GAME SUMMARY

NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (6-7) AT MIAMI DOLPHINS (8-5)

Sunday, December 20, 2020 • Hard Rock Stadium • 1:00 p.m. ET

The New England Patriots will travel to South Florida for their final regular season road game to face the Miami Dolphins for their second meeting of the season. The Patriots beat Miami in the season opener, 21-11, at Gillette Stadium.

Following the Miami game, the Patriots will return to Foxborough to close out the regular season with home games against the Buffalo Bills and New York Jets. It will be the sixth time the Patriots close out a regular season with at least three straight contests against division foes: 1971 (four straight), 1975 (five straight), 1981 (three straight), 1987 (three straight) and 2014 (three straight).

BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION:: This week's game will be broadcast by **CBS** and can be seen locally on **WBZ Channel 4. Ian Eagle** will handle play-by-play duties with **Charles Davis** as the color analyst. **Evan Washburn** will work from the sidelines. The game will be produced by **Mark Wolff** and directed by **Bob Fishman**.

NATIONAL RADIO: Thursday's game will be broadcast to a national audience on **Sports USA**. **Josh Appel** will call the with game with **Doug Plank** providing analysis.

LOCAL RADIO: 98.5 The Sports Hub is the flagship station for the Patriots Radio Network. A complete listing of the network's 35 stations can be found on page 57 this press release. Play-by-play broadcaster **Bob Socci** will call the action along with former Patriots quarterback **Scott Zolak**, who will provide color analysis. The games are produced by **Marc Cappello**.

GUNNER POSTING STRONG RETURNS

Gunner Olszewski is leading the NFL with a 20.6-yard punt return average (14 returns for 289 yards). If he continues that pace, it would be the highest return average in New England history. Julian Edelman has the highest average in a season at 15.5 in 2012. Only seven NFL players have a return average of at least 20.0 yards in a single season.

SERIES HISTORY

The New England Patriots and Miami Dolphins will square off for the second of the two scheduled meetings in 2020. The Patriots hosted Miami in the 2020 season-opener and came out on top of a 21-11 decision on Sept. 13. The two teams have split the series in each of the last three seasons. The Patriots will be looking for their 11th series sweep of Miami in team history, their first since the 2016 season and their 7th under head coach Bill Belichick.

The Patriots have had the upper hand at home against Miami, holding a 36-18 record in games played in New England in the regular season, including a 16-3 record at Gillette Stadium. But the Patriots are 16-37 all-time in the regular season at Miami.

The Dolphins and Patriots met for the first time in 1966 and began playing twice a year during the 1967 regular season, except in 1982 during a players' strike.

The two have played three times in the postseason with New England holding a 2-1 advantage.

IF THE PATRIOTS WIN...

- · New England will improve on their NFL-best 93-26 record against division opponents since 2001.
- · And a player eclipses 100 yards rushing, the team will improve to 54-3 since the 2000 regular season when a player rushes for at least 100 yards.
- And the team does not commit a turnover, New England will win its 73rd game since 2008 without committing a turnover. The Patriots enter Week 15 with a 72-10 record in zero turnover games since 2008.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR...

- The New England rushing attack enters this week fifth in the NFL, averaging 147.5 rushing yards per game (1,918 total rushing yards), on pace for 2,361 rushing yards for the season. That would rank fourth in team annals behind the 3,165 rushing yards in 1978, 2,948 in 1976 and 2,605 in 1983.
- The Patriots are averaging 4.49 yards per rushing attempt (427 rushes for 1,918 yards). If the team holds that pace, it would mark the fifth-highest average in team history.
- Damien Harris (3) and Sony Michel (1) have combined for four 100-yard rushing performances so far in 2020, the most since 2007 (5).

WHAT TO LOOK FOR...

