#### NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (0-1) VS. CAROLINA PANTHERS (1-0)

The New England Patriots will conduct joint practices with the Carolina Panthers on Tuesday and Wednesday on the practice fields behind Gillette Stadium prior to facing off on in a Week 2 preseason contest on Friday at Gillette Stadium. The Patriots and Panthers have been frequent preseason partners over the last several years, squaring off six times since 2014, including games in 2019 and 2014 at Gillette Stadium.

#### **BROADCAST INFORMATION**

**TELEVISION**: This week's game will be broadcast by the Patriots Preseason Television Network and can be seen in every New England state, as well as Alaska and Hawaii. The preseason network's flagship station is **WBZ-TV CBS** in Boston. **Bob Socci** provides the play-by-play and is joined by former Patriots quarterback **Scott Zolak** in the broadcast booth. WBZ's **Steve Burton** will provide sideline analysis.

**LOCAL RADIO:** 98.5 The Sports Hub is the flagship station for the Patriots Radio Network. A complete listing of the network's 33 stations can be found in this press release on page 60. The television broadcast will simulcast the game on the radio during the preseason.

#### **SERIES HISTORY**





The New England Patriots and the Carolina Panthers will meet in the preseason for the sixth time in the last nine seasons and for the third time in that time frame at Gillette Stadium. The Patriots last played Carolina in the preseason on Aug. 22, 2019 when they beat the Panthars, 10-3, at Gillette Stadium.

The team's met in the regular season last season with the Patriots taking a 24-6 victory at Carolina on Nov. 7, 2021. Since 2000, the Patriots have a winning record against every NFL team except Carolina at 3-3 and Seattle at 2-3.

New England leads the preseason matchups with a 8-3 advantage in the 11 preseason games while Carolina holds a 4-3 edge in the regular season.

The Patriots and Panthers met in Super Bowl XXXVIII on Feb. 2, 2004. The Patriots-Panthers Super Bowl is widely believed to be among the most entertaining Super Bowls ever played, as the Panthers took a fourth-quarter lead only to see the Patriots come up with a game-winning field goal to clinch the see-saw battle in the final seconds.

# PATRIOTS AND GIANTS MEET IN THE PRESEASON FOR THE 31ST TIME

# INDIVIDUAL NOTES

## MALCOLM BUTLER MAKES HIS RETURN IN A PATRIOTS UNIFORM

Malcolm Butler played in his first game in a Patriots uniform since 2017 after returning to the team this past offseason and was in the starting lineup. Butler spent his first four seasons with the Patriots (2014-17).

# SEVEN OF THE TEN 2022 DRAFT SELECTIONS MADE THEIR NFL DEBUT

Eight of the ten 2022 Draft selections made their NFL debut with two in the starting lineup. First-round pick OL Cole Strange started at left guard, and second-round pick WR Tyquan Thornton started at wide receiver. DB Jack Jones (fourth-round), RB Pierre Strong Jr. (fourth-round), QB Bailey Zappe (fourth-round), RB Kevin Harris (sixth-round) and DL Sam Roberts (sixth-round) each saw action in a reserve role. Third-round pick DB Marcus Jones, siixth-round pick OL Chasen Hines and seventh-round pick OL Andrew Stueber did not play.

## TYQUAN THORNTON'S FIRST NFL RECEPTION RESULTS IN A TD

Tyquan Thornton's first NFL reception resulted in a 2-yard touchdown pass from QB Brian Hoyer on the last play of the first quarter to culminate an 8-play, 55-yard drive.

# DB MYLES BRYANT RETURNS FIRST QUARTER PUNT FOR 30 YARDS

DB Myles Bryant returned a first quarter punt 30 yards for his first career punt return in either the NFL or during his collegiate career.

#### TRE NIXON RETURNED HIS FIRST NFL KICK AND LINED UP FOR HIS FIRST CAREER PUNT RETURN

WR Tre Nixon returned a second quarter kickoff for 25 yards. He had just one kickoff return for 0 yards during his college career at Central Florida. Nixon also lined up to field a punt return in the third quarter that was fair caught.

## NIXON HAD TWO 30-YARD RECEPTIONS IN THE THIRD QUARTER

Nixon had two 30-yard receptions in the third quarter from QB Bailey Zappe with a 36-yard catch and a 32-yard reception. The plays helped set up a 3-yard touchdown run by 2022 sixth-round draft pick RB Kevin Harris. Nixon finished the game with 4 receptions for 81 yards. KRISTIAN WILKERSON LED THE TEAM WITH 99 RECEIVING YARDS WR Kristian Wilkerson led the team with 8 receptions for 99 yards. He spent the majority of the last two years on the New England practice squad. Wilkerson was elevated to play in three games last season, including a start in the game vs. Jacksonville on Jan. 1 when he caught two touchdown passes from QB Mac Jones.

#### **BRIAN HOYER MAKES THE START**

QB Brian Hoyer started the game and played through the first quarter. He engineered an 8-play 55-yard touchdown drive that was capped with a 2-yard touchdown pass to WR Tyquan Thornton. He finished 5-of-8 for 59 yards with one touchdown.

# 2022 FOURTH-ROUND PICK QB BAILEY ZAPPE ENTERED THE GAME IN THE SECOND QUARTER

Fourth-round draft pick QB Bailey Zappe entered the game in the second quarter and played the rest of the game. He finished 19-of-32 for 205 yards with one touchdown, a 20-yard scoring play to WR Lil'Jordan Humphrey in the fourth quarter.

