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GREEN BAY OPENS PRESEASON IN PITTSBURGH

The Packers travel east to take on the Steelers in the first preseason contest.

- It will mark the fourth time in the past five years that Green Bay starts the preseason on the road.
- It will be the first preseason meeting between the Packers and Steelers since 2018, a 51-34 Green Bay win at home, and the first in Pittsburgh since 2015.
- It is the first time Green Bay has opened the preseason at Pittsburgh since 2007.
- It will be the 27th time the Packers have faced the Steelers in the preseason, the second most of any opponent (New York Giants, 30).
- Familiar faces will be on the home sideline, as the Steelers are led by former Packers head coach Mike McCarthy and QB Aaron Rodgers, who both helped lead the Packers to the Super Bowl XLV championship.
- Following the game at Pittsburgh, Green Bay will hold public practices on Sunday, Aug. 16, and Tuesday, Aug. 18, before going to Denver to take on the Broncos on Friday, Aug. 21, at 8 p.m. CT.
- The Packers finish off the open sessions of training camp with an open practice on Aug. 24 and then an open joint practice against Arizona (Aug. 26) before facing the Cardinals in the lone home preseason game, presented by Cenex, on Friday, Aug. 28, at 7 p.m. CT.
- The game against the Cardinals is designated as the Packers Give Back Game, highlighting Wisconsin mental-health advocates with NAMI Wisconsin before and during the contest.



WITH THE CALL

- Flagshipged by TODAY'S TMJ4 (WTMJ-TV) in Milwaukee and in conjunction with NBC 26 (WGBA-TV) in Green Bay, Packers preseason games are televised over a **24-station network** throughout the state of Wisconsin, Marquette-Escanaba in Michigan, Duluth and Rochester in Minnesota, Peoria, Rockford and Champaign in Illinois, Cedar Rapids-Waterloo, Davenport, Des Moines and Sioux City in Iowa, Omaha in Nebraska, Bismarck, Fargo and Minot in North Dakota, Sioux Falls in South Dakota and Anchorage, Fairbanks and Juneau in Alaska. Packers preseason games are also broadcast on Telemundo Wisconsin. For a list of affiliates, please go to packers.com/video/tv-network.
- The top-notch broadcast team includes CBS's **Kevin Harlan** (play-by-play) alongside former Green Bay fullback **John Kuhn** (analyst) with **Karley Marotta** of WTMJ-TV serving as the sideline reporter. Marotta will also host an informative half-hour pregame show.
- All Packers games can be heard on the **Packers Radio Network**, which is made up of **54 stations** in Wisconsin, Michigan, Minnesota, Illinois, North Dakota

and South Dakota. The flagship station of the Packers Radio Network is 95.7 BIG FM - WRIT. For a map and full listing of radio affiliates, go to packers.com/video/radio-network. **Wayne Larrivee** (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler **Larry McCarren** (analyst) call the action. McCarren first joined the team's broadcasts in 1995 and enters his 32nd season calling Packers games. After originally being paired together in 1999, McCarren and Larrivee enter their 28th season of broadcasts together. They surpassed Jim Irwin and Max McGee for the most regular-season and postseason games broadcast for the Packers with 313 at the 2018 season opener against Chicago.

MATT LaFLEUR...In his eighth season as the Packers' 15th head coach.

► Is entering his 18th season in the NFL in 2026, having served as an offensive coordinator for two seasons (Los Angeles Rams, 2017; Tennessee Titans, 2018), a QBs coach for six seasons (Washington Redskins, 2010-13; Atlanta Falcons, 2015-16) and an offensive assistant for two seasons (Houston Texans, 2008-09).

► In his first seven seasons leading the Packers, LaFleur has authored one of the finest starts to a head-coaching career in NFL history. Per the Elias Sports Bureau, his 76 regular-season wins are tied with Paul Brown for the second most in league history by a head coach in his first seven seasons in the NFL, trailing only George Seifert (86 in 1989-95). Green Bay's 76-40-1 (.654) regular-season record since 2019 ranks No. 1 in the NFC and No. 3 in the NFL over that span.

► In his first three seasons in Green Bay (2019-21), became the first head coach in NFL history to post 13-plus wins in three straight years. His 39 victories over that span passed Seifert (38 in 1989-91) for the most wins by an NFL head coach in his first three seasons in the league and are also tied for the fourth most by a coach over any three-season span in league history (Mike Ditka, 40 from 1985-87; Andy Reid, 40 from 2020-22 and 2022-24).

► Led the Packers to six playoff berths in seven seasons (tied for No. 2 in the NFL over that span), tied with Vince Lombardi and Mike Holmgren for the most playoff appearances by a Green Bay head coach in his first seven seasons.

► In his first season leading the Packers in 2019, became the first coach in club history to guide the team to the playoffs in his debut season. Also led the largest one-year win improvement in team history (plus-seven wins).

MIKE MCCARTHY...In his first season as the Steelers' 17th head coach.

► Guided the NFL's highest-scoring offense four times,

ranked in the top five nine times and in the top 10 on 11 occasions. Dallas and Green Bay averaged 26.8 and 25.9 points/game, respectively, ranking second and third in the NFL in scoring offense during his tenures.

► A Pittsburgh native, has a 174-112-2 (.608) regular-season record and has the fourth-most wins among active NFL coaches and the 15th most in NFL history.

► Has led his teams to 12 postseason appearances and eight division titles, including six NFC North titles (Packers) and two NFC East titles (Cowboys).

THE PACKERS-STEELERS SERIES

► Green Bay and Pittsburgh first met in 1933, and the Packers rattled off nine wins in a row (1933-46) to begin the regular-season series. The Packers currently hold the all-time regular-season series lead with a 20-17 record.

► Green Bay won the lone postseason matchup between these franchises with a 31-25 victory over Pittsburgh in Super Bowl XLV.

► The Packers have scored 27-plus points in six of the last seven matchups (3-4 record) against the Steelers. Four of those contests were 30-plus points for Green Bay, including the Super Bowl victory.

► Packers QB Jordan Love completed 29 of 37 passes for 360 yards and three TDs with zero INTs (career-high 134.2 rating).

► Packers TE Tucker Kraft caught seven passes for a career-high 143 yards (20.4 avg.) and two TDs.

► Steelers QB Aaron Rodgers completed 24 of 36 passes for 219 yards and two TDs with zero INTs.

HEAD COACH MATT LAFLEUR

LAFLEUR LEADS THE PACK

Head Coach **Matt LaFleur** (la-flew-er) led the Packers to three straight NFC North titles, is the only coach in franchise history to post 10-plus wins in each of his first three seasons with the team and is the only coach in NFL history to win at least 12 games (13) in each of his first three seasons (2019-21) as an NFL head coach (Elias Sports Bureau).

- ▶ LaFleur has led the Packers to 76 wins so far in his career, **tied with Paul Brown for No. 2 in NFL history for the most wins by a head coach in his first seven NFL seasons** (George Seifert, 86).
- ▶ LaFleur has led Green Bay to the postseason in six of his first seven seasons (2019-21, 2023-25), tied with Vince Lombardi and Mike Holmgren for the most post-season appearances by a Packers head coach in their first seven seasons.
- ▶ Green Bay has four 11-plus-win seasons under LaFleur (2019-21, 2024), the **most in the NFC and tied for No. 3 in the NFL** since 2019 (Buffalo and Kansas City, six / Baltimore, four).
- ▶ LaFleur has the **third-highest** regular-season winning percentage among active head coaches (min. 50 games):

- ▶ Dating back to 2019, the Packers have the **third-best** regular-season record in the NFL and the **top mark in the NFC**:

- ▶ LaFleur has guided the Packers to a 43-15 record at home (.741) in the regular season, **No. 2 in the NFL** since 2019.
- ▶ Since 2019, Green Bay is 33-25-1 on the road in the regular season, a .568 winning percentage that is **No. 8 in the NFL** over that span.
- ▶ The Packers are 37-26-1 in one-score games under LaFleur, a .586 winning percentage that ranks **No. 6 in the NFL** since 2019.
- ▶ The Packers have had at least **one winning streak of three-plus games in all seven seasons** under LaFleur (2019-25) and at least **one winning streak of four-plus games in every season but one** (2019-22, 2024-25).
- ▶ Green Bay is 25-11 (.694) in regular-season games played in December/January under LaFleur, **No. 2 in the NFL** since 2019. The Packers are 14-4 (.778, **tied for No. 1 in the NFL**) in December/January home games under LaFleur and have posted a plus-14 turnover differential in those contests, **No. 3 in the NFL**.
- ▶ The win in Week 6 last season was the 70th regular-season victory of LaFleur's career. By doing so in his 105th career regular-season game, LaFleur became the **fastest to 70 regular-season wins among current NFL head coaches** and was the fastest to reach the 70-win mark since Bill Cowher (105th game in 1998), per Elias.
- ▶ LaFleur tied John Harbaugh, Holmgren, McCarthy and Andy Reid for the **sixth-most wins** (66) by a head coach in the first 100 games (regular and postseason, since 1970).
- ▶ LaFleur guided the Packers to 67 wins in his first 100 regular-season games as head coach. Only **Vince**

Lombardi (73) and Holmgren (68) had more wins in their first 100 games in Packers history.

