the 2009 NFL season and will accommodate between 80,000 and 100,000 fans.

August 5, 2006 – Three-time Super Bowl Champion quarterback Troy Aikman and six-time Pro Bowl tackle Rayfield Wright become the eighth and ninth former Cowboys to be enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio. Aikman, the MVP of Super Bowl XXVII and the winningest quarterback of the 1990s is selected in his first year of eligibility. Wright, a member of the NFL's 1970s All-Decade team and two Super Bowl winning teams in Dallas is selected in his first year as a senior's committee nominee.

December 16, 2006 – With a 38-28 win over the Atlanta Falcons in the Georgia Dome, the Cowboys secured a playoff berth en route to a 9-7 regular season record and a second place finish in the NFC East. The victory marked the organization's 28th postseason appearance, extending their NFL record.

February 8, 2007 – Jerry Jones announced the appointment of Wade Phillips as the seventh head coach in Dallas Cowboys history. Phillips, who brought a previous 45-35 record as an NFL head coach to the club, replaced Bill Parcells who announced his retirement from coaching on January 22, 2007.

May 22, 2007 – At NFL owners' meetings in Nashville, Tennessee, North Texas was selected to host Super Bowl XLV. The game will be played at the Cowboys new stadium in Arlington, Texas, on February 6, 2011. The first Super Bowl to be presented in North Texas was awarded on the fourth ballot of a vote by the NFL ownership.

August 4, 2007 – Michael Irvin, a member of six divisional winners and three Super Bowl championship teams with the Cowboys of the 1990s, becomes the 10th former Dallas Cowboys player to be enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Irvin, the Cowboys career leader in receptions and yardage, is presented by team owner Jerry Jones for induction at the ceremony in Canton, Ohio.

December 9, 2007 – With a 28-27 win at Detroit, the Cowboys clinched the NFC Eastern Division title for the first time since 1998. The win gave Dallas its 20th division championship (16th NFC East). Dallas closed the season with an NFC-best 13-3 record, tying the club mark for regular season victories that was set in 1992.

February 10, 2008 – A record 13 Dallas Cowboys participated in the Pro Bowl in Hawaii. Representing the club on offense were starters Tony Romo, Terrell Owens, Flozell Adams, Andre Gurode, Leonard Davis and Jason Witten. Marion Barber was a reserve for the NFC offense. On the defensive side, DeMarcus Ware and Ken Hamlin were starters while Roy Williams, Terence Newman and Greg Ellis were reserves. Rookie placekicker Nick Folk was also selected.

December 4, 2008 – A topping out ceremony was held at the then named Cowboys Stadium as the last major lift took place over the stadium's east end zone door. Owner Jerry Jones and Arlington Mayor Robert Cluck were joined at the event by a number of Cowboys Hall of Fame players including Bob Lilly, Michael Irvin, Tony Dorsett and Rayfield Wright.

December 14, 2008 – With a 20-8 win over the N.Y. Giants, the Cowboys clinch the 32nd winning season in franchise history. Dallas finished the year 9-7.

December 16, 2008 – Five members of the Dallas Cowboys were named to the Pro Bowl as Davis (second selection), Gurode (third), Jay Ratliff (first), Ware (third) and Witten (fifth) were selected. Adams (fifth) was later added as injury replacement.

May 27, 2009 – With the Jones Family, Arlington Mayor Robert Cluck and many Cowboys greats present, the West End Zone doors opened to a crowd of almost 2,000 as part of the building's Ribbon Cutting ceremony.

June 6, 2009 – The inaugural event at the then named Cowboys Stadium was a star-studded country music concert headlined by George Strait. Superstar Reba McEntire, singer/songwriter Blake Shelton and recording artist Lee Ann Womack joined the event. During the middle of the show, Strait called for the roof to be opened, and the show finished under a starry night sky.

September 20, 2009 – The 105,121 fans who attended the first regular season game at the then named Cowboys Stadium (Dallas against the New York Giants) became the largest crowd to ever witness an NFL regular season – or postseason – game.

January 3, 2010 – With a 24-0 win over Philadelphia, the Cowboys wrapped up the NFC Eastern Division title – marking the 21st division crown in the club's 50-year history. Dallas advanced to the playoffs for the 12th time in the 21 years of Jones' tenure as the owner and general manager.

January 9, 2010 – Then named Cowboys Stadium played host to its first NFL playoff game when Dallas dropped Philadelphia by a 34-14 margin in front of 92,951 fans in Arlington. The victory increased the Cowboys NFL-best total of all-time postseason wins to 33.

February 14, 2010 – The 108,713 fans who saw the NBA All Star Game at the then named Cowboys Stadium became a part of history as they made up the largest crowd to attend a basketball game – at any level – in the more than 100-year history of the sport.

August 7, 2010 – Emmitt Smith, the NFL's all-time leading rusher with 18,355 yards and winner of three Super Bowl rings, became the 12th player in franchise history inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Smith, who won NFL and Super Bowl MVP awards and is the NFL record holder with 11 consecutive 1,000-yard rushing seasons, was presented by team owner Jerry Jones for the induction ceremony in Canton, Ohio.

January 6, 2011 – Jerry Jones announced the appointment of Jason Garrett as the eighth head coach in Dallas Cowboys history. The former Cowboys quarterback guided the club to a 5-3 record as the interim coach in the second half of the 2010 season and became the first former Cowboys player to earn a spot as the head coach.

February 6, 2011 – For the first time in the region's history, North Texas played host to a Super Bowl when the Green Bay Packers and Pittsburgh Steelers faced off in Super Bowl XLV on Feb. 6 at the then named Cowboys Stadium. The Packers earned their fourth Super Bowl Championship with a 31-25 win in front of 103,219 fans – the fourth-largest crowd to watch a Super Bowl.

November 6, 2011 – Larry Allen, Charles Haley and Drew Pearson were inducted into the Ring of Honor at halftime of the Cowboys-Seahawks game becoming the 18th, 19th and 20th members of the club's Ring of Honor. All three players earned Super Bowl rings in their years with the Cowboys, Allen - one; Haley - three and Pearson - one.

December 26, 2012 – Two Dallas Cowboys were named to the original Pro Bowl squad as DeMarcus Ware earned his seventh consecutive and overall trip and Jason Witten his eighth overall. Anthony Spencer then made his first career Pro Bowl appearance when he was added to the NFC's all-star roster as an injury replacement.

February 2, 2013 – Larry Allen, one of the best offensive linemen in NFL history, was announced as one of the inductees into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Allen, who spent 12 years in Dallas and was a part of four NFC East titles and one Super Bowl victory, made more Pro Bowl appearances than any offensive player and tied the second-most by any player in franchise history. Jerry Jones will be Allen's presenter at the ceremony. Former Cowboys head coach, Bill Parcells (2003-06) was also one of the inductees for the class of 2013.

July 25, 2013 – Dallas Cowboys and AT&T announced the new home of the Cowboys will be AT&T Stadium, formerly Cowboys Stadium.

August 13, 2013 – The City of Frisco, Texas and the Frisco Independent School District announced a partnership with the Dallas Cowboys establishing Frisco as the future home of the Cowboys world corporate headquarters and training location. A multi-use special events and sports facility, to be developed on a footprint of approximately 20 acres, and the Cowboys world corporate headquarters on a footprint of approximately five acres, is the centerpiece of additional mixed-use development on property surrounding the team's new location.

April 3, 2014 – Jerry Jones received the prestigious Horatio Alger Award in Washington, D.C. and was inducted as a lifetime member into the Horatio Alger Association of Distinguished Americans.

November 9, 2014 – The Dallas Cowboys played their first ever regular season game outside of the United States, defeating Jacksonville 31-17 at London's historical Wembley Stadium.

December 21, 2014 – With a 42-7 home win over the Indianapolis Colts, the Dallas Cowboys claimed their 18th NFC East and 22nd division title.

December 28, 2014 – The Dallas Cowboys beat Washington 44-17 to seal up road perfection for just the second time in club history.

January 15, 2015 – The Pro Football Writer's of America name Jerry Jones the 2014 NFL Executive of the Year. Jones put together a team that tied for the NFL's best record (12-4), claimed the NFC East championship and won its first playoff game since 2009.

January 31, 2015 – Charles Haley, who was a key part to the three Super Bowl champion teams in the 1990s, became a Hall of Fame inductee.

November 1, 2015 – During halftime of Dallas' Nov. 1, 2015 game against the Seattle Seahawks, Darren Woodson was inducted as the 21st member of the Cowboys Ring of Honor at AT&T Stadium. He finished his career as the Cowboys all-time leading tackler with 1,350 stops, was named to the Pro Bowl five times and was a three-time Super Bowl champion.

June 16, 2016 – After 31 years of calling the Valley Ranch facility home, the Cowboys conduct their final practice at the team headquarters in Irving, TX.

July, 2016 – The organization moves into The Star in Frisco, Texas, home of the new world headquarters of the Dallas Cowboys. The move makes the team the first and only NFL team to share a training facility with a public high school athletic program at Ford Center - an indoor venue with a seating capacity of 12,000.

August 21, 2016 – The official opening of The Star in Frisco was marked by the club's first practice at the new headquarters.

December 1, 2016 – The Cowboys won their 11th straight game of the 2016 season with the victory over Minnesota, setting a team record for the longest single-season win streak in team history.

December 20, 2016 – The Cowboys sent seven players to the Pro Bowl, as Tyron Smith (four), Zack Martin, (three), Travis Frederick (three), Dak Prescott (first) and Ezekiel Elliott (first) were named to the team on the initial ballot. Elliott and Prescott became the first Cowboys rookie duo named to the Pro Bowl, and Prescott is the only rookie quarterback in team history to earn the honor. Dez Bryant (three) and Sean Lee (two) were later named as injury replacements.

December 26, 2016 – Ezekiel Elliott finished his rookie campaign with a league leading 1,631 rushing yards - the third Cowboys running back to lead the league. His 11 games with 100-plus yards from scrimmage established a rookie team record and are tied for third in NFL history by a rookie.

January 1, 2017 – The Cowboys finished the season with 13 wins, tying the 2007 and 1992 teams for the most wins in team history. Dallas' 13-3 record earned them their 32nd appearance in the postseason – tied for the most in NFL history – and the team's 23rd division championship.

January 1, 2017 – Dak Prescott finished one of the most prolific rookie seasons by a quarterback in NFL history, tying the most wins (13) in NFL history and finishing with the highest QB rating (104.9), completion percentage (67.8) and third-most passing touchdowns (23).

February 4, 2017 – On the eve of Super Bowl LI in Houston, Texas, it was announced that Jerry Jones would be inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. His selection made him the third Cowboys non-player to have a bust in Canton, Ohio (Tex Schramm and Tom Landry). The Dallas Cowboys also took home four year-long honors at the NFL Honors event, as Jason Garrett won AP Coach of the Year, Dak Prescott won AP Offensive Rookie of the Year, Ezekiel Elliott won FedEx Ground Player of the Year and the Cowboys offensive line won Built Ford Tough Offensive Line of the Year.

May 24, 2017 – At an awards banquet in New York City, Jerry Jones was given the 2017 Lifetime Achievement Award, presented by *SportsBusiness Journal*.

August 5, 2017 – Jerry Jones becomes the 15th owner in NFL History to be inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

September 10, 2017 – Jason Witten sets the Cowboys franchise record for most career receiving yards, eclipsing Michael Irvin (11,904) in Cowboys annals. He passed Ed "Too Tall" Jones for most games played by a Cowboy (224) the following week at Denver.

November 30, 2017 – Dez Bryant establishes a franchise record, topping Bob Hayes (71) with his 72nd career receiving touchdown against Washington.

December 10, 2017 – The Cowboys win at the N.Y. Giants serves as Jerry Jones' 250th regular season win as the Dallas Cowboys Owner, President and General Manager since purchasing the team in 1989.

February, 2018 – Jason Witten earns his 11th trip to the Pro Bowl to tie Bob Lilly for the most appearances in franchise history.

November 29, 2018 – During halftime of the team's contest against the New Orleans Saints, the Cowboys named Gil Brandt as the 22nd member of the Ring of Honor. Brandt would later be inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

December 23, 2018 – With a win over Tampa Bay on Dec. 23, Dallas earned its 20th NFC East Division title since the division was first formed in 1970, its third division crown in the last five seasons.

December 30, 2018 – Ezekiel Elliott finished the season with 2,001 scrimmage yards and led the NFL in rushing with 1,434 yards, becoming only the fifth NFL player and second Cowboy to lead the league in rushing twice in their first three seasons. Leighton Vander Esch also established a franchise rookie record for tackles in a single-season, leading the Cowboys defense with 176 tackles.

April 9, 2019 – The Dallas Cowboys signed defensive end DeMarcus Lawrence to a five-year contract extension worth more than \$100 million, the biggest single contract in franchise history to date.

Sept. 4, 2019 – The Dallas Cowboys signed running back Ezekiel Elliott to a six-year contract extension worth more than \$90 million, which made him the highest-paid running back in NFL history. Elliott owns the Cowboys rookie rushing record, the single-season record for receptions by a running back and became just the fifth player since the 1970 NFL merger to lead the league in rushing twice in his first three seasons.

September 8, 2019 – Jason Witten returned to the Cowboys after a brief hiatus during the 2018 season, playing in his 16th NFL campaign - making him the longest-tenured Cowboy in franchise history.

October 2, 2019 – The National Medal of Honor Museum Foundation announces that Arlington, Texas is selected by the Foundation's Board of Directors as the site for the future National Medal of Honor Museum. Planned for construction near Arlington's AT&T Stadium, the first national museum of its kind is set to open to the public in 2025. The National Medal of Honor Museum will provide an unrivaled visitor experience with state-of-the-art permanent, interactive experiences and rotating exhibitions. Serving as a national landmark - and located in America's heartland - the Museum will illustrate the historical thread of sacrifice, patriotism and courage that runs through all U.S. military service members, past and present.

December 30, 2019 – The Cowboys boasted a 4,000-yard passer (Dak Prescott, 4,902), 1,000-yard rusher (Ezekiel Elliott, 1,357) and two 1,000-yard receivers (Amari Cooper, 1,189 and Michael Gallup, 1,008) for the first time in franchise history, and the offense totaled a team-record 6,904 net yards.

February, 2020 – The Cowboys sent six players to the Pro Bowl. Tyrone Smith earned his seventh overall and seventh consecutive trip, passing Rayfield Wright for the most by a Cowboys tackle in team history. He was joined by Zack Martin (sixth), Travis Frederick (fifth), Amari Cooper (fourth), Ezekiel Elliott (third), and Jaylon Smith (first) in the all-star game.

January 5, 2020 – Mike McCarthy was named the ninth head coach in franchise history. Along with 13 years of head coaching experience and 13 more as an assistant coach in the NFL, McCarthy came to Dallas owning the sixth-most wins (125) among active NFL head coaches, including a Super Bowl XLV win at AT&T Stadium in 2011.

March 10, 2021 – Dallas signed quarterback Dak Prescott to a four-year contract worth more than \$160 million, making him the highest paid player in Cowboys history and cementing his place among the highest paid players in NFL history.

March 25, 2021 – Jerry Jones and the Jones Family made a historic \$20 million donation to the National Medal Of Honor Museum Foundation, which has now surpassed \$250 million in total funds raised. Jones' daughter, Charlotte Jones, Chief Brand Officer/Co-Owner for the Cowboys, serves as Chairman of the Board for the Museum. The Jones family's generous contribution brings the Museum one step closer to opening its doors in 2025.

December 26, 2021 – With a win over Washington on Dec. 26, Dallas earned its 21st NFC East Division title since the division was first formed in 1970.

February 25, 2022 – Jerry Jones is honored as an MD Anderson Living Legend at a luncheon hosted in Dallas. The event honored Jones in an interview with Al Michaels of NBC's "Sunday Night Football," and raised nearly \$1.4 million in support of the University of Texas MD Anderson Cancer Center - the most money ever raised at the North Texas celebration.

March 12, 2022 – Jerry Jones is honored with the Walter Camp Distinguished American Award at the 56th annual Black Tie National Awards Gala. The Walter Camp Football Foundation's "Distinguished American" award is presented each year to an individual who has utilized his or her talents to attain great success in business, private life or public service and who may have accomplished that which no other has done.

December 24, 2022 – After losing the season opener to Tampa Bay at AT&T Stadium, the Dallas Cowboys won their final eight home games to post an 8-1 record at AT&T Stadium, the most home wins in a single season since the stadium opened in 2009.

January 8, 2023 – The Cowboys finished the season with 12 wins, the first time that Dallas won 12 games in back-to-back seasons since 1994-95. The Cowboys also advanced to the postseason in back-to-back seasons for the first time since 2006-07.

January 8, 2023 – CeeDee Lamb finished the year with 107 receptions, becoming the third Cowboys player to reach 100 catches in a season, joining Michael Irvin (111 in 1995) and Jason Witten (110 in 2012).

December 21, 2022 – The Cowboys sent eight players to the Pro Bowl. Zack Martin earned his eighth all-star selection, tying him with Emmitt Smith and Tyrone Smith for the sixth-most selections in team history. He was joined by DeMarcus Lawrence (third), Trevon Diggs (second), CeeDee Lamb (second), Micah Parsons (second), Tyler Biadasz (first), Tony Pollard (first) and KaVontae Turpin (first) in the all-star game.

February 9, 2023 – Dak Prescott was awarded with one of the highest honors in the NFL when he received the Walter Payton Man of the Year award for his outstanding community service efforts off the field, as well as excellence on the field. Prescott became the fourth Cowboys player to be bestowed with the honor, joining Roger Staubach, Troy Aikman and Jason Witten.

October 29, 2023 – DeMarcus Ware is announced as the 23rd and member of the Cowboys Ring of Honor during halftime ceremonies against the LA Rams.

December 30, 2023 – Jimmy Johnson is announced as the 24th member of the Cowboys Ring of Honor during halftime ceremonies against the Detroit.

January 3, 2024 – The Cowboys sent an NFL-high 10 players to the Pro Bowl. Zack Martin earned his ninth selection - tied for fifth-most by a Cowboy - and was joined by DeMarcus Lawrence (four), Dak Prescott (three), CeeDee Lamb (three), Micah Parsons (three), Bryan Anger (two), Brandon Aubrey (first), DaRon Bland (first), Jake Ferguson (first) and Tyler Smith (first) in the games.

January 7, 2024 – CeeDee Lamb set two single-season franchise records for receptions (135) and receiving yards (1,749).

January 7, 2024 – Dallas earned its 22nd NFC East Division title since the division was first formed in 1970 and won its 12th game for the third-straight season to secure its third-consecutive playoff berth, both firsts since the 1992-95 squads accomplished the feats.

February 4, 2024 – Dallas was awarded a tournament-high nine 2026 FIFA World Cup matches, including a semi-final match, to be played at AT&T Stadium.

February 8, 2024 – Dak Prescott finishes second in MVP voting at NFL Honors following his historic performance in 2023, becoming the first Cowboys quarterback to lead the NFL outright in touchdown passes with 36.

STEPHEN JONES

Chief Operating Officer
Co-Owner



With 35 years of NFL experience, Stephen Jones has established himself as one of the most successful and versatile executives in professional sports, as Co-Owner and the franchise's Chief Operating Officer.

Jones oversees the management operations for all aspects of the Dallas Cowboys and AT&T Stadium, while also overseeing the team's scouting and player personnel department. His work involves managing the organization's several hundred staff members, while also handling all of the club's salary cap and all major player contract concerns. He is active in the recruitment and management of all major events that come to AT&T Stadium and The Star in Frisco. Jones' experience as a major college football player, and his years as one of the NFL's top executives, were instrumental in his appointment to the League's prestigious Competition Committee. His active involvement in stadium management, design and development has also landed him a spot on the NFL's New Stadium Committee.

Following the Cowboys 12-4 regular season finish and 2014 NFC Eastern Division title, Stephen and Jerry Jones were named the co-recipients of the NFL Executive of the Year Award as presented by Sports Illustrated's Monday Morning Quarterback.

Beginning in 1989, Jones has played an integral role in the team's dramatic rise from a 1-15 record to being the NFL's "Team of the Decade" with three Super Bowl titles in the 1990s. As he enters his 36th NFL season, Jones has been a core architect of the Cowboys teams that have compiled three consecutive 12-win regular seasons for the first time since the 1992-95 squads. His recent work has seen the club restock its roster with some of the game's top talent, and the recent results have produced winning records in 13 of the last 20 seasons and division titles in 2007, 2009, 2014, 2016, 2018, 2021 and 2023. During his tenure with the team, Dallas has established the club record for regular season wins (13) in 1992 and equaled that mark with 13 victories in 2007 and 2016.

Over the last decade, Jones has crafted one of the more impressive drafting records in the NFL. Dallas has selected 15 players who have become Pro Bowlers since 2014: Zack Martin and DeMarcus Lawrence (2014), Byron Jones (2015), Ezekiel Elliott, Jaylon Smith and Dak Prescott (2016), Leighton Vander Esch (2018), Tony Pollard (2019), Tyler Biadasz, Trevon Diggs and CeeDee Lamb (2020), Micah Parsons (2021) and DaRon Bland, Jake Ferguson and Tyler Smith (2022). The 15 Pro Bowl draft picks are the most by any team over that span, and that group has gone on to earn a combined total of 35 Pro Bowl selections. Since 2010, Dallas has drafted nine players who have also been named to at least one All-Pro team since their selection - most in the NFL. In those same 10 years, Dallas has selected 31 players who have become starters, with 12 becoming All-Rookie Team selections.

The foundation for the future success of the team has been secured through savvy draft maneuvers and key free agent acquisitions, starting up front on the

offensive line. Martin earned his ninth Pro Bowl following the 2023 season and was joined by Tyler Smith, who earned his first Pro Bowl nod. Prescott and Elliott - Dallas' duo of young offensive backfield weapons - became the first pair of Cowboys rookies to ever be selected to the Pro Bowl in 2016. Prescott opened his career by becoming the first rookie quarterback in Cowboys history to be named to the Pro Bowl and the first to win AP Offensive Rookie of the Year, while Elliott won NFL rushing titles in two (2016 and 2018) of his first three years in the League. Prescott was also named the NFL's Walter Payton Man of the Year for 2022, becoming the fourth Cowboy to earn that special recognition (Troy Aikman, Roger Staubach, Jason Witten). Lamb is another in the line of great Cowboys receivers to don the famed number 88 jersey, establishing a team rookie record with 74 catches in his first season, then surpassing the 1,000-yard mark in his second year before becoming the only Cowboys receiver with multiple 100-catch campaigns, eventually establishing a franchise record with 135 catches and 1,749 receiving yards in 2023.

Defensively, Diggs, Parsons and Bland anchored an ascending young group of players. Diggs tied the club record with 11 interceptions in 2021, while Parsons earned AP Defensive Rookie of the Year honors by establishing a Cowboys rookie record with 13.0 sacks and followed that up with 13.5 sacks in 2022 and a second straight AP first-team All-Pro selection - the first Cowboys defender to earn first-team All-Pro honors in each of his first two seasons and only the second NFL defender since the 1970 Merger, joining Lawrence Taylor in 1981-82. Parsons finished his third season with 14.0 sacks in 2023, becoming the second NFL player since 1982 with at least 12.0 sacks in each of his first three seasons, joining Hall of Famer Reggie White. Bland set an NFL-record with five pick-sixes in his second pro season and led all defenders with nine interceptions in 2023, providing another ball-hawking, first-team All-Pro defender.

In the ever-evolving strategy that dictates a team's competitiveness in the current collective bargaining agreement, Jones' performance in managing the Cowboys salary cap, and the club's activity in free agency, has played a prominent role in the team's ability to compete at the NFL's highest level. Jones' involvement in shaping the Dallas roster under the salary cap was critical in allowing the Cowboys to maintain one of the NFL's most talented core group of players throughout the decade of the 1990s. His creativity and caretaking of the Cowboys cap played a key role in the team's 13 division titles, four conference championship game appearances and three world titles since 1989.

During a historic two-year period, Jones was involved in signing five Cowboys stars who were considered the best players in the game at their respective positions. Between September of 1993 and September of 1995, Jones helped orchestrate contract agreements with running back Emmitt Smith, quarterback Troy Aikman, fullback Daryl Johnston, wide receiver Michael Irvin and cornerback Deion Sanders.

Shortly after the turn of the century, Jones began spearheading the club's new stadium efforts, overseeing every element of the development and construction of the venue while also working closely with local government, community and business leaders. He was directly responsible for the club's successful referendum campaign in the fall of 2004 that saw the City of Arlington agree to join forces with the Cowboys in building a new state-of-the-art stadium later to be named AT&T Stadium.

Opened to the public in May of 2009, the stadium's dramatic first season of operation resulted in the venue being named the Sports Facility of the Year by the Sports Business Journal in May of 2010.

The 100,000-plus seat stadium established the attendance record for an NFL regular season game as 105,121 witnessed the September 20, 2009 home opener, while the 108,713 who attended the NBA All-Star Game on February 14, 2010 became the largest crowd to witness a game in the history of the sport.

In over 14 years of operation, more than 14 million fans have attended events that included high school and collegiate football, major college basketball, international soccer, professional bull riding, Supercross, world championship boxing and concerts featuring world-renowned recording artists. More than 6.5 million visitors have passed through the 12-story high doors of the stadium for daily public tours of the venue.

With its architectural versatility and cutting-edge media capabilities, AT&T Stadium has become a visible beacon that has established North Texas as a major focal point on the sports and entertainment canvas of North America and around the world.

The brilliant home of the Cowboys has become a powerful catalyst in attracting a wide range of national and international events that will define the future of the region for generations to come. The stadium has already played host to Super Bowl XLV (February of 2011), the NCAA Final Four in men's basketball (April of 2014), the Big 12 Championship game, the inaugural College Football Playoff Championship Game (January of 2015) and in 2018 became the first NFL stadium to host the NFL Draft. Other top flight sporting events for the future include the annual Cotton Bowl classic, 2024 PBR World Finals, hosting a tournament-high nine matches for the 2026 FIFA World Cup and the 2030 NCAA Men's Final Four, just to name a few.

In the summer of 2013, Jones was the organization's point person in the negotiations that established the multi-year naming rights agreement for the Cowboys home in Arlington with AT&T.

AT&T Stadium remains the only venue in the world to host an NBA All-Star Game, a Super Bowl, the Men's NCAA Final Four and the College Football Playoff Championship Game.

Shortly after the new name for AT&T Stadium was announced, Jones took on the responsibilities of spearheading a partnership with the City of Frisco (TX) and the Frisco Independent School District to develop a new home for the Cowboys World Headquarters and training facility in Frisco. The Star in Frisco opened its doors for operation in the summer of 2016. Located in a rapidly growing community of more than 200,000 residents, The Star is a partnership with the City of Frisco and Frisco ISD that focuses on inspiring a strong future for high school football, youth sports

and the next generation of players and fans by uniquely engaging them at the place where the Dallas Cowboys live, work and practice.

The Star is the only NFL training facility in the U.S. that is shared with a public high school athletic program. All 12 Frisco ISD high schools play home games within Ford Center at The Star, a state-of-the-art, 510,000-square-foot indoor athletic facility. With a capacity of 12,000 seats, Ford Center hosts a variety of events in addition to football games, such as concerts, collegiate basketball, professional boxing, soccer matches and meetings, to name a few.

The Star includes a 91-acre mixed-use development located on the Dallas Tollway. In addition to the team's headquarters, the project features shopping, dining, nightlife, athletic, fitness, event, hotel and residential options.

Prior to focusing much of his energy on the innovative projects in Arlington and Frisco, Jones' stewardship of historic Texas Stadium in Irving left behind a legacy of facility management that maximized the use and visibility of the venue into a year-round destination for sporting, entertainment, community and corporate events on an unprecedented level.

Jones has enjoyed a life long association with the game of football. A four-year letterman as a linebacker and special teams standout at the University of Arkansas, Jones was a starter for the Razorbacks in the Orange Bowl Classic Game that followed the 1986 season. Prior to attending the University of Arkansas, Jones was an all-state quarterback and a three-year starter at Catholic High School in Little Rock, Arkansas. In February of 2015, Jones was inducted into the Arkansas Sports Hall of Fame, where he joined his father who was a 1999 inductee.

In 2016 Jones was awarded the Junior Achievement Legacy Award which goes to a person whose leadership supports academic excellence in Arkansas. Jones followed that honor up in 2017, being named the 2017 Arkansan of the Year by Easter Seals Arkansas.

He earned his degree in chemical engineering from Arkansas in 1988 and immediately went to work in the oil and gas business for JMC Exploration as an engineer. In 2013 he was inducted as a member of the Arkansas Academy of Chemical Engineers.

On Feb. 25, 1989, Jerry Jones purchased the Dallas Cowboys and installed Stephen into a key front office position as one-of-three vice presidents with the club.

Jones is a past president of the Dallas Chapter of the Young Presidents' Organization. He serves on the board of directors for Complexity Gaming as well as the Cotton Bowl Athletic Association. He also serves on the board for the Dallas Citizens Council and the Baylor Health Care System Foundation. He is a former member of the NFL's Business Ventures Committee, and he is also a member of the board of directors for Legends Hospitality - the joint stadium catering venture involving the Dallas Cowboys and the New York Yankees organizations that Jones was instrumental in creating. In the spring of 2015, Jones was inducted into the Arkansas Sports Hall of Fame.

Jones was born in Danville, Arkansas and raised in Little Rock. He and his wife, Karen, live in Highland Park, Dallas and have four children and one grandchild.

Charlotte Jones is Co-Owner and the franchise's Chief Brand Officer. For more than 30 years, she has overseen all business operations, strategies and applications surrounding the team's brand as it is presented to fans worldwide. Her experience has propelled her forward as one of the most innovative and versatile executives among women in professional sports and executives as a whole. Jones' vision and direction leads the Cowboys in brand marketing, fan engagement, stadium design, entertainment, licensed apparel, cause marketing and community relations.

She played a significant role in shaping the design, décor, sponsor integration and overall presentation of AT&T Stadium, the renowned state-of-the-art venue that opened in Arlington, Texas in 2009. Under Jones' guidance, the venue has played host to some of the highest profile sports and entertainment events in the world - Super Bowl XLV, the 2010 NBA All-Star Game, the 2014 NCAA Men's Final Four and the first-ever College Football Championship game in 2015. She was instrumental in bringing the Academy of Country Music Awards to AT&T Stadium to celebrate the 50th anniversary, breaking ratings and attendance records, as well as WrestleMania 32, which broke WWE's all-time attendance record.

The stadium's signature element is one of the most prominent public art collections, the Dallas Cowboys Art Collection at AT&T Stadium and The Star in Frisco. Consisting of 95 works of contemporary art from an international array of 62 curated artists, the collection also includes 18 commissions and is displayed on the walls and in the grand public spaces of the stadium and the world headquarters at The Star. In 2013 Jones and her mother, Gene Jones, were the recipients of the Texas Medal of Arts - Arts Patrons Award, presented by the Texas Cultural Trust. The Gene and Jerry Jones Family Arlington Youth Foundation continues to work with the Arlington Independent School District to create a unique program to expose students to the arts.

Jones played an influential role in the design and development of The Star in Frisco, the Dallas Cowboys World Headquarters, team training facility and event center located in Frisco, Texas. Opened in 2016, the 91-acre mixed-use development serves as the team's headquarters and a destination for shopping, dining, nightlife, sports rehabilitation, fitness, events, luxury residential living and commercial real estate. For the past two years, the Ford Center at The Star played host to the Academy of Country Music Awards. In 2025 The Star will welcome back the ACM's to celebrate its 60th anniversary.

Recognized as one of the most prominent and impactful women in sports, Jones was named Chairman of the NFL Foundation in 2012 where she is responsible for spearheading the NFL efforts in youth football participation, health and safety, and community outreach. She is the first woman to serve in this position and is the first female executive in history to lead a major professional sports league charitable foundation. In 2014 she was appointed to the first NFL Conduct Committee, which endorses and enhances the new personal conduct policy for all NFL players and employees. She also serves on the Health and Safety Committee and the NFL's Legalized Sports Betting Committee. Concurrently, Jones is the President of the Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders and is responsible for overseeing what is considered to be the most prominent organization of its kind in the world.

In the philanthropy space, Jones became the first female to serve as Chairman of The Salvation Army's National Advisory Board from 2010-14. In 1997 she introduced a groundbreaking approach to fundraising on the worldwide stage by harnessing a Thanksgiving Day national television audience during the Cowboys halftime to kickoff The Salvation Army's National Red Kettle Campaign. Jones set the wheels in motion, helping the Army raise nearly three billion dollars and touch lives across the globe by combining the Dallas Cowboys and popular musical entertainers featured on network television during one of the most watched NFL games. Since that initial halftime presentation which featured the musical talents of Reba McEntire, other major entertainers performing at the Thanksgiving halftime show included Randy Travis, Clint Black, Toby Keith, Destiny's Child, Sheryl Crow, Carrie Underwood, Kelly Clarkson, the Jonas Brothers, Keith Urban, Enrique Iglesias, Kenny Chesney, Selena Gomez, Pitbull with Ne-Yo, Luke Bryan, Meghan Trainor, Ellie Goulding, Kane Brown and Luke Combs. With an average viewing audience of 41.7 million, the 2023 Thanksgiving game enjoyed a halftime performance by the legendary Dolly Parton, which was the most watched of the regular NFL season and third most watched regular season game ever.

In 2017 Jones was inducted into the Arkansas Sports Hall of Fame for Football Administration. Her spirit of involvement in the local community extends far beyond the realm of professional football. Since 1989 she has been actively involved with leadership roles in a wide range of organizations that include: The Boys and Girls Clubs of America, Southwestern Medical Foundation, the President's Advisory Council for The Dallas Center for Performing Arts Foundation, TACA Board of Governors, The Salvation Army, The Rise School, Shelton School, Make-A-Wish North Texas Presidents Council, Dallas Symphony and the Super Bowl XLV Host Committee. She chaired the 2014 North Texas Final Four Host Committee, responsible for hosting and organizing the record setting men's basketball championship at AT&T Stadium. Additionally, Jones is a member of the Board of Directors of Hilltop Holdings Corporation, serves as President of the Gene and Jerry Jones Family Foundation and the Gene and Jerry Jones Family Arlington Youth Foundation. She also serves on the SoftBank Advisory Council. She is a member of the James Madison Council, a philanthropic advisory group for the Library of Congress.

Since 2020, Jones has proudly served as Chairman of the National Medal of Honor Museum Foundation. The Museum and Griffin Institute will open in Arlington Texas in March 2025. It is designed to preserve and share the remarkable stories of the fewer than 4,000 individuals who have received the Medal of Honor and the 40 million members of the Armed Forces they served alongside. Its purpose is to recognize the values and ideals of the prestigious Medal of Honor: Courage, Sacrifice, Commitment, Integrity, Citizenship, Patriotism and to fulfill its mission to inspire America.

A native of Little Rock, Arkansas, Jones travels across the country speaking on philanthropic initiatives, brand innovation and cultivating the most valuable sports franchises in the world. She is a graduate of Stanford University and a proud mother of three children: daughter Haley, and sons Shy and Paxton. She and her husband, Amir Rozwadowski, reside in Dallas.



As Co-Owner and Chief Sales and Marketing Officer, Jerry Jones, Jr. is a key member of the Dallas Cowboys front office, overseeing the club's entire sales and marketing efforts, both those directed at the team's loyal fans as well as its corporate partners. With the Cowboys unique vertical structure, Jones leads a team that is not only responsible for the sales and marketing of the club, but also its vast merchandising business as well as all digital and broadcast media.

Jones was instrumental in the design and planning of AT&T Stadium, viewed as one of the world's truly unique sports and entertainment venues and he played an integral role in the development of the Dallas Cowboys World Headquarters and Training Facility located at The Star in Frisco, Texas. His desire to make the Cowboys practice facility about health and wellness, sports nutrition and sports medicine led to the building of the Baylor Scott and White Sports Therapy and Research Center. This 300,000-square-foot campus for sports medicine and sports performance opened its doors in June 2018. In keeping with his desire to create a destination for health and wellness, Jones was instrumental in building Cowboys Fit at The Star, a three-story 65,000-square-foot premier health and fitness center where members exercise and train to a Cowboy-centric workout routine. Since then, four other Cowboys Fit locations have been opened in Plano (June 2019), in the AT&T Discovery District in downtown Dallas (May 2020), Pflugerville (November 2020) and East Dallas (Summer 2022). In addition, he was instrumental in creating Cowboys Club, a first of its kind private membership club complete with private restaurant overlooking the practice fields.

From 2007 to 2008 Jones guided the transition of 65,000 season ticket holders as well as over 300 suite owners from Texas Stadium to the club's new home that opened in 2009. With a stadium capable of holding up to 100,000 fans, with eight club areas and 3.0 million square feet of space, this monumental effort required the expansion of the club's sales team to over 60 employees dedicated to personalized customer service. At the same time, Jones has also been deeply involved in the extension and expansion of the club's already sizable corporate sponsorship base. In recent years, Jones has directed the extension of long-term agreements with numerous valued partners like Miller Brewing, Ford, Bank of America, Pepsi and Dr Pepper as well as the expansion of the AT&T partnership to include stadium naming rights.

In both 2008 and 2009 these efforts were recognized by Sports Business Journal when Jones was named to their "40 Under 40" list of executives under the age of 40 who are making the greatest contribution to their organization and the world of sports and entertainment.

On the broadcast front, Jones oversaw the 2006 move to bring the club's radio broadcast in-house. The


move added English radio to the club's stable of English and Spanish television programming as well as the Spanish radio broadcast. Dallas Cowboys Media Department now originates over 40 hours a week of original television, radio, podcasts and internet programming aired across the Dallas Cowboys Broadcasting Network in five states and their owned and operated distribution platforms including dallascowboys.com, Cowboys Mobile (iOS and Android) and Cowboys Now (on Roku, Amazon Fire and Apple TV). Through his work, Jones has helped foster the NFL's largest team-operated media broadcast network.

Jones has established a growing reputation at the league level as it relates to sales and marketing. In the past, he has served on the NFL's Marketing Executives Committee, the Internet Working Group Committee and the League's Digital Media Committee.

In 2001, to help further the Dallas Cowboys marketing and brand image initiatives, Jones became the CEO of Dallas Cowboys Merchandising, Ltd. (DCM), a company formed in 1996 to design, manufacture and distribute Dallas Cowboys merchandise throughout the world. To date, the Cowboys are still the only major league sports team to form such an entity, enabling their fans to have the unique opportunity to enjoy the authenticity of team merchandise and memorabilia, straight from the source. DCM and the Dallas Cowboys continue to thrive as one of the top teams in NFL sales over the past 20 years. Today DCM has over 30 retail locations throughout Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico, including the 15,000-square-foot Pro Shop in AT&T Stadium and a 7,000-square-foot Pro Shop at the team headquarters facility, The Star in Frisco, TX. In 2020 DCM moved into a 400,000-square-foot manufacturing and distribution headquarters in Frisco, TX.

Jones took over as the club's Chief Marketing Officer in 2001 after first joining the club in 1996 as Vice President and General Counsel. He spent his early years negotiating rookie contracts, local radio and television broadcast rights fees and sponsorship agreements. He was also instrumental in launching the Dallas Cowboys official website, which continues to be at the forefront of internet technology and has become one of the NFL's most comprehensive and innovative team pages. In 2003 the site won the NFL's award for best overall team website, and in 2006, the site won the NFL's award for best content. With Jones' leadership, dallascowboys.com has had higher unique visitors, page views, and time spent on site every year since the league began tracking team sites. Additionally, they boast the largest social media community in the NFL.

Jones, born Sept. 27, 1969, earned his law degree from Southern Methodist University in 1995. He completed his undergraduate coursework at Georgetown University, where he majored in political science and graduated with a BA in 1992. Jones and his wife reside in Dallas, Texas with their children.

The Dallas Cowboys named Mike McCarthy the ninth head coach in franchise history on Jan. 8, 2020, handing the reigns of the team to an innovative offensive mind with a championship pedigree.

McCarthy came to Dallas with 13 years of head coaching experience and 13 additional years as an assistant coach in the NFL, including six as an offensive coordinator.

As a head coach, McCarthy has racked up a 167-102-2 regular season record - with the Green Bay Packers (2006-18) and Dallas Cowboys (2020-23) - and he owns the fifth-most wins among active NFL coaches and 18th all-time. His teams have qualified for the postseason 12 times, won six NFC North Division titles - two NFC East - made four NFC Championship Game appearances and took home a Super Bowl XLV championship held at AT&T Stadium in Arlington, Texas, following the 2010 NFL season.

Having mentored top quarterbacks, including Hall of Famers and future Hall of Famers, McCarthy's experience and success with young quarterbacks has helped shape the immediate future of the Dallas Cowboys.

The 2023 season brought McCarthy back to his roots as the offensive play-caller for the first time since 2018, and the Cowboys offense flourished as a result. Dak Prescott finished second in MVP voting as he led the NFL in completions (410) and passing touchdowns (36) - the only Cowboys quarterback to lead the NFL outright in passing scores. Overall, the offense led the league in points scored with 509 - second in single-season team history - and finished fifth with 371.6 yards-per-game while racking up an NFL-best five 40-point games - tied for the most in single-season team history. The team recorded its third straight 12-win season and made the playoffs for the third consecutive season - marking the first time for either streak since the 1993-95 seasons - en route to the second NFC East title under McCarthy's guidance. Dallas' 36 regular season wins since 2021 are the second-most in the NFL, trailing only Kansas City (37). It was also a historic season at AT&T Stadium in 2023, as Dallas lit up the 175-foot scoreboard with an NFL-leading 37.4 points-per-game and a franchise-record 299 total points to finish with a unblemished 8-0 record at home - the fourth time in franchise history Dallas recorded an undefeated record in its home venue (1969, 1980, and 1981).

In 2022 McCarthy led the charges of a team that finished 12-5 for the second straight season to mark the first time in his career and the first time for Dallas since 1994-95 to record consecutive 12-or-more win seasons. En route to the team's second straight playoff berth (first time since 2006-07), the Dallas offense finished third in the league in points (467, fourth in points-per-game) while the defense led the league in takeaways for the second consecutive season - the first team since Pittsburgh (1972-74) to notch two straight years at the top of the NFL's takeaway chart.

In McCarthy's second season in Dallas he led a team that took home the club's 25th division title as Dallas led the East with a 12-5 record in the NFL's first 17-game season in 2021. The Cowboys had

22 different players reach the end zone, an NFL record for the most players to score a touchdown on a team in a season. Dallas also finished with 530 total points, a franchise record. McCarthy's emphasis on complementary football was on display as the Cowboys tied for the league lead in turnover differential (+14) and ranked second in points off takeaways (119). The last time a Dallas team finished a season with a differential of at least +14 was 1981 (+18). McCarthy led Dallas to a 5-1 primetime record, the most primetime wins of McCarthy's 15-year career and the most by Dallas since 2016. Dallas went a perfect 6-0 against the NFC East in 2021, just the third time in franchise history that Dallas finished a season unbeaten against its division - 1969 and 1998. The Cowboys outscored divisional opponents 240-107.

Upon arriving in Dallas and filling out his inaugural staff, McCarthy was prepared to implement his high-velocity offense, but his plans came to a screeching halt as the NFL was faced with eliminating in-person meetings and practices due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Despite the challenges the pandemic posed, McCarthy pushed forward through the offseason, but he was faced with challenges at every turn. The injury bug hit the Dallas offense, forcing the club to not only start four different quarterbacks (for the first time since 2015) as Prescott (ankle) was lost for the season in Week 5, but also implement eight different starting offensive line combinations (not including in-game changes). In total, the club lost 152 games played and 127 starts to injury. Despite the hurdles, the 2020 Dallas Cowboys were in position to win the NFC East entering Week 17 but came up just short.

McCarthy launched his head coaching career with Green Bay on Jan. 12, 2006, and in 12-plus years as its head coach, he guided one of the most successful stretches in franchise history, reaching the postseason in eight consecutive seasons (2009-16). With his Super Bowl XLV victory, McCarthy joined Vince Lombardi and Mike Holmgren as the only coaches to guide the Packers to a Super Bowl win.

Known as a prolific offensive mind - and the primary play-caller - McCarthy's Packers offense finished fourth in the NFL in total offense (364.4) and third in points-per-game (26.0) through his tenure with the club. Behind the arm of Aaron Rodgers, over that same span, the Packers were third in passing offense. Additionally, over the course of 13 years with the Packers, his offenses regularly ranked in the top-10 in passing yards (10 times), total offense (nine) and scoring offense (nine).

In Week 6 of 2015, McCarthy earned the 100th regular season win of his career in just his 150th game, making him the seventh-fastest coach in NFL history and the then fastest current NFL coach to reach the 100-win plateau. Two years later in Week 6 of 2017, McCarthy coached his 200th career game, including postseason, and having compiled 128 victories, he tied Bud Grant and Chuck Noll for the sixth-most wins by a head coach through 200 games. McCarthy is only the fourth head coach in NFL history to lead a single franchise to eight-or-more consecutive playoff appearances, joining Tom Landry, Noll and Bill Belichick. Those eight appearances from 2009-16 were more than the rest of the NFC North Division combined over that span (Minnesota, three; Detroit, three; Chicago, one).

McCarthy's nine playoff appearances in Green Bay are the most by a Packers coach since the NFL postseason began in 1933, and he guided the Packers to a franchise-record fourth consecutive division title in 2014. With the victory over Dallas in the 2016 play-offs, McCarthy surpassed Lombardi and Holmgren for the most playoff victories in team history (10).

From 2011-14, the Packers were the only NFC team to win its division each year and one of only three teams in the NFL to do so over that span (Denver, New England). Through his time in Green Bay, McCarthy led the Packers to a 51-23-2 (.684) record against division opponents. That includes an impressive stretch from 2010-12 when the Packers reeled off 12 straight wins against NFC North opponents, the longest divisional winning streak in team history.

McCarthy's success began with dominance at home. Under McCarthy at Lambeau Field, the Packers owned the fourth-best home winning percentage (.73-.27-.2), in the league from 2006 through Week 13 of 2018. In 2014 Green Bay finished 8-0 at home for the fifth time since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger (1996-97, 2002 and 2011) and was one of only two teams to go undefeated at home during the regular season (Denver). Green Bay finished with a record of .500-or-better at home in 11 consecutive seasons under McCarthy.

In his first two seasons as head coach, McCarthy oversaw a renaissance in Brett Favre's career and the development of Rodgers as the quarterback of the future. Favre concluded his Green Bay career with a 95.7 passer rating in 2007, his best in 11 years and fourth-best in his career, while completing a then career-high 66.5 percent of his passes. Favre's interceptions dropped from 29 in 2005 to 18 in 2006 and then 15 in 2007. He finished second in the voting for what would have been an unprecedented fourth NFL MVP award, and he subsequently passed the torch to Rodgers, his understudy for his final three years in Green Bay and McCarthy's prime pupil for eight-plus seasons.

After taking over as the starter in 2008, Rodgers developed into one of the greatest quarterbacks in league history. Under McCarthy's tutelage, Rodgers

topped 4,000 passing yards six times (2008-09, 2011-12, 2014, 2016), which in 2008, combined with Favre's total in 2007, marked the first time in league history a team had two different quarterbacks throw for 4,000 yards in consecutive years. In the process, Rodgers also became the first quarterback in league history to surpass the 4,000-yard plateau in each of his first two seasons as a starter. In total, McCarthy had been on the coaching staff for eight of the 13 (1999, 2007-09, 2011-12, 2014, 2016) 4,000-yard passing seasons in franchise history. Rodgers posted 21,332 passing yards from 2008-12 to set an NFL record for the most passing yards by a quarterback in his first five seasons as a starter, surpassing the previous mark held by Peyton Manning (20,618, 1998-2002). His career passer rating of 104.5 was tops in NFL history, and he is the only quarterback in NFL history to have posted a 100-plus passer rating in six consecutive seasons (2009-14).

A Pittsburgh, Pa. native, McCarthy was named the 14th head coach of the Green Bay Packers, after serving 13 years as an NFL assistant. The third-youngest head coach in the NFL when he was hired at age 42 (the Saints Sean Payton was seven weeks younger and the N.Y. Jets Eric Mangini was 35), McCarthy took over a Packers team coming off its first losing season since 1991.

McCarthy is known for taking a hands-on teaching approach with young players and is well-respected around the league, in part because he called plays for six seasons as an offensive coordinator before becoming a head coach. He has tutored an impressive roster of NFL quarterbacks, while two of the biggest names he has worked with, Favre in Green Bay and Joe Montana in Kansas City, were at or beyond their peak years at the time. McCarthy played at least a part in the development of signal callers Aaron Brooks, Jake Delhomme, Matt Hasselbeck, Matt Flynn, Marc Bulger, Rich Gannon and Elvis Grbac. The entire stable of quarterbacks that McCarthy has worked with, which also includes Jeff Blake, Steve Bono and Dave Krieg, has combined for 45 career Pro Bowl selections, 10 Super Bowl starts and 10 Most Valuable Player awards.

McCarthy broke into the NFL as a quality control assistant with the Kansas City Chiefs in 1993. It was then he worked with Montana before moving up to quarterbacks coach from 1995-98, working with starters Gannon, Grbac and Bono.

When Gannon left the Chiefs for Oakland in 1999, McCarthy departed Kansas City to become Green Bay's quarterbacks coach. That year, the Packers ranked seventh in the NFL in passing and ninth in total offense. Favre threw for 4,091 yards, the third-highest total in his career at that point.

The following year, McCarthy began a successful five-year stint as the offensive coordinator of the New Orleans Saints. It became the most prolific offensive era to that point in the team's four decades, as the Saints set 10 offensive team records and 25 individual marks. Among the more notable accomplishments, the Saints led the NFC with 432 points and 49 touchdowns in 2002, both team records at the time. In his first season in 2000, McCarthy was named NFC Assistant Coach of the Year by USA Today. In 2005 McCarthy served as offensive coordinator for the San Francisco 49ers.

McCarthy began his six-year collegiate coaching career as a graduate assistant at Fort Hays State in Hays, Kan., (1987), just after completing his playing career at nearby Baker University in Baldwin City, Kan. At Baker, McCarthy earned a degree in business administration and was an all-conference tight end and senior captain in 1986, helping lead the Wildcats to an NIAA Division II national runner-up finish. He was inducted into the school's athletic hall of fame in October 2007.

At Fort Hays State under head coach John Vincent, McCarthy coached linebackers for two years while earning a master's degree in sports administration.

McCarthy returned to his hometown in 1989, serving first as a graduate assistant (1989-91) and then wide receivers coach for the Pittsburgh Panthers.

Born in Pittsburgh, McCarthy graduated from Bishop Boyle High School in Homestead, Pa. He and

his wife, Jessica, have five children and were actively involved in the Green Bay community, including hosting the annual Mike & Jessica McCarthy Golf Invitational. Established in June 2010, the tournament benefited the American Family Children's Hospital in Madison, Wis. The event raised funds that have helped the hospital expand with two new floors, a neonatal intensive care unit and additional pediatric beds.

In 2023 Blasko helped Tony Pollard navigate a heavy workload in his first season as the lead back. Pollard's 307 touches ranked sixth among NFL running backs in 2023, and he finished with his second consecutive 1,000-yard rushing season. Pollard ended 2023 with 252 carries for 1,005 rushing yards, sixth in the NFC.

Blasko assisted an offensive line group in 2022 that saw first round draft pick Tyler Smith step in immediately as a starter at left tackle in place of Tyron Smith (injury). The rookie started 16-of-17 games at left tackle and shifted to guard for one start, becoming the first Dallas rookie offensive lineman to start every game of the season since Zack Martin in 2014, fifth lineman overall and 15th rookie.

Blasko's second season in Dallas was a return to consistency as the Dallas line remained healthy for a majority of the season. Behind the line's work, Dallas led the league in total offense (407.0 yards-per-game), was second in pass offense (282.4) and third in rushing offense (124.6). The line's blocking allowed Dak Prescott to finish in the top-10 in all major passing categories, and Ezekiel Elliott recorded his fifth 1,000-yard season as he rushed for 1,002 yards with 10 touchdowns.

In his first season in Dallas, Blasko worked a line grouping that was decimated by injury, while also losing a key cog to retirement in Travis Frederick. Having both bookends (La'el Collins, all 16 games and Tyron Smith, 14 games) sidelined, Blasko initiated rookie free agent Terence Steele to the rigors of the NFL at right tackle, second-year undrafted free agent Brandon Knight at left tackle and 2020 fourth round rookie draft pick Tyler Biadasz (four starts) at center. Blasko also saw one of the best linemen in the NFL as Martin continued his dominance, while showing flexibility as he slid out to tackle for his first career snaps outside for two starts, missing six games to injury himself. Connor Williams was the lone regular on the line, playing all but one snap through the season at left guard.

Blasko spent 2019 as the Cleveland Browns assistant offensive line coach, and prior to landing in Cleveland, he was with the Packers for three seasons (2016-18), including the final two as assistant offensive line coach. He came to the Packers in 2016 as a coaching administrator. While with Green Bay, Blasko helped David Bakhtiari earn first-team All-Pro honors in 2018 and second-team honors in 2016 and 2017.

Prior to his career in the NFL, Blasko spent eight years coaching collegiately, starting with a three-year stint (2008-10) as a graduate assistant at the University of Akron. He then moved on to the University of Florida in 2011 as the offensive quality control coach. Blasko also assisted the University of Kansas (2012-14) and the University of Pennsylvania (2015) as the team's tight ends coach.

Blasko coached on the high school level for six seasons, serving as an offensive assistant at Steel Valley in Munhall, Pa., (2002-05) and as an offensive assistant at Bethel Park, Pa. (2006-07).

A native of Pittsburgh, Pa., Blasko graduated from Robert Morris University with a bachelor's degree in information sciences in 2005 and earned a master's degree in sports administration from Akron in 2009.

Blasko and his wife, Katie, have two sons, Tommy and Cooper.

In Chinyoung's first season with Dallas, he helped coach an offensive line that anchored the league's top scoring offense (29.9 points-per-game) while protecting the NFL's passing touchdown leader in 2023 - Dak Prescott (36). Chinyoung also helped oversee two Cowboys offensive linemen garner Pro Bowl and All-Pro honors. Zack Martin was named first-team All-Pro, while Tyler Smith was named second-team in just his second NFL season.

Before joining the Cowboys, Chinyoung entered the NFL in 2022 as an offensive quality control coach for the Denver Broncos.

Chinyoung came to the NFL with 10 years of full-time coaching experience, and he previously served as head coach/campus coordinator at Fort Bend Willowridge High School in Houston, Texas from 2020-21. In two seasons at the helm, Chinyoung led the Eagles to an appearance in the 2020 Texas High School Football Playoffs.

