## NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (0-2) AT NEW YORK JETS (1-1)

Sunday, September 24, 2023 • MetLife Stadium (82,500) • 1:00 p.m. ET

After starting the season with two consecutive home games, the New England Patriots will begin back-to-back road games, starting this Sunday when they travel to face the New York Jets at MetLife Stadium for their second straight AFC East matchup. Following the Jets game, the Patriots will travel to Dallas to face the Cowboys.

New England enters this week with 14 straight wins over the Jets.

## **BROADCAST INFORMATION**

**TELEVISION:** This week's game will be broadcast by **CBS** and can be seen locally on **WBZ-TV Channel 4. Jim Nantz** will handle play-by-play duties with **Tony Romo** as the color analyst. **Tracy Wolfson** will report from the sidelines. The game will be produced by **Jim Rikhoff** and directed by **Mike Arnold**.

**LOCAL RADIO:** 98.5 The Sports Hub is the flagship station for the Patriots Radio Network. A complete listing of the network's 33 stations can be found in this press release on page 59. Play-by-play broadcaster **Bob Socci** will call the action along with former Patriots quarterback **Scott Zolak**, who will provide color analysis. The games are produced by **Marc Cappello**.

## PATRIOTS LOOK TO CONTINUE WINNING STREAKS

The Patriots extended their winning streak to 14 straight victories over the New York Jets with their seventh straight series sweep in 2022. A win this week against the Jets will match the team mark for most consecutive wins over an opponent. The Patriots beat Buffalo 15 straight time (2003-10).

The New England Patriots and New York Jets will meet for the first of two scheduled 2023 meetings this week. The Patriots will host the Jets in the final week of the year in a game that has a time and date that is not set yet. The Patriots enter this week with 14 straight wins over the Jets, including series sweeps in each of the last seven seasons. The 14 straight wins are second in team history to the 15 straight wins the Patriots had over Buffalo (2003-10), and the seven straight series sweeps are the most in team history.

Overall, the Patriots have 23 series sweeps over the Jets with 14 under Bill Belichick and 16 under Robert Kraft.

New England leads the series, 73-54-1 overall. The Patriots are 39-25-1 all-time in home games against the Jets, including 19-4 at Gillette Stadium.

The teams have played in the postseason three times – a 1985 Wild Card game, a 2006 Wild Card game and an AFC Divisional game in 2010. New England beat the Jets, 26-14, in 1985 at the Meadowlands en route to Super Bowl XX. In 2006, the Patriots defeated the Jets, 37-16, at Gillette Stadium and the Jets beat the Patriots, 28-21, in the 2010 Divisional playoff game in Foxborough.

New England is 44-16 against the Jets since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994

New England's 73 overall victories over the Jets (including two playoff wins) are the second-most over any single opponent, trailing only the 77 all-time wins over Buffalo.



## **SECOND STRAIGHT GAME WITH 30 COMPLETIONS**

QB Mac Jones completed 31 passes against Miami. He completed a career-high 35 passes in the 2023 opener against Philadelphia. It is the second time in his career that he has had back-to-back games with 30 completions. He had back-to-back games with 30 completions as a rookie in 2021 when he had 30 completed passes vs. New Orleans on Sept. 26 followed by 31 completed passes vs. Tampa Bay on Oct. 3.

## JONES HAD A CAREER-LONG 18-YARD RUN

Mac Jones had a career-long 18-yard run to convert on a thirdand-15 situation in the fourth quarter. Two plays later, he connected on a 6-yard touchdown pass to TE Hunter Henry. Jones's previous long was a 15-yard run vs. Baltimore on Sept. 25, 2022.

## JONES COMPLETES 73.8 PERCENT OF HIS PASSES

Jones finished 31-of-42 for 231 yards for a 73.8 completion percentage. It was his 13th NFL game with a completion percentage of 70 percent or better.

For the second consecutive week, TE Hunter Henry has scored on a reception from Mac Jones. He caught a 6-yard touchdown pass in the fourth quarter. Henry caught a 9-yard touchdown pass in the season-opener vs. Philadelphia. Henry has already matched the two touchdowns he had in 2022. In his first season with New England in 2021, he set a career-high and tied for the NFL lead among tight ends with 9 touchdown receptions.

Under Kraft's leadership since he purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports.

Kraft has led the two most dominant decades in NFL history in terms of overall wins – 141 (2010-19) and 126 (2000-09).

Kraft is the most successful owner since he purchased the team in 1994 in terms of wins (349), division titles (19), winning percentage (.675), playoff wins (33) and playoff seasons (22).



Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. In his 29 seasons of ownership, he has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what many observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.238 pct.), the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention



to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (19), conference crowns (10) and Super Bowl championships (6) than any other NFL team. Additionally, the Patriots have achieved the most winning seasons (24) since Kraft assumed ownership beginning in 1994. Super Bowl LIII was the 10th Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has appeared in more than four Super Bowls. In Kraft's 29 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 22 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons.

## A WINNING TRADITION I

Robert Kraft won his 300th game overall as owner of the New England Patriots against Miami on Sept. 30, 2018. Kraft reached the milestone in his 25th NFL season and in his 432nd game, the fastest an owner has reached the mark. Al Davis of the Raiders accomplished the feat in 495 games (31 seasons) while Pat Bowlen of Denver reached 300 career wins in 501 games (30 seasons).