- ▶ LaFleur tied Holmgren, Cowher and Reid (67 each) for the **second-most regular-season wins** by any NFL head coach in their first 100 games in the last 40 seasons (Seifert, 78).
- ▶ Among Green Bay coaches, LaFleur is the **second fastest** (89 games) to reach 60 wins behind only Lombardi (82).
- ▶ LaFleur posted 29 wins in his first 50 road contests as head coach, the **second-most wins through 50 road games as Green Bay coach**, behind only Lombardi's 33 (STATS).
- ▶ LaFleur (23-2) tied Guy Chamberlin (23-1-1) for the **most wins in NFL history** by a head coach in his first 25 regular-season home games (Elias).
- ▶ LaFleur (39-10, .796, 2019-21) passed Seifert (38-10, .791, 1989-91) for the **most wins by an NFL head coach in his first three seasons** in the league (per Elias).
- ▶ LaFleur's 39 wins from 2019-21 **tied for the second most** by a coach over any three-season span in league history behind Mike Ditka's 40 wins with Chicago from 1985-87 and Reid's 40 with Kansas City from 2020-22 (Elias).
- ▶ LaFleur (2019-21) is the **only head coach in NFL history** to post 13-plus wins in three straight seasons (Elias).
- ▶ According to Elias, LaFleur was the **sixth head coach since 1970** to lead his team to the conference championship game in both of his first two seasons as a head coach (2019-20), joining Jim Harbaugh (2011-12), Rex Ryan (2009-10), Barry Switzer (1994-95), Seifert (1989-90) and Don McCafferty (1970-71).
- ▶ LaFleur (26) posted the **second-most wins in NFL history** by a coach in his first two seasons (2019-20) behind only Seifert (28 in 1989-90).
- ▶ LaFleur led the **biggest one-year win improvement** in franchise history in 2019 (plus-seven).
- ▶ The Packers rank in the **top five of the NFL** in winning percentage in division games since 2019:

- ▶ Green Bay is 14-7 (.667) in division games at home, **tied for No. 6 in the NFL** since 2019.
- ▶ The Packers are 13-8 in road division contests, a .650 winning percentage that is **tied for No. 6 in the NFL** since 2019.
- ▶ The Packers have averaged 25.74 points per division game since 2019, **No. 3 in the NFL** over that span.
- ▶ LaFleur's winning percentage of .917 (11-1) against division opponents in 2019-20 **tied for the second best** by a coach in his first two seasons as head coach, dating back to 1970 (Mike Tomlin, 11-1, .917 in 2007-08 / Mariucci, 15-1, .938 in 1997-98).
- ▶ Among head coaches who began their career since 1970, LaFleur was the **first one** to win his first seven road divisional games (Elias).
- ▶ The Packers are 12-2 (.857) against Chicago since 2019. LaFleur was the **only coach in NFL history** (Elias) to win his first 11 games against the Bears (Dennis Green won his first six for Minnesota in 1992-94). The 11-game win streak over Chicago (2019-24) was the longest by either team in the history of the series (10 straight by the Packers from 1994-98).

Two years after he co-founded the Packers with Curly Lambeau, George Calhoun began writing a piece called The Dope Sheet, which served as the official press release from 1921-24.



COACHING-STAFF CHANGES

Throughout the offseason, Head Coach **Matt LaFleur** made some changes and adjustments to the coaching staff.

- ▶ **Cam Achord** (AY-cord) was named special teams coordinator. He comes to the Packers with 10 years of experience coaching special teams in the NFL, including four seasons as a coordinator. Over the past two seasons, he served as assistant special teams coach with the New York Giants (2024-25). Last season, he helped coach a unit that returned 70 kickoffs for a single-season franchise-record 1,942 yards (27.7 avg.), surpassing the previous record of 1,688 yards set in 1964. The Giants' 27.7 kickoff return average was the second-highest mark in a single season in franchise history and ranked No. 5 among all NFL teams in 2025. Before New York, Achord spent six years coaching special teams for the New England Patriots, first as assistant special teams coach from 2018-19 and then as the special teams coordinator from 2020-23. The Patriots finished No. 3 in the NFL with a 26.2-yard kickoff return average in 2023 while their coverage team was No. 6, allowing an average 20.6 yards. In 2022, Achord led a unit ranked No. 1 in the NFL with 418 punt return yards and No. 3 with 1,274 total return yards.
- ▶ **Jonathan Gannon** was hired as defensive coordinator after serving as the head coach for the Arizona Cardinals for the past three seasons (2023-25). He guided the Cardinals to eight wins in 2024, double the team's win total from 2023 despite playing nine games against playoff teams in '24. Over the final 11 games in 2024, Arizona ranked No. 4 in the NFL in points allowed per game (19.6) and No. 6 in total defense (325.7 ypg), allowing the fewest total TDs (20) and the fewest passing TDs (10) in the NFL over that span. Gannon joined Arizona after spending two seasons (2021-22) as the defensive coordinator with Philadelphia, where he helped the Eagles advance to Super Bowl LVII. In both of Gannon's two seasons as defensive coordinator for Philadelphia, the Eagles had a top-10 defense, ranking No. 2 in the league in total defense in 2022 (301.5 ypg) and No. 10 in 2021 (328.8 ypg). In 2022, the Eagles also featured the NFL's top-ranked passing defense (179.8 ypg) and the No. 8-ranked scoring defense (20.2 ppg). In 2021-22, Philadelphia ranked No. 3 in total defense (315.1 ypg) and passing defense (200.4 ypg), No. 1 in sacks (99), No. 6 in tackles for a loss (168) and tied for No. 3 in defensive TDs (seven) and INT return TDs (four). He has 15 years of coaching experience in the NFL with the Cardinals, Eagles, Indianapolis Colts (2018-20), Minnesota Vikings (2014-17), Tennessee Titans (2012-13) and Atlanta Falcons (2007).
- ▶ **Bobby Babich** (BAB-itch) joins the Packers) as secondary/pass game coordinator after nine seasons with the Buffalo Bills as assistant defensive backs coach (2017), safeties coach (2018-21), linebackers coach (2022-23) and defensive coordinator (2024-25). He was part of a staff that helped the Bills rank No. 1 in the NFL over that span in total defense (314.6 ypg), passing defense (199.1 ypg), yards allowed per play (5.1), yards allowed per passing attempt (6.0), INTs (146) and takeaways (240).

- ▶ **Daniel Bullocks** was hired as cornerbacks coach and comes to the Packers from the San Francisco 49ers, where he was the defensive passing game specialist/defensive backs (2024-25), defensive backs coach (2023), safeties coach (2019-22) and assistant defensive backs coach (2017-18). During his time with the 49ers, Bullocks was part of a defensive staff that helped San Francisco rank in the top five in the NFL in total defense (No. 2, 318.4 ypg), yards allowed per play (No. 2, 5.2), passing yards per attempt (No. 4, 6.80) and passing defense (No. 5, 212.8 ypg) from 2017-25.
- ▶ **Jake Flint** joins as a strength & conditioning assistant after spending the past four seasons (2022-25) as the director of athletic development at Louisiana State University. Prior to joining the LSU staff in December 2021, Flint spent 12 years at the University of Notre Dame (2010-21) on the strength and conditioning staff, serving as co-director for the last five seasons.
- ▶ **Noah Pauley** comes aboard as wide receivers coach after coaching at the collegiate level for 13 seasons, where he tutored three wide receivers that went on to be selected in the first three rounds of the NFL Draft over a four-year span in Christian Watson (second round by Green Bay in 2022), Jayden Higgins (second round in 2025) and Jaylin Noel (third round in 2025). He spent the last three seasons at Iowa State, where he served as the pass game coordinator/wide receivers coach in 2024-25 and the wide receivers coach in 2023.
- ▶ **Sam Siefkes** (SEEF-kiss) joins Green Bay as linebackers coach after serving as the defensive coordinator for Virginia Tech in 2025. He is entering his fifth season in the NFL, having previously worked as the linebackers coach for the Arizona Cardinals (2023-24), where in 2024 he helped the Cardinals rank No. 4 in the league in points allowed per game (19.6) and allow the fewest total TDs (20) and the fewest passing TDs (10) in the NFL over the final 11 games.
- ▶ **Scott Fuchs** (rhymes with "books") was hired as a defensive analyst after spending the last two seasons (2024-25) as the assistant offensive line coach for the Tennessee Titans. He came to the NFL after spending 30 seasons coaching in college.
- ▶ The Packers also promoted **DeMarcus Covington** to OLBs/run game coordinator/assistant head coach - defense, **Luke Getsy** to quarterbacks coach/assistant head coach - offense, **Vince Oghobaase** (oh-guh-BAH-seel) to defensive line coach, **Rob Grosso** (GROW-so) to assistant wide receivers coach, **Cory Harkey** to assistant special teams coach and **Jeff Koonz** to assistant special teams coach.
- ▶ Green Bay hired **T.C. McCartney** as an offensive quality control coach and **Will Smart** as a defensive quality control coach. McCartney has 10 years of NFL coaching experience, most recently as the quarterbacks coach for the New England Patriots (2024), and Smart comes to the Packers from Vanderbilt University, where he was promoted to outside linebackers/edges coach after working as a pass-rush specialist in 2025.

