NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (1-2) AT GREEN BAY PACKERS (2-1)

Sunday, October 2, 2022 • Lambeau Field (81,041) • 4:25 p.m. ET

The New England Patriots will be on the road for the third time in four games when they travel to Green Bay to face the Packers on Sunday. It will be the Patriots first trip to Green Bay since the 2014 season. The Patriots will play against the NFC North for three of their next four games, starting with a trip to Lambeau Field this Sunday. The Patriots will return home to host Detroit on Oct. 9 and then will play Chicago in a Monday Night Football contest at Gillette Stadium on Oct. 24. The Patriots final contest against an NFC North team will be on Thanksgiving night when the team travels to Minnesota to face the Vikings.

BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be broadcast by **CBS** and can be seen locally on **WBZ-TV Channel 4**. **Jim Nantz** will handle play-by-play duties with **Tony Romo** as the color analyst. **Tracy Wolfson** will report from the sidelines. The game will be produced by **Jim Rikhooff** and directed by **Mike Arnold**.

NATIONAL RADIO: This week's game will be broadcast to a national audience by **Sports USA**. **Larry Kahn** will call the game with **Mark Carrier** providing analysis.

LOCAL RADIO: **98.5 The Sports Hub** is the flagship station for the Patriots Radio Network. A complete listing of the network's 33 stations can be found in this press release on page 60. Play-by-play broadcaster **Bob Socci** will call the action along with former Patriots quarterback **Scott Zolak**, who will provide color analysis. The games are produced by **Marc Cappello**.

NICK FOLK SETS NFL RECORD

K Nick Folk extended his streak to 57 straight field goals made under 50 yards with a 35-yard field goal in the second quarter vs. Baltimore last week to set the NFL record. He had been tied with Ryan Succop (2014-17 with Tennessee) with 56 straight field goals under 50 yards made. Folk's last miss from inside the 50-yard line was a 45-yard field goal attempt in the 2020 season-opener vs. Miami on Sept. 13.

PATRIOTS AT GREEN BAY PACKERS

SERIES HISTORY



The New England Patriots will play the Green Bay Packers for the first time since a 31-17 win at Gillette Stadium on Nov. 4, 2018 and will travel to Green Bay for the first time since a 26-21 loss on Nov. 30, 2014. That game was the team's last loss of the that season en route to the Super Bowl XLIX title.

This week's game will be just the fourth visit by New England to Lambeau Field. The Patriots own a 1-2 record in their previous three visits to Green Bay. In 1988, the Patriots were on the road against Green Bay but the game was played in Milwaukee. The Patriots dropped the game, 45-3.

The Patriots lead the regular season series with Green Bay, 6-5. Green Bay beat New England in the one postseason meeting between the two teams, a 35-21 Packers victory in Super Bowl XXXI at the Louisiana Superdome in New Orleans on Jan. 26, 1997.

The Patriots first regular season home victory under Robert Kraft was on Oct. 2, 1994 in a 17-16 win against the Packers at Foxboro Stadium.

The Patriots hosted the Packers in a Sunday Night Football game on Dec. 19, 2010 and won, 31-27. The game featured a 71-yard kickoff return by OL Dan Connolly to the 4-yard line in the second quarter. According to Elias Sports Bureau, it remains the longest kickoff return by an offensive lineman in NFL history. The run by Connolly topped the 48-yard touchdown return by Atlanta's Mal Snyder in 1969. The previous longest kickoff return for a Patriots offensive lineman was a 27-yard return by G Stephen Neal on Nov. 30, 2008, vs. Pittsburgh.

Folk's last miss from inside the 50-yard line was a 45-yard field goal attempt in the 2020 season-opener vs. Miami on Sept. 13.

FOLK ADDS A 50-YARD FIELD GOAL

Folk connected on a 50-yard field goal at the end of the first half. It was his 9th 50-yard field goal as a member of the Patriots to move out of a tie with Adam Vinatieri for sole possession of second place on the Patriots all-time list, behind the 25 by Stephen Gostkowski.

JONES MOVES INTO 7TH PLACE

QB Mac Jones entered the game needing 11 passing yards to move past Hugh Millen (4,276) into 7th place on the Patriots all-time passing list and reached the milestone on a 31-yard pass to WR DeVante Parker on the Patriots first offensive play of the game. He passed for 321 yards and now has 4,587 career passing yards. Jim Plunkett is in 6th place on the list with 9,932 passing yards.

