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### PACKERS FACE BROWNS IN PRESEASON DEBUT

Green Bay will travel to Cleveland to take on the Browns in the preseason opener.

► This will be the 26th time the Packers and Browns have played in the preseason and will tie for the second-most preseason games Green Bay has played against any opponent (Pittsburgh and Washington, 26 / New York Giants, 30).



► This will be the ninth time that the Packers will play their first game of their preseason slate against the Browns. It is the first time since 2016, when Green Bay hosted Cleveland in what was supposed to be its second preseason contest but ended up being the first after field conditions canceled the Packers' first game in Canton, Ohio.

► It is the first time since 2011 that Green Bay will open the preseason in Cleveland.

► The Packers open on the road for the third consecutive preseason.

► Following the first preseason game, the Packers will have two open practices (Aug. 13-14) back in Green Bay, before going to Denver, where they will have a joint practice (Aug. 16) before facing the Broncos on Aug. 18 at 7 p.m. CT.

► With the three-game preseason schedule implemented in 2021, the Packers will alternate between hosting one and two preseason games each year. This year, the Packers will start with two road games before the Baltimore Ravens come to Lambeau Field to close out the preseason. The matchup with the Ravens is designated as the Packers Give Back Game, with a benefiting charity to be highlighted through the game and surrounding activities.

### WITH THE CALL

► Flagship by Milwaukee's WTMJ-TV and in conjunction with WGBA-TV in Green Bay, Packers preseason games are televised over a 22-station network throughout the state of Wisconsin, Upper Michigan and north-eastern Minnesota, Peoria in Illinois, Cedar Rapids-Waterloo, Davenport and Des Moines in Iowa, Omaha in Nebraska, St. Louis in Missouri, Bismarck, Fargo and Minot in North Dakota, Sioux Falls in South Dakota and Anchorage, Fairbanks and Juneau in Alaska. All preseason games will also be broadcast on TELEMUNDO.

► The top-notch broadcast team includes CBS's **Kevin Harlan** (play-by-play) alongside former Green Bay fullback **John Kuhn** (analyst) with **Ashley Washburn** of WTMJ-TV serving as the sideline reporter. Washburn will also host an informative half-hour pregame show.

McCarren first joined the team's broadcasts in 1995 and enters his 30th season calling Packers games. After originally being paired together in 1999, McCarren and Larrivee enter their 26th season of broadcasts together. They surpassed Jim Irwin and Max McGee for the most regular-season and postseason games broadcast for the Packers with 313 at the 2018 season opener against Chicago.

**MATT LaFLEUR...**In his sixth season as the Packers' 15th head coach.

- ▶ Is in his 16th season in the NFL, having previously served as an offensive coordinator for two seasons (Los Angeles Rams, 2017; Tennessee Titans, 2018), a quarterbacks coach for six seasons (Washington Redskins, 2010-13; Atlanta Falcons, 2015-16), and an offensive assistant for two seasons (Houston Texans, 2008-09).
- ▶ In his first five seasons leading the Packers, has authored one of the greatest starts to a head-coaching career in NFL history. Per the Elias Sports Bureau, his 56 wins are tied for the second most in league history by a head coach in his first five seasons in the NFL, trailing only George Seifert (62 in 1989-93). Green Bay's 56-27 regular-season record since 2019 is tied for No. 3 in the NFL and ranks No. 1 in the NFC.
- ▶ Became the first coach in NFL history to post 13-plus wins in three straight seasons and his 39 wins from 2019-21 passed Seifert (38) for the most wins by an NFL head coach in his first three seasons in the league (Elias). His 39 wins are also tied for the second most by a coach over any three-season span in league history, trailing only Andy Reid's 40 wins with the Kansas City Chiefs from 2020-22 and Mike Ditka's 40 wins with the Chicago Bears from 1985-87 (Elias).
- ▶ Guided the Packers to a 32-9 record (.780) in the regular season from 2019-23 at Lambeau Field, the top home mark in the NFL over that span. His .733 win percentage (22-8 record) against NFC North opponents in his first five seasons also ranks as the best in the history of the NFC North/Central (min. 10 games).
- ▶ In his first season leading the Packers in 2019, became the first coach in club history to lead the team to the playoffs in his debut season. Also led the largest one-year win improvement in team history (plus-seven wins).

**KEVIN STEFANSKI...**In his fifth season as the Browns' 18th head coach.

- ▶ Is in his 19th season as an NFL coach, having previously spent 14 seasons with the Minnesota Vikings as an assistant to the head coach (2006-08), assistant QBs coach (2009-13), TE's coach (2014-15), RBs coach (2016), QBs coach/interim offensive coordinator (2017-18) and offensive coordinator (2019).
- ▶ Was named the *Associated Press* NFL Coach of the Year in 2020 and 2023, becoming the 16th coach to win the award multiple times since its inception in 1957.
- ▶ Has posted the highest winning percentage for a head coach in team history over a four-year span since 1986-89, including two 11-win seasons (2020, 2023) and two postseason appearances (2020, 2023).

**THE PACKERS-BROWNS SERIES**

- ▶ The Browns won the first three contests of the series (1953-56) before the Packers won the next five games played, including the 1965 NFL Championship. Cleveland has not won back-to-back games in the series since 1955-56.
- ▶ Green Bay captured its ninth NFL title when the Packers defeated the Browns, 23-12, in the 1965 NFL Championship at Lambeau Field.
- ▶ The Packers have won six of the last seven games played, including the last four consecutive contests. Green Bay has scored 24-plus points in every game since 1995.

**LAST MEETING, REGULAR SEASON**

- ▶ Packers QB Aaron Rodgers completed 24 of 34 passes for 202 yards and three TDs, becoming Green Bay's all-time leader in TD passes.
- ▶ Green Bay's defense intercepted QB Baker Mayfield four times and sacked Mayfield five times. CB Rasul Douglas had two INTs and LB Rashan Gary had two sacks.
- ▶ Packers WR Davante Adams led the team with 10 receptions for 114 yards and two TDs.
- ▶ Mayfield completed 21 of 36 passes for 222 yards and two TDs with four INTs.

## COACHING-STAFF CHANGES

Throughout the offseason, Head Coach **Matt LaFleur** made some changes to the coaching staff.

- ▶ **Jeff Hafley** was named defensive coordinator, joining the Packers after working as the head coach for Boston College for the past four seasons (2020-23). He led the Eagles to bowl eligibility in three of his four years. In 2021, the defense ranked No. 3 nationally in passing yards allowed (173.5 per game) and also were top 30 nationally in total defense, red-zone defense, first downs allowed, third-down percentage, team passing efficiency and defensive touchdowns. Prior to his time at BC, Hafley was the co-defensive coordinator/secondary coach for Ohio State in 2019. In his one season in Columbus, he was a finalist for the Frank Broyles Award and the 247 Sports Defensive Coordinator of the Year. Hafley helped the Buckeye defense rank No. 1 nationally in yards per play, No. 2 in total defense and passing yards allowed and No. 3 in scoring defense and sacks. Before his time at Ohio State, Hafley spent seven seasons as an NFL assistant coach. The Montvale, N.J., native worked as a defensive backs coach for the San Francisco 49ers (2016-18) and Cleveland Browns (2014-15). In 2018, the 49ers ranked No. 11 in the NFL in passing defense and were No. 14 in 2016 after ranking No. 27 the year before Hafley arrived. He first coached in the NFL as an assistant defensive backs coach for Tampa Bay in 2012 and then was the secondary/safeties coach for the Buccaneers in 2013.
- ▶ **Aaron Hill** joins the Packers as strength & conditioning coordinator after spending the last five seasons working for the San Francisco 49ers as an assistant strength and conditioning coach. Prior to his time in San Francisco, he worked under the same title at Vanderbilt University for four years (2015-18), assisting with all aspects of the university's football program during the season and offseason training. In 2015, Hill had an offseason internship in the Carolina Panthers' strength & conditioning department. His coaching career began at as a strength and conditioning intern in 2014-15 at the University of Minnesota, where he played linebacker from 2009-13.
- ▶ **Derrick Ansley** was brought in to be the passing game coordinator (defense). He spent the past three seasons working for the Los Angeles Chargers, first as secondary coach (2021-22) before being promoted to defensive coordinator (2023). He coached a secondary in 2022 that featured Pro Bowl safety Derwin James Jr., who earned second-team All-Pro honors from *The Associated Press*. Before joining the Chargers, Ansley spent two seasons (2019-20) as the defensive coordinator/defensive backs coach at the University of Tennessee. In his first season leading the Volunteers' defense, his group featured 11 first-time defensive starters, including five freshmen, and ranked in the top 25 nationally in total defense, passing defense and interceptions. Ansley's first NFL experience came in 2018 as the defensive backs coach for the Oakland Raiders, helping them increase their INT total from the year prior by nearly double digits (nine).
- ▶ **Anthony Campanile** (camp-uh-nell-ee) came up to Green Bay after four seasons with the Miami Dolphins as the linebackers/running game coordinator. During his time with the Dolphins, he was part of staffs that helped Miami rank No. 4 in the NFL over that span in sacks (185.0), No. 6 in rushing defense (106.4 ypg), No. 8 in takeaways (96) and third-down defense (38.6 pct.) and tied for No. 5 in forced fumbles (56). Campanile coached linebackers at the University of Michigan in 2019 after working for three seasons at Boston College, where he coached defensive backs (2016-17) and added co-defensive coordinator responsibilities in his final season (2018).

