### GREEN BAY ENTERS DRAFT WITH 10 SELECTIONS

Later this week, the Green Bay Packers will welcome another rookie class to their roster through the NFL Draft, held April 25-27 in Nashville, Tenn.

▶ Armed with 10 selections, the Packers will have plenty of opportunities to add more talent and depth to their roster. All picks are eligible to be traded.

▶ Green Bay enters the draft with a pick in every round, including two selections in the first, fourth and sixth rounds.



▶ The Packers have six picks in the first four rounds of the draft. If Green Bay makes selections at all six spots, it will be the 13th time the Packers have selected six or more players in the first four rounds of a single draft and the most since 2008, when Green Bay made six selections.

▶ The event will begin in prime time on Thursday night, with Round 1 on April 25 beginning at 7 p.m. CT.

▶ Rounds 2-3 also will be held in prime time, beginning on Friday, April 26, at 6 p.m. CT. Rounds 4-7 will complete the draft on Saturday, April 27, starting at 11 a.m. CT.

▶ Teams will have 10 minutes in between selections in the first round and seven minutes between each choice for Round 2. Rounds 3-6, including compensatory picks, will allow up to five minutes in between picks and Round 7, including compensatory picks, will allow four minutes. ### GUTEKUNST LEADS PACKERS IN SECOND DRAFT AS GM

GM **Brian Gutekunst** enters his 21st draft with the Packers and his second as the general manager.

▶ In his first draft as general manager, Gutekunst made a couple of trades involving first-round picks that resulted in the Packers selecting CB **Jaire Alexander** at No. 18 and gaining Green Bay the No. 30 pick in the 2019 draft. Alexander led the team with 15 passes defended and was named to the 2018 NFL All-Rookie team by the PFWA.

▶ Overall, Green Bay selected 11 players last year. For the first time since 2006 (five), the Packers had four or more rookies start six-plus games in 2018 (Alexander, 11; fifth-round selection WR **Marquez Valdes-Scantling**, 10; second-round pick CB **Josh Jackson**, 10 and sixth-round selection WR **Equanimeous St. Brown**, seven). The Packers had rookies play in a league-high 171 games in 2018.

▶ Gutekunst spent his first 13 seasons with Green Bay as a college scout, serving as an East Coast regional scout for two years (1999-2000) before switching to the Southeast region (2001-11).

▶ During his first 13 drafts with the Packers, Gutekunst was part of a personnel department that drafted several Pro Bowlers, including WR **Donald Driver** (seventh round, 1999), who is the team's all-time

leading receiver, T **Chad Clifton** (second round, 2000), DE **Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila** (fifth round, 2000), who is second in franchise history (since 1982) in sacks, WR **Javon Walker** (first round, 2002), DE **Aaron Kampman** (fifth round, 2002), C **Scott Wells** (seventh round, 2004), QB **Aaron Rodgers** (first round, 2005), S **Nick Collins** (second round, 2005), LB **A.J. Hawk** (first round, 2006), who is the leading tackler in franchise history, WR **Greg Jennings** (second round, 2006), WR **Jordy Nelson** (second round, 2008), G **Josh Sitton** (fourth round, 2008), DT **B.J. Raji** (first round, 2009), LB **Clay Matthews** (first round, 2009), who is the franchise leader in sacks, and WR **Randall Cobb** (second round, 2011), who was also selected to the All-Rookie Team by *Pro Football Weekly*/PFWA.

▶ Gutekunst was promoted to director of college scouting in 2012, a position he served in through 2015. Over that time period, Green Bay selected Pro Bowlers DT **Mike Daniels** (fourth round, 2012) who ranks No. 2 among Packers defensive tackles in sacks (since 1982), T **David Bakhtiari** (fourth round, 2013), who became the first Green Bay rookie to start every game at LT since the league went to a 16-game slate in 1978 and was selected All-Pro second-team by *The Associated Press* in 2016 and 2017 and first-team in 2018, RB **Eddie Lacy** (second round, 2012), who was named the NFL's Offensive Rookie of the Year by *AP*, S **Ha Ha Clinton-Dix** (first round, 2014), who was named to PFWA's All-Rookie team and a Pro Bowl (2016), and WR **Davante Adams** (second round, 2014), who has been selected to two Pro Bowls (2017-18). During that time, the Packers also drafted CB **Casey Hayward** (second round, 2012), who led all NFL rookies with six INTs in 2012 and became the first Packers CB to be named to the All-Rookie Team by *Pro Football Weekly*/PFWA since the team was first selected in 1974.