As a rookie, Jones led all rookie quarterbacks with a 67.6 completion percentage and tied an NFL rookie for most games with a completion percentage of 70 or higher. 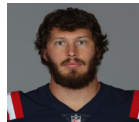

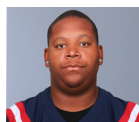

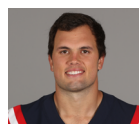

Under Kraft's leadership since he purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports.

Kraft has led the two most dominant decades in NFL history in terms of overall wins – 141 (2010-19) and 126 (2000-09).

Kraft is the most successful owner since he purchased the team in 1994 in terms of wins (342), division titles (19), winning percentage (.683), playoff wins (33) and playoff seasons (22).



Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. In his 28 seasons of ownership, he has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what many observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.238 pct.), the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (19), conference crowns (10) and Super Bowl championships (6) than any other NFL team. Additionally, the Patriots have achieved the most winning seasons (24) and are tied with Pittsburgh for the fewest losing seasons (3) since Kraft assumed ownership beginning in 1994. Super Bowl LIII was the 10th Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has appeared in more than four Super Bowls. In Kraft's 28 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 22 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons, and finished with a winning record 24 times.

A WINNING TRADITION I

Robert Kraft won his 300th game overall as owner of the New England Patriots against Miami on Sept. 30, 2018. Kraft reached the milestone in his 25th NFL season and in his 432nd game, the fastest an owner has reached the milestone. Al Davis of the Raiders accomplished the feat in 495 games (31 seasons) while Pat Bowlen of Denver reached 300 career wins in 501 games (30 seasons).

KRAFT PASSES OTHER OWNERS

The Patriots have 342 wins overall under Robert Kraft. He has produced more victories than every other Patriots owner combined. Under Kraft, the Patriots are 342-159 overall since he purchased the team in 1994. Kraft's predecessors in the owner's office went 225-276-9 in the 34 years prior to his purchase of the team.

CONTINUITY BREEDS SUCCESS

New England is the first team in NFL history to win six Super Bowls with the same owner (Robert Kraft), head coach (Bill Belichick) and quarterback (Tom Brady).

PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 28 times in their 62-year history. Twenty-two of those playoff berths have come in the 28 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. - The New England Patriots are tied with the Pittsburgh Steelers for the most Super Bowl wins in the NFL with six.

- The Patriots have 567 total victories, the fourth-most wins since 1960, behind the 578 wins by Pittsburgh, the 575 wins by Dallas and the 569 wins by Green Bay.
- New England (1,011) played their 1,000th game in franchise history (regular season and playoffs combined) against Cleveland on Nov. 14, 2021 and became the first original AFL team to play in 1,000 games.
- With rookie free agents DL DaMarcus Mitchell and DB Brenden Schooler making the initial 53-man roster in 2022, the Patriots have now had a rookie free agent make the opening day roster for 19 straight seasons, tied with Denver for the longest streak in the NFL
- The Patriots have finished in the top 10 for fewest points allowed in each of the last 10 seasons (2012-2021) to tie Tampa Bay, who became the last team to reach 10 straight seasons (1996-2005) for the fewest points allowed. 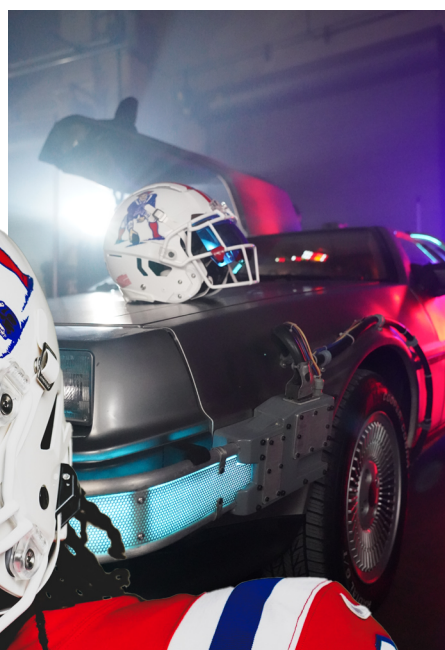

PATRIOTS THROWING IT BACK TO THE FUTURE

The Patriots announced the return of the red throwback uniforms late in the spring. The team will wear the uniform vs. Detroit on Oct. 9 and vs. Buffalo on Dec. 1. The uniform's design, a red jersey with timeless blue and white stripes across the sleeves and white numbers outlined in blue, is based on the uniform worn from 1984-1992 and sporadically worn from 1994-2012 as an alternate uniform. In 2013, the NFL announced a rule mandating every club stick to one helmet all season. Unfortunately for the Patriots, this meant sidelining the throwback uniforms as the silver helmet with the modern-day logo did not feel right to blend with the classic throwback threads. In June of 2021, a memo was sent to teams announcing the approval of a second helmet for the following season. The rule change allowed the Patriots to complete the throwback uniforms with a white helmet, white face mask and the Pat the Patriot logo to officially revive the red throwback uniforms for the upcoming season. The announcement of the long-awaited revival included the original DeLorean from the Back to the Future movie franchise and players repping the throwback threads. The social media posts instantly generated national attention as fans and media alike welcomed back the beloved red jerseys.

