The New England Patriots will return to Gillette Stadium for the next two games, starting this Saturday when they host the defending AFC Champions and AFC North-leading Cincinnati Bengals. Following the Bengals game, the Patriots will host the Miami Dolphins on Sunday, Jan. 1.

New England owns a 10-2 home record against Cincinnati, including a 4-0 record against the Bengals at Gillette Stadium.

## BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be broadcast by CBS and can be seen locally on WBZ-TV Channel 4. Ian Eagle will handle play-by-play duties with Charles Davis as the color analyst. Evan Washburn will work from the sidelines. The game will be produced by Mark Wolff and directed by Suzanne Smith.

NATIONAL RADIO: This week's game will be broadcast by ESPN Radio. Steve Levy will handle play-by-play duties with former Patriots Rob Ninkovich as the color analyst.

LOCAL RADIO: 98.5 The Sports Hub is the flagship station for the Patriots Radio Network. A complete listing of the network's 33 stations can be found in this press release on page 70. Play-by-play broadcaster Bob Socci will call the action along with former Patriots quarterback Scott Zolak, who will provide color analysis. The games are produced by Marc Cappello.

## AIMING TO BECOME FIRST TEAM TO FINISH IN TOP 10 FOR 11 STRAIGHT SEASONS

The 2022 New England Patriots are tied for 7th in the NFL, allowing 19.2 points per game and can become the first NFL team since the 1970 merger to finish in the top 10 for fewest points allowed in 11 straight seasons. The Patriots have finished in the top 10 for fewest points allowed in each of the last 10 seasons (2012-2021) to tie Tampa Bay, who became the last team to reach 10 straight seasons (1996-2005) for the fewest points allowed. The 2021 Patriots finished second in the NFL with 17.8 points allowed per game. Buffalo finished first with 17.0 points allowed per game.

The New England Patriots will host the Cincinnati Bengals for the first time since a 35-17 win on Oct. 16, 2016 and play the Bengals for the first time since a 34-13 win at Cincinnati on Dec. 15, 2019. It will mark the 27th meeting between the two teams.

New England leads the all-time series by a 17-9 margin in a series that dates back to 1968. The Patriots have emerged victorious in eight of the last 10 meetings.

While New England is 10-2 all-time at home against Cincinnati, including $4-0$ at Gillette Stadium, the series is tied at 7-7 in games played at Cincinnati. However, the Patriots are in front, 3-2 at Paul Brown Stadium.

## MY DOG ATEIT

In 2004, when Bill Belichick was asked a question about Cincinnati Bengals founder Paul Brown, he remarked that he owned two copies of Brown's autobiography, "PB: The Paul Brown Story," one of which was autographed. But Belichick wasn't the only one in his house who digested Brown's football wisdom. His dog ate the autographed copy, leaving him without the prized keepsake.

## BELICHICK'S ADMIRATION FOR PAUL BROWN

A connection between Bill Belichick and Cincinnati Bengals founder Paul Brown can be traced back to when an eight-year old Belichick attended a Browns training camp and watched the head coach walk the sidelines first-hand. Belichick's godfather, Bill Edwards, played and coached with Brown before going on to coach alongside Belichick's father, Steve, at Vanderbilt. While Belichick didn't personally know Brown, he studied and admired his forward-thinking football philosophies.

Brown, who was the first head coach and general manager of the Cleveland football franchise from 1946-62 as well as the founder of the Cincinnati Bengals in 1968, is credited with creating the draw and trap plays and implementing practices broken down by position groups, among other innovations. "He was so far ahead of his time in all other organizational things, a lot of schematic things," Belichick said. "The preparation that we all do, it's all very similar to what he did half a century ago. The more I know about Paul Brown, the more impressed I am with him." Belichick had such respect for Brown that when he tied him for most career wins on Nov. 14, 2010, in a victory over the Steelers in Pittsburgh, he wore a fedora to the stadium in honor of Brown's trademark style.

