NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (1-0) VS. SEATTLE SEAHAWKS (1-0)
Sunday, September 15, 2024 • Gillette Stadium (64,628) • 1:00 p.m. ET

The New England Patriots will host the Seattle Seahawks in the 2024 home-opener and will be looking for their first 2-0 start since the 2019 season. Last week, the Patriots traveled to Cincinnati and came away with a 16-10 victory. This week's game will mark the eighth time that the Patriots will play against an NFC team in the home-opener. The Patriots opened the season in 1978 at home vs. Washington and in 1985 at home vs. Green Bay. In 1993 the home-opener was vs. Detroit and in 1996 vs. Arizona. The Patriots opened at home in 2000 vs. Tampa Bay. In 2012 the home-opener was vs. Arizona. And in 2023 the Patriots opened the season at home vs. Philadelphia.

BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be broadcast by **FOX** and can be seen locally on **WFXT-TV** Channel 25. **Kenny Albert** will handle play-by-play duties with **Jonathan Vilma** as the color analyst. **Megan Olivi** will provide analysis from the sidelines. The game will be produced by **Fran Morison** and directed by **Bryan Lilley**.

LOCAL RADIO: **98.5 The Sports Hub** is the flagship station for the Patriots Radio Network. A complete listing of the network's 33 stations can be found in this press release on page 55. Play-by-play broadcaster **Bob Socci** will call the action along with former Patriots quarterback **Scott Zolak**, who will provide color analysis. The games are produced by **Marc Cappello**.

SEATTLE SCHEDULE QUIRK

The Seahawks are the only non-divisional team that the Patriots have played twice in the regular season in the same year. That scheduling oddity took place during the 1993 season, the only year in which the league's 16-game schedule was played over an 18-week span, and each team was allotted two bye weeks.

MAYO JOINS ROBERT KRAFT WITH FIRST WIN AT BENGALS

Head coach Jerod Mayo earned his first regular season win with the 16-10 win at Cincinnati. He joins Robert Kraft in earning their first regular season victories at Cincinnati. The Patriots gave Robert Kraft his first victory as Patriots owner with a 31-28 win over the Bengals at Riverfront Stadium in Cincinnati on Sept. 18, 1994.

The Patriots last two regular season games against Seattle were both Sunday Night Football games. The Patriots lost 31-24 on Nov. 13, 2016, in the last meeting between the two teams at Gillette Stadium.

This week's game marks the third time in team history that the Patriots will play their first home game of the season against Seattle. The Patriots opened at home against Seattle in 1984 and 1992, both in Week 3 of the season. The Patriots beat Seattle on Sept. 16, 1984, by a 38-23 score and lost 10-6 vs. Seattle on Sept. 20, 1992.

The Patriots and Seahawks played 12 times in a 14-year span from 1980-93, but have played only six times since then (2004, '08, '12, '16, '20 and Super Bowl XLIX).

Seattle is 1-1 all-time at Gillette Stadium.

Seahawks Offensive Coordinator Ryan Grubb and Assistant Wide Receivers Coach Tyson Prince worked closely with Patriots wide receiver Ja'Lynn Polk at the University of Washington.

Seahawks Wide Receivers Coach Frisman Jackson coached Patriots wideout Tyquan Thornton at Baylor in 2018 and 2019.

Patriots QB Drake Maye considers Seahawks QB Sam Howell one of his best friends after the two spent one year together at North Carolina. Maye took over as the starter for the Tar Heels in 2022 after Howell departed for the NFL following the 2021 season.

Patriots receiver K.J. Osborn and Seahawks tight end Tyler Mabry have been best friends since 6th grade. They played on the same middle school, high school and college team, and they were roommates during their time at Buffalo (2015-18).

TEAM NOTES

- A Patriots win this week against Seattle would give the Patriots their first 2-0 start to a season since 2019 when they started the year with an 8-0 record. The Patriots have started the season with a 2-0 record 15 times in team history.
- The Patriots defense allowed just 10 points in the season-opener. In 2023, the Patriots held their opponents to 10 or fewer points in four games. If the Patriots hold the Seahawks to 10 or fewer points this week, it will be the first time starting the season with two straight games with 10 or fewer points allowed since the 2019 season when they started the year with a 33-3 win vs. Pittsburgh followed by a 43-0 win at Miami.
- The Patriots did not have any turnovers in the season-opener at Cincinnati. If the Patriots repeat that feat this week, it will be the first time they do so in back-to-back games since the 2022 season when they went three-straight games without a turnover – vs. N.Y. Jets (11/20), at Minnesota (11/24) and vs. Buffalo (12/1). It would also be the first time without a turnover in back-to-back games to open the season since the 2017 season when they had no turnovers vs. Kansas City and at New Orleans.

RUNNING THE TABLE

The Patriots rushed for 170 yards last week in the win at Cincinnati. If the Patriots rush for 170 or more yards again this week, it would be the team's first time to do so in back-to-back games since the 2020 season when they had 250 yards rushing vs. Las Vegas (9/27) followed by 185 yards at Kansas City (10/5). The last time the Patriots opened the season with at least 170 yards rushing in their first two games was in 1974 with 196 yards rushing vs. Miami (9/15) followed by 173 yards rushing at the New York Giants (9/22).



JEROD MAYO HEAD COACH

- Jerod Mayo earned a victory in his regular season debut and will look to become the first New England coach to start his career with a 2-0 record since Pete Carroll won his first four games in 1997.

PATRIOTS TO WATCH

DEMARIO DOUGLAS #3, WR



- **WR DeMario Douglas** has at least one receiving first down in each of the 15 games that he has played. The only other Patriot since 1991 to start his NFL career with at least that many consecutive games with a catch for a first down was Brandin Cooks (16 straight in 2017). Douglas can match that total with a first down catch this week against Seattle.

RHAMONDRE STEVENSON #38, RB

- **RB Rhamondre Stevenson** rushed for 120 yards in the season-opener at Cincinnati. If he rushes for over 100 yards this week, it would be his first time to do so in back-to-back games. He would also be the first Patriots running back with back-to-back 100-yard rushing games since RB Damien Harris accomplished the feat in 2021 with 101 yards rushing vs. Dallas (10/17) followed by 106 yards rushing vs. the New York Jets (10/24). Stevenson can become the first Patriots player to start the year with two straight 100-yard rushing performances.

- **LB Ja'Whaun Bentley** led the team with 12 total tackles in the season-opener at Cincinnati. If he records 10 or more tackles this week, it would be his first time having back-to-back games with more than 10 tackles since he went three straight games with 10 or more tackles in 2022: 10 tackles at Arizona (12/12), 10 tackles at Las Vegas (12/18) and 11 tackles vs. Cincinnati (12/24). The last Patriots player to start the year with back-to-back games with at least 10 total tackles was current head coach Jerod Mayo in 2012 when he started the year with three-straight 10-plus tackle games: 13 at Tennessee (9/11), 11 vs. Arizona (9/16) and 13 at Baltimore (9/23).

KEION WHITE #99, DE

- **DE Keion White** registered a career-high 2½ sacks in the win at Cincinnati in the season-opener. He will look to become the first Patriots player with at least 2 sacks in back-to-back games since LB Joshua Uche in 2022 when he had 2 sacks vs. Buffalo on Dec. 1, followed by 3 sacks at Arizona on Dec. 12. White will look to become the first Patriots player with at least 2 sacks in the first two games of the season in team history.



BRYCE BARINGER #17, P

- **P Bryce Baringer** needs to have a 50-yard punt this week against Seattle to extend his streak to 19-straight games with at least one 50-yard punt. The NFL record for the longest streak with at least one 50-yard punt since 1970 is 38 by Shane Lechler (2007-10).

BRENDEN SCHOOLER #41, S

- **S Brenden Schooler** registered a career-high 3 special teams tackles in the win at Cincinnati. He will try to become the first Patriots player to have two straight games with at least 3 special teams tackles since Matthew Slater had a three-game streak of at least 3 special teams tackles in 2014.