Prior to Willowridge, Chinyoung spent eight seasons (2012-19) at Westfield High School, also in Houston. He served as assistant offensive line coach for four seasons (2012-15) before being promoted to assistant head coach while also overseeing the offensive line (2016-19). During his eight seasons at Westfield, the Mustangs recorded a 96-15 overall record, including a 58-1 mark in district play and registered first-place finishes in the district every year of his tenure. As assistant head coach, Chinyoung helped lead the team to 47 wins and an undefeated record in district play in each of his final four seasons. In that span, Westfield recorded five consecutive playoff appearances, posting a 12-4 record in the postseason.

Chinyoung attended Southern University, where he was a four-year letterwinner from 2007-10. He was named first-team All-SWAC on two occasions while being honored as a first-team All-Louisiana player in 2009.

Chinyoung earned a bachelor's degree from Southern University in therapeutic recreation and leisure studies.

He and his wife, Morgan Broussard-Chinyoung have two sons, Ramon II (RJ) and Myles Henry.

After an illustrious playing career - including 11 seasons with Dallas - Greg Ellis is entering his first NFL coaching gig as the Dallas Cowboys assistant defensive line coach in 2024.

Ellis spent four years at the collegiate level. In 2020 he was named athletic director and head football coach at Texas College, an NIAA school in Tyler, Texas. Ellis' first season with the program (2020), was canceled due to COVID-19, and in 2021, Texas College went 0-11.

In June 2022, Ellis accepted his second collegiate head coaching job at Southwestern Assemblies of God

(SAGU), an NIAA school in Waxahachie, Texas, about 30 miles south of Dallas. Ellis led SAGU to a 7-3 record in 2022, including the school's second consecutive NCCAA Victory Bowl appearance. SAGU finished 4-6 in 2023, Ellis' last season with the program.

Ellis' 12-year playing career began in 1998, when the Dallas Cowboys selected him with the eighth overall pick. He spent 11 seasons with Dallas and finished his Cowboys career with 77.0 sacks, ninth in franchise history. He led the team in sacks six times, third-most in franchise history behind DeMarcus Ware (eight seasons) and Harvey Martin (seven).

In 2007 Ellis was named NFL Comeback Player of the Year after returning from a ruptured Achilles injury that ended his 2006 season. While playing just 13 games in 2007, Ellis earned his first Pro Bowl selection and a career-high 12.5 sacks.

Ellis played one season with the Oakland Raiders in 2009 before retiring from the NFL.

Ellis played collegiately at North Carolina from 1994-97, where he was a three-time first-team All-ACC selection. He and his wife, Tangie, have two daughters, Tyann and Taliah, and one son, Geremiah.

John Fassel, who is known as one of the most creative special teams coaches in the league, enters his fifth season as the Cowboys special teams coordinator. Fassel, who headed up special teams for two pro clubs prior to his arrival in Dallas - LA Rams (2012-19) and Oakland Raiders (2009-11) - has dramatically improved the

Prior to Fassel's arrival, Dallas finished the 2019 season last in the NFL in kick return average and 31st in both net and gross punting average. Since 2020, the Cowboys rank second in the NFL in net punting average (43.4), fifth in kickoff return average (24.6) and fourth in field goals made (128).

The 2023 season marked the second straight year that the Cowboys signed a kicker in the summer prior to preseason, as Dallas added former soccer player and USFL kicker Brandon Aubrey to compete for the kicking job in training camp. Aubrey emerged from camp with a solid foothold as the kicker, and his performance proved to be one for the ages. Under Fassel's watchful eye, Aubrey set the franchise record for most points in a single season and most points in a first season in NFL history with 157. Aubrey also established the NFL record for consecutive field goals made without a miss to start a career, connecting on 35 straight field goals before his first miss, and led the NFL with 36 made kicks on the year, finishing third in the league with a 94.7% field goal percentage. Aubrey became the first Cowboys kicker to win NFC Special Teams Player of the Month since Richie Cunningham in 1997 and established a team record with 10 field goals of 50-plus yards on the year, capping off 2023 with a Pro Bowl berth and first-team All-Pro honors.

Bryan Anger also had a career year in 2023, earning his second career Pro Bowl nod (both under Fassel). Anger set single-season franchise records with a 44.9 net average and led the NFL with a 51.4 gross average. Dallas ranked last in punt returns (18) and 14th in kick returns (18) in 2023, but thanks to Fassel spearheading the push to change the kickoff rule in 2024, electric return man KaVaontae Turpin should see many more opportunities to affect the game in the upcoming season.

Midway through 2022 training camp, Dallas tried out multiple kickers in Oxnard, Calif., and signed Brett Maher, a veteran kicker who spent 2018 and most of the 2019 season with the Cowboys. Fassel helped Maher have a career season, making 29-of-32 field goals for a career-high 90.6 field goal percentage. Maher totaled nine 50-plus yard field goals in 2022, second-most in a season in team history. He also racked up 137 kicking points, second in franchise history and tied for the third-most in the NFL in 2022. One other valuable addition in training camp was rookie wide receiver/return specialist Turpin. Turpin broke onto the scene when he returned both a punt and kick return for a touchdown in the preseason win at the LA Chargers (8/20). Turpin finished the 2022 season fifth in punt return average (10.4) and was the only NFL player with a 50-yard kick return and 50-yard punt return. Turpin earned his first Pro Bowl selection and became the first player in Cowboys history to be named to the Pro Bowl as a return specialist.

In 2021 Fassel's special teams unit was one of the most effective groups in the NFL, highlighted by a league-high three blocked punts - two of which were recovered for a touchdown. Fassel's unit also led the NFL with four blocked kicks (three punts, one PAT) while tallying an NFL-high three special teams touchdowns. Fassel had a major influence in signing veteran punter Anger in free agency prior to the 2021 season. Under Fassel, Anger was selected to his first career Pro Bowl after leading the NFL and setting a then team record with a 44.6 net average in 2021. Anger's 44.6 net average was also the fourth-highest in NFL history. Along with an impressive net average, Anger set the then fran-

chise record in gross average (48.4). Fassel, who was with Greg Zuerlein since his rookie season with the LA Rams in 2012, watched Zuerlein become the third-fastest kicker to reach 250 field goals in NFL history, doing so in just 144 career games.

In 2020 Fassel helped Dallas secure Zuerlein, a player Fassel coached through his entire tenure with the Rams, to help the kicking unit. Zuerlein converted 34-of-41 field goals and 33-of-36 PAT tries, allowing him to set the club record for field goal attempts in a season, tie for the most field goals made and tie for second in single-season points (135). Tony Pollard settled in as the kickoff returner for Dallas, and he tied for second in the league with 32 returns, was fourth with 766 yards and eighth with an average of 23.9 yards-per-return. Additionally, Fassel worked with two different punters - Chris Jones and Hunter Niswander - after Jones was lost midway through the season with an abdominal injury.

In 2019 the Rams special teams unit returned two of the NFL's top specialists in Zuerlein and Johnny Hekker. Zuerlein's 24 field goals (24-of-33) tied for fourth in his career, and he connected on all 42 PAT tries. Called on for only 66 punts in 2019, Hekker finished third in the NFL with a 47.4 gross average and seventh with a 42.4 net, along with 22 punts downed inside the opponent's 20-yard line and a long of 71 yards (second-longest of his career).

Fassel's group continued to flourish in 2018 in all four phases of special teams, despite using multiple kickers and returners during the regular season. Cory Littleton blocked a pair of punts and posted an additional deflected punt en route to earning his first career Pro Bowl selection. It marked the ninth Rams special teams selection since Fassel took over in 2012. Zuerlein converted a 57-yard game-winning field goal in overtime of the NFC Championship game to send the Rams to the Super Bowl, marking the longest game-winning kick in playoff history.

In 2017 four Rams special teamers were named to the Pro Bowl in returner Pharoah Cooper, Hekker, long snapper Jake McQuaide and Zuerlein. Zuerlein led the league in scoring (158 points) despite playing only 14 games before going on the Reserve/Injured list.

In 2016 Hekker earned his third trip to the Pro Bowl after setting an NFL record with 51 punts downed inside the 20. He also established an NFL record for single-season net punting average (46.0), breaking the previous record that Hekker himself set in 2013. McQuaide became the first long snapper in franchise history to earn a Pro Bowl berth. From 2013-17, Benny Cunningham averaged 27.1 yards-per-kickoff return, a franchise career record. In addition to his special teams duties, Fassel served as interim head coach for the final three games in 2016.

In 2015 Hekker produced one of the best punting seasons in NFL history to earn his second Pro Bowl honor. The fourth-year pro led the NFL in punts (96), gross average (47.9), net average (43.7) and punts downed

inside the 20-yard line (41), becoming the first player to lead the league in all three categories since the NFL began tracking punts inside the 20 in 1976.

In Fassel's 2014 campaign, his units finished among the league's best in several categories. As a team, St. Louis was fifth in net punt average (41.8) and second in punt return average (13.0). The team's net punting average was the third-highest ever by a Rams special teams unit. Individually, Tavon Austin finished fifth in punt return average (11.2) and was an alternate to the Pro Bowl, while Cunningham led the NFC and was fifth in the NFL in kick return average (27.5).

In 2013 Fassel's punt team, led by Hekker, set a single-season NFL record for net punting average (44.2) and was named first-team All-Pro along with his first trip to the Pro Bowl. Zuerlein connected on the first 15 field goal attempts of his career and set a team record with eight field goals from 50 yards-or-more.

Fassel spent four seasons with the Raiders, first as assistant special teams coordinator in 2008, then special teams coordinator for three seasons (2009-11). While with the Raiders, his units led the NFL in takeaways, turnover differential and points scored in 2009 and 2010. Under Fassel's tutelage, punter Shane Lechler earned a Pro Bowl spot three consecutive years. In addition, Sebastian Janikowski achieved a single-season career-high 89.7 field goal percentage, missing only three attempts (47, 57 and 66 yards) in 2011. Janikowski also converted the then third-longest field goal in NFL history, a team-record 61-yarder at Cleveland in December 2009 and tied a then NFL record with a 63-yarder in 2011. Additionally, long snapper Jon Condo earned two Pro Bowl berths.

From 2005-07, Fassel was Baltimore's assistant special teams coach and helped the team to top-10 finishes in punt and kick return average from 2006-07.

From 2003-04, he was the head coach and assistant athletic director at New Mexico Highlands University. Fassel also served six months as the school's interim athletic director and taught undergraduate and graduate courses. He earned a master's degree in athletic administration at Idaho State, where he was a graduate assistant and sports science instructor from 2000-01. In 1999 and 2001, Fassel coached wide receivers and recruited for Bucknell. In Spring 2000, Fassel was the strength & conditioning and wide receivers coach for the Amsterdam Admirals of NFL Europe.

Fassel played wide receiver at Weber State, graduating in 1999 with a degree in exercise science. He signed as a rookie free agent wide receiver with the Indianapolis Colts.

Fassel is the son of late NFL coach Jim Fassel, who guided the New York Giants to the Super Bowl during the 2000 season. John is a triathlete who has finished three Ironman distance triathlons. He and his wife, Elizabeth, have three daughters: Lilah, Avery and Anna.

Ryan Feder arrived in 2020 as one of Dallas' quality control coordinators, working primarily with the

defense and linebackers unit. In 2023 Feder moved to the offensive side of the ball, where he helped with the quarterbacks, and in 2024 he was officially named the assistant quarterbacks coach/Game Management.

Feder's responsibilities also include devising a plan for specific game management decisions.

As part of the offensive staff in 2023, Feder helped design an offensive game plan that helped the Cowboys lead the league in scoring offense (29.9) and rank fifth in total offense (371.6). While working with the quarterbacks, Feder was part of a room that featured Dak Prescott, who led the NFL with 36 touchdown passes in 2023 and finished as the MVP runner-up. He also assisted in the development of Trey Lance, who was acquired from San Francisco via trade prior to the 2023 regular season.

From 2020-22, Feder helped coach a linebackers unit featuring two-time All-Pro Micah Parsons and Leighton Vander Esch. Parsons set the franchise rookie

record with 13.0 sacks in 2021 - tied for the third-most by a rookie in NFL history - and became the first player in team history to be named NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year. Parsons followed that up with 13.5 sacks in 2022 while finishing second in Defensive Player of the Year voting. Feder also helped guide Vander Esch (100 tackles in 2022) to his first 100-tackle season since his rookie year in 2018.

After departing Green Bay in 2018, Feder spent 2019 as a graduate assistant at Nebraska, assisting with the defensive backs while also pursuing a master's degree in business administration.

After earning his bachelor's degree in management and marketing from Florida State, Feder earned a law degree with a specialization in sports law from Tulane. While at Tulane Law School, Feder worked for two seasons as an analyst for Pro Football Focus, collecting and analyzing player participation data for NFL and NCAA teams and generating advanced scouting reports to target team trends and inefficiencies.

Feder also spent one year as an intern at Pro Sports Inc., assisting with 2014 NFL Draft preparation, including analyzing positional player contract structures and trends and researching and analyzing undrafted free agent signings and contract trends. During those three years, he also was a writer for OverTheCap.com, a website which analyzes the NFL salary cap.

The Dallas Cowboys hired Paul Guenther in 2024 to improve a run defense that ranked 16th in the NFL in 2023.

Guenther is entering his 20th season in the NFL and has coached with Defensive Coordinator Mike Zimmer in

13 seasons with Cincinnati, Guenther helped the team win four AFC North titles (2005, 2009, 2013 and 2015) and reach the playoffs seven times, including a five-year postseason streak from 2011-15.

After serving as a special teams and defensive assistant in his first nine years with Cincinnati, Guenther was promoted to the Bengals defensive coordinator in 2014 after Zimmer left to become the head coach of the Vikings. As the Bengals defensive play caller from 2014-17, Guenther guided a unit that ranked fifth in points allowed-per-game (20.1) during that span. In 2015 Cincinnati ranked second in the NFL and set single-season franchise records in scoring defense (17.4) and total rushing yards allowed (1,477). He once again posted a top-10 defense in 2016, when the Bengals ranked eighth in 2016 (19.7). Guenther coached defensive players to eight Pro Bowl selections as coordinator, including four straight Pro Bowl berths for defensive tackle Geno Atkins.

Along with keeping teams off the scoreboard, Guenther put an emphasis on takeaways, as the Bengals recorded 69 interceptions in his four years as defensive coordinator, best in the NFL. The Bengals also limited opposing quarterbacks to an 80.1 passer rating from 2014-17, best in the NFL over that span.

From 2005-11, Guenther assisted on special teams each season while also working with the linebackers from 2005-10 and defensive backs in 2011. In 2011 he also worked closely with Zimmer on blitz packages, and the Bengals ranked fifth in the NFL with 45 sacks, up from 27 the previous year.

Guenther started his NFL career as an offensive quality control coach with the Washington Commanders in 2002, working with Marvin Lewis.

Prior to the NFL, Guenther spent four years (1997-2000) as the head coach at his alma mater, Ursinus College, a Division III school in Pennsylvania. He was the youngest head coach in college football in the 1997 season at age 25. Guenther led the program to the NCAA Division III playoffs in 1999 and 2000, and his 1999 squad finished 10-2, setting a school record for wins.

Guenther's most recent coaching stop came in 2021 with the Minnesota Vikings, where he helped Zimmer construct defensive packages and assisted with the defensive gameplan.

Prior to Minnesota, Guenther spent three seasons (2018-20) as the Las Vegas Raiders defensive coordinator. In 2020 Guenther mentored defensive end Maxx Crosby, who led the team with 7.0 sacks, and second-year cornerback Trayvon Mullen, who posted career-highs in tackles (62), interceptions (two) and pass breakups (14).

In 2019 Guenther led a run defense that allowed just 98.1 rushing yards-per-game, the seventh-best mark in Raiders history. That total also ranked eighth in the NFL in 2019, was a 22-spot improvement from the team's finish in 2018 and the club's highest since 2002. The Raiders pass rush generated 32 sacks - 19 more than 2018 - while leading the league in rookie sacks (14.5) on the year. Crosby, the team's 2019 fourth round draft pick, ranked second among all NFL rookies with 10.0 sacks, which was also the second-most by a rookie in team history.

Guenther's first season with the Raiders saw him lead a young defense that grew as the year went on. He inherited a defense that finished last in interceptions in 2017 and improved to 14th in 2018 (14).

Before joining Ursinus as an assistant in 1996, Guenther began his coaching career at Western Maryland as an assistant from 1994-95.

A native of Richboro, PA, Guenther played linebacker at Ursinus and set the school record in career tackles (355) while earning all-conference honors three times. He and his wife, Patrice, have two sons, Jake and Duke.

In 2023 Harrington assisted with a new Dallas offense that finished fifth in the league in total yards-per-game (371.6), first in first downs-per-game (22.6) and second in third down percentage (48.3) while posting a league-best 509 total points. Harrington worked closely with the quarterbacks and running backs in his role and helped Tony Pollard reach 1,000 yards on the ground for the second-straight season (1,006).

Harrington assisted with the offensive game plan in 2022 and helped Dallas finish fourth in the NFL in scoring (27.5) despite Dak Prescott's thumb injury that sidelined him for five games. Harrington helped in the quarterback room, and when Prescott returned to action in Week 7 against Detroit (10/23), Dallas' offense led the league in offensive points-per-game (31.3) and third down offense (52.3%) for the remainder of the season.

In 2021 Harrington served as the tight ends coach at North Carolina Central, and under Harrington's tutelage, Isiah Macklin earned third-team All-Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference and was selected to play in the 2022 HBCU Legacy Bowl after finishing fourth on the team with 16 receptions for 201 yards and a touchdown.

From 2019-21, Harrington worked for the Washington Commanders as an offensive assistant and the

assistant director of player engagement. As an offensive assistant, he worked with the running backs and offensive line, helping Adrian Peterson to 1,040 scrimmage yards as the lead back in 2019. As the assistant director of player engagement, Harrington was responsible for helping guide the development and education of players in both their personal and professional lives along with assisting rookie classes with acclimating themselves to the life of the NFL.

In 2018 Harrington was the running backs coach and run game coordinator at Independence Community College in Independence, Kansas, leading the Pirates to 147.7 rushing yards-per-game.

Harrington served as the head coach of the Winterthur Warriors from 2015-17 in the Swiss Football League after playing running back and linebacker for the Frankfurt Galaxy (2015) and the Basel Gladiators (2014) He also spent time as a fullback for the Canadian Football League's Edmonton Eskimos in 2012.

Before playing in Europe, Harrington was an assistant coach at Clayton Valley Charter High School and the College of the Canyons, also spending time as a strength and conditioning intern at the College of the Canyons. Harrington began his coaching career at Colorado, coaching running backs and fullbacks as a graduate assistant in 2012.

Harrington played linebacker and fullback at Colorado from 2010-11, tallying seven special teams tackles and rushing twice for three yards with seven catches for 41 yards and a touchdown in his Buffaloes career.

Harrington graduated from Colorado with a degree in sociology, ethnic studies and communications.

Harrington and his wife, Daniela, have three sons, E.J., Dakari and Kibwe.

The Cowboys hired Al Harris to assist in coaching the defensive backs in 2020. Harris brings a wealth of knowledge to the Cowboys, spending the previous 11 years in coaching at both the collegiate and professional levels after finishing a 15-year NFL career as a prolific secondary player, earning two Pro Bowl nods and an All-Pro selection.

Harris earned the title of Assistant Head Coach/Defensive Backs heading into the 2024 season after leading the secondary to historic heights in 2023. All-Pro cornerback Trevon Diggs was lost for the season following a knee injury prior to Week 3, but second-year player DaRon Bland stepped up in a big way to fill the void, establishing an NFL record with five pick-sixes and a NFL-leading nine interceptions. Bland's five interception return scores in 2023 alone set the Cowboys career record, and he became one-of-six defensive players since the NFL merger to record five touchdowns in a season. Bland earned the lone Pro Bowl selection from the secondary and also took home first-team All-Pro honors. The secondary gave opposing quarterbacks fits, holding enemy passers to an 80.8 rating (sixth in the NFL) and recorded the eighth-most interceptions (17) while holding opponents to 187.4 net passing yards-per-game, fifth in the NFL and the lowest total by a Cowboys secondary since 2003. Veteran addition Stephon Gilmore proved to be a worthy acquisition, as he tied for sixth in the NFL with 14 forced incompletions, per PFF.

In 2022 Harris' unit improved from 20th in 2021 to eighth in the NFL in pass defense, limiting opposing offenses to 200.9 passing yards-per-game. Harris' top corner - Diggs - led the team with 14 pass breakups and tied for second on the team with three interceptions. Diggs was selected to his second straight Pro Bowl to become the first Cowboys cornerback since Deion Sanders (1996-99) to make it in consecutive years. Additionally, Harris helped Donovan Wilson have a breakout season, as the safety led the defense with a career-high 108 tackles. Harris also guided rookie cornerback Bland to step in as a starter after Anthony Brown suffered a season-ending Achilles injury. Bland's five interceptions led the defense in 2022 and were the most by a Cowboys rookie since 2002.

Under Harris' watch, Diggs experienced a meteoric rise during the 2021 season, becoming one of the best players at his position as he led the NFL with a franchise-high tying 11 interceptions. Overall, Diggs became the third Cowboy - fifth time - to lead the league in interceptions and the first since Everson Walls in 1985 (nine). Diggs was selected to his first Pro Bowl and earned first team All-Pro honors. Jayron Kearse paced the defense with a career-high 92 tackles during his first season with the team, while cornerback Anthony Brown set single-season career-bests in tackles (79),

pass breakups (17) and interceptions (three). In total, Harris' unit contributed to a defense that led the league in takeaways (34) and interceptions (26).

Harris oversaw the development of two rising young talents in the Dallas secondary in 2020, with rookie cornerback Diggs and second-year safety Wilson taking major steps as contributors for the back-end of the Cowboys defense. Diggs led all Cowboys defenders in interceptions (three) and pass breakups (14) as a rookie for the first time in Cowboys history (Cowboys did not track breakups before 1984). Despite being the seventh cornerback selected in the 2020 NFL Draft, Diggs tallied as many interceptions in his first year as the seven players drafted before him combined. Wilson emerged as a versatile weapon in the secondary, finishing the year with 67 tackles, two interceptions, three forced fumbles and 3.5 sacks. His 3.5 sacks were tied for fourth by a Cowboys defensive back in a season in team history.

Harris spent the 2019 season as a defensive assistant on Lane Kiffin's staff at Florida Atlantic University, helping guide the Owls to a program record-tying 11 wins and a bowl game win over SMU.

Harris was with the Kansas City Chiefs from 2013-18 as the secondary coach, overseeing a group that finished top-10 in interceptions in all but one of his six seasons at the helm, including a first place finish in 2016 (19) and two top-three finishes (2013, 2015). He oversaw Pro Bowl performances from Eric Berry (2013, 2015-16), Brandon Flowers (2013) and Marcus Peters (2015-16), who led the NFL in interceptions (19) during his three seasons with the Chiefs. Harris went to the playoffs in five of his six seasons with Kansas City, including an AFC Championship appearance in 2018.

Prior to joining the Chiefs in 2013, Harris started his coaching career in 2012 as a coaching intern with the Miami Dolphins under Head Coach Joe Philbin.

Originally drafted by Tampa Bay in the sixth round (169th overall) of the 1997 NFL Draft, Harris started 128-of-194 games played with the Philadelphia Eagles, Green Bay Packers, Miami Dolphins and St. Louis Rams. He finished his 15-year NFL career with 469 tackles, 21 interceptions, 148 passes defended and 4.0 sacks. Harris started his career on the Tampa Bay practice squad in 1997 before signing with Philadelphia in 1998, appearing as the team's nickel cornerback for five years and played in two NFC Championship games (2001 and 2002). He then spent seven seasons with the Packers (2003-09), including four under Head Coach Mike McCarthy, and earned Pro Bowl selections in 2007 and 2008. Harris finished his playing career with one season each in Miami (2010) and with the Rams (2011).

Harris was a two-year starter for Texas A&M-Kingsville from 1995-96 and was a first-team All-Lone Star Conference selection in 1996. His first two seasons of collegiate football were played at Trinity Valley Community College in Athens, Texas, where he was a member of a National Championship team.

Harris and his wife, Shyla, have a daughter, Lyla, and three sons, Al Jr., Gavin and Gage.

In 2023 Haslett served as the assistant tight ends coach, one of the youngest position groups on the roster. Haslett helped Jake Ferguson, who was in his first year as a starter, earn his first Pro Bowl selection. Ferguson finished second on the team with 71 receptions for 761 yards and five touchdowns. Ferguson's 761 receiving yards were eighth among all NFL tight ends, and his 90 career receptions were the second-most catches by a Cowboys tight end in the first two seasons of a career.

From 2020-22, Haslett was an offensive quality control coach and primarily helped with the tight ends. In 2022 Dalton Schultz topped 50 catches for the third straight year. Behind Schultz were two rookies, Ferguson and Peyton Hendershot, who combined to become the third rookie tight end duo in NFL history to record multiple receiving touchdowns in their first seasons.

The Cowboys offense led the NFL in scoring (31.2 points-per-game) and yards (407.0 yards-per-game) in 2021. Haslett once again worked closely with the tight

ends, helping Schultz to the best season of his career with 78 receptions, 808 yards and eight touchdowns.

In 2020 Haslett assisted an offense that ranked in the top-10 of most primary statistical categories. In the first five games of 2020, Haslett helped quarterback Dak Prescott lead the NFL in passing yards-per-game (371.2). Despite losing Prescott to injury and playing four different quarterbacks, the Cowboys offense ranked seventh in the NFL in receiving yards, eighth in passing yards and ninth in scrimmage yards.

Prior to Dallas, Haslett spent four years in the college ranks. Having grown up around coaching under the watchful eye of his father and longtime NFL coach, Jim Haslett, Chase earned his first foray into the NFL coaching ranks after cutting his teeth across the offensive side of the ball at Nebraska (graduate assistant/quarterbacks) in 2016-17, Mississippi State (quality control/offense) in 2018 and Mercer College (tight ends) in 2019.

A former collegiate quarterback at Illinois and Indiana University of Pennsylvania (IUP), Haslett earned his bachelor of science in recreation, sport and tourism from the University of Illinois in 2014 and his master of science in sport science from IUP in 2015.

Haslett and his wife, Paige, were married in July 2019 and have a son Caden.

Cannon Matthews joined Mike McCarthy's inaugural staff in Dallas as the defensive quality control coach after spending the previous three seasons in the same capacity with Washington.

Matthews enters his fifth season with the Cowboys in a new role as the safeties coach.

In 2023 Matthews was promoted as the team's assistant defensive backs coach, where he worked with defensive backs coach Al Harris. The duo coached All-Pro corner DaRon Bland, who set an NFL record for most pick-sixes in a single season (five), led the league in interceptions (nine) and logged a career-best 15 starts in his second season in the league.

In his first three seasons in Dallas (2020-22), Matthews assisted the defensive staff in the preparation of

the game plan, developing the playbook and breaking down opponent film. On the field, Matthews helped with the secondary and coordinated the opponent scout team.

He continued his on-field role with defensive backs, and highlighted at the position was Trevon Diggs as he became the first Cowboys cornerback since Deion Sanders (1996-99) to be named to the Pro Bowl in consecutive years (2021-22).

Matthews was named Washington's defensive quality control coach on February 13, 2017 after serving one year as the assistant defensive backs coach for the Cleveland Browns in 2016.

In Cleveland, Matthews helped guide a unit that recorded all 10 of the team's interceptions that season. The stint was his second with the Browns, including a defensive coaching internship during the 2013 season in which Cleveland jumped from 23rd to ninth in the NFL in total defense.

From 2014-15, Matthews held the defensive quality control role for the Tennessee Titans, assisting with the

team's linebackers. In his first season with the Titans in 2014, the team recorded at least one sack by 18 different players, a team record and the most in the NFL. One year later, the Titans finished sixth in the NFL in sacks-per-pass play, seventh in passing yards allowed and eighth in opponent rushing average.

Matthews spent one season as the running backs coach at Kentucky Christian University in 2012, helping the Knights to a 7-4 record and top-25 ranking during the first winning season in school history.

Prior to his time at the collegiate level, Matthews spent one year in Cleveland as an intern in the personnel department (2007) and four years with the Buffalo Bills. He served as a defensive and special teams coaching assistant from 2008-09 before transitioning to the offensive side of the ball for the 2010-11 seasons. He spent one season as a personnel intern with the Arena Football League's Arizona Rattlers in 2008.

A native of Bedford Heights, Ohio, Matthews earned a degree in sport management from Ohio University.

Scott McCurley enters 2024 as the Dallas Cowboys linebackers coach for the fifth straight season.

McCurley previously spent 13 seasons with the Green Bay Packers as a defensive assistant (2018), assistant linebackers coach (2014-17), defensive quality control (2009-13) and in coaching administration (2006-08). He spent the 2019 season out of football.

In 2023 there was a youth movement at the linebacker position following the season-ending neck injury to Leighton Vander Esch in Week 5. Second-year player Damone Clark made the transition to middle linebacker and played the sixth-most snaps of any defender on the year, leading the team with a career-high 115 tackles and four tackles for loss. After the injury to Vander Esch, Markquese Bell moved from safety to linebacker to aid the position, and he turned in a career year with 103 tackles (second on the team) and three tackles for loss. The return of 2023 draft pick DeMarion Overshown from injury and free agent addition Eric Kendricks should give the 2024 unit a boost heading into McCurley's fifth season.

In 2022 McCurley worked with Vander Esch and veteran free agent addition Anthony Barr to help solidify the second level of a Cowboys defense that ranked third in rushing scores allowed (nine) and ninth in opponent negative rushing play percentage (9.8%). Vander Esch had a resurgent season for Dallas, starting all 14

games played and finished second on the defense with 100 tackles while working alongside his battery-mate Barr, who added 61 tackles for the defense. Rookie Damone Clark, who missed the first seven games due to an injury suffered in college, saw more action on defense than anticipated, but responded well to add 50 tackles and two forced fumbles.

McCurley's second season with the Cowboys linebackers was highlighted by 2021 first round selection Micah Parsons out of Penn State. The rookie linebacker provided immediate production from Week 1 and went on to boast one of the best years by a rookie in NFL history. He racked up a franchise rookie record 13.0 sacks - tied for the third-most by a rookie in NFL history - and became the first player in team history to be named NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year. Other linebackers Vander Esch (86 tackles) and Keanu Neal (79) were second and tied for third on the team, respectively, in tackles.

In his first year with Dallas as the linebackers coach (2020), McCurley helped Jaylon Smith finish with a team-high 160 tackles, which ranked second in the NFL. McCurley also assisted with a defensive unit that forced 23 takeaways, seventh in the NFL.

As a defensive assistant in 2018, the Packers unit produced 44.0 sacks to tie for eighth in the NFL. Additionally, Blake Martinez produced his second consecutive 100-tackle season with a team-high 147 stops - the first Packer to lead the team in tackles in consecutive seasons since A.J. Hawk (2012-13).

As Green Bay's assistant linebackers coach (2014-17), McCurley worked with Associate Head Coach/Linebackers Winston Moss to oversee the preparation



of all linebackers with an emphasis on the inside linebackers. In 2017 second-year linebacker Martinez led the team with 158 tackles - eighth in team history - and 12 tackles for a loss. In 2015 McCurley helped Moss utilize the versatility of Clay Matthews in a switch to middle linebacker, as he started all 16 games for the first time in his career and made his sixth Pro Bowl with a career-high 85 tackles along with 6.5 sacks.

During his time as quality control coach, McCurley spent different seasons assisting with various positions throughout the defense.

McCurley broke into the NFL as a coaching admin with the Packers from 2006-08.

Before coming to Green Bay, McCurley enjoyed a lengthy playing and coaching career at the University of Pittsburgh. Initially a walk-on athlete who redshirt-

ed his first year, he earned a scholarship after his freshman season, lettered all four years at linebacker (1999-2002) and earned a spot on the 1999 Big East All-Academic team. Following graduation in 2003 with a bachelor's degree in movement science with a coaching minor, McCurley remained with the program as a defensive graduate assistant, where the 2004 team he coached won the Big East championship and a spot in the Fiesta Bowl.

Born in New Castle, Pa., McCurley attended Mohawk High School in Bessemer, Pa., where he earned all-conference honors his junior and senior years, playing linebacker and offensive line.

McCurley and his wife, Colleen, have two sons, Quentin and Deacon.

Harold Nash enters his fourth season as the Dallas Cowboys strength and conditioning coordinator, fifth overall with the team.

Nash was elevated to the lead role on the strength staff prior to the 2021 season after spending the 2020 season with the team as an assistant strength coach. In Nash's first year with the team, he was forced to navigate a devastating tragedy when head strength and conditioning coach Markus Paul passed away mid-season. Nash was thrust into a leadership role to finish the 2020 season, and he was hired in that position full-time going forward after demonstrating tremendous poise, cohesion and leadership.

In 2023 Nash worked closely with several players who returned from season-ending injuries in 2022, including Terence Steele (ACL), Jourdan Lewis (foot) and Rico Dowdle (ankle). Lewis was voted the Ed Block Courage Award recipient for his comeback.

In 2021 Nash was tasked with preparing a number of starters who missed upwards of 100 combined games due to injury in 2020, including Dak Prescott, who suffered a gruesome ankle injury in Week 5 of the 2020 season. Nash was instrumental in helping Prescott return to form in 2021, as the Dallas signal caller threw a franchise record 37 touchdown passes.

Nash joined Dallas after two previous stints in the NFL with the Detroit Lions and the New England Patriots.

In 2019 Nash served as the football performance coordinator for Detroit after working as the Lions head strength & conditioning coach his first three seasons with the team (2016-18). Nash coordinated the Lions performance program, including a comprehensive on and off-field workout plan which helped revamp the team's approach to player health and fitness to help maximize player performance and body recovery.

Prior to joining the Lions in 2016, he spent 11 seasons (2005-15) working with the New England Patriots, where he began as the team's assistant strength and conditioning coach (2005-10) before being promoted to head strength and conditioning coach in 2011. While with New England, Nash implemented the Patriots year-round conditioning program and also served as the team's player development director from 2005-10.

A former defensive back, Nash enjoyed an 11-year career in the Canadian Football League (1994-2004), including stints with the Shreveport Pirates (1994-95), Montreal Alouettes (1996-99), Winnipeg Blue Bombers (1999-2003) and Edmonton Eskimos (2004). He earned CFL All-Star recognition in 1997, 2000 and 2001.

Nash attended the University of Southwestern Louisiana (now Louisiana) and joined the football team as a walk-on, where he played defensive back for four seasons. Following his collegiate career, he signed with the New York Giants as an undrafted free agent and was a member of the team's training camp in 1993. He graduated from Southwestern Louisiana with a Bachelor of Science in Humanities.

A native of New Orleans, La., Nash and his wife, Dwan, have a son, Harold Nash III, who plays at Memphis.

The Dallas Cowboys hired Robert Prince in 2022 to coach a talented wide receivers room, and in 2024, he added passing game coordinator to his title.

In 2023 Prince helped CeeDee Lamb etch his name into both the Cowboys and NFL record books. Under Prince, Lamb set the single-season franchise record in receptions (135) and receiving yards (1,749) en route to his third straight Pro Bowl selection and was named first-team All-Pro. Along with leading the league in receptions (135), Lamb sat atop the NFL in targets (168), yards after catch (680), slot receiving yards (907) and 20-plus yard receptions (29). Lamb's 14 total touchdowns (12 receiving and two rushing) were also the most among all NFL wide receivers on the year. After the 2023 campaign, Prince was named the Darryl Drake Memorial Wide Receiver Coach of the Year by his peers across the league.

In his first season leading the Cowboys wideouts, Prince was tasked with transitioning Lamb into the No. 1 wide receiver role. Lamb did not disappoint as the team's top threat, leading the team with 107 receptions (tied for fifth in the NFL), 1,359 yards (sixth) and nine touchdowns (tied for sixth) as he earned his second straight trip to the Pro Bowl and a second-team All-Pro nod. Additionally, Prince's tutelage saw Noah Brown post career numbers in catches (43 - third on the team) and yards (555 - third).

Prince has 34 years of coaching experience, including 16 years in the NFL, and helped 12 of his receivers reach the Pro Bowl. Prince has an additional 17 years of experience at the collegiate level.

In his lone season with the Texans, Prince helped Brandin Cooks record a career-high 90 catches for 1,037 yards and six touchdowns. Cooks also became the third player in Texans history with back-to-back 1,000-yard seasons.

Prior to Houston, Prince spent seven seasons with the Detroit Lions (2014-20) as the wide receiver

coach. In Prince's seven years with Detroit, Lions receivers ranked fourth in the NFL in receiving yards (19,749) and seventh in both receptions (1,484) and receiving touchdowns (123).

While with Detroit, Prince helped Kenny Golladay record his second 1,000-yard receiving season in 2019, the first player in team history with two 1,000-yard seasons in his first three years. Prince also worked with Hall of Fame wide receiver Calvin Johnson from 2014-15, with Johnson earning Pro Bowl nods in both years. In 2014 Johnson and Golden Tate both surpassed 1,000 receiving yards, becoming the sixth duo in Lions history to reach 1,000 yards in the same season.

Before landing in Detroit, Prince was a key factor in crafting one of college football's most potent offensive attacks at Boise State. As the Boise State offensive coordinator in 2012, Prince's offense powered the team to an 11-2 record, and five of his offensive players were named All-Mountain West. Before taking on offensive coordinator duties, Prince served as the wide receivers coach for Boise State in 2011.

For the 2007-08 seasons, Prince worked as the assistant wide receivers coach at Jacksonville, and then joined the Seattle Seahawks in 2009 as the wide receivers coach.

Prince made his NFL coaching debut in Atlanta as an offensive assistant (2004-05) before becoming the assistant quarterbacks coach in 2006. Working with running backs and tight ends his first two seasons with the Falcons, Prince helped Atlanta lead the NFL in rushing in from 2004-05. As the assistant quarterbacks coach, Prince worked with quarterback Michael Vick, who threw for 2,474 yards and rushed for 1,039 yards.

Before his first stop at Boise State (2001-03), Prince was the wide receivers coach at Portland State in 1998 and was later promoted to offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach in 1999 and 2000. His previous coaching stints include the Japanese X-League (1996-97), Fort Lewis College (1994-95) and Sacramento State (1992-93).

Prince, who is one-of-14 minority coaches on the Dallas coaching staff, served in three different minority training camp internships with the San Francisco 49ers (2000, 2002) and the San Diego Chargers (2001).

Prince graduated from Humboldt State in 1990 and served as a graduate assistant in his last two years of school. Prince went on to earn his master's degree from the university in 1992.

Prince was born in Okinawa, Japan. He and his wife, Susan, reside in Dallas with their son, Tyson, and daughters, Hayden and Jasmin.

Brian Schottenheimer was promoted as the team's offensive coordinator on February 4, 2023.

In his first year as the Cowboys offensive coordinator, Dallas led the league in scoring offense (29.9 points-per-game), ranked fifth in total offense (371.6 yards-per-game)

and third in passing yards-per-game (258.6), all higher averages than 2022. Under Schottenheimer, Dallas scored 509 total points in 2023, the second-most points scored in a season in franchise history. Dallas also led the league with five 40-point games, tied for

the most such games in team history. Schottenheimer, along with McCarthy, emphasized complementary football, as Dallas' 16 giveaways tied for the second-fewest in the league in 2023 and were the third-fewest turnovers in a season in the club's 63-year history. Schottenheimer, who primarily worked with Scott Tolzien and the quarterbacks in practice, assisted Dak Prescott to a career season. Prescott led the NFL with 36 touchdown passes and totaled career-highs in completion percentage (69.5%) and passer rating (105.9).

Schottenheimer, a veteran coach with 23 years of NFL coaching experience and 13 years as an offensive coordinator at the pro level, previously served as a consultant for the Cowboys throughout the 2022 season, studying future opponents and assisting both the offensive and defensive units with game planning and self-scouting.

Before joining Dallas, Schottenheimer was the passing game coordinator for Jacksonville during the 2021 season, where he assisted with the Jaguars No. 1 overall selection, Trevor Lawrence, who finished his

rookie season with a single-season team rookie record 3,641 passing yards.

Previously, Schottenheimer spent three seasons (2018-20) as the Seattle Seahawks offensive coordinator, where he helped lead the Seahawks to three consecutive postseason appearances. In 2020 the team set franchise records for points scored (459) and points-per-game (28.7), while Russell Wilson marked his career milestones in touchdowns (40) and completion percentage (68.8) en route to his seventh Pro Bowl.

Additionally, Schottenheimer served as the quarterbacks coach for the Indianapolis Colts from 2016-17, working with Pro Bowl passer Andrew Luck, who established a then single-season career-high in completion percentage (63.5) and finished the season ranked eighth in passing yards (4,240), fifth in passing touchdowns (31) and ninth in passer rating (96.4).

Schottenheimer served as the offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach at Georgia in 2015 when the Bulldogs totaled 4,904 yards of offense.

Prior to his return to the collegiate ranks, Schottenheimer spent three seasons as the offensive coordinator for the St. Louis Rams (2012-14). The Rams tallied 38 touchdowns in 2013, which was then the most in a single season for the franchise since 2006 when they reached the endzone 39 times. Under Schottenheimer, Zac Stacy rushed for 973 yards - third-most rushing yards in franchise history by a rookie - while Jared Cook set the Rams single-season record for receiving yards by a tight end (671).

Schottenheimer spent six seasons as the New York Jets offensive coordinator (2006-11), including assembling an offense that helped the Jets earn back-to-back appearances in the AFC Championship Game.

In four seasons with San Diego as the quarterbacks coach (2002-2005), Schottenheimer helped Drew Brees become the NFL Comeback Player of the Year and earn Pro Bowl honors for the first time in his career after throwing 27 touchdown passes and finishing third in the NFL in passer rating in 2004.

Prior to San Diego, Schottenheimer worked for his father, Marty, in Washington and Kansas City. He was an offensive assistant with the Chiefs in 1998 and was the quarterbacks coach during his lone season with Washington in 2001.

In between those two stops, Schottenheimer moved to the collegiate level, overseeing tight ends at Southern California in 2000 and wide receivers at Syracuse in 1999.

Schottenheimer got his start as an offensive assistant under Dick Vermeil with the St. Louis Rams in 1997.

As a player, Schottenheimer earned three letters as a quarterback at the University of Florida from 1994-96, where he played under Steve Spurrier and backed up Heisman Trophy winner Danny Wuerffel during the Gators 1996 National Championship season. His career began at the University of Kansas where he played one season in 1992 before transferring to Florida.

Schottenheimer and his wife, Gemmi, have a son, Sutton, and a daughter, Savannah.

Steve Shimko joined the Dallas Cowboys in 2024 as an offensive quality control coach after spending the 2023 season as Boston College's offensive coordinator.

Shimko, a former college quarterback at Rutgers, spent the last

four years at Boston College.

As Boston College's offensive play caller in 2023, Shimko led the nation's 13th ranked rushing offense (199.5 rushing yards-per-game). Running back Thomas Castellanos finished with 1,289 rushing yards, good for 18th in the country. Under Shimko, Boston College averaged 24.8 points-per-game, its highest scoring average since 2019.

Before taking over play calling duties, Shimko coached quarterbacks in 2022 and tight ends from 2020-21.

In Shimko's first season with Boston College, he developed Hunter Long into a second-team All-American as he led all tight ends nationally in receptions (57) and ranked second in receiving yards (685). Long became the highest drafted Boston College tight end in school history after the Miami Dolphins selected him in the third round (81st overall) of the 2021 NFL Draft.

Prior to Boston College, Shimko spent two seasons (2018-19) as the assistant quarterbacks coach with the Seattle Seahawks, where he worked under Offensive Coordinator Brian Schottenheimer. In 2019 Shimko assisted Russell Wilson to a second-team All-Pro selection while Wilson threw for 4,110 yards and 31 touchdowns with just five interceptions.

Shimko joined Seattle after two seasons (2016-17) as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at

Garden City (Kan.) Community College, where he helped the team win the NJACC National Championship in his first season as offensive coordinator.

Shimko started his coaching career in the collegiate ranks, spending one season each at Georgia (2015), Western Michigan (2014) and his alma mater, Rutgers (2013).

In the 2023 season, Simonelli continued to work with the defensive line, a group that ranked fifth in the NFL with 264 pressures. He helped defensive tackle Osa Odighizuwa reach career-highs with 53 tackles, six tackles for loss and 36 pressures, adding 3.0 sacks. He also helped Micah Parsons tally a career-high 14.0 sacks and a league-leading 103 pressures, according to Pro Football Focus.

After spending time with the offense in 2021, Simonelli's duties switched to the defensive side of the ball in 2022, where he assisted Defensive Line Coach Aden Durde in preparing the defensive line for upcoming opponents and tendencies. Simonelli helped the Cowboys defensive line establish itself as one of the top pass rushing units in the NFL, as Dallas' 54 sacks tied for third in the league and were the most by a Cowboys

team since 2008 (59). Dallas also led the NFL with 271 quarterback pressures in 2022, per PFF.

In 2021 Simonelli spent time assisting the offense and was part of the operation that helped Dallas lead the NFL in both yards (407.0) and points (31.2). He worked closely with the running backs, helping Ezekiel Elliott record his fourth 1,000-yard rushing season (1,002) and Tony Pollard set then career-highs in rushing attempts (130), yards (719) and rushing average (5.5 avg.).

Simonelli's 2020 responsibilities included working with the special teams units and helping the special teams staff identify league, opponent and self-scout tendencies. He also assisted the head coach with game management decisions.

Before landing in Dallas, Simonelli was a student assistant coach while attending Wesleyan University.

Simonelli spent time working with the school's wide receivers (2017) and defensive line (2018) while also creating statistical reports to evaluate team efficiencies. Mike Solari is in his second stint with the Dallas Cowboys as the team's offensive line coach, bringing 34 years of NFL experience and 45 years of total coaching experience to the Dallas coaching ranks.

Solari's first year back with the Cowboys in 2023 saw two linemen earn Pro Bowl berths, as Zack Martin was named to his ninth Pro Bowl

and tied for fifth in Cowboys history, second-most by a Cowboys lineman - and Tyler Smith made his first Pro Bowl after a dominant season at left guard. The unit paved the way for the highest scoring offense in the league (29.9 points-per-game) and sustained drives to the tune of a league-best 47 10-play drives and 31:48 time of possession (third). Dak Prescott had a career season behind the line's protection, leading the NFL in touchdown passes (36) and finishing second in MVP voting while only taking a sack on 6.1% of dropbacks - the eighth-lowest figure in 2023. Tony Pollard recorded his second straight 1,000-yard season, and in total, the Dallas rushing attack only had 39 negative rushes on the year - 13th in the NFL.

Solari spent the 2022 season away from football after his most recent stint as the Seattle Seahawks offensive line coach from 2018-21, building a cohesive unit that helped Seattle finish the 2020 season ranked in the top-10 in rushing yards-per-attempt (sixth - 4.8) and points-per-game (eighth - 28.7) while scoring the most points in a season in franchise history (459). He also guided a line that blocked for Chris Carson who tallied back-to-back 1,000-yard campaigns in 2018-19, boasted a second-team All-Pro player in tackle Duane Brown and helped Seattle lead the league in rushing in 2018 with 2,560 yards.

Previously, Solari spent 2016-17 as the offensive line coach for the N.Y. Giants. Injuries forced Solari to use seven different starting offensive line combinations in 2016 but still only allowed 22 sacks - five fewer than the Giants surrendered in 2015 - and the third-lowest total in the NFL after Oakland (18) and Pittsburgh (21).

Solari was with the Green Bay Packers in 2015 as assistant offensive line coach, and from 2010-14, he coached the San Francisco 49ers offensive line. During that period, he helped the 49ers rank fifth in the NFL in rushing (132.1 yards-per-game) and sixth in yards-

per-carry (4.47). During Solari's tenure with the 49ers, which included three consecutive NFC Championship Game appearances (2011-13) and a berth in Super Bowl XLVII, at least one of his linemen was selected to the Pro Bowl in four-of-five seasons. Tackle Joe Staley earned Pro Bowl recognition four times (2011-14), while guard Mike Iupati was voted to play in the game three times (2012-14).

In 2012 San Francisco was one-of-three teams to start the same five offensive linemen for every regular season game, and each of the five starters was selected to the Pro Bowl as either a participant or an alternate. For its efforts, Solari's line earned the Madden Most Valuable Protectors Award.

Prior to joining the 49ers, Solari coached the offensive line in his first stint with the Seahawks from 2008-09. Under Solari's direction, Pro Football Hall of Fame tackle Walter Jones was named to the 2008 Pro Bowl.

Solari was with the Kansas City Chiefs from 1997-2007, serving as the offensive line coach for his first nine seasons with the club (1997-2005) and as the offensive coordinator for the final two years (2006-07). In Solari's nine seasons tutoring the offensive line, the Chiefs ranked first in the NFL in rushing scores (191), fourth in rushing yards (126.8), third in scoring (25.0) fifth in total offense (356.1) and sixth in sacks allowed (278). At least one of Solari's linemen was named to the Pro Bowl in all nine of his seasons in Kansas City, including a trio of Pro Bowlers in 2004-05 in Pro Football Hall of Fame guard Will Shields, guard Brian Waters and Pro Football Hall of Fame tackle Willie Roaf. The Chiefs became the first club to accomplish that feat since Dallas had three linemen selected to the Pro Bowl each season from 1992-95.

Solari's first stop in San Francisco came from 1992-96, where he served as the 49ers tight ends and assistant offensive line coach. The team went to three consecutive NFC Championship games and defeated the San Diego Chargers in Super Bowl XXIX. He was pivotal in the development and maturation of tight end Brent Jones, who was named to the Pro Bowl in four consecutive seasons (1992-95) and earned second-team All-Pro recognition in 1993-94.

Solari coached on Gene Stallings' staff at the University of Alabama from 1990-91, working with the offensive line and aiding the Crimson Tide to an 11-1 record and a No. 5 ranking in the final AP poll in 1991. Solari followed Stallings to Alabama from the Phoenix Cardinals, working as the offensive line coach in 1989 when he helped guide tackle Luis Sharpe to a Pro Bowl.

Solari cut his NFL coaching teeth with Dallas in 1987, serving as assistant offensive line/special teams coach for two seasons under Tom Landry and helped the Cowboys finish seventh in yards-per-game (340.0) and eighth in kick return average (20.3) during those two years.

Solari's coaching career began in 1977 at Mission Bay, Calif., High School, followed by stints at Mira Costa Junior College (1978) and U.S. International (1979). He helped lead Boise State to the NCAA Division I-AA Championship in 1980 and also served as offensive line coach on the collegiate level at Cincinnati (1981-82), Kansas (1983-85) and Pittsburgh (1986) before entering the NFL.

As a player, Solari was a two-time letterman as an offensive lineman (1975-76) at San Diego State. Solari began his collegiate career at the College of San Mateo (1973-74).

Solari was born on Jan. 16, 1955 in Daly City, Calif. He and his wife, Patti, have three children, Tamara, Stephanie and Michael.

in Green Bay in a similar capacity, first as the special teams quality control coach (2019-20) and then as the assistant special teams coach (2021).

Stewart assisted with the development of first-year kicker Brandon Aubrey throughout the 2023 season. Aubrey led the league in field goals made (36), ranked third in field goal percentage (94.7) and first in kicking points (157). He set NFL records in single-season touchbacks (99), consecutive field goals made without a miss to start a career (35) and set a franchise record for most field goals made in a single season (36). Bryan Anger also set franchise records by averaging 51.4 yards-per-punt and a net average of 44.9 yards in 2023.

In 2022 Stewart assisted Brett Maher to a career season, making 29-of-32 field goals for a career-high 90.6 field goal percentage. He also racked up 137 kicking points, then a single-season club record and tied for third-most in the NFL in 2022. The unit also benefited from the addition of wide receiver/return specialist KaVontae Turpin, who finished the season fifth in punt return average (10.4) and was the only NFL player with a 50-yard kick return and 50-yard punt return. Turpin earned his first Pro Bowl selection and became the first player in Cowboys history to be named to the Pro Bowl as a return specialist.

While with Green Bay, Mason Crosby made 25-of-34 (73.5%) field goals in 2021 and converted 49-of-51 PATs, leading the team in scoring (124 points) for the 13th time in his career. Punter Corey Bojorquez averaged 46.5 yards-per-punt on 53 punts and had the longest punt in the NFL on the season - an 82-yard bomb that ranked as the second-longest punt in Packers history. Green Bay finished 30th in kick return average (17.7) and 21st in punt return average (8.0) in 2021.

The Dallas Cowboys hired Rayna Stewart to assist John Fassel and the special teams units prior to the 2022 season. Stewart came to Dallas after three seasons

In 2020 Stewart worked with Crosby, who became the first Packer and just the sixth NFL player since 1932 to record a perfect field goal percentage in a season (min. one attempt-per-game) by connecting on all 16 of his field goal attempts. Crosby finished the season with an active streak of 18 converted field goals dating back to the 2019 season, the third-longest streak in franchise history.

In 2019 Stewart was part of a staff that saw Crosby connect on 22-of-24 field goal attempts (91.7%), matching Jan Stenerud's single-year franchise-record percentage in 1981. Crosby ranked fifth in the league in field goal percentage in 2019, the highest ranking by a Green Bay kicker since Ryan Longwell in 2003 (fourth). JK Scott posted 29 punts inside the 20 on the year, which ranked ninth in the NFL and was the most by a Packer since Tim Masthay recorded 30 in 2012.

Stewart spent four seasons (2015-18) at Vanderbilt, first as director of player development (2015-17) and then as special teams quality control coach (2018). As director of player development, he served as a mentor for players and oversaw a number of programs that helped the student-athletes transition from high school to college and prepare for post-graduate life. In 2018 Stewart helped Parker Thome rank fourth in the SEC with an average of 44.9 yards-per-punt, tied for the fourth-highest punting average in school history.

Prior to joining the Commodores, Stewart worked for two years as a teacher and head football coach at Whites Creek, Tenn., High School. Stewart also served as a teacher and coach at Battle Ground Academy in nearby Franklin, Tenn., for two years before leading the Whites Creek staff.

From 2009-10, Stewart worked with the Tennessee Titans linebackers and defensive line as a defensive quality control coach. He helped defensive linemen Kyle Vanden Bosch and Jason Babin earn Pro Bowl honors in 2009 and 2010, respectively.

Before coaching for the Titans, Stewart worked as a graduate assistant at Northwestern (2007-08), athletic director/head coach at Chicago, Ill., Hope Academy (2005-06), assistant coach at Centennial High School (2001-04) and interned with the Indianapolis Colts (2004).

He played collegiately at Northern Arizona, where he was a two-time All-American cornerback and set the school record for passes defended in a season, posting 19 in both 1994 and 1995. He was selected in the fifth round (No. 143 overall) of the 1996 NFL Draft by the Houston Oilers and played in 71 career games as a defensive back for the Oilers (1996-97), Miami Dolphins (1998) and Jacksonville Jaguars (1999-2000).

