The Patriots jumped to a 2-0 preseason record after a 35-0 victory over the Philadelphia Eagles last Thursday Night at Lincoln Financial Field. The Patriots will close out the preseason this Sunday against their most frequent preseason opponent. This week's game against the Giants will be 30th preseason meeting against the Giants, The two teams have closed out the preseason every year since 2005. It will be the Patriots first preseason game on a Sunday since facing the Buccaneers in Tampa Bay on Sunday, August 17 in 2008.

The Patriots and Giants will conduct two days of joint practices on Wednesday and Thursday on the practice fields behind Gillette Stadium.

It is the second straight week that the Patriots will conduct joint practice sessions. The Patriots and Eagles held joint practice sessions for two days last week prior to their preseason matchup.

## BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be broadcast by the Patriots Preseason Television Network and can be seen in every New England state, as well as Alaska and Hawaii. The preseason network's flagship station is WBZ-TV CBS in Boston. Bob Socci provides the play-by-play and is joined by former Patriots quarterback Scott Zolak in the broadcast booth. WBZ's Steve Burton will provide sideline analysis.

LOCAL RADIO: 98.5 The Sports Hub is the flagship station for the Patriots Radio Network. A complete listing of the network's 35 stations can be found in this press release. The television broadcast will be simulcast the game on the radio during the preseason.

## SGRIES HISTORY

The New England Patriots and New York Giants will meet for the 30th time in the preseason and for the 16th straight year in the preseason finale (not including the 2020 season when preseason was canceled due to the Covid-19 pandemic).

The clubs have been frequent preseason opponents recently, squaring off in the preseason openers for three straight years from 2001-03 and resuming the series in 2005 when they started to meet in the preseason finale.

The Patriots have faced the Giants more than any other team in the preseason with 29 matchups. Philadelphia is second with 24 preseason games.

The teams played three times during the 2007 and 2011 seasons with meetings in the preseason, the regular season and in the Super Bowl. The Patriots and Giants faced each other twice in 2019 with a preseason and a regular season meeting in Foxborough. The Patriots lost the preseason finale, 31-29, and then won the regular season matchup, 35-14.

Overall, the Giants hold a 19-10 advantage in the preseason series, while the Patriots claim a 7-4 edge in regular season play.

## NEW ENGLAND TIES

In the decades leading up to the founding of the American Football League in 1960, many football fans in New England followed the Giants, a franchise founded in 1925. New England-based NFL outfits such as the Providence Steam Roller (1925-31), the Boston Redskins (1932-36) and the Boston Yanks (1944-48) folded or moved away, leaving the Giants as the closest NFL team to New England until the Patriots franchise inaugurated play in the 1960 season.

## MEMORABLE MATCHUPS

Aug. 15, 1971 - The Patriots defeated the Giants 20-14 in the opening preseason game at the old Foxboro Stadium.

Dec. 21, 1996 - The Patriots rallied from a 22-3 fourth-quarter deficit to clinch a first-round playoff bye with a 23-22 win at Giants Stadium.
Aug. 10, 2001 - New England began its first Super Bowl championship season with a 14-0 preseason shutout of the defending NFC champion Giants.

Dec. 29, 2007 - The Patriots defeated the Giants by a thrilling 38-35 score to cap off the first 16-0 regular season in NFL history.

February 3, 2008 - The Patriots faced the Giants in Super Bowl XLII in Glendale, Ariz. The Giants 17-14 win snapped the Patriots perfect season.
February 5, 2012 - The Patriots faced the Giants in Super Bowl XLVI in Indianapolis, Ind. The Giants took a 21-17 lead when they scored with 57 seconds left in the game and held the Patriots on a final drive to secure the win.

November 15, 2015 - K Stephen Gostkowski drilled a 54-yard field goal with one second to play to lift the Patriots to a 27-26 come-from-behind victory. The Giants took a 26-24 lead with 1:47 to play before QB Tom Brady drove the Patriots 44 yards and converted a fourth-and-10 on the series to set up the game-winning field goal.

Last season the Patriots had two 200-yard games with 217 yards in Week 1 vs. Miami and 250 yards in Week 3 vs. Las Vegas. The Patriots have rushed for at least 200 yards rushing 16 times under Bill Belichick.

## PATRIOTS USE SAME QUARTERBACK ROTATION AS THEY DID IN PRESEASON OPENER

QB Cam Newton started the game and played the first three drives before being relieved by 2021 first-round draft pick QB Mac Jones. Newton finished 8-of-9 for 103 yards with one touchdown. Jones played through until 27 seconds left in the third quarter and finished $13-$ of-19 for 146 yards. QB Brian Hoyer played the rest of the game and was 2-of-3 for 30 yards.

DL Chase Winovich returned to practice during the week and saw his first action of the 2021 preseason, in a reserve role. He had a 7 -yard sack of Philadelphia QB Joe Flacco in the second quarter. He added a 9-yard sack of QB Nick Mullens in the third quarter. Winovich has his first NFL two-sack game in the 2020 regular season finale against the New York Jets on Jan. 3, 2021.