Two years after he co-founded the Packers with Curly Lambeau, George Calhoun began writing a piece called The Dope Sheet, which served as the official press release from 1921-24.





OFFSEASON MOVES

Packers General Manager **Brian Gutekunst** and his staff have made numerous moves that have helped Green Bay to a 82-49-2 record over the last eight seasons, three division titles, six playoff berths and appearances in two NFC title games. Even with a roster that is one of six NFL teams to make the playoffs in each of the past three seasons, Gutekunst and his staff still had decisions and moves to make.

► This offseason, the Packers gave numerous players contract extensions: C/G **Sean Rhyan**, who was one of only two Green Bay offensive linemen to appear in all 34 regular-season games over the last two seasons and was part of an offensive line that helped the Packers rank in the top five in the NFL in 2024-25 in sacks allowed (No. 2, 51), sack percentage (No. 4, 5.0), yards per passing attempt (No. 3, 8.0) and rushing yards (No. 5, 133.3 ypg); WR **Jayden Reed**, who ranks No. 1 in the NFL in passer rating when targeted (126.8) among wide receivers with 100 receptions from 2023-25 (TruMedia); WR **Christian Watson**, who is one of only three players in team history to post 125-plus catches and average 17.0-plus yards per catch in his first four NFL seasons (WRs Billy Howton and James Lofton); LB **Isaiah McDuffie**, who is one of only two players in the league (Texans LB E.J. Speed) to appear in 80-plus games and register 275-plus tackles on defense (286) and 30-plus tackles on special teams (34) since 2021, and DT **Devonte Wyatt**, who was one of two Packers (DL Rashan Gary) to post four-plus sacks in each of the last three seasons (2023-25).

► Green Bay acquired LB **Zaire Franklin** via trade with the Indianapolis Colts. He played in 132 games with 82 starts for Indianapolis from 2018-25 and was a six-time team captain (2020-25). Franklin led the league with 173 tackles (93 solo) and ranked No. 2 in the NFL with a career-high five forced fumbles in 2024, earning second-team All-Pro honors from *The Associated Press* as well as his first career Pro Bowl selection. From 2022-25, he led the NFL in tackles (643) and ranked No. 2 in solo tackles (364). Dating back to 2000 (per TruMedia), he is the only NFL player to register 600-plus tackles (643), 10-plus sacks (10) and 10-plus forced fumbles (11) over a four-season span (2022-25).

► The Packers made a few veteran free-agent signings, including WR **Sky Moore**, CB **Benjamin St-Juste** and QB **Tyrod Taylor**. Moore has appeared in 53 games with 11 starts during his NFL career (2022-24 with the Kansas City Chiefs, 2025 with the San Francisco 49ers) and has registered 48 receptions for 581 yards (12.1 avg.) and a TD, eight carries for 58 yards (7.3 avg.), 39 punt returns for 377 yards (9.7 avg.) and 38 kickoff returns for 1,000 yards (26.3 avg.). He ranked No. 6 in the NFL last season with a career-high 27.5-yard average on kickoff returns (33 returns for 907 yards), highlighted by a 98-yard return at Arizona in Week 11. It was the third-best average by a San Francisco player since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger (RB Vic Washington, 28.6 in 1972; WR Ted Ginn, 27.6 in 2011). St-Juste

has played in 70 games with 47 starts during his NFL career (2021-24 with the Washington Commanders, 2025 with the L.A. Chargers) and has posted 235 tackles (181 solo), four tackles for a loss, three sacks, two interceptions, 41 passes defended, four forced fumbles and a fumble recovery. In 2023, he started a career-high 16 contests and register 67 tackles (52 solo), a sack, an INT, two forced fumbles and a career-best 17 passes defended (No. 4 in the NFL). He was the first Washington player to record 15-plus passes defended and multiple forced fumbles in a season since CB Josh Norman in 2016. Taylor has played in 100 career games with 62 starts for Baltimore (2011-14), Buffalo (2015-17), Cleveland (2018), the Los Angeles Chargers (2019-20), Houston (2021), the New York Giants (2022-23) and the New York Jets (2024-25). He is the only quarterback in NFL history with 10,000-plus passing yards, 2,000-plus rushing yards, 70-plus passing TDs, 20-plus rushing TDs and fewer than 35 interceptions.

► Green Bay retained the following exclusive-rights free agents: WR **Bo Melton**, CB **Kamal Hadden** and G/T **Donovan Jennings**.

MEET THE DRAFT PICKS

Training-camp storylines always hover around new players and just how they figure into the depth chart. The Packers added a six-man draft class.

► CB **Brandon Cisse** (No. 52 overall) was selected by the Packers in the second round out of the University of South Carolina. He appeared in 34 games with 12 starts during his collegiate career, spending his first two seasons at North Carolina State (2023-24) and the 2025 season at South Carolina. Cisse finished his collegiate career with 65 tackles (41 solo), three tackles for a loss, two INTs, 12 passes defended and a forced fumble.

► Green Bay selected DT **Chris McClellan** (No. 77 overall) out of the University of Missouri in the third round. He played two seasons for the Tigers (2024-25), where he appeared in 26 games with 22 starts, and two seasons at the University of Florida (2022-23), where he played in 25 games with one start. McClellan earned second-team All-SEC honors from *The Associated Press* in 2025 after posting career highs in tackles (48), solo tackles (33), tackles for a loss (eight), sacks (six) and QB hurries (six).

► In the fourth round, the Packers drafted EDGE **Dani Dennis-Sutton** (No. 120 overall) out of Penn State. He finished his career ranked No. 6 in school history in sacks (23½) and tied for No. 5 in forced fumbles (seven). Dennis-Sutton earned third-team All-Big Ten recognition from the coaches and media in 2025 after posting 42 tackles (26 solo), 12 tackles for a loss, 8½ sacks, three forced fumbles, three passes defended and three blocked punts (tied single-season school record).

► C/G **Jager Burton** (No. 153 overall) out of the University of Kentucky was selected in the fifth round by Green Bay. He played in 51 contests with 47 starts



- at the University of Kentucky in five seasons (2021-25), starting all 47 games he played in over his final four seasons. During his collegiate career, Burton started 23 games at left guard, 15 games at center and nine contests at right guard. In 2025, he earned third-team All-SEC honors from the Pro Football and Sports Network and in 2022, he was selected by the coaches for the SEC All-Freshman Team, becoming the first Wildcat offensive linemen to earn the honor since Logan Stenberg in 2016.
- ▶ The sixth round saw the Packers first draft CB **Domani Jackson** (No. 201 overall) from the University of Alabama. He appeared in 46 games with 23 starts during his collegiate career, spending his first two seasons at the University of Southern California (2022-23) and his final two for the Crimson Tide (2024-25).
 - ▶ Green Bay traded back into the sixth round to draft K **Trey Smack** (No. 216 overall) out of the University of Florida. He made 53 of 64 field goals (82.8 pct.) and 100 of 101 extra points (99.0 pct.) during his Gator career. Smack set the school record with 10 made field goals of 50-plus yards (10-13, 76.9 pct.) over his final three seasons. He connected on 80-plus percent of his FG attempts in all three seasons as the primary kicker for the Gators (2023-25). Smack also recorded touchbacks on 177 of 237 kickoff attempts (74.7 pct.) in his career (2022-25).

A LOOK AT THE SCHEDULE

The Green Bay Packers' 2026 NFL schedule will feature nine home games and eight road contests and is highlighted by six prime-time contests (subject to flexible scheduling).

- ▶ Of the 17 games on the schedule, seven will be against teams that made the playoffs last season, including four versus division champions.
- ▶ The Packers will open the season on the road for the seventh time in the last eight seasons when they travel a state over to take on the Minnesota Vikings. It is the fourth time in the last five years that Green Bay has opened the season against a division foe. It is the third time in team history that the Packers open the season at Minnesota (2020 and 2022).
- ▶ The Packers follow it up with a trip out east to take on the New York Jets in Week 2.
- ▶ Week 3 has a short turnaround as the Packers welcome the Atlanta Falcons to Lambeau Field for a Thursday night matchup.
- ▶ Green Bay returns to the road in Week 4 when it travels to take on the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.
- ▶ A home game against the Chicago Bears in Week 5 starts a run of three home games in four weeks and four matchups against NFC opponents.
- ▶ The Dallas Cowboys visit on a Sunday night in Week 6.
- ▶ The Packers then travel across the lake to face the Detroit Lions before a short turnaround as Green Bay hosts the Carolina Panthers on a Thursday night in Week 8.

