PRESEASON GAME 1

PACKERS FACE JETS IN PRESEASON OPENER

The Packers will host the New York Jets at Lambeau Field on Saturday at 7 p.m. in the first preseason game, presented by Cenex. 

- ▶ The Packers open the preseason at home for the first time since 2021.
- ▶ This will be the 10th preseason meeting between the Packers and Jets, with Green Bay holding a 6-3 (.667) advantage in the series.
- ▶ The Jets and Packers last met in the preseason in 2021, a 23-14 New York victory at Lambeau.
- ▶ It is the third consecutive year that the Packers will open the preseason against an AFC opponent (at Cleveland in 2024 and at Cincinnati in 2023).
- ▶ The Packers have gone 2-1 in the preseason each of the last two years.
- ▶ Following the first preseason game, Green Bay will hold a public practice on Tuesday, Aug. 12, before going to Indianapolis, where it will have a joint practice (Aug. 14) before facing the Colts on Saturday, Aug. 16, at 12 p.m. CT.

WITH THE CALL

- ▶ Flagship by Milwaukee's WTMJ-TV and in conjunction with WGBA-TV in Green Bay, Packers preseason games are televised over a 22-station network throughout the state of Wisconsin, Upper Michigan and northeastern Minnesota, Peoria in Illinois, Cedar Rapids-Waterloo, Davenport and Des Moines in Iowa, Omaha in Nebraska, St. Louis in Missouri, Bismarck, Fargo and Minot in North Dakota, Sioux Falls in South Dakota and Anchorage and Fairbanks and Juneau in Alaska. All preseason games will also be broadcast on TELEMUNDO.
- ▶ The top-notch broadcast team includes CBS's **Kevin Harlan** (play-by-play) alongside former Green Bay fullback **John Kuhn** (analyst) with **Ashley Washburn** of WTMJ-TV serving as the sideline reporter. Washburn will also host an informative half-hour pregame show.

- ▶ All Packers games can be heard on the Packers Radio Network, which is made up of 54 stations in Wisconsin, Michigan, Minnesota, Illinois and North and South Dakota. 97.3 The Game – WRNW-Milwaukee begins

its fourth season as the flagship station of the Packers Radio Network. For a map and full listing of radio affiliates, go to packers.com/video/radio-network. **Wayne Larrivee** (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler **Larry McCarren** (analyst) call the action. McCarren first joined the team's broadcasts in 1995 and enters his 31st season calling Packers games. After originally being paired together in 1999, McCarren and Larrivee enter their 27th season of broadcasts together. They surpassed Jim Irwin and Max McGee for the most regular-season and postseason games broadcast for the Packers with 313 at the 2018 season opener against Chicago.

MATT LAFLEUR...In his seventh season as the Packers' 15th head coach.

► Is in his 17th season in the NFL, having previously served as an offensive coordinator for two seasons (Los Angeles Rams, 2017; Tennessee Titans, 2018), a quarterbacks coach for six seasons (Washington Redskins, 2010-13; Atlanta Falcons, 2015-16), and an offensive assistant for two seasons (Houston Texans, 2008-09).

► In his first six seasons leading the Packers, has authored one of the greatest starts to a head-coaching career in NFL history. Per the Elias Sports Bureau, his 67 wins are the second most in league history by a head coach in his first six seasons in the NFL, trailing only George Seifert (75 in 1989-94). Green Bay's 67-33 regular-season record since 2019 is No. 4 in the NFL and ranks No. 1 in the NFC.

► Became the first coach in NFL history to post 13-plus wins in three straight seasons and his 39 wins from 2019-21 passed Seifert (38) for the most wins by an NFL head coach in his first three seasons in the league (Elias). His 39 wins are also tied for the second most by a coach over any three-season span in league history, trailing only Andy Reid's 40 wins with the Kansas City Chiefs from 2020-22 and Mike Ditka's 40 wins with the Chicago Bears from 1985-87 (Elias).

► Led Green Bay to the playoffs last season for the fifth time in six years (tied for No. 3 in the NFL over that span), guiding the two youngest playoff teams in the NFL over the past 45 seasons in 2023 (weighted age of 25.25) and 2024 (25.72).

► In his first season leading the Packers in 2019, became the first coach in club history to guide the team to the playoffs in his debut season. Also led the largest one-year win improvement in team history (plus-seven wins).

AARON GLENN...In his first season as the Jets' 22nd head coach.

► Is in his 12th season as an NFL coach, having previously spent two seasons with the Cleveland Browns (2014-15), five seasons with the New Orleans Saints (2016-20) and four seasons with the Detroit Lions as defensive coordinator (2021-24).

► During his four seasons in Detroit, helped guide the Lions to two NFL North titles and an appearance in the NFC Championship game.

► In his final season in Detroit, helped the defense finish in the top 10 in scoring defense and takeaways, and the Lions finished first in point differential.

THE PACKERS-JETS SERIES

► The teams first met in the 1973 season opener, a 23-7 Green Bay victory in Milwaukee. Since then, the Jets have won nine of 13.

► The Packers and Jets combined to win the first three Super Bowls in NFL history, with Green Bay winning the first two and the Jets winning Super Bowl III.

► The only shutout in the series occurred on Oct. 31, 2010, as the Packers won, 9-0, their first road shutout since 1991.

► The Jets own the longest winning streak in the series, winning five consecutive games from 1979-91.

► Packers QB Aaron Rodgers completed 26 of 41 passes for 246 yards and a touchdown.

► Green Bay TE Robert Tonyan recorded a career-high 10 receptions for 90 yards (9.0 avg.).

► Packers WR Allen Lazard hauled in a 25-yard touchdown pass from Rodgers in the third quarter and finished with four receptions for 76 yards (19.0 avg.).

► Jets RB Breece Hall led the team with 20 carries for 116 yards and a touchdown.

COACHING-STAFF CHANGES

Throughout the offseason, Head Coach **Matt LaFleur** made some changes and adjustments to the coaching staff.

► **DeMarcus Covington** joins the Packers as defensive line/run game coordinator. He enters his ninth NFL season after working for the New England Patriots for the past eight seasons. Covington worked in multiple roles for the Patriots in his time there, first as a coaching assistant in 2017-18, then outside linebackers coach in 2019, followed by defensive line coach from 2020-23 and then defensive coordinator last season. While Covington was a position coach and defensive coordinator from 2019-24, New England ranked in the top five in the NFL in total defense (No. 3, 317.9 ypg), passing defense (No. 3, 204.4 ypg), yards allowed per play (No. 2, 5.1), first downs allowed per game (No. 2, 18.8), interceptions (No. 2, 102), interception percentage (No. 2, 3.1) and third-down defense (No. 2, 37.0 pct.). Prior to his time in the NFL, the former Samford University wide receiver was a graduate assistant at the University of Alabama-Birmingham (2012) and Ole Miss (2013-14), coached the defensive line at the University of Tennessee-Martin (2015) and was the co-defensive coordinator/defensive line coach at Eastern Illinois (2016).

► **Sean Duggan** (DUG-an) was promoted to linebackers coach in his second season with Green Bay after working as a defensive assistant for the Packers last year. He came to Green Bay after spending the previous four years at his alma mater, Boston College, first as linebackers coach (2020-22) before adding co-defensive coordinator to his duties in 2023. Prior to his time coaching at Boston College, Duggan was a defensive graduate assistant at Ohio State (2019) and coached linebackers at UMass (2018) and at the University of Hawaii (2016-17). He began his coaching career as a defensive graduate assistant at Boston College. As a player at BC, Duggan appeared in 45 career games and was a captain in 2014.

► **Luke Getsy** returns to the Packers as a senior assistant after being a consultant for Green Bay for part of last season. He originally joined the Packers as an offensive quality control coach (2014-15) and would go on to coach wide receivers (2016-17) and quarterbacks (2019-21), and added passing game coordinator (2020-21) to his positional duties. In his time between stints with Green Bay, Getsy was the offensive coordinator/wide receivers coach for Mississippi State (2018) and the offensive coordinator for the Chicago Bears (2022-23) and Las Vegas Raiders (2024). Prior to his first stint with the Packers, he coached on the collegiate level for seven seasons (2007-13). After his playing career at the University of Pittsburgh and the University of Akron, Getsy was a graduate assistant for the Zips (2007-08). In 2009, he was the offensive coordinator at West Virginia Wesleyan. Getsy returned to Pitt to serve as an offensive graduate assistant in 2010. From 2011-12, he was the offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach at Indiana University of Pennsylvania, and in 2013, Getsy was the wide receivers coach at Western Michigan.

► **Sean Mannion**, who was brought in as an offensive assistant last season, has been promoted to quarterbacks coach. He played quarterback in the NFL for nine seasons (2015-23) after originally being selected in the third round (No. 89 overall) of the 2015 NFL Draft by the St. Louis Rams. After four seasons with the Rams (2015-18), he played for the Minnesota Vikings (2019-23) and Seattle Seahawks (2023). Overall, he saw action in 14 games with three starts in his pro career. In college, Mannion made 43 starts at Oregon State, completing 1,187 of 1,838 passes (64.6 pct.) for 13,600 yards and 83 touchdowns. The two-time honorable mention All-Pacific-12 selection (2013-14) set school records for career passing TDs and completion percentage while ranking No. 2 in conference history in passing yards. In 2013, Mannion was tied for No. 4 in the nation in passing TDs (37) and ranked No. 2 in the country with 4,662 yards, a Pac-12 record.

► **Jeremiah Kolone** (ka-low-nay) joins the Packers as an offensive assistant (minority fellowship). He came to Green Bay after a short time as an offensive analyst at the University of Central Florida (2025) and a season as an offensive graduate assistant at the University of Arizona (2024). As a player, the former offensive lineman was originally signed as an undrafted free agent out of San Jose State by the Los Angeles Rams in 2018. Kolone spent time on the Rams' practice squad and active roster (2018-22), appearing in five games with two starts in 2022.

