GAME SUMMARY

NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (5-4) VS. NEW YORK JETS (6-3) Sunday, November 6, 2022 • Gillette Stadium (65,878) • 1:00 p.m. ET

The New England Patriots moved above .500 for the first time in 2022 after a 26-3 victory over the Indianapolis Colts prior to the Bye Week and will return to action this week when they begin a stretch of three games in 12 days when they host the New York Jets this Sunday. Following the Jets the Patriots will play back-to-back games on Thursday with a Thanksgiving night game at Minnesota and a Thursday night game against Buffalo at Gillette Stadium.

All four teams in the AFC East have a winning record through the first 10 weeks: Miami (7-3), the New York Jets (6-3), Buffalo (6-3) and New England (5-4). It marks the fifth time since 2002 that all four teams in a single division have a winning record through the first nine weeks of a season, joining the 2021 AFC North, 2021 AFC West, 2014 AFC North and 2008 NFC East.

BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be broadcast by **CBS** and can be seen locally on **WBZ-TV** Channel 4. Kevin Harlan will handle play-by-play duties with **Trent Green** as the color analyst. **Melanie Collins** will work from the sidelines. The game will be produced by **Ken Mack** and directed by **Jim Cornell**.

NATIONAL RADIO: Sunday's game will be broadcast to a national audience on **Sports USA**. Larry Kahn will call the game with **Dave McGinnis** providing analysis.

LOCAL RADIO: 98.5 The Sports Hub is the flagship station for the Patriots Radio Network. A complete listing of the network's 33 stations can be found in this press release on page 69. Play-by-play broadcaster **Bob Socci** will call the action along with former Patriots quarterback **Scott Zolak**, who will provide color analysis. The games are produced by **Marc Cappello**.

PATRIOTS HAVE WON 13 STRAIGHT OVER THE JETS

The Patriots have won 13 straight games over the New York Jets with six straight series sweeps (2016-21). If the Patriots win their 14th straight game against the Jets this week, they will have the longest current winning streak in the NFL.



PATRIOTS VS. NEW YORK JETS



The New England Patriots and New York Jets will meet for the second time this season and the second time in a three week span when they host the Jets this Sunday at Gillette Stadium. The Patriots won at MetLife Stadium, 22-17, on Oct. 30. The Patriots enter this week with 13 straight wins over the Jets, including series sweeps in each of the last six seasons. The 13 straight wins are second in team history to the 15 straight wins the Patriots had over Buffalo (2003-10) and the six straight series sweeps are second to seven straight over Buffalo (2004-10).

Overall, the Patriots have 22 series sweeps over the Jets with 13 under Bill Belichick and 15 under Robert Kraft.

New England leads the series, 72-54-1 overall. The Patriots are 38-25-1 all-time in home games against the Jets, including 18-4 at Gillette Stadium.

The teams have played in the postseason three times – a 1985 Wild Card game, a 2006 Wild Card game and an AFC Divisional game in 2010. New England beat the Jets, 26-14, in 1985 at the Meadowlands en route to Super Bowl XX. In 2006, the Patriots defeated the Jets, 37-16, at Gillette Stadium and the Jets beat the Patriots, 28-21, in the 2010 Divisional playoff game in Foxborough.

New England is 43-16 against the Jets since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994.

New England's 72 overall victories over the Jets (including two playoff wins) are the second-most over any single opponent, trailing only the 77 all-time wins over Buffalo.





Under Kraft's leadership since he purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. Kraft has led the two most dominant decades in NFL history in terms of overall wins – 141 (2010-19) and 126 (2000-09). Kraft is the most successful owner since he purchased the team in 1994 in terms of wins (346), division titles (19), winning percentage (.682), playoff wins (33) and playoff seasons (22).



Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. In his 28 seasons of ownership, he has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what many observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.238 pct.), the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention



to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (19), conference crowns (10) and Super Bowl championships (6) than any other NFL team. Additionally, the Patriots have achieved the most winning seasons (24) and are tied with Pittsburgh for the fewest losing seasons (3) since Kraft assumed ownership beginning in 1994. Super Bowl LIII was the 10th Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has appeared in more than four Super Bowls. In Kraft's 28 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 22 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons, and finished with a winning record 24 times.

A WINNING TRADITION I

Robert Kraft won his 300th game overall as owner of the New England Patriots against Miami on Sept. 30, 2018. Kraft reached the milestone in his 25th NFL season and in his 432nd game, the fastest an owner has reached the milestone. Al Davis of the Raiders accomplished the feat in 495 games (31 seasons) while Pat Bowlen of Denver reached 300 career wins in 501 games (30 seasons).

KRAFT PASSES OTHER OWNERS

The Patriots have 346 wins overall under Robert Kraft. He has produced more victories than every other Patriots owner combined. Under Kraft, the Patriots are 346-161 overall since he purchased the team in 1994. Kraft's predecessors in the owner's office went 225-276-9 in the 34 years prior to his purchase of the team.

CONTINUITY BREEDS SUCCESS

New England is the first team in NFL history to win six Super Bowls with the same owner (Robert Kraft), head coach (Bill Belichick) and quarterback (Tom Brady).

PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 28 times in their 62-year history. Twenty-two of those playoff berths have come in the 28 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. The Patriots have won 22 division crowns.

- The New England Patriots are tied with the Pittsburgh Steelers for the most Super Bowl wins in the NFL with six.
- The Patriots have played in 11 Super Bowls, the most by any team in NFL history. Dallas, Denver and Pittsburgh have played in eight.
- The Patriots are third in NFL history with 15 Conference Championship Game appearances, one behind the 16 by Pittsburgh and San Francisco.
- The New England Patriots have 37 postseason victories, the most in NFL history. Pittsburgh and Green Bay are second with 36 playoff wins all-time.
- The New England Patriots have earned seven No. 1 seeds, behind San Francisco (9) and Denver (8) since playoff seeding began in 1975.
- The Patriots have earned a first-round playoff bye an NFL-best 14 times since 1990. Pittsburgh and San Francisco are second with nine byes since 1990. New England is the only team in NFL history with nine straight first-round byes (2010-18).
- The Patriots have played in 59 postseason games, fourth-most in NFL history behind Dallas (64), Pittsburgh (63) and Green Bay (61). The Patriots need to play in one more postseason game in 2022 to become the fourth NFL team to play in 60 postseason games.
- The Patriots are second with 13 seasons of 12 wins since 1970, behind San Francisco's 14 seasons with 12 victories
- New England has won 13 games in a single season seven times in franchise history. Only San Francisco has more 13-win seasons with 10.
- The New England Patriots have won 14 or more games in a season five times, most in NFL history. San Francisco is second with four 14-win seasons.
- New England has 28 undefeated months since 2000, most in the NFL over that span. Green Bay is second with 20 undefeated months during that time.
- The Patriots have 35 winning seasons since 1970, second all-time behind Pittsburgh's 38