▶ In 2016-17, Gutekunst served as director of player personnel and those two drafts were highlighted by the addition of DT **Kenny Clark** (first round, 2016), who despite missing three games due to injury was No. 2 on the team with a career best six sacks and No. 3 with 73 tackles (46 solo) in 2018 while being named a Pro Bowl alternate, LB **Kyler Fackrell** (third round, 2016), who led the team with a career-best 10.5 sacks last season, LB **Blake Martinez** (fourth round, 2016), who has led the team in tackles each of the past two seasons, and RBs **Jamaal Williams** (fourth round, 2017) and **Aaron Jones** (fifth round, 2017), who became the first Packers rookie duo to both register 400-plus rushing yards in a season (2017). In 2018, Jones became the first Packer to lead the NFL in average yards per carry (5.47), min. 100 rush attempts.

### A LOOK INTO THE DRAFT ROOM

General Manager **Brian Gutekunst** heads up a talented and experienced player personnel staff.

- Members of the personnel staff have spent months, if not years with some prospects, studying for the 2019 NFL Draft. They visit schools throughout the season, attending practices, dozens of games and pro days in the spring. In each area, they have formed relationships with high school and college coaches, trying to get a better idea of who the person is, not just the football prospect.
- Working closely with Gutekunst year-round is Director - Football Operations Milt Hendrikson (15th NFL season), Co-Director of Player Personnel **Jon-Eric Sullivan** (16th NFL season), Co-Director of Player Personnel **John Wojciechowski** (24th NFL season), Director of College Scouting **Matt Malaspina** (22nd NFL season), National Scout **Sam Seale** (24th NFL season), Assistant Director of Pro Scouting/Salary Camp Analyst **Chad Brinker** (10th NFL season), Personnel Executive **Lee Gissendaner** (19th NFL season) and Senior Advisor to Football Operations **Ted Thompson** (28th NFL season).

- ▶ The last time the Packers drafted two players in the first round was in 2009: DT B.J. Raji at No. 9 and LB Clay Matthews at No. 26. Dating back to 1970, the Packers have selected two players in the first round eight times (1993, 1990, 1980, 1978, 1977, 1972, 1970).
- ▶ While first-round choices certainly can be key players for a franchise, as the Packers have shown with Pro Bowl selections QB **Aaron Rodgers** (2005), LB **A.J. Hawk** (2006), LB **Clay Matthews** (2009), DT **B.J. Raji** (2009) and S **Ha Ha Clinton-Dix** (2014), and starters T **Bryan**

- Bulaga** (2010) and DT **Kenny Clark** (2016), second-round selections can prove to be just as valuable. WRs **Jordy Nelson** (2008) and **Randall Cobb** (2011) were both picked in the second and became the first duo in NFL history to both have 90-plus receptions, 1,200-plus yards and 12-plus touchdown receptions in the same regular season (2014). Other second-round picks included WR **Davante Adams**, who was selected to the Pro Bowl in 2017-18, CB **Casey Hayward** (2012), who became the first CB in franchise history (since 1974) to be named to the All-Rookie Team by *Pro Football Weekly*/PFWA, and RB **Eddie Lacy** (2013), who was named the NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year by *The Associated Press* and earned a Pro Bowl selection in 2014.
- ▶ With 22 starters and a 53-man roster, selections in the third round often turn into significant contributors for a team. Examples are WR **James Jones** (2007), TE **Jermichael Finley** (2008), S **Morgan Burnett** (2010) and LB **Kyler Fackrell** (2016).
- ▶ The fourth and fifth rounds have also been a spot the Packers have found starters. The top two rushers for Green Bay last season were **Aaron Jones** (2017/fifth round) and **Jamaal Williams** (2017/fourth round). LB **Blake Martinez** (2016/fourth round) has led the team in tackles each of the last two seasons. Of the Packers' main starters on the recent offensive lines, five were drafted in the fourth or fifth round: G **Josh Sitton** (2008/fourth round), G **T.J. Lang** (2009/fourth round), two-time All-Pro T **David Bakhtiari** (2013/fourth round), C/G **JC Tretter** (2013/fourth round) and C **Corey Linsley** (2014/fifth round). A mainstay on the Packers' defensive line over the last few seasons, Pro Bowl DT **Mike Daniels** (2012) was also drafted in the fifth round. Green Bay has also found key contributors on both sides of the ball in the fourth and fifth rounds: DB **Micah Hyde** (2013/fifth), LB **Jake Ryan** (2015/fourth) and DE **Dean Lowry** (2016/fourth).
- ▶ Green Bay has received contributions from several late-round picks over the years, including DT **Johnny Jolly** (2006/sixth round), LB **Desmond Bishop** (2007/sixth round), K **Mason Crosby** (2007/sixth), QB **Matt Flynn** (2008/seventh), LB **Brad Jones** (2009/seventh), RB **James Starks** (2010/sixth), DE **C.J. Wilson** (2010/seventh) and LB **Sam Barrington** (2013/seventh).

