COMMITMENT TO EXCELLENCE

AL DAVIS

July 4, 1929 – Oct. 8, 2011

Al Davis, a true legend, was a maverick, a giant among giants, a star among stars, a hero, a mentor and a friend.

When Davis passed away during the 2011 season, football lost an innovator, a pioneer with a deep love and passion for the game, a man who most assuredly will never be forgotten or duplicated. A Pro Football Hall of Famer who arguably did more to change the game than any other individual, Davis was honored the day after his passing with a moment of silence at every NFL stadium.

At one of those venues, Houston's Reliant Stadium, Davis' players took the field without his guidance for the first time in 17,710 days. And in one of so many franchise games for the ages, this comeback featuring key contributions from three of his first-round draft choices, the Raiders that day honored Davis by doing what he cared about most – they won.

"Just win," Davis once said. "Play hard. Try not to make mistakes, but don't worry about mistakes because there's only one thing that counts: Just win."

Beyond that win in Houston, Davis' death spawned an overwhelming outpouring of statements from football executives, coaches and players, past and present. A clear common thread in those expressions of remembrance was that anyone with any level of affinity for football should acknowledge that the game would not be what it is without Davis.

That's not just because Davis held the titles of general manager, head coach, league commissioner and principal owner, and led the Raiders to more wins than any other team. The game would not be what it is because, through his unyielding efforts to build the finest franchise in sports, Davis broke social barriers, creating opportunities for countless individuals, and cared selflessly about people, treating them the way they wanted to be treated. No one has had a more profound and lasting impact on pro football.

SEEDS OF GENIUS

Had Davis remained in coaching, fellow innovator Bill Walsh once theorized, Davis would be considered one of the greatest coaches of all-time.


On Jan. 15, 1963, the American Football League Raiders made a 33-year-old Davis the youngest general manager and head coach in pro history. And before the budding genius called his first play, Davis took complete control over all phases of the franchise, including changing Oakland's uniform colors to silver and black, to resemble the great Army teams he had idolized during the 1940s, and re-branded the Raiders into an image that is today instantly recognized worldwide.

"If there's anything that we've done that I'm particularly proud of," Davis recalled later in his life, "I would have to say the perpetuation of the greatness of the Raiders; to take a professional football team and give it a distinct characteristic, that's different from all others."

That characteristic in his first season on the Raiders sideline became forever linked to winning. Davis earned Coach of the Year honors after leading the Raiders, 1-13 the season before, to the most significant year-to-year improvement in pro football history, a 10-4 mark. Although he sacrificed his coaching career to become AFL Commissioner following the 1965 season, the profession always remained important to him, partly because it served as the foundation for his contributions to football.

That foundation was first poured in his hometown, the borough of Brooklyn, N.Y., where he played basketball and learned some of his unshakeable principles under Coach Al Badain at Erasmus Hall High School.

Davis graduated with a degree in English literature from Syracuse University, which later honored him with a Letterman of Distinction award, and shortly after, in 1950, launched his career as line coach at Adelphi College.



After entering the Army in 1952, Davis served as head football coach at Ft. Belvoir, Va. There, he molded a national power, finishing with a win over Maryland, the reigning national champion.

Davis worked in the player personnel office of the Baltimore Colts for one year (1954), then spent two seasons (1955-56) as line coach and chief recruiter at The Citadel, before becoming in 1957 the University of Southern California's line coach.

His next job didn't take him very far, moving across town from USC to the Los Angeles Chargers of the new AFL, but the move to pro football was a major step. Hired by Sid Gillman in 1960 as the Chargers' offensive ends coach, Davis helped the team to a pair of division titles in just three years.

That rise gave Davis the opportunity to lead his own team in 1963. Several factors influenced his head-coach blueprints. In addition to his coaching career, the precision of the Black Knights of the Hudson, their quickness and explosion with Doc Blanchard and Glenn Davis, left an indelible impression on Davis growing up. He also took several chapters from another sport.

"As a young guy," he said, "I had a dream that someday I would build the finest organization in professional sports. I had a lot of thoughts on how I would do it. I had the inspiration of two great organizations when I was growing up.

"The Yankees to me personified the size of the players, power, the home run, and intimidation and fear. Very important characteristics to me of what I thought a great team and a great organization should have. The Dodgers, under Branch Rickey, were totally different in my mind. They represented speed. They represented development of players, a way of playing the game, the Dodger way of playing the game. And I always thought that someone intelligent could take all the qualities, the great qualities of both, and put them together and use them."

In addition to those qualities, he also instilled in the Raiders tenets that were all his own, and in the process, he revolutionized pro football.

Offensively, Davis created the vertical game, now known as stretching the field.

"When we came out of the huddle," he remembered about his Raiders, "we weren't looking for first downs. We didn't want to move the chains. We wanted touchdowns. We wanted the big play, the quick strike. It's No. 1 to say that you want to do that, it's No. 2 to say that you have the players to do it, but it's No. 3 to do it. Do it on first down of any football game, on that defense that you're playing against. For those cornerbacks that play out there on the corners, to know that the Raiders are coming at you, they're coming at you on top, they've got the speed to do it, and they will do it. It's like having the bomb and being willing to drop it. The adage that goes around in professional football, and I hear everyone say it, 'Take what they give you.' That all sounds good to everybody, but I always went the other way: We're going to take what we want."

On the other side of the line, Davis also wanted to attack, to put pressure on the pocket, and do more than just disrupt the offense physically.

"I do believe that this is a game, psychologically, of intimidation and of fear. I don't mean cowardly fear, but fear. I think this: That somewhere within the first five to 10 plays of the game that the other team's quarterback must go down, and he must go down hard. That alone sets the tempo for a game."

Once that tempo was established, taking a cue from college basketball, Davis was the first to utilize his cornerbacks in a bump-and-run principle.

"We used to call it the press. We got the idea from John Wooden, when he had his great zone press, with his great basketball teams, where they picked you up as soon as you took the ball out, and they pressured you. And we got the idea and called it press. And then I think Don Shula started calling it bump-and-run, so we changed to bump-and-run."



Davis' vision to see where the game was headed, or to pave a new road to winning, led future successful coaches like Bill Parcells and Bill Belichick to regard Davis as the NFL's most intelligent individual.

From 1963-2002, the Raiders dominated pro football, posting the game's best cumulative won-loss record. Earning the moniker "Team of the Decades," the franchise posted 17 winning seasons over an 18-year stretch from 1963-80. The Raiders then posted 11 more winning campaigns from 1982-2002, including double-digit wins in 1983, 1984, 1985, 1990, 1993, 2000, 2001 and 2002. All told under Davis, the Raiders won four league championships – Super Bowls XI, XV and XVIII and the 1967 AFL title.

FROM HEAD COACH TO COMMISSIONER, TO MERGER

Persuaded by American Football League owners who viewed him as the perfect person to lead their battle against the established NFL, Davis reluctantly became league commissioner on April 8, 1966. Remarkably, Davis would spend less than 16 weeks in that role, but the shots his administration fired during that short period still reverberate today.

For the first half of the 1960s, the AFL and NFL fought a tenacious fight for college talent, but they battled with a significant unwritten rule that veterans were off limits. A little more than a month after Davis took office, the NFL's New York Giants violated that rule, signing veteran Buffalo kicker Pete Gogolak. As long-time Raiders executive Al LoCasale remembered, the NFL took a shot with a revolver and Davis shot back using a machine gun. Davis passionately and strategically convinced AFL owners to go after established NFL stars. In a short period, the AFL had signed many of the NFL's veteran playmakers, including the NFL's leading passer John Brodie, and Roman Gabriel from the Los Angeles Rams.



"We had about four or five quarterbacks all lined up," Davis said. "Three or four of their other great players had already signed. It was a preliminary strike to let them know what's going to happen if they continue this."

Within months, the two leagues had agreed to a merger that formed the league familiar to today's fans, including as part of the agreement a world championship game now known as the Super Bowl. Having served as the driving force behind that merger, Davis resigned on July 25, 1966, returned to Oakland as head of football operations and purchased an interest in the franchise. Davis, who became managing general partner in 1972, teamed with head-coach successors John Rauch, John Madden and Tom Flores in building a stalwart that would become the league's most successful franchise.

A CHAMPION OF DIVERSITY AND EQUALITY

A trailblazer, Davis innovated not only how the game was played and coached, but also changed who held those roles, opening countless doors for qualified individuals, regardless of skin color.

Davis was 17 when, a short distance from his home, Jackie Robinson broke the color barrier in Major League Baseball. Shortly after, at Syracuse, Davis befriended Bernie Custis, who would fight racism and become pro football's first black quarterback. At USC, Davis started recruiting players from historically black colleges, and convinced future Pro Football Hall of Famer Willie Wood to remain at the school as the Trojans' quarterback. Wood and Ron Mix became the school's first interracial co-captains, and Davis helped Mix understand how athletics could serve as a leader in ushering needed social change.

With the Chargers, Davis teamed with Gillman to lead the fight for equality. In addition to refusing to stay at segregated team hotels, the team, inspired by Davis, recruited players from black programs, creating what Eddie Robinson called a new day for players of color and giving them a sense of belonging in the American Football League.

Later that decade, Davis brought to the Raiders guard Gene Upshaw and tackle Art Shell, eventual Hall of Famers. Upshaw and Shell joked that a convention of pro football's black offensive linemen could be held in a phone booth. But Davis gave them an opportunity, and Upshaw said he never experienced racism on the Raiders because Davis would never tolerate it.

And neither would Davis tolerate discrimination at the game's most important position. A year after Upshaw as a rookie helped the Raiders to an AFL championship, Davis in 1968 made Eldridge Dickey the first African-American quarterback ever selected in the first round. Again, Davis cared about one thing: Winning.

"We called it an untapped reservoir," Davis recalled. "We wanted to win. We wanted the players. We weren't interested in who they were, or exactly where they came from. I've always said, it's not important to be consistent; it's important to be right. It was done because it was right and fair, and to help the team win, and continue to win.

"The Raiders did become a proving ground for great minority players. I think it was an evolution, an evolution of equity and fairness, and we hope that's one legacy we leave."

Another legacy Davis left was hiring in 1989 the NFL's first African-American head coach, Shell. Davis told Shell the reason he hired him was not because he was black, but because he was the best available candidate for the job, and because he was a Raider. Upon winning his coaching debut, Shell had to remind reporters that he was not the game's first minority head coach. A decade before, Davis had hired Tom Flores to lead the Raiders to two Super Bowl victories. Additionally, Davis later made Amy Trask the NFL's first female chief executive.

THE RAIDER MYSTIQUE

To Davis, shattering barriers wasn't only about race or gender. He defined it on a larger scale, by creating an environment that allowed any individual the chance to succeed, and in the process fostered a unique brotherhood.

"The fire that burns brightest in me," Davis said, "and the fire that burns brightest in this organization is the will to win."

That philosophy evolved the Raiders' locker room into an us-versus-them mentality, a group that like its owner valued being feared more than respected. Davis brought in mavericks and molded them into champions, a group of rugged and colorful individualists that carried Davis' torch with swagger and intimidation.

Many of the players that won for the Raiders were rejected by other teams. But Davis did not treat them like misfits. He treated them like men, and those men brought him three Super Bowl titles and dominated the league like no other team.

"We may take a player in who doesn't have good social habits, or has been a failure somewhere else," Davis explained. "But it's predicated on bringing them into an environment, that can inspire them the will to do great, and they have done great."

A BELIEF IN HOW TO TREAT PEOPLE

Part of Davis' ability to acquire the right players and put them in an environment that bred success was his belief in how to deal with people. Davis always said that the Golden Rule was not good enough.

"When you have to lead men, you don't do unto others as you would have others do unto you," Davis said. "You do unto them, in a paramilitary situation, as they want to be done unto. You have to treat them the way they want to be treated."

That way of treating people led friends and former players to remember Davis as the epitome of loyalty. And in turn, he showed the rest of the NFL how to treat former players. Of all the awards he received, the recognition from men that played the game meant the most to Davis. In 1997, the NFL Alumni inducted Davis into the Order of the Leather Helmet, a lifetime-achievement award. Six years earlier, the NFL Players Association honored Davis with its inaugural Retired Players Award of Excellence, citing the care he had shown players long after they retired.

"I feel we're one of the last bastions of hope, as a team image, as a team organization," Davis explained. "I don't want to give that up with the Raiders. We believe in tradition. We believe in the glory. We believe in the debt we owe to our players from the past."

No question, the way Davis treated people led to a record nine Hall of Famers asking him to present them in Canton, Ohio, at their induction ceremonies, an exceptional fact that exists nowhere else in sports, and speaks volumes of Davis' compassion for others.

In 1992, Davis earned his own enshrinement in the Pro Football Hall of Fame, and for the first time stood at the familiar podium after someone else – his most successful Raiders coach, Madden – had introduced him. Davis took the opportunity to look back on the team that mirrored his life.

"Enshrinement is a reflection of a life's work, a reflection of a love affair with the greatest game the world has ever known. This honor is a testament to a great organization, and to all the capable people that have poured their talent and enthusiasm and loyalty into the greatness of the Raiders, and the Raiders legend and mystique."





GENERAL MANAGER

31st season in NFL (7 as a player) | 10th season with Raiders (4 as a player)

Reggie McKenzie, a former draft pick by Raiders Owner Al Davis, enters his 31st season in the National Football League and his sixth as General Manager of the Silver and Black. McKenzie

was named to the position by Owner Mark Davis on Jan. 10, 2012, becoming the first General Manager of the franchise since Al Davis was hired as Head Coach and General Manager in 1963.

In his first five years as General Manager, McKenzie has overseen significant changes in the organization's scouting, player personnel and football operations departments, while bringing refined football acumen to the Silver and Black. He was recognized as the NFL's 2016 Executive of the Year by the Sporting News, MMQB.com and the Pro Football Writers of America (PFWA), becoming the first Raider since Al Davis (2002) to earn the award, and enters his sixth season at the helm having already made a significant impact on the organization's positive trajectory.

In 2016, McKenzie assembled a roster that propelled the Raiders to the franchise's first 12-win season since 2000 and a post-season berth for the first time since 2002. An NFL-high seven players were selected for the Pro Bowl, the most since 1991, and two players earned spots on the Associated Press All-Pro First Team. All seven Pro Bowl selections were acquired during McKenzie's tenure and DE Khalil Mack, the Raiders' first-round draft pick in 2014, was named the NFL Defensive Player of the Year, becoming the first Raider since Lester Hayes in 1980 to earn the honor. QB Derek Carr, the Raiders' second-round pick in 2014, emerged as a Most Valuable Player candidate during a third season that saw him eclipse numerous franchise passing marks.

Adhering to a strategy of building a competitive roster through the draft while making strategic acquisitions via free agency and trades, McKenzie supplemented the roster in key areas this past offseason. On offense, wide receiver Cordarrelle Patterson and tight end Jared Cook were added in free agency, while defensive needs were addressed with the additions of cornerback Gareon Conley, safety Obi Melifonwu and defensive lineman Eddie Vanderdoes in the first three rounds of the 2017 NFL Draft.

McKenzie and the Raiders made a splash in the early free-agency period in March 2016 by signing guard Kelechi Osemele, linebacker Bruce Irvin, cornerback Sean Smith and safety Reggie Nelson, securing four of the "top 25 available free agents" according to NFL.com. Osemele was a consensus first-team All-Pro selection, Nelson earned a Pro Bowl nod, Smith tied for second on the team with two interceptions and Irvin ranked second on the team with seven sacks, as all four players enjoyed highly productive 2016 campaigns.