He finished his NFL career with 77 tackles, four fumble recoveries, two interceptions and a half sack.

A native of Chatsworth, Calif., Stewart earned a bachelor's degree in advertising from Northern Arizona and a master's degree in education administration from Tennessee State.

Stewart and his wife, Sonia, have four children: ShaRae, Tre, Mycah and Jadyn.

After a six-year playing career in the NFL, including his last four seasons with Dallas, Darian Thompson joined the Cowboys coaching staff in 2023.

During his first season in the coaching ranks, Thompson was tasked with developing a young linebackers unit that featured second-year player Damone Clark, who led the team with 115 tackles, and Markquese Bell, who switched to linebacker from safety after Leighton Vander Esch suffered a season-ending injury in Week 5. Thompson helped Bell learn a new position on the defense, and Bell's 102 tackles ranked second on the Cowboys behind Clark. Thompson also oversaw the position flexibility of three-time Pro Bowler Micah Parsons, who tallied a career-best 14.0 sacks in 2023.

Thompson's familiarity with the current coaching staff runs deep, as he played two years (2020-21) under Head Coach Mike McCarthy and played meaningful roles on Dan Quinn's defense and John Fassel's special teams unit.

Thompson began the second phase of his football career in coaching after playing safety for six seasons in the NFL - two with the N.Y. Giants (2016-17) and four with Dallas (2018-21). He was originally drafted in the third round (71st overall) by the N.Y. Giants out of Boise State. Thompson appeared in 18 games with 17 starts in his two seasons with the Giants.

After Dallas plucked him off the Cardinals practice squad in 2018, he was a key special teams contributor for the Cowboys before earning the starting safety job in 2020, a position he held until Donovan Wilson took over in Week 8. Thompson finished 2020 with 51 tackles and an interception.

In five years at Boise State, including his redshirt season as a freshman, Thompson was a two-time All-Mountain West first-team selection (2014-15) who played in 51 games with 44 starts. He finished his career with 242 tackles and a Mountain West Conference record 19 interceptions.

Thompson and his wife, Chelsey, have three daughters, Novah, Nya and Naomi, and a son, Ty.

After spending his first three years in Dallas as an offensive assistant, former NFL quarterback Scott Tolzien was named the Cowboys quarterbacks coach heading into the 2023 season.

Under the watchful eye of Tolzien in 2023, Dak Prescott finished second in MVP voting as he led the NFL in completions (410) and passing touchdowns (36) - the only Cowboys quarterback to lead the NFL outright in passing scores - while finishing second in passer rating (105.9) and third in yards (4,516). Prescott also reduced his interception totals from 15 in 2022 to nine in 2023, and his interception percentage of 1.5% was fourth among all NFL passers. Perhaps most impressive was Prescott's command of the offense, as he engineered three game-winning drives in 2023 - a higher total than in any single-season since his 2018 campaign, when he led five such drives - and now has 22 game-winning drives in his career. He finished with the most 100.0-rating games (11) and multi-passing touchdown games (11) league-wide.

Tolzien, who played for Mike McCarthy while both were in Green Bay (2013-16), was instrumental in preparing Prescott and Cooper Rush in 2022. After Prescott suffered a thumb injury in Week 1, Tolzien helped assemble the offensive game plan for Rush, who went 4-1 in his five starts in 2022 and became the first quarterback in franchise history to win his first five career starts. When Prescott returned to action in Week 7 against Detroit (10/23), Dallas' offense led the league in offensive points-per-game (31.3) and third down offense (52.3%), and was third in yards-per-game (384.3) for the rest of the season.

The offense grew to new heights in 2021, leading the NFL in scoring (31.2) - including a franchise-record 530 points - and yards (407.0) while also reaching the end zone on 28.6% of drives, sixth in the league. Tolzien's close work with Prescott saw the quarterback set a career-high and franchise-record 37 touchdown passes and record a 100.0 passer rating in eight games - tied for second in single-season team history.

In his first season with Dallas in 2020 Tolzien assisted with an offensive unit that ranked in the top-10 of most primary statistical categories. Despite losing Prescott to injury, the Cowboys offense ranked seventh in the NFL in receiving yards (4,511), eighth in passing yards (4,161) and tied for ninth in scrimmage yards (6,299).

Before becoming an NFL coach, Tolzien was given a brief introduction to off-field tasks in 2019 at his alma mater, Wisconsin, where he served as an analyst scouting opponents.

Tolzien enjoyed a seven-year NFL career, originally signing with the San Diego Chargers as a rookie free agent in 2011. He spent just over three seasons as a backup to Aaron Rodgers in Green Bay (2013-16), playing in six games with two starts over that time. He then served as a backup to Andrew Luck with the Colts from 2016-17, playing in four games with two starts.

Tolzien appeared in 29 games with 26 starts at Wisconsin, leaving with the school record for completion percentage (68.1) and efficiency rating (153.2).

Tolzien was a two-time all-conference and all-academic at William Fremd High School in Palatine, Ill.

Tolzien and his wife, Megan, have two daughters, Brooke and Caroline, and a son, Blake.

Wells oversaw the development of second-year tight end Jake Ferguson in 2023.

Ferguson, who was in his first season as the starter, notched 71 receptions for 761 yards and five touchdowns in 2023 to earn his first Pro Bowl nod. His 761 receiving yards ranked eighth among NFL tight ends, and Ferguson became the third tight end in franchise history to record at least 70 receptions and 700 receiving yards in a season, joining Jason Witten and Dalton Schultz. Under Wells, Ferguson has tallied 90 career receptions and 935 receiving yards, both the second-most by a Cowboys tight in the first two seasons of a career, trailing only Witten.

During the 2022 season, Wells saw diverse production from his tight end group. Schultz remained the group's leader, as he collected 57 receptions (second on the team) for 577 yards (second) and five touchdowns (second). Behind him, Wells received more production from two rookie tight ends - fourth round selection Ferguson (19 receptions for 174 yards and two touchdowns) and undrafted free agent Peyton Hendershot (11 receptions for 103 yards and two scores) as combined they became the third rookie tight end duo in NFL history to record multiple receiving touchdowns in their first season.

The tight end group was led again by Schultz in 2021, and under Wells' leadership, he recorded his best season with 78 catches for 808 yards and eight touchdowns - becoming the second Cowboys tight end to record 70 catches in a season (Jason Witten, nine times).

In 2020 Wells helped Schultz achieve a breakout season after starting tight end Blake Jarwin suffered a season-ending knee injury in Week 1. Despite the loss of Jarwin, Wells shaped Schultz into one of the top tight ends in the NFC during 2020, as Schultz recorded 615 receiving yards and four touchdowns on 64 catches.

Prior to Dallas, Wells spent eight seasons in different roles with the N.Y. Giants. From 2018-19 Wells

worked with a young and talented tight end in Evan Engram, who caught 88 passes and six touchdowns over two seasons, despite missing 13 games due to injury. Before assuming his position as tight ends coach, Wells spent five seasons as the team's assistant offensive line coach, first under Pat Flaherty and then Mike Solari. In 2017 Wells helped tutor a line that was constantly in transition. The Giants used 10 different starting combinations, their highest single-season total since the 1970 merger.

New York scored 420 points in 2015, the fifth-highest total in franchise history, and its 5,956 net yards were the third-highest total in team history. With the line providing consistent protection, Eli Manning set a single-season franchise record with 387 completions, and his 4,432 yards and 35 touchdown passes were both the second-highest totals in Giants history.

Wells joined the Giants in 2012 as an offensive quality control coach. He also helped coach the wide receivers that season. In 2012 the Giants scored 429 points, the second-highest total in franchise history.

Before joining the Giants staff, Wells spent four seasons at Louisiana State. From 2008-09 he was an offensive line assistant, and in his final two years at LSU, Wells was an assistant to the head coach and an assistant on special teams. In 2010 Wells was an offensive line intern for Dallas Cowboys training camp, where he worked alongside Hudson Houck.

Wells was the offensive line coach/run game coordinator/head strength and conditioning coach at Scotlandville High School in Baton Rouge, La. from 2006-07. He coached the offensive line and devised the offensive run game plans.

An offensive lineman, Wells played in the Arena Football League for the Grand Rapids Rampage, South Georgia Rampage and Louisiana Swashbucklers following a four-year career at guard at Southern University (2002-05). He was voted to the All-Southwestern Athletic Conference first team in 2002 and 2005, and Southern won the 2003 SWAC championship. He earned a bachelor's degree in criminal justice and, in 2007, a master's degree in criminal justice at Southern.

Wells is a native of Baker, La., just outside Baton Rouge. He was a Class 5A first-team all-state offensive line selection at Baker High School.

He and his wife, Tiffany, have two daughters, Adanya Neema and Zalka Nia.

past four seasons with the Washington Commanders coaching the defensive front. While in Washington, Zgonina spent all four seasons with the defensive line unit, his first two as assistant defensive line coach and his last two as defensive line coach.

During his four-year tenure at Washington, the defensive line room finished 14th in sacks (167) and 11th in rushing yards allowed-per-game (114.3). His 2022 defensive front finished third in total yards-per-game (304.6) allowed and 11th in rushing yards-per-game (113.3) allowed. As a unit, the defense also finished first in third down percentage (31.9) in 2022. Zgonina produced two Pro Bowlers in Jonathan Allen and Daron

Payne as well as a Pro Bowl alternate in Montez Sweat in 2022. He was also tasked with developing the 2020 No. 2 overall pick Chase Young.

Prior to his time in Washington, Zgonina served as the San Francisco 49ers defensive line coach from 2017-18, the New York Giants assistant defensive line coach in 2016 and the Houston Texans assistant defensive line coach in 2013.

A seventh round draft choice (185th overall) of the Pittsburgh Steelers in the 1993 NFL Draft, Zgonina played in 219 games (67 starts) and registered 448 tackles, 26 sacks, 13 fumble recoveries, 11 passes defended, three forced fumbles and one interception. The former defensive tackle played for the Steelers (1993-94), Carolina Panthers (1995), Atlanta Falcons (1996), St. Louis Rams (1997, 1999-2002), Indianapolis Colts (1998), Miami Dolphins (2003-06) and Houston Texans (2007-09) throughout his 17 NFL seasons.

Zgonina played collegiately at Purdue University (1989-92) where he was named Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year as a senior.

The Dallas Cowboys named Mike Zimmer defensive coordinator on Feb. 14, 2024, reuniting Zimmer with the defense that he coached for 13 seasons from 1994-2006. Zimmer has 28 years of NFL coaching experience, and in total, he has coached professionally and collegiately for 43 years, spending 25 as a defensive coordinator and eight as a head coach.

Zimmer returns to Dallas in 2024 after two years away from the coaching ranks following an eight-year stint as the head coach of the Minnesota Vikings, during which time the team recorded 72 wins, three playoff appearances and two division titles. The Vikings finished in the top-five in yards allowed three times (2016, third; 2017, first; 2018, fourth) and top-five in points allowed five times (2015, fifth; 2016, fifth; 2017, first; 2018, fourth; 2019, fifth) during Zimmer's leadership as head coach. In his tenure as an NFL defensive coordinator and head coach, Zimmer's units have ranked in the NFL's top-10 in yards allowed nine times and in the top-10 of points allowed eight times.

Zimmer has also overseen the growth and development of young defensive stars during his time in the NFL, mentoring 15 Pro Bowl players who earned 43 total Pro Bowl berths under his leadership.

He was named head coach of the Minnesota Vikings in January 2014, and in eight years at the helm, finished with a 72-56-1 regular season record with three postseason appearances and two NFC North titles. Zimmer led the club to an NFC Championship game in 2017 and posted a 2-3 record in the post-season. In his time as head coach, Zimmer's defenses ranked fourth in the NFL with 334 sacks, fourth in opponent third down conversion rate (36.6%), seventh in opponent points-per-game (21.3) and 11th in takeaways (184).

The Vikings best defensive performance under Zimmer came in 2017, highlighted by a No. 1 ranking in total defense - marking the first time Minnesota achieved the feat since the 1993 season - and five Pro Bowl selections.

Zimmer earned a head coaching opportunity after establishing himself as one of the top defensive coordinators in the NFL. His leadership of the Cincinnati Bengals defense (2009-13) ushered a franchise turnaround on the defensive side of the ball. The Bengals notched top-10 defensive rankings in points-per-game and yards-per-game in 2009, 2011, 2012 and 2013 after only cracking the NFL's top-10 once in 18 seasons prior to Zimmer joining the team. During his tenure with the Bengals, Zimmer tutored Geno Atkins as he became one of the top defensive tackles in the NFL, earning consensus All-Pro honors in 2012 and Pro Bowl berths from 2011-12. Vontaze Burfict bloomed from an undrafted rookie linebacker in 2012 to a Pro Bowler in just his second season in 2013 - the first Bengals linebacker to earn the honor since Jim LeClair in 1976.

Zimmer spent one season as the defensive coordinator in Atlanta (2007) following his first stint with the Cowboys where he led top-10 defenses for Dallas in both a 4-3 and 3-4 scheme. The 2003 Cowboys defense ranked No. 1 in the NFL with only 253.3 yards-per-game allowed. During Zimmer's tenure in Dallas as defensive backs coach (1994-99) and

defensive coordinator (2000-06), the team ranked in the top-five of NFL scoring defense a total of six times. In Zimmer's second season with the Cowboys in 1995, he oversaw a defensive backfield that allowed only 204.5 pass yards-per-game and finished second in the league with four pick-sixes, culminating in a Super Bowl XXX win over Pittsburgh during which cornerback Larry Brown won Super Bowl MVP with a pair of interceptions - one of which he returned for a touchdown in the game. Brown is one of only three defensive backs to earn Super Bowl MVP honors.

Before moving to the NFL ranks, Zimmer spent 15 seasons coaching at the collegiate level. He spent his final five seasons in the college ranks as defensive coordinator at Washington State from 1989-93. Zimmer was at Weber State from 1981-88, serving as defensive coordinator from 1983-88. He entered the profession at Missouri as an assistant from 1979-80.

Zimmer played quarterback and linebacker at Illinois State, earning a degree in physical education.

Coaching runs in the Zimmer headline, as Mike's father, Bill, earned Illinois Hall of Fame honors as a prep football and wrestling coach. Zimmer played football, baseball and wrestled at Lockport Township High School in suburban Chicago. Both Bill and Mike Zimmer have been inducted into the Lockport Hall of Fame, and Bill is also in the Bradley University and Illinois High School Hall of Fame.

Vikki Zimmer, Mike's wife of 27 years, passed away in Cincinnati on Oct. 8, 2009. The Pro Football Writers of America recognized Zimmer overcoming the tragedy by voting him the winner of the Halas Award for the season, an annual award presented to the individual in the NFL that overcame the most adversity to succeed. The Zimmer family awards scholarships to deserving students through the Mike Zimmer Foundation, which also hosts an annual football camp for youth and a fundraising golf tournament.

Zimmer and his late wife have three children, daughters Corri and Marki and a late son, Adam, who coached with his father in Minnesota and spent 16 years as an NFL coach.

TODD WILLIAMS

Vice President Football Operations/
Football Administration



Todd Williams is in his 30th season with the Dallas Cowboys, his 22nd season in the club's Player Personnel Department and was named the club's Vice President of Football Operations/Football Administration in 2021 after serving eight years as the senior director of football administration/football operations. In his role, he assists Stephen Jones, the club's Chief Operating Office/Co-Owner, while also overseeing the team's football operations, facilities, equipment, security and player development departments. Williams is primarily responsible for keeping Jones informed on the daily operations of the club. He is also responsible for monitoring the Cowboys salary cap and negotiating most rookie contracts, including many of Dallas' draft choices.

Williams is also responsible for making sure the club maintains compliance with the NFL's Collective Bargaining Agreement and labor related issues. Additionally, he coordinates different areas of football operations and is involved in several other administrative functions within the club. Most recently, Williams

was instrumental in coordinating the development of the football offices and training facilities of the team's world headquarters at The Star in Frisco.

Williams joined the Dallas Cowboys organization as an intern in the operations department during the 1995 training camp in Austin, Texas. He served as an administration and marketing intern through the 1995 season. He was hired as a player personnel assistant in 1996, working closely with the personnel department in processing contracts and coordinating travel plans for free agent tryouts. He was promoted to assistant director of player personnel in 2001.

Williams was a sports management major at the University of Tennessee, where he played tight end for the Vols football team from 1992-94. Prior to Tennessee, he played for Northeast Oklahoma A&M Junior College, helping guide the team to the 1991 National JUCO Championship.

Williams is married to Cyndi Comeaux Williams. He has two children, Kyle and Kamryn, and one stepson, Gauge Doisher.

CRAIG GLIEBER

Director of Team Travel and Logistics



Craig Glieber began his career with the Dallas Cowboys as an intern in the front office in 1988. He returned for the 1989 season, again as an intern, but was hired full time in 1990 as an assistant in the football operations department.

Glieber earned the title of director of team travel and logistics in 2022 after years of handling all aspects of the team's movements on the road and at training camp.

Glieber was elevated to assistant director of football operations in 1993, where he assisted with all aspects of team travel while also helping coordinate the team's training camp.

In 2012 Glieber took over the full time role of handling all team travel, including team charters, hotels,

ground transportation and equipment trucks for road games. He also coordinates travel and hotels for all visiting free agents as well as newly acquired draft picks, rookie free agents and veteran free agent signees.

While in school at SMU, Glieber was an assistant with SMU football (1985-87). Glieber also worked as a statistician for CBS Sports and Fox Sports Southwest broadcasts for his father, legendary broadcaster, Frank Glieber. Craig also worked as a statistician for Dallas Mavericks broadcasts through 2010.

Glieber earned undergraduate degrees in business administration and radio/TV in 1987 from Southern Methodist University. He then earned his M.B.A. from SMU in 2002.

JASON MCKAY

Director of Football Administration and Technology



Jason McKay returned to the Dallas Cowboys in 2012 as the club's assistant director of football administration. In 2020 McKay was named director of football administration and technology. In his role, McKay assists Vice President of Football Operations/Administration Todd Williams in the daily operations of the team. McKay also coordinates new player arrivals and assists in the set up and operation of the club's training camp, distribution and management of the club's football technology initiatives - including communications, analytics, iPad playbooks and emerging technology. He also oversees the team's video, analytics and football systems development departments. McKay also played a part in the planning and construction phases of the team headquarters at The Star in Frisco.

McKay spent three years with the United Football League (2010-12), serving as the director of football operations for the Hartford Colonials (2010-11)

before moving to the UFL league office for his final season as the director of football administration.

Before venturing to the UFL, McKay worked in the Arena Football League for eight seasons. He was a player personnel assistant for the Dallas Desperados (2001-04), while he was also working in the personnel office for the Dallas Cowboys. He then became the vice president of football operations for the Los Angeles Avengers, a position he held for five years.

McKay first became a part of the Cowboys family in 1993 when he was the manager for retail operations for Texas Stadium Corporation. He moved into the personnel department in 2000, serving as an assistant up until the start of the 2004 season.

McKay earned his Bachelor of Science in Mechanical Engineering Technology from the University of North Texas. He also earned his real estate license in the state of Nevada.

ADAM PRASIFKA

Senior Director of Salary Cap/Player Contracts



Adam Prasifka enters his 23rd year in the Dallas Cowboys Player Personnel department. In his role as senior director of salary cap/player contracts, Prasifka assists Chief Operating Officer/Co-Owner Stephen Jones and Vice President of Football Operations/Football Administration Todd Williams in managing the club's salary cap, negotiating player contracts and monitoring league transactions.

During Prasifka's tenure, Dallas has negotiated franchise-record contracts with quarterback Dak Prescott, running back Ezekiel Elliott, tackle Tyrion Smith, guard Zack Martin and cornerback Trevon Diggs, to name a few.

Prior to working with the Cowboys, Prasifka was a coaching assistant and equipment manager at the University of Arkansas (1999-02). He served as a mechanical engineering intern at DuPont (1998-99) and Cromwell Architects and Engineers (1998).

Prasifka earned his degree in mechanical engineering from the University of Arkansas in Fayetteville. He currently resides in Carrollton, Texas with his son, Cash.

BRYAN WANSLEY

Director of Player Development



Bryan Wansley embarks on his 29th year with the Dallas Cowboys and his 18th season as director of player development. He began his career in 1995 as an intern in the football operations department.

In his role, Wansley works with current and former players and their families to achieve a successful, well-balanced and healthy life during and after their playing experience. Player Development accomplishes its mission through peer-to-peer engagement of the NFL player community with innovative program and service offerings that meet the dynamic needs of the athletes and their families.

Wansley provides programs aimed at player development and wellness during each season and offseason. He also coordinates programs to push individual and team growth through special team related functions, which includes visits to military bases during training camp and setting up prominent speakers to address the team throughout the year on leadership and awareness.

He also works closely with the rookies as they transition into the NFL, providing assistance and programs on areas such as mental wellness, financial responsibility (budgets and credit), substance abuse (DUI), domestic violence, relationships, stress management and media/social media orientation.

Since the 2012 season, Wansley has been responsible for the coordination of the Dallas Cowboys yearly training camp, which includes overseeing hotel accommodations and travel coordination for all players and staff, assisting local city officials on planning fan experiences and overseeing and coordinating of five planning and setup strategy.

Before heading up Player Development, Wansley served as an assistant in football operations for six seasons (2001-06).

Wansley received his Bachelor of Arts in Sports Management from Harding University. In 2012 he received his athlete development certification from Wharton.

JOHN PARK

Director of Strategic Football Operations



John Park joined the Cowboys in 2023 as Director of Strategic Football Operations where he leads strategic football efforts for the team, working closely with coaches, scouts and front office staff to provide data-driven recommendations for team success. Park served in the same capacity with the Indianapolis Colts for seven seasons (2016-2022), where he was responsible for identifying, developing and deploying resources to support football operations.

He previously worked in NFL Player Engagement (2016) and with Rutgers Football (2014-2015) in both player development and recruiting roles. Additionally, Park currently serves on the High Performance Com-

mittee of USA Football, the inaugural Combine Performance Advisory Committee for the NFL Combine and the Ozzie Newsome GM Forum and Coaching Summit.

Before working in sports, Park served as a consultant for Alvarez & Marsal and Pricewaterhouse Coopers while a member of the American Academy of Actuaries.

Park earned his bachelor's degree in cultural anthropology from Duke University and his master's degree in actuarial science from Columbia University, and has also been selected for the NFL Executive Leadership Program League of Leaders at Stanford University.

WILL McCLAY

Vice President Player Personnel



Will McClay, in his 23rd season with the Cowboys Personnel Department, was named the club's Vice President of Player Personnel in 2017. McClay is instrumental in overseeing the club's NFL Draft process and play a key role in free agent and trade acquisitions.

McClay began to oversee the Cowboys draft process in 2014, and since that time the team has selected 15 players that have gone on to make at least one Pro Bowl - the most in the NFL over that span - including foundational pieces in Zack Martin (nine Pro Bowls), DeMarcus Lawrence (four), Dak Prescott (three), CeeDee Lamb (three) and Micah Parsons (three). Under his guidance, Dallas has also been able to mine the late rounds of the draft to find hidden gems, including fifth round pick DaRon Bland, who earned first-team All-Pro and a Pro Bowl nod after setting the NFL record with five pick-sixes in 2023, and undrafted kicker Brandon Aubrey, who made first-team All-Pro and set the NFL record for consecutive made kicks without a miss to start an NFL career, nailing 36 in a row after signing with the Cowboys out of the XFL.

With an emphasis on physicality entering the 2023 Draft, Dallas selected defensive tackle Mazi Smith as its first-of-seven players in the class. Smith and second round tight end Luke Schoonmaker played in all 17 games as rookies, both contributing in the run game on both sides of the ball. Smith finished with 15 tackles, two tackles for loss and a sack in his first year, and Schoonmaker added eight catches with two touchdowns - becoming the fifth Cowboy to score a touchdown on his first career catch. Injuries and veteran additions prevented the later round selections from making an immediate impact, with the five remaining picks of the class playing a combined 14 games in 2023, with much larger roles expected in the future.

The 2022 draft was largely about rebuilding the trenches on offense and defense, with six-of-nine draft picks coming on the offensive line or front seven of the defense. Offensive lineman Tyler Smith headlined the draft class, starting all 17 games in his rookie season - 16 at left tackle and one at left guard - to become the first Cowboys rookie to start at left tackle in a season-opener. The class was also highlighted by second round pick Sam Williams, who played in 15 games and recorded 4.0 sacks with a team-leading seven tackles for loss, and fifth-round pick DaRon Bland, who started eight-of-17 games and led the team with five interceptions - the first rookie to lead the Cowboys in picks since Derek Ross and Roy Williams in 2002 - while playing both nickel and outside corner. Overall, the 2022 draft class generated 89 games played with 39 starts, and the entire rookie class combined for 145 games played, 41 games started and 4,902 total snaps, the sixth-most snaps among rookies in the NFL.

McClay was tasked with rebuilding the defensive side of the ball in 2021, working with Defensive Coordinator Dan Quinn to add players that fit an updated vision of the Cowboys defense. Dallas lost eight players to other teams in free agency but also added eight players - the most signings by the Cowboys in any year of free agency since its inception in 1994 - including five defensive players. Dallas also saw immediate divi-

dends from its draft class, with Micah Parsons setting a franchise rookie record with 13.0 sacks, earning Defensive Rookie of the Year and first-team All-Pro honors in the process. Dallas' rookie draft picks played in a total of 112 games with 32 starts in 2021.

Entering the 2021 NFL Draft, McClay and the Cowboys undertook a unique challenge, building a roster while balancing a record-setting contract for quarterback Dak Prescott, which led to the Cowboys selecting 11 players - second-most all-time since the NFL moved to a seven round draft. The 11 selections also included eight defensive players, and all of the Cowboys first six selections were on defense - the first time that occurred in team history. The draft class, headlined by Parsons, consisted of 10 Power Five conference players and three 2021 Reese's Senior Bowl participants.

The Cowboys entered unfamiliar territory in 2020, undergoing a regime change at head coach for the first time since 2010, as Dallas hired Mike McCarthy as the ninth head coach in team history. As a result, Dallas saw a significant amount of change on both the coaching staff and player roster, with six starters defecting to other teams in free agency and the retirement of Travis Frederick. Under normal circumstances, the task of upgrading the roster in an offseason with such change would be difficult, but in 2020, the threat of COVID-19 halted all free agent visits and altered the NFL Draft evaluation period, leaving scouting departments and front offices short on key information used to make player evaluations. McClay and the front office tackled the task head on, signing free agents who had combined to make 631 starts and earn 14 Pro Bows.

In the 2020 Draft, Dallas was patient and calculating, jumping on the opportunity to add perhaps the top wide receiver prospect in CeeDee Lamb when he unexpectedly fell to the Cowboys at pick 17. The Cowboys then bolstered their defense, nabbing an athletic and ascending cornerback from Alabama in Trevon Diggs in Round 2.

In his earlier role as director of football research (2011-13), McClay evaluated players on NFL rosters and in other leagues, scouting Dallas' opponents using advanced scouting and analytic methods and overseeing the scouting department's technology tools.

McClay was a pro scout (2002-08), then pro scouting coordinator (2009-10), and he was responsible for sifting through free agents and locating some of the team's most notable signings before and during the season.

McClay originally came to Dallas as the defensive coordinator for the Dallas Desperados (2002-03) of the Arena Football League. He was the club's head coach for five seasons (2004-08), helping lead them to a league-best 15-1 record and consecutive Eastern Division Championships (2007-08). In his five seasons as head coach, he led the Desperados to a 54-24-1 record and was named AFL Coach of the Year in 2006.

Before joining the Cowboys and Desperados, McClay was the assistant director of pro scouting for the Jacksonville Jaguars. In his only season (2001) with the Jaguars, he scouted NFL teams in the preseason

and did advance scouting work during the season. Before joining Jacksonville, he was the player personnel director of the XFL's Orlando Rage, as well as a consultant and scout, in the spring of 2001.

Prior to moving into the personnel side of professional football, McClay spent 11 seasons in the AFL as a player and coach. He served as defensive coordinator and director of player personnel for the Grand Rapids Rampage in 1998. He added the title of assistant head coach in 1999, when the Rampage improved to an 8-6 record after going 3-11 the previous season. In 1997 he was the defensive coordinator and director of player personnel for the Anaheim Piranhas after

serving as the defensive coordinator for the Milwaukee Mustangs in 1995 and the Florida Bobcats in 1996.

McClay was the secondary and special teams coach of the Detroit Drive in 1993, helping the team reach the ArenaBowl. From 1989-92 he was a wide receiver/defensive back for the Drive, helping lead them to three ArenaBowl titles in four appearances.

McClay was a four-year letterman and captain as a defensive back at Rice University (1985-88), starting every game of his collegiate career. He graduated in 1990 with a degree in political science. McClay has one son, Gabriel.



Alex Loomis joined the Dallas Cowboys Scouting Department in July 2009 as the club's pro scouting intern. He became the pro scouting assistant leading up to the 2011 season, a pro scout in 2012 and the pro scouting coordinator in 2015. He was named director of pro scouting in 2017 where he is in charge of evaluating players and rosters from NFL and other professional football teams. Loomis is also responsible for advance scouting, free agency preparation and tracking player movements within the league.

Loomis played a hand in the recent acquisitions of Pro Bowl contributors Brandon Aubrey and KaVontae Turpin, who joined the team from the UFL, formerly the USFL and XFL, and key veteran additions in Ste-

phon Gilmore and Brandin Cooks via trades prior to the 2023 season - all of whom played significant roles in the success of the team the last couple of seasons.

He will continue in his role assisting with the NFL Combine and assisting in the team's draft preparations.

Loomis spent nine summers (2000-09) with the New Orleans Saints, seven as an operations intern and the final three as a scouting intern under his father, Saints GM Mickey Loomis.

Loomis graduated from Louisiana State with a degree in business management. Loomis and his wife, Amanda, have a son, Miles, and reside in Lewisville.



Mitch LaPoint joined the Cowboys Scouting Department in 2005 and served as the west area scout for three years before moving to the southeast area in 2008. In 2015 LaPoint was a national scout, and before the 2019 season he was promoted to assistant director of college scouting.

In 2022 he became director of college scouting, where he conducts the confluence of information on collegiate players prior to the NFL Draft, including input and scouting reports from teams scouts and coaches to inform decision making in building the draft boards.

LaPoint spent seven years (1998-04) working in the Kansas City Chiefs player personnel department.

From 2002-04 he served as the club's midwest area scout and football operations coordinator. As part of his operations responsibilities, he coordinated the Chiefs training camp at the University of Wisconsin - River Falls.

From 1999-01 LaPoint was an assistant in the scouting department, after spending 1998 as an intern.

The Lawrence, Kan., native received his bachelor's degree in sports management from the University of Kansas in 1998. LaPoint and his wife, Jenny, have two sons, John and Sam, and reside in Tulsa, Okla.



RICH BEHM

Scouting Video Coordinator



Rich Behm joined the Dallas Cowboys as a video assistant in 2002 and was responsible for shooting team practices and games. In 2004 he moved to the scouting department where he was responsible for compiling college regular season games, bowl games and all-star game video as well as NFL combine video and creating point of attack cutups for draft meetings. Behm also assists the scouts on the road, coordinating their digital video needs. He is also responsible for evaluating both college and pro players.

Prior to the Cowboys, Behm worked in hotel management while attending the University of Texas-Arlington.

Behm and his wife, Michelle, have two sons, Taylor and Peyton, and three daughters, Kendall, Brooklyn and Hallie. Behm's brother, Chris, works for Blue Star Media, the club's Television and Radio Broadcast Department.



TERRY GRAY

Pro Scouting Coordinator



Terry Gray joined the Dallas Cowboys in a full-time role in 2017 as the club's pro scouting coordinator. In his role, Gray tracks league transactions, develops opponent advanced scouting reports and evaluates league free agents. He is also charged with managing the NFL player database, and giving recommendations for free agent or waiver wire acquisitions.

Starting with his time as a coach with the Dallas Desperados (2005) up until coming on full time, Gray consulted for the Cowboys personnel department.

Prior to becoming a full-time member of the Cowboys scouting department, Gray spent 10 seasons (1994-95, 1997-98 and 2001-06) as a coach or scout in the Arena Football League, including a stint with ArenaBow XV winners Grand Rapids Rampage in 2001. He originally landed in Dallas as an assistant coach for the Cowboys-owned AFL team, Dallas Des-

perados, where he worked under then Head Coach and current Dallas Cowboys Vice President Player Personnel Will McClay.

In 1996 Gray coached tight ends at his alma mater, Baylor.

Before working in coaching and player personnel, Gray played professionally for the World League of American Football and NFL (1990-93), including stints with the LA Rams and Houston Oilers. He played along the offensive line at Cisco Junior College (1986-87) and finished his collegiate career at Baylor (1988-89).

Gray holds an associate degree in applied arts from Cisco Junior College and a bachelor's in education from Baylor University.

Gray and his wife, Mary, were married in May, 2016 and have a son, Timothy.

CHRIS HALL

College Scouting Coordinator



Chris Hall, now in his 35th season with the Cowboys, serves as the club's college scouting coordinator. In that capacity, he is charged with the day-to-day operation and organization of the college scouting portion of the Personnel Department, including the creation and sorting of college player information that ultimately becomes the NFL Draft. Hall also spends time on the road locally covering Texas schools while monitoring the college scouting database daily. He writes both college and pro player evaluations and organizes the highly successful post-draft free agent signing period that has helped the team sign impact undrafted free agents such as Barry Church in 2010, Dan Bailey in 2011, Cole Beasley, Lance Dunbar and Ron Leary in 2012, Jeff Heath in 2013, Blake Jarwin in 2017, Terence Steele in 2020 and Markquese Bell, Peyton Hendershot and Ka'Vonntae Turpin in 2022.

Hall is responsible for the organization of the annual Dallas Day - which allows visits from local college

prospects each year - and also coordinates the yearly 30 pre-draft top college prospect player visits allowed by the NFL before the yearly NFL Draft.

Since 1993 Hall has also assisted National Invitational Camp (NIC) in the operations of player arrival, check-in and execution of the NFL Scouting Combine in Indianapolis, Ind.

Hall originally joined the Cowboys scouting department in 1990 as a scouting assistant, where he was responsible for processing player reports, organizing film and working closely with the college scouts in managing and scheduling projects. Prior to joining the Cowboys, Hall worked briefly in the athletic offices at Southern Methodist University.

Hall graduated from Southern Methodist in 1990 with a degree in advertising. He resides in Coppell, Texas, with his wife, Susan, and two daughters, Izabella and Victoria.

KEITH O'QUINN

Advance Scouting Coordinator



Keith O'Quinn rejoined the Dallas Cowboys personnel department in 2020 as the advance scouting coordinator after spending the previous 10 seasons in coaching, including his last two as the team's special teams coordinator.

In his role, O'Quinn studies and evaluates personnel and schemes of upcoming opponents and presents it to the coaching staff to help shape the game plan. He also assists in pro free agent and college draft evaluations.

O'Quinn spent his first season as a coach as the team's quality control/offensive assistant in 2010, breaking down film of upcoming opponents' defenses. From 2011-12 O'Quinn also worked closely with the wide receivers, and in 2014 O'Quinn left the offensive side of the ball and became the assistant special teams coach, working with coordinator Rich Bisaccia for three seasons (2014-17) before being promoted as the special teams coordinator from 2018-19.

In his first stint with the Cowboys (2006-08), O'Quinn worked in the personnel department and evaluated players around the NFL and other professional leagues while serving as a pro scout in the Cowboys scouting department.

In 2009 O'Quinn left the Cowboys to become the director of pro personnel for the Cleveland Browns. While

with the Browns, O'Quinn contributed to Cleveland's player acquisition process by managing pro scouting operations and evaluating players and rosters from the NFL and all other levels of pro football.

Prior to joining the pro ranks, O'Quinn spent eight years as a high school and college coach. His last stint in that area was as the assistant football and head baseball coach at Kaufman, Texas, High School. Prior to that, he coached tight ends and special teams at Abilene Christian University from 2003-04. From 2000-03 O'Quinn served as tight ends and asst. offensive line coach at Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene, Texas.

In 1999 he worked as the run game coordinator and offensive line coach, at Bryan Adams High School in Dallas. O'Quinn began his coaching career at Liberty Christian School in Argyle, Texas, serving as a defensive backs and wide receivers coach.

A native of San Antonio, O'Quinn attended James Madison High School and earned a Bachelor's of Science degree from the University of North Texas, where he played strong safety. He went on to earn a master's degree in counseling and human development from Hardin-Simmons University.

O'Quinn and his wife, Reagan, have three children, Mysti, Brittney and Brock.

ERIC ELLINGWORTH

Southeast Area Scout



Eric Ellingworth came to the Dallas Cowboys in 2019 as a college scout after serving one season as a scouting assistant with the N.Y. Jets. Ellingworth scouts the southeast. While with the Jets, Ellingworth scouted both the college and pro ranks.

Mid-South Area Scout



After nine years in the coaching realm, Sam Garza entered the personnel arena as a pro scout with the Cowboys in 2005. Since 2020, Brown was responsible for the return to play at peak performance of numerous starters and key contributors, including Trevon Diggs (knee), Michael Gallup (knee), Dak Prescott (ankle), Tyron Smith (back), Terence Steele (knee) and Leighton Vander Esch (neck).

PRO: The Dallas Cowboys signed tested veteran Bryan Anger in April 2021, and since then, the 12-year vet has smashed franchise punting records in his three years with Dallas. In 2023 Anger set team records - which he previously owned - in both net punting average (44.9) and gross average (51.4). Anger's 51.4 gross punting average also ranked third in NFL single-season history. He is eighth on the NFL's all-time list for net yards (41.4) and gross yards (46.8). Since coming into the league in 2012, Anger is second in the league with 828 punts and eighth with a net of 41.4. Originally drafted in the third round (70th overall) of the 2012 NFL Draft by Jacksonville, Anger landed in Dallas after playing nine NFL seasons, including four with the Jaguars (2012-15), three in Tampa Bay (2016-18) and two in Houston (2019-20). Anger signed a three-year contract with the Cowboys during 2022 free agency and is entering the last year of his deal in 2024.

2023:

- Earned his second trip to the Pro Bowl, and was named second-team All-Pro, after finishing second in the NFL and establishing franchise records in both net average (44.9 - fifth in NFL history) and gross average (51.4 - third in NFL history).
- Became the second Cowboys punter to earn multiple Pro Bowl selections, joining Mat McBriar (two).
- Tied a career-low with two touchbacks, which also tied for third in the NFL.
- Against Seattle (11/30) held for placekicker Brandon Aubrey on four field goals and three extra points but did not have a punting opportunity, as neither team punted in the game. It was the first time in Cowboys history - fifth occurrence in NFL history - that no punts were recorded in a game.
- Tied a season-high with five punts at Buffalo (12/17) that included a season-best three punts downed inside the 20-yard line. Also posted a 55.0 gross average, a 48.6 net average and a long punt of 62 yards (second longest of the season).

2022:

- Tied his then career-best 48.4 gross from the previous season, punting the ball 68 times with 27 downed inside the 20-yard line and booted a career-long 83-yarder - second-longest in Cowboys history (Ron Widby, 84 yards in 1968).
- Had four-of-five punts downed inside the 20-yard line against Cincinnati (9/18).
- Named the special teams captain at the LA Rams (10/9) and punted six times for a 48.0 average.
- Booted a punt 83 yards against Chicago (10/30) - the longest punt of his career and the second-longest in Cowboys history behind Widby (84 yards in 1968).
- Punted eight times for a 47.0 average with four downed inside the 20-yard line in two postseason games at Tampa Bay (11/16/23) and at San Francisco (1/22/23).

2021:

- Landed all four of his punts inside the 10-yard line at the N.Y. Giants (12/19), establishing a season-high of punts downed inside the 20. Became the only Cowboys punter since 2000 to land four inside the 10-yard line in a game.
- In the Wild Card Playoff game against San Francisco (1/16/22), established team postseason records in net (51.4) and gross (53.6) averages while completing a 16-yard pass to C.J. Goodwin on a fake punt - the first-ever pass attempt by a Cowboys punter in the postseason.

2020 (Houston):

- Played in all 16 games for the eighth time in his career and averaged 46.4 yards-per-punt with a net of 41.8, 19 downed inside the 20, six touchbacks and a long of 67.
- Notched a season-best 56.0 gross (second-highest of his career) and 45.7 net at Cleveland (11/15).
- With four punts for 180 yards against Cincinnati (12/27), joined Shane Lechler and Johnny Hekker as the only punters in NFL history with 30,000 punt yards and a 46.0 average in their first nine seasons.

2019 (Tampa Bay/Houston):

- Released by Tampa in March and signed with Houston at the start of training camp, playing in 14 games and both playoff contests for the Texans, missing the first two games after being released at final cuts and re-signed Sept. 17.
- Finished with a gross of 46.5 yards and a 44.5-yard net - second in the NFL in 2019.
- In postseason play, had the highest net average in Texans history, and his five punts inside the 20 were second.
- Notched a season-best 51.4 net against Carolina (9/29), along with a season-long 71-yarder, then had his season-best gross (51.8) against Oakland (10/27).

PRO: In the search for a long-term kicker, the Dallas Cowboys signed Brandon Aubrey prior to training camp in 2023. Aubrey spent two seasons (2022-23) kicking for the Birmingham Stallions in the USFL and spent his collegiate athletic career as a soccer player at Notre Dame. During his first NFL season, Aubrey put together one of the most productive seasons by any first-year kicker in NFL history. He led the league in field goals made (36) and ranked third in field goal percentage (94.7). Aubrey made his first 35 field goal attempts in 2023, an NFL record for field goals made without a miss to start a career. Along with precision, Aubrey set the NFL single-season record with 99 touchbacks and led the league with 157 points scored, a single-season franchise record. PRO: The Dallas Cowboys selected DaRon Bland in the fifth round (167th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft. The tall and athletic cornerback fits the size and traits that the Cowboys defense seeks in its defensive backs. Bland exceeded all expectations in his first pro season, playing significant time at both the nickel and boundary corner positions to the tune of eight starts in 17 games played with 56 tackles, a tackle for loss, seven pass breakups and a team-leading five interceptions. Bland's five interceptions were the most by a Cowboys rookie since Derek Ross and Roy Williams each had five in 2002. Bland polished off a historic second pro season in 2023 where he led the NFL with a career-best nine interceptions, marking the second time in the last three years that a Cowboy led the NFL in interceptions (Trevon Diggs, 11 in 2021). Additionally, he returned five interceptions for touchdowns to set an NFL record for the most pick-sixes in a season, and he set career-highs in tackles (72 - tied for fourth on the defense), tackles for loss (three) and pass breakups (15 - tops on the defense) while starting a career-high 15-of-17 games played.

TRANSACTION SUMMARY:

4/30/22: Drafted in the fifth round (167th overall) by Dallas.

2023:

- Selected to his first Pro Bowl as a starter and named first-team All-Pro in his second season after starting 15-of-17 games and setting an NFL record with five interception return touchdowns. Also led the league with nine total picks and added 72 tackles, three tackles for loss and a team-high 15 pass breakups.
- Marked the second time in the last three years that a Cowboy led the NFL in interceptions (Diggs, 11 in 2021).

Became the third cornerback in Cowboys history with multiple interception return touchdowns in the same season, joining Diggs (two) in 2021 and Larry Brown (two) in 1995.
- Against the LA Rams (10/29) compiled seven tackles (tied for the team lead), two pass breakups and an interception that he returned 30 yards for a touchdown in the first quarter - his third pick-six of the season.
- Collected his fifth interception of the season against the N.Y. Giants (11/12), tying his single-season career-high from 2022. Also had four tackles and a pass breakup. Became the second player in franchise history to record five interceptions in each of his first two seasons, joining Walls (11 in 1981 and seven in 1982).
- Produced five tackles, a pass breakup and an interception he returned 30 yards for a touchdown in the fourth quarter at Carolina (11/19). It was his sixth interception of the season, fourth pick-six of the year to tie the most pick-sixes in a season in NFL history, joining Eric Allen (1993), Ken Houston (1971) and Jim Kearney (1972).
- Led the team with a career-best 10 tackles along with an interception he returned 63 yards for a touchdown against Washington on Thanksgiving (11/23). Set a single-season NFL record with his fifth interception return for a touchdown and became the first non-offensive player to score five touchdowns in a season since J.J. Watt in 2014.
- Posted six stops, his eighth interception of the season and a pass breakup against Seattle (11/30).
- Tallied three tackles, an interception and a pass breakup at Washington (1/7/24). His interception was his career-high ninth of the season to finish 2023 as the NFL's interception leader.
- Recorded six tackles in the postseason contest against Green Bay (1/14/24).

2022:

- Appeared in all 17 games, starting eight, as a boundary and nickel corner, recording 56 tackles, a tackle for loss, two pressures, a team-best five interceptions and seven pass breakups.

PRO: The Dallas Cowboys drafted a player with big-time potential when they selected Damone Clark in the fifth round (176th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft. Clark, a linebacker out of LSU, was projected to be a high pick before he had spinal fusion surgery to correct a herniated disc discovered in the pre-draft process. He began his rookie season on the Reserve/NFI list as he recovered and returned to play in 10 games with five starts, amassing 50 tackles and two forced fumbles in a prominent role on the Cowboys defense. PRO: The Dallas Cowboys added a speedy, big-play threat to their offense when they traded a 2023 fifth round pick and 2024 sixth round pick to Houston for Brandin Cooks. Cooks, who was selected 20th overall by New Orleans in the 2014 NFL Draft, has played in two Super Bowls - one each with New England and the LA Rams. He has six career 1,000-yard seasons, which is tied for the fifth-most in the NFL since he was drafted in 2014. Cooks also has the fifth-most receiving touchdowns of 40 yards-or-more (15) in that span. Despite being traded to four different teams, Cooks' production has not stopped. He joined Brandon Marshall as the only players in NFL history to record at least 1,000 receiving yards in a season with four different teams. Cooks proved to be a bonafide number two receiver in Dallas, catching 54 passes for 657 yards and eight touchdowns in 2023, helping draw coverage away from CeeDee Lamb, who broke the single-season Cowboys records for receptions (135) and yards (1,749).

PRO: The Dallas Cowboys bolstered their defensive backfield when they selected Trevon Diggs - one of the top cornerbacks and one of the best all-around athletes - in the second round (51st overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft. Diggs, who started his collegiate career as a receiver at Alabama, made the switch to defense as a sophomore and continued to improve each season. As a rookie in Dallas, Diggs started 11 of the 12 games he played, missing four in the middle of the season with a broken foot. Diggs finished his rookie season as the first Cowboys rookie to lead the team outright in interceptions (three) since Terence Newman in 2003, the first rookie to lead the team in breakups (14) since Byron Jones in 2015 and the first to lead in both categories since 1984 when Dallas started tracking breakups. Diggs had a breakout year in his second season, leading the NFL and tying a franchise record with 11 interceptions - returning two for touchdowns - making him the first Cowboy to lead the NFL in picks since Everson Walls in 1981. Diggs was named a Pro Bowl starter and earned first-team All-Pro honors for his efforts. Starting all 16 games he played, primarily shadowing the top opposing receivers, Diggs also led the defense with 21 breakups and finished seventh with 56 tackles - tying his total from his rookie season. Diggs grew into a complete cover corner as a third-year player, often shadowing the opponent's best receiver while recording three interceptions, 14 pass breakups and registered a forced incompleteness percentage of 12.1%, per *PFF*, on his way to his second straight Pro Bowl. On the eve of training camp in 2023, Diggs signed a five-year extension that keeps him in Dallas through 2028 and rewarded his historic performance through his first three NFL seasons. He was off to another hot start through the first few weeks of 2023 before suffering a knee injury during practice prior to Week 3, forcing him to miss the remainder of his fourth season. After an offseason of diligent rehab, Diggs looks to regain his All-Pro form in 2024.

PRO: For just the second time in franchise history, the Dallas Cowboys used a top-five pick to select a running back when the team chose Ezekiel Elliott with the fourth pick of the 2016 NFL Draft. Elliott had one of the most electric rookie seasons by a running back in NFL history, leading the league with 1,631 yards to become just the fifth rookie since the NFL merger to win the NFL rushing title. Elliott spent his first seven seasons as a pro with Dallas, earning three Pro Bowls, and led the Cowboys in rushing yards from 2016-21. He won the NFL rushing title in the 2016 and 2018 seasons, joining Emmitt Smith (four seasons) as the only Cowboys with multiple rushing titles. Elliott is one of the most decorated running backs in Cowboys history, entering 2024 ranked third in team history in rushing yards (8,262), rushing touchdowns (68) and fifth in scrimmage yards (10,598). After his release from Dallas in the 2023 offseason, Elliott signed with New England during training camp and led the Patriots with 642 rushing yards. The Cowboys re-signed Elliott heading into the 2024 season, adding him to a running back room in need of an experienced rusher.

- Had a season-high 80 yards on the ground on 16 carries at the N.Y. Jets (9/24).
- Scored his first touchdown of the year at Las Vegas (10/15), then scored again the following week against Buffalo (10/22).
- Totaled 140 scrimmage yards at Pittsburgh (12/7), rushing for 68 yards and catching seven passes for 72 yards, adding a touchdown through the air.

2022:

- Led the team in rushing attempts (231) and touchdowns (12) as part of a rushing tandem with Tony Pollard, totaling 876 yards on the ground and 968 scrimmage yards in 15 games played.
- Became the third Cowboys running back to eclipse 10,000 career scrimmage yards and tallied nine consecutive games with a touchdown, the eighth NFL player since the merger with a nine-game touchdown streak.
- Had 73 rushing yards on 15 carries and his first score of the season at the N.Y. Giants (9/26), adding a season-long 27-yard rush.
- Rushed 13 times for 81 yards and a touchdown at Philadelphia (10/16), the first game of nine straight with a score, and surpassed 10,000 scrimmage yards for his career - the third Cowboys running back to reach 10,000 career scrimmage yards.
- Scored two touchdowns on the ground against Detroit (10/23) and at Minnesota (11/20), the 20th and 21st multi-touchdown games of his career - tied with Tony Dorsett for second-most in team history.
- Tallied a season-high 92 rushing yards and a touchdown on 16 carries against the N.Y. Giants (11/24), including four rushes of 10-plus yards.
- Scored the game-winning touchdown on a two-yard rush against Houston (12/11), then scored on the ground at Tennessee (12/29), the final game of his nine-game touchdown streak and his 80th career touchdown, third-most in team history.

2021:

- Notched his fifth career 1,000-yard season, tallying 1,002 yards and 10 touchdowns - his third career 10-touchdown season.

- Playing in his 75th career game (and 75th career start), notched his first 100-yard game of the season (29th of his career) against Carolina (10/3), with 143 yards and a touchdown on 20 carries, including a long run of 47 yards (third-longest in his career).
- Topped 100 yards for the second straight game, finishing with 21 carries for 110 yards and a touchdown while catching two passes for two yards and a score against the N.Y. Giants (10/10).
- Notched his 12th career multi-rushing touchdown game, adding two against Atlanta (11/14), then tied Michael Irvin (65) for sixth on the Cowboys all-time touchdowns list, rushing for a score on Thanksgiving Day against Las Vegas (11/25).
- Added his ninth career game with a rushing and receiving touchdown, notching one each against Washington (12/26). His rushing score was the 10th of the season, marking his third 10-touchdown season, second in franchise history.
- Rushed 18 times for 87 yards in the finale at Philadelphia (1/8/22) to top 1,000 yards for the fourth time in his career.

2020:

- Started all 15 games he played, missing his first career game due to injury (calf), and rushed 244 times for 979 yards (11th in the NFL) with six touchdowns. Added 52 catches for 338 yards and two scores.

- Became the third Cowboy - Dorsett and Smith - to top 1,000 scrimmage yards in each of his first five seasons, finishing the year with 1,317.
- Opened the season with 96 yards on 22 carries with a touchdown and caught three passes for 31 yards and a touchdown at the LA Rams (9/13).
- Logged his 10th career multi-rushing touchdown game with two, rushing 19 times for 91 yards against the N.Y. Giants (10/11).
- Notched his first 100-yard game of the season, rushing for 103 yards on 21 carries while catching two passes for 11 yards with a six-yard touchdown catch at Minnesota (11/22).
- Passed 8,000 career scrimmage yards, rushing for 77 yards and adding 18 through the air at Baltimore (12/8).
- Missed his first career game due to injury (calf) against San Francisco (12/20), then returned against Philadelphia (12/27) to rush for 105 yards while nabbing his 50th catch of the season to mark his third straight 50-catch season - tied with Herschel Walker for the second-most 50-catch seasons by a Cowboy (Smith, four).

2019:

- Had his first career 100-yard game, rushing for 140 yards on 30 carries against Chicago (9/25). Became the 10th Cowboys rookie to rush for 100 yards. His 140 yards were eighth by a Cowboys rookie.
- Became the fourth club rookie to log consecutive 100-yard games with 138 at San Francisco (10/2). Also became the fifth Cowboys rusher overall with back-to-back 125-yard games.
- Rushed 15 times for 134 yards (8.9) with two touchdowns, including a career-long 60-yard jaunt for a score in the win over Cincinnati (10/9). It was his first multi-touchdown game - 21st by a Dallas rookie. He is the first club rookie with three consecutive 130-yard games - third NFL rookie (Eric Dickerson, 1983 and Mike Anderson, 2000).
- Had 157 yards - fourth by a Cowboys rookie rusher - on 28 carries (5.6). It was his fourth consecutive 100-yard game - first Cowboys rookie to four straight 100-yard outings - and the first NFL rookie rusher (11th overall back) to rush for at least 130 yards in four straight games.
- Had his second multi-touchdown game of the season, with two, on 18 carries for 92 yards at Cleveland (11/16).
- Earned NFC Offensive Player of the Week, rushing for his fifth 100-yard game of the season at Pittsburgh (11/13), tallying 114 yards and two touchdowns (his third multi-touchdown game of the season, second consecutive) on 21 carries. Both scores came in the final 2:00, making him the first player to score two touchdowns in the final 2:00 of a game since Ahmad Rashad in 1974. Had two catches for 95 yards (career-high) with an 83-yard touchdown - second-longest scoring catch by a rookie in team history, fifth by a club running back. Became the first back since Gale Sayers in 1965 with a 60-plus yard touchdown run and an 80-plus yard scoring catch in a season. His 209 scrimmage yards tied for fourth in club history - the sixth Dallas rookie to reach 200.
- Became the club's all-time leading rookie rusher, passing Dorsett (1,007), after rushing for 97 yards on 25 carries against Baltimore (11/20).
- Had two touchdowns and 97 yards on 20 carries on Thanksgiving Day against Washington (11/24) to become the fourth rookie in club history to reach 10 touchdowns - first since Emmitt Smith (1990). Also passed Smith for rush attempts by a rookie.
- Had a season-best 159 yards (fourth among rookies in team history) on 23 carries (6.9) with one touchdown against Tampa Bay (12/18). Became the second Cowboys rookie (Julius Jones) to post two 150-plus rushing yard games. PRO: The Dallas Cowboys chose Wisconsin tight end Jake Ferguson in the fourth round (129th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft. At Wisconsin, Ferguson established himself as a solid run blocker known for his reliable set of hands after catching a pass in all 47 collegiate appearances, a Wisconsin school record. The addition of Ferguson gave Dallas an upper hand in the run game in 2022, as the Cowboys ranked second in the league in rush yards with multiple tight ends on the field (962). Ferguson also recorded 19 catches in his rookie campaign, the fourth-most catches by a rookie tight end in Cowboys history. With the departure of Dalton Schultz in the 2023 offseason, Ferguson embraced his role as the top tight end, setting career-highs across the board with 71 receptions for 761 yards and five touchdowns as he was selected to his first Pro Bowl as an alternate for George Kittle. He provided an explosive after-the-catch threat that the Cowboys had been missing from the tight end position, and his rapport with Dak Prescott will be a key factor in 2024 as the league's top offense looks to push to further heights.

