## NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (1-1) AT TENNESSEE TITANS (1-1) Friday, August 25, 2023 • Nissan Stadium $(69,143) \cdot$ 8:15 p.m. ET

The New England Patriots were scheduled to travel directly from Green Bay to Nashville for joint practice sessions with the Tennessee Titans, but due to the circumstances that led to suspending the preseason game against the Packers in the fourth quarter, the Patriots traveled back to Foxboro. The team will practice at Gillette Stadium on Tuesday and Wednesday and then travel to Tennessee on Thursday prior to the 2023 preseason-finale on Friday night against the Titans.

## BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be broadcast by the Patriots Preseason Television Network and can be seen in every New England state, as well as Alaska and Hawaii. The preseason network's flagship station is WBZ-TV CBS in Boston. Bob Socci provides the play-by-play and is joined by former Patriots quarterback Scott Zolak in the broadcast booth and studio analysis by senior editor Paul Perillo. WBZ's Steve Burton will provide sideline analysis. Devin and Jason McCourty will be featured in "The McCourty TwinCast" to complement the broadcast. The TwinCast will stream on Patriots.com and WBZ.com.

LOCAL RADIO: 98.5 The Sports Hub is the flagship station for the Patriots Radio Network. A complete listing of the network's 33 stations can be found in this press release on page 60. The television broadcast will simulcast the game on the radio during the preseason.

## PATRIOTS ARE HEADING TO GERMANY

In Week 10 of the 2023 season the Patriots will travel to Frankfurt, Germany on Nov. 12. to corral the Indianapolis Colts. The game will be the Patriots' first in Germany as part of the 2023 National Football League's International Games. The internationally-televised game will be played at 3:30 p.m. in Frankfurt (9:30 a.m. Eastern Standard Time).

The Patriots visit to Germany will mark their first time hosting an international home game since the launch of the International Series in 2007. The Patriots have played three international games to date, including two in London and one in Mexico. In 2009, the Patriots defeated the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, 35-7, at Wembley Stadium. The Patriots returned to London in 2012 and won their game against the St. Louis Rams, 45-7. In 2017, the Patriots made their first appearance in Mexico City, defeating the Oakland Raiders, 33-8, at Estadio Azteca.

## SERIIES HISTORY

The New England Patriots and Tennessee Titans (formerly the Houston Oilers) will square off in the preseason for the first time since 2019 when the Patriots traveled to Nashville for joint practice sessions prior to a 22-17 victory on Aug. 17, 2019. The last time the two teams played in the regular season was in 2021 when Tennessee lost, 36-13, at Gillette Stadium on Nov. 28, 2021.

The teams have played 45 times in regular season and postseason play since the two charter members of the American Football League began play in 1960. The Patriots and Oilers played twice each year from 1960-1969 in the AFL and have played 25 times since the AFL-NFL merger in 1970. In those 25 post-merger games, the Patriots have a 16-9 record, including a 2-2 mark in playoff games

New England leads the overall regular season and postseason series, 26-18-1, with a 24-16-1 New England advantage in the regular season.

Under Kraft's leadership since he purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports.

Kraft has led the two most dominant decades in NFL history in terms of overall wins - 141 (2010-19) and 126 (2000-09).

Kraft is the most successful owner since he purchased the team in 1994 in terms of wins (349), division titles (19), winning percentage (.678), playoff wins (33) and playoff seasons (22).


Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. In his 29 seasons of ownership, he has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what many observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (. 238 pct.), the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on
 Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (19), conference crowns (10) and Super Bowl championships (6) than any other NFL team. Additionally, the Patriots have achieved the most winning seasons (24) since Kraft assumed ownership beginning in 1994. Super Bowl LIII was the 10th Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has appeared in more than four Super Bowls. In Kraft's 29 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 22 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons.

## A WINNING TRADITION I

Robert Kraft won his 300th game overall as owner of the New England Patriots against Miami on Sept. 30, 2018. Kraft reached the milestone in his 25th NFL season and in his 432nd game, the fastest an owner has reached the mark. ## KRAFT PASSES OTHER OWNERS

The Patriots have 349 wins overall under Robert Kraft. He has produced more victories than every other Patriots owner combined. Under Kraft, the Patriots are 349-166 overall since he purchased the team in 1994. Kraft's predecessors in the owner's office went 225-276-9 in the 34 years prior to his purchase of the team.

