The New England Patriots are off to a 6-2 start for the sixth straight season following a 25-6 Monday Night Football win over Buffalo. The victory marked the Patriots fifth consecutive win.

New England will play in primetime for the second straight week and for the fourth time in five weeks when they host the Green Bay Packers at Gillette Stadium in a Sunday Night Football game. The Patriots are 1-1 in 2018 on Sunday night. After dropping a 26-10 decision at Detroit on Sept. 23, the Patriots rebounded with a 4340 victory over Kansas City at Gillette Stadium on Oct. 14.

The Patriots concluded the month of October with a 4-0 mark, their 25 undefeated month since 2000.

\section*{SERIES HISTORY}

The New England Patriots will host the Green Bay Packers at Gillette Stadium for the first time since a 31-17 win on Sunday Night Football on Dec 19, 2010. The game featured a 71-yard kickoff return by OL Dan Connolly to the 4 -yard line in the second quarter. According to Elias Sports Bureau, it remains the longest kickoff return by an offensive lineman in NFL history. The run by Connolly topped the 48-yard touchdown return by Atlanta's Mal Snider in 1969. The previous longest kickoff return for a Patriots offensive lineman was a 27-yard return by G Stephen Neal on Nov. 30, 2008, vs. Pittsburgh.

New England and Green Bay last met in the 2014 regular season when the Patriots traveled to Lambeau Field on Nov. 30. The Packers beat the Patriots, 26-21, the team's last lost of that season en route to the Super Bowl XLIX title.

The regular-season series between the two teams is tied at five wins apiece. Green Bay beat New England in the one postseason meeting between the two teams, a 35-21 Packers victory in Super Bowl XXXI at the Louisiana Superdome in New Orleans on Jan. 26, 1997.

The Patriots first regular-season home victory under Robert Kraft was on Oct. 2, 1994 in a 17-16 win against the Packers.

The Green Bay Packers ended the New England Patriots sev-en-game winning streak, and snapped a streak of 14 straight wins over the NFC North, by fending off the Patriots in a 26-21 victory at Lambeau Field.

After jumping out to a 13-0 lead and a 23-14 halftime advantage, the Green Bay defense came up big to stop a potential game-winning drive with under three minutes to play. Down 26-21, QB Tom Brady drove the Patriots to the Packers 20-yard line where he just missed on a touchdown pass to TE Rob Gronkowski. On the next play, the Patriots faced a third-and 9, but Brady was sacked to force a fourth down. K Stephen Gostkowski ended a streak of 32 straight fourth-quarter field goals when his 47-yard attempt sailed wide right. Green Bay took over with 2:40 left to play and ran off the remaining time to secure the victory.

Green Bay QB Aaron Rodgers finished 24-of-38 for 368 yards and two touchdowns and helped the Packers convert 10-of-17 third downs (59 percent). Green Bay's lead could have been even wider if not for the Patriots holding the Packers to zero touchdowns on four trips to the red zone.

New England punched back after falling behind \(13-0\) in the first quarter when RB Brandon Bolden scored on a 6-yard touchdown run to culminate a five-play, 73-yard drive. Green Bay answered with a field goal for a 16-7 lead midway through the second quarter.

The Patriots engineered a 12-play, 80-yard drive that was highlighted by a 26 -yard pass from Brady to RB Shane Vereen to reach the Green Bay 20-yard line. The Patriots drove to the 2 -yard line, where Brady connected with WR Brandon LaFell for a touchdown pass to narrow the Packers lead to 16-14 with 1:09 left to play in the first half.

Green Bay's quick-strike offense hit on all cylinders on the ensuing drive when Rodgers connected with WR Jordy Nelson on a 45-yard touchdown pass for a 23-14 halftime lead.

After a scoreless third quarter, Brady opened the fourth quarter by connecting on his second touchdown pass to LaFell, a 15-yarder to finish a nine-play, 78-yard drive to make the score 23-21. Green Bay answered again with a field goal drive to make it 26-21 midway through the final quarter.

