NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (2-1) AT KANSAS CITY CHIEFS (3-0)

Sunday, OCT. 4, 2020 • Arrowhead Stadium • 4:25 p.m. ET

The New England Patriots will play the second of three straight AFC West opponents this week, when they travel to face the defending Super Bowl Champion Kansas City Chiefs at Arrowhead Stadium. Last week, the Patriots beat the Las Vegas Raiders at home and return to Gillette Stadium to play the Denver Broncos following this week's matchup against Kansas City.

For the second straight week, the Patriots opponent will be coming off a Monday Night Football game. The Raiders beat New Orleans at home in Week 2 and the Chiefs defeated the Baltimore Ravens on the road in Week 3.

BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be broadcast by CBS and can be seen locally on WBZ-TV Channel 4. Jim Nantz will handle play-by-play duties with Tony Romo as the color analyst. Tracy Wolfson will work from the sidelines. The game will be produced by Jim Rikhoff and directed by Mike Arnold.

NATIONAL RADIO: Sunday's game will be broadcast to a national audience on Sports USA. John Ahlers will call the game with Hank Bauer providing analysis.

LOCAL RADIO: 98.5 The Sports Hub is the flagship station for the Patriots Radio Network. A complete listing of the network's 38 stations can be found in this press release. Play-by-play broadcaster Bob Socci will call the action along with former Patriots guarterback Scott Zolak, who will provide color analysis. The games are produced by Marc Cappello.

THE DEFENSE IS OFFENSIVE

The Patriots have scored nine non-offensive touchdowns since the start of the 2019 season, the most in the NFL during that time. Last season, the Patriots had seven non-offensive touchdowns. They returned two fumbles, two blocked punts, and three interceptions for touchdowns. The Patriots record for most non-offensive touchdowns in a season is nine in 2010 and 1961.

DB Devin McCourty returned an interception 43 yards for a touchdown in Week 2 at Seattle and DL Deatrich Wise Jr. recovered a strip-sack fumble in the end zone in last week's win over Las Vegas at home.

PATRIOTS AT KANSAS CITY CHIEFS

SERIES HISTORY

The New England Patriots and Kansas City Chiefs will meet in the regular season for the fourth straight season. The three previous matchups in 2017, 18 and 19 were all played at Gillette Stadium. The Patriots will play at Kansas City in the regular season for the first time since 2014 when the Patriots lost, 41-14, in a Monday Night Football game on Sept. 29. The Patriots last visit to Arrowhead was in the 2018 AFC Championship Game, a game the Patriots won 37-31 in overtime. It was the second meeting of the two teams in 2018.

Kansas City holds a 19-14-3 edge over New England, including an 11-3-1 advantage in games played in Kansas City and a 5-1 record at Arrowhead Stadium. The Chiefs are 8-11-2 in games played at New England, including 2-4 at Gillette Stadium (2-5 including playoffs).

New England is 2-0 against Kansas City in the postseason after a 27-20 win on Jan. 16, 2016 in a 2015 AFC Divisional Playoff Game and then last year's 37-31 overtime win the AFC Championship Game on Jan. 20, 2019 at Kansas City.

The two teams played twice a year from 1960 until the 1970 AFL-NFL merger as two of the original American Football League teams.

IF THE PATRIOTS WIN...

- The Patriots will improve their NFL-best road record with their 131st road win since 1994.
- And a player eclipses 100 yards rushing, the team will improve to 53-1 since the 2000 regular season when a player rushes for at least 100 yards.
- And the team does not commit a turnover, New England will win its 70th game since 2008 without committing a turnover. The Patriots enter Week 3 with a 69-9 record in zero turnover games since 2008.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR...

