PRESEASON WEEK 1

PACKERS OPEN PRESEASON AGAINST THE TEXANS

The Packers will hold their first preseason game since 2019 when they welcome the Houston Texans to town Saturday night. Last year, the NFL canceled all preseason contests due to COVID-19.



- ▶ This year is the debut of the new NFL schedule, consisting of three preseason games played in preparation for a 17-game regular season.
- ▶ It is the second time that the Packers have opened the preseason against the Texans, having previously beat them at Lambeau Field, 28-26, in 2019.
- ▶ Green Bay has posted a .500 or better record in the preseason each of the last six preseasons (2014-19).
- ▶ The Packers have won nine consecutive preseason home games, with their last loss coming in 2015.
- ▶ After the Texans game, the Packers will welcome the New York Jets to town for a couple of joint practices (Aug. 18-19) before facing them in Lambeau Field on Saturday, Aug. 21, at 3:25 p.m.
- ▶ Postgame media availability will be conducted with a combination of in-person media and via Zoom.

PACKERS GIVE BACK GAME

- ▶ The preseason matchup between Green Bay and Houston will mark the inaugural Packers Give Back Game, which will annually support a benefiting charity from Wisconsin.
- ▶ The Packers will recognize Big Brothers Big Sisters as the nonprofit honoree for this Saturday's game.
- ▶ Hundreds of youth called "Littles" will receive a free bus ride to the game, enjoy a special tailgate party with their mentors, called "Bigs," and cheer on the team in a designated Big Brothers Big Sisters area in the north end zone.
- ▶ The Packers have worked with Big Brothers Big Sisters of Northeast Wisconsin for many years by awarding grants and donations and providing opportunities for Big/Little matches to enjoy experiences at Packers games and Lambeau Field. Additionally, Packers players, alumni and staff frequently appear at Big Brothers Big Sisters events to help raise awareness for the need for volunteers and mentors. - ▶ This year's Packers Give Back Game will also continue the team's support of Bishop's Charities and the Midwest Shrine Association, traditional recipients of preseason game recognition.

WITH THE CALL

- Preseason games are televised over the 21-station Packers TV Network throughout the state of Wisconsin, Upper Michigan, northeastern Minnesota, Peoria in Illinois, Cedar Rapids-Waterloo, Davenport and Des Moines in Iowa, Omaha in Nebraska, St. Louis in Missouri, Bismarck, Fargo and Minot in North Dakota, Sioux Falls in South Dakota and Anchorage, Fairbanks and Juneau in Alaska.
- ▶ The top-notch broadcast team includes CBS's **Kevin Harlan** (play-by-play) alongside fellow CBS broadcaster and Pro Football Hall of Fame receiver **James Lofton** (analyst), with former Green Bay fullback **John Kuhn** and **Lance Allan** of WTMJ-TV serving as the sideline reporters. Allan will also host an informative half-hour pregame show.

- ▶ In addition to flagship station WTMJ-TV in Milwaukee and WGBA/NBC in Green Bay the game will be televised over, Wis.; WKOW/ABC, Madison, Wis.; WAOW/ABC, Wausau/Rhineland, Wis.; WXOW/ABC, La Crosse, Wis.; WOOW/ABC, Eau Claire, Wis.; WLUC/NBC/FOX UP, Escanaba/Marquette, Mich.; KQDS-TV/FOX, Duluth, Minn./Superior, Wis.; WMDB/CBS, Peoria, Ill.; WHBF/CBS, Davenport, Iowa; KCCI/CBS, Des Moines, Iowa; KWLL/NBC, Cedar Rapids/Waterloo, Iowa; KTVI/FOX, St. Louis, Mo.; KETV/ABC, Omaha, Neb.; KNDB/BEK, Bismarck, N.D.; KRDK/BEK, Fargo, N.D.; KNDM/BEK, Minot, N.D.; KDLT/NBC, Sioux Falls, S.D.; KYUR/ABC, Anchorage, Alaska; KATN/ABC, Fairbanks, Alaska and KJUD/ABC, Juneau, Alaska.
- ▶ Milwaukee's WTMJ (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since November 1929, heads up the Packers Radio Network that is made up of 49 stations in four states. For a full listing of radio affiliates, go to www.packers.com. **Wayne Larrivee** (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler **Larry McCarren** (analyst) call the action. McCarren first joined the team's broadcasts in 1995 and enters his 26th season calling Packers games. After originally being paired together in 1999, McCarren and Larrivee enter their 22nd season of broadcasts together. They surpassed Jim Irvin and Max McGee for the most regular-season and postseason games broadcast for the Packers with 313 at the 2018 season opener against Chicago.

HEAD COACH MATT LAFLEUR

LAFLEUR LEADS THE PACK

Head Coach **Matt LaFleur** (la-flew-er) has led the Packers to back-to-back NFC North titles.

- ▶ According to the Elias Sports Bureau, LaFleur was the **sixth head coach since 1970** to lead their team to the conference championship game in both of his first two seasons as a head coach, joining Jim Harbaugh (2011-12), Rex Ryan (2009-10), Barry Switzer (1994-95), George Seifert (1989-90) and Don McCafferty (1970-71).
- ▶ LaFleur is just the **second NFL head coach** since the league went to a divisional format in 1967 to win 13-plus games and a division title in both of his first two seasons, joining Seifert (1989-90).
- ▶ LaFleur (26-6) posted the **most regular-season wins by a Packer head coach in his first two seasons** (Mike Sherman and Mike McCarthy, 21 each).
- ▶ LaFleur (26) posted the **second-most wins in NFL history by a coach in his first two seasons** behind only Seifert (28 in 1989-90).
- ▶ LaFleur guided the Packers to 26 wins in 2019-20 after the Packers won 13 games in 2017-18. That was the **biggest two-season win improvement** by a head coach in franchise history from the two seasons prior to him taking over, eclipsing the previous mark held by Vince Lombardi (15 victories in 1959-60 after the Packers won four games in 1957-58).
- ▶ LaFleur led the biggest one-year win improvement in franchise history in 2019:

- ▶ LaFleur is 11-1 in the NFC North, a .917 winning percentage that is tied for the best two-season winning percentage in divisional games for the Packers dating back to 1967 (2011-12, 11-1, .917).
- ▶ LaFleur's winning percentage of .917 (11-1) against division opponents is **tied for the second best** by a coach in his first two seasons as head coach, dating back to 1970 (Mike Tomlin, 11-1, .917 in 2007-08 / Steve Mariucci, 15-1, .938 in 1997-98).
- ▶ LaFleur has not lost back-to-back games as a head coach.
- ▶ Dating back to 2019 (including playoffs), LaFleur has led the Packers to a 14-3 record in games decided by single digits, an .824 winning percentage that ranks **No. 1 in the NFL** over that span (Sportradar).
- ▶ Dating back to 2019, the Packers are **tied for the best regular-season record in the NFL**:

- ▶ Dating back to 2019, Green Bay ranks in the **top 10 in the NFL** in the regular season in point differential per game (plus-6.3, No. 4), points per game (27.7, No. 6) and points allowed per game (21.3, No. 9), according to Sportradar.

- ▶ Under LaFleur, the Packers have had six players register 30-plus receptions each season, marking the **first time in franchise history** that Green Bay has had six players with 30-plus catches in back-to-back seasons.
- ▶ LaFleur was just the **sixth head coach in NFL history** to win 24 of his first 30 games (Elias Sports Bureau):

- ▶ LaFleur led Green Bay to a 20-5 record in his first 25 regular-season games, which **tied for No. 4 in NFL history** for the most wins by a head coach in his first 25 regular-season games (Elias Sports Bureau).
- ▶ LaFleur led Green Bay to seven home wins in 2019, the **most by a Packers head coach in his first season**. He followed it up with another 7-1 home record in 2020, giving LaFleur the **best home winning percentage by a Packers head coach in his first two seasons** since 1921:

- ▶ It was the first time Green Bay won seven-plus games in back-to-back seasons at Lambeau Field since doing it in three straight seasons from 2010-12.
- ▶ LaFleur (13-3) finished with the **most NFL wins by a Packer head coach in their first season**:

- ▶ LaFleur joined Jim Caldwell and Mariucci as the only head coaches with 13-plus wins to go undefeated in their division in their first season.
- ▶ LaFleur **tied for the third-most wins** by an NFL head coach in their first season:

- ▶ LaFleur became the first Packer head coach to start both of his first two seasons 3-0.
- ▶ LaFleur joined Phil Bengston (1968-69) as the only head coaches in franchise history to win the season opener in their first two seasons.

Two years after he co-founded the Packers with Curly Lambeau, George Calhoun began writing a piece called The Dope Sheet, which served as the official press release from 1921-24.



COACHING-STAFF CHANGES

Throughout the offseason, Head Coach **Matt LaFleur** saw some departures from the coaching staff and used a combination of promotions and new hires to fill those roles.

► **Joe Barry** was named the defensive coordinator, bringing 19 seasons of experience as an NFL assistant coach, including four as a defensive coordinator. He came to the Packers after serving as the assistant head coach/linebackers for the Los Angeles Rams from 2017-20. In his four seasons with the Rams, Barry was part of a defensive staff that helped the team rank No. 2 in the league over that span in in sacks (192.0), tied for No. 2 in takeaways (104) and interceptions (63), No. 7 in overall defense (329.9 ypg) and No. 9 in scoring defense (21.5 ppg). Last season marked the first time in franchise history that the Rams led the league in both scoring defense (18.5 ppg) and overall defense (281.9 ypg). The Rams also led the NFL in pass defense for the first time in franchise history and ranked No. 2 in the NFL in 2020 with 53.0 sacks.