## A WINNING TRADITION II

Kraft's winning percentage with the Patriots (.675) since taking over the team in 1994 is the highest among all owners/ownership groups with at least 200 wins (regular and postseason) with one team. He is one of just four owners with at least 200 wins and a winning percentage over .600.

## **KRAFT PASSES OTHER OWNERS**

The Patriots have 349 wins overall under Robert Kraft. He has produced more victories than every other Patriots owner combined. Under Kraft, the Patriots are 349-168 overall since he purchased the team in 1994. Kraft's predecessors in the owner's office went 225-276-9 in the 34 years prior to his purchase of the team.

## **CONTINUITY BREEDS SUCCESS**

New England is the first team in NFL history to win six Super Bowls with the same owner (Robert Kraft), head coach (Bill Belichick) and quarterback (Tom Brady).

## **PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS**

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 28 times in their 63-year history. Twenty-two of those playoff berths have come in the 29 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. The Patriots have won 22 division crowns.

Since the 1994 season, the Patriots have won 67.8 percent of their regular season games (316-150), which is the highest winning percentage in men's major American professional sports over that period. Since 1994, there have been 148 franchises that have fielded teams in the five major American sports leagues (NFL, MLB, NBA, NHL and MLS) and completed more than two full seasons of competition. On the women's side the Toronto Six (29-5-3) and the Boston Pride (90-29-10) of the PHF hold the two highest winning percentages of all women's professional sports teams.


- The New England Patriots are tied with the Pittsburgh Steelers for the most Super Bowl wins in NFL history with six.
- The Patriots have played in 11 Super Bowls, the most by any team in NFL history. Dallas, Denver and Pittsburgh have played in eight.
- The New England Patriots have 37 postseason victories, the most in NFL history. Dallas, Pittsburgh, Green Bay and San Francisco are second with 36 playoff wins all-time.
- The Patriots are third in NFL history with 15 Conference Championship Game appearances, behind San Francisco (18) and the Pittsburgh (16).
- The New England Patriots have earned seven No. 1 seeds, trailing only San Francisco (9) and Denver (8) since playoff seeding began in 1975.
- The Patriots have earned a first-round playoff bye an NFL-best 14 times since 1990. Pittsburgh and San Francisco are second with nine byes since 1990. New England is the only team in NFL history with nine straight first-round byes (2010-18).
- The Patriots have played in 59 postseason games, tied with San Francisco for the fourth-most in NFL history behind Dallas (66), Pittsburgh (63) and Green Bay (61).
- The Patriots are second with 13 seasons of 12 wins since 1970, behind San Francisco's 14 seasons with 12 victories.
- New England has won 13 games in a single season seven times in franchise history. Only San Francisco has more 13-win seasons with 10
- The New England Patriots have won 14 or more games in a season five times, most in NFL history. San Francisco is second with four 14-win seasons.
- New England has 28 undefeated months since 2000, most in the NFL over that span. Green Bay is second with 21 undefeated months during that time.
- The Patriots have 35 winning seasons since 1970, second all-time behind Pittsburgh's 39.



- The Patriots have 574 total victories, the fourth-most wins since their inception in 1960, behind the 588 wins by Dallas, 587 by Pittsburgh and the 576 by Green Bay.
- New England (1,027) played their 1,000th game in franchise history (regular season and playoffs combined) against Cleveland on Nov. 14, 2021, and became the first original AFL team to play in 1,000 games.
- The Patriots ended a 10-year streak of finishing in the top 10 for fewest points allowed (2012-2021) after finishing 11th in 2022 with 20.4 points allowed. The Patriots and Tampa Bay (1996-2005) are the last two teams to reach 10 straight seasons in the top 10 for fewest points allowed.

**MIKE ONWENU** – Began his collegiate career as a defensive lineman before switching to offensive line following his freshman season.

**ATONIO MAFI -** Played defensive tackle in college before moving to the offensive line during his junior year.

MARTE MAPU - Played both linebacker and safety in college.

**TY MONTGOMERY II -** Played both wide receiver and running back during his college career at Stanford.

**JABRILL PEPPERS** – Played wide receiver, running back and defensive back in college.

**BRENDEN SCHOOLER -** Played defensive back and wide receiver in college.

**TYRONE WHEATLEY JR.** - Played tight end during his collegiate years and did not switch to the offensive line until the spring of 2021 during his stint in the Spring League.

**KEION WHITE** - Played tight end as a redshirt at Old Dominion in 2018 before moving to defensive end in 2019.

## **GONE AND BACK**

28 players have had at least two stints with New England since 2000 (on the active roster with the Patriots for at least one game in each stint; on the active roster with another team for at least one game in between). The Patriots current roster has one such player returning for at least a second stint on the 53-man roster: Trent Brown. Trey Flowers is currently on the PUP List, but if he gets activated he will become the 29th player. LB Calvin Munson is on the practice squad but was elevated to the active roster for the first two games of the 2023 season. In addition, the Patriots have one current player that signed with New England but went to other teams before playing in their first game. OL Calvin Anderson signed with the Patriots as a rookie agent in 2019 but did not go to camp with the Patriots that summer.



Bill Belichick is the only head coach in NFL history to win six Super Bowl titles. He won more games overall (141) during a 10-year stretch (2010-19) than any other coach in NFL history. In 2007, Belichick led the Patriots to the fourth undefeated and untied regular season in NFL history and the only one since the NFL established a 16-game schedule in 1978. His 49 consecutive years as an NFL coach are most in NFL history. The only other NFL coaches with at least 40 consecutive NFL coaching seasons are Dick LeBeau (45) and Tom Moore (41).