- Through the first three games of the season, New England has not committed an offensive penalty. Since 2000 when Bill Belichick became head coach of the Patriots, the team has played consecutive games without committing an offensive penalty four times but had never achieved the feat in three straight games. The Patriots are the least penalized team in 2020 with just seven total penalties.
- Following DB Devin McCourty's pick-six in Week 2 at Seattle and DL Deatrich Wise Jr.'s fumble recovery in the end zone against Las Vegas last week, the Patriots have now scored a defensive touchdown in consecutive games under Bill Belichick eight times. New England scored defensive touchdowns in three consecutive games under Belichick once, in 2004.
- After a 250-yard rushing performance against the Raiders last week, the Patriots have a chance to record back-to-back 200-yard rushing games for the first time since 2012, when the team rushed for 247 and 251 yards in back-to-back weeks against the Bills (9/30) and Broncos (10/7). The combined total of 498 rushing yards in that two-game span is the best two-game aggregate rushing total for the team since its 519 total rushing yards in a twogame stretch in 1978.
- As a team, the Patriots have rushed for over 200 yards in two of the first three games this season. The last time New England began a season with 200-plus rushing yards in three-of-four games to start a season came in 1978, when the club rattled off three straight 200-yard rushing performances following the season opener. The Patriots have never eclipsed 200 yards rushing three times in a single season under Belichick.

- Cam Newton enters Week 4 with 29,755 career regular-season passing yards and needs 245 yards to become the 48th guarterback in NFL history to reach the 30,000-yard passing plateau.
- Newton needs 45 yards rushing to join Michael Vick as the only quarterbacks in NFL history with 5,000 career regular-season rushing yards.
- Newton, who has the most rushing first downs by guarterback in NFL history with 374, is tied for fifth in the NFL in 2020 with 15 rushing first downs.

BOUNCING BACK

Since 2003, the Patriots are 47-9 (.839) in regular-season games following a loss. They have dropped back-to-back regular-season games in 2006, 09, 11, 12, 15 (twice), 18 (twice) and 19.

HALFTIME LEADS ARE SAFE AT GILLETTE

The Patriots improved to 101-1 at Gillette Stadium when leading at halftime in the regular season, after leading 13-10 at halftime in a 36-20 win over the Raiders. The Patriots only loss was in the 2017 season opener vs. Kansas City when they squandered a 17-14 halftime lead in a 42-27 loss.

ANOTHER 200-YARD PERFORMANCE

The Patriots rushed for 250 yards for a 6.6-yard average. It marked the second time in 2020 that the Patriots rushed for over 200 yards, after gaining 217 yards in the season opener vs. Miami on Sept. 13. It also marked the 16th time under Bill Belichick that the team has rushed for 200 or more yards. The Patriots also had 200 yards two times under Belichick in 2004, 08, 10, 12, 14 and 18. 250 rushing yards were the most the Patriots have had in a game since rushing for 273 yards on Dec. 23, 2018, vs. Buffalo. The last time the Patriots had 200 rushing yards twice within the first three weeks was in 1983.

BETTER THAN AVERAGE

The Patriots 6.6 yards per carry average was the highest since 7.06 vs. Green Bay on Dec. 19, 2010. It was the 11th time under Bill Belichick that the Patriots have averaged at least six yards per carry in a game.

PENALTY-FREE FOOTBALL

The Patriots played their third straight game without any offensive penalties. New England entered the game as the least penalized team in the NFL with just five penalties and now have seven total penalties through three games this season. This stretch marks first time Patriots have not had an offensive penalty in three straight games. They achieved the feat in consecutive games four times since Bill Belichick became head coach: 2000, 2008, 2017 and 2018.

SWARMING DEFENSE

The Patriots defense forced three turnovers, including one that was recovered in the end zone for a touchdown. The Patriots now have seven total takeaways through three games. Last season, the Patriots finished second in the NFL with 36 total takeaways.

ANOTHER SCORE FOR THE DEFENSE

DL Deatrich Wise Jr. recovered a fumble in the end zone for a touchdown that was forced when he combined with LB Shilique Calhoun on a sack of Raiders QB Derek Carr in the end zone in the fourth quarter. At Seattle last week, DB Devin McCourty returned an interception 43 yards for a touchdown.