- The Patriots have 571 total victories, tied with Green Bay for the third-most wins since 1960, behind the 580 wins by Pittsburgh and the 579 by Dallas.
- New England (1,017) played their 1,000th game in franchise history (regular season and playoffs combined) against Cleveland on Nov. 14, 2021 and became the first original AFL team to play in 1,000 games.
- With rookie free agents DL DaMarcus Mitchell and DB Brenden Schooler making the initial 53-man roster in 2022, the Patriots have now had a rookie free agent make the opening day roster for 19 straight seasons, tied with Denver for the longest streak in the NFL
- The Patriots have finished in the top 10 for fewest points allowed in each of the last 10 seasons (2012-2021) to tie Tampa Bay, who became the last team to reach 10 straight seasons (1996-2005) for the fewest points allowed. The 2021 Patriots finished second in the NFL with 17.8 points allowed per game. Buffalo finished first with 17.0 points allowed per game. The 2022 New England team is ranked 6th in the NFL, allowing 18.4 points per game.





The Patriots announced the return of the red throwback uniforms late in the spring. The team wore the uniform vs. Detroit on Oct. 9 and will wear it again vs. Buffalo on Dec. 1. The uniform's design, a red jersey with timeless blue and white stripes across the sleeves and white numbers outlined in blue, is based on the uniform worn from 1984-1992 and sporadically worn from 1994-2012 as an alternate uniform. In 2013, the NFL announced a rule mandating every club stick to one helmet all season. Unfortunately for the Patriots, this meant sidelining the throwback uniforms as the silver helmet with the modern-day logo did not feel right to blend with the classic throwback threads. In June of 2021, a memo was sent to teams announcing the approval of a second helmet for the following season. The rule change allowed the Patriots to complete the throwback uniforms with a white helmet, white face mask and the Pat the Patriot logo to officially revive the red throwback uniforms for the upcoming season. The announcement of the long-awaited revival included the original Delorean from the Back to the Future movie franchise and players repping the throwback threads. The social media posts instantly generated national attention as fans and media alike welcomed back the beloved red jerseys.

500TH GAME FOR KRAFT

The game at Pittsburgh (9/18) was the 500th game of the Robert Kraft era. Kraft is the most successful owner since he purchased the team in 1994 in terms of Super Bowl wins (6), overall wins (345), division titles (19), winning percentage (.682), playoff wins (33) and playoff seasons (22).

PATRIOTS RUN OFF FINAL 6:33 TO SECURE THE VICTORY

The Patriots offense was holding a 17-14 lead when Pittsburgh punted the ball to the Patriots with 6:33 left in the game at Pittsburgh (9/18). Despite the Steelers still having all three timeouts, the Patriots were able to run out the clock on a 13-play, 56-yard drive.



WARMEST NOVEMBER HOME GAME IN THE BILL BELICHICK ERA

The game time temperature vs. Indianapolis (11/6) at kickoff was 75 degrees, the warmest game in November in the Bill Belichick era. The Patriots have had three other home games in November or later in the 60s - Nov. 25, 2002 vs. New Orleans (62 degrees), Nov. 8, 2009 vs. Miami (65 degrees) and Nov. 11, 2012 vs. Buffalo (60 degrees).

INDIANAPOLIS SHUTOUT ON THIRD DOWNS

The Patriots defense forced Indianapolis (11/6) to go 0-for-14 on third down. Since 1991, the Patriots are the third team to hold an opponent to 0-for-14 or more on third down in a game. The New York Jets held the Arizona Cardinals to 0-for-15 on third down on Dec. 2, 2012 and the Jets held the Tampa Bay Buccaneers to 0-for-14 on third down on Dec. 13, 2009. Since 1991, the Patriots twice held a team to 0-for-12 on third down – Dec. 31, 2017 vs. the New York Jets and Sept. 22, 2019 vs. the New York Jets.

PATRIOTS DEFENSE GENERATES SEASON-HIGH NINE SACKS; TIED FOR THE MOST UNDER BELICHICK

LB Matthew Judon and LB Josh Uche each recorded three sacks vs. Indianapolis (11/6). It is the second time in team history that the Patriots have had two players reach three sacks in a game. Don Blackmon and Andre Tippett each had a three-sack game on Sept. 9, 1985 vs. Green Bay. Judon and Uche are the second Patriots players to record 3 sacks in a game in 2022. Deatrich Wise Jr. had 3 sacks vs. Baltimore (9/25/22). It is the first game with a pair of teammates with at least three sacks since Aaron Donald and Troy Reeder in Week 5 of the 2020 season with the Los Angeles Rams.

PATRIOTS DEFENSE HELD INDIANAPOLIS TO JUST 121 TOTAL YARDS OVERALL

The Patriots defense held Indianapolis (11/6) to just 64 total first half yards, including just 19 yards in their first six drives. Overall, Indianapolis had just 121 total yards, the lowest total since the Patriots held the Jets to 105 total yards on Sept. 22, 2019. The Patriots held the Colts to 43 net yards passing, the lowest total since holding Tennessee to a franchise low -7 yards on Oct. 18, 2009. It is the 11th time the team has held the opponent to 43 net yards passing or less.

PATRIOTS EARN 13TH STRAIGHT VICTORY OVER JETS

The Patriots secured a 22-17 victory to mark their 13th straight victory over the New York Jets on Oct. 30. It is tied for the longest current winning streak in the NFL over an opponent.

Since 1970, the only other team to have two picks from one school followed by their next two picks from one school was the 1992 Los Angeles Rams who drafted DE Sean Gilbert (Pittsburgh) in the first round followed by DB Steve Israel (Pittsburgh) in the second round and then used two third-round picks for DL Marc Boutte (LSU) and WR Todd Kinchen (LSU).

KEEPING UP WITH THE JONES'

The Patriots have four players with the last name Jones with QB Mac Jones, DB Jonathan Jones, DB Jack Jones and DB Marcus Jones. It is the second time in team history that the team has had four players with the same last name. TEAM HISTORY; 14TH UNDER BELICHICK			

The Patriots earned their 31st shutout in franchise history and the 14th under Bill Belichick with the 29-0 victory vs. Detroit (10/9). It was the team's first shutout since a 25-0 win at Atlanta on Nov. 18, 2021. It was the first shutout at Gillette Stadium since a 27-0 win vs. Houston on Sept. 22, 2016.