## CONTINUITY BREEDS SUCCESS

New England is the first team in NFL history to win six Super Bowls with the same owner (Robert Kraft), head coach (Bill Belichick) and quarterback (Tom Brady).

## PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 28 times in their 63-year history. Twenty-two of those playoff berths have come in the 29 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. The Patriots have won 22 division crowns.

- Ty Montgomery II is making an impact on current individuals aging out of the foster care system, a cause that is close to his heart. "Those who have been in the foster care system will always hold a special place in my heart," Montgomery said. "I know the love they need. \section*{DEDICATION TO HIS GOALS}
- While in high school, Stevenson started gaining attention for the impressive stats he posted as a junior. Unfortunately, due to his grades, Stevenson was academically ineligible to receive a football scholarship despite being recruited. Following his senior year of high school, Stevenson took a year off from football and worked part-time jobs at Wal-Mart and Jimmy John's. But after a year away, he decided to follow a group of his friends and enroll in Cerritos Community College. During his time at Cerritos, he shared a two-bedroom apartment with up to six other guys at times and rode his bicycle 20 minutes to and from practice every day. After putting up monster stats in his second season at Cerriots, he committed to Oklahoma. Oklahoma led him to the 2021 NFL Draft where in the fourth round on the third day the Patriots selected Stevenson. In addition, he worked on his academics and made the Dean's List while at Oklahoma.

\section*{STEVENSON RECORDS FIRST RECEIVING TOUCHDOWN}
- Stevenson had his first career touchdown reception on a 3-yard pass from QB Mac Jones in the second quarter vs. Indianapolis on Nov. 62022.

\section*{CAREER HIGHS IN RECEPTIONS AND RECEIVING YARDS}
- Stevenson set career highs in receptions and receiving yards after finishing with 9 receptions for 76 yards at Minnesota on Nov. 24, 2022. His previous high in receptions was 8 vs. Chicago on Oct. 24, 2022 and his previous high in receiving yards was 72 yards on Oct. 30, 2022 at the New York Jets.

FROM HOUSTON BAPTIST, TO WESTERN KENTUCKY, TO NEW ENGLAND
- 2022 fourth-round draft pick QB Bailey Zappe played his first four college seasons at Houston Baptist before playing at Western Kentucky in 2021. While at Western Kentucky, Zappe set new all-time single season FBS records with 5,987 yards and 62 touchdown passes, breaking the record held by Texas Tech's B.J. Symons (5,833 in 2013) and Joe Burrow (60 touchdown passes in 2019).

\section*{BAILEY ZAPPE THROWS FOR OVER 300 YARDS}
- Zappe made his second straight start of the season at Cleveland on Oct. 16, 2022, and finished 24 -of- 34 for 309 yards with two touchdown passes en route to a \(38-15\) victory. He became the first Patriots rookie quarterback to win in his first home and first road game after starting in the \(29-0\) victory at home against Detroit on Oct. 9. Zappe had a passer rating of 118.4 against the Browns. He is the first rookie quarterback to win and record a 100 -plus passer rating in his first two starts since Sonny Jurgensen in 1957. Zappe had a passer rating of 100 in his first start against the Lions.

- "I think he has a ton of ability, natural ability, and he plays hard," Seymour told the Boston Herald. "I think he's going to be a problem for (opposing teams) for a long time to come. Hopefully he stays healthy and continues on the path he's on. I think he has a really bright future."


\section*{SECOND-MOST QUARTERBACK PRESSURES}
- Barmore posted the second-most quarterback pressures for a first-year defensive tackle since 2006, according to Pro Football Focus. His 48 pressures in 2021 were two more than Aaron Donald had during his rookie season.