► **Maurice Drayton** was promoted to special teams coordinator after spending the previous three seasons as assistant special teams coach for the Packers. Over the past few years he has worked with K Mason Crosby, who made all 16 field-goal attempts last season to become the first player in franchise history (since 1938) to never miss a field goal in a single regular season (min. two FG att.). From 2018-20, Crosby ranked No. 6 in the NFL over that span (min. 60 att.) with a field-goal percentage of 88.3 (68-77). Prior to coming to Green Bay, Drayton worked as the assistant special teams coach for the Indianapolis Colts from 2016-17. In 2016, he assisted P Pat McAfee in earning his second career Pro Bowl selection after leading the league in punting average (49.3) and ranking No. 3 in net punting average (42.7). After McAfee retired, Drayton helped P Rigoberto Sanchez finish No. 4 in the NFL in net punting average (42.6) in 2017 and earn a spot on the Pro Football Writers Association All-Rookie team.

► **Jerry Gray**, who is entering his 34th season in the NFL (nine as a player and 24 as a coach), was promoted to defensive backs/passing game coordinator. He joined Green Bay in 2020 as the defensive backs coach and helped the Packers to a No. 9 ranking in total defense (334.0 ypg) and a No. 7 ranking in pass defense (221.2 ypg) last season, the first time Green Bay ranked in the top 10 in both categories since 2010. Under Gray's tutelage, third-year CB Jaire Alexander earned second-team All-Pro honors from *The Associated Press*, becoming the first Green Bay CB to earn All-Pro honors since Charles Woodson in 2011. Alexander was also named to his first career Pro Bowl in 2020, making him one of three CBs in franchise history to make the Pro Bowl in his first three seasons (Herb Adderley, 1963, third season; Willie Buchanan, 1973, second season).

► **Adam Stenavich** (STEN-uh-ritch) was promoted to offensive line/run game coordinator. He served as the offensive line coach for the Packers for the past two seasons. Last season, Stenavich coached a line that blocked for an offense that ranked No. 1 in the league in scoring (31.8 ppg), giveaways (team-record 11) and time of possession (32:29), tied for No. 2 in sacks allowed (21), No. 5 in total offense (389.0 ypg) and No. 3 in yards per play (6.29). Green Bay allowed one sack/zero sacks in a league-high 13 games in 2020, tied for the most in a season in team history (2004).

► **Rayna Stewart** (ruh-NAY) was promoted to assis-

tant special teams coach after working as the special teams quality control coach for Green Bay over the last two seasons. Prior to joining Green Bay in 2019, Stewart spent four seasons at Vanderbilt, first as director of player development (2015-17) and then as special teams quality control coach (2018). Stewart was a defensive quality control coach with the Tennessee Titans from 2009-11, a graduate assistant at Northwestern University from 2007-08 and a training-camp intern for the Indianapolis Colts in 2004.

► **Connor Lewis** enters his sixth season with Green Bay and was promoted to special teams assistant/game management specialist after working as an offensive quality control coach in 2020. He originally joined the Packers in 2016 as a football technology analyst intern before being elevated to football technology analyst in 2017. Over the past five seasons, he has assisted the offensive coaching staff in data analysis, playing rules and game management. Prior to joining Green Bay, Lewis was an independent consultant for the Oakland Raiders (2015) and worked in the football analytics and information department for the New York Giants (2014).

► **John Dunn** was hired as a senior analyst. He is in his fifth season in the NFL and his first with the Packers. Dunn previously coached tight ends for the New York Jets (2019-20) and was a football assistant (2016) and offensive assistant with the Chicago Bears (2017), working with the wide receivers and quarterbacks as well as helping to install the offensive line protections. Between those two stops in the NFL, he was the offensive coordinator at the University of Connecticut in 2018.

► **Justin Hood** joined Green Bay as a defensive quality control coach after working as the secondary coach and defensive pass game coordinator at Kent State in 2019-20.

► **Ryan Mahaffey** and **Tim Zetts** were both hired as offensive quality control coaches. Mahaffey comes to Green Bay after coaching in college since 2013, most recently as the offensive coordinator (2019-20) at Northern Iowa, his alma mater. Zetts joined the Packers after serving as the offensive coordinator/quarterbacks for Austin Peay (Clarksville, Tenn.) in 2019-20.

PERSONNEL-STAFF PROMOTIONS

General Manager **Brian Gutekunst** promoted a couple of people on his staff as well in the offseason.

► **Chad Brinker**, who is entering his 12th season with the Packers' pro personnel department, was promoted to personnel/football administration executive. He has spent the previous three seasons as the assistant director of pro scouting/salary cap analyst. Brinker first joined Green Bay as a scouting assistant in 2010 and was promoted to pro scout in 2012. He spent a brief time as a running back with the New York Jets in 2003 and played for the Cologne Centurions of NFL Europe in 2004.

► **Patrick Moore** was promoted to assistant director of college scouting after spending the previous three seasons as a college scout for Green Bay. He joined the Packers in 2018 after spending five seasons as a scout for the Cleveland Browns. Prior to his stint in Cleveland, he was on the coaching staff at Fordham University for five seasons, serving as assistant head coach/offensive line (2010-11), defensive coordinator (2009) and linebackers/special teams coach (2007-08). Moore also held collegiate coaching positions at Louisiana Tech (2005-06), Auburn (2002-04), Western Carolina (2000-01) and at his alma mater, Illinois Wesleyan (1997).

OFFSEASON RETENTIONS

Packers General Manager **Brian Gutekunst** and his staff have made numerous moves that have helped Green Bay to a 26-6 record over the last two seasons, back-to-back division titles and appearances in two straight NFC Championship Games. This offseason, Gutekunst and his staff worked to retain that roster, which included bringing back:

- ▶ RB **Aaron Jones**, who was originally selected by the Packers in the fifth round of the 2017 NFL Draft, has played in 54 games with 42 starts over the past four seasons. He has recorded 3,364 yards and 37 rushing touchdowns on 651 carries (5.2 avg.) and hauled in 131 receptions for 1,057 yards (8.1 avg.) and six TDs. Jones is one of only two players in league history to post 3,000-plus rushing yards and 35-plus rushing TDs with an average of 5.00-plus yards per carry in their first four seasons in the NFL, joining RB Jim Brown (1957-60). Jones is one of three players in the NFL to post 2,000-plus rushing yards and 25-plus rushing TDs over the past two seasons (Derrick Henry, Dalvin Cook) and is the first Packer to hit those marks over a two-season span since FB Jim Taylor (1962-63). Jones has also started all four postseason games he has played in, registering 244 rushing yards and four TDs on 53 carries (4.6 avg.) with 11 receptions for 52 yards (4.7 avg.) and a TD.
- ▶ CB **Kevin King**, who was originally selected by the Packers in the second round of the 2017 NFL Draft (No. 33 overall), has played in 41 games with 36 starts during his first four seasons. He was tied for No. 1 on the Packers with six interceptions from 2018-20 (Darnell Savage). Last season, he started all 11 games he played in and both postseason contests. King finished the 2020 regular season with 57 tackles (second most of his career) and tied his career high (2019) with 45 solo tackles.
- ▶ TE **Marcodes Lewis** has spent the last three seasons with the Packers, appearing in 47 regular-season games with 30 starts and registering 28 receptions for 302 yards (10.8 avg.) and four TDs. He also started all four postseason contests for Green Bay over the last two seasons. Lewis is one of only seven tight ends in NFL history to play in 200-plus regular-season games (217) and post 400-plus receptions (403).
- ▶ The Packers retained exclusive-rights free agents WR **Allen Lazard** and TE **Robert Tonyan**. Lazard has appeared in 26 games with 12 starts over the last two seasons for Green Bay, posting 69 receptions for 935 yards (13.6 avg.) and six TDs, with 47 of his catches picking up first downs. He registered 22 receptions for 408 yards on third down in 2019-20, an average of 18.5 yards per catch that ranks No. 2 in the NFL (min. 20 rec.) over that span. Tonyan tied the single-season franchise record (Paul Coffman, 1984) for the most TD receptions by a tight end with 11 last season, which was also tied with Chiefs TE Travis Kelce for the league lead among TEs. He also posted career highs for receptions (52) and receiving yards (586) in 2020, joining Coffman (54-814-11 in 1983) as the only TEs in team history to register 45-plus catches, 500-plus receiving yards and nine-plus receiving TDs in a season.

MEET THE DRAFT PICKS

Training-camp storylines always hover around new players and just how they figure into the depth chart. The Packers added to an already talented roster with a nine-man draft class.

- ▶ CB **Eric Stokes** was selected by the Packers with the 29th selection in the first round out of Georgia. He started at CB in all nine regular-season games as a junior in 2020, earning first-team All-Southeastern Conference honors from *The Associated Press* after finishing tied for No. 2 in the conference and tied for No. 8 in the nation with four interceptions. Stokes was tied for No. 2 in the country in 2020 with two INT returns for TDs, posting a 30-yard TD at Arkansas and a 37-yard TD vs. Florida.