- QB Mac Jones is in seventh place on New England's all-time passing list with 7,345 career passing yards and needs 2,587 passing yards to move past Jim Plunkett (9,932) for sixth place on the list.
- Jones enters the 2023 season with the highest completion percentage in team history at 66.7.
- In 2022, Jones finished with a 65.2 completion percentage for his second season with a completion percentage of at least 65%. He finished his rookie season with a 67.6 completion percentage. Jones joins Justin Herbert and Joe Burrow as the only quarterbacks to have completed at least 65% of their passes in their first two seasons. Herbert and Burrow are the only quarterbacks to accomplish this feat in their first three seasons.

#### JONES SETS CAREER-HIGH WITH 382 YARDS PASSING

 Jones set a career-high with 382 yards passing at Minnesota on Nov. 24, 2022, for his second 300-yard game of the 2022 season. Jones previous best was 321 yards vs. Baltimore on Sept. 25, 2022. Jones finished 28-of-39 (.718) for 382 yards with two touchdowns for a passer rating of 119.8 against the Vikings.

#### JONES HAD TWO TOUCHDOWNS OF 30 YARDS OR MORE

Jones had two touchdown passes of more than 30 yards vs. Minnesota (11/24/22), completing a 34-yard touchdown pass to WR Nelson Agholor and a 37-yard touchdown pass to TE Hunter Henry. Overall, he had four passes of 30 or more yards against Minnesota, the most he has had in one game, besting the three he had vs. Baltimore on Sept. 25, 2022 and at Miami on Jan. 9, 2022.

#### **CAREER-HIGH WITH .851 COMPLETION PERCENTAGE**

 Jones set a career-high with a .851 completion percentage after completing 23-of-27 passes for 246 yards vs. the New York Jets (11/20/22). It is fourth highest in team history. Jones' previous best was .846 at Atlanta (23-of-26) on Nov. 18, 2021.

#### **MAKING A DIFFERENCE**

Ty Montgomery II is making an impact on current individuals aging out of the foster care system, a cause that is close to his heart. Montgomery sent 11 young adults aging out of the foster care system to Israel to be a part of a 10-day Jerusalem Encounter tour in the spring. His own charity, My 10 Percent, that Montgomery established in 2018, raised funds to help cover the expenses of the trip. He hopes to continue this initiative in the future and make this an annual event.



#### THE STORY BEHIND THE NUMBER

Juju Smith-Schuster wears No. 7 for more than just luck. "It kind of represents a lot of things, my mom's favorite number is seven," Smith-Schuster said. "She had seven kids, lucky No. 7, one of my favorite football players in soccer wears No. 7, Vinicius Jr., year seven [in the NFL]. So, it was kind of a number that I picked that represented a lot of things." The number has additional meaning in the 2023 season for the wide receiver with it being his seventh year in the league.



#### **WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2023**

- RB Rhamondre Stevenson recorded his first 1,000-yard rushing season with a career-high 1,040 rushing yards in 2022. He can become
  the third New England player with back-to-back 1,000-yard rushing
  seasons in 2023, joining Curtis Martin (1,487 in 1995, 1,152 in 1996
  and 1,160 in 1997) and Jim Nance (1,458 in 1966 and 1,216 in 1967).
- Stevenson became the ninth New England running back to lead the team in receptions after finishing with 69 in 2022. He can become the first New England running back to lead the team in two consecutive seasons in 2023.

#### RHAMONDRE REACHES 1,000 YARDS RUSHING

 Stevenson finished the 2022 season with 1,040 rushing yards, his first career 1,000-yard season and the 17th 1,000-yard season in New England history.

#### **DEDICATION TO HIS GOALS**

While in high school, Stevenson started gaining attention for the impressive stats he posted as a junior. Unfortunately, due to his grades, Stevenson was academically ineligible to receive a football scholarship despite being recruited. Following his senior year of high school, Stevenson took a year off from football and worked part-time jobs at Wal-Mart and Jimmy John's. But after a year away, he decided to follow a group of his friends and enroll in Cerritos Community College. During his time at Cerritos, he shared a two-bedroom apartment with up to six other guys at times and rode his bicycle 20 minutes to and from practice every day. After putting up monster stats in his second season at Cerriots, he committed to Oklahoma. Oklahoma led him to the 2021 NFL Draft where in the fourth round on the third day the Patriots selected Stevenson. In addition, he worked on his academics and made the Dean's List while at Oklahoma.

#### STEVENSON RECORDS FIRST RECEIVING TOUCHDOWN

Stevenson had his first career touchdown reception on a 3-yard pass from QB Mac Jones in the second quarter vs. Indianapolis on Nov. 6 2022.

#### **CAREER HIGHS IN RECEPTIONS AND RECEIVING YARDS**

Stevenson set career highs in receptions and receiving yards after finishing with nine receptions for 76 yards at Minnesota on Nov. 24, 2022. His previous high in receptions was eight vs. Chicago on Oct. 24, 2022, and his previous high in receiving yards was 72 yards on Oct. 30, 2022, at the New York Jets.

#### **STEVENSON HAS CAREER LONG RUNS**

 Stevenson had a career-long 49-yard run in the first quarter vs. Detroit on Oct. 9, 2022. His previous long was a 21-yard run on Nov. 18, 2021 at Atlanta. It is the longest run by a Patriots running back since RB Damien Harris scored on a 64-yard run at Buffalo on Dec. 6, 2021. Stevenson broke free for a 31-yard touchdown run at Cleveland on Oct. 16, 2022, and a 35-yard run at the New York Jets on Oct. 30, 2022.