## BILL MURRAY SAW HIS FIRST QCTION ON THE OFFENSIVE LINE

Bill Murray made his debut on the offensive line when he entered the game at right guard in the second quarter. Murray spent the last two seasons as a defensive lineman on the team's practice squad before he was moved to the offensive line in training camp. Murray was originally signed by the Patriots as a rookie free agent out of William & Mary in 2020.

#### JOSHUAH BLEDSOE MAKES NFL DEBUT

S Joshuah Bledsoe made his NFL debut after missing training camp last season due to an injury that forced him to begin the year on the Reserve/NFI list. Bledsoe was drafted by New England in the sixth round of the 2021 NFL Draft out of Missouri.

#### **VETERAN CB TERRANCE MIITCHELL FORCED A TURNOVER**

Newly acquired CB Terrance Mitchell was in the starting lineup and forced a fumble following a reception by Giants WR Collin Johnson that was recovered by DB Malcolm Butler.

# ROOKIE FREE AGENT DB BRAD HAWKINS STARTED IN THE NICKEL DEFENSE

Rookie free agent DB Brad Hawkins was in the starting lineup in the nickel defense. He was signed by the Patriots on Aug. 2. He originally was signed by Atlanta as a rookie free agent following the NFL Draft out of Michigan.

#### **ANFERNEE JENNINGS RETURNS TO ACTION**

LB Anfernee Jennings returned to action and was in the starting lineup. Jennings, a 2020 third-round draft pick, missed the entire 2021 season due to injury.

#### **RAEKWON MCMILLAN MAKES A START**

LB Raekwon McMillan was in the starting lineup after missing the 2021 season due to injury.

Under Kraft's leadership since he purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports.

Kraft has led the two most dominant decades in NFL history in terms of overall wins – 141 (2010-19) and 126 (2000-09).

Kraft is the most successful owner since he purchased the team in 1994 in terms of wins (341), division titles (19), winning percentage (.685), playoff wins (33) and playoff seasons (22).



Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. In his 28 seasons of ownership, he has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what many observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.238 pct.), the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention



to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (19), conference crowns (10) and Super Bowl championships (6) than any other NFL team. Additionally, the Patriots have achieved the most winning seasons (24) and are tied with Pittsburgh for the fewest losing seasons (3) since Kraft assumed ownership beginning in 1994. Super Bowl LIII was the 10th Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has appeared in more than four Super Bowls. In Kraft's 28 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 22 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons, and finished with a winning record 24 times.

#### A WINNING TRADITION I

Robert Kraft won his 300th game overall as owner of the New England Patriots against Miami on Sept. 30, 2018. Kraft reached the milestone in his 25th NFL season and in his 432nd game, the fastest an owner has reached the milestone. Al Davis of the Raiders accomplished the feat in 495 games (31 seasons) while Pat Bowlen of Denver reached 300 career wins in 501 games (30 seasons).

#### A WINNING TRADITION II

#### **KRAFT PASSES OTHER OWNERS**

The Patriots have 341 wins overall under Robert Kraft. He has produced more victories than every other Patriots owner combined. Under Kraft, the Patriots are 341-157 overall since he purchased the team in 1994. Kraft's predecessors in the owner's office went 225-276-9 in the 34 years prior to his purchase of the team.

#### **CONTINUITY BREEDS SUCCESS**

New England is the first team in NFL history to win six Super Bowls with the same owner (Robert Kraft), head coach (Bill Belichick) and quarterback (Tom Brady).

#### **PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS**

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 28 times in their 62-year history. Twenty-two of those playoff berths have come in the 28 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. The Patriots have won 22 division crowns.

- The Patriots have played in 11 Super Bowls, the most by any team in NFL history. Dallas, Denver and Pittsburgh have played in eight.
- The Patriots are third in NFL history with 15 Conference Championship Game appearances, one behind the 16 by Pittsburgh and San Francisco.
- The New England Patriots have 37 postseason victories, the most in NFL history. Pittsburgh and Green Bay are second with 36 playoff wins all-time.
- The New England Patriots have earned seven No. 1 seeds, behind San Francisco (9) and Denver (8) since playoff seeding began in
- The Patriots have earned a first-round playoff bye an NFL-best 14 times since 1990. Pittsburgh and San Francisco are second with nine byes since 1990. New England is the only team in NFL history with nine straight first-round byes (2010-18).
- The Patriots have played in 59 postseason games, fourth-most in NFL history behind Dallas (64), Pittsburgh (63) and Green Bay (61). The Patriots need to play in one more postseason game in 2022 to become the fourth NFL team to play in 60 postseason games.
- The Patriots are second with 13 seasons of 12 wins since 1970, behind San Francisco's 14 seasons with 12 victories
- New England has won 13 games in a single season seven times in franchise history. Only San Francisco has more 13-win seasons with 10.
- The New England Patriots have won 14 or more games in a season five times, most in NFL history. San Francisco is second with four
- New England has 28 undefeated months since 2000, most in the NFL over that span. Green Bay is second with 20 undefeated months during that time.
- The Patriots have 35 winning seasons since 1970, second all-time behind Pittsburgh's 38



- The Patriots have 566 total victories, the fourth-most wins since 1960, behind the 577 wins by Pittsburgh, the 573 wins by Dallas and the 567 wins by Green Bay.
- New England (1,008) played their 1,000th game in franchise history (regular season and playoffs combined) against Cleveland on Nov. 14, 2021 and became the first original AFL team to play in 1,000 games.
- With rookie free agent K Quinn Nordin making the initial 53-man roster in 2021, the Patriots have now had a rookie free agent make the opening day roster for the 18 straight seasons, the third-longest streak in the NFL. The L.A. Chargers have had a rookie free agent make their opening day roster for 25 straight seasons and Indianapolis has had a rookie free agent make their opening day roster for 23 straight seasons.
- The Patriots have finished in the top 10 for fewest points allowed in each of the last 10 seasons (2012-2021) to tie Tampa Bay, who became the last team to reach 10 straight seasons (1996-2005) for the fewest points allowed. The 2021 Patriots finished second in the NFL with 17.8 points allowed per game. Buffalo finished first with 17.0 points allowed per game.