2023:

- Named to his first Pro Bowl as a replacement for San Francisco's Kittle (Super Bowl) and finished second on the offense with 71 receptions for 761 yards and was third with five touchdowns while starting 16-of-17 games - all career-highs. Became only the third tight end in franchise history to record 70 receptions and 700 yards in a single season, joining Jason Witten (nine times) and Dalton Schultz (once).
- Led all receivers against New England (10/1) with a career-best seven receptions and 77 receiving yards with five first downs - the last Cowboys tight end with five first down receptions was Schultz against Houston (12/11/22).

- Led the offense with 72 yards on five catches against Philadelphia (12/10). Became the fifth tight end in Cowboys history to reach 50 receptions (51) and 500 receiving yards (570) in a single season.
- Was second on the team with 69 yards on six receptions (tied for second) in the regular season finale at Washington (1/7/24). Became only the third tight end in franchise history to record 70 receptions (71) and 700 yards (761) in a single season, joining Witten (nine times) and Schultz (once).

PRO: The Dallas Cowboys improved their secondary when they signed Malik Hooker during the first week of training camp in 2021. Hooker, the former 15th overall pick from the 2017 NFL Draft, arrived in Dallas after spending the first four years of his career with the Indianapolis Colts. His first four seasons did not come without struggle, as he missed 14 games in 2020 with a torn Achilles and more than half of his rookie season with a torn ACL and MCL. PRO: The Dallas Cowboys saw fortune fall their way in the first round of the 2020 NFL Draft when, at pick 17, Ceedee Lamb was available. Highly regarded as one of the top wide receivers in the draft, Lamb's addition to the Dallas offense gave the club one of the most dangerous offenses in the NFL. In his first year in Dallas, Lamb caught a team rookie record 74 passes for 935 yards (second) and five touchdowns (tied for fourth). He was second among league rookies in catches and receiving yards and became the first player in NFL history to start a rookie season with six consecutive games of five-or-more catches. His 1,017 scrimmage yards allowed him to become the seventh rookie in Cowboys history to top 1,000 scrimmage yards. Lamb made a vast improvement for his second season as he led the team with 79 catches and 1,102 yards while tying for second with six touchdowns and earned his first trip to the Pro Bowl in 2021. With the departure of Amari Cooper in 2022, Lamb was tabbed as the number one receiver for Dallas, and he stepped up with a career-best season. Lamb recorded 107 receptions - third Cowboys player to eclipse 100 catches - 1,359 yards and nine touchdowns in 17 starts, earning second-team All-Pro honors and his second consecutive Pro Bowl appearance. Lamb set the bar even higher in 2023, establishing the franchise single-season receptions record (135), single-season yards record (1,749) and turning in 14 total touchdowns to the tune of eight 100-yard games. He etched his name in multiple NFL record books as well, most notably setting the NFL record for consecutive 10-catch, 150-yard performances (three), and earned first-team All-Pro honors for the first time in his career as well as his third Pro Bowl selection.



TRANSACTION SUMMARY:

4/23/20: Drafted in the first round (17th overall) by Dallas.

2023:

- Turned in one of the finest performances by a Cowboys receiver in NFL history while starting all 17 games for the second straight season. Set single-season franchise records for receptions (NFL-best 135) - sixth in NFL history - and receiving yards (1,749) - eighth in NFL history - while his 12 receiving touchdowns tied for seventh in single-season team history.
- Added 14 rushes for 113 yards and two scores on the ground - all career-highs.
- Recorded eight games with 100 receiving yards - second in single-season team history behind Michael Irvin (11) - and seven 10-catch games, tied for second in single-season NFL history.
- Selected to his third straight Pro Bowl - first as a starter - and named first-team All-Pro by the Associated Press.

- Led all receivers with 11 catches for 143 yards against the N.Y. Jets (9/17).
- Made his 50th career start to the tune of seven catches for 117 yards at the LA Chargers (10/16).
- Tallied 12 receptions for 158 yards and tied a career-best with two touchdowns against the LA Rams (10/29). Notched his third career game with at least 10 receptions, 100 yards and two touchdowns, the most such games in franchise history, and became the fastest receiver in franchise history to reach 300 career catches.
- Notched 11 receptions for 191 yards at Philadelphia (11/5), then recorded 11 catches for 151 yards and a touchdown against the N.Y. Giants (11/12) - his third consecutive game with 10-plus catches and 150 receiving yards to establish an NFL record. Became the first Cowboy with 150 receiving yards in three consecutive games - the first NFL player to do so since Josh Gordon in 2013 - and the first player in team history - 11th in NFL history - with three consecutive games of 10-plus catches.
- Made six grabs for 38 yards and a touchdown - 25th of his career - at Carolina (11/19). Reached 1,000 yards in the 10th game of the year, making him the second-fastest Cowboy to do so in a season, trailing only Irvin (nine games in 1995).
- Logged 12 receptions for 116 yards and a touchdown against Seattle (11/30) - his sixth 100-yard receiving game of the year, a single-season career-high. It also marked his fifth game in 2023 with 10 receptions and 100 receiving yards, most in the NFL and the most 10-catch, 100-yard games in a season in franchise history.
- Led the offense with seven receptions for 53 yards at Buffalo (12/17) and rushed once for a touchdown - his career-best 10th score of the season. Surpassed 100 receptions (103), and combined with his 107 receptions in 2022, became the first player in franchise history to record 100 receptions in multiple seasons. Also joined Irvin (1995) as the fastest Cowboys to reach 100 receptions in a season (14 games).
- Led all receivers with 118 yards on six receptions and a long catch of 49 yards that went for a touchdown at Miami (12/24) - his seventh straight game with a score. Became the first receiver in Cowboys history to reach 5,000 career scrimmage yards (5,126) in his first four seasons, and also the sixth wide receiver in NFL history to do so, joining Jerry Rice, Torry Holt, Randy Moss, Michael Thomas and Justin Jefferson.
- Led all receivers with 13 receptions for 227 yards - both career-highs - and a 92-yard touchdown against Detroit (12/30). His 227 receiving yards were the fourth-most receiving yards in a game in franchise history and the most by any Cowboys player since Miles Austin had 250 yards in 2009 against Kansas City (10/11). His career-long 92-yard touchdown reception in the first quarter was the second-longest completion in franchise history (Hayes, 95 yards against Washington on Nov. 13, 1966), the longest play from scrimmage in the entire NFL in 2023 and marked his eighth-straight game with a score.
- Tied a career-best in receptions (13) while gaining 105 all-purpose yards (98 receiving and seven rushing) and scoring two touchdowns through the air at Washington (1/7/24). Scored in his ninth consecutive game, the only receiver in Cowboys history to record a touchdown in nine straight games and the third NFL receiver since 2000 with a nine-game touchdown streak (A.J. Green in 2012 and Randy Moss in 2003-04). Became the fourth player in NFL history with at least 130 receptions and 10 touchdown catches in a season, joining Antonio Brown (2015), Marvin Harrison (2002) and Cooper Kupp (2021).
- Led the team with 110 yards on nine receptions (second), including a postseason career-long catch of 47 yards in the Wild Card game against Green Bay (1/14/24).

2022:

- Started all 17 games, establishing then career-highs across all major receiving categories in catches (107), receiving yards (1,359) and touchdowns (nine) and became the third Cowboys player to eclipse 100 receptions in a season, joining Irvin (111) and Jason Witten (110).
- Earned second-team All-Pro honors and was named to his second consecutive Pro Bowl - finishing top-six in the league in catches (fifth), yards (sixth) and touchdowns (sixth).
- Named team captain in the season opener against Tampa Bay (9/11) but was held to two catches for 29 yards.
- Led the offense with eight receptions for 87 yards and his first score of the season at the N.Y. Giants (9/26).
- Caught six passes for 97 yards and a touchdown against Washington (10/2).
- Produced a then career performance with 11 catches for 150 yards - both single-game bests - and a career-high tying two touchdowns at Green Bay (11/13), notching his first 100-yard performance of the season. Surpassed 200 career catches to become the fastest player in team history (41 games) to reach the mark.

- Caught five passes for 52 yards and a touchdown in the season finale at Washington (1/8/23), finishing the regular season as the second Cowboy ever with 100 receptions and 1,300 receiving yards in a season (Irvin, 1995). His nine touchdowns were the most by a Cowboys receiver since Bryant (16) in 2014.
- Named a postseason captain and debuted with four receptions for 68 yards and a touchdown in the Wild Card Game at Tampa Bay (1/16/23) - the first postseason score of his career.
- Led all receivers with 10 catches for 117 yards in the Divisional Game at San Francisco (1/22/23) - his first 100-yard postseason game and the first by a Cowboy since Michael Gallup (119 yards) at the LA Rams in 2018 (1/12/19). 2021:

- Started 13 of the 16 games he played, missing one with a concussion, and led the team in receptions (79) and yards (1,102) while tying for second with six touchdowns. Also added 14 punt returns for 139 yards (9.9 avg.).
- Named to the Pro Bowl in place of Cooper Kupp, who played in the Super Bowl.
- Caught seven passes for 104 yards and a touchdown in the opener at Tampa Bay (9/9), passing 1,000 career yards in his 17th game played - the second-fastest Cowboy to the mark (Bob Hayes, 13 games).

2020:

- Started 14 of the 16 games he played and was second on the team with 74 catches (club rookie record) and 935 yards (second among club rookies all-time) and tied for first with five receiving touchdowns.
- Added 10 runs for 82 yards and a touchdown, 24 punt returns for 172 yards and a 47-yard kickoff return touchdown.
- Was the seventh rookie in Cowboys history to top 1,000 scrimmage yards (1,017) and one-of-29 rookies in NFL history - one-of-13 since the merger - to score a touchdown via rushing, receiving and kickoff return.
- Became the first Cowboys rookie to start an opener since Terrance Williams in 2013 and caught five passes for 59 yards at the LA Rams (9/13).
- Posted his first career 100-yard outing, finishing against Atlanta (9/20) with 106 yards on six catches.
- Became the sixth player in NFL history to start a career with five catches in each of his first four games, catching five for 79 yards with his first two career touchdowns against Cleveland (10/4). Became the seventh Cowboys rookie with multiple receiving touchdowns - the first since Bryant in 2010.
- Led the team with eight catches and 124 yards - his second 100-yard game - against the N.Y. Giants (10/11).
- Selected as a team captain at Washington (10/25) but was held without a catch. Had a streak of six consecutive games with at least five catches come to an end, but established an NFL rookie record by starting his career with six straight games with five-or-more receptions.
- Established a team rookie record for receptions in a season, surpassing Hayes (46 in 1965) after catching four passes for 34 yards with a touchdown at Minnesota (11/22). Also had a season-high 48 punt return yards on three returns.
- Passed Irvin (654) for fifth among Cowboys rookies in receiving yards at Baltimore (12/8), then moved into third at Cincinnati (12/13).
- In the game against San Francisco (12/20), caught five passes for 85 yards while becoming the eighth Cowboys rookie to return a kickoff for a touchdown on his first career kickoff return. His return came on an onside kick attempt, marking the first Dallas touchdown return on an onside kick attempt since Randall Williams (10/12/03).
- Had a season-long 52-yard catch for a touchdown against Philadelphia (12/27). Also had a rushing score to become the 11th Dallas receiver to catch a touchdown and run for one in a game, first since Terry Glenn (12/11/05).

PRO: With an immediate need for an impact player at defensive end, the Dallas Cowboys packaged their original second (47th overall) and third round (78th overall) draft choices to move up in the second round of the 2014 NFL Draft in a trade with Washington to select DeMarcus Lawrence with the 34th overall pick. Lawrence, a four-time Pro Bowler, is entering his 11th season with Dallas and ranks 12th in team history with 58.5 career sacks. He has also become one of the league's most effective run defenders while wrecking run plays in short yardage situations. Lawrence has played in 137 career games, eighth all-time among Cowboys edge defenders, and will enter 2024 as the most-tenured defensive player on the squad and a leader in the defensive room under new Defensive Coordinator Mike Zimmer.

PRO: The Dallas Cowboys added a talented and driven cornerback with their third round draft pick (92nd overall) in the 2017 NFL Draft when they selected Jourdan Lewis out of Michigan. Lewis, a well-established tackler on the defensive perimeter, has settled in as the Cowboys starting nickel corner since 2020, and during that span he ranks second on the team in tackles (140) – behind Diggs (146). The only time Lewis was not playing at nickel for Dallas was midway through the 2022 season, when he suffered a foot injury that knocked him out for the remainder of the season. He returned in 2023 and played in 16 games, missing only the season-opener, while recording 53 tackles, three forced fumbles and an interception and was voted the team's Ed Block Courage award recipient. He signed a one-year deal to return to Dallas in 2024.

- Inactive for the season opener after working back from the foot injury that ended his 2022 season but returned to play in Week 2 against the N.Y. Jets (9/17), seeing limited snaps on defense.

- In the Divisional Playoff Game against Green Bay (1/15/17), helped block for an offense that had a 100-yard rusher (Elliott-125), 100-yard receiver (Dez Bryant-132) and a 300-yard passer (Prescott-302) for only the second time in team playoff history. 

PRO: Micah Parsons was regarded as one of the top overall athletes in the 2021 NFL Draft, and the Dallas Cowboys landed the former Big Ten Linebacker of the Year when they traded out of the 10th spot - dropping to 12 and adding an extra third round pick to select him. The selection of Parsons did not disappoint, as the versatile all-around talent put together one of the most dynamic seasons by a rookie in club history. Besides earning a spot on the NFC Pro Bowl roster - the second Dallas rookie linebacker, fourth rookie defender and 12th overall rookie to earn a trip to the Pro Bowl - Parsons was honored as the first Cowboy to earn AP Defensive Rookie of the Year honors. He also became the first Cowboys defensive rookie to be named to the AP All-Pro Team. Parsons led the team with a club rookie record 13.0 sacks (tied for third by a rookie in NFL history and sixth overall in the NFL in 2021). He was also atop club defensive charts for hurries (42) and tackles for loss (12) while finishing fifth with 64 tackles. lofty expectations followed Parsons into his second season, and he lived up to the billing, leading the defense and ranking seventh in the NFL with 13.5 sacks, while adding 69 pressures, 54 tackles, five tackles for loss, three forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries across 17 starts. He became the first Cowboys defender to earn first-team All-Pro honors in each of his first two seasons and was named to his second Pro Bowl in as many seasons. Parsons pushed the bar up even higher in his third season, setting a career-high with 14.0 sacks to go along with a career-best 91 pressures, 56 tackles and seven tackles for loss on his way to his third consecutive Pro Bowl berth and second-team All-Pro honors. He joined Reggie White (1985-87) as the only players since 1982 with at least 12.0 sacks in each of their first three seasons and enters 2024 with more to prove under new Defensive Coordinator Mike Zimmer.

PRO: With their eyes toward the future, the Dallas Cowboys picked Dak Prescott out of Mississippi State with the team's second selection in the fourth round (135th overall) of the 2016 NFL Draft. Prescott became the first quarterback drafted by the Cowboys since Stephen McGee in 2009 and only the fifth in the common draft era since Jerry Jones bought the team in 1989. Prescott was slotted as Dallas' third quarterback when 2016 training camp opened, but throughout training camp, injuries to Kellen Moore (leg) and Tony Romo (back) thrust Prescott into the starting role for the 2016 season.

After losing the season-opener, Prescott led the Cowboys on an 11-game win streak to a franchise-tying 13-3 record and the NFC East title. He set club rookie records with 3,667 passing yards, 23 touchdowns and four interceptions for an NFL rookie record 104.9 passer rating while earning AP Offensive Rookie of the Year honors. Prescott has continued to excel since his rookie season, as his 73 wins as the Cowboys starting quarterback are the third-most by any quarterback since he was drafted in 2016, trailing only Tom Brady (79) and Patrick Mahomes (74). In the franchise's all-time passing records, Prescott enters 2024 ranking first in completion percentage (67.0%), second in passing touchdowns (202) and third in passing yards (29,459). Most recently in 2023, Prescott took his game to a new level with Mike McCarthy taking over play calling duties for the first time since 2018. Prescott went on to finish second in MVP voting and became the first Cowboys quarterback to lead the NFL outright in passing touchdowns with 36 (second in his career). He also led the league in completions (career-high tying 410), was second in completion percentage (career-high 69.5%; second in single-season team history) and quarterback rating (career-high 105.9; second in franchise history). As much success as he has had on the field, Prescott has excelled in his contributions to the community off the field. At NFL Honors in 2022, Prescott was awarded the most prestigious award in the league when he received the Walter Payton Man of the Year trophy for his outstanding community service efforts off the field, as well as excellence on the field. Prescott has helped Dallas to 12 wins in three consecutive seasons, and he will look to lead the Cowboys to further heights during the 2024 campaign.

2023:

- Authored a historic season, becoming the first Cowboys quarterback to lead the NFL outright in passing touchdowns (36 - second-most of his career) and led the league in completions (career-high tying 410), was second in completion percentage (career-high 69.5%; second-most in single-season team history) and quarterback rating (career-high 105.9; second-highest in franchise history) and third in passing yards (4,516 - second-most of his career; third-most in a single-season in team history) while starting all 17 games.
- Also rushed 55 times for 242 yards and two touchdowns.
- Named second-team All-Pro and earned his third Pro Bowl invite while finishing second in the NFL MVP voting.
- Opened the season 13-of-24 (54.2) for 143 yards with no touchdowns and no interceptions at the N.Y. Giants (9/10). Won his 11th consecutive start against the Giants, tying Roger Staubach for the longest win streak against the Giants since 1950, and eclipsed 25,000 career passing yards (25,086), joining Aaron Rodgers as the only two players in NFL history to amass 25,000 passing yards and 1,500 rushing yards in their first 100 career games.
- Connected on 28-of-34 passes (82.4% - seventh-highest of his career) for 261 yards with one touchdown, no interceptions and a 108.5 passer rating against New England (10/1).
- Threw for 272 yards on 21-of-30 passing with one touchdown at the LA Chargers (10/16). Also led the team with a season-high 40 yards on seven carries and an 18-yard score - the longest rushing score of his career.
- Completed 25-of-31 passes for 304 yards, four touchdowns and one interception against the LA Rams (10/29). His four passing touchdowns marked his eighth career game with four scores through the air, tying White for second in Cowboys history, and it marked six career games with 300 yards and four passing touchdowns, tied with Romo for the most such games in team history.
- Connected on 29-of-44 passes for 374 yards and three touchdowns and a 115.2 passer rating at Philadelphia (11/5).
- Threw for a season-high 404 yards on 26-of-35 passing (74.3%) with four touchdowns to one interception and rushed twice for 17 yards and a score against the N.Y. Giants (11/12). Notched his 10th career 400-yard game, the most in franchise history and tied with Dan Marino and Patrick Mahomes for the most 400-yard passing games in a player's first eight seasons. Was his third consecutive game with 300 passing yards, establishing a franchise record.
- Connected on 22-of-32 passes for 331 yards and four scores with a season-high 142.1 passer rating on Thanksgiving against Washington (11/23), his 10th career game with four-plus passing touchdowns, tying Romo for the most in franchise history.
- Engineered a game-winning drive at Seattle (11/30) - the 21st of his career, second in franchise history and the fifth-most by any quarterback since 2016 - while completing 29-of-41 passes for 299 yards and three touchdowns.
- Passed for 271 yards and two scores on 24-of-39 passing (61.5%) against Philadelphia (12/10), his seventh-consecutive multi-touchdown game - a career-long streak to tie Romo for the longest multi-passing touchdown streak in Cowboys history.
- Connected on 20-of-32 passes (62.5%) for 253 yards and two touchdowns at Miami (12/24). Reached 30 passing touchdowns on the season, the third time in his career with at least 30 passing touchdowns in a season (2019 and 2021).
- Tallied 345 yards, two touchdowns and an interception on 26-of-38 passing (68.4%) for a 103.5 passer rating against Detroit (12/30). Recorded his third career season with 4,000 passing yards, second in franchise history behind Romo (four seasons). His 92-yard completion to CeeDee Lamb in the first quarter was the longest completion of his career, and the second-longest in franchise history (Don Meredith-Bob Hayes, 95 yards against Washington on Nov. 13, 1966).

- Threw for 279 yards on 31-of-36 passing (86.1%), four touchdowns and one interception with a 124.4 quarterback rating at Washington (1/7/24) in the regular season finale - his fourth game with an 80.0 completion percentage-or-higher in 2023 to become the first quarterback in NFL history with four games in a season with a completion percentage of 80.0-or-higher (min. 30 attempts in each game). Recorded his 11th career game with four-plus passing touchdowns, establishing a franchise record, and became the second quarterback (Romo - 248) in franchise history to reach 200 career passing touchdowns (202).
- Threw for 403 yards on 41-of-60 passes - all franchise single-game postseason records - with three touchdowns and two interceptions in the Wild Card game against Green Bay (1/14/24). - Threw 23 touchdowns against 15 interceptions while completing 261-of-394 passes for 2,860 yards and a 91.1 passer rating despite missing five games with a thumb injury. Also rushed 45 times for 182 yards and a score.
- Opened the season against Tampa Bay (9/11) connecting on 14-of-29 passes for 134 yards and one pick, leaving the game early with the thumb injury and missing the next five games.
- Named a team captain in his return to action in Week 7 against Detroit (10/23), completing 19-of-25 passes for 207 yards and a touchdown, registering a 76.0% completion percentage and a 113.3 passer rating - his 45th game with a 100.0-or-better passer rating to break a tie with Aikman (44) for the second-most all-time in Cowboys history.
- Passed White (44) for the third-most multi-touchdown games in team history, recording his 45th after throwing for 250 yards and two scores on 21-of-27 passing against Chicago (10/30).
- Was 22-of-25 (88.0%) for 276 yards, two touchdowns and a 139.3 passer rating in a win at Minnesota (11/20). His 88.0 completion percentage was the second-highest of his career (88.6%, against Tampa Bay, 12/18/16), and he recorded a season-long 68-yard scoring strike to Tony Pollard, surpassing 150 career touchdown tosses on the play - the most touchdown throws by a Cowboys quarterback in his first seven seasons.
- Completed 20-of-30 passes for 170 yards, three scores and a pick against Indianapolis (12/4), leading the offense to a season-best 54 points and passing Staubach (153) and White (155) for third on the Cowboys all-time passing touchdowns list.
- Finished 24-of-39 for 284 yards with one touchdown and two interceptions against Houston (12/11), engineering an 11-play, 98-yard game-winning touchdown drive with 3:20 left in the fourth quarter to mark his 18th career game-winning drive - second in team history behind Romo (24).
- Threw for a season-high 347 yards on 27-of-35 passing with three touchdowns and an interception against Philadelphia (12/24) - his only 300-yard performance of the season.
- Tied Aikman (165) for the second-most touchdown throws by a Cowboys quarterback by throwing two at Tennessee (12/29), then broke the tie with a passing score the following week in the regular season finale at Washington (1/8/23).
- Named a team captain for the postseason and recorded one of the top postseason performances by a Cowboys quarterback in the Wild Card game at Tampa Bay (1/16/23), throwing for 305 yards, four touchdowns and no interceptions on 25-of-33 passing for a postseason career-best 143.3 passer rating, adding a rushing score as well. Became the first passer in team history to rack up five combined touchdowns in a postseason game and joined Aikman (Buffalo, 1/31/93) and Staubach (LA Rams, 1/4/76) as the third Cowboys quarterback to throw four passing scores in a postseason contest.
- Completed 23-of-37 passes for one touchdown with two interceptions, adding four carries for 22 yards on the ground in the Divisional Round loss at San Francisco (1/22/23).

2021:

- Threw a team-record 37 touchdowns and totaled 4,449 yards (fourth in team history) with 10 interceptions, completing a career-high 410 passes (second in team history) on 596 attempts (second in his career and in team history) for a 104.2 rating (second in his career, third in the NFL in 2021 and fourth in team history). Added 48 runs for 146 yards and a touchdown.
- Took home the club's Ed Block Courage Award for overcoming his injury suffered in 2021 and also earned NFC Offensive Player of the Week three times on the season - Weeks 6, 16 and 18.
- Named the offensive captain in his return to the field in the opener at Tampa Bay (9/9) and completed 42 passes on a career-high tying 58 attempts for 403 yards, three touchdowns and an interception.
- In the home-opening win over Philadelphia (9/27), went 21-of-26 for 238 yards with three touchdowns and a 143.3 rating.
- Threw four touchdowns and 188 yards on 14-of-22 passing against Carolina (10/3), notching his 21st career game with at least three touchdowns and his fifth career game with at least four. Three of his touchdowns came in the third quarter, becoming the second Cowboy (Romo in 2007) to have three touchdowns in a quarter.
- Led Dallas to a big win over the N.Y. Giants (10/10), completing 22-of-32 passes for 302 yards, three touchdowns and an interception. Moved into third in team history with his 38th career 100.0-rating game (116.9) and notched his third straight game with at least three touchdowns.
- Selected as the offensive captain and earned NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors for his performance at New England (10/17). Threw a season-high 445 yards and three touchdowns, including the 35-yard game-winner in overtime, on 36-of-51 passing (70.6%) with a 108.7 quarterback rating.
- At Minnesota (10/31) was inactive for the first time in his career after suffering a calf injury on the final play at New England.
- Added his 25th career rushing score while going 24-of-31 passing for 296 yards and two touchdowns with a 127.9 rating in the 40-point win over Atlanta (11/14).
- On Thanksgiving Day against Las Vegas (11/25), passed White (1,761) for third in completions in franchise history, finishing 32-of-47 for 375 yards, two touchdowns and a 106.3 rating.
- Selected as a team captain at New Orleans (12/2) and completed 65.0% of his passes for the ninth time on the year.
- Earned NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors after his performance against Washington (12/26), completing 28-of-39 passes (71.8%) for 330 yards and four touchdowns for a 131.4 rating. Became the first quarterback in NFL history to throw a touchdown to a running back (Ezekiel Elliott), wide receiver (Amari Cooper), tight end (Dalton Schultz) and offensive lineman (Terence Steele) in a regular season game.
- Threw for 226 yards against Arizona (1/22/22) and topped 4,000 yards on the season for the second time in his career. His three touchdowns gave him 32 for the season - a career-high - and marked his 10th multi-touchdown game of the season.
- Threw a single-game career-high and franchise-record tying five touchdowns on 21-of-27 passes for 295 yards and a 151.8 rating in just three quarters in the season finale at Philadelphia (1/8/22), giving him a club record 37 touchdowns on the season.

- Missed 11 games on Reserve/Injured after suffering an ankle injury Week 5 against the N.Y. Giants (10/11).
- Finished the season completing 151-of-222 passes (68.0) for 1,856 yards with nine touchdowns to four interceptions in five starts.
- Added three rushing touchdowns and 93 yards on 18 carries and caught his first career pass for an 11-yard touchdown in the game he suffered the injury.
- Selected as the offensive captain for Week 1.
- Took home NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors after going 34-of-47 for 450 yards and a touchdown while rushing five times for 18 yards and three touchdowns against Atlanta (9/20) to become the first NFL passer to throw for 400 yards and rush for three scores. It was the first multi-rushing touchdown game by a Dallas quarterback since Aikman (two, against Arizona, (9/6/98) and the first to rush for three in the NFL since Russell Wilson against Buffalo (12/16/12).
- At Seattle (9/27) completed 37-of-57 passes for 472 yards for three touchdowns and two interceptions. His 57 throws were a then career-high and his 37 completions were then second. For the first time in club history a Dallas quarterback passed for 400 yards in consecutive games, and only Ryan Fitzpatrick (three games in 2019) held a longer streak.
- Tied Fitzpatrick (three in 2019) for the most consecutive 400-yard games in NFL history, throwing for a personal-best 502 yards (second in team history) with four touchdowns on 41-of-58 passes with one interception against Cleveland (10/4). Became only the second Dallas quarterback to pass for 500 yards in a game (Romo, 506, vs. Denver, 10/6/13).
- Went 14-of-21 for 166 yards with a touchdown, rushed two times for seven yards and caught an 11-yard touchdown pass from Cedrick Wilson before a fractured ankle ended his season against the N.Y. Giants. Became the second Cowboys quarterback with a touchdown catch (White, twice).

2019:

- Became only the second quarterback - fifth time - in franchise history to pass for 4,000 yards and 30 touchdowns in a single season.
- Set single-season career-highs in passing yards (4,902 - second in franchise history), attempts (596 - second) and yards-per-attempt (8.2).
- Part of the first group in team history to boast a 4,000-yard passer (Prescott), a 1,000-yard rusher (Elliott) and a 1,000-yard receiver (two - Cooper and Michael Gallup) in a season.
- Twice named NFC Offensive Player of the Week - Weeks 1 and 11.
- Selected as a team captain for 2019.
- Named NFC Offensive Player of the Week after notching his second career 400-yard game, opening the season against the N.Y. Giants (9/8) with 405 yards and four touchdowns on 25-of-32 passes (78.1) with a perfect quarterback rating (158.3). He became the second Cowboy with a perfect rating (Craig Morton) and the fourth quarterback to register a perfect rating while attempting at least 30 passes in league history.
- Started his 50th career game and completed 26-of-30 passes for 269 yards and three touchdowns at Washington (9/15). His 86.7 completion percentage was then second in his career, and he completed a career-high tying 18 consecutive passes (second in team history). Rushed for 69 yards with a 42-yard long - longest by a Dallas quarterback. Also topped 1,000 career rushing yards.
- With two touchdowns against Miami (9/22), reached 75 career touchdowns passes, doing so in 51 games - the second-fastest Cowboy to reach the mark in games played under center (Romo-37) and fastest in total games.
- Had a season-high 463 yards on 27-of-44 passes with two touchdowns and three picks against Green Bay (10/6).
- Added rushing touchdowns in consecutive games with one each at the N.Y. Jets (10/13) and against Philadelphia (10/20), giving him the most career rushing touchdowns by a Cowboys quarterback (21).
- Earned NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors (second time on the season) at Detroit (11/17) after throwing for 444 yards and three touchdowns on 29-of-44 passes with a 116.6 rating.
- Established a single-season high in passing yards after throwing for 334 yards at Chicago (12/5) to become the second Cowboys passer (Romo) to top 4,000 yards in a season.

2018:

- Had 289 yards with two touchdowns, including a 90-yarder, and a season-best 121.6 rating on 22-of-31 passing on Thanksgiving Day against Washington (11/22). His 90-yard scoring throw to Cooper tied the then third-longest passing play in team history. He also rushed for a touchdown, giving him three straight games with a rushing score - longest streak in his career.
- Completed 18 consecutive passes (career-best and second in team history), finishing the game against New Orleans (11/29) with 248 yards and a score on 24-of-28 passes (85.7). Threw for 192 yards in the first half.
- Had then season-highs for attempts (54) and completions (42) for 455 yards, three touchdown throws and 23 passing first downs in the win over Philadelphia (12/9). Had a long pass of 75 yards for a touchdown, his second 75-plus yard scoring toss of the season. Also crossed 10,000 career passing yards in the game.
- Threw a season-high four scores with 387 yards on 27-of-44 passes for a 120.2 rating in the finale at the N.Y. Giants (12/30).
- Went 22-of-33 (66.7) for 226 yards with one touchdown and an interception in the Wild Card win over Seattle (1/5/19). Also rushed six times for 29 yards with one touchdown to become the first Cowboys passer with a rushing and a passing score in a playoff game.
- Completed 20-of-32 passes for 266 yards and a touchdown in the Divisional Playoff at the LA Rams (1/12/19).

2017:

- Selected as a team captain and started all 16 games, completing 308-of-490 passes (62.9%) for 3,324 yards, 22 touchdowns and 13 interceptions.
- Had a team quarterback record 357 rushing yards with six touchdowns on 57 runs.
- On his second attempt at Denver (9/17), became the first quarterback in NFL history to have less than five interceptions in his first 500 career attempts. Attempted a then career-high 50 passes, completing 30.
- Threw for three touchdowns in consecutive games (against the LA Rams, 10/1, and against Green Bay, 10/8) for the first time in his career. Also rushed for a score against the Packers.
- Became the 10th Dallas Cowboy to reach 5,000 passing yards and the third Cowboy (sixth time) to register three consecutive games with three touchdown passes, finishing at San Francisco (10/22) 16-of-25 for 234 yards and three touchdowns.

SIDELINES

- With a rushing score against Kansas City (11/5), became the third Cowboys quarterback with 10 career rushing touchdowns and the second NFL passer (Cam Newton) with at least 35 passing scores and 10 rushing scores in a player's first two seasons.
- With his rushing touchdown at Atlanta (11/12), joined Dan Marino, Daunte Culpepper and Kurt Warner as the only quarterbacks in NFL history with 50 combined (passing and rushing) touchdowns in a player's first two seasons.
- Threw for 332 yards at the N.Y. Giants (12/10) with three touchdowns and a 131.7 rating on 20-of-30 passing. All three of his scores were from 20-or-more yards (20, 50 and 81). He also completed a 54-yard pass to make him one-of-two quarterbacks in 2017 (Russell Wilson) with three completions of 50-plus yards in a single game.
- With 32 rush yards at Oakland (12/17), became the fourth Dallas quarterback to rush for 300 yards in a season.

2016:

- Started all 16 games and steered the club to a franchise-tying 13-3 record, tying the most wins by a rookie quarterback in NFL history.
- Set club rookie records with 3,667 yards, 23 touchdowns and only four interceptions on 311-of-459 passing (67.8%) for an NFL rookie record 104.9 quarterback rating while becoming the first quarterback in NFL history drafted in the fourth round-or-later to start all 16 games as a rookie.
- Was the club's second-leading rusher - 57 for 282 yards (4.9) with six touchdowns.
- Became the first rookie quarterback in team history to be named to the Pro Bowl and the first to win AP Offensive Rookie of the Year. Along with Elliott, the duo became the first pair of Dallas rookies to be selected to the Pro Bowl.
- Named NFL Offensive Rookie of the Month (November) as the first rookie quarterback in the Super Bowl era to go 4-0 with no interceptions in a calendar month. Became the first Dallas rookie quarterback to win the award.
- Made his NFL debut in the opener against the N.Y. Giants (9/11) as only the fourth rookie quarterback to start a season opener in team history. Completed 25-of-45 (55.6%) passes for 227 yards with no touchdowns and no interceptions. Was the 13th rookie quarterback to start a game for Dallas and the 40th different quarterback to start a game for the club.
- At Washington (9/18) earned his first win, completing 22-of-30 passes (73.3) for 292 yards. Added one rush for a six-yard touchdown - his first score as a pro. Set an NFL record by attempting 75 passes with no interceptions in the first two games of a player's career.
- Completed 19-of-24 passes (79.2) for 248 yards and his first career passing touchdown - a 17-yarder to Dez Bryant - and a 123.6 rating in the win over Chicago (9/25). Became the first rookie quarterback in team history with consecutive 100-rating games. Also added 36 yards on four runs with a touchdown.
- Against Cincinnati (10/9) completed 18-of-24 passes (75.0) for 227 yards and a touchdown and rushed seven times for four yards and a score. - In the win at Pittsburgh (11/13), completed 22-of-32 passes (68.8) for a season-high 319 yards (second by a rookie in team history) with two touchdowns and a 121.7 rating. It marked his eighth straight win, tying the second-longest streak by a rookie quarterback in NFL history. Had a season-long 83-yard scoring pass, along with a 50-yard scoring pass, becoming the first club rookie, seventh passer and 18th time a Cowboy had two 50-plus yard passing scores in a game. Logged his seventh 100.0-rating game of the season - fourth in the NFL by a rookie and the first rookie in NFL history with seven 100.0-rating games in his team's first nine games.
- Against Baltimore (11/20) logged his eighth 100.0-rating game of the season - tied for second by an NFL rookie and tied for fifth in club history. Had his sixth game with a 70.0-or-better completion percentage, tied for the most by an NFL rookie. Had his second 300-yard game - most by a Dallas rookie. Became the fourth Cowboys quarterback with consecutive 300-yard days and became the first NFL rookie to pass for 300-plus yards and two-plus touchdowns with no interceptions in consecutive games.
- On Thanksgiving Day against Washington (11/24), completed 70.8% (17-of-24) of his passes for 195 yards, one touchdown and a 108.9 rating to tie Russell Wilson (nine) for the most 100.0-rating games by a rookie in the Super Bowl era. His nine 100.0-rating games also tied Romo for third in a Cowboys season. His 70.8 completion percentage gave him his NFL rookie record seventh 70.0-rating game.
- Logged his 10th 100.0-rating game at Minnesota (12/1) to tie Romo for the most in a season in club history.
- Had the club's highest single-game completion percentage - second in NFL history - with an 88.9% (minimum 30 attempts), completing 32-of-36 passes for 279 yards against Tampa Bay (12/18). Completed his first nine passes, then had a streak of eight before closing the game with 12 consecutive completions. Topped 70.0% in a game for the eighth time to tie Aikman (1993) and Romo (2012) for the most games with a completion percentage above 70.0 in a season in team history. Completed each of his 11 second half throws to become the first rookie quarterback (minimum 10) to complete all of his second half passes. Added his sixth rushing score of the year, breaking a tie with Meredith for the most by a Dallas quarterback in a season.
- Completed 75.0% of his passes (15-of-20) and recorded a 148.3 rating - the highest rating by a Dallas rookie, ninth overall and second among rookies (minimum 20 attempts), 10th (minimum 10 attempts) in NFL history against Detroit (12/26). Threw three touchdowns - his fourth three-touchdown game of the season, tied for first by a rookie in league history. It was his club-record 11th 100.0-rating game to make him the first rookie in NFL history with 11 and the eighth different quarterback to 11. Established a club record with his ninth game above 70.0%. Became the first rookie in NFL history drafted in the fourth round-or-later to start each of his club's first 15 games and tied Roethlisberger (13) for the most wins by a rookie in league history. From the previous game, through his first four throws, had a streak of 16 consecutive completions - third in team history.
- Became the first Cowboys rookie quarterback to start a playoff game and just the second to attempt a postseason pass in the Divisional Game against Green Bay (1/15/17). Went 24-of-38 for 302 yards, three touchdowns and a 103.2 rating - all single-game postseason rookie highs - with one interception. His 302 yards were second by an NFL rookie in a postseason game and seventh in a playoff game overall in team history. He became the first NFL rookie passer with three scoring tosses in a playoff game, and his 103.2 rating was third by a league rookie.

- Broke school records for rushing yards by a quarterback (986), total offense (4,435), total offense per-game (341.2), touchdowns responsible (41), completion percentage (61.6), passing yards (3,449), passing yards-per-game (265.3), 200-yard passing games (12), passing touchdowns (27) and passing efficiency (151.7).
- Scored 15 touchdowns (14 rush, one receiving) to finish fifth nationally in points responsible for with 252.
- Was part of a two-quarterback system while seeing action in 11 total games - with seven starts - as a sophomore.
- Completed 156-of-267 passes for 1,940 yards with 10 touchdowns and seven picks, compiled a team-best 829 rushing yards on 134 carries with 13 scores, and also caught two passes – both for touchdowns.
- Set the then MSU single-season record for quarterback rushing yards with 829, while his 13 rushing scores were second-most by a quarterback in MSU history.
- Accounted for 25 touchdowns on the year, which ranked second in MSU history.
- Completed 18-of-29 passes for 194 yards with four touchdowns and no interceptions and rushed 32 times for 118 yards with four scores on the ground as a redshirt freshman.
- Sat out his true freshman year as a redshirt.

PRO: Cooper Rush signed with Dallas following the 2017 NFL Draft as a rookie free agent with the hopes of earning a shot as a backup quarterback, and he became the only rookie free agent in 2017 to make the active roster out of training camp. He started the season as the club's third quarterback and gameday inactive but earned his shot as the primary backup beginning in Week 7. As a rookie, Rush saw time in just two games, he played in just one game in 2018 and two in 2019 as Dak Prescott's primary backup. He was waived in May 2020, claimed off waivers by the N.Y. Giants and spent the first month of the 2020 season on the Giants practice squad. PRO: The Dallas Cowboys addressed an immediate need while also looking to the future when they drafted Tyler Smith in the first round (24th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft. Smith came to Dallas after three seasons at Tulsa, where he made 23 starts in 25 career games. He prepped down the road from the Cowboys facility at North Crowley High School in Fort Worth before his three-year career at Tulsa. In his rookie campaign, Smith was called to duty at left tackle after incumbent starter Tyron Smith went down with an injury at the end of training camp. Smith did not miss a beat, starting all 17 games of his rookie year - 16 at left tackle and one at left guard - and solidified the left side of the Cowboys offensive line. Smith developed into a prominent force on the offensive line in year two, earning his first Pro Bowl nod and garnering second-team All-Pro honors with 14 starts at left guard for the top offense in terms of points-per-game (29.9) and the fifth-best offense in yards-per-game (371.6). With the selection of Tyler Guyton in the first round of the 2024 NFL Draft, Smith looks to have a long-term home at left guard where he can continue to dominate for the Cowboys offensive attack.

PRO: After signing with Dallas as a rookie free agent following the 2020 NFL Draft, Terence Steele could have been considered a long shot to make the roster, but with a rash of injuries to the offensive line through training camp and the season, the Cibolo, Texas native not only earned a roster spot, but he also took on the starting right tackle job in place of La'el Collins (hip). With the departure of Collins, Steele took the reigns of the right tackle spot in 2022 and started 13 games on the right side of the line before a knee injury prematurely ended his breakout campaign, and he went to the Reserve/Injured list for the remainder of the season. After spending the offseason rehabbing, Steele signed a five-year extension prior to the 2023 regular season, keeping him in Dallas as a fixture on the right side of the offensive line for the long haul. He returned to play in a career-best 17 games with 17 starts at right tackle, anchoring the line for the top offense in the NFL (29.9 points-per-game).

PRO: Donovan Wilson was added to the mix at the safety position with the selection of the former Texas A&M product in the sixth round (213th overall) of the 2019 NFL Draft. Wilson played in 11 games as a rookie, seeing a majority of his time on special teams. In his second season, Wilson earned a starting role in Week 5 and went on to start 10 of the final 12 games, missing two to a groin injury. By season's end, he ranked fourth on the defense with 68 tackles while tying for first with two fumble recoveries, tying for second with three forced fumbles and two interceptions and tied for third with 3.5 sacks. Wilson was limited to starts in three-of-nine-contests in 2021, suffering multiple injuries through the season and posted 30 tackles with one for a loss, one hurry and one breakup. Cowboys in the Hall of Fame

Twenty-two members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio, have been elected based on their accomplishments with the Cowboys – Bob Lilly in 1980, Roger Staubach in 1985, Tom Landry in 1990, Tex Schramm in 1991, Tony Dorsett and Randy White in 1994, Mel Renfro in 1996, Troy Aikman and Rayfield Wright in 2006, Michael Irvin in 2007, Bob Hayes in 2009, Emmitt Smith in 2010, Deion Sanders in 2011, Larry Allen in 2013, Charles Haley in 2015, Jerry Jones in 2017, Gil Brandt in 2019, Jimmy Johnson and Cliff Harris in 2020, Drew Pearson in 2021 and Chuck Howley and DeMarcus Ware in 2023. In addition, eight others with ties to the Cowboys have also been enshrined in Canton: Herb Adderley (1980), Lance Alworth (1978), Mike Ditka (1988), Forrest Gregg (1977), Tommy McDonald (1998), Terrell Owens (2018), Bill Parcells (2013) and Jackie Smith (1994).

★ TROY AIKMAN ★ Quarterback, 1989-2000 INDUCTED – 2006

In 12 NFL seasons, Troy Aikman became one of the game's great quarterbacks. As just the third player in NFL history to lead a team to three Super Bowl victories, Aikman rewrote virtually every passing record in Cowboys history. He closed his career with 94 regular season wins, including 90 in the decade of the 1990s – making him the winningest starting quarterback of any decade in NFL history to that point (Joe Montana held the record with 86 wins in the 1980s).

Along with that mark, Aikman held or was tied for 47 Dallas passing records, including the club's career records for attempts (4,715), completions (2,898), passing yards (32,942), touchdowns (165) and completion percentage (61.5% – third best in NFL history at the time of his retirement). He also posted a then club-high 13 regular season 300-yard passing games during his career.

Along the way to these marks, Aikman guided Dallas from the cellar of 1-15 in 1989 to six NFC East titles (1992-96 and 1998), four NFC Championship Games (1992-95) and three Super Bowl titles (XXVII, XXVIII and XXX). He was one of the game's most accurate passers, completing at least 60 percent of his passes in 98-of-165 career games. In the postseason, he reached the 60% completion mark in 12-of-16 games. He completed 70 percent or more of his passes 42 times in his career, with Dallas posting a 37.5 record in those games, and he produced the top six single-season completion percentages in club history.

With his passing accuracy, Aikman was able to establish a club-record with a career interception rate of 2.99% (now held by Dak Prescott, 1.9%). Although not known for his fleet feet, Aikman successfully ran for a first down 49-of-72 times on third or fourth down during career. That ability to avoid the sack also allowed him to post the highest career pass attempts per sack ratio (19.2) in team history. Despite winning just one of his first 15 NFL starts, Aikman went on to start a club-record 180 games (165 regular season) at quarterback and post a 105-75 (.583) record, which includes an impeccable 11-4 mark in the postseason – 3-0 in the Super Bowl.

For his career, Aikman led the Cowboys from behind 16 times in the fourth quarter, including six times in the final 2:00. Another six times, he led the team to wins after the score was tied in the fourth quarter. Five of his game-winning drives came in overtime.

In the postseason Aikman truly shined. His four 300-yard passing days were the third best total in NFL history, and he holds the club records for postseason pass attempts (502), completions (320) and yards (3,849). In addition, Aikman's 23 career postseason passing touchdowns was just one shy of Staubach's club record of 24.

The first overall choice in the 1989 draft out of UCLA, Aikman completed 64.8 percent of his passes for 5,298 yards and 41 touchdowns while throwing only 17 interceptions in two seasons as the starter. He finished his career as the third rated passer in NCAA history. The All-America led the Bruins to a 20-4 record, including wins in the 1987 Aloha Bowl and the 1989 Cotton Bowl. He transferred to UCLA - where he received his degree in sociology in June, 2009 - after two seasons at Oklahoma (1984-85).

Aikman was born Nov. 21, 1966 in West Covina, Cali.

73 ★ LARRY ALLEN ★ Guard/Tackle, 1994-2005 INDUCTED – 2013

As a member of the NFL's All-Decade team for the 1990s and 2000s, Larry Allen was widely recognized as one of the NFL's premier offensive linemen, and he established himself as one of the most decorated offensive players in Dallas Cowboys and NFL history.

In 14 NFL seasons since being drafted in the second round out of Sonoma State, Allen was named to more Pro Bowls (10) than any other offensive lineman in Cowboys history. He also earned another Pro Bowl berth in 2006 while finishing his career with the San Francisco 49ers, bringing his Pro Bowl total to 11 selections. He was also named All-Pro seven times, six times at guard (1995-97, 1999-01) and once at tackle (1998). With his Pro Bowl selection at tackle in 1998, he became just the third player in league history to be selected to the Pro Bowl at more than one offensive line position during his career, joining Bruce Matthews (guard/center) and Chris Hinton (guard/tackle).

An ankle injury in the second week of the 2002 season limited Allen to five games and snapped his seven-year string of trips to the Pro Bowl, the fourth-longest streak in club history and the standard for Pro Bowl selections by a Dallas offensive lineman at that time. Allen fully recovered from his injury and earned his eighth Pro Bowl selection in 2003, tying Emmitt Smith as the only Dallas offensive player to be selected to eight Pro Bowls. In 2004 he earned his ninth trip to Hawaii, then made his 10th and final appearance in the annual all-star game as a Cowboy in 2005. Allen is tied with Mel Renfro for the second-most Pro Bowl selections by a Cowboy, trailing Bob Lilly (11) and Jason Witten (11).

He played all but one position along the offensive line in his 12 seasons in Dallas, moving between right tackle (1994), right guard (1995-97), left tackle (1997-98) and left guard (1999-03). During his illustrious career in Dallas, Allen was a member of an offensive unit that posted the four lowest sacks allowed totals in club history with 18 in 1995, 19 in 1996 and 1998, and 20 in 1994. He also played a very important part in Smith's race toward the all-time NFL rushing mark, having blocked for eight of Smith's 11 1,000-yard rushing seasons. Smith gained 11,463 of his 17,162 career yards with Dallas after Allen joined the Cowboys in 1994 and was a pivotal member of the Super Bowl XXX Champion team in 1995.

With a career-best bench press of 700 pounds and a squat lift of 900 pounds, Allen is also considered to be the strongest man to ever play professional football. After missing most of 2002 with a sprained left ankle that required surgery to remove bone spurs, Allen went on to start 48 straight games before signing and playing for two seasons (2006-07) with San Francisco where he started the final 27 games of his career. Allen started 197-of-203 career games played.



★ GIL BRANDT ★
Vice President of Player Personnel, 1960-88
INDUCTED – 2019

From the inception of the Dallas Cowboys in 1960, to 13 division titles, two Super Bowl titles and 20 consecutive winning seasons, Gil Brandt was behind the scenes as the man responsible for finding the next Cowboys cornerstone player. Throughout his tenure with the Dallas Cowboys, Brandt oversaw the acquisition of 15 of the 19 players who are currently in the Ring of Honor - including two undrafted free agents in Cliff Harris and Drew Pearson, a pair of seventh round selections in Rayfield

Wright and Bob Hayes, and a 10th round draft choice by the name of Roger Staubach. From that group, nine men also earned induction into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

In 30 years with the Cowboys, Brandt distinguished himself at the top of his profession - as an innovator - and someone who set the standard for excellence in the area of player personnel. Whether it be introducing computers and technology into the player evaluation process, negotiating contracts, or inviting 80 undrafted rookie free agents to training camp every year, Brandt brought new and creative philosophies to player acquisition that were copied by many teams in the NFL - and are still being used today.

Brandt was the first person to introduce computers to scouting. He worked with IBM to build a scoring system that assigned a numerical value to players, giving the Cowboys a more efficient way of evaluating talent. These numerical grades were then stored in punch cards and were input into the IBM mainframe so the Cowboys could average the scores of many scouting reports for a particular player and then assign players ranks. This system helped identify high-value players in the lower rounds of the NFL Draft, such as running back Herschel Walker in the fifth round of the 1985 draft and defensive tackle Chad Hennings in the 11th round of the 1988 draft. Brandt was also able to mine NFL talent from unusual places, such as the basketball court or the track and field complex, discovering players like four-time All-Pro cornerback Cornell Green and Pro Football Hall of Fame wide receiver Bob Hayes. Brandt helped field the team that came to win two Super Bowls under Tom Landry by combining these technological advances in scouting and developing the Cowboys system based heavily on numbers and statistics.


In the 30 years that have passed since 1989, Brandt has become one of the greatest ambassadors for not only the Cowboys, but for the entire National Football League. Each year, he works at the NFL Combine, the Super Bowl, the NFL Draft, and at the Pro Football Hall of Fame induction, handling a wide variety of duties. In all, Brandt has been involved with professional football for 60 years, a remarkable achievement that he continues to this day. He is credited with helping to create the NFL Scouting Combine, and he was solely responsible for overseeing player invitations to the NFL draft.

Brandt was born March 4, 1932 in Milwaukee, Wisc., and died on Aug. 31, 2023.

★ **TONY DORSETT** ★
Running Back, 1977-87
INDUCTED – 1994

Tony Dorsett arrived in Dallas in 1977 via a draft-day deal the Cowboys swung with the Seattle Seahawks for the sole intention of selecting the Heisman Trophy winner from the University of Pittsburgh. Then Cowboys president and General Manager Tex Schramm paid what seemed like a bundle for the right to draft Dorsett: one first-round, and three second-round choices. Following an 11-year career in Dallas, he indeed proved to be a steal of a deal for an eventual Pro Football Hall of Fame player.

The Dorsett deal paid dividends in his very first year with the Cowboys, as the four-time All-American picked up where he left off in college, rushing for 1,007 yards to earn NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year honors and at the time, set the rushing bar for rookie running backs in Dallas.

"A lot of the people said I wouldn't last in this league," Dorsett said in 1987. "I was the skinny little kid from Aliquippa, Pa., who wasn't supposed to make it."

Dorsett did make it, in fact he became one of the greatest running backs in NFL history. On Sept. 26, 1988 while playing his final NFL season with the Denver Broncos, Dorsett moved into second place on the NFL all-time rushing list with 12,306 rushing yards, and eventually finished his career with 12,739 yards. At the time, Dorsett trailed only Walter Payton when he retired after suffering a knee injury the following summer, but now ranks 10th behind Emmitt Smith, Payton, Frank Gore, Barry Sanders, Adrian Peterson, Curtis Martin, LaDainian Tomlinson, Jerome Bettis and Eric Dickerson.

By the time Dorsett completed his 12-year career, he had collected a victory in Super Bowl XII, four Pro Bowl selections, one All-Pro honor and three All-NFC selections.

One of the most notable moments of Dorsett's career came on Jan. 2, 1983, before a Monday Night Football television audience playing against the Minnesota Vikings. Dorsett received a handoff from quarterback Danny White and proceeded to run 99-yards for a touchdown, thus recording an unbreakable NFL record. Dorsett's greatest season came in 1981 when he rushed for 1,646 yards, a franchise record at the time, a total that now ranks fourth all-time.

"When he came to us, we hadn't had a strong running attack for about three years," Hall of Fame quarterback Roger Staubach once said. "Tony Dorsett is one of the greatest backs in NFL history."

Dorsett was the Heisman Trophy winner in 1976 and was the first Pitt football player to have his jersey retired. Dorsett left Pitt as a four-time All-American and four-time 1,000-yard rusher. His final collegiate highlight was a 27-3 victory over Georgia in the Sugar Bowl to claim the national title.

