**NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (2-4) VS. NEW YORK JETS (1-4)**  
 Sunday, October 24, 2021 • Gillette Stadium (65,878) • 1:00 p.m. ET

The New England Patriots will return to AFC East Division play this week when they host the New York Jets. The Patriots defeated the Jets, 25-6, in the first meeting between the two teams on Sept. 19 at MetLife Stadium. The Patriots extended their streak to 11 straight wins over the Jets with the victory. That streak is tied for the second-longest winning streak in team history. The Patriots beat Buffalo 15 straight times from 2003 through 2010 and also own an 11-game winning streak against Buffalo.

The Patriots will be looking for their 22nd series sweep against the Jets and a season sweep for the sixth straight season. It would be the 13th sweep under Bill Belichick and their 15th under Robert Kraft.

### BROADCAST INFORMATION

**TELEVISION:** This week's game will be broadcast by **CBS** and can be seen locally on **WBZ-TV** Channel 4. **Andrew Catalan** will handle play-by-play duties with **James Lofton** as the color analyst. **Amanda Balionis** will work from the sidelines. The game will be produced by **Steve McKee** and directed by **Andy Goldberg**.

**LOCAL RADIO:** **98.5 The Sports Hub** is the flagship station for the Patriots Radio Network. A complete listing of the network's 35 stations can be found on page 60. Play-by-play broadcaster **Bob Socci** will call the action along with former Patriots quarterback **Scott Zolak**, who will provide color analysis. The games are produced by **Marc Cappello**.

### RICHARD SEYMOUR TO BE HONORED AT HALFTIME

Richard Seymour was voted by the fans as the 30th inductee to the Patriots Hall of Fame in the spring of 2020, and after a year delay due to the pandemic, will celebrate his induction on Saturday, Oct. 23 along with the Patriots longtime cheerleading director Tracy Sormanti. Seymour will also be honored at halftime of the New York Jets game on Sunday.

Seymour joined Troy Brown (2012), Tedy Bruschi (2013), Kevin Faulk (2016), Ty Law (2014), Matt Light (2018) and Willie McGinest (2015), as the seventh player to enter the Patriots Hall of Fame as a three-time Super Bowl champion with the team.

Seymour spent the first eight seasons of his 12-year NFL career with the Patriots and played an important role in delivering six division titles, four conference crowns and three Super Bowl championships to New England. He was named to five straight Pro Bowls with the Patriots (2002-06) and earned three straight first-team All-Pro honors (2003-05). His five Pro Bowl berths are the most by any Patriots defensive lineman since the 1970 NFL merger. He was also a four-time team co-captain. In 2009, he was voted to the Patriots 50th Anniversary Team and the 2000s All-Decade Team. Seymour has been a finalist for the Pro Football Hall of Fame for the last three years.

# PATRIOTS VS. NEW YORK JETS

## SERIES HISTORY

The New England Patriots and New York Jets will meet for the second time in 2021. The Patriots beat the Jets, 25-6, at MetLife Stadium in Week 2 to extend their streak to 11 straight wins over the Jets. The Patriots will be looking for their 22nd series sweep and a season sweep for the sixth straight season. It would be the 13th sweep under Bill Belichick and their 15th under Robert Kraft.

New England leads the series, 70-54-1 overall. The Patriots are 37-25-1 all-time in home games against the Jets, including 17-4 at Gillette Stadium.

The teams have played in the postseason three times – a 1985 Wild Card game, a 2006 Wild Card game and an AFC Divisional game in 2010. New England beat the Jets, 26-14, in 1985 at the Meadowlands en route to Super Bowl XX. In 2006, the Patriots defeated the Jets, 37-16, at Gillette Stadium and the Jets beat the Patriots, 28-21, in the 2010 Divisional playoff game in Foxborough.

New England is 41-16 against the Jets since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994.

New England's 70 overall victories over the Jets (including two playoff wins) are the second most over any single opponent, trailing only the 76 all-time wins over Buffalo.

## PATRIOTS DEFENSE PRODUCES FOUR INTERCEPTIONS; END FIRST TWO JETS DRIVES WITH INTERCEPTIONS

The Patriots had four interceptions against the Jets (9/19/21), the most picks in a single game since they had four at Cincinnati on Dec. 15, 2019. The Patriots had four games with four picks total in 2019, including their game on Oct. 21, at the New York Jets, the only other time the Patriots picked off four passes against the Jets. The most picks in a single game in 2020 was in the opener vs. Miami when the Patriots had three interceptions. The Patriots ended the first two Jets drives with interceptions from CB J.C. Jackson and DB Adrian Phillips, leading to 10 points. Jackson added a second interception in the second quarter, and Devin McCourty had a pick in the third quarter. The Patriots finished tied for the NFL lead with Pittsburgh and New Orleans with 18 interceptions in 2020. The Patriots have five picks so far in 2021.

