GAME SUMMARY

NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (10-6) AT MIAMI DOLPHINS (8-8)
 Sunday, January 9, 2022 • Hark Rock Stadium (64,767) • 4:25 p.m. ET

The New England Patriots will close out the regular season when they travel to face the Miami Dolphins in a rematch of the 2021 season-opener, a 17-16, Miami victory. It marks the sixth time in team history that the Patriots will open and close the season against the same opponent. It also happened in 2003 and 2013 against Buffalo, 1974 and 1987 against Miami and 1981 against the Baltimore Colts.

The Patriots and Dolphins have split the annual series in each of the last four seasons, and Miami has not swept the Patriots since the 2000 season.

With the 17-game schedule being played for the first time, a game on January 9 in the latest the Patriots have ever played in a regular season game. Prior to this season the latest the Patriots ever played in their last regular season game was in 2001 when the Week 2 games were postponed and rescheduled to January 6 in the wake of the September 11 attacks.

BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be broadcast by **CBS** and can be seen locally on **WBZ-TV** Channel 4. **Spero Dedes** will handle play-by-play duties with **Jay Feely** as the color analyst. **Jenny Dell** will work from the sidelines. The game will be produced by **Jason Ross** and directed by **Jim Cornell**.

LOCAL RADIO: **98.5 The Sports Hub** is the flagship station for the Patriots Radio Network. A complete listing of the network's 35 stations can be found on page 70. Play-by-play broadcaster **Bob Socci** will call the action along with former Patriots quarterback **Scott Zolak**, who will provide color analysis. The games are produced by **Marc Cappello**.

PLAYOFF BERTHS UNDER KRAFT

New England has qualified for the playoffs 28 times in the team's 62-year history. The Patriots have earned 22 of those playoff berths, including an NFL-best 19 division championships, in the 28 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994. New England has won 22 division crowns overall (21 AFC East crowns) and has qualified as a Wild Card team on four occasions (1976, '85, '94 and '98). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 as part of a 16-team tournament following a players' strike.

AIMING FOR AN 11TH WIN

Bill Belichick owns the NFL record with 17 seasons of 11 wins in the regular season. Don Shula and Andy Reid are second with 13. With a victory over Miami this week, Belichick can extend his record to 18 seasons with 11 wins.

PATRIOTS AT MIAMI DOLPHINS

SERIES HISTORY

The New England Patriots and Miami Dolphins will square off for the second of two meetings in 2021 when they play this Sunday at Miami. The Patriots will try to avenge a 17-16 loss to Miami in the 2021 season-opener on Sept. 12. The two teams have split the series in each of the last four seasons

This week's game marks the sixth time in New England team history that they will open and close the season against the same opponent. It also happened in 2003 and 2013 against Buffalo, 1974 and 187 against Miami and 1981 against the Buffalo Bills.

The Patriots will be playing against Miami in the final regular game of the season for the 17th time overall. Of the 16 season-finale meetings, eight of them were played in Miami. The Patriots are 8-8 in those games, including 4-4 in those games played at Miami.

The Patriots have had the upper hand at home against Miami, holding a 36-19 record in games played in New England in the regular season, including a 16-4 record at Gillette Stadium. But the Patriots are 17-39 all-time in Miami, including two postseason contests. Miami beat New England at Gillette Stadium for the first time in the final game of the 2005 season.

The Dolphins and Patriots met for the first time in 1966 and began playing twice a year during the 1967 regular season, except in 1982 during a players' strike.

The two have played three times in the postseason with New England holding a 2-1 advantage.

- The Patriots will finish in the top 10 for fewest points allowed in each of the last 10 seasons (2012-2021), tying Tampa Bay, who became the last team to reach 10 straight seasons (1996-2005) for the fewest points allowed.
- The Patriots are second to Dallas (25) in 2021 with 23 interceptions and have a chance to take the NFL lead this week. In 2020, the Patriots tied for the NFL lead with Miami, New Orleans and Pittsburgh with 18 interceptions. The 2019 Patriots team led the NFL with 25 interceptions. Two teams have led the NFL in interceptions in three or more straight seasons: Kansas City (5 straight – 1966-70) and the New York Giants (3 straight – 1937-39). Overall, the Patriots have led the NFL in interceptions four times (2003, 2010, 2019 and 2020).
- With two interceptions this week against Miami, the Patriots will tie for the second-most interceptions under Bill Belichick in a single season. They had 25 picks in 2010 and 2019, second to the 29 interceptions they had in 2003.
- The Patriots have won 11 games 21 times in team history, including an NFL record 10 consecutive seasons from 2010-19. The Patriots have had 11 or more wins 17 times in Robert Kraft's 27 previous seasons of ownership after having only four 11-win seasons prior to Kraft purchasing the team (1976, '78, '85 & '86).

- The Patriots have 48 touchdowns in 2021 and need two this week to reach 50 touchdowns in a season for the 12th time in team history.
- The Patriots have three players with double-digit special teams tackles with Cody Davis (14), Matthew Slater (10) and Brandon King (10). 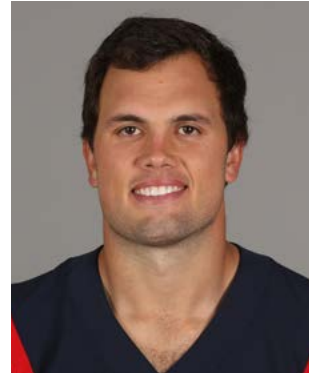

WHAT TO LOOK FOR...

- Damien Harris is tied for second in the NFL with 14 rushing touchdowns in 2021. He needs one more rushing touchdowns to move into sole possession of second place for the most rushing touchdowns in a season by a Patriot. Harris has scored five touchdowns in the last two games.
- Harris has five 100-yard rushing games in 2021. Since 1970, only Curtis Martin (9 in 1995) and Corey Dillon (9 in 2004) have had more than five 100-yard games in a season for the Patriots.
- Harris has rushed for a career-high 892 yards and if he gains 108 yards rushing this week, he will reach the 1,000-yard plateau. It would be the 17th time in team history, and first time since 2016, that the Patriots would have a 1,000-yard rusher.
- Harris averaged 5.04-yards per carry (137 rushing attempts for 691 yards) in 2020, becoming the fourth Patriots player to finish with at least a 5.0-yard average (minimum 100 attempts) in a season. The best back-to-back average in team history was Craig James with a 4.9 average in 1984 followed by a 4.7-yard average in 1985. Harris enters the final week of the season with a 4.7-yard average.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR...

- Nick Folk has a career high and is tied with Daniel Carlson (Raiders) for an NFL-leading 35 field goals in 2021. Folk, now in his 14th NFL season, has never led the NFL in field goals made. Since 1970, the Patriots have had a player finish first in the NFL in field goals five times – Tony Franklin in 1986, Adam Vinatieri in 2004 and Stephen Gostkowski in 2008, 2013 and 2014.
- Only two NFL players have reached 40 field goals in a season with David Akers (44) in 2011 with San Francisco and Neil Rackers (40) in 2005 with Arizona. Folk needs four field goals to become the third player in NFL history to reach 40 field goals in a season.
- Folk tied the team record for most 50-yard field goals in a season with his five. If he connects on a 50-yard field goal vs. Miami, he will establish the team record for most 50-yard field goals in one season. Stephen Gostkowski had five 50-yard field goals in 2013.
- Folk has connected on 54 straight field goals from under 50 yards, the second-longest streak in NFL history to the 56 straight field goals from under 50 yards by Ryan Succop (2014-17) while with Tennessee. He needs two more successful field goals under 50 yards to tie Succop. Folk's last miss under 50 yards was a 45-yard field goal attempt in the 2020 season-opener vs. Miami on Sept. 13.
- Folk has connected on four or more field goals five times in 2021 and needs to kick at least four field goals this week at Miami to tie the NFL record. The NFL record for most games in a season with at least four field goals is six by David Akers in 2011 with San Francisco.