► **Jeff Koonz** comes to Green Bay as a defensive assistant after a long collegiate coaching career, including the past five seasons (2020-24) at West Virginia University as the special teams coordinator and inside linebackers coach. He also worked as the defensive coordinator for the Mountaineers for the last part of the 2024 season. Koonz came to West Virginia after serving as the inside linebackers coach at Ole Miss for the 2019 season. Prior to that, he spent two years coaching the linebackers at North Texas (2017-18), adding co-defensive coordinator duties for the 2018 season. Koonz spent the previous three years at Cincinnati, coaching the safeties in 2014 and the linebackers in 2015-16. The Walkkill, New York, native also coached in college at Louisiana Tech (2010-13), Texas (2009 and 2005-06), Iowa State (2007-08) and Auburn (2004).

► Green Bay also moved **Connor Lewis** to pass game specialist/game management and hired **Cory Harkey** as special teams quality control coach and **Jamael Lett** (pronounced Jamal) as a defensive quality control coach. Lewis is in his 10th season with the Packers, including his sixth as a coach. Harkey comes to Green Bay after working as the assistant special teams coach for the Buffalo Bills for the past three seasons (2022-24) and Lett joins to the Packers after working as a defensive coaching assistant for the New England Patriots last season, his first year in the NFL.

Two years after he co-founded the Packers with Curly Lambeau, George Calhoun began writing a piece called *The Dope Sheet*, which served as the official press release from 1921-24.



OFFSEASON MOVES

Packers General Manager **Brian Gutekunst** and his staff have made numerous moves that have helped Green Bay to a 67-33 record over the last five seasons, three division titles, five playoff berths and appearances in two NFC title games. Even with a roster that in 2024 was the second youngest (25.72) by weighted age to make the playoffs over the last 45 seasons (1980-2024) behind the 2023 Packers (25.58), Gutekunst and his staff still had decisions and moves to make.

- ▶ The Packers made a couple of big free-agent signings in **G Aaron Banks** and **CB Nate Hobbs**. Banks, a fifth-year player out of the University of Notre Dame, was originally selected in the second round (No. 48 overall) of the 2021 NFL Draft by the San Francisco 49ers. He appeared in 53 games with 43 starts (all at left guard) in his four seasons with the 49ers as well as seven postseason contests with six starts. During his three seasons as a starter (2022-24), Banks was part of a line that helped San Francisco rank No. 2 in the NFL over that span in total offense (380.1 ypg), No. 1 in yards per play (6.3), No. 3 in yards per carry (4.73 avg.), tied for No. 5 in sacks allowed (101) and No. 6 in rushing offense (135.5 ypg). Hobbs, a fifth-year player out of the University of Illinois, was originally selected in the fifth round (No. 167 overall) of the 2021 NFL Draft by the Las Vegas Raiders. He played in 51 games with 38 starts in his four seasons with the Raiders, recording 278 tackles (199 solo), three sacks, 14 tackles for a loss, three interceptions, 19 passes defended, three forced fumbles and a fumble recovery. His average of 5.45 tackles per game from 2021-24 ranked No. 2 on the team (min. 30 games played) and his 14 tackles for a loss led the team's secondary over that span. Hobbs posted career highs for tackles (86), passes defended (seven) and tackles for a loss (six) in 2023 and earned All-Rookie honors from Pro Football Focus in 2021.
- ▶ **K Brandon McManus** re-signed after ranking No. 2 in the NFL in field-goal percentage (95.2, 20 of 21) in 2024, the second-best single-season mark in team history (min. one attempt per game) and the top mark among Green Bay kickers with 20-plus attempts in a season. He also tied for No. 1 in the league last season in extra-point percentage (100.0, 30 of 30) and became the first kicker in NFL history to make a game-winning FG as time expired in both of his first two games with a team (45-yarder vs. Houston in Week 7, 24-yarder at Jacksonville in Week 8). McManus ranks No. 3 in the NFL in field goals (273), points scored (1,161), field goals of 50-plus yards (48) and extra-point percentage (97.4, 342 of 351) since 2014.
- ▶ The Packers also re-signed LB **Isaiah McDuffie**, a fifth-year player out of Boston College. The former sixth-round pick has played in 63 regular-season games for Green Bay with 26 starts, recording 206 tackles (114 solo), eight tackles for a loss, a sack, six QB hits, four passes defended and a forced fumble. McDuffie has also contributed on special teams, registering 22 tackles and a fumble recovery. In 2024, he started all 17 games for the first time in his career and recorded a career-high 94 tackles (43 solo) that ranked No. 2 on the team, a shared sack, three tackles for a loss, three QB hits, a career-high three passes defended and a forced fumble. McDuffie has also started two of the four postseason contests he has played in.
- ▶ The Packers added WR **Mecole Hardman** and LB **Isaiah Simmons**. Hardman was the only player in the NFL to

post 10-plus receiving TDs, a punt return for a TD and a kickoff return for a TD from 2019-24. Simmons was the only player in the NFL to post 300-plus tackles (308), 15-plus tackles for a loss (15), eight-plus sacks (8%), five-plus forced fumbles (eight), five-plus INTs (five) and multiple INTs returned for TDs (two) over the last five seasons (2020-24).

- ▶ Green Bay retained the following exclusive-rights free agents: **S Zayne Anderson**, who played in a career-high 16 games with two starts in 2024 and tied for No. 2 on the team with a career-high nine special teams tackles; **WR Bo Melton**, who has picked up a first down on 18 of his 24 receptions over the last two seasons, a 75.0 percentage that leads the team among players with 20-plus catches since 2023; **T Kadeem Telfort**, who appeared in 16 games and the Wild Card contest last season; **RB Emanuel Wilson**, who averaged 4.87 yards per rushing attempt to rank No. 8 in the NFL among running backs with 100-plus attempts in 2024; and re-signed TE **John Fitzpatrick**, who played in nine games for Green Bay last season.
- ▶ Green Bay also welcomed back LB **Kristian Welch**, who finished No. 3 on the Packers in special teams tackles (six) in 2023. Last season, he played for the Denver Broncos and Baltimore Ravens.

MEET THE DRAFT PICKS

Training-camp storylines always hover around new players and just how they figure into the depth chart. The Packers added an 11-man draft class.

- ▶ **WR Matthew Golden** (No. 23 overall) was selected by the Packers in the first round out of the University of Texas. He played in 36 games with 33 starts in his three collegiate seasons (Houston, 2022-23; Texas, 2024), and was one of only six FBS players to post 35-plus receptions, 400-plus receiving yards and six-plus TD catches each season from 2022-24.
- ▶ Green Bay selected **T Anthony Belton** (No. 54 overall) out of North Carolina State in the second round. He appeared in 40 games with 32 starts at left tackle during his four seasons at North Carolina State, starting all 24 games he played in over his final two seasons (2023-24). Belton earned third-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference honors in 2023 after tying for the team lead with 51 pancake blocks.
- ▶ In the third round, the Packers drafted **WR Savion Williams** (No. 87 overall) out of TCU. He earned All-Big 12 honorable mention in 2024 after posting a career-high 60 catches for a career-best 611 yards (10.2 avg.) and a career-high six TDs while adding 32.2 rushing yards and six TDs on 51 carries (6.3 avg.). Last season, Williams became the first FBS player to register six-plus receiving TDs (six), six-plus rushing TDs (six) and a passing TD (one) in a season since North Carolina State WR Jaylen Samuels in 2016.
- ▶ **DL Barryn Sorrell** (No. 124 overall) out of the University of Texas was selected in the fourth round by Green Bay. He played in 49 games with 40 starts in four seasons (2021-24) at Texas, starting his final 30 college contests and leading the Longhorns with 15½ sacks over his final three seasons. In 2024, Sorrell tied his career high with 44 tackles (16 solo) while setting career highs for tackles for a loss (11), sacks (six) and QB hurries (team-high 12).
- ▶ The fifth round saw the Packers draft **DL Collin Oliver** (No. 159 overall) from Oklahoma State, where he became just the ninth defensive player in school



history to receive all-conference honors three times (2021-23), earning second-team All-Big 12 recognition from the coaches all three of those years and from *The Associated Press* in 2021 and 2023. In 2023, Oliver was the only FBS player in the country to register six-plus sacks (six), 15-plus tackles for a loss (15%), three-plus forced fumbles (four) and five-plus passes defended (five).

- ▶ Green Bay drafted DL **Warren Brinson** in the sixth round (No. 198 overall). During his five seasons playing for the Bulldogs (2020-24), he was part of defenses that contributed to Georgia ranking No. 1 in the country over that span in rushing defense (95.2 ypg), including No. 1 rankings in both 2020 (72.3 ypg) and 2022 (77.1 ypg). In 2024, Brinson played in 12 games with four starts and recorded career bests in tackles (26), solo tackles (20) and tackles for a loss (six) while tying his career high in sacks (two). He also registered 17 QB hurries, the second most of his career (19 in 2023).
- ▶ The seventh round brought two new players to Green Bay. First, CB **Micah Robinson** (No. 237 overall), who earned second-team All-American Athletic Conference honors in his only season at Tulane (2024), setting career highs in games played (14) and games started (12) and recording his first TD on an interception return. He saw action in 42 games with 21 starts at Furman (2020-23) and as a senior helped the Paladins to a 10-3 record, a Southern Conference title and a quarterfinal-round appearance in the FCS playoffs. Green Bay's final selection was G **John Williams** (No. 250 overall) out of the University of Cincinnati. He appeared in 52 games with 27 starts during his five seasons, starting all 24 contests at left tackle over his final two seasons (2023-24).