## LB MATT JUDON FORCES A FUMBLE THAT LEADS TO PATRIOTS FIRST POINTS

## JAKOBI MEYERS SCORES A TOUCHDOWN ON A 28-YARD PASS FROM CAM NEWTON

WR Jakobi Meyers capped an 8-play, 66-yard drive with a 28 -yard touchdown reception from QB Cam Newton late in the second quarter. Meyers has not registered a regular season receiving touchdown in his two seasons with the Patriots. He did score two receiving touchdowns in his first preseason game as a rookie at Detroit on August 8, 2019. He also has thrown two touchdown passes and scored on a two-point play on a pass reception.

He scored two touchdowns in the preseason opener against Washington with a 1-yard run and a 91-yard run in the fourth quarter.

## LB HARVEY LANGI RECORDS A PICK AND A SACK

Under Kraft's leadership since he purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports.

Kraft has led the two most dominant decades in NFL history in terms of overall wins - 141 (2010-19) and 126 (2000-09).

Kraft is the most successful owner since he purchased the team in 1994 in terms of wins (331), division titles (19), winning percentage (.690), playoff wins (33) and playoff seasons (21).


Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. In his 27 seasons of ownership, he has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what many observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (. 238 pct.), the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on
 Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (19), conference crowns (10) and Super Bowl championships (6) than any other NFL team. Additionally, the Patriots have achieved the most winning seasons (23) and are tied with Pittsburgh for the fewest losing seasons (3) since Kraft assumed ownership beginning in 1994. Super Bowl LIII was the 10th Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has appeared in more than four Super Bowls. In Kraft's 27 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 21 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons, and finished with a winning record 23 times.

## A WINNING TRADITION I

Robert Kraft won his 300th game overall as owner of the New England Patriots against Miami on Sept. 30, 2018. Kraft reached the milestone in his 25th NFL season and in his 432nd game, the fastest an owner has reached the milestone. Al Davis of Oakland/Los Angeles accomplished the feat in 495 games (31 seasons) while Pat Bowlen of Denver reached 300 career wins in 501 games ( 30 seasons).

## KRAFT PASSES OTHER OWNERS

The Patriots have 331 wins overall under Robert Kraft. He has produced more victories than every other Patriots owner combined. Under Kraft, the Patriots are 331-149 overall since he purchased the team in 1994. Kraft's predecessors in the owner's office went 225-276-9 in the 34 years prior to his purchase of the team.

## CONTINUITY BREEDS SUCCESS

New England is the first team in NFL history to win six Super Bowls with the same owner (Robert Kraft), head coach (Bill Belichick) and quarterback (Tom Brady).

## PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 27 times in their 61-year history Twenty-one of those playoff berths have come in the 27 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. The Patriots have won 22 division crowns, including 17 in the last 20 seasons and 19 of which have come since Robert Kraft's purchase in 1994.

The New England Patriots enter 2021 tied with the Pittsburgh Steelers for the most Super Bowl wins in the NFL with six.

- The Patriots have played in 11 Super Bowls, the most by any team in NFL history.
- The Patriots are third in NFL history with 15 Conference Championship Game appearances, one behind the 16 by Pittsburgh and San Francisco.
- The New England Patriots enter the 2021 season with 37 postseason victories, the most in NFL history. Pittsburgh is second with 36 playoff wins all-time.
- The New England Patriots earned seven No. 1 seeds, behind Denver (8) and San Francisco (9) since playoff seeding began in 1975.
- The Patriots earned a first-round playoff bye an NFL-best 14 times since the current playoff format was instituted in 1990. Pittsburgh and San Francisco are second with nine byes since 1990. New England is the only team in NFL history with nine straight first-round byes (2010-18).
- The Patriots have played in 58 postseason games, fourth-most in NFL history behind Dallas (63), Pittsburgh (62) and Green Bay (60).
- The Patriots need to play in two more postseason games in 2021 to become the fourth NFL team to play in 60 postseason games.
- The Patriots are second with 13 seasons of 12 wins since 1970 , behind San Francisco's 14 seasons with 12 victories.


- New England has won 13 games in a single season seven times in franchise history. Only San Francisco has more 13-win seasons with 10.
- The New England Patriots have won 14 or more games in a season five times, most in NFL history. San Francisco is second with four 14-win seasons.
- New England has 27 undefeated months since 2000, most in the NFL over that span. Indianapolis is second with 17 undefeated months during that time.
- The Patriots enter the 2021 season with 34 winning seasons since 1970, second all-time behind Pittsburgh's 37.
- The Patriots enter the 2021 season with 556 total victories, the third-most wins since 1960, behind the 568 wins by Pittsburgh and the 561 wins by Dallas.
- New England will begin the 2021 season with 990 games played in franchise history (regular season and playoffs combined) and will play game No. 1,000 in Week 10.
- With rookie free agent RB J.J. Taylor making the 53-man roster in 2020, the Patriots have now had a rookie free agent make the opening day roster for the 17 straight seasons, the third-longest streak in the NFL. The L.A. Chargers have had a rookie free agent make their opening day roster for 24 straight seasons and Indianapolis has had a rookie free agent make their opening day roster for 22 straight seasons.
- The Patriots have finished in the top 10 for fewest points allowed in each of the last nine seasons (2012-2020) and need to accomplish the feat in 2021 to tie Tampa Bay, who became the last team to reach 10 straight seasons (1996-2005) for the fewest points allowed.