#### STEVENSON HAS FOURTH CAREER 100-YARD GAME

 Stevenson had a career-high 172 yards rushing at Las Vegas on Dec. 18, 2022. It was his second 100-yard game of the year and fourth overall. He had 161 yards rushing vs. Detroit on Oct. 9, 2022. It is the 14th time in franchise history that a Patriots player has rushed for 160 yards or more.

### STEVENSON RECORDS FOURTH CAREER GAME WITH A 6.0-YARD AVERAGE PER CARRY

Stevenson finished with 19 rushing attempts for 172 yards for a 9.1yard average at Las Vegas on Dec. 18, 2022. It is the fourth time in his career and third time in 2022 he finished with a 6.0-yard average or better

#### **MOST TOUCHES**

Stevenson had 27 overall offensive touches with 25 rushing attempts and two receptions vs. Detroit (Oct. 9, 2022). It is the most offensive touches since RB Dion Lewis had 32 offensive touches with 26 rushing attempts and six receptions on Dec. 31, 2017, vs. the New York Jets.





#### STRANGE FACEMASK

2022 first-round draft pick OL Cole Strange started wearing the vertical bar facemask his senior season at Chattanooga. The idea started when the veteran offensive line group, who had been together for four years, wanted to do something different to finish out their final season playing alongside each other. They decided to all wear the same facemask and landed on the vertical bar. Strange brought the bar with him to the NFL and is one of only three NFL regulars to sport the vertical bar in their facemask.



#### THORNTON SCORES FIRST NFL TOUCHDOWN

2022 second-round draft pick WR Tyquan Thornton scored his first NFL touchdown on a 2-yard pass from QB Bailey Zappe in the third quarter at Cleveland on Oct. 16, 2022.

#### THORNTON SCORES SECOND TOUCHDOWN OF THE DAY ON A 19-YARD RUN

Thornton scored his second touchdown of the day on a 19-yard touchdown run in the fourth guarter at Cleveland on Oct. 16. He is the sixth Patriots wide receiver to score on a touchdown run and first since Cordarrelle Patterson in 2018. Thornton is the first Patriots wide receiver with a rushing touchdown and a receiving touchdown in the same game since David Patten at Indianapolis on Oct. 21, 2001.

#### FROM HOUSTON BAPTIST, TO WESTERN KENTUCKY, TO NEW ENGLAND

QB Bailey Zappe played his first four college seasons at Houston Baptist before playing at Western Kentucky in 2021. While at Western Kentucky. Zappe set new all-time single season FBS records with 5,987 yards and 62 touchdown passes, breaking the record held by Texas Tech's B.J. Symons (5,833 in 2013) and Joe Burrow (60 touchdown passes in 2019).

#### BAILEY ZAPPE THROWS FOR OVER 300 YARDS

Zappe made his second straight start of the season at Cleveland on Oct. 16, 2022, and finished 24-of-34 for 309 yards with two touchdown passes en route to a 38-15 victory. He became the first Patriots rookie quarterback to win in his first home and first road game after starting in the 29-0 victory at home against Detroit on Oct. 9. Zappe had a passer rating of 118.4 against the Browns. He is the first rookie quarterback to win and record a 100-plus passer rating in his first two starts since Sonny Jurgensen in 1957. Zappe had a passer rating of 100 in his first start against the Lions.





#### PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAMER RICHARD SEYMOUR SEES GREATNESS AHEAD FOR CHRISTIAN BARMORE

- For a defensive lineman, if Patriots and Pro Football Hall of Famer Richard Seymour is in your corner, there are few better compliments or endorsements.
- "I think he has a ton of ability, natural ability, and he plays hard," Seymour told the Boston Herald. "I think he's going to be a problem for (opposing teams) for a long time to come. Hopefully he stays healthy and continues on the path he's on. I think he has a really bright future."



#### SECOND-MOST QUARTERBACK PRESSURES

 Barmore posted the second-most quarterback pressures for a first-year defensive tackle since 2006, according to Pro Football Focus. His 48 pressures in 2021 were two more than Aaron Donald had during his rookie season



#### **2022 ACCOMPLISHMENTS**

 LB Ja'Whaun Bentley set a single-season career-high with 122 tackles in 2022. He surpassed his previous best of 108 total tackles in 2021. He became the 13th New England player to reach at least 120 total tackles in a season and the first Patriots player to do so since Jerod Mayo had 147 total tackles in 2012.



Ja'Whaun and his family were homeless starting his freshman year of high school, living with one set of grandparents, then the other, then an aunt. Ja'Whaun and his brother slept on couches and floors at times over the course of several years. Once Ja'Whaun entered the NFL, he was able to secure permanent housing for his family.



#### WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2023

DB Kyle Dugger scored three touchdowns in 2022 with two interceptions and a fumble returned for touchdowns. He needs one more defensive touchdown to tie Willie McGinest and Tedy Bruschi for the second-most defensive touchdowns in team history with four. Ty Law has the most defensive touchdowns with six.

### DUGGER PLAYS ROLE IN FOUR OF THE SEVEN DEFENSIVE TOUCHDOWNS

Dugger played a major role in four of the NFL-best seven defensive touchdowns in 2022. In addition to his pick-6 against Miami, he returned an interception 16 yards for a touchdown at Las Vegas, returned a fumble 59 yards for a touchdown vs. Detroit and forced a fumble that LB Raekwon McMillan returned 23 yards for a touchdown in the third quarter at Arizona (12/12).

