PACKERS HOST VIKINGS IN HOME OPENER

The Green Bay Packers take on the Minnesota Vikings at Lambeau Field on Sunday at 12 p.m. CDT, marking the second straight year, and the third time in the last four years (2016), that the Packers play the Vikings in Week 2.

- ▶ It marks the second year in a row but just the fourth time (2003, 2008, 2018) since the NFC North was formed in 2002 that Green Bay has played division opponents in both of the first two games.
- ▶ The Packers have scored 23-plus points in 11 of the last 13 home games vs. Minnesota.
- ▶ Green Bay has won four of the last six home September contests against the Vikings. Last year's September matchup ended in a 29-29 tie.
- ▶ Of the past 33 regular-season meetings between the teams, 22 of those games have been decided by seven points or less, including both contests last season.
- ▶ Through 117 meetings, which includes two postseason contests (1-1), the Packers hold a 60-54-3 edge over the Vikings in the all-time series.
- ▶ Including playoffs, Green Bay has a 7-3-2 mark (.667) against the Vikings at Lambeau Field since 2008.
- ▶ Green Bay is 4-1-1 in the last six home September contests against the Vikings.
- ▶ The Packers look to win their first two home games of the season for the sixth time in the last seven years.
- ▶ Green Bay begins a three-game stretch of home games, marking the first time the Packers have played three straight at home in September since 1990 (Weeks 1-3). It will be three home games in 12 days for the Packers, only the second time in team history (2016) that the team has had three home contests over a 12-day period.
- ▶ Five of the next six games for Green Bay will be played at home.
- ▶ This is the third straight year that the Packers have three home games in the month of September.



RODGERS AND THE VIKINGS

- ▶ Including the postseason, Green Bay is 12-8-1 against Minnesota with **Aaron Rodgers** as the starting quarterback.
- ▶ In 21 games as the starter against the Vikings (including playoffs), Rodgers has completed 449 of 660 passes (68.0 percent) for 5,307 yards, 42 TDs and six INTs with a passer rating of 109.7. His passer rating is the second highest of any opposing quarterback (min. 100 att.) vs. Minnesota (Kurt Warner, 112.4), according to pro-football-reference.com.
- ▶ Rodgers has recorded a 100-plus passer rating in 12 of his 21 starts against the Vikings (including the postseason) and a rating of 94-plus in 15 contests.
- ▶ Rodgers has recorded seven games with a passer rating of 130-plus against Minnesota, the most by a quarterback in NFL history against one opponent (according to the Elias Sports Bureau).
- ▶ In the last 15 games versus Minnesota (including playoffs), Rodgers has thrown 20 touchdowns and three interceptions.
- ▶ Rodgers is the only player to have four games with four-plus touchdown passes with zero interceptions against the Vikings. No other quarterback has more than two.

WITH THE CALL

FOX Sports, now in its 26th season as an NFL network television partner, will broadcast the game.



- ▶ Play-by-play man **Chris Myers** joins analyst **Daryl Johnston** and sideline reporter **Laura Okmin**.
- ▶ Milwaukee's WTMJ (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since November 1929, heads up the Packers Radio Network that is made up of 50 stations in four states. **Wayne Larrivee** (play-by-play), two-time Packers Pro Bowler **Larry McCarren** (analyst) and three-time Packers Pro Bowler and two-time All-Pro **John Kuhn** (sideline) will call the action. McCarren first joined the team's broadcasts in 1995 and enters his 25th season calling Packers games. After originally being paired together in 1999, McCarren and Larrivee enter their 21st season of broadcasts together. They surpassed Jim Irwin and Max McGee for the most regular-season and postseason games broadcast for the Packers with 313 at the 2018 season opener against Chicago.
- ▶ The broadcast is also available on Sirius Satellite Radio (WTMJ feed).
- ▶ ESPN Radio will air the game on radio across the country with **Marc Kestecher** (play-by-play) and **Jack Del Rio** (analyst) calling the action.
- ▶ The telecast is also available on DirecTV channel 712.

HOME SWEET HOME

Green Bay has a long tradition of playing well at Lambeau Field, and it continued during the 2018 season with a 5-2-1 record.

- ▶ Green Bay has 226 victories at Lambeau Field, the most home wins by any franchise at one stadium in NFL history.
- ▶ With the win over the Chicago Bears in Week 1 of 2018, Green Bay has won six straight home openers (2013-18).
- ▶ Since 2007, Green Bay is 71-23-2 at home during the regular season. The Packers' .750 winning percentage ranks in the top five in the NFL over that span:

- ▶ In 2018, the Packers had a point differential of plus-25 at home, marking the 11th time in the last 12 seasons that the Packers finished with a point differential of plus-20 or better at Lambeau Field.

- ▶ The Packers are 35-12-1 (.740, **No. 5 in the NFL**) at home in the second half of the season since 2007 with a plus-320 point differential that ranks **No. 5 in the NFL** over that span (pro-football-reference.com).
- ▶ Green Bay's defense had 26.0 sacks at home during the 2018 season, **tied for No. 4 in the NFL**:

- ▶ The Packers' 26.0 sacks at home in 2018 were the most by the team in a single season since recording 31.0 sacks at home in 2002.
- ▶ QB **Aaron Rodgers** has started 78 home games during the regular season for Green Bay, with the Packers holding a 61-16-1 record in those contests. He has completed 1,750 of 2,641 passes (66.3 pct.) for 21,104 yards (270.6 per game), 181 touchdowns, 33 interceptions and a passer rating of 108.2.
- ▶ Rodgers ranks **No. 1 in the NFL** since 1970 in passer rating at home (min. 500 pass att.), according to Sportradar:

- ▶ Rodgers has led Green Bay to an 11-2-1 record in his last 14 starts at home, recording a passer rating of 100-plus in nine of those games.
- ▶ From 2016-18, WR **Davante Adams** ranked in the top five of the NFL in TD receptions at home:

- In 2015, QB **Aaron Rodgers** recorded a passer rating of 135.4 in the month of September. Dating back to 1970, it ranks **No. 5 among NFL quarterbacks** in the month of September (min. 40 pass attempts).
- Rodgers recorded a passer rating of 100-plus in the month of September five times from 2011-18.

- Rodgers has registered 19 September games with a passer rating of 100-plus since 2008, ranking **No. 4 in the NFL** over that span (min. 15 pass attempts/game).
- Since 2008, Rodgers is one of four active quarterbacks in the NFL with a passer rating of 100-plus in the month of September (min. 300 att.):

KICKOFF WEEKEND

- With the victory over Chicago in Week 1, Green Bay has won 10 of its past 13 Kickoff Weekend games dating back to 2007.
- The Packers have won five consecutive Kickoff Weekend games (including three over the Bears) for the longest active streak in the NFC.
- Green Bay's 57 Kickoff Weekend wins are the most in the NFL and Chicago's 54 wins rank second.
- The Packers' .591 winning percentage (57-39-3) on Kickoff Weekend ranks No. 3 in the NFL.
- Dating back to 2002, the NFL has kicked off the season with a Thursday night game. This season was the third time the Packers played in the game and the victory at Chicago improved their record to 2-1.
- Head Coach **Matt LaFleur** became only the second coach to make his head-coaching debut in the NFL's primetime kickoff game (since 2002), joining Jim Zorn who made his debut with Washington in a losing effort against the New York Giants (16-7) in 2008.
- Of the six new NFL head coaches making their debut last weekend, LaFleur was the only one to win.

STAT OF THE WEEK

- ▶ With a win at Chicago in Week 1, **Matt LaFleur** became the sixth head coach in franchise history to win his first game, joining Curly Lambeau, Vince Lombardi, Phil Bengston, Forrest Gregg and Ray Rhodes. He joins Lombardi as the only Packers head coaches to beat the Bears in their first game.

NEW LEADER

The Green Bay Packers named **Matt LaFleur** (la-flew-er) the 15th head coach in franchise history on Jan. 8, 2019.

- ▶ He is in his 11th season in the NFL in 2019, having served as an offensive coordinator for two seasons (Los Angeles Rams, 2017; Tennessee Titans, 2018), a quarterbacks coach for six seasons (Washington Redskins, 2010-13; Atlanta Falcons, 2015-16) and an offensive assistant for two seasons (Houston Texans, 2008-09).
- ▶ During his first 10 seasons in the NFL, LaFleur was a part of offensive staffs that helped their teams rank in the top 10 in the league in total yards seven times (2008-09, 2012-13, 2015-17). In three of his last six seasons in the NFL, he was on a staff that helped its offense finish in the top five in the league in scoring, highlighted by No. 1 rankings in 2016 with the Falcons and in 2017 with the Rams.
- ▶ The former quarterback began his coaching career in 2003 at his alma mater, Saginaw Valley State. LaFleur has six seasons of coaching experience at the collegiate level, having also worked at Central Michigan (2004-05), Northern Michigan (2006), Ashland University (2007) and Notre Dame (2014).

THE NEW STAFF

LaFleur explored various avenues to compile his coaching staff, bringing in new coaches and retaining some from the 2018 staff.