Punter Jake Bailey, cornerback Stephon Gilmore and special teams captain Matthew Slater were selected to represent the New England Patriots in the 2021 NFL Pro Bowl. Due to COVID-19, the 2021 NFL Pro Bowl was held as a week-long virtual event instead of a football game between conference all-stars.

Bailey and WR Gunner Olszewski were named to the Associated Press (AP) All-Pro First Team. They also earned All-NFL Team honors from Pro Football Weekly and were named to the All-AFC Team by the Pro Football Writers Association (PFWA). Slater earned AP All-Pro Second Team honors. Olszewski was selected as a punt returner. Additionally, offensive lineman Mike Onwenu earned a spot at guard on PFWA's All-Rookie Team.

Bailey earned his first career Pro Bowl invitation. He led the NFL with a net average of 45.6 yards per punt and finished fourth in the NFL with a 48.7 gross punt average. His net and gross punt averages both set new single-season franchise records. Bailey also led the AFC and finished second in the NFL with 31 punts downed inside the opponent 20-yard line. Bailey's punting in 2020 allowed the fewest punt return yards in team history with 71 return yards, second in the NFL behind the 46 yards allowed by New Orleans. Bailey also handled kickoff duties and is the primary holder on extra points and field-goal attempts. He is the second punter in franchise history to earn Pro Bowl honors, joining Rich Camarillo, who was voted to the Pro Bowl in 1983.

Bailey became the first punter in Patriots history to garner AP All-Pro First Team honors and second Patriots punter to earn All-Pro accolades. Rich Camarillo was named to the AP All-Pro Second Team in 1983.

Gilmore earned his fourth career Pro Bowl and his third consecutive with the Patriots. The nine-year veteran started all 11 games he played at cornerback in 2020 and totaled 37 tackles, one interception, three passes defensed and one forced fumble. In 2019, Gilmore earned the Associated Press NFL Defensive Player of the Year honors. He led the NFL with 20 passes defensed and tied for the league with six interceptions.

Olszewski was named to the AP All-Pro First Team for the first time in his career. Olszewski finished first in the NFL with a 17.3-yard punt return average ( 20 returns for 346 yards and one touchdown). It is also the highest return average in Patriots history and the second-highest in the NFL since 1970. Julian Edelman had the highest average in a season at 15.5 in 2012. Olszewski is the fourth Patriots player to lead the league in punt return average. Danny Amendola led the NFL with a 12.0-yard average in 2015, Troy Brown led in 2001 with a 14.2-yard average and Irving Fryar tied for the NFL lead with a 14.1-yard average in 1985.

Onwenu started all 16 games at four different positions - 10 at right tackle, three at right guard, two as tackle-eligible tight end and one at left guard. The sixth-round draft pick out of Michigan played over 90 percent of the offensive snaps on the season and showed his versatility once injuries to other players forced him to change positions throughout the season.

Slater was named to his ninth career Pro Bowl as a special teams player, extending his record for most special teams Pro Bowl honors in NFL history. Steve Tasker is second with seven. Slater is tied with John Hannah for the second-most Pro Bowl selections in franchise history, behind the 14 by Tom Brady. The former fifth-round draft pick out of UCLA earned a roster position with the Patriots as a rookie in 2008 with his contributions on special teams. Entering the 2011 season, teammates elected him as their special teams captain. That year, he was also selected to his first Pro Bowl. Since then, he has earned special teams captain honors to start each season and been voted to the Pro Bowl at season's end every year except 2018. Slater has led the Patriots in special teams tackles for seven of his 12 seasons and had seven special teams tackles in 2020.

Slater also earned AP All-Pro Second-Team honors as a special teamer for the second time in his career (2017). He also garnered First-Team accolades in 2016 and 2019, making 2020 his fourth career appearance as an All-Pro.

## COLLEGE TEAMMATES REUNITING

The Patriots drafted two players from Alabama (QB Mac Jones and DL Christian Barmore) with their first two picks and drafted two players from Oklahoma with their next two picks (LB Ronnie Perkins and RB Rhamondre Stevenson) in the 2021 NFL Draft. It is the first time in team history that the Patriots drafted two players from the same school followed by two players from the same school in a single draft. Since 1970, the only other team to have two picks from one school followed by their next two picks from one school was the 1992 Los Angeles Rams who drafted DE Sean Gilbert (Pittsburgh) in the first round followed by DB Steve Israel (Pittsburgh) in the second round and then used two third-round picks for DL Marc Boutte (LSU) and WR Todd Kinchen (LSU).