- ▶ **Ryan Mahaffey** (muh-HAFF-ee), who enters his fourth season with the Packers, was promoted to wide receivers coach. He originally joined Green Bay in 2021 as an offensive quality control coach and spent the past two seasons as the assistant offensive line coach. Mahaffey came to Green Bay after coaching in college from 2013-20. The former tight end/fullback at Northern Iowa (2007-10) spent the 2019-20 seasons at his alma mater as the offensive coordinator. Mahaffey also worked as the recruiting coordinator/tight ends (2013) and co-offensive coordinator/wide receivers (2016) at UNI. Between those stints, he was a graduate assistant-wide receivers coach at Notre Dame (2014-15) and the tight ends coach at Western Kentucky (2017-18).
- ▶ **Sean Duggan** (DUG-an) joined the Packers as a defensive assistant after spending the last four years at his alma mater, Boston College, first as linebackers coach (2020-22) before adding co-defensive coordinator to his duties in 2023. Current Packers LB Isaiah McDuffie played under Duggan in 2020, ranking No. 5 in the country in tackles (107) to earn second-team All-ACC honors. Prior to his time coaching at Boston College, Duggan was a defensive graduate assistant at Ohio State (2019), and coached linebackers at UMass (2018) and at the University of Hawaii (2016-17).
- ▶ **Eddie Gordon** was hired as assistant offensive line coach after spending last year as the offensive line coach at the University of Alabama at Birmingham, where he helped the Blazers set a single-season record for total offense with an average of 450.0 yards per game. He spent the previous four years at the University of Georgia, first as a graduate assistant in 2019-21 and then as an offensive quality control coach in 2022. He was part of a staff that helped the Bulldogs go 29-1 and win back-to-back national championships in 2021 and 2022. Prior to joining Georgia, Gordon spent two seasons (2017-18) at his alma mater, Louisiana, where he played center from 2014-16.
- ▶ **Sean Mannion** was brought in as an offensive assistant. He played quarterback in the NFL (2015-23) after originally being selected in the third round (No. 89 overall) of the 2015 NFL Draft by the St. Louis Rams. After four seasons with the Rams (2015-18), he played for the Minnesota Vikings (2019-23) and Seattle Seahawks (2023). In college, Mannion made 43 starts at Oregon State, was a two-time honorable mention All-Pac-12 selection (2013-14) and set school records for career passing TDs (83) and completion percentage (64.6 pct.).
- ▶ **Vince Oghobaase** (oh-guh-BAH-see) was hired as assistant defensive line coach after four seasons coaching the defensive line at Boston College (2020-23). Prior to his time at BC, he coached the defensive line for UCLA in 2018-19. Oghobaase served as the assistant defensive line coach for the San Francisco 49ers in 2016-17. He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at his alma mater Duke (2011-12) and Ohio State (2013-15).
- ▶ **Jason Rebrovich** (reb-row-vitch), who joined the Packers as outside linebackers coach in 2022 and was promoted to pass rush specialist for 2023, was transitioned to defensive line coach.
- ▶ Green Bay also hired **Anthony Perkins** as a defensive quality control coach, **Marcus Jones**, **Todd Hunt** and **Ben Schumacher** as strength & conditioning assistants and **Myles White** as a coaching assistant (minority fellowship).

Two years after he co-founded the Packers with Curly Lambeau, George Calhoun began writing a piece called *The Dope Sheet*, which served as the official press release from 1921-24.





## OFFSEASON MOVES

Packers General Manager **Brian Gutekunst** and his staff have made numerous moves that have helped Green Bay to a 56-27 record over the last five seasons, three division titles, four playoff berths and appearances in two NFC title games. Even with a roster that in 2023 was the youngest team to win a playoff game since the merger (1970), Gutekunst and his staff still had decisions and moves to make.

- ▶ The Packers made a couple big free-agent signings in RB **Josh Jacobs** and S **Xavier McKinney**. Jacobs, a sixth-year former first-round pick out of the University of Alabama, played in 73 games with 72 starts for the Raiders in five seasons, and also started the only post-season contest he played in. He joined Emmitt Smith, Ricky Watters, Curtis Martin, LaDainian Tomlinson and Ezekiel Elliott as the only NFL players with 5,500-plus rushing yards (5,545), 45-plus rushing TDs (46) and 175-plus receptions (197) in their first five seasons. Jacobs was the only RB in the league with 1,100-plus yards from scrimmage and six-plus scrimmage TDs in each of the last five seasons (2019-23). (ZAY-vee) McKinney, a fifth-year player out of the University of Alabama, played in 49 games with 46 starts for the New York Giants and started both postseason contests he played in. From 2021-23, he ranked No. 2 among safeties in passes defended (26), according to STATS. McKinney was one of only two NFL players (S Jordan Whitehead) to register 250-plus tackles (254), eight-plus INTs and 25-plus passes defended (26) over the past three seasons (2021-23), according to STATS.
- ▶ CB **Keisean Nixon** (KEY-shawn) re-signed after becoming the fourth kick returner to be named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* in back-to-back years (2022-23), joining Cordarrelle Patterson (2019-20), Devin Hester (2006-07) and Mel Gray (1990-91). Nixon was the first Packer to earn a spot on the AP All-Pro team at KR since the position was added in 1976. Nixon was also named to the All-NFL and All-NFC teams as a kick returner by the Pro Football Writers of America in both 2022 and 2023, and in 2023 he was selected to the NFLPA Players' All-Pro team as a kick returner. He became just the second kick returner in franchise history to be selected to the All-NFL team by the PFWA (KR Roell Preston in 1998).
- ▶ Among the other players Green Bay re-signed this offseason were CB **Corey Ballentine** (BAL-en-tine), CB **Robert Rochell**, LB **Kristian Welch**, LB **Eric Wilson** and TE **Tyler Davis**. Ballentine appeared in the final eight games for Green Bay in 2022 and played in a career-best 14 games with a career-high six starts last season while also appearing in both postseason contests. In 2023, Ballentine set career highs in tackles (39), solo tackles (27), passes defended (seven) and registered his first career interception. Rochell played in nine regular-season games and both postseason contests last season for the Packers after being signed off the Carolina Panthers' practice squad on Oct. 25, 2023. He primarily played on special teams for Green Bay, tying his career high with four tackles. Welch appeared in 12 regular-season games and both postseason contests in his first year with Green Bay (2023), primarily on special teams as he ranked No. 3 on the team with six tackles. Wilson, an eighth-year player out of the University of Cincinnati, has played in 30 regular-season games for Green Bay and has led the Packers in special teams tackles each of the last two seasons (11 in 2023 and 13 in 2022). Davis, who signed with the Packers off the Indianapolis Colts' practice squad on Sept. 28, 2021, played in 31 regular-season games with one start and appeared in one postseason contest for Green Bay in 2021-22 but missed the 2023 season due to a knee injury.
- ▶ The Packers used a four-year qualifying offer to retain RB **AJ Dillon**, who ranked No. 2 on the team with 2,928 yards from scrimmage over the last three seasons

(2021-23). Green Bay also retained the following exclusive-rights free agents: T **Caleb Jones** who has been on the Packers' active roster for most of the last two seasons, P **Daniel Whelan**, who averaged 46.2 yards per punt in 2023 in his first season with the Packers, the second-best single-season mark in team history behind only Corey Bojorquez (46.5 avg. in 2021), and RB **Emanuel Wilson**, who played in seven games for the Packers as a rookie last season.