## TEAM NOTES...

- The Patriots scored on defense for the fifth time in 2022 at Las Vegas, tied with Arizona for the most defensive touchdowns scored in 2022. The Patriots team record for most defensive scores is six in 2003 and 2007.
- The Patriots have returned three interceptions for touchdowns so far in 2022. The Patriots have had four interceptions returned for a touchdown in a season in 1997 and 2010 and five in a season in 2001 and 2003.
- The Patriots have scored a defensive touchdown in each of the last two games with a 23-yard fumble return for a touchdown by LB Raekwon McMIllan at Arizona on Dec. 12 and a 16-yard interception return by DB Kyle Dugger at Las Vegas on Dec. 18. - The Patriots now have 48 sacks for the year, third in the NFL behind Philadelphia (55) and Dallas (49). The Patriots are on pace to finish with 58 sacks. If the Patriots continue the current pace they will finish tied for the second-most sacks in team history, trailing the 66 sacks recorded in 1963. The Patriots also had 58 sacks in 1977. The Patriots need one more sack to tie for the most sacks the team has had under Bill Belichick with 49 sacks in 2015.

## FOLK EXTENDS STREAK UNDER 40 TO 59

K Nick Folk extended his streak to 59 straight field goals under 40 yards with a 24 -yard field goal in the second quarter. His last miss under 40 yards was a 31-yard field goal attempt on Oct. 12, 2017 vs. New England when he played for Tampa Bay. The NFL record for most consecutive field goals made under 40 yards is 70 by Baltimore's Justin Tucker (2016-2020).

Under Kraft's leadership since he purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports.

Kraft has led the two most dominant decades in NFL history in terms of overall wins - 141 (2010-19) and 126 (2000-09).

Kraft is the most successful owner since he purchased the team in 1994 in terms of wins (348), division titles (19), winning percentage (.680), playoff wins (33) and playoff seasons (22).


Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. In his 28 seasons of ownership, he has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what many observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (. 238 pct.), the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on
 Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (19), conference crowns (10) and Super Bowl championships (6) than any other NFL team. Additionally, the Patriots have achieved the most winning seasons (24) and are tied with Pittsburgh for the fewest losing seasons (3) since Kraft assumed ownership beginning in 1994. Super Bowl LIII was the 10th Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has appeared in more than four Super Bowls. In Kraft's 28 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 22 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons, and finished with a winning record 24 times.

## A WINNING TRADITION I

## KRAFT PASSES OTHER OWNERS

The Patriots have 348 wins overall under Robert Kraft. He has produced more victories than every other Patriots owner combined. Under Kraft, the Patriots are 348-164 overall since he purchased the team in 1994. Kraft's predecessors in the owner's office went 225-276-9 in the 34 years prior to his purchase of the team.

Bill Belichick is the only head coach in NFL history to win six Super Bowl titles. He won more games overall (141) during a 10-year stretch (2010-19) than any other coach in NFL history. In 2007, Belichick led the Patriots to the fourth undefeated and untied regular season in NFL history and the first since the NFL established a 16-game schedule in 1978. - While in high school, Stevenson started gaining attention for the impressive stats he posted as a junior. Unfortunately, due to his grades, Stevenson was academically ineligible to receive a football scholarship despite being recruited. Following his senior year of high school, Stevenson took a year off from football working part-time jobs at Wal-Mart and Jimmy John's. But after a year away, he decided to follow a group of his friends and enroll in Cerritos Community College. During his time at Cerritos, he shared a two-bedroom apartment with up to six other guys at times and rode his bicycle 20 minutes to and from practice every day. After putting up monster stats in his second season at Cerriots, he committed to Oklahoma. Oklahoma led him to the 2021 NFL Draft where in the fourth round on the third day the Patriots selected Stevenson. In addition he worked on his academics and made the Dean's List while at Oklahoma.

\section*{STEVENSON RECORDS FIRST RECEIVING TOUCHDOWN}
- Stevenson had his first career touchdown reception on a 3-yard pass from QB Mac Jones in the second quarter vs. Indianapolis on Nov. 62022.