- ▶ Offensive coordinator **Nathaniel Hackett** brings 10 years of NFL experience to Green Bay, including five as an offensive coordinator (Buffalo, 2013-14; Jacksonville, 2016-18). In 2017, he guided the Jaguars to a No. 1 league ranking in rushing (141.4 ypg) for the first time in team history on their way to an appearance in the AFC Championship Game.
- ▶ Defensive coordinator **Mike Pettine** was retained after a 2018 season that featured 16 different players with at least a half-sack, the second most in team history (since 1982) behind only the 1987 campaign (strike season) that saw 17 players register a half-sack or more. The defense finished 2018 tied for No. 8 in the league in sacks (44), the most by Green Bay since 2013, and No. 12 in the NFL in pass defense (234.5 ypg) after finishing No. 23 in the category in 2017.
- ▶ Special teams coordinator **Shawn Mennenga** (MEN-in-guh) begins his eighth season in the NFL and returns to the league after leading the special teams at Vanderbilt last season. From 2011-17, he served as the special teams assistant for the Cleveland Browns, assisting Chris Tabor as the team ranked No. 7 in the league over that span in both punt return average (9.9) and opponent kickoff return average (21.8).
- ▶ **Chris Gizzi**, who served as a strength and conditioning assistant from 2014-18, was promoted to strength and conditioning coordinator. As a player, he appeared in 23 games for the Packers as a linebacker in 2000-01, ranking No. 5 on the team with eight tackles on special teams in 2000. Gizzi will lead a staff that consists of **Mark Lovat**, **Thadeus Jackson** and **Grant Thorne**.
- ▶ Quarterbacks coach **Luke Getsy** returns to the Packers after spending last season as the offensive coordinator/wide receivers coach for Mississippi State. Over his last two seasons in Green Bay (2016-17), Getsy worked as the wide receivers coach after originally joining the Packers in 2014 as the offensive quality control coach.
- ▶ Defensive line coach **Jerry Montgomery** is entering his fifth season with the Packers and second as defensive line coach. He worked as the defensive front assistant for Green Bay from 2015-17. Montgomery has helped with the development of DL Kenny Clark, who recorded 10.5 sacks over the past two seasons, the most among Packers defensive linemen and second most on the team over that span.

- ▶ Inside linebackers coach **Kirk Olivadotti** (ah-luh-vuh-DOT-ee) joins the Packers after coaching for the Washington Redskins for 16 seasons. He is one of 11 members of the Redskins' assistant coach honor roll, which recognizes coaches with at least 10 seasons of service as an assistant in Washington. During his time with the Redskins, Washington ranked in the top 10 in the NFL in overall defense eight times.
- ▶ Tight ends coach **Justin Outten** (OW-ten) was the offensive assistant for the Atlanta Falcons the past two seasons (2017-18). He began with the Falcons as an offensive intern in 2016. Over the last three seasons, Atlanta averaged 27.2 points per game (No. 4 in the NFL over that span) and 389.9 yards per game (No. 3 in the league over that span).
- ▶ Defensive backs coach **Jason Simmons** is entering his ninth season with the Packers having worked in various roles (secondary in 2018, assistant special teams coach from 2015-17, defensive/special teams assistant in 2014 and a coaching administrator from 2011-13). Before coaching, he played for 10 years in the NFL as a defensive back and was a standout on special teams during his career.
- ▶ Running backs coach **Ben Sirmans** is entering his fourth season in that position for the Packers. From 2016-18, Green Bay led the NFL with an average of 4.66 yards per carry, including an average of 5.01 yards per carry in 2018 (No. 2 in the NFL) that was the second-best single-season mark in team history. He joined the Packers after spending the previous four seasons (2012-15) as the running backs coach for the St. Louis Rams.
- ▶ Outside linebackers coach **Mike Smith** joins the Packers after spending the last three seasons with the Kansas City Chiefs, first as the assistant defensive line coach in 2016-17 and then coaching outside linebackers last season. In 2018, Smith coached Dee Ford, who was selected to his first Pro Bowl after tying for the NFL lead with seven forced fumbles and tying for No. 2 among NFL linebackers with a career-high 13 sacks.
- ▶ Offensive line coach **Adam Stenavich** (STEN-uh-vitch) comes to the Packers after serving as the assistant offensive line coach for the San Francisco 49ers the last two seasons. He helped coach a line that cleared the way for RB Matt Breida to average 4.96 yards per carry in 2016-17, ranking No. 5 in the NFL over that span (min. 200 att.). The Marshfield, Wis., native played left tackle at Michigan (2002-05) and was named first-team All-Big Ten in 2004-05. Following his collegiate career, Stenavich spent time with a few NFL teams, including a stint on the Packers' practice squad in 2006.
- ▶ Wide receivers coach **Alvis Whitted** (WHITT-id), who played wide receiver for nine seasons in the NFL, worked for the last seven years as the wide receivers coach at Colorado State. During his tenure at CSU, Whitted mentored three All-America wide receivers, including two consensus first-team All-Americans who also were finalists for the Biletnikoff Award (Michael Gallup in 2017 and Rashard Higgins in 2014).
- ▶ Assistant offensive line coach **Luke Butkus** comes to Green Bay after serving as the offensive line coach for the University of Illinois for the past three seasons (2016-18), a position he also held for the Fighting Illini in 2012. Between the two stints at his alma mater, he was the assistant offensive line coach for the Jacksonville Jaguars (2013-15).
- ▶ Assistant defensive backs coach **Ryan Downard** begins his second season in Green Bay after serving as the defensive quality control coach last year. He came to Green Bay after working at Bowling Green for two seasons, serving as the safeties coach in 2017 and the director of football operations in 2016.
- ▶ Assistant special teams coach **Maurice Drayton** was retained and is entering his fourth season coaching in the NFL. He worked as the assistant special teams coach for each of the past three seasons (Green Bay in 2018 and the Indianapolis Colts in 2016-17).
- ▶ Offensive assistant **Jason Vrable** enters his seventh season as an assistant coach in the NFL, previously working for the New York Jets (2017-18) and Buffalo Bills (2013-16).
- ▶ The staff also consists of four quality control coaches: **Wendel Davis** (defense), **Kevin Koger** (offense), **Christian Parker** (defense) and **Rayna Stewart** (special teams).

OFFSEASON ADDITIONS

Packers General Manager **Brian Gutekunst** and his staff made numerous moves to strengthen the roster this offseason:

► **S Adrian Amos** (A-miss), who joined the Packers after four seasons with the Chicago Bears. He appeared in 60 games with 56 starts, recording 305 tackles (244 solo), three forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, three interceptions (one he returned for a touchdown), 13 tackles for a loss and seven special teams tackles. Amos has started at least 10 games each season, including 14 or more three times. Amos was named to the Pro Football Writers Association All-Rookie team in 2015 after becoming the first Bears rookie to lead the team in tackles (based on coaches review) since LB Brian Urlacher in 2000.

► In Week 1, Amos picked off QB Mitchell Trubisky in the end zone on the Bears' second-to-last drive of the game to protect a 10-3 lead. He became the first player to record an interception in their first game with the Packers since Bryant Westbrook on October 13, 2002, according to the Elias Sports Bureau.

► Dating back to Week 9 of the 2018 season (including postseason) Amos is **tied for No. 1 in the NFL** with four interceptions.

► LB **Preston Smith** came to Green Bay after playing for the Washington Redskins for the past four years. He never missed a game in the NFL in his first four seasons, appearing in 64 regular-season contests with 50 starts. Smith recorded 163 tackles (103 solo), 24.5 sacks, four forced fumbles, four interceptions, 13 passes defensed and three fumble recoveries, including one returned for a TD for Washington. According to Sportradar, he ranked No. 5 among linebackers with 59 QB hits from 2015-18. Smith has played in one postseason contest, the 2015 Wild Card game vs. Green Bay in which he tallied three tackles (two solo) and a sack that resulted in a safety.

► Smith registered 1.5 sacks in Week 1, including taking down Trubisky on fourth down to seal the victory. It was the third time in his career that Smith recorded at least one sack in Week 1.

► LB **Za'Darius** (zuh-DARE-ee-us) **Smith** played in 58 regular-season games with 16 starts in four seasons for the Baltimore Ravens, recording 119 tackles (71 solo), 18.5 sacks, five passes defensed and three forced fumbles. In 2018, he set career highs in tackles (45), solo tackles (26) and sacks (team-high 8.5). According to Sportradar, Smith ranked No. 2 among NFL linebackers in 2018 in QB hits (25) and **tied for No. 6 in total pressures** (sacks + hurries + knockdowns) with 35.

► For the third year in a row, Smith registered a sack in the season opener. He is **one of six NFL players** to record a sack in Week 1 each of the last three seasons (2017-19).

► Dating back to 2017, Z. Smith has 44 QB hits and P. Smith has 40 QB Hits (according to Sportradar), **both ranking in the top five NFL linebackers** over that span:

► T/G **Billy Turner** spent time with the Miami Dolphins (2014-16), Baltimore Ravens (2016) and Denver Broncos (2016-18) over his first five seasons in the NFL. He played in 40 games with 25 starts for those three teams, opening contests at right guard (19 games), right tackle (four games), left tackle (one game) and left guard (one game). Turner's father, Maurice, played running back in the NFL for Minnesota (1984-85), Green Bay (1985) and the New York Jets (1987).

ODDS AND ENDS FROM WEEK 1

► The Packers' win at Chicago was only their fifth road win when scoring 10 or fewer points since 1940. A 9-0 win over the Jets in 2010 was the last one, but prior to that the previous one came in 1954 (7-6 at Baltimore).