- Jake Bailey is first in the NFL with 46.1 net yards per punt. If that holds, Bailey would set a new Patriots single-season record. Zoltan Mesko currently holds the record after averaging 41.5 net yards per punt in 2011 (minimum 40 punts).
- Bailey's gross punting average is 48.8 yards per punt, fourth in the NFL in 2020. If it holds it would be the highest in team history. Zoltan Mesko set the team record by averaging 46.5 yards per punt in 2011.
- Bailey's punting in 2020 has allowed just 46 return yards so far in 2020, the fewest yards allowed by any team. The
 Patriots record for fewest punt return yards allowed in a season is 75 in 2007.



K NICK FOLK

WHAT TO LOOK FOR...

- Entering this week's game, Patriots K Nick Folk has successfully converted 21 consecutive field goal attempts, now the second-longest streak of his career, behind the 23 consecutive field goals made in 2013 when Folk played for the New York Jets. Overall, Folk now has seven streaks of 10 or more consecutive field goal conversions in his career. After missing his first two field goal attempts of the 2020 season, Folk has not missed since, successfully connecting on 21 straight attempts.
- Folk enters this week 21-of-23 on field goal attempts in 2020, good for a 91.3 percent conversion rate. Stephen Gostkowski holds the single season club record when he converted 35-of-37 field goals in 2014, good for a 94.6 conversion rate.



WHAT TO LOOK FOR...

- Cam Newton has scored 11 rushing touchdowns in 2020, tied for third in the NFL overall. With one more rushing touchdown, he will tie former Patriots QB Steve Grogan for the Patriots team record for most rushing TDs in a season by a QB. He set the NFL record for rushing touchdowns by a QB in a single season with 14 in 2011.
- · Newton is the only QB in NFL history with three double-digit rushing touchdown seasons.
- · Newton has four multi-rush TD games so far this season, most by a QB in a single season in NFL history.
- Steve Grogan set a Patriots QB record in 1978 with 81 rushing attempts for 539 yards. Newton currently has 113
 carries for 451 yards and is on pace for 139 rushing attempts for 555 yards.

The NFL record for highest punt return average in a single season belongs to Herb Rich of the 1950 Baltimore Colts, who returned 12 punts for 276 yards, good for a 23.0 yard average (minimum 12 returns).

A RARE OCCURRENCE

The Patriots played against the L.A. Chargers on Sunday, Dec 6, at SoFi Stadium and played the Rams on Dec. 10 at SoFi Stadium on Thursday Night Football. The Patriots are the first team to play consecutive road games in the same stadium in the span of five days since the 1932 Portsmouth Spartans played the Staten Island Stapletons at Thompson Stadium on Oct 16 and Oct. 20. It is the first time that the Patriots played back-to-back games in the same state since 2008 when the Patriots played at San Francisco followed by a game the following week at San Diego.

FIRST-HALF SCORING STREAK IN TACT

The Patriots have now gone 83 straight games (regular season and post-season) without being shutout in the first half, the longest streak in NFL history. The second-longest streak also belongs to New England with an 82-game streak (Dec. 17, 2006 to Oct. 30, 2011).

PICKING OFF THEIR OPPONENTS

The Patriots defense has recorded 15 interceptions in 2020, second in the NFL to the 16 by Pittsburgh. The 2019 Patriots defense led the NFL with 25 interceptions.

INDIVIDUAL NOTES

BRYANT HAULS IN FIRST CAREER PICK

Undrafted rookie DB Myles Bryant registered his first NFL interception when he picked off Rams QB Jared Goff at the Los Angeles 32-yard line in the second quarter.

FOLK EXTENDS STREAK

K Nick Folk extended his streak to 21 consecutive field goals made with his 29-yard field goal in the second quarter. Folk missed his first two kicks of the season but has been perfect since, turning in the second-longest streak of his career. He made 23 straight field goals in 2013 while with the New York Jets. Folk is now 21-of-23 on field goal attempts in 2020 for a 91.3 field goal percentage. Folk's best season was in 2008 with Dallas when he was 20-of-22 for a 90.9 field goal percentage.