The Raiders also added considerable talent and increased roster depth through the 2016 NFL Draft. All seven of the team's draft picks saw significant action as rookies and first-round selection S Karl Joseph was named to the PFWA All-Rookie Team. McKenzie traded up for the first time as Raiders General Manager in the fourth round, dealing with Cleveland to advance 14 spots to select quarterback Connor Cook out of Michigan State with the 100th overall pick. Cook became the first rookie in the Super Bowl era to make his initial start in a postseason game, starting the Raiders' Wild Card game at Houston in January. A remarkable seven undrafted free agents, acquired by the Raiders in the weeks following the 2016 NFL Draft, finished the season on the team's active roster.

In 2015, four of McKenzie's former draft picks earned places in the Pro Bowl following the season, and five of the team's six Pro Bowl selections were drafted or signed during his tenure with the Silver and Black. On offense, McKenzie made key free-agent acquisitions along the offensive line and at several skill positions. Center Rodney Hudson was signed and joined a unit that included tackles Donald Penn and Austin Howard, both 2014 free agent signings. Wide receiver Michael Crabtree was also added and has responded by leading the team in receptions and touchdowns in each of the past two seasons.

McKenzie's scouting department added excellent talent at numerous positions through the 2015 NFL Draft. Wide receiver Amari Cooper, selected with the fourth-overall pick out of Alabama, had an immediate impact, setting franchise rookie records with 72 receptions for 1,070 yards and garnering PFWA All-Rookie and Pro Bowl honors. Defensive lineman Mario Edwards Jr., the Raiders' second-round selection, also had a solid impact as a rookie, starting 10 games and earning All-Rookie recognition.


McKenzie and his staff stocked the roster with exceptional talent in the 2014 NFL Draft, adding four immediate starters to the active roster and earning top grades across the board from local and national media. The Raiders selected six defensive players, including fifth-overall selection Mack, who earned consensus All-Rookie honors in his first season. Mack blossomed into one of the league's elite defenders in his second year, recording 15 sacks to rank second in the NFL and becoming the first player ever to be named first-team All-Pro at two different positions (defensive end and linebacker) in the same season. Mack continued his rise to superstardom in an outstanding third year, earning NFL Defensive Player of the Year honors after posting 11 sacks, including sacks in a record-tying eight consecutive games.

In the second round of the 2014 NFL Draft, McKenzie added Carr, who started all 16 games as a rookie and shattered every rookie passing record in franchise annals. Carr continued his ascent in his sopho-

more season, garnering Pro Bowl honors after passing for 3,987 yards and tossing 32 touchdowns, the second highest single-season total in franchise history. Carr burst into elite company during a third season that saw him emerge as a Most Valuable Player candidate. The quarterback passed for 28 touchdowns with only six interceptions, notching a 96.7 quarterback rating and leading seven fourth-quarterback comebacks before having his season cut short due to an injury suffered in the regular season's penultimate game. The 2014 draft class bounty also included starting guard Gabe Jackson, defensive tackle Justin Ellis and defensive back TJ Carrie.

Stocking the roster with talented players began in earnest for McKenzie with the 2013 NFL Draft, when he traded the third-overall pick to Miami in exchange for the 12th selection and the Dolphins' second-round choice, picks which he used to select cornerback DJ Hayden and tackle Menelik Watson, respectively. McKenzie later executed two additional draft-day trades, turning seven picks into a league-high 10 total selections, and mining talents in the later rounds like defensive lineman Stacy McGee, tight end Mychal Rivera and running back Latavius Murray, who earned a Pro Bowl nod in 2015.

In his first draft as General Manager in 2012, the Raiders owned just five selections and none before the 95th overall pick, which was a third-round compensatory choice. Following that draft, McKenzie added rookie free agent wide receiver Rod Streater, who totaled 39 receptions as a newcomer and led the Raiders with 60 catches for 888 yards in 2013, and punter Marquette King, who led the NFL in punting (48.9 avg.) in 2013 and set a franchise record with 40 punts placed inside the 20-yard line in 2015.

McKenzie, who played in 58 games with 40 starts at linebacker for the Silver and Black from 1985-88, re-joined the franchise after 18

years in the Green Bay Packers' personnel department. He joined the Packers in 1994 and helped Green Bay capture eight division titles and three conference championships, and both Super Bowl XXXI and Super Bowl XLV.

As a key component in evaluating and acquiring talent, McKenzie was instrumental in helping the Packers establish the NFL's second-best record, 194-110 (.638), trailing only New England (198-106, .651) since the 1993 dawn of free agency and the salary cap, a period of time that many observers predicted would be difficult to navigate for the small-market franchise.

McKenzie was promoted to director—football operations in 2008 by General Manager Ted Thompson and worked closely with Thompson in putting together a championship team, culminating in a Super Bowl title in 2010 and a 15-1 regular season record in 2011.

McKenzie oversaw the team's scouting efforts of all professional football leagues, including the NFL, CFL, NFL Europe and Arena Football League. He also played a key role in evaluating both players on the roster and potential free agents across the NFL. McKenzie provided advance scouting reports on upcoming opponents for the head coach and his staff and was heavily involved in all of the team's transactions and tryouts on a daily basis to build depth, including 2010, when the Packers won the Lombardi Trophy despite losing six opening-day starters — and 15 overall — to season-ending injuries. He was also central in signing free agents Ryan Pickett and Charles Woodson, the 2009 Defensive Player of the Year. His work helped produce several contributors in the run to the Super Bowl XLV title and a decade earlier, he helped obtain Eugene Robinson, Santana Dotson, Bruce Wilkerson, Andre Rison and Desmond Howard, who were significant contributors to the Packers' Super Bowl XXXI title.

It was McKenzie's "Raiders roots" that initially brought him to Green Bay. McKenzie reconnected with Pro Football Hall of Famer Ron Wolf, who was a Raiders executive when McKenzie was drafted and played for the Silver and Black, while McKenzie was a graduate assistant coach at the University of Tennessee in 1993. Wolf hired him on the spot following an interview in Green Bay and McKenzie began his NFL front office career as a pro personnel assistant for the Packers in 1994. In May 1997, Wolf promoted McKenzie to director of pro personnel after Green Bay won Super Bowl XXXI.

Selected by the Silver and Black as a 10th-round draft pick out of Tennessee in 1985, McKenzie excelled in his first year, earning All-Rookie Team honors as the Raiders went 12-4 and won the AFC West. He started all 32 games over his first two seasons at inside linebacker. After four years (1985-88) with the Raiders, McKenzie spent two seasons (1989-90) with the Phoenix Cardinals and one year with the San Francisco 49ers (1992).

Prior to signing with the 49ers, McKenzie played with the Montreal Machine of the World League of American Football (WLAF) in the spring of 1992. While out of pro football in 1991, he spent a season as a defensive coach for Dorsey High School in Los Angeles, helping the program to a CIF Los Angeles Section championship.

In 1993, McKenzie returned to the University of Tennessee and served as a graduate assistant coach under Phillip Fulmer, working with defensive coaches Larry Marmie, Lovie Smith, John Chavis and Jacob Burney. That year, the Volunteers appeared in the Florida Citrus Bowl and landed one of the nation's top recruiting classes, highlighted by quarterback Peyton Manning. During that time in Knoxville, McKenzie pursued a master's degree in education administration.

Born in Knoxville, Tenn., on Feb. 8, 1963, McKenzie earned a bachelor's degree in business administration with an emphasis in personnel management at Tennessee. An all-state linebacker and a four-sport letterman at Austin-East High School in Knoxville, McKenzie was valedictorian of his 1981 high school graduating class, in addition to throwing the shot and discus for his track team, playing baseball (first base) and basketball (forward), and starting on both sides of the line on the gridiron. His twin brother, Raleigh, who also attended Tennessee and enjoyed a 16-year NFL career with four teams before retiring in 2001, joined his brother in the Raiders' personnel department as a college scout in 2012. The McKenzie twins have a total of four Super Bowl rings between them.

McKenzie and his wife, June, have two daughters, Jasmin Dolores, a 2014 graduate of Wheaton College with a degree in elementary education and a master's degree in urban education at Union University, and Mahkayla Mariah, a 2015 graduate of Duke University with a degree in civil engineering. He also has two sons, Reginald Kahilil, entering his junior year at Tennessee, and Jalen Elijah, entering his freshman year at USC.



Jack DEL RIO

HEAD COACH

32nd season in NFL (11 as a player) | 3rd season with Raiders

Jack Del Rio was named the 19th head coach in the history of the Oakland Raiders franchise on Jan. 15, 2015. The appointment marked a homecoming for Del Rio, who was raised

in nearby Hayward, Calif.

Now entering his 32nd year in the NFL and his 21st season in coaching, Del Rio has played for, coached with, and learned from some of the best coaches in all of football. He was recruited to play at USC by John Robinson, and in the NFL he played under Bum Phillips, Jim Mora, Jimmy Johnson and Dennis Green. As a coach, he honed his skills on the staffs of Pro Football Hall of Famer Mike Ditka, Super Bowl winner Brian Billick and Super Bowl participant John Fox.

Last season, Del Rio guided the Raiders to a 12-4 record, marking the franchise's first 12-win season since 2000. The Raiders earned a postseason berth for the first time since 2002 and landed an NFL-high seven players on the AFC Pro Bowl squad. Two Raiders earned spots on the Associated Press All-Pro First Team and DE Khalil Mack was named Defensive Player of the Year. Del Rio was selected as the recipient of the Maxwell Club's Greasy Neale Professional Coach of the Year Award, becoming the sixth Raiders coach to earn NFL Coach of the Year honors. In addition, he was named the AFC Coach of the Year by Kansas City's Committee of 101.

Oakland tied for the NFL lead with a +16 turnover differential and the offensive unit ranked near the top of the league, finishing sixth in the NFL in yards per game (373.3), sixth in rushing yards per game (120.1) and seventh in points per game (26.0). The team committed just 14 turnovers on the year, a mark that ranked fourth fewest in the NFL. The defense strengthened as the season progressed, ranking 11th in the NFL in total yards allowed per game from Week 7 to the end of the year. The team also ranked second in the NFL in takeaways, forcing 30 turnovers on the year.

In his first season with the Raiders, Del Rio oversaw significant improvements as the Raiders more than doubled the previous year's win total. Oakland moved up 15 spots in the NFL rankings in turnover ratio, finishing 17th in the league (+1) after ranking 32nd in 2014 (-15). The team improved in five major statistical categories on offense alone, making gains in total offense, rushing, passing, points per game and third-down efficiency. On defense, the Raiders improved in rushing defense, points per game allowed and third-down defense. Six Raiders were selected for the Pro Bowl, marking the most since 1991.

Upon taking the reins in Oakland in January 2015, Del Rio embarked on assembling a heralded coaching staff that, collectively, counted seven Super Bowl titles, 62 playoff berths, one Hall of Fame induction and 165 coaching years to its credit.

As defensive coordinator with the Denver Broncos from 2012-14, Del Rio was part of three-straight AFC West titles and helped lead Denver to an AFC Championship and appearance in Super Bowl XLVIII following the 2013 campaign. It marked his second stint under Head Coach John Fox, as the two also spent the 2002 season together in Carolina. In all, he has coached 28 players to a total of 40 Pro Bowl selections.

In 2014, Del Rio's defensive unit boasted five Pro Bowl selections, ranked third in the NFL in overall defense (305.2 yards per game) and second in the league against the run, allowing 79.8 yards per game. With 25 takeaways and a plus-five turnover ratio, Del Rio's defense was instrumental in leading the Broncos to a third straight 12-win season.

In his second season with the Broncos in 2013, Del Rio's defense helped Denver to a 12-4 record and an appearance in Super Bowl XLVIII. Del Rio also accepted the additional role of interim head coach (Weeks 10-13) while Fox underwent a heart procedure, and led the Broncos to a 3-1 record against teams with a combined record of 29-9 (.763). With Del Rio at the helm, Denver beat previously-undefeated Kansas City twice in addition to San Diego, with the team's only loss coming at New England.

In 2012, Denver's defense finished as the NFL's second-ranked unit (290.8 yards per game), after finishing the previous season ranked 20th in the league. The group also tied for the league lead with 52 sacks and allowed the lowest opponent third-down percentage (30.6 percent), while tying for the largest scoring improvement (6.3 points per game) from the previous season.

Prior to joining the Broncos in 2012, Del Rio spent nine seasons at the helm in Jacksonville. During his head coaching tenure (2003 to 2011) with the Jaguars, the club ranked sixth in the NFL in yards per game allowed (317.3) and eighth in points per game allowed (20.3).

Under Del Rio, the Jaguars made two playoff appearances in 2005 and 2007, highlighted by the club's first postseason win in eight seasons with a 31-29 road victory against the Pittsburgh Steelers in a 2007 AFC Wild Card Game.

In 2009, Del Rio led one of the league's youngest teams, with four rookies in full-time roles as starters, 32 new players on the roster and a total of 16 rookies by season's end. The team was in playoff contention until the final weekend of the regular season, finishing 7-9. Rookies combined to make 71 starts, the most in team history, and the team was penalized a league-low of 70 times, the fewest in franchise histo-

ry. The Jaguars battled through injuries in 2008 to a 5-11 record despite having just four players start all 16 games and a total of 15 players on injured reserve at the end of the year.

The Jaguars posted an 11-5 record in 2007 to earn a second playoff berth in three years, in addition to claiming the franchise's first playoff win since the 1999 season, while becoming the first team in NFL history to win in Pittsburgh twice in one season. The offense ranked seventh in the league and scored a team-record 411 points. The offense had a team-record seven games with 400-or-more yards, while the defense held opponents to 17 points or less 10 times.

Del Rio led the 2006 Jaguars to a record of 8-8 as the team finished 5-3 against playoff teams and suffered seven losses by seven points or less. Among the highlights was a team-record 2,541 rushing yards and just 30 sacks allowed on offense. The defense registered the highest ranking in team history at

second overall.

In 2005, the Jaguars won eight of the last nine regular season games, including four straight on the road, en route to a 12-4 finish and a Wild Card playoff berth. The league's sixth-ranked defense was sixth in points allowed and had 19 interceptions. On offense, the team increased scoring by 100 points over the previous year and had a team-record and NFL-low six interceptions thrown.

In 2004, Del Rio posted the team's first winning record since 1999, leading the Jaguars to a 9-7 mark. In taking over the Jaguars in 2003, Del Rio was the architect of a defense that improved to sixth overall in the NFL and second against the run. The Jaguars' 5-11 record included six losses by seven points or less.

During his lone season as a defensive coordinator with Carolina in 2002, he inherited the NFL's worst defense statistically (371.4 yards per game allowed) and turned it into the league's second-ranked unit (290.4 yards per game allowed). Additionally, the 2002 Panthers squad led the NFL in rushing average against (3.7 avg.) and ranked second in third down efficiency (32.9 percent) and sacks (52).

As linebackers coach for the Baltimore Ravens from 1999-2001, Del Rio tutored a talented group that included Peter Boulware, Ray Lewis and Jamie Sharper. Baltimore's 2000 team set the NFL 16-game record by allowing only 165 points while recording four shutouts and forcing a league-best 49 turnovers. Lewis was named the NFL's Defensive Player of the Year and the MVP of Super Bowl XXXV that season after a playoff run in which the defense surrendered just one touchdown in four games.

Del Rio began his coaching career with the New Orleans Saints under Head Coach Mike Ditka, serving as an assistant strength coach in 1997 before moving on to coach the linebackers in 1998.

A veteran of 11 seasons as an NFL linebacker, he was selected in the third round (68th overall) of the 1985 NFL Draft by New Orleans and went on to make the NFL's All-Rookie Team and earn the Saints' Rookie of the Year award.

