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PACKERS FACE BENGALS IN PRESEASON DEBUT

The Packers will open the preseason taking on the Bengals in Cincinnati.

- ▶ The Packers and Bengals will practice against each other on Wednesday before facing off on Friday night.
- ▶ It will mark the second straight year that Green Bay starts the preseason on the road.
- ▶ It will be the first preseason meeting between the Packers and Bengals since 2012, a 27-13 Green Bay win at Cincinnati.
- ▶ The two teams last met in 2021 when the Packers won, 25-22, in overtime in the regular season at the Bengals.



WITH THE CALL

Flagship by Milwaukee's WTMJ-TV and in conjunction with WGBA-TV in Green Bay, Packers preseason games are televised over a 22-station network throughout the state of Wisconsin, Upper Michigan and northeastern Minnesota, Peoria in Illinois, Cedar Rapids-Waterloo, Davenport and Des Moines in Iowa, Omaha in Nebraska, St. Louis in Missouri, Bismarck, Fargo and Minot in North Dakota, Sioux Falls in South Dakota and Anchorage, Fairbanks and Juneau in Alaska.

▶ The top-notch broadcast team includes CBS's **Kevin Harlan** (play-by-play) alongside former Green Bay full-back **John Kuhn** (analyst) with **Lance Allan** of WTMJ-TV serving as the sideline reporter. Allan will also host an informative half-hour pregame show. Packers preseason games are also broadcast on Telemundo Wisconsin.

PRESEASON GAME 1

Wayne Larrivee (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler **Larry McCarren** (analyst) call the action. McCarren first joined the team's broadcasts in 1995 and enters his 29th season calling Packers games. After originally being paired together in 1999, McCarren and Larrivee enter their 25th season of broadcasts together. They surpassed Jim Irwin and Max McGee for the most regular-season and postseason games broadcast for the Packers with 313 at the 2018 season opener against Chicago.

HEAD COACH MATT LAFLEUR

LAFLEUR LEADS THE PACK

Head Coach **Matt LaFleur** (la-flew-er) has led the Packers to three straight NFC North titles, is the only coach in franchise history to post 10-plus wins in each of his first three seasons with the team and is the only coach in NFL history to win at least 12 games (13) in each of his first three seasons as an NFL head coach (Elias Sports Bureau).

- ▶ Dating back to 2019, the Packers have the **third-best** regular-season record in the NFL and the best in the NFC:

- ▶ Per Elias, LaFleur has recorded the **second-most wins in NFL history by a head coach in his first four seasons in the league:**

1. George Seifert	52 (1989-92)
2. Matt LaFleur	47 (2019-22)

- ▶ LaFleur has guided the Packers to a 27-6 record at home (.818) in the regular season, the **top home mark in the NFL** since 2019 (No. 2 is Kansas City, 25-8, .758).
- ▶ LaFleur (23-2) tied Guy Chamberlin (23-1-1) for the **most wins in NFL history** by a head coach in his first 25 regular-season home games (Elias).

- ▶ 2019-21 was the first time Green Bay won seven-plus games in three straight seasons at Lambeau Field since doing it in three straight years from 2010-12.
- ▶ Green Bay is 15-0 in the month of December under LaFleur, marking the **longest winning streak by a head coach** at the start of his career in the month of December (Elias).

- ▶ The Packers are 18-2 during the regular season in December/January under LaFleur, a .900 winning percentage that ranks **No. 1 in the NFL since 2019** (Kansas City is No. 2 at 19-3, .864).

- ▶ From Week 14 of 2019 to Week 17 of 2022, Green Bay won 10 straight at Lambeau Field in December/January, the **longest home winning streak** in those months by the Packers since 2008-13 (13 games).

- ▶ The Packers are 22-11 in one-score games under LaFleur, a .667 winning percentage that ranks **No. 2 in the NFL** since 2019 (Kansas City, is No. 1 at 25-11, .694).

- ▶ LaFleur (39-10, .796, 2019-21) passed Seifert (38-10, .791, 1989-91) for the **most wins by an NFL head coach in his first three seasons** in the league (per Elias).

- ▶ LaFleur's 39 wins from 2019-21 **tied for the second most** by a coach over any three-season span in league history behind only Mike Ditka's 40 wins with Chicago from 1985-87 (Elias).

- ▶ LaFleur is the **only head coach in NFL history** to post 13-plus wins in three straight seasons (Elias).

- ▶ LaFleur tied Seifert for the **third fastest to 40 wins** by a head coach in NFL history (51 games) behind only Paul Brown (47) and Chuck Knox (50).

- ▶ LaFleur (33) **tied for the second-most wins** by a head coach in his first 40 regular-season games (Chamberlin, 34; Brown, 33).

- ▶ LaFleur reached 30 wins in his first 37 games as a head coach, **tied for the third fastest in NFL history** (Brown, 37) to reach the 30-win mark (Elias), trailing Seifert (36) and Chamberlin (35).

- ▶ LaFleur led Green Bay to a 20-5 record in his first 25 regular-season games, which **tied for No. 4 in NFL history** for the most wins by a head coach in his first 25 regular-season games (Elias).

- ▶ According to Elias, LaFleur was the **sixth head coach since 1970** to lead his team to the conference champi-

onship game in both of his first two seasons as a head coach (2019-20), joining Jim Harbaugh (2011-12), Rex Ryan (2009-10), Barry Switzer (1994-95), Seifert (1989-90) and Don McCafferty (1970-71).

- ▶ LaFleur became just the **second NFL head coach** since the league went to a divisional format in 1967 to win 13-plus games and a division title in both of his first two seasons (2019-20), joining Seifert (1989-90).

- ▶ LaFleur (26) posted the **second-most wins in NFL history** by a coach in his first two seasons (2019-20) behind only Seifert (28 in 1989-90).

- ▶ LaFleur guided the Packers to 26 wins in 2019-20 after the Packers won 13 games in 2017-18. That was the **biggest two-season win improvement by a head coach in franchise history** from the two seasons prior to him taking over, eclipsing the previous mark held by Vince Lombardi (15 victories in 1959-60 after the Packers won four games in 1957-58).

- ▶ LaFleur led the **biggest one-year win improvement** in franchise history in 2019:

- ▶ LaFleur is 18-6 (.750) against the NFC North, giving him the **best record in the NFC North/Central** (min. 10 games) according to Elias:

- ▶ The Packers' .750 winning percentage in division games is **tied for No. 2 in the NFL** since 2019 (Buffalo, 18-6, .750 / Kansas City, 20-3, .870).

- ▶ Green Bay is 10-2 (.833) in division games at home, No. 2 in the NFL since 2019 (Dallas, 11-1, .917).

- ▶ LaFleur's winning percentage of .917 (11-1) against division opponents in 2019-20 **tied for the second best** by a coach in his first two seasons as head coach, dating back to 1970 (Mike Tomlin, 11-1, .917 in 2007-08 / Mariucci, 15-1, .938 in 1997-98).

- ▶ Among head coaches who began their career since 1970, LaFleur was the **first one** to win his first seven road divisional games (Elias).

- ▶ LaFleur is the **only coach in NFL history** (Elias) to win his first eight games against the Bears (Dennis Green won his first six for Minnesota in 1992-94).

- ▶ Under LaFleur, Green Bay is 42-6 when forcing at least one turnover, an .875 winning percentage that ranks **No. 1 in the NFL** since 2019 (TruMedia):

- ▶ The Packers posted at least one takeaway in 10 consecutive games (Weeks 7-13, 15-17), the **longest single-season streak by Green Bay since 2015** (10).

- ▶ Under LaFleur, Green Bay is 11-0 when finishing with a turnover margin of plus-3 or better.

Two years after he co-founded the Packers with Curly Lambeau, George Calhoun began writing a piece called The Dope Sheet, which served as the official press release from 1921-24.



COACHING-STAFF CHANGES

Throughout the offseason, Head Coach **Matt LaFleur** saw some departures from the coaching staff and used a combination of promotions and new hires to fill those roles.