In 1994 Dorsett became the ninth Cowboys player inducted into the Ring of Honor, and that same year he was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

He was born April 7, 1954, in Rochester, Pa.

94 ★ CHARLES HALEY ★

Defensive End, 1992-1996

INDUCTED - 2015

One of the most gifted pass rushers in his time in the NFL, Charles Haley left Dallas as the only player in league history to collect five Super Bowl rings. A mainstay on the Cowboys defensive line since arriving in Dallas via a trade with San Francisco in 1992, Haley earned his final ring in a 27-17 win over Pittsburgh in Super Bowl XXX. As a starter on Super Bowl contenders from his first day in the league, Haley played on 11 playoff teams in his 12 years in the league. Haley joined the San Francisco 49ers in 1986 as the team's fourth round draft pick (96th overall) and developed into one of the NFL's most devastating pass rushers during a career split between the 49ers and Cowboys.

Haley was a member of two 49ers championship teams (Super Bowls XXIII and XXIV) before his trade to Dallas. He earned three more Super Bowl rings during his first four seasons with the Cowboys.

Haley began his NFL career at linebacker and led San Francisco in sacks in each of his first six seasons. He recorded four double-digit sack totals with the 49ers, including 12.0 sacks as a rookie and a career-high and NFC-leading 16.0 sacks in 1990. He was moved to defensive end after his trade to Dallas and continued to excel at pressuring the quarterback. He added two more double-digit sack seasons in 1994 (12.5) and 1995 (10.5). Haley then suffered a serious back injury in 1996 that limited him to just five games. He retired after undergoing surgery. However, after a two-year hiatus, Haley re-signed with the 49ers as a backup defensive end for two playoff games in 1998. He came back to play one final season in 1999 and added 3.0 sacks to his career total.

When he walked away for the final time, Haley had amassed 100.5 sacks during his 169-game career. He was twice named NFC Defensive Player of the Year (1990 and 1994), voted to five Pro Bowls and named All-Pro two times, once as a linebacker and once as a defensive end. He played in six NFC championship games over a seven-season period. He started at left outside linebacker for the 49ers in the 1988, 1989, and 1990 games and at right defensive end for the Cowboys in the conference championships in 1992, 1993, and 1994. He was inactive for the Cowboys victory in the 1995 NFC Championship Game.

Haley was a member of 10 division championship teams during his 12-season NFL career. His final season marked the only year he played on a team with a losing record. Prior to that, the fewest number of wins in a season any 49ers and Cowboys team recorded with Haley on the roster was 10.



INDUCTED - 2020

Arriving in Dallas in 1970 as an undrafted free agent from tiny Ouachita Baptist in Arkansas, Cliff Harris went on to crack the starting lineup as a rookie, before missing time to military service. Harris then started the next nine consecutive years and earned six consecutive Pro Bowls and was named to four straight All-NFL teams.

A key member of two Super Bowl winning teams, and teams that earned three more trips to Super Bowls in the 70s, Harris was at his best in the postseason, finishing his career with six interceptions in 21 playoff games and earned a spot on the 1970s NFL All-Decade Team.

Harris, who earned the nickname "Captain Crash" by his teammates for his punishing hits and reckless pursuit of ball carriers, finished his 10-year Cowboys career with 29 interceptions and 16 fumble recoveries - tied for second in team history. Harris also guided the defense to a top-10 finish in each of his 10 seasons with Dallas, including the best defense in the league in 1977. When he retired, his 29 interceptions ranked fifth on the team's all-time interceptions list.

Early in his career, Harris saw time returning kickoffs and punts, averaging a career-best 28.4 yards-per-kickoff return in 1971. Over the five years in which he saw time as a returner (1970-74), he took back 63 kickoffs for 1,622 yards (25.7) and 66 punts for 418 yards (6.3) with 29 fair catches.

He led or tied for the team lead in interceptions three times (1974, 1977, 1979), kickoff returns twice (1971-72) and punt returns (1971-72), and his six postseason interceptions rank third in Cowboys history.

Upon retiring, Harris' name popped up on a few league records - tied for the most Super Bowl games by an individual (five), most postseason fumble recoveries (four) and tied for the most postseason games (21).

Harris was also inducted into the NAIA Hall of Fame in Kansas City in 1978. He was born Nov. 12, 1948 in Fayetteville, Ark.

★ BOB HAYES ★ Wide Receiver, 1965-74 INDUCTED - 2009

In his 10 seasons with the Dallas Cowboys, "Bullet" Bob Hayes revolutionized the wide receiver position and the way defenses would play in the NFL. He began his 11-year NFL career after winning two Olympic gold medals at the 1964 Olympic Games in Tokyo, Japan. He tied the world record (10.06 seconds) in the 100-meter dash and claimed his second gold medal running the anchor leg of the 400-meter relay to earn the title of "The World's Fastest Human." He arrived in Dallas in similar fashion to become – and remain – the only rookie in franchise history to ever lead the team in receptions (46), receiving yards (1,003) and a rookie club record of 12 touchdown catches. His 12 touchdown receptions as a rookie are currently tied for fifth in league history. His speed and threat of being able to go long forced teams to install the zone defense to corral Hayes.

Hayes finished his Cowboys career with 365 catches (eighth), for 7,295 yards (sixth) and 71 touchdowns (second). In club record books, Hayes still holds team receiving marks for most points in a game (24, tied), most touchdowns in a game (four, tied), longest reception (95t), highest career receiving average (20.0), highest single-season receiving average (26.1), touchdowns in a season by a rookie (12) and touchdowns in a game (four, tied).

Hayes was also a threat as a punt returner, returning 104 punts (fifth in team history) for 1,158 yards (fourth) and three touchdowns (tied for second). His 11.1 yard-per-return average is second in team record books only to Deion Sanders (13.3).

Hayes was a three-time Pro Bowl selection and became just the third rookie in club history (Don Perkins – 1961 and Mel Renfro – 1964) to be named to the Pro Bowl. He also earned All-Pro selections four times (1965-68) and was inducted into the Dallas Cowboys Ring of Honor in a halftime celebration against San Diego on Sept. 23, 2001.

Hayes split his time between football and track and field at Florida A&M where he became famous as the "World's Fastest Human." In 1963 he set the world record (9.1 seconds) in the 100-yard dash, a record that stood for 11 years.

Hayes was born December 20, 1942 and died on Sept. 18, 2002.

54 ★ CHUCK HOWLEY ★

Linebacker, 1961-73

INDUCTED – 2023

By the time Chuck Howley retired in 1973, legendary Hall of Fame coach Tom Landry said, "I don't know that I've seen anybody better at linebacker than Howley."

Howley almost didn't play professional football for 15 years. He originally retired from the game after two seasons with the Chicago Bears (1958-59) following a knee injury that cost him the entire 1960 season.

Still passionate about the game, Howley decided to test his knee injury at an alumni game at his alma mater, West Virginia, in 1961. His performance in the alumni game reenergized his appetite for football, and the following season he was traded from Chicago to the Dallas Cowboys, a franchise about to embark on their second season, for two future draft picks.

Howley, who was eligible for the Hall of Fame for more than 40 years, spent his final 13 seasons in Dallas (1961-73) as a leader on the Doomsday Defense. He played in two NFL Championship games and two Super Bowls. A five-time All-Pro and six-time Pro Bowler, Howley intercepted 25 passes and recovered 18 fumbles in 180 career regular season games.

In the Cowboys 13-16 loss to the Baltimore Colts in Super Bowl V, Howley intercepted two passes and recovered a fumble en route to winning Super Bowl MVP. To this day, Howley is still the only player in NFL history to be named Super Bowl MVP from the losing team.

One year later in the 1971 season, Howley led the Cowboys with an interception and fumble recovery while Dallas claimed its first Super Bowl title in a 24-3 win over the Miami Dolphins in Super Bowl VI.


Howley was a five-sport letterman at West Virginia, including the Southern Conference one-meter diving champion, a sprinter on the track team, and he excelled in gymnastics and wrestling. In football, Howley was All-Southern Conference for three years and was named Southern Conference Athlete of the Year his junior year.

He was the fourth player in franchise history to be inducted into the Ring of Honor during halftime of the Cowboys-Lions game on Oct. 30, 1977.



★ MICHAEL IRVIN ★
Wide Receiver, 1988-99
INDUCTED - 2007

Despite having his career cut short due to a spine injury, Michael Irvin left the NFL following the 1999 season owning or tied for 20 Cowboys receiving records. Those marks included career receptions (750), yardage (11,904) and 100-yard receiving games (47). During his illustrious career, Irvin also etched his name in the NFL record books. In league history, only Jerry Rice (12) and Steve Largent (eight) had recorded more 1,000-yard receiving seasons than the seven produced by Irvin at the time of his retirement. His 11 100-yard receiving games during the 1995 season is still the NFL standard, as is the seven consecutive 100-yard games he produced that same year. Irvin's 47 career 100-yard receiving games are tied for 10th in NFL history, and the Cowboys posted a 36-11 record when Irvin topped the 100-yard mark. In the 1990s, Irvin's consistent ability to achieve at the highest level established his place among the game's elite receivers. He finished his career tied with Charlie Joiner for 10th in NFL history on the all-time reception list, and he was ninth in league history in receiving yardage.

Irvin was selected to five Pro Bowls between 1991-98, giving him two more Pro Bowl appearances than any other wide receiver in club history. He is one of only two Cowboys players (Jason Witten 2007-11) to top 75 catches in five straight seasons (1991-1995), and his reception and yardage totals for six of the years between 1991-98 represent six of the top nine single-season performances in club history: 1997 (75 receptions for 1,180 yards); 1995 (111 for 1,603); 1994 (79 for 1,241), 1993 (88 for 1,330), 1992 (78 for 1,396) and 1991 (93 for 1,523). Irvin also stands alone as the club record holder in terms of most consecutive seasons leading the team in receptions (eight, 1991-98) and most total seasons leading the club in receptions (eight). He led or tied for the team lead in catches in 85 of his last 130 regular season games. Including playoff games, he had a catch of 20-yards-or-more in 121 of the 175 NFL games he played. Irvin's career receiving average of 15.9 is the fourth highest in team history, and he is fourth on the club's all-time receiving touchdown list with 65 - trailing Dez Bryant (73), Witten (72) and Bob Hayes (71).

Of his 750 career regular season catches, 95 went for 20-29 yards, 38 for 30-39, 18 for 40-49, 10 for 50-59 and nine for 60 yards-or-more. After entering the League in 1988, he started 147-of-159 regular season games (163-of-175 including playoffs). Irvin did not miss a start due to injury after the 1990 season, when he was overcoming a 1989 knee injury. Always a clutch performer, he became Troy Aikman's go-to-guy on third or fourth down and prospered, leading the team in catches on third or fourth down for first downs in '92 (22), '93 (16), '94 (20), '95 (27), '97 (23) and '98 (16). He had 165 first down catches on third or fourth down in his last 121 games and 185 after returning from the knee injury in 1990.

His performance in the postseason was every bit as impressive as his consistent play throughout the regular season. His six career 100-yard receiving days in the postseason are two shy of the NFL mark of eight by Jerry Rice. Irvin's 87 postseason receptions place him sixth in NFL playoff history, and his 1,315 postseason receiving yards rank second in league annals behind Rice (2,245).

Irvin was the 11th overall choice in 1988 draft out of Miami, Florida, where in just three seasons as a starter he set career records for catches (143), receiving yards (2,423) and touchdown receptions (26).

Irvin was born March 3, 1966.

★ **JIMMY JOHNSON** ★
Head Coach, 1989-93
INDUCTED – 2020

Jimmy Johnson was named the first Cowboys head coach under then new owner Jerry Jones in 1989. He arrived in the pro ranks after a very successful collegiate coaching career that included a national championship with the University of Miami.

In five seasons with the Cowboys, Johnson guided the team to two Super Bowl championships. In his first season in Dallas, Johnson's team finished 1-15, then 7-9 in 1990 before making a return to the playoffs in 1991 with an 11-5 finish.

The Cowboys then returned to the top of the NFL in 1992 and 1993 with back-to-back Super Bowl titles. Both seasons, Dallas claimed NFC Eastern Division titles, defeated the San Francisco 49ers in the NFC Championship game and overcame the Buffalo Bills in the Super Bowl.

On a personal front, Johnson was named NFL Coach of the Year by the Associated Press following the 1990 season after the team posted a 7-9 finish, narrowly missing the postseason by one game.

Johnson's 1992 team finished with a team-record 13 wins en route to an NFC Eastern Division crown. Dallas beat the Eagles in the Divisional round, followed by a win over the 49ers in the NFC Conference Championship. Dallas' return to the Super Bowl was highlighted by a 52-17 win over the Bills - the team's first league title since the 1977 season.

The following season, the defending NFL champion Dallas Cowboys entered the playoffs as the NFC's number one seed with 12-4 regular season finish. Dallas handed the Green Bay Packers a loss, then beat the 49ers to earn a rematch with the Bills in Super Bowl XXVIII. The Cowboys dealt Buffalo a 30-13 loss to claim Dallas' fourth Super Bowl championship.

Johnson left Dallas after compiling a 44-36 regular season record (.550 winning percentage) and an impressive 7-1 postseason mark (.875). He coached 10 Pro Bowl players who earned a combined 22 Pro Bowl selections in his five seasons in Dallas. Johnson also coached five future Hall of Famers in the peak of their careers - Troy Aikman, Larry Allen, Charles Haley, Michael Irvin and Emmitt Smith.

He returned to the NFL sidelines as the head coach of the Miami Dolphins (1996). After Miami finished 8-8 in Johnson's first year, the club strung together three consecutive winning seasons and playoff berths. Johnson's best season in Miami came in 1998 when his defense led the league in fewest points allowed (265) and led the league in interceptions (29), finishing with a 10-6 record.

In total, Johnson's regular season NFL record was 80-64, and his club's were 9-4 in the playoffs for an overall mark of 89-68-0.

Johnson was born July 16, 1943 in Port Arthur, Texas.

★ JERRY JONES ★ Owner/President/General Manager, 1989-Present INDUCTED - 2017

Recognized around the NFL as one of his era's most influential and passionate owners, Jerry Jones was selected for induction to the Pro Football Hall of Fame as a contributor in February of 2017.

In addition to becoming the first NFL owner to lead his franchise to three Super Bowl titles (1992, 93 and 95) in a four year period of time, Jones' efforts in the areas of sports marketing, promotion, stadium development, and network television negotiations created a lasting imprint on the landscape of the NFL and the American sports culture.

Since his purchase of the Cowboys in 1989, the team has won 13 division titles, while advancing to the postseason 18 times and reaching the NFC Championship game four times.

As Dallas' general manager, Jones has overseen personnel efforts that include the acquisition of 63 different players who have combined for a collective total of 184 Pro Bowl appearances as Cowboys. Seven Cowboys players from Jones' tenure of ownership have been inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame - Troy Aikman, Michael Irvin, Emmitt Smith, Deion Sanders, Larry Allen, Charles Haley and DeMarcus Ware - while Jones has served as the presenter for four of those men: Irvin, Smith, Allen and Ware.

The lasting landmarks to Jones' legacy of promoting and protecting the future of the sport of football can be seen in the conception and construction of AT&T Stadium in Arlington, Texas and The Star in Frisco, Texas. The stadium, which opened in 2009, has a capacity of over 100,000 and is the largest and most technologically sound indoor/outdoor stadium in the world. The Star, which serves as the world training headquarters for the Dallas Cowboys, is a state-of-the-art venue that enjoys a first-of-its-kind partnership with its surrounding community in Frisco, Texas, and the young men and women who compete in athletics at the high school and youth sports levels.

On the league level, Jones has served lengthy stints on nearly every significant NFL ownership committee, including the Competition Committee, the Broadcast Committee, the Management Council's Executive Committee, the Health and Safety Advisory Committee, and he is currently the chairman of the NFL Network and Pro Football Hall of Fame Committees.

Born on October 13, 1942, Jones' connections to the game of football go back to his playing days at North Little Rock High School. He then earned a scholarship to play at the University of Arkansas where he was a co-captain of the 1964 Razorbacks' national championship team.


Jones, who became the 15th NFL owner to be selected for induction into the Hall of Fame, is the only man in football history to both play for a collegiate national championship football team and own a Super Bowl winning club.

★ **TOM LANDRY** ★
Head Coach, 1960-88
INDUCTED – 1990

Tom Landry paced the sidelines as the “only head coach” in Dallas Cowboys history for 29 years in his trademark fedora. By the time Landry’s coaching career ended following the 1988 season, he had compiled a 270-178-6 record, then the third most wins in NFL history.

That distinguished career was good enough for Landry to gain entry into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1990 and the Cowboys Ring of Honor in 1993, thanks to leading the Cowboys to two Super Bowl titles, five Super Bowl appearances, five NFC Championships, 13 division titles and an incredible 20 consecutive winning seasons.

“This team has always played for me,” Landry said. “That was the key to why I continued coaching. If they wouldn’t play for me, I would have been out a long time ago. They always played hard and tried hard.”

Landry’s head coaching career did not start out very smoothly, coming over from the N.Y. Giants staff to take over the expansion Cowboys in 1960. That first year ended with an 0-11-1 in 1960, the tie coming against Landry’s former team the Giants, preventing the Cowboys from going winless. The Cowboys went on to suffer through losing seasons in the first five years, before going 7-7 in 1965.

But from that point on, Landry turned the franchise into “America’s Team,” the Cowboys reeling off 20 consecutive winning seasons from 1966-85, one of the longest winning streaks in all of professional sports.

As a player-coach with the Giants before coming to the Cowboys, Landry helped to develop what would eventually become a base defense in the NFL, the 4-3. It was innovations like this that caught the attention of Cowboys owner Clint Murchison Jr. and president Tex Schramm when it came time to select the franchise’s first head coach.

As head coach of the Cowboys, Landry introduced more innovations to the game, including offensive motion. Very seldom did the Cowboys run a play from the formation they initially lined up in after breaking the huddle. Landry brought back the shotgun formation, popularized situational substitutions and concocted the “Flex” defense.

Walking the sidelines characteristically stoic, Landry was always thinking a couple of plays ahead and what the long-term effects of each play he called might be. He coached football as if it were a chess match, positioning his team in the best way to win in the end. And in the end, no one coached with more success for a longer period of time than Landry. That success was the impetus for Landry’s induction into Pro Football Hall of Fame less than two years after he coached his last game.

The legendary coach, born Sept. 11, 1924, in Mission, Texas, died Feb. 12, 2000 of leukemia.

★ BOB LILLY ★
Defensive Tackle, 1961-74
INDUCTED - 1980

Before earning the nickname “Mr. Cowboy,” Bob Lilly was the first player ever drafted by the Dallas Cowboys in 1961. So it is fitting that Lilly not only became the first Cowboys player inducted into the Ring of Honor in 1975, but also became the franchise’s first player inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1980.

During the course of 14 seasons with the Cowboys, Lilly was named Rookie of the Year in 1961, was selected to the Pro Bowl a club-record-tying 11-times (Jason Witten) – 10 consecutive selections between 1964-74 – was named to the All-Pro team seven times and played in two Super Bowls, including the club’s very first Super Bowl victory, 24-3 over Miami in Super Bowl VI.

As the foundation of the famed “Doomsday Defense,” Lilly’s intensity was readily apparent in an infamous scene after the Cowboys Super Bowl V loss to the Baltimore Colts when he ripped his helmet off and hurled it into the air. The following year, the Lilly-led Cowboys defense held Miami to only a field goal in Super Bowl VI, the fewest points every given up in Super Bowl history.

“The competition is what I love,” Lilly once said. “That makes me a lot more intense. Personalities don’t enter into it at all. My objective is to get the man with the ball. Nobody better get in my way.”

Lilly is the Cowboys all-time leader in consecutive games played at 196, is tied for second with 14 seasons played and second all-time with 194 games started. Lilly led the Cowboys in sacks three consecutive years, beginning with his rookie season.

“A man like that comes along once in a lifetime,” late Cowboys head coach Tom Landry said in 1972. “He is something a little bit more than great. Nobody is better than Bob Lilly.”

Lilly was a two-time All-American defensive end at Texas Christian University and a two-time all-Southwest Conference team selection.



88 ★ DREW PEARSON ★ Wide Receiver, 1973-83 INDUCTED – 2021

Drew Pearson played 11 seasons with the Dallas Cowboys, beginning a long-standing tradition of greatness from players to don the number 88 jersey. A former undrafted free agent, Pearson was named to the All-Decade Team of the 1970s as he earned a niche as one of the top clutch receivers in football history, best exemplified by his 50-yard touchdown connection with Roger Staubach in what would be dubbed as the first ever Hail Mary play.

He led the team in receptions and receiving yards four consecutive seasons (1974-77) and recorded two 1,000-yard campaigns. In an era where passing offenses had not yet evolved into high powered aerial attacks, Pearson soared past his offensive peers, posting the most 800-yard receiving seasons (five) of any player in the 70s - including two 1,000-yard campaigns that were tied for the most by any player - and six seasons with 40-or-more catches to tie for the second-most.

Over the course of 156 games in Dallas, Pearson totaled 489 catches for 7,822 yards and 48 touchdowns, becoming the third Cowboys player to surpass 7,000-career yards. Combined with his 189 rushing yards, Pearson was the first Cowboys player to ever reach 8,000 scrimmage yards, and to this day, is only one-of-seven Cowboys players to reach that mark. Pearson ranks fifth in Cowboys history with a career average of 16.0 yards-per-reception. Pearson had a penchant for scoring long touchdowns, and of his 48 career touchdowns through the air, he scored 22 from 20-plus yards.

He has a resume filled with memorable game-winning catches. In 1980 he became the Cowboys all-time leading receiver in receptions, and in 1983, he took the top spot for receiving yards. He is littered through team and league postseason record books, including a catch in a club-record 22 consecutive playoff games. Pearson was a member of three Cowboys teams to reach the Super Bowl in the 1970s, winning Super Bowl XII in 1977. His game-winning "Hail Mary" catch against the Vikings in Minnesota in the divisional round of the 1975 playoffs will forever be remembered, as he caught a 50-yard heave from Staubach in the waning moments to give Dallas a 17-14 victory, propelling the Cowboys to an eventual Super Bowl appearance.

A three-time Pro Bowl selection and three-time first-team All-Pro honoree, Pearson led the NFL with 870 receiving yards in 1977. He was inducted in the Cowboys Ring of Honor during halftime of the Cowboys-Seahawks game on Nov. 6, 2011.

Pearson played collegiately at Tulsa, beginning his career as a quarterback before switching to wide receiver as a junior. Pearson received the University's President's Award as the team's "most unselfish" member as a senior, and in 1985 he was inducted into the Tulsa Athletics Hall of Fame.

He was born January 12, 1951, in South River, New Jersey.



★ MEL RENFRO ★
Defensive Back, 1964-77
INDUCTED - 1996

Mel Renfro first came to the Cowboys as a highly-acclaimed running back out of the University of Oregon. But Cowboys head coach Tom Landry saw Renfro as a defensive back when they selected him in the second round of the 1964 draft.

And what a defensive back he was during his 14-year career, becoming arguably the best safety/cornerback to ever play for the Cowboys, and one of the best to ever play in the NFL. His 52 career interceptions still stand as a team record, and his 26.4-yard career kickoff-return average is second - both a tribute to his running ability.

The NFL certainly got to know Renfro in a hurry, having been elected to the Pro Bowl in each of his first 10 seasons in the NFL - the first six at free safety and the final four at cornerback. His 10 Pro Bowl appearances are tied for second with Larry Allen, just one behind Bob Lilly (11) and Jason Witten (11) for the Cowboys.

On top of his 10 Pro Bowls, Renfro was a four-time All-Pro, playing in four Super Bowls and eight NFC Championships. He became the fifth member of the exclusive Ring of Honor in 1981, and was finally elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1996 in his 14th year of eligibility.

Renfro's 14 seasons with the Dallas Cowboys ties him for second in club history, just one shy of the record.

While at Oregon, Renfro led the team in rushing three consecutive years and was a two-time All-American. Despite coming to the NFL as an acclaimed runner, Renfro only ran the ball eight times during his career, all in 1966. Landry saw a free safety first, Renfro spending his first six seasons at safety and the final eight at corner.

In the middle of Renfro's All-Pro 1969 season, Landry was uncharacteristically complimentary toward one of his players, calling him "the best in the league at free safety."

But the Cowboys certainly figured out a way to capitalize on Renfro's running ability, having him return punts and kickoffs early in his career. He led the NFL in kickoff and punt returns his rookie season, and had seven interceptions, returning one for a touchdown. Renfro still is tied for the franchise lead with two career touchdown returns, and his 30-yard kickoff return average in 1965 still remains as the single-season high.

But it was interceptions Renfro was best known for during his career. In his first six years at free safety, Renfro totaled 30 interceptions. His interception totals declined somewhat when Landry moved him to cornerback for good in 1970. The decline had more to do with quarterbacks' reluctance to throw his way than any diminishing skills or quickness. His 626 interception return yards still stands as a career record for the Cowboys.

That 1971 Pro Bowl possibly was the greatest indication of Renfro's all-round ability. Not only did he play cornerback, but he also returned two punts for touchdowns, leading the NFC to a 27-6 win and earning the game's Most Valuable Player award.

He was born Dec. 30, 1941, in Houston, Texas.

21 ★ DEION SANDERS ★ Cornerback, 1995-99 INDUCTED - 2011

On Sept. 9 1995, the Dallas Cowboys made the biggest free agent move in the franchise's history by signing Deion Sanders to a long term contract. In doing so, Dallas was able to secure the services of one of the most talented cornerbacks in the history of the NFL. His stardom in the NFL was apparent from his first career game when he returned a punt 68 yards for a touchdown. More of that spectacular play continued throughout his 14-season, 188-game career. Sanders, who spent time with five different

NFL teams, scored a total of six touchdowns on punt returns, three on kickoff returns, and returned nine interceptions for scores. The multi-faceted athlete also returned one fumble for a touchdown and had 60 receptions for 784 yards and three touchdowns with the Atlanta Falcons (1989-1993), San Francisco 49ers (1994), Dallas Cowboys (1995-99), Washington Redskins (2000) and Baltimore Ravens (2004-05). In all, he recorded 53 interceptions including five with the Ravens when he returned to the field after a three-year retirement.

Sanders was an extremely gifted and versatile athlete, who was also a Major League Baseball player. As a baseball player, Sanders spent time with the New York Yankees (1989-90), Atlanta Braves (1991-94), Cincinnati Reds (1994-95, 1997, 2001) and San Francisco Giants (1995). He is the only man in professional sports to play in both a World Series (batting at a .533 World Series clip with Atlanta in 1992) and in the Super Bowl (with victorious San Francisco and Dallas teams following the 1994 and 1995 seasons). To further validate his versatility, Sanders is the only man in NFL history who has recorded both a pass reception – a 47-yarder, the longest completion of the game in Super Bowl XXX – and an interception – returned for 15 yards in Super Bowl XXIX – in Super Bowl action. After helping the Cowboys win Super Bowl XXX, Sanders announced on Feb. 20, 1996 that he would play football exclusively for the entire 1996 season. As a result, Sanders started 16 regular season games at cornerback and another eight at wide receiver – becoming the first two-way starter in the NFL since the Philadelphia Eagles Chuck Bednarik, who retired in 1962. At the completion of the 1996 football season, Sanders returned to baseball, signing with the Reds, and led the league in stolen bases (56) in the 1997 season before returning to football on a full-time basis in September.

He was selected to eight Pro Bowls, and became a member of the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 1990s as both a cornerback and a punt returner, leading the NFL in punt returns in 1998. He also led the NFC in kick-offs in 1992 and interceptions in 1991 and 1993. He was named first-team All-Pro nine times at cornerback in addition to receiving All-NFL acclaim by some media outlets as a kick returner in 1992 and as a punt returner in 1998. Sanders won two Super Bowls during his career. He started at right cornerback for the 49ers in their 49-26 victory over the San Diego Chargers in Super Bowl XXIX and at left cornerback in the Cowboys 27-17 win over the Pittsburgh Steelers in Super Bowl XXX.

His 23 career touchdowns (including playoffs) have been scored in the following manner: interceptions (nine), pass receptions (three), rushes (one), kickoff returns (three), punt returns (six) and fumble recoveries (one). Sanders holds the NFL record for career touchdowns scored on any type of return with 18. Perhaps the one statistic that supports Sanders' status as one of the game's greatest playmakers is his 25.1-yard career interception average on 53 career thefts (1,331 yards), ranking him seventh all-time. He retired second all-time in interception return yardage (1,331) and tied for second for most interceptions returned for a touchdown in a career (nine) and a season (three). His career-high 303 yards gained on interception returns with the 49ers in 1994 was third best ever in the NFL at the time of his retirement. He also returned three picks for touchdowns (74, 93, 90 yards) that season to become the first player ever to have two 90-yard interception returns for touchdowns in the same season. He was named the NFL's Defensive Player of the Year.

Sanders was originally drafted by Atlanta in the first round (fifth overall) of the 1989 NFL Draft out of Florida State, just behind Troy Aikman (first overall selection in 1989).

Sanders was born Aug. 9, 1967 in Fort Myers, Fla.

★ **TEX SCHRAMM** ★
President and General Manager, 1959-89
INDUCTED - 1991

Texas Earnest Schramm Jr., better known as “Tex,” rose to Professional Football Hall of Fame status during his 29 seasons as president and general manager of the Dallas Cowboys, turning a 1960 expansion franchise in Dallas into one of the most successful franchises in NFL history.

With Schramm overseeing the birth and growth of the Cowboys organization, the team reached five Super Bowls, winning two, made 18 playoff appearances and compiled an NFL-record 20 consecutive winning seasons, one of the longest such streaks in all of professional sports.

Schramm was an NFL pioneer and innovator. Under his watch, the Dallas Cowboys were always on the cutting edge with revolutionary ideas and visions. He was instrumental in creating the Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders, the first of their kind in professional football, developing the Cowboys Ring of Honor and bringing an annual Cowboys Thanksgiving Day game to the nation.

Schramm's work was not just focused on the Dallas Cowboys, as his tireless efforts changed the face of the entire NFL. He was a driving force behind the development and implementation of instant replay, giving the head referee a microphone for penalty announcements, shortening the play-clock and helping to develop the wild-card playoff system.

A tough negotiator, Schramm was the engineer in building the Cowboys foundation from the ground up. His tough stance in labor negotiations was also evident in his support for using replacement players during the 1987 NFL strike. After just three weeks, the move proved successful and the players returned to work. The benefits of this would be apparent in future years as lasting labor peace was reached with the NFL Players Association in 1992 and has continued since.

His position as chairman of the NFL Competition Committee from 1966 to 1988 aided his innovative efforts. Schramm's impact on the league was widespread, and probably his most cherished legacy since the one-time TV-executive at CBS who first came up with the idea of televising the Winter Olympics in 1960 from Squaw Valley was such a firm believer in preserving and making history.

One of Schramm's most significant accomplishments in the NFL was coordinating the merger of the established NFL and the fledgling American Football League in 1966, holding what amounted to as secret meetings with Kansas City Chiefs owner Lamar Hunt at the insistence of NFL Commissioner Pete Rozelle.

The merger of the two warring leagues led to what became known as the Super Bowl, and when the leagues combined in 1970, the most powerful sports league in the world.

After Schramm departed the Cowboys in 1989 when Jerry Jones bought the club, he went international, becoming president of the upstart World League of American Football, later to become known as NFL Europe. He was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1991.

“I'm not one of the great athletes like the men behind me,” a jubilant Schramm said during his Hall of Fame induction speech. “But I'm thrilled to be standing in front of them. Many of the men in here were my heroes. To be rubbing shoulders with them, it's beyond my comprehension.”


In all, Schramm spent 44 years of his life in professional football, starting as a sportswriter for the Austin American-Statesman in 1947 - a natural step for the California-born Schramm who earned a bachelor's degree in journalism from the University of Texas. Schramm spent 10 seasons with the Los Angeles Rams (1947-56), where Schramm first came in contact with Rozelle, who Schramm hired to be the Rams public relations director in 1952. Schramm then spent a brief period (1957-59) at CBS before being hired by Clint Murchison in 1959 to oversee the startup of the Dallas expansion franchise.

Schramm was born on June 2, 1920, in San Gabriel, Calif., and died July 15, 2003.

Running Back, 1990-2002

INDUCTED – 2010

In 15 seasons - 13 with Dallas - Emmitt Smith made an impact on the NFL that few players can match at any position or in any era. As the NFL's all-time leading rusher, Smith also won four NFL rushing titles, three Super Bowl titles and a league (1993) and Super Bowl (XXVIII) MVP award. He was selected to the Pro Bowl eight times, and among NFL running backs, only Barry Sanders (10) was selected more times. With 975 rushing yards in 2002, Smith became just the seventh player in NFL history to carry the title of all-time rushing leader, taking that designation from Walter Payton.

After 13 seasons in Dallas, Smith had 17,162 career rushing yards, and he moved past Payton's 16,726 career yard mark in Week Eight of the 2002 season against Seattle. Smith finished his pro career with 18,355 yards and is also the NFL's career rushing touchdowns leader (164), and second in league annals in total touchdowns (175), trailing Jerry Rice by 33. The first player in NFL history to post five straight seasons with over 1,400 yards rushing, Smith, Jim Brown and LaDainian Tomlinson are the only players with seven straight 10-touchdown seasons to start their career. With 1,021 yards rushing in 2001, Smith became the first player in NFL history to rush for 1,000 yards in 11 consecutive seasons and the first to post 11 1,000-yard rushing seasons in a career.

Smith holds the NFL record for career rushing attempts with 4,409, passing Payton (3,838) in Week Three of the 2002 season. With a then NFL-record 25 rushing touchdowns in 1995, Smith scored 100 career touchdowns in just six seasons, originally the fastest anyone in league history had reached that mark. Smith also tied Brown's NFL record by scoring 100 touchdowns in just 93 career games. Since Smith's accomplishment, Tomlinson reached the feat in 89 games. His 25 career scores against the Arizona Cardinals is tied for the third-best total by a player against an opponent since 1970, followed by his 24 scores against Washington and the N.Y. Giants.

His value to the Cowboys success can be seen in the club's 99-26 mark (91-24 in regular season) when he carried the ball 20-or-more times a game and 64-19 record (57-19 in regular season) when he rushed for 100 yards. The century mark became a big number in Smith's career, having rushed for 100 yards in 155-of-326 games dating back to high school, including 83-of-218 games with Dallas, including playoffs. In NFL annals, Smith's 78 regular season 100-yard rushing games is a record. Included in Smith's club-record 76 100-yard rushing games are 11 of the top-15 performances in team history and 18 days with over 150 yards (the fourth highest total of 150-yard games in NFL history). Smith rushed for over 100-yards against 22 of the 32 NFL teams.

In addition, he rushed for 2,466 yards against the Philadelphia Eagles in his 15-year career, his best output against any single opponent. That total ranks second since 1970 for running backs against one team. Smith also has the third and fourth best totals in that category.

One reason Smith was such a workhorse in the Dallas offense over the years was his ability to answer the bell at game time, having started 216-of-218 career games - including playoffs. While in Dallas, he missed just four career games due to injury, and it was that durability that enabled Smith to lead the Cowboys in rushing in 178 of his 201 career regular season games. The lack of decline in Smith's game is also evidenced by the fact that he had rushed for 5,928 yards from 1998-2002 - the fifth highest yardage total in the NFL over that time span. His 41 rushing touchdowns during his last five years in Dallas was the third-best figure in the league.

Not limited to rushing and scoring, Smith is fifth on the Cowboys all-time receptions list with 486 career catches, trailing Drew Pearson (489) by three receptions. Smith is one of only seven NFL players who have amassed over 9,000 career-rushing yards and 500 career receptions. He is second on the NFL's yards from scrimmage list and fourth on the NFL's all-time combined yardage list with 20,174 yards.


Smith was born on May 15, 1969 in Pensacola, Fla.

12 ★ ROGER STAUBACH ★

Quarterback, 1969-79

INDUCTED - 1985

Good things come to those who wait, and certainly the Dallas Cowboys patience in the mid-60's was supremely rewarded, landing one of the best players in franchise history because they were willing to wait for Roger Staubach to fulfill his military commitment.

For those five years of patience, the Cowboys landed the guy who became better known as "Roger The Dodger" over the next 11 years when he was selected to six Pro Bowls – including five consecutively – and was named the NFL Players Association Most Valuable Player in 1971. Staubach led the NFL in passing four times and was selected to the All-NFC team five times.

"He is one of the finest to ever play the game," Green Bay Packers Quarterback Bart Starr once said of Staubach. "I think if I had some of that Staubach competitiveness, I'd have been much better."

Staubach, the 1963 Heisman Trophy winner, was drafted by the Dallas Cowboys in 1964 from the Naval Academy, but did not join the team until 1969 due to his Navy commitment. Former president and general manager Tex Schramm signed Staubach to a futures contract in a hotel room in 1964, actually scribbling out the details on a legal-sized tablet that would have Staubach paid annually to participate in training camp practices when he had enough leave built up.

The 1963 Heisman Trophy winner showed up in Dallas as a 27-year-old rookie, but in those 11 seasons still managed to carve out the franchise's all-time leading quarterback rating of 83.42 and became a four-time NFL passing champion. But Staubach almost became better known for his scrambling ability, and to this day ranks 14th on the Cowboys all-time rushing list with 2,264 yards.

Staubach owns the fourth-most passing yards in club history, 22,700, and his 3,586 in 1979 still ranks as the 14th most passing yards in a single season for the Cowboys. He also ranks second in club history with a career average of 7.67 yards-per-attempt.

Staubach also became known as "Captain Comeback" for his 23 fourth-quarter come-from-behind victories in regular season and playoff games, including 14 in the final two minutes or overtime. Never was this more apparent than in a 1975 playoff game against the Minnesota Vikings when Staubach connected with wide receiver Drew Pearson on a desperation 50-yard "Hail Mary" touchdown pass that knocked the Vikings out of the playoffs.

"You could never defeat Roger mentally or physically," late Cowboys head coach Tom Landry said in 1983. "He was like that in a game, in practice or in the business world."

Staubach ended his Cowboys career with four Super Bowl appearances, including wins in Super Bowls VI and XII. In Super Bowl VI, Staubach was named the game's Most Valuable Player.

Following the 1979 season, Staubach retired, fearing the after-effects of recurring concussions.

In 1983, Staubach became the sixth member of the Dallas Cowboys Ring of Honor and two years later was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

He was born Feb. 5, 1942, in Cincinnati, Ohio.

94 ★ DEMARCUS WARE ★

Linebacker, 2005-13

INDUCTED – 2023

DeMarcus Ware was drafted by the Dallas Cowboys in the first round (11th overall) of the 2005 NFL Draft and quickly became one of the all-time greats to don the star on his helmet.

Ware spent nine seasons in Dallas (2005-13) and tallied a franchise-record 117.0 sacks. He spent the final three years of his career in Denver, where he helped the Broncos win Super Bowl L. In his 12-year career, Ware finished with 138.5 career sacks, eighth in NFL

history.

He was voted first-team All-Pro four times (2007-09, 2011), selected to nine Pro Bowls (2007-13, 2015-16) and was voted a member of the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 2000s.

Ware, who played collegiately at a small Division I school in Troy University, came into the NFL as an underdog with something to prove. He did just that, starting all 16 games at right outside linebacker as a rookie and amassed 58 tackles and a team-high 8.0 sacks.

Ware's rookie campaign was the first step into what would become a Hall of Fame career, as he led the Cowboys in sacks in each season from 2006-12. Ware was the NFL's sack leader in 2008 (20.0) and 2010 (15.5). Ware's 20.0 sacks in 2008 are a single season franchise-record, and in 2011 Ware barely missed becoming the first ever league defender to reach 20.0-or-more sacks in multiple seasons, finishing second in the league with 19.5. Despite coming up just short of 20.0 sacks, Ware paired up with Mark Gastineau as the only two men in league history with two seasons of 19.0-or-more sacks.

"I couldn't be more proud of - and happy for - DeMarcus Ware for this well-deserved recognition," Jerry Jones said. "His approach to the game, on and off the field, embodied all the traits it takes to be inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. He was a ferocious pass rusher on the field, and a true leader and role model in the locker room and in the community. We knew from the first moment he stepped on the practice field that DeMarcus was destined for greatness. The extra effort and time that he put in at practice to teach and help our offensive line be the best they could be was extraordinary and yet another example of the total team commitment he had and how it consumed him. DeMarcus earned this very rare and special place in NFL history every single day of his career."

In his 12-year career, Ware only had one season with a losing record and advanced to the postseason five times, including starting at linebacker for the Broncos in the Super Bowl L victory, where he recorded 2.0 sacks.

"I always said my pads talk," Ware said. "My pads did the talking. I don't have to be rambunctious and talk. Now putting this yellow jacket on, being part of the Hall of Fame, it talks. I don't have to say anything."


Following the 2016 season, Ware signed a ceremonial one-day contract and retired as a Dallas Cowboy. He was born July 31, 1982, in Auburn, Ala.

54 ★ RANDY WHITE ★

Defensive Tackle, 1975-1988

INDUCTED - 1994

Randy White came to the Cowboys from the University of Maryland as the No. 2 pick in the 1975 NFL Draft. Before his career was over, 14 years later, he would become known as the "Manster" – half man, half defensive monster – setting numerous franchise records as the heart-and-soul of the famed "Doomsday Defense."

White struggled in his first two years with the Cowboys when then head coach Tom Landry moved White from his familiar defensive tackle position to linebacker. But, after Landry moved White back to right tackle in 1977, White became one of the NFL's most dominating defensive linemen and a coveted co-Super Bowl MVP.

"Coming out of college a lot was expected of me," White said. "But I never did feel comfortable playing linebacker. Those first two years I was fighting for my life out there. Then they switched me to defensive tackle, where I was a lot more comfortable and from there my career took off."

White played 14 seasons, tying him for third all-time in franchise history, and he set a franchise record with eight All-Pro selections. White also was selected to nine Pro Bowls, ranking third in franchise history for Pro Bowl appearances. White's 16.0 sacks in 1978 rank third in franchise history for a single season, and he still remains third all-time in career tackles with 1,104, second with 701 career solo tackles and third in team history with 111.0 career sacks.

"His performances range anywhere from spectacular to spectacular," Landry once said. "He could out-match anybody's intensity from game to game."

In his career, White played in six NFC Championship Games and three Super Bowls, claiming victory in Super Bowl XII and co-MVP honors with teammate Harvey Martin. Even more astounding, White only missed one game in his 14-year career.

In 1994, White was inducted into the Ring of Honor with teammate Tony Dorsett, the same year he was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

"Any honor I receive is a reflection on the great teammates and coaches I had in my career," White said. "There's a real special group of guys with the Cowboys, and to be a part of that was a great honor." He was born Jan. 15, 1953, in Pittsburgh, Pa.

70 ★ RAYFIELD WRIGHT ★

Offensive Tackle, 1967-79

INDUCTED – 2006

Only 11 players have played football for the Dallas Cowboys longer than Rayfield Wright's 13 seasons, and only nine players in the history of the Cowboys organization have been to more Pro Bowls than Wright's six.

After playing tight end, tackle and defensive end during his first three NFL seasons, Wright settled in at right tackle in 1970. Before undergoing knee surgery that forced him to miss most of the 1977 season, Wright was acknowledged as the NFL's

premier offensive tackle. Wright was selected to six straight Pro Bowls (1971-76) as a tackle while earning All-Pro honors four times and earning recognition on the NFL's all-decade team for the 1970s.

During each of his 13 seasons, the Cowboys offense ranked in the top six in the NFL for total offense, including leading the league five times. Behind his blocking, Calvin Hill became the first 1,000-yard rusher in team history when he ran for 1,036 yards in 1972. All totaled, Dallas had a running back clear the 1,000-yard barrier five times during his tenure. Also behind his blocking, Roger Staubach became the first quarterback in franchise history to throw for more than 3,000 yards in a season when he totaled 3,190 passing yards in 1978, the year Wright returned from his knee surgery.

In his 13-year NFL career with the Dallas Cowboys, Wright was a key contributor to teams that had 13 straight winning seasons, made 12 playoff trips and won 10 division titles. He also played in eight conference championship games and won five NFC Championships (1970, 1971, 1975, 1977, 1978) and two Super Bowls (VI and XII). He was part of a team that had a 74.1% winning percentage in the regular season (137-48-1) and a 60.0% winning percentage in the post season (15-10).

During his 13 seasons, Wright was a participant in five Super Bowls, claiming the ultimate prize twice. Only three players in NFL history has appeared in more Super Bowls than Wright and he is one of only 22 players in NFL history, one-of-two offensive tackles, to have played in five Super Bowls.

During Wright's career, the Cowboys were the only team to play in five Super Bowls in one calendar decade – or in any 10-year period of time – advancing to the Super Bowl following the 1970, 1971 1975, 1977 and 1978 seasons.

Rayfield Wright was inducted into the Dallas Cowboys Ring of Honor on October 10, 2004, and the Pro Football Hall of Fam in 2006.

He was born August 23, 1945, in Griffin, Ga., and died April 7, 2022.

Ring of Honor

The Cowboys honor those who made outstanding contributions to the club by inducting them into the Ring of Honor at AT&T Stadium. Their names and the years of service are prominently displayed in silver on the wall above the seats at AT&T Stadium. The 24 members of the Cowboys Ring of Honor:



★ TROY AIKMAN ★ Quarterback, 1989-2000

Troy Aikman joined the Cowboys as the first overall pick in the 1989 NFL Draft out of UCLA. After guiding the franchise to three Super Bowl titles, Aikman retired holding or tied for 47 club passing records, including career attempts (4,715), completions (2,898), passing yards (32,942), touchdowns (165) and completion percentage (61.5%). At the time, he was the winningest quarterback of any decade, having finished his career with 94 regular season wins in the 90s. Aikman was a six-time Pro Bowler and the MVP of Super Bowl XXVII. He was inducted into the Ring of Honor with Emmitt Smith and Michael Irvin on Monday Sept. 19, 2005 at halftime of the Cowboys-Redskins game. Aikman was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2006.



★ LARRY ALLEN ★ Offensive Line, 1994-2005



Larry Allen finished his Dallas Cowboys career as one of the most decorated offensive players in Dallas Cowboys and NFL history. He was named to more Pro Bowls (10) than any other offensive lineman in Cowboys history. He earned his 11th trip in 2006 while finishing his career with the San Francisco 49ers. He was named All-Pro seven times, six times at guard and once at tackle. With his selection to the Pro Bowl at tackle in 1998, he became just the third player in league history to be selected to the all-star game at more than one offensive line position. In 12 seasons in Dallas, he played all but one offensive line position (center). Was a key part of the 1995 Super Bowl champion team. Inducted during halftime of the Cowboys-Seahawks game on Nov. 6, 2011. Elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2013.

★ GIL BRANDT ★ Vice President of Player Personnel, 1960-88

As the Dallas Cowboys original vice president of player personnel for the first 29 years of the franchise's existence, Gil Brandt oversaw the acquisition of 15 of the 20 players who are currently in the Ring of Honor. That included two undrafted free agents - Cliff Harris and Drew Pearson - a pair of seventh round picks - Rayfield Wright and Bob Hayes - and a 10th round choice - Roger Staubach. From that group, nine are also in the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Brandt was responsible for signing 53 players who earned a combined total of 178 Pro Bowl appearances. Brandt was also an innovator, introducing computers and technology into the player evaluation process, as well as such standard testing as the 40-yard dash. He was inducted into the Ring of Honor during halftime of the Cowboys-Saints game on Nov. 29, 2018. Elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2019.





★ TONY DORSETT ★

Running Back, 1977-1987

Tony Dorsett finished his career as the second leading rusher in NFL history and played in five NFC Championship Games, two Super Bowls and four Pro Bowls. After guiding the University of Pittsburgh to the 1976 national title and claiming the Heisman Trophy, Dorsett captured rookie of the year honors in 1977. He also holds the NFL record with a 99-yard touchdown run. Inducted into the Ring of Honor in 1994, Dorsett was also elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1994. Dorsett was inducted into the Ring of Honor at halftime of the Cowboys-Arizona game on Oct. 9, 1994.

★ CHARLES HALEY ★

Defensive End, 1992-1996

Charles Haley was the first player in NFL history to win five Super Bowls - Tom Brady, five - (two with San Francisco and three with Dallas). He arrived in Dallas after six seasons as a pass rushing threat for the 49ers. Upon his arrival, he was moved to defensive end and had back-to-back double-digit sack seasons (1994-95). He was a member of 10 division championship teams in his 12 NFL seasons and played for a team with a winning record through each of his first 11 years. In 63 games played for Dallas, Haley racked up 34.0 sacks and through his 169-game career, he amassed 100.5 sacks. Inducted during halftime of the Cowboys-Seahawks game on Nov. 6, 2011. Haley was elected into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2013.



★ CLIFF HARRIS ★


Safety, 1970-79

Nicknamed "Captain Crash," Cliff Harris went undrafted in 1970 out of tiny Ouachita Baptist in Arkansas, but he eventually found the starting lineup as a rookie and went on to start nine consecutive years. He was named to six Pro Bowls and four All-NFL teams, and he was a member of two Super Bowl winning teams. Harris was at his best in the postseason, finishing his career with six interceptions in 21 playoff games. Harris was a member of the 1970s NFL all-decade team. Harris was inducted into the Ring of Honor at halftime of the Cowboys-N.Y. Giants game on Oct. 10, 2004 and the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2020.

★ BOB HAYES ★

Wide Receiver, 1965-1974

Bob Hayes led the Cowboys in receptions three times and accumulated 365 receptions for 7,295 receiving yards during his 10-year career. His 71 career touchdown receptions rank second in Cowboys history (Dez Bryant, 73). Hayes also registered remarkable career numbers for average yards-per-catch (20.0) and average yards-per-punt return (11.1). He was a three-time Pro Bowl selection and four-time All-Pro. One of the greatest sprinters in the history of track and field, Hayes joined the Cowboys with the title of "World's Fastest Human" after winning the Olympic gold medal in the 100 meters in Tokyo in 1964. Hayes was inducted into the Ring of Honor at halftime of the Cowboys against San Diego on Sept 23, 2001. Hayes was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2009.






★ **CHUCK HOWLEY** ★
Linebacker, 1961-1973

When Chuck Howley retired in 1973, Tom Landry said “I don’t know that I’ve seen anybody better at linebacker than Howley.” A six-time All-Pro, Howley was the most valuable player in Super Bowl V. The Cowboys traded for Howley, who was drafted by Chicago in 1958. He was an All-America center at West Virginia. A six-time Pro Bowl selection, Howley was inducted into the Ring of Honor at halftime of the Cowboys against Detroit, Oct. 30, 1977. Howley was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2023.

★ **MICHAEL IRVIN** ★
Wide Receiver, 1988-1999

Michael “The Playmaker” Irvin helped lead the Dallas Cowboys to six division titles and three Super Bowl rings before a spinal injury cut his playing career short. Irvin was the team’s top receiver for eight consecutive seasons and retired as the Cowboys all-time leader in receptions (750), receiving yards (11,904), playoff receptions (87) and playoff receiving yards (1,315). As a five-time Pro Bowl selection, between 1991-98, Irvin has two more appearances than any other receiver in club history. Irvin was inducted into the Ring of Honor with Emmitt Smith and Troy Aikman on Monday Sept. 19, 2005 at halftime of the Cowboys-Redskins game. Irvin was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2007.



★ **LEE ROY JORDAN** ★
Linebacker, 1963-1976

The inspirational leader of the Cowboys first championship teams was Lee Roy Jordan. The Cowboys first-round draft choice in 1963 following an All-America career at Alabama, Jordan anchored the “Doomsday Defense” from his middle linebacker position for 14 years. He was named to the Pro Bowl five times and All-Pro twice. Jordan was inducted into the Ring of Honor at halftime of the Cowboys against Arizona on Oct. 29, 1989.



★ **JIMMY JOHNSON** ★
Head Coach, 1989-1993

The first head coach of the Cowboys in the Jerry Jones era (1989-present), Jimmy Johnson guided the club to two Super Bowl championships in five seasons as Dallas’ head coach. Johnson, who was college teammates with Jones at Arkansas, arrived in Dallas after a successful coaching career in the college ranks that included a national championship with the University of Miami. Johnson departed the Cowboys with a 51-37 overall record that included a 7-1 mark in the postseason. Johnson was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2020 and was inducted into the Ring of Honor at halftime of the Cowboys vs. Lions game on Dec. 30, 2023.



★ **TOM LANDRY** ★
Head Coach, 1960-1988

The first head coach of the Cowboys, Tom Landry led Dallas to two Super Bowl wins and five NFC titles in his 29 years at the Cowboys helm. He compiled a career record of 270-178-6, the third most wins in NFL history, and was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1990. Landry was inducted into the Ring of Honor at halftime of the Cowboys against N.Y. Giants on Nov. 7, 1993.






★ **BOB LILLY** ★
Defensive Tackle, 1961-1974

Nicknamed "Mr. Cowboy," Bob Lilly was the franchise's first draft choice in 1961, the first name in the Ring of Honor in 1975 and its first inductee into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1980. A seven-time All-Pro, Lilly was named to a club-record tying 11 Pro Bowls. He was a two-time All-SWC pick and an All-America at Texas Christian University before being drafted by Dallas. Lilly was inducted into the Ring of Honor at halftime of the Cowboys against Philadelphia on Nov. 23, 1975.

★ **DON MEREDITH** ★
Quarterback, 1960-1968

Don Meredith led the Cowboys to their first winning season and their first NFL Championship Game in 1966. Signed by Clint Murchison, Jr. before Dallas was granted its NFL franchise, "Dandy Don" played in two Pro Bowls and was named NFL Player of the Year in 1966. A two-time All-American at SMU, Meredith was inducted into the Ring of Honor at halftime of the Cowboys against N.Y. Giants on Nov. 7, 1976.



★ **DREW PEARSON** ★
Wide Receiver, 1973-1983

In 11 seasons with the Dallas Cowboys, Drew Pearson rose from unknown to legend. A former undrafted free agent, Pearson was named to the All-Decade Team of the 1970s as he earned a niche as one of the top clutch receivers in football history. He led the team in receptions and receiving yards four consecutive seasons (1974-77) and recorded two 1,000-yard campaigns. He has a resume filled with memorable game-winning catches. In 1980 he became the all-time leading receiver in receptions, and in 1983, he took the top spot for receiving yards. He is littered through team and league postseason record books, including a catch in a club-record 22 consecutive playoff games. He was a key member of the 1977 Super Bowl XII Championship squad. Inducted during halftime of the Cowboys-Seahawks game on Nov. 6, 2011. Pearson was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2021.



★ **DON PERKINS** ★
Running Back, 1961-1968

Don Perkins was the first Cowboys player to rush for more than 6,000 yards. A six-time Pro Bowl selection, Perkins finished among the top 10 NFL rushers in each of his eight seasons. He was named NFL Rookie of the Year in 1961 and All-NFL in 1962. Perkins was signed before Dallas was granted its NFL franchise. A three-time All-Skyline pick at New Mexico, Perkins was inducted into the Ring of Honor at halftime of the Cowboys against N.Y. Giants on Nov. 7, 1976.