#### **DUGGER EARNS HIS DEGREE**

- Dugger helped put Lenoir-Rhyne University on the map, becoming the highest-drafted athlete in the Division II football program's history.
- Three years after being selected in the second round of the 2020 NFL Draft, a diligent Dugger has worked hard to finish his degree, earning a Bachelor's degree in psychology with the Class of 2023.

#### **DUGGER SCORES ON A 59-YARD FUMBLE RETURN**

 Dugger recovered a fumble vs. Detroit (10/9/22) that was forced on a 13-yard sack by LB Matthew Judon, and returned the ball 59 yards for a touchdown in the second quarter. It is the fourth-longest fumble return in team history. It was Dugger's first career touchdown.

#### A PICK-6 AND A FORCED FUMBLE IN NFL STARTING DEBUT

• Patriots 2022 fourth-round pick Jack Jones was in the starting lineup at cornerback at Green Bay on Oct. 2, 2021, in place of the injured Jalen Mills. It was Jones' first NFL start. He forced and recovered a fumble on WR Romeo Doubs in the first quarter to give the Patriots a first down at the 50-yard line. Later in the second quarter, he intercepted QB Aaron Rodgers pass and returned it 40 yards for a touchdown. It was only the second time that Rodgers has had an interception returned for a touchdown at Lambeau Field (3,511 pass attempts). Jones is the first rookie in NFL history with a forced fumble, a fumble recovered and an interception returned for a touchdown in a single game.

#### JACK JONES HAS SECOND STRAIGHT GAME WITH A PICK

 DB Jonathan Jones intercepted Miami QB Skylar Thompson (01/01/22) in the fourth quarter for his fourth interception of the season, a new single-season career-high. He had three interceptions in 2018.

#### JONES SCORES FIRST NFL TOUCHDOWN

 Jones picked off a pass from Indianapolis QB Sam Ehlinger (11/6/22) in the fourth quarter and returned it 17 yards for his first career touchdown.

#### JONES BLOCK PARTY

Jones returned an interception for a touchdown and blocked a punt vs. Indianapolis on Nov. 6, 2022. #### **WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2023**

- LB Matthew Judon led the team with a career-high 15½ sacks in 2022 following a team-leading 12½ sacks in 2021. He can join Tony McGee (12 in 1977, 11½ in 1978 and 10½ in 1979) as the only Patriots player with three straight double-digit sack seasons.
- Judon has registered double-digit sack totals in each of his first two seasons in New England and can join Andre Tippett (3) and Tony Mc-Gee (3) as the only Patriots players with three double-digit sack totals.
- Judon has registered 28 total sacks in the last two seasons (15½ in 2022 and 12½ in 2021). He needs 16½ sacks in 2023 to match the best three-year total in New England history with 44½ sacks by Andre Tippett (18½ in 1984, 16½ in 1985 and 9½ in 1986).

#### 2022 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

 Judon was selected to represent the New England Patriots in the 2023 NFL Pro Bowl. Judon has earned four consecutive Pro Bowl berths, including two straight with the Patriots.



- Judon led the team with a career-high 12½ sacks in 2021 and reached a career-high and 15½ sacks in 2022 to become the fourth Patriots player with back-to-back 10-plus sack totals, joining Garin Veris (10 in 1985 and 11 in 1986), Andre Tippett (18½ in 1984 and 16½ in 1985) and Tony McGee (12 in 1977, 11½ in 1978 and 10½ in 1979). Judon also joined Tippett (3), McGee (3), Veris (2) and Chandler Jones (2) as the only Patriots to register more than one double-digit sack total.
- Judon registered a sack in each of the first five games of the 2022 season. He is the first New England player to start a season with at least one sack in each of the first five games to start a season. Patriots and Pro Football Hall of Famer Andre Tippett began the 1986 season with one sack in each of the first four games.
- Pro Football Hall of Famer Andre Tippett is the only Patriots player to record more sacks in a season than Judon's 15½ in 2022, with Tippett recording 18½ in 1984 and 16½ in 1985.

#### **WEEK 5 AFC DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK**

- Judon was named AFC Defensive Player of the Week by the National Football League for his performance in the Patriots 29-0 shutout victory over the Detroit Lions on Oct. 9, 2022. Detroit entered the game with the top-ranked offense and was averaging 35 points per game. Judon had a 9-yard sack of QB Jared Goff in the second quarter and then forced a fumble on a 13-yard sack later in the second quarter that was returned for a 59-yard touchdown by DB Kyle Dugger.
- It is the second Player of the Week Award for Judon in his career. He earned AFC Defensive Player of the Week honors following a Week 11 performance in 2017 while with Baltimore.

#### REPRESENTING FAMILY

Judon wore jersey #99 during his five seasons with the Baltimore Ravens, but chose jersey #9 upon joining New England in 2021. Said Judon, "I'm one of 10 children, so I got nine siblings. Every time I go out there, I represent them. I like nine. That's one of the reasons I rock it. Ninety-nine was taken, so I chose to use the new rule and getting on it."

#### **TEAM RECORD FOR MOST SACKS IN FIRST FIVE GAMES**

Judon set a team record with 6½ sacks through the first five games in 2021. He had six sacks in the first five games of the 2022 season. The previous record was 5½ sacks by Chandler Jones in 2015 and Andre Tippett in 1984.