Following two seasons in New Orleans (1985-86), he played for Kansas City (1987-88), Dallas (1989-91) and Minnesota (1992-95). He led the Vikings in tackles for three consecutive years and was selected to participate in the Pro Bowl in 1994. For his career, he played 160 games in the regular season and totaled 1,078 tackles, 12 sacks and 13 interceptions.

Del Rio was a four-year starter at the University of Southern California, where he earned consensus All-American honors as a senior and was runner-up for the Lombardi Award, given to the nation's best lineman or linebacker. Named co-MVP of the 1985 Rose Bowl, Del Rio recorded 340 career defensive stops, including 58 tackles for a loss. A standout catcher on the USC baseball team, Del Rio was drafted by the Toronto Blue Jays in 1981. He was inducted into the USC Athletic Hall of Fame in May 2015.

Del Rio was a three-sport star in football, baseball and basketball at Hayward (Calif.) High School. He earned a degree in political science from the University of Kansas while playing for the Chiefs.

Born on April 4, 1963, in Castro Valley, Calif., Del Rio and his wife, Linda, have three daughters, Lauren, Hope and Aubrey, and a son, Luke, who is a quarterback at the University of Florida.

DEFENSIVE ASSISTANT

10th season in NFL (7 as a player) | 3rd season with Raiders

Sam Anno enters his third season with the Oakland Raiders as defensive assistant. He joined the NFL coaching ranks in the same capacity for the Silver and Black in 2015 after

spending the prior six seasons at the University of San Diego as an assistant head coach/linebackers and special teams.

In his second year with the Raiders, Anno contributed to a defense that produced two Pro Bowlers in DE Khalil Mack and newcomer S Reggie Nelson. Mack became the first Raider to record back-to-back double-digit sack seasons since 2005-06, while Nelson added a team-high and NFL-leading seven takeaways amongst all safeties. Mack also tied an NFL record by recording a sack in eight consecutive weeks, three of which were consecutive sack-fumble games. His stellar play once again earned him an All-Pro selection, the second of his career, en route to becoming the 2016 Defensive Player of the Year.

In addition, Anno helped lead a team that forced an AFC-best 20 forced fumbles, led by free agent acquisition LB Bruce Irvin and his league-leading six forced fumbles. The defense also finished second in the NFL with 30 takeaways in 2016. The unit strengthened as the season progressed, ranking 11th in the NFL in total yards allowed from Week 7 to the regular season's conclusion.

During his first year in Oakland, Anno helped the defense produce two Pro Bowlers in veteran S Charles Woodson and Mack. Anno assisted Mack in recording one of the most prolific defensive seasons in franchise history. Mack finished the year with the Toreros. San Diego closed out the 2014 season with a 9-3 record and their first trip to the NCAA Division I FCS Playoffs, falling to Montana in the NCAA Division I Football Championship. In the 2013 season, senior DE Steve Gargiulo was tabbed first-team All-Pioneer Football League, while fellow DE Blake Oliaro closed out his career with 30 sacks. Following the 2011 campaign, Oliaro was tabbed the PFL Defender of the Year and an All-American, and senior DE Mario Kurn signed a free agent contract with the Raiders.

Prior to coaching at San Diego, Anno coached linebackers and special teams at Central Connecticut State in 2008, where the team went 7-4 overall and tied for third in the Northeast Conference standings with a 4-3 mark.

Anno began coaching collegiately at USC, spending three years at his alma mater serving as a video assistant in 2007 and a defensive and special teams graduate assistant in 2005 and 2006.

Before joining the collegiate coaching ranks, Anno coached at Venice (Calif.) High School as an assistant in 2004. He served as the defensive coordinator at Santa Monica (Calif.) High School from 2000-01 after spending four seasons as an assistant there.

Todd DOWNING

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR

17th season in NFL | 3rd season with Raiders

Todd Downing enters his first season as the team's offensive coordinator in 2017 after spending two years as quarterbacks coach. Following his appointment in January, Downing is now in his 17th NFL season and third with the Raiders.

Downing continued in the mentoring of QB Derek Carr in 2016, as Carr was named to his second consecutive Pro Bowl and emerged as an MVP candidate. Carr led the Raiders offensive attack as the unit finished sixth in the NFL in total offense (373.3 yard per game) and sixth in rushing offense (120.1 yards per game). He finished the year among NFL leaders, throwing for 3,937 yards on 357-of-560 passing (63.8 percent) with 28 touchdowns to just six interceptions for a quarterback rating of 96.7. He was named AFC Offensive Player of the Week for his performance in Week 8 vs. Tampa Bay when he set the franchise record with 513 passing yards in the team's overtime victory.

Carr's campaign was marked by his play in the clutch, as he orchestrated seven fourth quarter/overtime comeback and game-winning drives in 2016. His seven such games ranked second in the NFL in 2016, and set a new franchise single-season record. In the team's win against Buffalo, he became the first quarterback in NFL history with five game-winning touchdown passes in the fourth quarter/overtime in a single season. While playing from behind, Carr passed for 7.3 yards per attempt, 15 touchdowns to just one interception and a passer rating of 102.5. He was named the Castrol Edge Clutch Performer of the Year for his performance in 2016.

In his first season with Oakland, Downing helped Carr post one of the most prolific passing campaigns in team history on his way to becoming the first quarterback to represent the Raiders in the Pro Bowl since 2002. For his efforts with the position group in

2015, Downing was named Pro Football Focus' Quarterbacks Coach of the Year. Under Downing's tutelage, Carr improved his passer rating by 14.5 points from his rookie season to 91.1 in 2015, the fifth largest improvement in the NFL over that span. Downing oversaw staggering production from Carr and the passing attack, as the quarterbacks combined for the second most passing touchdowns (34) and the third most passing yards (4,129) in team history last season. Carr's 32 touchdown passes tied for the seventh most in the NFL in 2015, and he led the NFL with 13 touchdowns of 25-or-more yards.

Prior to joining the Raiders, Downing guided second-year QB EJ Manuel and veteran QB Kyle Orton, leading Buffalo to a 9-7 record in 2014. After Manuel threw touchdowns in each of his four starts on the season, Downing helped Orton record his best statistical season since 2010. In just 12 starts, Orton posted his third 3,000-yard season and tied his third best touchdown mark with 18 scores.

Downing joined the Bills after five seasons with the Detroit Lions, four of them working with quarterbacks. Downing got his start in Detroit as an offensive quality control coach in 2009 before becoming the assistant quarterbacks coach in 2010, working with QB Matthew Stafford, the Lions' first-overall pick in the 2009 NFL Draft.

In Downing's three seasons as quarterbacks coach in Detroit, Stafford started all 48 games and passed for at least 4,600 yards and 20 touchdowns each year, including a 5,000-yard, 41-touchdown season in 2011, which led to the Lions' first playoff berth since 1999. Under Downing's tutelage, Stafford went on to become the franchise leader in attempts, completions and passing yards, and ranked second in touchdowns with 109 by the end of 2013.

In 2013, Stafford completed 371-of-634 passes for 4,650 yards and 29 touchdowns, his third consecutive 4,600-yard, 20-touchdown season. The year prior, he fell just shy of his second-straight 5,000-yard season, setting franchise marks in both attempts and completions by connecting on 435-of-727 passes (59.8 percent) for 4,967 yards and 20 touchdowns.



In 2011, Downing's first year as quarterbacks coach, Stafford set franchise passing records for yards (5,038), touchdowns (41), passer rating (97.2) and completion percentage (63.5). He was one of only three quarterbacks, along with QB Drew Brees and QB Tom Brady, to finish 2011 in the top five of all six major passing categories: third in yards, third in touchdown passes, fifth in quarterback rating, fifth in completion percentage, first in attempts (663) and second in completions (421).

Downing's guidance helped Stafford record two of the best seasons in NFL history. His 2011 and 2012 seasons rank eighth and ninth, respectively, on the all-time single-season passing yards list, and Stafford and Brees are the only players to have thrown for at least 4,900 yards in back-to-back seasons.

The 2010 season forced Downing to deal with several injuries at the quarterback position. However, all three of the team's signal callers maintained production throughout the season and all three won at least two games that season. In all, the Lions started Stafford (three games), QB Shaun Hill (10 games) and QB Drew Stanton (three games), and the team ranked third in the league in completions (383), third in attempts (633), 12th in gross passing yards (4,001) and were tied for 11th in touchdown passes (26).


Before working exclusively with quarterbacks, Downing served as a defensive assistant and assistant special teams coach with the St. Louis Rams from 2006-07. In 2008, he was named assistant secondary/defensive quality control coach in St. Louis.

Downing got his start at the NFL level with the Minnesota Vikings on current Raiders offensive line coach and former Vikings Head Coach Mike Tice's staff, where he worked as an intern and coaching assistant from 2001-02 and as a football systems analyst from 2003-04. He was named offensive quality control coach for the Vikings in 2005. He helped the Vikings achieve top-five finishes in three years (2003-05) and a playoff appearance in 2004.

Before he entered the NFL ranks, Downing began his coaching career with his alma mater, Eden Prairie (Minn.) High School, from 1999-2000. In 2000, he helped lead the Eagles to the Minnesota Class 5-A State Title.

Darryl Eto enters his third season with the Raiders as assistant strength and conditioning coach following five seasons as the director of strength and conditioning with the NBA's Hous-

ton Rockets. Recognized as an expert in the field of plyometrics, conditioning and speed training, Eto has nearly 30 years of experience in the industry. In his current role, Eto's focus is on all areas of athletic development.

Last season, Eto and his staff helped the club post 12 wins and return to the postseason for the first time since 2002. In 2015, Eto and the strength and conditioning staff implemented a new strength and conditioning program that assisted the team to a four-win improvement from the 2014 season. Just prior to the beginning of the 2015 season, he and his staff helped the organization in the planning, building and opening of the new Performance Center, giving the players a state of the art building in which to train and recover at the highest level.

During his time with the Rockets, Eto oversaw all player training and physical performance development. He refined his practice in applied anatomy, exercise physiology and biomechanics over the course of 25 years before joining the Rockets. 

Jethro FRANKLIN

DEFENSIVE LINE

11th season in NFL | 3rd season with Raiders

Jethro Franklin enters his third season with the Oakland Raiders as defensive line coach. He has 27 years of experience coaching defensive line at both the NFL and collegiate levels.

In 2016, Franklin guided a defensive line that saw DE Khalil Mack follow his stellar sophomore campaign with yet another outstanding season, becoming the first Raider since 1980 to win the Associated Press Defensive Player of the Year Award. His eight-game sack streak during the regular season tied an NFL record, and he came away with a sack-fumble in three consecutive games during that stretch. Mack's elite season earned him numerous individual accolades, including his second Pro Bowl nod, two AFC Defensive Player of the Week honors and the AFC Defensive Player of the Month in November. Mack also became the first player since 2009 to record an interception, sack, forced fumble, fumble recovery and touchdown in the same game in Week 12 vs. Carolina. His campaign was capped with the Pro Football Writers of America Defensive Player of the Year Award and his second First Team All-Pro selection in addition to the Associated Press honor.

Franklin also welcomed free agent acquisition LB Bruce Irvin into the rotation, as the fifth-year pro started all 16 games for the first time in his career, and tied a franchise record with a career-high six forced fumbles. Mack and Irvin became one of the most dominant duos across the league, combining for 18 sacks and 11 forced fumbles. Their 11 forced fumbles were the most between two players on any team in 2016. The defensive line also got significant contributions from DL Denico Autry (37 tackles and two fumble recoveries), DT Stacy McGee (2.5 sacks and two forced fumbles) and DT Dan Williams.

In 2015, Franklin's line was led by Mack, who enjoyed a breakout sophomore season. Mack started all 16 games, totaled 79 tackles (58), two forced fumbles and four passes defended on the year, earning him his first Pro Bowl nod. Mack also became the first player in NFL history to earn first-team All-Pro selections at two positions, defensive end and linebacker. He finished second in the league with 15 sacks, including a four-game stretch where he posted 10 sacks. Mack was named AFC Defensive Player of the Week for his Week 14 performance in the victory over the Denver Broncos, where he tied a franchise record with five sacks. Mack recorded four multi-sack games in 2015, including three straight in Weeks 12-14.

Under Franklin's tutelage, free agent signee Williams made a career-high 15 starts in 2015 and also notched a career-high 59 tackles (34 solo), one sack and a personal-best three passes defended in his first season with the Silver and Black. Second-round draft pick Edwards Jr. also made significant contributions as a rookie, starting 10-of-14 games played with 41 tackles (31), two sacks, three passes defended and three forced fumbles.

Prior to coaching the Silver and Black, Franklin spent 2011-14 as the Miami Hurricanes defensive line coach. In 2014, Franklin's unit helped the Hurricanes move from 89th in FBS total defense the previous season to 14th (329.6 yards per game), and 36th in scoring defense (24.3 points per game). The defensive line also improved significantly against the run, reducing its 176.5 rushing yards allowed per game (77th) in 2013, to a 30th-ranked 137.1 yards per game in 2014.

Franklin's line helped the Hurricanes to a No. 9 national ranking in red zone defense, 14th in total defense and 21st in scoring defense, holding opponents to an average of 20.1 points per game in his first season. Franklin also helped the development of 2012 third-round draft pick DE Olivier Vernon as he totaled 81 tackles (51) and nine sacks in his collegiate career.



Prior to Miami, Franklin spent 2010 at Temple where he tutored standout DE Muhammad Wilkerson, who was taken in the first round of the 2011 NFL Draft by the New York Jets. In his only season at Temple, Franklin's line helped lead the Owls to an 8-4 record, including 5-3 in MAC games. Under his direction, both Wilkerson and DL Elisha Joseph garnered All-MAC First-Team honors.

Franklin coached the defensive line at USC in 2009, helping the Trojans to a victory in the Emerald Bowl. Before his second coaching stint at USC, Franklin spent three seasons coaching defensive line units in the NFL. He spent the 2007-08 seasons with the Houston Texans where DE Mario Williams set the Texans single-season sack record and made the 2008 Pro Bowl. Franklin spent the 2006 season with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Franklin first coached the defensive line at USC in 2005-06. In 2005, DEs Lawrence Jackson (first round, Seattle) and Frostee Rucker were All-Pac-10 first-teamers, while DT Sedrick Ellis (first round, New Orleans), Rucker (third round, Cincinnati) and DT LaJuan Ramsay (sixth round, Philadelphia) were NFL draft picks.

He went to USC after spending five seasons (2000-04) coaching the defensive line for the Green Bay Packers and tutoring DE Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila, a Green Bay Packer Hall of Famer and the franchise's all-time sacks leader. Under Franklin's tutelage, Gbaja-Biamila led the NFC in sacks (2004), was named to a Pro Bowl (2003) and received the Ed Block Courage Award (2002). The defense set various Packers' game, season and all-time sack records during his tenure. Franklin served as the defensive line coach for UCLA in 1999-2000 before joining the NFL coaching ranks.

Franklin began his coaching career at his alma mater, Fresno State, where he was in charge of the defensive line for eight seasons (1991-98). The Bulldogs played in three bowls while he was there, the 1991 California Bowl, 1992 Freedom Bowl and 1993 Aloha Bowl. While at Fresno State, he had a pair of NFL coaching fellowships, working with the Buffalo Bills in the summer of 1994 and the Cleveland Browns in the summer of 1995.