- ▶ The Packers also added T **Andre Dillard**, a sixth-year former first-round draft pick who has played in 59 regular-season games with 19 starts for the Philadelphia Eagles (2019-22) and Tennessee Titans (2023), and K **Greg Joseph**, who spent the past three seasons with the Minnesota Vikings (2021-23).
- ▶ The Packers also added a couple players from other teams via waiver claim in K **James Turner** (Detroit Lions) and DL **Spencer Waage** (WAY-jee, San Francisco 49ers).

## MEET THE DRAFT PICKS

Training-camp storylines always hover around new players and just how they figure into the depth chart. The Packers added an 11-man draft class.

- ▶ T/G **Jordan Morgan** (No. 25 overall) was selected by the Packers in the first round out of the University of Arizona after earning first-team All-Pacific-12 honors from *The Associated Press* and from the coaches in 2023 and helping the Wildcats rank No. 20 in the nation in total offense (448.0 ypg), No. 8 in passing offense (308.3 ypg) and No. 18 in scoring offense (34.6 ppg).
- ▶ Green Bay had two picks in the second round, first selecting LB **Edgerrin Cooper** (No. 45 overall) out of Texas A&M and then S **Javon Bullard** (No. 58 overall) out of the University of Georgia. Cooper received first-team All-America honors from the Walter Camp Football Foundation, AP and the American Football Coaches Association to become a consensus All-America selection in 2023. Bullard earned second-team All-Southeastern Conference honors from the AP in 2023 after ranking No. 3 on the team with a career-high 56 tackles (39 solo).
- ▶ The Packers also selected twice in third round, drafting RB **Marshawn Lloyd** (No. 88 overall) out of the University of Southern California and LB **Ty Ron Hooper** (No. 91 overall) from the University of Missouri. Lloyd earned All-Pacific-12 honorable mention in 2023 after recording 820 rushing yards and nine TDs on 116 carries, an average of 7.07 yards per carry that ranked No. 11 in the nation. Cooper earned second-team All-Southeastern Conference honors from the coaches in 2023, posting a team-high 55 tackles (36 solo), six tackles for a loss and three sacks through 10 games before an injury sidelined him for the final two contests of the regular season.
- ▶ In the fourth round, the Packers selected S **Evan Williams** (No. 111 overall) out of the University of Oregon, where he earned second-team All-Pacific-12 honors from the coaches and third-team All-Pac-12 recognition from *Phil Steele's College Football* in 2023 after leading the Ducks with 82 tackles (49 solo) and recording a career-high 4½ sacks (No. 2 on the team and No. 1 among Pac-12 defensive backs).
- ▶ Green Bay had two picks in the fifth round, selecting C/G **Jacob Monk** (No. 163 overall) out of Duke and S **Kitan Oladapo** (kuh-TAWN oh-luh-DAPP-oh, No. 169 overall) from Oregon State University. Monk earned second-team All-Atlantic Coast honors in 2023 and twice earned All-ACC honorable mention (2021-22) while also being a two-time team captain (2022-23). Oladapo earned first-team All-America honors from Pro Football Focus and first-team All-Pacific-12 recognition from the AP in 2023.
- ▶ The sixth round saw the Packers draft T **Travis Glover** (No. 202 overall) from Georgia State, where he played in 59 games with 57 starts (35 at left tackle, 18 at right

tackle and four at left guard) in five seasons (2019-23) and earned first-team All-Sun Belt Conference honors from the coaches and media as a senior in 2023.

- ▶ The seventh round brought two new players to Green Bay. First, QB **Michael Pratt** (No. 245 overall), who played in 45 games with 44 starts at Tulane and finished as the school's all-time leader in passing yards (9,602), passing TDs (90), completion percentage (60.6) and interception percentage (2.16). Green Bay's final selection was CB **Kalen King** (No. 255 overall) out of Penn State. He earned second-team All-Big Ten honors from the coaches and media in 2023 and received All-America honors from the Walter Camp Football Foundation (second team), Pro Football Focus (third team) and *Phil Steele's College Football* (honorable mention) as well as third-team All-Big Ten honors from the coaches and media in 2022.

## A LOOK AT THE SCHEDULE

The Green Bay Packers' 2024 NFL schedule will feature 17 regular-season games and three preseason games. It is highlighted by five prime-time contests (subject to flexible scheduling) on the original schedule for the 11th straight year (2014-24). Of the 14 opponents on the schedule, 10 of those teams finished with a record above .500 last season.

- ▶ With the three-game preseason schedule implemented in 2021, the Packers will alternate between hosting one and two preseason games each year. This year, the Packers will start with two road games, first at the Cleveland Browns and then at the Denver Broncos. The Baltimore Ravens will come to Lambeau Field to close out the preseason. The matchup with the Ravens is designated as the Packers Give Back Game, with a benefiting charity to be highlighted through the game and surrounding activities.

- ▶ This year will be the first time that nine regular-season games will be played at Lambeau Field. As previously announced, the Gold package will receive the ninth regular-season game this year, the first year the ninth game will be hosted at Lambeau Field. Green package season ticket holders will receive their typical allotment of regular-season games (six) and will also receive this year's preseason contest. The next time Lambeau Field hosts the ninth regular-season game, the Green package will receive that game and the Gold package will receive the preseason contest.

- ▶ The Packers will open the season in São Paulo, Brazil, marking the sixth straight year and the 10th time in the last 12 seasons that Green Bay has started the season as the road team. Green Bay is the only team in the NFL to open the season as the road team each of the last six years (2019-24). It is the first time over that span that it will be against a team outside the NFC North.

- ▶ Week 2 sees Green Bay facing the Indianapolis Colts in the home opener, marking the first time the Packers will face an AFC team in the home opener since 2014 against the New York Jets.

- ▶ Green Bay goes back on the road in Week 3 as it travels to Nashville to take on the Tennessee Titans. It is the earliest visit to Nashville to play the Titans and the second-earliest visit against the franchise (Week 1 at Houston Oilers in 1983).

- ▶ The first NFC North opponent the Packers face will be the Minnesota Vikings at home in Week 4. Green Bay has won two of the last three and three of the last five home games against the Vikings.

- ▶ Green Bay faces a pair of NFC West teams in Weeks 5-6. First, the Packers go to Los Angeles to play the Rams, who Green Bay has won eight of the last nine regular season matchups against, before welcoming the Arizona Cardinals to Lambeau Field. Dating back to 1955, Green Bay is 8-1 against the Cardinals at home.

- ▶ Green Bay will take on a couple AFC teams after that with a home game against the Houston Texans in Week 7 and a road trip to take on the Jacksonville Jaguars in Week 8. The Packers hold a 4-1 lead in the

Texans series, including wins in the last three contests and are 5-2 against the Jaguars, including wins in each of the last three matchups.

- ▶ A home game against the Detroit Lions in Week 9 will precede the bye week, which comes in Week 10 for the first time since 2012. It marks the fourth time in six seasons under Head Coach Matt LaFleur that the Packers' bye has been Week 10 or later.

- ▶ The Packers stay in the division for a matchup at the Chicago Bears in Week 11. Including a 2010 playoff victory at Chicago, Green Bay has won 25 of the last 30 meetings between the rivals at Soldier Field, including 13 of the last 14.

- ▶ Week 12 will see Green Bay welcome the San Francisco 49ers to Lambeau Field. The Packers have won seven of the last eight regular-season home games against the 49ers.

- ▶ Week 13 will be a short week for the Packers as they will play at home against the Miami Dolphins on Thanksgiving night. It is the second straight year that Green Bay has played on Thanksgiving but only the second time at home on the holiday since 1923 (Chicago, 2015). It starts a run of four consecutive prime-time games, which would be the first time the Packers have played four straight prime-time games in a single season since the merger (Elias Sports Bureau).

- ▶ The Packers start December on Thursday night in Week 14 at Detroit, where Green Bay has won three of the last five contests.

- ▶ The Packers go west in Week 15 to face the Seattle Seahawks on a Sunday night. Green Bay has not played at Seattle since 2018 and the Packers last won in Seattle in 2008.

- ▶ For the 32nd straight season (1993-2024), Green Bay will play on *Monday Night Football* as it hosts the New Orleans Saints in Week 16.