★ **MEL RENFRO** ★
Defensive Back, 1964-1977

Mel Renfro was named to the Pro Bowl his first 10 seasons in the NFL. He is the club's all-time leading interceptor with 52 and kickoff returner with a 26.4-yard career average. Renfro was drafted in the second round in 1964 after a career as an All-America halfback and world class sprinter at Oregon. A five-time All-Pro, Renfro was inducted into the Ring of Honor at halftime of the Cowboys against Miami, Oct. 25, 1981. In 1996 Renfro was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

★ **TEX SCHRAMM** ★
President and General Manager, 1959-1989

Texas Earnest Schramm Jr., served 29 seasons as president and general manager of the Cowboys, turning a 1960 expansion team into one of the most successful franchises in NFL history. Under Schramm, the team reached five Super Bowls, winning two, made 18 playoff appearances and compiled an NFL-record 20 consecutive winning seasons. Schramm was instrumental in creating the Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders, developing the Cowboys Ring of Honor and bringing an annual Cowboys Thanksgiving Day game to the nation. Schramm, as chairman of the NFL Competition Committee from 1966 to 1988, was a driving force behind the development of instant replay, giving the head referee a microphone for penalty announcements and developing the wild-card playoff system. One of Schramm's most significant accomplishments was coordinating the merger of the NFL and the American Football League in 1966. He was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1991. Schramm was inducted into the Ring of Honor at halftime of the Cowboys game against Philadelphia on Oct. 12, 2003.



★ **EMMITT SMITH** ★
Running Back, 1990-2002

Emmitt Smith retired as the NFL's all-time rushing leader with 18,355 yards and scored more rushing touchdowns (164) than any other player in NFL history. Smith was selected to the Pro Bowl eight times, won four NFL rushing titles ('91, '92, '93 and '95), three Super Bowl titles, and a league (1993) and Super Bowl (XXVIII) MVP award. Smith broke Walter Payton's NFL rushing record at Texas Stadium on Oct. 27, 2002 on an 11-yard run in the fourth quarter against the Seattle Seahawks. Smith was inducted into the Ring of Honor with Troy Aikman and Michael Irvin on Monday Sept. 19, 2005 at halftime of the Cowboys-Redskins game. Smith was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2010.



★ **ROGER STAUBACH** ★
Quarterback, 1969-1979

Roger Staubach led the Cowboys to six NFC Championship Games, four Super Bowls and two Super Bowl titles. A great clutch performer, Staubach led Dallas to comeback victories 23 times, 14 in the last two minutes or overtime. A five-time Pro Bowler, he was drafted by Dallas in 1964 after winning the Heisman Trophy and Maxwell Award at the Naval Academy. Staubach was inducted into the Ring of Honor at halftime of the Cowboys against Tampa Bay, Oct. 9, 1983. Staubach was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1985.







★ **DeMARCUS WARE** ★
Linebacker, 2005-13

Ware spent nine seasons in Dallas (2005-13) and tallied a franchise-record 117.0 sacks while earning first-team All-Pro four times (2007-09, 2011), was named to nine Pro Bowls (2007-13, 2015-16) and was voted a member of the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 2000s. He led the Cowboys in sacks in each season from 2006-12, the most seasons atop the sack chart and the longest streak in team history. Ware was the NFL's sack leader in 2008 (20.0) - establishing a single-season franchise record - and 2010 (15.5). He was inducted into the Ring of Honor at halftime of the Cowboys game against the LA Rams on Oct. 29, 2023. Ware was also elected into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2023, where Cowboys Owner/President/General Manager Jerry Jones presented him for induction.

★ **RANDY WHITE** ★
Defensive Tackle, 1975-1988

A nine-time Pro Bowler during his 14 years with Dallas, Randy White established a club-record with eight straight All-Pro selections. White was co-MVP (with teammate Harvey Martin) in the Cowboys Super Bowl XII victory over Denver. A consensus All-America defensive end for Maryland in 1974, White won both the Outland Trophy and the Vince Lombardi Awards. White was inducted into the Ring of Honor at halftime of the Cowboys game against Arizona on Oct. 9, 1994. White was also elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1994.




★ **DARREN WOODSON** ★
Safety, 1992-2003

Darren Woodson retired as the Dallas Cowboys all-time tackle leader, posting 1,350 through his 12-year playing career. Originally drafted in the second round of the 1992 draft, coming out of school as a linebacker, Woodson made the switch to safety and flourished in all phases of his career. He was a key part of a defense that won three Super Bowl Championships. A five-time Pro Bowler, Woodson is the only player in Cowboys history to play under five head coaches - Jimmy Johnson, Barry Switzer, Chan Gailey, Dave Campo and Bill Parcells. Until the year he finished playing, Woodson was a regular on special teams units, ranking second in club history with 134 career special teams tackles. Woodson was inducted into the Ring of Honor at halftime of the Cowboys-Seahawks game on Nov. 1, 2015.

★ **RAYFIELD WRIGHT** ★
Tackle, 1967-1979

Rayfield Wright is the only offensive lineman in the Ring of Honor. A seventh-round draft choice, Wright made the conversion from tight end to tackle and became the Cowboys most decorated offensive lineman of the 1970s. During his 13-year career, the "Big Cat" was selected to the Pro Bowl six times, named All-Pro on four occasions and was on two Super Bowl-winning teams in the 1970s. He was the leader of Dallas offensive line units that produced the club's first five 1,000-yard individual rushing seasons. Wright was inducted into the Ring of Honor at halftime of the Cowboys-N.Y. Giants game on Oct. 10, 2004. Wright was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2006.

Historical Highlights

1960

LANDRY HIRED – Clint Murchison, Jr., and Bedford Wynne sign N.Y. Giants defensive assistant Tom Landry to a personal services contract on Dec. 27, 1959, with the intention of naming him head coach once they are awarded an expansion franchise by the NFL.

NFL FRANCHISE – Clint Murchison, Jr., and Bedford Wynne were awarded an expansion franchise in the NFL at the annual league meeting in Miami Beach, Fla. The Cowboys were to play as a "swing" team, playing every other team one time during the first season, although listed in the Western Conference standings (January 28).

COWBOYS STOCKED – A player pool was set up in the league meeting in Los Angeles, with each of 12 NFL teams freezing 25 names on its roster and the Cowboys allowed to pick three from each team for a total of 36 veterans. Dallas, once given the list, had to select its 36 players within 24 hours (March 13).

TRAINING STARTS – Rookies report to first Cowboys camp at Pacific University in Forest Grove, Oregon (July 9).

FIRST PRE-SEASON GAME – The Cowboys, less than six months in existence, get their first test and drop a 16-10 preseason game to San Francisco in Seattle (August 6).

FIRST HOME GAME – In their Dallas debut, in the Salesmanship Club preseason game, the Cowboys led the world champion Baltimore Colts into the final minute before a 62-yard pass from Johnny Unitas to Lenny Moore gave the Colts a 14-10 victory (August 19).

FIRST VICTORY – In a preseason game at Louisville, KY, the Cowboys beat the New York's Giants, 14-3, with Frank Clarke catching touchdown passes for 73 yards (Eddie LeBaron) and 74 yards (Don Meredith) (August 27).

FIRST LEAGUE GAME – In their first league game, Dallas fell to Pittsburgh, 35-28, with Bobby Layne leading a fourth-period Steelers rally (Sept. 24, Saturday night).

STREAK SNAPPED – Dallas snaps a 10-game loss streak by tying the N.Y. Giants, 31-31, at Yankee Stadium (Dec. 4).

1961

TRAINING STARTS – Rookies launch training at new campsite – St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minn. (July 9).

FIRST LEAGUE WIN – Scoring 10 points in the final 56 seconds, the Cowboys score their first NFL victory, 27-24, over Pittsburgh in the '61 league opener in the Cotton Bowl. Allen Green's 27-yard field goal on the game's final play won it before 23,500 spectators (Sept. 17).

1962

TRAINING STARTS – Team begins training at new campsite – Northern Michigan College in Marquette, Mich. (July 13).

PENALTY HISTORY – For the first time in anyone's memory in an NFL game, points were awarded for a penalty. The Cowboys were holding in the end zone on a 99-yard touchdown pass from LeBaron to Clarke, and Pittsburgh was awarded a safety. The Steelers eventually won, 30-28 (Sept. 23).

100-YARD FIRSTS – Amos Marsh returned a kickoff 101 yards and Mike Gaechter returned a pass interception 100 yards, both plays for fourth quarter touchdowns in a 41-19 win over Philadelphia in Dallas. It was the first time in NFL history that two 100-yard runs had been made in the same game, much less by the same team in the same quarter (Oct. 14).

1963

SHIFT TO KANSAS CITY – The rival Dallas Texans of the AFL announce they are moving the franchise to Kansas City (Feb. 8).

CALIFORNIA TRAINING SITE – The Cowboys open training at California Lutheran College in Thousand Oaks, Calif. (July 12).

HOWTON SETS RECORD – Bill Howton broke Don Hutson's all-time receiving mark with a 14-yard catch at Washington. Hutson's record was 7,991 yards and the catch gave Howton an even 8,000 yards (Sept. 29).

1964

LANDRY CONTRACT – With one year to go on his original contract, Tom Landry is signed to a 10-year extension, in effect giving him an 11-year pact, possibly the longest in major pro sports history (Feb. 5).

1965

FIRST SELLOUT – An overflow crowd of 76,251 jams the Cotton Bowl for the Cleveland game, notching the team's first home sellout. Cleveland won, 24-17 (Nov. 21).

1966

PLAYOFF BOWL – After defeating New York, 38-20, in the season finale (and winning five of their last seven games) to get into the Playoff Bowl at Miami, the Cowboys fall to Baltimore, 35-3 (Jan. 15).

MERGER – Peace comes to pro football with Cowboys General Manager Tex Schramm completing two months of negotiations with AFL's Lamar Hunt, merging the two leagues under the NFL banner (June 8).

SCHRAMM ELEVATED – Texas E. Schramm, Vice President and General Manager of the Cowboys from the beginning, was named President of the club by Owner Clint Murchison, Jr., who retained the title of Chairman of the Board.

NEELY CASE SOLVED – Dallas and Houston reached agreement in the Ralph Neely case. Neely remained with Dallas with Houston receiving the Cowboys Nos. 1, 2 and two fifth round picks in the 1967 draft (Nov. 17).

THE CHAMPIONSHIP – The Cowboys won their first championship, capturing the Eastern Conference title with a 10-3-1 record, but lost the NFL Championship Game to Green Bay, 34-27.

1967

TEXAS STADIUM – On Dec. 23, Owner Clint Murchison, Jr. formally announced plans to build Texas Stadium in suburban Irving. The stadium, to be financed through a bond-option plan, would be ready for the 1970 season. The stadium would seat a minimum of 58,000.

SECOND CHAMPIONSHIP – Under the NFL's new format, the Cowboys easily won the Capitol Division and defeated Cleveland, Century Division winner, 52-14, in the Cotton Bowl for the Eastern conference championship. However, on Dec. 31 in Green Bay, the Cowboys lost their second bid for an NFL title, falling to the Packers, 21-17, in the 13 degree below weather.

1968

WIN CAPITOL – For the second straight year the Cowboys won the Capitol Division, but for the first time in three years the Cowboys did not win the Eastern Championship, being upset at Cleveland, 31-20, on Dec. 21. Dallas won the Runner-Up Bowl over Minnesota, 17-13.

1969

TEXAS STADIUM – Ground was broken for Texas Stadium in suburban Irving on January 25, and on June 29 Bert Rose was named general manager of the stadium.

ORIGINALS RETIRE – An era ended for the Cowboys in July. On July 5th at a press conference in Dallas, quarterback Don Meredith, the last of the original Cowboys, announced his retirement. Then, on July 18th, the day the veterans were to report to training camp, all-time rushing great Don Perkins officially retired.

REPEAT CAPITOL WINS – Once again the Cowboys rolled to the Capitol Division Championship with an 11-2-1 season. However, the Cowboys failed to win the Eastern Championship when on Dec. 28, the Cowboys lost to Cleveland, 38-14, in the Cotton Bowl.

1970

FIVE STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS – The Cowboys won their last five games to finish 10-4, claim the Eastern Division championship and make the playoffs for the fifth year in a row. They defeated Detroit, 5-0, in the opening round to get a shot at the National Conference championship.

FIRST NFC TITLE – The Cowboys captured the biggest prize of their 11-year history on Jan. 3, 1971 when they downed San Francisco, 17-10, for the NFC crown. A 16-13 loss to Baltimore in the Super Bowl Jan. 17 left Dallas with one major goal still unrealized.

1971

TEXAS STADIUM – The Cowboys opened a new era in their sparkling Irving, Texas, home with a 44-21 victory over the New England Patriots on Oct. 24. Duane Thomas scored the first touchdown in the new stadium, a 56-yard run just two minutes and 16 seconds after the opening kickoff. Attendance was 65,708.

SIX STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS – The Cowboys won their last seven games to finish 11-3, claim the Eastern Division championship and make the playoffs for the sixth year in a row. They defeated Minnesota, 20-12, in the opening round.

SECOND NFC TITLE – For the second consecutive year, the Cowboys met the San Francisco 49ers in the National Conference showdown. This time Dallas won 14-3, to qualify for its second straight Super Bowl.

FIRST WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP – The Cowboys downed the Miami Dolphins, 24-3, to win Super Bowl VI in New Orleans on Jan. 16. It was the 10th victory in a row for Dallas as Roger Staubach passed for two touchdowns and was named the game's Most Valuable Player.

1972

FIRST 1,000-YARD BACK – Calvin Hill became the first Dallas player to rush for 1,000 yards when he gained 111 on Dec. 9 against the Washington Redskins in Texas Stadium. Hill wound up with 1,036 yards for the season on a then record 245 carries.

SEVEN STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS – The Cowboys qualified for the NFL playoffs a record seventh consecutive year, their 10-4 record earning them the National Conference Wild Card berth. Roger Staubach passed for two touchdowns in the last 1:30 to give the Cowboys a 30-28 victory at San Francisco in the first round. Then, at Washington on New Year's Eve, Dallas was foiled in its bid for a third straight NFL title with the Redskins win, 16-3.

1973

100 VICTORIES – The Cowboys and Coach Tom Landry recorded their 100th victory with a 40-3 Texas Stadium win over the New Orleans Saints on Sept. 24. Landry ended the season with a career mark of 108-80-6 to rank ninth on the list of the NFL's all-time winningest coaches.

EIGHT STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS – The Cowboys regained the NFC Eastern Division title with a 10-4 record and broke their own NFL record by reaching the playoffs for the eighth year in a row. Dallas defeated the Western Division champion Los Angeles Rams in the first round, 27-16, but fell to Central Division winner Minnesota in the NFC Championship Game, 27-10.

1974

FIRST TOP DRAFT CHOICE – For the first time in their history, the Cowboys had the very first choice in the NFL Draft. The No. 1 pick came to Dallas from Houston in exchange for Tody Smith and Billy Parks. The Cowboys selected Ed "Too Tall" Jones, a 6-9, 260-pound defensive end from Tennessee State.

PLAYOFFS MISSED – The record breaking string of eight straight years in the NFL playoffs was broken when the club's 8-6 record failed to qualify.

1975

LILLY HONORED – "Mr. Cowboy" was honored on Bob Lilly Day at Texas Stadium at halftime of the Philadelphia game on Nov. 23. It was first such recognition ever given to a Dallas player. Lilly never missed a game in 14 years with the Cowboys, earning All-Pro honors seven times at defensive tackle before retiring prior to the '75 season.

TEN STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS – The Cowboys 10-4 record earned them the NFC Wild Card berth in the playoffs. The composite record over 10 straight winning seasons was 101-37-2.

THIRD NFC TITLE – After shocking Minnesota in the first round, 17-14, on Roger Staubach's 50-yard "Hail Mary" pass to Drew Pearson, the Cowboys traveled to Los Angeles for the NFC showdown. Staubach threw four touchdown passes, three to Preston Pearson, and Dallas won, 37-7. Pittsburgh won Super Bowl X on Jan. 18 in Miami, 21-17.

1976

MEREDITH, PERKINS HONORED – Former Cowboys greats Don Meredith and Don Perkins joined Bob Lilly in the Ring of Honor at Texas Stadium during halftime ceremonies at the New York Giants game on Nov. 7.

ELEVEN STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS – The Cowboys won the NFC Eastern Division title with their 11-3 record, giving them their 11th straight winning season and 10th playoff berth in that period. A 14-12 first round loss to Los Angeles – the first time Dallas had lost in the first round under the current playoff setup – ended the season.

1977

HOWLEY HONORED – Former All-Pro linebacker Chuck Howley, a Cowboy from 1961 through 1973, became the fourth member of the Ring of Honor. Howley was honored during ceremonies at halftime of the Detroit Lions game on Oct. 30.

TWELVE STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS – Getting off to an 8-0 start, their best ever, the Cowboys rolled to a 12-2 record, the championship of the NFC East, and their 12th consecutive winning season. They opened their 11th visit to the playoffs in those 12 years with a 37-7 first-round victory over the Chicago Bears at Texas Stadium.

FOURTH NFC TITLE – Dallas crushed the Minnesota Vikings at Texas Stadium, 23-6, for National Conference crown No. 4 and the right to meet the Denver Broncos in Super Bowl XII.

SECOND WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP – The Cowboys stopped the Denver Broncos, 27-10, to win Super Bowl XII in New Orleans on Jan. 15, 1978. In the process, Dallas tied Minnesota for most Super Bowl appearances (four) and Green Bay, Miami and Pittsburgh for most Super Bowl victories (two). Defensive linemen Harvey Martin and Randy White were named co-MVPs in the game.

1978

THIRTEEN STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS – After a mediocre 6-4 start, the Cowboys won six straight games to finish the expanded regular season with a 12-4 record and their 10th division crown. It marked the Cowboys 13th consecutive winning season and 12th trip to the playoffs in that span. Dallas rallied to beat Atlanta 27-20 in a divisional playoff at Texas Stadium, sending the Cowboys to their seventh NFC championship game in the past nine years.

FIFTH NFC TITLE – Dallas shut out the Rams in Los Angeles 28-0 in the National Conference title game to advance to the Super Bowl a record fifth time, including three of the last four. In the first Super Bowl rematch, Pittsburgh edged the Cowboys 35-31 for the NFL championship on Jan. 21 in Miami's Orange Bowl.

1979

TWENTIETH ANNIVERSARY – The Cowboys celebrated their 20th anniversary season at halftime of the St. Louis Cardinals game at Texas Stadium on Oct. 21. Star players from each of those 20 seasons plus Coach Tom Landry were introduced during the halftime ceremonies.

FOURTH STRAIGHT NFC EAST TITLE – The Cowboys won their final three regular season games to finish with an 11-5 record, their 11th division championship, including the past four NFC East titles, and 14th consecutive winning season. The Cowboys made their 13th trip to the playoffs in those 14 years, but were eliminated by Los Angeles 21-19 in a divisional playoff at Texas Stadium.

1980

STAUBACH RETIRES – At a press conference at Texas Stadium on March 31, quarterback Roger Staubach announced his retirement after 11 record-breaking years with the Cowboys. Staubach held all major Cowboys passing records and was the all-time leading NFL passer.

LILLY ENTERS HALL OF FAME – Bob Lilly, a seven-time All-Pro defensive tackle in his 14-year career with the Cowboys from 1961-74, became the first Cowboys player to be inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Enshrined along with Lilly on Aug. 2 at Canton, Ohio, were Herb Adderley, who played for the Cowboys from 1970-71, Jim Otto and Deacon Jones.

FIFTEEN STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS – Behind new starting quarterback Danny White, the Cowboys rolled to their 15th consecutive winning season with a surprising 12-4 record, tied for best in the league with Philadelphia and Atlanta. The Cowboys lost the NFC East title to Philadelphia on a tie-breaker, but entered the playoffs for the 14th time in 15 years, this time as a wild card team. The Cowboys beat Los Angeles 34-13 at Texas Stadium in the NFC Wild Card Game and rallied past the Falcons at Atlanta 30-27 to advance to the NFC Championship Game at Philadelphia. But the Cowboys lost 20-7 in their bid for a sixth Super Bowl appearance.

LANDRY'S 200TH VICTORY – Tom Landry joined George Halas and Curly Lambeau as the only coaches with 200 NFL victories when the Cowboys beat Los Angeles 34-13 on Dec. 28 at Texas Stadium in the NFC Wild Card Game, raising Landry's record to 200-119-6, counting regular season and playoff games.

1981

RENFRO HONORED – Former All-Pro defensive back Mel Renfro, the Cowboys all-time leading pass interceptor, became the fifth member of the Cowboys Ring of Honor. Renfro, who played for Dallas from 1964 through 1977, was honored during halftime ceremonies of the Cowboys-Miami Dolphins game at Texas Stadium on Oct. 25.

TWELFTH DIVISION CHAMPIONSHIP – The Cowboys regained the NFC Eastern Division Championship, their 12th division title since 1966, with a 12-4 record and tied Oakland's NFL mark of 16 consecutive winning seasons. Entering the playoffs for the 15th time in that span, the Cowboys advanced to the NFC Championship Game for the ninth time in 12 years by routing Tampa Bay 38-0 at Texas Stadium. But for the second year in a row Dallas lost the conference title game. San Francisco scored a last-minute touchdown at Candlestick Park to edge the Cowboys 28-27 for a berth in Super Bowl XVI.

1982

200TH REGULAR-SEASON VICTORY – The Cowboys beat Washington 24-10 at RFK Stadium on Dec. 5 for the club's and Coach Tom Landry's 200th regular season victory.

SEVENTEEN STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS – The Cowboys finished the strike-shortened regular season 6-3 to establish an NFL record of 17 consecutive winning seasons. Entering the playoffs for a record-tying eighth straight year and for the 16th time in 17 years, the Cowboys beat Tampa Bay 30-17 and Green Bay 37-26, both at Texas Stadium, to advance to the NFC Championship Game for the third year in a row. But again the Cowboys come up short, losing 31-17 at Washington.

1983

STAUBACH HONORED – Former quarterback Roger Staubach, who led the Cowboys to four Super Bowls, became the sixth member of the Ring of Honor during halftime ceremonies of the Cowboys-Tampa Bay game on Oct. 9.

NEW HEADQUARTERS – Ground was broken on Nov. 29 for the Cowboys new headquarters and training facility at Valley Ranch in northwest Dallas County.

EIGHTEEN STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS – The Cowboys extended their NFL record to 18 consecutive winning seasons with a 12-4 finish. The club also set a league record with its ninth straight playoff appearance, qualifying as a wild card entry. The LA Rams eliminated Dallas from the playoffs, however, with a 24-17 upset victory at Texas Stadium in the NFC Wild Card Game on Dec. 26.

1984

SILVER SEASON – The Cowboys kicked off their 25th anniversary with a news conference at Texas Stadium on Jan. 27. President Tex Schramm announced the Cowboys would celebrate their 25th anniversary during 1984 under the theme “Silver Season.”

OWNERSHIP CHANGES HANDS – The sale of the Cowboys from the Murchison family to an 11-member limited partnership headed by Dallas businessman H.R. “Bum” Bright was approved by NFL owners on March 19 at the league’s annual meeting in Honolulu. The sale was completed on May 18.

NINETEEN STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS – The Cowboys defeated the Eagles 26-10 in Philadelphia to extend their NFL record to 19 consecutive winning seasons. The Cowboys finished 9-7 and missed the playoffs for the first time in 10 years and only the second time in 19 years.

1985

STAUBACH ENTERS HALL OF FAME – Roger Staubach, the master of the comeback victory during his 11-year career as a Cowboys quarterback, was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in his first year of eligibility. Enshrined with Staubach on Aug. 3 at Canton, Ohio, were Pete Rozelle, Joe Namath, O.J. Simpson and Frank Gatski. Staubach joined Bob Lilly as the only players who spent their entire career with the Cowboys to be elected to the Hall of Fame.

TEXAS STADIUM IMPROVEMENTS – Texas Stadium unveiled a new look when the Cowboys opened their preseason schedule against Green Bay on Aug. 10. The stadium became the first to have two DiamondVision color scoreboards, and the addition of 118 Crown Suites gave Texas Stadium more private suites, 296, than any stadium in the nation.

COWBOYS RANCH OPENS – Cowboys players and coaches reported on Aug. 27 to the team’s new headquarters and training facility at Cowboys Center in Valley Ranch.

DORSETT PASSES 10,000 YARDS – On a 19-yard sweep around left end, Tony Dorsett, became the sixth player in NFL history to rush for 10,000 yards. Dorsett’s feat highlighted a 27-13 victory over Pittsburgh at Texas Stadium on Oct. 13.

THIRTEENTH DIVISION CHAMPIONSHIP – The Cowboys edged the New York Giants 28-21 on Dec. 15 at Texas Stadium to capture the NFC Eastern Division championship for the first time since 1981. Picked in most season previews to finish third or fourth in the division, the Cowboys rallied for their NFL record 20th consecutive winning season, a 13th division title in 20 years and a playoff berth for the 18th time in that span. But in their NFL record 36th playoff game appearance, the Cowboys fell 20-0 to the Los Angeles Rams in Anaheim Stadium on Jan. 4.

1986

COWBOYS GO TO LONDON – The Cowboys began preparations for their first trip to a foreign country when the NFL announced on March 12 that the Cowboys would play the Super Bowl champion Chicago Bears in a preseason game at London’s Wembley Stadium on Aug. 3.

100TH WIN AT TEXAS STADIUM – Dallas defeated St. Louis 37-6 for the club’s 100th victory at Texas Stadium. Since the facility opened in 1971 the Cowboys compiled a 100-25 (.800) record.

STREAK BROKEN – The Cowboys streak of 20 consecutive winning seasons from 1966 through 1985, third longest in professional sports history, came to an end when the club finished with a 7-9 record after losing seven of its last eight games. Only baseball’s New York Yankees (39 straight winning seasons, 1926-64) and hockey’s Montreal Canadiens (32 from 1951-52 through 1982-83) surpassed the Cowboys accomplishments.

1987

FOUNDER DIES – Cowboys founder Clint Murchison, Jr., died March 30 after a long illness. Murchison, 63, who owned the club until 1984, acquired the expansion Dallas franchise in the NFL in 1960. He hired Tex Schramm as general manager, gave Tom Landry a 10-year contract when his coaching career was in doubt in 1964 and was instrumental in the building of Texas Stadium.

DORSETT GETS 12,000 YARDS – Tony Dorsett became the fourth rusher in NFL history to gain more than 12,000 yards when he registered 52 yards against the Rams on Dec. 21 for a career total of 12,036. The only runners ahead of Dorsett were Walter Payton, Jim Brown and Franco Harris.

1988

LANDRY TIES LAMBEAU – Dallas opened the 1988 season against Pittsburgh on Sept. 12 and Tom Landry tied an NFL record held by Curly Lambeau by coaching in his 29th consecutive season with the same team. Lambeau led the Green Bay Packers from 1921-49.

1989

JONES ACQUIRES COWBOYS, NAMES JOHNSON COACH – Jerry Jones reached an agreement to purchase the Cowboys from Bum Bright on Feb. 25 and announced that University of Miami Coach Jimmy Johnson would replace Tom Landry.

SALE APPROVED, SCHRAMM RESIGNS – The sale of the Cowboys to Jerry Jones was unanimously approved by NFL owners on April 18 at a special meeting in New York. At the same meeting, Tex Schramm was named president of the new World League of American Football. He announced his resignation as president and general manager of the Cowboys after 29 years with the club.

AIKMAN SIGNED – The Cowboys, holding the No. 1 pick in the NFL Draft for only the second time in their history, announced the signing of quarterback Troy Aikman to a six-year contract on April 20.

WALKER TRADED – Herschel Walker is traded to Minnesota on Oct. 12 for five players, six conditional draft choices and a 1992 first round draft choice. Among the players who actually came to Dallas as a result of the trade included Emmitt Smith, Russell Maryland, Kevin Smith and Darren Woodson.

JORDAN HONORED – Former All-Pro linebacker Lee Roy Jordan (1963-76), became the seventh member of the Ring of Honor. Jordan was honored during ceremonies at halftime of the Phoenix Cardinals game on Oct. 29.

1990

AUSTIN TRAINING CAMP – Beginning on July 18, nearly 100,000 fans visit the Cowboys first ever in-state training camp at St. Edward's University in Austin, Tex.

LANDRY ENTERS HALL OF FAME – Tom Landry, who led the Cowboys to five Super Bowls and 20 consecutive winning seasons as the Cowboys head coach from 1960-88, was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in his first year of eligibility. Enshrined on Aug. 4 at Canton, Ohio, Landry joined former Dallas players Bob Lilly and Roger Staubach as the only Hall of Fame members who built their achievements with the Cowboys.

SMITH ROOKIE OF THE YEAR, JOHNSON COACH OF THE YEAR – Following a dramatic turn-around season where the team posted a 7-9 record and missed the playoffs by one game, Jimmy Johnson was named the NFL Coach of the Year by the Associated Press. Running back Emmitt Smith, who led all NFL rookie running backs in rushing yardage and touchdowns, was named the A.P.'s NFC Offensive Rookie of the Year.

1991

RECORD DRAFT HAUL INCLUDES MARYLAND AS NO. 1 OVERALL PICK – After a pre-draft trade with the New England Patriots, the Cowboys used the No. 1 overall selection in the NFL Draft for only the third time in franchise history. Dallas chose Outland Trophy winner Russell Maryland (DT) with the top pick. The Cowboys went on to acquire 16 more choices, setting a club record for most selections in a 12-round draft with 17 overall.

SCHRAMM ENTERS HALL OF FAME – One of the NFL's true innovators, and the guiding force behind the development of America's Team, Tex Schramm was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame on July 27, 1991. Schramm, who served as the President and General Manager of the Dallas Cowboys from the team's inception in 1960 until his retirement in 1989, joined Staubach, Lilly and Landry with his enshrinement in Canton, Ohio.

RETURN TO THE PLAYOFFS – After winning the final five games of the season, Dallas finished with an 11-5 record – the team's best mark since the 1983 season. The initial spark to the winning streak was a 24-21 win over the eventual World Champion Washington Redskins on Nov. 24. The win, at Washington's RFK Stadium, ended the Redskins' bid for a perfect regular season after 11 straight wins. Dallas finished second in the NFC East and qualified as the NFC's No. 2 Wild Card Playoff entry, marking the club's first postseason trip since 1985. Dallas traveled to Chicago and defeated the Bears 17-13 in the opening round Wild Card Game before dropping a 38-6 decision at Detroit the following week.

SMITH AND IRVIN LEAD NFL – Emmitt Smith and Michael Irvin became the first two players from the same team to lead the NFL in rushing yardage and receiving yardage in the same season. Smith had 1,563 yards rushing, while Irvin set single-season club records for receptions (93) and receiving yardage (1,523). Both players were named to the NFC Pro Bowl squad along with tight end Jay Novacek and quarterback Troy Aikman. The Cowboys sent four offensive players to the Pro Bowl for the first time since 1979, and Irvin was named the MVP of the Pro Bowl Game.

1992

JONES NAMED TO COMPETITION COMMITTEE – On May 1, Jerry Jones, was appointed to the NFL's Competition Committee by Commissioner Paul Tagliabue. Jones became the first owner to serve on the prestigious committee since the death of Cincinnati's Paul Brown.

FOURTEENTH DIVISION CHAMPIONSHIP – Before a national television audience on ABC's Monday Night Football, the Cowboys defeated the Atlanta Falcons (41-17) at the Georgia Dome to claim the NFC Eastern Division Championship. The victory marked the Cowboys first divisional title since 1985.

RECORD NUMBER OF OFFENSIVE PRO BOWL SELECTIONS – Six players from the Cowboys offense were selected to play in the Pro Bowl: RB Emmitt Smith, TE Jay Novacek, QB Troy Aikman, WR Michael Irvin, G Nate Newton and C Mark Stepnoski. The six players establish a Dallas Cowboys record for most offensive players selected to the Pro Bowl.

CLUB RECORD FOR VICTORIES/SMITH EARNS SECOND RUSHING TITLE – On Dec. 27, Dallas defeated Chicago by a 17-14 score at Texas Stadium. The victory was the 13th of the year for Dallas, establishing a new club record for victories in a season. Emmitt Smith finished the season with 1,713 rushing yards, enabling him to become the first player to win back-to-back NFL rushing titles since Eric Dickerson (1983-84).

ROAD ATTENDANCE RECORD SET – The Cowboys set a new team record for road attendance by averaging 72,523 fans-per-road game in 1992. The team also played before a sold-out stadium in all 16 regular season games for the first time since the 1981 season.

SIXTH NFC TITLE – On January 17, 1993, the Cowboys defeated the San Francisco 49ers by a 30-20 score at Candlestick Park. The victory sends Dallas to Super Bowl XXVII in Pasadena, marking the Cowboys first NFC title, and Super Bowl trip, since 1978.

THIRD WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP – While making an NFL record sixth Super Bowl appearance, the Cowboys defeated Buffalo 52-17 in Super Bowl XXVII at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena on Jan. 31, 1993. The victory enabled the Cowboys to become the only franchise in NFL history to win more than one Super Bowl under two different ownerships. The Super Bowl crowd of 98,374 was the largest crowd to ever witness a Dallas Cowboys game. The game was also witnessed by 133.4 million television viewers, making Super Bowl XXVII the most watched event in television history.

1993

WHITE HOUSE VISIT – On March 5, the Super Bowl Champion Dallas Cowboys became the first athletic team to visit the White House under the Clinton administration. The Cowboys team visit to the White House was the first in club history.

LANDRY HONORED – Former Head Coach Tom Landry, who led Dallas to two Super Bowl wins and five NFC titles in his 29 years at the Cowboys helm, became the eighth member of the Ring of Honor during halftime ceremonies of the Cowboys-New York Giants game on Nov. 7.

RECORD NUMBER OF PRO BOWL SELECTIONS – An NFC-record 11 Dallas players were selected to the Pro Bowl, including a club-record eight offensive selections (seven Pro Bowl starters).

FIFTEENTH DIVISION CHAMPIONSHIP – In the final game of the regular season on Jan. 2, the Cowboys defeat the New York Giants 16-13 in overtime at Giants Stadium to claim their 15th division crown and their second consecutive NFC East title.

SMITH EARNS THIRD RUSHING TITLE – Emmitt Smith finishes the season with 1,486 yards to earn his third straight NFL rushing crown. He becomes just the fourth man in NFL history to win three consecutive rushing titles.

SEVENTH NFC TITLE – Dallas defeats San Francisco 38-21 in the NFC Championship Game at Texas Stadium. The victory gives the Cowboys an NFL-record seventh conference championship in the first conference title game to be played at Texas Stadium since Jan. 1, 1978 (a 23-6 win over Minnesota).

FOURTH WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP – Dallas becomes one of just three NFL teams to win four Super Bowls by defeating Buffalo (30-13) in Super Bowl XXVIII. The game, played at the Georgia Dome in Atlanta, featured two rushing touchdowns by Super Bowl MVP Emmitt Smith. Dallas raised its NFL record number of Super Bowl appearances to seven (one fourth of all the Super Bowl games played).

1994

SWITZER NAMED HEAD COACH – Barry Switzer is named the new head coach of the Dallas Cowboys – and the third head coach in team history – on March 30. Switzer replaces Jimmy Johnson, who stepped down as the Cowboys head coach the previous day.

DORSETT AND WHITE ENTER HALL OF FAME – Tony Dorsett, the Cowboys all-time leading rusher in his 11-year career with the Cowboys from 1977-87, and Randy White, a nine-time Pro Bowl defensive tackle in his 14-year career with the Cowboys from 1975-78, are both inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in their first year of eligibility. They were enshrined on July 30 in Canton, Ohio.

NFL RECORD CROWD IN MEXICO CITY – The Cowboys travel to Mexico City to play the Houston Oilers in a preseason game in front of 112,376 fans, the largest crowd to ever witness an NFL game (Aug. 15).

DORSETT AND WHITE HONORED – Former All-Pro, running back Tony Dorsett and defensive tackle Randy White, became the ninth and 10th members of the Ring of Honor. They were honored during ceremonies at halftime of the Arizona Cardinals game on Oct. 9.

SIXTEENTH DIVISION CHAMPIONSHIP – The Cowboys clinched the NFC Eastern Division Crown in the first week of December with a 31-19 victory over the Eagles in Philadelphia (Dec. 4).

RECORD NUMBER OF PRO BOWL SELECTIONS – AGAIN – For the second straight year, the Cowboys send 11 players to the Pro Bowl, tying the NFC record that Dallas established in 1993.

NFL RECORD FOR TITLE GAME APPEARANCES – While making an NFL record 13th NFC Championship Game appearance, the Cowboys become the only team in NFL history to advance to at least two championship games in every decade of the team's existence. Dallas fell short of its third straight Super Bowl with a 38-28 loss to the San Francisco 49ers at Candlestick Park on Jan. 15, 1995.

1995

SEVENTEENTH DIVISION CHAMPIONSHIP – On Dec. 24, Dallas wrapped up its fourth straight NFC Eastern Division title – a feat that no other NFC East team has accomplished other than the Cowboys teams from 1976 to 1979.

SMITH WINS FOURTH RUSHING CROWN – Emmitt Smith closes the season with a team-record 1,773 rushing yards and an NFL record 25 touchdowns. Smith led the NFL in rushing for the fourth time in five years, becoming just the fifth player in NFL history to win at least four rushing titles.

TEN PRO BOWLERS SELECTED – Ten Cowboys are selected to the NFC Pro Bowl squad. Since 1993, Dallas has earned 32 Pro Bowl selections – the most ever by one team over a three year period of time.

EIGHTH NFC TITLE – The Cowboys win an NFL record eighth conference championship game by defeating the Green Bay Packers 38-27 at Texas Stadium on Jan. 14, 1996. The victory marked the Cowboys third NFC title in four years.

THREE SUPER BOWL TITLES IN FOUR YEARS – Dallas becomes the first team in NFL history to win three Super Bowls in a four year period by defeating the Pittsburgh Steelers 27-17 in Super Bowl XXX at Sun Devil Stadium in Tempe, AZ. The game, played on Jan. 28, 1996, is witnessed by 138.4 million television viewers, making Super Bowl XXX the most watched event in television history. The victory enables Dallas to earn its fifth Super Bowl title – joining the San Francisco 49ers as the only NFL franchises to win five Super Bowls.

1996

RENFRO ENTERS HALL OF FAME – Mel Renfro, a 10-time Pro Bowl selection, becomes the seventh player in club history to gain induction into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. During his 14-year career, Renfro became one of the best to ever play in the secondary, recording 52 career interceptions and a 26.4-yard career kickoff return average – marks that still stand as club records.

SMITH PASSES 10,000 YARDS – On a six-yard dash up the middle against Washington on Thanksgiving Day, Emmitt Smith became the 12th player in NFL history to rush for 10,000 yards. Smith's feat highlighted a 21-10 win over the Redskins at Texas Stadium on Nov. 28.

NINE PRO BOWLERS SELECTED – A NFL-high nine players are selected to the NFC Pro Bowl squad, the fourth straight year Dallas has led the NFL in Pro Bowl selections. Over the past four seasons, Dallas has sent 41 players to Hawaii, the most ever in the NFL in a four-year period. The next highest total was posted by the 1971-74 Miami Dolphins with 38.

EIGHTEENTH DIVISION CHAMPIONSHIP – On Dec. 15, Dallas wrapped up its fifth straight NFC Eastern Division title – a feat never before achieved in the NFC East – and the 18th division title in team history with a 12-6 win over New England at Texas Stadium. The Carolina Panthers eliminated the Cowboys from the playoffs in a divisional playoff loss at Carolina.

1997

IRVIN TOPS 10,000 YARDS – On a 14-yard touchdown reception at Washington on Oct. 13, Michael Irvin became the 14th player in NFL history to record over 10,000 yards receiving.

PLAYOFF STREAK SNAPPED – The Cowboys close the 1997 season with a 6-10 record, marking the team's first non-playoff season since 1990.

1998

GAILEY NAMED HEAD COACH – Jerry Jones named Chan Gailey as the fourth head coach in the history of the Dallas Cowboys franchise on Feb. 12. Gailey, who had previously served as the Pittsburgh Steelers offensive coordinator, replaced Barry Switzer, who resigned from his position on January 9th.

TRAINING CAMP OPENS IN WICHITA FALLS – The Cowboys open training camp at Midwestern State University in Wichita Falls, Texas on July 15. Attendance figures for the four-week camp exceed 100,000.

SANDERS SETS RETURN MARK – On Sept. 21, Deion Sanders returned a punt 59 yards for a touchdown in the first half at the New York Giants and then took an interception 71 yards for a score in the fourth quarter. It was the first time in club history one player scored two touchdowns on returns of any kind in the same game.

SMITH BECOMES CLUB'S ALL-TIME RUSHER – With 163 yards on 29 carries in a 16-6 win over the New York Giants on Nov. 8, Emmitt Smith becomes the Dallas Cowboys all-time leading rusher. Smith's performance pushes him past Tony Dorsett (12,036) and into the Cowboys top spot.

NINETEENTH DIVISION CHAMPIONSHIP – After a one-year absence from postseason play, the Cowboys clinch their sixth NFC Eastern Division title in the last seven years with a 13-9 win over Philadelphia at Texas Stadium on Dec. 20. The 1998 division crown is the 19th division championship (15th NFC East title) in the club's 39-year history.

SMITH BECOMES NFL'S ALL-TIME RUSHING TOUCHDOWN LEADER – After scoring a first half touchdown on a one-yard run against the Redskins at Texas Stadium, Emmitt Smith becomes the NFL's all-time leader in rushing touchdowns, passing Marcus Allen (123). Smith later added a 26-yard score to give him 125 rushing touchdowns by season's end.

COWBOYS POST 10 WINS AND SWEEP NFC EAST – The Cowboys closed the year with a 23-7 victory over Washington and a 10-6 record, marking the 23rd season in which Dallas recorded at least 10 wins – a NFL record. The win over the Redskins also enabled Dallas to become the first team in the history of the NFC East to post an 8-0 record in division play.

COWBOYS EXTEND NFL-RECORD WITH 25TH PLAYOFF APPEARANCE – The Cowboys extended their NFL record for postseason appearances to 25 with a 20-7 loss to Arizona in a NFC Wild Card Playoff Game at Texas Stadium on Jan. 2, 1999.

1999

COWBOYS COMEBACK – The Cowboys overcome a 21 point fourth quarter deficit and pull out an overtime win over the Washington Redskins in the season opener on Sept. 12. After the team scored 21 points in the fourth quarter to tie the game – tying the largest deficit overcome to win a game – Troy Aikman connected with Raghieb Ismail on a 76-yard bomb in overtime to provide the final margin of victory.

IRVIN RECORDS FINAL CATCH – On Oct. 10 at Veterans Stadium in Philadelphia, wide receiver Michael Irvin went across the middle and hauled in an eight-yard reception for the 750th catch of his career. The catch would be the last of his career as he suffered neck and back injuries on the play and was never able to return to the playing field. Irvin finished his career tied for 10th on the NFL's all-time reception list and was ninth all-time in receiving yards.

SELLOUT STREAK ENDS – The Dallas Cowboys NFL-record of consecutive games in front of sold out stadiums comes to an end on Dec. 24, 1999 in a Christmas Eve game against the New Orleans Saints in the Louisiana Superdome. The streak, which included home and away games, came to a halt after 160 games. It began on December 23, 1990 at Philadelphia's Veterans Stadium and included 79 straight sell-outs at Texas Stadium (including playoffs) and 81 straight sell-outs on the road (including playoffs).

AIKMAN NFL'S WINNINGEST QUARTERBACK – With eight wins in 1999, Troy Aikman became the winningest starting quarterback of any decade in NFL history with 90 wins in the 1990s. He broke the mark of 86 wins set by Joe Montana in the 1980s.

TEAM OF THE 90'S – The Cowboys close the century as the NFL's most successful team in the decade of the 1990s. From 1990 to 1999, Dallas qualified for the playoffs eight times, won six division titles, made four trips to the conference championship game and won three Super Bowls.

SMITH BECOMES NFL'S ALL-TIME LEADING POSTSEASON RUSHER – Emmitt Smith ran for 99 yards in a 27-10 loss at Minnesota in an NFC Wild Card Playoff Game on Jan. 9, 1999. The total gave Smith the NFL record with 1,586 career postseason rushing yards, moving him past Franco Harris (1,556).

2000

CAMPO NAMED HEAD COACH – Jerry Jones named Cowboys defensive coordinator Dave Campo as the fifth head coach in franchise history on Jan. 26. Campo spent the previous 11 seasons as an assistant coach in Dallas and was the defensive coordinator for the 1995 team that won Super Bowl XXX. He replaced Chan Gailey, who was fired on Jan. 11.

TOM LANDRY DIES – After a long battle with leukemia, Tom Landry died on Feb. 12 at the age of 75.

SMITH ECLIPSES 15,000 YARDS – With 150 yards rushing against Washington on Dec. 10, running back Emmitt Smith became just the third player in NFL history to rush for over 15,000 career yards, joining Walter Payton and Barry Sanders. Smith's effort also pushed him past the 1,000-yard mark for the season, marking the 10th consecutive season he has done so. Barry Sanders is the only other player to have accomplished this feat.

2001

AIKMAN RETIRES – At a press conference at Texas Stadium on April 9, quarterback Troy Aikman announced his retirement after 12 seasons with the Cowboys. Aikman departed holding or tied for 47 separate club passing records.

HAYES HONORED – Former All-Pro wide receiver Bob Hayes, the "World's Fastest Human," became the 11th member of the Ring of Honor. He was inducted during a ceremony at halftime of the San Diego game on Sept. 23.

2002

SMITH BECOMES NFL'S ALL-TIME LEADING RUSHER – On second-and-seven from the Dallas 30-yard line with 9:28 remaining in the fourth quarter against Seattle at Texas Stadium on Oct. 27, Emmitt Smith burst up the middle on an 11-yard run to become the NFL's all-time leading rusher. With that carry, he moved past Walter Payton's mark of 16,726 career rushing yards. Smith finished the day with 109 yards on 24 carries. By season's end, he had extended the record to 17,162 career rushing yards.

2003

PARCELLS BECOMES SIXTH COACH IN CLUB HISTORY – On Jan. 2, Bill Parcells was named the sixth head coach in club history, replacing Dave Campo who was fired on December 30. In 15 seasons as a head coach with the New York Giants, the New England Patriots and the New York Jets, Parcells has posted a 149-106-1 record, including victories in Super Bowls XXI and XXV with the Giants and an appearance in Super Bowl XXXI with the Patriots. His 149 career wins place him 13th in NFL history.

EMMITT SMITH RELEASED – On Feb. 27, Emmitt Smith was released after 13 seasons with the club. He departs as the NFL's all-time leading rusher and holds or is tied for 62 club records. On March 27, Smith signed a two-year contract with the Arizona Cardinals.

TEX SCHRAMM DIES – One of the founding fathers of the Dallas Cowboys, Tex Schramm died on July 15 at the age of 83.

SCHRAMM HONORED – The first president and general manager of the club, Tex Schramm became the 12th member of the Ring of Honor. He was a driving force in turning a 1960 expansion team into one of the most popular and successful sports franchises in the world, Schramm was honored during a halftime ceremony of the Philadelphia game on Oct. 12.

COWBOYS POST 10 WINS AND RETURN TO THE PLAYOFFS – The Cowboys topped the N.Y. Giants on Dec. 21 to record their 10th win of the season and secure a wild card berth in the playoffs. It was the club's 27th postseason appearance, extending their NFL record. It was also the 24th season in franchise history that the club had posted at least 10 wins, also a league record.

2004

HARRIS AND WRIGHT HONORED – Two members of the NFL's All-Decade team from the 1970s, Cliff Harris and Rayfield Wright, became the 13th and 14th members of the Ring of Honor. The duo were key members of the Cowboys teams that captured Super Bowl VI and XII titles and were both six-time Pro Bowl selections. Harris and Wright were honored during a ceremony at halftime of the N.Y. Giants game on Oct. 10.

ARLINGTON, TEXAS AND THE DALLAS COWBOYS – With 55% of the vote, the citizens of Arlington, Texas, overwhelming support a stadium referendum at the polls on Nov. 2. The public-private partnership between the City of Arlington and the Dallas Cowboys will fund a retractable roof stadium with capacity for up to 90,000 people in the heart of Arlington's entertainment district. With over \$400 million committed by the team and stadium users, it will be the largest private investment in a stadium in NFL history, and the stadium will give North Texas the ability to bring major events like the Super Bowl and the NCAA Final Four to the region.

SMITH AND WOODSON RETIRE – Within one month's time, the NFL's all-time leading rusher and the Cowboys all-time leading tackler walk away from the game of football for the final time. At a December 29 press conference, Darren Woodson announced his retirement after 12 seasons with the Cowboys. Woodson departed with the club record for career tackles with 1,350. Just a few weeks later on February 3, 2005 at a press conference in Jacksonville, Florida, at Super Bowl XXXIX, Emmitt Smith announced his retirement after 13 seasons with the Cowboys and two with the Arizona Cardinals. In 15 NFL seasons he amassed league records with 18,355 rushing yards, 164 rushing touchdowns and 78 100-yard rushing games.

2005

TRIPLETS HONORED – Troy Aikman, Michael Irvin and Emmitt Smith, the cornerstone players of the three-time Super Bowl Champion Cowboys teams of the 1990s became the 15th, 16th and 17th members of the club's Ring of Honor. The trio finished their Cowboys career holding almost every major passing, receiving and rushing record while helping the team become the NFL's Team of the Decade for the '90s. A record crowd of 65,207 fans pack Texas Stadium to witness the halftime event during the Monday Night Football match-up against division rival Washington on Sept. 19.

29TH WINNING SEASON – With a 24-20 win at Carolina, the Cowboys clinch the 29th winning season in the franchise's 46 years in operation. Dallas finished the year 9-7.

20 MILLION FANS – The Cowboys played in front of 63,131 fans in the regular season finale at Texas Stadium on Jan. 1, 2006, pushing the club's all-time home attendance figure past the 20 million mark. Dating back to the 1960 franchise opener at the Cotton Bowl, 20,002,761 fans have now seen the Dallas Cowboys live at the Cotton Bowl and Texas Stadium.

2006

AIKMAN AND WRIGHT ENTER HALL OF FAME – Three-time Super Bowl Champion quarterback Troy Aikman and six-time Pro Bowl tackle Rayfield Wright become the eighth and ninth former Cowboys to be enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio. Aikman, the MVP of Super Bowl XXVII and the winningest quarterback of the 1990's is selected in his first year of eligibility. Wright, a member of the NFL's 1970s All-Decade team and two Super Bowl winning teams in Dallas is selected in his first year as a senior's committee nominee. Enshrinement ceremonies were scheduled for Aug. 5, 2006 in Canton, Ohio.

CONSTRUCTION BEGINS ON NEW COWBOYS STADIUM – On April 10, 2006, ground was broken on the new Dallas Cowboys Stadium in Arlington, Texas. The state-of-the-art venue is scheduled for completion by the start of the 2009 NFL season and will accommodate between 80,000 and 100,000 fans.

30th WINNING SEASON AND 28th PLAYOFF APPEARANCE – A victory over the Atlanta Falcons in the Georgia Dome on Dec. 16 wrapped up the Cowboys place in the NFL playoffs for the 28th time while securing the club's 30th winning season (9-7).

2007

PHILLIPS HIRED AS SEVENTH HEAD COACH – On Feb. 8, Jerry Jones announced the appointment of Wade Phillips as the seventh head coach in Dallas Cowboys history. Phillips, who brought a previous 45-35 record as an NFL head coach to the club, replaced Bill Parcells who announced his retirement from coaching on Jan. 22.

SUPER BOWL AWARDED TO NORTH TEXAS AND COWBOYS NEW STADIUM – On May 22, at NFL owners' meetings in Nashville, North Texas was selected to host Super Bowl XLV. The game will be played at the Cowboys new stadium in Arlington, Texas on February 6, 2011. The first Super Bowl to be presented in North Texas was awarded on the fourth ballot of a vote by the NFL ownership.

IRVIN ENTERS HALL OF FAME – Michael Irvin, a member of six divisional winners and three Super Bowl championship teams with the Cowboys of the 1990s, became the 10th former Dallas Cowboys player to be enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Irvin, the Cowboys career leader in receptions and yardage, chose team owner Jerry Jones to present him for induction at the ceremony in Canton, Ohio on Aug. 4, 2007.

COWBOYS WIN NFC EASTERN DIVISION – With a 28-27 win at Detroit on Dec. 9, the Cowboys clinched the NFC Eastern Division title for the first time since 1998. The win gave Dallas its 20th division championship (16th NFC East). Dallas closed the season with an NFC-best 13-3 record, tying the club mark for regular season victories that was set in 1992.

2008

PRO BOWL COWBOYS – A record 13 Dallas Cowboys participated in the Pro Bowl in Hawaii (Feb. 10). Representing the club on offense were starters Tony Romo, Terrell Owens, Flozell Adams, Andre Gurode, Leonard Davis and Jason Witten. Marion Barber was a reserve for the NFC offense. On the defensive side, DeMarcus Ware and Ken Hamlin were starters while Roy Williams, Terence Newman and Greg Ellis were reserves. Rookie placekicker Nick Folk was also selected.

A FINAL FAREWELL – The Dallas Cowboys played their final game at Texas Stadium against the Baltimore Ravens on Sat., Dec. 20 in front of 63,800 fans. Jason Witten scored the final Cowboys touchdown at the stadium on a 21-yard pass from Tony Romo to cut Dallas' deficit to 26-24 with 1:36 remaining. On Baltimore's next possession, LeRon McClain scored on an 82-yard run to mark the longest running play by an opponent at the stadium to give the Ravens the 33-24 win.

SACK ATTACK – In the final game at Texas Stadium, DeMarcus Ware picked up his league-leading 20th sack of the season. Ware's 20.0 sacks also established a club record since sacks became an official stat in 1982.

2009

HAYES ENTERS HALL OF FAME – "Bullet" Bob Hayes was enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame, becoming the 11th former Cowboy to receive that honor. Hayes spent 10 seasons with the Cowboys and revolutionized the wide receiver position and the way defenses would play in the NFL. He began his 11-year NFL career after winning two olympic gold medals at the 1964 Olympic Games in Tokyo, Japan where he earned the title of "The World's Fastest Human." The three-time Pro Bowl selection arrived in Dallas after the olympics and remains - as the only rookie in franchise history to ever lead the team in receptions (46), receiving yards (1,003) and a rookie club record of 12 touchdown catches.