\section*{2022 ACCOMPLISHMENTS}
- LB Ja'Whaun Bentley set a single-season career-high with 122 tackles in 2022. He surpassed his previous best of 108 total tackles in 2021. He became the 13th New England player to reach at least 120 total tackles in a season and the first Patriots player to do so since Jerod Mayo had 147 total tackles in 2012.


Ja'Whaun and his family were homeless starting his freshman year of high school, living with one set of grandparents, then the other, then an aunt. Ja'Whaun and his brother slept on couches and floors at times over the course of several years. Once Ja'Whaun entered the NFL, he was able to secure permanent housing for his family.

\section*{A PICK-6 AND A FORCED FUMBLE IN NFL STARTING DEBUT}
- Patriots 2022 fourth-round pick Jack Jones was in the starting lineup at cornerback at Green Bay on Oct. 2, 2021, in place of the injured Jalen Mills. It was Jones' first NFL start. He forced and recovered a fumble on WR Romeo Doubs in the first quarter to give the Patriots a first down at the 50-yard line. Later in the second quarter, he intercepted QB Aaron Rodgers pass and returned it 40 yards for a touchdown. It was only the second time that Rodgers has had an interception returned for a touchdown at Lambeau Field ( 3,511 pass attempts). Jones is the first rookie in NFL history with a forced fumble, a fumble recovered and an interception returned for a touchdown in a single game.

\section*{WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2023}
- LB Matthew Judon led the team with a career-high \(151 / 2\) sacks in 2022 following a team-leading \(121 / 2\) sacks in 2021 . He can join Tony McGee ( 12 in \(1977,11 \frac{1}{2}\) in 1978 and \(101 / 2\) in 1979) as the only Patriots player with three straight double-digit sack seasons.
- Judon has registered double-digit sack totals in each of his first two seasons in New England and can join Andre Tippett (3) and Tony McGee (3) as the only Patriots players with three double-digit sack totals. Judon has registered 28 total sacks in the last two seasons ( \(151 / 2\) in 2022 and \(121 / 2\) in 2021). He needs \(161 / 2\) sacks in 2023 to match the best three-year total in New England history with \(441 / 2\) sacks by Andre Tippett ( \(181 / 2\) in \(1984,161 / 2\) in 1985 and \(91 / 2\) in 1986).

- Judon was selected to represent the New England Patriots in the 2023 NFL Pro Bowl. Judon has earned four consecutive Pro Bowls and two straight with the Patriots.

- Judon led the team with a career-high \(121 / 2\) sacks in 2021 and reached a career-high and \(151 / 2\) sacks in 2022 to become the fourth Patriots player with back-to-back 10-plus sack totals, joining Garin Veris (10 in 1985 and 11 in 1986), Andre Tippett ( \(181 / 2\) in 1984 and \(161 / 2\) in 1985) and Tony McGee ( 12 in \(1977,11 \frac{1}{2}\) in 1978 and \(101 / 2\) in 1979). - Pro Football Hall of Famer Andre Tippett is the only Patriots player to record more sacks in a season than Judon's \(151 / 2\) in 2022 with Tippett recording \(181 / 2\) in 1984 and \(161 / 2\) in 1985.

\section*{WEEK 5 AFC DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK}
- Judon was named AFC Defensive Player of the Week by the National Football League for his performance in the Patriots 29-0 shutout victory over the Detroit Lions on Oct. 9, 2022. Detroit entered the game with the top ranked offense and was averaging 35 points per game. Judon had a 9-yard sack of QB Jared Goff in the second quarter and then forced a fumble on a 13-yard sack later in the second quarter that was returned for a 59-yard touchdown by DB Kyle Dugger.
- It is the second Player of the Week Award for Judon in his career. He earned AFC Defensive Player of the Week honors following a Week 11 performance in 2017 while with Baltimore.

- DB Jalen Mills has embraced his nickname "The Green Goblin." The origins of the nickname started out as a joke during his rookie season with Philadelphia when he dyed his hair green. Mills is not sure whether it was a coach or the media, but the spiderman villain nickname stuck.
- Said Mills, "It just kind of came from my rookie year and then just throughout my years playing for the Eagles, my style of play. That's what I get it from. It's kind of something that I stuck with."