A LOOK AT THE SCHEDULE

The Green Bay Packers' 2025 NFL schedule will feature eight home games and nine road contests and is highlighted by four prime-time contests (subject to flexible scheduling). Of the 17 games on the schedule, nine will be against teams that made the playoffs last season, including four versus division champions.

- ▶ Green Bay opens the season with back-to-back home games against 2024 playoff teams (Detroit and Washington). It is the first time since 2018 that Green Bay will play its first two games at home.
- ▶ The Packers will open the season at home for the first time since 2018 and only the third time in the last 13 seasons. Green Bay was the only team in the NFL to open the season on the road each of the last six years (2019-24).
- ▶ Green Bay has four road games in a five-game stretch from Weeks 3-8 (Week 5 bye).
- ▶ The Packers have three separate instances of back-to-back road trips (Weeks 3-4, Weeks 7-8, Weeks 15-16).
- ▶ The Packers go on the road for the first time in Week 3 when they travel to take on the Cleveland Browns, kicking off a stretch of three AFC North opponents in five games.
- ▶ Green Bay faces a prime-time road test in Week 4 at Dallas against the Cowboys on Sunday Night Football.
- ▶ The Packers will be on the bye the following week, marking its earliest bye week since 2020 (Week 5).
- ▶ Green Bay takes on the Cincinnati Bengals at home in Week 6 before going west to take on the Arizona Cardinals in Week 7.
- ▶ The Packers go east in Week 8 to play a Sunday night game at the Pittsburgh Steelers.

- ▶ Green Bay follows up back-to-back road games with two straight home games, a Week 9 contest against the Carolina Panthers and then a Week 10 *Monday Night Football* game against the Philadelphia Eagles, marking the third time playing the defending Super Bowl champion at home in the last four seasons (defeated the Los Angeles Rams in 2022 and Kansas City Chiefs in 2023). It is the 33rd straight season (1993-2025) that Green Bay will play on *MNF*.
- ▶ Week 11 brings another game against the NFC East as the Packers travel to play the New York Giants.
- ▶ The next three games will come against the NFC North over a span of 15 days. After hosting the Minnesota Vikings in Week 12, the Packers will play at the Lions on Thanksgiving, marking the third straight year that Green Bay has played on Thanksgiving, including the second time over that span in Detroit. The Packers begin December at home against the Chicago Bears in Week 14. After a road game at the Denver Broncos in Week 15, Green Bay faces the Bears again in Week 16 at Chicago on a Saturday.
- ▶ The final two regular season contests are against teams with 12-plus wins in 2024 (vs Baltimore, at Minnesota).
- ▶ Green Bay is scheduled to play on a Saturday or Sunday in both Week 17 (vs. Baltimore) and 18 (at Minnesota). If either of those two games is played on a Saturday, it will mark multiple Saturday games for the Packers for first time since 1966.
- ▶ Green Bay finishes the regular season with three of four games on the road.
- ▶ It is the first time since 2020 that the Packers are not finishing the season with back-to-back division contests and the first time since 2021 that Green Bay will finish the regular season on the road.
- ▶ The Packers and Vikings finish the regular season against each other for the first time since 2015 and in Minnesota for the first time since 2012.

HEAD COACH MATT LAFLEUR

LAFLEUR LEADS THE PACK

Head Coach **Matt LaFleur** (la-flew-er) led the Packers to three straight NFC North titles, is the only coach in franchise history to post 10-plus wins in each of his first three seasons with the team and is the only coach in NFL history to win at least 12 games (13) in each of his first three seasons (2019-21) as an NFL head coach (Elias Sports Bureau).

► LaFleur has led Green Bay to the playoffs in five of his six seasons (2019-21, 2023-24). The Packers have three postseason wins under LaFleur, tied for **No. 8 in the NFL** since 2019.

► Green Bay has four 11-plus-win seasons under LaFleur (2019-21, 2024), the **most in the NFL and tied for No. 3 in the NFL** since 2019 (Kansas City, six / Buffalo, five / Baltimore, four).

► LaFleur's 67 career regular-season wins are the **second-most wins by a head coach in his first six NFL seasons** behind only George Seifert (75), per Elias.

► LaFleur tied John Harbaugh, Mike Holmgren, Mike McCarthy and Andy Reid for the **sixth-most wins** (66) by a head coach in the first 100 games (regular and postseason, since 1970).

► LaFleur has gone 67-33 in his career as Packers head coach. Only **Vince Lombardi (73) and Holmgren (68) had more wins in their first 100 games** as a head coach in Packers history.

► LaFleur tied Holmgren, Bill Cowher and Reid (67 each) for the **second-most regular-season wins** by any NFL head coach in their first 100 games in the last 40 seasons (Seifert, 78).

► Among active NFL head coaches, LaFleur is the **second-fastest** (89 games) to reach 60 wins behind only Pittsburgh's Mike Tomlin (88 games). Among Green Bay head coaches, LaFleur is the **second-fastest** to 60 wins behind only Lombardi (82 games).

► LaFleur has the **third-highest** regular-season winning percentage among active head coaches (min. 50 games):

► The Packers have had at least **one winning streak of three-plus games in every season** under LaFleur (2019-24).

► LaFleur has guided the Packers to a 38-12 record at home (.760) in the regular season, **tied for No. 2 in the NFL** (Kansas City) since 2019 (Buffalo, 39-11, .780).

► Since 2019, Green Bay is 29-21 on the road in the regular season, a .580 winning percentage that is **tied for No. 7 in the NFL** over that span.

► The Packers' six wins in one-score games **tied for No. 4 in the NFL** during the 2023 regular season. Green Bay was 5-5 (.500) in 2024 and 33-21 in one-score games under LaFleur, a .611 winning percentage that ranks **No. 6 in the NFL** since 2019.

► Green Bay is 24-7 (.800) in regular-season games played in December or later under LaFleur, **tied for No. 2 in the NFL since 2019**. Green Bay ranks **No. 2 in the league** over that span in point margin (plus-276).

► LaFleur (23-2) tied Guy Chamberlin (23-1-1) for the **most wins in NFL history** by a head coach in his first 25 regular-season home games (Elias).

► LaFleur (39-10, .796, 2019-21) passed Seifert (38-10, .791, 1989-91) for the **most wins by an NFL head coach in his first three seasons** in the league (per Elias).

► LaFleur's 39 wins from 2019-21 **tied for the second most** by a coach over any three-season span in league history behind Mike Ditka's 40 wins with Chicago from 1985-87 and Reid's 40 with Kansas City from 2020-22 (Elias).

► LaFleur is the **only head coach in NFL history** to post 13-plus wins in three straight seasons (Elias).

► LaFleur tied Seifert for the **third-fastest to 40 wins** by a head coach in NFL history (51 games) behind only Paul Brown (47) and Chuck Knox (50).

► According to Elias, LaFleur was the **sixth head coach since 1970** to lead his team to the conference championship game in both of his first two seasons as a head coach (2019-20), joining Jim Harbaugh (2011-12), Rex Ryan (2009-10), Barry Switzer (1994-95), Seifert (1989-90) and Don McCafferty (1970-71).

► LaFleur (26) posted the **second-most wins in NFL history** by a coach in his first two seasons (2019-20) behind only Seifert (28 in 1989-90).

► LaFleur led the **biggest one-year win improvement** in franchise history in 2019:

► Green Bay is 11-7 (.611) in division games at home, **tied for No. 9 in the NFL** since 2019.

► The Packers are 12-6 in road division contests, a .667 winning percentage that is **tied for No. 4 in the NFL** since 2019.

► LaFleur's winning percentage of .917 (11-1) against division opponents in 2019-20 **tied for the second best** by a coach in his first two seasons as head coach, dating back to 1970 (Mike Tomlin, 11-1, .917 in 2007-08 / Mariucci, 15-1, .938 in 1997-98).

► Among head coaches who began their career since 1970, LaFleur was the **first one** to win his first seven road divisional games (Elias).

► LaFleur is the **only coach in NFL history** (Elias) to win his first 11 games against the Bears (Dennis Green won his first six for Minnesota in 1992-94). The 11-game win streak over Chicago (2019-24) was the longest by either team in the history of the series (10 straight by the Packers from 1994-98).

PACKERS REACHED THE POSTSEASON IN 2024

The Green Bay Packers finished the 2024 regular season 11-6, making the postseason for the second straight season and for the fifth time in the last six seasons.