- ▶ Green Bay drafted C/G **Josh Myers** out of Ohio State in the second round (No. 62 overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft. He played in 31 games in three years (2018-20) at Ohio State and started his final 21 contests for the Buckeyes. Last season, Myers was a team captain, was named second-team All-American by *Sporting News* and first-team All-Big Ten by the coaches, and was a Rimington Trophy finalist, an award given to the nation's best center.
- ▶ WR **Amari Rodgers** was drafted by the Packers in the third round (No. 85 overall), becoming just the second WR drafted out of Clemson in franchise history (Gary Barnes, third round in 1962). He finished his career at Clemson ranked No. 6 in school history in receptions (181) and No. 12 in receiving yards (2,144). Rodgers earned first-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference honors as a senior in 2020 after recording career highs in receptions (77), receiving yards (1,020) and receiving TDs (seven). He was one of only five players at Clemson from 2000-20 to record a rushing TD, a receiving TD and a TD on a punt return.
- ▶ In the fourth round (No. 142 overall), the Packers selected T/G **Royce Newman** out of the University of Mississippi. He played in 43 games over four seasons at Mississippi, starting the final 22 games in his last two seasons. Newman started all 10 games at right tackle in 2020 and helped Mississippi reach the Outback Bowl, its first bowl appearance since the 2015 season. In 2019, Newman started all 12 games at left guard and allowed just one sack in 416 pass blocks.
- ▶ With the first of two picks in the fifth round, Green Bay drafted DL **T.J. Slaton** (No. 193 overall), the first defensive lineman selected by Green Bay out of the University of Florida in franchise history. He started all 12 games at defensive tackle for the Gators in 2020, recording a career-high 37 tackles (13 solo), 3½ tackles for a loss, 1½ sacks and five QB hurries. Slaton appeared in 12 contests in 2019 and set career highs in tackles for a loss (four) and sacks (two).
- ▶ CB **Shemar Jean-Charles** (John Charles) was taken with the second of two fifth-round picks (No. 178 overall), becoming the second player out of Appalachian State (LB D.J. Smith, sixth round, 2011) drafted by Green Bay. He was named a first-team All-American by the Walter Camp Football Foundation, second-team All-American by *Sporting News* and PFF College and third-team All-American by *Phil Steele's College Football* after leading the nation with 17 passes defended in 2020.
- ▶ T/G **Cole Van Lanen** was drafted with the first of two picks by the Packers in the sixth round (No. 214 overall). The Green Bay native played in 45 games with 19 starts at left tackle in his four seasons with the Badgers, with 18 of those starts coming over his final two seasons. He earned first-team All-Big Ten honors from the conference's coaches and second-team recognition from the media as a senior in 2020.
- ▶ The Packers used the second sixth-round pick (No. 220 overall) on LB **Isaiah McDuffie** out of Boston College. He earned second-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference honors in 2020 after ranking No. 5 in the nation and No. 2 in the ACC with a career-best 107 tackles (54 solo). According to stathead.com, McDuffie was one of three players in the FBS to post at least 100 tackles (107), three sacks (three) and six tackles for a loss (6½) in 2020.
- ▶ Green Bay's final selection in the draft was RB **Kylin Hill** (No. 256 overall), the first RB drafted out of Mississippi State by Green Bay since Ode Burrell (third round) in 1964. He finished his career ranked No. 8 in school history in rushing yards (2,535). As a senior in 2020, Hill set the single-game school record for receiving yards by an RB with 158 at LSU and tied the school mark for catches in a game (WR Eric Moulds, 1995) with 15 at Kentucky. Hill earned first-team All-Southeastern Conference honors from AP as a junior in 2019 after posting a career-high 1,350 rushing yards (No. 4 in school history) and a career-best 10 rushing TDs.

MATT LAFLEUR... In his third season as the Packers' 15th head coach.

- ▶ In his 13th season in the NFL, having previously served as an offensive coordinator for two seasons (Los Angeles Rams, 2017; Tennessee Titans, 2018), a quarterbacks coach for six seasons (Washington Football Team, 2010-13; Atlanta Falcons, 2015-16), and an offensive assistant for two seasons (Houston Texans, 2008-09).
- ▶ In his first two seasons leading the Packers, has authored one of the greatest starts to a head-coaching career in NFL history. For the second consecutive season in 2020, led Green Bay to a 13-3 record and captured the NFC North crown while also earning the No. 1 seed in the NFC for the first time since 2011. It was just the second time in team history that the Packers had won 13-plus games in back-to-back seasons (13-3 in 1996 and 1997).
- ▶ According to the Elias Sports Bureau, was the sixth head coach since 1970 to lead his team to the conference championship game in both of his first two seasons as a head coach, joining Jim Harbaugh (2011-12), Rex Ryan (2009-10), Barry Switzer (1994-95), George Seifert (1989-90) and Don McCafferty (1970-71).
- ▶ Became just the second NFL head coach since the league went to a divisional format in 1967 to win 13-plus games and a division title in both of his first two seasons, joining Seifert (1989-90).
- ▶ In his first season leading the Packers in 2019, became the first coach in club history to lead the team to the playoffs in his debut season. Also led the largest one-year win improvement in team history (plus-seven wins).

DAVID CULLEY... Named head coach of the Houston Texans on Jan. 29, 2021, becoming the fourth head coach in franchise history.

- ▶ Owns 27 years of NFL coaching experience and 43 overall in coaching after a 16-year career on the collegiate level.
- ▶ Joins the Texans from the Baltimore Ravens, where he served the last two seasons (2019-20) as the assistant head coach / pass coordinator / wide receivers coach.
- ▶ As an NFL coach, has been a part of staffs that have captured 10 division titles, made the playoffs in 17 different seasons and appeared in six conference championship games.

THE PACKERS-TEXANS SERIES

- ▶ The two clubs have played each other only five times in the regular season since the Texans entered the NFL as an expansion club in 2002.
- ▶ The first meeting came in a nationally televised Sunday night contest at Reliant Stadium in Houston, one that the Packers won, 16-13, on a 46-yard field goal by Ryan Longwell as time expired.
- ▶ Houston native and longtime Packers WR Donald Driver led Green Bay with 10 catches for 148 yards (14.8 avg.) and QB Brett Favre threw for 383 yards in the win.

He then served in various roles coaching the offensive line on the Packers' coaching staff (2004-2018), where he held the positions of assistant offensive line/quality control coach (2004-05), assistant offensive line (2006), offensive line coach (2007-17) and offensive line coach and run game coordinator (2018)... Current Texans linebackers Joe Thomas (2015-17) and Christian Kirksey (2020) played for the Packers... Texans OL Justin McCray (2017-19) and DB Tremon Smith (2019) are also former Packers... Texans G/T Max Scharping is a native of Green Bay, Wis., and attended Southwest High School... Packers WR Randall Cobb was traded from Houston back to Green Bay on July 28... Texans S Eric Murray attended Riverside University High School in Milwaukee, Wis. ... Packers G Jon Runyan and Texans CB John Reid played together at St. Joseph's Prep School in Philadelphia... Runyan was born in Houston when his father, Jon Runyan Sr., played for the Houston Oilers... Packers assistant special teams coach Rayna Stewart was originally drafted by the Houston Oilers in 1996 and played there for two seasons (1996-97)... Packers LB Za'Darius Smith (2015-18) played for the Baltimore Ravens alongside Texans WR Chris Moore (2016-18) and DB Terrence Brooks (2015)... Packers S Adrian Amos (2015-18) played for the Chicago Bears, where he overlapped with Texans WR Anthony Miller (2018) and DL Brandon Dunn (2015)... Texas natives on the Packers' coaching staff include Gray (Lubbock), Smith (Lubbock) and defensive quality control coach Wendel Davis (Sweeny)... Several Packers coaches have held positions at Texas colleges, including Gray (Southern Methodist, 1995-96), Smith (Texas Tech, 2013-15), assistant defensive backs coach Ryan Downard (Texas Tech, 2013) and Davis (West Texas A&M, 2010-12; Texas A&M - Commerce, 2013-14; University of Texas, 2015).

- ▶ Green Bay hopped out to a 21-0 halftime lead behind three first-half TD passes by QB Aaron Rodgers. Rodgers finished 23-of-34 passing with 283 yards and four TDs.
- ▶ WR Davante Adams hauled in a game-high 13 receptions for a career-high 196 yards and two TDs.
- ▶ His 196 yards rank eighth highest in Packers single-game history.

BREAKING DOWN THE ROSTER

The Packers enter the first preseason game with a 90-man roster that is composed of 44 offensive players, 41 defensive players and five specialists.

- ▶ Of the 90 players on Green Bay's roster, 41 of them (45.5 percent) were draft picks of the Packers. Green Bay has eight players that were drafted in the first round, including seven that were selected by the Packers.
- ▶ Green Bay has 38 players on the roster that began their careers as undrafted free agents.
- ▶ 58.8 percent of the players (53 of 90) on Green Bay's roster entered the league as a sixth-round or seventh-round pick or as an undrafted player.
- ▶ Of the 90 players on the roster, 82 of them (91.1

percent) are 28 years old or younger (as of August 9) and 50 players (55.5 percent) are 24 years old or younger.

- ▶ Of the 90 players on the roster, 29 of them (32.2 percent) played collegiately outside of the "Power Five" conferences (ACC, Big 10, Big 12, Pac-12 and SEC).
- ▶ Over 26 percent of the players (24 of 90, 26.6 percent) attended high school in either California (13 players) or Texas (11 players). In total, Green Bay's roster is composed of players from 26 different states and two different countries (United States and Canada).