The Patriots final offensive drive that put them in position for a potential game-tying score was kept alive when Brady completed a 5-yard pass to WR Julian Edelman to convert a fourth-and 3 from the New England 49-yard line.

The New England Patriots improved to 6-2 after earning their seventh straight win over the Buffalo Bills in a 25-6 victory at New Era Field on Monday Night Football.

The New England defense smothered the Buffalo offense, limiting their offensive output to just two field goals. Buffalo did not drive closer than the New England 30-yard line. Tom Brady threw for over 300 yards, WR Julian Edelman had 104 yards receiving, RB James White had 10 receptions and DB Devin McCourty sealed the win with an 84-yard interception return for a touchdown with just over six minutes to play.

Brady finished 29-of-45 for 324 yards but was held without a touchdown pass for the first time all season. Edelman caught nine passes for 104 yards and White caught 10 passes for 79 yards. In addition to McCourty, LB Kyle Van Noy had a productive night with a two-sack performance. He forced a fumble on a 6 -yard sack in the third quarter that was recovered by S Patrick Chung at the Buffalo 29-yard line. That helped set up a 25-yard field goal by K Stephen Gostkowski that gave New England a 12-6 lead.

Gostkowski connected on his first three field-goal attempts to give New England a 9-0 lead. After stalling on their first drive of the game, the Patriots next four drives of the first half reached Bills territory. Gostkowski finished four-of five on field goal attempts, only missing on a 50-yarder right before halftime.

Buffalo's K Stephen Hauschka was good on a 47-yard field goal in the second quarter and a 51-yarder in the third quarter for Buffalo's only scoring of the day.

The Patriots only touchdown of the night came in the fourth quarter when White scored on a 1-yard run to finish a 10-play, 85-yard drive.

The play before McCourty's pick, Buffalo TE Jason Croon's one-handed diving touchdown catch was negated by a video review. The touchdown would have made it a one score game.

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. Now in his 25th season of ownership, Kraft has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (. 238 pct.) and logging the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to
 New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (17), conference crowns (9) and Super Bowl championships (5) than any other NFL team. Additionally, the Patriots have achieved the most winning seasons (21) and have the fewest losing seasons (2) since Kraft assumed ownership beginning in 1994. Super Bowl LII was the ninth Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has appeared in more than four Super Bowls. In Kraft's 24 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 19 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons. In 2017, Kraft earned his 21st winning season in 24 years of owning the franchise.

- Since purchasing the team in 1994, Robert Kraft has 30 career postseason wins as an owner, third-most in NFL history behind the Rooney Family in Pittsburgh (36) and the Green Bay Packers (34). The Rooney Family founded the Steelers in 1933 while the Green Bay Packers were founded in 1919.

Under Robert Kraft's guidance, the 2000-09 Patriots set the NFL record for most wins in a decade in NFL history with 126 overall wins overall. With 11 wins overall in 2018, the Patriots will tie that record for the current decade.

\section*{KRAFT PASSES OTHER OWNERS}

The Patriots have 304 wins overall under Robert Kraft. He has produced more victories than every other Patriots owner combined. Under Kraft, the Patriots are 304-132 overall since he purchased the team in 1994. Kraft's predecessors in the owner's office went 225-276-9 in the 34 years prior to his purchase of the team.

\section*{CONTINUITY BREEDS SUCCESS}

New England is the first team in NFL history to win five Super Bowls with the same owner (Robert Kraft), head coach (Bill Belichick) and quarterback (Tom Brady).

\section*{PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS}

Tom Brady has quarterbacked the Patriots to victories in 202 of his 259 career regu-lar-season starts, compiling a .780 winning percentage and giving him the best record of any quarterback in the Super Bowl era (since 1966). Brady's 155 career wins in his first 200 starts are the most in NFL history. Peyton Manning is second with 136 wins in his first 200 career starts.