Under Kraft's leadership since he purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports.

Kraft has led the two most dominant decades in NFL history in terms of overall wins – 141 (2010-19) and 126 (2000-09).

Kraft is the most successful owner since he purchased the team in 1994 in terms of wins (341), division titles (19), winning percentage (.688), playoff wins (33) and playoff seasons (22).



Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. In his 28 seasons of ownership, he has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what many observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.238 pct.), the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (19), conference crowns (10) and Super Bowl championships (6) than any other NFL team. Additionally, the Patriots have achieved the most winning seasons (24) and are tied with Pittsburgh for the fewest losing seasons (3) since Kraft assumed ownership beginning in 1994. Super Bowl LIII was the 10th Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has appeared in more than four Super Bowls. In Kraft's 28 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 22 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons, and finished with a winning record 24 times.

A WINNING TRADITION I

Robert Kraft won his 300th game overall as owner of the New England Patriots against Miami on Sept. 30, 2018. Kraft reached the milestone in his 25th NFL season and in his 432nd game, the fastest an owner has reached the milestone. Al Davis of the Raiders accomplished the feat in 495 games (31 seasons) while Pat Bowlen of Denver reached 300 career wins in 501 games (30 seasons).

A WINNING TRADITION II

Kraft's winning percentage with the Patriots (.688) since taking over the team in 1994 is the highest among all owners/ownership groups with at least 200 wins (regular and postseason) with one team. He is one of just four owners with at least 200 wins and a winning percentage over .600.

KRAFT PASSES OTHER OWNERS

The Patriots have 341 wins overall under Robert Kraft. He has produced more victories than every other Patriots owner combined. Under Kraft, the Patriots are 341-155 overall since he purchased the team in 1994. Kraft's predecessors in the owner's office went 225-276-9 in the 34 years prior to his purchase of the team.

CONTINUITY BREEDS SUCCESS

New England is the first team in NFL history to win six Super Bowls with the same owner (Robert Kraft), head coach (Bill Belichick) and quarterback (Tom Brady).

PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 28 times in their 62-year history. Twenty-two of those playoff berths have come in the 28 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. The Patriots have won 22 division crowns.

PATRIOTS

- The New England Patriots are tied with the Pittsburgh Steelers for the most Super Bowl wins in the NFL with six.
- The Patriots have played in 11 Super Bowls, the most by any team in NFL history. Dallas, Denver and Pittsburgh have played in eight.
- The Patriots are third in NFL history with 15 Conference Championship Game appearances, one behind the 16 by Pittsburgh and San Francisco.
- The New England Patriots have 37 postseason victories, the most in NFL history. Pittsburgh is second with 36 playoff wins all-time.
- The New England Patriots earned seven No. 1 seeds, behind Denver (8) and San Francisco (9) since playoff seeding began in 1975.
- The Patriots earned a first-round playoff bye an NFL-best 14 times since 1990. Pittsburgh and San Francisco are second with nine byes since 1990. New England is the only team in NFL history with nine straight first-round byes (2010-18).
- The Patriots have played in 58 postseason games, fourth-most in NFL history behind Dallas (63), Pittsburgh (62) and Green Bay (60). The Patriots need to play in two more postseason games in 2021 to become the fourth NFL team to play in 60 postseason games.
- The Patriots are second with 13 seasons of 12 wins since 1970, behind San Francisco's 14 seasons with 12 victories
- New England has won 13 games in a single season seven times in franchise history. Only San Francisco has more 13-win seasons with 10.
- The New England Patriots have won 14 or more games in a season five times, most in NFL history. San Francisco is second with four 14-win seasons.
- New England has 28 undefeated months since 2000, most in the NFL over that span. Green Bay is second with 20 undefeated months during that time.
- The Patriots have 35 winning seasons since 1970, second all-time behind Pittsburgh's 37



- The Patriots have 566 total victories, the fourth-most wins since 1960, behind the 576 wins by Pittsburgh, the 572 wins by Dallas and the 567 wins by Green Bay.
- New England (1,006) played in their 1,000 games in franchise history (regular season and playoffs combined) against Cleveland on Nov. 14, 2021 and became the first original AFL team to play in 1,000 games.
- With rookie free agent K Quinn Nordin making the initial 53-man roster in 2021, the Patriots have now had a rookie free agent make the opening day roster for the 18th straight season, the third-longest streak in the NFL. The L.A. Chargers have had a rookie free agent make their opening day roster for 25 straight seasons and Indianapolis has had a rookie free agent make their opening day roster for 23 straight seasons.
- The Patriots have finished in the top 10 for fewest points allowed in each of the last nine seasons (2012-2020) and need to accomplish the feat in 2021 to tie Tampa Bay, who became the last team to reach 10 straight seasons (1996-2005) for the fewest points allowed. The 2021 Patriots are first in the NFL with 16.9 points allowed per game.

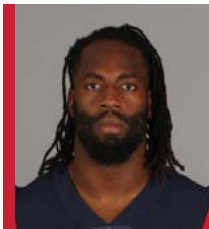

J.C. JACKSON
1ST PRO BOWL SELECTION

New England Patriots cornerback J.C. Jackson, linebacker Matthew Judon and special teams captain Matthew Slater have been selected to represent the New England Patriots in the 2022 NFL Pro Bowl. The 2022 Pro Bowl will be played on Sunday, Feb. 6 at Allegiant Stadium in Las Vegas.

Jackson earned his first Pro Bowl berth. His eight interceptions this season are the second-most in the NFL, behind Dallas' Trevon Diggs (11). Jackson has the most interceptions since entering the NFL in 2018 as a rookie free agent out of Maryland with 25 picks. Those 25 interceptions in his first four NFL seasons are tied with Lester Hayes (25) and Everson Walls (25) for the most by a player in his first four seasons since 1970.



MATTHEW JUDON
3RD PRO BOWL SELECTION

Judon is headed to his third straight Pro Bowl and first with the Patriots. He has a career-high 12 ½ sacks this season and is tied with Chandler Jones and Mike Vrabel for the most sacks in a season under Bill Belichick. Judon signed with the Patriots last offseason as an unrestricted free agent from Baltimore. He originally entered the NFL as a fifth-round draft pick by the Ravens out of Grand Valley State in the 2016 NFL Draft.



MATTHEW SLATER
10TH PRO BOWL SELECTION

Slater has been named to his 10th career Pro Bowl as a special teams player, extending his record for most special teams Pro Bowl honors in NFL history. Steve Tasker is second with seven. Slater moved out of a tie with John Hannah (9) for sole possession for the second-most Pro Bowl selections in franchise history, behind the 14 by Tom Brady. The former fifth-round draft pick out of UCLA earned a roster position with the Patriots as a rookie in 2008 with his contributions on special teams. Entering the 2011 season, teammates elected him as their special teams captain. That year, he was also selected to his first Pro Bowl. Since then, he has earned special teams captain honors to start each season. In addition, he has been voted to the Pro Bowl every year since 2011, except 2018.