► **Rich Bisaccia** was promoted to assistant head coach/special teams coordinator. This will be the 12th season that he has held the title of associate head coach or assistant head coach in the NFL. Bisaccia has 40 years of coaching experience, including 21 seasons in the NFL as a special teams coordinator with the Packers (2022), Oakland/Las Vegas Raiders (2018-21), Dallas Cowboys (2013-17), San Diego Chargers (2011-12) and Tampa Bay Buccaneers (2002-10). Last year he helped Keisean Nixon earn first-team All-Pro honors from *The Associated Press*. Nixon was the first Packer kick returner to earn a spot on the AP All-Pro team since it added the position in 1976. Nixon (1,009) was the third player in team history to lead the NFL in kickoff return yards (A1 Carmichael in 1956 and 1957, Dave Hampton in 1971).

► **Greg Williams** joins Green Bay as the passing game coordinator (defense). He brings 19 years of coaching experience to the Packers, including 14 seasons in the NFL. He spent the past four seasons as the cornerbacks coach for the Arizona Cardinals. In 2022, Williams guided a cornerback group that helped Arizona rank No. 2 in the league in yards allowed per completion (10.10), the top single-season mark by the Cardinals since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger. Prior to his time in Arizona, Williams was the defensive backs coach for the Denver Broncos (2018) and Indianapolis Colts (2016-17). His first NFL coaching experience was working seven seasons with the San Diego Chargers, first as assistant linebackers coach (2009-12) and then as assistant secondary coach (2013-15). The former wide receiver and defensive back at the University of North Carolina (1994-97) spent time in training camp with the Chicago Bears and New York Giants while also playing two seasons (1999-2000) with the Amsterdam Admirals of NFL Europe, one year with the San Francisco Demons of the XFL (2001) and five years in the Arena Football League with the Indiana Firebirds (2001-03) and Chicago Rush (2004-05). Williams began his coaching career at Arizona State as an intern in 2003 and worked as an assistant coach at the College of DuPage for two seasons (2004-05). He then spent two years (2006-07) as Arkansas Tech's defensive backs coach and recruiting coordinator before working as a graduate assistant for the 2008 season at the University of Pittsburgh.

► **Ryan Downard** is entering his sixth season in Green Bay and first as defensive backs coach after serving as the safeties coach last season, as the assistant defensive backs coach from 2019-21 and defensive quality control coach in 2018. In 2022, the Packers ranked No. 6 in the NFL in passing defense (197.0 ypg) and tied for No. 4 in interceptions (17). He came to Green Bay after working at Bowling Green for two seasons, serving as the safeties coach in 2017 and the director of football operations in 2016. From 2014-15, Downard was a defensive coaching assistant with the Cleveland Browns, assisting with the defensive line in 2014 and the defensive backs in 2015. Prior to his two seasons with the Browns, he served as a graduate assistant at Texas Tech and Toledo. Downard played defensive back at Eastern Michigan, where he earned honorable mention Freshman All-American recognition from Scout.com in 2007 after ranking No. 2 in the country among freshmen with six INTs.

► **Jason Rebrovich** was promoted to pass rush specialist after originally joining the Packers to coach the outside linebackers in 2022. He was part of a coaching staff that helped Green Bay finish No. 6 in passing defense (197.0 ypg) and No. 8 in opponent third-down

percentage (37.63) last season. Rebrovich has 21 years of coaching experience, including nine seasons in the NFL (Jacksonville Jaguars, 2017-20 / Buffalo Bills, 2013-16). In 2019, Rebrovich oversaw the development of DE Josh Allen, who led all NFL rookies and broke the single-season franchise record for rookies with 10.5 sacks on his way to earning All-Rookie honors from the PFWA. In 2017, the Jaguars ranked No. 2 in the league with 55 sacks, the second most in a season in team history, as three defensive linemen earned Pro Bowl honors (Calais Campbell, Yannick Ngakoue, Malik Jackson). Prior to entering the NFL coaching ranks, Rebrovich spent 12 seasons coaching at the collegiate level at Syracuse (2011-12), SUNY Cortland (2008-10, 2001-03), Ferris State (2005-07) and Concord (2004).

► **Tim Lester** joins the Packers as a senior analyst. He comes to Green Bay after spending the last six seasons (2017-22) as the head coach at Western Michigan, where he also was a four-year starter at quarterback from 1996-99 and coached quarterbacks in 2005-06. Prior to being the head coach at his alma mater, he coached quarterbacks at Purdue in 2016. From 2013-15, he coached the same position at Syracuse, including doubling as the offensive coordinator during his last two seasons. He went to the Orange after being the head coach at Division III Elmhurst College from 2008-2012, posting a 33-19 record for a .635 winning percentage, the second highest in school history. Lester also served as an assistant at North Central College (2007) and Elmhurst (2002-03). He was the head coach at Division II Saint Joseph's College in 2004, receiving Independent Football Alliance Coach of the Year honors.

► **Rob Grosso** comes to Green Bay as an offensive quality control assistant after working as a defensive quality control coach for the Arizona Cardinals from 2019-22. Prior to working for the Cardinals, he was the assistant to the head coach under Vance Joseph for the Denver Broncos in 2018. With the Broncos, Grosso also assisted with the team's outside linebackers and special teams. He was elevated to that position after serving as an operations intern with the Broncos during the 2017 season. Grosso worked with the Arizona Rattlers of the Indoor Football League during the 2017 season as a coaching/player personnel intern. He got his start in the NFL with Denver for two years (2015-16) as a training camp operations intern before working as a volunteer assistant scout with the Saskatchewan Rough Riders (2016-17) of the Canadian Football League and as a scout for Sports Info Solutions (2016). The former wide receiver at John Carroll University (2011-13) helped with his alma mater's wide receivers for two seasons as a student coaching/recruiting assistant following his playing days.

► **Kyle Wilber** joins the Packers as a special teams quality control coach. He played linebacker, defensive end and was a key special-teams contributor in the NFL for 10 seasons (2012-21), appearing in 135 games with 17 starts in the regular season and playing in four post-season contests. He originally was a fourth-round pick (No. 113 overall) by the Dallas Cowboys in the 2012 NFL Draft out of Wake Forest. After six seasons with the Cowboys (2012-17), he played four seasons with the Oakland/Las Vegas Raiders (2018-21). Over his career, Wilber registered 105 tackles (71 solo), six tackles for a loss, 3.5 sacks, seven QB hits, four passes defensed, a forced fumble and four fumble recoveries on defense. On special teams, he recorded 58 tackles, two forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries.

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OFFSEASON MOVES

Packers General Manager **Brian Gutekunst** and his staff have made numerous moves that have helped Green Bay to a 47-19 record over the last four seasons, three division titles and appearances in two NFC title games. This offseason, Gutekunst and his staff had decisions and moves to make with the roster.

