# EMPOWERS

Over 900 students and chaperones from across Wisconsin attended the Packers' Empower event. The Packers-funded middle school leadership conference is aimed at inspiring students to be leaders, be their best selves and create positive changes in their communities. Students heard from interactive keynote speaker, Darryl Bellamy Jr., on fearing less by embracing their fears and acting even in the face of uncertainty. They also attended a Packers alumni panel hosted by Scott Wells and Earl Dotson, took a tour of Lambeau Field and packed care kits for patients and families at the Ronald McDonald House Charities Eastern Wisconsin located in Milwaukee.

The digital course funded by the NFL Foundation is geared towards students to provide them with tools to address their mental wellbeing and interpersonal relationships on a foundational level. It consists of two courses– Healthy Relationships and Understanding Mental Wellness. In 2024, the Packers reached 1,705 students, 53 schools and contributed 1,633 hours of learning in Wisconsin through the program.

### **Character Playbook Live**

As part of the Green Bay Packers Mental Health Awareness Month in May, safety Anthony Johnson Jr. and Team Behavioral Clinician Dr. Carr participated in an insightful live panel discussion with 375 middle school students from 22 schools throughout Wisconsin. Topics discussed included social media influences on mental health and practical tips for a positive online experience.

### **Character Playbook Community Impact Project**

The Packers invited middle school students to take part in the Character Playbook Community Impact Project to create and execute a service project that directly impacted their school, neighborhood or community. Ten group project ideas were selected to receive a grant of up to \$500 to help finance implementation. The projects that received support include:

Hi-Mount Community School, Milwaukee: create a community garden.

Kiel Middle School: build a fundraising stand to utilize when fundraising and collecting donation items.

Badger Middle School, West Bend: create encouraging "lift kits" for students to give their peers if they notice they are struggling.

Poynette Middle School HOPE Squad: host an engaging "HOPE Night" to bring students and families together to talk about suicide awareness and prevention.

Seymour Middle School eighth graders: engage in small acts of kindness by visiting and playing bingo with elementary school students and residents of a local retirement home, along with creating and delivering cards for the local veteran's manor.

Harborside Academy's Pollinator People, Kenosha: plant a pollinator patch to improve water quality in the Lake Michigan area.

Gaenslen School, Milwaukee: organize a school food drive and meal kit assembly event to address food insecurity.

St. Clare Catholic School, Wrightstown: assemble "love baskets" for students with disabilities to foster and promote inclusivity.

Mineral Point Middle School: organize a district wide generosity day by pairing K–5 students with middle and high school students to create community gift bags and deliver to different organizations.

Waterloo Intermediate/Middle School: compete in the "Pirate Games" to promote community and inclusion while developing important life skills such as teamwork and sportsmanship.



This at-home reading program is offered to students in grades 4K through 5. It aims to support children reading at grade level by third grade and developing lifelong reading habits. Participants who read outside of school for 240 minutes received a Packers Hall of Fame voucher. Classrooms with 75% or higher completion rate were eligible to receive a \$100 grant to use towards literacy resources. Additionally, schools with five or more classrooms completing the program were entered to win one of five \$1,000 grants for literacy resources at the school. The Packers distributed \$26,600 to 54 schools in Wisconsin.

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The Green Bay Packers and UScellular teamed up for the Leap for Learning program to help identify and award Leopold Elementary School in Fitchburg with \$20,000 in technology upgrades to improve STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) education. Packers alumnus Jared Abbrederis was on hand for the surprise announcement.

### **Brown County Scholarships**

At the Packers' request, NFL Properties returns royalty fees paid for using the Packers logo on Wisconsin automobile license plates and the funds are used toward scholarships for students residing in Brown County. To ensure CollegeReady and Northeast Wisconsin Technical College Educational Foundation Inc. each receive a \$26,500 donation annually, the Packers fund the remainder of the amount not covered by the royalty fees, a figure that totals \$610,000 since 2006.



Timeout for Reading, a literacy–themed event, was held at Lambeau Field on March 1. The free event featured a story time with Ashlee Alicea, author of *Luka and Little Feather*, a reading by Packers alumnus Kevin Barry and a reading in Spanish.

Kids in pre-K through fifth grade selected books and bookmarks free of charge. Howe Community Resource Center, Bellin Health and Oneida Reads also took part in the event by offering different literacy activity booths for children to enjoy. Special reading areas were available for attendees to enjoy while reading their books.