- The Patriots rushed for 217 yards in Week 1 vs. Miami in 2020 and for 250 yards in Week 3 vs. Las Vegas. The Patriots have also rushed for 200 yards twice in a single season under Belichick in 2004, '08, '10, '12, '14 and '18.
- The Patriots 6.59 yards per carry average vs. Las Vegas in Week 3 was their highest since 7.06 vs. Green Bay on Dec. 19, 2010. It marked the 11th time under Bill Belichick that the Patriots have averaged at least six yards per carry in a single game.

- The Patriots defense scored two touchdowns in 2020. S Devin McCourty returned an interception 43 yards for a score in Week 2 at Seattle and DL Deatrich Wise Jr. recovered a strip-sack fumble in the end zone for his first career TD in the Week 3 win vs. Las Vegas.
- The Patriots have scored 11 non-offensive touchdowns since the start of the 2019 season, most in the NFL during that span. In 2019, the Patriots had seven non-offensive touchdowns - two fumbles, two blocked punts, and three interceptions for touchdowns. The Patriots record for most non-offensive touchdowns in a single season is nine in 1961 and 2010.


## PICKING OFF THE COMPETHION

The 2020 Patriots defense tied for the NFL lead with Miami, New Orleans, and Pittsburgh with 18 interceptions. The 2019 Patriots defense led the NFL with 25 interceptions; the team record of 31 interceptions was set in 1964.

## LIMITNG OFFENSES

The 2020 New England Patriots finished 7th in the NFL for fewest points allowed with 22.1 points allowed per game. The Patriots have finished in top 10 in fewest points allowed in each of the last nine seasons, which is the longest current streak. The last team to do that in nine or more consecutive seasons is Tampa Bay (10 straight from 1996 to 2005).

## A SHUTDOWN SHUTOUT

The Patriots earned their 29th shutout in franchise history and 12th under Bill Belichick in the 45-0 victory over the L.A. Chargers (12/6/20). New England has scored three 30-plus point road shutout wins over the last two seasons: a 43-0 win at Miami (9/15/19), a 33-0 win at N.Y. Jets (10/21/19) and the 45-0 victory over the Chargers in Week 13.

## BAILEY REALYY BOOTAD IT IN 2020

Jake Bailey's punting in 2020 allowed a total of 71 punt return yards on 12 returns. The 12 punt returns allowed were second in NFL and team history, behind the 11 by New England in 2008.

## A SP=CIAL NIGHT FOR SCORING

The Patriots scored two touchdowns on special teams at the L.A. Chargers on Dec. 6, 2020. WR Gunner Olszewski scored on a 70yard punt return and DB Cody Davis blocked a field goal that was returned 44 yards for a touchdown by DB Devin McCourty. It marked the third game under Bill Belichick and fifth time since the 1970 AFLNFL merger that the Patriots have scored twice in a single game on special teams. Both special teams scores occurred in the second quarter, the second time in team history that has occurred. New England also scored multiple special teams touchdowns in a single quarter at Baltimore on Nov. 23, 1980 (4th Quarter).

## MULTIPLE ST SCORES IN A GAME UNDER BELICHICK

The Patriots also scored two special teams touchdowns at Chicago (10/21/18) with a 95-yard kickoff return by WR Cordarrelle Patterson and a 29-yard return of a blocked punt by LB Kyle Van Noy.

On Oct. 4, 2010, at Miami, WR Brandon Tate returned a kickoff 103 yards for a score and CB Kyle Arrington returned a blocked field goal 35 yards for a touchdown

## A RARE OCCURRENCE

In the Week 13 win over the L.A. Chargers (12/6/20), the Patriots became the sixth team in NFL history with both a punt returned for a touchdown and a blocked field goal returned for a touchdown in the same game. It was the first such occasion since Baltimore achieved the feat in Week 12 of the 2015 season.

Bill Belichick is the only head coach in NFL history to win six Super Bowl titles. He won more games overall (141) during a 10-year stretch (2010-19) than any other coach in NFL history. In 2007, Belichick led the Patriots to the fourth undefeated and untied regular season in NFL history and the first since the NFL established a 16-game schedule in 1978. His 47 consecutive years as an NFL coach are most in NFL history, passing the 45 by Dick LeBeau. The only other NFL coach with at least 40 consecutive NFL coaching seasons is Tom Moore with 41.

He will look to add to that total during the 2021 season.

- WR Jakobi Meyers threw two touchdown passes in 2020. He completed a 24-yard touchdown pass to RB Rex Burkhead vs. Baltimore (11/15) and a 19-yard touchdown pass to QB Cam Newton vs. N.Y. ## QB CAM NEWTON