- ▶ The Packers and Jets agreed to a trade that sent QB **Aaron Rodgers**, a first-round selection (No. 15) and a fifth-round choice (No. 170) in 2023 to New York for a first-round selection (No. 13), a second-round pick (No. 42) and a sixth-round selection (No. 207) in 2023 and a conditional second-round choice in 2024.
- ▶ Green Bay signed QB **Jordan Love** to a contract extension. He has appeared in 10 games with one start for the Packers after originally being selected by Green Bay in the first round (No. 26 overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft out of Utah State. Love played in four games last season, completing 14 of 21 passes (66.7 pct.) for 195 yards and a TD and a passer rating of 112.2. He entered the Week 12 game at Philadelphia in the fourth quarter last season, connecting on 6 of 9 passes (66.7 pct.) for 113 yards and a 63-yard TD for a 146.8 rating.
- ▶ Late in the 2023 season, Green Bay signed G/T **Elgton Jenkins** to a contract extension. Last year, he earned his second trip to the Pro Bowl (2020) in just his fourth season in the league. According to Stathead.com, Jenkins was the 11th Packers offensive lineman to be named to multiple Pro Bowls. Jenkins was part of a line that helped the Packers rank No. 7 in the NFL in sacks allowed (32), including just 17 in Weeks 7-18, tied for the third fewest in the league over that span.
- ▶ CB **Keisean Nixon** re-signed after his first season with Green Bay that saw him be named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press*. He was the first Packer kick returner to earn a spot on the AP All-Pro team since it added the position in 1976. He was also named to the All-NFL and All-NFC teams by the Pro Football Writers of America as a kick returner, becoming just the second kick returner in franchise history to be selected to the All-NFL teams by the PFWA (KR Roell Preston in 1998). Nixon finished the 2022 season leading the NFL with 1,009 kickoff return yards and a kickoff return average of 28.8 (min. 25 att.). His kickoff return average ranks No. 1 in team history for a single season (min. 30 returns). Nixon was just the third player in team history to lead the NFL in kickoff return yards (Al Carmichael in 1956 and 1957, Dave Hampton in 1971).
- ▶ Among the other players Green Bay re-signed this offseason were S **Rudy Ford**, LB **Tyler Hollins**, S **Dallin Leavitt**, LB **Eric Wilson** and TE **Justin Davis**. Ford appeared in all 17 games with a career-best six starts in his first season in Green Bay, recording 40 tackles (29 solo), a career-high three interceptions (No. 3 on the team), a forced fumble, a fumble recovery and three passes defended. He led the team with a career-best 87 yards on INT returns, which tied for No. 7 in the NFL. Hollins, a fifth-year player out of the University of Oregon, played in six games for Green Bay last season after he was claimed off waivers from the Los Angeles Rams on Nov. 24, 2022. In those six contests for the Packers, he posted nine tackles (four solo), 2.5 sacks, four QB hits and three tackles for a loss. Leavitt joined the Packers just before the 2022 training camp and went on to play in all 17 games for Green Bay. He tied for No. 1 on the team with a career-high 13 special teams tackles. Wilson, a seventh-year player out of the University of Cincinnati, was signed by the Packers off the New Orleans Saints' practice squad on Oct. 4, 2022. He went on to play in 13 games for the Packers and tied for the team lead with 13 special teams tackles. Davis, who signed with the Packers off the Indianapolis Colts' practice squad on Sept. 28, 2021, has played in 31 regular-season games with one start and appeared in one postseason contest for Green Bay over the last two seasons.
- ▶ The Packers retained restricted free agent T **Yosh Nijman**, who played in all 50 games from 2020-22 with 21 starts, opening 11 games at right tackle and 10 at left tackle.
- ▶ Green Bay also added S **Tarvarius Moore**, LS **Matt Orzech** and S **Jonathan Owens**. Moore, a sixth-year player, was originally drafted by the San Francisco 49ers in the third round (No. 95 overall) of the 2018 NFL Draft out of Southern Mississippi. He played in 61 regular-season games with 13 starts during the regular season and appeared in six postseason contests. Orzech, a fourth-year player, saw action in 34

regular-season games and four postseason contests for the Rams over the last two seasons (2021-22). Owens is a fifth-year player that played in 31 games with 19 starts for the Houston Texans from 2019-22. Last season, he set career marks across the board with 17 games started, 125 tackles (No. 2 on the team), 84 solo tackles (No. 2 on the team), a sack, a QB hit and four passes defended.

- ▶ The Packers also added a couple players from other professional football leagues this offseason. Green Bay signed QB **Alex McGough**, who played for the Birmingham Stallions of the United States Football League, earning league MVP honors and leading his team to the USFL title, and P **Daniel Whelan**, who played for the D.C. Defenders in 2023, earning All-XFL honors after ranking No. 3 in the league in both punting average (45.6) and punts inside the 20 (11).
- ▶ The Packers were allocated DL **Kenneth Odumegwu** from Nigeria as part of the NFL International Player Pathway program. He is from Anambra State in Nigeria and was converted to football via Educational Basketball. Odumegwu attended Osi Unemiyora's NFL Africa Touchdown Camp in Accra, Ghana, where he was named defensive Most Valuable Player.

MEET THE DRAFT PICKS

Training-camp storylines always hover around new players and just how they figure into the depth chart. The Packers added a 13-man draft class.

- ▶ LB **Lukas Van Ness** (No. 13 overall) was selected by the Packers in the first round out of Iowa after earning second-team All-Big Ten honors from the conference's coaches and media as a redshirt sophomore in 2022.
- ▶ Green Bay had two picks in the second round, first selecting TE **Luke Musgrave** (No. 42 overall) out of Oregon State and then WR **Jayden Reed** (No. 50 overall) out of Michigan State. According to Stats Pass, Musgrave ranked No. 2 among Pacific-12 tight ends and No. 8 among tight ends in the Power Five in yards per reception (14.3) from 2021-22. Reed earned first-team All-America honors from the American Football Coaches Association as a junior in 2021 as an all-purpose player after leading the Big Ten in punt return TDs (two) and ranking No. 2 in the conference in all-purpose yards (128.8 ypg).
- ▶ TE **Tucker Kraft** was drafted by the Packers in the third round (No. 78 overall) out of South Dakota State after earning numerous All-America honors (third-team in 2022; first- and second-team in 2021) and first-team All-Missouri Valley Football Conference (MVFC) honors in each of his last two seasons.
- ▶ In the fourth round, the Packers selected DL **Colby Wooden** (No. 116 overall) out of Auburn. He earned third-team All-Southeastern Conference honors from *Phil Steele's College Football* as a senior in 2022 after recording career highs in sacks (six), tackles for a loss (11.5) and QB hits (10).
- ▶ Green Bay had two picks in the fifth round, selecting QB **Sean Clifford** (No. 149 overall) out of Penn State and WR **Dontayvion Wicks** (No. 159 overall) from the University of Virginia. Clifford finished as the school's all-time leader in completion percentage (61.4), completions (833), passing yards (10,661), total yards (11,734), passing touchdowns (86), pass attempts (1,356) and wins as a starting quarterback (32). Wicks set the UVA's single-season school record for receiving yards with 1,203 yards on 57 catches (21.1 avg.) in 2021.
- ▶ The sixth round contained two picks for the Packers in DL **Karl Brooks** (No. 179 overall) from Bowling Green and K **Anders Carlson** (No. 207 overall) from Auburn. Brooks finished with 27.5 career sacks to rank No. 3 all-time in program history and Carlson ranked No. 2 in school history in scoring (410) and field goals made (79) and No. 3 in extra points made (173).
- ▶ The seventh round brought four new players to Green Bay. First was CB **Carrington Valentine** (No. 232 overall) who led the University of Kentucky and ranked No. 9 in the SEC in passes defended (11) in 2022. The Packers then took RB **Lew Nichols** (No. 235 overall), who finished his career ranked No. 6 on Central Michigan's all-time rushing list with 3,061 yards. With the No. 242 overall pick, Green Bay selected S **Anthony Johnson Jr.**, who finished his career at Iowa State by starting the final 53 games. The Packers used their final pick of the draft on WR **Grant DuBose** after he finished his career at Charlotte ranked No. 4 in school history with 1,684 receiving yards in just two seasons and No. 2 all-time in receiving yards per game (70.2).

MATT LaFLEUR...In his fifth season as the Packers' 15th head coach.

► Enters his 15th season in the NFL, having previously served as an offensive coordinator for two seasons (Los Angeles Rams, 2017; Tennessee Titans, 2018), a quarterbacks coach for six seasons (Washington Redskins, 2010-13; Atlanta Falcons, 2015-16), and an offensive assistant for two seasons (Houston Texans, 2008-09).

► In his first four seasons leading the Packers, has authored one of the greatest starts to a head-coaching career in NFL history. Per the Elias Sports Bureau, his 47 wins are the second most in league history by a head coach in his first four seasons in the NFL, trailing only George Seifert (52 in 1989-92). Green Bay's 47-19 regular-season record since 2019 ranks No. 3 in the NFL and No. 1 in the NFC.

► Became the first coach in NFL history to post 13-plus wins in three straight seasons and his 39 wins from 2019-21 passed Seifert (38) for the most wins by an NFL head coach in his first three seasons in the league (Elias). His 39 wins are also tied for the second most by a coach over any three-season span in league history, trailing only Andy Reid's 40 wins with Kansas City from 2002-22 and Mike Ditka's 40 wins with the Chicago Bears from 1985-87 (Elias).