\section*{A NUMBER CHANGE WITH A STORY}

Late in the Eagles' eventual Super Bowl-winning season, Jalen's Uncle Uhkoto lost his battle with cancer. The once-close relatives had long since drifted apart and fallen out of touch. As a result, only in the wake of Uhkoto's death did Jalen learn that his uncle - a man who otherwise shunned sports - could quote his nephew's NFL statistics chapter and verse: every pass breakup, every interception, every tackle, every game, Uhkoto was keeping track of Jalen. The discovery left him with a heavy heart.
"It kind of broke me down," Jalen revealed, "because we had grown apart. We were close at one point in time. It took that moment for me to realize, this is a man I looked up to as a younger kid, and now he was looking up to me, keeping up with sports that he didn't even care about. So, I wanted to honor him in my own quiet way."

In 2021, Mills got that opportunity. After signing his free-agent contract with New England, Jalen learned that the NFL would relax its jersey number restrictions, allowing certain positions beyond kickers, punters and quarterbacks to wear single-digits on their uniforms.

Mills, who wore 31 and 21 at times as an Eagle, chose No. 2 in New England. Almost no one ever called Uhkoto - pronounced uh-COO-too - by his full name. They preferred his shortened nickname: Two.


\section*{VERSATILITY}
- "I'm one of the guys that when you ask me what position I play, I say 'defense.' I want to be able to line up everywhere, and most importantly, I want to be able to produce everywhere."
- Began his career in 2014 in San Diego focusing on special teams and was selected to his first Pro Bowl in 2018 as a special teamer. His 2018 Pro Bowl berth was the only one that Matthew Slater did not get voted to from 2011-2021.
- Started all 16 games at safety in 2020 for the Patriots and led the team in tackles with a career-high 107.


\section*{ASK AND JAHLANI RECEIVED}

LB Jahlani Tavai starred in high school as a nose guard. He was undersized and did not attract attention of many colleges. But after finding out one of the English teachers at his high school was the son of then-Hawaii coach Norm Chow, he reached out to the teacher, Cameron Chow, and asked if Cameron could tell his dad to scout his tape. Cameron followed up and passed along Jahlani's tape to his dad and the very next day Jahlani had a scholarship offer. According to Jahlani, his football career would have been over after high school if it wasn't for this connection.

The Patriots signed DL Justus Tavai as a rookie free agent this past spring, the younger brother of LB Jahlani Tavai. The Tavai brothers can become the sixth set of brothers to play together New England.

- DB Marcus Jones scored on a 48-yard touchdown reception vs. Buffalo on Dec. 1, 2022. If he scores on offense in 2023, he will join LB Mike Vrabel (8 touchdown receptions) as the only defensive player with more than one touchdown on offense in team history. Vrabel also has the most offensive touchdowns by an NFL defensive player with 10 in the regular season.
- Jones returned a punt 84 yards for a touchdown vs. the New York Jets on Nov. 20, 2022. If he returns a kickoff for a touchdown in 2023, he will become the first New England player to return a punt and a kickoff for a touchdown. He returned 27 kickoffs for 645 yards as a rookie.
- If Jones returns a punt for a touchdown in 2023, he will join Julian Edelman (4), Troy Brown (3), Irving Fryar (3) and Mike Haynes (2) as the only Patriots players with more than one punt returned for a touchdown.
- Jones handled kickoff and punt return duties as a rookie in 2022. He will look to become the first Patriots player to ever return a kickoff for a touchdown and punt for a touchdown in the same season and the first NFL player to accomplish the feat since 2019 when Jamal Agnew did so for Detroit.
- Jones scored on offense, defense and special teams in 2022. He is the only player to score in all three phases in a single season since 1970. He is one of ten players to score on offense, defense and special teams during their NFL career.