### Free Book Fairs

Throughout 2024, sponsored book fairs were delivered to three schools in need: Anne Sullivan Elementary in Green Bay and Nathan Hawthorne Elementary and Gilbert Stuart Elementary in Milwaukee. Each student picked out three books of their choice, free of cost. A total of 1,253 students were reached with new books, adding a total of 4,665 books to the kids' home libraries. Each teacher also selected 10 books, with a total of 900 books distributed to stock their classrooms. These books supplied a grand total of 1,001,700 reading minutes across the participating schools.

Ten Wisconsin high schools were invited to the Don Hutson Center for the second annual Girls Flag Open. Players were led through an on–field fundamentals clinic by Global Flag Ambassador Desiree Abrams, competed in Team Skills Challenges and played two exhibition games. During lunch, participants heard from a panel of female Packers employees who shared their experiences as women in the sports industry. Each team received a \$1,000 donation for their program.










For the second consecutive year, the Packers hosted four high school girls flag football teams for a scrimmage at Lambeau Field. During halftime of the Packers-Cardinals game, Black Hawk High School faced off against Kickapoo High School, while Muskego High School scrimmaged against Verona Area High School.











The Packers welcomed 48 teams from Wisconsin, Kansas, Minnesota, Missouri and Michigan to the third annual NFL FLAG Regional tournament. The tournament started with a special Kickoff Event in Titletown on Friday. Participants enjoyed team introductions, hearing from Packers alumnus Mike Daniels and participated in Player Skills Challenges. During Saturday's tournament, teams had the opportunity to play on the same fields the Packers practice on, as tournament games were held on Ray Nitschke Field and in the Don Hutson Center. Winners from each of the 11 divisions qualified for the 2024 NFL FLAG Championships in Canton, Ohio and received a \$5,000 donation for team travel.





### **NFL FLAG in Brazil**

Ahead of the Packers' international game in Brazil, the NFL hosted a Community Day on Sept. 4 in São Paulo where kids participated in flag football fundamentals drills and enjoyed mini footballs and t-shirts donated by the Packers.



Players from 12 teams from across the state participated in the fifth annual Exceptional Abilities Challenge. Each team played two games against opponents of similar skill levels. Packers alumnus Ryan Grant spoke to and took pictures with the teams during lunch. All players and coaches received a gold medal for their participation in the event.





The fifth annual Nike 11–ON was held in Titletown, with eight teams from across Wisconsin competing in the one–day event. Teams earned points for their standings in Team Skills Challenges, 7–on–7 games and Lineman Challenge competitions. During lunch, teams heard from Packers alumnus Scott Wells. Menomonie High School took first place with Sun Prairie East High School the runner–up. Each participating school's football program received a \$1,000 donation.







The Packers hosted 21 Football Outreach Camps for more than 2,700 kids in 2024. Several Packers players participated in camps at Syble Hopp in De Pere and with the GRIT 920 program for kids with special needs.



# Football Outreach Grant and Equipment Donation Opportunities

The Packers and USA Football awarded USA Football grants to eight youth football organizations throughout Wisconsin. The fall grants provided continued support of grassroots football by awarding new equipment and resources to youth programs based on merit and need.

St. Francis Public School District in Milwaukee was awarded a \$250,000 grant from the Packers and the NFL Foundation Grassroots Program. The grant will be applied to the installation of a synthetic turf field at St. Francis High School. An additional \$50,000 was awarded to Fox Valley Pop Warner Football, Inc. to fund field improvements at the Challenger Accessible Football Field at Plamann Park in Appleton

Twenty Wisconsin youth football programs received a \$1,000 grant as part of the Packers Youth Football Matching Grant Program.

More than 30 youth, high school and college football programs in Wisconsin received football equipment donations, including cleats, gloves and a variety of pads.

### Girls Flag Club/Intramural Grant

Through the Packers' inaugural Girls Flag Club/Intramural Grant Program, 20 high schools each received a \$5,000 equipment grant to offset expenses that go along with forming and running their own girls flag football program. The goal of the program is to help drive school participation in the sport as part of the continued effort to have girls flag football become a sanctioned high school sport in Wisconsin.

### Girls Flag National HS Player of the Year

The Packers nominated Riley Vertz, a senior at Kettle Moraine High School, for the Maxwell Football Club Girls National Flag Football Player of the Year award. The award, in its inaugural year, recognizes female high school flag football players for their outstanding on–field performance, academic achievement and community service.