A LOOK AT THE SCHEDULE

The Green Bay Packers' 2021 NFL schedule features 17 regular-season games and three preseason games. It is highlighted by five prime-time contests (subject to flexible scheduling) on the original schedule for the eighth straight year (2014-21) and 10 games against 2020 playoff teams.

- ▶ The Packers will open the season at the New Orleans Saints, marking the third straight year and the seventh time in the last nine seasons that Green Bay has started the season on the road.
- ▶ Week 2 brings a division opponent at home for the fourth consecutive season, and for the second straight year it will be the Detroit Lions. The game will be on *Monday Night Football* and is the first of three home prime-time games against division opponents.
- ▶ The Packers go back on the road in Week 3 as they travel to face the San Francisco 49ers on a Sunday night, marking the fourth consecutive season Green Bay has faced the 49ers in a prime-time contest and the third consecutive year on the road.
- ▶ Over the next two weeks, Green Bay will play the first of two back-to-backs against the AFC North, welcoming the Pittsburgh Steelers to Lambeau Field in Week 4 and traveling to Cincinnati to take on the Bengals in Week 5. The Cincinnati game will be the first of four road contests in five weeks for the Packers.
- ▶ Week 6 brings a return to division play as Green Bay goes to Chicago and faces off with the Bears.
- ▶ The Packers then return to Lambeau for a Week 7 contest against the Washington Football Team before back-to-back road trips.
- ▶ The Packers will visit the Arizona Cardinals on a Thursday night in Week 8 to finish an October slate that will see them play five games for the first time since 2010, and then a trip to Kansas City to play the Chiefs in Week 9.
- ▶ Green Bay plays six of its final eight regular-season games against the NFC, starting with the Seattle Seahawks in Week 10 at home.
- ▶ After a trip to play the Minnesota Vikings in Week 11, Green Bay finishes the regular season with four of its last six games at home for the second straight year and the fourth time since 1940 (1969, 1977).
- ▶ Green Bay hosts the Los Angeles Rams before a Week 13 bye, marking the seventh straight season the Packers will play at home heading into their bye week. It is the latest bye ever for Green Bay, and it is the fourth time since 1990 that the Packers have had a bye in Week 10 or later (Week 11 in 2019, Week 10 in 2012 and 2010). It will be the first time since 2017 that Green Bay plays at home heading into the bye and coming out of the bye.
- ▶ The matchup versus Chicago on a Sunday night in Week 14 marks the 16th consecutive regular season that the Packers and Bears have squared off in a prime-time game.
- ▶ In Weeks 15-16, Green Bay will finish off its slate against the AFC North with a trip to face the Baltimore Ravens and then a home game on Christmas Day against the Cleveland Browns. It is just the third time the Packers will play on Christmas, having hosted the Bears in 2005 and 2011.
- ▶ Green Bay will end the regular season with back-to-back NFC North games for the fourth time in the last six seasons.
- ▶ The Packers' last regular-season home game is slated for a Sunday night versus the Vikings in Week 17.
- ▶ For the fourth time in the last six years, Green Bay will

end the regular season in Detroit. The game at the Lions is scheduled for Sunday, but the league schedule does not list Saturday games or a Sunday night game in Week 18, and three games with playoff implications will be moved to those time slots no later than six days prior to January 9.

2021 OPPONENTS

The Packers' 2021 schedule includes 11 games against teams that made the playoffs, including seven games versus teams who registered 10-plus wins.

PACKERS WIN THE NFC NORTH IN 2020

The Green Bay Packers finished the 2020 regular season with an NFC-best 13-3 record and captured their second consecutive division title.

- ▶ It was the **third time since 1990** that the Packers earned the No. 1 seed in the NFC playoffs (2011, 1996).
- ▶ The Packers (5-1) were **one of four teams** to win five-plus division games during the 2020 season (Buffalo and New Orleans, 6-0 / Tennessee, 5-1). Green Bay's winning percentage of .833 in division games tied for the fifth best by the franchise since 1967.
- ▶ Under Head Coach **Matt LaFleur**, Green Bay is 11-1 (.917) in division games, **tied with the New Orleans Saints for the best record in division contests** from 2019-20.
- ▶ It is the best two-year division record for Green Bay since going 11-1 in 2011-12.
- ▶ Dating back to 1967, it marked only the **second time** (2011-12) the Packers have lost one or fewer division games over a two-year span.
- ▶ Green Bay was undefeated in road division games in 2020, marking the second straight year it did not lose a road division game and just the eighth time since 1967.
- ▶ It marked the **first time** the Packers did not lose a road division game in back-to-back seasons, dating back to 1967.
- ▶ Green Bay was **one of three teams** (Kansas City, New Orleans) to go 6-0 in road division games over the last two regular seasons (2019-20).

STACKING WINS

- ▶ With a win over Philadelphia in Week 13 of 2020, Green Bay (805) became the **first team in NFL history** to reach 800 wins (including playoffs).
- ▶ The past two seasons (2019-20) marked only the second time in team history (1996-97) that the Packers have ended the regular season on a winning streak of five-plus games in back-to-back years.
- ▶ With matching 13-3 records in 2019-20, it is just the **second time in team history** that the Packers have won 13-plus games in back-to-back seasons (13-3 in 1996 and 1997).
- ▶ Green Bay is the **only team in the NFL** to win 13-plus regular-season games in both 2019 and 2020.
- ▶ The Packers have won 20 of their last 24 games (including postseason).
- ▶ This was the 34th playoff appearance for the Packers, the **most in NFL history**.
- ▶ It was the franchise's 21st playoff appearance in the last 28 seasons (1993-2020).
- ▶ Green Bay (36) is tied with Pittsburgh for the **second-most postseason wins** in league history behind New England (37).

BACK-TO-BACK NFC CHAMPIONSHIP GAMES

Green Bay earned a trip to the NFC title game last season for the ninth time since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger.

- ▶ It was the third time (2007 and 1996) that Lambeau Field hosted the NFC Championship.
- ▶ It was Green Bay's fourth NFC Championship appearance since 2014 (2014, 2016, 2019), the most in the NFC over that span. No other NFC team has advanced to the conference title game more than once since 2014.
- ▶ It marked the first time since 1995-97 that Green Bay has appeared in consecutive NFC title games.

GREEN BAY UNDER THE LIGHTS

- ▶ The Packers went 6-0 in prime-time games during the 2020 regular season, the first time Green Bay has ever gone undefeated in a season that they played five-plus games in primetime (previous best was 4-2 in both in 2016 and 2019).
- ▶ Among teams to play at least three prime-time games during the 2020 regular season, the Packers tied for the best winning percentage in the league (Sportradar):

- ▶ Dating back to 2000, Rodgers owns the **second-highest** (136.8 in four games in 2011) and the **fifth-highest** (134.8 in six games in 2020) single-season passer rating in prime-time games (min. 50 pass att.) in the NFL (Sportradar).
- ▶ Adams **tied for No. 2 in the NFL** with five receiving TDs in prime-time games in 2020 even though he missed two of the six contests due to injury.
- ▶ TE **Robert Tonyan** posted six receiving TDs in prime-time contests in 2020, **No. 1 in the NFL**. Dating back to 2000, his six receiving TDs were the most by a Packer player in prime-time contests since Adams posted seven receiving TDs in six prime-time games in 2016. It also **tied for the second most by an NFL TE** since 2000 (Rob Gronkowski, seven in 2015).
- ▶ Adams and Tonyan were **two of four NFL players** (Tyler Lockett and Stefon Diggs) to register three receiving TDs in a prime-time game during the 2020 regular season.
- ▶ Adams has recorded a TD reception in nine consecutive games on Sunday Night Football, the **longest such streak in NFL history** (via NFL).
- ▶ Overall, Rodgers has played in 18 Monday games, recording a passer rating of 101.1 that ranks **No. 3 among active players** (min. 200 pass att.).
- ▶ Green Bay has won seven of its last eight games on **MNF**.
- ▶ The Packers' .875 winning percentage (7-1) on **MNF** since 2014 is **No. 2 in the NFL** over that span (Pittsburgh, 9-1, .900).

SOME TEAM HISTORY IN 2020

The Packers set some all-time marks with their performance during the 2020 regular season.