► Guided the Packers to a 27-6 record (.818) in the regular season from 2019-22 at Lambeau Field, the top home mark in the NFL since 2019. His .750 win percentage (18-6 record) against NFC North opponents in his first four seasons also ranks as the best in the history of the NFC North/Central (min. 10 games).

► In his first season leading the Packers in 2019, became the first coach in club history to lead the team to the playoffs in his debut season. Also led the largest one-year win improvement in team history (plus-seven wins).

ZAC TAYLOR...In his fifth season as the Bengals' 10th head coach.

► Is in his 11th year as an NFL coach and his fifth season as head coach of the Bengals after spending time with the L.A. Rams (2017-18) and Miami Dolphins (2012-15).

► Through four seasons with the Bengals, has led the team to back-to-back AFC North titles (2021-22), two consecutive AFC Championship games (2021-22) and an appearance in Super Bowl LVI in 2021.

► Became one of only 13 head coaches in NFL history to win five of their first six career postseason games after defeating Baltimore and Buffalo in the Wild Card and Divisional Playoffs, respectively, in 2022.

THE PACKERS-BENGALS SERIES

► Green Bay has won the last two regular-season matchups with Cincinnati, both in overtime, bringing the regular-season series record to 7-7.

► The series between the Packers and Bengals began at Lambeau Field in 1971 where Green Bay faced legendary Cincinnati head coach Paul Brown. The Packers earned a 20-17 victory on a field goal from Lou Michaels to secure the inaugural game between the two squads.

► One of the most notable games between the Packers and Bengals was in 1992 when QB Brett Favre replaced an injured Don Majkowski in the first quarter and led Green Bay to a come-from-behind 24-23 victory that included a 35-yard TD pass to Kitrick Taylor with only 13 seconds left in the game.

LAST MEETING, REGULAR SEASON

Oct. 10, 2021, Paul Brown Stadium, Packers won, 25-22 (OT)

► Packers K Mason Crosby hit a 49-yard field goal in overtime to give Green Bay its fourth straight win after losing its opening game of the season.

► Bengals RB Joe Mixon scored on an 8-yard rushing TD with 3:27 left in regulation and the two-point conversion from QB Joe Burrow to WR Tee Higgins tied the game.

► Packers QB Aaron Rodgers completed 27 of 39 attempts for 344 yards, two TDs and one INT for a 102.9 rating.

► Packers WR Davante Adams hauled in 11 catches for 206 yards and one TD while RB AJ Dillon caught Rodgers' other TD, a 12-yard reception.

A LOOK AT THE SCHEDULE

The Green Bay Packers' 2023 NFL schedule will feature 17 regular-season games and three preseason games. It is highlighted by five prime-time contests (subject to flexible scheduling) on the original schedule for the 10th straight year (2014-23).

▶ With the three-game preseason schedule implemented for the 2021 season, the Packers will alternate between hosting one and two preseason games each year. This year, Green Bay opens at the Cincinnati Bengals before returning home to face the New England Patriots and then the Seattle Seahawks. Both home games will have a charitable aspect to them, with the first contest designated as the Play Football Game and the second game as the Packers Give Back Game.

▶ The Packers will open the regular season at the Chicago Bears, marking the fifth straight year and the ninth time in the last 11 seasons that Green Bay has started the season on the road. Green Bay is the only team in the NFL to open the season on the road each of the last five years (2019-23). It is also the fourth time in the last five years that the Packers have opened the season on the road against a division opponent.

▶ Week 2 sees Green Bay traveling to take on the Atlanta Falcons, marking the first time since 2016 that the Packers have opened the season with back-to-back road contests.

▶ Green Bay will have its home opener at Lambeau Field in Week 3 against the New Orleans Saints.

▶ The Packers stay at home for a short week to host the Detroit Lions on a Thursday for the first time.

▶ Week 5 has the Packers visiting Las Vegas for the first time to play the Raiders on *Monday Night Football*. It marks the 31st straight season (1992-2023) that Green Bay will play on *MNF*.

▶ The Packers will be on the bye in Week 6, marking the first Week 6 bye for Green Bay since 2006.

▶ After the bye week, the Packers travel back out west to face the Denver Broncos. It is the first time since 2011 that Green Bay will play road games on each side of the bye week.

▶ In Week 8, the Packers will host Minnesota in the first of four scheduled noon (CT) games in a row, with three of them at home.

▶ In Week 9, Lambeau Field will welcome the Los Angeles Rams, marking the first time the Rams have played in Green Bay in three consecutive seasons.

▶ After a trip to play the Pittsburgh Steelers in Week 10, the Packers return home to take on the Los Angeles Chargers in Week 11. Including Super Bowl XLV, six of the last eight games between the Packers and Steelers have been decided by seven points or less. Green Bay holds a 10-2 (.833) record against the Chargers, including a 4-1 mark at home.

▶ Week 12 will be another short week for the Packers as they will play at the Lions on Thanksgiving. It is the first time Green Bay has played on the holiday since they hosted the Bears in 2015 and the first time at Detroit since 2013. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, the two Thursday games against Detroit mark just the second time that two teams have squared off multiple times on a Thursday in the same season (1926 Chicago Bears/Chicago Cardinals).

▶ The month of December starts with the first of three prime-time matchups for Green Bay, which would be the most played by the Packers in a single season in the month of December. After the Packers host the Kansas City Chiefs on Sunday night in Week 13, they will travel to take on the New York Giants on *MNF* in Week 14. It is just the second time (2019) that Green Bay has multiple Thursday games and multiple Monday games.

▶ In Week 15, the Packers return to Lambeau to play Tampa Bay in what is the second-latest visit by the Buccaneers (Week 17 in 2000).

▶ After two straight seasons of playing on Christmas,

Green Bay visits the Carolina Panthers in Week 16 on Christmas Eve. Each of the last four games and six of the last seven games between the two have been decided by eight points or less.

▶ For the third straight season and the fourth time in the last five, the Packers will finish the regular season with back-to-back NFC North contests. They will travel a state over to take on the Vikings in a prime-time matchup on New Year's Eve in Week 17 and then return home to face the Bears in the season finale on either Jan. 6 or 7.

BREAKING DOWN THE ROSTER

The Packers have a 91-man roster that is composed of 43 offensive players, 43 defensive players and five specialists.

- ▶ Of the 91 players on Green Bay's roster, 42 of them (46.2 percent) were draft picks of the Packers.
- ▶ Green Bay has nine players that were drafted in the first round and all were selected by the Packers.
- ▶ Green Bay has 36 players on the roster that began their careers as undrafted free agents.
- ▶ 62.6 percent of the players (57 of 91) on Green Bay's roster entered the league as a sixth-round or seventh-round pick or as an undrafted player.
- ▶ Of the 91 players on the roster, 86 of them (94.5 percent) are 28 years old or younger (as of Aug. 11) and 48 players (52.7 percent) are 24 years old or younger.
- ▶ Of the 91 players on the roster, 57 of them (62.6 percent) played collegiately in the "Power Five" conferences (ACC, Big 10, Big 12, Pac-12 and SEC).
- ▶ The conference most represented on the roster is the SEC with 16 players while the Big Ten ranks No. 2 with 14 players.

NOTES ON THE 2022 OFFENSE

- ▶ The Packers ranked **No. 5 in the NFL** in average time of possession (31.23) in 2022.
- ▶ Green Bay gave up 32 sacks, the **seventh fewest in the NFL** in 2022 (Tampa Bay was No. 1 with 22). The Packers finished the season strong, allowing 17 sacks from Weeks 7-18, tied for the third fewest in the NFL over that span.
- ▶ The Packers finished **No. 7** in sacks allowed per pass attempt (5.68 pct.).
- ▶ According to TruMedia, the Green Bay offense allowed a pressure rate (pct. of offensive dropbacks where QB was sacked, under duress or hit) of 5.3 pct. in 2022, the **eighth lowest in the NFL**.
- ▶ The 11 TD receptions by rookies during the 2022 regular season were the **third most for a single season in team history** (12 in 1954 and 13 in 1952).