The Patriots have never had a wide receiver complete more than two passes in a single season. Julian Edelman completed two passes in 2018, 2019 and 2020, and Harold Jackson completed two passes in 1980. In addition to the Tampa Bay game, Meyers completed two passes, both for touchdowns, in 2020.
- The most passes thrown by a non-quarterback in a single season for the Patriots were by RB Andy Johnson, who was 7-of-9 for 194 yards with four touchdowns in 1981 and RB Dick Christy, who was 6-of-11 for 94 yards with two touchdowns in 1960.

- Mac Jones has passed for 1,472 yards during the first six games and is on pace for 4,170 passing yards. He leads all rookie quarterbacks in passing yards (1,472) and completions (150). Only three rookie quarterbacks have ever passed for at least 4,000 yards.
- After six games, Jones' completion percentage is 71.1. The best completion percentage for a season by a rookie quarterback is Dak Prescott at 67.76 percent in 2016.

## TEAM NOTES

### **PATRIOTS EXTEND NFL RECORD TO 92 STRAIGHT GAMES SCORING IN FIRST HALF**

The Patriots have gone 92 straight games (regular season and post-season) scoring in the first half, to extend an NFL record, following Damien Harris' 4-yard touchdown run in the first quarter. The Patriots also own the second-longest streak at 82 games with a first half score (2006-11). The last time the Patriots failed to score in the first half was a 16-0 loss at home against Buffalo on Oct. 2, 2016.

### **PATRIOTS DEFENSE FORCES TWO TURNOVERS IN THE RED ZONE IN THE SECOND QUARTER**

The Patriots defense forced two turnovers in the red zone. DB Kyle Dugger intercepted QB Dak Prescott in the end zone in the second quarter, and later in the quarter, LB Ja'Whaun Bentley forced a fumble on Prescott on a fourth-and-goal sneak from the New England 1-yard line, which was recovered by LB Kyle Van Noy.

### **PATRIOTS PLAY FIRST REGULAR SEASON OVERTIME GAME SINCE 2015**

The Patriots and Dallas went into overtime, the Patriots first regular season overtime game since Dec. 27, 2015 when they lost 26-20 at the New York Jets. Overall, it was the first overtime game since a 37-31 win on Jan. 20, 2019 in the AFC Championship Game at Kansas City.

### **PATRIOTS PUT UP A 14-POINT FIRST QUARTER**

The 14 points in the first quarter by the Patriots are the most by the Patriots since Oct. 27, 2019 vs. Cleveland when the Patriots scored 17 points.

## INDIVIDUAL NOTES

### **RB DAMIEN HARRIS HAS SECOND 100-YARD GAME OF THE 2021 SEASON; FIFTH 100-YARD GAME OF HIS CAREER**

RB Damien Harris finished with 101 yards rushing on 18 attempts for a 5.6-yard average. It is the second 100-yard game of the season for Harris and the fifth of his career. Harris had 100 yards on Sept. 12, 2001 vs. the Dolphins. Harris had two 21-yard runs in the game with one in the first quarter and one in the fourth quarter.

### **JONES BECOMES FIRST ROOKIE TO COMPLETE 70 PERCENT OF HIS PASSES IN 5 OF FIRST 6 GAMES**

QB Mac Jones finished 15-of-21 for 229 yards with two touchdowns and one interception for a 71.4 completion percentage. He has completed 70 percent of his passes in five of his first six games to become the first rookie quarterback to ever accomplish the feat.

### **JONES HAS A HIGH COMPLETION PERCENTAGE**

Through six games, Jones has completed 71.1 percent of his passes. The rookie record is 67.76 by Dak Prescott in 2016.

### **HUNTER HENRY HAS A TOUCHDOWN IN THIRD STRAIGHT GAME**

TE Hunter Henry caught a 20-yard touchdown pass from QB Mac Jones and has now had a touchdown reception in three straight games. He had a three-game stretch with three touchdowns as a rookie in 2016 with the Chargers.

### **DB KYLE DUGGER REGISTERS FIRST NFL INTERCEPTION**

DB Kyle Dugger registered his first career interception when he picked off QB Dak Prescott in the end zone in the second quarter off a deflected pass by DB Justin Bethel. Dugger returned the pick 29 yard to the New England 25-yard line.

### **JA'WHAUN BENTLEY FORCES A FUMBLE ON THE GOAL LINE**

LB Ja'Whaun Bentley forced a fumble when Dallas QB Dak Prescott reached over the goal line late in the first half to preserve a 14-10 New England lead at the end of the first half. The play completed a goal line stand, as Dallas had a first-and-goal from the New England 1-yard line.

### **BENTLEY HAS THIRD 10-PLUS TACKLE GAME**

Bentley led the team with 13 total tackles. It is his third career game with 10-plus tackles. He had 14 total tackles vs. Arizona on Nov. 29, 2020 and 12 total tackles vs. Denver on Oct. 18, 2020.

### **RB RHAMONDRE STEVENSON SCORES FIRST NFL TOUCHDOWN**

2021 fourth-round draft pick RB Rhamondre Stevenson scored his first NFL touchdown on a 1-yard run in the fourth quarter.