► The last road win by the Packers against the Bears when scoring 10 or fewer points was on Oct. 16, 1932 (2-0), according to NBC.

► The 10 points given up by Green Bay were the fewest points allowed by the Packers at Soldier Field since a 17-3 win on Nov. 22, 1992. It was also the fewest points allowed by the Packers in Week 1 since a 34-3 win at Tampa Bay on Sept. 1, 1996. Prior to that, a 31-0 win on Sept. 17, 1948, at the Boston Yanks.

► Green Bay allowed 46 rushing yards on 15 carries (3.1 avg.), marking the second-fewest rushing yards allowed in a season opener since the 1970 merger behind only the 38 the Packers allowed on 13 carries at Carolina on Sept. 13, 2004.

► P **JK Scott** landed five punts inside the 20-yard line at Chicago, becoming the first Packer punter with five punts inside the 20-yard line since Tim Masthay vs. Minnesota on Oct. 2, 2014.

► Scott finished Week 1 ranking No. 7 in the league in both net punting average (43.6) and gross punting average (47.6).

MATT LaFLEUR...In his first season as the Packers' 15th head coach.

- ▶ Entering his 11th season in the NFL, having served as an offensive coordinator for two seasons (Los Angeles Rams, 2017; Tennessee Titans, 2018), a quarterbacks coach for six seasons (Washington Redskins, 2010-13; Atlanta Falcons, 2015-16), and an offensive assistat for two seasons (Houston Texans, 2008-09).
- ▶ Guided the Titans' offense in 2018 to a No. 7 league ranking in rushing (126.4 ypg) as Tennessee registered 11 games with 100-plus rushing yards, tied for No. 2 in the NFL.
- ▶ Helped the Rams lead the league in scoring with an average of 29.9 points per game in 2017, more than doubling their average from 2016 (14.0 ppg).
- ▶ Tutored QB Matt Ryan, who led the league in passer rating (117.1) in 2016 on his way to being named NFL Most Valuable Player by *The Associated Press*.
- ▶ Coached rookie QB Robert Griffin III with the Redskins in 2012, who became the first QB in team history to win *AP* Offensive Rookie of the Year.

MIKE ZIMMER...In his sixth year as the Vikings' 9th head coach.

- ▶ Led Minnesota to a record-setting 2017 campaign that saw the Vikings go 13-3, win the NFC North title and advance to the NFC Championship Game.
- ▶ After inheriting the No. 31 defense in the league in 2014, guided the Minnesota defense to the top ranking in both yards allowed and points allowed in 2017.
- ▶ The 2017 division title marked Zimmer's second in four years after piloting the Vikings to an 11-5 record and an NFC North crown in 2015.
- ▶ A longtime defensive coordinator prior to taking the Minnesota job, coached four top-10 defensive units in Cincinnati (2009, 2011-13), three in Dallas (2001, 2003, 2005) and three as head coach of the Vikings (2016-18).

THE PACKERS-VIKINGS SERIES

- ▶ The Packers began the series with six straight wins before Minnesota rattled off 22 victories in 32 contests from 1964-79.
- ▶ Green Bay started a run of its own in 1979 that generated 16 wins over 21 games and lasted until 1990.
- ▶ Since 2000, the Packers are 13-6-2 (.667) versus the Vikings at Lambeau Field (incl. postseason).
- ▶ In the two Wild Card playoff contests between the franchises, Green Bay and Minnesota have each scored 41 total points and won a game by 14 points.
- ▶ The 29-29 tie in the 2018 Week 2 matchup between these clubs was the eighth OT contest in the series. The Vikings hold a 4-1-3 advantage in OT games.

- ▶ Vikings QB Kirk Cousins completed 29 of 38 passes for 342 yards, including three touchdown passes.
- ▶ Minnesota WR Adam Thielen (125) recorded his ninth 100-yard receiving game in 2018.
- ▶ Adams broke a single-season career high with his 75th reception of 2018 coming in the third quarter. Adams also recorded his first 1,000-yard receiving season with his performance in Week 12.

► Dating back to 1982, the five sacks Green Bay registered at Chicago marked only the **fourth time** the Packers recorded five-plus sacks in the season opener (six in 2010, seven in 2001 and five in 1995).

KENNY KEEPS IMPROVING

In 2016, DL **Kenny Clark** became the youngest player to appear in a season opener for the Packers since Arnie Herber (20 years old) in 1930. After starting two of 16 games played as a rookie, Clark has started 26 games since the start of the 2017 season.

- Despite being placed on injured reserve following Week 16, Clark ranked No. 3 on the team in QB hits (seven) in 2018.
- After recording 4.5 sacks in 2017, Clark was second on the team with a career-high six sacks in 2018. He started 2019 with half a sack in Week 1.
- Clark was **tied for No. 7 in the NFL** with two opponent fumble recoveries during the 2018 season. He forced and recovered a fumble of Bills QB Josh Allen in Week 4. In Week 1, he recovered a fumble forced by LB **Nick Perry** on a sack of Chicago QB Mitchell Trubisky on fourth down late in the fourth quarter.
- In Week 8, Clark tied his career high with two sacks against the Rams. Dating back to 2016, he is **tied for team lead** in multi-sack games (LB **Kyler Fackrell**), according to pro-football-reference.com.
- In Week 3 of 2018, he matched his career high in tackles (10) and solo tackles (seven).
- The former All-American from UCLA finished **No. 4 on the team** and led the defensive line with 78 tackles (39 solo) in 2017.
- According to STATS, Clark's 4.5 sacks in December 2017 were the **most by a Packer defensive tackle in the month of December** in a single season (since 1982).

RACKING UP POINTS

K **Mason Crosby** continues moving his way up the record books.

- In Week 14 of 2018, Crosby connected on the 300th regular-season field goal of his career, becoming the 32nd player in league history with 300-plus career field goals (307).
- Crosby has played in 193 straight games for the Packers, the **second most all-time** behind only QB Brett Favre (255).
- Crosby has been named NFC Special Teams Player of the Week a team-record seven times in his career, including in 2018 after hitting a game-winning field goal in Week 6.
- Crosby finished **No. 10 in the NFL** in scoring in 2018 with 124 points.
- Crosby hit five field goals of 50-plus yards in 2018, which tied his career high (2013) and **tied for No. 3 in the NFL** in 2018 (Baltimore Ravens K Justin Tucker) behind the six made by New York Jets K Jason Myers and Dallas Cowboys K Brett Maher. It was the **second most in a season in team history** behind only Chris Jacke, who made six in 1993.
- Crosby has recorded a game-winning field goal in each of the last three seasons (2016 at Chicago, 2017 vs. Cincinnati, 2018 vs. San Francisco).
- In Week 4 of 2018, Crosby hit two 52-yard field goals, joining Ryan Longwell (at Atlanta, Nov. 13, 2005) as the only Packers to make two 50-plus-yard field goals in a regular-season game. It was the first time two field goals of 50-plus yards had been made by a kicker at Lambeau Field. Crosby had previously connected on two 50-plus field goals (56, 51) in the 2016 NFC Divisional Playoff win at Dallas.
- Crosby tied his career high (two previous times) and matched the single-game franchise record with five field goals in Week 2 of the 2018 season (37, 40, 31, 48, 36). He finished with a career-high 17 points, the most by a Packers kicker since Ryan Longwell recorded 17 at Arizona on Sept. 24, 2000.
- Crosby passed Longwell in Week 2 of the 2015 season to become the franchise career points leader:

TAKING CARE OF THE BALL

- ▶ The Packers were one of 12 NFL teams to not turn over the ball in Week 1. Nine of the 12 teams won their games.
- ▶ Green Bay ranked **No. 2 in the NFL** in 2018 with 15 giveaways (Seattle, 11). It marked the sixth time in the last eight seasons that the Packers had 17 or fewer giveaways. That is tied for the most over that span with New England (six seasons). Since QB **Aaron Rodgers** took over as the starter in 2008, the Packers have ranked in the top 10 in the NFL in the category in nine of 11 seasons.
- ▶ Rodgers finished the 2018 season with just two INTs on 597 attempts, a 0.34 interception percentage that set an **NFL single-season record among passing qualifiers** (Chiefs QB Damon Huard, 0.41 in 2006, 244-1). It was the third time in his career he led the league in lowest interception percentage, tying Bart Starr for the most in team history. Rodgers is tied for **No. 3 in NFL history** with Starr and four others behind only Sammy Baugh (five times) and Tom Brady (four).
- ▶ Rodgers' two INTs during the 2018 season were the **fewest in a season in league history by a QB with 500-plus attempts**, eclipsing the previous low of five held by Rodgers (2014), Vikings QB Sam Bradford (2016) and Chiefs QB Alex Smith (2017).
- ▶ Rodgers also set the **franchise record** for the fewest INTs in a season (min. 200 att.), besting Starr's mark of three INTs on 251 attempts in 1966.
- ▶ Rodgers' streak of consecutive attempts without an INT ended at 402 in Week 15 of 2018. He had surpassed Patriots QB Tom Brady (358 in 2010-11) for the **longest streak in league history**.
- ▶ Rodgers recorded nine straight zero-INT games (min. 15 att.) during the 2018 season (Weeks 5-6, 8-14) to tie for the second-longest streak in NFL history behind only Brady (11 games in 2010).
- ▶ In 2018, Rodgers did not throw an INT in 13 games, tied for the most (2014) in a season in team annals (min. 15 att.).
- ▶ Rodgers ranks **No. 1 in the NFL** in zero-INT games since 2018 (min. 15 att.):