# PATRIOTS THROWING IT BACK TO THE FUTURE

The Patriots announced the return of the red throwback uniforms late in the spring. The uniform's design, a red jersey with timeless blue and white stripes across the sleeves and white numbers outlined in blue, is based on the uniform worn from 1984-1992 and sporadically worn from 1994-2012 as an alternate uniform. In 2013, the NFL announced a rule mandating every club stick to one helmet all season. Unfortunately for the Patriots, this meant sidelining the throwback uniforms as the silver helmet with the modern-day logo did not feel right to blend with the classic throwback threads. In June of 2021, a memo was sent to teams announcing the approval of a second helmet for the following season. The rule change allowed the Patriots to complete the throwback uniforms with a white helmet, white face mask and the Pat the Patriot logo to officially revive the red throwback uniforms for the upcoming season. The announcement of the long-awaited revival included the original Delorean from the Back to the Future movie franchise and players repping the throwback threads. The social media posts instantly generated national attention as fans and media

alike welcomed back the beloved red jerseys.

New England Patriots cornerback J.C. Jackson, quarterback Mac Jones, linebacker Matthew Judon and special teams captain Matthew Slater were selected to represent the New England Patriots in the 2022 NFL Pro Bowl. The 2022 Pro Bowl was played on Sunday, Feb. 6 at Allegiant Stadium in Las Vegas.

**Jackson** earned his first Pro Bowl berth. His eight interceptions in 2021 were the second-most in the NFL, behind Dallas' Trevon Diggs (11). Jackson has the most interceptions since entering the NFL in 2018 as a rookie free agent out of Maryland with 25 picks. Those 25 interceptions in his first four NFL seasons are tied with Lester Hayes (25) and Everson Walls (25) for the most by a player in his first four seasons since 1970. Jackson was also named AP All-Pro Second Team honors for his play in 2021.



MAC JONES

**Jones** was named to the 2022 Pro Bowl and joined Devin McCourty (2010), Curtis Martin (1995), John Stephens (1988) and Mike Haynes (1976) as the only New England rookies to earn a Pro Bowl selection. Jones led all rookies in 2021 with 3,801 yards passing, the fifth-highest total by a rookie quarterback. He also became the 12th rookie to lead his team to a winning record since 1970. Jones was also named to the PFWA All-Rookie Team.



MATTHEW JUDON 3RD PRO BOWL SELECTION PFWA-ALL AFC TEAM

**Judon** earned his third straight Pro Bowl berth and first with the Patriots. He had a career-high 12  $\frac{1}{2}$  sacks last season and is tied with Chandler Jones and Mike Vrabel for the most sacks in a season under Bill Belichick. Judon signed with the Patriots last offseason as an unrestricted free agent from Baltimore. He originally entered the NFL as a fifth-round draft pick by the Ravens out of Grand Valley State in the 2016 NFL Draft.


**Slater** was named to his 10th career Pro Bowl as a special teams player, extending his record for most special teams Pro Bowl honors in NFL history. Steve Tasker is second with seven. Slater moved out of a tie with John Hannah (9) for sole possession for the second-most Pro Bowl selections in franchise history, behind the 14 by Tom Brady. The former fifth-round draft pick out of UCLA earned a roster position with the Patriots as a rookie in 2008 with his contributions on special teams. Entering the 2011 season, teammates elected him as their special teams captain. That year, he was also selected to his first Pro Bowl. Since then, he has earned special teams captain honors to start each season. In addition, he has been voted to the Pro Bowl every year since 2011, except 2018.

Slater also earned AP All-Pro Second Team honors as a special teamer for the second straight season and for the third time in his career. He also garnered First Team accolades in 2016 and 2019, making 2021 his fifth career appearance as an All-Pro. Slater also was named the 2021 Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award winner.

In addition, Bill Belichick was named the PFWA Executive of the Year and rookie DL Christian Barmore was named to the PFWA All-Rookie Team.

#### PATRIOTS DEFENSE PRODUCES FOUR INTERCEPTIONS; END FIRST TWO JETS DRIVES WITH INTERCEPTIONS

The Patriots had four interceptions against the Jets (9/19/21), the most picks in a single game since they had four at Cincinnati on Dec. 15, 2019. The Patriots ended the first two Jets drives with interceptions from CB J.C. Jackson and DB Adrian Phillips, leading to 10 points. Jackson added a second interception in the second quarter, and Devin McCourty had a pick in the third quarter. The Patriots had their second game in 2021 with four picks in the 25-0 shutout win at Atlanta on Nov. 18.