PATRIOTS DEFENSE PRODUCES FOUR INTERCEPTIONS; END FIRST TWO JETS DRIVES WITH INTERCEPTIONS

The Patriots had four interceptions against the Jets (9/19/21), the most picks in a single game since they had four at Cincinnati on Dec. 15, 2019. The Patriots ended the first two Jets drives with interceptions from CB J.C. Jackson and DB Adrian Phillips, leading to 10 points. Jackson added a second interception in the second quarter, and Devin McCourty had a pick in the third quarter. The Patriots had their second game in 2021 with four picks in the 25-0 shutout win at Atlanta on Nov. 18.

PATRIOTS SCORE 50

The Patriots finished with 54 points against the New York Jets on Oct. 24, 2021 and 50 points against Jacksonville on Jan. 2. The Patriots have scored 50 points 10 times under Bill Belichick. The 54 points are the 7th most points scored in team history. It is the third time in team history that the Patriots have had a season with two games scoring at least 50 points. They also scored 50 points in two games in 2007 and 2012.

PATRIOTS SCORE 50 AGAINST THE JETS FOR THE THIRD TIME IN TEAM HISTORY

The 50-point output marks the third 50-point game the Patriots have produced against the Jets. The Patriots scored a 56-3 win vs. the Jets on Sept. 9, 1979 and a 55-21 victory vs. the Jets on Oct. 29, 1978.

PATRIOTS EXPLODE FOR 31 POINTS IN THE FIRST HALF

The Patriots scored 31 points in the first half against the Jets (10/24). It is the 12th time in team history that they have had a 30-point first half, the 10th time under Bill Belichick and the first since a 30-13 halftime lead in a 36-20 win at New Orleans on Sept. 17, 2017.

PATRIOTS TIE TEAM RECORD WITH FOUR RUSHING TDs

The Patriots tied a team record with four rushing touchdowns in the win against the Jets (10/24) and the win vs. Jacksonville (01/02). The Patriots have had four rushing touchdowns in a game 11 times overall. They have accomplished the mark four times against the Jets – Sept. 8, 1963, Oct. 18, 1976, Oct. 29, 1978 and Oct. 24, 2021.

PATRIOTS OFFENSE PRODUCES 32 FIRST DOWNS

The Patriots offense produced 32 first downs in the win against the New York Jets (10/24) and in the win vs. Jacksonville (01/02), the 13th time in team history that they have had at least 32 first downs. It is the most since tying a team record with 35 first downs in the win vs. Jacksonville on Sept. 27, 2015.

PATRIOTS OFFENSE GAINS 551 TOTAL YARDS

The Patriots offense generated 551 total yards against the New York Jets (10/24), the 7th highest total in team history and the most since 555 total yards at New Orleans on Sept. 17, 2017.

RECEIVERS HAVE COMPLETED THREE PASSES IN 2021

Kendrick Bourne's 25-yard touchdown pass to Nelson Agholor against the Jets on Oct. 24 was the third pass completion by a Patriots wide receiver in 2021. Jakobi Meyers completed two passes vs. Tampa Bay on Oct. 3. The 2020 Patriots had four completions by wide receivers. The most passes completed by a New England team by non-quarterbacks was seven in 1981.

PATRIOTS 2ND IN THE NFL WITH 23 INTERCEPTIONS

The Patriots are second to Dallas (25) in 2021 with 23 interceptions in 2021. In 2020, the Patriots tied for the NFL lead with Miami, New Orleans and Pittsburgh with 18 interceptions. The 2019 New England team led the NFL with 25 interceptions. Two teams have led the NFL in interceptions in three or more straight seasons: Kansas City (5 straight – 1966-70) and the New York Giants (3 straight – 1937-39). Overall, the Patriots have led the NFL in interceptions four times (2003, 2010, 2019 and 2020).

LOCKDOWN DEFENSE

The 2021 Patriots defense is ranked 3rd in the NFL. Under Bill Belichick, the Patriots have had a defense finish in the top 10 eight times, including the 2019 defense that finished first in the NFL.

PATRIOTS PLAY 1,000 GAME

New England (1,006) played in their 1,000 game in franchise history against Cleveland on Nov. 14, 2021 to become the first original AFL team to play in 1,000 games.

The Patriots capped an 11-play 99-yard drive with a 23-yard touchdown pass from QB Mac Jones to WR Kendrick Bourne against Cleveland on Nov. 14, 2021. It is the first 99-yard drive for New England since a 10-play, 99-yard drive that was culminated by a 10-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady to Rob Gronkowski vs. San Diego on Sept. 18, 2011. Since 2000, the Patriots have now had three drives of 99 yards. Brady completed a 99-yard touchdown pass to WR Wes Welker at Miami on Sept. 12, 2011. Those are the only 99-yard drive for the Patriots since 1980.

SUNDAY DRIVES

The Patriots offense had three 90-yard drives that resulted in touchdowns against Cleveland on Nov. 14, 2021. The Patriots had an 11-play, 99-yard drive in the second quarter that resulted in a touchdown, an 8-play, 92-yard scoring drive and a 6-play, 95-yard scoring drive. It is the only time in the Bill Belichick era that the team has had three 90-play drives in a game.

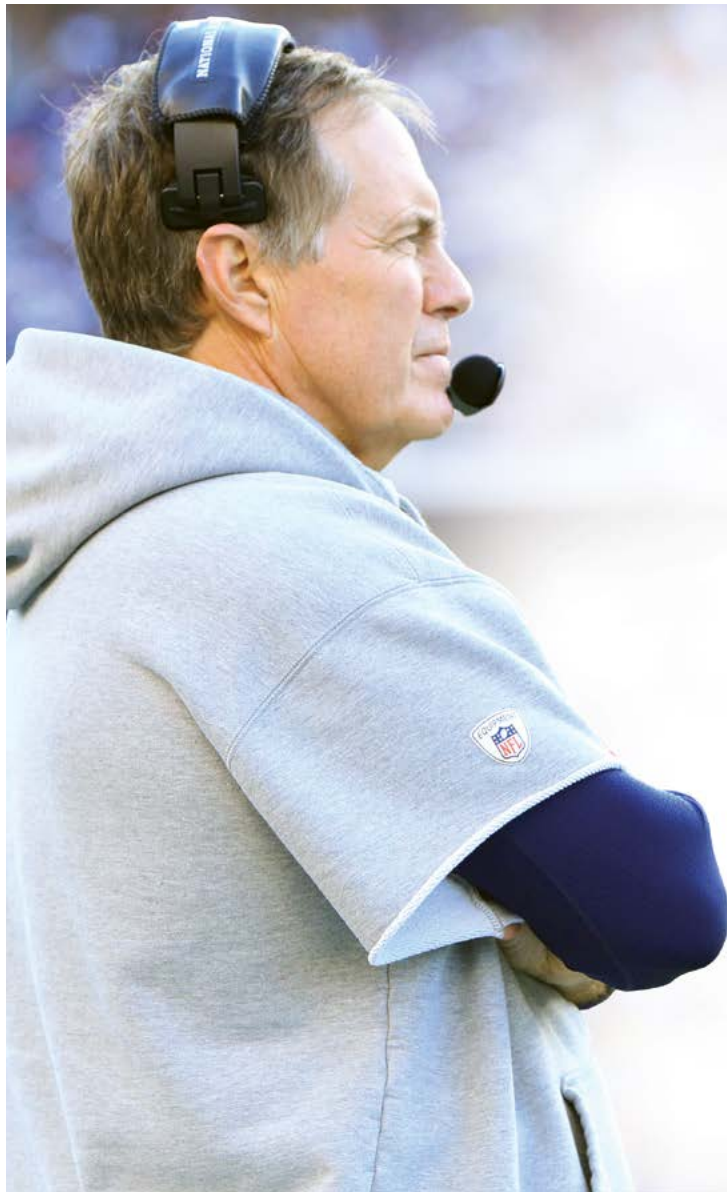

Bill Belichick is the only head coach in NFL history to win six Super Bowl titles. He won more games overall (141) during a 10-year stretch (2010-19) than any other coach in NFL history. WR KENDRICK BOURNE COMPLETES FIRST NFL PASS FOR A TOUCHDOWN

WR Kendrick Bourne completed his first NFL pass attempt for a 25-yard touchdown pass to WR Nelson Agholor in the first quarter against the New York Jets on Oct. 24, 2021, giving him a perfect passer rating of 158.3.