- ▶ Green Bay's 509 points this season were the **second most in team history** (560 in 2011).
- ▶ Per the Elias Sports Bureau, the Packers had 11 different players catch a TD pass during the 2020 regular season, the **most in a season in team history**.
- ▶ The Packers scored 66 TDs on the season, the second most in a season in franchise annals (70 in 2011).
- ▶ For the **first time in franchise history**, the Packers had two different players score 17-plus TDs in back-to-back years (RB **Aaron Jones**, 19 in 2019; WR **Davante Adams**, 18 in 2020).
- ▶ For the second consecutive year and just the **third time in team history**, Green Bay had a pair of 100-point scorers in the same season. The Packers were the only team in the NFL to have a pair of 100-point scorers in both 2019 and 2020 (2020: Adams/K **Mason Crosby**; 2019: Jones/Crosby; 2003: RB Ahman Green/K Ryan Longwell).
- ▶ For the first time in franchise history, the Packers had a running back (Jones), a wide receiver (Adams) and a tight end (**Robert Tonyan**) all score 10-plus TDs in the same season.
- ▶ Adams and Tonyan were just the **third duo in team history** with 10-plus receiving TDs in the same season (2014: Jordy Nelson and Randall Cobb / 2016: Nelson and Adams).
- ▶ For the first time in franchise history, Green Bay had three different players (Jones in Week 2, Adams in Week 8, Tonyan in Week 4) register three TDs in a game in the same season.
- ▶ With **Krys Barnes** (10 starts) and **Kamal Martin** (six starts), the 2020 season marked the first time the Packers had a pair of rookie LBs start six-plus games on the season since 2009 (Clay Matthews, 13; Brad Jones, seven).
- ▶ In Week 17 at Chicago, Green Bay ran 44 offensive plays and scored 35 points. It marked just the **second time since 1970 that the Packers** scored 35-plus points on 44 or fewer offensive plays (38 points on 44 plays at Indianapolis, Nov. 16, 1997) and just the **eighth time in happened in the NFL** since 1970.
- ▶ Week 16 vs. Tennessee was the first time the Packers did not have any penalties and did not punt in the same game since Elias began tracking penalties in 1941.
- ▶ Green Bay scored 30-plus points in four straight games (Weeks 11-14), which **tied for the second-longest streak in team history**, trailing only a seven-game streak in 1963. The Packers also had a streak of four straight games with 30-plus to start the season (Weeks 1-4). It was the **first time in franchise history** that the Packers had two separate streaks of four straight games with 30-plus points in a season.
- ▶ The Packers scored 20-plus points in the first half in eight games this season, the most by Green Bay since 2011 (eight).
- ▶ Green Bay scored 219 points in the second quarter this season, the **most in NFL history** (New England, 199 in 2007), per the Elias Sports Bureau.
- ▶ The Packers scored on their opening drive 12 times during the regular season, just the third NFL team to do so since 2000 (New England, 13 in 2007; L.A. Rams, 12 in 2017).
- ▶ Green Bay joined the 2007 Patriots as the **only NFL teams since 1980** to score on their opening drive in each of the first eight games of the season (Elias).

- ▶ Dating back to 2000, the 73 points that Green Bay scored on opening drives during the 2020 season ranks **No. 1 in the NFL**. Also since 2000, Green Bay **tied for the most opening-drive scores** (13) and the most opening-drive TDs (nine) in a single season (Sportradar).
- ▶ The Packers had 12 games with 30-plus points, the most by Green Bay in a season (2011). Green Bay had nine games with 30-plus points/zero giveaways, **tied for the most in NFL history** (2010 Patriots).
- ▶ Green Bay had four games this season with 40-plus points, **tied for No. 2 in team history** (six in 2011).
- ▶ The Packers **tied the single-season franchise record** with only 11 fumbles on the season, matching the previous low of 11 in 10 games in 1944.
- ▶ Green Bay also **tied the single-season team mark** with only six fumbles lost on the season, tying the franchise mark of six in 1943 (10 games), 1995 (16 games) and 2011 (16 games).
- ▶ The Packers posted 13 games this season with one sack/zero sacks allowed, **tied for No. 1 in team history** (13 in 2004).
- ▶ QB **Aaron Rodgers** was sacked 20 times during the 2020 regular season, the fewest in his career as a starter. Rodgers' previous low for 16 starts in a season was 28 in 2014. The 20 sacks of Rodgers were the fourth fewest among Green Bay QBs who started all 16 games.
- ▶ It was just the **second time since 1940** that Green Bay had two 230-plus-yard rushing games on fewer than 40 carries in a season (three games in 2003).
- ▶ Green Bay scored TDs on its first three series in Weeks 15-16, the first time in the last 40 seasons that the Packers had scored TDs on each of their opening three drives in back-to-back games.
- ▶ The Packers scored four first-half touchdowns in Weeks 12-13, just the **third time** Green Bay has scored four first-half TDs in back-to-back weeks in franchise history (Nov. 12-Nov. 19, 1961; Nov. 9-Nov. 16, 2014).
- ▶ Green Bay posted three-plus TD drives in the first half in eight games this season, the **most in the NFL** (Buffalo had six, Tampa Bay and Tennessee had five). Since 2000 (Sportradar), the eight games were the **most by the Packers in a season**.
- ▶ Green Bay had three-plus TD drives in the first half in five of its last seven games (Weeks 11-17) and in each of its last three. Since 2000, the only other times the Packers had three-plus TD drives in the first half of three straight games were 2012 (Sept. 30-Oct. 14) and 2003 (Sept. 29-Oct. 12).
- ▶ The Packers posted a red-zone TD percentage of 75-plus in 12 of 16 games this season, the most by Green Bay in a season since 2000 (Sportradar).
- ▶ Green Bay finished the 2020 regular season with a 75-plus percentage in the red zone in each of the final seven games, the longest single-season streak by the Packers since 2000.
- ▶ The Packers ranked **No. 8 this season** in red-zone defense (57.7 percent) after finishing **tied for No. 6 in red-zone D in 2019** (50.0 percent). Since Sportradar began tracking in 2000, it was the first time Green Bay had ranked in the top 10 in the NFL in the category in back-to-back seasons. Over the last two seasons, the Packers limited opponents to a red-zone TD percentage of 50 percent or less in 23 of 32 games.
- ▶ Green Bay allowed 39 completions of 20-plus yards (**No. 4 in NFL** in 2020), the fewest in a season by GB since 2005 (36). It was the first time the Packers ranked in the top three in the NFL in the category since 1998 (tied for No. 3 with 43).
- ▶ Dating back to 2000, the 39 completions of 20-plus yards allowed by Green Bay in 2020 were the third fewest in a single season (36 in 2005 and 37 in 2002).

HISTORY FOR RODGERS IN 2020 REG. SEASON

- ▶ QB **Aaron Rodgers** led the NFL with a 121.5 passer rating, the second-highest **single-season mark by a quarterback in NFL history**, trailing only his 122.5 rating in 2011.
- ▶ Rodgers became the **first QB in league history** to throw 40-plus TD passes in three different seasons (45 in 2011, 40 in 2016 and 48 in 2020).
- ▶ Rodgers became the **first QB in franchise history** to post three consecutive 4,000-yard passing seasons. It was the ninth 4,000-yard season of his career.
- ▶ Rodgers' 48 TD passes were the **most in team history**, passing his own mark of 45 from 2011. Rodgers tied Dan Marino for the fifth-most TD passes in a single season in NFL history.
- ▶ Rodgers joined Peyton Manning (2004, 2013) as the **only QBs in NFL history** to have two seasons with 45-plus passing TDs.
- ▶ Rodgers has posted 40-plus passing TDs and three-plus rushing TDs three times in his career (2011, 2016, 2020). Colts QB Andrew Luck (2014) is the only other NFL quarterback to hit those marks in a single season.
- ▶ Rodgers threw 35 TD passes in the red zone during the 2020 season with no INTs, the most without an interception since Manning (37/0) in 2013.
- ▶ Rodgers set **NFL single-season marks** for the most games with a 120-plus passer rating (10) and games with a 120-plus rating/four-plus passing TDs (seven).
- ▶ Rodgers became the **first QB in NFL history** to throw multiple TD passes and post a completion percentage of 70-plus in six straight games (Weeks 9-14).
- ▶ Rodgers threw three TD passes in the first half six times last season, passing Manning's mark (five in 2004) for the **most games in a season** (Elias Sports Bureau).
- ▶ Rodgers has 17 games with two-plus passing TDs and a rushing TD, tying Steve Young for the second most in NFL history behind Cam Newton (21).
- ▶ Rodgers became the **first QB in NFL history** to have five seasons with 35-plus TD passes (2011-12, 2014, 2016, 2020).
- ▶ Rodgers now has seven seasons with 30-plus TD passes, **tied for the fourth most in NFL history**.
- ▶ Rodgers (31) passed Tobin Rote (29) for the **franchise mark for rushing TDs among quarterbacks**.
- ▶ With four TD passes in Week 16, Rodgers (218) passed Brett Favre (214) for the most TD passes at Lambeau Field.
- ▶ Rodgers threw 25 TD passes in the second quarter in 2020, the **most in a season in any quarter in NFL history**, surpassing Marino's total of 21 in the second quarter in 1986 (Elias Sports Bureau).
- ▶ Rodgers and WR **Davante Adams** (497) moved past Favre and Donald Driver (486) as the **most prolific duo in team history in terms of receptions**.

400

- ▶ Rodgers became the **seventh quarterback in NFL history** to throw 400 TD passes, the **fastest to reach that mark in league history** by doing so on his 6,462nd attempt (Manning, 7,226).
- ▶ Rodgers also became the **fastest to reach 400 TDs in terms of games**, doing so in his 193rd career game (Drew Brees, 205).
- ▶ Rodgers also set the mark for the **fewest INTs at the time of his 400th career TD pass** at 88, besting the previous mark held by Tom Brady (143).

50,000

- ▶ Rodgers became the **first QB in NFL history** with 50,000-plus passing yards, 400-plus passing TDs and 3,000-plus rushing yards.
- ▶ Rodgers became the **11th player in NFL history** to hit the 50,000-yard passing mark, doing so on his 6,436th career attempt (39-yard TD to Robert Tonyan), the **second fastest to 50,000 passing yards in**

NFL history behind only Ben Roethlisberger (6,361 attempts).

- ▶ Rodgers joined John Elway as the **only QBs in NFL history** with 50,000-plus passing yards and 3,000-plus rushing yards.

