FIRST-ROUND TEAMMATES

The Jaguars drafted a pair of Clemson players with their first two selections, picking QB **Trevor Lawrence** with the No. 1 overall selection and RB **Travis Etienne** with the No. 25 selection. It marked the first time in the common draft era that a quarterback and a running back from the same school were selected in the first round by the same team.

Etienne was the fourth running back selected in the first round by the Jaguars in franchise history and first since 2017, while Lawrence was the fourth quarterback selected in the first round and first since 2014.



DYNAMIC DUOS

The 2021 draft marked the fifth and sixth time since 2000 that a quarterback and a running back from the same school were both chosen in the first round of the same NFL Draft since 2000. Along with Lawrence and Etienne, Alabama QB **Mac Jones** (No. 15) and RB **Najee Harris** (No. 24) were selected in the first round.

ALL-TIME PICKS BY POSITION

The Jaguars have selected 225 players through the NFL Draft, including 113 defensive players, 104 offensive players and eight special teams players. In the 2021 draft, they selected nine players: two defensive linemen, one quarterback, one running back, one cornerback, one tight end, one wide receiver, one safety and one offensive lineman.

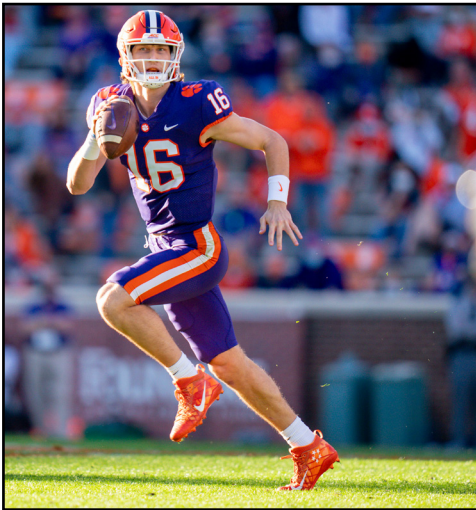

- Concluded his career with a 34-2 record (.944) as a starter, the third-best winning percentage by a starting quarterback with at least 30 career starts since 1978
- Completed 758-of-1138 career passes (66.6 percent) for 10,098 yards with 90 touchdowns and 17 interceptions for a pass efficiency rating of 164.3 in 2,237 snaps over 40 career games (36 starts)
- Finished in the top five in school history in career completion percentage (66.6, second), passing touchdowns (90, tied for second), interception percentage (1.49, second), passing yards (10,098, third), total offense yards (11,041, third), touchdown responsibility (108, third) and completions (758, fourth)
- Holds Clemson career records in career winning percentage (.944), pass efficiency rating (164.3), yards per passing attempt (8.87) and tied for the most wins against Top 25 opponents (nine)
- Rushed 231 times for 943 career rushing yards and 18 rushing touchdowns, the fifth-most career rushing touchdowns by a Clemson quarterback in the modern era
- Became the first quarterback in Atlantic Coast Conference history to win three ACC Championship games and was only the sixth quarterback in ACC history to record at least 10,000 career passing yards

PROVEN WINNER

QB **Trevor Lawrence** has won every regular season game he has played since his freshman year of high school, including in his three-year career at Clemson. Lawrence went 34-2 (.944) with the Tigers, the third-best winning percentage by a starting quarterback with a minimum of 30 starts.

CB **Tyson Campbell** became the fourth player from the University of Georgia to be selected by the Jaguars in franchise history and the 24th cornerback to be drafted. Campbell was the sixth cornerback selected in the 2021 draft and the second player from Georgia. He is one of three cornerbacks in the last 10 years (2011-20) the Jaguars have selected with a top 50 pick, joining CBs **CJ Henderson** (2020) and **Jalen Ramsey** (2016).

Campbell started all 10 games at cornerback for the Bulldogs in 2020, finishing with 29 tackles and five pass breakups. He was a high school 2A state champion in the 100 and 200 meters.

WHAT THEY ARE SAYING

"I feel like I can do it all. With my athletic ability and my knowledge of the game, I can play all over the field." – CB **Tyson Campbell**

"I've known Tyson since his sophomore year in high school, state champ in Florida. He's a versatile defensive back so when you look at our corners and Tyson, you've got these long, six-foot-plus guys that run a 4.4 [40-yard dash] and he's physical. The flexibility that he will provide — he was a safety in high school, and like I said I've known him a long time. I actually heard on television and we agreed with the assessment on television that he's so confident in his speed he's never out of control. We love that guy on film." – Head Coach **Urban Meyer**

OL **Walker Little** was selected with the 45th overall pick. He started 13 games in 2018 and earned All-Pac 12 First Team honors as a sophomore in 2018 prior to missing the 2019 season (injury) and 2020 season (COVID-19 opt-out).

Little became the third tackle to be selected in the second round by the Jaguars in the last five drafts, joining current Jaguars offensive linemen **Jawaan Taylor** and **Cam Robinson**. Little is the first player to attend Stanford to be selected in franchise history.