- ▶ Per the Elias Sports Bureau, the Packers were the **second-youngest team** (25.72) by weighted age to make the playoffs over the last 45 seasons (1980-2024), behind the 2023 Packers (25.58).
- ▶ The Packers made the postseason for the 37th time, the **most by a team in NFL history** (Dallas, 36).
- ▶ It was the 13th playoff appearance for Green Bay in 16 years, the **most in the NFL over that span**.
- ▶ Green Bay (37) is tied with New England for the **second-most postseason wins in league history** (San Francisco, 38).
- ▶ Dating back to realignment (2002), Green Bay **leads the NFC** with 16 playoff appearances.
- ▶ It was the franchise's 24th playoff appearance in the last 32 seasons (1993-2024).
- ▶ Green Bay (five) is **one of six NFL teams** to make it to the postseason five-plus times from 2019-24 (Buffalo and Kansas City, six times / Baltimore, Philadelphia and Tampa Bay, five times).
- ▶ The 2024 Packers were the **fourth team in NFL history** to finish third or worse in its division despite winning 11-plus games (1984 Raiders, 1985 Patriots, 2020 Browns, all 11-5).
- ▶ The five regular-season games the Packers played against opponents with 13-plus wins were the most by any team in 2024. The 2024 Packers were the **first team in NFL history** to play five-plus such games in a season and make the playoffs.
- ▶ The Packers have 13 wins in playoff road games, **No. 1 in the NFL** (Baltimore and Tennessee rank No. 2 with 11).
- ▶ Green Bay has played 32 road playoff games, the **most in the NFL** (Dallas and L.A. Rams are tied for No. 2 with 27).
- ▶ QB **Jordan Love** has 678 passing yards in the postseason, passing Lynn Dickey (592) for **No. 4 in franchise postseason history**. Love is also tied with Dickey (five) for the **fourth-most passing TDs** in Green Bay post-season history. Bart Starr holds the No. 3 spot in both passing yards (1,753) and passing TDs (15) in Packers postseason history.
- ▶ RB **Josh Jacobs** became the second player (RB LaDainian Tomlinson) to post 80-plus rushing yards and 40-plus receiving yards in both of his first two playoff games (121 total, 81 rushing, 40 receiving at Philadelphia, 2024 NFC-Wild Card / 127 total, 83 rushing, 44 receiving, 2021 AFC-Wild Card, Las Vegas at Cincinnati).
- ▶ Jacobs is **one of six players** (James Cook, two / Aaron Jones, two / Cooper Kupp, two / Saquon Barkley, three / Christian McCaffrey, four) to have two-plus 120-plus yard scrimmage games in the postseason since 2021.
- ▶ Jacobs posted a rushing TD in nine consecutive games (Weeks 11-18 and Wild Card Playoff), marking the longest NFL streak since RB Ezekiel Elliot in 2022 (nine), including playoffs.
- ▶ DL **Rashan Gary** has 4.5 postseason sacks, tying Julius Peppers (4.5) for **No. 5** in Packers postseason history. DL **Kenny Clark** holds the **No. 4** spot with five sacks and LB Nick Perry is **No. 3** with seven.
- ▶ The Packers fell to 11-6 (.647) in the Wild Card Playoffs, including 1-1 under LaFleur and a 4-3 (.571) mark on the road.
- ▶ The 25 combined regular-season wins between Philadelphia and Green Bay were the most ever in a Wild Card game.
- ▶ It marked Green Bay's third-most road playoff games (four) against a single team (49ers – six, Cowboys – seven).
- ▶ It was just the second time that the Packers faced a team in the playoffs that won 14-plus games in the regular season (2001 St. Louis Rams went 14-2).
- ▶ It was a rematch of the season opener that saw the Packers and Eagles play in Brazil. It was the sixth time (2002, Atlanta Falcons / 2010, Philadelphia / 2012 and 2013, San Francisco 49ers / 2014, Seattle Seahawks) that Green Bay faced the team they opened the regular season against in the playoffs.

2024 REGULAR-SEASON NOTES

- ▶ Last season was the fourth time in six seasons (2019-21, 2024) under Head Coach **Matt LaFleur** that the Packers had won 11-plus regular-season games.
- ▶ It was the 33rd time Green Bay has reached 10 wins in a season, marking the **most double-digit-win seasons of all-time** (Dallas, 32).
- ▶ Green Bay was one of nine teams to finish with 11-plus wins in 2024. The .647 winning percentage (11-6) ranked **No. 5 in the NFC and tied for No. 8 in the NFL**.
- ▶ In the regular season, Green Bay had an average margin of defeat of 4.00, **No. 1 in the NFL** this season (Baltimore was No. 2, 4.40). The Packers' 4.00 margin of defeat in 2024 was their lowest season mark since 2010 (3.33, also No. 1 in the NFL).
- ▶ The NFC North was the **only division** to have three teams with 11-plus wins. It was also the **only division in the NFC and one of only three in the NFL** (AFC North and West) to have three teams over .500.
- ▶ Dating back to 2002, the 2024 NFC North ranked **No. 1** in winning percentage (.662, 45-23), points scored (1,766), point differential (plus-384) and turnover differential (plus-41).
- ▶ The Packers finished **No. 5 in the NFL** in total offense and total defense for the 2024 regular season. Green Bay was the **only team in the NFL** to have a top-five offense and defense this season and it was the first time the Packers finished in the top five in both categories since **1998** (No. 5 offense, No. 4 defense).
- ▶ Green Bay ranked **No. 6 in the NFL** in points allowed (19.9 ppg), **No. 5 in yards allowed** (314.5 ypg), **No. 7 in rushing yards allowed** (99.4) and **No. 4 in takeaways** (31) in the regular season. Over the last 10 seasons (2015-24), it was **one of only three teams** (2018 Bears, 2019 Patriots) to allow fewer than 20 points per game, fewer than 315.0 yards per game and fewer than 100.0 rushing yards per game while also posting 30-plus takeaways. It was just the **second time since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger** that the Packers have hit all four of those marks in a single season, having also done it in 2009.
- ▶ The Packers averaged 27.4 points per game (**No. 6 in the NFL**), 6.4 yards per play (**No. 3**) and 9.0 passing yards per attempt (**No. 2**) on the road during the 2024 regular season.
- ▶ The Packers finished the season with 460 points, the **fifth most in a season in franchise history**.
- ▶ The Packers scored 24-plus points in 13 games in the regular season, **tied for No. 3 in the NFL** behind Detroit (14) and Tampa Bay (14).
- ▶ Green Bay **tied for No. 4 in the NFL** in 30-plus-point games this season (eight), trailing Detroit (10), Baltimore (11) and Buffalo (12).
- ▶ Green Bay had five straight games with 30-plus points (Weeks 12-16), the **second-longest streak in team history** (seven in 1963).
- ▶ In their final seven games (Weeks 12-18), the Packers outscored their opponents, 58-17, in the opening quarter. Green Bay ranked **No. 3 in the NFL** in first-quarter scoring this season (118).
- ▶ The Packers had four players with 25-plus receptions, 600-plus receiving yards and multiple receiving TDs (WR **Romeo Doubs**, TE **Tucker Kraft**, WR **Jayden Reed**, and WR **Christian Watson**), marking just the fourth time in team history that Green Bay has accomplished this feat:

1983 (Paul Coffman, Gerry Ellis, John Jefferson, James Lofton)

2011 (Jermichael Finley, Greg Jennings, James Jones, Jordy Nelson)

2012 (Randall Cobb, Jermichael Finley, James Jones, Jordy Nelson)

- ▶ Green Bay (New Orleans, Week 16) was one of two teams (Denver, Week 18) to record a shutout in the NFL during the 2024 regular season. It was the Packers' first shutout since a 17-0 win vs. Seattle on Nov. 14, 2021. It was Green Bay's largest shutout victory since a 34-0 win vs. Minnesota on Nov. 11, 2007. It was the largest by an NFL team on *Monday Night Football* since Seattle's 42-0 victory over Philadelphia on Dec. 5, 2005.
- ▶ Week 16 saw Green Bay become the **second team in NFL history** to record a shutout, score 34-plus points, register 175-plus rushing yards, have 35-plus minutes in time of possession, allow zero sacks and have zero giveaways in a single game (New England, 38-0 vs. Indianapolis on Dec. 26, 1993).
- ▶ Green Bay posted 6,303 total yards on the season, the **fourth most in a season in team annals**.
- ▶ The Packers **tied for No. 6 in the NFL** this season with six games of 400-plus yards (Baltimore and Tampa Bay led with 10). The six 400-plus-yard games were the **second most by the Packers in a season** under LaFleur (eight in 2020).
- ▶ Green Bay recorded the **second-most** rushing yards and **tied for the second-most** rushing first downs in a season in franchise history:

- ▶ The Packers had 526 rushing attempts on the season, the **fifth most in a season in team history** and the most since 1978 (550).
- ▶ With RB **Josh Jacobs** (1,329) and RB **Emanuel Wilson** (502), it marked the fifth consecutive year that the Packers had two running backs post 500-plus rushing yards each (2020-24), the **longest streak in team history**. The Packers and the Lions are the **only teams in the NFL** to have two RBs post 500-plus yards rushing in each of the last five seasons.
- ▶ Green Bay posted 375-plus yards in nine games this season (Weeks 1-4, 6, 8-9, 13, 16), **No. 5 in the league** (Baltimore led with 15), via Stathead.com.
- ▶ The Packers posted 160-plus rushing yards in eight games in the regular season, **No. 3 in the league** behind Philadelphia (11) and Baltimore (12).
- ▶ Green Bay recorded 1,480 first-half rushing yards in the regular season, **No. 1 in the NFL**. Jacobs **led the league** with 846 first-half rushing yards this season (Atlanta RB Bijan Robinson was No. 2 with 781).
- ▶ The Packers had four games in 2024 with 100-plus rushing yards in the first half. Green Bay accomplished that feat four times total in the previous five seasons (2019-23). The four on the season tied for the most (2003) by the Packers since 2000.