Tim Holt enters his third season with the Oakland Raiders as assistant offensive line coach after joining the team in 2015. Under Holt's tutelage, the offensive line proved stout all year,

ranking first in the league at protecting the quarterback, allowing just 18 sacks on the year. The offensive unit ranked near the top of the league in 2016, finishing sixth in the NFL in yards per game (373.3), sixth in rushing yards per game (120.1) and seventh in points per game (26.0). The offensive line saw three members selected to the Pro Bowl as C Rodney Hudson, G/T Kelechi Osemele and T Donald Penn were all named to annual all-star game. Osemele, in his first year with the Silver and Black after signing as an unrestricted free agent in the offseason, also earned his first career All-Pro selection. Hudson and Penn were additionally named to the Pro Football Writers of America's All-AFC Team and Osemele to the Pro Football Writers of America's All-NFL Team.

Holt joined the Raiders in 2015 after spending 2014 at the collegiate level at Stetson University. In his first season with the Raiders, Holt helped guide an exceptional offensive line that gave up just 33 sacks on the year, tied for 11th fewest in the league. The Raiders' offensive line did not allow a sack in three games and held opponents to two sacks or less in 10 games. Behind the line, QB Derek Carr completed 350 passes for 3,987 yards with 32 touchdowns, all career highs. The line paved the way for RB Latavius Murray to surpass 1,000 rushing yards for the first time in his career, making him the first Raider to do so since 2010. In total, four offensive players earned Pro Bowl nods (Carr, Murray, WR Amari Cooper and FB Marcel Reece).

Holt was named the offensive line coach and run game coordinator at Stetson in 2014 after coaching the line for the Chicago Bears in 2012, succeeding current Raiders offensive line coach Mike Tice, who was promoted to offensive coordinator. His line helped RB Matt Forte eclipse the 1,000-yard mark for the third time in his career.

Prior to joining the Bears, Holt spent three years with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as an offensive assistant (2009) and assistant offensive line coach (2010-11). He helped improve the Buccaneers' offense to 20th in the league in scoring in 2010 after the team ranked 30th the previous season. In his final two years with the Bucs, the team's offensive line paved the way for the rushing attack to average 4.5 rushing yards per carry, seventh best in the NFL. While with Tampa Bay, Holt helped current Raider Penn to a Pro Bowl selection in 2010.

Holt spent 14 years coaching at the collegiate level before breaking into the professional ranks, including a one-year stint at Stonehill College (2008) as the offensive line coach/run game coordinator. Holt spent four years at his alma mater, Division II Southern Connecticut State, from 2004-07, where he worked with offensive line before coaching the running backs. Prior to returning to Southern Connecticut State, Holt was the offensive coordinator/offensive line coach at American International from 2001-03.

Holt began his coaching career at Southern Connecticut State as a graduate assistant from 1995-96, where he worked primarily with the tight ends and offensive line. He spent the next two years at Lehigh (1997-98) working with the tight ends and offensive line and had a stint at Cornell (1999-2000) as the tight ends/assistant offensive line coach and then as the running backs coach.

Nick HOLZ

ASSISTANT WIDE RECEIVERS

6th season in NFL | 6th season with Raiders

Nick Holz enters his first season as assistant wide receivers coach with the Raiders in 2017, having spent two seasons as the Silver and Black's quality control – offense from 2015-16 and

three seasons as the team's offensive assistant from 2012-14.

In 2016, Holz continued to assist in developing the team's wide receivers, helping WR Amari Cooper earn his second consecutive Pro Bowl selection. Cooper led the team with 1,153 receiving yards on 83 catches (13.9 avg.) with five touchdowns, becoming just the third player in NFL history with at least 1,000 yards and 70 catches in each of his first two seasons. WR Michael Crabtree recorded his first 1,000-plus yard season since 2012, and led the team with a career-high 89 receptions, becoming the third Raider with multiple 85-catch seasons. Crabtree also recorded eight touchdowns, which ranked fourth among AFC receivers.

Holz's focus in 2015 was primarily on the wide receivers, where he helped a young, talented corps. Holz guided first-round draft pick Cooper as he set rookie-franchise records for receptions (72), receiving yards (1,070) and 100-yard games (five). His reception total stands as the most by an NFL wide receiver 21 years old or younger. Holz also helped free agent Crabtree thrive during his first season in Oakland, leading the team with 85 receptions for 922 yards and nine touchdowns.

In 2014, Holz helped to groom the team's receivers while helping several free-agent acquisitions adapt into productive roles. Holz developed WR Andre Holmes, as he went on to set career highs with 47 receptions and 693 yards, and second-year WR Brice Butler emerged as a deep threat with 21 receptions and two touchdowns.

Holz worked extensively with Oakland's youthful receiving corps in 2013, helping second-year WR Rod Streater lead the team with 60 receptions and 888 yards. Streater also set a career single-game mark, collecting 130 receiving yards on seven catches and one touchdown against the New York Jets on Dec. 8.

In 2012, Holz aided Streater, who became one of the most productive undrafted rookie players in recent NFL history. Streater's 39 catches in 2012 were tied for third most among undrafted rookies since 2000, and fourth most by a Raider rookie.

Prior to joining the Silver and Black, Holz assisted on a Stanford staff that led the Cardinal to appearances in the Sun Bowl, Orange Bowl and Fiesta Bowl. As an assistant quarterbacks coach, he helped QB Andrew Luck earn first-team All-American honors and finish as the runner-up in Heisman Trophy voting twice.


He began his collegiate coaching career at Nebraska, where he served as offensive quality control coach and video intern for the Cornhuskers in 2007.

Bobby JOHNSON

TIGHT ENDS

8th season in NFL | 3rd season with Raiders

Bobby Johnson enters his third year with the Raiders as tight ends coach. In his 22-year coaching career, 15 of them at the collegiate level, Johnson has spent 10 seasons coaching tight ends and the last seven seasons working in the NFL.

During his second season in Oakland, Johnson continued the development of second-year TE Clive Walford, who set career highs with 33 receptions for 359 yards while tying a career-high three touchdowns. Walford started in eight games in the absence of veteran TE Lee Smith, who suffered a season-ending ankle injury in Week 4. Fourth-year TE Mychal Rivera appeared in 13 games with two starts, recording 192 yards on 18 receptions with one touchdown.

Under Johnson's tutelage in 2015, Rivera appeared in all 16 games and finished the season tied for fourth on the team with 32 receptions, for 280 yards and one touchdown. Free agent signee Smith completed his fifth NFL season starting a career-high 15 games and set a career high with 12 receptions. Third-round draft pick Walford emerged as a dependable receiving option and blocker throughout his rookie campaign, playing in all 16 games and finishing with 28 receptions for 329 yards and three touchdowns.

Prior to joining the Silver and Black, Johnson spent two seasons with the Detroit Lions as tight ends coach (2013) and assistant offensive line coach (2014). He brought a rejuvenated approach to the Lions tight end corps in 2013, as his instruction allowed for the emergence of one of the NFL's top tight end duos in TE Brandon Pettigrew and undrafted rookie TE Joseph Fauria.

Pettigrew (two) and Fauria (seven) combined for nine of QB Matthew Stafford's 29 touchdown passes in 2013, and totaled a combined 59 receptions for 623 yards. Fauria set the franchise record for touchdown receptions by a rookie tight end, and his three-touchdown performance in Week 6 at Cleveland set a single-game franchise record among tight ends and all rookies. His seven scores were also tied for second among all 2013 rookies.

Prior to joining the Lions, Johnson served a one-year stint as tight ends coach with the Jacksonville Jaguars (2012) and two years as assistant offensive line coach with the Buffalo Bills (2010-11). With the Jaguars, Johnson helped veteran TE Mercedes Lewis to his second 50-reception season and his third 500-yard season, while also recording his second-highest touchdown total with four scores. Under his guidance, the Bills' offensive line ranked tied for seventh in the NFL from 2010-11 with just 57 sacks allowed. The team also averaged 4.6 rushing yards per attempt over those two seasons, good for sixth in the league.

From 2005-09, Johnson was the offensive line coach at Indiana, where he developed two NFL linemen in G/T Rodger Saffold, a second-round selection of the St. Louis Rams in 2010, and G James Brewer, a New York Giants' fourth-round pick in 2011.

Before his stint at Indiana, Johnson was an assistant coach at Miami (Ohio), his alma mater, from 1999-2004, helping the RedHawks to a 13-1 season, a MAC Championship and GMAC Bowl victory in 2003. He also helped the team to an 8-5 finish in 2004 and a berth in the Independence Bowl. He spent his final season at Miami (Ohio) as the offensive line coach after working with the tight ends from 1999-2003. During his five-year tenure, the RedHawks were 36-5 when outrushing the opponent.


At Miami (Ohio), Johnson worked with eventual NFL draft picks G Jacob Bell (Tennessee Titans, 2004 fifth-round selection) and G Alex Sulfsted (Kansas City Chiefs, 2001 sixth-round selection), as well as free-agent signees TE Matt Brandt (Detroit Lions, 2004) and T Ben Herrell (Carolina Panthers, 2004).

Johnson spent four years at the University of Akron, the first two as a graduate assistant (1995-96) and then as the Zips' defensive line coach (1997-98).

Miller helped grow and develop the strength and conditioning program in the 2016 season as the Raiders finished with a 12-4 record and a postseason berth, their first since 2002.

In his first season, Miller and the rest of the strength and conditioning staff implemented a new strength and conditioning program that assisted the team to a four-win improvement from the 2014 season.



Rob MOORE

WIDE RECEIVERS

16th season in NFL (12 as a player) | 3rd season with Raiders

Rob Moore enters his third season with the Silver and Black as wide receivers coach in 2017, and 16th NFL season overall.

Last year, Moore's receiving corps was led by WRs Amari Cooper and Michael Crabtree, as Crabtree paced the team with a career-high 89 receptions (1,003 yards) and Cooper led the way with 1,153 yards (83 receptions). Cooper was voted to his second Pro Bowl and Crabtree was named an alternate for the annual all-star game after becoming the first pair of Raiders receivers to both go over 1,000 receiving yards since 2001. Cooper made history in his second year, becoming the third player in NFL history to record 1,000 yards and 70 catches in each of his first two seasons. He also set the mark for receptions by a Raider through his first two years (155). Crabtree enjoyed a stellar year in his second year with the Silver and Black under Moore's tutelage, eclipsing 1,000 receiving yards for the first time since 2012 and leading the team with eight touchdown receptions.

In his first season in Oakland, Moore was charged with overseeing the development of rookie Cooper, the team's first-round selection in the 2015 NFL Draft. Moore helped Cooper set franchise-rookie records for receptions (72), receiving yards (1,070) and 100-yard games (five). His reception total stands as the most by an NFL wide receiver 21 years old or younger. Cooper eclipsed the 1,000-yard mark in just 14 games, becoming the first Raiders rookie and the first Raider since 2005 to reach that milestone. Moore also helped free agent Crabtree thrive in his first season with Oakland by leading the team with 85 receptions and nine touchdowns for 922 yards. Crabtree notched three 100-yard outings and tied career highs with his reception and touchdown totals. Under Moore's tutelage in 2015, a total of four different Raiders totaled at least four receiving touchdowns, and five scores were accounted for by undrafted first-year player WR Seth Roberts.

After coaching five seasons at the collegiate level, Moore joined the Buffalo Bills in 2014 to help mentor a youthful wide receiving corps. Moore helped rookie WR Sammy Watkins, the team's fourth-overall pick in the 2014 NFL Draft, total 65 receptions for 982 yards and six touchdowns, setting the franchise-rookie records for receptions and yards. Under Moore's guidance, second-year WR Robert Woods set new personal bests with 65 catches for 699 yards and five touchdowns. Another young wide receiver, Chris Hogan, also set career highs with 41 receptions, 426 yards and four touchdowns.

As wide receivers coach at Syracuse, Moore helped the Orange to three bowl victories in four years from 2010-13. Under his tutelage, WR Alec Lemon finished his career ranked first in the Orange record books for all-time receptions (201) and second in all-time receiving yards (1,780).

Prior to his coaching stint at Syracuse, Moore was the wide receivers coach for Phoenix (Ariz.) Junior College in 2009. He also spent time working as a consultant for Protect Management and Athlete's Performance, training athletes for the NFL draft where he oversaw future draft picks including WR Robert Meachem, WR Dwayne Bowe, TE Vernon Davis, WR Golden Tate and WR Arrelious Benn.


Moore got his start in coaching at Montclair (N.J.) High School from 2002-03, working with wide receivers.

Ken NORTON, JR.

DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

21st season in NFL (13 as a player) | 3rd season with Raiders

Ken Norton, Jr. enters his eighth season as an NFL coach and third as Oakland's defensive coordinator. Overall, 2017 will be Norton, Jr.'s 21st NFL season and 14th season in coaching.

As a 20-year NFL veteran as a player and coach, Norton, Jr. has been a part of four Super Bowl-winning teams (three as a player and one as a coach). From 1989-2000, he was an All-Pro linebacker for the Dallas Cowboys and San Francisco 49ers. He and Raiders Head Coach Jack Del Rio played alongside one another in the linebacking corps of the Cowboys from 1989-91.

In 2016, Norton, Jr. led a defense that helped the Raiders post 12 wins and return to the postseason for the first time since 2002. The defensive unit produced the Associated Press Defensive Player of the Year in DE Khalil Mack and two Pro Bowlers (Mack and S Reggie Nelson). A key identity for the Raiders' defense in 2016 was the ability to take the ball away and keep the opponents out of the end zone in crucial times. Oakland ranked second in the NFL with 30 turnovers, posting 16 interceptions and 14 fumble recoveries. In crunch time, Norton, Jr.'s defense stood tall, as the Raiders allowed only three points inside the game's final three minutes, the fewest allowed in the NFL. The defense was also strong in the game's opening quarter, allowing just 43 points on the year in the first quarter, good for second fewest allowed last year. For the second straight year, Norton, Jr.'s defense strengthened as the year went along, finishing 11th in the league in net yards per game allowed (333.2) from Week 7-17.

The unit was led by Mack, as he was named the AP Defensive Player of the Year. He became the first Raider to win the award since 1980. His eight-game sack streak during the regular season tied an NFL record, and he came away with a sack-fumble in three consecutive games during that stretch. Mack's elite season earned him numerous individual accolades, including his second Pro Bowl nod, two AFC Defensive Player of the Week honors and the AFC Defensive Player of the Month in November. The defense also received solid contributions at all levels, including the likes of Nelson (team-leading five interceptions), LB Bruce Irvin (seven sacks and six forced fumbles), LB Malcolm Smith (team-leading 115 tackles) and CB David Amerson (team-leading 14 passes defensed.)

In his first year as the Raiders defensive coordinator in 2015, Norton, Jr. led a unit that helped the Raiders to a four-win improvement from 2014. Over the course of the season, his unit progressed as the team came down the stretch. Over the final seven weeks of the season, the defense ranked seventh in the league in total defense, allowing just 305.9 yards per game. For the season, the team excelled at getting off the field, ranking ninth in the NFL (51.7 percent) on third downs. Norton, Jr.'s defense produced two Pro Bowlers in 2015, as Mack and S Charles Woodson were named to the squad. Mack enjoyed a breakout sophomore season, finishing second in the league with 15 sacks, including a four-game stretch where he posted 10 sacks. He also became the first player in NFL history to earn first-team All-Pro selections at two positions, defensive end and linebacker. Woodson paced the secondary and led the team with five interceptions, his most as a Raider since his rookie season of 1998.

From 2010-14, Norton, Jr. served as Seattle's linebackers coach, helping the team to three NFC West Division titles, two NFC Championships and a Super Bowl XLVIII title. Over that period, Norton, Jr. helped the Seahawks' defense rank second in total defense (309.5 yards per game) and the unit finished in the top 10 four times (2011-14), including leading the league in total defense the past two seasons. Seattle's defense also proved to have a nose for the ball during Norton, Jr.'s tenure, forcing the fourth-most turnovers with 147. Additionally, he was part of a defensive staff that sent 11 players to the Pro Bowl from 2011-14.