- Stevenson set career highs in receptions and receiving yards after finishing with 9 receptions for 76 yards at Minnesota on Nov. 24, 2022. - Patriots 2022 fourth-round pick Jack Jones was in the starting lineup at cornerback at Green Bay on Oct. 2, 2021 in place of the injured Jalen Mills. It was Jones's first NFL start. He forced and recovered a fumble on WR Romeo Doubs in the first quarter to give the Patriots a first down at the 50-yard line. \section*{THE RISE OF THE GREEN GOBLIN}
- DB Jalen Mills has embraced his nickname "The Green Goblin." The origins of the nickname started out as a joke during his rookie season with Philadelphia when he dyed his hair green. Mills is not sure whether it was a coach or the media, but the spiderman villain nickname stuck.
- Said Mills, "It just kind of came from my rookie year and then just throughout my years playing for the Eagles, my style of play. That's what I get it from. It's kind of something that I stuck with."

\section*{A NUMBER CHANGE WITH A STORY}

Late in the Eagles' eventual Super Bowl-winning season, Jalen's Uncle Uhkoto lost his battle with cancer. The once-close relatives had long since drifted apart and fallen out of touch. As a result, only in the wake of Uhkoto's death did Jalen learned that his uncle - a man who otherwise shunned sports - could quote his nephew's NFL statistics chapter and verse: every pass breakup, every interception, every tackle, every game, Uhkoto was keeping track of Jalen. The discovery left him with a heavy heart.
"It kind of broke me down," Jalen revealed, "because we had grown apart. We were close at one point in time. It took that moment for me to realize, this is a man I looked up to as a younger kid, and now he was looking up to me, keeping up with sports that he didn't even care about. So, I wanted to honor him in my own quiet way."

In 2021, Mills would get that opportunity. After signing his free-agent contract with New England, Jalen learned that the NFL would relax its jersey number restrictions, allowing certain positions beyond kicker, punter, and quarterback to wear single-digits on their uniforms.

Mills, who wore 31 and 21 at times as an Eagle, chose No. 2 here in New England. You see, almost no one ever called Uhkoto - pronounced uh-COO-too - by his full name. They preferred his shortened nickname: Two.

- "I'm one of the guys that when you ask me what position I play, I say 'defense.' I want to be able to line up everywhere, and most importantly, I want to be able to produce everywhere."
- Began his career in 2014 in San Diego focusing on special teams and was selected to his first Pro Bowl in 2018 as a special teamer. His 2018 Pro Bowl berth was the only one that Matthew Slater did not get voted to since 2011.
- Started all 16 games at safety in 2020 for the Patriots and led the team in tackles with a career-high 107.

- Phillips picked off a fourth quarter pass from QB Justin Herbert and returned it 26 yards for a touchdown at the L.A. Chargers on Oct. 31, 2021. It was Phillips' first career touchdown. It is the Patriots first interception returned for a touchdown since DB Devin McCourty returned a pick 43 yards for a touchdown at Seattle on Sept. 20, 2020. He was named AFC Defensive Player of the Week for his performance.

- Phillips finished with two interceptions against the Chargers. He also picked off Herbert in the second quarter. He earned AFC Defensive Player of the Week honors for his effort.


\section*{ASK AND JAHLANI RECEIVED}
- LB Jahlani Tavai starred in high school as a nose guard. He was undersized and did not attract attention of many colleges. But after finding out one of the English teachers at his high school was the son of then-Hawaii coach Norm Chow, he reached out to the teacher, Cameron Chow, and asked if Cameron could tell his dad scout Jahlani. Cameron followed up and passed along Jahlani's tape to his dad and the very next day Jahlani had a scholarship offer. According to Jahlani, his football career would have been over after high school if it wasn't for this connection.


\section*{LB JOSH UCHE HAS CAREER-HIGH THREE SACKS}
- LB Josh Uche registered a career-high three sacks after dropping Indianapolis (11/6/22) QB Sam Ehlinger for a 2-yard loss and an 8-yard loss in the second quarter and a 1 -yard sack in the third quarter. He has three career game with at least two sacks. He had his first two-sack game after registering two fourth quarter sacks at the New York Jets on Sept. 19, 2021 and also had two sacks vs. Buffalo on Dec. 12022.