BAILEY GOES LONG

Jake Bailey had a career-long 71-yard punt in the fourth quarter. His previous best was 65 yards, which he accomplished three times, most recently at the L.A. Chargers on Dec. 6, 2020. He also had a 65-yard punt vs. Dallas on Nov. 24, 2019 and at Cincinnati on Dec. 15, 2019. Bailey's 71-yard punt is the first 70-yard punt for the Patriots since Chris Hanson had a 70-yard punt vs. Kansas City on Sept. 7, 2008. It is the longest punt for the Patriots since 2001, when Lee Johnson registered a 76-yard punt at Cincinnati on Sept. 9, 2001.

Since purchasing the team in 1994, the Patriots, under Robert Krafts' leadership, have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports.

Kraft has led the two most dominant decades in NFL history in terms of overall wins – 141 (2010-19) and 126 (2000-09)

Mr. Kraft is the most successful owner since he purchased the team in 1994 in terms of wins (330), division titles (19), winning percentage (.692), playoff wins (33), playoff seasons (21).



Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. In his 26 seasons of ownership, he has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what many observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.238 pct.), logging the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced



his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (19), conference crowns (10) and Super Bowl championships (6) than any other NFL team. Additionally, the Patriots have achieved the most winning seasons (23) and have the fewest losing seasons (2) since Kraft assumed ownership beginning in 1994. Super Bowl LIII was the 10th Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has appeared in more than four Super Bowls. In Kraft's 26 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 21 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons. Kraft earned his 23rd winning season in 26 years of owning the franchise in 2019.



A WINNING TRADITION I

Robert Kraft won his 300th game overall as owner of the New England Patriots against Miami on Sept. 30, 2018. Kraft reached the milestone in his 25th NFL season and in his 432nd game, the fastest an owner has reached the milestone. Al Davis of Oakland/Los Angeles accomplished the feat in 495 games (31 seasons) while Pat Bowlen of Denver reached 300 career wins in 501 games (30 seasons).

KRAFT PASSES OTHER OWNERS

The Patriots have 330 wins overall under Robert Kraft. He has produced more victories than every other Patriots owner combined. Under Kraft, the Patriots are 330-147 overall since he purchased the team in 1994. Kraft's predecessors in the owner's office went 225-276-9 in the 34 years prior to his purchase of the team.

CONTINUITY BREEDS SUCCESS

New England is the first team in NFL history to win six Super Bowls with the same owner (Robert Kraft), head coach (Bill Belichick) and quarterback (Tom Brady).

PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 27 times in their 60-year history. Twenty-one of those playoff berths have come in the 26 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. The Patriots have won 22 division crowns, including 17 in the last 19 seasons and 19 of which have come since Robert Kraft's purchase in 1994.

- The Patriots have played in 11 Super Bowls, the most by any team in NFL history.
- The Patriots are third in NFL history with 15 Conference Championship Game appearances, one behind the 16 by Pittsburgh and San Francisco
- The New England Patriots have 37 postseason victories, the most in NFL history. Pittsburgh is second with 36 playoff wins all-time.
- The Patriots qualified for the playoffs for 11 straight seasons (2009-19), the longest streak in NFL history. Dallas and Indianapolis are tied for second with nine consecutive seasons with a playoff berth.

- The Patriots rushed for 217 yards in Week 1 vs. Miami and for 250 yards in Week 3 vs. Las Vegas. The Patriots have also rushed for 200 yards twice in a single season under Belichick in 2004, '08, '10, '12, '14 and '18 but never three times in a single year.
- The Patriots 6.59 yards per carry average vs. Las Vegas in Week 3 was their highest since 7.06 vs. Green Bay on Dec. 19, 2010. It marked the 11th time under Bill Belichick that the Patriots have averaged at least six yards per carry in a single game.



PUT A RUSH ON THAT

The Patriots have rushed for 1,918 yards in 2020 and rank fifth in the NFL at 147.5 yards per game. The offense is on pace to finish with 2,360 yards rushing, which would rank fourth in team history.