SECOND STRAIGHT VISIT BY DETROIT WITH A TOP RANKED UNIT

Detroit (10/9) entered the game with the top ranked offense averaging an NFL-high 35 points per game and 437 yards per game and were held to 0 points and 312 total yards. It was the second straight time the Lions traveled to New England with a top ranked unit. When the Lions last played at Gillette Stadium on Nov. 23, 2014, the Patriots rolled to a 34-9 win against the Lions' top ranked defense. Detroit scored at least 24 points in each of their first four games this season.

PATRIOTS SCORE ON DEFENSE FOR SECOND STRAIGHT WEEK

The Patriots defense scored a touchdown for the second straight week after LB Matthew Judon forced a fumble on a 13-yard sack in the second quarter vs. Detroit (10/9) that was recovered and returned 59 yards for a touchdown by S Kyle Dugger. Rookie DB Jack Jones intercepted a QB Aaron Rodgers pass at Green Bay (10/2) and returned it 40 yards for a touchdown. It was the first fumble returned for touchdown by New England since LB Dont'a Hightower returned a fumble 26 yards for a touchdown vs. Cleveland on Oct. 27, 2019. In 2021 the Patriots defense scored three times with three interceptions returned for touchdowns, including one in back-to-back weeks – At L.A. Chargers (10/31) and at Carolina (11/7).

100-YARD RUSHER AND A 100-YARD RECEIVER IN THE SAME GAME FOR FIRST TIME SINCE 2014

RB Rhamondre Stevenson had 161 yards rushing and WR Jakobi Meyers had 111 receiving yards vs. Detroit (10/9). It is the first time the Patriots had a 100-yard rusher and 100-yard receiver in the same game since Oct. 5, 2014 when RB Stevan Ridley had 113 yards rushing and TE Rob Gronkowski had 100 yards receiving.

PATRIOTS STOP DETROIT ON ALL 6 FOURTH DOWN ATTEMPTS

The Patriots defense forced six unsuccessful fourth down attempts vs. Detroit (10/9). It is the most since New England was held to 0-for-5 on fourth down attempts on Oct. 8, 1995 vs. Denver. The previous best for the Patriots defense was stopping an opponent on all four attempts, which they had done twice before, vs. Denver (11/2/14) and vs. Tampa Bay (9/22/13).

PATRIOTS AVERAGE 5-YARDS PER CARRY FOR THIRD STRAIGHT GAME

The Patriots gained 176 yards rushing on 35 attempts for a 5.0-yards per carry vs Detroit (10/9). It was the third straight week that they averaged at least 5 yards per carry. They averaged 5.2-yards per carry vs. Baltimore on Sept. 25 and 5.1-yard per carry at Green Bay on Oct. 2. The Patriots have had three 3-game stretches averaging 5-yards per carry in a game (1977, 2020 and 2022)

PATRIOTS HAVE FIRST ROOKIE-TO-ROOKIE TD CONNECTION SINCE 1993

QB Bailey Zappe's 2-yard touchdown pass to WR Tyquan Thornton in the third quarter at Cleveland (10/16) marked the first time the Patriots had a rookie-to-rookie touchdown connection since the season finale of the 1993 season when QB Drew Bledsoe threw an 11-yard touchdown pass to WR Vincent Brisby in the third quarter vs. Miami on Jan. 2, 1994.

PATRIOTS DEFENSE WAS FIRST TO HOLD CLEVELAND UNDER 170 RUSHING YARDS

Cleveland (10/16) entered the game with the top ranked rushing attack, posting five consecutive games of 170 rushing yards and was averaging 192.4-yards per game. Nick Chubb had rushed for 100 yards in four of the first five games and had 100 scrimmage yards in all five games. Cleveland rushed for 70 yards and Chubb had 70 yards from scrimmage (56 rushing yards and 14 receiving yards)

PATRIOTS DEFENSE EXTENDED MARK TO SEVEN STRAIGHT STOPS ON FOURTH DOWN

The Patriots stopped Cleveland (10/16) on a 4th-and-1 situation in the second quarter for their seventh straight hold on fourth down. The Patriots stopped Detroit on six fourth-down attempts the week before. The last team with at least seven straight fourth-down stops was Denver with eight straight in 2021. Cleveland converted on fourth down late in the fourth quarter to end the streak.

The Patriots had two strong weeks going against two top ranked teams. Detroit (10/9) entered the game with the top ranked offense and was averaging 35 points a game in a 29-0 shutout and Cleveland (10/16) entered with the top ranked rushing attack (192.4) and were held to 70 yards.



The Patriots have two Cliff Harris Award winners on the roster with DB Kyle Dugger (2019) and DL Sam Roberts (2021). The award is given to the best defensive player from a small school and is named after Dallas Pro Football Hall of Famer Cliff Harris. The Patriots are the third team to have at least two Cliff Harris Award winners on the same team since the award was first handed out in 2013, joining the 2021 Chicago Bears with DB Marqui Christian (2015) and DB Michael Joseph (2017) and the 2020 New York Jets with DB Marqui Christian (2015), DB Corey Ballentine (2018) and DB Pierre Desir (2013).



Bill Belichick is the only head coach in NFL history to win six Super Bowl titles. He won more games overall (141) during a 10-year stretch (2010-19) than any other coach in NFL history. In 2007, Belichick led the Patriots to the fourth undefeated and untied regular season in NFL history and the first since the NFL established a 16-game schedule in 1978. His 48 consecutive years as an NFL coach are most in NFL history. The only other NFL coaches with at least 40 consecutive NFL coaching seasons are Dick LeBeau (45) and Tom Moore (41).

WR KENDRICK BOURNE COMPLETES FIRST NFL PASS FOR A TOUCHDOWN

 WR Kendrick Bourne completed his first NFL pass attempt for a 25yard touchdown pass to WR Nelson Agholor in the first quarter vs. New York Jets on Oct. 24, 2021, giving him a perfect passer rating of 158.3.

BOURNE 10-YARD RUNS

 Prior to the 2021 season, Bourne never had a rushing attempt in his NFL career. He had six 10-yard runs in 2021, including a 16-yard run on his first ever rushing attempt at the New York Jets on Sept. 19. He had three 10-yard runs vs. Cleveland on Nov. 14, 2021 with a 15-yard run in the first quarter, an 11-yard run in the second quarter and a 17yard run in the third quarter.

BOURNE HAD CAREER-HIGH IN RECEIVING YARDS

Bourne caught 4 passes for a career-high 98 yards against Cleveland (11/14/21). His previous best was 96 yards vs. New Orleans on Sept. 26, 2021.