- If Brady reaches 30 or more touchdowns passes in 2018 , he will become just the fourth player in NFL history with 30 or more touchdown passes in eight seasons, joining Brett Favre (9), Peyton Manning (9) and Drew Brees (9).

\section*{FROM STANDOUT QB TO WR}

Edelman began his college football career with a year at the College of San Mateo (Calif.) before transferring to Kent State, where as a senior, he completed 56 percent of his passes (153-of-275 for 1,820 yards) with 13 touchdowns. He was also the leading rusher, gaining 1,551 yards on 215 attempts (an average of 7.5 yards per carry) and scoring 13 touchdowns. His offensive numbers broke Kent State's single-season record for total offense set by Joshua Cribbs in 2003.
Said head coach Bill Belichick on the versatility of Edelman: "He played the quarterback position in college at Kent State and all the positions really that he's played in the NFL - covering kicks, returning kicks, slot receiver, outside receiver, slot defender - he didn't do any of those things in college. I think that really speaks to his versatility and how much he's grown as a player and how many things he's learned how to do that he really didn't have much experience with in college. I'd say that's pretty unusual, especially to be as competent in them as he is."

\section*{FATHERLY ADVICE}

If there is one thing Julian Edelman has never lacked, it's athletic ability. A dual-threat quarterback at Kent State and former baseball standout in high school, Edelman once wowed Toronto Blue Jays players with his impressive footwork while fielding ground balls in an appearance at batting practice in 2011
This natural ability may have been overlooked by NFL scouts, who let him fall to the Patriots in the seventh round of the 2009 NFL Draft. Edelman remains focused on the lessons his father, Frank Edelman, taught him at a young age. "I'm still constantly trying to learn," Edelman told The Boston Herald. "My dad always put it in my head, when you're green, you're growing, when you're ripe, you're lost. When you're done learning, you're done."

Despite a successful three-year lacrosse career at Penn State, Hogan, also a standout football player in high school, said that playing college football was always in the back of his mind. Chris did not get invited to compete in the Combine that year but turned heads during a Pro Day at Fordham University. Later that summer, he signed with the San Francisco 49ers as an undrafted free agent.

## SCHOOL'S NOT OUT

Although he already owns a bachelor's degree in communications and a master's degree in recreation, sport and tourism from his time at the University of Illinois, Ted Karras hasn't completely given up his notebook for an NFL playbook. Along with teammate Joe Thuney, Karras is pursuing his MBA from Indiana University thanks to an NFLPA program that provides tuition assistance for players while navigating a busy NFL schedule.
"It just seems to be that everyone keeps wanting to pay for my school, so I'm not going to turn it down," Karras told the Boston Globe.

Karras and Thuney began their MBA pursuit two weeks after the Patriots Super Bowl LI victory by taking online classes and Skyping with professors from Indiana University's Kelley School of Business up until training camp. They continued their classes in the 2018 offseason.

## ELECTED TEAM LEADER

Patriots wide receiver Matthew Slater has been named to seven straight Pro Bowls (2011-17) for his special teams work, but perhaps more revealing of his value to New England is the fact that he was elected a captain by his teammates for the eighth straight season in 2018.

The special teams ace shared what it means to be a captain with high school football players in a story published by The Boston Globe. "I think first and foremost, you have to be able to put others before yourself. Being a captain and leadership is about serving, and to me, that means a great deal of sacrifice - putting aside personal agendas for the greater common goal. Leadership is equated with sacrifice. I think you have to be willing to do whatever it takes for the unit to succeed. I think you need to lead by example. A lot of times, it's about what you do, not what you say."

## SLATER'S EMERGENCE WAS SPECIAL

Bill Belichick acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eightman rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there - fourth-and short, where they're trying to protect the box - but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts."