- ▶ Green Bay makes another run out east to take on the AFC champs from last season in the Patriots, the first visit to New England since 2018, which was also a Week 9 contest.
- ▶ The Packers welcome the Vikings at Lambeau Field before a Week 11 bye.
- ▶ In Week 12, Green Bay goes west to Los Angeles to face the Rams on Thanksgiving Eve.
- ▶ The Packers finish the second of two back-to-back road stretches with a trip to face the Saints in New Orleans in Week 13.
- ▶ The regular season finishes with four of the final five contests at home.
- ▶ Week 14 is a prime-time matchup at home against the Buffalo Bills on Sunday Night Football.
- ▶ The Packers finish their AFC East slate by hosting the Miami Dolphins the next week.
- ▶ The final regular-season road game will take place in Chicago on Christmas against the Bears, marking the third Christmas meeting between the Packers and Bears (2005, 2011) and the first at Soldier Field.
- ▶ The Houston Texans come to Lambeau Field for a matchup on *Monday Night Football* in Week 17.
- ▶ The regular-season finale will be at home against the Detroit Lions on a day and time to be determined. It is the fourth time under Head Coach Matt LaFleur that Green Bay will end the season against Detroit (2019, 2021-22).

PACKERS REACH THIRD STRAIGHT POSTSEASON

The Green Bay Packers made the postseason for the third consecutive season. Green Bay was **one of six NFL teams** to make the playoffs in each of the last three seasons (2023-25), joining Buffalo, Houston, the Los Angeles Rams, Philadelphia and Pittsburgh.

- ▶ Dating back to 2019, Green Bay has made the postseason six times, tied with Kansas City and Philadelphia for the **second-most postseason appearances in the NFL** over that span (Buffalo, seven).
- ▶ The Packers made the postseason for the 38th time, the **most by a team in NFL history** (Dallas, 36).
- ▶ It was the 14th playoff appearance for Green Bay in 17 years, the **most in the NFL over that span**.
- ▶ Dating back to realignment (2002), Green Bay **leads the NFC** with 17 playoff appearances.
- ▶ It was the franchise's 25th playoff appearance in the last 33 seasons (1993-2025), the **most in the NFL** over that span.
- ▶ Green Bay (37) has the **third-most postseason wins in league history** (San Francisco, 40 / New England, 40).
- ▶ The Packers have 13 wins in playoff road games, **No. 1 in the NFL** (Baltimore and Tennessee rank No. 2 with 11).
- ▶ Green Bay has played 33 road playoff games, the **most in the NFL** (L.A. Rams rank No. 2 with 31).
- ▶ 2025 was the second time the Packers played three Saturday games (including playoffs) in a season (1953).
- ▶ The Wild Card game at Chicago was the **first time in team history** that the Packers had four different wide receivers post a TD catch in a postseason game.
- ▶ QB **Jordan Love** completed 24 of 46 passes for 323 yards, four TDs and a passer rating of 103.8 in the 2025 Wild Card contest, joining QBs Bart Starr (Jan. 1, 1967) and Aaron Rodgers (Jan. 8, 2017) as the **only players in team history** to post 300-plus passing yards and four TDs with no INTs in a playoff game.
- ▶ WR **Matthew Golden** became the **second rookie in team history** (WR Davante Adams vs. Dallas on Jan. 11, 2015) to post 80-plus receiving yards and a receiving TD in a playoff game.
- ▶ P **Daniel Whelan** posted a 48.8-yard gross punting average against the Bears in the Wild Card game, the top single-game mark (min. four punts) in team postseason history.

2025 REGULAR-SEASON NOTES

- ▶ It was the sixth time in seven seasons under LaFleur that the Packers have won nine-plus games (2019-21, 2023-25). Green Bay is **tied for No. 2 in the league** in seasons with nine-plus wins since 2019 (Buffalo ranks No. 1 with seven).
- ▶ Since 2019, the Packers have six winning seasons, **tied for No. 2 in the NFL** over the span behind the Bills (seven).
- ▶ The Packers have won six-plus games in 20 consecutive seasons (since 2006). Only the Steelers have a longer active streak (37 consecutive seasons).
- ▶ Green Bay finished the regular season with a 5-3 (.625) home record, its eighth straight season (2018-25) with a winning record at Lambeau Field. The Chiefs were the **only other NFL team** with a winning record at

home each season from 2018-25.

- ▶ The Packers were 4-4-1 on the road, marking the fifth time in seven seasons under LaFleur that Green Bay finished with a record of .500 or better on the road.
- ▶ Green Bay finished 4-2 in division games in the regular season, a .667 winning percentage that **tied for No. 6 in the NFL** (five AFC teams tied for No. 1, 5-1, .833).
- ▶ The Packers (4-2) finished tied for the **best division record in the NFC North** for the 2025 regular season (Minnesota, 4-2 / Chicago and Detroit, 2-4).
- ▶ Green Bay played in six prime-time games during the regular season (**tied for No. 3 in the NFL**), including two of their last three contests. The Packers played their seventh prime-time game in the Wild Card Playoff to **tie for the most in the league** (Baltimore, Kansas City and San Francisco) in the regular and postseason. It was the third time since 2000 (2012, 2015) that Green Bay played seven prime-time games in a season (including playoffs).
- ▶ With 13 giveaways last season, it marked the fourth time under Head Coach **Matt LaFleur** (2019-21, 2025) that the Packers posted 13 or fewer giveaways in a season. He became only the **second coach in NFL history** to guide a team to four seasons with 13 or fewer giveaways (Bill Belichick with New England in 2010, 2014 and 2016-17).
- ▶ Green Bay has 109 giveaways since 2019, the fewest in the NFL over that span (New Orleans is No. 2 with 129) and the fewest over a seven-season span in team history.
- ▶ The Packers have 19 zero-giveaway divisional games since 2019, **No. 1 in the NFL**. Green Bay is 17-2 in those contests.
- ▶ Dating back to 1933, the 2025 season marked the **first time** the Packers won four straight road games in a single season while not turning the ball over in any of the games.
- ▶ Last season was the first time Green Bay swept the season series against Detroit since 2020. The Packers split the season series with both Chicago and Minnesota this season.
- ▶ Dating back to the 1970 merger, last season was the first time the Packers played two games against a divisional opponent (Detroit) in a season and did not allow a sack or turn the ball over in either game.
- ▶ The Packers (2023-25) became the **first NFL team** since the merger to not turn the ball over or allow a sack in three straight Thanksgiving games.
- ▶ The Packers have won five of their last six Thanksgiving meetings against the Lions.
- ▶ The Packers are 55-28-1 in conference games since 2019, a .661 winning percentage that ranks **No. 1 in the NFC** and **No. 3 in the NFL**. Green Bay finished 7-4-1 in conference games during the 2025 regular season, a .625 winning percentage that ranked **No. 4 in the NFC**.
- ▶ Green Bay has a plus-37 turnover margin in conference play since 2019, **No. 1 in the NFC** and **No. 2 in the NFL** over that span (Pittsburgh, plus-45).
- ▶ The Packers allowed 20.8 points per conference game last regular season, **No. 1 in the NFC** and **tied for No. 6 in the NFL**.

- ▶ Green Bay allowed fewer than 300 yards eight times last season (**tied for No. 8 in the NFL**), the most in a season by Green Bay since 2010 (nine).
- ▶ The Packers allowed a **league-low** 26 first-quarter points in 2025 (Seattle was No. 2 with 51). Per Elias, it was the fewest first-quarter points allowed by the Packers in a season since 1978 (20 points allowed). It was the fewest by an NFL team since the 2018 Cowboys (24).
- ▶ The Packers did not allow a point in the first quarter in the first five games of the 2025 season, the longest single-season streak by Green Bay since a six-game streak in 1995 (Weeks 1-4, 6), per Elias.
- ▶ Dating back to the 2024 season, the Packers have not allowed any points on an opening drive in 15 of the last 21 games. The Packers' streak of nine straight games (Week 16 of 2024 - Week 4 of 2025, Week 6 of 2025) was the **second-longest streak by Green Bay** behind only a 10-game streak in 2012 (Weeks 1-9, 11), dating back to 2000 (per TruMedia).
- ▶ Green Bay went 13 straight opening drives without allowing a touchdown (Weeks 15-18 of 2024, Weeks 1-4 and 6-10 of 2025). The last time the Packers had a longer stretch was 23 straight from December 2014 to October 2016 (STATS).
- ▶ Green Bay gave up 148 first-half points last season, **No. 4 in the NFL**.
- ▶ The Packers held nine of their opponents to 20 points or less last season, **No. 9 in the NFL**.
- ▶ The 2025 season was the **third time since 2000** (2001, 2019) that Green Bay held each of its first three opponents to less than 20 points (13, 18, 13).
- ▶ In 2024-25, the Packers held their opponents to 20 points or less 18 times, **No. 7 in the NFL** over that span.
- ▶ Green Bay allowed 25 or fewer points in 14 games last season, **tied for No. 4 in the NFL**, and in 26 games over the past two seasons (2024-25), **tied for No. 2 in the league** (Philadelphia was No. 1 with 29).
- ▶ The Packers allowed 24 or fewer points in 14 consecutive home games (Week 7 of 2024 to Week 14 of 2025). It was the **longest home streak by Green Bay** dating back to the 1970 AFL-NFL merger.
- ▶ Green Bay allowed 17.9 points per game at home last season, **No. 6 in the NFL**.
- ▶ The Packers allowed 21 or fewer points in seven of eight home games last season. It was the first time since 1996 that the Packers held their opponent to 21 points or less points in each of the first seven home contests.
- ▶ The Packers have won 15 of their last 21 games against teams from outside their division. Green Bay's streak of 11 straight wins against teams outside of the NFC North, which is the **longest streak by the Packers** in games played outside the division since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger (per Elias) and the longest streak by an NFC North team since divisional realignment in 2002, was snapped with a Week 3 loss at Cleveland.
- ▶ Green Bay gave up 145 total yards, posted five sacks and allowed 10 first downs in Week 12 vs. Minnesota, marking the first time the Packers had given up fewer than 150 yards, fewer than seven points and 10 or fewer first downs, and recorded five-plus sacks in a game since Dec. 21, 2014, at Tampa Bay.
- ▶ In Week 12, the Packers posted a season-high three