Throughout the 2024 high school football season, 10 Wisconsin high school football coaches were named the Green Bay Packers High School Coach of the Week. Recipients were selected based on their incredible impact on the field and in their communities. Each received a \$1,000 donation to their school's football program from the Packers and the NFL Foundation. In addition to the donation, the winning coaches received recognition on packers.com, wissports.net and wifca.org and were mentioned in the Packers gameday program.

The Coaches of the Week and Coach of the Year were also recognized at Lambeau Field during the Packers-Bears game on Jan. 5.

## NFL Don Shula National High School Coach of the Year for the NFC

All NFL clubs nominate a high school coach that demonstrates the integrity, achievement and leadership exemplified by Don Shula. The Packers' nominee, Bill Jacklin of Slinger High School, was named the NFL Don Shula National High School Coach of the Year for the NFC. He attended the Pro Bowl Games and Super Bowl LIX. His high school football program received a \$15,000 award, and Coach Jacklin received a \$10,000 cash award, courtesy of the NFL Foundation and Nike.







In its inaugural year, the Green Bay Packers, in conjunction with the WIAA and the InSideOut Initiative, named Peggy Seegers—Braun of Divine Savior Holy Angels High School in Milwaukee, as the first recipient of the Athletic Director of the Year award. Seegers—Braun is described as an outstanding role model to the school's all–girls population.

Packers alumnus Jarrett Bush also spoke to the coaches. All attendees received their USA Football coaching certification for participating in the one-day event, courtesy of the Packers.





This program, presented by Head & Shoulders, showcases impressive catches, throws, interceptions, broken tackles, fumble recoveries and other exceptional plays made by Wisconsin high school football players. Submitted game highlights were reviewed by a panel of Packers staff, and the top five plays each month were featured on the Packers' social media platforms. Each winning school also received a \$1,000 donation, courtesy of the Packers and Head & Shoulders.

### High School Quarterback Challenge Presented by HPE and Camera Corner

During halftime of each game at Lambeau Field, players from two rival Wisconsin high schools compete to see who can complete the longest pass.



### **NFL Latino Youth Honors**

This program recognizes outstanding Latino high school tackle and flag football athletes for their academic and athletic excellence. The Packers nominated Mariano Talamantez, a senior at St. Catherine's High School in Racine. A finalist for the award, Talamantez participated in special events during Super Bowl LIX Week in New Orleans. Talamantez was named the male winner of the national award at the NFL Honors, receiving a \$25,000 grant to use toward college.

### **Youth Football Programs Scrimmage at Lambeau Field**

Teams from the Waupun Gridiron Association scrimmaged on Lambeau Field prior to the Packers taking the field for their annual Family Night.

At halftime of the Packers–Ravens preseason game at Lambeau Field, teams from the Sauk Prairie Youth Football Association participated in a scrimmage. The Packers provided more than 2,700 tickets to Wisconsin youth football programs to attend the preseason matchup.



### **USA Football Blitz**

The Packers hosted their first USA Football Blitz in Titletown. USA Football instructors and several Green Bay East High School football players were on hand to help 375 kids ages 5–14 learn and grow their skills.







### **Community Blood Drives**

The Packers donated event space at the Johnsonville Tailgate Village for three community blood drives held during 2024 in partnership with the American Red Cross. A total of 1,083 units of blood were collected. The Packers and Red Cross celebrated a milestone at the November drive, surpassing 15,000 pints donated at the Green Bay Packers Give Back Community Blood Drives since the two organizations held the first community drive in 2009.



### **Festival of Lights**

The 18th annual Festival of Lights was held at Lambeau Field on Dec. 7. The free family event featured holiday movies, holiday card making, area high school choirs, photo opportunities with Santa Claus and cookie decorating. Families attending the event donated new, unwrapped toys for Toys for Tots. The event moved out onto Harlan Plaza for the formal lighting of the over 50–foot spruce tree donated by Neil and Julie Basten of De Pere.





The Lambeau Field Atrium was converted into an indoor fun zone with inflatable obstacle courses, a bounce house, climbing walls, football and gymnastics circuits, pickleball, a ninja course and a gaga ball pit. Bellin Health certified instructors offered 10-minute mindful yoga sessions to teach kids techniques to strengthen their minds and bodies. This free event is focused on getting kids out of the house to get active and enjoy physical activity. Attendees also donated hygiene items to the Help for the Homeless Hygiene Drive.





