ABOUT THE FOUNDATION



The New England Patriots Charitable Foundation is the nonprofit organization established by Robert Kraft and the Kraft family in 1994 to support charitable and philanthropic agencies throughout New England. This support comes in the form of direct grants and the donation of signed memorabilia to charitable causes, and from Patriots players who offer their direct support by appearing at charity functions throughout the year.

The Foundation's primary goal is to support programs that aid the youth and families of the New England region by assisting programs that foster cultural diversity, education, family and health. The Foundation has taken special interest in youth programs that encourage education, creativity and development of character.

RON BURTON AWARD



The Ron Burton Community Service Award is presented annually to a Patriots player in recognition of his many contributions in the community and is named after Ron Burton, who was the first player drafted in franchise history and left a lasting legacy by committing his life to helping others. Patriots punter Zoltan Mesko was awarded the prestigious New England Patriots Ron Burton Award Community Service Award at the 2012 Kickoff Gala in recognition of his outstanding commitment to the community. Previous Ron Burton Award winners include Joe Andruzzi (2003), Troy Brown (2004), Matt Light (2005), Jarvis Green (2006), Ty Warren (2007), Larry Izzo (2008), Kevin Faulk (2009), Vince Wilfork (2010) and Jerod Mayo (2011).

PATRIOTS FUN FACTS & FIGURES



Since its inception in 1994, the New England Patriots Charitable Foundation has donated millions of dollars to charitable causes throughout the region and around the world.

The Foundation made more than 2,000 donations of autographed memorabilia to thousands of New England nonprofits during the 2012 season.





Current and former Patriots players made more than 350 player appearances throughout the 2012 season as part of Patriots Community Tuesdays.

In 2013, 34 members of the Patriots Marathon Team raised a recordbreaking \$253,000 in support of the Myra Kraft Community MVP Awards and a donation to the One Fund Boston in the wake of the marathon tragedy.

Patriots fans donated more than 76,876 volunteer hours throughout the 2012 football season as part of the Celebrate Volunteerism initiative.

More than 25,000 Patriots fans in Massachusetts are displaying their team pride with a Patriots license plate.

Following the marathon tragedy in April, the Kraft family announced a matching donation program, which resulted in a \$617,000 donation to the One Fund Boston, in support of victims.

More than 130 members of the military were welcomed by the Kraft family at the Veteran's Day game and assisted in displaying an American flag that spanned the entire field.





Students at Weymouth High School donated 21,000 volunteer hours in 2012 as part of the Patriots school-based Celebrate Volunteerism program.



The Patriots teamed with veterans during Raytheon's pregame hospitality in The Hall at Patriot Place presented by Raytheon, to create 100 personalized care packages for troops serving overseas. The event took place in collaboration with \$25,000 grand prize Myra Kraft Community MVP Award winner Lou Cimaglia's nonprofit, Local Heroes.

Patriots players, alumni and staff sported more than 2,000 Celebrate Volunteerism T-shirts while volunteering in New England communities.



In 2012, the Foundation recognized 16 outstanding volunteers as Patriots Difference Makers. You too can become a Patriots Difference Maker by pledging volunteer hours, printing an official Patriots Difference Maker Certificate and submitting your volunteerism photos.





Each year, the Foundation raffles off a chance to travel on the team plane on an away-game trip through the "Ultimate Road Trip Raffle." IN AN ON-FIELD CEREMONY, THE FOUNDATION PROVIDED \$25,000 IN GRANTS TO THE 16 NONPROFITS OF THE PATRIOTS DIFFERENCE MAKERS OF THE WEEK.

The nonprofit where each Patriots Difference Maker volunteers was awarded a \$1,000 grant in recognition for their volunteer work. At the end of the 2012 season, members of the Kraft family and a panel of judges named a grand prize Patriots Difference Maker whose nonprofit received an additional \$10,000 grant. David Rosenthal from the American Cancer Society, which supports individuals and families battling cancer, was named the grand prize winner for his outstanding dedication and service to those in need.


DEC. 30 CELEBRATION & BEYOND

THROUGHOUT THE YEAR, PATRIOTS PLAYERS VISIT SCHOOLS, BOYS & GIRLS CLUBS AND COMMUNITY ORGANIZATIONS PROMOTING LITERACY, EDUCATION AND CREATIVE LEARNING THROUGH PROGRAMS THAT INCLUDE READ BETWEEN THE LINES, SCHOLARSHIPS AND THE "SCIENCE OF SPORTS" SCIENCE FAIR IN PARTNERSHIP WITH RAYTHEON. THE PATRIOTS AIM TO INSPIRE SUCCESS IN AND OUTSIDE THE CLASSROOM.