#### **PATRIOTS SCORE 50**

The Patriots finished with 54 points against the New York Jets on Oct. 24, 2021 and 50 points against Jacksonville on Jan. 2. The Patriots have scored 50 points 10 times under Bill Belichick The 54 points are the 7th most points scored in team history. It is the third time in team history that the Patriots have had a season with two games scoring at least 50 points. They also scored 50 points in two games in 2007 and 2012.

# PATRIOTS SCORE 50 AGAINST THE JETS FOR THE THIRD TIME IN TEAM HISTORY

The 50-point output marks the third 50-point game the Patriots have produced against the Jets. The Patriots scored a 56-3 win vs. the Jets on Sept. 9, 1979 and a 55-21 victory vs. the Jets on Oct. 29, 1978.

#### PATRIOTS EXPLODE FOR 31 POINTS IN THE FIRST HALF

The Patriots scored 31 points in the first half against the Jets (10/24). It is the 12th time in team history that they have had a 30-point first half, the 10th time under Bill Belichick and the first since a 30-13 halftime lead in a 36-20 win at New Orleans on Sept. 17, 2017.

#### PATRIOTS TIE TEAM RECORD WITH FOUR RUSHING TDS

The Patriots tied a team record with four rushing touchdowns in the wins vs. N.Y. Jets (10/24) and vs. Jacksonville (01/02). The Patriots have had four rushing touchdowns in a game 11 times overall. They have accomplished the mark four times against the Jets – Sept. 8, 1963, Oct. 18, 1976, Oct. 29, 1978 and Oct. 24, 2021.

#### **PATRIOTS OFFENSE PRODUCES 32 FIRST DOWNS**

The Patriots offense produced 32 first downs in the win against the New York Jets (10/24) and in the win vs. Jacksonville (01/02), the 13th time in team history that they have had at least 32 first downs. It is the most since tying a team record with 35 first downs in the win vs. Jacksonville on Sept. 27, 2015.

#### **PATRIOTS OFFENSE GAINS 551 TOTAL YARDS**

#### **RECEIVERS HAVE COMPLETED THREE PASSES IN 2021**

Kendrick Bourne's 25-yard touchdown pass to Nelson Agholor against the Jets on Oct. 24 was the third pass completion by a Patriots wide receiver in 2021. Jakobi Meyers completed two passes vs. Tampa Bay on Oct. 3. The 2020 Patriots had four completions by wide receivers. The most passes completed by a New England team by non-quarterbacks was seven in 1981.

#### PATRIOTS 2ND IN THE NFL WITH 23 INTERCEPTIONS

The Patriots finished second to Dallas (26) in 2021 with 23 interceptions. In 2020, the Patriots tied for the NFL lead with Miami, New Orleans and Pittsburgh with 18 interceptions. The 2019 New England team led the NFL with 25 interceptions. Two teams have led the NFL in interceptions in three or more straight seasons: Kansas City (5 straight – 1966-70) and the New York Giants (3 straight – 1937-39). Overall, the Patriots have led the NFL in interceptions four times (2003, 2010, 2019 and 2020).

#### **LOCKDOWN DEFENSE**

The 2021 Patriots defense finished 4th in the NFL. Under Bill Belichick, the Patriots have had a defense finish in the top 10 nine times, including the 2019 defense that finished first in the NFL.

#### **PATRIOTS PLAY 1,000 GAME**

New England (1,008) played their 1,000th game in franchise history against Cleveland on Nov. 14, 2021 to become the first original AFL team to play in 1,000 games.

#### THIRD HIGHEST COMPLETION PERCENTAGE

QB Mac Jones (19-of-23) and QB Brian Hoyer (3-for-3) combined to go 22-for-26 for an 84.6 completion percentage in the 45-7 win against the Cleveland Browns on Nov. 14. Jones was 22-of-26 in the Atlanta game for an 84.6 completion percentage to tie for the third-best completion percentage games in team history.

The Patriots capped an 11-play 99-yard drive with a 23-yard touch-down pass from QB Mac Jones to WR Kendrick Bourne against Cleveland on Nov. 14, 2021. It was the first 99-yard drive for New England since a 10-play, 99-yard drive that was culminated by a 10-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady to Rob Gronkowski vs. San Diego on Sept. 18, 2011. Since 2000, the Patriots have now had three drives of 99 yards. Brady completed a 99-yard touchdown pass to WR Wes Welker at Miami on Sept. 12, 2011. Those are the only 99-yard drive for the Patriots since 1980.

#### **SUNDAY DRIVES**

The Patriots offense had three 90-yard drives that resulted in touchdowns against Cleveland on Nov. 14, 2021. The Patriots had an 11-play, 99-yard drive in the second quarter that resulted in a touchdown, an 8-play, 92-yard scoring drive and a 6-play, 95-yard scoring drive. It is the only time in the Bill Belichick era that the team has had three 90-play drives in a game.

#### THE PATRIOTS SCORED ON EIGHT OF THEIR NINE DRIVES

The Patriots scored on eight of their first nine offensive drives vs. Jacksonville (01/02) - (the 10th possession was a victory formation kneel down). The Patriots also scored on all but one drive (9-of-10) vs. the New York Jets on Oct. 24 and vs. Cleveland on Nov. 14 (7-of-8).

The Patriots intercepted three different Atlanta quarterbacks in the fourth quarter. They are the first team to intercept three different quarterbacks in the same quarter since Chicago picked off Tampa Bay's Craig Erickson, Steve DeBerg and Casey Weldon in the fourth quarter on Sept. 26, 1993.