HISTORY FOR ADAMS IN 2020 REG. SEASON

- ▶ WR **Davante Adams** set the **franchise record** for receptions in a season with 115 and tied Sterling Sharpe (1994) for the most receiving TDs in a season with 18 (**tied for No. 3 in NFL history**).
- ▶ Adams became the **first player in NFL history** to have 15-plus TD receptions and average 95-plus receiving yards and eight-plus receptions per game.
- ▶ Adams led the NFL in receiving TDs, receiving yards per game and receptions per game in 2020, the **first player to lead the league in all three categories** since Sharpe in 1992.
- ▶ Adams tied Jerry Rice for the **most seasons in NFL history** with 110-plus receptions and 13-plus receiving TDs (two).
- ▶ It was Adams' second career 100-catch season (111 in 2018), joining Sharpe (1992-93) as the **only players in team history** to record two 100-catch seasons.
- ▶ Adams posted five games last season with two-plus TD receptions, the **second most in a season in team history** behind only Don Hutson (six in 1942).
- ▶ Adams recorded two games last season with three-plus receiving TDs, **matching the single-season team record** held by Hutson (1938 and 1942) and Sharpe (1994).
- ▶ Adams (546) moved past James Lofton (530) into the **No. 4 spot in team history** for career receptions. Adams trails former teammate Jordy Nelson (550) for the third most.
- ▶ Adams became the **first player in NFL history** with 100-plus receptions and 18-plus receiving TDs in a season.
- ▶ Adams had five games with at least 10 receptions, 100 receiving yards and a touchdown catch last season, the **second most in a single season in NFL history** (Michael Thomas, six games in 2019).
- ▶ Adams had four games last season with 10-plus receptions, 100-plus receiving yards and two-plus receiving TDs, the **only player in NFL history** to do so in a season.
- ▶ Adams has seven career games with 10-plus receptions/two-plus TDs, the **most in team history** ahead of Hutson (three).
- ▶ Adams posted a receiving TD in eight straight games (Weeks 7-14), setting the **franchise record** previously held by Hutson (seven in 1941-42 and 1943-44). Adams (eight) also passed Hutson, Paul Hornung (1960) and Ahman Green (2003) for the **most consecutive games with a TD in team annals** (seven).
- ▶ It was the first time in team history that two players (Adams, eight / TE **Robert Tonyan**, five) had streaks of five-plus games with a receiving TD in the same season.
- ▶ Adams had a streak of eight straight games (Weeks 7-14) with six-plus catches and a receiving TD, passing WR Terrell Owens (seven in 2007) for the **longest streak in league history**.
- ▶ Adams became the **fifth player in team history** with 500-plus catches, and reached that mark in his 95th career game, topping Sharpe's team mark (96 games) for the fastest to 500 career receptions.
- ▶ Adams became the **second Packer** (Sharpe) and the **sixth player in NFL history** to register 540-plus receptions/60-plus TD catches in his first seven seasons.
- ▶ In the red zone last season, Adams recorded 14 receiving TDs (tied for the most in NFL history) and 23 receptions (most in league history).
- ▶ Adams had 43 red-zone TD receptions from 2016-20, marking the **second most over a five-season span in NFL history** (Cris Carter, 46, 1995-99).

MORE INDIVIDUAL FEATS IN 2020 REG. SEASON

- ▶ RB **Aaron Jones** was the **first player in franchise history** to have three games in a season with 130-plus rushing yards and a rushing TD on 20 or fewer carries. He became just the fourth NFL player since the merger to do so in three games in a season (Garrison Hearst, 1998; Barry Sanders, 1996; Franco Harris, 1972).
- ▶ Jones is **one of two players in NFL history** (Jim Brown, 1957-60) to rush for 3,000-plus yards, 35-plus TDs and average 5.00-plus yards per carry in their first four seasons in the league.
- ▶ Jones is one of three players in the NFL to post 2,000-plus rushing yards and 25-plus rushing TDs over the past two seasons (Derrick Henry, Dalvin Cook). Jones is the first Packer to hit those marks over a two-season span since FB Jim Taylor (1962-63).
- ▶ Jones finished the season with 1,104 yards on 201 carries, setting a **franchise record** (min. 200 rush att.) with 5.49 yards per rush attempt. Jones was the first Packer to finish in the top five (No. 4) in the NFL in rushing yards since Ahman Green finished No. 2 in 2003.
- ▶ Jones (2019-20) joined Green (2000-01) as **the only Packers** with 1,000-plus rushing yards, nine-plus rushing TDs and 45-plus receptions in back-to-back seasons.
- ▶ Jones became the **first player in franchise history** to have two TD runs of 75-plus yards in a season (career-long 77-yard TD vs. Philadelphia in Week 13 and a 75-yard TD vs. Detroit in Week 2).
- ▶ Jones posted three runs of 50-plus yards last season (2020), tied with Green (2001 and 2003) for the **most by a Packer in the last 40 seasons** (Elias).
- ▶ RB **AJ Dillon** posted a career-high 124 yards rushing and two TDs on 21 carries (5.9 avg.) in Week 16, becoming the **youngest player in team history** (per Elias) to post 100-plus rushing yards and two-plus rushing TDs in a game. Dillon is the only rookie in franchise history to rush for 120-plus yards and two TDs in a game.
- ▶ K **Mason Crosby** made all 16 field-goal attempts last season, becoming the **first player in franchise history** (since 1938) to never miss a field goal in a single regular season (min. two FG att.).
- ▶ Crosby has made 18 consecutive field goals (2019-20), the **third-longest streak in team history** behind his own streaks of 19 in 2013-14 and 23 in 2010-11.
- ▶ Crosby made a FG of 50-plus yards in Weeks 14-15, marking the fifth time in his career he has hit a 50-plus yard field goal in back-to-back games (2008, 2013, 2015, 2018, 2020). Chris Jacke (twice) is the only other Green Bay kicker to do that more than once.
- ▶ TE **Marcedes Lewis** became just the **seventh TE in NFL history** to play in 200-plus games and register 400-plus receptions (Tony Gonzalez, Antonio Gates, Jason Witten, Shannon Sharpe, Jackie Smith, Ben Watson).
- ▶ Dating back to 1970, G **Elton Jenkins** became the first Packer to start games at guard, center and tackle in the same season (Elias).
- ▶ TE **Robert Tonyan** became the **first TE in team history** to register a TD reception in five straight games (Weeks 11-15) and the first NFL TE to do so in a single season since Broncos TE Julius Thomas in 2014.
- ▶ Tonyan posted 11 TD catches on the season, **tied for the most in a season by a tight end in team history** (Paul Coffman, 11 in 1983).
- ▶ Tonyan also became the **first TE in team history** to have a TD catch of 25-plus yards in three straight games (Weeks 11-13). He was the first NFL tight end to do so since Bengals TE Rodney Holman (three straight in 1986-87). Tonyan is only the third Packer (Greg Jennings, 2008; James Lofton, 1984) to post a TD catch of 25-plus yards in three consecutive games since the 1970 merger.
- ▶ Tonyan (50-568-10) became just the second TE in team history to have 45-plus catches, 500-plus receiving yards and nine-plus receiving TDs in a season, joining Coffman (54-814-11 in 1983).
- ▶ LB **Ba'Darius Smith** posted the **most sacks by a player in his first two seasons with the Packers** (26.0) as he moved past Clay Matthews (23.5 in 2009-10). Smith also became the first Packer with a double-digit sack total in back-to-back seasons since Matthews (2009-10).
- ▶ Smith posted a sack in 10 games last season, **tying a single-season team record** (Tim Harris, 10 games in 1988 and 1989).
- ▶ With 13.5 sacks last season and 12.5 sacks last season, Smith matched the longest streak in team history with back-to-back seasons with 12-plus sacks (four others) and was the first to do so since DE Aaron Kampman (2006-07).
- ▶ WR **Marquez Valdes-Scantling** led the NFL (min. 10 rec.) with 27.2 yards per reception on third down, the **most by a Packer and the fourth-best mark in the NFL** in a single-season dating back to 1991.
- ▶ Among players with 32-plus receptions in a season, Valdes-Scantling's average of 20.9 yards per catch in 2020 was the **top mark in the NFL over the last 10 seasons**. It was also the top average by a Packer with 32-plus catches in a single season since Lofton (22.0) in 1984.
- ▶ Valdes-Scantling **led the NFL** (min. 32 rec.) in yards per reception (20.9) for the 2020 regular season. He became the first Packer since Lofton (1984) to lead the NFL in yards per catch.
- ▶ Valdes-Scantling posted six catches of 40-plus yards last season (**tied for No. 1 in the NFL**).
- ▶ Valdes-Scantling's six receptions of 40-plus yards were the **third most by a Packer** in a single season since 2011 (Jordy Nelson: seven in 2011 and eight in 2014).
- ▶ Valdes-Scantling registered a reception of 45-plus yards in three straight games (Weeks 9-11), tying Max McGee (1958-59) and Lofton (1984) for the **third-longest streak by a Packer** since 1950 (Elias).
- ▶ Valdes-Scantling has 15 catches of 40-plus yards in his career, marking the **second-most** 40-yard receptions by a Packer in their first three seasons (WR Greg Jennings, 17) over the last 40 seasons (Elias).
- ▶ Valdes-Scantling joined Boyd Dowler and Lofton as the only Packers to average 25-plus receptions and 15-plus yards per catch in each of their first three NFL seasons.