- ▶ Green Bay allowed 22.0 sacks during the 2024 regular season (**No. 2 in the NFL**), **tied for the fifth fewest** in team history in seasons with 16-plus games.
- ▶ The Packers did not allow a sack in six games this season, **No. 3 in the NFL** for the 2024 season and their most since 2004 (eight).
- ▶ The Packers were **No. 1 in the league** this season with three games with 175-plus rushing yards and zero sacks allowed (Weeks 2, 6 and 16).
- ▶ The Packers finished in the **top 10 of the NFL** in the following offensive categories for the 2024 regular season:
 - Total Yards Per Game: 370.8 (No. 5)
 - Yards Per Play: 6.14 (No. 5)
 - Rushing Yards Per Game: 146.8 (No. 5)
 - Rushing Yards Per Play: 4.75 (No. 6)

- ▶ Green Bay joined the Ravens as the **only teams in the league** this season to **rank in the top five** in sacks allowed (No. 2, 22), total offense (No. 5, 370.8 ypg), rushing offense (No. 5, 146.8 ypg) and yards per play (No. 5, 6.14). It was the first time Green Bay had finished with a top-five league ranking in all four of those categories since 2003.
- ▶ From Weeks 12-16, the Packers allowed three sacks and turned the ball over twice. It was the **first time since the merger** that Green Bay allowed three or fewer sacks and turned the ball over two or fewer times over a five-game span.
- ▶ Green Bay posted 136 explosive plays (run of 12-plus yards or pass of 16-plus yards), its **second most in a season** dating back to 2000 behind only 2011 (141).
- ▶ The Packers' 55 explosive runs were their **most in a season** dating back to 2000.
- ▶ The Packers ranked in the **top five in the NFL** in explosive plays and explosive runs this season:

- ▶ Green Bay registered multiple completions of 50-plus yards in two games this season (two in Weeks 5 and 8). The Packers were **one of nine NFL teams** to record multiple 50-yard completions in multiple games this season (Indianapolis, three / Cincinnati, Detroit, Jacksonville, Miami, New Orleans, Tennessee and Washington, two) and were the **only team** to do it in multiple games (TruMedia).

- ▶ The Packers led the league in points scored on the first possession of the second half in two of the previous three seasons (56 in 2023 and 72 in 2021). Green Bay (58) finished **No. 5 in the NFL** in points scored on the first possession of the second half this season.
- ▶ Green Bay ranked **No. 2 in the NFL** in points off turnovers in the regular season:

- ▶ Green Bay finished **No. 2 in the league** with six games with three-plus takeaways in the regular season (Pittsburgh, seven). It was the most in a season for the Packers since 2011 (six). Green Bay is 18-2 (.900) under LaFleur when it forces three-plus turnovers.
- ▶ The Packers finished the year with 45.0 sacks and 31 takeaways, just the **fifth time in team history** (1992, 2001, 2006, 2010) that they registered 45.0-plus sacks and 30-plus takeaways in a season.
- ▶ Green Bay ranked **among the best in the NFL** in takeaways, interceptions and takeaways by fumble in the regular season:

- ▶ The 31 takeaways were the most by the Packers since 2011 (38).
- ▶ The Packers posted 31 takeaways 2024 after recording 18 in 2023, the biggest one-season improvement by Green Bay since 1998-99 (plus-18, 23 takeaways in 1998 and 41 in 1999).
- ▶ The Packers ranked **No. 3 in the NFL** in interception rate in the regular season (3.01 pct.).

- The Packers forced a turnover in seven straight games to close out the regular season, tied with Cincinnati for the second-longest active regular-season streak in the NFL (Vikings, 17).
- The Packers finished **tied for No. 3 in the league** in turnover differential this season:

- Green Bay was 9-1 this season (.900) and is 47-4 (.922) under LaFleur when winning the turnover margin.
- The Packers **tied for No. 7 in the NFL** with two wins in games they lost the turnover differential this season.
- The Packers allowed 24 or fewer points in each of their last seven games at home, the **longest single-season home streak since 2005** (seven).
- Green Bay held five of its last eight opponents to less than 20 points.
- The Packers were **tied for No. 5 in the league** in games allowing fewer than 20 points in the regular season (nine). Green Bay was 9-0 when allowing less than 20 points in a game this season and are 39-4 (.907) under LaFleur (since 2019). The Packers are **tied for No. 4 in the NFL** (Philadelphia) in winning percentage when holding teams under 20 points since 2019.
- The Packers finished in the **top 10 of the NFL** in the following defensive categories this season:

- The Packers finished the regular season **No. 5 in the NFL** in point differential per game (plus-7.2).
- Green Bay joined the Broncos as the **only teams in the NFL in 2024** to rank in the **top 10 in the league** in total defense (**No. 5**, 314.5 ypg), run defense (**No. 7**, 99.4 ypg), scoring defense (**No. 6**, 19.9 ppg), yards allowed per play (**No. 5**, 5.16), takeaways (**No. 4**, 31) and sacks (**t-No. 8**, 45), the first time the Packers had finished in the **top 10 in the NFL in all six of those categories** since 1996.
- The Packers improvement of 28.94 rushing yards per game allowed is the biggest one-year improvement by Green Bay since 2008-09 (131.56 rushing yards allowed per game in 2008 and 83.31 rushing yards allowed per game in 2009).
- The Packers were **one of three NFL teams** to allow less than 100.0 rushing yards per game and less than 4.0 yards per carry in 2024 (Baltimore, Denver).
- Green Bay allowed opponents to gain 4-plus yards on just 40.8 pct. of rushing attempts in the regular season, **No. 1 in the NFC** and **No. 3 in the NFL** behind Denver (40.6 pct.) and Las Vegas (40.7 pct.).
- The Packers were 3-1 in the 2024 regular season when allowing a 100-yard rusher, the best record by any team that had at least two such games.
- Green Bay's nine-game streak of not allowing an indi-

vidual 75-yard rusher (Weeks 9, 11-18) was its longest since 2009 when Green Bay also ended the regular season with a nine-game streak and **tied 2009 for the third longest** since the 1970 merger (including play-offs). The Packers' most consecutive games without allowing an individual 75-yard rusher since 1970 are 13 games spanning the 1970-71 seasons and No. 2 is 11 games in the 1993-94 seasons (TruMedia).

- From Week 11-18, Green Bay allowed 84.0 rushing YPG (**third fewest in NFL**), 3.6 yards per carry (**second fewest in NFL**) and no player has hit 75-plus rushing yards in a game against the Packers in that span.
- Green Bay **led the league** in points allowed in the fourth quarter (65) and was **No. 2** in scoring differential in the fourth quarter (plus-64) in the regular season.
- Opposing quarterbacks averaged 3.5 yards per carry against Green Bay in the regular season, **No. 4 in the NFL**.
- QB **Jordan Love** (2023-24) became the fourth Packers QB in franchise history to throw for 25-plus touchdowns in consecutive seasons (Aaron Rodgers, Brett Favre, Lynn Dickey).
- Love was **one of two NFL players** (Jared Goff) with 25-plus TD passes and a 95-plus rating in each of the past two regular seasons (2023-24).
- Love has posted a passer rating of 105-plus in 16 of his 33 career starts, **tied for the fifth most by a QB** in his first 33 career starts (since 1950).
- Over the last two seasons, Love ranked **No. 2 in the NFL** in passer rating (110.7) in games played in Weeks 11-18, connecting on 317 of 464 passes (68.3 pct.) for 3,719 yards and 28 TDs with just two INTs.
- Love did not throw an INT in seven straight games (Weeks 12-18, 2024), the **longest streak of his career**.
- Love has thrown 173 straight pass attempts since his last interception. Only Patrick Mahomes (237) has a longer active streak among current starting quarterbacks.
- For the first time in his career, Love posted a 100-plus passer rating in five straight games (Weeks 11-15). It **tied for the third-longest streak by a Packer since 1950** (Aaron Rodgers, 12 games in 2011 and eight games in 2020).
- Despite missing two full games due to injury and parts of two others, Love finished in the **top 10** in TD passes in the regular season:

- Love finished **No. 4 in the NFL** in yards/completion (12.65), **No. 5** in yards/attempt (7.97), **No. 6** in TD percentage (5.9 pct.) and **No. 7** in passing TDs per game (1.67).
- Since the start of the 2023 season, Love has thrown multiple TD passes in 19 games, **tied for No. 3 in the NFL** (Josh Allen, Joe Burrow, Lamar Jackson) over that span (Baker Mayfield, 22 / Jared Goff, 21).
- Love posted 16 straight games with 200-plus passing yards and at least one passing TD (2023: Week 8 - 2024: Weeks 1, 4-7), the **second-longest streak in franchise history** behind only Rodgers' 19-game streak from 2010-12.
- Love became the **fifth NFL QB since 1950** to have multiple TD passes in at least 16 of their first 23 career regular-season starts (16th such game in 23rd career start). Love joined Dan Marino (19), Kurt Warner (19), Mahomes (18) and Tony Romo (17).

- ▶ Love threw multiple TD passes in nine consecutive games (2023: Weeks 15-18 - 2024: Weeks 1, 4-7), the **third-longest streak in team history** behind only Rodgers' 13-game streak in 2011 and Brett Favre's 12-game streak in 1994-95. Love (25 years old) is the **fourth quarterback aged 25 or younger** with at least two touchdown passes in nine-plus consecutive games (nine games), joining Mahomes (14 consecutive games in 2018-19), Favre (12 in 1994-95) and Marino (10 games in 1984 and nine games in 1986-87).
- ▶ Including the postseason, Love had multiple passing TDs in 11 consecutive games played (2023: Weeks 15-20 - 2024: Weeks 1, 4-7). He became the **10th QB since 1970** to have multiple passing TDs in 11 straight games (including postseason).
- ▶ Love was the **first Packers QB** to throw three-plus TD passes in three straight home games (2024: Weeks 4, 6-7) in a single season since Rodgers in 2014.
- ▶ In Week 6, Love tied his career high (Week 4 this season vs. Minnesota) with four TD passes. He became the **first Green Bay QB** to throw four-plus TD passes in back-to-back home games in a single season since Favre (1995). The performance earned Love FedEx Air NFL Player of the Week honors via a fan vote.
- ▶ Love posted career highs for passing yards (389), passing TDs (four) and completions (32) in Week 4 vs. Minnesota. It marked just the **third time in franchise history** that a Packers QB has posted 375-plus passing yards, four-plus TD passes and 30-plus completions in a game as he joined Matt Flynn (vs. Detroit on Jan. 1, 2012) and Rodgers (vs. Washington on Sept. 15, 2013).
- ▶ Love registered a 137.3 passer rating when targeting WR **Jayden Reed** during the 2024 regular season (**highest** among QB-WR duos with 60-plus targets in 2024 per NextGenStats).
- ▶ Among players with 50-plus targets, Reed ranked **No. 2 in the league** in passer rating when targeted (137.5), the top single-season mark by a Packers WR since Jordy Nelson (148.4) in 2011.
- ▶ Since 2023, TE **Tucker Kraft** (No. 3, 127.2) and Reed (No. 4, 126.6) rank in the top-five in the NFL (min. 100 targets) in passer rating when targeted.
- ▶ **S Xavier McKinney** finished the regular season **No. 2 in the league** in interceptions:

- ▶ McKinney **tied for the league lead** with nine takeaways in the regular season (eight INTs, one opponent fumble recovery).
- ▶ McKinney registered the most INTs by a Packer since CB Charles Woodson (nine in 2009).
- ▶ McKinney posted eight INTs in the 2024 regular season, the most INTs by a Packer in his first season with the team since 2006 (Woodson, eight).
- ▶ McKinney's eight games with an INT in the regular season (**tied for the league lead**) **tied for the most ever by a Packer**:

- ▶ McKinney became the **first player in team history** to record six games with an INT in the first eight games of a season. Since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, it **tied for the second-most games** with an INT in the first eight contests behind only Washington DB Lemar Parrish (seven games in 1979).