FIRST KICKOFF WEEKEND VICTORY SINCE 2020

The Patriots earned their first kickoff weekend victory since a 21-11 victory over Miami at Gillette Stadium on Sept. 13, 2020.

OPEN AGAINST CINCINNATI FOR FOURTH TIME

The Patriots opened the season against Cincinnati for the fourth time in team history and for the first time since a 38-24 win against Cincinnati on Sept. 12, 2010, at Gillette Stadium. The Patriots are 2-2 in those games.

ONE OF THE 2024 ROOKIES MAKES OPENING DAY STARTS

One of the 2024 draft picks was in the starting lineup with fourth-round pick G Layden Robinson starting at right guard. Twenty-nine rookies have now started on opening day since 2000.

THE PATRIOTS DID NOT COMMIT ANY TURNOVERS

The Patriots did not commit any turnovers in the win against Cincinnati. The Patriots had just one game in 2023 with zero turnovers - at the New York Jets on Sept. 24 in a 15-10 win.

RECOVERED TWO FUMBLES AGAINST CINCINNATI; BENGALS HAD JUST TWO LOST FUMBLES IN 2023

The Patriots forced and recovered two fumbles against the Bengals, who lost just two fumbles in 2023. S Kyle Dugger forced a fumble on TE Tanner Hudson at the 2-yard line that was recovered by CB Marcus Jones. In the third quarter, LS Joe Cardona forced a fumble on a punt that was recovered S Jaylinn Hawkins. In 2023, Cincinnati had just two lost fumbles in 2023 with every other NFL team having at least five last season. It was also tied for the fewest fumbles lost by a team in the Super Bowl era (also 2019 Saints, 2014 Vikings & 2002 Chiefs).

PATRIOTS HELD A 10-0 LEAD AT HALFTIME

The Patriots were in front of Cincinnati 10-0 at halftime. In 2023, the Patriots held a halftime lead in five games, going 4-1 in those games. The Patriots were in front 13-7 after three quarters. In 2023, the Patriots were 4-0 when leading heading into the fourth quarter.

PATRIOTS RUN FOR 170 YARDS ON THE GROUND

The Patriots ran for a combined 170 yards on the ground. The 170 yards marks the most yards the Patriots ran for since Dec. 18, 2022, when they played at the Las Vegas Raiders and ran for 206 yards.

INDIVIDUAL NOTES

MAYO MAKES REGULAR SEASON DEBUT AS A HEAD COACH

Jerod Mayo coached in his first regular season game and joined Ron Meyer (1982), Raymond Berry (1984), Dick MacPherson (1991) and Pete Carroll (1997) as the only Patriots coaches to earn a win in their first regular season game with the 16-10 win over the Bengals.

MAYO JOINS ROBERT KRAFT WITH FIRST WIN AT BENGALS

Mayo earned his first regular season win with the 16-10 victory at Cincinnati. He joins Robert Kraft in earning their first regular season wins at Cincinnati. The Patriots gave Robert Kraft his first victory as Patriots owner with a 31-28 win over the Bengals at Riverfront Stadium in Cincinnati on Sept. 18 in 1994.

BRISSETT MAKES THIRD START WITH PATS

QB Jacoby Brissett made his third-career start for the Patriots after making two starts in three games as a rookie with New England in 2016 – vs. Houston on Sept. 22, 2016 and vs. Buffalo on Oct. 2, 2016. He led the Patriots to a 27-0 win in his first start against the Texans.

BRISSETT 30TH PLAYER TO HAVE TWO STINTS

Brissett became the 30th player to have at least two stints with the Patriots since 2000 (on the active roster with the Patriots for at least one game in each stint; on the active roster with another team for at least one game in between). Brissett originally joined New England as a third-round draft pick in 2016 and played in three games with two starts as a rookie. He was traded to Indianapolis at the end of training camp in 2016 and has also played with Miami, Cleveland and Washington before being re-signed with the Patriots this past offseason.

BARINGER CONTINUES A STREAK

As a rookie in 2023, Baringer had at least one 50-yard punt in all 17 games, the longest single-season streak in team history. The NFL record for the longest streak with at least one 50-yard punt since 1970 is 38 by Shane Lechler (2007-10). He increased his streak to 18 games with a 56-yard punt in the second quarter.

STEVENSON GOES OVER 100 YARDS; MATCHES CAREER-HIGH IN ATTEMPTS

RB Rhamondre Stevenson had his fifth career 100-yard rushing performance after finishing with 25 carries for 120 yards. The Patriots did not have a 100-yard rusher in 2023. It is the first 100-yard rushing performance since Stevenson had 172 rushing yards at Las Vegas on Dec. 18, 2022. His 25 rushing attempts matched his career high. He had 25 rushing attempts vs. Detroit on Oct. 9, 2022.

STREAK TO 15 STRAIGHT GAMES WITH A 1ST DOWN

DeMario Douglas had at least one receiving first down in each of his 14 games in 2023. The only other Patriot since 1991 to start his NFL career with at least that many consecutive games with a catch for a first down was Brandin Cooks (16 straight in 2017). Douglas increased that total to 15 with a 9-yard reception in the first quarter on a third-and-8 situation for a first down.

DUGGER FORCES A FUMBLE AT THE 1-YARD LINE

S Kyle Dugger forced a fumble after a catch by TE Tanner Hudson at the 2-yard line that was recovered by CB Marcus Jones and returned 17 yards to help prevent a score in the second quarter.

CARDONA FORCES FIRST CAREER FUMBLE

Team captain LS Joe Cardona forced a fumble on a third quarter punt that was recovered by S Jaylinn Hawkins at the Cincinnati 24-yard line. The turnover helped lead to a 35-yard field goal by K Joey Slye.

CAREER-HIGH WITH 3 SPECIAL TEAMS TACKLES

S Brenden Schooler had a career-high 3 special teams tackles. He had five games with 2 special teams tackles, most recently on Nov. 5, 2023 vs. Washington. It is the most special teams tackles by a Patriots player since DB Cody Davis had 4 special teams tackles vs. the New York Jets on Oct. 24, 2021.

BENTLEY REACHES 10 TACKLES

LB Ja'Whaun Bentley finished with a team-leading 12 tackles for his 14th 10-plus tackle game. In 2023, Bentley had three games with at least 10 tackles.

KEION WHITE RECORDS CAREER-HIGH WITH 2½ SACKS

DE Keion White sacked QB Joe Burrow for a loss of 4 yards in the first quarter on a second-down play in the first quarter. In the second quarter, he combined with LB Ja'Whaun Bentley on a 5-yard sack of Burrow for a on a third-and-3 situation in the second quarter to stop a drive. He dropped Burrow for a 2-yard loss on third down in the fourth quarter. As a rookie in 2023, he recorded one sack when he dropped QB Tommy DeVito for a 9-yard loss at the New York Giants on Nov. 28, 2023.

HASTY RETURNED SECOND HALF KICKOFF

RB Ja'Mycal Hasty returned the second half kickoff 27 yards. It was his first kickoff return since Oct. 30, 2022 vs. Denver when he returned a kickoff 29 yards when he played for Jacksonville.

JONES WITH A KEY FOURTH-DOWN STOP

CB Jonathan Jones stopped the Bengals on a fourth-down attempt in the third quarter. Faced with a fourth-and-three, QB Joe Burrow completed a pass to WR Andrei Iosivas, but was stopped shot after a tackle by Jones.

POLK RECORDS FIRST RECEPTION

2024 second-round draft pick WR Ja'Lynn Polk recorded his first NFL reception for a 6-yard gain from QB Jacoby Brissett in the third quarter.