- ▶ Four times Rodgers has had 10-plus zero-INT games (min. 15 att.) in a season (13 in 2018, 11 in 2016, 13 in 2014, 12 in 2009). The only other QB in team history to have 10 in a season was Starr (10) in 1964.
- ▶ Week 13 of 2018 was Rodgers' fourth game since 2015 with 50-plus pass attempts and zero INTs, **the most in the NFL over that span**. His four games of 50-plus pass attempts and no INTs are the only ones in team history.
- ▶ The Week 16 game at the N.Y. Jets in 2018 was his third career game with 55-plus attempts and zero INTs, tied with Brady for the **most in league history**.
- ▶ Since 1932, Rodgers ranks **No. 1 in the NFL** in touchdown/interception ratio, according to Sportradar (min. 1,500 att.):

- ▶ The Packers played in two overtime games in 2018, **tied for the second most in the NFL** behind the Cleveland Browns' four contests.
- ▶ According to Sportradar, QB **Aaron Rodgers** recorded a 118.8 passer rating in overtime in 2018, tied with Oakland QB Derek Carr for the **second-highest** passer rating in the NFL (Dallas QB Dak Prescott, 151.6).
- ▶ In Week 16, Green Bay came back from 15 points down in the fourth quarter to defeat the Jets in overtime.
- ▶ The Week 2 game between the Packers and Vikings ended in a 29-29 tie, Green Bay's first tie game since Nov. 24, 2013, which was also against Minnesota at Lambeau Field (26-26).
- ▶ It marked just the third tie game between the two teams in the 58-year history of the series (1961-2018).
- ▶ At least one NFL game went to overtime in each of the first five weeks of the 2018 season, marking the first time that a season has featured at least one overtime game in each of its first five weeks.
- ▶ Green Bay won three games in overtime (Weeks 3, 13 and 14) during the 2017 season, the most by the Packers in a single season in franchise history. Green Bay's three overtime wins last season were tied for the second most in a season since the NFL added an OT period in 1974, trailing only the 2011 Arizona Cardinals (four wins).
- ▶ In 2017, the Packers registered overtime wins in back-to-back games (Weeks 13-14) for the first time in team history.
- ▶ The Packers are 5-4-2 in regular-season OT games since 2007.

ALL-PRO TACKLE

- ▶ **T David Bakhtiari** was named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* in 2018. It was the first time he was named to the first team but the third year in a row he was named All-Pro by the AP.
- ▶ Bakhtiari was the first Packers offensive tackle to earn first-team honors since Forrest Gregg in 1967
- ▶ Bakhtiari was also named to the All-NFL team by the Pro Football Writers of America.

ASCENDING ADAMS

WR **Davante Adams** has continued to get better as his career has gone on. He is the **only player in the NFL** to record 70-plus receptions, 850-plus receiving yards and 10-plus receiving touchdowns in each of the past three seasons (2016-18), earning Pro Bowl honors in each of the last two seasons.

TAKING HIS PLACE AMONG THE GAME'S BEST

QB **Aaron Rodgers** surpassed the 1,500-attempt plateau for his career in 2010, the benchmark to qualify for passer rating in the NFL record book.

▶ Rodgers ranks **No. 1 in NFL history** in career passer rating:

▶ In 2018, Rodgers threw for 442 yards, three touchdowns and zero interceptions at Detroit in Week 5 and then recorded 425 yards, two touchdowns and zero interceptions in Week 6, becoming the **first player in NFL history to have back-to-back 400-yard games with no INTs**. Rodgers added 442 yards against the Jets in Week 16 to become the **first QB in NFL history to have three games with 425-plus passing yards in a season**.

▶ It was the seventh 400-yard passing game for Rodgers, a **franchise record**. No other quarterback in franchise annals has more than one 400-yard passing game (four QBs with one).

▶ Rodgers reached 40,000 passing yards in his 154th career game (Week 5 at Detroit, 2018). At the time, he had 323 passing TDs, becoming the **first quarterback in NFL history to reach 40,000 passing yards and 300 TD passes in fewer than 157 games**, the number in which both Peyton Manning and Dan Marino reached the two marks.

▶ Rodgers tied Manning for the **fourth-fewest games to reach 40,000 passing yards**, trailing Matt Ryan (151), Drew Brees (152) and Marino (153), according to the Elias Sports Bureau.

RODGERS AND TOUCHDOWNS

QB **Aaron Rodgers** has found the end zone a lot in his career, and that continued in 2018. It was the first time in his career that he registered 25-plus touchdowns and two or fewer interceptions in a season (25/2). Dating back to 1920, he was the **third player in the NFL** with 25-plus TDs and two or fewer INTs in a single season (Tom Brady, 28/2 in 2016 and Nick Foles, 27/2 in 2013), according to pro-football-reference.com.

- ▶ In Week 2 of 2017, Rodgers became the 11th NFL player to throw 300 passing touchdowns, reaching the mark in his 144th career game to pass Peyton Manning and Dan Marino (157) for the fewest games needed to reach 300 passing TDs in NFL history.
- ▶ Rodgers reached 300 passing TDs on his 4,742nd pass attempt, surpassing Manning (5,306) for the fewest in league history.
- ▶ Rodgers also became the first quarterback to reach 300 passing TDs before throwing 100 interceptions. His 73 interceptions passed Brady (115) for the fewest at the time of reaching 300 passing TDs.
- ▶ With a league-best 40 passing TDs during the 2016 regular season, Rodgers became just the fourth QB in NFL history to record two seasons (also 2011) with 40-plus TD passes (Marino, Manning, Brees). It was his franchise-record fourth season (2011-12, 2014, 2016) with 35-plus TD passes (Brett Favre, three, 1995-97).
- ▶ Rodgers has five seasons with 4,000-plus passing yards and 30-plus passing TDs (2009, 2011-12, 2014, 2016), the most in team history.

- Green Bay posted a season-high 195 rushing yards on 25 carries (7.8 avg.) in Week 10 last season, just the third time since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger that the Packers recorded 195-plus rushing yards on 25 or fewer carries (at St. Louis Cardinals, Sept. 29, 1985; at Chicago, Dec. 18, 2016).
- The Packers rushed for 100 yards on 17 carries (5.9 avg.) in Week 3 at Washington, marking the fewest rushing attempts by Green Bay in a 100-yard rushing game since Oct. 18, 2015, vs. San Diego (17-133).

JONES JUMPS TO THE FRONT

► RB **Aaron Jones** put together an impressive 2018 season before an injury landed him on injured reserve after Week 15. He finished **No. 1 in the NFL** in rushing average (min. 100 att.) for the 2018 season, becoming the first Packer to lead the league in the category since the NFL went to a 16-game schedule in 1978:

- Jones posted at least one rushing TD in five straight games for the first time in his career in 2018 (Weeks 10-14). It was the longest streak by a Packer since RB Ahman Green's five-game streak in 2003-04 and was **tied for the longest streak in the league in 2018** (Browns RB Nick Chubb).
- In Weeks 8-10 of 2018, Jones became the first Packer since QB Tobin Rote in 1951 to have 75-plus rushing yards on 15 or fewer attempts in three straight games.
- Jones rushed for a career-high 145 yards on 15 carries (9.7 avg.) with a career-best two rushing TDs in Week 10 of 2018 to become just the sixth Packer since 1950 to rush for 145-plus yards in a game on 15 or fewer carries and the first to accomplish the feat since Green had 15 carries for 163 yards vs. Dallas on Oct. 24, 2004.
- In Week 10 of 2018, Jones rushed for 96 yards on four carries (24.0 avg.) in the first quarter, the most rushing yards by a Packer in a first quarter since Green had 122 rushing yards vs. Detroit in the opening quarter on Sept. 9, 2001. Jones had 101 rushing yards in the first half, the most by a Packer since RB Ty Montgomery posted 123 yards on the ground in the first half at Chicago on Dec. 18, 2016.
- Jones had a career-high six runs of 10-plus yards in Week 10 of 2018, the most by a Packer since Green had six at Minnesota on Nov. 2, 2003.

Green Bay was one of only five teams in the league to have at least three rookies start 10-plus games in 2018 (Oakland Raiders had four; Cleveland Browns, Indianapolis Colts and the New York Giants had three).
- ▶ For the first time since 2006 (five), the Packers had four or more rookies start six-plus games in 2018 (Alexander, 11; Valdes-Scantling, 10; Jackson, 10 and WR **Equanimeous St. Brown**, seven) according to the Elias Sports Bureau.
- ▶ Green Bay led the NFL in 2018 in both the number of rookies to play in at least one regular-season game (17) and total games played by rookies (171), according to the Elias Sports Bureau.
- ▶ Alexander led the team with 15 passes defended and was named to the 2018 NFL All-Rookie team by the PFWA.
- ▶ Valdes-Scantling averaged 15.3 yards per catch in 2018, the top mark posted by a Green Bay rookie (min. 25 rec.) since WR James Lofton's 17.8-yard average in 1978.
- ▶ Valdes-Scantling registered four receptions of 40-plus yards in 2018, **tied for the most among NFL rookies** (Falcons WR Calvin Ridley, Bills WR Robert Foster).