In 2014, Norton, Jr. helped the Seahawks win the NFC title for the second straight year. Seattle's defense finished the year as the league's top-ranked defense by a large margin, surrendering only 267.1 yards per game (Detroit was ranked second at 300.9 yards per game). Norton, Jr.'s linebacking corps led the way for Seattle, as LBs K.J. Wright and Bobby Wagner led the team in tackles with 107 and 104, respectively. Wagner became just the sixth player in franchise history to record three straight seasons of at least 100 tackles. Wagner was also selected to his first Pro Bowl in 2014.

Helping the Seahawks capture Super Bowl XLVIII in 2013, Norton, Jr. tutored Smith, who was named Super Bowl MVP after posting nine tackles (five solo), a 69-yard interception return for a touchdown and one fumble recovery. Wagner led the team in tackles during the regular season with 119, and tied for the team lead with 34 postseason tackles.

With Seattle emerging as a dominant defense in 2012, Norton, Jr. was instrumental in the development of the 2012 second-round draft pick Wagner, who secured his role as the team's starting middle linebacker and finished second in the Associated Press Defensive Rookie of the Year voting. Wagner led the team with 140 tackles (86 solo), and his 140 tackles were a franchise record for tackles by a rookie. He also guided Irvin in his rookie season, as he posted eight sacks on the campaign.

In his first two seasons in Seattle, Norton, Jr. helped LB David Hawthorne to back-to-back 100-tackle seasons. He also oversaw the development of Wright as he emerged as a starter in the linebacking corps as a rookie in 2011. Wright

finished fifth on the team with 61 tackles in only 12 games started. In 2010, he helped the Seahawks win the NFC West title and defeat the high-powered New Orleans Saints in the Wild Card round.

Prior to joining the NFL coaching ranks, Norton, Jr. spent six seasons coaching on the defensive side of the ball at USC under Pete Carroll. During his career at USC, Norton, Jr. tutored an impressive group of linebackers who went on to have success at the NFL level. Among those players are LB Brian Cushing, LB Clay Matthews, LB Keith Rivers, LB Rey Mauluga and LB Lofa Tatupu. Cushing, Matthews and Rivers were all NFL first-round draft picks. During his time at USC, the school played in the 2005 Orange Bowl (BCS Championship Game), 2006 Rose Bowl (BCS Championship Game), 2007 Rose Bowl, 2008 Rose Bowl, 2009 Rose Bowl and 2009 Emerald Bowl.

In 2008, Mauluga was named a first-team All-American and the Pac-10 Defensive Player of the Year, made his third consecutive All-Pac-10 First Team and was USC's first-ever winner of the Bednarik Award. He also was a finalist for the Lombardi, Butkus and Nagurski Awards. Cushing was also a Butkus Award finalist and won All-Pac-10 First Team honors. Following the season, Cushing and Matthews were first-round picks in the NFL Draft and Mauluga was a second-round selection.

In 2007, Rivers was an All-American first-teamer and was a first-round NFL draft pick following the season, while LB Thomas Williams was a fifth-round NFL selection. In 2006 and 2007, Rivers and Mauluga made the All-Pac-10 First Team. LBs Dallas Sartz (fifth round) and Oscar Lua (seventh round) were also selected in the 2007 NFL Draft.

Mauluga was named first-team Freshman All-American in 2005 and LBs Matt Grootegoed and Tatupu were named first-team All-American in 2004. Grootegoed was also a Butkus Award finalist and Tatupu was selected in the second round of the NFL draft. Norton, Jr. also helped USC win the BCS National Championship in 2004, beating Oklahoma, 55-19.

After retiring from the NFL in 2000, Norton, Jr. was a radio and television commentator and analyst, including appearances on the NFL Network. He also served as the defensive coordinator at Hamilton High School in Los Angeles, Calif., in 2003.

John PAGANO

ASSISTANT HEAD COACH - DEFENSE

22nd season in NFL | 1st season with Raiders

John Pagano joins the Silver and Black for his first season as the team's assistant head coach – defense after 15 seasons with the San Diego Chargers. The 2017 season will be Pagano's 22nd

season in the NFL after serving the last five years as the defensive coordinator of the Chargers.

Pagano brings a strong defensive background to his role with the Raiders, having worked on the defensive staff of an NFL team since 1996. In addition to his NFL stops with the New Orleans Saints, Indianapolis Colts and Chargers, Pagano has spent time at four colleges, including Mesa State College in Grand Junction, Colo., University of Nevada-Las Vegas, Louisiana Tech and Mississippi. In all, Pagano has spent 30 years in coaching.

From 2012-16, Pagano served as the Chargers defensive coordinator, helping the team to an appearance in the Divisional Round in 2013. Over those five seasons, Pagano's defense ranked 13th in the NFL in total net yards per game allowed (348.1).

Last season, the Chargers' defense tied for the NFL lead with 18 interceptions – led by Pro Bowl CB Casey Hayward's seven – despite finishing the year with 11 defensive players on the Reserve/Injured List. Pagano also mentored rookie first-round pick DE Joey Bosa, who was named a Pro Bowl alternate and earned a spot on the Pro Football Writers of America's All-Rookie Team. Second-year LB Denzel Perryman was also a key contributor for Pagano's unit last year, leading the team in tackles and picking up an AFC Defensive Player of the Week award for his performance in Week 7 against the eventual NFC Champion Atlanta Falcons.

In 2015, the Chargers' core of young defenders showed impressive growth as the season progressed in Pagano's system. The defense was one of the NFL's best during the last month of the 2015 season. During the final five games, the Chargers allowed the fifth-fewest passing yards in the NFL (993) and the Bolts' pass defense recorded more interceptions (five) than touchdown passes allowed (four). The Chargers also surrendered only 91 points during that span, ninth-fewest in the NFL. CB Jason Verrett led the team in interceptions and made his first Pro Bowl. LB Manti Te'o led the team with 107 tackles, while Perryman ranked second with 95, despite starting just over half the season. LB Melvin Ingram led the team's pass rush, pacing the squad with 10.5 sacks, good for 12th in the NFL.

In 2014, the Chargers ranked ninth in the NFL in total defense and fourth in pass defense, marking the second time in Pagano's first three years as defensive coordinator that the team ranked in the top 10 in total defense. Pagano's unit ranked fourth in the league in red zone defense over the last eight games, helping the team down the stretch. From Sept. 14-Oct. 5, the Chargers went four games without allowing a point in the fourth quarter, the second longest stretch in team history.

In the team's run to the Divisional Round in 2013, the Chargers recorded 16 takeaways in their last eight games (two playoff games included) and won four of their final five regular season contests to earn a playoff berth. In December, the Chargers surrendered just 315.8 yards per game (sixth in the NFL) and 17.6 points per game (third in the NFL). The unit also set a team record, going 12 consecutive quarters without allowing an offensive touchdown. In the postseason, the Chargers recorded a season high four takeaways against Cincinnati in the Wild Card Playoffs, and two more against Denver in the Divisional Round.

Pagano made an immediate impression in his first season as defensive coordinator in 2012, as the Chargers ranked ninth in total defense and sixth in run defense. The team recorded 38 sacks on the year and scored seven defensive touchdowns, second most in the NFL and two shy of the team record of nine set in 1961.


Pagano originally joined the Chargers in 2002 as the team's quality control coach for the defense before moving up the ranks. He began as an assistant linebackers coach before moving to outside linebackers and then ultimately to linebackers coach before becoming the team's defensive coordinator in 2012. One of Pagano's star pupils was three-time Pro Bowl LB Shawne Merriman, the NFL's Defensive Rookie of the Year in 2005 and the NFL's leader in sacks in 2006.

RUNNING BACKS

18th season in NFL (9 as a player) | 3rd season with Raiders

Bernie Parmalee enters his third season with the Oakland Raiders as running backs coach after joining the team in 2015.

In 2016, the Raiders' rushing attack ranked near the top of the league, finishing sixth in the NFL in rushing yards per game (120.1) and Parmalee's backfield amassed 20 total touchdowns. Veteran RB Latavius Murray led the ground game for the second year in a row, totaling 788 rushing yards on 195 carries with 12 touchdowns and earning a selection as a Pro Bowl alternate. Murray's 12 rushing touchdowns were the most by a Raider since 1990. In his first season as the team's primary fullback, FB/RB Jamize Olawale produced the two longest passing plays of the season for the Raiders. Parmalee proved instrumental in the development of rookie RBs Jalen Richard and DeAndré Washington in 2016, as both earned significant playing time throughout their rookie campaign. On the year, Richard totaled 83 rushes for 491 yards with one touchdown, and 29 receptions for 194 yards and two touchdowns. Washington finished the season totaling 87 rushes for 467 yards with two touchdowns and 17 receptions for 115 yards in 14 games.

During his first year in Oakland, Parmalee produced two Pro Bowlers out of the backfield in Murray and FB Marcel Reece. Parmalee guided Murray during his first season as the team's primary rusher, as he recorded 1,066 rushing yards on 266 carries with six touchdowns, all career highs. Under Parmalee's direction, Murray finished second in the AFC and sixth in the NFL while becoming the first Raider to eclipse 1,000 rushing yards since 2010. The third-year player also set career bests with 232 receiving yards and 41 catches, third most on the team. Parmalee also helped Olawale emerge as an offensive weapon in 2015, setting career highs with 24 rushing attempts for 110 yards with one touchdown and nine receptions for 84 yards.

Parmalee served as the tight ends coach for three seasons with the Kansas City Chiefs from 2010-12. In his first season with Kansas City, he was instrumental in the development of TE Tony Moeaki, who caught 47 passes, the top mark by a rookie tight end in Chiefs history. Under his direction, Moeaki also finished with 556 receiving yards, trailing only TE Walter White (559) for the best total by a rookie tight end in club annals. In 2012, Moeaki finished second on the team with 453 receiving yards, behind only WR Dwayne Bowe.

Prior to joining the Chiefs, Parmalee spent five seasons with Notre Dame, serving as the tight ends coach. He also assisted with special teams during his first two seasons.

During his tenure with the Fighting Irish, Parmalee was instrumental in the development of three of the top tight ends in school history. Notre Dame was the only school to have two tight ends selected in the first two rounds of the NFL Draft from 2006-09. A second-round selection (38th overall) of Seattle in 2008, TE John Carlson registered 100 catches for 1,093 yards at Notre Dame. TE Anthony Fasano caught 92 passes for 1,102 yards for the Fighting Irish before being selected by Dallas in the second round (53rd overall) of the 2006 NFL Draft. TE Kyle Rudolph started all 13 contests as a freshman in 2008, becoming the first Notre Dame tight end to start every game as a freshman. He had 29 receptions, the most by a freshman in Notre Dame history, and was selected to the All-Freshman team by The Sporting News.

Parmalee spent three seasons as an assistant coach with the Miami Dolphins before joining Notre Dame. During his coaching tenure with the Dolphins, he served as the tight ends coach (2004), assistant special teams/offensive assistant (running backs, 2003) and assistant special teams coach (2002). Parmalee tutored a position group in 2004 that was led by TE Randy McMichael, who caught a team-high 73 passes for 791 yards with four touchdowns.

QUARTERBACKS

9th season in NFL | 3rd season with Raiders

Jake Peetz enters his ninth NFL season and his third with the Silver and Black. After finishing his first season as the team's assistant quarterbacks coach and spending the 2015 cam-

paign as the senior offensive assistant, Peetz will enter 2017 as the team's quarterback's coach

In Peetz' first year in the quarterbacks room in 2016, he helped mentor QB Derek Carr, who followed up a breakout sophomore campaign with a brilliant third year. In Carr's 15 games, he ranked among the very best in major statistical categories, throwing for 28 touchdowns, 3,937 yards on 357 completions while tossing a career-low six interceptions, and earning a career high passer rating of 96.7. Carr's stellar third year earned him his second consecutive Pro Bowl nod and was highlighted by a Week 8 performance against the Buccaneers in which he threw for a franchise-record 513 yards while adding four touchdowns. With his assistance in the workroom, Carr garnered an AFC Offensive Player of the Week award, FedEx Air Player of the Week honor, and four Castrol Edge Clutch Performer of the Week selections. Carr was the only player in 2016 to win multiple Clutch Performer of the Week awards en route to being selected as the Castrol Edge Clutch Performer of the Year.

Carr dominated when playing from behind, throwing for 7.3 yards per attempt, 15 touchdowns to just one interception and a passer rating of 102.5, good for fourth best in the NFL. Carr's exceptional play led to seven fourth-quarter comebacks and game-winning drives in 2016, the most in the AFC and most in single-season franchise history. During Carr's comeback's, he became the first quarterback in NFL history to toss five game-winning touchdown passes in the fourth quarter or overtime in the same season.

In his first season with Oakland, Peetz contributed to an offense that featured four Pro Bowlers, including two in the backfield with RB Latavius Murray and FB Marcel Reece being selected. Working primarily with the running backs, Peetz helped Murray become the Raiders' first 1,000-yard rusher since 2010 and saw the offense post an improvement of 51.3 total yards per game from the 2014 season.

In 2014, Peetz helped the Redskins receiving corps finish eighth in the NFL with an average of 278.8 receiving yards per game. WR DeSean Jackson led the team with 1,169 receiving yards and added six touchdowns in his first season with the team. WR Pierre Garcon led the team with 68 receptions.

Prior to joining the Redskins, Peetz spent the 2013 season as an offensive analyst under Nick Saban at Alabama, assisting the quarterbacks and helping the Crimson Tide to an 11-2 record. Alabama spent the first 13 weeks of the season as the nation's top-ranked team and boasted the nation's consensus top recruiting class for 2014, according to Rivals.com, ESPN.com, Scout.com and 247sports.com.

Peetz began his NFL coaching career with the Jacksonville Jaguars in 2008, spending five seasons there. He was named offensive assistant/assistant quarterbacks coach in 2012 and he assisted quarterbacks coach Greg Olson in addition to handling quality control duties. Prior to being named offensive assistant, he spent two seasons as the team's BLESTO scout. He initially joined the Jaguars as a scouting assistant in 2008.





SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR

29th season in NFL | 3rd season with Raiders

Brad Seely, entering his 29th season as an NFL assistant coach, is in his third year at the helm of the Raiders special teams. Overall, Seely brings nearly 40 years of coaching experi-

ence into 2017.

Seely, in his seventh assignment in charge of a team's special teams unit, has previously directed those of the Carolina Panthers, New England Patriots, Cleveland Browns and San Francisco 49ers. In 39 years of coaching, Seely has also served NFL stints with the New York Jets and Indianapolis Colts. Additionally, he spent 11 seasons at the collegiate level.

Seely's special teams unit was one of the NFL's best in 2016. On the year, the Raiders finished first in the league in average starting field position (31.7 yard line) and second in opponent average starting field position (25.2 yard line). Oakland also saw improvement for the second straight year in yards allowed per kickoff return (19.9), ranking sixth in the NFL. Seely continued to play an instrumental role in the development of P Marquette King, who solidified himself as one of the league's top punters, earning Associated Press All-Pro Second Team honors. King recorded 81 punts for 3,937 yards (48.6 avg.) and 34 punts placed inside the opponents' 20-yard line, which ranked tied for fifth in the NFL. He was also named the AFC Special Teams Player of the Week for his Week 7 performance against the Jaguars. K Sebastian Janikowski also posted another solid season under Seely, as he connected on 29-of-35 field goals, including three from 50-or-more yards to become the NFL's all-time leader with 55 field goals of that distance.