- ▶ Green Bay was the only team to rank in the **top 10 in the NFL** in all of the following categories: total yards per game (389.0, **No. 5**), yards per play (6.29, **No. 3**), passing yards per game (256.6, **No. 9**), passing yards per play (7.81, **No. 2**), rushing yards per game (132.4, **No. 8**) and rushing yards per carry (4.78, **No. 7**).
- ▶ Dating back to 1991, the 2020 season was just the third time the Packers ranked in the top 10 in total net yards per game, rushing yards per game and passing yards per game (2004 and 2013).
- ▶ Dating back to 1970, it was the eighth time that Green Bay finished in the top five in both points per game and total net yards per game and the first time since 2011.
- ▶ The Packers also ranked at the top or near the top of the league in:

- ▶ Green Bay was the **only NFL team to have three different players** (WR Davante Adams-18, RB Aaron Jones-11, TE Robert Tonyan-11) with 10-plus TDs this season.
- ▶ Dating back to 1931 (stathead.com), it was just the **second time** that three Packers posted 10-plus touchdowns in the same season (2014: Randall Cobb, 12; Eddie Lacy, 13; Jordy Nelson, 13).
- ▶ The Packers ranked at the top of league in 2020 in 40-plus-yard plays and 40-plus-yard TDs:

- ▶ Green Bay's 18 plays of 40-plus yards were the most it had in a season since registering 18 in 2011, and the Packers' eight 40-plus-yard TDs were the most since posting 10 in 2014.
- ▶ WR **Marquez Valdes-Scantling tied for No. 1 in the NFL in 2020** with six plays of 40-plus yards and was **No. 2 in the league** with four 40-plus-yard TDs (Tyreek Hill, five), according to Sportradar.
- ▶ Valdes-Scantling (six) and Adams (five) marked the first time since 2009 that the Packers had two players with at least five receptions of 40-plus yards each in the same season (Greg Jennings, six; Donald Driver, five).
- ▶ Green Bay was at the top of the league in the 2020 regular season in red-zone offense:

- ▶ Since 2000, there have been **five NFL teams** to finish the season with a red-zone TD percentage of 75-plus (2003 Chiefs, 77.8; 2013 Broncos, 76.1; 2019 Titans, 75.6; 2020 Titans, 75.0; Packers, 80.0).
- ▶ The Packers posted a red-zone TD percentage of 75-plus percent in 12 of 16 games in 2020. That was the **most in a season by Green Bay** since the NFL began tracking in 2000 (nine in 2019).
- ▶ Green Bay was **one of three teams** (Cleveland and Tampa Bay) to not turn the ball over in the red zone during the 2020 regular season. Dating back to 1991, it marked just the **second time** the Packers did not commit a turnover in the red zone in the regular season (2008), according to Sportradar.
- ▶ The Packers finished **No. 4 in the NFL** in offensive points scored on drives started in the final two minutes of the half and game (62), and were **No. 1 in the league** with eight passing TDs (Sportradar).

DIVISION DOMINANCE

- ▶ Green Bay started off the 2020 season with continued success in the NFC North, winning three of its first four games against division foes, including the franchise's 100th all-time win against the Bears (including playoffs) in Week 12, and finished with a 5-1 record and second consecutive NFC North title.
- ▶ The Packers were one of four teams to win five-plus division games last season (Buffalo and New Orleans, 6-0 / Tennessee, 5-1).
- ▶ Green Bay was one of three teams (Kansas City, New Orleans) to go 6-0 in road division games over the last two seasons (2019-20).
- ▶ The Packers scored 43 points at Minnesota in Week 1 and 42 points versus Detroit in Week 2 this season. It was only the third time Green Bay has scored 40-plus points in back-to-back divisional games (1984, 2014).
- ▶ Green Bay posted 40-plus points three times last season against an NFC North foe (41 vs. Chicago in Week 12). It was the **first time in team history** that the Packers have posted three 40-point games in a season against divisional opponents since the league went to a divisional format in 1967.
- ▶ Green Bay **led the NFL** during the 2020 regular season in points per game (35.7) in division games, scoring 30-plus points in five of six contests.
- ▶ The Packers scored the most points per game (35.7) in 2020 then they ever had against division opponents, dating back to 1967. Green Bay surpassed the 35.3 average they posted against the division in 2011.
- ▶ The Packers recorded the fewest giveaways against the division in 2020 (two) then they ever had in a single season, dating back to 1967.
- ▶ Since the NFL went to 32 teams in 2002, there have been two teams to average 35-plus points per game and record two or fewer giveaways vs. divisional opponents, the 2020 Packers (35.7, two) and the 2016 Atlanta Falcons (38.5, two).
- ▶ In 2020, Green Bay scored the sixth-most (43 at Minnesota) and tied for the seventh-most (42 vs. Detroit) and the ninth-most points (41 vs. Chicago) in a division game dating back to 2002.
- ▶ Head Coach **Matt LaFleur** has led the Packers to division titles in both of his first two seasons and is one of four NFL head coaches to debut in the Super Bowl era to win his first eight divisional games with a team. All coaches listed below were in their first career head-coaching positions (via the Elias Sports Bureau):

- ▶ Green Bay's eight-game divisional winning streak ended in Week 8 in 2020, but it **tied the second longest** for the franchise since the league went to a divisional format in 1967, trailing only the 12-game streak from 2010-12.

- ▶ Green Bay has won seven division titles with **Aaron Rodgers** as the starting quarterback.
- ▶ Rodgers led the league in both passing TDs and passer rating (min. 50 pass att.) in division games this season (Sportradar):

- ▶ Rodgers' 20 TD passes were the most against his own division in a season without throwing an interception in **NFL history**, besting the 18/0 ratio Rodgers threw for against the NFC North in 2014.
- ▶ Dating back to 1948, Rodgers' 20 TD passes **tied for the fifth most** against division opponents in the NFL (Dan Marino is No. 1 with 24 in 1984).
- ▶ Rodgers owns three of the top five marks for single-season passer rating against divisional opponents (min. 100 pass att.) since 1948:

- ▶ Rodgers threw four-plus TD passes for the fifth time against the Bears in Week 12 and the sixth time in Week 17, the **most in NFL history** (Fran Tarkenton, four).
- ▶ Rodgers posted his seventh career game with a 130-plus rating against Chicago in Week 17, four more than any other NFL quarterback (John Brodie, three).
- ▶ **WR Davante Adams** led the NFL last season in receiving TDs against division opponents:

- ▶ Dating back to 1967, Adams **tied the franchise record** for TD receptions (eight) against the division in one season (Sterling Sharpe in 1993 and 1994 and Robert Brooks in 1995).
- ▶ Dating back to 2002, Adams' eight TD receptions tied for the third most in the NFL against division opponents (Terrell Owens, nine in 2007 / Randy Moss, 11 in 2007).
- ▶ **RB Aaron Jones** registered five rushing TDs against division opponents last year, the most by a Packer since Ahman Green in 2003 (six) and **tied for No. 4 in the NFL in 2019**. Jones posted four rushing TDs in five NFC North games this season (**tied for No. 9 in the NFL**), and his nine since the start of last season rank **No. 4 in the NFL**:

- ▶ **LB Za'Darius Smith** is **tied for No. 7 in the NFL in sacks** against division opponents since 2019 (8.5).
- ▶ Dating back to 2019, the Packers have 33.0 sacks against NFC North teams, the **most among teams in the NFC North division** over that time span (Minnesota, 24.0 / Chicago, 24.0 / Detroit, 17.0).

THE BALL

► After finishing **No. 2 in the NFL** in 2019 in giveaways with a franchise-record-tying 13, Green Bay set the single-season franchise record and led the league in giveaways during the 2020 regular season:

- Green Bay is 19-0 under Head Coach **Matt LaFleur** when winning the turnover margin. It is the most wins with no losses over a two-season span by an NFL team since the 2011-12 Packers (20-0).
- The Packers' 19-zero-giveaway games in 2019-20 tied the top NFL mark over a two-season span (New England, 19 in 2010-11).
- The Packers finished with four giveaways at home last season, the **fewest in a season in team history** (five in 2014) and tied for the fourth fewest in NFL history (three teams with three).
- Green Bay finished last season **tied for No. 3 in the NFL** in turnover differential (+12) and **tied for No. 7 in the league** this season (+7). The Packers plus-19 turnover differential in 2019-20 is No. 3 in the NFL over that span.
- The Packers won the TO margin in 10 games last season, all victories. Green Bay finished ranked **No. 1 in the NFL** in most games winning the turnover margin this season (stathead.com).

- Dating back to 1940, the 2020 season marked just the sixth time Green Bay won the turnover margin in 10-plus games in a single regular season (12 in 2009 and 2011 / 10 in 1962, 1965, 2015 and 2020).
- The Packers were **No. 1 in the NFL** with 10 zero-giveaway games in 2020. Dating back to 2019, Green Bay is **No. 1 in the NFL** in zero-giveaway games with 19 (Tennessee is No. 2 with 13).
- Green Bay set a **franchise record** for the most zero-giveaway games in a season (10) in 2020, passing the mark the Packers set in 2019 (according to the Elias Sports Bureau):

- Since 1932, Rodgers ranks **No. 2 in the NFL** in touch-down/interception ratio, according to Sportradar (min. 1,500 att.):

ALL-PRO

Green Bay Packers WR **Davante Adams**, T **David Bakhtiari**, C **Corey Linsley** and QB **Aaron Rodgers** were named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* while CB **Jaire Alexander** and LB **Za'Darius Smith** were named second-team All-Pro by AP.