WHAT THEY ARE SAYING

"I'm one hundred percent. I'm as strong and in shape as I've ever been. I'm really ready for the NFL, for this next step. This last year and a half has been a lot of training, it's been a lot of football studying just trying to learn the game a lot better, trying to get stronger and just working on a lot of technique work ... I've been training and working really hard to be in the best shape to one, get here, and be drafted but also to compete and play." –OL **Walker Little**

"He hasn't played in a long time. He was the number one tackle coming out of high school, I remember him. He was very good before he got hurt. I know Coach [David] Shaw fairly well, and you watch his athleticism and bendability for a big man ... He's again trying to develop to at one point become a starter." – Head Coach **Urban Meyer**

S **Andre Cisco** was selected by the Jaguars with the No. 65 overall pick. Cisco played in 24 games collegiately and totaled 136 tackles, 29 passes defended, 13 INTs, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. He was a three-year starter for the Orange and two-time All-ACC selection. Cisco's 12 INTs from 2018-19 were the most by any player in college football during that span with current Jaguars CB **Luq Barcoo's** 10 INTs at San Diego State ranking second.

WHAT THEY ARE SAYING

"Andre Cisco was my #1 safety in this draft. Speed jumps out on film and great hips gives him great range. The Jaguars secondary is stacked with young talent." - NBC Sports **Chris Simms**

DT **Jay Tufele** was the Jaguars selection with the 106th overall draft pick. Tufele appeared in 25 games with 18 career starts and posted 65 tackles, including 11 tackles for a loss. In 2019, he earned All-Pac-12 First Team honors and won USC Defensive Lineman of the Year for the second consecutive season when he recorded 42 tackles, including 6.5 tackles for loss. In 2018, he appeared in 12 games and made 23 tackles and was named to Phil Steele's All-Pac-12 Second Team. Tufele (*too-FAY-leh*) is originally from Salt Lake City and attended Bingham high school. The Jaguars have selected eight players from Southern California in their 27-year draft history, the second-most of any school.

WHAT THEY ARE SAYING

"Being the guy I am, just being very explosive, very nasty and bringing my game and bringing that into the Jacksonville Jaguars ... I know [some of] these guys [the Jaguars drafted] and I know that they're ready and what they're capable of and what we're going to bring into this organization, in our defense and it's going to be lights out. We're going to be nasty and we're going to be ready to come on Sundays and just show out and be great in that way." - DT **Jay Tufele**

In two seasons at Alabama-Birmingham, Jaguars No. 121 overall pick DE Jordan Smith recorded 96 tackles, 14.5 sacks and 27 tackles for loss. He was named first-team All-Conference USA in 2020 after recording 43 tackles, 4.5 sacks and one INT as a senior.

It marks the third consecutive year the Jaguars have selected a defensive end in the first four rounds with Smith joining DE/LB K'Lavon Chaisson (2020) and DE Josh Allen (2019). Listed at 6'7, Smith is the tallest player the Jaguars have drafted since DT John Henderson in 2002.

WHAT THEY ARE SAYING

"I feel like I was the best pass rusher in this draft...I have a big arsenal of moves. I use my mind. I use my mental game to help me excel in the game. So, I feel like I bring a lot to the table. I'm a great person. I'm a great teammate, great locker room guy, so I feel like I bring a lot to the table." – DE **Jordan Smith**

The Jaguars selected TE Luke Farrell with the No. 145 overall pick. Farrell played in 44 games and made 32 starts, registering 34 receptions for 380 yards and four TDs in his college career. Farrell helped lead the Buckeyes to College Football Playoff appearances in two of his four seasons. The team accumulated a 45-5 record in his four-year career.

Originally from Perry, Ohio, Farrell was a Associated Press All-State selection as a senior in 2015 after catching 33 passes for 446 yards at Perry High School. Farrell played for Head Coach Urban Meyer for two years at Ohio State and is the ninth tight end to be drafted in Jaguars history.

WHAT THEY ARE SAYING

"I definitely think I'm one of the best, if not the best, blocking tight ends coming out of this class. But I think one of my biggest strengths is my versatility and my toughness. I think whatever they're going to ask me to do, I can do at a high level—and we were asked to do a lot as tight ends at Ohio State and I know I can continue to do that. And then, I think I play the game with a lot of toughness, in every aspect." – TE Luke Farrell

WR **Jalen Camp** was selected with the No. 209 overall pick, becoming the fourth player from Georgia Tech to be selected by the Jaguars in franchise history. Camp played in 49 games with the Yellow Jackets and registered 48 catches for 808 yards and five TDs, including a career-best 439 receiving yards and four TDs in 2020.

Camp ran a 4.43 40-yard dash and produced 30 repetitions of 225 pounds on the bench press. He was named to Bruce Feldman's '2020 Freaks List' for his combination of size and strength.

WHAT THEY ARE SAYING

"He's a guy that we studied ... We looked at his measurables. He is a big, strong, fast guy that we had a great call with and we look forward to working with him." – Head Coach **Urban Meyer**

"I think I have a very high ceiling. That's something I stressed to a lot of coaches and a lot of guys I've talked to throughout this entire process. I think whoever reaches out and takes a chance on me is going to get a diamond in this draft.