#### THE RISE OF THE GREEN GOBLIN

- DB Jalen Mills has embraced his nickname "The Green Goblin." The
  origins of the nickname started out as a joke during his rookie season
  with Philadelphia when he dyed his hair green. Mills is not sure whether it was a coach or the media, but the spiderman villain nickname
  stuck.
- Said Mills, "It just kind of came from my rookie year and then just throughout my years playing for the Eagles, my style of play. That's what I get it from. It's kind of something that I stuck with."

#### A NUMBER CHANGE WITH A STORY

Late in the Eagles' eventual Super Bowl-winning season, Jalen's Uncle Uhkoto lost his battle with cancer. The once-close relatives had long since drifted apart and fallen out of touch. As a result, only in the wake of Uhkoto's death did Jalen learn that his uncle – a man who otherwise shunned sports – could quote his nephew's NFL statistics chapter and verse: every pass breakup, every interception, every tackle, every game, Uhkoto was keeping track of Jalen. The discovery left him with a heavy heart.

"It kind of broke me down," Jalen revealed, "because we had grown apart. We were close at one point in time. It took that moment for me to realize, this is a man I looked up to as a younger kid, and now he was looking up to me, keeping up with sports that he didn't even care about. So, I wanted to honor him in my own quiet way."

In 2021, Mills got that opportunity. After signing his free-agent contract with New England, Jalen learned that the NFL would relax its jersey number restrictions, allowing certain positions beyond kickers, punters and quarterbacks to wear single-digits on their uniforms.

Mills, who wore 31 and 21 at times as an Eagle, chose No. 2 in New England. Almost no one ever called Uhkoto – pronounced uh-COO-too – by his full name. They preferred his shortened nickname: Two.



#### **VERSATILITY**

- "I'm one of the guys that when you ask me what position I play, I say 'defense.' I want to be able to line up everywhere, and most importantly, I want to be able to produce everywhere."
- Began his career in 2014 in San Diego focusing on special teams and was selected to his first Pro Bowl in 2018 as a special teamer. His 2018 Pro Bowl berth was the only one that Matthew Slater did not get voted to from 2011-2021.
- Started all 16 games at safety in 2020 for the Patriots and led the team in tackles with a career-high 107.



#### ASK AND JAHLANI RECEIVED

LB Jahlani Tavai starred in high school as a nose guard. He was undersized and did not attract the attention of many colleges. But after finding out one of the English teachers at his high school was the son of then-Hawaii coach Norm Chow, he reached out to the teacher, Cameron Chow, and asked if Cameron could tell his dad to scout his tape. Cameron followed up and passed along Jahlani's tape to his dad, and the very next day Jahlani had a scholarship offer. According to Jahlani, his football career would have been over after high school if it wasn't for this connection.



#### WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2023

• LB Josh Uche had a career-high 11½ sacks in 2022 and can become the fifth Patriots player with back-to-back 10-plus sack totals, joining Matthew Judon (15½ in 2022 and 12½ in 2021), Garin Veris (10 in 1985 and 11 in 1986), Andre Tippett (18½ in 1984 and 16½ in 1985) and Tony McGee (12 in 1977, 11½ in 1978 and 10½ in 1979). Uche can join Tippett (3), Tony McGee (3), Garin Veris (2), Chandler Jones (2) and Judon (2) as the only Patriots to register more than one double-digit sack total.

#### **CAREER-HIGH THREE SACKS**

 Uche registered a career-high three sacks after dropping Indianapolis QB Sam Ehlinger (11/6/22) for a 2-yard loss and an 8-yard loss in the second quarter and a 1-yard sack in the third quarter. He has three career games with at least two sacks. He had his first two-sack game after registering two fourth quarter sacks at the New York Jets on Sept. 19, 2021, and also had two sacks vs. Buffalo on Dec. 1, 2022.

#### **UCHE HAD TWO 3-SACK GAMES IN 2022**

 Uche had his second 3-sack game of the 2022 season at Arizona on Dec. 12. He was named AFC Defensive Player of the Week for his efforts. Uche also had three sacks at the New York Jets on Oct. 30. Andre Tippett (3 in 1985 and 3 in 1987) and Mike Vrabel (2 in 2007) are the only Patriots players with multiple 3-sack games in a season.

#### **UCHE FOLLOWED A 2-SACK GAME WITH 3 SACKS**

 Uche had two sacks vs. Buffalo on Dec. 1, 2022, and followed that game with three sacks against Arizona. He is the first Patriots player since Trey Flowers in 2016 to have back-to-back games with at least two sacks. Flowers had two sacks at Buffalo (10/30) followed by two sacks vs. Seattle (11/13).



#### DEATRICH WISE JR. RECORDS THREE SACKS VS. BALTIMORE

- Wise had his first career three-sack game after a 3-yard sack in the first quarter, an 8-yard sack and a 1-yard sack in the second quarter vs. Baltimore on Sept. 25, 2022. His previous best was 1½ sacks, which he accomplished three times vs. Buffalo (12/24/17), vs. Houston (9/9/18) and vs. Cleveland (11/14/21).
- Wise is the fifth Patriots player to register three sacks in a half. DL Henry Thomas had three sacks in the first half at St. Louis on Dec. 13, 1998. LB Tully Banta-Cain had three sacks in the second half at Buffalo on Dec. 20, 2009, DL Jarvis Green had three sacks in the second half at Cincinnati on Oct. 1, 2006, and Josh Uche at Arizona on Dec. 12, 2022.