- The Packers' four first-team selections were the most since 1967 (six), which was also the last time Green Bay got two offensive linemen on the first team (Jerry Kramer and Forrest Gregg).
- Adams was the first Packers WR to earn first-team All-Pro honors since Antonio Freeman in 1998.
- Alexander was the first Green Bay CB to earn All-Pro honors since Charles Woodson in 2011.
- Bakhtiari was named All-Pro for the fifth year in a row (first team in 2018 and 2020 / second team in 2016-17, 2019).
- Linsley became the first Green Bay center to earn first-team All-Pro honors since Jim Ringo in 1963.
- Rodgers earned All-Pro honors for the fourth season (first team in 2011 and 2014, second team in 2012).
- Smith earned his first All-Pro honor and was the first Packers LB to be named All-Pro since Clay Matthews in 2012.

PRO BOWL

Adams, Alexander, Bakhtiari, G **Elgton Jenkins**, RB **Aaron Jones**, Rodgers and Smith were named to the Pro Bowl roster.

- The Packers' seven selections tied for the most in the NFL this year (Baltimore, Kansas City and Seattle). It was the most original selections for Green Bay since seven players were selected in 2011.
- Six of the players were named starters (all but Jones), giving Green Bay the most starter selections since it had eight in 1967.
- Dating back to 1938, it was the 11th time that the Packers have had multiple offensive linemen selected to the Pro Bowl (three in 1963, 1962 and two in 2016, 2012, 2003, 1967, 1966, 1961, 1960, 1959).
- It marked Adams' fourth straight selection (2017-20), making him only the second Packers WR to make four-plus consecutive Pro Bowls (James Lofton, six in a row from 1980-85). Adams' four career selections are tied for the third most by a WR in franchise history, trailing Sterling Sharpe (five) and Lofton (seven).
- Alexander earned his first Pro Bowl honor in his third NFL season, becoming the first Packers cornerback selected since Sam Shields in 2014. He is one of three cornerbacks in franchise history to make the Pro Bowl in his first three seasons, joining Herb Adderley (1963, third season) and Willie Buchanon (1973, second season).
- Bakhtiari earned his third trip to the Pro Bowl and his second straight as an original selection.
- Jenkins earned his first selection and is just the third Packers offensive lineman (Deral Teteak as a rookie in 1952 and Charley Brock in his second year in 1940) to make the Pro Bowl in their first two seasons.
- Jones earned his first Pro Bowl selection in his fourth season. Dating back to 2000, he is just the third Packer running back to be selected to the Pro Bowl (Ahman Green, 2001-04 and Eddie Lacy, 2013).
- For Rodgers, it marked the ninth Pro Bowl selection of his career (2009, 2011-12, 2014-16, 2018-20), tying QB Brett Favre and T Forrest Gregg for the most Pro Bowl selections by a Packer.
- Smith made his second career Pro Bowl and first as an original selection after being an injury replacement last season. He was the first Packer defender to earn a selection in consecutive years since LB Clay Matthews in 2014-15.

QUICK STARTS

Green Bay started games quick to help fuel a 2020 regular season that saw the Packers score the second-most points (509) in franchise history (560 in 2011).

- Dating back to 2000, it was the **most points a team scored on opening drives** in a single season, besting the 71 that New England put up in 2007 (Sportradar). It also marked just the fourth time since 2000 that the Packers scored 50-plus points on opening drives in one regular season (59 in 2011 / 58 in 2016 / 54 in 2017).
- Since 2000, it was the **most scores on opening drives** for Green Bay in a single season and only the second time the Packers reached double digits (10 in 2016). It also tied the 2007 Patriots for the **most in the NFL** in a single season (Sportradar).
- Green Bay ranked **No. 1 in the NFL** in passing TDs on opening drives in the 2020 regular season:

- In each of the last two seasons, QB **Aaron Rodgers** has led the NFL in passer rating (min. 45 pass att.) on opening drives, and both ratings rank in the top five in a single season in the NFL since 2000:

Green Bay Packers WR **Davante Adams**, T **David Bakhtiari**, C **Corey Linsley** and QB **Aaron Rodgers** were named to the 2020 All-NFL and All-NFC teams by the Pro Football Writers of America. They were joined by teammates, CB **Jaire Alexander** and LB **Za'Darius Smith** on the PFWA All-NFC team.

- The Packers led the league with four selections to the PFWA All-NFL team.
- The four selections to the All-NFL offense tied the 2016 Dallas Cowboys for the most by one team to the offensive unit.
- Green Bay led the conference with six selections to the PFWA All-NFC team.

TRAINING-CAMP MEDIA INFORMATION & POLICIES

TRAINING-CAMP PRACTICE ACCESS

- ▶ All public practices are open in their entirety to a limited number of credentialed media. Photography (video and still) will be limited to certain periods and areas during training camp.

VIDEO/PHOTO POLICY

- ▶ The team reserves the right to limit photography to certain periods for competitive reasons.
- ▶ During practice periods in which B-roll and still photography are NOT permitted, the media may not utilize camera phones either. The communications staff will alert the media of the permissible "shooting" periods before and during each practice.
- ▶ Video of practice and Zoom interviews by an individual or media outlet can be posted on social-media sites in compliance with the NFL online-content policy.
- ▶ No live-streaming or live broadcast of practice or Zoom interviews is permitted by an individual or media outlet at any time on any platform.
- ▶ Tripods are not allowed to be used while filming from the sideline.

BLOGGING/TWITTER POLICY

- ▶ During training camp, "Twitter/blogging" is allowed during practices, but the Packers would ask that members of the media utilizing the technology adhere to a few simple guidelines. Please note that this policy is for training-camp practices only and does change during the regular season.
- ▶ NO entries about specific schemes, personnel groupings or anything that might be related in any way to game planning. If you have ANY questions about this, please ask a member of the Packers' communications staff before posting.
- ▶ NO entries regarding "football communications," including specific exchanges between coaches and players that might be overheard. Acknowledgement that the conversation occurred is acceptable, but we ask that the details of the conversation be withheld.
- ▶ NO detailed speculation as to the potential nature or severity of an injury until Head Coach Matt LaFleur has addressed it following practice. Once again, acknowledging that an injury occurred and providing general details (i.e., 'Right leg...' or 'Left wrist...') is permitted, but anything beyond that would be purely speculative and possibly inaccurate.
- ▶ The team would like to continue to keep training-camp practices open to those wishing to utilize blogs and/or Twitter, but such a policy is contingent upon media adhering to the guidelines above. If there are ANY questions regarding what is or is not acceptable, please contact a member of the Packers' communications department.

PRIVATE TEAM COMMUNICATION

- ▶ The Packers ask all media, print and electronic, to refrain from reporting or recording any team communication meant solely for the team.
- ▶ This includes the post-practice team huddle, in which LaFleur addresses his players. It also includes mid-practice and/or post-practice communication between any coach and his players, especially conversations of a reprimanding, negative nature.
- ▶ In general, reporting that the conversation took place is acceptable, just not the details of those conversations. Details are not to be relayed to the public either directly (through firsthand hearing), or indirectly (through interviews, even if the subject answers the question).

- ▶ If media has any question as to whether communication should be kept private, please contact the communications department before writing or airing such conversations.

INJURY-FOOTAGE POLICY

- ▶ Again this season, the Packers respectfully ask all photographers (video and still) to follow guidelines related to shooting injured players.
- ▶ Photographers are asked to avoid filming, photographing, printing and/or airing any shots of any injury situation, while the injury occurs, while trainers attend to/treat the injured player, and while the player is leaving the field, either on his own or with aid. This includes minor injuries.
- ▶ The team will allow shots of players after they've been treated. For instance, cameras are allowed to shoot a player on the sideline with ice on his knee, after trainers have left.
- ▶ However, cameras are not allowed to film a player on crutches, either on the field or in the locker room.
- ▶ If outlets choose not to respect this policy — or any other policy — the team will have no choice but to consider limiting access to the field.

INJURY INFORMATION

- ▶ All injury information will be issued by Head Coach Matt LaFleur. Please do not address injury questions to another coach or staff member.

NFL ONLINE-CONTENT POLICY

- ▶ Accredited Organizations may supplement its traditional media distribution platform (e.g., newspaper, television, radio) with other new media distribution platforms that it controls (e.g., websites, official social media accounts, applications, podcasts), provided that, with respect to such new media distribution platforms: (i) any use of film or video or digital still images is limited to a reasonable amount or number (as applicable), and used only to illustrate or support news and editorial coverage of the Game or Event (as opposed to use in connection with or on commercial products (e.g., apparel, posters, commemorative programs, or other types of souvenir or other merchandise, or sponsored content) purposes; (ii) any use of film or video or digital still images is not used to create Simulated Video of game action; (iii) no video of game action is used (except that, if the Accredited Organization is a television broadcaster, Game or Event highlights may be shown as part of a single, non-archived, online "simulcast" of any regularly scheduled television news programming the Accredited Organization may broadcast, provided it adheres to the limits on such broadcasts set forth below); and (iv) use of non-game audio and video content obtained as a result of credentialed card access (e.g., press conferences, training camp, practice and/or interviews at NFL venues or events): (1) must be limited to 90 seconds maximum per day (180 seconds maximum -- 90 seconds per Member Club -- in two-Member Club markets), (2) may not be posted or streamed "live" or in real time in any form or medium and may not be archived (i.e., made available for on-demand public access for more than 24 hours after posting, etc.), (3) may appear only in an editorial context (i.e., no sponsorship, merchandising or advertising integrated with or around the content, including digital advertising, etc.), and (4) must be accompanied by links back to NFL.com and to the applicable Member Club's web site.