BREAKING DOWN THE ROSTER

The Packers have a 53-man roster that is composed of 25 offensive players, 25 defensive players and three specialists.

- ▶ Of the 53 players on Green Bay's roster, 29 of them (54.7 percent) were draft picks of the Packers. Green Bay has seven players that were drafted in the first round, including six that were selected by the Packers.
- ▶ Green Bay has 15 players on the roster that began their careers as undrafted free agents.
- ▶ Over a third of the players (21 of 53, 39.6 percent) on Green Bay's roster entered the league as a sixth-round or seventh-round pick or as an undrafted player.

- ▶ Of the 53 players on the roster, 46 of them (86.8 percent) are 28 years old or younger (as of Aug. 15) and 26 players (49.1 percent) are 24 years old or younger.

ON THE ROAD AGAIN

Green Bay went 7-1 away from Lambeau Field in 2011, with the seven road wins setting a single-season franchise record.

- Dating back to 2000, the Packers have been able to stay above the .500 mark on the road, a notable achievement in the National Football League.
- Since 2000, Green Bay is one of only six NFL teams to have a regular-season road record above .500.

Another packed house at Lambeau Field against the Detroit Lions in Week 17 of 2018 brought the stadium's consecutive-sellouts streak to 342 regular-season games (not including replacement games).

- The league's longest-tenured stadium, Lambeau Field hosted its 62nd season of football in 2018. For the victory over Dallas in the Divisional round of the 2014 playoffs, Packers fans set a new Lambeau Field paid-attendance record (79,704).
- Across American professional sports, only Boston's Fenway Park (1912) and Chicago's Wrigley Field (1914) have longer tenures.

THE LAMBEAU ADVANTAGE

The crown jewel of the National Football League, Lambeau Field has long been known as one of the tougher venues to play in, particularly during the harsh Wisconsin winter.

- Re-establishing home-field advantage after a 4-4 mark in 2008 was one of the goals of 2009, and with the Packers finishing 6-2 at home, they accomplished that goal. Green Bay followed that up with a 7-1 mark at Lambeau Field in 2010, a perfect 8-0 record in 2011, the first undefeated home mark since 2002, and a 7-1 mark in 2012. The Packers were one of two teams to finish undefeated at home during the 2014 regular season (Denver).
- Green Bay was 5-2-1 (.786) at home in 2018, marking the eighth time in the last 10 seasons that the Packers won five-plus games at home.
- Since **Ron Wolf** and **Mike Holmgren** began the revitalization of the franchise in 1992, Green Bay owns the best home record in the NFL. A look at the top regular-season home W-L records since the '92 season:

A LOOK AT THE SCHEDULE

The Green Bay Packers' 2019 NFL regular-season schedule – highlighted by five prime-time contests (subject to flexible scheduling) on the original schedule for the sixth straight year (2014-19) – was released April 17 by the National Football League.

- ▶ The Packers will face 2018 playoff teams in six games this season (Chicago, Philadelphia, Dallas, Kansas City, L.A. Chargers), with four of those contests taking place on the road.
- ▶ The Packers opened the season at the Chicago Bears in the NFL's Thursday night regular-season opener. It marked the fourth time in team history that Green Bay opened at Chicago (1979, 1981, 2015).
- ▶ The Packers will open their home slate in Week 2 against the Minnesota Vikings, marking just the fourth time (2003, 2008, 2018) since the NFC North was formed in 2002 that Green Bay has played division opponents in both of the first two games.
- ▶ Green Bay stays at home both of the next two weeks, the first time the Packers have played three straight at home in September since 1990 (Weeks 1-3). They host the Denver Broncos in Week 3 and the Philadelphia Eagles in a Thursday night matchup in Week 4.
- ▶ The Packers travel to take on the Dallas Cowboys in Week 5. It is the seventh matchup between the two teams in the regular and postseason since 2013, with Green Bay holding a 5-1 record in those contests.
- ▶ For the second time in three seasons, the Packers will host the Detroit Lions on *Monday Night Football*, this time in Week 6. It is the fifth Monday night matchup between the two clubs (1964, 1971, 1972, 2017).
- ▶ A home game against the Oakland Raiders in Week 7 will be the Packers' fifth at Lambeau in 2019, marking the most home contests for Green Bay in the first seven games of a season since 1978 when it also played five at home (not including the 1987 strike year).
- ▶ In Week 8, Green Bay is at Kansas City in a Sunday night matchup.
- ▶ The following week, Green Bay travels to Los Angeles to take on the Chargers. While it's the first time the Packers will play the Chargers since they moved to Los Angeles, it is the seventh away game against the Chargers, and Green Bay has won the previous six.
- ▶ In Week 10, the Packers host the Carolina Panthers in the fourth contest between the two teams in the last six years (2014, 2015, 2017).
- ▶ Green Bay will have its bye the following week, marking the first Week 11 bye for the Packers and the latest for the team since the bye was reintroduced in 1990.
- ▶ Over the next two weeks, Green Bay will crisscross the country, playing at the San Francisco 49ers in Week 12 and at the New York Giants in Week 13.
- ▶ In Week 14, the Packers take on the Washington Redskins in the third matchup between the two in the last five years (including the postseason), but the first in Green Bay since 2013.
- ▶ Week 15 has the Bears coming to Green Bay. The Packers are 10-2 all-time at home against the Bears in December/January games.
- ▶ The Packers close out the regular season with two road games for the first time since 2004 when they played at Minnesota and Chicago.
- ▶ In Week 16, Green Bay is at the Vikings and on *MNF* for the second time on the season. The Packers last played two Monday games in the same regular season in 2009.
- ▶ Green Bay will close out the regular season against the Lions for the fourth straight year and the fifth time in the last six seasons.

CHICAGO (AP)—The Green Bay Packers beat the Chicago Bears by on Thursday night, 10-3. And while it was ugly on offense, likely in great part due to the lack of action so many regulars on that side of the ball got in the preseason, it was a thing of beauty for the defenders in green, gold and white. On this night, the Packers were the Monsters of the Midway.

There was plenty of noise heading into Soldier Field about Chicago's D, which was dominant in 2018 as the Bears won the NFC North. And it played quite well against Aaron Rodgers and the pack, sacking Rodgers five times and yielding only 213 yards.

But the Packers were stingier.

The Packers defense totaled five sacks on a clearly befuddled Mitchell Trubisky. The only turnover of the game was a fourth-quarter pick in the end zone by former Bears safety Adrian Amos.

Green Bay went into the end zone on an 8-yard jump-ball reception by tight end Jimmy Graham — a former college basketball player who dived out to perfection on the play. That was the difference, thanks to the stringy Packers D.

The game also was marked by sloppy offense and penalties. But the Packers made the fewest mistakes and now lead the league's longest series 99-95-6. Green Bay has won 16 of the last 19 regular-season meetings, and Rodgers is 17-5.

Chicago's defense hardly stacked, getting five sacks — tying the most it has had against Rodgers. But it could do little with the ball and Trubisky never found his stride. He even was sacked on Chicago's final offensive play.

Mason Crosby made a 39-yard field goal in the final period of the game, while Chicago got a 38-yarder from Eddy Pineiro. Bears fans rejoiced in relief on the first score of the season: Pineiro's first-quarter field goal. The last such kick on Soldier Field was Cody Parkey's double-dunk off the goalpost and crossbar that sent Chicago home from the wild-card round.

Each team had 10 penalties, there was a total of 467 yards or only offense, and several drops. At one point, Chicago had three straight penalties to put it in a first-and-40. No, the Bears didn't convert.

It was a rough start in the opening series for Green Bay. A run and a pass netted zero yards, then Rodgers was sacked heavily by Roy Robertson-Harris for a 10-yard loss. Rodgers was sacked again on the next three-and-out and Chicago took over at the Packers' 36 after a punt. Chicago had forced 17 yards in losses on those series, and the Packers had minus-12 yards through one period.

Rodgers got it going at the start of the second quarter, launching a 47-yard completion to Marquez Valdes-Scantling. Two more completions got the pack to the 8, and Graham then scored.

By halftime, Green Bay had outgained Chicago 119 yards to 98.

THROUGH WEEK 1

17 Davante Adams, WR, 6th Year, Fresno State

- Led the team with a career-high 111 receptions in 2018, the second most in team history behind only WR Sterling Sharpe's 112 in 1993, for a career-best 1,386 yards (12.5 avg.) and a career-high 13 TDs on his way to earning Pro Bowl honors for the second straight year, his first as an original selection.
 - Was the only player in the NFL with 70-plus receptions and 10-plus TD catches in each of the last three seasons (2016-18). Joins Sharpe (1992-94) as the only players in team history to accomplish the feat in three straight seasons.
 - Has 35 receiving TDs since 2016, No. 2 in the league (Patriots WR Antonio Brown, 36) over that span. Has caught at least one TD pass in 28 games since '16, tops in the NFL over that span.
 - Is the lone player in the league to have 10-plus receiving TDs each of the past three seasons (2016-18). Joins WR Don Hutson (1941-43) and Sharpe (1992-94) as the only players in team history to do so in three straight seasons.
 - Leads the league with 26 receiving TDs in the red zone since 2016, seven more than any other player in the NFL.
 - Has posted seven games in his career with 10-plus catches, tied with Sharpe and WR Donald Driver for the most in team history.
- At Chicago (Sept. 5):** Started and appeared on 62 of 64 snaps, tying for the team lead with four receptions for 36 yards (9.0 avg.), with three of the catches picking up first downs.