NON-OFFENSIVE TD SCORING LEADERS

The Patriots nine non-offensive touchdowns since the start of the 2019 season are the most in the NFL during that time. Last season, the Patriots had seven non-offensive touchdowns. They returned two fumbles, two blocked punts, and three interceptions for touchdowns. The Patriots record for most non-offensive touchdowns in a season is nine in 2010 and 1961.

MOST RUSH YARDS AND TDS UNDER BELICHICK

The Patriots have 534 yards rushing and seven rushing touchdowns through the first three games, the most rushing yards and rushing touchdowns through the first three games under Bill Belichick. The Patriots had 455 rushing yards through three games in 2007 and had five rushing touchdowns through three games in 2015 and 16.

INDIVIDUAL NOTES

ANOTHER BELICHICK MILESTONE

Bill Belichick reached his 275th regular-season victory as a head coach. He is third all-time in regular-season wins, behind Don Shula (328) and George Halas (318).

NEWTON PASSES CUNNINGHAM

Cam Newton moved past Randall Cunningham into sole possession of second place on the NFL's all-time lost for rushing yards by a quarterback with 4,955 yards. He trails only Michael Vick, who finished his career with 6,109 yards rushing. Newton reached the milestone on a 2-yard run the first quarter, after entering the game tied with Cunningham.

He also forced a fumble when he combined with Deatrich Wise Jr. on a sack in the end zone that was recovered by Wise in the end zone for a touchdown. The last time that a Patriots has forced two fumbles in a game was at Buffalo on Sept. 29, 2019 when LB Kyle Van Noy had two forced fumbles. It is the 11th time in team history that a player had forced at least two fumbles in a single game. Calhoun has now had back-to-back games with sacks. He had his first full NFL sack the previous week at Seattle.

WINOVICH THE ENFORCER

Chase Winovich forced his first NFL fumble on a 6-yard sack of QB Derek Carr that was recovered by DL Lawrence Guy at the Raiders 42-yard line in the second quarter.

ZUBER GETS A TOUCH IN FIRST NFL ACTION

Undrafted rookie WR Isaiah Zuber was elevated to the 53-man roster the day before the game. On his first NFL play he took a hand-off for a 13-yard run.



THUNEY STARTS AT CENTER

Joe Thuney made his first NFL start at center in place of the injured David Andrews. He entered the game with 66 straight starts at left guard. Thuney played at center in the final drive of a preseason game on Sept. 1, 2017, at the New York Giants. He entered his redshirt sophomore year of college as the projected starting center at North Carolina State, but ended up starting at right tackle in the first game, the second game at right guard and then at left tackle for the rest of that season.



Since purchasing the team in 1994, the Patriots, under Robert Krafts' leadership, have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. Kraft has led the two most dominant decades in NFL history in terms of overall wins – 141 (2010-19) and 126 (2000-09) Mr. Kraft is the most successful owner since he purchased the team in 1994 in terms of wins (326), division titles (19), winning percentage (.698), playoff wins (33), playoff seasons (21).



Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. In his 26 seasons of ownership, he has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.238 pct.), logging the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring



a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (19), conference crowns (10) and Super Bowl championships (6) than any other NFL team. Additionally, the Patriots have achieved the most winning seasons (23) and have the fewest losing seasons (2) since Kraft assumed ownership beginning in 1994. Super Bowl LIII was the 10th Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has appeared in more than four Super Bowls. In Kraft's 26 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 21 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons. Kraft earned his 23rd winning season in 26 years of owning the franchise in 2019.

A WINNING TRADITION

Robert Kraft won his 300th game overall as owner of the New England Patriots against Miami on Sept. 30, 2018. Kraft reached the milestone in his 25th NFL season and in his 432nd game, the fastest an owner has reached the milestone. Al Davis of Oakland accomplished the feat in 495 games (31 seasons) while Pat Bowlen of Denver reached 300 career wins in 501 games (30 seasons).

A WINNING TRADITION

Kraft's winning percentage with the Patriots (.698) since taking over the team in 1994 is the highest among all owners/ownership groups with at least 200 wins (regular and postseason) with one team. He is one of just four owners with at least 200 wins and a winning percentage over .600.