# PATRIOTS DEFENSE HOLDS ATLANTA TO 40 YARDS RUSHING

The Patriots defense held the Falcons to just 40 yards rushing. It is the lowest since holding the New York Jets to just 36 yards rushing on Sept. 22, 2019. Overall, it is the 15th time under Bill Belichick that the Patriots held a team to 40 yards rushing or less.

# PATRIOTS EARN 30TH SHUTOUT IN TEAM HISTORY, 13TH UNDER BELICHICK

The Patriots earned their 30th shutout in franchise history and 13th under Bill Belichick with the 25-0 victory over the Atlanta Falcons (11/18). It was the Patriots' first shutout since a 45-0 win at Los Angeles Chargers on Dec. 6, 2020.



Bill Belichick is the only head coach in NFL history to win six Super Bowl titles. He won more games overall (141) during a 10-year stretch (2010-19) than any other coach in NFL history. In 2007, Belichick led the Patriots to the fourth undefeated and untied regular season in NFL history and the first since the NFL established a 16-game schedule in 1978. His 48 consecutive years as an NFL coach are most in NFL history. The only other NFL coaches with at least 40 consecutive NFL coaching seasons are Dick LeBeau (45) and Tom Moore (41).

- WR Jakobi Meyers (168 receptions for 1,954 yards) has the most career receptions and receiving yards by any undrafted Patriots receiver that began his career with the team. His 59 receptions for 729 yards in 2020 were also the most in a single season by a rookie free agent that was originally signed by the team. He surpassed that number with 83 receptions and 866 receiving yards in 2021 for the best statistical receiving season for an undrafted Patriots receiver.

#### A SPECIAL BIRTHDAY PERFORMANCE

• Meyers set career highs on his 24th birthday (11/09/20) with 12 receptions for 169 yards in a win over the New York Jets. The 12 receptions were the most by a Patriot since Julian Edelman caught 13 passes at Miami on Dec. 15, 2013.

#### **MEYERS MAKES HIS MARK**

• Meyers has the most receptions and receiving yards of any undrafted player who signed with the Patriots as an undrafted free agent.

#### **MEYERS JOINS ELITE CLUB**

 Meyers, who threw touchdown passes in Weeks 10 and 17 in 2020, became the fourth wide receiver with two touchdown passes in a single season in the Super Bowl era, joining Rod Gardner (2003), Antwaan Randle El (2010) and Odell Beckham Jr. (2018).

#### **MEYERS COMPLETES TWO PASSES IN ONE GAME**

• Meyers completed two passes vs. Tampa Bay on Oct. 3, 2021. He caught a backwards pass from QB Mac Jones and then threw across the field to RB Brandon Bolden, who managed a 15-yard gain in the second quarter. He completed a 30-yard pass to WR Nelson Agholor in the fourth quarter on a flea flicker. The only other wide receiver to complete two passes in single game for New England was Julian Edelman vs. Denver on Oct. 18, 2020. The only other non-quarterbacks to complete two passes in a game for New England were running backs



– Dick Christy on Nov. 18, 1960 vs. Dallas Texans and Andy Johnson on Sept. 6, 1981 vs. Baltimore Colts.

• Meyers has completed 4-of-4 passes for 88 yards with two touchdown passes for a perfect 158.3 passer rating in his career.

"We ended up losing, but it was still a great experience. It was a good experience to meet Cam when I was very young. A lot of guys where I come from look up to him, so that was definitely a once-in-a lifetime opportunity for me."


 Meyers has thrown for two touchdown passes but scored his first NFL receiving touchdown on an 11-yard pass from QB Brian Hoyer in the fourth quarter against Cleveland (11/14/21).

#### **MEYERS USING HIS ARM**

Meyers threw two touchdown passes in 2020. He completed a 24-yard touchdown pass to RB Rex Burkhead vs. Baltimore (11/15) and a 19-yard touchdown pass to QB Cam Newton vs. N.Y. Jets (1/3). Overall, Patriots wide receivers completed four passes in 2020. WR Julian Edelman also completed two passes. The four pass completions by wide receivers are the most in team history. They have three so far in 2021.

#### **MULTIPLE TDS FROM JAKOBI**

• Meyers (two touchdown passes) became the third Patriots wide receiver to throw a touchdown pass under head coach Bill Belichick. David Patten threw a 60-yard touchdown pass on Oct. 21, 2001, at Indianapolis and WR Julian Edelman threw a 15-yard touchdown pass to WR Phillip Dorsett at Philadelphia on Nov. 17, 2019. Kendrick Bourne became the fourth to do so with a 25-yard touchdown pass to WR Nelson Agholor vs. N.Y. Jets on Oct. 24, 2021.





#### 2021 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

 LB Ja'Whaun Bentley set single-season career-highs with 91 tackles and 1½ sacks in 2020. He surpassed that total with 108 total tackles in 2021.



Ja'Whaun and his family were homeless starting his freshman year of high school, living with one set of grandparents, then the other, then an aunt. Ja'Whaun and his brother slept on couches and floors at times over the course of several years. Once Ja'Whaun entered the NFL, he was able to secure permanent housing for his family.



#### FO[U]R THE PATRIOTS

• CB Malcolm Butler wore jersey #21 when he originally played with the Patriots. Butler shared with the local media why he switched to jersey #4. Butler explained the significance of the number four. "Fresh start. It was what was available," he said. "I do this fo[u]r the Patriots, fo[u]r myself, fo[u]r my family."