Bill Belichick is the only head coach in NFL history to win six Super Bowl titles. He won more games overall (141) during a 10-year stretch (2010-19) than any other coach in NFL history. - Harris enters the 2022 season with eight career 100-yard rushing games and needs two more to become the fifth New England running back to reach at least 10 career 100-yard rushing games, joining Jim Nance (17), Curtis Martin (14), Corey Dillon (11) and Sam Cunningham (11).

- Harris had 929 yards rushing with 15 TDs in 2021, moving past the 641 yards and 5 TDs he had in 2020. He tied for second in the NFL with the 15 touchdowns in 2021.

- Harris scored on a career-long 64-yard touchdown run in the first quarter at Buffalo (12/6/21). Harris's previous long was a 41-yard run on Oct. 5, 2020 at Kansas City. JONES FINISHES WITH AN 80 PERCENT PASS COMPLETION FOR SECOND STRAIGHT WEEK

- Jones completed 22-of-26 passes for an .846 pass completion percentage at Atlanta (11/18/21). It is tied for the fourth-best in team history. Jones was 19-of-23 for an .826 completion percentage vs. Cleveland on Nov. 14, the sixth-highest in team history. Jones is the first rookie quarterback in NFL history and the first New England player to ever complete at least 80 percent of his passes in back-to-back games (min. 20 attempts). - Meyers, who threw touchdown passes in Weeks 10 and 17 in 2020, became the fourth wide receiver with two touchdown passes in a single season in the Super Bowl era, joining Rod Gardner (2003), Antwaan Randle El (2010) and Odell Beckham Jr. (2018).

MEYERS COMPLETES TWO PASSES IN ONE GAME

- Meyers completed two passes vs. Tampa Bay on Oct. 3, 2021. He caught a backwards pass from QB Mac Jones and then threw across the field to RB Brandon Bolden, who managed a 15-yard gain in the second quarter. He completed a 30-yard pass to WR Nelson Agholor in the fourth quarter on a flea flicker. - Meyers has thrown for two touchdown passes but scored his first NFL receiving touchdown on an 11-yard pass from QB Brian Hoyer in the fourth quarter against Cleveland (11/14/21).

MEYERS USING HIS ARM

- Meyers threw two touchdown passes in 2020. He completed a 24-yard touchdown pass to RB Rex Burkhead vs. Baltimore (11/15) and a 19-yard touchdown pass to QB Cam Newton vs. N.Y. Jets (1/3). Overall, Patriots wide receivers completed four passes in 2020. WR Julian Edelman also completed two passes. The four pass completions by wide receivers are the most in team history. NEWLY ENSHRINED PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME RICHARD SEYMOUR SEES GREATNESS AHEAD FOR CHRISTIAN BARMORE

- For a defensive lineman, if Richard Seymour's is in your corner, there are few better compliments or endorsements.
- "I think he has a ton of ability, natural ability, and he plays hard," Seymour told the Herald recently. "I think he's going to be a problem for (opposing teams) for a long time to come. Hopefully he stays healthy and continues on the path he's on. I think he has a really bright future."

SECOND-MOST QUARTERBACK PRESSURES

- Barmore posted the second-most quarterback pressures for a first-year defensive tackle since 2006, according to Pro Football Focus. His 48 pressures were two more than Aaron Donald had during his rookie season.



2021 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- LB Ja'Whaun Bentley set single-season career-highs with 91 tackles and 1½ sacks in 2020. He surpassed that total with 108 total tackles in 2021.



Ja'Whaun and his family were homeless starting his freshman year of high school, living with one set of grandparents, then the other, then an aunt. Ja'Whaun and his brother slept on couches and floors at times over the course of several years. Once Ja'Whaun entered the NFL, he was able to secure permanent housing for his family.