90 Montravius Adams, DL, 3rd Year, Auburn

- Played in all 16 games with one start in 2018, seeing action on defense and special teams. Posted 26 tackles (17 solo), 1½ sacks, six tackles for a loss, a forced fumble and three quarterback pressures.
 - After a foot injury sidelined him for most of training camp and the first two regular-season games, saw action in seven games as a rookie in 2017, recording five tackles (one solo) and a QB hit.
 - Earned first-team All-Southeastern Conference honors from *The Associated Press* as a senior at Auburn in 2016 after recording 44 tackles (26 solo), 8½ tackles for a loss, 4½ sacks, a forced fumble, two fumble recoveries (one for a TD) and an interception.
- At Chicago (Sept. 5):** Started and appeared on 22 snaps, posting four tackles (two solo).

23 Jaire Alexander, CB, 2nd Year, Louisville

- Was named to the PFWA's All-Rookie team after leading the team with 15 passes defensed. Became just the second Packers CB to be honored since 1974 (CB Casey Hayward, 2012).
 - Appeared in 13 games with 11 starts as a rookie and ranked No. 2 on the team with 76 tackles (61 solo) while adding a half-sack, three tackles for a loss, an interception and a QB pressure.
 - In Week 8 at the Los Angeles Rams, finished with five passes defensed, the most by a Green Bay defender during the 2018 season.
 - Earned second-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference recognition as a sophomore in 2016 after posting a team-high five interceptions (tied for No. 11 in the country) along with a career-best 39 tackles (31 solo) and 14 passes defensed.
- At Chicago (Sept. 5):** Started and played all 73 snaps, finishing with six tackles (two solo) and two passes defensed...Late in the first quarter, got his right hand in to break up a pass from QB Mitchell Trubisky intended for WR Taylor Gabriel...Late in the fourth quarter with the Packers holding a 10-3 lead and the Bears driving, broke up a pass from Trubisky intended for TE Adam Shaheen near the sideline at the Green Bay 10.

81 Geronimo Allison, WR, 4th Year, Illinois

- Was the only player on the Packers to have a catch of 60-plus yards in both of the last two seasons (72-yarder in 2017, 64-yard touchdown in 2018).

- In his eight career starts, has posted 30 receptions for 470 yards (15.7 avg.) and three TDs.
 - Despite being limited to just five games due to injury in 2018, registered a career-best 303 yards receiving and matched his career high with two receiving TDs on 20 receptions (15.2 avg.)
 - Led the team with a career-high 122 receiving yards on a career-best six catches (20.3 avg.) in Week 3 vs. Cincinnati in 2017, highlighted by his career-long 72-yard grab in overtime that set up K Mason Crosby's game-winning 27-yard field goal.
- At Chicago (Sept. 5):** Appeared on 32 plays on offense.

31 Adrian Amos, S, 5th Year, Penn State

- Played in 60 games with 56 starts for the Chicago Bears over four seasons (2015-18), recording 305 tackles (244 solo), 17 passes defensed, three interceptions, three forced fumbles, three fumble recoveries, 13 tackles for a loss, two sacks and seven tackles on special teams.
 - Was one of four NFL safeties (Malcolm Jenkins, Eddie Jackson, Mike Adams) to register at least three INTs, three forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries from 2016-18, according to pro-football-reference.com.
 - Started all 16 games on a defense that finished No. 1 in the NFL in 2018 in points allowed per game (17.7), yards per play (4.78), takeaways (36) and interceptions (27), and set career highs in passes defensed (eight) and interceptions (two).
 - Named to PFWA's All-Rookie team in 2015 after he became the first Bears rookie to lead the team in tackles (based on coaches review) since LB Brian Urlacher in 2000.

69 David Bakhtiari, T, 7th Year, Colorado

- Earned first-team All-Pro honors from *The Associated Press* in 2018, the first Packers offensive tackle to earn first-team recognition since Forrest Gregg in 1967.
 - Was a second-team AP All-Pro selection in 2016 and 2017, making him one of only two Green Bay tackles (Gregg, 1962-67) to earn AP All-Pro honors in three consecutive seasons. Joined Chiefs RT Mitchell Schwartz as the only tackles in the league to earn AP All-Pro honors in each of the last three seasons (2016-18).
 - Was selected to his first career Pro Bowl in 2016, having initially been named a first alternate before being selected as an injury replacement for Eagles T Jason Peters. Was also named a Pro Bowl alternate in 2014 and 2017-18.
 - Has started all 91 regular-season games he has appeared in at LT since entering the league in 2013. Opened all 16 regular-season games in four of his first six seasons in the NFL.
- At Chicago (Sept. 5):** Started at LT and played all 64 snaps, helping to protect QB Aaron Rodgers as he connected on 18 of 30 passes for 203 yards and a TD with no INTs for a 91.4 rating.

8 Tim Boyle, QB, 2nd Year, Eastern Kentucky

- Spent his entire rookie season on the Packers' active roster in 2018. Was listed as a gameday inactive for every game with the exception of Week 2 vs. Minnesota (Sept. 16) when he was active but did not play.
- Started 19 of 36 games played over four seasons at Eastern Kentucky

(2017) and Connecticut (2013-15).

- Led the Ohio Valley Conference with 2,134 passing yards as a redshirt senior in 2017, good for No. 5 in a single season in school history.

►**At Chicago (Sept. 5):** Served as the No. 2 QB, but did not see any action.

43 Hunter Bradley, LS, 2nd Year, Mississippi State

- As a rookie, handled snapping duties in all 16 games and had one tackle on special teams.

- Played in 41 career games at Mississippi State, serving as the primary long snapper since Week 2 of the 2015 season.

- Entered college as a tight end, but suffered two knee injuries in his first two years and moved to long snapper.

►**At Chicago (Sept. 5):** Handled snapping duties on all punts and placements, helping P JK Scott register a career-high five punts inside the 20.

98 Fadol Brown, DL, 2nd Year, Mississippi

- Claimed off waivers by the Green Bay Packers in Week 14 of 2018 and appeared in four games, recording two tackles (both solo) on defense and a tackle on special teams.

- After spending the 2017 season on the practice squad for Oakland, appeared in eight contests for the Raiders in 2018 before being released on Dec. 4.

- Overall, played in 12 contests in 2018 and registered 19 tackles (16 solo) and a pass defended along with a tackle on special teams.

28 Tony Brown, CB, 2nd Year, Alabama

- Spent the first three weeks of the season on Green Bay's practice squad before being elevated to the active roster and appearing in 11 games with three starts.

- With 1,473 career points, ranks No. 1 on the all-time franchise scoring list, having surpassed K Ryan Longwell (1,054) in 2015.

- Is the all-time franchise leader in field goals (308), 50-yard field goals (34) and extra points (549).

- Has kicked the seven longest field goals in franchise history (58-yarder in 2011, two 57-yarders in 2013, 56-yarders in 2010, 2011 and 2015, 55-yarder in 2014).

- Has not missed a game in his career, playing in 193 straight contests in the regular season, the second-longest streak in franchise history (QB Brett Favre, 255).

- Registered a franchise-record 10 straight 100-point seasons (2007-16), one of only three players in NFL history to register 100-plus points in 10-plus consecutive seasons (Jason Elam, 16, 1993-2008; Adam Vinatieri, 13, 1996-2008).

- Set a franchise record with 23 consecutive field goals made (2010-11), topping K Chris Jacke's mark of 17 straight in 1993.

- Holds the NFL postseason record for most consecutive FGs made with 23 straight from 2010-16.

►**At Chicago (Sept. 5):** Connected on his lone FG attempt of the evening, a 39-yarder with just over five minutes remaining in the game to extend the Packers' lead to 10-3, the eventual final score...Registered touchbacks on all three of his kickoffs.

11 Trevor Davis, WR, 4th Year, California

- Posted a 12.1-yard average on punt returns from 2016-18, good for No. 2 in the NFL (min. 35 ret.) behind only Lions CB Jamal Agnew (12.3).

- Ranked No. 9 in the league among players with 25-plus returns with a 22.6-yard average on kickoff returns from 2016-18.

- Joined Chiefs WR Tyreek Hill as the only players in the league to have a punt return of 55-plus yards in both 2016 and 2017.

- Played in all 16 games in 2017, ranking No. 3 in the NFL in punt-return average (12.0 avg.) and No. 8 in the NFL in kickoff-return average (22.8 avg.). Among players with 20-plus punt returns in a season, his 12.0-yard average on punt returns in 2017 ranks No. 6 in franchise history.

►**At Chicago (Sept. 5):** Appeared on 19 plays on offense and had a 28-yard reception in the fourth quarter...Made the catch on his knees over

- Played in all 16 games and made his first two career starts in 2017, seeing time on defense and special teams for the second straight season. Was tied for No. 2 on the team with 20 quarterback pressures.

52 Rashaan Gary, LB, Rookie, Michigan

- Appeared in 15 games with a career-high 13 starts in 2018 and posted career bests in tackles (60, No. 5 on the team), solo tackles (43) and passes defended (four), and registered the first two interceptions and the first fumble recovery of his career.
- ▶**At Chicago (Sept. 5):** Appeared on three plays on special teams in his Packers debut.