### **WR KENDRICK BOURNE HAS CAREER LONG**

Mac Jones connected with Kendrick Bourne for a 75-yard touchdown pass in the fourth quarter, his longest career reception. His previous long was a 54-yard reception from QB Jimmy Garoppolo vs. Tennessee on Dec. 17, 2017 when he played for San Francisco.

Under Kraft's leadership since he purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports.

Kraft has led the two most dominant decades in NFL history in terms of overall wins – 141 (2010-19) and 126 (2000-09).

Kraft is the most successful owner since he purchased the team in 1994 in terms of wins (333), division titles (19), winning percentage (.685), playoff wins (33) and playoff seasons (21).



Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. In his 27 seasons of ownership, he has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what many observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.238 pct.), the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (19), conference crowns (10) and Super Bowl championships (6) than any other NFL team. Additionally, the Patriots have achieved the most winning seasons (23) and are tied with Pittsburgh for the fewest losing seasons (3) since Kraft assumed ownership beginning in 1994. Super Bowl LIII was the 10th Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has appeared in more than four Super Bowls. In Kraft's 27 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 21 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons, and finished with a winning record 23 times.

## DYNASTY VS. DYNASTY

Of all the great teams throughout the Super Bowl era, the New England Patriots and the San Francisco 49ers have set a standard of extended excellence above all of the others.

### 49ERS (1981-98)

### A WINNING TRADITION I

Robert Kraft won his 300th game overall as owner of the New England Patriots against Miami on Sept. 30, 2018. Kraft reached the milestone in his 25th NFL season and in his 432nd game, the fastest an owner has reached the milestone. Al Davis of Oakland/Los Angeles accomplished the feat in 495 games (31 seasons) while Pat Bowlen of Denver reached 300 career wins in 501 games (30 seasons).

### A WINNING TRADITION II

Kraft's winning percentage with the Patriots (.685) since taking over the team in 1994 is the highest among all owners/ownership groups with at least 200 wins (regular and postseason) with one team. He is one of just four owners with at least 200 wins and a winning percentage over .600.

### KRAFT PASSES OTHER OWNERS

The Patriots have 333 wins overall under Robert Kraft. He has produced more victories than every other Patriots owner combined. Under Kraft, the Patriots are 333-153 overall since he purchased the team in 1994. Kraft's predecessors in the owner's office went 225-276-9 in the 34 years prior to his purchase of the team.

### CONTINUITY BREEDS SUCCESS

New England is the first team in NFL history to win six Super Bowls with the same owner (Robert Kraft), head coach (Bill Belichick) and quarterback (Tom Brady).

### PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 27 times in their 61-year history. Twenty-one of those playoff berths have come in the 27 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. The Patriots have won 22 division crowns, including 17 in the last 20 seasons and 19 of which have come since Robert Kraft's purchase in 1994.

# PATRIOTS POINTS OF INTEREST IN 2021

## PATRIOTS

- The New England Patriots are tied with the Pittsburgh Steelers for the most Super Bowl wins in the NFL with six.
- The Patriots have played in 11 Super Bowls, the most by any team in NFL history. Dallas, Denver and Pittsburgh have played in eight.
- The Patriots are third in NFL history with 15 Conference Championship Game appearances, one behind the 16 by Pittsburgh and San Francisco.
- The New England Patriots have 37 postseason victories, the most in NFL history. Pittsburgh is second with 36 playoff wins all-time.
- The New England Patriots earned seven No. 1 seeds, behind Denver (8) and San Francisco (9) since playoff seeding began in 1975.
- The Patriots earned a first-round playoff bye an NFL-best 14 times since the current playoff format was instituted in 1990. Pittsburgh and San Francisco are second with nine byes since 1990. New England is the only team in NFL history with nine straight first-round byes (2010-18).
- The Patriots have played in 58 postseason games, fourth-most in NFL history behind Dallas (63), Pittsburgh (62) and Green Bay (60).
- The Patriots need to play in two more postseason games in 2021 to become the fourth NFL team to play in 60 postseason games.
- The Patriots are second with 13 seasons of 12 wins since 1970, behind San Francisco's 14 seasons with 12 victories



- New England has won 13 games in a single season seven times in franchise history. Only San Francisco has more 13-win seasons with 10.
- The New England Patriots have won 14 or more games in a season five times, most in NFL history. San Francisco is second with four 14-win seasons.
- New England has 27 undefeated months since 2000, most in the NFL over that span. Indianapolis is second with 17 undefeated months during that time.
- The Patriots have 34 winning seasons since 1970, second all-time behind Pittsburgh's 37.
- The Patriots have 558 total victories, the fourth-most wins since 1960, behind the 571 wins by Pittsburgh and the 566 wins by Dallas and the 559 wins by Green Bay.
- New England has played in 996 games in franchise history (regular season and playoffs combined) and will play game No. 1,000 in Week 10. They will become the first original AFL team to play in 1,000 games.
- With rookie free agent K Quinn Nordin making the 53-man roster in 2021, the Patriots have now had a rookie free agent make the opening day roster for the 18th straight season, the third-longest streak in the NFL. The L.A. Chargers have had a rookie free agent make their opening day roster for 25 straight seasons and Indianapolis has had a rookie free agent make their opening day roster for 23 straight seasons.
- The Patriots have finished in the top 10 for fewest points allowed in each of the last nine seasons (2012-2020) and need to accomplish the feat in 2021 to tie Tampa Bay, who became the last team to reach 10 straight seasons (1996-2005) for the fewest points allowed.