- LB Matthew Judon led the team with a career-high 12 1/2 sacks in 2021 and can become the fourth Patriots player with back-to-back 10-plus sack totals, joining Garin Veris (10 in 1985 and 11 in 1986), Andre Tippett (18 1/2 in 1984 and 16 1/2 in 1985) and Tony McGee (12 in 1977, 11 1/2 in 1978 and 10 1/2 in 1979). Judon can join Tippett (3), McGee (3), Veris (2) and Jones (2) as the only Patriots to register more than one double-digit sack total.

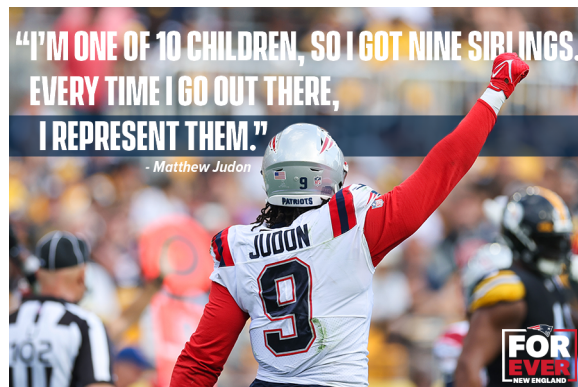

He had 2 ½ sacks vs. New Orleans on Sept. 26. His career-best is 3 sacks vs. Oakland on Nov. 25, 2018, when he played for Baltimore.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2022

- Devin McCourty enters the 2022 season tied with Ty Law for the second-most Pro Bowl invitations as a Patriots defensive back with four. Only CB Mike Haynes (6) had more Pro Bowl nods as a Patriots defensive back.
- McCourty (31) became the third Patriots player to reach 30 interceptions with his pick at Atlanta on Nov. 18, 2021. He is third on the all-time interception, behind Ty Law (36) and Raymond Clayborn (36).
- McCourty has played in 191 career regular season games, the 10th-most games in New England history. If he plays in all 17 games in 2022 he will have played in the 5th-most games in New England history with 205.
- McCourty has 515 interception return yards in his regular season career and became the third Patriot with 500 return yards at the NY Jets (9/19 behind Ty Law (583) and Raymond Clayborn (555)).
- McCourty tied Brett Favre and Gene Upshaw for the fourth-most post-season starts in NFL history with 24 after starting in the 2022 Wild Card game at Buffalo.

- McCourty has 191 starts, third in team history to the 283 by Tom Brady and 212 by Bruce Armstrong. With 11 more starts, he will become the third Patriots player to start in 200 career games. Entering 2022, only 86 players in NFL history have 200 starts.

INCHING CLOSER

- Devin McCourty is fourth all-time in New England history with 37 total takeaways. He needs three total takeaways to join Raymond Clayborn (44), Fred Marion (42) and Ty Law (40) as the only players in team history with 40 total takeaways.
- McCourty tied for fourth in the NFL with five interceptions in 2019, his third career season with five-plus interceptions. That mark tied Marcus Peters and Earl Thomas for most seasons with five-plus interception seasons since 2010. Additionally, McCourty's 31 regular season interceptions since he entered the league in 2010 are tied for the third-most in the NFL over that span.

- McCourty has played in the most defensive snaps since he entered the NFL in 2010 with 11,622 defensive snaps. Malcolm Jenkins (New Orleans and Philadelphia) is second with 11,407 defensive snaps.

McCOURTD

- McCourty has four career touchdowns following a return of a blocked field goal for a touchdown at L.A. Chargers (12/6/20) and his 43-yard interception return for a touchdown at Seattle (9/20/20). McCourty also had an 84-yard interception return for a touchdown at Buffalo in 2018 and a 104-yard kickoff return vs. N.Y. Jets in 2012.

IN GOOD COMPANY

- McCourty earned Associated Press All-Pro Second Team honors at safety in 2013 and 2016. He also earned Second Team All-Pro Honors as a rookie in 2010 when he played cornerback. McCourty joined Pro Football Hall of Famers Rod Woodson and Ronnie Lott as the only NFL players to earn All-Pro honors at both safety and cornerback.



THE RISE OF THE GREEN GOBLIN

- DB Jalen Mills has embraced his nickname "The Green Goblin." The origins of the nickname started out as a joke during his rookie season with Philadelphia when he dyed his hair green. Mills is not sure whether it was a coach or the media but the spiderman villain nickname was inspired and took off with the fans.
- Said Mills, "It just kind of came from my rookie year and then just throughout my years playing for the Eagles, my style of play. That's what I get it from. It's kind of something that I stuck with."

