NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (4-5) AT HOUSTON TEXANS (2-7)
Sunday, November 22, 2020 • Reliant Stadium • 1:00 p.m. ET
The New England Patriots look to even their 2020 regular-season record at 5-5 with a victory this Sunday at the Houston Texans.

The Patriots will face Houston Texans for the sixth straight year in the regular season and for the second straight time in Houston. Last year, the Patriots dropped a 28-22 decision at Houston in a Sunday Night Football game on Dec. 1, 2019. The Patriots are 4-1 against the Texans over the five previous regular-season games.

## BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be broadcast by CBS and can be seen locally on WBZ-TV. Andrew Catalon will handle play-by-play duties with James Lofton as the color analyst. AJ Ross will work from the sidelines. The game will be produced by Steve McKee and directed by Andy Goldberg.

LOCAL RADIO: 98.5 The Sports Hub is the flagship station for the Patriots Radio Network. A complete listing of the network's 35 stations can be found in this press release. Play-by-play broadcaster Bob Socci will call the action along with former Patriots quarterback Scott Zolak, who will provide color analysis. The games are produced by Marc Cappello.

## ACTION JACKSON

J.C. Jackson recorded three interceptions as an undrafted rookie in 2018, five interceptions last year, and leads the NFL in 2020 with six interceptions. His 14 interceptions since the start of the 2018 season are the most in the NFL over that span.

## SERIES HISTORY

The New England Patriots will face Houston Texans for the sixth straight year in the regular season and for the second straight time in Houston. Last year the Patriots dropped a 28-22 decision at Houston in a Sunday Night Football game on Dec. 1, 2019. The Patriots are 4-1 against the Texans over the five previous regular-season games.

In 2016, the Patriots and Texans played two times with New England taking a $27-0$ victory on Sept. 22 and then a $34-16$ win in the Divisional Playoffs. Both of those games were played at Gillette Stadium.

Overall, the Patriots and Texans have met 12 times and hold an 10-2 advantage ( $8-2$ regular season, 2-0 playoffs) since Houston entered the NFL in 2002s.

The Patriots are 3-2 overall against the Texans when playing in Houston.

Before the Texans joined the league, the Patriots and the Houston Oilers were foes dating back to the days of the American Football League, playing twice a year from 1960-69 and 33 times overall before the Oilers moved to Tennessee following the 1996 season.

## WORTH NOTING

Houston wide receiver DeAndre Carter spent time on the Patriots practice squad and took part in training in 2015 and 2016. He was released in September 2016 before the start of the season and was claimed by San Francisco.

Daniel Fells, the bother of Texans tight end Darren Fells played 14 games (including one playoff game) with the Patriots in 2012. He caught four passes for 85 -yards including a 35 -yard reception in a 24-23 Week 6 loss at Seattle (10/14/12)

## IF THE PATRIOTS WIN...

- New England will win their 132nd road game since 1994, most in the NFL over that span.
- And a player eclipses 100 yards rushing, the team will improve to $54-3$ since the 2000 regular season when a player rushes for at least 100 yards.
- And the team does not commit a turnover, New England will win its 72 nd game since 2008 without committing a turnover. The Patriots enter Week 11 with a 71-9 record in zero turnover games since 2008.


## WHAT TO LOOK FOR...

- The Patriots have been called for an NFL-low 29 total penalties. The fewest penalties the Patriots have ever had in a 16-game season was 57 in 2008. The fewest penalties in a 16-game season is 55 by the 2012 Atlanta Falcons. The 2020 Patriots are on pace for 52 total penalties.
- The New England offense enters this week third in the NFL averaging 161.1 rushing yards per game (1,450 total rushing yards), on pace for 2,578 rushing yards for the season. That would rank fourth in team annals behind the 3,165 rushing yards in 1978, 2,948 in 1976 and 2,605 in 1983.
- Damien Harris (3) and Sony Michel (1) have combined for four 100-yard rushing performances so far in 2020, the most since 2007 (5).
- The Patriots defense has recorded 11 interceptions entering this week's game at Houston, tied with Indianapolis and Pittsburgh for second-most in the NFL behind Tampa Bay's 12. The 2019 Patriots led the NFL with 25 interceptions.

## WHAT TO LOOK FOR...

- RB Rex Burkhead has six total touchdowns in 2020 (three rushing touchdowns \& three receiving touchdowns), second to the career-high eight touchdowns (five rushing and three receiving) he had in 2017 with the Patriots. He needs one more receiving touchdown to set a single-season career-high with four. The Patriots record for most receiving touchdowns by a running back in a single season is seven by James white (2018) and Larry Garron (1964).