## PATRIOTS DEFENSE PRODUCES FOUR INTERCEPTIONS; END FIRST TWO JETS DRIVES WITH INTERCEPTIONS

The Patriots had four interceptions against the Jets (9/19/21), the most picks in a single game since they had four at Cincinnati on Dec. 15, 2019. The Patriots had four games with four picks total in 2019, including their game on Oct. 21, at the New York Jets, the only other time the Patriots picked off four passes against the Jets. The most picks in a single game in 2020 was in the opener vs. Miami when the Patriots had three interceptions. The Patriots ended the first two Jets drives with interceptions from CB J.C. Jackson and DB Adrian Phillips, leading to 10 points. Jackson added a second interception in the second quarter, and Devin McCourty had a pick in the third quarter. The Patriots finished tied for the NFL lead with Pittsburgh and New Orleans with 18 interceptions in 2020. The Patriots have five picks so far in 2021.



Bill Belichick is the only head coach in NFL history to win six Super Bowl titles. He won more games overall (141) during a 10-year stretch (2010-19) than any other coach in NFL history. In 2007, Belichick led the Patriots to the fourth undefeated and untied regular season in NFL history and the first since the NFL established a 16-game schedule in 1978. His 47 consecutive years as an NFL coach are most in NFL history, passing the 45 by Dick LeBeau. The only other NFL coach with at least 40 consecutive NFL coaching seasons is Tom Moore with 41.

## RB BRANDON BOLDEN

### JERSEY SWAP

• Heading into his 9th season in the league, RB Brandon Bolden announced that he would change jersey numbers. Instead of wearing the familiar No. 38 that he wore previously with New England as well as his one season in Miami in 2018, he will be moving forward in jersey number 25.

• Pitts was part of the Kansas City Chiefs team that won Super Bowl V and played in the first Super Bowl.

• Jones followed a 74.4 completion percentage in the opener against Miami by completing 73.3 percent of his passes (22-of-30 passes) for 186 yards at the NY Jet. He is the first quarterback with a 70-plus completion percentage in each of his first two games (min. 10 attempts in each game). He has now completed over 70 percent of his passes in four of his first five NFL games.

### JONES COMPLETES 19 CONSECUTIVE PASSES TO TIE TEAM MARK

Jones completed 19 straight passes during a stretch from the second quarter to the fourth quarter vs. Tampa Bay on Oct. 3, tied for the longest streak in team history. • Meyers, who threw touchdown passes in Weeks 10 and 17 in 2020, became the fourth wide receiver with two touchdown passes in a single season in the Super Bowl era, joining Rod Gardner (2003), Antwan Randle El (2010) and Odell Beckham Jr. (2018).

## JAKOBI MEYERS COMPLETES TWO PASSES IN ONE GAME

- Meyers completed two passes vs. Tampa Bay on Oct. 3, 2021. He caught a backwards pass from QB Mac Jones and then threw across the field to RB Brandon Bolden, who managed a 15-yard gain in the second quarter. He completed a 30-yard pass to WR Nelson Agholor in the fourth quarter on a flea flicker. The only other wide receiver to complete two passes in single game for New England was Julian Edelman vs. Denver on Oct. 18, 2020. The only other non-quarterbacks to complete two passes in a game for New England were running backs – Dick Christy on Nov. 18, 1960 vs. Dallas Texans and Andy Johnson on Sept. 6, 1981 vs. Baltimore Colts.

- Meyers has completed 4-of-4 passes for 88 yards with two touchdown passes for a perfect 158.3 passer rating in his career.

### A FAMOUS NAMESAKE

- A noted sports fan and basketball enthusiast, Shaq's mother, Alicia McGuire, named her son Shaquille Olajuwon Mason in 1993 after her two favorite NBA stars at the time, Shaquille O'Neal and Hakeem Olajuwon. The Tennessee native had the opportunity to meet one of his namesakes at a Memphis Grizzlies game while O'Neal was a member of the Miami Heat, receiving a special meet-and-greet and having his jersey signed.





# PATRIOTS DEFENSIVE NOTES

## LB JA'WHAUN BENTLEY

### 2020 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- LB Ja'Whaun Bentley set single-season career-highs with 91 tackles and 1½ sacks in 2020.



Ja'Whaun and his family were homeless starting his freshman year of high school, living with one set of grandparents, then the other, then an aunt. Ja'Whaun and his brother slept on couches and floors at times over the course of several years. Once Ja'Whaun entered the NFL, he was able to secure permanent housing for his family.