An Ohio native, Joe Thuney was told he may not have the size to play offensive line in the Big Ten conference for his hometown Ohio State Buckeyes. Settling on North Carolina State, Thuney went on to become a mainstay on the offensive line while also earning his bachelor's degree in accounting in just three years, added an international studies degree and minoring in Spanish.

## DB DEUIN MCCOURTY

## WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2018

Devin McCourty enters 2018 tied with Ty Law for second-most Pro Bowls as a Patriots defensive back with four. Only CB Mike Haynes had more Pro Bowl invites as a Patriots DB with six.

## DOUBLE TROUBLE

After being selected by the Patriots in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, CB Devin McCourty became part of a select group in league history. McCourty's identical twin brother, Jason, joined the Patriots this past offseason for his 10th NFL season. The two became the 12th set of twins to play in the NFL. In the season opener, Devin and Jason became the first set of twins to play together on the same NFL team since 1926 when Gene and Tom Golsen suited up together for the Louisville Colonels. Shaquill and Shaquem Griffin of the Seattle Seahawks also accomplished this unique occurrence on Kickoff Weekend. New England also had twins on the team last year, with TE Jacob Hollister on the roster and WR Cody Hollister on the practice squad. Jacob is on the roster again this year and Cody is on the non-football/injury list.

Devin and Jason were cornerbacks in the Rutgers secondary from 2005-08. Devin redshirted for the 2005 season and was a year behind his brother in eligibility. Devin became the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998-2000. His twin brother, Jason, played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 1999-2001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox.

## McCOURTY GOES LONG

McCourty had a 104-yard kickoff return for a touchdown vs. N.Y Jets (10/21/12), the second longest kickoff return in team history. Ellis Hobbs has the longest in team history with a 108-yard return for a touchdown at N.Y. Jets on Sept. 9, 2007. McCourty was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week for his performance.

## IN GOOD COMPANY

McCourty earned Associated Press All-Pro Second Team honors at safety in 2013 and 2016. He also earned Second Team All-Pro Honors as a rookie in 2010 when he played cornerback. McCourty joins Pro Football Hall of Famers Rod Woodson and Ronnie Lott as the only NFL players to earn All-Pro honors at both safety and cornerback.


## BROTHERS IN ARMS

Devin, along with twin brother Jason McCourty, has seen first-hand the effects of sickle cell disease. Both their aunt and uncle lived with the disease while their father carried the trait. Devin and Jason partnered with Embrace Kids Foundation to form their own "Tackle Sickle Cell" campaign aiming to educate the public, increase blood donations and raise money and awareness for the fight against sickle cell disease. Devin's work with the local Boston Children's Hospital has helped advance research of the disease with doctors now as close as they've ever been to a cure.

## K STEPHEN GOSTKOWSKI

## WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2018

- If Stephen Gostkowski leads the NFL in scoring in 2018, he will set the NFL mark for most seasons leading the NFL in scoring with six, moving past Don Hutson (5) and Gino Cappelletti (5). Gostkowski has led the NFL in scoring in 2008, 2012-14 and 2015
- In 2015, Gostkowski became the first NFL player with four seasons of 150 or more points. He added his fifth season of 150 or more points in 2017 and can add to that number in 2018.

- Gostkowski (5) needs one more 30 -field goal season in 2018 to move out of a tie with David Akers (5), John Carney (5) and Justin Tucker (5) for the most in NFL history with six seasons of 30 or more field goals.
- Gostkowski has led the NFL in field goals three times (2008, 2013 and 2014), and if he leads the NFL in field goals in 2018, he will join Lou Groza (5), Jack Manders (4), Ward Cuff (4) and Mark Moseley (4) as the only NFL players to lead the NFL in field goals in at least four seasons.
- Gostkowski made 92.5 percent (37-of-40) of his field goals in 2017. He tied Adam Vinatieri (2002, 2004, 2010, 2014 and 2015) for the most seasons at 90 percent on field goals with five and needs one more season of 90 percent to set the NFL mark.
- Gostkowski $(1,690)$ is in 16th on the NFL's all-time list for points.
- Gostkowski (180) is second all-time in postseason points, behind Adam Vinatieri (234) and will look to add to those numbers in 2018.
- Gostkowski is third on the NFL's all-time postseason list with 34 field goals behind Adam Vinatieri (56) and David Akers (39).