## 2020 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Became the 48th QB in NFL history to reach 30,000 career passing yards vs. San Francisco (10/25) and is the only player in NFL history with 30,000 passing yards and 5,000 career rushing yards.
- Joined Michael Vick as the second QB in NFL history to reach 5,000 career rushing yards vs. Denver (10/18).
- Newton (12) scored double-digit rushing touchdowns for the third time in his career, becoming the only NFL quarterback to accomplish the feat in three separate seasons. He had an NFL record of 14 in 2011, 10 in 2015 and 12 in 2020, tying him with Steve Grogan (12 in 1976) for the most rushing TDs by a Patriots QB in a single season.
- Newton scored multiple rushing touchdowns in a game four times in 2020, the most in a single season by an NFL quarterback.
- Newton set a new franchise record for most rushing attempts (137) and yards (592) by a Patriots QB in a single season. Steve Grogan previously held the record with 81 rushing attempts for 539 yards in 1978.
- In the season-opener vs. Miami (9/13), Newton set a Patriots record for most rushing attempts in a single game by a QB with 15 attempts for 75 yards. The previous record was held by Steve Grogan, with 12 rushing attempts at Buffalo (11/20/77).
- Newton had a 49-yard rush vs. N.Y. Jets (1/3), the longest run in Patriots history by a quarterback. It was his eighth career run of over 40 yards and his longest since a 62-yard run vs. Minnesota (12/10/17).


## RECORD-SETTING QB

- In addition to owning the NFL record for career rushing touchdowns by a quarterback and sitting second for career rushing yards by a QB, Newton owns two additional QB records for most rushing first downs and most games with a passing and rushing touchdown.

- James White has 25 career touchdown receptions in the regular season, second all-time among Patriots running backs behind the 26 by Larry Garron.

- White has 369 career regular season receptions, second in New England history among running backs behind the 431 by Kevin Faulk.
- White is second among all Patriots running backs with 3,184 career receiving yards, behind Kevin Faulk $(3,701)$. He needs 518 receiving yards in 2021 to move past Faulk into first among all Patriots running backs.

- White is seventh in NFL history among running backs since 1970 with 25 touchdown receptions.


## SECOND-FASTEST TO 25

## LB DONT'A HIGHTOWER

## WINNER ON MULTIPLE LEVELS

- Dont'a Hightower (three Super Bowl championships and two national titles at Alabama) and Russell Maryland (two national championships at Miami and three Super Bowl Championships with Dallas) are the only two players in NFL history with at least two national championships and two Super Bowl wins.



## MR. FEBRUARY

- Hightower has made two Su-per-Bowl altering plays during his career and was part of a record-setting performance in another. Head coach Bill Belichick referred to Hightower as "Mr. February" at the team's Super Bowl LIII ring ceremony.
- In Super Bowl XLIX vs. Seattle, Hightower made a crucial tackle on Seahawks RB Marshawn Lynch at the 1-yard line the play before CB Malcolm Butler intercepted Seattle QB Russell Wilson to seal the victory in the waning moments.
- New England trailed the AtIanta Falcons, 28-12, midway through the fourth quarter when Hightower strip-sacked Falcons QB Matt Ryan at the Atlanta 25 -yard line. The fumble was recovered by the Patriots and the turnover led to a touchdown that helped spark the record comeback in Super Bowl LI.
- Led a defensive unit in the Super Bowl LIII win over the L.A. Rams $(2 / 3 / 19)$. Hightower recorded two sacks and a pass defensed as part of a stifling defense that became the second team in Super Bowl history to hold its opponent to just three points



## WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2021

J.C. Jackson led the Patriots with nine interceptions in 2020. Asante Samuel set the team record for most interceptions in consecutive seasons with 16 . Samuel picked off 10 passes in 2006 and six in 2007.

Jackson has 17 interceptions since 2018, second-most in the NFL over that span behind the 18 by Xavien Howard.

Jackson led the NFL with 11 takeaways in 2020. From 2019-20, Jackson had a total
 of 16 takeaways, tied with Ron Hall (196364) and Asante Samuel (2006-07) for the best two-year total in New England. The Patriots record for most takeaways in a three-year span is 22 by Ron Hall (1964-66-(20 interceptions in two fumble recoveries).

## ACTION JACKSON

- J.C. Jackson recorded three interceptions as an undrafted rookie in 2018, five interceptions in 2019, and finished second in the NFL in 2020 with nine interceptions. His 17 interceptions are second-most in the NFL since the start of the 2018 season. Jackson led the NFL in 2020 with 11 total takeaways (nine interceptions and two fumble recoveries).

## J.C. HAS TAKEAWAY RECORD UNDER BELICHICK

- DB Ron Hall set a Patriots franchise record in 1964 with 13 takeaways (11 interceptions \& two fumble recoveries) in a single season. J.C. Jackson recorded nine interceptions and recovered two fumbles for an NFL-leading 11 takeaways in 2020. He passed CB Asante Samuel (10 interceptions) for the record for most takeaways in a single season under Bill Belichick as Patriots head coach. ## WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2021