## LB JAMIE COLLINS SR.

### PATH TO THE NFL

- The road to the NFL was anything but easy for linebacker and 2013 second-round draft pick Jamie Collins Sr. The youngest of five siblings growing up in Quentin, Miss., Collins Sr. lost both of his parents when he was six years old and was raised by one of his sisters. Collins Sr. turned to football as an outlet to help him through the tough times.
- "It means a lot. It's my living," Collins Sr. told the Boston Herald. "It kept me on track." Collins Sr.'s resiliency in dealing with adversity has made a lasting impact on fellow Mississippi native and former Patriots teammate Stevan Ridley, who grew up 30 miles west of Meadville in Natchez, Miss., and got to know Collins through a family friend.
- "What I've known about him, he really has been a strong person," Ridley told the Herald in 2013. "Anybody that's gone through the things that he's gone through and still finds a way to be successful on the football field, you have to be mentally tough. That's what he's kind of done as a teammate here. He's come in here and accepted his role and done a pretty good job as a rookie."

### SACKS AND PICKS

- Since entering the NFL in 2013, Collins is the player in the NFL with at least 25 sacks and 10 interceptions. Collins has accumulated 25 ½ sacks and 11 picks during his career. He is the first player to accomplish the feat within his first 100 career games.

## LB DONT'A HIGHTOWER

### WINNER ON MULTIPLE LEVELS

- Dont'a Hightower (three Super Bowl championships and two national titles at Alabama) and Russell Maryland (two national championships at Miami and three Super Bowl Championships with Dallas) are the only two players in NFL history with at least two national championships and two Super Bowl wins.

### MR. FEBRUARY

- Hightower has made two Super-Bowl altering plays during his career and was part of a record-setting performance in another. Head coach Bill Belichick referred to Hightower as "Mr. February" at the team's Super Bowl LIII ring ceremony.
- In Super Bowl XLIX vs. Seattle, Hightower made a crucial tackle on Seahawks RB Marshawn Lynch at the 1-yard line the play before CB Malcolm Butler intercepted Seattle QB Russell Wilson to seal the victory in the waning moments.
- New England trailed the Atlanta Falcons, 28-12, midway through the fourth quarter when Hightower strip-sacked Falcons QB Matt Ryan at the Atlanta 25-yard line. The fumble was recovered by the Patriots and the turnover led to a touchdown that helped spark the record comeback in Super Bowl LI.
- Led a defensive unit in the Super Bowl LIII win over the L.A. Rams (2/3/19). Hightower recorded two sacks and a pass defended as part of a stifling defense that became the second team in Super Bowl history to hold its opponent to just three points.

## DB J.C. JACKSON

### WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2021

- J.C. Jackson led the Patriots with nine interceptions in 2020. Asante Samuel set the team record for most interceptions in consecutive seasons with 16. Samuel picked off 10 passes in 2006 and six in 2007.
- Jackson has 19 interceptions since 2018, tied for the most in the NFL over that span with the Miami's Xavien Howard.
- Jackson led the NFL with 11 takeaways in 2020. From 2019-20, Jackson had a total of 16 takeaways, tied with Ron Hall (1963-64) and Asante Samuel (2006-07) for the best two-year total in New England. The Patriots record for most takeaways in a three-year span is 22 by Ron Hall (1964-66 - (20 interceptions in two fumble recoveries).



### ACTION JACKSON

- J.C. Jackson is tied with Miami's Xavien Howard for the most interceptions since he entered the NFL as a rookie free agent in 2018 with a total of 19 interceptions. He has three games with two interceptions, most recently at the New York Jets on Sept. 19, 2021. Jackson led the NFL in 2020 with 11 total takeaways (nine interceptions and two fumble recoveries).

- DB Ron Hall set a Patriots franchise record in 1964 with 13 takeaways (11 interceptions & two fumble recoveries) in a single season. J.C. Jackson recorded nine interceptions and recovered two fumbles for an NFL-leading 11 takeaways in 2020. ### J.C. JACKSON HAS A PICK AGAINST JETS FOR THIRD STRAIGHT GAME

- J.C. Jackson registered his first interception of the 2021 season when he intercepted a Zach Wilson pass in the first quarter to give the Patriots a first down at the Jets 35-yard line at the NY Jets (9/19). It was his third straight pick against the Jets after intercepting a pass in both Jets games in 2020. The last player to have to have interceptions in three straight games against the Jets was Patriots safety Lawyer Milloy in 1998-99.

### JACKSON HAD TWO PICKS IN A GAME FOR THIRD TIME IN HIS CAREER

- Jackson had a second pick later in the second quarter against the Jets. It is the third time in his career that he has had two interceptions in a game. He had two picks at Buffalo on Sept. 29, 2019 and two picks at Cincinnati on Dec. 15, 2019.

### REPRESENTING FAMILY

- Matthew Judon wore jersey #99 during his five seasons with the Baltimore Ravens but chose jersey #9 upon joining New England in 2021.
- Said Judon, "I'm one of 10 children, so I got nine siblings. Every time I go out there, I represent them. I like nine. That's one of the reasons I rock it. Ninety-nine was taken, so I chose to use the new rule and getting on it."