BOURNE HAD SECOND CAREER TWO-TD GAME

Bourne scored on a 4-yard touchdown pass in the first quarter and a 41yard touchdown pass in the third quarter vs. Tennessee (11/28/21). It was his second career two-touchdown game. He had two touchdowns at New Orleans on Dec. 8, 2019 when he played for San Francisco.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2022

- RB Damien Harris has 1,934 career rushing yards and needs 983 rushing yards to move into the all-time Top-10 in team history.
- Harris had a team-leading 15 rushing touchdowns in 2021 and looks to become the fourth Patriots player to have consecutive seasons with 10 or more touchdowns, joining Curtis Martin (14 in 1995 and 14 in 1996), Corey Dillon (12 in 2004, 12 in 2005 and 13 in 2006) and BenJarvus Green-Ellis (13 in 2010 and 11 in 2011).





- Harris had 15 rushing touchdowns in 2021 and has three in 2022. He will look to set the team record for most rushing touchdowns in consecutive seasons set by Curtis Martin with 28 (14-1995 and 14-1996).
- Harris enters the 2022 season with eight career 100-yard rushing games and needs two more to become the fifth New England running back to reach at least 10 career 100-yard rushing games, joining Jim Nance (17), Curtis Martin (14), Corey Dillon (11) and Sam Cunningham (11).

 Harris scored his 20th rushing touchdown at Green Bay (10/2/22) and became the 14th Patriots player to reach 20 career rushing touchdowns and needs three more to move into the Top-10 in team history.

- QB Mac Jones has the highest completion percentage in team history at 67.2.
- Jones needs eight games with a passer rating of 100-or-higher to become the fifth quarterback all-time to have 15 such games in his first two seasons, joining Russell Wilson (17), Dak Prescott (16), Justin Herbert (15), and Dan Marino (15). JONES FINISHES WITH AN 80 PERCENT PASS COMPLETION FOR SECOND STRAIGHT WEEK

Jones completed 22-of-26 passes for an .846 pass completion percentage at Atlanta (11/18/21). It is tied for the fourth-best in team history. Jones was 19-of-23 for an .826 completion percentage vs. Cleveland on Nov. 14, the sixth-highest in team history. Jones is the first rookie quarterback in NFL history and the first New England player to ever complete at least 80 percent of his passes in back-to-back games (min. 20 attempts). The NFL record for most 80 percent completion games (min. 20 attempts) in a season is four by Drew Brees in 2018 and Kirk Cousins in 2019.

3-TOUCHDOWN PERFORMANCE

Jones had his first career three-touchdown performance against Cleveland on Nov. 14 and also had three touchdowns vs. Jacksonville (01/02). He had seven games in 2021 with at least two touchdowns. The NFL record for most games with at least two touchdown passes by a rookie quarterback is Justin Herbert of the Los Angeles Chargers with 10 games in 2020.

JONES BECOMES 15TH ROOKIE QUARTERBACK TO REACH 3,000 PASSING YARDS AND 20 TDS

Jones is the 15th rookie quarterback to reach 3,000 passing yards and 20 touchdown passes and now has 3,801 passing yards with 22 touchdowns.

OFFENSIVE ROOKIE OF THE MONTH

Jones was named Offensive Rookie of the Month for November by the National Football League. Jones is the first Patriots rookie to receive a rookie of the month honor since DL Chandler Jones in September of the 2012 season. Jones led the Patriots to a perfect record in November, completing 76-of-99 passes for 854 yards and seven touchdown passes. He completed 76.8 percent of his passes and had a quarterback rating of 117.2.



WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2022

- WR Jakobi Meyers has scored on three two-point plays and needs one more two-point score to tie Julian Edelman and Gino Cappelletti with four for the most in team history.
- Meyers (208 receptions for 2,411 yards) has the most career receptions and receiving yards by any undrafted Patriots receiver that began his career with the team. His 59 receptions for 729 yards in 2020 were also the most in a single season by a rookie free agent that was originally signed by the team. He surpassed that number with 83 receptions and 866 receiving yards in 2021 for the best statistical receiving season for an undrafted Patriots receiver.

A SPECIAL BIRTHDAY PERFORMANCE

MEYERS JOINS ELITE CLUB

 Meyers, who threw touchdown passes in Weeks 10 and 17 in 2020, became the fourth wide receiver with two touchdown passes in a single season in the Super Bowl era, joining Rod Gardner (2003), Antwaan Randle El (2010) and Odell Beckham Jr. (2018).

MEYERS COMPLETES TWO PASSES IN ONE GAME

Meyers completed two passes vs. Tampa Bay on Oct. 3, 2021. He caught a backwards pass from QB Mac Jones and then threw across the field to RB Brandon Bolden, who managed a 15-yard gain in the second quarter. He completed a 30-yard pass to WR Nelson Agholor in the fourth quarter on a flea flicker. The only other wide receiver to complete two passes in single game for New England was Julian Edelman vs. Denver on Oct. 18, 2020. The only other non-quarterbacks to complete two passes in a game for New England were running backs – Dick Christy on Nov. 18, 1960 vs. Dallas Texans and Andy Johnson on Sept. 6, 1981 vs. Baltimore Colts.

"When I was younger in high school, I made [Newton's] 7-on-7 team – his all-star team – and we traveled to Florida to play in a league," Meyers said. "We ended up losing, but it was still a great experience. It was a good experience to meet Cam when I was very young. A lot of guys where I come from look up to him, so that was definitely a once-in-a lifetime opportunity for me."

MEYERS SCORES FIRST NFL RECEIVING TOUCHDOWN

 Meyers has thrown for two touchdown passes but scored his first NFL receiving touchdown on an 11-yard pass from QB Brian Hoyer in the fourth quarter against Cleveland (11/14/21).

MEYERS USING HIS ARM

 Meyers threw two touchdown passes in 2020. He completed a 24-yard touchdown pass to RB Rex Burkhead vs. Baltimore (11/15) and a 19-yard touchdown pass to QB Cam Newton vs. N.Y. Jets (1/3). Overall, Patriots wide receivers completed four passes in 2020. WR Julian Edelman also completed two passes. The four pass completions by wide receivers are the most in team history. They had three in 2021.

Meyers (two touchdown passes) became the third Patriots wide receiver to throw a touchdown pass under head coach Bill Belichick. David Patten threw a 60-yard touchdown pass on Oct. 21, 2001, at Indianapolis and WR Julian Edelman threw a 15-yard touchdown pass to WR Phillip Dorsett at Philadelphia on Nov. 17, 2019. Kendrick Bourne became the fourth to do so with a 25-yard touchdown pass to WR Nelson Agholor vs. N.Y. Jets on Oct. 24, 2021.



RHAMONDRE STEVENSON'S STORY

"I have a very special story, I feel like," Rhamondre Stevenson told the Boston Globe recently. "Thinking about it is kind of crazy, because of all the hardships I've been through. Some of it was just my fault, but it's crazy being where I am now compared to where I came from."