#### 'SCRAP'

• Butler was nicknamed "Strap" by former teammate Jamie Collins Sr., alluding to his ability to so closely cover receivers on the field. In 2015, some teammates started calling him "Scrap" for his scrappy style of play.



#### **WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2022**

- LB Matthew Judon led the team with a career-high 12 1/2 sacks in 2021 and can become the fourth Patriots player with back-to-back 10-plus sack totals, joining Garin Veris (10 in 1985 and 11 in 1986), Andre Tippett (18 1/2 in 1984 and 16 1/2 in 1985) and Tony McGee (12 in 1977, 11 1/2 in 1978 and 10 1/2 in 1979). Judon can join Tippett (3), McGee (3), Veris (2) and Jones (2) as the only Patriots to register more than one double-digit sack total.
- Judon is one of five NFL players with at least 90 quarterback hits since 2018

#### REPRESENTING FAMILY

- Matthew Judon wore jersey #99 during his five seasons with the Baltimore Ravens but chose jersey #9 upon joining New England in 2021.
- Said Judon, "I'm one of 10 children, so I got nine siblings. Every time I go out there, I represent them. I like nine. That's one of the reasons I rock it. Ninety-nine was taken, so I chose to use the new rule and getting on it."

### JUDON HAS EIGHTH TWO-SACK GAME; SECOND OF THE 2021 SEASON

• Judon had two sacks in a three-play sequence in the second quarter at Houston (10/10/21). It is the 8th time in his career that he has had a multi-sack game and second time in 2021. He had 2  $\frac{1}{2}$  sacks vs. New Orleans on Sept. 26. His career-best is 3 sacks vs. Oakland on Nov. 25, 2018, when he played for Baltimore.

### JUDON SETS TEAM RECORD FOR MOST SACKS IN FIRST FIVE GAMES

- Judon set a team record with 6  $\frac{1}{2}$  sacks through the first five games. The previous record was 5  $\frac{1}{2}$  sacks by Chandler Jones in 2015 and Andre Tippett in 1984.

### JUDON SETS CAREER-HIGH BY REACHING DOUBLE-DIGIT SACKS

• Judon reached double-digit sacks for the first time in his career after a 9-yard sack of QB Matt Ryan in the second quarter at Atlanta (11/18/21) pushed his season total to 10  $\frac{1}{2}$  sacks. It is the 17th time that the Patriots have had a player reach 10 or more sacks in a season. Judon's previous best was 9  $\frac{1}{2}$  in 2019 with Baltimore. He finished the year with 12  $\frac{1}{2}$  sacks and is tied with Chandler Jones (2015) and Mike Vrabel (2007) for the most sacks in a season by a Patriots player under Bill Belichick.

#### **WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2022**

- Devin McCourty enters the 2022 season tied with Ty Law for the second-most Pro Bowl invitations as a Patriots defensive back with four.
   Only CB Mike Haynes (6) had more Pro Bowl nods as a Patriots defensive back
- McCourty (31) became the third Patriots player to reach 30 interceptions with his pick at Atlanta on Nov. 18, 2021. He is third on the all-time interception, behind Ty Law (36) and Raymond Clayborn (36).
- McCourty has played in 188 career regular season games, the 10th-most games in New England history. If he plays in all 17 games in 2022 he will have played in the 5th-most games in New England history with 205.
- McCourty has 515 interception return yards in his regular season career and became the third Patriot with 500 return yards at the NY Jets (9/19 behind Ty Law (583) and Raymond Clayborn (555).
  - McCourty tied Brett Favre and Gene Upshaw for the fourth-most postseason starts in NFL history with 24 after starting in the 2022 Wild Card game at Buffalo.

 McCourty enters the 2022 season with 188 starts, third in team history to the 283 by Tom Brady and 212 by Bruce Armstrong. He will become the third Patriots player to start in 200 career games in 2022 and the 86th player in NFL history with 200 starts.

#### **INCHING CLOSER**

- Devin McCourty is fourth all-time in New England history with 37 total takeaways. He needs three total takeaways to join Raymond Clayborn (44), Fred Marion (42) and Ty Law (40) as the only players in team history with 40 total takeaways.
- McCourty tied for fourth in the NFL with five interceptions in 2019, his third


 McCourty has played in the most defensive snaps since he entered the NFL in 2010 with 11,446 defensive snaps. Malcolm Jenkins (New Orleans and Philadelphia) is second with 11,407 defensive snaps.

#### McCOUR-TD

 McCourty has four career touchdowns following a return of a blocked field goal for a touchdown at L.A. Chargers (12/6/20) and his 43-yard interception return for a touchdown at Seattle (9/20/20). McCourty also had an 84-yard interception return for a touchdown at Buffalo in 2018 and a 104-yard kickoff return vs. N.Y. Jets in 2012.

#### IN GOOD COMPANY

 McCourty earned Associated Press All-Pro Second Team honors at safety in 2013 and 2016. He also earned Second Team All-Pro Honors as a rookie in 2010 when he played cornerback. McCourty joined Pro Football Hall of Famers Rod Woodson and Ronnie Lott as the only NFL players to earn All-Pro honors at both safety and cornerback.





#### THE RISE OF THE GREEN GOBLIN

- DB Jalen Mills has embraced his nickname "The Green Goblin." The origins of the nickname started out as a joke during his rookie season with Philadelphia when he dyed his hair green. Mills is not sure whether it was a coach or the media but the spiderman villain nickname was inspired and took off with the fans.
- Said Mills, "It just kind of came from my rookie year and then just throughout my years playing for the Eagles, my style of play. That's what I get it from. It's kind of something that I stuck with."