### LB MATT JUDON HAS EIGHTH TWO-SACK GAME; SECOND OF THE 2021 SEASON

- LB Matt Judon had two sacks in a three-play sequence in the second quarter at Houston (10/10/21) to run his total to 6 ½ sacks for the season. It is the 8th time in his career that he has had a multi-sack game and second time in 2021. He had 2 ½ sacks vs. New Orleans on Sept. 26. His career-best is 3 sacks vs. Oakland on Nov. 25, 2018, when he played for Baltimore. His best season total is 9 ½ sacks in 2019. In 2020, DL Chase Winovich led the team with 5 ½ sacks.

### JUDON SETS TEAM RECORD FOR MOST SACKS IN FIRST FIVE GAMES

- Judon set a team record with 6 ½ sacks through the first five games. The previous record was 5 ½ sacks by Chandler Jones in 2015 and Andre Tippett in 1984.

## DB DEVIN McCOURTY



### WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2021

- Devin McCourty is sixth all-time in New England history with 35 total takeaways. He needs five total takeaways to join Raymond Clayborn (44), Fred Marion (42) and Ty Law (40) as the only players in team history with 40 total takeaways.
- McCourty enters 2021 tied with Ty Law for second-most Pro Bowl invitations as a Patriots defensive back with four. Only CB Mike Haynes (6) had more Pro Bowl nods as a Patriots defensive back.
- McCourty tied for fourth in the NFL with five interceptions in 2019, his third career season with five-plus interceptions. That mark tied Marcus Peters and Earl Thomas for most seasons with five-plus interception seasons since 2010. Additionally, McCourty's 28 regular season interceptions since he entered the league in 2010 are tied for the sixth-most in the NFL over that span.
- McCourty has played in 177 career regular season games. If he plays in all 16 games in 2021 he will have played in the 10th-most games in New England history.

### 2021 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- McCourty had his first pick of the season at the NY Jets (9/19) and moved into a tie for third place on the Patriots all-time interception list with Ron Hall, Roland James and Fred Marion with 29, behind Ty Law (36) and Raymond Clayborn (36).
- McCourty now has 515 interception return yards in his regular season career and became the third Patriot with 500 return yards at the NY Jets (9/19).

## THE MOST IMPORTANT ABILITY IS AVAILABILITY

- McCourty has played the most defensive snaps since he entered the NFL in 2010 with 10,858 defensive snaps. Malcolm Jenkins (New Orleans and Philadelphia) is second with 10,733 defensive snaps.

## McCOUR-TD

- McCourty has four career touchdowns following return of a blocked field goal for a touchdown at L.A. Chargers (12/6/20) and his 43-yard interception return for a touchdown at Seattle (9/20/20). McCourty also had an 84-yard interception return for a touchdown at Buffalo in 2018 and a 104-yard kickoff return vs. N.Y. Jets in 2012.

## DOUBLE TROUBLE

- After being selected by the Patriots in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, Devin McCourty became part of a select group in league history. McCourty's identical twin brother, Jason, joined the Patriots in 2018 (now with Miami). The two became the 12th set of twins to play in the NFL. In the 2018 season opener, Devin and Jason became the first set of twins to play together on the same NFL team since 1926 when Gene and Tom Golsen suited up together for the Louisville Colonels.

- Devin became the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998-2000. His twin brother, Jason, played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 1999-2001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox.

## IN GOOD COMPANY

- Devin McCourty earned Associated Press All-Pro Second Team honors at safety in 2013 and 2016. He also earned Second Team All-Pro Honors as a rookie in 2010 when he played cornerback. McCourty joined Pro Football Hall of Famers Rod Woodson and Ronnie Lott as the only NFL players to earn All-Pro honors at both safety and cornerback.

## BROTHERS IN ARMS

- Devin and Jason McCourty have seen first-hand the effects of sickle cell disease. Both their aunt and uncle lived with the disease while their father carried the trait. Devin and Jason partnered with Embrace Kids Foundation to form their own "Tackle Sickle Cell" campaign aiming to educate the public, increase blood donations and raise money and awareness for the fight against sickle cell disease. Devin's work with the local Boston Children's Hospital has helped advance research of the disease with doctors now as close as they've ever been to a cure.



## DB ADRIAN PHILLIPS

### VERSATILITY

- "I'm one of the guys that when you ask me what position I play, I say 'defense.' I want to be able to line up everywhere, and most importantly, I want to be able to produce everywhere."



- Began his career in 2014 in San Diego focusing on special teams and was selected to his first Pro Bowl in 2018 as a special teamer.

- Started all 16 games at safety last year for the Patriots and led the team in tackles with a career-high 107.

- Of his 746 snaps last season, Phillips saw 473 snaps in the box and 163 snaps off the edges.

### BAILEY SETS TEAM RECORD

• Jake Bailey finished first in the NFL with 45.6 net yards per punt in 2020, a new single-season team record. The previous record was 41.5 by Zoltan Mesko in 2011. His gross punt average of 48.7 is also a team record, besting the 46.5 gross average by Mesko in 2011. His 45.6 net yards per punt is second all-time in NFL history in a single season to the 46.0 net average by Johnny Hekker in 2016 with the Rams.