- ▶ For the fourth straight season and the fifth time in the last six years, the Packers will finish the regular season with back-to-back NFC North contests. For the second consecutive season, they will travel a state over to take on the Vikings in Week 17 and then return home to face the Bears in the season finale on a date and time to be determined.

## HEAD COACH MATT LAFLEUR

### LAFLEUR LEADS THE PACK

Head Coach **Matt LaFleur** (la-flew-er) led the Packers to three straight NFC North titles, is the only coach in franchise history to post 10-plus wins in each of his first three seasons with the team and is the only coach in NFL history to win at least 12 games (13) in each of his first three seasons (2019-21) as an NFL head coach (Elias Sports Bureau).

▶ LaFleur has led Green Bay to the playoffs in four of his five seasons (2019-21, 2023). The Packers have three postseason wins from 2019-23, **No. 7 in the NFL** over that span.

▶ Per Elias, LaFleur is tied for the **second-most wins in NFL history by a head coach in his first five seasons in the league:**

▶ LaFleur recorded his 50th career regular-season victory as head coach in his 74th career game, becoming the **second fastest to 50 wins in team history** behind only Vince Lombardi (66 games).

▶ Dating back to 2019, the Packers have tied for the **third-best** regular-season record in the NFL and have the **top mark in the NFC:**

▶ The Packers have had at least one three-game winning streak in all five seasons under LaFleur.

▶ LaFleur has guided the Packers to a 32-9 record at home (.780) in the regular season, the **top home mark in the NFL** since 2019.

▶ Since 2019, Green Bay is 24-18 on the road in the regular season, a .571 winning percentage that ranks **No. 7 in the NFL** over that span.

▶ After beginning the 2023 season 1-4 in one-score games, Green Bay won five of its last six. The Packers' six wins in one-score games **tied for No. 4 in the NFL** during the 2023 regular season. Green Bay is 28-16 in one-score games under LaFleur, a .636 winning percentage that ranks **No. 3 in the NFL** since 2019 (Pittsburgh, 37-16, .694 / Kansas City, 31-16, .660).

▶ LaFleur (23-2) tied Guy Chamberlin (23-1-1) for the **most wins in NFL history** by a head coach in his first 25 regular-season home games (Elias).

▶ 2019-21 was the first time Green Bay won seven-plus games in three straight seasons at Lambeau Field since doing it in three straight years from 2010-12.

▶ Green Bay started 16-0 in the month of December under LaFleur before a loss in Week 14 (2023), marking the **longest in NFL history under an individual head coach and the second longest by a team.** Only the San Diego Chargers won more consecutive December games (18 from 2006-09). Five of those Chargers wins came under head coach Marty Schottenheimer and 13 under Norv Turner. Other than LaFleur, the only head coach to win 14-plus consecutive December games was Andy Reid (14 with Kansas City from 2018-21).

▶ The Packers are 22-4 during the regular season in December/January under LaFleur, an .846 winning percentage that ranks **No. 1 in the NFL since 2019** (Buffalo is No. 2 at 20-5, .800).

▶ LaFleur (39-10, .796, 2019-21) passed George Seifert (38-10, .791, 1989-91) for the **most wins by an NFL head coach in his first three seasons in the league** (per Elias).

▶ LaFleur's 39 wins from 2019-21 **tied for the second most** by a coach over any three-season span in league history behind Mike Ditka's 40 wins with Chicago from 1985-87 and Reid's 40 with Kansas City from 2020-22 (Elias).

▶ LaFleur is the **only head coach in NFL history** to post 13-plus wins in three straight seasons (Elias).

▶ LaFleur tied Seifert for the **third fastest to 40 wins** by a head coach in NFL history (51 games) behind only Paul Brown (47) and Chuck Knox (50).

▶ LaFleur (33) **tied for the second-most wins** by a head coach in his first 40 regular-season games (Chamberlin, 34; Brown, 33).

▶ LaFleur reached 30 wins in his first 37 games as a head coach, **tied for the third fastest in NFL history** (Brown, 37) to reach the 30-win mark (Elias), trailing Seifert (36) and Chamberlin (35).

▶ According to Elias, LaFleur was the **sixth head coach since 1970** to lead his team to the conference championship game in both of his first two seasons as a head coach (2019-20), joining Jim Harbaugh (2011-12), Rex Ryan (2009-10), Barry Switzer (1994-95), Seifert (1989-90) and Don McCafferty (1970-71).

▶ LaFleur became just the **second NFL head coach** since the league went to a divisional format in 1967 to win 13-plus games and a division title in both of his first two seasons (2019-20), joining Seifert (1989-90).

▶ LaFleur (26) posted the **second-most wins in NFL history** by a coach in his first two seasons (2019-20) behind only Seifert (28 in 1989-90).

▶ LaFleur led the **biggest one-year win improvement** in franchise history in 2019:

▶ LaFleur is 22-8 (.733) against the NFC North, giving him the **best record in the NFC North/Central** (min. 10 games) according to Elias:

▶ The Packers' .733 winning percentage in division games is **tied for No. 2 in the NFL** since 2019.

▶ Green Bay is 11-4 (.733) in division games at home, **tied for No. 4 in the NFL** since 2019 (Dallas ranks No. 1, 14-1, .933).

▶ LaFleur's winning percentage of .917 (11-1) against division opponents in 2019-20 **tied for the second best** by a coach in his first two seasons as head coach, dating back to 1970 (Mike Tomlin, 11-1, .917 in 2007-08 / Mariucci, 15-1, .938 in 1997-98).

▶ Among head coaches who began their career since 1970, LaFleur was the **first one** to win his first seven road divisional games (Elias).

▶ LaFleur is the **only coach in NFL history** (Elias) to win his first 10 games against the Bears (Dennis Green won his first six for Minnesota in 1992-94). The 10-game win streak over Chicago tied for the longest by either team in the history of the series (10 straight by the Packers from 1994-98). Green Bay's 10-game streak against Chicago is tied for its second-longest winning streak against any franchise (15 games, Chicago Cardinals, 1937-46).

Two years after he co-founded the Packers with Curly Lambeau, George Calhoun began writing a piece called The Dope Sheet, which served as the official press release from 1921-24.



## PACKERS RETURNED TO THE PLAYOFFS IN 2023

The Green Bay Packers returned to the postseason after finishing 9-8 in the 2023 regular season.

- ▶ Green Bay (37) is tied with New England for the **second-most postseason wins in league history** (San Francisco, 38).
- ▶ The Packers are tied with the Dallas Cowboys for the **most all-time postseason appearances** with 36 each.
- ▶ The Cowboys have played the most playoff games in NFL history (67), Pittsburgh is No. 2 (64) and the Packers rank No. 3 (63).
- ▶ Dating back to realignment (2002), Green Bay leads the NFC with 16 playoff appearances.
- ▶ It was the franchise's 23rd playoff appearance in the last 31 seasons (1993-2023).
- ▶ It was the first time in team history that the Packers made the playoffs after winning three or fewer games in their first nine contests, per the Elias Sports Bureau.
- ▶ Green Bay (four) was **one of five NFL teams** to make it to the postseason four-plus times from 2019-23 (Buffalo and Kansas City, five times / Philadelphia and Tampa Bay, four times).
- ▶ The Packers are **one of five NFL teams** to score 1,100-plus points in the postseason.
- ▶ The Packers have 13 wins in playoff road games, **No. 1 in the NFL** (Baltimore and Tennessee rank No. 2 with 11).
- ▶ Green Bay (one) and Kansas City (two) were the **only teams** to win on the road in the 2023 playoffs. It was the first time since 2017 that only one NFC team won a road playoff game.
- ▶ Green Bay has played 31 road playoff games, the **most in the NFL** (Dallas and L.A. Rams are tied for No. 2 with 27).
- ▶ The Wild Card win at Dallas was the first time in **franchise history** (regular season or playoffs) that the Packers posted 48-plus points, 400-plus total yards, zero giveaways and zero sacks allowed in a game. Green Bay also became the first NFL team in postseason history to hit those marks in a game.
- ▶ The Packers (four) were **one of four teams** to play in the Divisional Playoffs four-plus times from 2019-23 (Kansas City, five times / Buffalo and San Francisco, four times).
- ▶ For the **first time in team history**, Green Bay did not allow a sack in back-to-back playoff games in a single postseason. If you include the regular season, the Packers gave up two sacks over their final five games, the fewest allowed over a five-game span by Green Bay since giving up two sacks in five games in 2004 (Oct. 24 - Nov. 29), per Elias.
- ▶ QB **Jordan Love** led the Packers to the playoffs in his first year as a starter and posted a passer rating of 108.6 in the playoffs, the **fourth-highest single-postseason mark in franchise history**, (min. 30 pass att.), trailing Bart Starr (135.6, 1966) and Aaron Rodgers (121.4 in 2009 and 109.8 in 2010).
- ▶ Green Bay became the **youngest team** to win a playoff game since the merger (1970).
- ▶ Per Elias, the Packers were the **fourth-youngest team to make the playoffs** since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger. With a weighted age of 25.58, Green Bay was the youngest playoff team since the 1974 Buffalo Bills (25.56). The other two younger teams were the 1970 Bengals (25.22) and the 1970 Dolphins (25.44).
- ▶ Green Bay entered the postseason with a combined 74 games of playoff experience, the fewest for the Packers since the 1993 team that had 67 games of postseason experience entering the playoffs (Elias).
- ▶ WR **Romeo Doubs** posted 234 receiving yards, **No. 7 in franchise history in a single postseason** and the **second most by a player with only one or two playoff games** behind only WR Davante Adams (298 yards in two games in 2019).
- ▶ WR **Jayden Reed** led the Packers in receptions (64) and receiving yards (793) in the 2023 regular season. Dating back to 1932, Reed joined Sterling Sharpe in 1988, James Lofton in 1978, Billy Howton in 1952, Don Hutson in 1935 and Joe Laws in 1934 as the **only rookies to lead the Packers in receiving yards**.