DEDICATION TO HIS GOALS

While in high school, Stevenson started gaining attention for the impressive stats he posted as a junior. Unfortunately, due to his grades, Stevenson was academically ineligible to receive a football scholarship despite being recruited. Following his senior year of high school, Stevenson took a year off from football working part-time jobs at Wal-Mart and Jimmy John's. But after a year away, he decided to follow a group of his friends and enroll in Cerritos Community College. During his time at Cerritos, he shared a two-bedroom apartment with up to six other guys at times and rode his bicycle 20 minutes to and from practice every day. After putting up monster stats in his second season at Cerritos, he committed to Oklahoma. Oklahoma led him to the 2021 NFL Draft where in the fourth round on the third day the Patriots selected Stevenson. In addition he worked on his academics and made the Dean's List while at Oklahoma.

STEVENSON RECORDS FIRST RECEIVING TOUCHDOWN

 RB Rhamondre Stevenson had his first career touchdown reception on a 3-yard pass from QB Mac Jones in the second quarter vs. Indianapolis on Nov. 6 2022.

STEVENSON HAS CAREER LONG RUNS

 Stevenson had a career-long 49 yard run in the first quarter vs. Detroit on Oct. 9, 2022. His previous long was a 21-yard run on Nov. 18, 2021 at Atlanta. It is the longest run by a Patriots running back since RB Damien Harris scored on a 64-yard run at Buffalo on Dec. 6, 2021. Stevenson broke free for a 31-yard touchdown run at Cleveland on Oct. 16, 2022 and a 35-yard run at the New York Jets on Oct. 30, 2022.

STEVENSON HAS THIRD CAREER 100-YARD GAME

 Stevenson had a career-high 161 yards rushing for his third career 100-yard rushing game vs. Detroit on Oct. 9, 2022. His previous high was 107 rushing yards vs. Jacksonville on Jan. 2, 2022. The 161 yards rushing was the most by a Patriots running back since Jonas Gray rushed for 201 yards at Indianapolis (11/16/14). Today's effort is the 13th time in franchise history that a Patriots player has rushed for 160 yards or more.

STEVENSON RECORDS THIRD CAREER GAME WITH A 6.0-YARD AVERAGE PER CARRY

 Stevenson finished with 25 rushing attempts for 161 yards for a 6.4yard average vs. Detroit on Oct. 9, 2022. It is the third time in his career and second time in 2022 he has finished with a 6.0-yard average. He had a 6.1-yard average vs. Baltimore (9/25/22). As a rookie in 2021, he had 10 carries for 62 yards for 6.2-yard average at Carolina on Nov. 7, 2021.

MOST TOUCHES

 Stevenson had 27 overall offensive touches with 25 rushing attempts and two receptions vs. Detroit (on Oct. 9, 2022. It is the most offensive touches since RB Dion Lewis had 32 offensive touches with 26 rushing attempts and 6 receptions on Dec. 31, 2017 vs. the New York Jets.



STRANGE FACEMASK

2022 first-round draft pick OL Cole Strange started wearing the vertical bar facemask his senior season at Chattanooga. The idea started when the veteran offensive line group, who had been together for four years, wanted to do something different to finish out their final season playing alongside each other. So they decided to all wear the same facemask and landed on the vertical bar. Strange brought the bar with him to the NFL and is one of only three NFL regulars to sport the vertical bar in their facemask.





2022 SECOND-ROUND PICK TYQUAN THORNTON SCORES FIRST NFL TOUCHDOWN

 2022 second-round draft pick WR Tyquan Thornton scored his first NFL touchdown on a 2-yard pass from QB Bailey Zappe in the third quarter at Cleveland on Oct. 16, 2022.

THORNTON SCORES SECOND TOUCHDOWN OF THE DAY ON A 19-YARD RUN

Thornton scored his second touchdown of the day on a 19-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter at Cleveland on Oct. 16. He is the sixth Patriots wide receiver to score on a touchdown run and first since Cordarrelle Patterson in 2018. Thornton is the first Patriots wide receiver with a rushing touchdown and a receiving touchdown in the same game since David Patten at Indianapolis on Oct. 21, 2001.

FROM HOUSTON BAPTIST, TO WESTERN KENTUCKY, TO NEW ENGLAND

2022 fourth-round draft pick QB Bailey Zappe played his first four college seasons at Houston Baptist before playing at Western Kentucky in 2021. While at Western Kentucky, Zappe set new all-time single season FBS records with 5,987 yards and 62 touchdown passes. He moved past Texas Tech's B.J. Symons (5,833 in 2013) and Joe Burrow (60 touchdown passes in 2019).

BAILEY ZAPPE THROWS FOR OVER 300 YARDS

Zappe made his second straight start of the season at Cleveland on Oct. 16, 2022 and finished 24-of-34 for 309 yards with two touchdown passes en route to a 38-15 victory. He became the first Patriots rookie quarterback to win in his first home and first road games after starting in the 29-0 victory at home against Detroit on Oct. 9. Zappe had a passer rating of 118.4 against the Browns. He is the first rookie quarterback to win and record a 100-plus passer rating in his first two starts since Sonny Jurgensen in 1957. Zappe had a passer rating of 100 in his first start against the Lions.



NEWLY ENSHRINED PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAMER RICHARD SEYMOUR SEES GREATNESS AHEAD FOR CHRISTIAN BARMORE

- For a defensive lineman, if Patriots and Pro Football Hall of Famer Richard Seymour's is in your corner, there are few better compliments or endorsements.
- "I think he has a ton of ability, natural ability, and he plays hard," Seymour told the Herald recently. "I think he's going to be a problem for (opposing teams) for a long time to come. Hopefully he stays healthy and continues on the path he's on. I think he has a really bright future."

SECOND-MOST QUARTERBACK PRESSURES

 Barmore posted the second-most quarterback pressures for a first-year defensive tackle since 2006, according to Pro Football Focus. His 48 pressures were two more than Aaron Donald had during his rookie season.



2021 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

 LB Ja'Whaun Bentley set single-season career-highs with 91 tackles and 1½ sacks in 2020. He surpassed that total with 108 total tackles in 2021.



Ja'Whaun and his family were homeless starting his freshman year of high school, living with one set of grandparents, then the other, then an aunt. Ja'Whaun and his brother slept on couches and floors at times over the course of several years. Once Ja'Whaun entered the NFL, he was <u>able to secure permanent housing for his family</u>.



S KYLE DUGGER SCORES ON A 59-YARD FUMBLE RETURN

S Kyle Dugger recovered a fumble vs. Detroit (10/9/22) that was forced on a 13-yard sack by LB Matthew Judon and returned the ball 59 yards for a touchdown in the second quarter. It is the fourth-longest fumble return in team history. It is Dugger's first career touchdown.