A NUMBER CHANGE WITH A STORY

Late in the Eagles' eventual Super Bowl-winning season, Jalen's Uncle Uhkoto lost his battle with cancer. The once-close relatives had long since drifted apart and fallen out of touch. As a result, only in the wake of Uhkoto's death did Jalen learn that his uncle – a man who otherwise shunned sports – could quote his nephew's NFL statistics chapter and verse: every pass breakup, every interception, every tackle, every game, Uhkoto was keeping track of Jalen. The discovery left him with a heavy heart.

"It kind of broke me down," Jalen revealed, "because we had grown apart. We were close at one point in time. It took that moment for me to realize, this is a man I looked up to as a younger kid, and now he was looking up to me, keeping up with sports that he didn't even care about. So, I wanted to honor him in my own quiet way."

In 2021, Mills would get that opportunity. After signing his free-agent contract with New England this past spring, Jalen learned that the NFL would relax its jersey number restrictions, allowing certain positions beyond kicker, punter, and quarterback to wear single-digits on their uniforms.

Mills, who wore 31 and 21 at times as an Eagle, chose No. 2 here in New England. You see, almost no one ever called Uhkoto – pronounced uh-COO-too – by his full name. They preferred his shortened nickname: Two.



VERSATILITY

- "I'm one of the guys that when you ask me what position I play, I say 'defense.' I want to be able to line up everywhere, and most importantly, I want to be able to produce everywhere."
- Began his career in 2014 in San Diego focusing on special teams and was selected to his first Pro Bowl in 2018 as a special teamer. His 2018 Pro Bowl berth was the only one that Matthew Slater did not get voted to since 2011.
- Started all 16 games at safety in 2020 for the Patriots and led the team in tackles with a career-high 107.

ADRIAN PHILLIPS HAS FIRST CAREER PICK SIX

- Phillips picked off a fourth quarter pass from QB Justin Herbert and returned it 26 yards for a touchdown at the L.A. Chargers on Oct. 31, 2021. It was Phillips' first career touchdown. It is the Patriots first interception returned for a touchdown since DB Devin McCourty returned a pick 43 yards for a touchdown at Seattle on Sept. 20, 2020. He was named AFC Defensive Player of the Week for his performance.

PHILLIPS HAS FIRST CAREER TWO-INTERCEPTION GAME

- Phillips finished with two interceptions against the Chargers. He also picked off Herbert in the second quarter. He earned AFC Defensive Player of the Week honors for his effort.

BAILEY SETS TEAM RECORD

- P Jake Bailey finished first in the NFL with 45.6 net yards per punt in 2020, a new single-season team record. The previous record was 41.5 by Zoltan Mesko in 2011. His gross punt average of 48.7 is also a team record, besting the 46.5 gross average by Mesko in 2011. His 45.6 net yards per punt is second all-time in NFL history in a single season to the 46.0 net average by Johnny Hekker in 2016 with the Rams.

DIMINISHING [PUNT] RETURNS

- Bailey's punting in 2020 allowed a total of just 71 punt return yards on 12 returns. It is the fewest punt return yards allowed by the Patriots in team history and the seventh-fewest punt return yards allowed in a season in NFL history. The 12 punt returns allowed are third in NFL history and second in team history to the 11 by New England in 2008.

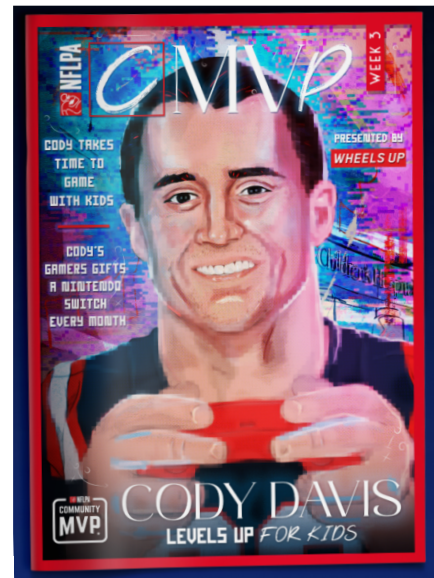

DAVIS IN DOUBLE-DIGIT SPECIAL TEAMS TACKLES

- Cody Davis had a single-season personal high with a team-leading 15 special teams tackles, tied for the third-most in 2021. It is the third time in his career that he has reached double-digit special teams tackles. Davis had 10 special teams tackles in 2015 with St. Louis and 10 special teams tackles in 2018 with Jacksonville.
- Davis launched a program in partnership with Boston Children's Hospital called Cody's Gamers. Once a month, Cody sends a Nintendo Switch to a young patient. He then sets up a Zoom call to talk to the patient while they play a video game together. After each gaming session, Cody sends a personalized gift basket to the patient with items based on what the patient likes or mementos from games played during their Zoom call. For this work, Cody was named the Week Three NFLPA Community MVP.



WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2022

- K Nick Folk is in eighth place on the New England all-time scoring list with 326 total points and needs 83 total points to move past Stanley Morgan (408) into seventh place. Folk is also in sixth place on the New England all-time field goal list with 79 field goals and needs 15 field goals to move past Tony Franklin (93) into fifth place.
- Folk finished tied for first in the NFL in 2021 with Daniel Carlson of the Raiders with 150 points, and tied for second in the NFL with Chris Boswell of Pittsburgh with 36 field goals, behind the 40 by Carlson.
- Folk is one of 12 NFL players to have at least four seasons with 30 field goals.

- Folk has made 57 consecutive regular season field goals made under 50 yards to set the NFL record. He moved past K Ryan Succop of Tennessee (56 straight - 2014-17). Folk's last miss from inside the 50-yard line was a 45-yard field goal in the 2020 season-opener vs. Miami on Sept. 13.

LOCAL LINEAGE

- Folk's mother is a direct descendant of William Bradford, a founder, settler and longtime governor of the Plymouth Colony settlement. Bradford was also a passenger on the *Mayflower's* original voyage to America.

FOLK HERO

- Folk kicked his second game-winning field goal as time expired in 2020, connecting on a 50-yard field goal against Arizona (11/29/20) to give the Patriots a 20-17 win. He had a 51-yard game-winning field goal as time expired at the New York Jets on Nov. 9, 2020 to give the Patriots a 30-27 victory. He is the first NFL kicker with two game-winning field goals as time expired in a single season. Overall, he has three game-winning field goals as time expired. He also kicked a 53-yard game-winning field goal as time expired at Buffalo on Oct. 8, 2007, when he was a rookie with the Dallas Cowboys.

FOLK DIGS THE LONG BALL

- Folk owns the record for the two longest field goals as time expired in franchise history with a 50-yard game-winning field goal vs. Arizona (11/29/20) and a 51-yarder he hit at N.Y. Jets (11/9). The previous long was 48 yards by Adam Vinatieri in Super Bowl XXXVI vs. the St. Louis Rams.

FOLK SETS TEAM RECORD FOR CONSECUTIVE FIELD GOALS

- Folk set the team record with 33 consecutive field goals after connecting on field goals of 46, 49, 32 and 26 yards at the New York (9/19/21) and extended that mark to 36 straight field with a 27-yarder vs. Tampa Bay before missing a 56-yarder in the fourth quarter. He passed Stephen Gostkowski, who connected on 31 straight field goals. After missing his first two field goals of the 2020 season, he kicked 36 straight field goals. Folk's previous longest streak was 23 straight field goals in 2013 when he played for the New York Jets. The NFL record is 44 straight field goals by Adam Vinatieri.

FOLK DRILLS TWO 52-YARD FIELD GOALS

LONGEST FIELD GOALS AS A MEMBER OF THE PATRIOTS

- Folk drilled a 52-yard field goal in the second quarter and 52-yard field goal in the third quarter at Houston (10/10/21), his longest field goals as a member of the Patriots. His longest to that point as a Patriots was a 51-yard field goal on Dec. 21, 2019 vs. Buffalo and a 51-yard field goal at the New York Jets on Nov. 9, 2020. His career-long is a 56-yard field goal on Oct. 17, 2010 at Denver when he played for the New York Jets.

FOLK HAS SECOND NFL GAME WITH TWO 50-YARD FIELD GOALS

- Folk had his second NFL game with two 50-yard field goals at Houston (10/10/21). He had two 51-yard field goals on Nov. 18, 2012 at St. Louis as a member of the New York Jets.

FOLK BECOMES SECOND PATS PLAYER TO CONNECT ON TWO 50-YARD FIELD GOALS IN ONE GAME

- Folk is the second Patriots player to have two 50-yard field goals in one game after he drilled two 52-yard field goals at Houston on Oct. 10, 2021. K Stephen Gostkowski accomplished the feat three times, with the most recent happening against Oakland on Nov. 19, 2017 in Mexico City.