### DIMINISHING [PUNT] RETURNS

• Bailey's punting in 2020 allowed a total of just 71 punt return yards on 12 returns. It is the fewest punt return yards allowed by the Patriots in team history and the sixth-fewest punt return yards allowed in a season in NFL history. The 12 punt returns allowed are second in NFL history and team history to the 11 by New England in 2008.

### WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2021

• Justin Bethel has reached double-digit special teams tackles in each of his nine NFL seasons, and will try to reach 10 straight in 2021. Bethel led the team with 14 special teams tackles in 2020.

## WR GUNNER OLSZEWSKI

### WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2021

• Gunner Olszewski will attempt to become the first New England player to lead the NFL in two straight years in punt return average and the first NFL player to do so since Devin Hester led the NFL in 2010 and 2011.

• Olszewski will look to become the first NFL player to average 17.0-yards per punt return or more in back-to-back seasons. Devin Hester owns the best mark with a 17.1-yard average in 2010 followed by 16.2-yard average in 2011.



### PUNT RETURN RECORD

• WR Gunner Olszewski finished first in the NFL with a 17.3-yard punt return average (20 returns for 346 yards and one touchdown) in 2020. It is the highest return average in Patriots history and the second-highest in the NFL since 1970. Julian Edelman had the highest average in a season at 15.5 in 2012. Olszewski is the fourth Patriots player to lead the league in punt return average. Danny Amendola led the NFL with a 12.0-yard average in 2015, Troy Brown led in 2001 with a 14.2-yard average and Irving Fryar tied for the NFL lead with a 14.1-yard average in 1985.

• WR Gunner Olszewski scored his first NFL touchdown on a 70-yard punt return at the L.A. Chargers on Dec. 6, 2020. It was the first punt return for a touchdown for New England since WR Julian Edelman returned a punt 84 yards vs. Denver on Nov. 2, 2014. Olszewski's return came on the heels of an 82-yard punt return for a touchdown that was called back due to a penalty in the previous game.

• Olszewski scored on a 70-yard punt return touchdown and had a 61-yard return in the Patriots win at the L.A. Chargers on Dec. 6, 2020. He is the first player in Patriots history with two punt returns of at least 60 yards in a single game and the first NFL player to do so since Indianapolis RB Nyheim Hines had 84 and 71-yard punt return touchdowns vs. Carolina on Dec. 22, 2019. Before Olszewski, the two longest punt returns in a single game for the Patriots was Julian Edelman on Nov. 18, 2012, vs. Indianapolis with a 68-yard punt returned for a touchdown and a 49-yard return.

## WR MATTHEW SLATER



### WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2021

• Matthew Slater has earned an NFL record nine special teams Pro Bowl invitations and will look to add to that in 2021.

• Slater entered his 14th season with the Patriots in 2021, tied with Stephen Gostkowski, Bruce Armstrong and Steve Nelson for the fourth-most in team history, behind the 15 by Troy Brown and Julius Adams, the 16 by Steve Grogan and the 20 by Tom Brady.

• Slater has played in 195 regular season games. If he plays in all 16 games in 2021 he will reach 205, the fourth-most in team history and will be one of five players to play in 200 regular season games for the Patriots.

## 2020 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

• Slater earned his ninth Pro Bowl invitation in 2020, extending his NFL record for most Pro Bowl selections as a special teamer. Slater is now tied with John Hannah (1976, 78-85) for second-most Pro Bowl selections as a Patriot with nine. Tom Brady holds the franchise record with 14.

• Slater is one of 10 sons of Hall of Fame members to be drafted in NFL history.

• Slater was voted to the Pro Bowl for seven straight seasons from 2011-17 and two more from 2019-20. Those nine selections are two more than the seven that his father earned with the L.A. Rams. The Slater family's 16 combined Pro Bowls are the second-most among father-son contingents to have been voted to at least one Pro Bowl each.

## ELECTED TEAM LEADER

• Slater has been named to nine Pro Bowls (2011-17, 19-20) for his special teams work, but perhaps more revealing of his value to New England is the fact that he was elected a captain by his teammates for the 11th straight season in 2021.

The special teams ace shared what it means to be a captain with high school football players in a story published by *The Boston Globe*. "You have to be able to put others before yourself. Being a captain and leadership is about serving, and to me, that means a great deal of sacrifice – putting aside personal agendas for the greater common goal. Leadership is equated with sacrifice. I think you have to be willing to do whatever it takes for the unit to succeed. I think you need to lead by example. A lot of times, it's about what you do, not what you say."

## SLATER'S EMERGENCE WAS SPECIAL

• Bill Belichick acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eight-man rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there — fourth-and-short, where they're trying to protect the box — but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts."

## SLATER'S SCORE

• During a 2007 game against Arizona State, UCLA's Matthew Slater returned a kickoff 89 yards for the final touchdown of his collegiate career. In the Patriots 16-10 win over Buffalo on Sept. 29, 2019, DB J.C. Jackson blocked a punt, which Slater returned 11 yards for his first NFL touchdown, 12 seasons after his last touchdown.