- takeaways and improved to 40-6 (.870) under LaFleur when they register multiple takeaways in a game.
- ▶ Dating back to 1978, the 4 yards allowed in the second half of Week 12 were the fewest given up in any half by Green Bay (per Elias).
- ▶ The Packers recorded three takeaways and 4 yards allowed in the second half of Week 12. Per Elias, the last NFL team to register three-plus takeaways and allow fewer than 5 total yards in a half was the Buffalo Bills against the Cleveland Browns on Dec. 12, 2004. The Bills had three takeaways and allowed 2 yards in the first half of that game.
- ▶ The Week 8 win at Pittsburgh (Oct. 26, 2025) was just the **third time in team history** (all under LaFleur) that the Packers posted 35-plus points, 450-plus total yards, no turnovers and no sacks allowed in a game (Sept. 13, 2020, at Minnesota / Jan. 2, 2022, vs. Minnesota). It was just the third time that a team hit those marks against the Steelers (Washington on Nov. 17, 1991 / New England on Nov. 14, 2020).
- ▶ The Week 4 tie at Dallas (40-40) was the **second-highest-scoring tie in NFL history** (43-43, Oakland Raiders at Boston Patriots in Week 6, 1964). It was the first tie for Green Bay since Week 2 of 2018 vs. Minnesota. The game ended with nine consecutive scoring drives (by either team), the most consecutive scoring drives to end any game dating back to 1993.
- ▶ The Packers won five games last season by two-plus possessions, **tied for No. 9 in the NFL** (Los Angeles Rams and Seattle tied for No. 1 with eight).
- ▶ The Packers scored 27-plus points in nine games last season, **tied for No. 7 in the NFL**. Green Bay was 8-0-1 in those contests.
- ▶ The Packers scored 20-plus points in six of nine road games last season (**tied for No. 9 in the NFL**) and were 4-1-1 in those contests. Dating back to 2023, Green Bay has scored 20-plus points in 20 road games, **tied for No. 2 in the NFL** over that span (Baltimore, 23). The Packers' streak of scoring 20-plus points in 12 straight road games in the regular season, the **longest streak in team history** (STATS), came to an end in Week 3 at Cleveland in 2025.
- ▶ Green Bay averaged 13.2 points per game in the second half/OT last season, **No. 7 in the NFL**.
- ▶ The Packers' defense finished the regular season ranked in the **top 10 of the NFL** in yards per play (5.0, **No. 9**), yards per passing play (6.01, **No. 8**), goal-to-go percentage (68.97, **No. 9**), Next Gen Stat pressure rate (36.6, **No. 8**), NGS QB pressures (223, **No. 10**) and QB hits (98, **t-No. 9**).
- ▶ Green Bay allowed 101 explosive plays (12-plus-yard rushes / 16-plus-yard receptions) this season, **No. 10 in the NFL**.
- ▶ The Packers allowed 68 explosive passing plays, **tied for No. 10 in the league** last season.
- ▶ Green Bay allowed five or fewer explosive plays in 10 games last season. The Packers gave up zero explosive rushing plays in four contests last season and zero explosive passing plays in one game.
- ▶ The Packers allowed one or fewer explosive rush plays in eight games last season and were 6-2 in those contests.
- ▶ Green Bay finished **tied for No. 4 in the NFL** with an explosive-play differential of plus-27 last season and

was **No. 3 in the league** with a plus-48 differential over the past two seasons (2024-25). The previous top single-season mark by Green Bay since 2000 was plus-21 in both 2000 and 2024.

- ▶ The Packers won the explosive-play differential in 12 games last season (tied with 2009 for the most by the Packers in a season dating back to 2000), tied in three games and lost in just two games this season. The Packers won the explosive-play differential in the first five games of the 2025 season, the **longest single-season streak by the Packers** since a five-game streak in 2009.
- ▶ Green Bay allowed fewer than 5 yards per play in 10 of 17 games last season.
- ▶ The Packers registered 26 NGS QB pressures at Arizona in Week 7, their **most in a game** dating back to 2016 (previous high was 24 at Chicago on Sept. 10, 2023).
- ▶ In the 2025 regular season, the Green Bay offense ranked near the top of the league in the following explosive categories: plays (128, **No. 6**), receptions (90, **tied for No. 5**), 20-plus-yard completions (58, **No. 6**), 50-plus-yard completions (four, **tied for No. 6**), 10-plus-yard rushes (57, **No. 6**).
- ▶ Dating back to 2024, the Packers rank in the top five of the NFL in explosive plays:

- ▶ Last season in the red zone, the Green Bay offense ranked at or near the top of the league in yards per play (3.5, **No. 1**), yards per carry (3.3, **No. 3**) and yards per pass attempt (4.0, **No. 8**).
- ▶ In third-and-long (7 or more yards), the Packers **led the NFL** in conversion percentage (38.4) and tied New England for the league lead in opponent conversion percentage (15.4) this season. Dating back to 1995 (per STATS), the Packers are the only team to **lead the NFL (or tie for the league lead)** in both categories in the same season.
- ▶ The Green Bay offense finished in the **top 10 in the NFL** in the following categories last season:

- ▶ Dating back to 1970, the 2025 Packers' third-down percentage (48.8) was the third best by Green Bay in a single season (49.4 in 2020 and 49.1 in 1995).
- ▶ Green Bay tied (1943, 1995, 2011, 2020 and 2021) the **single-season franchise record** for fewest fumbles in a season with six in 2025.
- ▶ The 13 giveaways by the Packers last season tied (2014, 2019, 2021) the **second-best mark in team history** (11 in 2020).
- ▶ The Packers rushed for a season-high 192 yards in Week 16 at Chicago, their most rushing yards since Week 2, 2024 vs Indianapolis (261 rush yds).

- ▶ During the four-game winning streak from Weeks 11-14, the Packers scored TDs on nine of 11 red-zone drives (81.8 pct.) and converted 28 of 49 third downs (57.1 pct.).
- ▶ Green Bay posted a red-zone TD efficiency of 60-plus percent in 10 games last season.
- ▶ Green Bay has won 15 of its last 16 regular-season games when it does not have a giveaway. The Packers are 44-6 (.880) under LaFleur when they don't turn the ball over. The 50 zero-giveaway games since 2019 **lead the NFL** over that span (Philadelphia ranks No. 2 with 43; 36-7).
- ▶ Week 18 was the 26th time under LaFleur that the Packers did not turn the ball over on the road (22-4 record in those games), **tied for No. 1 in the league** since 2019.
- ▶ Green Bay's third-down percentage in Week 4 at Dallas (71.4, 10 of 14) was the **second-best** mark in a game under LaFleur, trailing only the 72.7 percentage (8 of 11) vs. Detroit on Dec. 13, 2020.
- ▶ Eight different Packers led or tied for the team lead in receiving yards for at least a game last season (**Matthew Golden** in Weeks 3, 6 and 15 (tied with Reed) / **Josh Jacobs** in Weeks 4 and 10 / **Jakobie Keeney-James** in Week 18 / **Tucker Kraft** in Weeks 2 and 8 / **Romeo Doubs** in Weeks 1, 7, 9, 11 and 16 / **Jayden Reed** in Week 15 (tied with Golden) **Christian Watson** in Weeks 12, 14 and 17 / **Dontayvion Wicks** in Week 13).
- ▶ In Week 4, the Packers gained 32 first downs, **tied for the third most in a game in team history** behind only the 37 at Philadelphia on Nov. 11, 1962, and the 35 at the N.Y. Jets on Dec. 23, 2018.
- ▶ QB **Jordan Love** **tied for No. 5 in the NFL** last season in games with a passer rating of 110-plus (six), trailing Jared Goff (seven), Drake Maye (eight), Sam Darnold (eight) and Matthew Stafford (eight).
- ▶ Love is 13-0-1 as a starter when he has a 115-plus passer rating.
- ▶ Love **tied for No. 6 in the NFL** in games with a 100-plus passer rating last season (eight) and Green Bay was 7-0-1 in those contests. Love posted four of those on the road, **tied for No. 5 in the league**.
- ▶ Love had a combined 112.9 rating in the five NFC North contests he played in last season (73 of 111 for 872 yards and nine TDs with one INT), ranking **No. 3 in the NFL** in passer rating in division games in 2025 (Maye, 121.4; Stafford, 114.2).
- ▶ Love finished the regular season in the **top 10 of the NFL** in the following passing categories:

- ▶ Love's eight TD passes were **tied for No. 9 in the league** last season in prime time.
- ▶ Love has registered 102 passing plays of 25-plus yards since 2023, **tied for No. 2 in the NFL over that span** (Goff, 107).
- ▶ Love (1981) passed QB Don Majkowski (889, 1987-92) for the **fifth-most completions in franchise history**. QB Lynn Dickey (1976-77, 1979-85) holds the **No. 4** spot with 1,592 completions.
- ▶ Love is the **sixth QB in franchise history** with 75-plus career TD passes (83).
- ▶ Dating back to 1970, Love is the **only NFL QB** to have a 120-plus passer rating (min. 15 pass att.) in three Thanksgiving games (2023-25).
- ▶ Love is the **first Packers QB since 1950** to lead the team to three wins on Thanksgiving.
- ▶ In Week 14, Love threw three TD passes of 20-plus yards (23, 45, 41) for the **first time in his career**, becoming the first Green Bay QB to do so in a game since Aaron Rodgers (Week 7 vs. Oakland in 2019).
- ▶ Love played in his 50th NFL game in Week 9 and became just the **fourth QB in NFL history** with 10,000-plus passing yards (10,225), 70-plus passing TDs (73) and fewer than 30 INTs (28) in his first 50 games, joining Patrick Mahomes, Russell Wilson and Dak Prescott as the only QBs to hit those marks.
- ▶ Love went over the 10,000-yard passing mark for his career in Week 9 and did so on the 1,308th passing attempt of his career to become the **second fastest to 10,000 passing yards in team history** (Rodgers, 1,299 attempts).
- ▶ In Week 8 at Pittsburgh, Love became the **first quarterback in franchise history** to hit the following marks in a single game: 350-plus passing yards, three-plus passing TDs, zero INTs, zero sacks, 75-plus completions percentage and 9.5-plus yards per attempt.
- ▶ In Week 8, Love joined Rodgers and Brett Favre (twice) as the **only Packers quarterbacks** with 350-plus passing yards, zero interceptions, and zero sacks taken in a single game.
- ▶ Love recorded 20 straight completions from the second quarter to the fourth quarter in Week 8, **tied for the franchise record** (Favre, Week 12, 2007).
- ▶ Love became the **fifth NFL quarterback** with 1,750-plus passing yards, 13-plus passing TDs, two or fewer INTs, a 70-plus percent completion percentage and an average of 8-plus passing yards per attempt through the first seven games of a season (Matt Ryan, 2018 / Drew Brees, 2018 / Alex Smith, 2017 / Tom Brady, 2007).
- ▶ Love was **one of three NFL quarterbacks** to post 70-plus passing TDs (71) and 25 or fewer INTs (25) in his first 40 career starts (Lamar Jackson, 70/21 and Mahomes, 101/19).
- ▶ Love recorded 16 games with multiple passing TDs/zero INTs in his first 40 starts, **No. 2 in the NFL** (Mahomes, 19). Love **tied for No. 5 in the league** this season with six such games.
- ▶ Love made his 35th career start in Week 2 and became just the **fifth NFL quarterback** to post 60-plus TD passes (62) and fewer than 25 interceptions (23) in his first 35 pro starts, joining Jackson, Mahomes, Rodgers and Carson Wentz.

- ▶ Love posted 14 career starts with multiple TD passes (two) and no INTs in his first 35 starts. That ranked **No. 3 in NFL history by a QB in his first 35 starts** behind only Mahomes (16) and Brock Purdy (15).
- ▶ In Week 4 at Dallas, Love **became the first player in team history** with 30-plus completions, 300-plus passing yards, three-plus TD passes, zero INTs and 25-plus rushing yards in a game.
- ▶ Love's streak of consecutive passing attempts without an INT ended at 249 in Week 3, the **sixth-longest streak in team history** behind Rodgers (402, 277, 257, 251) and QB Bart Starr (294).
- ▶ From Week 12 of 2024 through Week 2 of 2025, Love posted nine straight games without an INT (min. 10 att.), which **tied the longest streak by a Packer since the 1970 merger** (Rodgers, nine straight in 2018).
- ▶ Love posted **three of the top eight passer ratings as a starter of his career** (including the postseason) this season (No. 2 was 134.2 in Week 8 / No. 5 was 128.6 in Week 1 / No. 8 was 124.2 in Week 13).
- ▶ RB **Josh Jacobs** finished the 2025 regular season ranked **near the top of the NFL** in rushing TDs:

- ▶ Jacobs is **tied for No. 4 in the NFL** with 28 rushing TDs since 2024.
- ▶ Since 2024, Jacobs **leads the NFL** with 23 rushing TDs in goal-to-go situations.
- ▶ Jacobs had a rushing TD in 10 games last season (**tied for the league high**).
- ▶ With 28 rushing TDs as a Packer, Jacobs moved past RB Eddie Lacy (20 in 2013-14) for the **most rushing TDs by a player in his first two seasons with the team**.
- ▶ Jacobs (28) is a rushing TD away from tying John Brockington and Rote (29) for **No. 9 in franchise history**.
- ▶ Jacobs has 74 career rushing TDs, **No. 3 among active players** (Bills QB Josh Allen, 79 / Ravens RB Derrick Henry, 122).
- ▶ Jacobs had three games with multiple rushing TDs last season, **tied for No. 7 in the NFL**. His six games with multiple rushing TDs over the last two seasons (2024-25) **tied for No. 6 in the NFL** over that span. Jacobs has 18 career games with two-plus rushing TDs, **No. 2 in the NFL** since 2019 (Henry, 28).
- ▶ Jacobs posted a rushing TD in a **franchise-record** (since 1933) 10 consecutive home games (Week 9 of 2024 to Week 14 of 2025), per Elias. Jacobs has posted 13 rushing TDs in the last 11 games he has played at Lambeau Field.
- ▶ Jacobs is the **only player in the NFL** to post 1,100-plus yards from scrimmage and six-plus scrimmage TDs in each of the last seven seasons (2019-25). He is **one of six players in NFL history** to hit those marks in each of his first seven seasons in the league (Eric Dickerson, Adrian Peterson, Emmitt Smith, LaDainian Tomlinson and Ricky Watters).
- ▶ Jacobs is the **fifth NFL player since 2000** with at least 1,100 scrimmage yards in each of his first seven sea-

- sons, joining Matt Forte, Alvin Kamara, Peterson and Tomlinson.
- ▶ Jacobs posted three straight games with multiple rushing TDs in the same season for the first time in his career (Weeks 4, 6-7, 2025). Jacobs was the **first Packer to do so since Jim Taylor in 1961**. Over the last 20 seasons, only Tomlinson had a longer streak in the NFL (eight games).
 - ▶ Jacobs had a rushing TD in six consecutive games (Week 4 and Weeks 6-10, 2025), **tied for the third-longest streak in team history** behind his own 10-game streak (2024-25) and Paul Hornung's seven-game streak in 1960.
 - ▶ Jacobs posted a rushing TD in 11 consecutive games (including the playoffs) from Week 11 of the 2024 season through Week 2 last season. It **tied for the second-longest streak** in the NFL since 2000 behind only Tomlinson (12 straight in 2004).
 - ▶ Jacobs is **one of four players in NFL history** to post 7,500 rushing yards, 70-plus rushing TDs, 250-plus receptions and 2,000-plus receiving yards in his first seven seasons (Barry Sanders, Smith and Tomlinson).
 - ▶ In Week 10, Jacobs became the **sixth player since 2000 with a rushing touchdown in 50 of his first 100 career games**, joining Tomlinson (64 games), Peterson (60), Shaun Alexander (58), Ezekiel Elliott (52) and Henry (50).
 - ▶ Jacobs' 25 rushing TDs as a Packer were the **most in team history by a player in his first 25 games with the team**. Jacobs **tied for No. 3 in NFL history for the most rushing TDs by a player in his first 25 games with a team** behind only RBs Michael Turner (27 with Atlanta) and Jim Brown (26 with Cleveland), per Elias.
 - ▶ Jacobs joined FB Taylor (three straight, 1960-62) as the **only players in team history with 10-plus rushing TDs in back-to-back seasons**. Jacobs (two), Taylor (three) and RB Ahman Green (two) are the **only players with multiple 10-plus rushing-TD seasons in franchise history**.
 - ▶ Jacobs has registered a rushing TD in eight of his last 10 prime-time games. Week 16 was the end of his streak of eight straight prime-time games with a rushing TD, the **longest streak by an NFL player** since the 1970 merger.
 - ▶ Jacobs **tied for No. 3 in the NFL** with five rushing TDs in prime-time games last season.
 - ▶ Jacobs recorded 150-plus yards from scrimmage in two straight games (150 vs. Cincinnati in Week 6 and 157 at Dallas in Week 4), the first Packer to do so in a single season since Green in 2003 (Weeks 9-10).
 - ▶ Jacobs became the **third player since the 1970 merger** (Tomlinson in 2006 and Priest Holmes in 2002) to register 80-plus rushing yards, two-plus rushing TDs and 50-plus receiving yards in consecutive games (Weeks 4 and 6).
 - ▶ In Week 4, Jacobs became just the **third Packer** to post 85-plus rushing yards, 70-plus receiving yards and multiple rushing TDs in a game, joining RBs Dorsey Levens (at Indianapolis on Nov. 16, 1997) and Aaron Jones (at Dallas on Oct. 6, 2019).