80 Jimmy Graham, TE, 10th Year, Miami

- Is the only tight end in league history to have two seasons with 1,200-plus receiving yards and 10-plus receiving touchdowns (2011, 2013) and is the only TE to register four consecutive seasons with 85-plus catches (2011-14).
- Ranks No. 4 in NFL history among tight ends with 72 career TD catches and ranks No. 4 in the league in TD receptions among all players since entering the NFL in 2010.
- Has been selected to five career Pro Bowls (2011, 2013-14, 2016-17) and earned first-team All-Pro honors from *The Associated Press* in 2013. Has posted four seasons with 10-plus TD catches, tied for No. 2 in league annals among TEs behind only Patriots TE Rob Gronkowski (five).
- Registered 1,310 receiving yards with the New Orleans Saints in 2011, the second most in NFL history by a TE to that point behind only Gronkowski (1,327 in 2011), and posted 16 TD catches in 2013, No. 2 in a season among TEs behind only Gronkowski (17 in 2011).
- Appeared in 137 games with 101 starts during his first nine NFL seasons, playing in 15 or 16 games in eight of his first nine years in the league.
- ▶**At Chicago (Sept. 5):** Played 35 snaps and caught three passes for

- Is the only RB in team history to post 75-plus carries with an average of 5.45 yards per carry or better in both of his first two seasons in the NFL.

►**At Chicago (Sept. 5):** Led the team with 39 rushing yards on 13 carries (3.0 avg.) and added one reception for 0 yards.

96 Kingsley Keke, DL, Rookie, Texas A&M

- Played in all 52 games with 35 starts in his four seasons with the Aggies, recording 150 tackles (57 solo), 21 tackles for a loss, 12 sacks, seven passes defensed, three fumble recoveries and a forced fumble.

- Started all 13 games as a senior in 2018 and led the team with a career-high seven sacks. Ranked No. 2 on the team with a career-best 11 tackles for a loss.

- Helped the A&M defense finish No. 3 in the country in run defense in 2018 with an average of 95.2 yards allowed per game, the best mark posted by the Aggies since 1994 (92.4 ypg).

89 Mercedes Lewis, TE, 14th Year, UCLA

- Has played in 187 games since entering the NFL in 2006, the fourth most among tight ends over that span behind only Vernon Davis (195), Jason Witten (193) and Antonio Gates (191).

- Appeared in 170 contests for the Jacksonville Jaguars during his 12 seasons with the team (2006-17), the third most in franchise history. Played in either 15 or 16 regular-season games in nine of his seasons in Jacksonville.

- Finished his career with the Jaguars ranked No. 3 in team history in receiving yards (4,502) and receptions (375) and No. 2 in receiving TDs (33), tops among tight ends in all three categories.

- Was named to the Pro Bowl in 2010, the first tight end in team history to be honored, after posting career highs in receptions (58), receiving yards (700) and receiving TDs (10).

- Helped block for the top four single-season rushing-yardage totals in franchise history (2006-07, 2010, 2017). In 2017, helped the Jaguars lead the league in rushing (141.4 ypg) for the first time in franchise history.

yards per carry (5.01) and giveaways (15) and No. 1 in rushing first-down percentage (29.4).

• Started every game in 2014, becoming the first rookie center to open every game for the Packers since the league went to a 16-game schedule in 1978. Was named to the PFWA's All-Rookie team, the first Green Bay center to be honored since its inception in 1974.

► **At Chicago (Sept. 5):** Started at C and played all 64 snaps, helping to protect QB Aaron Rodgers as he connected on 18 of 30 passes for 203 yards and a TD with no INTs for a 91.4 rating.

94 Dean Lowry, DL, 4th Year, Northwestern

• Has only missed one game in his career, appearing in 48 regular-season contests with 20 starts since entering the league in 2016.

• Saw action in all 16 games and made eight starts in 2018, setting career highs in tackles (57), solo tackles (39), sacks (three) and passes defended (four) while also registering the first forced fumble of his career.

• Played in all 16 games with 11 starts in 2017 and registered 34 tackles (22 solo), two sacks, seven tackles for a loss, a fumble recovery for a touchdown, two passes defended, eight QB hits and six QB pressures.

• Earned NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors vs. Tampa Bay (Week 13, 2017) after recording four tackles (all solo), a sack, a QB pressure, a QB hit and a fumble recovery he returned 62 yards for a touchdown. • Finished No. 3 on the team with career-best five sacks in 2018, and was No. 3 on the team with 10 tackles for a loss.

• Played in 13 games with nine starts at ILB and ranked No. 5 on the team with 62 tackles (46 solo) as a rookie in 2016. Became the first Green Bay rookie to start on defense in Week 1 since LB Nick Perry in 2012.

► **At Chicago (Sept. 5):** Started and played all 73 snaps, finishing with a team-high 13 tackles (six solo), two tackles for a loss, a sack and a QB pressure...On the Bears' opening drive, came up the middle to sack QB Mitchell Trubisky for a 6-yard loss on third down to force a punt...Late in the first half, brought down RB Mike Davis for a 1-yard loss on a third-down screen play to force a three-and-out.

62 Lucas Patrick, G, 3rd Year, Duke

• Spent the entire 2016 season on Green Bay's practice squad. Was originally signed by the Packers as an undrafted free agent on June 1, 2016, after participating in Green Bay's rookie orientation camp that May on a

tryout basis.

► **At Chicago (Sept. 5):** Appeared on two plays on special teams.

25 Will Redmond, S, 4th Year, Mississippi State

• Played in five games for the Packers in 2018, seeing time on defense and special teams, and posted one tackle on special teams.

• Originally selected by the San Francisco 49ers in the third round of the 2016 NFL Draft with the No. 68 overall selection. Spent his entire rookie season on injured reserve (knee) and the first eight games of the 2017 season on injured reserve (ankle).

• Spent time on the Kansas City Chiefs' practice squad in 2017.

► **At Chicago (Sept. 5):** Played 17 snaps on special teams.

12 Aaron Rodgers, QB, 15th Year, California

• Ranks No. 1 in NFL history (min. 1,500 attempts) in career passer rating (103.1), interception percentage (1.45) and TD/INT ratio (4.24, 339/80).

• Set an NFL single-season record in 2018 with his interception percentage of 0.34 (two INTs on 597 attempts), besting the previous mark held by Chiefs QB Damon Huard (0.41 in 2006). Also set a league record last season for consecutive passing attempts without an INT (402).

• Has posted seven seasons (2009, 2011-12, 2014-16, 2018) with 500-plus passing attempts and eight or fewer INTs, the most in NFL history ahead of Patriots QB Tom Brady (four), Redskins QB Alex Smith (two), Falcons QB Matt Ryan (two) and nine QBs (one).

• Has been named the NFL's Most Valuable Player by *The Associated Press* twice in his career (2011, 2014), one of only eight players in league history to win the award multiple times.

• Has been selected to the Pro Bowl in seven of the last 10 seasons (2009, 2011-12, 2014-16, 2018).

• Is the only quarterback in league history to record a 100-plus passer rating in six consecutive seasons (2009-14), with no other QB doing so in more than four straight seasons.

• Is one of only three QBs in NFL history with 40,000-plus passing yards and 2,500-plus rushing yards (Fran Tarkenton, John Elway).

• In 159 career regular-season starts (since 2008), has posted 56 games with 300-plus passing yards (No. 5 in the NFL over that span), 96 without an interception (No. 1, min. 15 attempts) and 86 with a 100-plus passer rating (No. 2).

• In the franchise record books, holds seven of the top eight single-season marks for passer rating (2009-14, 2016), four of the top six for passing TDs (2011-12, 2014, 2016), six of the top seven for completion percentage (2010-14, 2016) and five of the top seven for passing yards (2009, 2011, 2014, 2016, 2018).

26 Darnell Savage, S, Rookie, Maryland

• Earned All-Big Ten honors from media and coaches in each of his final two years, being named honorable mention in 2017 and second team in 2018. Started all 36 games over his final three seasons at Maryland.

• In 2018, ranked No. 2 in the Big Ten, trailing only teammate LB Tre Watson (five), and No. 13 in the country with four interceptions.

• Led the team with a career-high 11 passes defended and tied for the team lead with three interceptions as a junior in 2017.

• Set career highs with 59 tackles and 45 solo tackles as a sophomore in 2016 and as a junior in 2017.

► **At Chicago (Sept. 5):** Started and played all 73 snaps, becoming the first rookie safety to start for the Packers in Week 1 since Morgan Burnett in 2010...Registered three tackles (all solo), a pass defended, a QB pressure and a QB hit...Late in the first half, broke up a QB Mitchell Trubisky pass over the middle intended for WR Allen Robinson on third down to force a Chicago punt.

6 JK Scott, P, 2nd Year, Alabama

- Averaged 44.7 yards per punt as a rookie in 2018, the third-best single-season mark (min. 35 punts) in team history behind only Tim Masthay (45.6 in 2011) and Craig Hentrich (45.0 in 1997).
 - Became the first punter in team history to register a punt of 58-plus yards in each of his first three NFL games and was the first NFL punter to do so since Redskins P Tress Way in 2014.
 - Holds University of Alabama records for career punting yards (11,074), attempts (243) and average yards per punt (45.6).
 - Selected to an All-America team in three of his four seasons at Alabama, earning first-team honors in 2014 and second-team honors in '16 and '17.
- **At Chicago (Sept. 5):** Punted a career-high nine times on the evening posting a 47.6-yard gross average and a 43.6-yard net average with a career-best five punts placed inside the 20...Became the first Packers punter to register five punts inside the 20 since Tim Masthay did so vs. Minnesota on Oct. 2, 2014...Posted a pair of 63-yard punts, including one with under two minutes remaining in the game that put the ball at the Chicago 10 after the Bears were called for a holding on the return.