KRAFT PASSES OTHER OWNERS

The Patriots have 326 wins overall under Robert Kraft. He has produced more victories than every other Patriots owner combined. Under Kraft, the Patriots are 326-141 overall since he purchased the team in 1994. Kraft's predecessors in the owner's office went 225-276-9 in the 34 years prior to his purchase of the team.

CONTINUITY BREEDS SUCCESS

New England is the first team in NFL history to win six Super Bowls with the same owner (Robert Kraft), head coach (Bill Belichick) and guarterback (Tom Brady).

PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 27 times in their 60-year history. Twenty-one of those playoff berths have come in the 26 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. The Patriots have won 22 division crowns, including 17 in the last 19 seasons and 19 of which have come since Robert Kraft's purchase in 1994.

TEAM - WHAT TO LOOK FOR

- The Patriots are tied with Pittsburgh for the most Super Bowl wins with six and need one more Super Bowl win for most Super Bowl wins in NFL history.
- The Patriots have played in the most Super Bowls in NFL history with 11 and look to add to that number in 2020.
- The Patriots enter the 2020 season second with 15 Conference Championship Game appearances, one behind the 16 by Pittsburgh and San Francisco.
- The New England Patriots enter the 2020 season with 37 postseason victories, the most in NFL history, and will look to add to that number in 2020. Pittsburgh is second with 36 playoff wins all-time.
- The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs for 11 straight seasons (2009-19), the most in NFL history. Dallas and Indianapolis are tied for second with nine consecutive seasons with a playoff berth.

- The Patriots have played in 58 postseason games, tied with Green Bay (58) for third all-time and need to play in two more postseason games in 2020 to become the third NFL team to play in 60 postseason games, joining Dallas (63) and Pittsburgh (61).
- The Patriots have achieved 19 straight seasons (2001-19) with a record of .500 or better, second all-time behind the 21 seasons by Dallas (1965-85).

RUSH TO VICTORY

Since 2000, New England is 52-1 in the regular season when a Patriot eclipses 100 yards rushing. The only loss during the Bill Belichick era came at Miami on Dec. 20, 2004, when Corey Dillon rushed for 121 yards on 26 carries and the Patriots fell 29-28 to the Dolphins. Since then, New England is 39-0 with a 100-yard rusher. In 2018, RB Sony Michel had four 100-yard games and New England went 4-0 in those contests.



STACKING A DOMINANT DEFENSIVE SEASON

- The 2019 Patriots finished with the top-ranked defense in the NFL for the first time in team history. While the Patriots finished in the top-10 in defense 15 other times, they had never finished first in the NFL until 2019. The highest the Patriots had ranked prior to 2019 was when they finished with the third-ranked defense in 1979. The highest the Patriots ranked under Bill Belichick prior to 2019 was the 2007 team that finished fourth in total defense.
- The Patriots finished first in the NFL last year by allowing 14.1 points per game. The Patriots finished first in that category two other times in team history, allowing of 15.6 points per game in 2016 and 14.9 points per game in 2003.
- The Patriots allowed an NFL-low of 225 points in 2019, the fewest the team has ever allowed in a 16-game schedule. The previous low was 237 in 2006. Of the Patriots 225 points allowed last season, 35 points were scored on opponent turnovers returned for touchdowns (two interceptions and three fumbles returned for touchdowns). The fewest points by a Bill Belichick coached defense was the 1994 Cleveland Browns, who allowed just 204 points (12.8 points per game). The 225 points allowed by the Patriots are the fewest by an NFL defense in the last decade. The previous low was by the 2011 Pittsburgh Steelers with 227 points allowed.
- The 2019 Patriots finished first in the NFL with 25 interceptions and tied for sixth with 47 sacks.
- New England led the NFL in 2019 with a +21 turnover margin.

LEAGUE-LEADING DEFENSE



Bill Belichick is the only head coach in NFL history to win six Super Bowl titles. He won more regular-season games (123) and more games overall (136) during a 10-year stretch (2002-11) than any other coach in NFL history. In 2007, Belichick led the Patriots to the fourth undefeated and untied regular season in NFL history and the first since the NFL established a 16-game schedule in 1978. His 46 consecutive years as an NFL coach are first in NFL history, passing the 45 by Dick LeBeau. The only other NFL coach with at least 40 consecutive NFL coaching seasons is Tom Moore with 41.