WR Kendrick Bourne had a 15-yard run in the first quarter, an 11-yard run in the second quarter and a 17-yard run in the third quarter against Cleveland on Nov. 14, 2021. 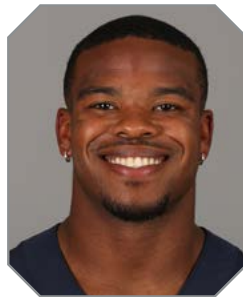

The best back-to-back average in team history was Craig James with a 4.9 average in 1984 followed by a 4.7-yard average in 1985. Harris enters the final game with a 4.7-yard average.

HARRIS SETS CAREER HIGH

Harris has 892 yards rushing with 14 TDs in 2021, moving past the 641 yards and 5 TDs he had in 2020. He is tied for second in the NFL with the 14 touchdowns.

HARRIS SCORES ON A CAREER-LONG TOUCHDOWN RUN

Harris scored on a career-long 64-yard touchdown run in the first quarter at Buffalo (12/6/21). Harris' previous long was a 41-yard run on Oct. 5, 2020 at Kansas City. It is the longest run and longest touchdown run by the Patriots in the regular season since a 70-yard touchdown run by Curtis Martin on Sept. 21, 1997 vs. Chicago. LeGarrette Blount had a 73-yard touchdown run vs. Indianapolis on Jan. 11, 2014 in an AFC Divisional Playoff Game.

FOURTH-HIGHEST RUSHING AVERAGE IN A SINGLE GAME

Harris finished with 111 yards on 10 carries for an 11.1-yard average at Buffalo (12/6/21). Harris' 11.1 average is the fourth-highest among all Patriots running backs in a single game with at least 10 rushing attempts.

HARRIS 100 YARDS RUSHING

RB Damien Harris had his fifth 100-yard rushing game of the 2021 season after finishing with 103 yards on 18 attempts vs. Buffalo (12/26). Since 1970, only Curtis Martin (9 in 1995) and Corey Dillon (9 in 2004) have had more than five 100-yard games in a season for the Patriots. John Stephens also had five 100-yard games in 1988.

HARRIS REACHES DOUBLE-DIGIT RUSHING TOUCHDOWNS

Harris has 14 rushing touchdowns and became the 12th New England player to reach double-digit rushing touchdowns in a season. He joins LeGarrette Blount, Curtis Martin, Corey Dillon, BenJarvus Green-Ellis, Steve Grogan, Cam Newton, Stevan Ridley, Antowain Smith, Horace Ivory, Jim Nance and Tony Collins as the Patriots players to reach 10 rushing touchdowns in a season. Harris is the first Patriot to reach double-digits in rushing touchdowns since LeGarrette Blount set the team mark with 18 during the 2016 season.

HARRIS AT 14

Harris' 14 rushing touchdowns are tied for the most by a Patriots player in his first or second season. Curtis Martin had 14 in 1995 and 1996.

QB MAC JONES

HIGH COMPLETION PCT.

- New England Patriots 2021 first-round draft pick Mac Jones made his first NFL start in the season-opener vs. Miami on Sept. 12 and completed 29-of-39 passes for 281 yards with one touchdown for a completion percentage of 74.4. That is the fourth-highest completion percentage by a rookie in Week 1 since 1970 (min. 10 attempts).

MAC JONES - FIRST NFL QB WITH 70-PLUS COMPLETION PERCENTAGE IN FIRST TWO GAMES

Jones followed a 74.4 completion percentage in the opener against Miami by completing 73.3 percent of his passes (22-of-30 passes) for 186 yards at the NY Jets (9/19). He is the first quarterback with a 70-plus completion percentage in each of his first two games (min. 10 attempts in each game). He has now completed over 70 percent of his passes in nine of his first 16 NFL games. He tied Dak Prescott for the most such games by a rookie quarterback in a season.

JONES COMPLETES 19 CONSECUTIVE PASSES TO TIE TEAM MARK

Jones completed 19 straight passes during a stretch from the second quarter to the fourth quarter vs. Tampa Bay on Oct. 3, tied for the longest streak in team history. Tom Brady had a streak of 19 consecutive passes in Week 1 of the 2015 season vs. Pittsburgh on Sept. 10, 2015. The streak of 19 consecutive completions is the most by a rookie in at least the last 40 years.

MAC JONES WINS FIRST SIX ROAD GAMES

Jones won his first six road games, joining Dak Prescott (6 in 2016) and Ben Roethlisberger (6 in 2004) as the only rookie quarterbacks to win each of their first six road games in league annals.

STRONG THROUGH 15

- Mac Jones has passed for 3,540 yards through 16 games. He leads all rookie quarterbacks in passing yards (3,540), completion percentage (67.6) and touchdown passes (21).
- Through 16 games, Jones' completion percentage is 67.6. The best completion percentage for a season by a rookie quarterback is Dak Prescott at 67.7 percent in 2016, followed by Justin Herbert at 66.6 in 2020 and Ben Roethlisberger at 66.4 in 2004.

3-TOUCHDOWN PERFORMANCE

- Jones had his first career three-touchdown performance against Cleveland on Nov. 14 and also had three touchdowns vs. Jacksonville (01/02). He now has seven games in 2021 with at least two touchdowns. The NFL record for most games with at least two touchdown passes by a rookie quarterback is Justin Herbert of the Los Angeles Chargers with 10 games in 2020.

JONES FINISHES WITH AN 80 PERCENT PASS COMPLETION FOR SECOND STRAIGHT WEEK

Jones completed 22-of-26 passes for an .846 pass completion percentage at Atlanta (11/18/21). It is tied for the fourth-best in team history. Jones was 19-of-23 for an .826 completion percentage vs. Cleveland on Nov. 14, the sixth-highest in team history. Jones is the first rookie quarterback in NFL history and the first New England player to ever complete at least 80 percent of his passes in back-to-back games (min. 20 attempts). The NFL record for most 80 percent completion games (min. 20 attempts) in a season is four by Drew Brees in 2018 and Kirk Cousins in 2019.

JONES HAS MOST WINS BY A PATRIOTS ROOKIE QB

Jones' 10 wins are the most in a season by a Patriots rookie quarterback, surpassing the six wins by Jim Plunkett in 1971 and the five by Drew Bledsoe in 1993. He has 10 wins while the rest of the 2021 rookie quarterbacks have a combined 10 wins.

Jones was named Offensive Rookie of the Month for November by the National Football League. Jones is the first Patriots rookie to receive a rookie of the month honor since DL Chandler Jones in September of the 2012 season. Jones led the Patriots to a perfect record in November, completing 76-of-99 passes for 854 yards and seven touchdown passes. He completed 76.8 percent of his passes and had a quarterback rating of 117.2.