- ▶ With 85 tackles in the regular season, McKinney became the first NFL player with 85-plus tackles and nine-plus takeaways in a season since Titans S Kevin Byard in 2017.
- ▶ McKinney was the **first Packer since CB Willie Buchanon in 1978** to post six interceptions in the team's first eight games of the season.
- ▶ McKinney became the **first player in team history** to register an INT in each of his first five games in a Green Bay uniform. He was also the **first NFL player** since the 1970 merger with an INT in each of his first five games with a team.
- ▶ McKinney's streak of five straight games with an INT (Week 1-5) **tied for the longest streak in franchise history** (Irv Comp in 1943).
- ▶ McKinney was the **fourth NFL player since 1970** with a takeaway in each of his team's first five games of a season, joining Trevon Diggs (2021), Brian Russell (2003) and Lemar Parrish (1979).
- ▶ Dating back to the 2023 season, McKinney had at least one INT in six straight games (Week 18 of 2023 / Week 1-5, 2024). It tied with eight other players for the **longest INT streak since the 1970 merger**. It **tied for the sixth-longest streak in NFL history** behind only Tom Morrow (eight in 1962-63) and four players with seven.
- ▶ McKinney's seven INTs over six games (Week 18 of 2023 / Weeks 1-5, 2024) **tied for the most in the NFL since 2010** over a six-game span with Cowboys CB Trevon Diggs (2021) and Chiefs CB Marcus Peters (2015-16).
- ▶ **RB Josh Jacobs** became the **fourth NFL player since 2000** with at least 800 rushing yards and six rushing TDs in each of his first six career seasons, joining Ezekiel Elliott, Adrian Peterson and Pro Football Hall of Famer LaDainian Tomlinson.
- ▶ Jacobs, Detroit RB Jahmyr Gibbs and Baltimore RB Derrick Henry were the **only NFL players this season** with 1,500-plus scrimmage yards and 15-plus rushing TDs.
- ▶ Jacobs had seven straight games (Weeks 11-17) with at least one rushing TD and 65-plus scrimmage yards. **The only players since 1970 with longer single-season streaks** were: John Riggins (eight), Terrell Davis (eight), Tomlinson (eight), DeAngelo Williams (eight), Emmitt Smith (11) and Jonathan Taylor (11)
- ▶ Jacobs finished **No. 6 in the NFL** in rushing yards during the regular season:

- ▶ Jacobs (1,329) recorded the **most rushing yards by a player in their first season with the Packers**, passing Eddie Lacy (1,178 in 2013).
- ▶ Jacobs registered the fourth 1,000-yard rushing season of his career, **tied for the second most in the NFL** since he entered the league in 2019 (Henry, five).
- ▶ Jacobs became just the **fourth player in team history** to clear the 1,300-yard rushing mark (Ahman Green, 2001 and 2003; Jim Taylor, 1961 and 1962; Dorsey Levens, 1997). His 1,329 yards on the season rank **No. 5 in single-season team history**.
- ▶ Jacobs finished **No. 4 in the NFL** this season with 15 rushing TDs (**tied for No. 3 in team history**), passing his single-season career high of 12 set in 2020 and 2022.

- Overall, Jacobs had 16 TDs in the regular season, the **most by a Packer in his first season with the team** (Green, 13 in 2000; WR Billy Howton, 13 in 1952) and **tied for No. 7 in team history**.
- Jacobs **tied his single-game career high** with three rushing TDs in both Week 12 and 14. His two games with three-plus rushing TDs **tied for the second most by a Packer in a single season** (Taylor, three in 1962).
- Jacobs posted a rushing TD in eight straight games (Weeks 11-18), the **longest streak of his career** and the **longest streak in team history**. It also **tied the franchise mark** (WR Davante Adams, 2020) for the most consecutive games (eight) with a TD.
- Jacobs had 12 rushing TDs in the last eight regular-season games.
- Jacobs rushed for a league-high 279 yards on opening drives this season, the **top single-season mark by a Packer** dating back to 2000 (Green, 233 in 2003). It was also the **second-highest single-season mark in the NFL** since 2020 (Christian McCaffrey, 331 in 2023).
- Jacobs has three seasons with 1,000-plus rushing yards and 12-plus rushing TDs (2020, 2022, 2024), **tied for the seventh most by an NFL player** in their first six seasons.
- Jacobs is **one of seven players in NFL history** to post 1,100-plus yards from scrimmage and six-plus rushing TDs in each of his first six seasons in the league (Smith, Ricky Watters, Peterson, Tomlinson, Eric Dickerson, Elliott).
- Jacobs registered 90-plus scrimmage yards in 12 games during the regular season, **tied for No. 4 in the NFL**.
- Jacobs has posted 50-plus yards from scrimmage **21 times in his last 23 games**.
- Jacobs finished **No. 6 in the NFL** this season and **No. 6 in single-season franchise history** with 1,671 yards from scrimmage.
- Jacobs finished **No. 10 in the NFL** this season in explosive runs (23) and ranked **No. 7** in runs of 10-plus yards (33), per TruMedia.
- Jacobs finished **No. 3 among NFL running backs** with five receptions of 20-plus yards in the regular season (TruMedia).
- Jacobs has eight career games with 100-plus rushing yards and two-plus rushing TDs, **No. 3 in the NFL** since he entered the league in 2019. He **tied for No. 4 in the NFL** with two games this season.
- In Week 7, Jacobs posted the first TD catch of his career on his 212th career reception. Only RB Thomas Jones (242) had more receptions prior to his first receiving TD.
- WR **Jayden Reed** is the only player in NFL history to post the following numbers in both of his first two NFL seasons and is just the third to do it in back-to-back seasons (Marshall Faulk, 2000-01, and Bobby Mitchell, 1966-67):
 - 55-plus receptions
 - 750-plus receiving yards
 - Six-plus receiving TDs
 - 100-plus rushing yards
 - At least one rushing TD
- Reed went over the 1,000-yard mark for yards from scrimmage during the 2024 regular season, finishing with 1,020.
- Reed is the **first WR in team history** to register 900-plus yards from scrimmage in both of his first two seasons.

- Reed has 119 career catches, the **second most by a Packer** in his first two NFL seasons behind only WR Sterling Sharpe (145 in 1988-89).
- Reed became the **first player in team history** with 700-plus receiving yards and 150-plus rushing yards in a season.
- Reed (14) tied WR Don Hutson for the **third-most TD receptions by a Packer in his first two NFL seasons** behind only Howton (17) and WR Greg Jennings (15). Reed and Hutson are the **only Packers** with six-plus receiving TDs in both of their first two NFL seasons.
- Reed was the **first NFL wide receiver** to post a TD run of 30-plus yards in back-to-back seasons (2023-24) since Eagles WR DeSean Jackson and Jets WR Brad Smith did so in 2009-10.
- WR **Romeo Doubs** became the **third player in team history** to post 40-plus receptions, 400-plus receiving yards and three-plus receiving TDs in each of his first three NFL seasons (James Lofton, Jennings).
- Among NFL tight ends, TE **Tucker Kraft** finished near the top of the league in the regular season in a few categories (TruMedia):

- Kraft was **one of only two tight ends in the league** (George Kittle) to post 50-plus receptions, 700-plus receiving yards, seven-plus receiving TDs and an average of 14.0-plus yards per catch in the regular season. Kraft became just the **second Green Bay tight end since the 1970 merger** to hit those marks in a season (Paul Coffman, 1983).
- Per TruMedia, Kraft's 9.1 yards after the catch per reception was the **second-best single-season mark by an NFL tight end dating back to 2000** behind only Kittle (9.9) in 2018.
- Among players with 50-plus targets, Kraft ranked **No. 6 among all players** in passer rating when targeted (131.1) in 2024.
- Kraft (81 in 2023-24) passed Richard Rodgers (78 in 2014-15) for the **most receptions by a Packer tight end** in their first two seasons (since 1970).
- Kraft was the first Green Bay TE with 700-plus receiving yards in a season since Jermichael Finley in 2011.
- In Week 13, Kraft tied his single-game career high with six catches, and his 78 receiving yards tied his second-best mark in a game behind only his 88 yards at the L.A. Rams in Week 5 this season.