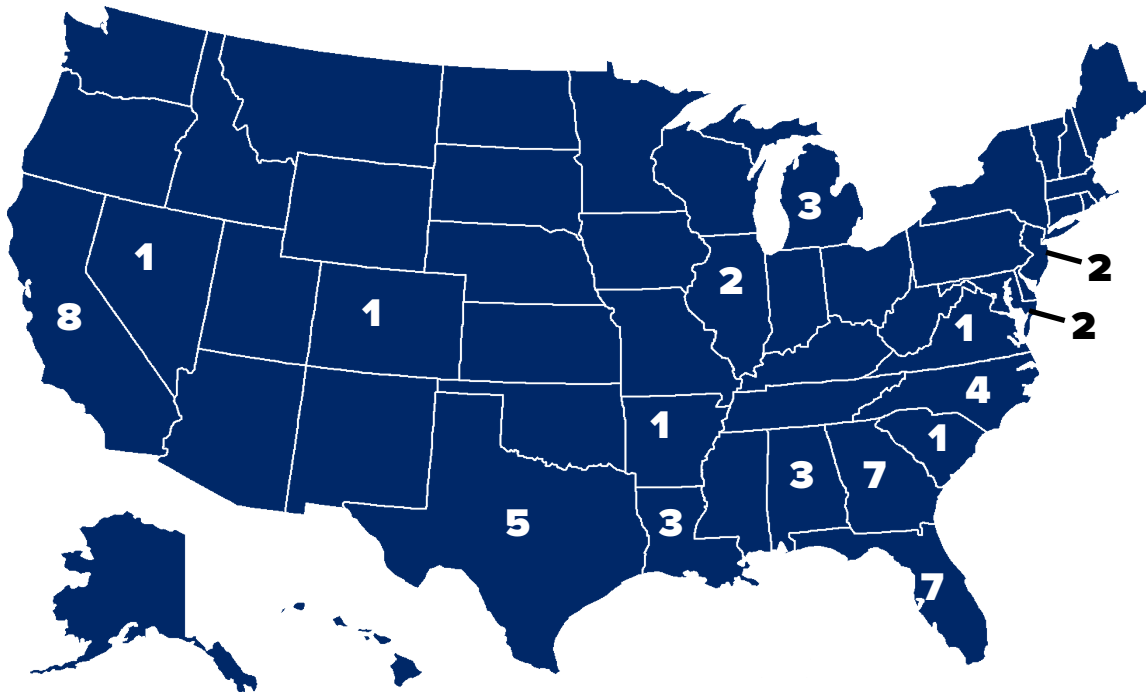

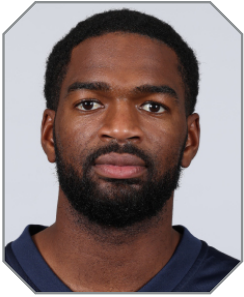

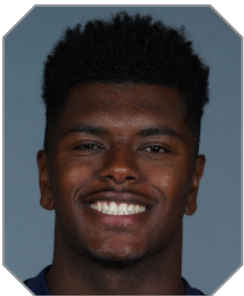


ANTONIO GIBSON, #4

- In 2020, Gibson became the first rookie to score three touchdowns on Thanksgiving since former Patriot Randy Moss did so in 1998, and also became the first running back to rush for 100+ yards with three touchdowns on the same day since Barry Sanders in 1997. He led all rookies in rushing touchdowns with 11, and was the first Washington rookie to record at least 1,000 scrimmage yards since Alfred Morris in 2012.
- In 2021, Gibson was the third Washington player in franchise history to achieve 1,000 rushing yards within his first two seasons, joining Morris and Robert Griffin III.

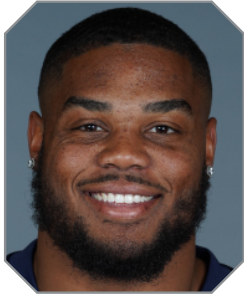

Under Kraft's leadership since he purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports.

Kraft has led the two most dominant decades in NFL history in terms of overall wins – 141 (2010-19) and 126 (2000-09).

Kraft is the most successful owner since he purchased the team in 1994 in terms of wins (354), division titles (19), winning percentage (.664), playoff wins (33) and playoff seasons (22).



Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. In his 30 seasons of ownership, he is credited with transforming one of the league's least successful clubs into one of the most valuable. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.238 pct.), the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (19), conference crowns (10) and Super Bowl championships (6) than any other NFL team. Additionally, the Patriots have achieved the most winning seasons (24) since Kraft assumed ownership beginning in 1994. **Super Bowl LIII was the 10th Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has appeared in more than four Super Bowls.** In Kraft's 30 seasons, the Patriots qualified for the playoffs 22 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons.

A WINNING TRADITION I

Robert Kraft won his 300th game overall as owner of the New England Patriots against Miami on Sept. 30, 2018. Kraft reached the milestone in his 25th NFL season and in his 432nd game, the fastest an owner has reached the mark. Al Davis of the Raiders accomplished the feat in 495 games (31 seasons) while Pat Bowlen of Denver reached 300 career wins in 501 games (30 seasons).

KRAFT PASSES OTHER OWNERS

The Patriots have 354 wins overall under Robert Kraft. He has produced more victories than every other Patriots owner combined. Under Kraft, the Patriots are 354-179 overall since he purchased the team in 1994. Kraft's predecessors in the owner's office went 225-276-9 in the 34 years prior to his purchase of the team.

CONTINUITY BREEDS SUCCESS

New England is the first team in NFL history to win six Super Bowls with the same owner (Robert Kraft), head coach (Bill Belichick) and quarterback (Tom Brady).

PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 28 times in their 63-year history. Twenty-two of those playoff berths have come in the 29 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. The Patriots have won 22 division crowns.

Since the 1994 season, the Patriots have won 66.3 percent of their regular season games (320-163), which is the highest winning percentage in men's major American professional sports over that period. Since 1994, there have been 148 franchises that have fielded teams in the five major American sports leagues (NFL, MLB, NBA, NHL and MLS) and completed more than two full seasons of competition. On the women's side the Toronto Six (29-5-3) and the Boston Pride (90-29-10) of the PHF hold the two highest winning percentages of all women's professional sports teams.

- The New England Patriots are tied with the Pittsburgh Steelers for the most Super Bowl wins in NFL history with six.
- The Patriots have played in 11 Super Bowls, the most by any team in NFL history. Dallas, Denver, Pittsburgh and San Francisco have played in eight.
- The New England Patriots have 37 postseason victories, tied with Green Bay for the second-most in NFL history to the 38 postseason wins by San Francisco.
- The Patriots are third in NFL history with 15 Conference Championship Game appearances, behind San Francisco (19) and Pittsburgh (16).
- The New England Patriots have earned seven No. 1 seeds, trailing only San Francisco (10) and Denver (8) since playoff seeding began in 1975.
- The Patriots have earned a first-round playoff bye an NFL-best 14 times since 1990. San Francisco is second with 10 byes since 1990. New England is the only team in NFL history with nine straight first-round byes (2010-18).
- The Patriots have played in 59 postseason games, the fifth-most in NFL history, behind Dallas (67), Pittsburgh (64), Green Bay (63) and San Francisco (62).
- The Patriots are second with 13 seasons of 12 wins since 1970, behind San Francisco's 16 seasons with 12 victories.
- New England has won 13 games in a single season seven times in franchise history. Only San Francisco has more 13-win seasons with 11.
- The New England Patriots have won 14 or more games in a season five times, most in NFL history. San Francisco is second with four 14-win seasons.
- New England has 28 undefeated months since 2000, most in the NFL over that span. Green Bay is second with 21 undefeated months during that time.
- The Patriots have 35 winning seasons since 1970, third all-time, behind Pittsburgh's 40 and Dallas' 36.
- The Patriots have 579 total victories, the fourth-most wins since their inception in 1960, behind the 599 wins by Dallas, 597 by Pittsburgh and the 585 by Green Bay.
- New England (1,043) played their 1,000th game in franchise history (regular season and playoffs combined) against Cleveland on Nov. 14, 2021, and became the first original AFL team to play in 1,000 games.
- The Patriots ended a 10-year streak of finishing in the top 10 for fewest points allowed (2012-2021) after finishing 11th in 2022 with 20.4 points allowed. The Patriots and Tampa Bay (1996-2005) are the last two teams to reach 10 straight seasons in the top 10 for fewest points allowed.