A PICK SIX AND A FORCED FUMBLE IN NFL STARTING DEBUT

Patriots 2022 fourth-round pick Jack Jones was in the starting lineup at cornerback at Green Bay on Oct. 2, 2021 in place of the injured Jalen Mills. It was Jones's first NFL start. He forced and recovered a fumble on WR Romeo Doubs in the first quarter to give the Patriots a first down at the 50-yard line. Later in the second quarter he intercepted a QB Aaron Rodgers pass and returned it 40 yards for a touchdown. It was only the second time that Rodgers has had an interception returned for a touchdown at Lambeau Field (3,511 pass attempts). Jones is the first rookie in NFL history with a forced fumble, a fumble recover and an interception returned for a touchdown in a single game.

JACK JONES HAS SECOND STRAIGHT GAME WITH A PICK

Jones intercepted a QB Jared Goff vs. Detroit (10/9/22) pass at the New England 3-yard line in the first quarter for his second straight game with a pick. At Green Bay he intercepted QB Aaron Rodgers and returned it 40 yards for a touchdown. Jones is the first New England rookie with a pick in back-to-back games since 2013 when Logan Ryan and Duron Harmon each had games with back-to-back interceptions.

 CB Jonathan Jones picked off a pass from Indianapolis (11/6/22) QB Sam Ehlinger in the fourth quarter and returned it 17 yards for his first career touchdown.

2022 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- LB Matthew Judon led the team with a career-high 12 1/2 sacks in 2021 and has already reached 11 1/2 sacks in 2022 to become the fourth Patriots player with back-to-back 10-plus sack totals, joining Garin Veris (10 in 1985 and 11 in 1986), Andre Tippett (18 1/2 in 1984 and 16 1/2 in 1985) and Tony McGee (12 in 1977, 11 1/2 in 1978 and 10 1/2 in 1979). Judon also joined Tippett (3), McGee (3), Veris (2) and Jones (2) as the only Patriots to register more than one double-digit sack total. He is first in the NFL with 11 1/2 sacks so far in 2022.
- Judon registered a sack in each of the first five games of the 2022 season. He is the first New England player to start a season with at least one sack in each of the first five games to start a season. Patriots and Pro Football Hall of Famer Andre Tippett began the 1986 season with one sack in each of the first four games.

WEEK 5 AFC DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Judon was named AFC Defensive Player of the Week by the National Football League for his performance in the Patriots 29-0 shutout victory over the Detroit Lions on Oct. 9, 2022. Detroit entered the game with the top ranked offense and was averaging 35 points per game. It is the second Player of the Week Award for Judon in his career. He earned AFC Defensive Player of the Week honors following a Week 11 performance in 2017



while with Baltimore. Judon had a 9-yard sack of QB Jared Goff in the second quarter and then forced a fumble on a 13-yard sack later in the second quarter that was returned for a 59-yard touchdown.

- Devin McCourty enters the 2022 season tied with Ty Law for the second-most Pro Bowl invitations as a Patriots defensive back with four. Only CB Mike Haynes (6) had more Pro Bowl nods as a Patriots defensive back.
- McCourty (33) became the third Patriots player to reach 30 interceptions with his pick at Atlanta on Nov. 18, 2021. He is third on the alltime interception list, behind Ty Law (36) and Raymond Clayborn (36).
- McCourty has played in 197 career regular season games, tied for the 6th-most games in New England history. If he plays in all 17 games in 2022 he will have played in the 5th-most games in New England history with 205.

- McCourty has 551 interception return yards in his regular season career and became the third Patriot with 500 return yards at the NY Jets (9/19 behind Ty Law (583) and Raymond Clayborn (555).
- McCourty tied Brett Favre and Gene Upshaw for the fourth-most postseason starts in NFL history with 24 after starting in the 2022 Wild Card game at Buffalo.

McCourty has 197 starts, third in team history to the 283 by Tom Brady and 212 by Bruce Armstrong. With three more starts, he will become the third Patriots player to start in 200 career games. Entering 2022, only 89 players in NFL history have 200 starts and only 23 have done so with one team.

THE RISE OF THE GREEN GOBLIN

- DB Jalen Mills has embraced his nickname "The Green Goblin." The origins of the nickname started out as a joke during his rookie season with Philadelphia when he dyed his hair green. Mills is not sure whether it was a coach or the media, but the spiderman villain nickname stuck.
- Said Mills, "It just kind of came from my rookie year and then just throughout my years playing for the Eagles, my style of play. That's what I get it from. It's kind of something that I stuck with."

A NUMBER CHANGE WITH A STORY

Late in the Eagles' eventual Super Bowl-winning season, Jalen's Uncle Uhkoto lost his battle with cancer. The once-close relatives had long since drifted apart and fallen out of touch. As a result, only in the wake of Uhkoto's death did Jalen learned that his uncle – a man who otherwise shunned sports – could quote his nephew's NFL statistics chapter and verse: every pass breakup, every interception, every tackle, every game, Uhkoto was keeping track of Jalen. The discovery left him with a heavy heart.

"It kind of broke me down," Jalen revealed, "because we had grown apart. We were close at one point in time. It took that moment for me to realize, this is a man I looked up to as a younger kid, and now he was looking up to me, keeping up with sports that he didn't even care about. So, I wanted to honor him in my own quiet way."

In 2021, Mills would get that opportunity. After signing his free-agent contract with New England, Jalen learned that the NFL would relax its jersey number restrictions, allowing certain positions beyond kicker, punter, and quarterback to wear single-digits on their uniforms.

Mills, who wore 31 and 21 at times as an Eagle, chose No. 2 here in New England. You see, almost no one ever called Uhkoto – pronounced uh-COO-too – by his full name. They preferred his shortened nickname: Two.



VERSATILITY

- "I'm one of the guys that when you ask me what position I play, I say 'defense.' I want to be able to line up everywhere, and most importantly, I want to be able to produce everywhere."
- Began his career in 2014 in San Diego focusing on special teams and was selected to his first Pro Bowl in 2018 as a special teamer. His 2018 Pro Bowl berth was the only one that Matthew Slater did not get voted to since 2011.
- Started all 16 games at safety in 2020 for the Patriots and led the team in tackles with a career-high 107.

ADRIAN PHILLIPS HAS FIRST CAREER PICK SIX

 Phillips picked off a fourth quarter pass from QB Justin Herbert and returned it 26 yards for a touchdown at the L.A. Chargers on Oct. 31, 2021. It was Phillips' first career touchdown. It is the Patriots first interception returned for a touchdown since DB Devin McCourty returned a pick 43 yards for a touchdown at Seattle on Sept. 20, 2020. He was named AFC Defensive Player of the Week for his performance.