- Devin McCourty enters the 2021 season sixth all-time in New England history with 34 total takeaways. He needs six total takeaways in 2021 to join Raymond Clayborn (44), Fred Marion (42) and Ty Law (40) as the only players in team history with 40 total takeaways.
- McCourty enters 2021 tied with Ty Law for second-most Pro Bowl invitations as a Patriots defensive back with four. Only CB Mike Haynes (6) had more Pro Bowl nods as a Patriots defensive back.
- McCourty enters 2021 tied with Mike Haynes for sixth place on the Patriots all-time list with 28 interceptions. He needs two picks in 2021 to join Ty Law (36) and Raymond Clayborn (36) as the third Patriot to reach 30 interceptions.
- McCourty tied for fourth in the NFL with five interceptions in 2019, his third career season with five-plus interceptions. That mark tied Marcus Peters and Earl Thomas for most seasons with five-plus interception seasons since 2010. Additionally, McCourty's 28 regular season interceptions since he entered the league in 2010 are tied for the sixth-most in the NFL over that span.
- McCourty enters 2021 having played in 171 career regular season games. If he plays in all 16 games in 2021 he will have played in the 10th-most games in New England history.
- McCourty has 493 interception return yards in his regular season career and needs seven yards to become the third Patriot with 500 return yards

## 2020 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- McCourty entered the 2020 season in eighth place in franchise history with 26 interceptions and tied Maurice Hurst for seventh place with 27 after an interception return for a touchdown at Seattle on Sept. 20. He then tied Mike Haynes for sixth place with a pick vs. San Francisco (10/25).


## THE MOST IMPORTANT ABILITY IS AVAILABILITY

- McCourty has played the most defensive snaps since he entered the NFL in 2010 with 10,859 defensive snaps. Malcolm Jenkins (New Orleans and Philadelphia) is second with 10,817 defensive snaps.


## McCOUR-TD

- DB Devin McCourty has four career touchdowns following return of a blocked field goal for a touchdown at L.A. Chargers (12/6/20) and his 43yard interception return for a touchdown at Seattle (9/20/20). McCourty also had an 84-yard interception return for a touchdown at Buffalo in 2018 and a 104-yard kickoff return vs. N.Y. Jets in 2012.


## DOUBLE TROUBLE

- After being selected by the Patriots in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, Devin McCourty became part of a select group in league history. McCourty's identical twin brother, Jason, joined the Patriots in 2018 (now with Miami). The two became the 12th set of twins to play in the NFL. In the 2018 season opener, Devin and Jason became the first set of twins to play together on the same NFL team since 1926 when Gene and Tom Golsen suited up together for the Louisville Colonels.
- Devin became the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998-2000. His twin brother, Jason, played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 1999-2001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox.


## IN GOOD COMPANY

- Devin McCourty earned Associated Press All-Pro Second Team honors at safety in 2013 and 2016. He also earned Second Team All-Pro Honors as a rookie in 2010 when he played cornerback. McCourty joined Pro Football Hall of Famers Rod Woodson and Ronnie Lott as the only NFL players to earn All-Pro honors at both safety and cornerback.


## BROTHERS IN ARMS

- Devin and Jason McCourty have seen first-hand the effects of sickle cell disease. Both their aunt and uncle lived with the disease while their father carried the trait. Devin and Jason partnered with Embrace Kids Foundation to form their own "Tackle Sickle Cell" campaign aiming to educate the public, increase blood donations and raise money and awareness for the fight against sickle cell disease. Devin's work with the local Boston Children's Hospital has helped advance research of the disease with doctors now as close as they've ever been to a cure.

## BAILEY SETS TEAM RECORD

- Jake Bailey finished first in the NFL with 45.6 net yards per punt in 2020, a new single-season team record. The previous record was 41.5 by Zoltan Mesko in 2011. His gross punt average of 48.7 is also a team record, besting the 46.5 gross average by Mesko in 2011. His 45.6 net yards per punt is second all-time in NFL history in a single season to the 46.0 net average by Johnny Hekker in 2016 with the Rams.


## DIMINISHING [PUNT] RETURNS

- Bailey’s punting in 2020 allowed a total of just 71 punt return yards on 12 returns. It is the fewest punt return yards allowed by the Patriots in team history and the sixth-fewest punt return yards allowed in a season in NFL history. The 12 punt returns allowed are second in NFL history and team history to the 11 by New England in 2008.

## WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2021

- Justin Bethel has reached double-digit special teams tackles in each of his nine NFL seasons, and will try to reach 10 straight in 2021. Bethel led the team with 14 special teams tackles.

## WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2021

- Nick Folk finished the 2020 season with 26 consecutive field goals. After missing his first two field goals of the season, Folk did not miss. It marks the second-longest field goal streak in team history and the longest streak in Folk's career. His previous best was 23 straight field goals in 2013 when he played for the New York Jets.

## LOCAL LINEAGE

- Nick Folk's mother is a direct descendant of William Bradford, a founder, settler and longtime governor of the Plymouth Colony settlement. Bradford was also a passenger on the Mayflower's original voyage to America.


## FOLK'S HIGH CONVERSION RATE

- Nick Folk finished the 2020 season 26 -of- 28 on field goal attempts for a conversion rate of 92.9. Folk previously had two seasons when with a field-goal conversion rate of at least 90 percent. He was 20-of22 (90.9\%) in 2008 with Dallas and 33-of-36 (91.7\%) in 2013 with the New York Jets. The highest field-goal percentage in a season for the Patriots was 95.6 by Stephen Gostkowski in 2014, when he converted 35-of-37 field goals.