- The Patriots finished with a positive turnover ratio for 17 straight seasons (2006-22), the longest streak since the 1970 merger before the streak ended in 2023. Seattle is second with 13 straight seasons with a positive turnover ratio.
- The Patriots finished ranked 7th in total defense. The Patriots have finished in the top 10 in defense 11 times since 2000.
- The Patriots will play in their fifth international game when they face Jacksonville in London on Oct. 20. It will be their second straight year with an international game after playing in Frankfurt, Germany in 2023. The Patriots played in London in 2009, 2012 and in Mexico City in 2017. The five international games are tied for fourth all-time, with Las Vegas, behind the 13 by Jacksonville, eight by Buffalo and seven by Miami.
- The Patriots went 19 straight seasons (2001-19) without being swept in a series by a division opponent, the longest such streak since the 1970 NFL merger.
- The Patriots are 109-4 all-time at Gillette Stadium in the regular season when leading at halftime.

TALE OF THE TWOS

- The Patriots 2008 NFL Draft produced **two** NFL head coaches with Patriots head coach Jerod Mayo in the first round and Minnesota head coach Kevin O'Connell in the third round. The only other instance in the common draft era that produced two head coaches was the 1981 Chicago Bears who picked former San Francisco head coach Mike Singletary in the second round and former Rams and Tennessee head coach Jeff Fisher in the seventh round.
- The Patriots have **two** members of head coach Jerod Mayo's staff that were teammates with him when the Patriots earned a victory in Super Bowl XLIX over Seattle. Dont'a Hightower serves as inside linebackers coach and Matthew Slater serves as a special assistant to the head coach.
- The Patriots have **two** Paul Hornung Award winners as the nation's most versatile player with DB Jabrill Peppers (2016) and DB Marcus Jones (2021).
- The Patriots have **two** sets of twins on the team with Kyle Dugger (Kaelyn) and Davon Godchaux (Devin).
- Christian Elliss has **two** brothers playing in the NFL with Jonah (Denver) and Kaden (Atlanta). The Elliss brothers are one of **two** families with three brothers currently playing in the NFL, joining the Sewell family - Penie (Detroit), Nephi (New Orleans) and Noah (Chicago). Christian's father, Luther, was selected in the first round (20th overall) by Detroit in the 1995 NFL Draft out of Utah and was a two-time Pro Bowl selection. He coaches the defensive line at Utah.
- The Patriots have **two** players on the current roster that were teammates with head coach Jerod Mayo during his final season with the Patriots in 2015 - C David Andrews and LS Joe Cardona. The only other current NFL coach that was teammates with two of his current players is Houston's DeMeco Ryans, who was teammates with S Kareem Jackson and C Jon Weeks in 2011 with Houston and then served as their head coach in 2023.

Brissett was traded by New England to Indianapolis in 2017 and has played with Indianapolis, Miami, Cleveland and Washington.

MEET JEROD MAYO

6TH COACHING SEASON | 14TH NFL SEASON | 1ST SEASON AS PATRIOTS HEAD COACH

JEROD'S JOURNEY

Jerod Mayo was born Feb. 23, 1986, in Hampton, Va., and played college football at Tennessee. Mayo was drafted in the first round (10th overall) of the 2008 draft and spent his entire NFL career in New England before retiring following the 2015 season. After his retirement, Mayo served as an executive in finance at Optum as senior vice president of business development before returning to the Patriots to start his coaching career as inside linebackers coach in 2019. Without a defensive coordinator by title in the past five seasons, Mayo's role and responsibilities grew each year. Jerod was introduced by Patriots Chairman and CEO Robert Kraft as the 15th head coach in franchise history in a press conference held at Gillette Stadium on Jan. 17, 2024.

A TRACK RECORD OF SUCCESS

AS A PLAYER: Mayo played linebacker and appeared in 103 games, racking up 905 total tackles. He was a 2014 Super Bowl Champion and made the Pro Bowl after the 2010 and 2012 seasons, leading the league in tackles each season. He led the Patriots in tackles in each of his first five seasons and became just the second Patriots player to win the Associated Press Defensive Rookie of the Year award.

IN THE BUSINESS WORLD: While at Optum from 2016 through 2019, Mayo took the skills and understanding that he mastered in football and transformed himself into a business executive. While at Optum, he worked on consumer solutions with clients and consulted on mergers and acquisitions.

AS A COACH: In his five seasons with the Patriots, the defense finished in the top 10 in total defense four times. Under Mayo's tutelage in his first coaching season, former linebacker and current linebacker coach Dont'a Hightower earned his second career Pro Bowl nod. Former Patriots LB Matthew Judon tallied career highs in sack totals in back-to-back seasons, recording 12½ sacks in 2021 and 15½ in 2022. Judon earned his second straight Pro Bowl invitation with the Patriots. Last season, the defense ranked seventh overall in yards allowed.

"Jerod is a great leader, a great captain, a great friend. I think he had a tremendous amount of success in football and then had success in other parts of his life when he retired. And then him coming back into coaching, I think it's great for the NFL and certainly great for the Patriots. He's got a great understanding of how things need to be done. I think Jerod does an incredible job relating to everybody in the locker room, all the coaches, and I think he'll do a great job."

A Natural leader

- Mayo learned his values and leadership style through the people he met in both football and business. Mayo's grandfather, Walter Johnson, was a Chief Master Sergeant in the Air Force, and Mayo credits him for helping him learn the discipline to reach success. Mayo also credits his manager at Optum, Mike Mateo, his mom and Coach Belichick with influencing his coaching style.
- As a player, Mayo was named captain for seven consecutive seasons (2009-15), starting in his second year on the team, and is a 2014 Super Bowl Champion. "You're a captain in your second year. That spoke about not only his leadership, but I think also how he got along with everybody on the team. I think of a guy who can stand in front of a room, and no matter what they say, the men in the room walk away saying, I'll follow that guy," said former Patriots S Devin McCourty about Mayo.

"The ability to communicate with anyone and make them feel like you are on an equal level, and he can speak on a level that is educated and that is personable. When you have those two things, you get people listening to you. They listen to what you say, and it's easier for you to convey what you need from them, or what you want from them on the field, and that is something that I think he is exceptional at."

PATRIOTS HEAD COACHES AS PRO PLAYERS

Jerod Mayo is the first head coach for the Patriots that was formerly a Patriots' player. He is the fifth Patriots head coach in team history to have played professional football. The four other Patriots' head coaches that played in professional football include: Lou Saban (1960-61), Mike Holovak (1961-68), Clive Rush (1969-70) and Raymond Berry (1984-89).

Linebacker - Cleveland Browns (1946-49)



- Selected in the 10th round of the 1944 Draft by Card-Pitt, a temporary merger between the Chicago Cardinals and Pittsburgh Steelers.
- Joined the **Cleveland Browns** under the AAFC (All-America Football Conference) coached by Paul Brown, where he played as **linebacker** and placekicker.
- Won the AAFC Championship in 1946, 1947, 1948 and 1949.
- Coached the Boston Patriots in 1960-61 as head coach, the inaugural year of the team.



MIKE HOLOVAK | 1961-68

Running Back - Los Angeles Rams (1946), Chicago Bears (1947-48)



- Selected fifth overall by the Cleveland Rams in the 1943 NFL Draft, but enlisted in the U.S. Navy during World War II before eventually playing as **running back** for the **Los Angeles Rams** in 1946.
- Traded to the Chicago Bears in 1947 and led the team in rushing yards in back-to-back seasons.
- From 1960-61, Holovak served as the Boston Patriots running backs coach before becoming the head coach from 1961-68.



CLIVE RUSH | 1969-70

Wide Receiver - Green Bay Packers (1953)



- Played one season as **wide receiver** with the **Green Bay Packers** in 1953.
- Entered the collegiate coaching realm with Dayton (1954), Ohio State (1955-57), Oklahoma (1958) and back to Ohio State (1959) before becoming the head coach at Toledo (1960-62).
- Became the offensive coordinator for the New York Jets from 1963-68.
- Was named the head coach of the Boston Patriots from 1969-70.