FROM STANDOUT QB TO WR

Edelman began his college football career with a year at the College of San Mateo (Calif.) before transferring to Kent State, where as a senior, he completed 56 percent of his passes (153-of-275 for 1,820 yards) with 13 touchdowns. He was also the team's leading rusher, gaining 1,551 yards on 215 attempts (an average of 7.5 yards per carry) and scoring 13 touchdowns. His offensive numbers broke Kent State's single-season record for total offense set by Joshua Cribbs in 2003.

Said head coach Bill Belichick on the versatility of Edelman: "He played the quarterback position in college at Kent State and all the positions really that he's played in the NFL – covering kicks, returning kicks, slot receiver, outside receiver, slot defender – he didn't do any of those things in college. I think that really speaks to his versatility and how much he's grown as a player and how many things he's learned how to do that he really didn't have much experience with in college. I'd say that's pretty unusual, especially to be as competent in them as he is."

FATHERLY ADVICE

If there is one thing Julian Edelman has never lacked, it's athletic ability. A dual-threat quarterback at Kent State and former baseball standout in high school, Edelman once wowed Toronto Blue Jays players with his impressive footwork while fielding ground balls in an appearance at batting practice in 2011.

This natural ability may have been overlooked by NFL scouts, who let him fall to the Patriots in the seventh round of the 2009 NFL Draft. Edelman remains focused on the lessons his father, Frank Edelman, taught him at a young age. "I'm still constantly trying to learn," Edelman told the *Boston Herald*. "My dad always put it in my head, when you're green, you're growing, when you're ripe, you're lost. When you're done learning, you're done."

SUPER BOWL MVP

Edelman was named Super Bowl MVP after finishing with 10 receptions for 141 yards in Super Bowl LIII vs. the L.A. Rams. He became the seventh wide receiver to win Super Bowl MVP honors and the second Patriots wide receiver to win the award. Deion Branch was named MVP in Super Bowl XXXIX.



ELECTED TEAM LEADER

Slater was named to eight Pro Bowls (2011-17, 19) for his special teams work, but perhaps more revealing of his value to New England is the fact that he was elected a captain by his teammates for the 10th straight season in 2020.

The special teams ace shared what it means to be a captain with high school football players in a story published by The Boston Globe. "I think first and foremost, you have to be able to put others before yourself. Being a captain and leadership is about serving, and to me, that means a great deal of sacrifice - putting aside personal agendas for the greater common goal. Leadership is equated with sacrifice. I think you have to be willing to do whatever it takes for the unit to succeed. I think you need to lead by example. A lot of times, it's about what you do, not what you say."

SLATER EMERGENCE WAS SPECIAL

Bill Belichick acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eight-man rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there - fourth-and-short, where they're trying to protect the box — but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts."

SLATER SCORES FIRST CAREER TOUCHDOWN

During a 2007 loss to Arizona State, UCLA's Matthew Slater returned a kickoff 89 yards for the final touchdown of his collegiate career. In the Patriots 16-10 win over Buffalo on Sept. 29, 2019, DB J.C. Jackson blocked a punt, which Slater returned 11 yards for his first NFL touchdown, 12 seasons after his last touchdown.

OL JOE THUNEY

SUPER BOWL RECORD SETTER

Joe Thuney became the first player in NFL history to start in the Super Bowl in each of his first three seasons in the NFL.

SNAPS FOR THUNEY

No player has registered more offensive snaps than Thuney since he entered the league in 2016. Thuney has played 4,702 snaps, followed by Eagles center Jason Kelce (4,611) and Buccaneers left tackle Donovan Smith (4,537).