FOLK 4-FOR-4 ON FIELD GOALS IN FOUR 2021 ROAD GAME

- Folk connected on all four field goals (52, 52, 32 and 21) at Houston on Oct. 10, 2021 and was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week. He connected on four field goals in four of the eight 2021 road games - at the N.Y. Jets (9/19), at LA Chargers (10/31) and at Atlanta (11/18). Overall he has had at least four field goals in a game 14 times and six times as a member of the Patriots. He has connected on five field goals in a game three times, including making five field goals vs. Tennessee (11/28/21)

FOLK CONNECTS ON HIS 300TH CAREER FIELD GOAL

Folk (324) became the 35th NFL player to reach 300 career field goals following his 39-yard field goal in the second quarter at the New York Jets on Oct. 24, 2021. He became the fifth active kicker to reach 300 career field goals, joining Robbie Gould (424), Mason Crosby (372), Matt Prater (355) and Justin Tucker (329).

FOLK MAKES 5TH 50-YARD FIELD GOAL OF THE 2021 SEASON

- Folk connected on a 52-yard field goal vs. Tennessee on Nov. 28, 2021 in the fourth quarter. It was his fifth 50-yard field goal of the 2021 season to tie the team record for most 50-yard field goals in one season. Stephen Gostkowski had five 50-yard field goals in 2013.

HISTORICALLY ACCURATE

- Folk posted the third-best field goal percentage in New England history in 2020. He was 36-of-39 (92.3) in 2021.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2022

- Matthew Slater earned his 10th Pro Bowl invitation in 2021, extending his NFL record for most Pro Bowl selections as a special teamer. Slater has the second-most Pro Bowl selections as a Patriot with 10. Tom Brady holds the franchise record with 14. He is one of three active players to be selected to 10 Pro Bowls, joining Tom Brady (15) and Aaron Rodgers (10).
- Slater is in his 15th season with the Patriots in 2022, tied with Troy Brown and Julius Adams, behind only the 20 by Tom Brady and the 16 by Steve Grogan.
- Slater has played in 209 regular season games, behind the 285 by Tom Brady and the 212 by Bruce Armstrong. If he plays in all 17 games in 2022 he will move into second place with 223 games played in a Patriots uniform.
- Slater has played in 103 games at Gillette Stadium, the second-most games played at Gillette as a member of the Patriots, behind Tom Brady (134).
- Slater enters the 2022 season having played in 25 postseason games, tied for the eighth-most postseason games played in NFL history.

REGARDED HIGHLY BY HEAD COACH BILL BELICHICK

- ESPN Patriots beat writer Mike Reiss reported Bill Belichick complimenting Slater on being one of the best in special teams. [He] will go up there, in the kicking game, with [Tom] Brady on offense and [Lawrence] Taylor on defense. So I feel very, very fortunate to have the opportunity to coach all the players, but I'd say those three in particular."

- Slater played in his 200th career regular season game against the Atlanta Falcons (11/18/21). He is the fifth Patriots player to reach 200 regular season games.

ELECTED TEAM LEADER

- Slater has been named to 10 Pro Bowls for his special teams work, but perhaps more revealing of his value to New England is the fact that he was elected a captain by his teammates for the 12th straight season in 2022.
- He shared what it means to be a captain in a story published by *The Boston Globe*. "You have to be able to put others before yourself. Being a captain and leadership is about serving, and to me, that means a great deal of sacrifice – putting aside personal agendas for the greater common goal. Leadership is equated with sacrifice. I think you have to be willing to do whatever it takes for the unit to succeed. I think you need to lead by example. A lot of times, it's about what you do, not what you say."

ALL-STAR COMBINATION

- Slater was voted to the Pro Bowl for seven straight seasons from 2011-17 and three more from 2019-21. Those 10 selections are three more than the seven that his father earned with the L.A. Rams. The Slater family's 17 combined Pro Bowls are the second-most among father-son contingents to have been voted to at least one Pro Bowl each.

SLATER'S EMERGENCE WAS SPECIAL

- Bill Belichick acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eight-man rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there — fourth-and-short, where they're trying to protect the box — but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts."

SLATER'S SCORE

- During a 2007 game against Arizona State, UCLA's Matthew Slater returned a kickoff 89 yards for the final touchdown of his collegiate career. In the Patriots 16-10 win over Buffalo on Sept. 29, 2019, DB J.C. Jackson blocked a punt, which Slater returned 11 yards for his first NFL touchdown, 12 seasons after his last touchdown.

- Slater is the team's all-time leader in special teams tackles with 159. Since 1994, Slater is third among all NFL players, behind only Larry Izzo (205) and Keith Burns (197).