- Drafted by the **Baltimore Colts** 203rd overall in the 20th round of the 1954 NFL Draft, where he spent 13 seasons as a **wide receiver**.
- Was a six-time Pro-Bowler and three-time first-team All-Pro.
- Berry played on the 1958 and 1959 NFL Championship teams.
- Served as wide receivers coach for the New England Patriots from 1978-81.
- Became head coach from 1984-89, where he went 48-39 across six seasons including an appearance in Super Bowl XX in 1985.

- Patriots QB Jacoby Brissett has thrown an interception on just 1.4% of his career pass attempts, tied with Aaron Rodgers for the lowest interception percentage of any quarterback. Brissett has thrown just 23 interceptions in 1,624 pass attempts. Rodgers has 106 interceptions in 7,682 attempts.

A HALL OF FAME FRIENDSHIP

- One bond that hits close to home with QB Jacoby Brissett is with former Patriots head coach and Pro Football Hall of Famer Bill Parcells, who first met Jacoby at his Palm Beach high school football practice at age 15. Parcells served as a key mentor in the development of Brissett's quarterback skills during a key juncture of his life where Brissett was deciding between football or basketball moving forward. With football being the path forward, Parcells aided Brissett while in college and during the NFL draft process. The "longstanding relationship" between Parcells and Brissett has endured throughout Jacoby's second career stint with the Patriots. Parcells recently said to MassLive, "I really do love him. I really do. I have a strong affection for him. He is an absolute No. 1, high-class kid."



THE MEANING BEHIND THE NICKNAME

- DeMario Douglas is more commonly referred to by his nickname, "Pop". Although the nickname is fitting for his quickness on the field, the name actually comes from family ties. Douglas' granddad passed away on his first birthday. The wide receiver was commonly referred to as 'Poppa' from his granddad – a nickname that was quickly shortened to just 'Pop'.

NUMBER CHANGE

- Pop Douglas changed his jersey number from No. 81 to No. 3 this season. He wore No. 3 in college at Liberty, as well as in little league, middle school and high school. He explained its meaning to him: "It's big because I was raised by three strong ladies -- my mom, grandma and great grandma," he said.

ROOKIE RECEIVING RECORDS

- Douglas finished the 2023 season with 49 receptions for a team-leading 561 yards. He has the most receptions and receiving yards by a rookie wide receiver during Bill Belichick's reign as Patriots head coach.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2024

- TE Hunter Henry is eighth on the all-time reception list among New England tight ends with 135 receptions. He ranks ninth in receiving yards with 1,549 and is tied for sixth with 17 touchdown receptions. He needs 15 receptions to become the eighth New England tight end to reach 150 receptions, 251 receiving yards to become the eighth New England tight end to reach 1,800 receiving yards and 3 touchdowns to become the fifth New England tight end with 20 touchdowns.

HENRY SCORES TWO LONGEST TD PASSES OF HIS CAREER

- TE Hunter Henry scored on a 31-yard touchdown pass from QB Bailey Zappe in the third quarter at Cleveland on Oct. 16, 2022, and had a 37-yard touchdown from Mac Jones at Minnesota in the third quarter on Nov. 24, 2022, the longest touchdown receptions of his career. His previous best was a 30-yard touchdown pass at Jacksonville on Dec. 8, 2019, when he played for the Chargers.

AMONG THE LEADERS

- Since entering the league in 2016, Henry is tied for third in receiving touchdowns among all tight ends in the NFL with 38. He also ranks seventh in career receiving yards with 3,853 and 10th in receptions with 329. He joins teammate Austin Hooper on two of these lists, as Hooper ranks sixth in receptions (364) and 10th in receiving yards (3,702).

TOP OF THE ORDER

- The Patriots used the third pick in the 2024 draft for the first time in team history and used the pick to select **QB Drake Maye** from North Carolina. It marks the fifth time since 1970 that the team has drafted a quarterback in the first round - **Jim Plunkett** from Stanford (1st overall in 1971), **Tony Eason** from Illinois (15th overall in 1983), **Drew Bledsoe** from Washington State (1st overall in 1993), **Mac Jones** from Alabama (15th overall in 2021) and Drake Maye from North Carolina (3rd overall). Maye is the first Patriots drafted in the top 10 since 2008 when the team selected current head coach and former LB Jerod Mayo with the 10th pick overall out of Tennessee.

THE MAYE WAY

- Maye, the youngest of four boys, hails from a family of athletes. His father, Mark, also played quarterback at the University of North Carolina from 1983-1988. His brother, Luke, played basketball at North Carolina (2015-19), winning a national title in 2017 with the Tar Heels. Luke now plays overseas in Japan. His brother, Cole, won a baseball national championship in 2017 with the University of Florida as a pitcher. His brother, Beau, also plays basketball at the University of North Carolina. Despite the rich tradition of family athleticism, Drake Maye, measuring at 6'4, is the shortest of the four brothers (Luke at 6'8; Cole at 6'7; Beau at 6'8).

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2024

- RB Rhamondre Stevenson recorded his first 1,000-yard rushing season with a career-high 1,040 rushing yards in 2022. He can become the third New England player to reach at least two 1,000-yard rushing seasons, joining Curtis Martin (3) and Jim Nance (2).
- Stevenson led the team in receptions in 2022 with 69. He can join Tony Collins (1985 and 1987) as the only New England running backs to lead the team in receptions in two seasons.
- Stevenson is in 17th place in team history with 2,385 rushing yards and needs 532 yards to move past LeGarrette Blount (2,917) into 10th place on the New England all-time rushing yards list.

STEVENSON REACHES 1,000 YARDS RUSHING

- Stevenson finished the 2022 season with 1,040 rushing yards, his first career 1,000-yard season and the 17th 1,000-yard season in New England history.

DEDICATION TO HIS GOALS

- While in high school, Stevenson started gaining attention for the impressive stats he posted as a junior. Unfortunately, due to his grades, Stevenson was academically ineligible to receive a football scholarship despite being recruited. Following his senior year of high school, Stevenson took a year off from football and worked part-time jobs at Wal-Mart and Jimmy John's. But after a year away, he decided to follow a group of his friends and enroll in Cerritos Community College. During his time at Cerritos, he shared a two-bedroom apartment with up to six other guys at times and rode his bicycle 20 minutes to and from practice every day. After putting up monster stats in his second season at Cerritos, he committed to Oklahoma. Oklahoma led him to the 2021 NFL Draft where in the fourth round on the third day the Patriots selected Stevenson. In addition, he worked on his academics and made the Dean's List while at Oklahoma.

STEVENSON RECORDS FIRST RECEIVING TOUCHDOWN

- Stevenson had his first career touchdown reception on a 3-yard pass from QB Mac Jones in the second quarter vs. Indianapolis on Nov. 6 2022.

CAREER HIGHS IN RECEPTIONS AND RECEIVING YARDS

- Stevenson set career highs in receptions and receiving yards after finishing with nine receptions for 76 yards at Minnesota on Nov. 24, 2022. His previous high in receptions was eight vs. Chicago on Oct. 24, 2022, and his previous high in receiving yards was 72 yards on Oct. 30, 2022, at the New York Jets.

STEVENSON HAS CAREER LONG RUN

- Stevenson had a career-long 64-yard touchdown run in the second quarter vs. Washington on Nov. 5, 2023. His previous long was a 49-yard run vs. Detroit on Oct. 9, 2022, and his previous longest touchdown run was a 34-yard touchdown run at Las Vegas on Dec. 18, 2022. It is the longest touchdown run for a Patriots player since RB Damien Harris had a 64-yard touchdown run at Buffalo on Dec. 6, 2022. It is tied with Harris for the longest touchdown run by a Patriot player in the regular seasons since a 70-yard run by Curtis Martin on Sept. 21, 1997 vs. Chicago.