DRAFTING A DOZEN – The Dallas Cowboys entered the 2009 draft with 11 selections and finished the weekend with 12 picks. Dallas' 12 draft picks marked the most selected since the draft was shortened to seven rounds in 1994 and the most overall picks since selecting 15 players in 1992's 12-round draft. After trading away their second round pick - the club's only first-day draft pick - Dallas selected all 12 picks from Round Three on to mark the most selections after the third round since picking up 14 players in the 12-round draft in 1991.

RIBBON CUTTING – In a ceremony involving the Jones Family, Arlington Mayor Robert Cluck, and a host of Cowboys greats on hand, the West End Zone doors to AT&T Stadium were officially opened to a crowd of close to 2,000 as part of the building's Ribbon Cutting ceremony on May 27.

OPENING ACT – The inaugural event at AT&T Stadium was a star-studded country music concert headlined by George Strait. Superstar Reba McEntire, singer/songwriter Blake Shelton and recording artist Lee Ann Womack joined the event.

ATTENDANCE RECORD – The 105,121 fans who attended the first regular season game at AT&T Stadium (Dallas vs. the N.Y. Giants, 9/20/09) became the largest crowd to ever witness an NFL regular season - or postseason - game.

2010

COWBOYS WIN NFC EASTERN DIVISION – With a 24-0 win over Philadelphia (1/3/10), the Cowboys wrapped up the NFC Eastern Division title - marking the 21st division crown in the club's 50 year history. Dallas advanced to the playoffs for the 12th time in the 21 years of Jones' tenure as the owner and general manager.

AT&T STADIUM HOSTS FIRST PLAYOFF GAME – Dallas beat Philadelphia 34-14 in front of 92,951 fans in Arlington (1/19/10). The victory increased the Cowboys NFL-best total of all-time postseason wins to 33.

NBA ALL STAR GAME – The 108,713 fans who saw the NBA All Star Game at AT&T Stadium became a part of history as they made up the largest crowd to attend a basketball game - at any level - in the more than 100-year history of the sport.

SMITH ENTERS HALL OF FAME – Emmitt Smith, the NFL's all-time leading rusher with 18,355 yards and winner of three Super Bowl rings, became the 12th player in franchise history inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Smith, who won NFL and Super Bowl MVP awards and is the NFL record holder with 11 consecutive 1,000-yard rushing seasons, is presented by team owner Jerry Jones for the induction ceremony.

MIDSEASON CHANGE – For the first time in Dallas Cowboys history, a coaching change was made during the season. Wade Phillips was relieved of his duties on Nov. 8 and Jason Garrett was named Interim Head Coach. Under Garrett, Dallas finished the season 5-3 after starting it 1-6.

2011

GARRETT BECOMES EIGHTH HEAD COACH IN CLUB HISTORY – On Jan. 5, Jason Garrett was named the eighth head coach in franchise history after serving as the interim head coach for the second half of the 2010 season. Garrett spent the previous four seasons as the club's offensive coordinator while also serving as the assistant head coach for three.

NEW COACHING STAFF MOVES IN – Beginning with the hiring of Rob Ryan as the club's defensive coordinator on Jan. 15, Dallas added six new coaches and added duties to three others. Matt Eberflus became the linebackers coach on Jan. 26, followed by Ben Bloom as the defensive quality control coach/linebackers on Jan. 31. Brian Baker was named defensive line coach on Feb. 7, Mike Woicik returned as the strength and conditioning coach on Feb. 9, Jimmy Robinson became the assistant head coach/wide receivers on Feb. 11 and Walt Williams an assistant strength and conditioning coach on Feb. 14. On Feb. 17, John Garrett added the title passing game coordinator, Hudson Houck running game coordinator and Wes Phillips was named assistant offensive line coach.

SANDERS ENTERS HALL OF FAME – Deion Sanders, a member of three divisional winners and a Super Bowl championship team with the Cowboys from 1995-99, became the 13th former Dallas Cowboys player to be enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Sanders, the biggest free agent move in the history of the franchise at the time, was also the only man in professional sports to play in both a World Series and a Super Bowl.

SUPER BOWL XLV COMES TO NORTH TEXAS – For the first time in the region's history, North Texas played host to a Super Bowl when the Green Bay Packers and Pittsburgh Steelers faced off in Super Bowl XLV on Feb. 6 at AT&T Stadium. The Packers earned their fourth Super Bowl Championship with a 31-25 win in front of 103,219 fans - the fourth-largest crowd to watch a Super Bowl.

THREE ENTER RING OF HONOR – Larry Allen, Charles Haley and Drew Pearson were inducted into the Ring of Honor on Nov. 6, 2011 at halftime of the Cowboys-Seahawks game becoming the 18th, 19th and 20th members of the club's Ring of Honor. All three players earned Super Bowl rings in their years with the Cowboys, Allen - three; Haley - three and Pearson - one.

SETTING RECORDS – DeMarco Murray saw extended time against St. Louis (10/23) with an injury to Felix Jones. Murray seized the opportunity and established a single-game club record with 253 rushing yards, breaking Emmitt Smith's mark of 237 set in 1993. He scored his first career touchdown on a 91-yard run which was the longest first career rushing touchdown in NFL history and the second-longest run in team history. Over the course of the next four games, he rushed for 601 yards, the most in club history over that span.

2012

COACHING STAFF ADDITIONS – The Dallas Cowboys welcomed three new coaches to their staff in the 2012 offseason starting with Bill Callahan, who was named the club's offensive coordinator/offensive line coach on Jan. 12. That same day, the club hired Jerome Henderson to lead the secondary and added Joe Baker as an assistant secondary coach on Feb. 13.

FREE AGENCY FRENZY – The Cowboys were active in free agency, signing seven veteran players, the most since 1990 when 16 were signed. The club targeted cover corner Brandon Carr and locked him up with a five-year \$50.1 million contract on March 14. The team also signed guard Mackenzy Bernadeau, quarterback Kyle Orton, and fullback Lawrence Vickers on the same day. Linebacker Dan Connor was added on March 15, guard Nate Livings on March 16 and safety Brodney Pool on March 19.

TRADE TO LAND IN TOP 10 – With the trade to move up to the sixth overall pick to select cornerback Morris Claiborne, the Cowboys traded into the top 10 in the NFL Draft for the first time since trading up to draft Russell Maryland with the top overall selection in 1991.

ALL-TIME RECEPTIONS LEADER – In the fourth quarter of the game at Atlanta (11/4), Jason Witten hauled in his fourth catch of the game to give him 751 career receptions to pass Michael Irvin's club record of 750.

BREAKING A RECORD – With his third catch of the home finale against New Orleans On Dec. 23, Jason Witten established an NFL tight end single-season receptions record, finishing the game with 103 catches. The previous mark was held by Tony Gonzalez (102 in 2004). Witten finished the season with 110 catches, just one shy of Michael Irvin's record set in 1995.

2013

TWO MORE COWBOYS IN HALL OF FAME – Dallas had two more members enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio when Larry Allen and Bill Parcells were both inducted. Allen, a member of the NFL's All-Decade Team for the 1990s and 2000s, became the second Cowboys offensive lineman to earn a bust in Canton. Parcells, who coached four seasons in Dallas, is the third head coach (Tom Landry) or executive (Tex Schramm) to have the honor.

2014

IT'S GOOD! – Dan Bailey drilled two field goals in the win at St. Louis (9/21) to pass Chris Boniol with the longest streak of consecutive field goals made - 28. He added two more against Houston (10/5) before missing one in that same game, setting the mark at 30.

500TH WIN – In handing New Orleans (9/28) a 38-17 Sunday night loss, the Dallas Cowboys registered their 500th overall win (including postseason). Dallas became the 11th team in NFL history with 500 wins, and did it in 880 games, the second-fastest to reach 500. Chicago was the fastest, reaching the mark in 870 games.

900 CATCHES FOR 10,000 YARDS – Jason Witten became the second Dallas Cowboy (Irvin) to reach 10,000 career receiving yards after tallying 59 yards against Houston (10/5). He then became just the second tight end - 16th player - in league history to reach 900 career catches with his two at Seattle (10/12).

THE GOAT – In the win at Seattle (10/12), Dan Bailey had three field goals, including a career-long 56-yarder, to give him 102 career field goals made. He became the second Cowboys kicker (Rafael Septien) to reach 100 and also qualified for all-time kicking stats. By season's end, Bailey's 89.8 field goal percentage is tops all-time.

RUN MURRAY, RUN – DeMarco Murray's 128 rushing yards against the N.Y. Giants (10/19) made him the first rusher in NFL history to record a streak of seven consecutive games to open the season with 100 rushing yards, breaking Jim Brown's 56-year old record of six straight games to open a season. Murray continued the streak a week later against Washington (10/27) before failing to reach 100 yards versus Arizona in Week 9, setting the NFL record at eight consecutive games. Murray was recognized as the NFL Offensive player of the month in both September and October for his accomplishments during the stretch.

ALL-TIME CLUB PASSING YARDS LEADER – Tony Romo completed 18-of-20 passes for 218 yards in the win at Indianapolis (12/21). His 218 yards gave him 32,971 for his career to pass Troy Aikman (32,942) as the club's all-time passing yards leader.

DOUBLE CROWN WITH A SPLASH – Dallas closed out its home schedule with a 42-7 victory over Indianapolis (12/21) to give the club its 22nd division and 18th NFC East title. Then the season-ending win at Washington (12/28) provided several highlights for Dallas. The club earned its eighth road win of the season to become the first team in club history and the sixth team since the NFL merger to go 8-0 on the road. Additionally, Murray finished the game with his club-record 12th 100-yard game of the season to give him 1,845 yards on the season, passing Emmitt Smith's previous mark of 1,773 (1995).

EIGHT-BALL TO THE PRO BOWL – The Dallas Cowboys had eight players - seven on offense - earn a selection to the Pro Bowl. DeMarco Murray made his second trip and was selected as a team captain. Tony Romo (fourth), Jason Witten (10th), Tyron Smith (second), Dez Bryant (first), Travis Frederick (first), Louis-Philippe Ladouceur (first) and Zack Martin (first) all made the cut.

WITH HONORS – Dallas Cowboys Owner, President and General Manager Jerry Jones was recognized as the 2014 Pro Football Writers of America Executive of the Year. Jones is the first member of the Cowboys – and second NFL owner (Al Davis, Oakland – 2002) – to earn the PFWA's Executive of the Year award, which began in 1993. DeMarco Murray was named the AP Offensive Player of the Year for 2014. In his best season as a professional, Murray led the NFL with a Cowboys franchise-record 1,845 rushing yards, 2,261 scrimmage yards, 392 rush attempts and 13 touchdowns while carrying the Cowboys into the playoffs for the first time since 2009. The Dallas Cowboys placed a league-high four players – wide receiver Dez Bryant, center Travis Frederick, running back DeMarco Murray and tackle Tyron Smith – on the 2014 All-NFL team, chosen in voting conducted by the Professional Football Writers of America (PFWA).

2015

COACH EXTENDED – The Dallas Cowboys signed Head Coach Jason Garrett to a five-year contract extension on January 15, 2015. Garrett is third on the Dallas Cowboys all-time coaching wins list, with 42 regular and postseason victories. The Cowboys also announced an extension for Defensive Coordinator Rod Marinelli as well as an extension and promotion of Scott Linehan to offensive coordinator.

WOODSON HONORED – During halftime of Dallas' Nov. 1, 2015 game against the Seattle Seahawks, Darren Woodson was inducted as the 21st member of the Cowboys Ring of Honor at AT&T Stadium. He finished his career as the Cowboys all-time leading tackler with 1,350 stops, was named to the Pro Bowl five times and was a three-time Super Bowl champion.

DYNAMIC DUO – Tony Romo connected with Dez Bryant for their 50th touchdown in the fourth quarter at Miami (11/22) to surpass Troy Aikman and Michael Irvin (49) for the most QB-WR touchdowns in franchise history. It took Bryant and Romo 68 games to score 50 touchdowns, while it took Aikman and Irvin 128 games to reach 49 touchdowns.

ALL-TIME CONSECUTIVE GAMES PLAYED LEADER – Jason Witten played in his 197th consecutive game at Miami (11/22) to surpass Bob Lilly (196, 1961-1974) for the most consecutive games played in team history. He then played in his 200th consecutive game at Green Bay (12/13) to become the first Cowboy to reach that milestone.

1,000 RECEPTIONS – Jason Witten reached 1,000 career receptions at Washington (12/7) to become the 12th player in NFL history - second tight end - to do so. By reaching that mark in his 203rd game, he became the sixth-fastest player in NFL history - fastest tight end - to get to that point.

GARRETT PASSES JOHNSON IN WINS – Head Coach Jason Garrett earned his 45th career regular season win at Washington (12/7) to surpass Jimmy Johnson (44) for the second-most regular season head coaching wins in team history.

MOST CONSECUTIVE GAMES WITH A CATCH – Jason Witten caught a pass in his 118th consecutive game at Buffalo (12/27) to surpass Michael Irvin (117) for the most consecutive games with a catch in team history.

2016

END OF AN ERA – After 31 years of calling the Valley Ranch practice facility home, the Cowboys conduct their final practice at the team headquarters in Irving, TX on June 21.

A NEW HEADQUARTERS – The organization moves into The Star in Frisco, Texas, the new World Headquarters of the Dallas Cowboys. The move enables the team to become the first and only NFL team to share a training facility with a public high school athletic program at Ford Center – an indoor venue with a seating capacity of 12,000.

SHATTERING A CLUB RECORD – In the Thursday night win at Minnesota (Dec. 1), the Dallas Cowboys extended their win streak to 11 games - the longest single-season streak in franchise history.

LUCKY WEEK 13 – With the 17-15 win over the Minnesota Vikings on Thursday night, along with the Washington Redskins loss the following Sunday, the Dallas Cowboys became the first team in the NFL to clinch a playoff berth - the franchise's 32nd trip to the postseason.

GOING BOWLING – Five Dallas Cowboys were initially selected to the Pro Bowl - Tyron Smith (fourth selection), Travis Frederick and Zack Martin (three apiece) and Ezekiel Elliott and Dak Prescott (first). Two more were added as replacements - Dez Bryant (third, for Julio Jones) and Sean Lee (second, for Luke Kuechly).

2017

HIGHEST HONOR, AND THEN SOME – On the eve of Super Bowl LI, Owner/President/General Manager Jerry Jones became the newest member of the Dallas Cowboys selected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame. The accolades continued as Jason Garrett was named AP Coach of the Year, Dak Prescott was named AP Offensive Rookie of the Year, the offensive line earned the Built Ford Tough Offensive Line of the Year and Ezekiel Elliot was the FedEx Ground Player of the Year.

A LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT – Owner/President/General Manager Jerry Jones received the 2017 Lifetime Achievement Award, presented by *SportsBusiness Daily/Journal* at a banquet in New York City.

HALL OF FAME OWNER - Owner/President/General Manager Jerry Jones is inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame on August 5, 2017, becoming the 15th owner to be enshrined.

RECORD SETTER - Jason Witten sets the Cowboys franchise record for most career receiving yards, eclipsing Michael Irvin (11,904) in Cowboys annals in the home-opening win against the N.Y. Giants on Sept. 9. He passed Ed "Too Tall" Jones for most games played by a Cowboy (224) the following week at Denver.

TOUCHDOWN FOR 88 - Dez Bryant establishes a franchise record, topping Bob Hayes (71) with his 72nd career receiving touchdown against Washington on Oct. 21.

WINNING OWNER - The Cowboys win at the N.Y. Giants on Dec. 10, 2017 serves as Jerry Jones' 250th regular season win as the Dallas Cowboys Owner, President and General Manager since purchasing the team in 1989.

PRO BOWL COWBOY - Jason Witten earns his 11th trip to the Pro Bowl to tie Bob Lilly for the most appearances in franchise history. He was joined by Travis Frederick (fourth), Tyron Smith (fifth), Zack Martin (fourth) and DeMarcus Lawrence (first) as Pro Bowl selections.

2018

COACHING STAFF ADDITIONS – The Dallas Cowboys welcomed eight new coaches to their staff in the 2018 offseason, including four assistants on offense - Paul Alexander (offensive line), Sanjay Lal (wide receivers), Kellen Moore (quarterbacks) and Doug Nussmeier (tight ends). On defense, Kris Richard was brought in to lead the secondary and coordinate the passing defense, along with Ken Amato (defensive assistant). Doug Colman (asst. special teams) and Markus Paul (strength and conditioning) were the final additions.

LONG BALL BRETT - First-year kicker Brett Maher connected on a 62-yard field goal in the Cowboys December victory over the Philadelphia Eagles, the seventh-longest field goal in NFL history and the longest make in Cowboys history, besting the previous long of 56 yards.

IT HAS A NICE RING TO IT - During halftime of the team's contest against the New Orleans Saints, the Cowboys named Gil Brandt as the 22nd member of the Ring of Honor.

NFC EAST CHAMPS - With a win over Tampa Bay on Dec. 23, Dallas earned its 20th NFC East Division title since the division was first formed in 1970, its third division crown in the last five seasons.

ZEKE 2K - Ezekiel Elliott tallied 2,001 scrimmage yards and led the NFL in rushing with 1,434 yards, becoming only the fifth NFL player and second Cowboy to lead the league in rushing twice in their first three seasons.

I MUST BREAK YOU - Rookie Leighton Vander Esch established a franchise rookie record for tackles in a single-season, leading the Cowboys defense with 176 tackles. He also established the club rookie single-game record with 19 stops at Philadelphia on Nov. 11.

PRO BOWL COWBOYS - The Cowboys sent eight players to the Pro Bowl, with five players from offense earning a spot in the game. Tyron Smith earned his sixth overall and sixth consecutive trip, tying Rayfield Wright for the most by a Cowboys tackle in team history. He was joined by Zack Martin (fifth), Amari Cooper (third), Ezekiel Elliott (second), DeMarcus Lawrence (second), Dak Prescott (second), Byron Jones (first) and rookie linebacker Leighton Vander Esch (first) - the 11th rookie and first rookie linebacker to make the game in team history.

2019

GOLD JACKET GIL - On the eve of Super Bowl LIII in Atlanta, Gil Brandt became the most recent Dallas Cowboy selected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

COACHING STAFF ADDITIONS - The Dallas Cowboys shuffled the coaching ranks following the 2018 season, promoting Kellen Moore from quarterbacks coach to offensive coordinator, Marc Colombo from assistant offensive line to offensive line coach, and adding three new coaches to the staff - Jon Kitna as quarterbacks coach, Adam Klefner as assistant offensive line, and Carlos Polk as assistant special teams.

WAR DADDY BUCKS - The Dallas Cowboys signed defensive end DeMarcus Lawrence to a five-year contract extension worth more than \$100 million, making him the highest paid player in Cowboys history. Prior to the start of the season, the club signed running back Ezekiel Elliott to a \$90 million extension, making him the highest paid running back in league history at the time of signing.

QUARTERDAK - Dak Prescott continued his ascent as one of the league's top young quarterbacks, leading the NFL's top-ranked offense and notching career highs in passing yards (4,902 - second in team history), completions (second), attempts (596) and passing touchdowns (30), becoming only the second passer in Cowboys history to reach 4,000 yards and 30 touchdowns in a single-season.

WITTEN IN HISTORY - Jason Witten returned to the Cowboys after a brief hiatus during the 2018 season, playing in his 16th NFL campaign - making him the longest-tenured Cowboy in franchise history.

OFFENSIVE ARSENAL - The Cowboys boasted a 4,000-yard passer (Prescott, 4,902), 1,000-yard rusher (Elliott, 1,357) and two 1,000-yard receivers (Cooper, 1,189 and Michael Gallup, 1,008) for the first time in franchise history, and the offense totaled a team-record 6,904 net yards.

PRO BOWL COWBOYS - The Cowboys sent six players to the Pro Bowl, with five players from offense earning a spot in the game. Tyron Smith earned his seventh overall and seventh consecutive trip, passing Rayfield Wright for the most by a Cowboys tackle in team history. He was joined by Zack Martin (sixth), Travis Frederick (fifth), Amari Cooper (fourth), Ezekiel Elliott (third), and Jaylon Smith (first) in the all-star game.

2020

MCCARTHY BECOMES NINTH HEAD COACH IN CLUB HISTORY - On Jan. 5, Mike McCarthy was named the ninth head coach in franchise history. Along with 13 years of head coaching experience and 13 more as an assistant coach in the NFL, McCarthy comes to Dallas owning the sixth-most wins (125) and fourth-highest winning percentage among active NFL head coaches, including a Super Bowl XLV win at AT&T Stadium in 2011.

COACHING STAFF ADDITIONS - The Dallas Cowboys welcomed 18 new coaches to their staff in the 2020 offseason, including seven assistants on offense - Jeff Blasko (asst. offensive line), Chase Haslett (quality control/offense), Adam Henry (wide receivers), Skip Peete (running backs), Joe Philbin (offensive line), Scott Tolzien (coaching assistant) and Lunda Wells (tight ends). On defense, Mike Nolan was brought on as the defensive coordinator and he was joined by George Edwards (senior defensive assistant), Al Harris (secondary), Maurice Linguist (secondary), Cannon Matthews (quality control/defense), Scott McCurley (linebackers) and Jim Tomsula. Dallas brought on Rob Davis as the Assistant Head Coach, and then rounded out their coaching staff with John Fassel (special teams coordinator), Matt Daniels (asst. special teams), and Harold Nash (strength & conditioning).

HALL OF FAME COWBOYS - As part of the Pro Football Hall of Fame's Centennial Slate, former Cowboys Head Coach Jimmy Johnson and Safety Cliff Harris were elected to the Hall of Fame, giving Dallas 19 Hall of Famers in its history.

LAMB OF LEGEND - First round draft pick CeeDee Lamb broke a slew of Cowboys rookie records in his first year with the team, smashing Bob Hayes' rookie record for receptions (46) by hauling in 74 passes for 935 yards - second in team history by a rookie. He also established a Cowboys rookie record with nine games of five-or-more catches, and became one-of-three Cowboys players to score a rushing, receiving and return touchdown in the same season.

COMEBACK COWBOYS - The Dallas Cowboys rallied from a 20-point deficit against the Atlanta Falcons and won the game on a 46-yard Greg Zuerlein field goal as time expired, taking their only lead of the game in the 40-39 win. The comeback was tied for the second-largest in team history, trailing three 21-point comebacks.

O' CANADA - Long time long snapper Louis-Philippe Ladouceur finished his 16th NFL season with the Cowboys on his way to the second-most games played in Cowboys history with 253. Ladouceur established a record for the most games played by a Canadian-born player in NFL history, passing Eddie Murray's 250 games.

PANDEMIC ATTENDANCE - AT&T Stadium allowed fans at all eight regular season home games in 2020, becoming one-of-19 NFL teams to host fans during the COVID-19 pandemic. Additionally, the Cowboys averaged over 27,000 fans-per-game, the highest attendance in the NFL during the 2020 season.

2021

HAIL MARY HALL OF FAMER - Dallas Cowboys legend Drew Pearson became the 20th former Cowboy to earn a bust in Canton, Ohio as a senior finalist in the Pro Football Hall of Fame's 2021 class. Playing his entire 11-year career in Dallas, Pearson ranks fourth on the franchise's all-time list in catches (489) and receiving yards (7,822) and seventh in receiving touchdowns (48). A member of the NFL's 1970s All-Decade team, he was inducted into the Cowboys Ring of Honor in 2011.

FRANCHISE QUARTERDAK - The Dallas Cowboys signed quarterback Dak Prescott to a four-year contract worth more than \$160 million, making him the highest paid player in Cowboys history and cementing his place among the highest paid players in NFL history.

COACHING STAFF ADDITIONS - The Dallas Cowboys added four new coaches to Mike McCarthy's staff in his second season, recruiting Dan Quinn to be the club's new defensive coordinator and then adding Secondary Coach Joe Whitt Jr., Defensive Line Coach Aden Durde and Assistant Strength and Conditioning Coach Cedric Smith.

RECORD-SETTING QUARTERDAK - Dak Prescott returned to the field with a vengeance after a devastating ankle injury prematurely ended his 2020 season, leading all NFL passers with eight games of a 100.0 passer rating and at least three touchdown passes while also setting the single-season Cowboys record with 37 touchdown passes in 2021.

CAN YOU DIGG(S) IT? - Trevon Diggs recorded 11 interceptions in his second NFL season, tied with Everson Walls (11 in 1981) for the most in a single season in team history, and combined with his 21 pass breakups, he became the seventh defender in the modern NFL era to have double-digit interceptions and at least 20 pass breakups in a single season.

THE LIONBACKER - Micah Parsons capped one of the most prolific first seasons in NFL history with the AP Defensive Rookie of the Year award - first ever Cowboy to win the award - adding to his overflowing trophy case of honors and acknowledgments. Parsons set the Cowboys rookie sack record with 13.0 takedowns in 2021, which also tied the third-most by any rookie in NFL history, and tallied a full sack in six consecutive games to become the third rookie in league history (since 1982 when sacks became official) to record a six-game streak with a full sack, joining Jevon Kearse (eight games) and Mike Croel (six games).

AP ASSISTANT COACH OF THE YEAR - Defensive Coordinator Dan Quinn was named the 2021 AP Assistant Coach of the Year after leading Dallas to improvements in essentially every major defensive statistical category in 2021, becoming one of the most dynamic units in the NFL. The defense forced a league-high 34 takeaways and scored a league-best and franchise-record six defensive touchdowns in 2021, while also finishing second in the NFL in third down defense (34.1%) and opponent three-and-out drives (43) and ranking seventh in opponent points-per-game (21.1).

EXCLUSIVE COMPANY - The Cowboys finished 2021 as the first team in NFL history with a 4,000-yard passer (Dak Prescott, 4,429), a 1,000-yard rusher (Ezekiel Elliott, 1,002), a 1,000-yard receiver (CeeDee Lamb, 1,102) a 10.0-sack player (Micah Parsons, 13.0) and a 10-interception player (Trevon Diggs, 11).

YOU GET A TOUCHDOWN, TOO - The Dallas Cowboys had 22 different players score a touchdown in the 2021 season, which was the most players to score a touchdown in a single season in team history and the most in NFL history. The 1968, 1980, 1983, 1987 and 2001 Cowboys teams are second with 16 players.

NFC EAST CHAMPS - Dallas earned its 21st NFC East Division title since the division was first formed in 1970, its fourth division crown in the last six seasons, and went a perfect 6-0 against its division in 2021 - marking just the third division sweep in a season in team history, joining the 1969 and 1998 Cowboys teams.

LEAGUE-LEADING ATTENDANCE - AT&T Stadium welcomed fans back with open arms in the first full season after the COVID-19 pandemic limited fan interactions for two seasons, leading the NFL with a home attendance of 691,390 over eight home games in 2021.

PRO BOWL COWBOYS - The Cowboys sent six players to the Pro Bowl, with four players earning their first trip to the game. Tyron Smith earned his eighth all-star selection, tying him with Emmitt Smith for the sixth-most selections in team history. He was joined by Zack Martin (seventh), CeeDee Lamb (first), Trevon Diggs (first), Micah Parsons (first) and Bryan Anger (first) in the all-star game.

2022

COACHING STAFF ADDITIONS – The Dallas Cowboys added two new coaches to the staff in 2022, hiring Robert Prince to coach wide receivers and Rayna Stewart as the assistant special teams coach.

DISTINGUISHED AMERICAN – Owner/President/General Manager Jerry Jones was honored with the Walter Camp Distinguished American Award on March 12 at the 56th annual Black Tie National Awards Gala. The Walter Camp Football Foundation “Distinguished American” award is presented each year to an individual who has utilized his or her talents to attain great success in business, private life or public service and who may have accomplished that which no other has done.

DIRTY DOZEN – Head Coach Mike McCarthy led the Dallas Cowboys to a 12-5 regular season record in 2022, the first time that Dallas won 12 games in back-to-back seasons since 1994-95. The Cowboys also advanced to the postseason in back-to-back seasons for the first time since 2006-07.

HOME FIELD ADVANTAGE – After losing the season opener to Tampa Bay at AT&T Stadium, the Dallas Cowboys won their final eight home games to post an 8-1 record at AT&T Stadium, the most home wins in a single season since the stadium opened in 2009.

TAKE THAT BALL AWAY - The Dallas Cowboys led the NFL with 33 takeaways in 2022 just one season after leading the league with 34 takeaways. Dallas was the first team to lead the NFL in takeaways in consecutive seasons since the Pittsburgh Steelers from 1972-74.

RUSH HOUR - After Dak Prescott was injured in the season opener, Cooper Rush was called upon to step in as the Cowboys signal caller. Rush started the next five games at quarterback, leading the Cowboys to four straight wins before falling at Philadelphia in his final start. Combined with a win at Minnesota in 2021, Rush became the only quarterback in franchise history to win his first five career starts.

NO SILENCING THIS LAMB - In his first year as the No. 1 receiver for Dallas, CeeDee Lamb had a breakout season with 107 receptions. Lamb became the third player in franchise history to reach 100 catches in a season, joining Michael Irvin (111 in 1995) and Jason Witten (110 in 2012). Lamb also displayed his big-play ability, reeling in 24 catches of 20-plus yards, tied for third in the NFL in 2022. After recording five 100-yard receiving games in his first two seasons combined, Lamb tallied five 100-yard games in 2022 alone, and his 10 career 100-yard games are the second-most by a Cowboys receiver through his first three seasons.

THE LION IS ALWAYS HUNGRY - After a record-setting rookie season in 2021, Micah Parsons was on the prowl once again, finishing seventh in the NFL with a career-high 13.5 sacks. He is the first player in Cowboys history with double-digit sacks in each of his first two seasons, and Parsons joined Aldon Smith and Reggie White as the only three NFL players since 1982 with 13.0-plus sacks in each of their first two seasons. Parsons also racked up six multi-sack games in 2022, tying DeMarcus Ware for the most multi-sack contests in a season.

MONEY MAHER - Brett Maher signed with the Cowboys during training camp in Oxnard, Calif., prior to the season. Maher finished his 2022 campaign making 29-of-32 field goals, amounting a career-high 90.6% field goal percentage. His 137 kicking points were a single-season franchise record. Maher also made nine field goals of 50 yards-or-more, the most in a season in team history and tied for the fifth-most in NFL history.

PRO BOWL COWBOYS - The Cowboys sent eight players to the Pro Bowl, with three players earning their first trip to the game. Zack Martin earned his eighth all-star selection, tying him with Emmitt Smith and Tyron Smith for the sixth-most selections in team history. He was joined by DeMarcus Lawrence (third), Trevon Diggs (second), CeeDee Lamb (second), Micah Parsons (second), Tyler Biadasz (first), Tony Pollard (first) and KaVontae Turpin (first). Turpin became the first designated return specialist in franchise history to earn a Pro Bowl invite.

ALL-PRO COWBOYS - Zack Martin and Micah Parsons were selected to the 2022 AP first-team All-Pro squad. Martin earned his sixth All-Pro nod, tied with Larry Allen for the third-most in franchise history. Martin and Allen are also the only two Cowboys offensive linemen with six All-Pro selections. On the defensive side, Parsons earned his second All-Pro selection in as many seasons, joining Bob Hayes (1965-66) as the only two players in franchise history to earn first-team All-Pro in each of their first two seasons. Parsons also joined Lawrence Taylor as the only two NFL defenders with All-Pro nods in their first two seasons since the 1970 NFL-AFL merger.

2023

COACHING STAFF ADDITIONS – The Dallas Cowboys added seven new coaches to the staff in 2023, hiring Ramon Chinyoung (Quality Control/Assistant Offensive Line), Will Harriger (Quality Control/Offensive Assistant), Mike Solari (Offensive Line), Shariff Floyd (Quality Control/Assistant Defensive Line), Pete Ohnegian (Quality Control/Defensive Assistant) and former Cowboys safety Darian Thompson (Quality Control/Assistant Linebackers).

TWO MORE COWBOYS IN HALL OF FAME – Dallas Cowboys legends Chuck Howley and DeMarcus Ware were officially elected into the Pro Football Hall of Fame, giving the Cowboys 22 members in Canton, Ohio. Howley, who was selected as a senior finalist, was eligible for the Hall of Fame for more than 40 years and is still the only player in NFL history to be named Super Bowl MVP from the losing team (Super Bowl V). Ware, a first round pick of the Cowboys in 2005, played nine seasons in Dallas and holds the franchise’s all-time sack record (117.0).

A SWEET HONOR - Dak Prescott was awarded with one of the highest honors in the NFL when he received the Walter Payton Man of the Year trophy for his outstanding community service efforts off the field, as well as excellence on the field. Prescott became the fourth Cowboys player to be bestowed with the honor, joining Roger Staubach, Troy Aikman and Jason Witten.

ROOM FOR TWO MORE - DeMarcus Ware and Jimmy Johnson became the two newest additions to the Cowboys Ring of Honor. During halftime of Dallas' Oct. 29, 2023 game against the LA Rams, Ware was inducted as the 23rd member of the Cowboys Ring of Honor at AT&T Stadium. Decorated Cowboys football coach, Jimmy Johnson, joined Ware as the 24th member of the Ring of Honor at halftime of the final regular season home game on Dec. 30, 2023 against the Detroit Lions.

PICK 6 KING - DaRon Bland set the NFL single-season record for pick-sixes when he grabbed his fifth interception returned for touchdown on Thanksgiving Day against the Washington Commanders. Bland jumped an out route from Washington's Sam Howell, and the second-year corner returned the interception 63 yards as the Cowboys defeated the Commanders 45-10.

HOME SWEET HOME - The Cowboys finished the regular season with an 8-0 record at AT&T stadium, marking the team's first perfect home regular season since 1981. Dallas stretched their home winning streak to 16 games, the longest active streak in the NFL and second-longest in franchise history.

FEEDING LAMB - CeeDee Lamb set two single-season franchise records in receptions (135) and receiving yards (1,749). One of the league's elite receivers, who wears the prestigious No. 88, also led the NFL in targets (181), receptions (135) and ranked second in receiving yards (1,749) while being named first-team All-Pro and a finalist for NFL Offensive Player of the Year.

BUTTER AUBREY - First-year standout Brandon Aubrey earned his 'butter' nickname as he shattered three NFL records. Aubrey made 35 consecutive field goals to start the season, which became the most made without a miss to start a career in NFL history. He also scored 157 points, a single-season franchise record and the most scored in a first NFL season. Aubrey also added 99 touchbacks, setting a NFL single-season record while finishing the year with 36 field goals, the most made in a season in Cowboys history.

NFC BEAST - Dallas earned its 22nd NFC East Division title since the division was first formed in 1970, 13th under Jerry Jones' stewardship and the second in the Mike McCarthy era. The Cowboys posted a 5-1 record against divisional opponents and outscored their division rivals 228-78.

PRO BOWL COWBOYS - Ten Dallas Cowboys were named to the 2024 NFL Pro Bowl Games, the most in the NFL and most by any Cowboys team since 2007 (13). Zack Martin earned his ninth selection, tied for the fifth-most by any Cowboy all-time and the second-most by a Dallas offensive lineman. Other Cowboys Pro Bowlers included DeMarcus Lawrence (fourth selection), CeeDee Lamb (third), Micah Parsons (third), Dak Prescott (third), Bryan Anger (second), Brandon Aubrey (first), DaRon Bland (first), Jake Ferguson (first) and Tyler Smith (first).

ALL-PRO 'BOYS - Nine Dallas Cowboys were selected to the 2023 AP All-Pro teams, the most among any NFL club. CeeDee Lamb, Zack Martin, DaRon Bland and Brandon Aubrey earned first-team honors while Dak Prescott, Micah Parsons, Tyrone Smith and Bryan Anger received second-team nods.

2024

COACHING STAFF ADDITIONS - The Dallas Cowboys added six new coaches to Mike McCarthy's staff in his fifth season. Mike Zimmer was named the club's defensive coordinator before adding Paul Guenther (defensive run game coordinator), Jeff Zgonina (defensive line), Greg Ellis (assistant defensive line/quality control), Cristian Garcia (assistant defensive backs/quality control) and Steve Shimko (offensive assistant/quality control).

WORLD CUP MATCHES - AT&T Stadium was selected to host nine 2026 World Cup matches, the most of any of the other 15 host venues. It will host five group stage matches, two round of 32 matches, one round of 16 match and a semi-final.

Home to the Dallas Cowboys

The Dallas Cowboys have called three different stadiums home during their 64 years of existence. Their original home was the Cotton Bowl (1960-1971), followed by Texas Stadium (1971-2008) and finally their current home, AT&T Stadium (2009-present).

Cotton Bowl



The original Fair Park football stadium was built in 1921 and seated 15,000. That wooden structure was razed in 1930 and construction began on what is now the Cotton Bowl. The original seating capacity of the stadium was 46,200 and built at a cost of \$328,000. In January 1936, Fair Park Stadium was officially renamed The Cotton Bowl in recognition of the fact that more cotton was raised within 200 miles of Dallas than any other town in America. Later additions of upper decks on each side increased capacity to 75,504 by the time the Cowboys arrived in 1960. From 1960 into the 1971 season, the

Cowboys called the Cotton Bowl home, posting a 45-33-4 record, including a 2-2 mark in postseason. Until 2009, the largest home crowd in club history was the 80,259 fans that packed into the Cotton Bowl on Nov. 24, 1966 to watch the Cowboys defeat the Cleveland Browns 26-14 in the inaugural Thanksgiving Day game in Dallas.

Texas Stadium



Texas Stadium, a football facility built at a cost of \$35 million in 1971, was the home of the Dallas Cowboys for 38 seasons and hosted its final game on Dec. 20, 2008 against the Baltimore Ravens. The Cowboys opened their facility on Oct. 24, 1971 with a 44-21 victory over New England. During that time, the Cowboys posted a 213-100 record (.681), including a 16-6 (.727) mark in the postseason, at home. Located in the Dallas suburb of Irving, Texas Stadium had a seating capacity of 65,581 and featured 381 luxury suites, 52 concession stands, 40 specialty stands, 86 restrooms, 115 drinking fountains and 130 acres of parking. Texas Stadium's most unique feature was the partial roof which covered fans from inclement weather but left the game outdoors. The Cowboys incorporated the design feature in their current home, which also includes a retractable roof.



AT&T Stadium AT&T STADIUM

On Nov. 2, 2004, the voters of Arlington approved a public-private partnership with the Dallas Cowboys to build a state-of-the-art, retractable roof stadium in Arlington, Texas. Located in the heart of Arlington's entertainment district, construction on the stadium began in April 2006 and was completed early in the summer of 2009.



The largest NFL stadium ever built was designed to enhance the international Cowboys brand with its modern progressive architecture while incorporating elements of the Texas Stadium heritage such as the shape of the roof's opening, the Ring of Honor and Tom Landry statue.

The 3.0-million-square-foot stadium has a capacity of up to 100,000. The stadium features signature monumental arches, an expansive retractable roof, massive glass retractable end zone doors, a distinguishing canted glass wall and one of the world's largest center-hung HD video board.

"The challenge for us with this stadium was to innovate, but at the same time never forget to acknowledge tradition," said Jerry Jones, owner, president and general manager, Dallas Cowboys. "This stadium embodies the spirit of the Dallas Cowboys, and that starts with the familiar 'hole in the roof.' What we have designed is a building we believe is both architecturally significant and also reflects the emotion and competition that goes on inside."

The stadium was designed by HKS Architects, one of the top stadium designers in the world. The stadium was renamed AT&T Stadium on July 25, 2013 after the Cowboys and AT&T announced a long-term agreement.

The 2009 season rang in a new era for the Dallas Cowboys as the club moved to its new home in Arlington, Texas to kick off the 2009 season. Officially opened on May 27, 2009 in a ribbon cutting ceremony, then named Cowboys Stadium hosted the first Cowboys game on Aug. 21 - a preseason contest against the Tennessee Titans. The first regular season Cowboys game was on September 20 against the N.Y. Giants, and the game set an NFL attendance record at 105,121.

Not only is the stadium home to the Dallas Cowboys, but it played host to Super Bowl XLV on February 6, 2011, the first Super Bowl in the region. This venue is also home to the annual Goodyear Cotton Bowl Classic, Big 12 Championship, as well as annual college football games. On Jan. 12, 2015, AT&T Stadium hosted the first ever College Football Playoff National Championship Game, and the venue is also a part of the rotation for the College Football Playoff semifinal games. In April 2014, the stadium hosted the NCAA Men's Basketball Final Four.

Key Design Highlights

★ **Monumental Arches** – The stadium features two monumental arches, soaring 292 feet above the playing field, which support a retractable roof. As the longest single span roof structure in the world, each boxed arch is 17 feet wide by 35 feet deep. Weighing 3,255 tons each, these impressive structures span a quarter mile (1,290 feet) in length. As one of the first components to be constructed, the arches form a striking silhouette on the Arlington landscape as sunlight reflects against the metallic surface during the day.




★ **Retractable Roof** – Designed to be open or closed, depending on weather conditions, the expansive retractable roof is the largest of its kind in the world and measures approximately 661,000 square feet. When closed, the roof encompasses 104 million cubic feet of volume, making it the largest enclosed NFL stadium. The retractable roof is designed specifically to emulate the opening at Texas Stadium, which was recognized around the world, and allows views inward and outward. Each panel can open or close in 10 minutes. The entire playing field can be seen from directly above.

★ **Retractable Doors** – The stadium features the largest retractable end zone doors in the world. Each has a five-leaf, clear, retractable opening measuring 120 feet high by 180 feet wide. The five 38-foot panels take only six minutes to open or close. By using clear glass for the door panels, spectators experience panoramic vistas from within the seating bowl and when circulating through the stadium concourses. Moreover, the operability provides air circulation during game-day and non-game-day events.

★ **Center-Hung Videoboard** – Within the seating bowl, Cowboys fans are provided with a one-of-a-kind feature unlike any other in the world, a center-hung videoboard. Hanging 90 feet above

the field from the roof structure, the innovative videoboard center spans between the 20-yard lines and features four individual boards – two facing the sidelines and two facing the end zones. The sideline boards measure 160 feet wide by 72 feet tall while those facing the end zones measure 53 feet by 30 feet. All four boards are angled toward the stands for optimal viewing. The stunning combination of these boards immerses spectators with video imagery, creating a premium on upper level seats and presenting the game in a way never before experienced. The center-hung video board now features UHD Resolution utilizing 450 million pixels and HDR Color Rendition.



★ **Canted Glass Wall** – One of the most compelling architectural features of the stadium design is the canted glass exterior wall. The 86-foot high glass, curtain-wall surface slopes outwardly at a 14 degree angle to create a luminescent glow day or night. A fritted glass system transitions up the elevation to create a dynamic, ever-changing aesthetic depending on the time of day. At night, a series of internal lights gently wash the glass wall to create a glow across the facade.

★ **Suites** – The design includes over 300 suites that have been decentralized and are in eight locations distributed across five separate levels of the stadium. The most unique are the field-level sideline suites for up-close and personal viewing of the games.

Design Statistics

★ **Total Square Footage:** 3.0 million square feet. The entire Statue of Liberty and its base could fit into the stadium with the roof closed. The stadium is also the world's largest column-free room. The American Airlines Center in Dallas could fit entirely into the stadium at field level.

★ **Interior Cubic Volume:** 104 million cubic feet. (By comparison, NRG Stadium in Houston measures 90 million cubic feet.) AT&T Stadium is the largest enclosed stadium (in cubic feet) in the NFL.

★ **Seating Capacity:** With ticketed areas in the end zone plazas and platforms, capacity can reach over 100,000.


★ **Suites:** There are over 300 suites in eight different locations on five separate levels of the stadium. Field-level suites are available on the sidelines as well as in the end zones for up-close and personal viewing of the games. The Optum Hall of Fame level suites are 20 rows from the field, making them some of the closest elevated suites in the NFL.

★ **Domed Roof:** At 661,000 square feet, the stadium is the largest domed structure in North America.

★ **Retractable Roof:** The open roof design that was a unique feature of Texas Stadium was carried over into the design of the stadium, with the improvement of a new retractable feature, revealing an opening that measures 256 feet wide and 410 feet long. Two bi-parting mechanized roof panels are driven by a rack-and-pinion drive system consisting of 64 7.5 HP electric motors, making it the first of its kind in the world. The open/close time is 10 minutes.

★ **Arches:** The roof is supported by two 35-feet deep and 17-feet wide boxed arch trusses. Each truss spans nearly a quarter mile (1,290 feet) making the roof one of the longest clear-span structures in the world. The arches are more than twice the length of the Gateway Arch in St. Louis.

★ **Glass Retractable Doors:** Each end zone features a five-leaf clear glass retractable door measuring 120 feet high and 180 feet wide, making it the tallest movable glass wall in the world.



As the largest NFL venue ever built, the stadium boasts the most spectacular column-free room in the world, stretching a quarter-mile in length. Encasing 3.0 million square feet, the majestic scale of the stadium measures twice the distance of the St. Louis Gateway arch. In addition, the Statue of Liberty can stand completely inside the room structure. The length of the arches spans the same distance as the height of the Empire State Building. The magnitude of the stadium's size and scale places it on the world's stage of iconic structures.

On July 25, 2013, two iconic American brands - the Dallas Cowboys and AT&T - jointly announced an expansion of their long-standing relationship to include a new name for the team's home, AT&T Stadium, as well as plans to create an innovative, mobile-first experience for fans.



"AT&T is an iconic American leader that has guided the path of communication in the world for more than 100 years," said Cowboys owner Jerry Jones. "Our stadium has always been about providing fans with an unsurpassed experience in the area of technology. With AT&T, we are growing our relationship with one of the world's strongest and most innovative companies to ultimately provide fans with the latest cutting-edge technology for many years to come."

The name change is reflected in substantial signage updates throughout the building, prominently featuring AT&T, both inside and outside of the stadium. The Cowboys and AT&T work together to deliver an interactive game day experience for fans like no other. AT&T and the Cowboys continue to invest in advanced mobile technology in and around AT&T Stadium to benefit all visitors.

AT&T Stadium - What Fans Need to Know

★ Access

One of the great assets Arlington has is accessibility to the entire metroplex. There are 14 approaches from major highways into AT&T Stadium in Arlington. From a regional standpoint, the stadium is one of the most accessible venues ever planned.

★ Parking

It is estimated that between parking under control of the Cowboys, as well as entrepreneurial lots around the stadium, there are as many as 30,000 parking spaces available to fans on game day.

★ Outdoors Areas and Open End Zones

The stadium design incorporates two open end zones with glass retractable doors measuring 120 feet high and 180 feet wide, making them the tallest glass retractable doors in the world. Outside these doors, one in each end zone – along with the three party decks in each end zone – create over 420,000 square feet of entertainment space (approximately 10 acres). Media boards and large-screen monitors add entertainment to the area, and create a festival atmosphere, making these areas a great space for people to gather before, during and after events to socialize. The field is 50 feet below ground level, so fans entering on the ground floor will have a panoramic view over the field. The end zone area has the flexibility to convert from standing-room only to seating, based on specific event needs.

★ Video Boards

There are approximately 3,000 televisions in the building, with the most unique being the four board cluster that is suspended 90 feet directly over the center of the playing surface. The board runs from the 20-yard line to the 20-yard line - measuring 160 feet in length and 72 feet in height - making it one of the world's largest center-hung video board installations, setting a Guinness Book World Record. The center video board allows fans on all levels to view the game in crisp, clear images during the game. This creates a premium on the value of the upper-level seats and makes the game more exciting for all fans.

★ Amenities and Restrooms

The stadium features 824 concession points of sale as well as more than 1,800 toilets. Some of the restrooms are reversible based on the needs of the event.

★ Ring of Honor

Members of the Dallas Cowboys Ring of Honor are forever honored on the wall surrounding the field, emblazoned with the same letters and numbers that originally hung proudly at Texas Stadium.

★ Miller Lite®House

Located on the west side of AT&T Stadium, Miller Lite®House is the place to go for all pre-game tailgating and post-game celebrations. Fans can grab an ice-cold Miller Lite before finding a seat under the canopy of trees and watching the game on one of over 50 large screen TVs. Or, grab your friends and head over to the 80-yard replica Cowboys field for some tailgate games. Miller Lite®House is also a key location for Dallas Cowboys NFL Season Rally Days and national and local destination music and culinary events year round at AT&T Stadium.

- ★ **August 7, 2009** – Stadium artwork unveiled featuring 23 pieces with 13 specially commissioned for the stadium, including: Franz Ackermann, Mel Bochner, Olafur Eliasson, Teresita Fernandez, Matthew Ritchie and Lawrence Weiner. The collection now consists of 95 paintings, sculptures and photographs by 62 artists, including 18 specially commissioned pieces.

- ★ **August 21, 2009** – The first Dallas Cowboys game - a preseason contest against the Tennessee Titans - is played at the new stadium in front of 75,720 fans. The Cowboys defeated the Titans 30-10.
- ★ **August 27, 2009** – The Dallas Cowboys hold an open and free practice to the public with 26,460 in attendance - the most ever to attend a Cowboys practice.
- ★ **September 5, 2009** – BYU upsets Oklahoma 14-13 in the first collegiate football game at the stadium in front of 75,437 in the then inaugural Cowboys Classic.
- ★ **September 20, 2009** – The Dallas Cowboys play their first regular season game against the N.Y. Giants in front of an NFL-record crowd of 105,121 but lose the game 33-31.
- ★ **September 28, 2009** – The Dallas Cowboys earn their first win at their new stadium with a 21-7 victory over the Carolina Panthers on Monday Night Football. On the same night, the Guinness World Records certifies that the Cowboys video board is the largest high definition center-hung video display in the world.
- ★ **December 5, 2009** – The stadium hosts the first ever Dr Pepper Big 12 Championship game with Texas defeating Nebraska 13-12 in front of 76,211.
- ★ **January 2010** – Following the conclusion of the NFL's regular season, the Dallas Cowboys set a then single-season club record for tickets distributed (718,055) during eight regular season games.
- ★ **January 2, 2010** – Ole Miss defeats Oklahoma State 21-7 in the first Cotton Bowl Classic game at AT&T Stadium in front of 77,928 - the then second-largest crowd in Cotton Bowl history.
- ★ **January 9, 2010** – The Dallas Cowboys host their first home playoff game at the stadium, and with a 34-14 victory over the Philadelphia Eagles in front of 92,951, earn their first playoff win in 13 years.
- ★ **February 14, 2010** – The stadium hosts the 2010 NBA All-Star Game in front of 108,713 fans, setting attendance records for the most at an NBA All-Star Game, most to witness a basketball game (college or pro) and the largest crowd in American professional sports history. The East defeats the West, 141-139.
- ★ **March 13, 2010** – Manny Pacquiao defeats Joshua Clottey in the first boxing match at the stadium in front of 50,944 in attendance - the then second-largest attendance for a boxing event in the state of Texas.
- ★ **December 10, 17 & 18, 2010** – Six ULL Texas state championship football games, including five games over a two-day span, are played at the stadium for the first time.
- ★ **February 6, 2011** – The stadium hosts North Texas' first Super Bowl as Green Bay beats Pittsburgh 31-25 in Super Bowl XLV in front of 103,219 - the fourth-largest Super Bowl attendance figure.
- ★ **March 29 & 32, 2013** – The stadium hosts the 2013 NCAA Men's Basketball South Regional Semifinals and finals - with more than 77,000 fans on hand to watch the Sweet 16 and Elite 8.
- ★ **July 25, 2013** – The stadium was renamed AT&T Stadium on July 25, 2013 after the Cowboys and AT&T announced a long term agreement.
- ★ **April 5-7, 2014** – AT&T Stadium hosts its first NCAA Men's Basketball Final Four between Connecticut, Florida, Kentucky and Wisconsin over two days. In the semifinals, 79,444 are in attendance to mark the largest crowd ever for a college basketball game, the largest crowd for an NCAA Final Four game and the largest crowd for the semifinals in NCAA history. UConn defeats Florida 63-53 and Kentucky downs Wisconsin 74-73. In the NCAA Championship Game, UConn is victorious over Kentucky 60-54 as the largest crowd for an NCAA Basketball Championship Game at 79,238 cheer on the event. The combined attendance of 158,682 is the largest two-day attendance ever for the event.
- ★ **June 7, 2014** – Country megastar George Strait brings his "The Cowboy Rides Away" Tour to AT&T Stadium with the largest crowd for an indoor concert in North American history at 104,793 in attendance.
- ★ **January 4, 2015** – The inaugural College Football Playoff National Championship is played at AT&T Stadium between Ohio State and Oregon. The Buckeyes defeat the Ducks 42-20 with 85,689 in attendance.
- ★ **April 19, 2015** – The Academy of Country Music Awards hosts its 50th Anniversary awards show at AT&T Stadium and sets the Guinness World Record for the attendance at an Awards Show Broadcast with 70,252.
- ★ **April 3, 2016** – WrestleMania 32 makes its mark in North Texas when 101,763 attend the event which sets a new WWE attendance record. It also serves as the fifth-highest attended event at AT&T Stadium.
- ★ **April 26-28, 2018** – AT&T Stadium becomes the first NFL stadium to host an NFL Draft. The NFL Draft Experience set an opening Day 1 of the Draft attendance record as over 100,000 people attended the free event on the first night of the NFL Draft. Overall, more than 200,000 fans attended the three-day event.
- ★ **August 2018** – The Dallas Cowboys celebrate 10 years for games and events at AT&T Stadium since the building opened its doors in 2009.
- ★ **December 2019** – AT&T Stadium is named Facility of the Decade by *Sports Business Journal*.
- ★ **September-December 2020** – AT&T Stadium allows fans at all eight regular season home games in 2020, becoming one-of-19 NFL teams to host fans during the COVID-19 pandemic. Additionally, the Cowboys average over 27,000 fans-per-game, the highest attendance in the NFL during the 2020 season.
- ★ **January 1, 2021** – The Rose Bowl is moved to AT&T Stadium due to the growing number of COVID-19 cases in Southern California and is only the second time in the prestigious game's history that it has been moved out of state, and the first since 1942 during World War II. The 107th Rose Bowl and College Football Semifinal Game saw Alabama down Notre Dame, 31-14 in front of a limited crowd of 18,373.
- ★ **May 8, 2021** – Canelo Alvarez returns to AT&T Stadium for the second time in a super middleweight unification fight against Billy Joe Saunders, who he defeats between the eighth and ninth rounds with 73,126 in attendance - the largest indoor attendance for a boxing event in the United States. The previous mark was 63,350 for the Muhammad Ali-Leon Spinks rematch in 1978.
- ★ **2021 Season** – As the NFL returned to full capacity attendance for all 32 teams during the 2021 season, the Dallas Cowboys once again led the league in home paid attendance in eight games in the regular season with a total of 691,390.
- ★ **June 16, 2022** – The city of Dallas was named one-of-16 host cities for the 2026 FIFA World Cup, with matches to be played at AT&T Stadium.
- ★ **February 4, 2024** – AT&T Stadium is awarded a tournament-high nine matches - including a Semi-final match - during the 2026 FIFA World Cup.