PHILLIPS HAS FIRST CAREER TWO-INTERCEPTION GAME

 Phillips finished with two interceptions against the Chargers. He also picked off Herbert in the second quarter. He earned AFC Defensive Player of the Week honors for his effort.

ASK AND JAHLANI RECEIVED

LB Jahlani Tavai starred in high school as a nose guard. He was undersized and di not attaract attention of many colleges. But after finding out one of the English teachers at his high school was the son of then-Hawaii coach Norm Chow, he reached out to the teacher, Cameron Chow, and asked if Cameron could tell his dad scout Jahlani. Cameron followed up and passed along Jahlani's tape to his dad and the very next day Jahlani had a scholorship offer. According to Jahlani, his football career would have been over after high school if it wasn't for this connection.



LB JOSH UCHE HAS CAREER-HIGH THREE SACKS

LB Josh Uche registered a career-high three sacks after dropping Indianapolis (11/6)/22) QB Sam Ehlinger for a 2-yard loss and an 8-yard loss in the second quarter and a 1-yard sack in the third quarter. It is his second career game with at least two sacks. He had his first two-sack game after registering two fourth quarter sacks at the New York Jets on Sept. 19, 2021.



FIRST TIME TEAM CAPTAIN

• Deatrich Wise Jr. was named a team captain for the first time in his career in 2022.

DEATRICH WISE JR. RECORDS THREE SACKS VS. BALTIMORE

- Wise had his first career three-sack game after a 3-yard sack in the first quarter and an 8-yard sack and a 1-yard sack in the second quarter vs. Baltimore on Sept. 25, 2022. His previous best was 1½ sacks, which he accomplished three times – vs. Buffalo (12/24/17), vs. Houston (9/9/18) and vs. Cleveland (11/14/21).
- Wise is the fourth Patriots player to register three sacks in a half. DL Henry Thomas had three sacks in the first half at St. Louis on Dec. 13, 1998. LB Tully Banta-Cain had three sacks in the second half at Buffalo on Dec. 20, 2009 and DL Jarvis Green had three sacks in the second half at Cincinnati on Oct. 1, 2006.

2022 RON BURTON COMMUNITY SERVICE AWARD WINNER

 Wise was honored with the 2022 Ron Burton Community Service Award at the Patriots Premiere this past September for his dedication to serving his community. After receiving the award, Wise said, "You don't go out in the community for the gratification. You just do it because it's in your heart to do. It's an honor to win an award of this prestige and to be in the same group as everybody who's won that before and have my name with the Burton family.".





BAILEY SETS TEAM RECORD

 P Jake Bailey finished first in the NFL with 45.6 net yards per punt in 2020, a new single-season team record. The previous record was 41.5 by Zoltan Mesko in 2011. His gross punt average of 48.7 is also a team record, besting the 46.5 gross average by Mesko in 2011. His 45.6 net yards per punt is second all-time in NFL history in a single season to the 46.0 net average by Johnny Hekker in 2016 with the Rams.

DIMINISHING [PUNT] RETURNS

 Bailey's punting in 2020 allowed a total of just 71 punt return yards on 12 returns. It is the fewest punt return yards allowed by the Patriots in team history and the seventh-fewest punt return yards allowed in a season in NFL history. The 12 punt returns allowed are third in NFL history and second in team history to the 11 by New England in 2008.

2022 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- K Nick Folk kicked four field goals vs. Indianapolis (11/6/22) to move past Tony Franklin (93) into fifth place on New England's all-time list with 95 field goals. John Smith is fourth with 128 career field goals.
- Folk extended his NFL record to 64 consecutive regular season field goals made under 50 yards at Cleveland on Oct. 16, 2022 before the streak ended on a missed 45-yard field goal in the fourth quarter. He moved past K Ryan Succop of Tennessee (56 straight - 2014-17). Folk has kicked 52 straight field goals under 40 yards. His last miss was a 31-yarder on Oct. 5, 2017 vs. New England when he played for Tampa Bay. The NFL record is 70 by Justin Tucker.

LOCAL LINEAGE

 Folk's mother is a direct descendant of William Bradford, a founder, settler and longtime governor of the Plymouth Colony settlement. Bradford was also a passenger on the *Mayflower*'s original voyage to America.

FOLK HERO

Folk kicked his second game-winning field goal as time expired in 2020, connecting on a 50-yard field goal against Arizona (11/29/20) to give the Patriots a 20-17 win. He had a 51-yard game-winning field goal as time expired at the New York Jets on Nov. 9, 2020 to give the Patriots a 30-27 victory. He is the first NFL kicker with two game-winning field goals as time expired in a single season. Overall, he has three game-winning field goal as time expired as time expired. He also kicked a 53-yard game-winning field goal as time expired at Buffalo on Oct. 8, 2007, when he was a rookie with the Dallas Cowboys.

LONGEST GAME-WINNING KICKS

 Folk owns the record for the two longest field goals as time expired in franchise history with a 50-yard game-winning field goal vs. Arizona (11/29/20) and a 51-yarder he hit at N.Y. Jets (11/9/20). The previous longest game-winning kick as time expired was 48 yards by Adam Vinatieri in Super Bowl XXXVI vs. the St. Louis Rams.

FOLK SETS TEAM RECORD FOR CONSECUTIVE FIELD GOALS

Folk set the team record with 33 consecutive field goals after connecting on field goals of 46, 49, 32 and 26 yards at the New York (9/19/21) and extended that mark to 36 straight field goals with a 27-yarder vs. Tampa Bay before missing a 56-yarder in the fourth quarter. He passed Stephen Gostkowski, who connected on 31 straight field goals. After missing his first two field goals of the 2020 season, he kicked 36 straight field goals. Folk's previous longest streak was 23 straight field goals in 2013 when he played for the New York Jets. The NFL record is 44 straight field goals by Adam Vinatieri.

- Slater earned his 10th Pro Bowl invitation in 2021, extending his NFL record for most Pro Bowl selections as a special teamer. Slater has the second-most Pro Bowl selections as a Patriot with 10. Tom Brady holds the franchise record with 14. He is one of three active players to be selected to 10 Pro Bowls, joining Tom Brady (15) and Aaron Rodgers (10).
- Slater is in his 15th season with the Patriots in 2022, tied with Troy Brown and Julius Adams, behind only the 20 by Tom Brady and the 16 by Steve Grogan.