STEVENSON HAS FIFTH CAREER 100-YARD GAME

- Stevenson had his fifth 100-yard game in the 2024 season-opener with 120 yards in the win vs. Cincinnati on Sept. 8. He had a career-high 172 yards rushing at Las Vegas on Dec. 18, 2022. It was his second 100-yard game of the year and fourth overall. He has two 100-yard games of 160 or more yards. In addition to the 172, he had 161 yards rushing vs. Detroit on Oct. 9, 2022. He has two of the teams 14 games with at least 160 yards rushing. Only Curtis Martin and Jim Nance with three have more.

STEVENSON HAS THIRD GAME WITH 9.0 AVERAGE

- Stevenson finished nine carries for 87 yards for a 9.7-yard average vs. Washington on Nov. 5, 2023, the highest average of his career and the third time he had at least a 9.0-yard average. He had a 9.1-yard average at Las Vegas on Dec. 18, 2022 and a 9.0-yard average at Buffalo on Jan. 8, 2023.



STRANGE FACEMASK

- 2022 first-round draft pick OL Cole Strange started wearing the vertical bar facemask his senior season at Chattanooga. The idea started when the veteran offensive line group, who had been together for four years, wanted to do something different to finish out their final season playing alongside each other. They decided to all wear the same facemask and landed on the vertical bar. Strange brought the bar with him to the NFL and is one of only three NFL regulars to sport the vertical bar in their facemask.



SECOND-LONGEST RUN EVER BY A PATRIOTS RECEIVER

- WR Tyquan Thornton had a 39-yard run in the fourth quarter vs. the Los Angeles Chargers on Dec. 3, 2023, the second longest run ever by a Patriots wide receiver. WR Julian Edelman had a 47-yard run in the fourth quarter vs. Indianapolis on Nov. 18, 2012. Thornton's previous long was a 19-yard touchdown run at Cleveland on Oct. 16, 2022.

THORNTON SCORES FIRST NFL TOUCHDOWN

- Thornton scored his first NFL touchdown on a 2-yard pass from QB Bailey Zappe in the third quarter at Cleveland on Oct. 16, 2022.

SCORES SECOND TD OF THE DAY ON A 19-YARD RUN

- Thornton scored his second touchdown of the day on a 19-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter at Cleveland on Oct. 16. He is the sixth Patriots wide receiver to score on a touchdown run and first since Cordarrelle Patterson in 2018. Thornton is the first Patriots wide receiver with a rushing touchdown and a receiving touchdown in the same game since David Patten at Indianapolis on Oct. 21, 2001.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2024

- DL Christian Barmore led the Patriots with 8½ sacks in 2023. If he leads the team in sacks in 2024, he will be the first defensive lineman to lead the team in two consecutive seasons since DL Trey Flowers did so in three straight seasons (2016-18).

JOURNEY TO THE NFL

- As a high school sophomore, football wasn't on Christian Barmore's radar. Barmore played basketball in high school until his junior year, when the football coach at Delaware Valley Charter High School convinced him to give football a chance. Moving to Neumann Goretti High School as a senior after his previous high school closed, Barmore became a highly-recruited prospect in just his second season of organized football, committing to the University of Alabama.

PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAMER RICHARD SEYMOUR SEES GREATNESS AHEAD FOR CHRISTIAN BARMORE

- For a defensive lineman, if Patriots and Pro Football Hall of Famer Richard Seymour is in your corner, there are few better compliments or endorsements.
- "I think he has a ton of ability, natural ability, and he plays hard," Seymour told the Boston Herald. "I think he's going to be a problem for (opposing teams) for a long time to come. Hopefully he stays healthy and continues on the path he's on. I think he has a really bright future."

SECOND-MOST QUARTERBACK PRESSURES

- Barmore posted the second-most quarterback pressures for a first-year defensive tackle since 2006, according to Pro Football Focus. His 48 pressures in 2021 were two more than Aaron Donald had during his rookie season.

FIRST CAREER THREE-SACK GAME


- Barmore finished with his first career 3-sack game, all in the third quarter, at Denver on Dec. 24, 2023. He had two 8-yard sacks and one 9-yard sack of Denver QB Russell Wilson. He increased his 2023 total to 8½ sacks. He is the first Patriots player with a 3-sack game since LB Joshua Uche had a 3-sack game at Arizona on Dec. 12, 2022. The last defensive lineman with a 3-sack game for New England was Deatrich Wise Jr. on Sept. 25, 2022 vs. Baltimore.
- Barmore finished the 2023 season with a career-high 8½ sacks.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2024

- LB Ja'Whaun Bentley has registered 100 total tackles in three straight seasons (108 in 2021, 122 in 2022 and 114 in 2023). He can join LB Vincent Brown (four straight from 1991 through 1994) and LB Jerod Mayo (five straight from 2008 through 2012) as the only Patriots players with at least four straight 100 tackle seasons.

CAREER HIGH IN TACKLES

- Bentley set a single-season career-high with 122 tackles in 2022. He became the 13th New England player to reach at least 120 total tackles in a season and the first Patriots player to do so since Jerod Mayo had 147 total tackles in 2012.



Ja'Whaun and his family were homeless starting his freshman year of high school, living with one set of grandparents, then the other, then an aunt. Ja'Whaun and his brother slept on couches and floors at times over the course of several years. Once Ja'Whaun entered the NFL, he was able to secure permanent housing for his family.



WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2024

- Dugger scored 3 touchdowns in 2022 with 2 interceptions returned for touchdowns and a fumble returned for a touchdown. He needs one more defensive touchdown to tie Willie McGinest and Tedy Bruschi for the second-most defensive touchdowns in team history with 4, behind the 6 by Ty Law.

DUGGER PLAYS ROLE IN FOUR OF THE 7 DEFENSIVE TDS

- Dugger played a major role in four of the NFL-best 7 defensive touchdowns in 2022. In addition to his pick-6 against Miami, he returned an interception 16 yards for a touchdown at Las Vegas, returned a fumble 59 yards for a touchdown vs. Detroit and forced a fumble that LB Raekwon McMillan returned 23 yards for a touchdown in the third quarter at Arizona (12/12).

DUGGER EARNS HIS DEGREE

- Dugger helped put Lenoir-Rhyne University on the map, becoming the highest-drafted athlete in the Division II football program's history.
- Three years after being selected in the second round of the 2020 NFL Draft, a diligent Dugger worked hard to finish his degree, earning a Bachelor's degree in psychology in 2023.

DUGGER SCORES ON A 59-YARD FUMBLE RETURN

- Dugger recovered a fumble vs. Detroit (10/9/22) that was forced on a 13-yard sack by LB Matthew Judon, and returned the ball 59 yards for a touchdown in the second quarter. It is the fourth-longest fumble return in team history. It was Dugger's first career touchdown.

IN RARE COMPANY

- DL Davon Godchaux is one of only four NFL defensive tackles to have at least 55 total tackles in each of the past three seasons (2021-2023) after accumulating 65 tackles in 2021, 62 tackles in 2022 and 56 tackles in 2023. The others are DeForest Buckner (Indianapolis), Zach Sieler (Miami) and Christian Wilkins (Miami).



GONZALEZ RECORDS HIS FIRST CAREER INTERCEPTION

- CB Christian Gonzalez recorded his first NFL interception in the fourth quarter vs. Miami on Sept. 17, 2023 when he picked off a deep pass by Miami QB Tua Tagovailoa intended for WR Tyreek Hill.

ROOKIE OF THE MONTH

- Gonzalez was named the Defensive Rookie of the Month for September by the National Football League, becoming the fifth Patriots player to win a rookie of the month honor and the third defensive player to earn the award. Gonzalez joins QB Mac Jones (November of 2021), DE Chandler Jones (September of 2012), LB Jerod Mayo (October of 2008) and WR Deion Branch (September of 2002).