- ▶ WR **Christian Watson** (three) is the **fourth player in Packers history** with five-plus receiving TDs in at least three of his first four career seasons, joining Don Hutson (four), Antonio Freeman (three) and Max McGee (three).
- ▶ Watson had three TD receptions of 35-plus yards last season, the most by a Packer in a season since Watson registered three of 35-plus yards in 2022.
- ▶ Among players with 30-plus carries, WR **Jayden Reed** ranks **No. 1 in the NFL** in explosive-run percentage since 2023 (38.2, 13-34) with QB **Malik Willis** (19.1, 9-47) ranking **No. 2 in the league** over that span.
- ▶ CB **Keisean Nixon** **tied for No. 6 in the NFL** last season in passes defended:

- ▶ Nixon posted five games last season with multiple passes defended, **tied for No. 3 in the league**. Nixon's five games with multiple passes defended were the most by a Packer in a season since CB Jaire Alexander (five) in 2019.
- ▶ Nixon's 17 passes defended were the most by a Packer in a season since Alexander posted 17 in 2019.
- ▶ According to TruMedia, LB **Edgerrin Cooper** (4.67) ranks **No. 7 in the NFL** this season in lowest average offense yards gained when the player made the tackle (min. 100 tackles).
- ▶ In Week 18 at Minnesota, DL **Barryn Sorrell** became the **first Green Bay rookie dating back to 2000** to register eight-plus tackles, a sack and a fumble recovery in a game. He became the **first Green Bay defensive lineman** to hit those marks in a game since Vonnie Holliday did so at Tennessee on Dec. 16, 2001.
- ▶ P **Daniel Whelan** set the **single-season franchise records** for gross punting average (51.7) and net punting average (43.9 avg.), Whelan's 51.7-yard punting average was the third-best single-season mark by an NFL punter (min. 40 punts) behind Ryan Stonehouse (53.10 in 2022 and 53.06 in 2023)
- ▶ Since the 1970 NFL-AFL merger, Whelan is the only Green Bay punter to **lead the league** in gross punting average.
- ▶ Whelan's 50.8-yard net average in Week 18 at Minnesota was the **second-best mark by an NFL player since 2000** in games with eight-plus punts behind only Johnny Hekker's 52.9-yard net average on eight punts at New England on Dec. 4, 2016.



AWARDS AND HONORS

ALL-PRO

- ▶ DL **Micah Parsons** earned first-team All-Pro honors from *The Associated Press*. It was the fourth time in his career that he's been voted to the AP All-Pro team. Parsons earned first-team honors in 2021-22 and second-team recognition in 2023. He was the first Packers edge rusher to be named first-team All-Pro since Za'Darius Smith in 2020.
- ▶ Parsons was also named one of five finalists for the AP NFL Defensive Player of the Year, joining DE Myles Garrett, DE Will Anderson Jr., DE Aidan Hutchinson and LB Nik Bonitto. It was the fourth time he has been a finalist for NFL Defensive Player of the Year in his five seasons. Parsons has finished third in the voting in 2025 and 2023 and was second in the voting his first two years in the league (2021-22).
- ▶ S **Xavier McKinney** earned second-team All-Pro honors from the AP. It was his second straight selection to the AP All-Pro team, having earned first-team honors in his first season with the Packers (2024). He was the first Packer since DB Charles Woodson (2008-11) to make the All-Pro defensive team in consecutive seasons.
- ▶ Other Packers players who received All-Pro votes included P **Daniel Whelan** (received three first-place votes), T **Zach Tom**, WR **Christian Watson**, S **Evan Williams**, LB **Edgerrin Cooper**, CB **Keisean Nixon** and LS **Matt Orzech**.

ALL-NFC

- ▶ Parsons was named to the All-NFC team by the Pro Football Writers of America, marking his fifth selection to the team.

PRO BOWL

- ▶ Parsons was selected to his fifth consecutive Pro Bowl, becoming the first defensive player to be named to the Pro Bowl in each of his first five career seasons since former Los Angeles Rams DL Aaron Donald (10).
- ▶ Parsons **tied for No. 5 in the NFL** in sacks last season (12.5).
- ▶ Parsons is the **only NFL player** (since 1982) with 12-plus sacks in each of his first five seasons (2021-25).
- ▶ Parsons **tied for No. 1 in the league** last season in sacks in the fourth quarter/overtime (eight).
- ▶ Parsons (65.0) ranks **No. 5 in the NFL** for sacks by a player in their first five seasons since 1982, trailing Reggie White (81.0), J.J. Watt (74.5), T.J. Watt (72.0) and Derrick Thomas (66.0).
- ▶ Parsons (65.0), who is 26 years old, has the **fifth-most sacks by a player under the age of 27 since 1982**. Only J.J. Watt (74.5 sacks), Myles Garrett (72), White (70) and Derrick Thomas (66) have more.
- ▶ Parsons has 18 career games with two-plus sacks, the **fourth-most games with at least two sacks by a player in their first five seasons** since 1982. Only White (24), J.J. Watt (21) and Richard Dent (19) have more.
- ▶ Parsons ranked in the **top five of the NFL** last season in NGS QB pressures (83, No. 1), NGS pressure rate (21.3 pct., No. 2) and QB hits (26, t-No. 5).
- ▶ Dating back to 2016 when pressures were first tracked by NGS, Parsons' 83 pressures are the **most by a Packer in a single season** (73 by LB Za'Darius Smith in 2019 was the previous high).
- ▶ CB **Keisean Nixon** was named to the Pro Bowl Games as a replacement for Seattle Seahawks CB Devon Witherspoon, who was unable to participate due to the Super Bowl.
- ▶ It was the first career Pro Bowl selection for Nixon, who started a career-high 17 games for the Packers

this season, recording 72 tackles (58 solo, No. 2 on the team), three tackles for a loss, an interception, a fumble recovery and a career-high 17 passes defended (tied for No. 6 in the NFL).

- ▶ His team-high 17 passes defended were the most by a Packer in a season since CB Jaire Alexander recorded 17 in 2019.

IN-SEASON AWARDS

- ▶ Love earned **NFC Offensive Player of the Week** for games played in Week 13 (November 27-28, November 30, December 1). It was the fourth career Offensive Player of the Week award for Love and second this season (Week 8, Oct 23, 26-27). Love is the third Packers quarterback to win the award four times (2023: Weeks 17, 18 / 2025: Week 8, 13), joining Aaron Rodgers (14-time winner) and Pro Football Hall of Famer Brett Favre (12). Love is the only former Utah State player to win four Player of the Week awards.
- ▶ Love was selected the **FedEx Air Player of the Week** via fan vote for his performances in Week 8 and in the win on Thanksgiving at Detroit in Week 13. FedEx will proudly offer a \$2,000 donation for each win in Love's name to Feeding America for a local food bank in Green Bay.
- ▶ Parsons was named **NFC Defensive Player of the Month for October** (Weeks 5-8). Parsons was the only player in the NFC in the month of October to record three sacks in a game (Week 8 at Arizona) and finished the month with four sacks, tied for No. 2 in the NFC and five tackles for loss, tied for No. 3. Green Bay was the only NFC team to go undefeated (3-0) from Weeks 5-8. The award marks Parsons' second career Player of the Month honor (September 2023 with Dallas). He is the first Packer to win Defensive Player of the Month since Xavier McKinney (October 2024). Parsons is the second former Penn State defensive player to earn multiple Defensive Player of the Month awards, joining Sean Lee.
- ▶ Parsons earned **NFC Defensive Player of the Week** honors for his performance in Week 7 at Arizona. It was the fourth career Defensive Player of the Week award for Parsons and first as a Packer (2021: Week 8 / 2022: Week 5 / 2023: Week 2). Parsons is the third Packers defensive lineman to earn the honor in the past 20 seasons (2006-25), joining Aaron Kampman (twice) and Dean Lowry. Parsons ties Cameron Wake (four-time winner) for the most Defensive Players of the Week awards won by a former Penn State player.