- ▶ WRs **Romeo Doubs** (42, three) and **Christian Watson** (41, seven) became the **third rookie WR duo in NFL history** to each have 40-plus receptions and three-plus TD receptions (Bill Groman, Charley Hennigan, 1960 / Darrin Chiaverini, Kevin Johnson, 1999).
- ▶ Watson was the **only NFL player** to have seven-plus receiving TDs (seven) and multiple rushing TDs (two) in the 2022 regular season.
- ▶ According to Elias, Watson was the **second rookie in NFL history** to post seven-plus receiving TDs and multiple rushing TDs (Chase Claypool, 2020).
- ▶ Watson joined Johnny (Blood) McNally (1931) and Don Hutson (1941) as the only Packers with seven-plus receiving TDs and multiple rushing TDs in a season.
- ▶ Watson posted the **third-most TD receptions by a Packers rookie** in team history:

- ▶ The only other time the Packers had two rookies with three-plus TD catches was in 1951 (Carlton Elliott and Ray Pelfrey each had five).
- ▶ Doubs (**t-No. 6**, 42) and Watson (**t-No. 8**, 41) both finished in the top 10 among NFL rookies in receptions in 2022.
- ▶ Watson (**No. 5**, 611) and Doubs (**No. 10**, 425) also both ranked in the top 10 among NFL rookies in receiving yards this season.
- ▶ Watson became just the fourth NFL wide receiver since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger to post 40-plus receptions, 600-plus receiving yards, seven-plus receiving TDs and multiple rushing TDs in a season (Claypool and Tyreek Hill in 2020 / Jerry Rice 1994).
- ▶ Watson posted three 100-yard receiving games in 2022, the most by a Green Bay rookie in a season since Billy Howton (five) in 1952. It also **tied for the most among NFL rookies in 2022** (Olave and Wilson).
- ▶ All three of Watson's 100-yard receiving games during the 2022 regular season came on five or fewer receptions, the most by a Packer since Greg Jennings had four in 2009.
- ▶ Watson (Weeks 10-13) joined Randy Moss (1998) as the only NFL rookie WRs with eight scrimmage TDs over a four-game span, per Elias.
- ▶ Watson became the **sixth rookie in the Super Bowl era** with at least eight scrimmage touchdowns in a four-game span (Weeks 10-13), joining Moss and RBs Eric Dickerson (1983), Edgerrin James (1999), Mike Anderson and Clinton Portis (2002).
- ▶ Watson became the **third rookie in the Super Bowl era** with at least seven TD receptions in a four-game span (Weeks 10-13), joining Moss (eight in 1998) and Odell Beckham Jr. (seven TD receptions in 2014).
- ▶ Watson became the **first Packers rookie** to record a TD reception in four straight games (Weeks 10-13) since Howton (five) in 1952.
- ▶ Watson ranked **No. 4 in the league** in yards after the catch per reception (6.73) for the 2022 season (min. 36 rec.).
- ▶ Watson finished **No. 6 in the NFL** in average yards per target (13.8) in 2022 (min. 36 rec.).

MORE NOTES ON THE 2022 OFFENSE

- ▶ The Packers posted 175-plus rushing yards in five games during the 2022 regular season, **tied for No. 3 in the NFL** behind only Chicago (eight) and Baltimore (seven). It was the most by Green Bay in a season since 2013.
- ▶ RB **Aaron Jones** registered a career high 1,121 rushing yards in 2022 (**No. 9 in the NFL**), marking his third career 1,000-yard season and third in the last four seasons (2019-20) to tie John Brockington (three, 1971-73) for the third-most 1,000-yard rushing seasons in franchise history (Jim Taylor, five, 1960-64 / Ahman Green, six, 2000-04 and 2006). According to Stathead.com, only five NFL players had three-plus 1,000-yard rushing seasons from 2019-22 (Josh Jacobs and Derrick Henry, three / Nick Chubb and Dalvin Cook, four).
- ▶ Jones has posted three 1,000-yard rushing seasons (2019-20, 2022) on fewer than 250 carries, **tied for the second most in NFL history** behind only Taylor (four).
- ▶ Jones set a career high with 59 receptions during the 2022 season and was one of four RBs in the league (Austin Ekeler, Christian McCaffrey, Jerick McKinnon) with 50-plus receptions and five-plus receiving TDs, the most by Green Bay RB since Green had 57 in 2002.
- ▶ Jones joined Ekeler as the **only NFL running backs** with 50-plus receptions and five-plus receiving TDs in both 2021 and 2022. Jones is the **only RB in team history** to do it in back-to-back seasons.
- ▶ According to Stathead.com, the 59 receptions by Jones **tied for the seventh most** in a single season by a Packer running back and were the most since Green posted 62 in 2001.
- ▶ Jones and McCaffrey were the **only players in the NFL** for the 2022 season with 1,100-plus rushing yards, 55-plus receptions and five-plus receiving TDs. Jones became the **first player in team history** to hit all those marks in the same season.
- ▶ Jones finished the 2022 season **No. 2 among running backs** in yards per carry (min. 100 att.):

- ▶ Jones is **one of three NFL players** with 5,000-plus rushing yards, 60-plus scrimmage TDs and an average of 5.0-plus yards per carry in the first six seasons of their career (Jim Brown, 1957-62; Adrian Peterson, 2007-12).
- ▶ Jones is the **seventh player in NFL history** with 40-plus rushing TDs (43) and 15-plus receiving TDs (17) in his first six NFL seasons.
- ▶ Jones ranks **No. 3 on the Packers' all-time rushing list**:

- ▶ Jones is the **only NFL player** with at least 30 rushing touchdowns (31) and 15 receiving touchdowns (16) since 2019.

- ▶ Dating back to 1950, the three games of 130-plus rushing yards by Jones **tied for the third most by a Packer in a single regular season**, trailing Taylor (four in 1962) and Green (seven in 2003), according to Stathead.com.
- ▶ Jones **tied for No. 4 in the NFL** in 2022 with five 100-yard rushing games (Stathead.com).
- ▶ In Week 15, Jones (90 rushing yards, 36 receiving yards, one TD) and RB **AJ Dillon** (36 rushing yards, 35 receiving yards, career-high-tying two TDs) became the **first Green Bay RB tandem** to each post 35-plus rushing yards/35-plus receiving yards and a TD in the same game since Elijah Pitts and Taylor did so vs. Minnesota on Nov. 6, 1966.
- ▶ For the second straight season and the **fourth time in franchise history**, a RB tandem (Jones and Dillon) both registered 650-plus rushing yards and seven scrimmage TDs in the same season:

- ▶ Dillon posted six rushing TDs in Weeks 12-18, **tied for No. 1 in the league over that span**.
- ▶ Dillon had a rushing TD in five consecutive games (Weeks 12-13, 15-17), **tied for the fourth-longest streak in team history**.
- ▶ Jones and Dillon were the **only RB tandem** with 700-plus rushing yards and five scrimmage TDs each during both the 2021 and 2022 seasons (Stathead.com).

2022 GENERAL NOTES

- ▶ After having 15 players appear in every game in 2021, Green Bay had 26 players play in every game in 2022, tied with Minnesota for the third most in the NFL (Philadelphia, 27 / Jacksonville, 30). Dating back to 2000, it was the fourth-most Packers to appear in every game behind the 28 that played in 2000, 2014 and 2019).
- ▶ The Packers **tied for No. 10** in the league (89) for the least amount of penalties in 2022. Under LaFleur, the Packers have never ranked lower than No. 11 (No. 1 in 2021, 69 / t-No. 11 in 2020, 84 / t-No. 9 in 2019, 100).
- ▶ From 2019-22, Green Bay ranked **No. 4 in the NFL** with 342 penalties.
- ▶ Since the league went to a 16-game schedule in 1978, below are the best four-year marks by the Packers for penalties (excluding the windows that include 1982 because the strike-shortened year skews the numbers):

- ▶ For the fourth straight season, Green Bay finished on the positive side of the turnover margin (plus-two, t-No. 12 in the NFL in 2022). Since 2019, the Packers rank No. 2 in the NFL in turnover margin (plus-34).