\section*{JONES SCORES ON OFFENSE, DEFENSE AND SPECIAL TEAMS}
- Jones returned a third quarter interception 69 yards for a touchdown vs. Cincinnati on Dec. 24, 2022. He scored on a punt return for a touchdown, a touchdown reception and an interception returned for a touchdown to become the fourth player in NFL history to do so in a season, joining Frank Bacon (1920), Bill Dudley (1947) and Tommy Harmon (1947). Jones returned a punt 84 yards for a touchdown vs. the New York Jets on Nov. 20 and scored on a 48-yard touchdown pass vs. Buffalo on Dec. 1 in addition to the pick-6 against the Bengals. The only other player in the Super Bowl era to score a 40-plus touchdown in each of those ways in their entire career is Deion Sanders.

- Jones, who made his first career start on defense vs. Buffalo on Dec. 1, 2022, also lined up on offense and scored on a 48-yard touchdown pass from QB Mac Jones on his first play from scrimmage in the first quarter. Jones became the first defensive back to record a touchdown reception on offense since 2000 when S Marcus Coleman of the New York Jets caught a 45-yard touchdown pass from QB Vinny Testaverde against Buffalo on Sept. 17, 2000. Jones caught 15 passes for 137 yards with one receiving touchdown during his college career. He scored on a 47-yard touchdown pass vs. Navy on Sept. 25, 2021. Jones joins LB Mike Vrabel (six 1-yard touchdowns and four 2-yard touchdowns from Tom Brady), LB Elandon Roberts (38-yard touchdown pass from Brady vs. Miami on Dec. 29, 2019) and LB/DE John Tanner (2-yard as the only pass from QB Jim Plunkett on Nov. 24, 1974 at Baltimore) as the only New England defensive players to catch touchdowns.

- Jones is the first Patriots player to catch a touchdown on his first reception since LB Elandon Roberts caught a 38 -yard touchdown pass in the third quarter vs Miami on Dec. 29, 2019. \section*{JONES RETURNS PUNT 84 YARDS FOR A TOUCHDOWN}
- Jones returned a fourth quarter punt 84 yards for a touchdown vs. the New York Jets on Nov. 20, 2022 with five seconds to play. It is tied with Julian Edelman (84-yard touchdown return vs. Denver on Nov. 2, 2014) for the fifth-longest punt return in team history. Jones is the first player with a punt return for a touchdown in 2022. - Jones' punt return for a touchdown with five seconds remaining vs. the New York Jets (11/20) marked the second-latest game-winning punt return for a touchdown in regulation since 1970, trailing only DeSean Jackson (no time remaining on Dec. 19, 2010) who returned a punt 65 -yards for a touchdown in Philadelphia's win at the New York Giants.


JONES' 84-YARD PUNT RETURN IS SECOND LONGEST GOAHEAD TD IN 4 TH QUARTER IN TEAM HISTORY
- Jones' 84-yard punt return for a touchdown is the second longest goahead 4th quarter touchdown in team history. The only longer return was the 91 -yard missed field goal return for a touchdown by Ron Burton at Denver on Nov. 11, 1962.

- Jones was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week by the National Football League for his performance in the Patriots 10-3 victory over the New York Jets in Week 11.

- Jones registered his first career interception in the third quarter at Arizona on Dec. 12, 2022. He had a 48-yard touchdown reception vs. Buffalo (12/1/22) and returned a punt 84 yards for a touchdown vs. the New York Jets (11/20/22). The only other NFL player with a receiving touchdown, a punt or kick returned for a touchdown and an interception in the same season is Deion Sanders in 1992.

- Bill Belichick acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eight-man rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there - fourth-and-short, where they're trying to protect the box - but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts."

- During a 2007 game against Arizona State, UCLA's Matthew Slater returned a kickoff 89 yards for the final touchdown of his collegiate career. - The Josh Uche Foundation was created to empower and provide at-risk youth with educational advancement, resource programming, mentorship and mental health empowerment.

- The mission of TB77 Cares is To change lives of under privileged youth by providing effective means and tools that will advance their opportunities and inspire hope.
- During the offseason, Trent visited the Old Colony YMCA for their final Digital Design Class put on in partnership with Ticker and Create. TB77 Cares sponsored the event where students learned how to use the game development platform, The Unreal Engine, to design their own 2D and 3D games.
- Over 450 kids in the Auburn City Schools District face food insecurity in the summer months. Trent was asked by his former professor at Florida if he wanted to be part of the event run by the Auburn College of Human Sciences. Trent agreed to match dollar for dollar of all donations to the Summer Sustenance Project that helped kids get their proper nutrition. Kids were able to pick up a week's worth of food and snacks each week throughout the summer.