READ BETWEEN THE LINES

EACH YEAR, THE FOUNDATION PRESENTS READ BETWEEN THE LINES, A PROGRAM THAT AIMS TO ENCOURAGE SUMMER READING AT SCHOOL ASSEMBLIES AT NEW ENGLAND MIDDLE SCHOOLS.

With the goal to encourage reading year-round, current and former Patriots players visit schools at the end of each school year to promote the summer reading program which encourages students to meet their schools' summer reading goals to earn a school assembly in the fall featuring Patriots players and special prizes. The kickoff events emphasize the importance of reading, education and setting goals, followed by a question and answer session with the students. If the school reports an achieved reading goal in the fall, Patriots players return for a celebration and lunch with the top performers in each grade.



Nearly 3,000 Patriots book marks were distributed to local students to encourage summer reading.

During the four-month program, more than 40 Raytheon employees volunteered to made weekly visits to 17 Boys & Girls Club locations (Billerica, Brockton, Charlestown, Dorchester, Hudson, Lawrence, Leominster, Lowell, Marlborough, Marshfield, Nashua (N.H.), Newport (R.I.), Portsmouth (R.I.), Roxbury, Salem (N.H.), Waltham and Woburn Boys & Girls Clubs) to help imagine and execute projects that explore math or science through sports in preparation for the "Science of Sports" Science Fair. The competing teams presented their projects to a panel of executive judges including Raytheon Chairman and CEO William H. Swanson, The Kraft Group Chairman and CEO Robert Kraft and Patriots tackle Nate Solder.

RAYTHEON EMPLOYEES TEAM WITH STUDENTS FROM BOYS & GIRLS CLUBS ACROSS NEW ENGLAND FOR A FIVE-MONTH PROGRAM THAT CULMINATES WITH A SCIENCE FAIR AT GILLETTE STADIUM. TO CELEBRATE THE FIFTH ANNIVERSARY OF THE PROGRAM, RAYTHEON CHAIRMAN AND CEO WILLIAM H. SWANSON AND CHAIRMAN AND CEO OF THE NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS, ROBERT KRAFT, SAT DOWN PRIOR TO THE 2013 SCIENCE FAIR TO REFLECT ON THEIR FAVORITE MOMENTS.

Five years into the program, what is your favorite memory?



ROBERT KRAFT:

"Though each year is memorable, one of my favorite memories is meeting the grand prize winners from last year's 'Science of Sports' Science Fair. The 'Las Ultimate Twirlers' were an all-girl team from Lawrence, Mass. that explored the use of science in the sport of gymnastics. When I met the team, I could sense their passion for

their project, their excitement about what they were learning and interest in how it applied to their every-day life. They were full of enthusiasm, which gets me excited

about helping to build futures in math and science.

Not only did I enjoy their energetic presentation, but when we announced them as the grand prize winners, it was fun to see their excitement as they ran onto the stage to receive their trophy and scholarships."



BILL SWANSON:

"I love watching these young students being selected and recognized for their achievements. I have so much fun being a judge and hearing them explain to me what they are doing.

Then I get to ask questions to see how well they understand the principles of science they use to

reach a conclusion. When you see them 'light up' explaining their projects, it is something special."

Why did Raytheon and the New England Patriots partner to develop the Science of Sports Science Fair?

ROBERT KRAFT:

"First of all, I have great respect and admiration for Raytheon's Chairman and CEO Bill Swanson. He has done tremendous things with Raytheon. We enjoy a shared vision for excellence in the business community as well as a fervent commitment to philanthropy and communities in our region and around the world.

One of the projects we have worked together to develop is The Hall at Patriot Place presented by Raytheon, which opened in 2008. Not only is The Hall a unique place to learn and remember Patriots history, but we partnered with Raytheon to utilize math and science to promote education through family-centered games, activities and science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) education.

Throughout the school year, thousands of students visit The Hall to learn about the Patriots. Through sports, we can attract students to engage in the study of science in a way that most really enjoy. As part of wanting to do more, five years ago we implemented this 'Science of Sports' Science Fair which engages hundreds of youth at New England Boys & Girls Clubs and pairs them with more than 70 Raytheon volunteer mentors to brainstorm, create and host their project at our annual 'Science of Sports' Science Fair. Each year, Bill and I are joined by a Patriots player to serve as judges. We enjoy meeting the students, learning about their projects and awarding scholarships for the best projects."