In his first season at the helm of Oakland's special teams unit, Seely directed a special teams unit that led the league in kickoff return yards (1,268) and total return yards (1,540). In coverage, the Raiders allowed only 22.7 yards per kickoff return, improving from 32nd in the league in 2014 to 13th in 2015. Under his guidance, the team also blocked five combined extra points and field goals, tied for the most in a season by any NFL team since 1995. Seely also helped King improve his accuracy and precision, leading to one of the most prolific punting seasons in team history. King placed 40 of his 83 punts inside the opponents' 20-yard line, a franchise record and the second most in the NFL in 2015.

Seely spent four seasons with the San Francisco 49ers from 2011-14, overseeing one of the top units in the NFL. During that time span, the 49ers tied (New England Patriots) for the most field goals converted (130), ranked second in net punting average (41.9), second in gross punting average (48.2) and seventh in opponent punt return average (8.3).

In 2014 under Seely, the 49ers special teams unit was led by K Phil Dawson and P Andy Lee. Dawson connected on 25-of-31 field goal attempts, including the second most made field goals in the league of 50-or-more yards. He also became one of 20 players in NFL history to surpass 1,500 points scored for his career. Lee finished the season with the sixth highest punting average (46.8) in the NFL.

In 2013, San Francisco's special teams unit ranked second in the NFL according to The Dallas Morning News' Rick Gosselin's annual special teams rankings. Dawson set a franchise record with 27 consecutive field goals made. Dawson also set single-season career highs with 140 points, 44 made PATs and 32 made field goals. Lee ranked third in the NFL with a 48.2 gross punting average and fourth in net punting average (41.7).

Under Seely's direction in 2012, the 49ers fielded one of the strongest special teams units in the NFL. Lee led the NFL with 43.2 net punting average, while also ranking fifth in the league with a 48.0 gross punting average, on his way to All-Pro honors. San Francisco also led the NFL in starting field position (31.8-yard line) and ranked second in the NFL in opponents starting field position (24.9-yard line).

In Seely's first year with the 49ers in 2011, the special teams unit emerged as one of the best in the NFL. K David Akers set the NFL single-season record for most field goals (44) and points with no touchdowns (166). Lee set the NFL record with a 44.0 net punting average, while the 49ers led the NFL in average starting field position (33.5-yard line) and opponents average starting field position (24.3-yard line). Both Lee

and Akers earned All-Pro and Pro Bowl selections. For his efforts, Seely was named Special Teams Coach of the Year by Gosselin.

Seely spent the 2009-10 seasons with the Cleveland Browns, garnering Special Teams Coach of the Year honors in 2009 after leading the Browns to the top ranking in Gosselin's rankings. In 2010, his unit led the NFL in kickoff coverage and his punt coverage team ranked fifth. KR Josh Cribbs also earned Pro Bowl honors in each of Seely's seasons in Cleveland. Seely's special teams unit led the NFL in kickoff coverage, while ranking fifth in the NFL in punt coverage in 2010.

In 2009, Seely was named Special Teams Coach of the Year after leading the Browns to a league-best special teams ranking according to Gosselin's formula. It marked Seely's fifth top-five finish for his special teams units since 1990.

Prior to joining the Browns, Seely spent 10 seasons as the New England Patriots special teams coach (1999-2008), where he was part of three Super Bowl championships. Over the span of his tenure in New England, the Patriots led the NFL in kickoff return average (23.5), were fourth in field goal percentage (83.4) and ranked eighth in punt return average (9.9). In addition, his units registered 11 returns for touchdowns, including eight on kickoffs, a figure that tied for second in the NFL over that 10-year stretch.

In 2007, Seely helped the club record the first 16-0 regular season in NFL history. K Stephen Gostkowski set an NFL record for PATs in a season with 74. Gostkowski also finished third in the league in total points. Seely's punting unit ranked fourth in the league in 2005, averaging 44.6 yards per punt. In 2003, New England's special teams units led the AFC in numerous categories, as the punt coverage unit allowed just 6.3 yards per punt return, and New England ranked fourth in the NFL with a 23.8 kickoff return average. Seely also helped produced a total of three special teams Pro Bowlers (K Adam Vinatieri, LB Larry Izzo and Gostkowski). He also tutored the AFC's leading kick returner on two occasions (RB Kevin Faulk in 2002 and WR Bethel Johnson in 2003) and leading punt returner (WR Troy Brown in 2002).

Serving on the coaching staff of the Carolina Panthers from 1995-98, Seely helped coach an expansion team to an NFC Championship Game appearance in just its second season. In 1996 and 1997, WR Michael Bates became the first player in 35 years to lead the league in kick return average in consecutive seasons, earning two consecutive trips to the Pro Bowl for his efforts. In 1996, Seely earned Special Teams Coach of the Year honors. He also had the league's best kicker, as K John Kasay set a then-NFL single-season record with 37 field goals. In addition to the success of Bates and Kasay, Carolina also boasted one of the league's top coverage units as the Panthers led the NFL in opponents average punt return (5.4) and ranked fifth in opponents average kickoff return (20.1) in 1996.

Seely began his NFL career in 1989 with the Indianapolis Colts, serving as their special teams/tight ends coach for five years (1989-93). During his time with Colts, he assisted in the development of two Pro Bowl special teamers, P Rohn Stark and WR Clarence Verdin. In 1992, the Colts had the NFL's top special teams unit based on Gosselin's special teams rankings. Seely then coached the New York Jets' special teams for one year (1994), and in that season, New York ranked fifth in the league in opponents kickoff return average (19.6) and sixth in opponents punt return average (6.8).

Seely's collegiate coaching career began as an assistant coach at South Dakota State in 1978. He then moved on to become a graduate assistant at Colorado State in 1979, before being named the Rams offensive line coach in 1980. Seely then served as the offensive line coach at Southern Methodist (1981), North Carolina State (1982), Pacific (1983) and Oklahoma State (1984-88).

PERSONAL: Raised in Baltic, S.D. ...Played eight-man football at Baltic (S.D.) High School... Earned all-conference honors as a guard at South Dakota State (1974-77)...Signed as an undrafted free agent with the Dallas Cowboys following his senior season...Majored in economics and physical education...He and his wife, Patti, have three daughters, Sarah, Hannah and Brynn.

9th season in NFL | 3rd season with Raiders

Tracy Smith enters his third season with the Raiders, serving as the assistant special teams coach. He is entering his ninth NFL season in 2017.

In 2016, Smith saw K Sebastian Janikowski connect on 29-of-35 field goals, including three from 50-or-more yards to become the NFL's all-time leader with 55 field goals of that distance. Janikowski also surpassed 400 career field goals to finish 2016 with 414, the ninth most in NFL history, and moved into 10th on the NFL's all-time scoring list with 1,799 points scored. Smith helped P Marquette King establish himself as one of the league's elite punters, earning Associated Press All-Pro Second Team honors. King recorded 81 punts for 3,937 yards (48.6 avg.) and 34 punts placed inside the opponents' 20-yard line, which ranked tied for fifth in the NFL. Under Smith's guidance, the Raiders saw improvement for the second straight year in yards allowed per kickoff return (19.9), ranking sixth in the NFL.

In his first season with Oakland, Smith oversaw a special teams unit that led the league in kickoff return yards (1,268) and total return yards (1,540). The Raiders allowed only 22.7 yards per kickoff return, improving from 32nd in the league in 2014 to 13th in 2015. Under Smith's guidance, the team also blocked five combined extra points and field goals, tied for the most in a season by any NFL team since 1995. In 2015, Smith also helped King improve his accuracy and precision, leading to one of the most prolific punting seasons in team history. King placed 40 of his 83 punts inside the opponents' 20-yard line, a franchise record and the second most in the NFL in 2015.

Smith joined Oakland after spending the previous three seasons with the San Francisco 49ers, assisting current Raiders and former 49ers special teams coordinator Brad Seely on one of the top units in the NFL. During that time span, the 49ers ranked in the top 10 in field goals made (ninth, 86) and opponents punt return average (ninth, 8.3). San Francisco also ranked in the top five in net punting average (fourth, 41.3) and gross punting average (third, 47.5).

In 2014, the 49ers special teams unit was led by K Phil Dawson and P Andy Lee. Dawson connected on 25-of-31 field goal attempts, including the second-most made field goals in the league of 50-or-more yards (six). He also became one of 19 players in NFL history to surpass 1,500 points scored for his career. Lee finished the season with the sixth-highest punting average (46.8) in the NFL.

In 2013, San Francisco's special teams unit ranked second in the NFL according to The Dallas Morning News' Rick Goselin's annual special teams rankings. Dawson set a franchise record with 27 consecutive field goals made. Dawson also set

single-season career highs with 140 points, 44 made PATs and 32 made field goals. Lee ranked third in the NFL with a 48.2 gross punting average and fourth in net punting average (41.7).

The 49ers fielded one of the strongest special teams units in the NFL in 2012. Lee led the NFL with 43.2 net punting average, while also ranking fifth in the league with a 48.0 gross punting average, on his way to All-Pro honors. San Francisco also led the NFL in starting field position (31.8-yard line) and ranked second in the NFL in opponents starting field position (24.9-yard line).

Smith spent the 2011 season with the Seattle Seahawks as a coaching assistant. Prior to joining the Seahawks, Smith served as a special teams assistant with the Cleveland Browns, working under Seely.

Before making the jump to the NFL, Smith served as the tight ends coach at Utah State from 2006-08. Smith spent 2005 as the offensive graduate assistant at LSU. In his position, he worked with the Tiger quarterbacks.

Prior to coaching at LSU, Smith was a restricted earnings coach working with tight ends and serving as the team's video coordinator at Stephen F. Austin.

OUTSIDE LINEBACKERS

6th season in NFL | 6th season with Raiders

Travis Smith enters his sixth year with the Raiders and his first as outside linebackers. He previously served as quality control - defense for the Silver and Black from 2015-16.

Smith again worked closely with the defensive line throughout the 2016 season, aiding third-year All Pro DE Khalil Mack to his second consecutive Pro Bowl and first Defensive Player of the Year honor. Mack's eight-game sack streak during the regular season tied an NFL record, and he came away with a sack-fumble in three consecutive games during that stretch. Mack's elite season earned him numerous individual accolades, including his second Pro Bowl nod, two AFC Defensive Player of the Week honors and the AFC Defensive Player of the Month in November. His campaign was capped with the Pro Football Writers of America Defensive Player of the Year Award and his second All-Pro First Team selection in addition to the Associated Press honor.

LB Bruce Irvin also saw success in his first season with the Silver and Black, as the fifth-year pro started all 16 games for the first time in his career, and tied a franchise record with a career-high six forced fumbles. Mack and Irvin became one of the most dominant duos across the league, combining for 18 sacks and 11 forced fumbles. The defensive line also got significant contributions from DL Denico Autry (37 tackles and two fumble recoveries), DT Stacy McGee (2.5 sacks and two forced fumbles) and DT Dan Williams.

In 2015, Smith contributed to a defense that featured two Pro Bowlers in veteran S Charles Woodson and Mack. Working primarily with the defensive line, Smith continued to work with Mack as he developed into an elite defender, totaling 15 sacks to rank second in the league and third in franchise history, and earning his first Pro Bowl selection. Mack also tied a franchise record with five sacks against Denver in Week 14, becoming just the sixth player in the NFL with a five sack game since sacks became an official stat in 1982. Smith also helped in the development of rookie DE Mario Edwards Jr., who quickly became a significant contributor, posting 41 tackles (31 solo), two sacks, three passes defended and three forced fumbles in 10 starts.

As the Raiders defensive assistant, Smith worked extensively with the linebackers. In 2014, Smith helped tutor Mack as a rookie. Oakland's first-round (fifth overall) selection in the 2014 NFL Draft, Mack finished third in the voting for the Associated Press Defensive Rookie of the Year. He was also named to the Pro Football Writers of America's All-Rookie Team. Mack was also the only rookie named to the 2014 USA Football All-Fundamentals Team, which honors 26 NFL players who exhibit exemplary football techniques for young players to emulate. In addition, LB Sio Moore notched a career-high 112 tackles.


In 2013, Smith helped a revamped unit that included three new starters in veteran LBs Nick Roach and Kevin Burnett and rookie Moore. Roach played every snap at middle linebacker and posted career highs in tackles (152) and sacks (5.5), while Moore was named to the PFWA All-Rookie Team after recording 4.5 sacks in his first season.

Smith joined the Raiders after spending the previous two years in the collegiate ranks. Smith was an offensive technical intern at Colorado in 2011. He coached at Santa Monica (Calif.) Junior College in 2010, assisting the tight ends and the defensive linemen. He also served as an undergraduate assistant coach at Cal Poly.

LINEBACKERS

10th season in NFL | 3rd season with Raiders

Sal Sunseri enters his third season with the Silver and Black as linebackers coach. A 33-year coaching veteran, Sunseri begins his 10th season in the NFL.

Under Sunseri in 2016, LB Malcolm Smith led the team in tackles for the second straight year with 115 (87 solo). Smith appeared in 15 games and finished with one interception, six passes defended and tied a career-high two forced fumbles. Veteran LB Perry Riley Jr., who joined the team a quarter of the way into the season, proved to be a great addition for the Raiders in his first season, as he finished with 62 tackles (45) in just 11 games. Free agent signee LB Bruce Irvin tied for first in the NFL with six forced fumbles while setting a career-high 61 tackles (46) in his first year with the Silver and Black. Sunseri guided rookie LB Cory James, who emerged as a significant contributor in 2016. James appeared in all 16 games with five starts and recorded 48 tackles (38) with one forced fumble.

Under Sunseri's tutelage in 2015, free agent signee Smith led Oakland in tackles in his first year with the team, recording a career-high 143. Smith helped solidify the Raiders' linebacking corps, starting all 16 games and playing nearly every defensive snap. Smith finished with four sacks, good for second on the team. Sunseri helped develop rookie LBs Neiron Ball and Ben Heeney as they made substantial contributions in their first year. Ball emerged as a starter at outside linebacker before injuring his knee in Week 7, totaling nine tackles (four), one sack and one pass defended in six games with two starts. Heeney played in 15 games with three starts and earned 39 tackles (28), 2.5 sacks and one forced fumble.

Prior to joining the Raiders, Sunseri spent two years at Florida State. There, Sunseri helped Florida State complete a 13-1 Rose Bowl campaign in 2014 and an undefeated (14-0) BCS National Championship season in 2013. Following the 2013 season, Sunseri was promoted to head coach of defense while continuing to serve as defensive ends coach. The 2014 Seminole defense was key to Florida State's school- and ACC-record 29-game winning streak, which tied for the 12th longest streak in NCAA history. Seven FSU defenders were named to the All-ACC team in 2014, including current Raider DE Mario Edwards Jr. Edwards Jr. led the team with 11 tackles for loss and also had three sacks, five passes defended and two forced fumbles.

Overall, Florida State went 28-1 with Sunseri as an assistant coach, as he joined the team prior to the 2013 Orange Bowl. The 2013 National Championship marked Sunseri's third BCS title in five years, following his 2009 and 2011 championship runs at Alabama. The defensive ends, coached by Sunseri, had monumental success in 2013. The Seminole defense also ranked No. 1 in scoring defense (12.1 points per game) and No. 3 in total defense (281.4 yards per game). Jones collected All-ACC Second-Team accolades and finished with 56 tackles, eight tackles for loss and a team-best six quarterback pressures, while Edwards Jr. was named to the All-ACC Third Team and finished with 28 tackles, including 9.5 tackles for loss and 3.5 sacks.

Sunseri served as Tennessee's defensive coordinator in 2012. With the Vols, Sunseri coached two of the nation's top defensive players in LB A.J. Johnson and CB Byron Moore. Johnson was fourth in the nation and led the SEC with an average of 11.5 tackles per game. Moore was tied for 11th in the nation in interceptions, leading the SEC in that category.