## 2023 REGULAR-SEASON NOTES

- ▶ The Packers finished the regular season with 117 explosive plays (12-plus-yard runs and 16-plus-yard passes) on the season, their most under LaFleur and their most since 2018 (120).
- ▶ Green Bay recorded seven-plus explosive plays in each of the final 10 regular-season contests (Weeks 9-18), the Packers' longest single-season streak since 2014 (10 games).
- ▶ The Packers registered at least six explosive plays in each of the last 11 regular-season games (Weeks 7-18), the second-longest streak in the NFL this season behind only Miami's 13-game streak (Weeks 1-9, 11-14). Dating back to 2000, it was the third-longest single-season streak by Green Bay:

- ▶ The Packers recorded at least five explosive passing plays (16-plus yards) in 10 straight games (Weeks 7-16), the longest single-season streak by Green Bay dating back to 2000 and the longest current streak in the NFL.
- ▶ From Weeks 9-18, the Packers ranked near the top of the league in both explosive plays (12-plus-yard runs and 16-plus-yard passes) and explosive pass plays, according to TruMedia:

- ▶ QB **Jordan Love** finished **No. 7** in the NFL with 85 explosive passes (16-plus yards) in the 2023 regular season. It was the third most by a Green Bay QB since 2000 (Aaron Rodgers, 102 in 2011 and 86 in 2018).
- ▶ **Green Bay tied for No. 3** in the NFL in 25-plus-yard pass plays in the 2023 regular season (Stats Pass):

- ▶ In Weeks 15-18 of 2023, Green Bay **led the NFL** with 16 sacks.
- ▶ The Packers ranked **No. 9** in sacks/pass attempt (8.6 pct.) in 2023.
- ▶ The Packers had three players with at least seven sacks each in the 2023 regular season, the team's most since 2007 (three players).
- ▶ Green Bay **tied for No. 11** in the NFL in QB hits (102) during the 2023 regular season (TruMedia).
- ▶ The Packers allowed 20 or fewer points nine times during the regular season, **tied for No. 10** in the league.
- ▶ Green Bay's defense allowed 34 points after giveaways (18) in the regular season, **No. 3** in the NFL (Stats Pass).

- ▶ The Green Bay defense finished **No. 9** in red-zone percentage (50.88) in the 2023 regular season and ranked **No. 4** in opponent red-zone third-down percentage (25.0, 9-36), according to Stats Pass.
- ▶ The Packers' defense **tied for No. 7** in the NFL in fumble recoveries this season (10).
- ▶ Dating back to the 2022 season, the Packers have not allowed a touchdown on an opening drive in 20 of their last 22 games.
- ▶ Green Bay finished the 2023 regular season ranked **No. 3** in sacks allowed (30) and **No. 4** in sacks allowed/pass attempt (5.16). It is the second time in the last four

- seasons that the Packers finished in the top three in the league in sacks allowed (tied for No. 2 in 2020 with 21).
- ▶ The Packers were **one of only two teams in the NFL** (San Francisco) to rank in the top six in the league this season in sacks allowed (**No. 3, 30**), giveaways (**t-No. 6, 18**) and third-down percentage (**No. 5, 47.1**).
- ▶ Green Bay finished the season with a TD percentage of 95.0 (19-20) in goal-to-go situations. That is the **top single-season mark by any NFL team** dating back to 2000.

It marked just the **second time in team history** (since 1950) that Green Bay did not punt in a game and committed one penalty/zero penalties (vs. Tennessee, Dec. 27, 2020). The Packers were only the seventh team to accomplish the feat in a game since the 1970 merger.
- ▶ The Packers finished the 2023 regular season **tied for No. 1** in the NFL in opponent drives started inside the 20-yard line after kickoffs (12), according to Stats Pass.
- ▶ Green Bay ranked **No. 3** in the NFL in percentage of kickoff returns that went 20-plus yards (83.9, 26-31).
- ▶ The Packers **led the league** this season in kickoff returns of 20-plus yards (26).

- ▶ Nixon (2022-23) joined Al Carmichael (1956-57) as the only players in team history to **lead the NFL in kickoff return yards in back-to-back seasons** (min. 20 att.).
- ▶ Nixon was just the **second player in team history** to post 750-plus yards on kickoff returns in back-to-back seasons (2022-23), joining Randall Cobb (2011-12).
- ▶ Nixon **leads the NFL** with eight games with 100-plus kickoff return yards since 2022.
- ▶ Week 10 of 2023 was Nixon's eighth game with 100-plus kickoff return yards on five or fewer returns since the start of the 2022 season, the **most over a two-season span by an NFL player since Cordarrelle Patterson had nine in 2013-14**.
- ▶ Nixon has six kickoff returns of 50-plus yards and 19 of 30-plus yards since 2022, **No. 1** in the NFL in both categories over that span.

- ▶ Love became the first quarterback to help lead the Packers to the postseason in his first full year as a starter since at least 1950, when the league began recording starts for every player (Elias Sports Bureau).
- ▶ Love's 32 passing TDs were the **fourth most by a QB in its first season with multiple starts**, trailing Mahomes (50 in 2018), Warner (41 in 1999) and Daunte Culpepper (33 in 2000).

- ▶ Love finished the 2023 regular season with a passer rating of 96.0, **No. 11 in the NFL**.
- ▶ Love posted a career-high completion percentage of 84.4 in Week 18 as he connected on 27 of 32 passes for 316 yards and two TDs with no INTs (128.6 rating). Love became the **first QB in team history** to throw for 300-plus yards and multiple TDs with no INTs while posting 25-plus completions and a completion percentage of 84-plus.
- ▶ Love's 84.4 completion percentage in Week 18 was the **second-best mark in team history** among QBs with 30-plus attempts in a game behind only Lynn Dickey at Houston on Sept. 4, 1983 (27 of 31, 87.1).
- ▶ Love joined Tom Brady (30 of 35, Oct. 26, 2014) as the **only QBs in NFL history** to have 30-plus passing attempts and a completion percentage of 84-plus against the Bears.
- ▶ In two games against Chicago in 2023, Love completed 14 of 17 passes for 182 yards, three TDs, no INTs for a 150.9 passer rating, becoming the **only NFL quarterback since 2000** to have 15-plus passing attempts with a rating of 150-plus on third down in a season against the Bears.
- ▶ Over the final eight games (Week 11-18) of the 2023 regular season, Love completed 196 of 279 passes (70.3 pct.) for 2,150 yards and 18 TDs with one INT for a 112.7 rating. He posted a 100-plus rating and multiple TD passes/zero INTs in seven of those eight contests. Love joined Rodgers (Nov. 14, 2021-Jan. 9, 2022) as the only Green Bay QBs to post 2,150-plus passing yards, 18-plus pass-ing TDs, one/zero interceptions and a completion percentage of 70-plus over an eight-game span in a single season.
- ▶ Over the final 10 games of the regular season (Weeks 9-18), Love completed 59 of 95 passes (62.1 pct.) on third down for 716 yards, 12 TDs and zero INTs for a 124.8 passer rating. According to STATS, the only other Packers with multiple such games in a season are Rodgers (eight times), Brett Favre (three times) and Bart Starr (two games in 1961). Rodgers is the only one with more than two such games in a season.
- ▶ The Packers had seven players with 25-plus receptions during the 2023 regular season, **tied for the second most in a season by the Packers** behind only 2005 (eight players).