## WHAT TO LOOK FOR...

- Jackson has recorded an interception in five consecutive games heading into Week 11, a Patriots record. With his pick last week vs. Baltimore, he broke a tie with Devin McCourty (2019) and Mike Haynes (1976), who recorded an interception in four straight contests. Minnesota's Brian Russell in 2003 was the last NFL player to intercept a pass in six consecutive contests. ## WHAT TO LOOK FOR...

- With his next interception, Devin McCourty (28) will tie Ron Hall, Roland James and Fred Marion for third all-time in Patriots history with 29 career interceptions.
- McCourty has 493 interception return yards in his regular-season career and needs seven yards to become the third Patriot with 500 return yards.

- Cam Newton has scored nine rushing touchdowns in 2020, on pace for 16 for the season. That mark would set a new NFL record for rushing touchdowns by a QB
- With one more rushing touchdown this season, Newton will become the 11th Patriot to rush for double-digit TDs in a single season and first since RB LeGarrette Blount set a franchise record with 18 rushing TDs in 2016.
- Newton is the only QB in NFL history with two double-digit rushing touchdown seasons and with one more rushing TD, he will extend his NFL record with a third season of 10-plus rushing touchdowns.

Since purchasing the team in 1994, the Patriots, under Robert Krafts' leadership, have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports.

Kraft has led the two most dominant decades in NFL history in terms of overall wins - 141 (2010-19) and 126 (2000-09)

Mr. Kraft is the most successful owner since he purchased the team in 1994 in terms of wins (328), division titles (19), winning percentage (.693), playoff wins (33), playoff seasons (21).


Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. In his 26 seasons of ownership, he has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (198993 ), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (. 238 pct.), logging the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21,
 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (19), conference crowns (10) and Super Bowl championships (6) than any other NFL team. Additionally, the Patriots have achieved the most winning seasons (23) and have the fewest losing seasons (2) since Kraft assumed ownership beginning in 1994. Super Bowl LIII was the 10th Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has appeared in more than four Super Bowls. In Kraft's 26 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 21 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons. Kraft earned his 23 rd winning season in 26 years of owning the franchise in 2019.

## A WINNING TRADITION

Robert Kraft won his 300th game overall as owner of the New England Patriots against Miami on Sept. 30, 2018. Kraft reached the milestone in his 25th NFL season and in his 432nd game, the fastest an owner has reached the milestone. Al Davis of Oakland accomplished the feat in 495 games (31 seasons) while Pat Bowlen of Denver reached 300 career wins in 501 games (30 seasons).

## A WINNING TRADITION

Kraft's winning percentage with the Patriots (.693) since taking over the team in 1994 is the highest among all owners/ownership groups with at least 200 wins (regular and postseason) with one team. He is one of just four owners with at least 200 wins and a winning percentage over . 600 .

## KRAFT PASSES OTHER OWNERS

The Patriots have 328 wins overall under Robert Kraft. He has produced more victories than every other Patriots owner combined. Under Kraft, the Patriots are 328-145 overall since he purchased the team in 1994. Kraft's predecessors in the owner's office went 225-276-9 in the 34 years prior to his purchase of the team.

## CONTINUITY BREEDS SUCCESS

New England is the first team in NFL history to win six Super Bowls with the same owner (Robert Kraft), head coach (Bill Belichick) and quarterback (Tom Brady).

## PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 27 times in their 60-year history. Twenty-one of those playoff berths have come in the 26 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. The Patriots have won 22 division crowns, including 17 in the last 19 seasons and 19 of which have come since Robert Kraft's purchase in 1994.

## A MODEL OF CONSISTENCY

Since Kraft took ownership of the team in 1994, the Patriots have had just three head coaches - Bill Parcells (1994-96), Pete Carroll (1997-99) and current head coach Bill Belichick (2000-present). The only team with fewer head coaches since 1994 is the Pittsburgh Steelers, who have had two: Bill Cowher (1992-2006) and Mike Tomlin (2007-present).