DOUBLE TROUBLE

After being selected by the Patriots in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, CB Devin McCourty became part of a select group in league history. McCourty's identical twin brother, Jason, joined the Patriots in 2018. The two became the 12th set of twins to play in the NFL. In the 2018 season opener, Devin and Jason became the first set of twins to play together on the same NFL team since 1926 when Gene and Tom Golsen suited up together for the Louisville Colonels.

Devin became the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998-2000. His twin brother, Jason, played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 1999-2001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox.

IN GOOD COMPANY

Devin McCourty earned Associated Press All-Pro Second Team honors at safety in 2013 and 2016. He also earned Second Team All-Pro Honors as a rookie in 2010 when he played cornerback. McCourty joined Pro Football Hall of Famers Rod Woodson and Ronnie Lott as the only NFL players to earn All-Pro honors at both safety and cornerback.

BROTHERS IN ARMS

Devin and Jason McCourty have seen first-hand the effects of sickle cell disease. Both their aunt and uncle lived with the disease while their father carried the trait. Devin and Jason partnered with Embrace Kids Foundation to form their own "Tackle Sickle Cell" campaign aiming to educate the public, increase blood donations and raise money and awareness for the fight against sickle cell disease. Devin's work with the local Boston Children's Hospital has helped advance research of the disease with doctors now as close as they've ever been to a cure.

New England has qualified for the playoffs 27 times in its 60-year

history. The Patriots have earned 21 of those playoff berths in the 26 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994. New England has won 22 division crowns overall (21 AFC East crowns) and has qualified as a Wild Card team on four occasions (1998, 1994, 1985 and 1976). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 as part of a 16-team tournament following a players' strike.



ANNUAL ACHIEVEMENT

The Patriots won more than half of their games for the 19th straight year in 2019. They are the first team to win more than half of their games in 19 straight seasons since free agency began in 1993.

The Patriots are also the first team to win more than half of their games in 19 straight seasons since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, more than the 49ers (16 straight from 1983-98) and the Cowboys (16 straight from 1970-85).

The Patriots have now won nine or more games in 23 of the 26 seasons Robert Kraft has owned the team.

SCORING FLURRY

The Patriots scored three touchdowns in a 57-second span during the final two minutes of the first half against Chicago on Oct. 26, 2014, turning a 17-7 lead into a 38-7 cushion. It was the fastest three-touchdown flurry in the NFL since the Patriots had three touchdowns in 52 seconds against the New York Jets on Nov. 22, 2012. The Patriots are one of three teams to score three touchdowns in under a minute since the 1970 merger, and are the only team to have achieved the feat twice.

HOW THE PATRIOTS SCORED THREE TOUCHDOWNS IN 57 SECONDS:

- Rob Gronkowski caught a 2-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady with 1:57 left in the first half to make the score 24-7 and cap off a 10-play, 80-yard drive.
- After the Patriots defense forced a three-and-out, a 42-yard Julian Edelman punt return gave New England possession at the Chicago 9-yard line, and Brady found Brandon LaFell for a 9-yard touchdown on the next play to give the Patriots a 31-7 lead with 1:07 left in the first half.
- On the Bears first play following the LaFell touchdown, Zach Moore forced a Jay Cutler fumble that was recovered by Rob Ninkovich and returned for a 15-yard touchdown that gave the Patriots a 38-7 Patriots lead with 55 seconds left in the first half.

COMEBACKS FOR THE AGES

The Patriots have staged two historic come-from-behind victories over the past several seasons:

Belichick coached the Patriots back from a 25-point deficit to win Super Bowl LI. A comeback of that magnitude is extremely rare. There had been 2,656 games in which a team led by 25 points or more in NFL history, including the postseason. Teams leading by 25 had recorded 2,647 wins, seven losses and two ties, a winning percentage of .997.

New England came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos, 34-31, in overtime in a Sunday Night Football matchup on Nov. 24, 2013, marking the largest regular-season comeback win in team history, after trailing 24-0 at halftime.

New England's previous best comeback win was from a 23-0 deficit to win, 38-23, vs. Seattle (09/16/84). The Patriots also came back from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, 23-22 (12/21/96). The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently vs. Buffalo (01/01/12).