ELECTED TEAM LEADER

- Slater has been named to 10 Pro Bowls for his special teams work, but perhaps more revealing of his value to New England is the fact that he was elected a captain by his teammates for the 12th straight season in 2022.
- He shared what it means to be a captain in a story published by *The Boston Globe.* "You have to be able to put others before yourself. Being a captain and leadership is about serving, and to me, that means a great deal of sacrifice – putting aside personal agendas for the greater common goal. Leadership is equated with sacrifice. I think you have to be willing to do whatever it takes for the unit to succeed. I think you need to lead by example. A lot of times, it's about what you do, not what you say."

Slater has earned 10 Pro Bowl invitations (2011-17, 19-21) as a special teams player. Steve Tasker (1987, 90-95) has the second-most with seven Pro Bowl selections. Slater is also the only special teams player to earn seven consecutive Pro Bowls, which he did from 2011-17.

Slater was voted to the Pro Bowl for seven straight seasons from 2011-17 and three more from 2019-21. Those 10 selections are three more than the seven that his father earned with the L.A. Rams. SLATER'S EMERGENCE WAS SPECIAL

Bill Belichick acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eight-man rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there — fourth-and-short, where they're trying to protect the box — but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts."

SLATER'S SCORE

During a 2007 game against Arizona State, UCLA's Matthew Slater returned a kickoff 89 yards for the final touchdown of his collegiate career. In the Patriots 16-10 win over Buffalo on Sept. 29, 2019, DB J.C. Jackson blocked a punt, which Slater returned 11 yards for his first NFL touchdown, 12 seasons after his last touchdown.

From Sickle Cell to Education to Criminal Justice to Healthcare Equity, Devin's work is prolific. He has steered the New England Patriots' Players Social Justice Fund since it was established at the end of the 2018 season, and has served as a Players Coalition Task Force Member and Chair of its Education & Economic Advancement Committee since its founding in 2018. Devin serves as a member of the Board of Boston Medical Center and on the Advisory Board of Boston Uncornered, which redirects gang-involved individuals from violence and incarceration to education and careers. Devin is an advocate for a number of other issues that affect the community. His positive and meaningful impact on others has been immeasurable.



- The Josh Uche Foundation was created to empower and provide at-risk youth with educational advancement, resource programming, mentorship, and mental health empowerment.
- Josh plans to start an annual football camp that incorporates yoga and athletic mobility to show young athletes that there's more to physical fitness than just lifting weights and running fast.
- On top of the introduction of the football camps, Josh Uche is currently in the process of developing a mental health app for athletes.



 The Chauxdown Foundation empowers at-risk youth through fitness, literacy and educational programming. The foundation has helped serve and impact over 2,000 youth in the Miami, Florida and Plaquemine, Louisiana communities. Chauxdown has impacted the community in a variety of ways, from giving children toys to play with, to making sure they have the proper school supplies to receive proper education at school.



- Wise Up & Co. is a foundation started by Patriots defensive lineman Deatrich Wise Jr. and his brothers, Daniel and Solomon Wise. The brothers started the foundation to leverage their name off the field with the aim to have a positive impact on the community.
- Deatrich has been a community pillar by supporting organizations that share the same mission, to assist youth, fight hunger, and celebrate individuality. He has been involved with Big Brothers, Big Sisters and on a yearly basis, runs a Thanksgiving and Christmas drive to support those in the local Massachusetts community.

- During the offseason, Trent visited the Old Colony YMCA for their final Digital Design Class put on in partnership with Ticker and Create. TB77 Cares sponsored the event where students learned how to use the game development platform, The Unreal Engine, to design their own 2D and 3D games.
- Over 450 kids in the Auburn City Schools District face food insecurity in the summer months. Trent was asked by his former professor at Florida if he wanted to be part of the event run by the Auburn College of Human Sciences. Trent agreed to match dollar for dollar of all donations to the Summer Sustenance Project that helped kids get their proper nutrition. Kids were able to pick up a week's worth of food and snacks each week throughout the summer.



- The Children's Tumor Foundation has a special place in Patriots kicker Nick Folk's heart. His cousin, Blake, has neurofibromatosis (NF), a genetic disorder that causes tumors to grow on nerves throughout the body. The term NF represents three distinct disorders: NF1, NF2 and schwannomatosis. For Blake, his NF impacts him most where his optic nerves cross in his brain. He currently has 5 brain tumors.
- Though NF affects over 2.5 million people worldwide, it is still relatively unknown in the general public. The Children's Tumor Foundation's MAKE NF VISIBLE campaign brings awareness and inclusion to all NF patients. Those with visible signs of NF struggle to be seen as more than just their NF, while patients whose NF is invisible struggle to make others understand. - The Slater Family Foundation was established in 2020 by Matthew Slater and his wife Dr. Shahrzad Slater. The Foundation aims at empowering individuals, churches, schools, and community groups in all aspects of health and well-being including: spiritual, relational, medical, educational, economical, environmental and to the Glory of God.
- In addition to the Foundation, Matthew and Shahrzad have over the years supported a range of non-profit organizations including; International Justice Mission, Compassion International, Ron Burton Training Village, World Vision, the ELISHA Project, Barnabas Fund, Voice of the Martyrs, and Open Doors.

New England has qualified for the playoffs 28 times in the team's 62-year history. The Patriots have earned 22 of those playoff berths in the 28 seasons since Rob-

ert Kraft purchased the team in 1994. New England has won 22 division crowns overall (21 AFC East crowns) and has qualified as a Wild Card team on five occasions (1976, '85, '94, '98 and 2021). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 as part of a 16-team tournament following a players' strike.

The Patriots have staged two historic come-from-behind victories over the past several seasons:

Bill Belichick coached the Patriots back from a 25-point deficit to win Super Bowl LI. A comeback of that magnitude is extremely rare. There had been 2,656 games in which a team led by 25 points or more in NFL history, including the postseason. Teams leading by 25 had recorded 2,647 wins, seven losses and two ties, a winning percentage of .997.

New England came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos, 34-31, in overtime in a Sunday Night Football matchup on Nov. 24, 2013, marking the largest regular season comeback win in team history, after trailing 24-0 at halftime.

New England's previous best comeback win was from a 23-0 deficit to win, 38-23, vs. Seattle (09/16/84). The Patriots also came back from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, 23-22 (12/21/96). The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently vs. Buffalo (01/01/12).

Since the 1994 season, the Patriots have won 68.3 percent of their regular season games (313-145), which is the highest winning percentage in men's major American professional sports over that period. Since 1994, there have been 148 franchises that have fielded teams in the five major American sports leagues (NFL, MLB, NBA, NHL and MLS) and completed more than two full seasons of competition. On the women's side the Toronto Six (24-4-1) and the Boston Pride (85-27-9) of the PHF hold the two highest winning percentages of all women's professional sports teams.