- Deatrich Wise Jr. was named a team captain for the first time in his career in 2022.

LB Tully Banta-Cain had three sacks in the second half at Buffalo on Dec. 20, 2009, DL Jarvis Green had three sacks in the second half at Cincinnati on Oct. 1, 2006 and Josh Uche at Arizona on Dec. 12.

- Wise was honored with the 2022 Ron Burton Community Service Award at the Patriots Premiere this past September for his dedication to serving his community. After receiving the award, Wise said, "You don't go out in the community for the gratification. You just do it because it's in your heart to do. It's an honor to win an award of this prestige and to be in the same group as everybody who's won that before and have my name with the Burton family."

- Jones, who made his first career start on defense vs. Buffalo on Dec. 1, 2022, also lined up on offense and scored on a 48-yard touchdown pass from QB Mac Jones on his first play from scrimmage in the first quarter. Jones became the first defensive back to record a touchdown reception on offense since 2000 when S Marcus Coleman of the New York Jets caught a 45-yard touchdown pass from QB Vinny Testaverde against Buffalo on Sept 17, 2000. Jones caught 15 passes for 137 yards with a one receiving touchdown during his college career. He scored on a 47-yard touchdown pass vs. Navy on Sept. 25, 2021. Jones is the first player with a punt return for a touchdown in 2022. Jones's punt return for a touchdown is the first for the Patriots since Gunner Olszewski's 70-yard return at the LA Chargers on Dec. 6, 2020.

- Slater has been named to 10 Pro Bowls for his special teams work, but perhaps more revealing of his value to New England is the fact that he was elected a captain by his teammates for the 12th straight season in 2022.
- He shared what it means to be a captain in a story published by The Boston Globe. "You have to be able to put others before yourself. Being a captain and leadership is about serving, and to me, that means a great deal of sacrifice - putting aside personal agendas for the greater common goal. Leadership is equated with sacrifice. - Bill Belichick acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eight-man rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there - fourth-and-short, where they're trying to protect the box - but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts."

- During a 2007 game against Arizona State, UCLA's Matthew Slater returned a kickoff 89 yards for the final touchdown of his collegiate career. - From Sickle Cell to Education to Criminal Justice to Healthcare Equity, Devin's work is prolific. He has steered the New England Patriots' Players Social Justice Fund since it was established at the end of the 2018 season, and has served as a Players Coalition Task Force Member and Chair of its Education \& Economic Advancement Committee since its founding in 2018. Devin serves as a member of the Board of Boston Medical Center and on the Advisory Board of Boston Uncornered, which redirects gang-involved individuals from violence and incarceration to education and careers. Devin is an advocate for a number of other issues that affect the community. His positive and meaningful impact on others has been immeasurable.

- The Josh Uche Foundation was created to empower and provide at-risk youth with educational advancement, resource programming, mentorship, and mental health empowerment.
- Josh plans to start an annual football camp that incorporates yoga and athletic mobility to show young athletes that there's more to physical fitness than just lifting weights and running fast.

Though NF affects over 2.5 million people worldwide, it is still relatively unknown in the general public. The Children's Tumor Foundation's MAKE NF VISIBLE campaign brings awareness and inclusion to all NF patients. Those with visible signs of NF struggle to be seen as more than just their NF, while patients whose NF is invisible struggle to make others understand. \section*{COMEBACKS FOR THE AGES}

The Patriots have staged two historic come-from-behind victories over the past several seasons:

Bill Belichick coached the Patriots back from a 25-point deficit to win Super Bowl LI. A comeback of that magnitude is extremely rare. There had been 2,656 games in which a team led by 25 points or more in NFL history, including the postseason. Teams leading by 25 had recorded 2,647 wins, seven losses and two ties, a winning percentage of .997.

New England came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos, 34-31, in overtime in a Sunday Night Football matchup on Nov. 24, 2013, marking the largest regular season comeback win in team history, after trailing 24-0 at halftime.