Prior to Tennessee, Sunseri spent three years as the assistant head coach and linebackers coach at the University of Alabama under Nick Saban, including the 2009 and 2011 National Championship teams. The 2011 Crimson Tide outside linebackers flourished under Sunseri and contributed to the overall success of the defense. Lombardi and Butkus Award finalist OLB Courtney Upshaw led the way with 17 tackles for loss and 8.5 sacks, which ranked second and fourth, respectively, in the SEC. Sunseri was also recognized individually for his contributions when he was named a finalist for the Broyles Award, presented to the nation's top assistant coach.

In 2010, Sunseri continued to build on his solid foundation from the National Championship season. The defensive unit ranked third in the country in scoring defense and fifth in total defense. Sophomore LB Dont'a Hightower garnered second-team All-SEC honors with 69 tackles and nine quarterback hurries. Upshaw led the Crimson Tide with 14.5 tackles for loss and seven sacks, and was named the MVP of the Capital One Bowl.

In Sunseri's first season at Alabama in 2009, he helped guide the Crimson Tide to the National Championship behind a dominant defense that ranked second nationally in four major categories: rushing defense, pass efficiency defense, total defense and scoring defense. The Alabama defense generated 32 sacks and 98 tackles for loss, despite losing Hightower to an early-season injury.


Sunseri spent seven years (2002-08) with the Carolina Panthers under then-head coach John Fox, a tenure that included the franchise's first NFC Championship and Super Bowl appearance. He joined the Panthers as a defensive assistant in 2002, then took over as defensive line coach in 2003. His defensive line with the Panthers was regarded as one of the best in the NFL. DEs Julius Peppers and Mike Rucker and DT Kris Jenkins earned Pro Bowl honors during his tenure. Sunseri produced at least one Pro Bowl defensive lineman five times as the line coach. The Panthers were among the top 10 in the NFL in fewest yards allowed in four of his seven seasons.

Prior to his time at Carolina, Sunseri worked as the linebackers coach and special teams coordinator at Michigan State in 2001 after spending 2000 on Saban's LSU staff in the same capacity. He was the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at Alabama A&M in 1998 and 1999 after three seasons as the linebackers coach at Louisville. Sunseri's climb of the coaching ladder included one-year stops at Illinois State (1994) and Iowa Wesleyan (1993). He broke into coaching at his alma mater, Pittsburgh, in 1985 and directed the defensive line and linebackers before being named assistant head coach in 1992.

PERSONAL: Native of Pittsburgh, Pa. ...Began his playing career at the University of Pittsburgh in 1978 as a walk-on...Finished his career as team captain and consensus All-American as a senior in 1981...A three-year starter at linebacker, he helped

the Panthers to a combined record of 33-3...Anchored a defensive unit that led the NCAA in total defense in 1980 and 1981...Was the defensive MVP in the 1982 Senior Bowl... Mike TICE

OFFENSIVE LINE

35th season in NFL (14 as a player) | 3rd season with Raiders

Mike Tice enters his third season with the Silver and Black as offensive line coach, bringing 20 years of NFL coaching experience, including 10 seasons as an offensive line coach and four

as a head coach.

Last season, Tice's offensive line showcased three Pro Bowlers in C Rodney Hudson (Tice's third-career Pro Bowl Center), LT Donald Penn, and newcomer G/T Kelechi Osemele, who joined during the 2016 free agency period. In addition to Osemele's Pro Bowl selection, he also garnered first-team All-Pro recognition by the Associated Press in just his first year with the Silver and Black. The offensive line helped the offensive unit finish as the number six rushing attack in the NFL, averaging 120.1 yards per game and racking up 17 scores on the ground in the process.

The offensive line proved to be just as effective in pass-blocking situations as they were when run blocking, surrendering an NFL-best 18 sacks throughout the season. The 18 sacks surrendered were the fewest in team history dating back to the AFL-NFL Merger in 1970. Because of their stellar protection, QB Derek Carr was able to collect his second consecutive Pro Bowl selection.

In 2015 under Tice, the Raiders' offensive line helped Carr set career highs in passing yards (3,987), and passing touchdowns (32), earning him his first Pro Bowl nod. Carr led the NFL with 13 touchdown passes of 25-plus yards. On the year, the O-line gave up only 33 sacks, tied for 11th in the league. The offensive line held opponents to two sacks or less in 10 of the team's games. Consistency was key for Tice's line, as they had only three different starting offensive line combinations on the year. The offensive line also paved the way for Murray to surpass the 1,000-yard mark for the first time in his career with 1,066 yards and six touchdowns, earning his first Pro Bowl selection. In total, four offensive players secured Pro Bowl nods (WR Amari Cooper, FB Marcel Reece).

Tice held the same position with the Atlanta Falcons during the 2014 campaign. Despite losing five offensive linemen to season-ending injuries and working with five different line combinations that included three starting centers, one of which was an undrafted rookie, and three right tackles, the unit gave up just 31 sacks on the season, helping QB Matt Ryan finish second in the league with 415 completions. Tice's line blocked for an offense that ranked eighth in the NFL in total offense (378.2 yards per game) and fifth in passing yards per game (284.6).

Prior to joining the Falcons coaching staff, Tice served as the Bears' offensive line coach for two seasons before being promoted to offensive coordinator in 2012. In 2011, Chicago's offensive line helped the Bears produce 2,015 rushing yards, which was only the second time the club eclipsed 2,000 rushing yards in the last 22 seasons.

Tice spent the previous four seasons in Jacksonville as assistant head coach, also serving as the tight ends coach for his last three years with the club under current Raiders Head Coach Jack Del Rio. In his first two seasons with the Jaguars, the club's rushing attack had two of the most productive seasons in team history, gaining 2,541 yards in 2006 and 2,391 yards in 2007, first and third, respectively, in team annals. In 2007, the Jaguars set franchise records in points (411), yards per play (5.6) and touchdowns (50) en route to a playoff berth and a victory over the Steelers in the AFC Divisional Playoff round.

Before landing in Jacksonville, Tice spent 14 seasons with the Minnesota Vikings as a player and coach, serving his final four-plus years there as head coach after taking over as interim head coach for the final game of the 2001 campaign. He became the first Vikings player to go on to serve as head coach.

In his four-plus seasons as head coach, Tice compiled a 32-33 (.492) record with a 1-1 mark in the playoffs. Also in his tenure as head coach, the Vikings offense set the NFL record for most consecutive games with 300-plus yards of offense, a feat accomplished over 36 games between September 29, 2002 and October 31, 2004. Tice led the Vikings to the playoffs in 2004 and

their first road playoff victory in franchise history with a win at Green Bay, joining Jerry Burns as the only coaches in club history to win their playoff debuts. The Vikings set a team record in 2004 for net yards (6,339) and passing yards (4,754). QB Daunte Culpepper set numerous club passing records and produced one of the finest seasons in NFL history by a quarterback.

The Vikings finished with a winning record in 2003 for the first time since 2000. The Vikings led the NFL in offense for the first time in their history and sent four players to the Pro Bowl. In Tice's first season as head coach in 2002, the Vikings led the NFL in rushing for the first time in team history with 2,507 yards.

Before being promoted to interim head coach, Tice served as the Vikings offensive line coach from 1997-2001. As an offensive line coach, he instructed five different players – C Matt Birk, C Jeff Christy, G Randall McDaniel, G/T Todd Steussie and T Korey Stringer – to a combined 10 Pro Bowl appearances. From 1999-2000, Tice's offensive line helped the Vikings offense record the second most consecutive games with 300-or-more yards, doing so in 30 straight games. In 1998, when the Vikings scored a then-NFL-record 556 points, three Minnesota offensive linemen were named Pro Bowl starters. Tice began his NFL coaching career with the Vikings in 1996 as a tight ends coach.

Nate Tice enters his first season as quality control – offense for the Oakland Raiders after serving as a seasonal offensive assistant for the Silver and Black in 2016.

Last season, Tice assisted on a staff that led the Raiders to a 12-4 record and their first postseason berth since 2002. Tice worked with an offense that featured five Pro Bowlers – QB Derek Carr, WR Amari Cooper, C Rodney Hudson, G/T Kelechi Osemele and T Donald Penn. Additionally, the unit finished sixth in the NFL in total offense (373.3 yard per game) and sixth in rushing offense (120.1 yards per game). The unit also finished seventh in the NFL, averaging 26.0 points per game.

3rd season in NFL | 3rd season with Raiders

Brent Vieselmeier enters his third season with the Silver and Black and first as safeties coach. He joined the Raiders in 2015 after spending 15 years coaching at the college and high

school levels.

In 2016, the linebacking corps was led by veteran LBs Bruce Irvin, Perry Riley Jr. and Malcolm Smith. The addition of Irvin in free agency made an immediate impact, as Irvin started all 16 games for the first time in his career, generating seven sacks (second most on the team), and tied a franchise record with six forced fumbles, also tying for the NFL lead. Smith recorded a team-high 115 tackles (86 solo), a mark that led the team for the second consecutive season. Riley Jr. joined the team in October and stepped in upon arrival and emerged into a starting role, finishing sixth on the team with 62 tackles (45). Rookie LB Cory James saw significant time in 2016, making five starts and posting 43 stops in his five starts.

In his first season in the NFL, Vieselmeier assisted with a linebackers corps that had a significant impact on the Raiders overall defense. With Vieselmeier's assistance, Smith lead the team with a career-high 143 tackles (98), while finishing second on the team with four sacks. Vieselmeier also assisted in the development of rookie LBs Ben Heeney and Neiron Ball. Heeney emerged as a key contributor on defense late in the season finishing with 39 tackles (28), 2.5 sacks and one forced fumble. Ball emerged as a starter at outside linebacker making nine tackles (four), one sack and one pass defended in his six appearances before having his rookie season cut short due to a knee injury.

Vieselmeier spent two seasons as co-defensive coordinator at Houston Baptist University from 2013-14. Prior to joining the Huskies, he served as head coach at Valor Christian High School in Highlands Ranch, Colo., beginning in March 2007, where he launched the football program. At Valor Christian, he compiled a 55-12 record, leading the Eagles to four-straight state championships in 2009 (3A), 2010 (4A), 2011 (4A) and 2012 (5A). He was named the Denver Post Colorado Coach of the


Year in 2009, 2010 and 2011 and was All Sport Jefferson County Coach of the Year in 2010.

Rod WOODSON

CORNERBACKS

21st season in NFL (17 as a player) | 6th season with Raiders (2 as a player)

Rod Woodson returns for his 21st NFL season, 17 as a player, and his fourth season coaching with the Silver and Black, second as cornerbacks coach. Woodson served as as-

stant defensive backs coach from 2015-16. Woodson is in his second coaching stint with the Raiders, having coached cornerbacks for the Silver and Black in 2011.

In 2016, the defensive unit strengthened as the season progressed, with the unit ranking 11th in the NFL in total yards allowed per game from Week 7 to the end of the year. The team also ranked second in the NFL in takeaways, forcing 30 turnovers on the year. Offseason free agent acquisition S Reggie Nelson received a Pro Bowl nod, the second of his career. Nelson's veteran leadership on the field proved beneficial for the entire secondary, as newcomer CB Sean Smith provided strong play throughout the season, finishing tied for second on the team in interceptions, and rookie S Karl Joseph earned considerable playing time and success in 2016, stepping into a starting role early in the season and provided solid play throughout, posting 76 tackles (51 solo), one interception, six passes defended and one fumble recovery in 12 games. Joseph was named to the Pro Football Writers of America's All-Rookie Team for his efforts.

In his first season back with the Raiders, Woodson helped develop a talented secondary led by 18-year NFL veteran S Charles Woodson, who earned a Pro Bowl selection in his final season after leading the team with five interceptions. In total, the defense produced 14 interceptions, up from just nine in 2014. Woodson helped the pass defense improve drastically over the season, as the secondary allowed an astounding 111.7 fewer passing yards per game over the team's final eight games after giving up 314.6 yards per game in the first eight contests. Woodson's 2015 campaign was also marked by the transformation of several young prospects into versatile starters, including CB David Amerson. After joining the team prior to Week 3, Woodson quickly got the third-year player up to speed as Amerson went on to post a franchise-record 26 passes defended with four interceptions and one interception returned for a touchdown.

In 2011, Woodson helped tutor the cornerbacks unit for Oakland, as the team finished 8-8. CB Stanford Rutt finished second on the team with four interceptions and led the team with 15 passes defended.

Woodson participated in the Bill Walsh Minority Coaching Fellowship Program with the Denver Broncos during the 2014 offseason. In 2013, Woodson interned in training camp with the Pittsburgh Steelers.



A native of Upland, Calif., Vandernat graduated from Cal Poly Pomona and received his master's degree in Sport Management from the University of San Francisco.



SUPER BOWL II

Miami Orange Bowl; Sunday, Jan. 14, 1968; Attendance: 75,546; Time: 2:34 PM PST; Weather: 68°F; partly cloudy, 52% humidity, wind W 14 mph

The Raiders stormed into Super Bowl II after claiming the club's first-ever American Football League championship with a 40-7 romp over the Houston Oilers on Dec. 31, 1967. The Raiders mounted a spirited challenge to the Green Bay Packers, the defending Super Bowl champions, but ultimately fell short in Miami, 33-14.

In a game that drew the first 53 million gate in football history, the Bart Starr-led Packers jumped out to a 13-0 lead in the second quarter after a 62-yard touchdown reception by Boyd Dowler. The Raiders cut into the lead with a 23-yard touchdown pass from Daryle Lamonica to Bill Miller, the first of two touchdown receptions on the day for the wide receiver, who played collegiately at the University of Miami.

Down 16-7 entering the second half, the Raiders were unable to contain a Packers offense that added a 2-yard touchdown run by Donny Anderson and Don Chandler's fourth field goal of the day, in the third quarter. Herb Adderley's 60-yard interception return for a touchdown on a fourth-quarter Lamonica pass sealed the Packers victory. Lamonica connected with Miller for a 23-yard Oakland touchdown late in the final period.

Starr earned the game's MVP honors after completing 13-of-24 passes for 202 yards and one touchdown. Miller hauled in a game-high five passes for 84 yards and two touchdowns to lead the Raiders.


The 1976 Raiders advanced to Super Bowl XI with a 13-1 regular season record and a 2-0 mark in the playoffs, upending the Pittsburgh Steelers in the AFC Championship Game for the first time in three tries, 24-7. Against the NFC Champion Vikings in front of 103,424 fans at the Rose Bowl, the Silver and Black put forth dominant efforts on both offense and defense in posting a 32-14 victory and capturing the club's first-ever Super Bowl championship.

Oakland built a 16-0 first-half lead as Dave Casper and Pete Banaszak each scored short touchdowns after receptions by Fred Biletnikoff brought the Raiders to the goal line on two separate drives. An additional short-yardage touchdown run by Banaszak in the second half put the Raiders up, 26-7, and set the stage for the signature moment of the contest. With Fran Tarkenton under heavy pressure in the fourth quarter, veteran Willie Brown intercepted a pass and returned it 75 yards for a touchdown to seal the victory.

The Vikings could only muster two second-half touchdowns as the Silver and Black put together a dominant defensive performance, limiting Chuck Foreman to just 44 yards rushing and intercepting Tarkenton twice.

Biletnikoff's 79 yards on four receptions, three of which set up Raider touchdowns, earned him MVP honors, while Clarence Davis helped pace the offense with 137 rushing yards on 16 carries.