## K NICK FOLK



### LOCAL LINEAGE

Nick Folk's mother is a direct descendant of William Bradford, a founder, settler and long-time governor of the Plymouth Colony settlement. Bradford was also a passenger on the *Mayflower's* original voyage to America.

### FOLK HERO

Folk kicked his second game-winning field goal as time expired in 2020, connecting on a 50-yard field goal against Arizona (11/29/20)

to give the Patriots a 20-17 win. He had a 51-yard game-winning field goal as time expired at the New York Jets on Nov. 9, 2020 to give the Patriots a 30-27 victory. He is the first NFL kicker with two game-winning field goals as time expired in a single season. Overall, he has three game-winning field goals as time expired. He also kicked a 53-yard field game-winning field goal as time expired at Buffalo on Oct. 8, 2007, when he was a rookie with the Dallas Cowboys.

### FOLK DIGS THE LONG BALL

Folk's 50-yard game-winning field goal vs. Arizona (11/29/20) was the second-longest game-winning field goal with no time left in Patriots history, behind the 51-yarder he hit at N.Y. Jets (11/9). The previous long was 48 yards by Adam Vinatieri in Super Bowl XXXVI vs. the St. Louis Rams.

### NICK FOLK SETS TEAM RECORD FOR CONSECUTIVE FIELD GOALS

K Nick Folk set the team record with 33 consecutive field goals after connecting on field goals of 46, 49, 32 and 26 yards at the New York (9/19/21) and extended that mark to 36 straight field with a 27-yarder vs. Tampa Bay before missing a 56-yarder in the fourth quarter. He passed Stephen Gostkowski, who connected on 31 straight field goals. After missing his first two field goals of the 2020 season, he kicked 36 straight field goals. Folk's previous longest streak was 23 straight field goals in 2013 when he played for the New York Jets. The NFL record is 44 straight field goals by Adam Vinatieri.

His career-long is a 56-yard field goal on Oct. 17, 2010 at Denver when he played for the New York Jets.

Folk had his second NFL game with two 50-yard field goals at Houston (10/10/21) He had two 51-yard field goals on Nov. 18, 2012 t St. Louis as a member of the New York Jets.



### FOLK BECOMES SECOND PATS PLAYER TO CONNECT ON TWO 50-YARD FIELD GOALS IN ONE GAME

Folk is the second Patriots player to have two 50-yard field goals in one game after he drilled two 52-yard field goals at Houston on Oct. 10, 2021. K Stephen Gostkowski accomplished the feat three times with the most recent happening against Oakland on Nov. 19, 2017 in Mexico City.

### FOLK FINISHES 4-FOR-4 ON FIELD GOALS

Folk connected on all four field goals (52, 52, 32 and 21) at Houston on Oct. 10, 2021 and was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week. It is the 11th time in his career that he has had at least four field goals in a game, his third as a member of the Patriots and his second time in 2021. He connected on four field goal at the NY Jets (9/19). He has connected on five field goals in a game twice.

## PLAYOFF BERTHS UNDER KRAFT

New England has qualified for the playoffs 27 times in the team's 61-year history. The Patriots have earned 21 of those playoff berths in the 27 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994. New England has won 22 division crowns overall (21 AFC East crowns) and has qualified as a Wild Card team on four occasions (1976, '85, '94 and '98). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 as part of a 16-team tournament following a players' strike.



## ANNUAL ACHIEVEMENT

The Patriots are also the only team to win more than half of their games in 19 straight seasons since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, more than the 49ers (16 straight from 1983-98) and the Cowboys (16 straight from 1970-85).

- Rob Gronkowski caught a 2-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady with 1:57 left in the first half to make the score 24-7 and cap off a 10-play, 80-yard drive.
- After the Patriots defense forced a three-and-out, a 42-yard Julian Edelman punt return gave New England possession at the Chicago 9-yard line, and Brady found Brandon LaFell for a 9-yard touchdown on the next play to give the Patriots a 31-7 lead with 1:07 left in the first half.
- On the Bears first play following the LaFell touchdown, Zach Moore forced a Jay Cutler fumble that was recovered by Rob Ninkovich and returned for a 15-yard touchdown that gave the Patriots a 38-7 Patriots lead with 55 seconds left in the first half.

## COMEBACKS FOR THE AGES

The Patriots have staged two historic come-from-behind victories over the past several seasons:

Belichick coached the Patriots back from a 25-point deficit to win Super Bowl LI. A comeback of that magnitude is extremely rare. There had been 2,656 games in which a team led by 25 points or more in NFL history, including the postseason. Teams leading by 25 had recorded 2,647 wins, seven losses and two ties, a winning percentage of .997.

New England came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos, 34-31, in overtime in a Sunday Night Football matchup on Nov. 24, 2013, marking the largest regular season comeback win in team history, after trailing 24-0 at halftime.

New England's previous best comeback win was from a 23-0 deficit to win, 38-23, vs. Seattle (09/16/84). The Patriots also came back from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, 23-22 (12/21/96). The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently vs. Buffalo (01/01/12).