10 Darrius Shepherd, WR, Rookie, North Dakota State

- Signed by Green Bay as an undrafted free agent on May 6, 2019, after participating in the team's rookie orientation on a tryout basis
 - Played in 57 games with 36 starts over four years at North Dakota State, helping the Bison compile a 54-5 record (.915) from 2015-18 and capture three NCAA Division I FCS national championships (2015, 2017-18) and four consecutive Missouri Valley Football Conference titles.
 - Finished second all-time at NDSU with 188 receptions and 2,841 receiving yards (15.1 avg.), and was sixth with 20 career TD receptions. Ended fifth on the NDSU career chart for punt return yards (578) and sixth in punt return attempts (44) and yards per return (13.14).
- **At Chicago (Sept. 5):** Inactive (hamstring).

91 Preston Smith, LB, 5th Year, Mississippi State

- Played in 64 games with 50 starts for the Washington Redskins (2015-18), including starts in all 48 games over the last three seasons.
 - Was the only player in the NFL to register 20-plus sacks, four-plus interceptions and four-plus forced fumbles from 2015-18. Became the first NFL player to do it over a four-year span since former Packers LB Clay Matthews (2011-14).
 - With two seasons with eight sacks (2015 and 2017), was tied for the third-most seasons by a LB with eight-plus sacks from 2015-18 (Ryan Kerrigan and Von Miller: four), according to pro-football-reference.com.
 - His 24½ sacks were the second most among Washington players from 2015-18 (Kerrigan, 46½).
- **At Chicago (Sept. 5):** Started and played 72 of 73 snaps, finishing with eight tackles (three solo), a team-high 1½ sacks, a pass defensed, two QB pressures and five QB hits...On the Bears' first drive, batted down a QB Mitchell Trubisky pass intended for WR Allen Robinson...Early in the third quarter, posted a shared zero-yard sack of Trubisky with DL Kenny Clark to force a three-and-out...Sealed the win with a fourth-down sack with just over a minute remaining in the game, running a stunt with LB Za'Darius Smith to beat LG Cody Whitehair on his way to bringing down Trubisky for an 11-yard loss.

55 Za'Darius Smith, LB, 5th Year, Kentucky

- Appeared in all 16 games with a career-high eight starts for the Ravens in 2018 and posted a career-best 45 tackles (26 solo) and a career-high and team-leading 8½ sacks for a Baltimore defense that finished No. 1 in the NFL in overall defense (292.9 ypg) and No. 2 in scoring defense (17.9 ppg).

 - Earned second-team All-Big 12 honors in 2016 after ranking No. 2 on the team and in the conference with 121 tackles (59 solo).
 - His eight games with 10-plus tackles in 2016 were tied for the most in the Power 5 conferences (ACC, Big 10, Big 12, SEC, Pac-12), according to sports-reference.com.
- **At Chicago (Sept. 5):** Played 19 snaps on special teams in his NFL debut and registered a tackle.

65 Lane Taylor, G, 7th Year, Oklahoma State

- Has started all 46 games he has played in since 2016, the most by a Green Bay player over that span.
 - Has started games at three different spots on the offensive line (45 at left guard, two at left tackle, one at right guard) during his career.
 - In his first three seasons as a starter (2016-18), helped the Packers rank No. 1 in the NFL over that span with an average of 4.66 yards per carry, the best three-year mark by the team since 1961-63 (4.72 avg.)
 - Helped clear holes for RB Aaron Jones in 2018, who became the first Packer to lead the league in yards per carry (5.47) since the NFL went to a 16-game schedule in 1978.
- **At Chicago (Sept. 5):** Started at LG and played all 64 snaps, helping to protect QB Aaron Rodgers as he connected on 18 of 30 passes for 203 yards and a TD with no INTs for a 91.4 rating.

85 Robert Tonyan, TE, 2nd Year, Indiana State

- Played in all 16 games with one start in 2018, posting four catches for 77 yards (19.3 avg.) and a touchdown.
 - Caught a 54-yard TD pass from QB Aaron Rodgers at Seattle last season in Week 11, becoming the first Packer to post a TD catch of 50-plus yards on his first career reception since WR Jessie Clark (75-yard TD catch) vs. Tampa Bay on Oct. 2, 1983.
 - Joined the Packers in December 2017 and spent the final four weeks that season on Green Bay's practice squad. Originally entered the NFL with the Detroit Lions in May 2017 as an undrafted free agent.
- **At Chicago (Sept. 5):** Appeared on 20 plays on offense and posted a 28-yard reception in the fourth quarter...Found an opening in the middle

of the field to haul in the pass from QB Aaron Rodgers and take it to the Chicago 40...Also played 13 snaps on special teams and recorded a tackle.

77 Billy Turner, T/G, 6th Year, North Dakota State

- Has played in 41 games with 26 starts during his career and has started games at four positions (13 at right guard, eight at left guard, four at right tackle, one at left tackle).

- Appeared in 20 games with 11 starts for Denver from 2016-18, highlighted by a career-high 16 games played with 11 starts for the Broncos last season.

- Helped block for RB Phillip Lindsay in '18, who ranked No. 3 in the league in yards per carry (5.40), the third-best average among running backs in franchise history behind only Clinton Portis (5.52 in 2002, 5.49 in 2003).

- Played in 20 games with 14 starts for the Miami Dolphins from 2014-16, including a 2015 campaign that saw him start a career-high 12 games (all at RG).

►**At Chicago (Sept. 5):** Started at RG and played all 64 snaps, helping to protect QB Aaron Rodgers as he connected on 18 of 30 passes for 203 yards and a TD with no INTs for a 91.4 rating.

83 Marquez Valdes-Scantling, WR, 2nd Year, South Florida

- Posted 38 catches for 581 yards and two TDs in 2018, an average of 15.3 yards per catch that was the top mark posted by a Green Bay rookie (min. 25 rec.) since WR James Lofton's 17.8-yard average in 1978.

- Ranked No. 6 among NFL rookies in receiving yards and had four receptions of 40-plus yards, tied for the most among league rookies (Falcons WR Calvin Ridley, Bills WR Robert Foster).

- Registered two 100-yard receiving games last season, tied for No. 2 in franchise history among rookies behind only Billy Howton (six in 1952).

- Became the first Packer since WR Max McGee in 1959 to register two 100-yard receiving games on three or fewer catches in a season, and was only the third NFL player to accomplish that feat since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger (Rams WR Drew Hill, 1980; Patriots WR Stanley Morgan, 1978, 1980, 1984).

►**At Chicago (Sept. 5):** Started and played 42 snaps, pacing the team with 52 yards receiving on four catches (13.0 avg.)...On Green Bay's first offensive play of the second quarter, caught a deep pass down the middle of the field for a 47-yard gain to the Chicago 27 with CB Prince Amukamara in coverage, helping to set up QB Aaron Rodgers' 8-yard TD pass to TE Jimmy Graham three plays later that would turn out to be the game-winning TD.

45 Danny Vitale, FB, 4th Year, Northwestern

- Appeared in the final five games of the season for the Packers in 2018 after being signed to the active roster from the practice squad on Dec. 1.

- Played in 24 games with nine starts for the Cleveland Browns in 2016-17, hauling in seven passes for 46 yards (6.6 avg.). Led the Browns with nine tackles on special teams in 2017.

- Was selected by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in the sixth round (No. 197 overall) of the 2016 NFL Draft.

►**At Chicago (Sept. 5):** Started and played 11 snaps on offense...Also appeared on 19 plays on special teams.

22 Dexter Williams, RB, Rookie, Notre Dame

- Led Notre Dame in rushing as a senior in 2018 with a career-high 995 yards on 158 carries (6.3 avg.), an average of 110.6 rushing yards per game.

- Also paced the Fighting Irish in rushing touchdowns with 12 in just nine games, the most by a Notre Dame RB since Jonas Gray posted the same number in 11 games in 2011. Registered a 97-yard TD run at Virginia Tech last season, the second-longest run in school history.

- Posted four games with 140-plus rushing yards in '18, highlighted by his career-high 202-yard output vs. Florida State.

- Was one of only eight FBS players in 2018 to average at least 6.3 yards per attempt (min. 150 carries) with 12-plus rushing TDs.

►**At Chicago (Sept. 5):** Inactive (healthy scratch).

30 Jamaal Williams, RB, 3rd Year, Brigham Young

- Is one of only three players in team history (RBs Gerry Ellis and Eddie Lacy) to register 400-plus rushing yards and 200-plus receiving yards in both of his first two seasons in the NFL.

- Posted 95 rushing yards and 61 receiving yards at the N.Y. Jets last season in Week 16, becoming just the third Packer since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger to have 95-plus rushing yards and 60-plus receiving yards in a game (RB John Brockington, Nov. 17, 1974, at Minnesota; RB Dorsey Levens, Nov. 16, 1997, at Indianapolis).

- Rushed for a team-high 556 yards in 2017, the fourth most by a Green Bay rookie in team history, and four touchdowns on 153 carries (3.6 avg.).