Jones helped lead the Patriots to seven straight wins. He is the fourth rookie quarterback in the Super Bowl era to lead his team to win at least seven consecutive games.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2021

- WR Jakobi Meyers (164 receptions for 1,884 yards) has the most career receptions and receiving yards by any undrafted Patriots receiver that began his career with the team. His 59 receptions for 729 yards in 2020 were also the most in a single season by a rookie free agent that was originally signed by the team. He surpassed that number with 79 receptions and 796 receiving yards in 2021 for the best statistical receiving season for an undrafted Patriots receiver.

A SPECIAL BIRTHDAY PERFORMANCE

- Meyers set career highs on his 24th birthday (11/09/20) with 12 receptions for 169 yards in a win over the New York Jets. The 12 receptions were the most by a Patriot since Julian Edelman caught 13 passes at Miami on Dec. 15, 2013.

MEYERS MAKES HIS MARK

- Meyers has the most receptions and receiving yards for any undrafted player who signed with the Patriots as an undrafted free agent.

MEYERS JOINS ELITE CLUB

- Meyers, who threw touchdown passes in Weeks 10 and 17 in 2020, became the fourth wide receiver with two touchdown passes in a single season in the Super Bowl era, joining Rod Gardner (2003), Antwaan Randle El (2010) and Odell Beckham Jr. (2018).

MEYERS COMPLETES TWO PASSES IN ONE GAME

- Meyers completed two passes vs. Tampa Bay on Oct. 3, 2021. He caught a backwards pass from QB Mac Jones and then threw across the field to RB Brandon Bolden, who managed a 15-yard gain in the second quarter. He completed a 30-yard pass to WR Nelson Agholor in the fourth quarter on a flea flicker. The only other wide receiver to complete two passes in single game for New England was Julian Edelman vs. Denver on Oct. 18, 2020. The only other non-quarterbacks to complete two passes in a game for New England were running backs – Dick Christy on Nov. 18, 1960 vs. Dallas Texans and Andy Johnson on Sept. 6, 1981 vs. Baltimore Colts.

PERFECT PASSER RATING

- Meyers has completed 4-of-4 passes for 88 yards with two touchdown passes for a perfect 158.3 passer rating in his career.

"We ended up losing, but it was still a great experience. It was a good experience to meet Cam when I was very young. A lot of guys where I come from look up to him, so that was definitely a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for me."



MEYERS SCORES FIRST NFL TOUCHDOWN

- Meyers scored his first NFL touchdown on an 11-yard pass from QB Brian Hoyer in the fourth quarter against Cleveland (11/14/21). It was his 135th career reception. He has scored on three 2-points plays and thrown for two touchdown passes.

MEYERS USING HIS ARM

- Meyers threw two touchdown passes in 2020. He completed a 24-yard touchdown pass to RB Rex Burkhead vs. Baltimore (11/15) and a 19-yard touchdown pass to QB Cam Newton vs. N.Y. Jets (1/3). Overall, Patriots wide receivers completed four passes in 2020. WR Julian Edelman also completed two passes. The four pass completions by wide receivers are the most in team history. They have three so far in 2021.

MULTIPLE TDS FROM JAKOBI

- Meyers (two touchdown passes) became the third Patriots wide receiver to throw a touchdown pass under head coach Bill Belichick. David Patten threw a 60-yard touchdown pass on Oct. 21, 2001, at Indianapolis and WR Julian Edelman threw a 15-yard touchdown pass to WR Phillip Dorsett at Philadelphia on Nov. 17, 2019. Kendrick Bourne became the fourth to do so with a 25-yard touchdown to WR Nelson Agholor vs. N.Y. Jets on Oct. 24, 2021.

LB JA'WHAUN BENTLEY

2020 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- LB Ja'Whaun Bentley set single-season career-highs with 91 tackles and 1½ sacks in 2020. He leads the 2021 team with 90 total tackles.



Ja'Whaun and his family were homeless starting his freshman year of high school, living with one set of grandparents, then the other, then an aunt. Ja'Whaun and his brother slept on couches and floors at times over the course of several years. Once Ja'Whaun entered the NFL, he was able to secure permanent housing for his family.

LB JAMIE COLLINS SR.

PATH TO THE NFL

- The road to the NFL was anything but easy for linebacker and 2013 second-round draft pick Jamie Collins Sr. The youngest of five siblings growing up in Quentin, Miss., Collins Sr. lost both of his parents when he was six years old and was raised by one of his sisters. Collins Sr. turned to football as an outlet to help him through the tough times.
- "It means a lot. It's my living," Collins Sr. told the Boston Herald. "It kept me on track." Collins Sr.'s resiliency in dealing with adversity has made a lasting impact on fellow Mississippi native and former Patriots teammate Stevan Ridley, who grew up 30 miles west of Meadville in Natchez, Miss., and got to know Collins through a family friend.
- "What I've known about him, he really has been a strong person," Ridley told the Herald in 2013. "Anybody that's gone through the things that he's gone through and still finds a way to be successful on the football field, you have to be mentally tough. That's what he's kind of done as a teammate here. He's come in here and accepted his role and done a pretty good job as a rookie."

SACKS AND PICKS

- Since entering the NFL in 2013, Collins is the player in the NFL with at least 25 sacks and 10 interceptions. Collins has accumulated 26 ½ sacks and 12 picks during his career. He is the first player to accomplish the feat within his first 100 career games.

LB DONT'A HIGHTOWER

WINNER ON MULTIPLE LEVELS

- Dont'a Hightower (three Super Bowl championships and two national titles at Alabama) and Russell Maryland (two national championships at Miami and three Super Bowl Championships with Dallas) are the only two players in NFL history with at least two national championships and two Super Bowl wins.

MR. FEBRUARY

- Hightower has made two Super-Bowl altering plays during his career and was part of a record-setting performance in another. Head coach Bill Belichick referred to Hightower as "Mr. February" at the team's Super Bowl LIII ring ceremony.
- In Super Bowl XLIX vs. Seattle, Hightower made a crucial tackle on Seahawks RB Marshawn Lynch at the 1-yard line the play before CB Malcolm Butler intercepted Seattle QB Russell Wilson to seal the victory in the waning moments.
- New England trailed the Atlanta Falcons, 28-12, midway through the fourth quarter when Hightower strip-sacked Falcons QB Matt Ryan at the Atlanta 25-yard line. The fumble was recovered by the Patriots and the turnover led to a touchdown that helped spark the record comeback in Super Bowl LI.
- Led a defensive unit in the Super Bowl LIII win over the L.A. Rams (2/3/19). Hightower recorded two sacks and a pass defended as part of a stifling defense that became the second team in Super Bowl history to hold its opponent to just three points.

- J.C. Jackson led the Patriots with nine interceptions in 2020. Jackson has eight interceptions so far in 2021. Samuel picked off 10 passes in 2006 and six in 2007.
- Jackson has 25 interceptions since 2018, the most in the NFL over that span.

J.C. JACKSON HAS A PICK AGAINST JETS FOR FOURTH STRAIGHT GAME

- J.C. Jackson registered his first interception of the 2021 season when he intercepted a Zach Wilson pass in the first quarter to give the Patriots a first down at the Jets 35-yard line at the NY Jets (9/19). It was his third straight pick against the Jets after intercepting a pass in both Jets games in 2020. He also picked off a pass in the second Jets game (10/24) in 2021 for his fourth straight game against the Jets with a pick to join Baltimore's Eric Waddle, who had four interceptions against Cleveland (2016-17) as the last player to accomplish the feat.

J.C. Jackson now has 25 interceptions through his first four NFL seasons, passing Mike Haynes (22) for the most through a player's first four seasons with the Patriots. Jackson's 25 career interceptions are tied with Lester Hayes and Everson Walls for the most interceptions by a player in his first four seasons since 1970.