- Kraft posted 75-plus receiving yards in three games this season, **tied for the most by a Green Bay tight end** in a single season since the merger (1970).
- Kraft had a streak of 17 consecutive games with multiple receptions (Weeks 11-18 of 2023 and Weeks 1-9 of 2024), the **longest streak by a Green Bay tight end in the Super Bowl era**.
- Kraft has registered **two of the six longest catches by a Green Bay tight end** in the Super Bowl era, per the Elias Sports Bureau:
 - 10/28/1979 - Paul Coffman - 78
 - 12/18/193 - Paul Coffman - 74
 - 11/04/2012 - Tom Crabtree - 72
 - 10/27/2024 - Tucker Kraft - 67
 - 10/6/2024 - Tucker Kraft - 66
 - 10/10/1993 - Jackie Harris - 66
- Kraft became the **first Packer tight end** to post at least two catches of 65-plus yards (two) in a season in the Super Bowl era. Kraft is just the **fourth NFL tight end** to accomplish that feat since 2000, joining Kittle (three in 2018), Mark Andrews (two in 2018) and Vance McDonald (two in 2016).
- WR **Dontayvion Wicks** became just the **sixth player in team history** to register four-plus TD catches in both of first two seasons in the league (2023-24), joining Don Hutson (1935-36), Billy Howton (1952-53), Lofton (1978-79), **Christian Watson** (2022-23) and **Jayden Reed** (2023-24).
- All five of Wicks' TD catches in the regular season came at Lambeau Field. Dating back to the 2023 season, he has posted seven TD catches in his last 10 home games.
- DL **Rashan Gary** (39.0) holds the **No. 8 spot in franchise history** in sacks and DL **Kenny Clark** (35.0) is **No. 10** (since 1982):

- Gary **led the team** in sacks (7.5) and had a career-high nine tackles for a loss in 2024.
- Gary finished the regular season with a sack in five of the last eight games.
- G **Sean Rhyan**, OL **Zach Tom** and T **Rasheed Walker**, who were drafted by the Packers in 2022, all started their 17th game of the season in Week 18. Per the Elias Sports Bureau, it is the **only time since the 1970 merger** that Green Bay has had three offensive linemen drafted in the same class go on to start every game for the Packers in the same season. The Kansas City Chiefs' draft class of 1974 was the last team to accomplish this feat (T Charlie Getty, T Matt Herkenhoff and G Tom Condon started every game in 1981).
- QB **Malik Willis** became the **first QB in team history** to post a 100-plus rating in each of his first three games with the team in which he attempted 10-plus passes.
- Among QBs with 50-plus attempts, Willis passer rating of 124.8 is the **top single-season mark in NFL history**.
- CB **Keisean Nixon** was the first Green Bay defensive back with multiple sacks and multiple forced fumbles in a regular season since CB Tramon Williams in 2013.

- Nixon was the **first Green Bay defensive back** (since 2000) to post three-plus sacks and three-plus forced fumbles in a regular season.
- Nixon was **one of five players and the only defensive back in the NFL** this season with three-plus sacks (three), three-plus forced fumbles (three) and an interception (one), according to Stathead.com.
- LB **Quay Walker** averaged 5.54 solo tackles per game in the 2024 regular season, **No. 5 in the NFL** (min. 10 games played).
- LB **Edgerrin Cooper** was the **only rookie in the NFL in 2024** with three-plus sacks, an interception, a fumble recovery and a forced fumble. Cooper was the first rookie linebacker to hit those marks in a season since Ravens LB Patrick Queen in 2020. Cooper joined LB A.J. Hawk (2006) as the **only Green Bay rookies** to accomplish that feat since 2000.
- Cooper **led the team and all NFL rookies** with 13 tackles for a loss in 2024.
- Cooper (77 tackles) and S **Javon Bullard** (85 tackles) were the **only pair of rookie teammates** with 75-plus tackles each in 2024.
- Per TruMedia, Cooper is the **only NFL player since 2000** to post 12-plus tackles for a loss and 10-plus special teams tackles in a season.
- Cooper **led the NFL** in tackles for a loss (eight) in the final four weeks of the regular season (Weeks 15-18).
- In Week 17, Cooper became the first NFL rookie to register four tackles for a loss in a game since Cowboys LB Micah Parsons did so at Minnesota on Oct. 31, 2021. Dating back to 2000, Cooper was the **first Green Bay rookie** to record four tackles for a loss in a game.
- Cooper was the **only player in the NFL** in the 2024 regular season to post 75-plus tackles, 13-plus tackles for a loss, three-plus sacks, an interception, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery. Dating back to 2000, he became the **first NFL rookie** to hit those marks in a season. Since 2000, he joins LB A.J. Hawk (2013) as the only Packers to hit those marks in a season. Over the past five seasons (2020-24), he is **one of three NFL players** to hit those marks in a season, joining Steelers DL Cameron Heyward (2021) and Bears LB Roquan Smith (2020).
- In addition to being the **first Packer rookie** with a sack and an interception in a game (Week 15) since DL Esera Tualo on Oct. 27, 1991, Cooper joined Clay Matthews (Nov. 7, 2010, vs. Dallas) as the **only Packers since 2000** to post a sack, an interception, two passes defended and two tackles for a loss in a game. Cooper is the only player in the NFL to hit those four marks in a game this season.
- In Week 8, Cooper became the **first Green Bay rookie since 2000** to post eight-plus tackles (eight), a sack (one), a forced fumble (one) and a pass defended (one) in a game.
- K **Brandon McManus** ended the regular season on a streak of 15 consecutive field goals made.
- McManus connected on 20 of 21 field goals in the regular season, a 95.2 percentage that ranks **No. 2 in single-season team history** (min. one attempt per game) and **No. 1 among kickers with 20-plus FG attempts in a season**.
- McManus became the **first kicker in NFL history** to make a game-winning field goal as time expired in both of his first two games with a team (Elias).
- McManus became the first kicker to make two FGs of 55-plus yards in a single season at Lambeau Field.
- P **Daniel Whelan** finished the regular season with a 46.1-yard gross punting average, **No. 3 in single-season franchise history**, and a 40.2-yard net average, **No. 3 in single-season team annals**.



2024 AWARDS AND HONORS

ALL-PRO

- **S Xavier McKinney** earned first-team All-Pro honors from *The Associated Press*. He became the first Packers safety to be named first-team All-Pro since 2000 and the first defensive back to earn first-team honors since CB Charles Woodson in 2009. Other Packers players who received All-Pro votes included G **Elgton Jenkins**, T **Zach Tom**, K **eseian Nixon** at both CB and KR, and LB **Edgerrin Cooper**.
- Also for the first time in his career, McKinney earned All-Pro honors from the NFL Players Association following a league-wide vote.

ALL-NFL AND ALL-NFC

- **S Xavier McKinney** was named to the All-NFL team and All-NFC team by the Pro Football Writers of America, his first career selection to either team. He became the first Green Bay safety to earn a spot on the PFWA All-NFL team since 2000.

PRO BOWL

- Green Bay Packers DL **Rashan Gary**, RB **Josh Jacobs** and S **Xavier McKinney** (starter) were named to the Pro Bowl roster and G **Elgton Jenkins** was named first alternate. Other alternates included CB **Jaire Alexander**, DL **Kenny Clark**, TE **Tucker Kraft**, QB **Jordan Love**, C **Josh Myers** and KR **Keisean Nixon**.
- It was the first Pro Bowl selection for Gary, who moved into No. 8 on the Packers' all-time sack list (since 1982) this season. It is the sixth consecutive year (2019-24) the Packers have had a defensive player make the Pro Bowl.
- Jacobs earned his third Pro Bowl selection (2020, 2022) and first as a member of the Packers. He became the fourth Green Bay running back to make a Pro Bowl in the last 25 years (2000-24), joining Ahman Green (2001-04), Eddie Lacy (2013) and Aaron Jones (2020).
- McKinney earned the first Pro Bowl selection of his career in his first season with Green Bay. He became the first Packers safety to make the Pro Bowl since Ha Ha Clinton-Dix in 2016.

ALL-ROOKIE

- LB **Edgerrin Cooper** and S **Evan Williams** were selected to the PFWA All-Rookie team. The only other times Green Bay had two rookies make the PFWA All-Rookie team (1974-2024) was LB Clay Matthews and DL B.J. Raji in 2009, LB Wayne Simmons and S George Teague in 1993 and DE Alphonso Carreker and S Tom Flynn in 1984.

IN-SEASON AWARDS

- LB **Edgerrin Cooper** was named NFL Defensive Rookie of the Month for regular-season games played in the months of December and January. Cooper led all rookies in tackles per game (8.8) and tackles for a loss (eight), and recorded two passes defended, a sack, an INT and a fumble recovery in four games.
- Cooper became the **second Packers linebacker** to win Defensive Rookie of the Month, joining Nick Barnett (October 2003), and the second former Texas A&M player to win a Rookie of the Month award, joining Rocky Bernard (September 2002).
- Cooper was named **NFC Defensive Player of the Week** for Week 8 (October 24, 27-28) and Week 15 (December 12, 15-16), becoming the **first Packers rookie and the fifth rookie ever** to win Defensive Player of the Week multiple times (Nick Bosa in 2019, Brian Cushing in 2009, Kamren Kinchens in 2024 and Shaquille Leonard in 2018). Cooper was the first Packers rookie to win Defensive Player of the Week since Matthews (Week 13, 2009). He was the first former Texas A&M player to win Defensive Player of the Week multiple times as a rookie and joined Von Miller (Week 11, 2011) as the only former Texas A&M players to win Defensive Player of the Week as a rookie.
- DL **Karl Brooks** was named **NFC Special Teams Player of the Week** for Week 11 after he blocked a field goal on the final play of regulation to secure the Packers' 20-19 victory over the Bears. It was the first career Special Teams Player of the Week award for Brooks, as he becomes the first Packers defensive lineman to win

the award. Brooks becomes the third former Bowling Green player to win a Player of the Week award.