## FOLK HERO

- Folk kicked his second game-winning field goal as time expired, connecting on a 50-yard field goal against Arizona (11/29/20) to give the Patriots a 20-17 win. He had a 51-yard game-winning field goal as time expired at the New York Jets on Nov. 9, 2020 to give the Patriots a 30-27 victory. He is the first NFL kicker with two game-winning field goals as time expired in a single season. Overall, he has three-gamewinning field goals as time expired. He also kicked a 53-yard field game-winning field goal as time expired at Buffalo on Oct. 8, 2007, when he was a rookie with the Dallas Cowboys.


## FOLK DIGS THE LONG BALL

- Folk's 50-yard game-winning field goal vs. Arizona (11/29) was the second-longest game-winning field goal with no time left in Patriots history, behind the 51-yarder he hit at N.Y. Jets (11/9). The previous long was 48 yards by Adam Vinatieri in Super Bowl XXXVI vs. the St. Louis Rams


## WRR GUNNER OLSZEWSKI

## WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2021

- Gunner Olszewski will attempt to become the first New England player to lead the NFL in two straight years in punt return average and the first NFL player since Devin Hester led the NFL in 2010 and 2011.
- Olszewski will look to become the first NFL player to average 17.0-yards per punt return or more in back-toback seasons. Devin Hester owns the best mark with a 17.1-yard average in 2010 followed by 16.2-yard average in 2011.


## PUNT RETURN RECORD

- WR Gunner Olszewski finished first

in the NFL with a 17.3-yard punt return average ( 20 returns for 346 yards and one touchdown) in 2020. It is the highest return average in Patriots history and the second-highest in the NFL since 1970. Julian Edelman had the highest average in a season at 15.5 in 2012. Olszewski is the fourth Patriots player to lead the league in punt return average. Danny Amendola led the NFL with a 12.0-yard average in 2015, Troy Brown led in 2001 with a 14.2-yard average and Irving Fryar tied for the NFL lead with a 14.1-yard average in 1985

## OLSZEWSKI SCORES FIRST NFL TD ON A PUNT RETURN

- WR Gunner Olszewski scored his first NFL touchdown on a 70-yard punt return at the L.A. Chargers on Dec. 6, 2020. It was the first punt return for a touchdown for New England since WR Julian Edelman returned a punt 84 yards vs. Denver on Nov. 2, 2014. Olszewski's return came on the heels of an 82-yard punt return for a touchdown that was called back due to a penalty in the previous game.

## GUNNER GOES LONG TWICE

- Olszewski scored on a 70-yard punt return touchdown and had a 61yard return in the Patriots win at the L.A. Chargers on Dec. 6, 2020. He is the first player in Patriots history with two punt returns of at least 60 yards in a single game and the first NFL player to do so since Indianapolis RB Nyheim Hines had 84 and 71-yard punt return touchdowns vs. Carolina on Dec. 22, 2019. Before Olszewski, the two longest punt returns in a single game for the Patriots was Julian Edelman on Nov. 18, 2012, vs. Indianapolis with a 68-yard punt returned for a touchdown and a 49-yard return.

- Olszewski scored his first touchdown reception on a career-long 38yard pass in the win at the L.A. Chargers on Dec. 6, 2020. Olszewski joined Julian Edelman (vs. Denver in 2014 and vs. Indianapolis in 2012), Stanley Morgan (vs. Baltimore in 1979) and Irving Fryar (vs. Indianapolis in 1985) as the only Patriots with a punt returned touchdown and a touchdown reception in the same game.

## WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2021

- Matthew Slater has earned an NFL record nine special teams Pro Bowl invitations and will look to add to that in 2021.
- Slater will enter his 14 th season with the Patriots in 2021, tied with Stephen Gostkowski, Bruce Armstrong and Steve Nelson for the fourth-most in team history, behind the 15 by Troy Brown and Julius Adams, the 16 by Steve Grogan and the 20 by Tom Brady.
- Slater has played in 189 regular season games. If he plays in all 16 games in 2021 he will reach 205, the fourth-most in team history and will be one of five players to play in 200 regular season games for the Patriots.


## 2020 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Slater earned his ninth Pro Bowl invitation in 2020, extending his NFL record for most Pro Bowl selections as a special teamer. Slater is now tied with John Hannah $(1976,78-85)$ for second-most Pro Bowl selections as a Patriot with nine. Tom Brady holds the franchise record with 14.

- Slater is one of 10 sons of Hall of Fame members to be drafted in NFL history.

Slater has earned nine Pro Bowl invitations (2011-17, 19-20) as a special teams player. He passed Steve Tasker (1987, 90-95) for the most special teams Pro Bowl honors in NFL history last year. Slater is also the only special teams player to earn seven consecutive Pro Bowls, which he did from 2011-17.