JACKSON SETS CAREER HIGH WITH 20 PASSES DEFENSED

Jackson is tied for first in the NFL with Trevon Diggs with 21 passes defended in 2021 and surpassed his previous career high of 14 passes defended set in 2020.

JACKSON MOVES INTO TOP TEN

Jackson secured his 25th interception to move out of a tie with Ronnie Lipsett and Nick Buoniconti for 9th place on the Patriots all-time interception list Maurice Hurst is in 8th place with 27 interceptions.

JACKSON HAS HIGHEST TWO-YEAR INTERCEPTION TOTAL IN TEAM HISTORY

Jackson increased his two-year interception total to 17 (9 in 2020 and 8 in 2021) to move past Asante Samuel (16) - (10 in 2006 and 6 in 2007) for the most interceptions in consecutive seasons for the Patriots.

AFC PLAYER OF THE MONTH

Jackson was named AFC Defensive Player of the Month for November. It is the first NFL honor for Jackson and the first AFC Defensive Player of the Month honor for the Patriots since 2019 when Stephon Gilmore (October) and DB Devin McCourty (September) won the award. Jackson helped New England finish the month of November with a perfect 4-0 record behind a defense that allowed just 26 points (6.5 points per game), including all four games without allowing a point in the second half. Jackson had four interceptions in November, including an 88-yard interception return for a touchdown in the third quarter of the victory at Carolina on Nov. 7.

JACKSON BECOMES 8TH PATRIOTS DEFENSIVE PLAYER TO REACH 20 PASSES DEFENSED

Jackson leads the NFL with a career-high 22 passes defended. He is the 8th Patriots defensive player to reach 20 passes defended in a season.

• Matthew Judon wore jersey #99 during his five seasons with the Baltimore Ravens but chose jersey #9 upon joining New England in 2021.

• Said Judon, "I'm one of 10 children, so I got nine siblings. Every time I go out there, I represent them. I like nine. That's one of the reasons I rock it. Ninety-nine was taken, so I chose to use the new rule and getting on it."



LB MATT JUDON HAS EIGHTH TWO-SACK GAME; SECOND OF THE 2021 SEASON

• LB Matt Judon had two sacks in a three-play sequence in the second quarter at Houston (10/10/21). It is the 8th time in his career that he has had a multi-sack game and second time in 2021. He had 2 ½ sacks vs. New Orleans on Sept. 26. His career-best is 3 sacks vs. Oakland on Nov. 25, 2018, when he played for Baltimore.

JUDON SETS TEAM RECORD FOR MOST SACKS IN FIRST FIVE GAMES

• Judon set a team record with 6 ½ sacks through the first five games. The previous record was 5 ½ sacks by Chandler Jones in 2015 and Andre Tippett in 1984.

JUDON SETS CAREER-HIGH BY REACHING DOUBLE-DIGIT SACKS

• Judon reached double-digit sacks for the first time in his career after a 9-yard sack of QB Matt Ryan in the second quarter at Atlanta (11/18/21) pushed his season total to 10 ½ sacks. It is the 17th time that the Patriots have had a player reach 10 or more sacks in a season. Judon's previous best was 9 ½ in 2019 with Baltimore. He now has 12 ½ sacks and is tied with Chandler Jones (2015) and Mike Vrabel (2007) for the most sacks in a season by a Patriots player under Bill Belichick.

DB DEVIN McCOURTY

INCHING CLOSER

- Devin McCourty is fourth all-time in New England history with 37 total takeaways. He needs three total takeaways to join Raymond Clayborn (44), Fred Marion (42) and Ty Law (40) as the only players in team history with 40 total takeaways.
- McCourty is tied with Ty Law for second-most Pro Bowl invitations as a Patriots defensive back with four. Only CB Mike Haynes (6) had more Pro Bowl nods as a Patriots defensive back.
- McCourty tied for fourth in the NFL with five interceptions in 2019, his third career season with five-plus interceptions. That mark tied Marcus Peters and Earl Thomas for most seasons with five-plus interception seasons since 2010. Additionally, McCourty's 31 regular season interceptions since he entered the league in 2010 are tied for the second-most in the NFL over that span.
- McCourty has played in 187 career regular season games. With one more game in 2021, he will have played in the 10th-most games in New England history.

THE MOST IMPORTANT ABILITY IS AVAILABILITY

- McCourty has played in the most defensive snaps since he entered the NFL in 2010 with 11,380 defensive snaps. Malcolm Jenkins (New Orleans and Philadelphia) is second with 11,359 defensive snaps.

MCCOUR-TD

- McCourty has four career touchdowns following a return of a blocked field goal for a touchdown at L.A. Chargers (12/6/20) and his 43-yard interception return for a touchdown at Seattle (9/20/20). McCourty also had an 84-yard interception return for a touchdown at Buffalo in 2018 and a 104-yard kickoff return vs. N.Y. Jets in 2012.

DOUBLE TROUBLE

- After being selected by the Patriots in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, Devin McCourty became part of a select group in league history. McCourty's identical twin brother, Jason, joined the Patriots in 2018 (now with Miami). The two became the 12th set of twins to play in the NFL. In the 2018 season opener, Devin and Jason became the first set of twins to play together on the same NFL team since 1926 when Gene and Tom Golsen suited up together for the Louisville Colonels.
- McCourty became the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998-2000. His twin brother, Jason, played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 1999-2001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox.

IN GOOD COMPANY

- McCourty earned Associated Press All-Pro Second Team honors at safety in 2013 and 2016. He also earned Second Team All-Pro Honors as a rookie in 2010 when he played cornerback. McCourty joined Pro Football Hall of Famers Rod Woodson and Ronnie Lott as the only NFL players to earn All-Pro honors at both safety and cornerback.

BROTHERS IN ARMS

- Devin and Jason McCourty have seen first-hand the effects of sickle cell disease. Both their aunt and uncle lived with the disease while their father carried the trait. Devin and Jason partnered with Embrace Kids Foundation to form their own "Tackle Sickle Cell" campaign aiming to educate the public, increase blood donations and raise money and awareness for the fight against sickle cell disease. Devin's work with the local Boston Children's Hospital has helped advance research of the disease with doctors now as close as they've ever been to a cure.'

THE RISE OF THE GREEN GOBLIN

- Jalen Mills has embraced his nickname "The Green Goblin." The origins of the nickname started out as a joke during his rookie season with Philadelphia when he dyed his hair green. Mills is not sure whether it was a coach or the media but the spiderman villain nickname was inspired and took off with the fans.

- Said Mills, "It just kind of came from my rookie year and then just throughout my years playing for the Eagles, my style of play. That's what I get it from. It's kind of something that I stuck with."



DB ADRIAN PHILLIPS

VERSATILITY

- "I'm one of the guys that when you ask me what position I play, I say 'defense.' I want to be able to line up everywhere, and most importantly, I want to be able to produce everywhere."



- Began his career in 2014 in San Diego focusing on special teams and was selected to his first Pro Bowl in 2018 as a special teamer. His 2018 Pro Bowl berth was the only one that Matthew Slater did not get voted in since 2011.

- Started all 16 games at safety last year for the Patriots and led the team in tackles with a career-high 107.

- Phillips scored his first career touchdown on a 26-yard interceptions return at LA Chargers (10/31/21). He has a career-high of four picks in 2021.