#### 2022 RON BURTON COMMUNITY SERVICE AWARD WINNER

• Wise was honored with the 2022 Ron Burton Community Service Award at the Patriots Premiere last September for his dedication to serving his community. After receiving the award, Wise said, "You don't go out in the community for the gratification. You just do it because it's in your heart to do. It's an honor to win an award of this prestige and to be in the same group as everybody who's won that before and have my name with the Burton family."









#### WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2023

- DB Marcus Jones scored on a 48-yard touchdown reception vs. Buffalo on Dec. 1, 2022. If he scores on offense in 2023, he will join LB Mike Vrabel (8 touchdown receptions) as the only defensive player with more than one touchdown on offense in team history. Vrabel also has the most offensive touchdowns by an NFL defensive player with 10 in the regular season.
- Jones returned a punt 84 yards for a touchdown vs. the New York Jets on Nov. 20, 2022. If he returns a kickoff for a touchdown in 2023, he will become the first New England player to return a punt and a kickoff for a touchdown. He returned 27 kickoffs for 645 yards as a rookie.
- If Jones returns a punt for a touchdown in 2023, he will join Julian Edelman (4), Troy Brown (3), Irving Fryar (3) and Mike Haynes (2) as the only Patriots players with more than one punt returned for a touchdown
- Jones handled kickoff and punt return duties as a rookie in 2022. He will look to become the first Patriots player to ever return a kickoff for a touchdown and punt for a touchdown in the same season and the first NFL player to accomplish the feat since 2019 when Jamal Agnew did so for Detroit.
- Jones scored on offense, defense and special teams in 2022. He is the only player to score in all three phases in a single season since 1970. He is one of ten players to score on offense, defense and special teams during their NFL career.

#### JONES SCORES ON OFFENSE, DEFENSE AND SPECIAL TEAMS

Jones returned a third quarter interception 69 yards for a touchdown vs. Cincinnati on Dec. 24, 2022. He scored on a punt return for a touchdown, a touchdown reception and an interception returned for a touchdown to become the fourth player in NFL history to do so in a season, joining Frank Bacon (1920), Bill Dudley (1947) and Tommy Harmon (1947). Jones returned a punt 84 yards for a touchdown vs. the New York Jets on Nov. 20 and scored on a 48-yard touchdown pass vs. Buffalo on Dec. 1 in addition to the pick-6 against the Bengals. The only other player in the Super Bowl era to score a 40-plus touchdown in each of those ways in their entire career is Deion Sand-

#### FIRST DB TO CATCH A TD ON OFFENSE SINCE 2000

Jones, who made his first career start on defense vs. Buffalo on Dec. 1, 2022, also lined up on offense and scored on a 48-yard touchdown pass from QB Mac Jones on his first play from scrimmage in the first quarter. Jones became the first defensive back to record a touchdown reception on offense since 2000 when S Marcus Coleman of the New York Jets caught a 45-yard touchdown pass from QB Vinny Testaverde against Buffalo on Sept. 17, 2000. Jones caught 15 passes for 137 yards with one receiving touchdown during his college career. He scored on a 47-yard touchdown pass vs. Navy on Sept. 25, 2021. Jones joins LB Mike Vrabel (six 1-yard touchdowns and four 2-yard touchdowns from Tom Brady), LB Elandon Roberts (38-yard touchdown pass from Brady vs. Miami on Dec. 29, 2019) and LB/DE John Tanner (2-yard as the only pass from QB Jim Plunkett on Nov. 24, 1974 at Baltimore) as the only New England defensive players to catch touchdowns.

#### FIRST PAT TO CATCH A TD ON FIRST RECEPTION SINCE 2019

Jones is the first Patriots player to catch a touchdown on his first reception since LB Elandon Roberts caught a 38-yard touchdown pass in the third quarter vs Miami on Dec. 29, 2019. Jones's 48-yard touchdown on his first offensive play is the longest by a Patriots player on his first play since WR Stephen Starring caught a 73-yard touchdown pass from Steve Grogan on his first offensive play vs. Baltimore on Sept. 4, 1983.



#### 9TH PATRIOT TO SCORE ON FIRST CAREER RECEPTION

 Since 1990, DB Marcus Jones is the ninth Patriots player with a touchdown reception on his first NFL reception.

#### JONES MAKES FIRST NFL START

Jones made his first NFL start as a defensive back in a nickel defensive alignment vs. Buffalo on Dec. 1, 2022. He finished the game with one pass defensed. He also had one special teams tackle.

#### **JONES RETURNS PUNT 84 YARDS FOR A TOUCHDOWN**

Jones returned a fourth quarter punt 84 yards for a touchdown vs. the New York Jets on Nov. 20, 2022 with five seconds to play. It is tied with Julian Edelman (84-yard touchdown return vs. Denver on Nov. 2, 2014) for the fifth-longest punt return in team history. Jones was the first player with a punt return for a touchdown in 2022. Jones' punt return for a touchdown is the first for the Patriots since Gunner Olszewski's 70-yard return at the LA Chargers on Dec. 6, 2020.

#### LAST MINUTE GAME WINNER

- Jones is the sixth player in the NFL to record a game-winning punt-return for a touchdown in the final two minutes of regulation or in overtime since 1970, joining Patrick Peterson (Nov. 6, 2011), DeSean Jackson (Dec. 19, 2010), Brian Westbrook (Oct. 19, 2003), Tamarick Vanover (Oct 9, 1995) and Walter Stanley (Nov. 27, 1986).
- Jones' punt return for a touchdown with five seconds remaining vs. the New York Jets (11/20) marked the second-latest game-winning punt return for a touchdown in regulation since 1970, trailing only DeSean Jackson (no time remaining on Dec. 19, 2010) who returned a punt 65-yards for a touchdown in Philadelphia's win at the New York Giants.