The Star in Frisco

In August 2013, the Dallas Cowboys, in partnership with the City of Frisco and the Frisco Independent School District (FISD), announced plans for The Star in Frisco - a vision that would become home of the Dallas Cowboys World Corporate Headquarters and Training Facility. Officially opened to the public in August 2016, The Star in Frisco is a leading entertainment destination.

The Star is located in Frisco, Texas, a suburb north of Dallas, Texas that boasts more than 200,000 residents. The facility is comprised of four mixed-use developments along the Dallas North Tollway in between Warren Parkway and Lebanon Road.

Plans for the 91-acre mixed-use development quickly grew from the Dallas Cowboys World Corporate Headquarters to become a destination that featured shopping, dining and nightlife, as well as athletic, fitness, health, event, hotel and residential options.

In partnership with the City of Frisco and Frisco ISD, the Cowboys focused on inspiring the next generation of players and fans by uniquely engaging them at the place where the Dallas Cowboys live, work and practice.

The Star became the first NFL training facility in the U.S. that is shared with a public high school athletic program. All 12 Frisco ISD high schools play games within Ford Center at The Star, a state-of-the-art, 510,000-square-foot indoor athletic facility. With a capacity of 12,000 seats, Ford Center hosts a variety of events in addition to football games, such as the Academy of Country Music Awards, professional boxing, lacrosse and soccer matches, collegiate basketball tournaments, concerts, meetings and more.

"Moving from Valley Ranch to The Star was bittersweet," said Jerry Jones, owner and president, Dallas Cowboys. "We had a lot of history and memories there, but what is exciting now is what we've built at The Star that goes beyond just the Dallas Cowboys team. It involves these young, talented athletes from Frisco ISD; it involves the entire Frisco community with what we offer from training, health and wellness, to dining, entertainment, shopping and more. We've put our heart and soul into this next chapter for the Cowboys, and we love watching fans experience everything that The Star has to offer."

The Cowboys worked with several companies to develop all elements of The Star, including Manhattan Construction Group, Gensler, O'Brien Architects, iCRAVE, Advent Design Corp., Kimley-Horn and Associates, Walter P. Moore, and Henderson Engineers, Inc.

The Cowboys officially moved into The Star in July 2016 and held the first event in Ford Center on August 27, 2016: The Star Kickoff presented by Whataburger - a one-day event that featured eight FISD high school varsity football teams.

Key Design Highlights

★ **Ford Center at The Star** – Ford Center at The Star is a state-of-the-art, 510,000-square-foot indoor athletic facility shared by the Dallas Cowboys, the City of Frisco and Frisco ISD's 12 high schools. It seats 12,000 in folding fixed seats and features an interior video board (1,824 square feet) and an exterior video board (2,270 square feet). The exterior video board is one of the largest in high school sports. Beyond high school football, Ford Center hosts a variety of events including concerts, boxing matches, soccer games, marching band competitions, lacrosse and more. Ford Center at The Star is home to Dallas Cowboys Football Operations, including its locker room, training room, coaches' offices, team rooms, training table and hydrotherapy. Frisco ISD has a dedicated side to Ford Center that includes a locker room, training room, press area and coaches' offices. Ford Center at The Star boasts one indoor and two outdoor (one turf and one natural grass) NFL and University Interscholastic League (UIL) compliant practice fields. It includes four luxury suites and a premium hospitality area that overlooks the indoor stadium and outdoor practice fields.

★ **War Room at The Star** – The NFL Draft is conducted in a state-of-the-art war room outfitted with advanced technology and adorned with Dallas Cowboys historical draft documents. The room is approximately 40' x 30', and on Draft Day, is filled with about 40 people (20-25 coaches, 12-15 scouts, several team trainers/executives). A large (roughly 20' x 7'), fully interactive video wall exists at the front of the room and is comprised of a 0.7 pixel pitch microLED video wall with a custom collaboration software package. In addition, the room includes four 4K multi-touch displays - two, 98-inch, and two, 76-inch - on a wall to be used for side-by-side comparison of two players doing the same exercise/running the same play during a game. A display case in the hallway outside of the war room contains three historical draft books with notable evaluations of Cowboys legends, such as Troy Aikman, Michael Irvin and Emmitt Smith, and one high-tech, animated draft book that "scribbles" notes and plays video clips. The room is open to the public for tours of The Star, and fans have the chance to win a "War Room Experience" in a continued partnership with the Texas Lottery.

★ **Outdoor Entertainment at The Star** – The 40,500-square-foot Tostitos Championship Plaza is where Times Square meets town square. Located at the heart of The Star, it features a 2,270-square-foot video board, interactive displays and other video boards, a 50-yard football field for community activities, a 10,000-square-foot Dallas Cowboys Pro Shop that sells team apparel, fashion, souvenirs and memorabilia, as well as Miller Lite@House at The Star which offers the opportunity to experience the feeling of game day, every day. In addition, the Dallas Cowboys Ring of Honor Walk presented by Dr Pepper, leads up to Ford Center, and highlights key players in Cowboys history. The Star also features "Huddle", a large outdoor sculpture by internationally acclaimed sculptor Tom Friedman, as part of the Dallas Cowboys Art Collection.

★ **Baylor Scott & White Sports Therapy & Research at The Star** – Opened in the summer of 2018, the 300,000-square-foot campus, named Baylor Scott & White Sports Therapy & Research at The Star, focuses on injury prevention, research and wellness for athletes of all levels, and has become



a nationally recognized model for the holistic treatment of physically active individuals. It is also a first-of-its-kind collaboration between an NFL team, a health system and a school district - Frisco ISD. The initial phase of the project included an ambulatory surgery center, a diagnostic imaging center, physical therapy, a preventive care program for athletes and several other health care offerings.

★ **Cowboys Club** – Cowboys Club, located at The Star, is an exclusive, members-only club designed to provide one-of-a-kind experiences for members and their guests. Cowboys Club overlooks the Dallas Cowboys practice fields and Ford Center field, allowing a bird's-eye view of the Cowboys and Frisco ISD games and camps. The club venue features multiple bar and dining options, including a five-star restaurant, as well as a terrace where members can dine. Cowboys Club hosts daily, members-only events, and each member has access to meeting rooms and catering to both business and private gatherings. The Cowboys began selling Cowboys Club memberships on January 12, 2016, and sold out approximately one month later on February 15, 2016. Cowboys Summer Training Camp



The Dallas Cowboys return to Oxnard, California to open their 65th training camp in 2024.

This year marks the 18th time the Cowboys will have spent at least a portion of their training camp in Oxnard, and the 45th overall training camp in California.

Dallas came back to the west coast after training in the Alamodome in San Antonio prior to the 2011 season. Since 2001, the Cowboys have held training camp in Oxnard (2001, 2004-06, 2008, 2010 and 2012-19, 21-23), and/or Wichita Falls (2001) and/or San Antonio (2007, 2009, 2010 and 2011) and/or Frisco (2017-23).

Dallas will also hold a portion of its training camp at its home in Frisco, Texas, the eighth time the Cowboys will have training camp practices in Frisco.

Training Camp History

June 3, 1960 – The newly formed Dallas Cowboys franchise announced that it will train at Pacific University in Forest Grove, Oregon. Rookies reported on July 9.

May 24, 1961 – Due to its proximity to their first exhibition game against Minnesota in Minneapolis, the Dallas Cowboys move training camp to St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minn. Camp opened on July 9.

June 8, 1962 – The Dallas Cowboys move their training camp site to the campus of Northern Michigan College on the shores of Lake Superior in Marquette, Mich. Rookies reported on July 13.

July 12, 1963 – Because the team played three of its first four preseason games on the west coast, the Dallas Cowboys moved training camp to California Lutheran College in Thousand Oaks, Calif. This camp, which was the first of 27 at CLC, opened on July 12.

Dec. 6, 1989 – For the first time in the 30-year history of the team, the Dallas Cowboys trained in Texas as the club announced its 1990 training camp would be held at St. Edward's University in Austin, Texas. This camp, the first of eight at St. Ed's, opened on July 22.

Feb. 17, 1998 – The Cowboys begin a four-year stay at Midwestern State University in Wichita Falls, Texas, with their 1998 camp. The first camp at Midwestern State University opened on July 16. In 2001, the Cowboys split camp between Midwestern State and the Residence Inn in Oxnard, Calif., spending two weeks at each location.

May 17, 2002 – The Cowboys continue their commitment to fans in the state of Texas by announcing the 2002 training camp will take place at the Alamodome in San Antonio, Texas. The camp, which ran for four weeks, opened on July 26. The Cowboys returned to the Alamodome again in 2003.

Oct. 24, 2003 – The Cowboys announce a return to California for training camp. For the 2004-06 seasons, the Cowboys conduct their entire training camp in Oxnard, Calif., at the Residence Inn at River Ridge, using practice fields provided by The City of Oxnard. The Cowboys opened their first returned camp on July 30, 2004.

May 4, 2006 – The Dallas Cowboys announce a five-year commitment to once again call the City of San Antonio its summer home beginning in 2007. The Alamodome, which played host to Cowboys training camps in 2002 and 2003 will again be the site for the team's summer practice sessions.

Summer, 2010 – The Dallas Cowboys held a split camp, spending the first portion in the Alamodome in San Antonio and the second at the Residence Inn at River Ridge in Oxnard.

July, 2012 – The Dallas Cowboys returned to Oxnard, California for all of training camp at the Residence Inn at River Ridge after spending the 2011 training camp in San Antonio at the Alamodome.

August, 2017 – After spending the first four weeks of training camp in Oxnard, California, the Dallas Cowboys returned home to hold their first ever training camp practices at their new practice facility at The Star in Frisco. Six training camp practices were held inside Ford Center and open to the public.

August, 2020 – For the first time in franchise history, the Cowboys spent all of training camp at The Star in Frisco due to COVID-19 restrictions.

July, 2021 – The Cowboys return to Oxnard, California for training camp after spending 2020 training in Frisco.





Throughout the 1960s, the Dallas Cowboys held tryouts for local high school students to cheer for the Dallas Cowboys at the Cotton Bowl. By the early 1970s, an effort was underway to enhance the glamour, excitement, and entertainment value of the NFL gameday experience. Director Dee Brock hired choreographer, Texie Waterman, who auditioned dancers and taught her signature Broadway-style routines. In 1972, Tex Schramm and Dee Brock joined forces with local designer, Paula Van Wagoner, and introduced Texas Stadium to the reimagined Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders. Wearing the classic star-spangled blue and white uniform, the Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders became an international phenomenon.

By the mid-seventies, the squad's national popularity created such a sensation that two top-rated, made-for-tv movies, were produced. The DCC have made guest appearances on national television shows such as, 'The Love Boat', 'Saturday Night Live', 'The Oprah Winfrey Show', 'Family Feud', 'David Letterman', 'The Today Show', 'American Idol', and 'American Ninja Warrior'. Benefiting charity, they competed on '1 versus 100', 'Are You Smarter Than a Fifth Grader', and 'Identity'. For more than two decades, they produced 'The Making of the Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders Swimsuit Calendar' television special for network and social media distribution. With 16 Seasons of 'Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders: Making the Team', the DCC became the subject of Country Music Television's longest running and highest rated TV show in CMT history earning them a Critics Choice Award nomination. Premiering summer 2024 the new Netflix series, 'America's Sweethearts: Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders,' provides a dazzling showcase of the iconic cheerleading squad's journey through the 2023-24 season. The documentary offers an unfiltered look at the rigorous auditions, intense training camp and electric atmosphere of performing at AT&T Stadium, giving viewers a front-row seat to the dedication and dynamics that define America's Sweethearts.

In 1979 the Department of Defense requested the Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders presence on a South Korean USO Tour during the Christmas holidays. These collaborative efforts over the past four decades have evolved into 85 tours spanning 42 countries. The DCC bring their own special brand of goodwill and gratitude to the military personnel and their families traveling to diverse locations such as Iraq, Bosnia, Afghanistan, Cuba, Korea, and the Persian Gulf. In recognition of their distinguished service to American Troops, the Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders were presented the 'USO's 50th Anniversary Award' in 1991, and the Department of Defense presented the squad with the first ever 'Spirit of Hope Award' in 1997. They were inducted into the Veterans of Foreign Wars Hall of Fame in 2002, and in 2013, the DCC were awarded the American Legion's prestigious Distinguished Service Medal. The Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders are the only group, to date, to be recognized with all four of these honors.

The DCC continue to have a tremendous impact on sports and entertainment. 'America's Sweethearts' are recognized around the world as an elite performance group and, while they are often imitated, their iconic uniform is one of the most well-known symbols of pop culture. In 2018 the uniform was donated to the Sports Entertainment and Pop Culture Collection in the Smithsonian National Museum of American History.

While the DCC grace the sidelines of AT&T Stadium, they are also active in their community, making annual visits to children's hospitals, veteran's hospitals, senior living centers and elementary schools. They are also in demand throughout the year at festivals, sporting events, corporate conventions and headliner concerts around the country. They frequently appear on national magazine covers, television commercials and films. Their annual calendar collection includes a swimsuit calendar, sideline action calendar, cameo calendar and a 120-page special edition of The Dallas Cowboys Star Magazine.

The Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders are truly extraordinary dancers with impressive careers in education, law, nursing, and accounting, just to name a few. Chief Brand Officer/Co-Owner, Charlotte Jones, has entrusted the leadership of the squad to Director Kelli McGonagill Finglass and Head Choreographer Judy Trammell. This dynamic duo, driven by the highest of standards, has consistently led this time-tested group of diverse women for over 30 years. Often imitated, never equaled... they are 'America's Sweethearts'.

The talented group of men and women who make up "DCRB" entertain audiences from around the world as they enter the plazas of AT&T Stadium before each game. After every Cowboys score during the game, the Rhythm and Blue Dancers & Drumline dazzle fans with captivating celebration per-

formances. The Rhythm and Blue Dancers were conceptualized under the direction of Dallas Cowboys Executive Vice President/Chief Brand Officer Charlotte Jones. It is the first and only entertainment concept of its kind in the NFL.

The Dallas Cowboys Rhythm and Blue is a two-part entertainment entity. The percussion troop drumline masters the rhythm, and the dance team moves the spirit of Cowboys Nation true blue. Music from cutting edge drum cadences and dynamic routines featuring a strong level of breakdancing and hip-hop based movement combine to form an electrifying fan favorite! In the short period of time since its inception, the remarkably high level of performances and choreography has garnered DCRB national attention and prestige. Inside Dance Magazine and notable industry insiders say that DCRB is changing the face of sports entertainment! The group has been showcased at international competitions and has been requested to appear at both charity and corporate appearances in the DFW metroplex, Texas, New Mexico, Las Vegas, Nevada and Panama City, Panama, and has garnered national acclaim with their "Back to Football" halftimes featuring the Kinjaz & Super Cr3w from NBC's hit television show, "World of Dance."

The Rookie Squad fosters an opportunity for these extraordinary performers to gain valuable dance and performance training to grow as professional performers.

Jenny Durbin Smith leads DCRB and the Rookie Squad with her expertise and award-winning choreography as director and head choreographer for the team. Durbin Smith has been choreographing for 20 years for teams such as the NFL Pro Bowl Cheerleaders, Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders, Dallas Mavericks Dancers, Dallas Desperados Dancers, The Officials, NFL & NBA Pro Cheerleader Conventions and numerous NBA, college, high school and studio competition teams. She has also lent her skills to several national television commercials, television shows, touring stage shows and promotions such as Oprah's Vision Tour in Dallas, 'America's Got Talent', Mary Kay, Hasbro,

MTV's 'TRL', 'Queen of the South' and Monday Night Football. Durbin Smith uses her extensive dance experience and authentic coaching style to fashion a one-of-a-kind entertainment concept within the professional sports arena.

The DCRB and Rookie Squad uniforms were created by Jenny Durbin Smith in partnership with Rebel Athletic, a proud partner of the Dallas Cowboys Rhythm and Blue Dancers. The uniform bears the standard of a contemporary, stylish and hip Cowboys image while keeping the tradition and excellence of America's Team.

The Dallas Cowboys are known globally as pioneers of game-day entertainment. "We want to revolutionize sports entertainment by thinking 'outside of the box' and bringing content that is innovative, dynamic and unique to the world of professional sports entertainment, while also complimenting our existing game-day elements," Durbin Smith says of DCRB. THE MISSION. Gene and Jerry Jones Family Arlington Youth Foundation's mission is to enhance the quality of life of youth of the City of Arlington by funding programs and facilities dedicated to football and athletics, health and wellness, education and the arts through matching grants.

As part of their commitment to the City of Arlington, Texas - home of AT&T Stadium - the Jones Family has pledged to donate \$16.5 million to organizations supporting Arlington youth over 33 years through the Gene and Jerry Jones Family Arlington Youth Foundation. The Board of Directors includes Jerry Jones, Gene Jones, Charlotte Jones, Arlington Mayor Jim Ross, and Arlington City Manager Trey Yelverton.

AISD Back to School Kickoff

Since its inception in 2015, the Gene and Jerry Jones Family Arlington Youth Foundation has supported the AISD Back to School Kickoff as the presenting sponsor through annual grants and in-kind donations. Held at AT&T Stadium, the annual event provides backpacks, supplies and other support to 10,000 Arlington children in need. Pre-registered students for the Back to School Kickoff receive a complimentary backpack filled with school supplies appropriate to their grade level, free immunizations, vision and dental services as well as haircuts from Arlington ISD cosmetology students from the Dan Dipert Career + Technical Center. The event also includes a robust resource fair where students and their families receive information about low-cost resources for childcare, tutoring, and counseling.

Dallas Cowboys Arlington ISD Art Program

The AISD Fifth Grade Art Program at AT&T Stadium continued during the 2023-24 school year, wherein Arlington ISD fifth and eighth grade students receive the opportunity to tour the Dallas Cowboys Art Collection throughout the year for free, courtesy of The Jones Family. Upon completion of their field trip, each student creates a work of art inspired by the Dallas Cowboys Art Collection, which consists of 95 paintings, sculptures and photographs by 62 artists, including 18 specially commissioned pieces. The students and their families are then invited to an annual spring reception showcasing their work. More than 40,000 AISD fifth and eighth graders have taken art tours of AT&T Stadium since the program's start in 2015, and it will continue in the 2024-25 school year. The goal of the program is to instill an appreciation for art in students at a pivotal grade level, encouraging them to continue the pursuit of art education beyond their elementary and junior high school requirements. The 2023 graduating class of seniors were the first class of fifth grade art students to participate in the program having started in 2015. In celebration of the program milestone, the Dallas Cowboys and AISD implemented program enhancements focused on annually celebrating the graduating seniors enrolled in Art IV with a goal to create continuous growth and success. During the month of December, a curated display of the senior's artwork is showcased at AT&T Stadium for all fans and guests to view. The seniors and their families are then invited to attend a Dallas Cowboys home game to view their art at AT&T Stadium and join Gene Jones on field for a special pre-game recognition. All Art IV seniors are also invited to apply for one of three Dallas Cowboys Art Program Scholarships totaling \$15,000, with winners announced at the annual fifth and eighth grade spring reception at AT&T Stadium.



National Medal of Honor Museum Foundation

The National Medal of Honor Museum Foundation is on a Mission to Inspire America by promoting Medal of Honor values of courage and sacrifice, commitment and integrity, citizenship and patriotism. The Foundation will bring the stories of Medal of Honor recipients, our country's highest recognition for valor in combat, to our nation through a museum located in Arlington, Texas. Housed at the National Medal of Honor Museum, the National Medal of Honor Griffin Institute will focus on character education for students, business professionals and scholars to empower and foster an understanding of the essential elements of character-driven leadership, honor and love of country. Gene and Jerry Jones Family Arlington Youth Foundation and the Dallas Cowboys are proud supporters of the National Medal of Honor Museum Foundation and their mission to inspire a future generation of character driven leaders and specifically their impact within the Arlington community.

Community Outreach and the Dallas Cowboys

THE SALVATION ARMY



The Dallas Cowboys primary community focus is rooted in the Jones Family's longstanding passion for, and commitment to The Salvation Army. From 2010 to 2014, Chief Brand Officer and Co-Owner Charlotte Jones served as chair of The Salvation Army's National Advisory Board - the first woman to ever hold that distinguished title. Gene and Jerry Jones have both served on The Salvation Army's National Advisory Board, as well as the local DFW Metroplex Command's Advisory Board. Red Kettle Campaign

For the past 27 years, the Jones Family has dedicated the Cowboys annual Thanksgiving Day halftime performance as a national showcase to kick off The Salvation Army's iconic Red Kettle Campaign. Under the direction of Charlotte Jones, the Cowboys have produced the annual halftime event and welcomed renowned entertainers from across the musical spectrum. Performers have included Randy Travis, Destiny's Child, Carrie Underwood, The Jonas Brothers, Kenny Chesney, Selena Gomez, Eric Church, Meghan Trainor, Kane Brown and most recently Dolly Parton. Since 1997, The Salvation Army has served more than 800 million people through programs that address homelessness, food insecurity, drug and alcohol abuse, human trafficking and more. In that same period, and with the help of the Dallas Cowboys, the Red Kettle Campaign has raised more than \$3.67 billion to aid the work.



Early Thanksgiving with the Cowboys

Traditionally, the week before Thanksgiving, Gene Jones and Charlotte Jones lead players, cheerleaders, mascot Rowdy and players' and coaches' significant others in serving an early Thanksgiving meal to hundreds of clients receiving assistance from The Salvation Army. With help from partners Albertsons and UnitedHealthcare, the effort has nearly served 12,000 meals. Veteran players and wives serve patrons of the Army's Carr P. Collins Center in Dallas, while rookie players and cheerleaders visit the Army's Mabey Social Services Center in Fort Worth.



The Salvation Army Angel Tree Program

Every year the entire Cowboys organization, its partners and associates support The Salvation Army's Angel Tree program. Players, coaches, executives and staff join corporate partners and leaseholders at The Star in purchasing toys and necessities for hundreds of "Angels" in need. The program, which makes Christmas brighter for nearly 60,000 children and special needs senior citizens in the DFW Metroplex alone, is truly a team effort for the Cowboys.



50/50 Raffle

The Dallas Cowboys launched their 50/50 Raffle program at AT&T Stadium in 2016 with a majority of proceeds benefiting The Salvation Army. Raffle tickets are sold to fans during each home game, with a drawing to determine which lucky fan will split the game's jackpot with The Salvation Army. Since its inception, the effort has grossed more than \$6.3 million dollars, with The Salvation Army receiving approximately half of that amount to support a variety of initiatives from youth outreach to veteran's assistance and domestic violence shelter programs. In 2023 the team's Salute to Service game against the N.Y. Giants (11/12) was dedicated to benefit the National Medal of Honor Museum Foundation in Arlington, Texas.



Gene and Jerry Jones Family North Texas Youth Education Town

Thanks to a \$1 million matching grant from the Gene and Jerry Jones Family Arlington Youth Foundation in concurrence with a donation from the NFL, the Gene and Jerry Jones Family North Texas Youth Education Town (the "YET") officially opened its doors at The Salvation Army Arlington Corps in October 2013. The YET is the legacy project of Super Bowl XLV, providing educational, athletic and arts programs to hundreds of Arlington youth and their families, as well as countless other services. The Jones Family was joined by several distinguished guests in celebrating the center's grand opening, including NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell, National Commander of The Salvation Army Commissioner David Jeffrey and Cowboys Pro Football Hall of Fame running back and chair of the YET Advisory Board Emmitt Smith. The Dallas Cowboys engage with YET programming year-round, providing unique opportunities to the youth enrolled in the center's daily activities.



Disaster Relief

When disaster strikes, The Salvation Army is often first on the scene to offer food, shelter, clothing, spiritual comfort and more. The Cowboys are proud to have assisted the Army in relief efforts in the DFW Metroplex and beyond. Most recently, the Dallas Cowboys utilized the 2020 NFL Draft to raise funds and awareness for The Salvation Army's COVID-19 relief efforts. Collectively, the NFL Family donated more than \$100 million to various COVID-19 outreach efforts.

NATIONAL MEDAL OF HONOR MUSEUM AND SALUTE TO SERVICE OUTREACH

The Dallas Cowboys and NFL take great pride in honoring our nation's military and veterans during Salute to Service campaigns and at other times throughout the year, across multiple locations - at home in the DFW Metroplex, at training camp in California, around the world in partnership with the USO and working closely with the National Medal of Honor Museum to honor the Medal of Honor recipients and the values of courage and sacrifice, commitment and integrity, and citizenship and patriotism.

National Medal of Honor Museum

In 2019 the National Medal of Honor Museum Foundation announced Arlington as the site for the future museum, which will illustrate the historical thread of sacrifice, patriotism and courage that runs through all U.S. military service members, past and present. The National Medal of Honor Museum will also include an education center aimed at character development in our nation's youth. Charlotte Jones, Chief Brand Officer and Co-Owner of the Cowboys, serves as Chairman of the Board for the Museum. In 2020 the Jones Family announced a historic \$20 million donation to the National Medal of Honor Museum, and on March 25th, 2022 National Medal of Honor Day, The National Medal of Honor Museum Foundation (NMOHMF) broke ground on its future home in Arlington, Texas. The first national museum of its kind, currently under construction near AT&T Stadium, is set to open to the public in March 2025.



Salute to Service Week

Salute to Service Week is an annual tradition of the Dallas Cowboys, with a variety of military and veteran related community outreach efforts centered in the week leading up to Veterans Day. With focus on the relationship with the National Medal of Honor Museum, the week's events impact several military demographics - veterans, active-duty soldiers, military spouses, children and more. The 2023 Salute to Service Week events included the NFL Character Playbook and National Medal of Honor Museum Launch Event, National Medal of Honor Museum Hard Hat Tour with the Cowboys Offensive Line, NFL USO Salute to Service Madden Championship Tournament, Operation Shower and much more. Salute to Service Week culminated with the Dallas Cowboys nationally televised match-up against the New York Giants on Nov. 12th.

Salute to Service Game

The Cowboys, alongside the NFL, activate an annual Salute to Service campaign honoring members of all six branches of the military both past and present each fall with an emphasis on the National Medal of Honor Museum. Last season, the Dallas Cowboys culminated the celebration on Nov. 12th at AT&T Stadium vs. the New York Giants by incorporating many special moments throughout pre-game, in-game and halftime. Former President George W. Bush and First Lady Laura Bush took part in the coin toss alongside Tyler Smith, Damone Clark and Israel Mukuamu. Founding Donors who have contributed to the National Medal of Honor Museum project had the opportunity to join the Cowboys official trumpet player Freddie Jones for the playing of the National Anthem while



Medal of Honor Recipients stood shoulder-to-shoulder with the Cowboys. During halftime the Dallas Cowboys recognized current members of all branches of the armed services and 16 Medal of Honor recipients alongside recording artist Lee Greenwood performing his patriotic song, "God Bless the U.S.A.". The Dallas Cowboys 50/50 Raffle for the Salute to Service game changed beneficiaries for the day to benefit the National Medal of Honor Museum. Raffle staff and volunteers traded in their traditional red uniforms for gold, along with signage and promotional collateral. The biggest raffle jackpot in Cowboys 50/50 Raffle history of \$140,436 was split 50/50 between one lucky fan and the National Medal of Honor Museum.

Military Days at Training Camp

During summer training camp in Oxnard, California, and at The Star in Frisco, the Cowboys provide military families of nearby military installations - notably the Naval Base Ventura County at Point Mugu, Fort Hood in Killeen, TX and the Naval Air Station Joint Reserve Base in Fort Worth - with special opportunities to interact with the team before and after training camp practices. Additionally, the Cowboys support the local chapters of Merging Vets & Players (MVP) in DFW and Oxnard throughout the year. In 2023 Head Coach Mike McCarthy was recognized with the Catalyst Award at the National MVP Awards Gala for his support of MVP and his outstanding commitment to fostering unity and strengthening community bonds.



Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders USO Tours

The world-famous Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders organization - America's Sweethearts - is completely subsidized by the club for the primary purpose of spreading goodwill on a local, national and international platform. Aside from their obvious game day presence and numerous local community appearances, the Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders have participated in USO visits to troops in more than 200 locations since their first tour on Christmas Day 1979. In 2024 the Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders participated in their 85th tour visiting four military bases across South Korea; Camp Walker, Camp Humphreys, Camp Casey and Camp Bonifas. The Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders hosted dance performances, a youth cheer clinic, and meet and greets with service members and families.



YOUTH FOOTBALL OUTREACH

The values learned through team sport carry over to everyday life and provide important skills and tools for success. From camps to in-school character programming to health and safety clinics, the Dallas Cowboys are working year-round to grow the love and excitement of playing football in youth.

The Dallas Cowboys FLAG-In-Schools Curriculum

As part of the NFL effort to grow the game of flag football across the country, the Dallas Cowboys are working with NFL FLAG and GenYOUTH to provide elementary schools across North Texas the opportunity to add flag football to physical education classes through the NFL FLAG-In-Schools program. The NFL FLAG-In-Schools program has helped more than 16 million students get active since 2014. Each program kit donated to Dallas ISD will include: 10 age-appropriate footballs; 50 flag belts; participation certificates; access to the official standards-based NFL FLAG-In-Schools football curriculum developed by SHAPE America; NFL FLAG-In-Schools Rules of the game in both English and Spanish; as well as 101 Teaching Nutrition Tips. In 2023, the Dallas Cowboys launched a three-year initiative to provide all 141 Dallas ISD elementary schools with the NFL FLAG-In-Schools program. The initial donation of 75 FLAG-In-Schools kits to Dallas ISD made an immediate impact to 30,000 youth. Through the Dallas Cowboys partnership with the Texas Lottery, the club's three-year commitment to Dallas ISD was realized two years early with the remaining 141 elementary schools receiving their NFL-FLAG-In-Schools program kit, bringing the total youth impact to Dallas ISD to more than 75,000 students. Going into the 2024-25 school year, the Dallas Cowboys plan to similarly saturate Arlington ISD and Fort Worth ISD elementary schools with the NFL FLAG-In-Schools curriculum, providing school access to flag football to an additional 54,000 students.



High School Girls Flag Football

In 2022 in an effort to introduce the game of football to a broader audience, the Dallas Cowboys partnered with the NFL, NFL FLAG, the NFL Foundation and Nike to support the varsity girls flag football league in Fort Worth ISD (FWISD). The FWISD girls flag football league is one of the first scholastically organized female flag efforts for a public school system in the State of Texas. In its second pilot year, FWISD fielded 16 teams representing 15 different high schools with more than 400 girls suited up to play. The long-term goal of the pilot program is to have the sport adopted statewide as a recognized Title IX activity. In addition to the flag league, the team also hosts a one-day girls flag football Jamboree in partnership with Nike which takes approximately 200 female student athletes through skills and drill stations. New for 2023, Bridgestone joined the Cowboys to help grow the game of girls flag football directly in school communities across North Texas. The Girls Flag On Tour Driven by Bridgestone brings flag football camp experiences to school campus for middle and high school girls that have interest, but may not have ever been offered the option to play.



Community Camps & Field Days

The Dallas Cowboys work with non-profits and local school districts to host free community camps for those youth who might otherwise have barriers to attendance or may need special adaptations to their camp experience. In partnership with Nike, the Dallas Cowboys hosted community camps for students served by St. Philips School and Community Center and The Salvation Army in the neighborhoods where these children live and play. Campers were provided an authentic Dallas Cowboys youth camp experience, t-shirt and goodie bag, as well as lunch. To demonstrate how adaptable the game of football can be, the club also partnered with Special Olympics and the Texas Lottery for an inclusive Field Day at Ford Center in Frisco and the Boys & Girls Club of Collin County with help from Smoothie King to allow students of all socio-economic means to enjoy the game.



Community Quarterback Challenge

The Dallas Cowboys Community Quarterback Challenge asks North Texas high school football teams to execute a community service project that impacts their campus, feeder schools or neighboring community. Student-athletes can apply for grant funds provided by Gene and Jerry Jones Family Foundation to complete their efforts. Projects include community beautification endeavors, courtyard refurbishments, elementary-focused reading initiatives and more. Through the volunteerism effort, teams complete and execute their project "game plans" with community service "Huddles" across the year. More than 1,200 student athletes participated in the 2023-24 program, giving back to their respective schools and communities.



NFL Athletic Trainer Program

Through a matching grant opportunity with the NFL Foundation, the Cowboys partner with Arlington ISD to provide certified Athletic Trainers for fall football, spring wrestling, spring soccer and other special athletic events involving Arlington junior high school athletes. Over the course of the 2023-24 school year, certified athletic trainers visited games, schools and practice sites, detecting and monitoring the treatment of concussions and other sports-related injuries.

High School Coaching Diversity

The Dallas Cowboys hosted the third annual High School Diversity Coaching Summit at The Star in Frisco during the team's off-season optional training activities. Presented by Nike, the event offered 20 North Texas high school assistant football coaches an opportunity to discuss professional and personal development topics with Dallas Cowboys coaches and team personnel. The objective of the program is to provide high school assistant coaches with an opportunity to observe, discuss and gain knowledge of coaching at the highest level with the goal of potentially increasing the number of diverse head coaching candidates available to lead high school football programs in North Texas. The attending coaches participated in discussions on resumes and networking, setting up a staff, talent evaluation, utilizing nutrition and strength training to impact player safety, moving up through the ranks and shared challenges and best practices for leadership both on and off the field. The participants are also provided an opportunity to apply for a unique Scouting Internship with the Cowboys Player Personnel department, helping to grade film for staff in preparation for the NFL Draft.



Gatorade Speed & Agility Series

In partnership with Gatorade, the Dallas Cowboys developed a series of clinics available to both boys and girls of all sports that utilizes the movement and drills of football to help all athletes increase speed, endurance and flexibility. Launched during the summer of 2023, the five-camp series measured participant growth over the six-week program. Moving into Spring of 2024, the team offered a one-day program model for high schools looking to host their feeder middle school student-athletes to a workout on the upper campus to create connection and camaraderie between the rising students and their future coaches.



Youth Coaches Clinic

The Dallas Cowboys coaching staff has made a tradition of hosting a one-day teaching clinic for youth, middle and high school football coaches from across the region every summer. Close to the heart of Cowboys Owner, President and General Manager Jerry Jones, the event allows participants to attend for free and features presentations from Cowboys position coaches and coordinators, as well as remarks from Head Coach Mike McCarthy and Mr. Jones himself. Participants receive complimentary team merchandise, lunch, information on USA Football, NFL FLAG and NCAA Eligibility, as well as two tickets to a Dallas Cowboys preseason home game. The clinic also recognizes National CPR and AED Awareness Week (June 1-7) and the NFL's Smart Heart Sports Coalition with a Hands-Only CPR training collaboratively led by coalition members American Red Cross and American Heart Association.



Dallas Cowboys Football & Dance Academy

The Dallas Cowboys Youth Football and Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders (DCC) Dance Camps provide children unique opportunities throughout the summer and school year to learn from former NFL players and current DCC. With specialty position camps as well as three-day summer camps, athletes in grades 2-12 sharpen their skills and gain experience at all levels. Dancers ages 3-16 can learn dance skills and routines while experiencing what it is like to perform as part of the world-famous squad during a halftime performance at a Dallas Cowboys preseason game.



Local Grassroots Efforts

In partnership with the NFL Foundation, the Dallas Cowboys work with the Local Initiative Support Corporation (LISC) to identify and fund, through matching grants, field refurbishments and athletic facility enhancements in the North Texas area. Projects funded through the LISC effort include builds associated with The Salvation Army, Boys & Girls Clubs of Greater Dallas, Mercy Street, Beyond Every Door, St. Philips School and Community Center and others.

Dallas Cowboys PLAY 60 Fitness Zones

Dallas Cowboys PLAY 60 Fitness Zones are fun, Cowboys-branded activity spaces designed to get kids up and moving. The Fitness Zones are intended to give youth new and safe spaces to play that they may not otherwise have access to. To date, Cowboys Fitness Zones have been installed at Mi Escuelita Preschool in Dallas, Gabe Allen Elementary School, Boys & Girls Club of Arlington, Gene and Jerry Jones Family North Texas Youth Education Town in Arlington, the Grand Prairie Boys & Girls Club, The Salvation Army Mabee Center in Fort Worth, the Boys & Girls Club at Uplift Education Williams Prep in Dallas, Nexus Recovery Center in Dallas, The Salvation Army Plano Corps, the Boys & Girls Club of Frisco, The Salvation Army Boys & Girls Club Garland and Mission Arlington.



Holiday Hospital Visits

The entire Dallas Cowboys team has conducted annual Christmas visits to local children's hospitals since the Jones family's first season as team owners in 1989. Cowboys players and cheerleaders annually deliver "game socks" loaded with Cowboys goodies and toys courtesy of the team and the UnitedHealthcare Children's Foundation to nearly 800 children seeking treatment from four local children's hospitals over the holiday season.



Make-A-Wish

The Cowboys have partnered with the Make-A-Wish Foundation of North Texas since 1992 to grant more than 300 wishes of youth from over 41 states, Canada and Mexico. These "Wish Kids" - youth suffering from a variety of life-threatening illnesses - are invited to tour the team's training facility, watch practice and meet their favorite players before coming to AT&T Stadium with their families to be the Cowboys VIP guest during a home game. The Cowboys were honored to accept the Chris Greicius Celebrity Award at Make-A-Wish's Evening of Excellence in October 2016.



Children's Cancer Fund Luncheon and Fashion Show Annual Supporters

As a longstanding tradition, the Cowboys were proud to participate in the annual Children's Cancer Fund Fashion Show event. Cowboys Legend Troy Aikman and Quarterback Dak Prescott serve as the event's honorary chairs. In 2021 Roger Staubach officially passed on his honor as voluntary Children's Cancer Fund Gala Honorary Chair to quarterback Dak Prescott. Cowboys Legends and Dallas Cowboys players are traditionally joined by Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders and team mascot, Rowdy, who serve as celebrity escorts for the pediatric cancer patients and survivors on the runway. The event annually raises over \$2 million for children's cancer research at Children's Medical Center Dallas, while creating a positive experience for dozens of children undergoing cancer treatment.



Happy Hill Farm Academy and Home

The Cowboys have a long-standing partnership with Happy Hill Farm Academy and Home - a residential school for at-risk youth in Granbury, Texas. The Farm is the home of the Dallas Cowboys Courage House supported by the NFL's Ed Block Courage Award program. During the 2023 preseason, members of Happy Hill Farm football team presented the Ed Block Courage Award to the Cowboys 2023 team winner, cornerback Jourdan Lewis.



INSPIRE CHANGE

The Dallas Cowboys are committed to conversations and actions that move us towards a more equal and just tomorrow. Through partnerships with The Salvation Army, Café Momentum, Unlocking Doors, local police departments, DFW judiciary leaders and more, the Cowboys are engaging in the four priority areas of the NFL's Inspire Change initiative: education, economic advancement, police and community relations, and criminal justice reform. Inspire Change showcases how NFL players, clubs and the league are joining together to ensure that access to opportunity is a reality for all.

Inspire Change Changemaker Award and Social Justice Community Grants

The Dallas Cowboys awarded the 2023 Inspire Change Changemaker Award to Tyler Chambless, the Program Manager for The Salvation Army North Texas Family Life Center and Gene and Jerry Jones Family North Texas Youth Education Town. Tyler was recognized at the Cowboys Inspire Change game on December 30 for going above and beyond in his pursuit of change and social justice and surprised with a \$10,000 donation from the NFL Foundation. The Changemaker Award recognizes individuals in each NFL team market making a difference in their community across Inspire Change's four focus areas. Chambless works with The Salvation Army directly making an impact under the Inspire Change education, mentorship and economic advancement pillars. In celebration of Inspire Change the Gene and Jerry Jones Family Foundation also awarded three Social Justice Community Grants to The Salvation Army, Café Momentum and Unlocking Doors to fund programs or initiatives that reduce barriers to opportunity.



Inspire Change Prison Fellowship Camp

Each summer, the Dallas Cowboys, led by Special Teams Coordinator John Fassel, support Prison Fellowship Ministries - the nation's largest non-profit serving prisoners, former prisoners, and their families - in hosting a free Flag football camp for more than 150 children at The Star in Frisco. The youth, whose parents are currently incarcerated, have been sourced by Prison Fellowship from a variety of North Texas non-profit organizations to attend the camp at no cost to themselves or their families. Participants learn flag football skills and drills from Cowboys youth football camp coaches - all former NFL players, as well as receive free Nike footwear, a swag bag and lunch. Fassel, accompanied by members of the Dallas Cowboys roster of players and coaches, join the action on field providing direction during drills and sharing advice and encouragement. The camp is part of the Dallas Cowboys Inspire Change outreach aiming to drive further progress around social justice reform.



Monthly Employee Mentorship Visits

Once a month, Dallas Cowboys employees and Legends are invited to visit The Salvation Army Plano and The Salvation Army Gene and Jerry Jones Family Youth Education Town (YET) to play games, help with homework, share stories and more with the main goal to be a positive influence in the lives of the at-risk youth served by The Salvation Army and develop unique and influential educational opportunities to underserved communities and students.



WOMEN'S CAUSES

The Dallas Cowboys champion women and families facing crisis, whether that be illness like breast cancer or tragedies such as domestic violence or sexual assault. The club empowers female employees and fans to make a difference in the lives of other women through a variety of outreach campaigns that specifically support the team's increasing female fanbase.

Breast Cancer Awareness

The Cowboys partner with Susan G. Komen® to support Breast Cancer Awareness Month in October. The Cowboys feature breast cancer as one of several cancerous diseases during an October home game every year. The special Crucial Catch halftime performance features breast cancer survivors and co-survivors taking the field to form the nationally recognized pink ribbon, surrounded by ribbons supporting other cancer awareness causes.

Star Survivors

In partnership with Susan G. Komen, the Dallas Cowboys host five breast cancer survivors (and Cowboys fans) at The Star who have gone above and beyond to give back to others throughout their fight. Together, the women are given a chance to relax and indulge in a one-of-a-kind Cowboys experience being pampered with surprises along the way. In 2023 the group of Star Survivors were hosted by Tom Thumb in a suite at the Crucial Catch game after a special pregame field presentation, where Haley Anderson and Legend Bradie James presented them with a pink floral wrist corsage and a \$500 Tom Thumb gift card.



Race for the Cure

A key component to the Cowboys partnership with Susan G. Komen is participation in Race for the Cure. Every year the Jones Family Foundation supports the cause by underwriting the registration costs of all full-time Cowboys employees to participate with TEAM COWBOYS in the race. Since 2013 TEAM COWBOYS has opened its roster for all fans and supporters to join. Members of TEAM COWBOYS receive a discount on their registration and a chance to purchase the exclusive TEAM COWBOYS t-shirt.

Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault Platform

The Cowboys have long supported organizations like The Salvation Army and The Family Place that provide immediate shelter, resources and counseling for women and children escaping domestic violence and other crises. The team also is a community partner of The Gatehouse - a supportive living community on 61-acres in Grapevine, Texas, where women and children can seek longer-term shelter (up to two and a half years) and paths for permanent change.



Ladies First: Breaking Barriers

Celebrating Women's History Month, the Dallas Cowboys and the Character Playbook program powered by EverFi host a hybrid discussion focused on highlighting influential female figures who are paving the way as "the first" to break barriers to hold prominent roles in the sports industry. In 2023 the fourth Annual Ladies First: Breaking Barriers event featured Sam Rapoport, Senior Director of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion of the NFL, Dr. Lisa Langston, Director of Athletics of Ft. Worth ISD, and Dallas Cowboys Chief Brand Officer and Co-Owner Charlotte Jones. Following the panel, the girls from Arlington Heights participated in FLAG drills led by the Dallas Cowboys Youth Academy coaches.



W.I.N. – Women Impact Now Campaign

The Dallas Cowboys W.I.N. initiative started as a retail campaign targeting the club's ever growing female fanbase. Since that time, the W.I.N. effort has become a movement of women helping women to make a difference in our community. The Cowboys W.I.N. team has provided financial assistance to The Salvation Army domestic violence shelter, adopted an apartment at The Gatehouse in Grapevine, volunteered their time with *Unsung Heroes* to install a home school and tutoring space for young girls victimized by human trafficking, organized and hosted a baby shower for pregnant soldiers, supported breast cancer awareness through Susan G. Komen and much more. Now formally recognized as a Dallas Cowboys employee resource group, W.I.N. actively works to provide special events, support and outreach for all female members of the club's staff.



HISPANIC OUTREACH

The Cowboys long history of supporting Hispanic outreach initiatives starts at the very top of the organization. In November 2002 Jerry Jones' appreciation for Hispanic culture earned him the title of "Honorary Mariachi" at the Mariachi Vargas Extravaganza in San Antonio, Texas. The event's organizers selected Jones because of his love of Latin culture, his contributions to education and the diverse fan base he represents as owner of the Cowboys. In 2021 the Dallas Cowboys announced that the team was awarded a license to expand their International Home Marketing Area (HMA) into Mexico. This comes as the NFL aims to increase international awareness and excitement alongside selected clubs.

Hispanic Heritage Month

Since 2006 the Cowboys have dedicated one home game annually to celebrating Hispanic Heritage Month (Sept. 15 - Oct. 15) and the rich culture and contributions of their many loyal Hispanic fans. Hispanic Heritage Month games are enriched with elements of Hispanic culture, including presentations of Latin American flags and special plaza performances from Ballet Folklorico Festival dancers and musicians.



PLAY 60 Hispanic Youth Outreach

During Hispanic Heritage Month and throughout the year, the Cowboys focus several community outreach activities on predominantly Hispanic youth. This year members of Unidos, a Dallas Cowboys Employee Resource Group, were joined by Sam Williams, to put the finishing touches on a new PLAY 60 FITNESS ZONE at the Mi Escuelita Preschool in South Dallas, before cutting the ribbon and opening it for play! Led by Sam, the kids used their new slide, played tag and were given a Cowboys goodie bag before heading back to school. The Dallas Cowboys closed out Play 60 Week and kicked off Hispanic Heritage Month by partnering with EVERFI to present Play 60 Character Camp at Young Men's Leadership Academy (YMLA) of Dallas ISD. The YMLA 6th grade class participated in FLAG football drill stations while also learning about the importance of strong character and building life skills from Dallas Cowboys Legend Kenny Gant and members of Unidos, a Dallas Cowboys employee network.



FAN ENGAGEMENT & COMMUNITY OUTREACH

In addition to the six pillars of outreach for Gene and Jerry Jones Family Foundation - The Salvation Army, The National Medal of Honor Museum, youth football, youth health and wellness, Inspire Change, Hispanic outreach and women's causes - the Dallas Cowboys support causes important to our fans and partners throughout the year by activating various events and club resources.

Dallas Cowboys Rookie Club Presented by Blockchain.com

The Dallas Cowboys Rookie Club is an annual outreach initiative designed to introduce the team's newest members to the importance of giving back to the North Texas community. Traditionally, the Rookie Club participates in numerous community service projects and appearances, from school visits and Fitness Zone builds with children, to youth football camps and assisting the clients of The Salvation Army.



Hope Lodge Visits with Cowboys Starbot

The Dallas Cowboys telepresence robot visits with patients of the American Cancer Society Gene and Jerry Jones Family Hope Lodge throughout the year. Nicknamed "Cowboys Starbot," the robot allows Dallas Cowboys players, alumni, cheerleaders, executives and others to visit cancer patients and their caregivers currently staying at the care facility.



Taste of the Cowboys

Hosted annually by the Dallas Cowboys with attendance by Cowboys Legends and current roster members, the Taste of the Cowboys tailgate party benefits the North Texas Food Bank. In 2023 the legendary tailgate party held at Ford Center at The Star featured a silent and live auction, live music and culinary creations from over thirty of the area's hottest restaurant chefs. Since the fundraiser's inception in 2005, the effort has raised more than \$4.4 million and provided approximately 14 million meals to hungry North Texas children through the Food Bank's member agencies and feeding programs.

Taste of the Cowboys Challenge

The Taste of the Cowboys Challenge - a youth cooking competition presented by Dairy MAX and supported by Legends Hospitality, Gene and Jerry Jones Family Foundation and Albertsons Tom Thumb - challenges local high school culinary teams to an Iron Chef and Chopped-inspired competition to create a three-course "tailgate themed" meal using ingredients commonly donated to the North Texas Food Bank. The event highlights ways food bank clients can build delicious meals using common pantry items. The student teams earn grant money for their schools and Albertsons Tom Thumb gift cards to stock their school kitchens. To date, more than \$80,000 has been given in grants to local high school culinary teams.



NFL Draft Day Fan Celebrations

The Dallas Cowboys celebrate their fans across the year, but specifically during the spring, by hosting three days of fan appreciation celebrations in association with the NFL Draft. The free events include concerts, appearances and autograph opportunities with current players, Legends, cheerleaders and mascot, in addition to sponsor activations, a 5K Fun Run/Walk and community volunteerism activities. In addition to the Draft Day event presented by Miller Lite, the Dallas Cowboys encouraged fans to celebrate the 2024 NFL Draft all weekend long by participating in the Dallas Cowboys Draft Day 5K presented Baylor Scott & White Health.



Dallas Cowboys Women's Association

The Dallas Cowboys Women's Association - an organization of players, coaches and executive wives and significant others - works on behalf of the team to make a difference in the North Texas community. Traditionally, the Women's Association joins Gene Jones, Charlotte Jones and Cowboys players each year in serving an early Thanksgiving Day meal at The Salvation Army; volunteer at The Salvation Army Angel Tree Warehouse distributing Christmas gifts to at-risk families; hosts an annual hospital visit as part of their weekly Bible study; and participate in various fellowship activities throughout the season.



Dallas Cowboys Legends

The Cowboys celebrate the team's storied history by integrating the team's former players into their year-round community outreach and game day experience at AT&T Stadium. The Dallas Cowboys Legends program encompasses the great tradition that is the Dallas Cowboys into fan engagement, player mentorship, community programming and appearances. Dallas Cowboys Legends are an extension of the larger NFL Legends Community, a program of NFL Player Engagement, which works to raise awareness for the resources, tools and benefits available to all members, past and present, of the NFL family, creating a lifelong network and support system for all NFL players.



FOUNDATION OF SUPPORT

In addition to the outreach of Gene and Jerry Jones Family Foundation and Gene and Jerry Jones Family Arlington Youth Foundation, the Dallas Cowboys work closely with the NFL Foundation to make an impact on the North Texas community.

NFL Foundation

In December 2012, NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell appointed Cowboys Chief Brand Officer and Co-Owner Charlotte Jones as chair of the NFL Foundation - the first woman to ever lead the charitable foundation of a major sports league. In this position, Jones oversees what was formerly NFL Charities and the NFL Youth Football Fund and its awarding of more than \$23 million in grants annually to support youth and high school football programs, player health and safety efforts and community outreach initiatives. Cowboys Class Acts

Cowboys Class Acts honors DFW teachers that constantly encourage, lead and strive for excellence in the classroom.

Cowboys NFL Draft Day Fan Appreciation Party

Every spring, the Dallas Cowboys host a fan appreciation event which corresponds with NFL Draft Day. Players and cheerleaders attend to thank fans for their support by signing autographs, posing for photos and celebrating those new team members chosen through the draft process.

Children's Cancer Fund Fashion Show

Each spring, Dallas Cowboys players walk the runway in the annual Children's Cancer Fund Fashion Show chaired by Roger Staubach and Troy Aikman. The players serve as celebrity escorts for youth-models who have been stricken with cancer.

Dallas Cowboys Kickoff Luncheon

An annual luncheon offering fans the first official look at the Dallas Cowboys regular season squad which benefits Happy Hill Farm Academy and Home - a residential school for at-risk children - and home of the Dallas Cowboys Ed Block Courage House.

Dallas Cowboys Rookie Club

A program designed to introduce rookie team members to the importance of community service. Entering its 22nd season, rookie players have participated in monthly charity visits over the last 20 years to various non-profit organizations serving children and adults.

Holiday Hospital Visits

Under the enthusiastic guidance of Gene Jones, who serves as a member of the board of trustees for Children's Medical Center Dallas, the entire Cowboys team has conducted annual Christmas visits to local children's hospitals in each of the past 30 years. The holiday visitation program, which involves not only every player, but also the Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders, extends to four different hospitals throughout Dallas and Fort Worth.

Make-A-Wish

The Cowboys partner with Make-A-Wish to host children with life-threatening illnesses and their families each week of the season. The children are invited to tour The Star, watch practice and meet their favorite Cowboys players before coming to AT&T Stadium to be the team's special pregame sideline guest at a home game.

My Cause My Cleats

My Cause My Cleats is an annual, league-wide campaign that encourages players to pick a cause that is important to them and represent their chosen organization on custom designed cleats during a designated week of the regular NFL season.

NFL Draft-A-Thon

A three-day virtual "Draft-A-Thon" fundraiser which pays tribute to healthcare workers and first responders - including raising funds for the work being done to combat the impact of COVID-19.

PLAY 60

The national youth health and wellness campaign of the NFL and its 32 clubs. PLAY 60 encourages kids to eat nutritiously and get 60 minutes of physical activity in each day. A variety of programming and events fall under the PLAY 60 platform, including Fuel Up to Play 60, the PLAY 60 Challenge, NFL PLAY 60 FITNESSGRAM with The Cooper Institute and the annual Hometown Huddle PLAY 60 event.

Prison Fellowship Camp

The Dallas Cowboys, led by Special Teams Coordinator John Fassel, partner with Prison Fellowship Ministries - the nation's largest non-profit serving prisoners, former prisoners, and their families - in hosting a free football camp for children at The Star in Frisco. Fassel is accompanied by members of the Dallas Cowboys roster and coaches, who join the action on field providing direction during drills and share advice and encouragement.

Salute to Service

Salute to Service is a year-round effort across the NFL to Honor, Empower, and Connect our nation's service members, veterans and their families. Annually, the Cowboys honor military veterans and active duty members throughout Salute to Service week in a variety of ways as part of the Salute to Service campaign.

Star Scholars Program

The Star Scholars program, powered by Reliant, recognizes six deserving DFW student-athletes for their leadership, determination and commitment to athletics, academics and the community with a \$10,000 scholarship to kickstart their college careers.

Taste of the Cowboys

Benefits the North Texas Food Bank, raises money to provide hundreds of thousands of meals to hungry children in North Texas, hosted by current and former players.

The Salvation Army Angel Tree

Cowboys players, coaches and front office staff annually participate in The Salvation Army Angel Tree program - an opportunity to adopt underprivileged children during the Christmas holiday to purchase gifts which they might not otherwise receive.

The Salvation Army Early Thanksgiving Meal

Due to the team's traditional Thanksgiving Day football game, the Dallas Cowboys annually serve an "early" Thanksgiving Day meal to underprivileged men, women and children at The Salvation Army Carr P. Collins Social Service Center. In 2012 the team added a second location to their outreach and also served clients at The Salvation Army's Mabee Social Service Center in Fort Worth.