ADRIAN PHILLIPS HAS FIRST CAREER PICK SIX

Phillips picked off a fourth quarter pass from QB Justin Herbert and returned it 26 yards for a touchdown at the L.A. Chargers on Oct. 31. It is Phillips' first career touchdown. It is the Patriots first interception returned for a touchdown since DB Devin McCourty returned a pick 43 yards for a touchdown at Seattle on Sept. 20, 2020. He was named AFC Defensive Player of the Week for his performance.

PHILLIPS HAS FIRST CAREER TWO-INTERCEPTION GAME

Phillips finished with two interceptions against the Chargers. He also picked off Herbert in the second quarter. He earned AFC Defensive Player of the Week honors for his effort.

LB KYLE VAN NOY

LB KYLE VAN NOY HAS FIFTH CAREER GAME WITH AT LEAST TWO SACKS

LB Kyle Van Noy had two second quarter sacks with a 3-yard sack and a 13-yard sack of Atlanta QB Matt Ryan (11/18/21). It is his fifth career two-sack game. Four of his two sack games came while he played for the Patriots. He had two sacks on Oct. 15, 2017 at the New York Jets, Oct. 29, 2018 at Buffalo and Sept. 29, 2019 at Buffalo. He had a career-high three sacks on Dec. 6, 2020 vs. Cincinnati while he played for Miami. It's the third time in 2021 the Patriots had a player finish with at least two sacks. Matthew Judon has had two multiple sack games in 2021.



VAN NOY SCORES ON AN INTERCEPTION

Van Noy intercepted QB Matt Ryan in the fourth quarter and returned the pick 35 yards for a touchdown at Atlanta (11/18/21). It is his first pick six and fourth career touchdown. He scored touchdowns when he returned a blocked punt at Chicago (10/21/18), returned a fumble for a touchdown vs. NY Jets (12/30/18) and returned a fumble for a touchdown 22 yards vs. NY Giants (10/10/19).

BAILEY SETS TEAM RECORD

Jake Bailey finished first in the NFL with 45.6 net yards per punt in 2020, a new single-season team record. The previous record was 41.5 by Zoltan Mesko in 2011. His gross punt average of 48.7 is also a team record, besting the 46.5 gross average by Mesko in 2011. His 45.6 net yards per punt is second all-time in NFL history in a single season to the 46.0 net average by Johnny Hekker in 2016 with the Rams.

DIMINISHING [PUNT] RETURNS

Bailey's punting in 2020 allowed a total of just 71 punt return yards on 12 returns. It is the fewest punt return yards allowed by the Patriots in team history and the sixth-fewest punt return yards allowed in a season in NFL history. The 12 punt returns allowed are second in NFL history and team history to the 11 by New England in 2008.

CODY DAVIS IS SPECIAL

Cody Davis has a single-season personal high with a team-leading 14 special teams tackles, tied for the fourth-most in 2021. He is tied for the third-most special teams tackles in 2021. It is the third time in his career that he has reached double-digit special teams tackles. Davis had 10 special teams tackles in 2015 with St. Louis and 10 special teams tackles in 2018 with Jacksonville.

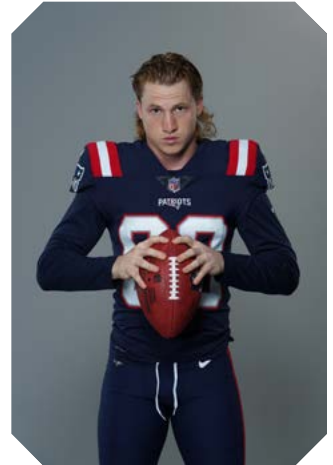


WR GUNNER OLSZEWSKI

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2021

Gunner Olszewski will attempt to become the first New England player to lead the NFL in two straight years in punt return average and the first NFL player to do so since Devin Hester led the NFL in 2010 and 2011.

Olszewski will look to become the first NFL player to average 17.0 yards per punt return or more in back-to-back seasons. Devin Hester owns the best mark with a 17.1-yard average in 2010 followed by 16.2-yard average in 2011. He is currently second in the NFL with an 12.0-yard punt return average so far in 2021.



PUNT RETURN RECORD

Olszewski finished first in the NFL with a 17.3-yard punt return average (20 returns for 346 yards and one touchdown) in 2020. It is the highest return average in Patriots history and the second-highest in the NFL since 1970. Julian Edelman had the highest average in a season at 15.5 in 2012. Olszewski is the fourth Patriots player to lead the league in punt return average. Danny Amendola led the NFL with a 12.0-yard average in 2015, Troy Brown led in 2001 with a 14.2-yard average and Irving Fryar tied for the NFL lead with a 14.1-yard average in 1985.

OLSZEWSKI SCORES FIRST NFL TD ON A PUNT RETURN

Olszewski scored his first NFL touchdown on a 70-yard punt return at the L.A. Chargers on Dec. 6, 2020. It was the first punt return for a touchdown for New England since WR Julian Edelman returned a punt 84 yards vs. Denver on Nov. 2, 2014. Olszewski's return came on the heels of an 82-yard punt return for a touchdown that was called back due to a penalty in the previous game.

GUNNER GOES LONG TWICE

Olszewski scored on a 70-yard punt return touchdown and had a 61-yard return in the Patriots win at the L.A. Chargers on Dec. 6, 2020. He is the first player in Patriots history with two punt returns of at least 60 yards in a single game and the first NFL player to do so since Indianapolis RB Nyheim Hines had 84 and 71-yard punt return touchdowns vs. Carolina on Dec. 22, 2019. Before Olszewski, the two longest punt returns in a single game for the Patriots was Julian Edelman on Nov. 18, 2012, vs. Indianapolis with a 68-yard punt returned for a touchdown and a 49-yard return.

Olszewski scored his first touchdown reception on a career-long 38-yard pass in the win at the L.A. Chargers on Dec. 6, 2020. Olszewski joined Julian Edelman (vs. Denver in 2014 and vs. Indianapolis in 2012), Stanley Morgan (vs. Baltimore in 1979) and Irving Fryar (vs. Indianapolis in 1985) as the only Patriots with a punt returned touchdown and a touchdown reception in the same game.

GUNNER OLSZEWSKI GOES LONG THREE TIMES

Olszewski had three 20-yard punt returns at the L.A. Chargers on Oct. 31, 2021 with a 20-yard return, a 21-yard return and a 27-yard return. The last NFL player with three punt returns of 20 or more yards in a single game was Nyheim Hines of Indianapolis on Dec. 22, 2019 vs. Tennessee. The last New England player to do so was Troy Brown on Sept. 11, 2000 at the New York Jets (31, 21 and 38-yard returns).

Olszewski has returned 64 punts for 814 yards for a 12.7-yard punt return average. The NFL uses 75 punt returns to qualify for the NFL record, which is 12.8 yards per return by George McAfee.

ELECTED TEAM LEADER

- Slater has been named to 10 Pro Bowls for his special teams work, but perhaps more revealing of his value to New England is the fact that he was elected a captain by his teammates for the 11th straight season in 2021.
- He shared what it means to be a captain with high school football players in a story published by *The Boston Globe*. "You have to be able to put others before yourself. Being a captain and leadership is about serving, and to me, that means a great deal of sacrifice – putting aside personal agendas for the greater common goal. Leadership is equated with sacrifice. I think you have to be willing to do whatever it takes for the unit to succeed. I think you need to lead by example. A lot of times, it's about what you do, not what you say."

SLATER'S EMERGENCE WAS SPECIAL

• Bill Belichick acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eight-man rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there — fourth-and-short, where they're trying to protect the box — but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts."