### **Autographed Items**

A priority of Packers Give Back is assisting the fundraising efforts of Wisconsin's nonprofit organizations. Each request is reviewed individually by community outreach staff to ensure selected donation items will positively impact the nonprofit organization. Upwards of 10,000 requests were received the past year from organizations in each of Wisconsin's 72 counties.

### **Clothing and Toiletries**

### **Community Events Grants**

Nonprofit organizations located in or primarily serving Brown County who are hosting events at Lambeau Field can apply for a grant that waived room rental fees. Each September, four nonprofit applicants are selected to benefit. A total of \$20,500 in room rental fees were waived during the past year from this grant opportunity.

### The Mark Murphy Endowed Director of Athletics Position

The Packers made a \$250,000 donation to the University of Wisconsin – Green Bay in honor of Packers' longtime President and CEO Mark Murphy. This donation is the leading gift to establish and endow the Mark Murphy Director of Athletics position at the University. It also kickstarted a \$1 million fundraising campaign goal that will help ensure Phoenix student–athletes are able to excel in the classroom and in competition, while also making a positive impact in the Green Bay community.





### **Packers Give Back Days**

### **Green Bay Packers United Way Campaign**

Through employee contributions and other activities focused on raising awareness of the challenges faced by ALICE (asset limited, income constrained, employed) families, more than \$16,000 was raised for the programs and services provided by Brown County United Way.

### **Give BIG Green Bay Business Boost Donation**

As a Business Boost participant, Packers Give Back encouraged employees to learn more about the nonprofit organizations participating in the 24-hour online giving event and as an incentive, offered to match up to \$15,000 of personal donations made by employees.

### **Volunteerism Grant**

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For the fourth consecutive year, the Packers and the Volunteer Center of Brown County in Green Bay collaborated to offer an affiliate partner program to nonprofit organizations in Brown, Oconto and Shawano counties. The \$10,000 donation, made possible by a grant from the NFL Foundation, reduced membership fees for the program that connects nonprofit organizations with dedicated volunteers needed to fulfill their missions.

### Help for the Homeless Hygiene Drive

Packers employees donated more than 200 various hygiene items and \$1,000 during the annual Help for the Homeless Hygiene Drive. Donations collected help stock the shelves of homeless and crisis programs in the community the donations were collected.



Nonprofit organizations benefit two-fold from Packers employees who volunteer; the volunteer hours they provide and if 50 or more hours are accumulated throughout the calendar year, a \$500 donation to the organization is provided by the Packers. In 2024, \$4,500 was donated on behalf of nine employees who recorded 1,237 volunteer hours done on personal time.



This program matches eligible personal donations made by employees to nonprofit organizations, with donation amounts ranging from \$25 up to a maximum of \$500 per calendar year. In 2024, \$16,843.50 in personal donations made by 56 employees plus \$16,843.50 matched by the Packers equaled a total impact of \$33,687.





Art supplies and monetary donations collected from attendees were donated to the Boys & Girls Club of the Bay & Lakes Region. This NFL initiative encourages players across the league to wear customized cleats on gameday to raise awareness for their hand-picked causes and show their support for numerous nonprofit organizations around the country. During the Week 13 Packers–Dolphins game, 36 Packers players and coaches wore their customized cleats. 

# **Packers Tailgate Tour**



## **Impact Grants**

Impact grants are aimed at directing significant funds toward organizations making a difference in their communities in Brown, Dane and Milwaukee counties. In June, \$1.75 million was awarded to ten nonprofit organizations. Varying in amounts, some of the grants are matching grants, which require the recipient organization to raise the same amount to secure the grant.

#### In Milwaukee County:


College Possible – \$125,000 matching grant to grow their college–readiness strategy program to be more accessible statewide.

Attendees mingled with Foundation Trustees and Packers alumnus Dorsey Levens while the Green Bay Preble Concert Choir, a grant recipient, provided entertainment. Following lunch, the program featured messages from Wilson Jones, Foundation Chair, representatives from three grant recipients and Levens. At the conclusion of the program, attendees were provided complimentary admission to the Packers Hall of Fame.











#### Salute to Service Month

Since it began in 2002, this program has raised more than \$1.9 million to help alleviate hunger in Wisconsin and has provided more than one million meals for those in need.








To kick off the postseason, fans of all ages were welcomed to send mail to the team as encouragement. Some letters and drawings were featured on packers.com.

Children also participated in the DreamDrive bike tradition throughout training camp by offering players rides on their own bikes at practices open to the public.