NFL WALTER PAYTON MAN OF THE YEAR AWARD

The Green Bay Packers announced on Dec. 4 that QB **Jordan Love** was selected as the team's club winner for the **2025 Walter Payton Man of the Year Award**. The award is the league's most prestigious honor, recognizing players who excel on the field and demonstrate a commitment to making a positive impact beyond the game. All 32 club winners will be recognized for their achievements during the week leading up to Super Bowl LX in the Bay Area. The national winner of the 2025 Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award will be announced during NFL Honors, a primetime awards special airing on Thursday, Feb. 5. In May 2024, Love launched his foundation, Hands of 10ve, to empower children from all backgrounds to participate in sports, raise awareness about mental health and suicide prevention and foster stronger relationships between law enforcement and the communities they serve – all causes deeply personal to him. Through 10ve for Cleats, a Hands of 10ve initiative,

AWARDS AND HONORS

Love donates cleats to an entire youth sports team for every touchdown scored during the season. In its first year, the program donated more than 1,300 pairs of cleats to 26 Wisconsin teams, and it is now expanding to include his hometown of Bakersfield, Calif. Hands of 10ve also hosts annual impact events including the Green Bay Charity Softball Game, youth football camps in Bakersfield and Milwaukee, winter coat drives and holiday shopping sprees for local children. Throughout his career, Love has participated in fundraising initiatives for the Salvation Army of Greater Green Bay, Rawhide Youth Services and the Vince Lombardi Cancer Foundation, using his platform to advance their missions and make a tangible difference. A steadfast advocate for mental health awareness, Love has sponsored community walks in Brown County and Kern County to raise visibility for organizations dedicated to suicide prevention and supporting those affected by loss. In April, Love visited the Kern County Youth Detention Center in Bakersfield to share a message about resilience and the importance of making positive choices, ultimately surprising each at-risk youth attendee with a \$20,000 scholarship toward trade school or college. Within the law enforcement community, Love has raised awareness and funds for the Bakersfield Police Activities League (PAL) through the NFL's My Cause My Cleats initiative and has served as a keynote speaker at conferences, encouraging open dialogue around mental health while actively working to build stronger, more compassionate relationships between officers and the communities they serve.

NFL SALUTE TO SERVICE AWARD

The Green Bay Packers nominated T/G **Darian Kinnard** as their **2025 Salute to Service Award** nominee. Each year, the award recognizes NFL players, coaches, staff and alumni who have demonstrated a commitment to honoring and supporting military and veteran communities. Growing up in a family with strong military ties – including his great-grandfather who served as a paratrooper and his mother who worked as a registered nurse at a VA hospital – Kinnard learned from an early age the importance of honoring and thanking servicemembers. In his first season with Green Bay, Kinnard spent time with children whose parents deployed in May with the Army National Guard's 2-127th unit.

ART ROONEY SPORTSMANSHIP AWARD

The Green Bay Packers nominated QB **Jordan Love** for the **twelfth annual Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award**. The award is presented each year to an NFL player who best demonstrates the qualities of on-field sportsmanship, including fair play, respect for the game and opponents and integrity in competition. Created in 2014, the award honors the late founding owner of the Pittsburgh Steelers and Pro Football Hall of Famer Art Rooney Sr. A panel of former players from the NFL Legends Community will select eight finalists (four in the AFC and four in the NFC) from the 32 nominees. The eight finalists will be listed on the Pro Bowl ballot under the NFL Sportsmanship Award category when players vote in December.

ED BLOCK COURAGE AWARD

WR **Christian Watson** was named the Packers' 2025 winner of the Ed Block Courage Award, which is voted on by the players and recognizes a teammate who best exemplifies commitments to the principles of sportsmanship and courage. Each team recognizes an annual recipient for his professionalism, strength and dedication, and for being a role model in the community.

BREAKING DOWN THE ROSTER

The Packers enter the preseason with a 91-man roster that is composed of 47 offensive players, 40 defensive players and four specialists.

- ▶ Of the 91 players on Green Bay's roster, 34 of them (37.4 percent) were draft picks of the Packers.
- ▶ Green Bay has seven players that were drafted in the first round and five were selected by the Packers.
- ▶ Green Bay has 34 players on the roster that began their careers as undrafted free agents.
- ▶ 59.3 percent of the players (54 of 91) on Green Bay's roster entered the league as a sixth-round or seventh-round pick or as an undrafted player.

- ▶ Of the 91 players on the roster, 86 of them (94.5 percent) are 28 years old or younger (as of August 10) and 32 players (35.2 percent) are 24 years old or younger.
- ▶ Of the 91 players on the roster, 72 of them (79.1 percent) played collegiately in the "Power Four" conferences (ACC, Big Ten, Big 12 and SEC).
- ▶ The conference most represented on the roster is the SEC with 26 players while the Big Ten is No. 2 with 17 and the Big 12 is No. 3 with 15.

TRAINING-CAMP MEDIA INFORMATION & POLICIES

TRAINING-CAMP PRACTICE ACCESS

- ▶ All public practices are open in their entirety to credentialed media. Photography (video and still) will be limited to certain periods and areas during training camp.

VIDEO/PHOTO POLICY

- ▶ The team reserves the right to limit photography to certain periods for competitive reasons.
- ▶ During practice periods in which B-roll and still photography are NOT permitted, the media may not utilize camera phones either. The communications staff will alert the media of the permissible "shooting" periods before and during each practice.
- ▶ Video of practice and interviews by an individual or media outlet can be posted on social-media sites in compliance with the NFL online-content policy.
- ▶ No live-streaming or live broadcast of practice, interviews or press conferences is permitted by an individual or media outlet at any time on any platform.
- ▶ Tripods are not allowed to be used while filming from the sideline.

INJURY-FOOTAGE POLICY

- ▶ Again this season, the Packers respectfully ask all photographers (video and still) to follow guidelines related to shooting injured players.
- ▶ No shooting/filming injured players that are rehabbing on and around the practice fields.
- ▶ Photographers are asked to avoid filming, photographing, printing and/or airing any shots of any injury situation, while the injury occurs, while trainers attend to/treat the injured player, and while the player is leaving the field, either on his own or with aid. This includes minor injuries.
- ▶ The team will allow shots of players after they've been treated. For instance, cameras are allowed to shoot a player on the sideline with ice on his knee, after trainers have left.
- ▶ However, cameras are not allowed to film a player on crutches, either on the field or in the locker room.
- ▶ If outlets choose not to respect this policy — or any other policy — the team will have no choice but to consider limiting access to the field.

BLOGGING/SOCIAL MEDIA POLICY

- ▶ During training camp, "X/Twitter, Instagram, Threads, BlueSky, blogging, etc." is allowed during practices, but the Packers would ask that members of the media utilizing the technology adhere to a few simple guidelines. Please note that this policy is for training-camp practices only and does change during the regular season.
- ▶ NO entries about specific schemes, personnel groupings or anything that might be related in any way to game planning. If you have ANY questions about this, please ask a member of the Packers' communications staff before posting.
- ▶ NO entries regarding "football communications," including specific exchanges between coaches and players that might be overheard. Acknowledgement that the conversation occurred is acceptable, but we ask that the details of the conversation be withheld.
- ▶ NO detailed speculation as to the potential nature or severity of an injury until Head Coach Matt LaFleur has addressed it. Once again, acknowledging that an injury occurred and providing general details (i.e., "Right leg..." or "Left wrist...") is permitted, but anything beyond that would be purely speculative and possibly inaccurate.

- ▶ The team would like to continue to keep training-camp practices open to those wishing to utilize blogs and/or X/Twitter, but such a policy is contingent upon media adhering to the guidelines above. If there are ANY questions regarding what is or is not acceptable, please contact a member of the Packers' communications department.

PRIVATE TEAM COMMUNICATION

- ▶ The Packers ask all media, print and electronic, to refrain from reporting or recording any team communication meant solely for the team.
- ▶ This includes the post-practice team huddle, in which LaFleur addresses his players. It also includes mid-practice and/or post-practice communication between any coach and his players, especially conversations of a reprimanding, negative nature.
- ▶ In general, reporting that the conversation took place is acceptable, just not the details of those conversations. Details are not to be relayed to the public either directly (through firsthand hearing), or indirectly (through interviews, even if the subject answers the question).
- ▶ If media has any question as to whether communication should be kept private, please contact the communications department before writing or airing such conversations.

INJURY INFORMATION

- ▶ All injury information will be issued by Head Coach Matt LaFleur. Please do not address injury questions to another coach or staff member.

NFL ONLINE-CONTENT POLICY

- ▶ The Accredited Media Organization may supplement its traditional media distribution platform (e.g., newspaper, television, radio) with other new media distribution platforms that it controls (e.g., websites, official social media accounts, applications, podcasts), provided that, with respect to such new media distribution platforms: (i) any use of film or video or digital still images is limited to a reasonable amount or number (as applicable), and used only to illustrate or support news and editorial coverage of the Game or Event (as opposed to use in connection with or on commercial products (e.g., apparel, posters, commemorative programs, or other types of souvenir or other merchandise, or sponsored content)); (ii) any use of film or video or digital still images is not used to create Simulated Video (as defined below) of game action; (iii) no video of game action is used (except that, if the Accredited Media Organization is a television broadcaster, Game or Event highlights may be shown as part of a single, non-archived, online "simulcast" of any regularly scheduled television news programming the Accredited Media Organization may broadcast, provided it adheres to the limits on such broadcasts set forth below); and (iv) use of non-game audio and video content obtained as a result of credential card access (e.g., press conferences, training camp, practice and/or interviews at NFL or Member Club Facilities or Events): (1) must be limited to 90 seconds maximum per day (180 seconds maximum -- 90 seconds per Member Club -- in two-Member Club markets), (2) may not be posted or streamed "live" or in real time in any form or medium and may not be archived (i.e., made available for on-demand public access for more than 24 hours after posting, etc.), (3) may appear only in an editorial context (i.e., no sponsorship, merchandising or advertising integrated with or around the content, including digital advertising, etc.), and (4) must be accompanied by links back to NFL.com and to the applicable Member Club's web site.