NOTES ON THE 2022 DEFENSE

- ▶ The Packers allowed 20 or fewer points in each of the final five games of the 2022 season, Green Bay's longest streak since a five-game streak to end the 2019 season.
- ▶ Green Bay was one of four teams (Baltimore, Kansas City, N.Y. Jets) to hold 16 opponents under 30 points during the 2022 regular season. It was also a franchise single-season record.
- ▶ The Packers' defense finished the 2022 season **No. 5 in the NFL** in goal-to-go percentage (63.64), **No. 8** in third-down percentage (37.63) and **No. 10** in first downs/game (18.9).
- ▶ Green Bay finished near the top of the league in a few passing-defense categories in 2022:

- ▶ Green Bay had 351 return yards on INTs in 2022, **No. 2 in the NFL** (New England, 383) and the most in a season by the Packers since 2014 (396 yards).
- ▶ The Packers posted a season-high four takeaways in Week 17, matching their total from Week 16 at Miami, as they posted back-to-back games with four-plus takeaways for the first time since 2016 (Weeks 14-15). Weeks 14-15 of 2016 was also the last time Green Bay registered three-plus INTs in consecutive games. Green Bay finished **tied for No. 11 in the NFL** with 24 takeaways in 2022.
- ▶ Green Bay scored 28 points off of takeaways in Week 17 of 2022, its most in a game since Oct. 9, 2005, vs. New Orleans (31 points).
- ▶ The Packers finished **No. 7 in the NFL** with 79 takeaway points for the 2022 season (Stats Pass). It marked the fourth straight season Green Bay ranked in the top 10 in takeaway points (**No. 9** with 87 in 2019, **No. 5** with 93 in 2020 and **No. 4** with 102 in 2021).
- ▶ Under LaFleur (2019-22), the Packers are 29-3 (.906) when posting seven-plus points off of takeaways.
- ▶ The Packers' 12 takeaways during their four-game winning streak (Weeks 13, 15-17) were the most by Green Bay in a four-game span in a season since 2016 (13 in Weeks 14-17).
- ▶ In Weeks 7-18, the Packers had 20 takeaways, **No. 3 in the NFL** over that span (San Francisco, No. 2 with 23 / Dallas, No. 1 with 26).
- ▶ Green Bay's defense **led the league** in fourth-quarter interceptions in 2022:

- ▶ Green Bay's 11 fourth-quarter INTs in 2022 also **tied for the most** by the Packers in a season dating back to 2000 (2008). It was also the most fourth-quarter INTs by an NFL team since the 2018 Chicago Bears (11).
- ▶ Green Bay recorded an INT on each of the Dolphins' final three drives in Week 16, a feat not done by the Packers since Sept. 24, 2000, at Arizona.
- ▶ CBs **Jaire Alexander** (t-No. 5, five) and **Rasul Douglas** (t-No. 11, four) were the only CB combo in the league in 2022 to each have four-plus INTs. It was the first time since 2011 (four players) that the Packers had multiple players with four-plus INTs.
- ▶ Alexander and Douglas were both tied for the most fourth-quarter INTs in the NFL last season:

- ▶ Douglas had four-plus INTs in both of the last two seasons (2021-22), becoming the first Packer to accomplish the feat since CB Tramon Williams in 2010-11. Douglas is **one of six NFL defensive backs** with at least four interceptions in each of the past two seasons.
- ▶ In 2022, Douglas set career highs in tackles (76) and solo tackles (53), and tied his career high from the 2021 season with 13 passes defended.
- ▶ Alexander tied for No. 2 in the NFL last season with two INT returns of 20-plus yards (Stats Pass).
- ▶ LB **Preston Smith** recorded team highs in sacks (8.5) and QB hits (20) during the 2022 regular season. According to TruMedia, Smith **tied for No. 10 among linebackers** in QB hits.
- ▶ Smith posted his fifth season with eight-plus sacks, **tied for the seventh most in the NFL** since 2015.
- ▶ Smith entered the league in 2015 and has posted four-plus sacks in each of his first eight seasons. According to Stathead.com) Smith is **one of six players** to record four-plus sacks in every season from 2015-22 (Aaron Donald, Carlos Dunlap, Justin Houston, Cameron Jordan, Khalil Mack).
- ▶ LB **Quay Walker** led the Packers with 119 total tackles, the fifth most by a Green Bay rookie since 1975 (Johnnie Gray, 123 in 1975 / Nick Barnett, 134 in 2003 / A.J. Hawk, 155 in 2006 / Rich Wingo, 166 in 1979). Walker finished **No. 2 among NFL rookies** in tackles and posted five-plus tackles in 16 games, **tied for the most among rookies** in 2022.
- ▶ Walker **led the team**, was **No. 2 among rookies** and was **tied for No. 6 in the NFL** in 2022 with three forced fumbles.
- ▶ S **Darnell Savage** posted the first INT return for a TD in his career (75-yarder in the first quarter) in Week 17. It was the longest INT return TD by a Packer since CB Casey Hayward's 82-yarder vs. Chicago on Nov. 9, 2014.

- ▶ The Packers ranked **No. 3 in the NFL** in average starting field position after kickoffs (26.7) for the 2022 season.
- ▶ Green Bay **led the league** in a couple of kickoff-return stats in 2022:

- ▶ The Packers posted a kickoff return for a TD and an interception return for a TD in the same game (Week 17) for only the second time in franchise history (Oct. 30, 1967, at St. Louis; Herb Adderley INT TD and Travis Williams KR TD). Green Bay became the first NFL team to have both in a first quarter since Tampa Bay did so vs. Atlanta on Dec. 16, 2007.
- ▶ According to the Elias Sports Bureau, in Week 17 the Packers became the first team in NFL history to have a kickoff return TD of 105-plus yards and an INT return TD of 75-plus yards in the same game.
- ▶ CB **Keisean Nixon** finished the 2022 season leading the NFL in kickoff return yards and kickoff return average (min. 25 att.):

- ▶ Nixon became just the third player in team history to lead the NFL in kickoff return yards (Al Carmichael in 1956 and 1957, Dave Hampton in 1971).
- ▶ Nixon became the **fourth player since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger** to post 1,000-plus yards on 35 or fewer kickoff returns, joining Cordarelle Patterson (2015, 2020), Joe McKnight (2011) and Alvin Haymond (1970).
- ▶ Nixon finished **No. 1 in team history** in single-season kickoff return average (min. 30 returns):

- ▶ Nixon posted a career-long 105-yard kickoff return for a TD in Week 17, the first kickoff return TD by a Packer since WR **Randall Cobb's** 108-yarder on Sept. 8, 2011, vs. New Orleans. Nixon's 105-yard TD return was the third-longest kickoff return in team history behind Cobb's 108-yarder and Carmichael's 106-yard TD vs. Chicago on Oct. 7, 1956.
- ▶ According to Elias, Nixon was the only Packer to post a 90-plus-yard kickoff return in back-to-back games over the last 45 seasons and became only the third NFL player to accomplish that feat in back-to-back games in the same season over that time span (Tony Horne, 1999; Byron Hanspard, 1997).
- ▶ Nixon posted seven consecutive games with 90-plus kickoff return yards on five or fewer returns (Weeks 10-13, 15-17) the **second-longest streak in NFL history**:

- ▶ In 2022, Nixon posted a league-best six games with 100-plus yards on kickoff returns, tying Hampton (1971) for the most in a season by a Packer (since 1950). Nixon's six were the most by an NFL player since 2013 (Patterson, eight; Devin Hester, six).
- ▶ Nixon led the league with five kickoff returns of 50-plus yards on the season (no other player had more than two), the most by a Packer in a season since 2000 and the most by an NFL player since Jets WR Andre Roberts in 2018 (six). All five of Nixon's returns came in Weeks 12-18.
- ▶ According to Stathead, Nixon's streak of four consecutive games with 100-plus yards on kickoff returns (Weeks 10-13) **tied for the longest by a Packer** (WR Steve Odom, four straight, 1975) since 1941.
- ▶ Nixon posted a kickoff return of 30-plus yards in seven straight games (Weeks 11-13, 15-18), the longest streak by a Packer dating back to 2000 and the longest in the NFL since Andre Roberts (seven straight) in 2018.
- ▶ Nixon **tied for No. 4 in the NFL** with 21 kickoff returns of 20-plus yards during the 2022 season (Stats Pass).