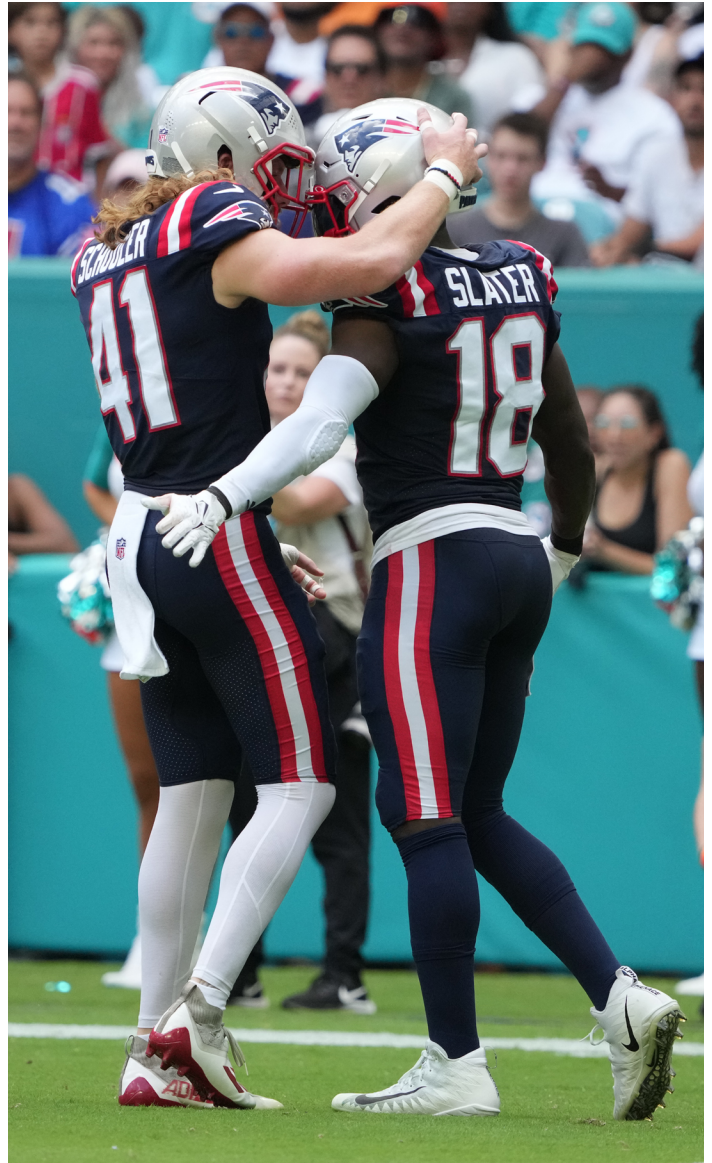

PLAYOFF BERTHS UNDER KRAFT

New England has qualified for the playoffs 28 times in the team's 62-year history. The Patriots have earned 22 of those playoff berths in the 28 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994. New England has won 22 division crowns overall (21 AFC East crowns) and has qualified as a Wild Card team on five occasions (1976, '85, '94, '98 and 2021). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 as part of a 16-team tournament following a players' strike.



ANNUAL ACHIEVEMENT

The Patriots are also the only team to win more than half of their games in 19 straight seasons since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, more than the 49ers (16 straight from 1983-98) and the Cowboys (16 straight from 1970-85).

The Patriots have now won nine or more games in 24 of the 28 seasons Robert Kraft has owned the team.

SCORING FLURRY

The Patriots scored three touchdowns in a 57-second span during the final two minutes of the first half against Chicago on Oct. 26, 2014, turning a 17-7 lead into a 38-7 cushion. It was the fastest three-touchdown flurry in the NFL since the Patriots had three touchdowns in 52 seconds against the New York Jets on Nov. 22, 2012. The Patriots are one of three teams to score three touchdowns in under a minute since the 1970 merger, and are the only team to have achieved the feat twice.

COMEBACKS FOR THE AGES

The Patriots have staged two historic come-from-behind victories over the past several seasons:

Bill Belichick coached the Patriots back from a 25-point deficit to win Super Bowl LI. A comeback of that magnitude is extremely rare. There had been 2,656 games in which a team led by 25 points or more in NFL history, including the postseason. Teams leading by 25 had recorded 2,647 wins, seven losses and two ties, a winning percentage of .997.

New England came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos, 34-31, in overtime in a Sunday Night Football matchup on Nov. 24, 2013, marking the largest regular season comeback win in team history, after trailing 24-0 at halftime.

New England's previous best comeback win was from a 23-0 deficit to win, 38-23, vs. Seattle (09/16/84). The Patriots also came back from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, 23-22 (12/21/96). The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently vs. Buffalo (01/01/12).