- ▶ WRs **Romeo Doubs** and **Jayden Reed** finished the 2023 regular season **tied for No. 8 in the NFL** in receiving TDs with eight.
- ▶ Doubs and Reed were **one of four teammate tandems in the league** to both have eight-plus receiving TDs this season.
- ▶ Doubs posted a TD reception in seven games during the regular season, **tied for No. 7 in the NFL**.
- ▶ Doubs finished the regular season ranked **No. 4 in the NFL** in red-zone TD receptions (seven).
- ▶ Green Bay had three players with at least five receiving TDs this season – WRs Doubs (eight), Reed (eight) and **Christian Watson** (five) – each starting the season at 24 or younger. The only team to have more such players in NFL history is the 2020 Steelers (four), according to STATS.
- ▶ Reed became the **first rookie in NFL history** with:
  - 60-plus receptions
  - 750-plus receiving yards
  - Eight-plus receiving TDs
  - 100-plus rushing yards
  - Two-plus rushing TDs
- ▶ Reed posted a career-high 112 receiving yards on four catches (28.0 avg.) in Week 18, including a career-long 59-yard reception. He finished **No. 1 on the team** this season in receptions (64) and receiving yards (793) and **tied for the team lead** in receiving TDs (eight). Reed was the **first Green Bay rookie** to lead the team in receptions and receiving yards since WR Sterling Sharpe in 1988.
- ▶ Reed (64), WR **Dontayvion Wicks** (39), TE **Luke Musgrave** (34) and TE **Tucker Kraft** marked the first time in team history that four rookies each registered 30-plus receptions in a season. Dating back to the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, the Packers are the only team to accomplish that feat.
- ▶ According to the Elias Sports Bureau, the Packers had six rookies with at least one TD reception this season, the **most in franchise history** and the **most by an NFL team in the Super Bowl era** (excluding the 1987 strike season).
- ▶ With 64 receptions, Reed passed Sharpe (55 in 1988) for the **most catches by a rookie in franchise history**.
- ▶ Reed is **one of only two rookies in team history** to post 50-plus receptions, 500-plus receiving yards and six-plus receiving TDs in a season (Billy Howton in 1952).
- ▶ Reed was **one of only three players in the league** this season (Cowboys WR CeeDee Lamb and Raiders WR Jakobi Meyers) to post eight-plus receiving TDs and multiple rushing TDs and was just the **third rookie in NFL history** to hit those marks in a season (Ray Ramsey, 1947; Chase Claypool, 2020).
- ▶ Reed finished **tied for No. 5 in the NFL** with 10 receptions of 30-plus yards this season (Miami WR Tyreek Hill led the league with 14). Dating back to 2000, Reed recorded the **most 30-plus-yard receptions by a Green Bay rookie** and **tied for the fifth most by an NFL rookie** (Ja'Marr Chase is No. 1 with 13 in 2021).
- ▶ Among rookies, Reed finished in the top 10 in scrimmage TDs (10, **t-No. 3**), receiving TDs (eight, **No. 3**), receiving yards (793, **No. 6**) and receptions (64, **No. 8**) this season.
- ▶ Reed's 10 TDs were the third most by a rookie in team history (Eddie Lacy, 11 in 2013 and Billy Howton, 13 in 1952).
- ▶ Reed was the first Packer since Walter Stanley in 1987 to record a reception of 40-plus yards, a run of 20-plus yards and a punt return of 35-plus yards in the same season (Elias Sports Bureau).
- ▶ Wicks finished **No. 2 among NFL rookies** (min. two rec./team game) with an average of 14.9 yards per reception this season (Houston WR Tank Dell, 15.1).
- ▶ Wicks ranked **No. 2 among rookies** in first downs per reception (74.4), min. two rec./team game.
- ▶ Wicks posted four explosive catches (16-plus yards) in

- Week 15, the **most by a Packer in a game in the regular season** and he was the only Green Bay rookie since 2000 to record four explosive receptions in a game.

- ▶ Musgrave tied Bubba Franks (34 in 2000) for the **most receptions by a rookie tight end in team history**.
- ▶ Kraft registered four consecutive games (Weeks 14-17, 2023) with four-plus receptions and 45-plus receiving yards, tying for the **third-longest streak by a rookie tight end dating back to 1970**. Keith Jackson (1988) and Dalton Kincaid (2023) both had five-game streaks.

**MORE 2023 REGULAR-SEASON NOTES**

- ▶ The Packers posted 902 total yards and 52 first downs in the final two games of the season (Weeks 17-18), the first time they registered 900-plus yards and 50-plus first downs over a two-game span in a single season since Weeks 1-2 in 2020.
- ▶ Green Bay's 77 first downs over the final three games were the most in the league in Weeks 16-18 and the most by the Packers over a three-game span since Weeks 1-3 in 2020 (81 first downs).
- ▶ Week 18 was the first time the Packers had a 300-yard passer (Love, 316), a 100-yard rusher (RB Aaron Jones, 111) and a 100-yard receiver (Reed, 112) in a game since Oct. 10, 2021 (at Cincinnati).
- ▶ In Weeks 16-18, the Packers converted 24 of 38 third downs, a 63.2 percentage that was the top mark by Green Bay over a three-game span in a single season (min. 30 att.) since the 1970 merger.
- ▶ In team history, the Packers have had four games where rookies accounted for 200-plus receiving yards in a game, with all four coming this season (224 vs. Chicago in Week 18, 235 vs. Tampa Bay in Week 15, 213 vs. L.A. Chargers in Week 11 and 205 at Pittsburgh in Week 10). Green Bay is the first NFL team to have four 200-yard receiving games from a group of rookies since the merger (1970).
- ▶ The Packers' 19 combined catches for a combined 235 yards in Week 15 against Tampa Bay were the most in both categories by a group of rookies in team history (Elias Sports Bureau).
- ▶ The Packers posted season highs for first downs (28), total yards (470) and time of possession (37:32) at Minnesota in Week 17. The yardage total was Green Bay's best since Week 17 vs. Minnesota in 2021 (481 yards) and the first-down total was its top mark since Week 17 vs. Minnesota in 2021 (29 first downs).
- ▶ The Packers posted 30-plus points, 365-plus yards, 25-plus first downs and one sack/zero sacks allowed in both Week 16 and 17. It was only the **second time since the NFL merger (1970)** that Green Bay had hit those marks in back-to-back games in a single season (Weeks 1-2, 2020).
- ▶ The Packers finished 4-2 against the NFC North last season, a .667 winning percentage that tied for the best in the division (Detroit) and tied for No. 5 in the NFL. Green Bay finished 3-0 on the road against the division for the third time in the last five years, it is tied with San Francisco for the second most 3-0 seasons in road division games since 2019 behind Kansas City (four).
- ▶ The Packers are 22-8 against the NFC North since 2019, a .733 divisional winning percentage that is tied for No. 2 in the NFL over that span (Kansas City, 25-5, .833).
- ▶ With 41.5 sacks as a Packer, LB **Preston Smith** is tied with Ezra Johnson (41.5) for **No. 6 on Green Bay's all-time list**. DE Aaron Kampman holds the No. 5 spot with 54.0 sacks.
- ▶ Smith was one of 11 NFL players to post eight-plus sacks (8.0) each of the last three seasons (2021-23) according to Stathead.
- ▶ Smith posted eight-plus sacks for the sixth season since 2015, tied for the fifth most in the NFL over that span.
- ▶ With 34.0 career sacks, DL **Kenny Clark** moved up to **No. 9** on Green Bay's all-time list (since 1982), trailing LB Tony Bennett (36.0) for the No. 8 spot on the list.
- ▶ For the first time since 2007, the Packers had three players register seven-plus sacks (Clark, LBs **Rashan Gary** and Smith). It tied for the second-most players in a season in team history (since 1982).
- ▶ LB **Lukas Van Ness** and DL **Karl Brooks** each recorded four sacks, marking just the second time (since 1982) that Green Bay had a pair of rookies both register four-plus sacks (LBs Clay Matthews and Brad Jones in 2009).