MEYERS JOINS SELECT WR CLUB

Jakobi Meyers became the third wide receiver to throw a touchdown pass under head coach Bill Belichick in the regular season with a 24-yard touchdown pass vs. Baltimore (11/15/20). David Patten threw a 60-yard TD pass at Indianapolis (10/21/01) and Julian Edelman threw a 15-yard TD pass to WR Phillip Dorsett at Philadelphia (11/17/19).

DEFENSE

- The Patriots defense has scored two touchdowns through 13 games in 2020. DB Devin McCourty returned an interception 43 yards for a score in Week 2 at Seattle and DL Deatrich Wise Jr. recovered a stripsack fumble in the end zone for his first career TD in the Week 3 win vs. Las Vegas.
- The Patriots have scored 11 non-offensive touchdowns since the start of the 2019 season, most in the NFL during that span. In 2019, the Patriots had seven non-offensive touchdowns - two fumbles, two blocked punts, and three interceptions for touchdowns. The Patriots record for most non-offensive touchdowns in a single season is nine in 1961 and 2010.



PICKING OFF THE COMPETITION

The Patriots defense has recorded 15 interceptions in 2020, tied with Indianapolis and Kansas City for third in the NFL, behind the 17 by Pittsburgh and 16 by Miami. The 2019 Patriots defense led the NFL with 25 interceptions.

A SHUTDOWN SHUTOUT

The Patriots earned their 29th shutout in franchise history and 12th under Bill Belichick with the 45-0 victory over the L.A. Chargers on Dec.6, 2020. New England now has three 30-plus point road shutout wins over the last two seasons: a 43-0 win at Miami (9/15/19), a 33-0 win at N.Y. Jets (10/21/19) and the 45-0 victory over the Chargers in Week 13.

SPECIAL TEAMS

A SPECIAL NIGHT FOR SCORING

The Patriots scored two touchdowns on special teams at the L.A. Chargers on Dec. 6. WR Gunner Olszewski scored on a 70-yard punt returned and DB Cody Davis blocked a field goal that was returned 44 yards for a touchdown by DB Devin McCourty. It marked the third game under Bill Belichick and fifth time since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger that the Patriots have scored twice on special teams. Both special teams scores occurred in the second quarter, the second time in team history that has occurred. New England also score multiple special teams touchdowns in a single quarter at Baltimore on Nov. 23, 1980.

MULTIPLE SPECIAL TEAMS SCORES IN A SINGLE GAME UNDER BILL BELICHICK

The Patriots also scored two special teams touchdowns at Chicago (10/21/18) with a 95-yard kickoff return by WR Cordarrelle Patterson and a 29-yard return of a blocked punt by LB Kyle Van Noy.

On Oct. 4, 2010, at Miami, WR Brandon Tate returned a kickoff 103 yards for a score and CB Kyle Arrington returned a blocked field goal 35 yards for a touchdown.

A RARE OCCURRENCE

In the Week 13 win over the L.A. Chargers (12/6), the Patriots became the sixth team in NFL history with both a punt returned for a touchdown and a blocked field goal returned for a touchdown in the same game. It was the first such occasion since Baltimore in Week 12 of the 2015 season.



Bill Belichick is the only head coach in NFL history to win six Super Bowl titles. He won more regular season games (123) and more games overall (136) during a 10-year stretch (2002-11) than any other coach in NFL history. In 2007, Belichick led the Patriots to the fourth undefeated and untied regular season in NFL history and the first since the NFL established a 16-game schedule in 1978. His 46 consecutive years as an NFL coach are first in NFL history, passing the 45 by Dick LeBeau. The only other NFL coach with at least 40 consecutive NFL coaching seasons is Tom Moore with 41.