THE COLD MONTHS

- ▶ Green Bay was 4-1 (.800) in December/January in 2022, making it one of eight NFL teams with one or fewer losses in those months in the regular season.
- ▶ The Packers are 18-2 during the regular season in December/January under Head Coach **Matt LaFlaur**, a .900 winning percentage that ranks **No. 1 in the NFL since 2019** (Kansas City is No. 2 at 19-3, .864).
- ▶ Since 2010, the Packers own the league's **best regular-season record** in December and January at 47-16 (.746).
- ▶ The Packers won 15 consecutive games in December (Week 13 of 2019 - Week 16 of 2022), the second-longest such streak in NFL history. The only team with a longer streak of December wins was the Chargers, who won 18 straight in the calendar's final month in 2006-2009 (Elias Sports Bureau).
- ▶ Green Bay is 10-1 (.909) at Lambeau Field under LaFlaur in December/January, **tied for No. 1 in the NFL** (Kansas City) in those months since 2019. In those 11 contests, Green Bay scored 29.3 points per game (**No. 2 in NFL**) and allowed 16.8 points per game (**No. 5 in NFL**).

2022 HONORS

PRO BOWL

- ▶ **CB Jaire Alexander** was named to the Pro Bowl Games for the 2022 season.
- ▶ Alexander earned his second Pro Bowl honor (2020) in his fifth NFL season, becoming the 13th defensive back in franchise history to be named to multiple Pro Bowls.
- ▶ According to Stathead.com, he is the sixth Packer defensive back to earn multiple Pro Bowl honors in the first five years of his career and the first since S Nick Collins (2008-09).
- ▶ G/T **Elgton Jenkins** was named to the Pro Bowl as a replacement for Philadelphia Eagles G London Dickerson, who was participating in the Super Bowl.
- ▶ Jenkins earned his second trip to the Pro Bowl (2020) in just his fourth season in the league.

ALL-PROS

- ▶ **CB Keisean Nixon** was selected first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press*, becoming the first Packer kick returner to earn a spot on the AP All-Pro team since it added the position in 1976.
- ▶ Nixon received 44 of 50 first-place votes for kickoff returner. His 136 total points bested Minnesota's Kene Nwangwu, who made the second team with 27 points.
- ▶ Alexander was named second-team All-Pro by the AP, marking his second selection to AP's second team (2020).
- ▶ Alexander (62 points) received 16 first-place votes, finishing third at corner behind Sauce Gardner (136, 43) and Patrick Surtain (79, 20).
- ▶ Alexander joined Charles Woodson (four) and Herb Adderley (seven) as the only Packers cornerbacks to be named to multiple AP All-Pro teams.

ALL-NFL, ALL-NFC AND ALL-ROOKIE

- ▶ Nixon was named to the All-NFL and All-NFC teams by the Pro Football Writers of America as a kick returner, becoming just the second kick returner in franchise history to be selected to the All-NFL teams by the PFWA (KR Roell Preston in 1998).
- ▶ Alexander was named to the PFWA's All-NFC team for the second time in his career (2020).
- ▶ **LB Quay Walker** was named to the PFWA's All-Rookie team, the first Packer rookie to be selected to the team since 2019. Dating back to 1974, Walker is the eighth Packers LB to make the team, joining John Anderson (1978), Brian Noble (1985), Wayne Simmons (1993), Na'il Diggs (2000), Nick Barnett (2003), A.J. Hawk (2006) and Clay Matthews (2009).

JONES NOMINATED FOR TWO AWARDS

- ▶ RB **Aaron Jones** was named as one of eight finalists for the **2022 Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award**. The award is presented each year to an NFL player who best demonstrates the qualities of on-field sportsmanship, including fair play, respect for the game and opponents, and integrity in competition.
- ▶ It marked Jones' first year as a finalist but second year as the Packers' nominee.
- ▶ A panel of former players from the NFL Legends Community (Warrick Dunn, Larry Fitzgerald, Curtis Martin and Leonard Wheeler) selected the eight finalists from the 32 NFL club nominees.
- ▶ For the second consecutive year, Jones was the team's nominee for the NFL's **Walter Payton Man of the Year Award**. Considered one of the league's most prestigious honors, the award recognizes an NFL player for outstanding community service activities off the field, as well as excellence on the field.
- ▶ All 32 team winners were highlighted as nominees and recognized for their important work during the weekend leading up to Super Bowl LVII. The 2022 Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year was announced during NFL Honors, a prime-time awards special that aired the Thursday before Super Bowl LVII, on NBC. All 32 nominees received up to a \$40,000 donation in their name to their charity of choice. The winner of the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year award received a \$250,000 donation to the charity of his choice.
- ▶ Jones has been a constant presence in the community dating back to his time in high school and college, and especially since coming to Green Bay in 2017. Having grown up with two parents in the U.S. Army and with other loved ones who have served, causes affiliated with the military are particularly important to Jones.

During his time in Green Bay, he's been a big part of the Packers' Salute to Service efforts, from sending videos to veterans to speaking to youth at military academies and taking part in events like the team's Huddle for Heroes aimed at honoring veterans. He's visited servicemembers in the hospital and visited military bases.

- ▶ Jones also has been involved with numerous programs and charities that benefit kids including events at the Boys & Girls Club, both in Green Bay and in Milwaukee, and he hosts football camps during the offseason in El Paso and Wisconsin. Jones also visits children in the hospital or those who are facing health issues, whether in person or over video chat, and has highlighted them and their courage through the My Cause My Cleats campaign.
- ▶ He has taken his community involvement to the next level in recent years by building upon the work of his foundation, the A&A All the Way Foundation, with his twin brother, Alvin. The A&A All the Way Foundation is dedicated to making an impact in the lives of children through charitable giving and action and executes events that inspire, educate and promote unity and diversity across multiple communities.

PLAYERS OF THE WEEK/MONTH

- ▶ Nixon was named NFC Special Teams Player of the Week for games played in Week 17.
- ▶ Nixon recorded a 105-yard kickoff return for a touchdown in the Packers' 41-17 win over Minnesota. It marked the longest kickoff-return TD in the NFL last season.
- ▶ It was Nixon's first career Special Teams Player of the Week award.
- ▶ It was the 17th time a Packers returner had been named Special Teams Player of the Week and the first since WR Trevor Davis in Week 14 of 2017.
- ▶ Nixon was the fourth former South Carolina cornerback to win a Player of the Week award and the first since Johnathan Joseph was named Defensive Player of the Week in Week 6 of the 2017 season.
- ▶ WR **Christian Watson** was named NFL Offensive Rookie of the Month for November.
- ▶ Watson registered 14 receptions for 289 yards (20.6 avg.) and six TDs in the month of November, the most touchdown receptions among all players that month.
- ▶ Watson was the third Green Bay rookie to win Offensive Rookie of the Month honors, joining running backs Samkon Gado (November 2005) and Eddie Lacy (October 2013).
- ▶ Watson became the second former North Dakota State player to win a Rookie of the Month award, joining QB Carson Wentz (September 2016).
- ▶ Watson was named Pepsi NFL Rookie of the Week for Week 10 after recording four receptions for 107 yards (26.8 avg.) and three touchdowns.
- ▶ Watson was the fourth Packers wide receiver to win the honor, joining Greg Jennings (Week 3, 2006), James Jones (Week 8, 2007) and **Romeo Doubs** (Week 3, 2022).
- ▶ P **Pat O'Donnell** was named NFC Special Teams Player of the Week for games played in Week 3. O'Donnell punted seven times with a 48.4-yard average (44.7 net) and placed a career-high five punts inside the 20-yard line in the Packers' win over Tampa Bay.
- ▶ This was O'Donnell's first career Special Teams Player of the Week award and he joined Craig Hentrich (Week 11, 1994) and Tim Masthay (Week 8, 2010; Week 13, 2011; Week 2, 2012) as the third Packers punter to earn the honor.
- ▶ WR **Romeo Doubs** was named Pepsi NFL Rookie of the Week for Week 3. Doubs posted eight receptions on eight targets for 73 yards (9.1 avg.) and his first career TD.
- ▶ Doubs was the first player out of the University of Nevada to be named Rookie of the Week.
- ▶ Jones was voted the FedEx Ground NFL Player of the Week for Week 2 via fan vote.
- ▶ It was the fifth time Jones won the award, tying RB Ahman Green for the most Ground awards by a Packer.
- ▶ Since 2017, when Jones entered the league, he is tied for fourth-most Ground wins with Alvin Kamara and Joe Mixon. Only Derrick Henry (15), Dalvin Cook (six) and Jonathan Taylor (six) have more in that timeframe.