- ▶ WRs **Christian Watson** and **Romeo Doubs** registered the fifth- and sixth-most TD receptions by a Packer in their first two NFL seasons:

- ▶ Love posted both a passing TD and a rushing TD in both Weeks 3-4, becoming **only the third Packer quarterback since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger** to accomplish that feat in back-to-back games (Rodgers, four times; Lynn Dickey, twice).
- ▶ Love joined QB Brett Favre (1996) as **the only Packers** to register three-plus passing TDs and zero interceptions in both of the first two games of a season.
- ▶ Love is the **only QB in team history** to throw at least one TD pass in each of his first five career starts (per STATS, since QB starts were tracked in 1950).
- ▶ Love, in his third career start, recorded three touch-down passes with no interceptions for a 113.5 rating in Week 2. Love, who posted three TD passes and no interceptions in his second career start in Week 1, was the **fourth player ever** with at least three TD passes and no interceptions in two of his first three career starts, joining Case Keenum (2013), Patrick Mahomes (2017-18) and Kurt Warner (1999).
- ▶ In Week 5, Love connected with Watson on a 77-yard pass and also recorded a 26-yard run. Dating back to 1978, Love is the only Green Bay QB to post a pass of 75-plus yards and a run of 25-plus yards in the same game (Elias).
- ▶ WR **Dontayvion Wicks** completed a 14-yard pass to RB Aaron Jones in Week 7, becoming the first non-quarterback to complete a pass for the Packers as a rookie since RB Willard Harrell on Nov. 30, 1975, according to the Elias Sports Bureau.
- ▶ Wicks led the team in Week 11 with a career-high 91 receiving yards on three receptions (30.3 avg.), with all three of his catches going for 25-plus yards. Over the last 45 seasons, he is the **only Packers rookie** through three receptions of 25-plus yards in a game (Elias Sports Bureau).
- ▶ CB **Carrington Valentine** led the team and ranked **No. 7 among NFL rookies** with nine passes defended during the 2023 regular season (TruMedia). Dating back to 2000, he was the **sixth Packer rookie** to post nine-plus passes defended and first since CB **Eric Stokes** (14) in 2021.
- ▶ In Week 11, Valentine matched his career high with a team-leading three passes defended (also Week 9 vs. L.A. Rams). He was the first Green Bay rookie to register two games with three-plus passes defended since CB Casey Hayward (2012).
- ▶ **K Anders Carlson** became the first NFL rookie to make at least one field goal in all 17 regular-season games, topping the previous mark of 15. He also passed Ryan Longwell (15 in 2004) and Mason Crosby (15 in 2013, 2018, 2021) for **the most games with a field goal in a single season in team history**, according to STATS.
- ▶ Carlson also tied Crosby (17 in 2013-14) for the franchise record for **most consecutive games with a field goal**.

## MORE 2023 REGULAR-SEASON NOTES

- ▶ Green Bay won after trailing, 17-0, at the end of the third quarter in Week 3, marking only the **second time in the history of the franchise** (per the Elias Sports Bureau) that the Packers won a game after trailing by 17-plus points entering the fourth quarter. The Packers beat the Chicago Bears, 24-23, on Sept. 9, 2018, after trailing, 20-3, after three quarters.
- ▶ Per Elias, it marked the first time a team won a game after being down by 17-plus points and not scoring in the first three quarters since the Carolina Panthers beat the Philadelphia Eagles, 21-17, on Oct. 21, 2018, after trailing, 17-0, through three quarters.
- ▶ The Packers had two 80-yard TD drives in the fourth quarter of Week 3 (seven plays for 80 yards, nine plays for 80 yards), the first time they had two TD drives of 80-plus yards in a fourth quarter since Dec. 23, 2018, at the N.Y. Jets.
- ▶ The Packers featured three running backs with 40-plus rushing yards in Week 9 (**Aaron Jones**, 73; **Emanuel Wilson**, 43; **AJ Dillon**, 40). It marked the first time Green Bay had three RBs each register 40-plus rushing yards in a game since Dec. 11, 1994, vs. Chicago (Edgar Bennett, Reggie Cobb, LeShon Johnson).
- ▶ Green Bay held the Rams to 68 yards rushing on 26 carries (2.8 avg.) with a long of 8 yards in a Week 9 victory. The week before the Packers held the Vikings to 62 rushing yards on 31 carries (2.0 avg.), marking only the fourth time since the 1970 merger that the Packers allowed 2 or fewer yards per carry in a game with 30-plus opponent rushing attempts:

- ▶ The last time the Packers held their opponent to less than 70 rushing yards on 25 or more attempts in back-to-back games was 1945 (three straight, Nov. 18-Dec. 2).
- ▶ The Packers lost two fumbles in Week 9, their first ones of the season, snapping a streak of seven straight games without a lost fumble. **That tied for the team's longest streak in the last 70 years** (seven-game streaks in 1967 and 2019-20).
- ▶ In Week 10, for the first time in franchise history, Green Bay had three rookies (**Wen Jayden Reed**, five for 84 / **TE Luke Musgrave**, two for 64 / **Wicks**, three for 51) each post 50-plus receiving yards, per the Elias Sports Bureau.
- ▶ According to the Elias Sports Bureau, the 2023 Packers (Weeks 10-11) and the 2017 Jaguars (Weeks 15-16) are the only **two times** in the Super Bowl era that a team has had rookies account for 200-plus receiving yards in back-to-back games.
- ▶ The 27 points scored by the Packers in Week 13 were the most allowed by the Chiefs in a game during the 2023 regular and postseason. It snapped Kansas City's streak of not allowing more than 24 points in a game in 15 straight contests dating back to last season, its longest streak since a 19-game streak in 1997-98.
- ▶ Green Bay has won 11 consecutive games at Lambeau Field against AFC West teams dating back to 2003. That is the longest home winning streak by an NFL team against AFC West clubs since 2002, besting the Chiefs' nine-game streak from 2015-18 and the Patriots' nine-game streak from 2007-14.
- ▶ The Packers are 9-2 (.818) at Lambeau Field against AFC teams under Head Coach **Matt LaFleur**.
- ▶ In two games against Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes (2021 and 2023), the Packers have limited him to a 76.8 passer rating, his **lowest vs. any team in the NFL that he has started against multiple times**. Green Bay is the only NFL team to limit him to a QB rating of less than 80 in back-to-back games.
- ▶ The Packers posted 375-plus yards in five consecutive games (Weeks 9-13), their longest single-season streak since a five-game streak in 2013 (Weeks 1-3, 5-6).
- ▶ Green Bay posted 375-plus total yards and no turnovers in three consecutive games (Weeks 11-13) for the second time in franchise history (2021, Weeks 11-13).

- ▶ On Thanksgiving at Detroit, QB **Jordan Love** became the **first Green Bay quarterback** with a pass of 50-plus yards (53) and a run of 35-plus yards (37) in a game since Brett Favre vs. Tennessee on Dec. 20, 1998.
- ▶ Love posted a career-high 322 passing yards in Week 11, the **most passing yards** by a Green Bay QB since Aaron Rodgers registered 341 yards vs. Chicago on Dec. 12, 2021.
- ▶ Love's 879 passing yards from Week 10-12 were the **fourth most in the NFL over that span**.
- ▶ Love had five pass plays of at least 25 yards at Pittsburgh in Week 10, **matching the most by any Packers quarterback in a road game in the last 20 seasons**.
- ▶ The Packers did not allow more than 24 points in a game in nine straight contests (Week 5, Weeks 7-14), their longest single-season streak since a nine-game streak in 2010.
- ▶ From Week 11-15, Love completed 128 of 186 passes for 1,359 yards, 11 TDs and one INT for a 107.3 passer rating. Since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, Love is **one of only two Green Bay quarterbacks** to complete 125-plus passes for 1,350-plus passing yards with 11-plus passing TDs and one/zero INTs over a five-game span during a single season. Aaron Rodgers (four times in 2021) is the only other Packers QB to accomplish that feat since 1970.
- ▶ Green Bay registered a goal-to-go touchdown efficiency of 95.0 percent, the **best single season mark in league history** (TruMedia).
- ▶ The Packers played in eight games decided by four points or less during the 2023 regular season (3-5). According to STATS, it was the most such games in a single season by the Packers since they played in eight in 2010 (2-6 in those games).