GONZO'S JOURNEY

- Before his collegiate success, even the prospect of going to college seemed out of reach for Gonzalez. He didn't want his family to have to pay his college tuition, and as a sophomore, he was a backup quarterback on his high school's junior varsity team that went 1-9. He almost gave up the sport, but after his family's encouragement and transferring schools, Gonzalez's new coaches switched him to defense, and he quickly attracted the attention of colleges around the nation.
- To understand the athleticism of Christian Gonzalez, look no further than his family. His father, Hector, played basketball at UTEP and professionally overseas. Gonzalez's two older sisters were both on the Colombian National Team for track & field and were college All-Americans. His eldest sister competed in the 2020 Olympics, and his younger sister is a rising star in soccer.



CAREER-HIGH WITH FOURTH INTERCEPTION

- DB Jonathan Jones intercepted Miami QB Skylar Thompson (01/01/22) in the fourth quarter for his fourth interception of the season, a new single-season career-high. He had 3 interceptions in 2018.

JONES SCORES FIRST NFL TOUCHDOWN

- Jones picked off a pass from Indianapolis QB Sam Ehlinger (11/6/22) in the fourth quarter and returned it 17 yards for his first career touchdown.

JONES BLOCK PARTY

- Jones returned an interception for a touchdown and blocked a punt vs. Indianapolis on Nov. 6, 2022. He is the fifth player to have a pick-6 and a blocked kick in the same game since 2000 and the first to have a blocked punt and a pick-6 in the same game since Patrick Chung in 2010 with the Patriots at Miami on Oct. 4, 2010.

CAREER-HIGH THREE SACKS

- Uche registered a career-high 3 sacks after dropping Indianapolis QB Sam Ehlinger (11/6/22) for a 2-yard loss and an 8-yard loss in the second quarter and a 1-yard sack in the third quarter. He has three career games with at least 2 sacks. He had his first two-sack game after registering two fourth quarter sacks at the New York Jets on Sept. 19, 2021, and also had 2 sacks vs. Buffalo on Dec. 1, 2022 and 3 at Arizona on Dec. 12, 2022.

UCHE HAD TWO 3-SACK GAMES IN 2022

- Uche had his second 3-sack game of the 2022 season at Arizona on Dec. 12. He was named AFC Defensive Player of the Week for his efforts. Uche also had 3 sacks at the New York Jets on Oct. 30. Andre Tippett (3 in 1985 and 3 in 1987) and Mike Vrabel (2 in 2007) are the only Patriots players with multiple 3-sack games in a season.

UCHE FOLLOWED A 2-SACK GAME WITH 3 SACKS

- Uche had 2 sacks vs. Buffalo on Dec. 1, 2022, and followed that game with 3 sacks against Arizona (12/12/22). He is the first Patriots player since Trey Flowers in 2016 to have back-to-back games with at least 2 sacks. Flowers had 2 sacks at Buffalo (10/30) followed by 2 sacks vs. Seattle (11/13).



ASK AND JAHLANI RECEIVED

- LB Jahlani Tavai starred in high school as a nose guard. He was undersized and did not attract the attention of many colleges. But after finding out one of the English teachers at his high school was the son of then-Hawaii coach Norm Chow, he reached out to the teacher, Cameron Chow, and asked if Cameron could tell his dad to scout his tape. Cameron followed up and passed along Jahlani's tape to his dad, and the very next day, Jahlani had a scholarship offer. According to Jahlani, his football career would have been over after high school if it wasn't for this connection.

ONE AND ONLY

- Tavai is the only NFL player within the last decade to play at least 70% of the snaps on offense or defense and 70% of the snaps on special teams, a feat he accomplished in 2023.



THIRD TIME TEAM CAPTAIN

- Deatrich Wise Jr. has been named a team captain for the last three seasons.

- Wise had his first career 3-sack game after a 3-yard sack in the first quarter, an 8-yard sack and a 1-yard sack in the second quarter vs. Baltimore on Sept. 25, 2022. His previous best was 1½ sacks, which he accomplished three times – vs. Buffalo (12/24/17), vs. Houston (9/9/18) and vs. Cleveland (11/14/21).
- Wise is the fifth Patriots player to register 3 sacks in a half. DL Henry Thomas had 3 sacks in the first half at St. Louis on Dec. 13, 1998. LB Tully Banta-Cain had 3 sacks in the second half at Buffalo on Dec. 20, 2009, DL Jarvis Green had 3 sacks in the second half at Cincinnati on Oct. 1, 2006, and Joshua Uche at Arizona on Dec. 12, 2022. DL Christian Barmore had 3 third quarter sacks at Denver on Dec. 24, 2023.

- Wise was honored with the 2022 Ron Burton Community Service Award at the Patriots Premiere for his dedication to serving his community. After receiving the award, Wise said, "You don't go out in the community for the gratification. You just do it because it's in your heart to do. It's an honor to win an award of this prestige and to be in the same group as everybody who's won that before and have my name with the Burton family."

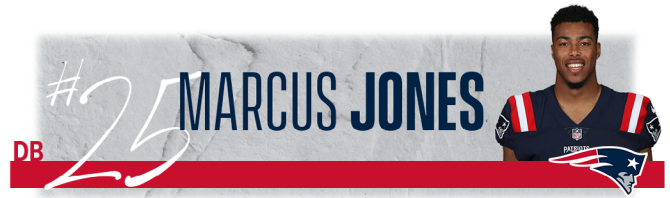

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2024

- P Bryce Baringer led the NFL and set a team record in 2023 with 38 punts inside the 20-yard line. Baringer will look to become the second Patriots punter with back-to-back seasons with at least 30 punts inside the 2-yard line Jake Bailey had 36 in 2019 and 31 in 2020.

FROM WALK-ON TO ALL-AMERICAN

- Baringer had an unconventional path to the NFL. He began his collegiate career by earning a walk-on spot at Illinois in 2018 as a true freshman, but due to being buried on the depth chart and the cost of out-of-state tuition, he transferred home to Michigan State as a regular student. Outside of a four-game stint on the Michigan State team due to injuries on the roster, Baringer did not have a walk-on spot available to him in 2019. After a year serving as the team's photographer to maintain access to the facilities to train, Baringer attended an open tryout with a new coaching staff at the Spartans and made the team, establishing himself as the Spartans top punter in 2020 and going on to have record-breaking seasons in 2021 and 2022. In 2022, he was named the Big 10 Punter of the Year and a consensus All-American by all five major associations.

BARINGER SETS TEAM MARK AND EXTENDS MARK

- Baringer had at least one 50-yard punt in all 17 games in 2023 to set the team record for the longest single season streak in team history (at any point of the season). Zoltan Mesko had a 12-game streak in 2011. Baringer extended his record to 18 with a 50-yard punt in the 2024 season opener. The NFL record for the longest streak with at least one 50-yard punt since 1970 is 38 by Shane Lechler (2007-10).

RECORD BREAKING

- Baringer connected on a 79-yard punt in the second quarter vs. Indianapolis on Nov. 12, 2023 in Frankfurt, Germany, the fifth-longest punt in team history.

- Baringer has had three games in 2023 when he has drilled at least two 60-yard punts, with a 60-yard and 63-yard punt at Miami on Oct 29, a 79-yard and a 65-yard punt vs. Indianapolis on Nov. 12 and a 63 and 60-yard punt vs. the NY Jets on Jan. 7. He is the only Patriots punter with at least two games with two 60-yard punts in a season.
- Baringer finished the year with 38 punts inside the 20-yard line, the most in a season for the Patriots. Jake Bailey had 36 punts inside the 20-yard line in 2019.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2024

- DB Marcus Jones scored on a 48-yard touchdown reception vs. Buffalo on Dec. 1, 2022. If he scores on offense in 2024, he will join LB Mike Vrabel (8 touchdown receptions) as the only defensive player with more than one touchdown on offense in team history. Vrabel also has the most offensive touchdowns by an NFL defensive player with 10 in the regular season.
- Jones returned a punt 84 yards for a touchdown vs. the New York Jets on Nov. 20, 2022. If he returns a kickoff for a touchdown, he will become the first New England player to return a punt and a kickoff for a touchdown.
- If Jones returns a punt for a touchdown in 2024, he will join Julian Edelman (4), Troy Brown (3), Irving Fryar (3) and Mike Haynes (2) as the only Patriots players with more than one punt returned for a touchdown.
- Jones handled kickoff and punt return duties as a rookie in 2022. He will look to become the first Patriots player to ever return a kickoff for a touchdown and punt for a touchdown in the same season and the first NFL player to accomplish the feat since 2019 when Jamal Agnew did so for Detroit.
- Jones scored on offense, defense and special teams in 2022. He is the only player to score in all three phases in a single season since 1970. He is one of ten players to score on offense, defense and special teams during their NFL career.