BILL SWANSON:

"I have had the good fortune of knowing Robert Kraft for many years. We have much in common, and I've been consistently impressed with his leadership, business acumen and integrity. So we're often looking for areas where we can work together and partner.

After we teamed up for The Hall at Patriot Place presented by Raytheon, we were discussing how we might partner to help the youth of New England, and the concept of the Science Fair came up. Robert and the Kraft family are renowned for giving back to the community, and Raytheon has long been focused on supporting math and science education. We combined these interests to benefit the students at area Boys and Girls Clubs.

Raytheon has our passionate employee volunteers who mentor the students, and the Patriots provide the venue, the players and make the students feel like superstars. It's far exceeded our initial expectations, and it's become one of the events I most look forward to each year."



"SCIENCE OF SPORTS" SCIENCE FAIR

Patriots players Danny Woodhead, Patrick Chung, Sebastian Vollmer and Jerod Mayo have all participated as guest judges; do you have any memorable stories about them?

ROBERT KRAFT:

"I am always amazed at how much science is utilized in the sport of football. That is one of the things the judges talk about before each science fair. It's one of the conversations I really enjoy having with each of the players that participate from year to year. It brings it back to the importance of education, which is the reason we implemented this program. Each of the players bring their own personality to the judging process.

Jerod Mayo dove into the projects and spent a lot of time laughing with the students. Patrick Chung really pored over the scores and debated while trying to make the right decision. Last year, when Danny Woodhead joined us we joked that he met the height requirement of being a judge. This year will be a little different when we are joined by 6-foot-7-inch offensive tackle Nate Solder. I am looking forward to it and I know Nate is, too."

BILL SWANSON:

"It was fun having Danny Woodhead last year, because he was one player I was taller than. It's good knowing that I'm bigger than a professional football player, and I hope Robert Kraft has let Coach Belichick know that I'm available if needed."

What do you look forward to the most for each Science of Sports Science Fair? ROBERT KRAFT:

"One of my big concerns is that we have a shortage of young people in the study of math and science and we don't fill the engineering needs of this country. I think this program plants the seeds in young, talented people who hopefully will be inspired to continue study in the field.

At this year's 'Science of Sports' Science Fair, we welcome one of the largest groups of students and Raytheon mentors in the five years since we created this program.

Each year, I am impressed as the projects get more creative. I am looking forward to seeing this year's projects, meeting the students and encouraging them to continue their educational pursuits in math and sciences."

BILL SWANSON:

"Seeing these young students get excited about the Science of Sports. It never gets old. They work so hard on these projects and are so proud of their work. Then they get to experience Gillette Stadium, which brings their experience to a whole other level.

Their enthusiasm is truly infectious, which really makes you feel good about the future – since our nation needs to inspire a new generation of scientists, technologists and engineers to drive innovation and U.S. economic growth. And of course, I always look forward to strengthening our partnership with Robert, the Kraft family and the Patriots."



What about the Science of Sports Program are you most proud?

ROBERT KRAFT:

"I think one of my favorite elements of this program is the idea that investing in our youth reaps numerous rewards and creates a positive ripple effect for the future. The 'Science of Sports.' Science Fair utilizes many different groups of volunteers, including more than 70 Raytheon mentors. Through these sports-themed projects, the mentors make science fun. I am sure, through this science fair, seeds of interest have sprouted from students who otherwise might have never taken an interest in math or sciences. Inspiring study in STEM fields is so important to our future.

I am just proud to see the engagement and excitement these students have about their projects and hope it inspires greatness in the future."

BILL SWANSON:

"The partnership with the Kraft family, the Patriots organization, and seeing how working together we all make a difference in the lives of others. Robert and I share a concern for growing the 'pipeline' of students pursuing studies and careers in STEM.

STEM careers are wonderfully rewarding and challenging, and they are also much needed for our nation to continue as innovation leaders in this era of global competitiveness. It is our hope that this Science Fair serves to inspire the students to develop an interest in STEM so they'll be excited to pursue STEM education.


Sometimes all it takes is a single moment or spark to inspire a future engineer or scientist to pursue a STEM career. What a great 'spark' to pair science and sports together."


When reading to children out loud, players often read the Let's Go Patriots book, which encourages children to interact with the reader and cheer "Let's Go Patriots!" on cue.