#### A NUMBER CHANGE WITH A STORY

Late in the Eagles' eventual Super Bowl-winning season, Jalen's Uncle Uhkoto lost his battle with cancer. The once-close relatives had long since drifted apart and fallen out of touch. As a result, only in the wake of Uhkoto's death did Jalen learn that his uncle – a man who otherwise shunned sports – could quote his nephew's NFL statistics chapter and verse: every pass breakup, every interception, every tackle, every game, Uhkoto was keeping track of Jalen. The discovery left him with a heavy heart.

"It kind of broke me down," Jalen revealed, "because we had grown apart. We were close at one point in time. It took that moment for me to realize, this is a man I looked up to as a younger kid, and now he was looking up to me, keeping up with sports that he didn't even care about. So, I wanted to honor him in my own quiet way ... You're the first person I've told this to "

In 2021, Mills would get that opportunity. After signing his free-agent contract with New England this past spring, Jalen learned that the NFL would relax its jersey number restrictions, allowing certain positions beyond kicker, punter, and quarterback to wear single-digits on their uniforms.

Mills, who wore 31 and 21 at times as an Eagle, chose No. 2 here in New England. You see, almost no one ever called Uhkoto – pronounced a-COO-too– by his full name. They preferred his shortened nickname: Two.



#### VEDCATII ITV

- "I'm one of the guys that when you ask me what position I play, I say 'defense.' I want to be able to line up everywhere, and most importantly, I want to be able to produce everywhere."
- Began his career in 2014 in San Diego focusing on special teams and was selected to his first Pro Bowl in 2018 as a special teamer. His 2018 Pro Bowl berth was the only one that Matthew Slater did not get voted in since 2011.
- Started all 16 games at safety last year for the Patriots and led the team in tackles with a career-high 107.
- · Phillips scored his first career touchdown on a 26-yard interceptions re-


turn at L.A. Chargers (10/31/21). He had a career-high of four picks in 2021.

• Phillips picked off a fourth quarter pass from QB Justin Herbert and returned it 26 yards for a touchdown at the L.A. Chargers on Oct. 31, 2021. It was Phillips' first career touchdown. It is the Patriots first interception returned for a touchdown since DB Devin McCourty returned a pick 43 yards for a touchdown at Seattle on Sept. 20, 2020. He was named AFC Defensive Player of the Week for his performance.

#### PHILLIPS HAS FIRST CAREER TWO-INTERCEPTION GAME

 Phillips finished with two interceptions against the Chargers. He also picked off Herbert in the second quarter. He earned AFC Defensive Player of the Week honors for his effort.

• Jake Bailey finished first in the NFL with 45.6 net yards per punt in 2020, a new single-season team record. The previous record was 41.5 by Zoltan Mesko in 2011. His gross punt average of 48.7 is also a team record, besting the 46.5 gross average by Mesko in 2011. His 45.6 net yards per punt is second all-time in NFL history in a single season to the 46.0 net average by Johnny Hekker in 2016 with the Rams.

#### **DIMINISHING [PUNT] RETURNS**

• Bailey's punting in 2020 allowed a total of just 71 punt return yards on 12 returns. It is the fewest punt return yards allowed by the Patriots in team history and the seventh-fewest punt return yards allowed in a season in NFL history. The 12 punt returns allowed are third in NFL history and team history to the 11 by New England in 2008.

Cody Davis had a single-season personal high with a team-leading 15 special teams tackles, tied for the third-most in 2021. - Folk enters the 2022 season tied for eighth place on the New England all-time scoring list with 312 total points and needs 107 total points to move past Stanley Morgan (408) into seventh place. Folk is also in sixth place on the New England all-time field goal list with 76 field goals and needs 18 field goals to move past Tony Franklin (93) into fifth place.
- Folk enters the 2022 season with 55 consecutive regular season field goals made under 50 yards and needs one more to tie the NFL record of 56 straight field goals made under 50 yards set by K Ryan Succop of Tennessee (2014-17). Folk's last miss from inside the 50-yard line was a 45-yard field goal in the 2020 season-opener vs. Miami on Sept. 13.

#### LOCAL LINEAGE

 Nick Folk's mother is a direct descendant of William Bradford, a founder, settler and longtime governor of the Plymouth Colony settlement. Bradford was also a passenger on the *Mayflower*'s original voyage to America.



#### **FOLK HERO**

• Folk kicked his second game-winning field goal as time expired in 2020, connecting on a 50-yard field goal against Arizona (11/29/20) to give the Patriots a 20-17 win. He had a 51-yard game-winning field goal as time expired at the New York Jets on Nov. 9, 2020 to give the Patriots a 30-27 victory. He is the first NFL kicker with two game-winning field goals as time expired in a single season. Overall, he has three game-winning field goals as time expired. He also kicked a 53-yard game-winning field goal as time expired at Buffalo on Oct. 8, 2007, when he was a rookie with the Dallas Cowboys.

#### **FOLK DIGS THE LONG BALL**

• Folk's 50-yard game-winning field goal vs. Arizona (11/29/20) was the second-longest game-winning field goal with no time left in Patriots history, behind the 51-yarder he hit at N.Y. Jets (11/9). The previous long was 48 yards by Adam Vinatieri in Super Bowl XXXVI vs. the St. Louis Rams.