FROM STANDOUT QB TO WR

Edelman began his college football career with a year at the College of San Mateo (Calif.) before transferring to Kent State, where, as a senior, he completed 56 percent of his passes (153-of-275 for 1,820 yards) with 13 touchdowns. He was also the team's leading rusher, gaining 1,551 yards on 215 attempts (an average of 7.5 yards per carry) and scoring 13 touchdowns. His offensive numbers broke Kent State's single-season record for total offense set by Joshua Cribbs in 2003.

"He played the quarterback position in college at Kent State and all the positions really that he's played in the NFL – covering kicks, returning kicks, slot receiver, outside receiver, slot defender – he didn't do any of those things in college. I think that really speaks to his versatility and how much he's grown as a player and how many things he's learned how to do that he really didn't have much experience with in college. I'd say that's pretty unusual, especially to be as competent in them as he is." said Bill Belichick.

FATHERLY ADVICE

If there is one thing Julian Edelman has never lacked, it is athletic ability. A dual-threat quarterback at Kent State and former baseball standout in high school, Edelman once wowed Toronto Blue Jays players with his impressive footwork while fielding ground balls in an appearance at batting practice in 2011.

This natural ability may have been overlooked by NFL scouts, who let him fall to the Patriots in the seventh round of the 2009 NFL Draft. Edelman remains focused on the lessons his father, Frank Edelman, taught him at a young age. "I'm still constantly trying to learn," Edelman told the *Boston Herald*. "My dad always put it in my head, when you're green, you're growing, when you're ripe, you're lost. When you're done learning, you're done."

WR Gunner Olszewski scored his first NFL touchdown on a 70-yard punt return at the L.A. Chargers on Dec. 6, 2020. It was the first punt return for a touchdown for New England since WR Julian Edelman returned a punt 84 yards vs. Denver on Nov. 2, 2014. Olszewski's return came on the heels of an 82-yard punt return for a touchdown that was called back due to a penalty in the previous game.

ELECTED TEAM LEADER

Slater was named to eight Pro Bowls (2011-17, '19) for his special teams work, but perhaps more revealing of his value to New England is the fact that he was elected a captain by his teammates for the 10th straight season in 2020.

The special teams ace shared what it means to be a captain with high school football players in a story published by *The Boston Globe*. "You have to be able to put others before yourself. Being a captain and leadership is about serving, and to me, that means a great deal of sacrifice – putting aside personal agendas for the greater common goal. Leadership is equated with sacrifice. I think you have to be willing to do whatever it takes for the unit to succeed. I think you need to lead by example. A lot of times, it's about what you do, not what you say."

SLATER'S EMERGENCE WAS SPECIAL

Bill Belichick acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eightman rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there — fourth-and-short, where they're trying to protect the box — but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts."

SLATER SCORES FIRST CAREER TOUCHDOWN

During a 2007 game against Arizona State, UCLA's Matthew Slater returned a kickoff 89 yards for the final touchdown of his collegiate career. In the Patriots 16-10 win over Buffalo on Sept. 29, 2019, DB J.C. Jackson blocked a punt, which Slater returned 11 yards for his first NFL touchdown, 12 seasons after his last touchdown.




THUNEY STARTS AT CENTER

During his first offseason, Butler entered a rib eating contest, which judges ruled that his team had lost. Butler disagreed and began arguing with the judges. Then Commodore defensive coordinator Bob Shoop was in attendance and witnessed Butler's demeanor and was impressed with his competitive attitude. Shoop convinced then head coach James Franklin to ask Butler to transition to defense.



"Coach Franklin brought me into his office and he asked me what I wanted, and I wanted whatever was best for the team," Butler told The Tennessean. "Because we were so short on defensive linemen at that time, that's how it happened."



McCourty has played the most defensive snaps since he entered the NFL in 2010 with 10,753 defensive snaps. Malcolm Jenkins (New Orleans and Philadelphia) is second with 10,657 defensive snaps.