#### JONES' 84-YARD PUNT RETURN IS SECOND LONGEST GO-AHEAD TD IN 4TH QUARTER IN TEAM HISTORY

 Jones' 84-yard punt return for a touchdown is the second longest goahead 4th quarter touchdown in team history. The only longer return was the 91-yard missed field goal return for a touchdown by Ron Burton at Denver on Nov. 11, 1962.

#### **WEEK 11 AFC SPECIAL TEAMS PLAYER OF THE WEEK**

 Jones was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week by the National Football League for his performance in the Patriots 10-3 victory over the New York Jets in Week 11.

#### JONES JOINS DEION SANDERS AS TRIPLE-THREAT

Jones registered his first career interception in the third quarter at Arizona on Dec. 12, 2022. He had a 48-yard touchdown reception vs. Buffalo (12/1/22) and returned a punt 84 yards for a touchdown vs. the New York Jets (11/20/22). The only other NFL player with a receiving touchdown, a punt or kick returned for a touchdown and an interception in the same season is Deion Sanders in 1992.



#### SCHOOLER - SPECIAL TEAMS ACE

 Rookie Brenden Schooler recovered his second fumble on the punt return team when he recovered a muffed punt return by WR Chester Rogers in the fourth quarter at Cleveland (10/16/22). Schooler also recovered a muffed punt at Pittsburgh (9/18/22). Schooler had a team-leading 14 special teams tackles in 2022, including 11 solo special teams tackles.

- Matthew Slater has earned an NFL record 10 special teams Pro Bowl invitations and will look to add to that in 2023. His 10 Pro Bowl berths with the Patriots are second to the 14 by Tom Brady.
- Slater entered his 16th consecutive season with the Patriots in 2023, tied with Steve Grogan, behind only the 20 by Tom Brady.

#### **ELECTED TEAM LEADER**

- Slater has been named to 10 Pro Bowls for his special teams work, but perhaps more revealing of his value to New England is the fact that he was elected a captain by his teammates for the 13th straight season in 2023.
- He shared what it means to be a captain in a story published by The Boston Globe. "You have to be able to put others before yourself. Being a captain and leadership is about serving, and to me, that means a great deal of sacrifice putting aside personal agendas for the greater common goal. Leadership is equated with sacrifice. I think you have to be willing to do whatever it takes for the unit to succeed. I think you need to lead by example. A lot of times, it's about what you do, not what you say."

#### **PRO BOWL RECORD**

Slater has earned 10 Pro Bowl invitations (2011-17, 19-21) as a special teams player. Steve Tasker (1987, 90-95) has the second-most with seven Pro Bowl selections. Slater is also the only special teams player to earn seven consecutive Pro Bowls, which he did from 2011-17.



#### **ALL-STAR COMBINATION**

Slater was voted to the Pro Bowl for seven straight seasons from 2011-17 and three more from 2019-21. Those 10 selections are three more than the seven that his father earned with the L.A. Rams. The Slater family's 17 combined Pro Bowls are the second-most among father-son contingents to have been voted to at least one Pro Bowl each.

#### **SLATER'S EMERGENCE WAS SPECIAL**

Bill Belichick acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eight-man rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there — fourth-and-short, where they're trying to protect the box — but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts."



#### **SLATER'S SCORE**

 During a 2007 game against Arizona State, UCLA's Matthew Slater returned a kickoff 89 yards for the final touchdown of his collegiate career. In the Patriots 16-10 win over Buffalo on Sept. 29, 2019, DB J.C. Jackson blocked a punt, which Slater returned 11 yards for his first NFL touchdown, 12 seasons after his last touchdown.

# PATRIOTS PLAYER FOUNDATION WORK



- The Josh Uche Foundation was created to empower and provide at-risk youth with educational advancement, resource programming, mentorship and mental health empowerment.
- Josh plans to start an annual football camp that incorporates yoga and athletic mobility to show young athletes that there's more to physical fitness than just lifting weights and running fast.
- On top of the introduction of the football camps, Josh Uche is currently in the process of developing a mental health app for athletes.



- Wise Up & Co. is a foundation started by Patriots defensive lineman Deatrich Wise Jr. and his brothers, Daniel and Solomon Wise. The brothers started the foundation to leverage their name off the field with the aim to have a positive impact on the community.

#### **COMEBACKS FOR THE AGES**

The Patriots have staged two historic come-from-behind victories over the past several seasons:

Bill Belichick coached the Patriots back from a 25-point deficit to win Super Bowl LI. A comeback of that magnitude is extremely rare. There had been 2,656 games in which a team led by 25 points or more in NFL history, including the postseason. Teams leading by 25 had recorded 2,647 wins, seven losses and two ties, a winning percentage of .997.

New England came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos, 34-31, in overtime in a Sunday Night Football matchup on Nov. 24, 2013, marking the largest regular season comeback win in team history, after trailing 24-0 at halftime.

New England's previous best comeback win was from a 23-0 deficit to win, 38-23, vs. Seattle (09/16/84). The Patriots also came back from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, 23-22 (12/21/96). The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently vs. Buffalo (01/01/12).