#### FOLK SETS TEAM RECORD FOR CONSECUTIVE FIELD GOALS

• Folk set the team record with 33 consecutive field goals after connecting on field goals of 46, 49, 32 and 26 yards at the New York (9/19/21) and extended that mark to 36 straight field with a 27-yarder vs. Tampa Bay before missing a 56-yarder in the fourth quarter. He passed Stephen Gostkowski, who connected on 31 straight field goals. After missing his first two field goals of the 2020 season, he kicked 36 straight field goals. • Folk connected on all four field goals (52, 52, 32 and 21) at Houston on Oct. 10, 2021 and was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week. He connected on four field goals in four of the eight 2021 road games - at the N.Y. Jets (9/19), at LA Chargers (10/31) and at Atlanta (11/18). Overall he has had at least four field goals in a game 14 times and six times as a member of the Patriots. #### **WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2022**

- Matthew Slater earned his 10th Pro Bowl invitation in 2021, extending his NFL record for most Pro Bowl selections as a special teamer. Slater has the second-most Pro Bowl selections as a Patriot with 10. Tom Brady holds the franchise record with 14.
- Slater will enter his 15th season with the Patriots in 2022, tied with Troy Brown and Julius Adams, behind only the 16 by Steve Grogan and the 20 by Tom Brady.
- Slater has played in 206 regular season games, tied with Julius Adams for the third-most in team history, behind the 285 by Tom Brady and the 212 by Bruce Armstrong. If he plays in all 17 games in 2022 he will move into second place with 223 games played in a Patriots uniform.

#### **ELECTED TEAM LEADER**

- Slater has been named to 10 Pro Bowls for his special teams work, but perhaps more revealing of his value to New England is the fact that he was elected a captain by his teammates for the 11th straight season in 2021.
- He shared what it means to be a captain with high school football players in a story published by *The Boston Globe*. "You have to be able to put others before yourself. Being a captain and leadership is about serving, and to me, that means a great deal of sacrifice putting aside personal agendas for the greater common goal. Leadership is equated with sacrifice. I think you have to be willing to do whatever it takes for the unit to succeed. I think you need to lead by example. A lot of times, it's about what you do, not what you say."

• Bill Belichick acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eight-man rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there — fourth-and-short, where they're trying to protect the box — but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts."

The term NF represents three distinct disorders: NF1, NF2 and schwannomatosis. For Blake, his NF impacts him most where his optic nerves cross in his brain. He currently has 5 brain tumors.
- Though NF affects over 2.5 million people worldwide, it is still relatively unknown in the general public. The Children's Tumor Foundation's MAKE NF VISIBLE campaign brings awareness and inclusion to all NF patients. Those with visible signs of NF struggle to be seen as more than just their NF, while patients whose NF is invisible struggle to make others understand. • The mission of the Jonathan Jones Next Step Foundation, Inc. is to educate youth on practical life application, to encourage professional development and to empower them through education and mentorship. Established in 2019, the idea was birthed from Jones' love and recognition for developing youth; whether it is by way of football camps, meal distributions or fundraisers, and to pour back into them. However, he was no stranger to volunteerism; growing up, he would volunteer in the community at a local soup kitchen and became a change agent at a young age. He knew that when he became a professional football player, he would then have the vehicle and platform to give back on a larger scale.



- The Slater Family Foundation was established in 2020 by Matthew Slater and his wife Dr. Shahrzad Slater. The Foundation aims at empowering individuals, churches, schools, and community groups in all aspects of health and well-being including: spiritual, relational, medical, educational, economical, environmental and to the Glory of God.
- In addition to the Foundation, Matthew and Shahrzad have over the years supported a range of non-profit organizations including; International Justice Mission, Compassion International, Ron Burton Training Village, World Vision, the ELISHA Project, Barnabas Fund, Voice of the Martyrs, and Open Doors.
- Despite building a Foundation of their own, the Slaters hope to continue to work alongside non-profits, bringing attention to the multiple causes and organizations.

New England has qualified for the playoffs 28 times in the team's 62-year history. The Patriots have earned 22 of those playoff berths

in the 28 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994. New England has won 22 division crowns overall (21 AFC East crowns) and has qualified as a Wild Card team on five occasions (1976, '85, '94, '98 and 2021). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 as part of a 16-team tournament following a players' strike.

- On the Bears first play following the LaFell touchdown, Zach Moore forced a Jay Cutler fumble that was recovered by Rob Ninkovich and returned for a 15-yard touchdown that gave the Patriots a 38-7 Patriots lead with 55 seconds left in the first half

#### **COMEBACKS FOR THE AGES**

The Patriots have staged two historic come-from-behind victories over the past several seasons:

Belichick coached the Patriots back from a 25-point deficit to win Super Bowl LI. A comeback of that magnitude is extremely rare. There had been 2,656 games in which a team led by 25 points or more in NFL history, including the postseason. Teams leading by 25 had recorded 2,647 wins, seven losses and two ties, a winning percentage of .997.

New England came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos, 34-31, in overtime in a Sunday Night Football matchup on Nov. 24, 2013, marking the largest regular season comeback win in team history, after trailing 24-0 at halftime.

New England's previous best comeback win was from a 23-0 deficit to win, 38-23, vs. Seattle (09/16/84). The Patriots also came back from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, 23-22 (12/21/96). The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently vs. Buffalo (01/01/12).