PACKERS DIGITAL

Media and fans can visit www.packers.com and follow the Packers on social media for the most up-to-date information throughout training camp.

- ▶ On-demand video clips of all general manager, coach and player interviews will be available on the website.
- ▶ Video conferences will be live streamed on packers.com, the Packers' mobile app, CTV app (Apple TV, Roku, Amazon Fire TV), Facebook, Twitter and YouTube.
- ▶ Daily written stories covering practice and interviews with General Manager Brian Gutekunst, Head Coach Matt LaFleur, assistant coaches and players will be available on the website.
- ▶ 'Packers Unscripted' will return twice a week as a video and podcast, featuring hosts Wes Hodkiewicz and Mike Spofford.
- ▶ 'Three Things' videos, featuring various Packers Digital analysts, will recap a day's events.
- ▶ 'Packers Daily' video packages will be posted on the site and socially.
- ▶ 'Rock Report' videos featuring Larry McCarren and 'Remix' videos with highlights from practice will also be available.
- ▶ Fun 'off-the field' videos will be shared to give fans a closer look at this year's team.

CONSECUTIVE-SELLOUT STREAK

Due to health-and-safety concerns, the Packers made the decision to first not have fans at home games and then to sell a limited number tickets to a few home games in 2020 due to the pandemic, which put a pause to the franchise's sellout streak. The Packers were happy to welcome back full crowds for the 2021 season and after Week 18 against the Detroit Lions in 2022, the sellout streak moved to 365 regular-season games at Lambeau Field (not including replacement games).

- ▶ The league's longest-tenured stadium, Lambeau Field is hosting its 66th season of football in 2022. For the victory over Seattle in the Divisional round of the 2019 playoffs, 78,998 Packers fans filled Lambeau Field for the second-highest paid attendance in stadium history (79,704 in the Divisional round of the 2014 playoffs versus Dallas).
- ▶ Across American professional sports, only Boston's Fenway Park (1912) and Chicago's Wrigley Field (1914) have longer tenures.

TRAINING-CAMP MEDIA INFORMATION & POLICIES

TRAINING-CAMP PRACTICE ACCESS

- ▶ All public practices are open in their entirety to credentialed media. Photography (video and still) will be limited to certain periods and areas during training camp.

VIDEO/PHOTO POLICY

- ▶ The team reserves the right to limit photography to certain periods for competitive reasons.
- ▶ During practice periods in which B-roll and still photography are NOT permitted, the media may not utilize camera phones either. The communications staff will alert the media of the permissible "shooting" periods before and during each practice.
- ▶ Video of practice and interviews by an individual or media outlet can be posted on social-media sites in compliance with the NFL online-content policy.
- ▶ No live-streaming or live broadcast of practice, interviews or press conferences is permitted by an individual or media outlet at any time on any platform.
- ▶ Tripods are not allowed to be used while filming from the sideline.

INJURY-FOOTAGE POLICY

- ▶ Again this season, the Packers respectfully ask all photographers (video and still) to follow guidelines related to shooting injured players.
- ▶ No shooting/filming injured players that are rehabbing on and around the practice fields.
- ▶ Photographers are asked to avoid filming, photographing, printing and/or airing any shots of any injury situation, while the injury occurs, while trainers attend to/treat the injured player, and while the player is leaving the field, either on his own or with aid. This includes minor injuries.
- ▶ The team will allow shots of players after they've been treated. For instance, cameras are allowed to shoot a player on the sideline with ice on his knee, after trainers have left.
- ▶ However, cameras are not allowed to film a player on crutches, either on the field or in the locker room.
- ▶ If outlets choose not to respect this policy — or any other policy — the team will have no choice but to consider limiting access to the field.

BLOGGING/TWITTER POLICY

- ▶ During training camp, "Twitter/blogging" is allowed during practices, but the Packers would ask that members of the media utilizing the technology adhere to a few simple guidelines. Please note that this policy is for training-camp practices only and does change during the regular season.
- ▶ NO entries about specific schemes, personnel groupings or anything that might be related in any way to game planning. If you have ANY questions about this, please ask a member of the Packers' communications staff before posting.
- ▶ NO entries regarding "football communications," including specific exchanges between coaches and players that might be overheard. Acknowledgement that the conversation occurred is acceptable, but we ask that the details of the conversation be withheld.
- ▶ NO detailed speculation as to the potential nature or severity of an injury until Head Coach Matt LaFleur has addressed it. Once again, acknowledging that an injury occurred and providing general details (i.e., "Right leg..." or "Left wrist...") is permitted, but anything beyond that would be purely speculative and possibly inaccurate.
- ▶ The team would like to continue to keep training-camp practices open to those wishing to utilize blogs

and/or Twitter, but such a policy is contingent upon media adhering to the guidelines above. If there are ANY questions regarding what is or is not acceptable, please contact a member of the Packers' communications department.

PRIVATE TEAM COMMUNICATION

- ▶ The Packers ask all media, print and electronic, to refrain from reporting or recording any team communication meant solely for the team.
- ▶ This includes the post-practice team huddle, in which LaFleur addresses his players. It also includes mid-practice and/or post-practice communication between any coach and his players, especially conversations of a reprimanding, negative nature.
- ▶ In general, reporting that the conversation took place is acceptable, just not the details of those conversations. Details are not to be relayed to the public either directly (through firsthand hearing), or indirectly (through interviews, even if the subject answers the question).
- ▶ If media has any question as to whether communication should be kept private, please contact the communications department before writing or airing such conversations.

INJURY INFORMATION

- ▶ All injury information will be issued by Head Coach Matt LaFleur. Please do not address injury questions to another coach or staff member.

NFL ONLINE-CONTENT POLICY

- ▶ Accredited Organizations may supplement its traditional media distribution platform (e.g., newspaper, television, radio) with other new media distribution platforms that it controls (e.g., websites, official social media accounts, applications, podcasts), provided that, with respect to such new media distribution platforms: (i) any use of film or video or digital still images is limited to a reasonable amount or number (as applicable), and used only to illustrate or support news and editorial coverage of the Game or Event (as opposed to use in connection with or on commercial products (e.g., apparel, posters, commemorative programs, or other types of souvenir or other merchandise, or sponsored content) purposes; (ii) any use of film or video or digital still images is not used to create Simulated Video of game action; (iii) no video of game action is used (except that, if the Accredited Organization is a television broadcaster, Game or Event highlights may be shown as part of a single, non-archived, online "simulcast" of any regularly scheduled television news programming the Accredited Organization may broadcast, provided it adheres to the limits on such broadcasts set forth below); and (iv) use of non-game audio and video content obtained as a result of credentialed card access (e.g., press conferences, training camp, practice and/or interviews at NFL venues or events): (1) must be limited to 90 seconds maximum per day (180 seconds maximum -- 90 seconds per Member Club -- in two-Member Club markets), (2) may not be posted or streamed "live" or in real time in any form or medium and may not be archived (i.e., made available for on-demand public access for more than 24 hours after posting, etc.), (3) may appear only in an editorial context (i.e., no sponsorship, merchandising or advertising integrated with or around the content, including digital advertising, etc.), and (4) must be accompanied by links back to NFL.com and to the applicable Member Club's web site.