## TEAM - POINTS OF INTEREST

- The Patriots are tied with Pittsburgh for the most Super Bowl wins with six and need one more Super Bowl win for most Super Bowl wins in NFL history.
- The Patriots have played in the most Super Bowls in NFL history with 11 and look to add to that number in 2020.
- The Patriots enter the 2020 season second with 15 Conference Championship Game appearances, one behind the 16 by Pittsburgh and San Francisco.
- The New England Patriots enter the 2020 season with 37 postseason victories, the most in NFL history, and will look to add to that number in 2020. Pittsburgh is second with 36 playoff wins all-time.
- The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs for 11 straight seasons (2009-19), the most in NFL history. Dallas and Indianapolis are tied for second with nine consecutive seasons with a playoff berth.
- The Patriots extended their NFL record with 11 straight division titles (2009-19) and look to add to that number in 2020. The Los Angeles Rams are second with seven straight division titles (1973-79).
- The New England Patriots have earned seven No. 1 seeds and need one more to tie Denver (8) for second behind San Francisco (9) for the most since playoff seeding began in 1975.
- The Patriots have earned a first-round playoff bye an NFL-best 14 times since the current playoff format was instituted in 1990. Pittsburgh and San Francisco are second with nine byes since 1990. The Patriots are the only team in NFL history with nine straight first-round byes (2010-18).
- The Patriots have played in 58 postseason games, tied with Green Bay (58) for third all-time and need to play in two more postseason games in 2020 to become the third NFL team to play in 60 postseason games, joining Dallas (63) and Pittsburgh (61).
- The Patriots have achieved 19 straight seasons (2001-19) with a record of .500 or better, second all-time behind the 21 seasons by Dallas (1965-85).

- The Patriots have 34 winning seasons since 1970 , second all-time behind the 37 winning seasons by Pittsburgh.
- The Patriots finished the 2019 season with 420 points and have now reached 400 or more points in 13 straight seasons (2007-19) to extend their NFL record. The San Diego Chargers previously held the record by scoring at least 400 points in eight straight seasons from 2004-11. The New Orleans Saints have the second-longest active streak, scoring 400 points for their ninth straight season in 2019.
- The Patriots have tallied seven safeties since 2015, tied with Indianapolis for the most during that time. The Los Angeles Rams are second with six safeties during that time.

- The Patriots rushed for 217 yards in Week 1 vs. Miami and for 250 yards in Week 3 vs. Las Vegas. The Patriots have also rushed for 200 yards twice in a single season under Belichick in 2004, 08, 10, 12, 14 and 18 but never three times in a single year.
- The Patriots 6.6 yards per carry average vs. Las Vegas in Week 3 was their highest since 7.06 vs. Green Bay on Dec. 19, 2010. It marked the 11th time under Bill Belichick that the Patriots have averaged at least six yards per carry in a single game.



## PUT A RUSH ON THAT

The Patriots have rushed for 1,450 yards in 2020, ranked third in the NFL at 161.1 yards per game. The offense is on pace to finish with 2,578 yards rushing, which would rank fourth in team history.

## DEFENSE

- The Patriots defense has contributed two touchdowns through seven games in 2020. DB Devin McCourty returned an interception 43 yards to the house in Week 2 at Seattle and DL Deatrich Wise Jr. recovered a strip-sack fumble in the end zone for his first career TD in the Week 3 win vs. Las Vegas.
The Patriots have scored nine non-offensive touchdowns since the start of the 2019 season, most in the NFL during that time. In 2019, the Patriots had seven non-offensive touchdowns - two fumbles, two blocked punts, and three interceptions for touchdowns. The Patriots record for most non-offensive touchdowns in a single season is nine in 2010 and 1961.

## WHAT TO WATCH FOR IN 2020

- Bill Belichick has an NFL-best six Super Bowl championships as a head coach and joins George Halas and Curly Lambeau as the only NFL coaches with six championships since the league began postseason play in 1933.
- Belichick is third all-time with 277 career regular-season wins, behind Don Shula (328) and George Halas (318).
- Belichick has 308 victories (regular season and playoffs combined), third all-time behind Don Shula (347) and George Halas (324).
- Belichick's 17 division titles are the most by a head coach in NFL history. Don Shula and Tom Landry are second with 13 division crowns.
- Belichick can extend his NFL record with a 12th consecutive division title in 2020. Four other coaches are tied for second with six straight division titles.

## 2020 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- In Week 1 vs. Miami, Edelman (620) joined Wes Welker (672) to become the second Patriot to reach 600 career receptions. Edelman now needs 53 receptions to move past Welker.

Set a single-game career high with 179 yards receiving on eight receptions at Seattle Week 2. His previous career-high was 151 receiving yards on eight receptions with a touchdown at Miami (/1//17).