- Though NF affects over 2.5 million people worldwide, it is still relatively unknown in the general public. The Children's Tumor Foundation's MAKE NF VISIBLE campaign brings awareness and inclusion to all NF patients. Those with visible signs of NF struggle to be seen as more than just their NF, while patients whose NF is invisible struggle to make others understand. The Patriots have staged two historic come-from-behind victories over the past several seasons:

Bill Belichick coached the Patriots back from a 25-point deficit to win Super Bowl LI. A comeback of that magnitude is extremely rare. There had been 2,656 games in which a team led by 25 points or more in NFL history, including the postseason. Teams leading by 25 had recorded 2,647 wins, seven losses and two ties, a winning percentage of .997.

New England came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos, 34-31, in overtime in a Sunday Night Football matchup on Nov. 24, 2013, marking the largest regular season comeback win in team history, after trailing 24-0 at halftime.

New England's previous best comeback win was from a 23-0 deficit to win, 38-23, vs. Seattle (09/16/84). The Patriots also came back from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, 23-22 (12/21/96). The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently vs. Buffalo (01/01/12)

    - The New England Patriots are tied with the Pittsburgh Steelers for the most Super Bowl wins in NFL history with six.
    - The Patriots have played in 11 Super Bowls, the most by any team in NFL history. Dallas, Denver and Pittsburgh have played in eight.
    - The New England Patriots have 37 postseason victories, the most in NFL history. Dallas, Pittsburgh, Green Bay and San Francisco are second with 36 playoff wins all-time.
    - The Patriots are third in NFL history with 15 Conference Championship Game appearances, behind San Francisco (18) and the Pittsburgh (16).
    - The New England Patriots have earned seven No. 1 seeds, trailing only San Francisco (9) and Denver (8) since playoff seeding began in 1975.
    - The Patriots have earned a first-round playoff bye an NFL-best 14 times since 1990. Pittsburgh and San Francisco are second with nine byes since 1990. New England is the only team in NFL history with nine straight first-round byes (2010-18).
    - The Patriots have played in 59 postseason games, tied with San Francisco for the fourth-most in NFL history behind Dallas (66), Pittsburgh (63) and Green Bay (61).
    - The Patriots are second with 13 seasons of 12 wins since 1970, behind San Francisco's 14 seasons with 12 victories.
    - New England has won 13 games in a single season seven times in franchise history. Only San Francisco has more 13-win seasons with 10.
    - The New England Patriots have won 14 or more games in a season five times, most in NFL history. San Francisco is second with four 14 -win seasons.
    - New England has 28 undefeated months since 2000, most in the NFL over that span. Green Bay is second with 21 undefeated months during that time.
    - The Patriots have 35 winning seasons since 1970, second all-time behind Pittsburgh's 39.
    
    - The Patriots have 574 total victories, the fourth-most wins since their inception in 1960, behind the 586 wins by Pittsburgh and Dallas and the 575 by Green Bay.
    - New England (1,025) played their 1,000th game in franchise history (regular season and playoffs combined) against Cleveland on Nov. 14, 2021, and became the first original AFL team to play in 1,000 games.
    - With rookie free agents DL DaMarcus Mitchell and DB Brenden Schooler making the initial 53-man roster in 2022, the Patriots have now had a rookie free agent make the opening day roster for 19 straight seasons, tied with Denver for the longest streak in the NFL.
    - The Patriots ended a 10-year streak of finishing in the top 10 for fewest points allowed (2012-2021) after finishing 11th in 2022 with 20.4 points allowed.     The Patriots limited the Jets to just 2 yards on seven offensive possessions in the second half on Nov. 20. It is the fewest yards allowed by the team in a half in franchise history. The previous low was 25 yards by the Los Angeles Rams in the first half on Dec. 4, 2016.