## KICKING A CAREER HIGH

Gostkowski made five field goals vs. Cincinnati (10/5/14), setting a new single-game career high. Gostkowski's five field goals tied the second highest single-game total in Patriots history, trailing only Gino Cappelletti's six successful field goals on Oct. 4, 1964. He matched that total with five field goals in the win vs. Kansas City (10/14/18).

## TWO FROM 50-PLUS

Gostkowski drilled a team-record 62-yard field goal and a 51-yarder in Mexico City against Oakland on Nov. 19, 2017. It was the third time that he made two field goals of 50-plus yards in a single game. He drilled a 51-yard field goal and a 53 -yarder vs. Arizona (9/16/12) and connected on two 53-yard field goals at Houston (12/1/13). ## SCORING FLURRY

The Patriots scored three touchdowns in a 57-second span during the final two minutes of the first half against Chicago on Oct. 26, 2014, to turn a 17-7 lead into a 38-7 cushion. It was the fastest three-touchdown flurry in the NFL since the Patriots had three touchdowns in 52 seconds against the New York Jets on Nov. 22, 2012. The Patriots are one of three teams to score three touchdowns in under a minute since the 1970 merger, and are the only team to have achieved the feat twice.

## HOW THE PATRIOTS SCORED THREE TOUCHDOWNS

 IN 57 SECONDS:- Rob Gronkowski got the scoring started by hauling in a 2-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady with 1:57 left in the first half to make the score 24-7 and cap off a 10-play, 80-yard drive.
- After the Patriots defense forced a quick three-and-out, a 42-yard Julian Edelman punt return gave New England possession at the Chicago 9-yard line, and Brady found Brandon LaFell for a 9-yard touchdown on the next play to give the Patriots a 31-7 lead with 1:07 left in the first half.
- On the Bears first play following the LaFell touchdown, Zach Moore forced a Jay Cutler fumble that was recovered by Rob Ninkovich and returned for a 15-yard touchdown that gave the Patriots a 38-7 Patriots lead with 55 seconds left in the first half.


## A COMEBACK FOR THE ACES

The Patriots came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos, 34-31, in overtime in a Sunday Night Football matchup on Nov. 24, 2013, marking the largest regular-season comeback win in team history, after trailing 24-0 at halftime.
New England's previous best comeback win was from a 23-0 deficit to win, $38-23$, vs. Seattle (9/16/84). The Patriots also came back from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, 23-22 (12/21/96). The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently vs. Buffalo (1/1/12).

## ALLTIME PLAYOFF RESULS

The Patriots have compiled a 34-20 record in their 54 playoff games and their 630 playoff winning percentage is second-best in NFL history among teams that have played at least 15 playoff games.

## PLAYOFF BERTHS UNDER KRAFT

New England has qualified for the playoffs 25 times in its 58 -year history. The Patriots have earned 19 of those playoff berths in the 24 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994. New England has won 20 division crowns overall (19 AFC East crowns) and has qualified as a Wild Card team on four occasions (1998, 1994, 1985 and 1976). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 as part of a 16-team tournament following a players' strike.

## ANNUAL ACHIEVEMENT

The Patriots won more than half of their games for the 17th straight year in 2017. They are the first team to win more than half of their games in 17 straight seasons since free agency began in 1993.
The Patriots are also the first team to win more than half of their games in 17 straight seasons since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, moving past the 49ers (16 straight from 1983-98) and the Cowboys (16 straight from 1970-85).

The Patriots have now won nine or more games in 21 of the 24 seasons Robert Kraft has owned the team.