## WHAT TO WATCH FOR IN 2020

- Edelman is in fourth place on the Patriots career receiving yards list with 6,822 receiving yards. He needs 638 yards to move past Wes Welker $(7,459)$ into third place in team history, behind the 7,861 yards by Rob Gronkowski and 10,352 by Stanley Morgan.
- Edelman enters 2020 in ninth place on the Patriots all-time list with 36 receiving touchdowns and can move past Wes Welker (37), Irving Fryar (38), Jim Colclough (39) in 2020.
- Edelman enters the 2020 season with 1,986 punt return yards in the regular season, third in team history to the 2,625 by Troy Brown and 2,055 by Irving Fryar. Edelman needs 14 punt return yards to become the third Patriots player with 2,000 punt return yards.
- Edelman enters 2020 second in NFL history with 118 postseason receptions, second behind Jerry Rice (151).
- Edelman is one of 15 NFL players with at least 1,000 career postseason receiving yards and his 1,442 postseason receiving yards are second all-time, behind the 2,245 playoff receiving yards by Jerry Rice.
- Edelman has accrued six postseason 100-yard receiving games, the most in New England history and tied with Michael Irvin for second all-time, behind the eight 100-yard receiving games by Jerry Rice.

## FROM STANDOUT QB TO WR

Edelman began his college football career with a year at the College of San Mateo (Calif.) before transferring to Kent State, where as a senior, he completed 56 percent of his passes (153-of-275 for 1,820 yards) with 13 touchdowns. He was also the team's leading rusher, gaining 1,551 yards on 215 attempts (an average of 7.5 yards per carry) and scoring 13 touchdowns. His offensive numbers broke Kent State's single-season record for total offense set by Joshua Cribbs in 2003.

Said head coach Bill Belichick on the versatility of Edelman: "He played the quarterback position in college at Kent State and all the positions really that he's played in the NFL - covering kicks, returning kicks, slot receiver, outside receiver, slot defender - he didn't do any of those things in college. I think that really speaks to his versatility and how much he's grown as a player and how many things he's learned how to do that he really didn't have much experience with in college. l'd say that's pretty unusual, especially to be as competent in them as he is."

## FATHERLY ADVICE

If there is one thing Julian Edelman has never lacked, it's athletic ability. A dual-threat quarterback at Kent State and former baseball standout in high school, Edelman once wowed Toronto Blue Jays players with his impressive footwork while fielding ground balls in an appearance at batting practice in 2011.

This natural ability may have been overlooked by NFL scouts, who let him fall to the Patriots in the seventh round of the 2009 NFL Draft. Edelman remains focused on the lessons his father, Frank Edelman, taught him at a young age. "I'm still constantly trying to learn," Edelman told the Boston Herald. "My dad always put it in my head, when you're green, you're growing, when you're ripe, you're lost. When you're done learning, you're done."

Edelman ranks second all-time in NFL postseason history with 118 receptions. ## ELECTED TEAM LEADER

Slater was named to eight Pro Bowls (2011-17, 19) for his special teams work, but perhaps more revealing of his value to New England is the fact that he was elected a captain by his teammates for the 10th straight season in 2020.

The special teams ace shared what it means to be a captain with high school football players in a story published by The Boston Globe. "You have to be able to put others before yourself. Being a captain and leadership is about serving, and to me, that means a great deal of sacrifice - putting aside personal agendas for the greater common goal. Leadership is equated with sacrifice. I think you have to be willing to do whatever it takes for the unit to succeed. I think you need to lead by example. A lot of times, it's about what you do, not what you say."

## SLATER EMERGENCE WAS SPECIAL

Bill Belichick acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eight-man rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there - fourth-and-short, where they're trying to protect the box - but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts."

## SLATER SCORES FIRST CAREER TOUCHDOWN

During a 2007 loss to Arizona State, UCLA's Matthew Slater returned a kickoff 89 yards for the final touchdown of his collegiate career. Thuney has taken advantage of an NFLPA program that assists its players in earning college degrees. After earning his degree in accounting while also studying international studies at N.C.. State, Thuney recently earned his MBA through Indiana University's Kelley School of Business.

## 2020 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

McCourty entered the 2020 season in eighth place in franchise history with 26 interceptions and tied Maurice Hurst for seventh place with 27 after an interception return for a touchdown at Seattle on Sept. 20. He tied Mike Haynes for sixth place with a pick vs. San Francisco (10/25).