- **S Xavier McKinney** earned **NFC Defensive Player of the Month** honors for October (Weeks 5-8). McKinney was the only NFL player with multiple interceptions (two), a sack (one) and a fumble recovery (one) in Weeks 5-8. It is his first career Player of the Month honor and he is the third Packers defensive back to earn Defensive Player of the Month, joining Charles Woodson (three-time winner) and Atari Bigby (December 2007). McKinney is the third former University of Alabama safety to earn Player of the Month honors, joining Landon Collins (November 2016) and Eddie Jackson (November 2018).
- In Week 6, QB **Jordan Love** was voted the FedEx Air NFL Player of the Week by the fans after he tied his career high (Week 4 this season vs. Minnesota) with four TD passes and became the **first Green Bay QB** to throw four-plus TD passes in back-to-back home games in a single season since Brett Favre (1995).

WALTER PAYTON MAN OF THE YEAR

In early December, the Green Bay Packers announced that DL **Kenny Clark** had been named the team's nominee for the NFL's Walter Payton Man of the Year Award. The award is the league's most prestigious honor and acknowledges NFL players that excel on the field and demonstrate a steadfast commitment to creating a positive impact beyond the game. This was the second time Clark has been nominated for the award, having been previously nominated in 2018.

- As soon as he entered the league in 2016, Clark began to use his platform to make a difference for kids, families and those in need across Wisconsin and his native Southern California. Clark's foundation – The Clark Family Dreams Do Come True Foundation – focuses on empowering youth with resources and mentorship to succeed no matter their upbringing. Last summer, the foundation hosted its eighth annual Kenny Clark Dreams Do Come True Football Camp in California, providing hundreds of kids the opportunity to learn and play the game with NFL players and coaches at no cost. Clark has assembled food packages for Wisconsin families, provided 250 families in Riverside, Calif., with a full Thanksgiving dinner, and donated celebrity dinners to the Boys & Girls Club of Greater Green Bay. He has also hosted coat and toy drives so kids can stay warm and experience the joy of the holidays. Clark has also been involved in a wide variety of Packers community outreach efforts during his time with the team. Perhaps closest to Clark's heart is the work he does to support children with incarcerated parents. Knowing first-hand the challenges of having an incarcerated parent, Clark works to provide hope and encouragement to kids in similar situations.

NFL SALUTE TO SERVICE AWARD

In early November 2024, the Green Bay Packers nominated DL **Lukas Van Ness** as their 2024 Salute to Service Award nominee. Each year, the award recognizes NFL players, coaches, staff and alumni who have demonstrated a commitment to honoring and supporting military and veteran communities.

- Growing up with several family members that served in the military, including his grandfather who earned the rank of Lieutenant Colonel in the U.S. Army during his 27-year career, the importance of honoring and thanking servicemembers was instilled in Van Ness at a young age. Van Ness began to make an impact on the military community soon after the Packers selected him in the first round of the 2023 NFL Draft. During his rookie season, he connected with local veterans through a "Huddle for Heroes" event, answering questions and spending time with the veterans to personally thank them for their service. He also wrote letters to be sent to active-duty military members to encourage and empower them while on deployment. During the Packers' 2024 Military Appreciation Week, Van Ness assisted a family grieving the loss of a loved one who served. He joined them to assemble and paint a flag to honor their fallen soldier.

BREAKING DOWN THE ROSTER

The Packers enter the preseason with a 91-man roster that is composed of 46 offensive players, 41 defensive players and four specialists.

- ▶ Of the 91 players on Green Bay's roster, 40 of them (44 percent) were draft picks of the Packers.
- ▶ Green Bay has 10 players that were drafted in the first round and eight were selected by the Packers.
- ▶ Green Bay has 36 players on the roster that began their careers as undrafted free agents.
- ▶ 57.1 percent of the players (52 of 91) on Green Bay's roster entered the league as a sixth-round or seventh-round pick or as an undrafted player.
- ▶ Of the 91 players on the roster, 86 of them (94.5

percent) are 28 years old or younger (as of August 4) and 43 players (47.3 percent) are 24 years old or younger.

- ▶ Of the 91 players on the roster, 60 of them (65.9 percent) played collegiately in the "Power Four" conferences (ACC, Big Ten, Big 12 and SEC).
- ▶ The conference most represented on the roster is the SEC with 23 players while the Big Ten is No. 2 with 17 and the Big 12 is No. 3 with 11.

TRAINING-CAMP MEDIA INFORMATION & POLICIES

TRAINING-CAMP PRACTICE ACCESS

- ▶ All public practices are open in their entirety to credentialed media. Photography (video and still) will be limited to certain periods and areas during training camp.

VIDEO/PHOTO POLICY

- ▶ The team reserves the right to limit photography to certain periods for competitive reasons.
- ▶ During practice periods in which B-roll and still photography are NOT permitted, the media may not utilize camera phones either. The communications staff will alert the media of the permissible "shooting" periods before and during each practice.
- ▶ Video of practice and interviews by an individual or media outlet can be posted on social-media sites in compliance with the NFL online-content policy.
- ▶ No live-streaming or live broadcast of practice, interviews or press conferences is permitted by an individual or media outlet at any time on any platform.
- ▶ Tripods are not allowed to be used while filming from the sideline.

INJURY-FOOTAGE POLICY

- ▶ Again this season, the Packers respectfully ask all photographers (video and still) to follow guidelines related to shooting injured players.
- ▶ No shooting/filming injured players that are rehabbing on and around the practice fields.
- ▶ Photographers are asked to avoid filming, photographing, printing and/or airing any shots of any injury situation, while the injury occurs, while trainers attend to/treat the injured player, and while the player is leaving the field, either on his own or with aid. This includes minor injuries.
- ▶ The team will allow shots of players after they've been treated. For instance, cameras are allowed to shoot a player on the sideline with ice on his knee, after trainers have left.
- ▶ However, cameras are not allowed to film a player on crutches, either on the field or in the locker room.
- ▶ If outlets choose not to respect this policy — or any other policy — the team will have no choice but to consider limiting access to the field.

BLOGGING/TWITTER POLICY

- ▶ During training camp, "X/Twitter, blogging" is allowed during practices, but the Packers would ask that members of the media utilizing the technology adhere to a few simple guidelines. Please note that this policy is for training-camp practices only and does change during the regular season.
- ▶ NO entries about specific schemes, personnel groupings or anything that might be related in any way to game planning. If you have ANY questions about this, please ask a member of the Packers' communications staff before posting.
- ▶ NO entries regarding "football communications," including specific exchanges between coaches and players that might be overheard. Acknowledgement that the conversation occurred is acceptable, but we ask that the details of the conversation be withheld.
- ▶ NO detailed speculation as to the potential nature or severity of an injury until Head Coach Matt LaFleur has addressed it. Once again, acknowledging that an injury occurred and providing general details (i.e., "Right leg..." or "Left wrist...") is permitted, but anything beyond that would be purely speculative and possibly inaccurate.
- ▶ The team would like to continue to keep training-camp practices open to those wishing to utilize blogs and/

or X/Twitter, but such a policy is contingent upon media adhering to the guidelines above. If there are ANY questions regarding what is or is not acceptable, please contact a member of the Packers' communications department.

PRIVATE TEAM COMMUNICATION

- ▶ The Packers ask all media, print and electronic, to refrain from reporting or recording any team communication meant solely for the team.
- ▶ This includes the post-practice team huddle, in which LaFleur addresses his players. It also includes mid-practice and/or post-practice communication between any coach and his players, especially conversations of a reprimanding, negative nature.
- ▶ In general, reporting that the conversation took place is acceptable, just not the details of those conversations. Details are not to be relayed to the public either directly (through firsthand hearing), or indirectly (through interviews, even if the subject answers the question).
- ▶ If media has any question as to whether communication should be kept private, please contact the communications department before writing or airing such conversations.

INJURY INFORMATION

- ▶ All injury information will be issued by Head Coach Matt LaFleur. Please do not address injury questions to another coach or staff member.

NFL ONLINE-CONTENT POLICY

- ▶ Accredited Organizations may supplement its traditional media distribution platform (e.g., newspaper, television, radio) with other new media distribution platforms that it controls (e.g., websites, official social media accounts, applications, podcasts), provided that, with respect to such new media distribution platforms: (i) any use of film or video or digital still images is limited to a reasonable amount or number (as applicable), and used only to illustrate or support news and editorial coverage of the Game or Event (as opposed to use in connection with or on commercial products (e.g., apparel, posters, commemorative programs, or other types of souvenir or other merchandise, or sponsored content) purposes; (ii) any use of film or video or digital still images is not used to create Simulated Video of game action; (iii) no video of game action is used (except that, if the Accredited Organization is a television broadcaster, Game or Event highlights may be shown as part of a single, non-archived, online "simulcast" of any regularly scheduled television news programming the Accredited Organization may broadcast, provided it adheres to the limits on such broadcasts set forth below); and (iv) use of non-game audio and video content obtained as a result of credentialed card access (e.g., press conferences, training camp, practice and/or interviews at NFL venues or events): (1) must be limited to 90 seconds maximum per day (180 seconds maximum -- 90 seconds per Member Club -- in two-Member Club markets), (2) may not be posted or streamed "live" or in real time in any form or medium and may not be archived (i.e., made available for on-demand public access for more than 24 hours after posting, etc.), (3) may appear only in an editorial context (i.e., no sponsorship, merchandising or advertising integrated with or around the content, including digital advertising, etc.), and (4) must be accompanied by links back to NFL.com and to the applicable Member Club's web site.