New England's previous best comeback win was from a 23-0 deficit to win, 38-23, vs. Seattle (09/16/84). The Patriots also came back from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, 23-22 (12/21/96). The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently vs. Buffalo (01/01/12)

    The New England Patriots are tied with the Pittsburgh Steelers for the most Super Bowl wins in the NFL with six.

    - The Patriots have played in 11 Super Bowls, the most by any team in NFL history. Dallas, Denver and Pittsburgh have played in eight.
    - The Patriots are third in NFL history with 15 Conference Championship Game appearances, one behind the 16 by Pittsburgh and San Francisco.
    - The New England Patriots have 37 postseason victories, the most in NFL history. Pittsburgh and Green Bay are second with 36 playoff wins all-time.
    - The New England Patriots have earned seven No. 1 seeds, behind San Francisco (9) and Denver (8) since playoff seeding began in 1975.
    - The Patriots have earned a first-round playoff bye an NFL-best 14 times since 1990. Pittsburgh and San Francisco are second with nine byes since 1990. New England is the only team in NFL history with nine straight first-round byes (2010-18).
    - The Patriots have played in 59 postseason games, fourth-most in NFL history behind Dallas (64), Pittsburgh (63) and Green Bay (61). The Patriots need to play in one more postseason game in 2022 to become the fourth NFL team to play in 60 postseason games.
    - The Patriots are second with 13 seasons of 12 wins since 1970, behind San Francisco's 14 seasons with 12 victories
    - New England has won 13 games in a single season seven times in franchise history. Only San Francisco has more 13-win seasons with 10.
    - The New England Patriots have won 14 or more games in a season five times, most in NFL history. San Francisco is second with four 14 -win seasons.
    - New England has 28 undefeated months since 2000, most in the NFL over that span. Green Bay is second with 20 undefeated months during that time.
    - The Patriots have 35 winning seasons since 1970 , second all-time behind Pittsburgh's 38
    
    - The Patriots have 573 total victories tied with Green Bay for the third-most wins since 1960, behind the 583 wins by Pittsburgh and Dallas.
    - New England (1,022) played their 1,000th game in franchise history (regular season and playoffs combined) against Cleveland on Nov. 14, 2021 and became the first original AFL team to play in 1,000 games.
    - With rookie free agents DL DaMarcus Mitchell and DB Brenden Schooler making the initial 53-man roster in 2022, the Patriots have now had a rookie free agent make the opening day roster for 19 straight seasons, tied with Denver for the longest streak in the NFL
    - The Patriots have finished in the top 10 for fewest points allowed in each of the last 10 seasons (2012-2021) to tie Tampa Bay, who became the last team to reach 10 straight seasons (1996-2005) for the fewest points allowed. The 2021 Patriots finished second in the NFL with 17.8 points allowed per game. Buffalo finished first with 17.0 points allowed per game. The 2022 New England team is tied for 7th in the NFL, allowing 19.2 points per game. They can become the first team since the NFL merger in 1970 finish in the top 10 in 11 straight seasons.

    The Patriots announced the return of the red throwback uniforms late in the spring. The team wore the uniform vs. Detroit on Oct. 9 and vs. Buffalo on Dec. 1. The uniform's design, a red jersey with timeless blue and white stripes across the sleeves and white numbers outlined in blue, is based on the uniform worn from 1984-1992 and sporadically worn from 1994-2012 as an alternate uniform. In 2013, the NFL announced a rule mandating every club stick to one helmet all season. Unfortunately for the Patriots, this meant sidelining the throwback uniforms as the silver helmet with the modern-day logo did not feel right to blend with the classic throwback threads. In June of 2021, a memo was sent to teams announcing the approval of a second helmet for the following season. The rule change allowed the Patriots to complete the throwback uniforms with a white helmet, white face mask and the Pat the Patriot logo to officially revive the red throwback uniforms for the upcoming season. The announcement of the long-awaited revival included the original Delorean from the Back to the Future movie franchise and players repping the throwback threads. The social media posts instantly generated national attention as fans and media alike welcomed back the beloved red jerseys.