## WHAT TO WATCH FOR IN 2020

- Devin McCourty enters 2020 tied with Ty Law for second most Pro Bowls as a Patriots defensive back with four. Only CB Mike Haynes had more Pro Bowl invites as a Patriots defensive back with six.
- McCourty (28) needs two interceptions to join Ty Law (36), Raymond Clayborn (36) as the third Patriot to reach 30 interceptions.


## PICK LEADER

Devin McCourty tied for fourth in the NFL with five interceptions in 2019, his third career season with five-plus interceptions. That mark tied Marcus Peters and Earl Thomas for most seasons with 5-plus interception seasons since 2010. Additionally, McCourty's 28 regular-season interceptions since he entered the league in 2010 are tied for the fifth-most in the NFL over that span.



## THE MOST IMPORTANT ABILITY IS AVAILABILITY

McCourty has played the most defensive snaps since he entered the NFL in 2010 with 10,502 defensive snaps. Arizona's Patrick Peterson is second during that time with 9,583 defensive snaps.

## McCOUR-TD

DB Devin McCourty now has three career touchdowns following his $43-y a r d$ interception return for a touchdown at Seattle on Sept. 20. McCourty also had an 84-yard interception return for a touchdown at Buffalo in 2018 and a 104-yard kickoff return vs. the New York Jets in 2012.

## DOUBLE TROUBLE

After being selected by the Patriots in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, CB Devin McCourty became part of a select group in league history. McCourty's identical twin brother, Jason, joined the Patriots in 2018. The two became the 12th set of twins to play in the NFL. In the 2018 season opener, Devin and Jason became the first set of twins to play together on the same NFL team since 1926 when Gene and Tom Golsen suited up together for the Louisville Colonels.

Devin became the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998-2000. His twin brother, Jason, played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 19992001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox.

## IN GOOD COMPANY

Devin McCourty earned Associated Press All-Pro Second Team honors at safety in 2013 and 2016. He also earned Second Team All-Pro Honors as a rookie in 2010 when he played cornerback. McCourty joined Pro Football Hall of Famers Rod Woodson and Ronnie Lott as the only NFL players to earn All-Pro honors at both safety and cornerback.

## BROTHERS IN ARMS

Devin and Jason McCourty have seen first-hand the effects of sickle cell disease. Both their aunt and uncle lived with the disease while their father carried the trait. Devin and Jason partnered with Embrace Kids Foundation to form their own "Tackle Sickle Cell" campaign aiming to educate the public, increase blood donations and raise money and awareness for the fight against sickle cell disease. Devin's work with the local Boston Children's Hospital has helped advance research of the disease with doctors now as close as they've ever been to a cure.

## ALLTIME PLAYOFF RESULTS

The Patriots have compiled a 37-21 record in their 58 playoff games and their .638 playoff winning percentage is the best in NFL history among teams that have played at least 15 playoff games.

## PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

## PLAYOFF BERTHS UNDER KRAFT

New England has qualified for the playoffs 27 times in its 60 -year history. The Patriots have earned 21 of those playoff berths in the 26 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994. New England has won 22 division crowns overall ( 21 AFC East crowns) and has qualified as a Wild Card team on four occasions (1998, 1994, 1985 and 1976). The Patriots also qualified for the
 playoffs in 1982 as part of a 16-team tournament following a players' strike

## ANNUAL ACHIEVEMENT

The Patriots won more than half of their games for the 19th straight year in 2019. They are the first team to win more than half of their games in 19 straight seasons since free agency began in 1993.

The Patriots are also the first team to win more than half of their games in 19 straight seasons since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, more than the 49ers ( 16 straight from 1983-98) and the Cowboys (16 straight from 1970-85).

## COMABACKS FOR THE AGES

The Patriots have staged two historic come-from-behind victories over the past several seasons:

Belichick coached the Patriots back from a 25-point deficit to win Super Bowl LI. A comeback of that magnitude is extremely rare. There had been 2,656 games in which a team led by 25 points or more in NFL history, including the postseason. Teams leading by 25 had recorded 2,647 wins, seven losses and two ties, a winning percentage of .997.

New England came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos, 34-31, in overtime in a Sunday Night Football matchup on Nov. 24, 2013, marking the largest regular-season comeback win in team history, after trailing 24-0 at halftime.

New England's previous best comeback win was from a 23-0 deficit to win, $38-23$, vs. Seattle (09/16/84). The Patriots also came back from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, 23-22 (12/21/96). The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently vs. Buffalo (01/01/12)