SLATER'S SCORE

• During a 2007 game against Arizona State, UCLA's Matthew Slater returned a kickoff 89 yards for the final touchdown of his collegiate career. In the Patriots 16-10 win over Buffalo on Sept. 29, 2019, DB J.C. Jackson blocked a punt, which Slater returned 11 yards for his first NFL touchdown, 12 seasons after his last touchdown.

LOCAL LINEAGE

Nick Folk's mother is a direct descendant of William Bradford, a founder, settler and longtime governor of the Plymouth Colony settlement. Bradford was also a passenger on the *Mayflower's* original voyage to America.



FOLK HERO

Folk kicked his second game-winning field goal as time expired in 2020, connecting on a 50-yard field goal against Arizona (11/29/20) to give the Patriots a 20-17 win.

He had a 51-yard game-winning field goal as time expired at the New York Jets on Nov. 9, 2020 to give the Patriots a 30-27 victory. He is the first NFL kicker with two game-winning field goals as time expired in a single season. Overall, he has three game-winning field goals as time expired. He also kicked a 53-yard field game-winning field goal as time expired at Buffalo on Oct. 8, 2007, when he was a rookie with the Dallas Cowboys.

FOLK DIGS THE LONG BALL

Folk's 50-yard game-winning field goal vs. Arizona (11/29/20) was the second-longest game-winning field goal with no time left in Patriots history, behind the 51-yarder he hit at N.Y. Jets (11/9). The previous long was 48 yards by Adam Vinatieri in Super Bowl XXXVI vs. the St. Louis Rams.



PATRIOTS SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

FOLK SETS TEAM RECORD FOR CONSECUTIVE FIELD GOALS

Folk set the team record with 33 consecutive field goals after connecting on field goals of 46, 49, 32 and 26 yards at the New York (9/19/21) and extended that mark to 36 straight field with a 27-yarder vs. Tampa Bay before missing a 56-yarder in the fourth quarter. He passed Stephen Gostkowski, who connected on 31 straight field goals. After missing his first two field goals of the 2020 season, he kicked 36 straight field goals. Folk's previous longest streak was 23 straight field goals in 2013 when he played for the New York Jets. The NFL record is 44 straight field goals by Adam Vinatieri.

FOLK DRILLS TWO 52-YARD FIELD GOALS

LONGEST FIELD GOALS AS A MEMBER OF THE PATRIOTS

Folk drilled a 52-yard field goal in the second quarter and 52-yard field goal in the third quarter at Houston (10/10/21), his longest field goals as a member of the Patriots. He had a 51-yard field goal on Dec. 21, 2019 vs. Buffalo and a 51-yard field goal at the New York Jets on Nov. 9, 2020. His career-long is a 56-yard field goal on Oct. 17, 2010 at Denver when he played for the New York Jets.

FOLK HAS SECOND NFL GAME WITH TWO 50-YARD FIELD GOALS

Folk had his second NFL game with two 50-yard field goals at Houston (10/10/21). He had two 51-yard field goals on Nov. 18, 2012 t St. Louis as a member of the New York Jets.

FOLK BECOMES SECOND PATS PLAYER TO CONNECT ON TWO 50-YARD FIELD GOALS IN ONE GAME

Folk is the second Patriots player to have two 50-yard field goals in one game after he drilled two 52-yard field goals at Houston on Oct. 10, 2021. K Stephen Gostkowski accomplished the feat three times with the most recent happening against Oakland on Nov. 19, 2017 in Mexico City.

FOLK 4-FOR-4 ON FIELD GOALS IN FOUR 2021 ROAD GAMES

Folk connected on all four field goals (52, 52, 32 and 21) at Houston on Oct. 10, 201 and was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week. He has connected on four field goals in four of the seven 2021 road games - at the NY Jets (9/19), at LA Chargers (10/31) and at Atlanta (11/18). Overall he has had at least four field goals in a game 14 times and six times as a member of the Patriots. He has connected on five field goals in a game three times, including making five field goals vs. Tennessee (11/28/21)

FOLK CONNECTS ON HIS 300TH CAREER FIELD GOAL

Nick Folk (320) became the 35th NFL player to reach 300 career field goals following his 39-yard field goal in the second quarter at the New York Jets on Oct. 24, 2021. He became the fifth active kicker to reach 300 career field goals, joining Robbie Gould (418), Mason Crosby (369), Matt Prater (348) and Justin Tucker (324).

FOLK MAKES 5TH 50-YARD FIELD GOAL OF THE 2021 SEASON

Folk connected on a 52-yard field goal vs. Tennessee on Nov. 28, 2021 in the fourth quarter. It is his fifth 50-yard field goal of the 2021 season to tie the team record for most 50-yard field goals in one season. Stephen Gostkowski had five 50-yard field goals in 2013.

HISTORICALLY ACCURATE

Nick Folk posted the third-best field goal percentage in New England history in 2020. He is 35-of-38 (92.1) so far in 2021.

The Patriots have now had a player reach 30 field goals in a season nine times. Folk is leading the NFL with 31 field goals.

CHILDREN'S TUMOR FOUNDATION

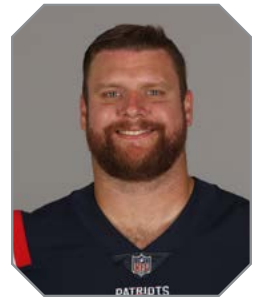

PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 28 times in their 62-year history. Twenty-two of those playoff berths have come in the 28 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. The Patriots have won 22 division crowns - 19 since Robert Kraft's purchase in 1994 and 17 in the last 19 seasons.

PLAYOFF BERTHS UNDER KRAFT

New England has qualified for the playoffs 28 times in the team's 62-year history. The Patriots have earned 22 of those playoff berths in the 28 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994. New England has won 22 division crowns overall (21 AFC East crowns) and has qualified as a Wild Card team on four occasions (1976, '85, '94 and '98). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 as part of a 16-team tournament following a players' strike.



ANNUAL ACHIEVEMENT

The Patriots are also the only team to win more than half of their games in 19 straight seasons since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, more than the 49ers (16 straight from 1983-98) and the Cowboys (16 straight from 1970-85).

The Patriots have now won nine or more games in 23 of the 27 seasons Robert Kraft has owned the team.

- Rob Gronkowski caught a 2-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady with 1:57 left in the first half to make the score 24-7 and cap off a 10-play, 80-yard drive.
- After the Patriots defense forced a three-and-out, a 42-yard Julian Edelman punt return gave New England possession at the Chicago 9-yard line, and Brady found Brandon LaFell for a 9-yard touchdown on the next play to give the Patriots a 31-7 lead with 1:07 left in the first half.
- On the Bears first play following the LaFell touchdown, Zach Moore forced a Jay Cutler fumble that was recovered by Rob Ninkovich and returned for a 15-yard touchdown that gave the Patriots a 38-7 Patriots lead with 55 seconds left in the first half.

COMEBACKS FOR THE AGES

The Patriots have staged two historic come-from-behind victories over the past several seasons:

Belichick coached the Patriots back from a 25-point deficit to win Super Bowl LI. A comeback of that magnitude is extremely rare. There had been 2,656 games in which a team led by 25 points or more in NFL history, including the postseason. Teams leading by 25 had recorded 2,647 wins, seven losses and two ties, a winning percentage of .997.

New England came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos, 34-31, in overtime in a Sunday Night Football matchup on Nov. 24, 2013, marking the largest regular season comeback win in team history, after trailing 24-0 at halftime.

New England's previous best comeback win was from a 23-0 deficit to win, 38-23, vs. Seattle (09/16/84). The Patriots also came back from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, 23-22 (12/21/96). The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently vs. Buffalo (01/01/12).