## 2023 HONORS

- ▶ CB **Keisean Nixon** was named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* at kick returner. He became the fourth kick returner to receive AP honors in back-to-back years, joining Cordarrelle Patterson (2019-20), Devin Hester (2006-07) and Mel Gray (1990-91).
- ▶ Nixon was also named to the All-NFL team as a kick returner by the Pro Football Writers of America and to the NFLPA Players' All-Pro team as a kick returner.
- ▶ DL **Kenny Clark** was named to the Pro Bowl Games, replacing San Francisco 49ers DL Javon Hargrave, who was unable to participate due to the Super Bowl.
- ▶ It was Clark's third trip to the Pro Bowl after being an original selection in 2021 and an injury replacement in 2019. He was also named an alternate in 2018.
- ▶ Clark joins Henry Jordan (1960-61, 1963, 1966) as the only Packers defensive tackles to make three-plus Pro Bowls.
- ▶ QB **Jordan Love** earned NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors for the final two weeks of the regular season after leading the Packers to wins over the Vikings and Bears. It was the first player of the week honors of his career.
- ▶ Love was the second Packers player to win any of the league's weekly awards (offense, defense, special teams) in back-to-back weeks since their inception in 1984, joining WR Don Beebe, who in 1996 won the special teams award in Week 6 and the offensive award in Week 7.
- ▶ Love became the fourth Packer QB to earn the honor at least two times (Don Majkowski, twice / Brett Favre, 12 times / Aaron Rodgers, 19 times)
- ▶ Love was one of two players this season to win any of the league's weekly awards in consecutive weeks, joining Browns P Dustin Hopkins (AFC special teams, Weeks 6-7).
- ▶ The last quarterbacks to win either conference's offensive award in back-to-back weeks were Philadelphia's Jalen Hurts (Weeks 12-13, 2022) and Buffalo's Josh Allen (Weeks 5-6, 2022).
- ▶ Love is the first Utah State quarterback to win OPOW twice.
- ▶ Love was also voted FedEx Air NFL Player of the Week for Week 18.

## BREAKING DOWN THE ROSTER

The Packers have a 90-man roster that is composed of 42 offensive players, 43 defensive players and five specialists.

- ▶ Of the 90 players on Green Bay's roster, 44 of them (48.8 percent) were draft picks of the Packers.
- ▶ Green Bay has 11 players that were drafted in the first round and nine were selected by the Packers.
- ▶ Green Bay has 36 players on the roster that began their careers as undrafted free agents.
- ▶ 58.9 percent of the players (53 of 90) on Green Bay's roster entered the league as a sixth-round or seventh-round pick or as an undrafted player.
- ▶ Of the 90 players on the roster, 86 of them (95.6

- percent) are 28 years old or younger (as of Aug. 5) and 47 players (52.2 percent) are 24 years old or younger.
- ▶ Of the 90 players on the roster, 60 of them (66.7 percent) played collegiately in the "Power Five" conferences (ACC, Big 10, Big 12, Pac-12 and SEC).
- ▶ The Big Ten and the SEC are the conferences most represented on the roster with 19 players each while the ACC is next with 11.

## TRAINING-CAMP MEDIA INFORMATION & POLICIES

### TRAINING-CAMP PRACTICE ACCESS

- ▶ All public practices are open in their entirety to credentialed media. Photography (video and still) will be limited to certain periods and areas during training camp.

### VIDEO/PHOTO POLICY

- ▶ The team reserves the right to limit photography to certain periods for competitive reasons.
- ▶ During practice periods in which B-roll and still photography are NOT permitted, the media may not utilize camera phones either. The communications staff will alert the media of the permissible "shooting" periods before and during each practice.
- ▶ Video of practice and interviews by an individual or media outlet can be posted on social-media sites in compliance with the NFL online-content policy.
- ▶ No live-streaming or live broadcast of practice, interviews or press conferences is permitted by an individual or media outlet at any time on any platform.
- ▶ Tripods are not allowed to be used while filming from the sideline.

### INJURY-FOOTAGE POLICY

- ▶ Again this season, the Packers respectfully ask all photographers (video and still) to follow guidelines related to shooting injured players.
- ▶ No shooting/filming injured players that are rehabbing on and around the practice fields.
- ▶ Photographers are asked to avoid filming, photographing, printing and/or airing any shots of any injury situation, while the injury occurs, while trainers attend to/treat the injured player, and while the player is leaving the field, either on his own or with aid. This includes minor injuries.
- ▶ The team will allow shots of players after they've been treated. For instance, cameras are allowed to shoot a player on the sideline with ice on his knee, after trainers have left.
- ▶ However, cameras are not allowed to film a player on crutches, either on the field or in the locker room.
- ▶ If outlets choose not to respect this policy — or any other policy — the team will have no choice but to consider limiting access to the field.

### BLOGGING/TWITTER POLICY

- ▶ During training camp, "X/Twitter, blogging" is allowed during practices, but the Packers would ask that members of the media utilizing the technology adhere to a few simple guidelines. Please note that this policy is for training-camp practices only and does change during the regular season.
- ▶ NO entries about specific schemes, personnel groupings or anything that might be related in any way to game planning. If you have ANY questions about this, please ask a member of the Packers' communications staff before posting.
- ▶ NO entries regarding "football communications," including specific exchanges between coaches and players that might be overheard. Acknowledgement that the conversation occurred is acceptable, but we ask that the details of the conversation be withheld.
- ▶ NO detailed speculation as to the potential nature or severity of an injury until Head Coach Matt LaFleur has addressed it. Once again, acknowledging that an injury occurred and providing general details (i.e., "Right leg..." or "Left wrist...") is permitted, but anything beyond that would be purely speculative and possibly inaccurate.
- ▶ The team would like to continue to keep training-camp practices open to those wishing to utilize blogs

and/or Twitter, but such a policy is contingent upon media adhering to the guidelines above. If there are ANY questions regarding what is or is not acceptable, please contact a member of the Packers' communications department.

### PRIVATE TEAM COMMUNICATION

- ▶ The Packers ask all media, print and electronic, to refrain from reporting or recording any team communication meant solely for the team.
- ▶ This includes the post-practice team huddle, in which LaFleur addresses his players. It also includes mid-practice and/or post-practice communication between any coach and his players, especially conversations of a reprimanding, negative nature.
- ▶ In general, reporting that the conversation took place is acceptable, just not the details of those conversations. Details are not to be relayed to the public either directly (through firsthand hearing), or indirectly (through interviews, even if the subject answers the question).
- ▶ If media has any question as to whether communication should be kept private, please contact the communications department before writing or airing such conversations.

### INJURY INFORMATION

- ▶ All injury information will be issued by Head Coach Matt LaFleur. Please do not address injury questions to another coach or staff member.

### NFL ONLINE-CONTENT POLICY

- ▶ Accredited Organizations may supplement its traditional media distribution platform (e.g., newspaper, television, radio) with other new media distribution platforms that it controls (e.g., websites, official social media accounts, applications, podcasts), provided that, with respect to such new media distribution platforms: (i) any use of film or video or digital still images is limited to a reasonable amount or number (as applicable), and used only to illustrate or support news and editorial coverage of the Game or Event (as opposed to use in connection with or on commercial products (e.g., apparel, posters, commemorative programs, or other types of souvenir or other merchandise, or sponsored content) purposes; (ii) any use of film or video or digital still images is not used to create Simulated Video of game action; (iii) no video of game action is used (except that, if the Accredited Organization is a television broadcaster, Game or Event highlights may be shown as part of a single, non-archived, online "simulcast" of any regularly scheduled television news programming the Accredited Organization may broadcast, provided it adheres to the limits on such broadcasts set forth below); and (iv) use of non-game audio and video content obtained as a result of credentialed card access (e.g., press conferences, training camp, practice and/or interviews at NFL venues or events): (1) must be limited to 90 seconds maximum per day (180 seconds maximum -- 90 seconds per Member Club -- in two-Member Club markets), (2) may not be posted or streamed "live" or in real time in any form or medium and may not be archived (i.e., made available for on-demand public access for more than 24 hours after posting, etc.), (3) may appear only in an editorial context (i.e., no sponsorship, merchandising or advertising integrated with or around the content, including digital advertising, etc.), and (4) must be accompanied by links back to NFL.com and to the applicable Member Club's web site.