WITH \$754,258 RAISED IN 2012, THE PATRIOTS PLATELET PEDALERS ARE ONE OF THE HIGHEST FUNDRAISING TEAMS IN THE PAN-MASS CHALLENGE.

In 2013, and for six years running, the Patriots Platelet Pedalers are the largest team in the Pan-Mass Challenge, averaging 120 riders each year and raising funds for Dana-Farber Cancer Institute. The money is earmarked for Dr. Ken Anderson, the Kraft Family Professor of Medicine at Harvard Medical School and Dana-Farber, to support his multiple myeloma research and development of novel therapies. Since the team aligned with the Kraft family and Patriots organization in 2008, the PPP team has raised more than \$3.6 million for cancer research.





MAKE-A-WISH

IN 2013, ON PATRIOTS DAY, THE PATRIOTS MARATHON TEAM STOOD AT THE STARTING LINE OF THE 117TH BOSTON MARATHON AFTER MONTHS OF TIRELESS TRAINING AND RECORD-BREAKING FUNDRAISING IN SUPPORT OF THE MYRA KRAFT COMMUNITY MVP AWARDS. THE DAY HAD A VERY DIFFERENT ENDING THAN ANYONE THOUGHT IT WOULD.

Setting an ambitious fundraising goal, the team eclipsed past totals with a record-breaking \$253,000 raised. The 2013 team included runners from 10 states, and a variety of Patriots staff members, former players, first-time marathoners and avid runners.

For the third year, the funds raised supported the Myra Kraft Community MVP Awards program, which honors deserving volunteers by awarding grants to the nonprofits for which they volunteer. 

"I consider our veterans and active duty soldiers as the true unsung heroes of our country," said Patriots Chairman and CEO Robert Kraft the week of the game. "We look forward to honoring our military with events throughout the week, including a pregame Salute to Service on Sunday that will include representatives from each branch of military. It's always great to give our fans an opportunity to show their appreciation to these real Patriots heroes."

The game also featured a flyover from 439 Airlift Wing in Westover, Mass., a Color Guard ceremony performed by the Army National Guard and national anthem sung by the 215th Army Band's Voices of Freedom. During the game, all service men and women were asked to stand and be recognized and messages from military members serving overseas were played in-game on the video boards.

Prior to the game, the Foundation and 2012 Myra Kraft Community MVP Award winner, Lou Cimaglia from Local Heroes, joined Patriots partner Raytheon for a military care package event during Raytheon's pregame hospitality in The Hall at Patriot Place presented by Raytheon. More than 150 veterans and their families attended. Guests had the opportunity to create a care package, as well as write a personalized message for troops serving overseas. Throughout the weekend, veterans and active military also enjoyed free trips to The Hall.

Also in recognition of Veterans Day, the Patriots unveiled a permanently unoccupied black seat in the south end of Gillette Stadium that is dedicated to the thousands of Patriots who remain unaccounted for as POW/MIA. The empty seat serves as a permanent memorial to honor the brave men and women who served our country and never returned home.








THE KRAFT CENTER

THE Myra H. Kraft LEGACY FUNDS



Myra Kraft served on the Boys & Girls Clubs of Boston's (BGCB) Board of Directors from 1983 to 2011, including an unprecedented seven years as Chair. Becoming the first woman to serve as Chair of the Board was one of the proudest of Myra's myriad of accomplishments. Under her leadership, BGCB grew dramatically in the number and quality of programs offered and the number of youth served. In Myra's honor, funds have been established to recognize Myra's legacy, and they have been funded generously by gifts given in her name by her friends, family and those she impacted. Myra believed strongly in the importance of giving back, and through gifts to the Myra H. Kraft Giving Back Funds, donors are helping to keep Myra's legacy of philanthropic giving alive for generations to come.





Myra H. Kraft Volunteer Fund GIVING BACK

The Myra H. Kraft Giving Back Volunteer Services Fund continues to make a significant impact on the 15,000 youth that the Boys & Girls Clubs of Boston (BGCB) serves annually.

The Boys & Girls Clubs of Boston's (BGCB) was fortunate to host nearly 700 ongoing individual volunteers in Fiscal Year 2013. These volunteers included local college students, corporate partners, and BGCB alumni who committed at least one hour a week for 12 weeks providing programming and administrative support to our 11 Clubs. Of BGCB volunteers surveyed in the spring, 92 percent felt they had made a worthwhile contribution to the organization through their volunteer work.