    The Patriots held the Jets to just six first downs on Nov. 20, the fewest since allowing just five in a game at Green Bay on Nov. 19, 2006. The Patriots last held the Jets to just six first downs on Sept. 22, 2019.

    The Patriots $10-3$ victory over the Jets on Nov. 20 was the team's first win without an offensive touchdown since a 12-0 win vs. Miami on Dec. 7, 2003, when the team scored on a field goal, a 5-yard interception return by LB Tedy Bruschi and a safety. The Patriots win was the first game in at least 40 seasons in which the first touchdown was a defensive or special teams touchdown in the final minute of the game.

    ## DEFENSIVE STAND

    ## WARM NOVEMBER GAME

    The game time temperature vs. Indianapolis (11/6) at kickoff was 75 degrees, the warmest game in November in the Bill Belichick era. The Patriots have had three other home games in November or later in the 60 s - Nov. 25, 2002 vs. New Orleans ( 62 degrees), Nov. 8, 2009 vs. Miami (65 degrees) and Nov. 11, 2012 vs. Buffalo (60 degrees).

    ## SHUTOUT ON THIRD

It is the first time the Patriots had a 100-yard rusher and 100-yard receiver in the same game since Oct. 5, 2014, when RB Stevan Ridley had 113 yards rushing and TE Rob Gronkowski had 100 yards receiving.

    ## PATRIOTS STOP DETROTT ON ALL 6 FOURTH DOWN ATTEMPTS

    The Patriots defense forced six unsuccessful fourth down attempts vs. Detroit (10/9). It is the most since New England was held to 0-for-5 on fourth down attempts on Oct. 8, 1995, vs. Denver. The previous best for the Patriots defense was stopping an opponent on all four attempts, which they had done twice before: vs. Denver $(11 / 2 / 14)$ and vs. Tampa Bay (9/22/13).

    ## EXTENDAD FOURTH DOWN STOPS

    The Patriots stopped Cleveland $(10 / 16)$ on a 4 th-and- 1 situation in the second quarter for their seventh straight hold on fourth down. The Patriots stopped Detroit on six fourth-down attempts the week before. The last team with at least seven straight fourth-down stops was Denver with eight straight in 2021. Cleveland converted on fourth down late in the fourth quarter to end the streak.

    ## PATRIOTS AVERAGE 5-YARDS PAR CARRY FOR THIRD STRAIGHT GAME

    The Patriots gained 176 yards rushing on 35 attempts for a 5.0-yards per carry vs Detroit (10/9). It was the third straight week that they averaged at least 5 yards per carry. They averaged 5.2 -yards per carry vs. Baltimore on Sept. 25 and 5.1-yard per carry at Green Bay on Oct. 2. The Patriots have had three 3 -game stretches averaging 5 -yards per carry in a game (1977, 2020 and 2022).

    ## PATRIOTS HAVE FIRST ROOKI=-TO-ROOKIE TD CONN=CTION SINCE 1993

    QB Bailey Zappe's 2-yard touchdown pass to WR Tyquan Thornton in the third quarter at Cleveland $(10 / 16)$ marked the first time the Patriots had a rookie-to-rookie touchdown connection since the season finale of the 1993 season when QB Drew Bledsoe threw an 11-yard touchdown pass to WR Vincent Brisby in the third quarter vs. Miami on Jan. 2, 1994.

    ## PATRIOTS DEFENSE WAS FIRST TO HOLD CLEVELAND UNDER 170 RUSHINC YARDS

    Cleveland (10/16) entered the game with the top-ranked rushing attack, posting five consecutive games of 170 rushing yards and was averaging 192.4-yards per game. Nick Chubb had rushed for 100 yards in four of the first five games and had 100 scrimmage yards in all five games. Cleveland rushed for 70 yards and Chubb was limited to 70 yards from scrimmage ( 56 rushing yards and 14 receiving yards).

    ## STRONG BACKTO-BACK GAMES

    The Patriots had two strong weeks going against two top ranked teams. Detroit (10/9) entered the game with the top ranked offense and was averaging 35 points a game in a 29-0 shutout and Cleveland (10/16) entered with the top-ranked rushing attack (192.4) and were held to 70 yards.