## 2019 SCHEDULE RELEASED

The Green Bay Packers' 2019 NFL regular-season schedule – highlighted by five prime-time contests (subject to flexible scheduling) on the original schedule for the sixth straight year (2014-19) – was released April 17 by the National Football League.

- ▶ For the second consecutive season, the Packers open the season at home and will play three of their first four games at Lambeau Field.
- ▶ The Packers will open the season at the Chicago Bears in the NFL's Thursday night regular-season opener. It marks the fourth time in team history that Green Bay has opened at Chicago (1979, 1981, 2015).
- ▶ The Packers will open their home slate in Week 2 against the Minnesota Vikings, marking just the fourth time (2003, 2008, 2018) since the NFC North was formed in 2002 that Green Bay has played division opponents in both of the first two games.
- ▶ Green Bay stays at home both of the next two weeks, the first time the Packers have played three straight at home in September since 1990 (Weeks 1-3). They host the Denver Broncos in Week 3 and the Philadelphia Eagles in a Thursday night matchup in Week 4.
- ▶ The Packers travel to take on the Dallas Cowboys in Week 5. It is the seventh matchup between the two teams in the regular and postseason since 2013, with Green Bay holding a 5-1 record in those contests.
- ▶ For the second time in three seasons, the Packers will host the Detroit Lions on *Monday Night Football*, this time in Week 6. It is the fifth Monday night matchup between the two clubs (1964, 1971, 1972, 2017).
- ▶ A home game against the Oakland Raiders in Week 7 will be the Packers' fifth at Lambeau in 2019, marking the most home contests for Green Bay in the first seven games of a season since 1978 when it also played five at home (not including the 1987 strike year).
- ▶ In Week 8, Green Bay is at Kansas City in a Sunday night matchup.
- ▶ The following week, Green Bay travels to Los Angeles to take on the Chargers. While it's the first time the Packers will play the Chargers since they moved to Los Angeles, it is the seventh away game against the Chargers, and Green Bay has won the previous six.
- ▶ In Week 10, the Packers host the Carolina Panthers in the fourth contest between the two teams in the last six years (2014, 2015, 2017).
- ▶ Green Bay will have its bye the following week, marking the first Week 11 bye for the Packers and the latest for the team since the bye was reintroduced in 1990.
- ▶ Over the next two weeks, Green Bay will crisscross the country, playing at the San Francisco 49ers in Week 12 and at the New York Giants in Week 13.
- ▶ In Week 14 they take on the Washington Redskins in the third matchup between the two in the last five years (including the postseason), but the first in Green Bay since 2013.
- ▶ Week 15 has the Bears coming to Green Bay. The Packers are 10-2 all-time at home against the Bears in December/January games.
- ▶ The Packers close out the regular season with two road games for the first time since 2004 when they played at Minnesota and Chicago.
- ▶ In Week 16, Green Bay is at the Vikings and on *MON* for the second time on the season. The Packers last played two Monday games in the same regular season in 2009.
- ▶ Green Bay will close out the regular season against the Lions for the fourth straight year and the fifth time in the last six seasons.