In a year-long collaboration with Lasell College, students from the college served as volunteers at both the South Boston Club and on the Lasell campus. Volunteers supported Club events, such as the South Boston Club St. Patrick's Day Road Race and Regional Keystone Conference for 450 teens, ran a fashion and reading program at South Boston, donated gifts to BGCB's holiday gift drive and provided college workshops and early college awareness programming. One highlight of the partnership was the opportunity for South Boston Club members to spend an afternoon experiencing "college life" with a tour of Lasell's campus, dinner in the dining hall and organized activities in classes with faculty and students. One Lasell student commented, "I love being able to work with the kids and show them that college is an option for everyone."

In total, the partnership allowed 197 Lasell students and staff to contribute 1,135 hours over the course of the academic year to positively impact over 200 Club members from several Clubs within the agency.

The MHK Volunteer Services Fund continues to have a terrific impact on the youth we serve.



The Myra H. Kraft Giving Back Assistance Fund is a fund that helps those with crucial unmet needs related to daily living and is 100 percent funded by the Kraft family. Grants from the Assistance Fund are awarded for a range of needs including health care, education, transportation and housing, among others. The Boys & Girls Clubs of Boston is pleased to report that the Myra H. Kraft Giving Back Assistance Fund continues to have an outstanding impact on the community. Annually, more than \$150,000 will be awarded to deserving community members through the Myra H. Kraft Giving Back Assistance Fund, continuing Myra's legacy of compassion and generosity.

2013 MYRA H. KRAFT GIVING BACK ASSISTANCE FUND AWARDEES INCLUDE:

KIM

In April 2013, BGCB used the Myra H. Kraft Giving Back Assistance Fund to help the family of Kim, a Club member who was hit by a car and suffered major injuries including multiple broken bones, internal bleeding and memory loss. While Kim's medical bills were covered through insurance, her mother was afraid that when she finally came home from the hospital, the family's electricity would be turned off due to an outstanding bill. The Assistance Fund covered the family's amount due.

SHEILA

In May 2013, the fund supported Sheila, a volunteer facing financial hardship after her husband was murdered last August. At the time of her husband's death, Sheila was left with two-week-old infant and an eight-year-old child, and since then she had been struggling to afford rent, utilities, car payments, food, clothing and numerous expenses associated with maintaining the household. Her gas was shut off and she had to seek services to restore the heat despite being far in arrears. BGCB provided Sheila with the funds she needed to pay her gas bill, referred her to the DA's office for Victim's Assistance and encouraged her to apply for Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits.

JENNA

In June, the Assistance Fund supported Jenna, an active member of the Parents Committee at the Club, whose daughter was tragically killed in a drive-by shooting. The event deeply impacted members, parents and staff at the Club, and Jenna found herself in need of financial support to cover funeral expenses. BGCB provided her with funds towards the expenses.

KARIN

The Assistance Fund also supported Karin, a client of Women's Lunch Place. Karin's sister died in March and Karin had to use her rent money to cover funeral expenses. She had been searching for additional income, but had been unable to find anything and was in jeopardy of losing her apartment. BGCB helped Karin to pay her back rent to avoid eviction.

DIANE

This summer, the Club suffered a tragic loss when Diane, a 39-year-old mother of four young Club members, died after a courageous battle with cancer. Diane's family needed to use what little money they had put aside to cover funeral costs, leaving them in need of financial assistance for food, summer clothes and summer camp fees.




AMERICAN FOOTBALL IN ISRAEL

The Kraft Family Stadium is outfitted with a FieldTurf surface and is home to a number of AFI and IFL teams. The Kraft Family Stadium also hosts youth programs in football, baseball and soccer, and is one of the most heavily used sports facilities in Jerusalem. It also serves as a venue for special events and summer day camp for over 200 children.

OPERATION MOSES - Caring, Leadership and a Journey to Hope

Robert and Myra Kraft were leaders in providing support to Ethiopian *olim* (immigrants) who came to Israel through the covert Operation Moses. They played a key role in providing integration strategies for individuals from diverse backgrounds, including thousands of Jewish Ethiopians who fled Ethiopia on foot for refugee camps in Sudan. Their perilous journey usually took two weeks to a month, during which they endured violence and illness along the way. The Krafts were at the forefront of the efforts to resettle this brave vanguard of Ethiopian *aliyah* in Israel. They helped meet a complex set of needs including Hebrew language acquisition, housing, medical and dental care, with a special focus on the needs of children. More than 8,000 were airlifted to Israel from Sudanese camps between November 1984 and January 1985. Their leadership continues to have an important impact on Israeli society and culture.