DB Devin McCourty now has four career touchdowns following return of a blocked field goal for a touchdown at LA Chargers (12/6) and his 43-yard interception return for a touchdown at Seattle (9/20/20). McCourty also had an 84-yard interception return for a touchdown at Buffalo in 2018 and a 104-yard kickoff return vs. N.Y. Jets in 2012.

DOUBLE TROUBLE

After being selected by the Patriots in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, Devin McCourty became part of a select group in league history. McCourty's identical twin brother, Jason, joined the Patriots in 2018. The two became the 12th set of twins to play in the NFL. In the 2018 season opener, Devin and Jason became the first set of twins to play together on the same NFL team since 1926 when Gene and Tom Golsen suited up together for the Louisville Colonels.

Devin became the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998-2000. His twin brother, Jason, played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 1999-2001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox.

IN GOOD COMPANY

Devin McCourty earned Associated Press All-Pro Second Team honors at safety in 2013 and 2016. He also earned Second Team All-Pro Honors as a rookie in 2010 when he played cornerback. McCourty joined Pro Football Hall of Famers Rod Woodson and Ronnie Lott as the only NFL players to earn All-Pro honors at both safety and cornerback.

BROTHERS IN ARMS

Devin and Jason McCourty have seen first-hand the effects of sickle cell disease. Both their aunt and uncle lived with the disease while their father carried the trait. Devin and Jason partnered with Embrace Kids Foundation to form their own "Tackle Sickle Cell" campaign aiming to educate the public, increase blood donations and raise money and awareness for the fight against sickle cell disease. Devin's work with the local Boston Children's Hospital has helped advance research of the disease with doctors now as close as they've ever been to a cure.

PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

Twenty-one of those playoff berths have come in the 26 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. PLAYOFF BERTHS UNDER KRAFT

New England has qualified for the playoffs 27 times in the team's 60-year history. The Patriots have earned 21 of those playoff berths in the 26 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994. New England has won 22 division crowns overall (21 AFC East crowns) and has qualified as a Wild Card team on four



occasions (1976, '85, '94 and '98). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 as part of a 16-team tournament following a players' strike.

ANNUAL ACHIEVEMENT

The Patriots won more than half of their games for the 19th straight year in 2019. They are the first team to win more than half of their games in 19 straight seasons since free agency began in 1993.

The Patriots are also the first team to win more than half of their games in 19 straight seasons since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, more than the 49ers (16 straight from 1983-98) and the Cowboys (16 straight from 1970-85).

The Patriots have now won nine or more games in 23 of the 26 seasons Robert Kraft has owned the team.

- Rob Gronkowski caught a 2-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady with 1:57 left in the first half to make the score 24-7 and cap off a 10-play, 80-yard drive.
- After the Patriots defense forced a three-and-out, a 42-yard Julian Edelman punt return gave New England possession at the Chicago 9-yard line, and Brady found Brandon LaFell for a 9-yard touchdown on the next play to give the Patriots a 31-7 lead with 1:07 left in the first half.
- On the Bears first play following the LaFell touchdown, Zach Moore forced a Jay Cutler fumble that was recovered by Rob Ninkovich and returned for a 15-yard touchdown that gave the Patriots a 38-7 Patriots lead with 55 seconds left in the first half.

COMEBACKS FOR THE AGES

The Patriots have staged two historic come-from-behind victories over the past several seasons:

Belichick coached the Patriots back from a 25-point deficit to win Super Bowl LI. A comeback of that magnitude is extremely rare. There had been 2,656 games in which a team led by 25 points or more in NFL history, including the postseason. Teams leading by 25 had recorded 2,647 wins, seven losses and two ties, a winning percentage of .997.

New England came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos, 34-31, in overtime in a Sunday Night Football matchup on Nov. 24, 2013, marking the largest regular season comeback win in team history, after trailing 24-0 at halftime.

New England's previous best comeback win was from a 23-0 deficit to win, 38-23, vs. Seattle (09/16/84). The Patriots also came back from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, 23-22 (12/21/96). The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently vs. Buffalo (01/01/12).