## ALL-STAR COMBINATION

Slater was voted to the Pro Bowl for seven straight seasons from 2011-17 and two more from 2019-20. Those nine selections are two more than the seven that his father earned with the L.A. Rams. The Slater family's 16 combined Pro Bowls are the sec-ond-most among father-son contingents to have been voted to at least one Pro Bowl each.

## ELECTED TEAM LEADER

- Slater has been named to nine Pro Bowls (2011-17, 19-20) for his special teams work, but perhaps more revealing of his value to New England is the fact that he was elected a captain by his teammates for the 10th straight season in 2020.

The special teams ace shared what it means to be a captain with high school football players in a story published by The Boston Globe. "You have to be able to put others before yourself. Being a captain and leadership is about serving, and to me, that means a great deal of sacrifice - putting aside personal agendas for the greater common goal. Leadership is equated with sacrifice. I think you have to be willing to do whatever it takes for the unit to succeed. I think you need to lead by example. A lot of times, it's about what you do, not what you say."

## SLATER'S EMERGENCE WAS SPECIAL

- Bill Belichick acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eight-man rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there - fourth-and-short, where they're trying to protect the box - but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts.


## SLATER'S SCORE

- During a 2007 game against Arizona State, UCLA's Matthew Slater returned a kickoff 89 yards for the final touchdown of his collegiate career. In the Patriots 16-10 win over Buffalo on Sept. 29, 2019, DB J.C. Jackson blocked a punt, which Slater returned 11 yards for his first NFL touchdown, 12 seasons after his last touchdown.



## ALLTIME PLAYOFF RESULTS

The Patriots have compiled a 37-21 record in their 58 playoff games and their .638 playoff winning percentage is the best in NFL history among teams that have played at least 15 postseason games.

## PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 27 times in their 60-year history. Twenty-one of those playoff berths have come in the 27 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. The Patriots have won 22 division crowns - 19 since Robert Kraft's purchase in 1994 and 17 in the last 19 seasons.

## PLAYOFF BERTHS UNDAR KRAFT

New England has qualified for the playoffs 27 times in the team's 61 -year history. The Patriots have earned 21 of those playoff berths in the 27 seasons since Robert
Kraft purchased the team in 1994. New England has won 22 division crowns overall (21 AFC East crowns) and has qualified as a Wild Card team on four occasions (1976, '85, '94 and '98) The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 as part of a 16-team tournament following a players' strike.

## ANNUAL ACHIEVEMENT

The Patriots are also the only team to win more than half of their games in 19 straight seasons since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, more than the 49ers ( 16 straight from 1983-98) and the Cowboys (16 straight from 1970-85).

The Patriots have now won nine or more games in 23 of the 27 seasons Robert Kraft has owned the team.

## HISTORIC SCORING CLIP

The Patriots had a historic scoring output over a three-game span in October and November 2014. New England tied a team record by scoring 40 or more points in three consecutive games from Oct. 26 to Nov. 16. The Patriots also scored 40 or more in three straight games in 2007. The Patriots have scored 40 or more points 62 times in team history, including 35 times since Bill Belichick became head coach in 2000, and 19 times since 2010.

## SCORING FLURRY

The Patriots scored three touchdowns in a 57-second span during the final two minutes of the first half against Chicago on Oct. 26, 2014, turning a 17-7 lead into a 38-7 cushion. It was the fastest three-touchdown flurry in the NFL since the Patriots had three touchdowns in 52 seconds against the New York Jets on Nov. 22, 2012. The Patriots are one of three teams to score three touchdowns in under a minute since the 1970 merger, and are the only team to have achieved the feat twice.


## HOW THE PATRIOTS SCORED THREE TOUCHDOWNS IN 57 SECONDS:

- Rob Gronkowski caught a 2-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady with 1:57 left in the first half to make the score 24-7 and cap off a 10-play, 80-yard drive.
- After the Patriots defense forced a three-and-out, a 42-yard Julian Edelman punt return gave New England possession at the Chicago 9-yard line, and Brady found Brandon LaFell for a 9-yard touchdown on the next play to give the Patriots a 31-7 lead with 1:07 left in the first half.
- On the Bears first play following the LaFell touchdown, Zach Moore forced a Jay Cutler fumble that was recovered by Rob Ninkovich and returned for a 15-yard touchdown that gave the Patriots a 38-7 Patriots lead with 55 seconds left in the first half.


## COMEAACKS FOR THE ACES

The Patriots have staged two historic come-from-behind victories over the past several seasons:

Belichick coached the Patriots back from a 25-point deficit to win Super Bowl LI. A comeback of that magnitude is extremely rare. There had been 2,656 games in which a team led by 25 points or more in NFL history, including the postseason. Teams leading by 25 had recorded 2,647 wins, seven losses and two ties, a winning percentage of .997.

New England came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos, 34-31, in overtime in a Sunday Night Football matchup on Nov. 24, 2013, marking the largest regular season comeback win in team history, after trailing 24-0 at halftime.

New England's previous best comeback win was from a 23-0 deficit to win, 38-23, vs. Seattle (09/16/84). The Patriots also came back from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, 23-22 (12/21/96). The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently vs. Buffalo (01/01/12).