- Jones, who won the 2021 Paul Hornung Award as the nation's most versatile player after returning two punts and two kickoff returns for a touchdown in college in 2021, finished second in the NFL with a 12.5-yard punt return average, second in total return yards with 1,007 and seventh in kickoff return average with a 23.9 average. He was named to the Associated Press All-Pro First Team as a punt returner, the first Patriots rookie to be named All-Pro First Team.

JONES SCORES ON OFFENSE, DEFENSE AND SPECIAL TEAMS

- Jones returned a third quarter interception 69 yards for a touchdown vs. Cincinnati on Dec. 24, 2022. He scored on a punt return for a touchdown, a touchdown reception and an interception returned for a touchdown to become the fourth player in NFL history to do so in a season, joining Frank Bacon (1920), Bill Dudley (1947) and Tommy Harmon (1947). Jones returned a punt 84 yards for a touchdown vs. the New York Jets on Nov. 20 and scored on a 48-yard touchdown pass vs. Buffalo on Dec. 1 in addition to the pick-6 against the Bengals. The only other player in the Super Bowl era to score a 40-plus yard touchdown in each of those ways in their entire career is Deion Sanders.

FIRST DB TO CATCH A TD ON OFFENSE SINCE 2000

- Jones, who made his first career start on defense vs. Buffalo on Dec. 1, 2022, also lined up on offense and scored on a 48-yard touchdown pass from QB Mac Jones on his first play from scrimmage in the first quarter. Jones became the first defensive back to record a touchdown reception on offense since 2000 when S Marcus Coleman of the New York Jets caught a 45-yard touchdown pass from QB Vinny Testaverde against Buffalo on Sept. 17, 2000. Jones caught 15 passes for 137 yards with one receiving touchdown during his college career. He scored on a 47-yard touchdown pass vs. Navy on Sept. 25, 2021. Jones joins LB Mike Vrabel (six 1-yard touchdowns and four 2-yard touchdowns from Tom Brady), LB Elandon Roberts (38-yard touchdown pass from Brady vs. Miami on Dec. 29, 2019) and LB/DE John Tanner (2-yard as the only pass from QB Jim Plunkett on Nov. 24, 1974 at Baltimore) as the only New England defensive players to catch touchdowns.

FIRST PAT TO CATCH A TD ON FIRST RECEPTION SINCE 2019

- Jones is the first Patriots player to catch a touchdown on his first reception since LB Elandon Roberts caught a 38-yard touchdown pass in the third quarter vs Miami on Dec. 29, 2019. Jones's 48-yard touchdown on his first offensive play is the longest by a Patriots player on his first play since WR Stephen Starring caught a 73-yard touchdown pass from Steve Grogan on his first offensive play vs. Baltimore on Sept. 4, 1983.

JONES MAKES FIRST NFL START

- Jones made his first NFL start as a defensive back in a nickel defensive alignment vs. Buffalo on Dec. 1, 2022. He finished the game with one pass defended. He also had one special teams tackle.

JONES RETURNS PUNT 84 YARDS FOR A TOUCHDOWN

- Jones returned a fourth quarter punt 84 yards for a touchdown vs. the New York Jets on Nov. 20, 2022 with five seconds to play. It is tied with Julian Edelman (84-yard touchdown return vs. Denver on Nov. 2, 2014) for the fifth-longest punt return in team history. Jones was the first player with a punt return for a touchdown in 2022. Jones' punt return for a touchdown is the first for the Patriots since Gunner Olszewski's 70-yard return at the LA Chargers on Dec. 6, 2020.

LAST MINUTE GAME WINNER

- Jones is the sixth player in the NFL to record a game-winning punt-return for a touchdown in the final two minutes of regulation or in overtime since 1970, joining Patrick Peterson (Nov. 6, 2011), DeSean Jackson (Dec. 19, 2010), Brian Westbrook (Oct. 19, 2003), Tamarick Vanover (Oct 9, 1995) and Walter Stanley (Nov. 27, 1986).
- Jones' punt return for a touchdown with five seconds remaining vs. the New York Jets (11/20) marked the second-latest game-winning punt return for a touchdown in regulation since 1970, trailing only DeSean Jackson (no time remaining on Dec. 19, 2010) who returned a punt 65-yards for a touchdown in Philadelphia's win at the New York Giants.

JONES' 84-YARD PUNT RETURN IS SECOND LONGEST GO-AHEAD TD IN 4TH QUARTER IN TEAM HISTORY

- Jones' 84-yard punt return for a touchdown is the second longest go-ahead 4th quarter touchdown in team history. The only longer return was the 91-yard missed field goal return for a touchdown by Ron Burton at Denver on Nov. 11, 1962.

WEEK 11 AFC SPECIAL TEAMS PLAYER OF THE WEEK

- Jones was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week by the National Football League for his performance in the Patriots 10-3 victory over the New York Jets in Week 11.

JONES JOINS DEION SANDERS AS TRIPLE-THREAT

- Jones registered his first career interception in the third quarter at Arizona on Dec. 12, 2022. He had a 48-yard touchdown reception vs. Buffalo (12/1/22) and returned a punt 84 yards for a touchdown vs. the New York Jets (11/20/22). The only other NFL player with a receiving touchdown, a punt or kick returned for a touchdown and an interception in the same season is Deion Sanders in 1992.



WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2024

- DB Brenden Schooler has led the Patriots in special teams tackles in each of the last two seasons with 14 in 2022 and 13 in 2023. The last player to start his career with three consecutive seasons with 10 or more special teams tackles was Tyler Matakevich (six straight from 2016-2021 with Pittsburgh and Buffalo). He had a career-high of 3 special teams tackles in the 2024 season-opener at Cincinnati on Sept. 24. It was the most special teams tackles in a game since S Cody Davis had 4 special teams tackles vs. the New York Jets on Oct. 24, 2021.

SCHOOLER - ROOKIE SPECIAL TEAMS ACE

- Schooler recovered his second fumble of the 2022 season on the punt return team when he recovered a muffed punt return by WR Chester Rogers in the fourth quarter at Cleveland (10/16/22). Schooler also recovered a muffed punt at Pittsburgh (9/18/22). Schooler had a team-leading 14 special teams tackles in 2022, including 11 solo special teams tackles.

SCHOOLER RECORDS 1ST CAREER BLOCKED FIELD GOAL

- Schooler blocked a 49-yard field goal attempt in the third quarter vs. Miami on Sept. 17, 2023 for his first career field goal block. It was the Patriots first blocked field goal attempt since DB Cody Davis blocked a 58-yard attempt at the LA Chargers on Dec. 6, 2020 that was returned 44 yards for a touchdown by S Devin McCourty. In 2022, the Patriots had one blocked kick when DB Jonathan Jones blocked a punt vs. Indianapolis on Nov. 6, 2022.

TIED FOR SECOND WITH 13 SPECIAL TEAMS TACKLES IN 2023

- Schooler reached double-digit special teams tackles in 2023 with 13 for the second straight season. As a rookie in 2022, he had a team-leading 14 special teams tackles. He is the first NFL player to begin his career with two straight 10-plus special teams tackle seasons since LB Grant Stuard with 11 special teams tackles in 2021 when he played with Tampa Bay and 11 special teams tackles in 2022 when he played for Indianapolis. Schooler finished tied for second in the NFL with 13 special teams tackles in 2023 and was named All-Pro as a core special teams player by the NFLPA.