Ten Raiders from Super Bowl XI would go on to enshrinement in the Pro Football Hall of Fame, with Owner Al Davis joining Head Coach John Madden, Biletnikoff, Brown, Ted Hendricks, Ray Guy, Ken Stabler, Gene Upshaw, Art Shell and Casper in Canton.


The 1980 Oakland Raiders entered Super Bowl XV against the NFC Champion Philadelphia Eagles as the ultimate underdogs. Not only were the Raiders the first wild card team to advance to the Super Bowl since the NFL adopted the new playoff format in 1978, but the Eagles had already defeated the Silver and Black, 10-7, just eight weeks earlier. This matchup would be markedly different, as a team that started the season with just a 2-3 record would claim the club's second championship with a dominating 27-10 victory.

The Raiders wasted no time establishing themselves in New Orleans, as Rod Martin picked off a Ron Jaworski pass on the game's third play and re-

turned it 25 yards to set up a Jim Plunkett touchdown pass to Cliff Branch. Later in the first quarter, Plunkett hit Kenny King for an 80-yard touchdown strike that set a then-Super Bowl record and gave the Silver and Black a 14-0 lead.

Head coach Tom Flores, employing a philosophy of pressure football, kept the offense firing away in the second half. Plunkett engineered a third-quarter drive that culminated in a 29-yard touchdown pass to Branch that gave the Raiders an insurmountable 21-3 lead. Chris Bahr added two field goals in the second half and the defense, led by a Super Bowl-record three interceptions by Martin, surrendered only a fourth-quarter touchdown.

Plunkett was tabbed for MVP honors after completing 13-of-21 passes for 261 yards and three touchdowns as the Silver and Black became the first wild card team in NFL history to win the Super Bowl.

SUPER BOWL XVIII

Tampa Stadium; Sunday, Jan. 22, 1984; Attendance: 72,920; Time: 3:31 PM PST; Weather: 68°F; partly cloudy, wind NE 20 mph

Famously dubbed "Black Sunday" by NFL Films, Super Bowl XVIII put on display the best that the NFL had to offer as the Los Angeles Raiders drubbed the Washington Redskins, 38-9. The resounding victory rested on the running brilliance of Marcus Allen and the strength of dominating defense and special teams play that lifted the Raiders to the club's third Super Bowl title in eight years.

Clad in their famous black jerseys, the Raiders jumped on the scoreboard first as Derrick Jensen blocked a first-quarter punt deep in Washington territory and fell on the ball in the end zone for a touchdown. In the second quarter, Jim Plunkett orchestrated an efficient three-play drive that culminated in a 12-yard touchdown pass to Cliff Branch.

After a Redskins field goal, the Silver and Black defense would strike just moments before halftime. Keying on a Washington screen pass play that had worked successfully against the Raiders during a regular season meeting between the two teams, defensive coordinator Charlie Sumner inserted reserve Jack Squirek with time winding down in the first half. As Joe Theismann lobbed a screen out towards Joe Washington from the 12-yard line, Squirek stepped in front of the pass and returned the interception for a touchdown to give the Raiders a 21-3 halftime advantage.

The Raiders' second half performance was just as dominant as the team shifted focus to its running game, led by Allen. The second-year running back scored a third-quarter touchdown on a 5-yard run

before breaking off perhaps the finest run in Super Bowl history later in the same period. Allen took a handoff from Plunkett and started left on the play but went too wide for his blocking and reversed his field, burst free of pursuit and found the end zone after a 74-yard sprint to give the Raiders an insurmountable lead and give the city of Los Angeles its first and only Super Bowl victory.

Allen was the easy choice as the game's Most Valuable Player, gaining 191 yards on 20 carries with two touchdowns.

After three seasons of knocking on the door, the 2002 Raiders broke through to earn a place in the Super Bowl for the fifth time in franchise history. Led by NFL Most Valuable Player Rich Gannon, the Silver and Black claimed a third-straight AFC West title in 2002, and dispatched the Tennessee Titans in the AFC Championship Game, 41-24, in dominating fashion. The team's ultimate goal of a fourth Super Bowl title would prove elusive, however, as the Raiders fell to the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in Super Bowl XXXVII in San Diego, 48-21.

The Raiders got on the board first, capitalizing on a Charles Woodson interception on the game's first possession and getting a 40-yard field goal from Sebastian Janikowski. The score would be the last until late in the third quarter for the Raiders, as the Buccaneers reeled off 34 unanswered points to build a large lead.

The Silver and Black got back into the game with three touchdowns in the second half. Gannon connected with Jerry Porter and Jerry Rice on touchdown passes of 39 and 48 yards, respectively, and Eric Johnson returned a blocked punt 13 yards for a score to move the Raiders to within two points at 34-21 in the fourth quarter.

Tampa Bay halted any chance of a Raider comeback with two interception returns for touchdowns in the fourth quarter, one by Derrick Brooks for 44 yards and one by Dwight Smith on a tipped pass for 50 yards.

RAIDERS 40, HOUSTON OILERS 7

1967 AFL Championship

Dec. 31, 1967 at Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum; Oakland, Calif.

The Raiders made a splash in the organization's first-ever postseason contest, posting an emphatic 40-7 victory over Houston in front of 53,330 fans at Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum.

Fullbacks Pete Banaszak (15-116) and Hewritt Dixon (21-144) each topped 100 yards on the ground and quarterback Daryle Lamonica tossed a pair of touchdown passes and rushed for an additional score in the rout. Veteran kicker George Blanda added four field goals for Oakland.

Following a tight first period, Dixon got the Raiders into the endzone with a 69-yard touchdown scamper around left end in the second quarter. Blanda set up for a field-goal attempt on fourth-and-1 later in the frame, but Lamonica took the snap and connected with tight end Dave Kocourek for a 17-yard touchdown pass to give the Raiders a 17-0 lead at the half.

In the third quarter, Lamonica's 1-yard dive and the second of Blanda's four field goals gave Oakland an insurmountable 27-0 lead. Two more Blanda field goals and a 12-yard touchdown pass from Lamonica to wide receiver Bill Miller in the fourth period closed out the scoring for the day for Oakland, earning for the Raiders the right to represent the American Football League in the second AFL-NFL Championship.





Deadlocked atop the AFL Western Division standings with identical 12-2 records, the Raiders and Chiefs met in a playoff contest to determine the New York Jets' opponent in the 1968 AFL Championship Game. Oakland used a devastating air attack behind quarterback Daryle Lamonica and receivers Fred Biletnikoff and Warren Wells to hand Kansas City a 41-6 defeat and book a date with Joe Namath's Jets for a shot at the team's second straight AFL title.

Lamonica lived up to his "Mad Bomber" moniker, passing for 347 yards on 19 completions with five touchdowns on the day. All of Lamonica's scoring tosses went to either Biletnikoff (7-180-3) or Wells (4-93-2), while an opportunistic Raider defense picked off Chiefs quarterback Len Dawson four times in the decisive victory.

Oakland jumped out to a 21-0 lead in the first quarter following two touchdown passes from Lamonica to Biletnikoff and an additional scoring toss to Wells. The Chiefs got into the action with a pair of Jan Stenerud field goals in the second quarter, but a 54-yard pass on a third-and-8 play for Biletnikoff's third scoring catch gave



the Raiders a 28-6 advantage at the half.

Following a scoreless third period, Lamonica hooked up with Wells for a 35-yard touchdown pass in the fourth quarter to extend the Oakland lead. Well's second touchdown of the day and a pair of George Blanda field goals following interceptions by defensive backs Willie Brown and Nemiah Wilson sealed the victory for the Silver and Black.

NEW YORK JETS 27, RAIDERS 23

Just six weeks after the two teams met in the famed "Heidi Game," the Raiders' quest for a second straight AFL title came to an end as Joe Namath's 6-yard touchdown pass to receiver Don Maynard with just under eight minutes remaining in regulation lifted the Jets to a 27-23 win in a back-and-forth struggle.

Oakland quarterback Daryle Lamonica posted a second prolific passing performance in as many weeks, completing 20-of-47 attempts for a franchise-record 401 yards and one touchdown. Fred Biletnikoff hauled in seven passes for 190 yards and one touchdown to lead all receivers.

After surrendering 10 points in the first quarter, a 29-yard scoring pass from Lamonica to Biletnikoff and a George Blanda field goal trimmed the New York lead to 13-10 entering the half. Blanda tied the score with a 9-yard field goal midway through the third period, but the Jets took the lead once again by way of a 20-yard pass from Namath to Pete Lammons, setting up a wildly entertaining fourth quarter.

Blanda's third field goal of the day, a 20-yarder, cut the lead to four points in the final period and rookie defensive back George Atkinson picked off a Namath pass and returned it to New York's 5-yard line on the ensuing possession. Fullback Pete Banaszak barreled into the end zone on the very next play, giving the Raiders their first lead of the game.

The Jets came back with a three-play scoring drive, culminating in Namath's touchdown pass to Maynard after the two had hooked up for a 52-yard gain on the previous play. Lamonica took the Raiders deep into scoring range on two more fourth-quarter drives, the second of which ended on an incomplete swing pass intended for Charlie Smith that was ruled a lateral and recovered by the Jets.



Quarterback Daryle Lamonica, in perhaps his finest hour as a pro, set a single-game playoff record with six touchdown passes to lead the Silver and Black to a swift and decisive 56-7 victory over the visiting Houston Oilers in an AFL Divisional Playoff.

Under the direction of first-year head coach John Madden, a quick-strike offense and a smothering defense paced the Raiders to 28 first-quarter points. On the team's second possession, Lamonica connected with running back Larry Todd for a 40-yard completion, setting up a 13-yard scoring pass to receiver Fred Biletnikoff. On the ensuing possession, defensive back George Atkinson picked off a pass from Houston quarterback Pete Beathard and returned it 57 yards for a touchdown, staking the Raiders to a 14-0 advantage.

The Raider defense struck again on the Oilers' next series, as lineman Carleton Oats recovered a fumble on a first-down play. The turnover set up another scoring strike, with Lamonica finding receiver Rod Sherman for a 24-yard score. Another Oiler fumble, this time by Beathard on a first-down snap, set up an immediate 31-yard scoring pass from Lamonica to Biletnikoff.

Oakland's offense continued to fire on all cylinders in the second quarter, as Lamonica hooked up with running back Charlie Smith for a 60-yard touchdown catch-and-run to make the score 35-0.

Third-quarter touchdown passes to Sherman and tight end Billy Cannon gave Lamonica the record and effectively put the game out of reach for Houston. A late fourth-quarter touchdown pass from Beathard was equaled by a 4-yard touchdown run from full-back Marv Hubbard to round out the scoring.

Lamonica's touchdown bounty established the single-game playoff standard, and has been matched only twice since his record-setting day. As a team, the win over Houston remains the highest playoff point total and largest postseason margin of victory in franchise history.



The final American Football League Championship fittingly took place in Oakland, as the Raiders had come to dominate the AFL's Western Division, advancing to the championship contest for the third straight season.

A stifling Kansas City defense and a balanced offense led by quarterback Len Dawson conspired to derail the Raiders' attempt for a second AFL title in three seasons. The Chiefs' defense harassed Oakland quarterbacks Daryle Lamonica and George Blanda, forcing the signal-callers to throw four interceptions. Despite the best efforts of running back Charlie Smith, who totaled eight catches for 86 yards and rushed for the Raiders' lone touchdown, the high-flying Oakland offense was limited to its lowest point total of the season.

Smith got the Raiders on the scoreboard first, scampering in around left end from three yards out to cap a 66-yard drive at the end of the first quarter. The Chiefs leveled the score behind a 1-yard scoring plunge by running back Wendell Hayes, and the teams entered the half tied at seven.

Blanda entered the contest at quarterback for Lamonica, who sustained a hand injury, in the third quarter but was picked off deep in Kansas City territory. The Chiefs capitalized on the ensuing possession, marching 94 yards on a drive that culminated in a 5-yard touchdown run by running back Robert Holmes.

Back in the huddle, Lamonica and the Raiders attempted to even the score, but the dinged-up quarterback was picked off on three straight possessions in the fourth quarter. A Jan Stenerud field goal capped the scoring for Kansas City, which came away with the upset victory in Oakland.



The Raiders spoiled Miami's post-season debut on a muddy Coliseum field, using an opportunistic passing attack to upend the upstart Dolphins. Quarterback Daryle Lamonica tossed two touchdown passes and defensive back Willie Brown's 50-yard interception return for a touchdown earned the Raiders a spot in the first AFC Championship game with the 21-14 win.

Miami struck first, as quarterback Bob Griese found receiver Paul Warfield in the end zone for a 16-yard touchdown pass in the second quarter. Oakland pulled even near the half, as Lamonica connected with receiver Fred Biletnikoff for a 22-yard score with 1:50 left on the clock.

Oakland drove to the Miami 2-yard line on the opening possession of the third quarter, but a fumble by running back Charlie

Smith was recovered by safety Jake Scott. The Dolphins drove to their own 38-yard line but a Griese pass intended for Warfield was picked off by Brown and returned half the length of the field for a score.

Following a missed Miami field-goal attempt early in the fourth quarter, Lamonica unleashed an 82-yard touchdown pass to receiver Rod Sherman with 9:34 left to play, extending the Raider lead. Griese led the Dolphins to within one score with a 7-yard scoring toss to Willie Richardson, but the Oakland defense held firm on Miami's following possession to close out the victory.

BALTIMORE COLTS 27, RAIDERS 17

The Silver and Black fell short of a Super Bowl berth for the third straight season, falling to Baltimore on a barren Memorial Stadium field in the first AFC Championship game, 27-17.

The matchup between Oakland, owners of the league's top offense, and the Colts, who were led by legendary signal-caller Johnny Unitas, made for a most compelling championship battle that was dubbed the "Duel in the Dust" by NFL Films.

The Baltimore defense immediately posed problems for quarterback Daryle Lamonica, and the Raider offense stalled in the first quarter, failing to record a first down. Rookie kicker Jim O'Brien gave the Colts the lead midway through the opening frame, booting a 16-yard field goal.

Oakland drove into Colts territory early in the second period but Lamonica was sacked by Bubba Smith, forcing the quarterback to leave the game due to injury. Grizzled veteran George Blanda was called into action once again, looking to spark the Raiders to victory as he had over a remarkable five-game stretch during the regular season. After a 2-yard touchdown plunge by rookie running back Norm Bulaich put the Colts up 10-0, the Raiders drove into Colts territory and Blanda put Oakland on the board with a 48-yard field goal.

Blanda quickly drew the Raiders level in the third quarter, piloting the half's opening drive and connecting with receiver Fred Biletnikoff for a 38-yard touchdown pass. The Colts answered immediately with a field goal and took a commanding lead at the end of the period on Bulaich's second rushing touchdown of the day, an expertly-blocked 11-yard scamper around left end.

The Raiders pulled to within three points on their first drive of the fourth period. Blanda hit Warren Wells for a 15-yard touchdown, part of a five-catch, 108-yard day for the deep-threat receiver. Matching Blanda blow-for-blow was the immeasurable Unitas, who promptly tossed a 68-yard scoring strike to receiver Ray Perkins to bring the Colts' lead back to 10 points.

Blanda's magic could not rally the Raiders again, however, as two of the team's final four possessions resulted in interceptions deep in Baltimore territory and the Colts advanced to Super Bowl V.



PITTSBURGH 13, RAIDERS 7

What many have referred to as the greatest and most controversial play of all-time, "The Immaculate Reception," decided an AFC Playoff tilt between the Raiders and Steelers, setting the stage for numerous postseason battles between the two elite teams during the 1970s.

Oakland, returning to the postseason after a one-year hiatus, nursed a 7-6 advantage in a physical contest, and the Steelers were facing a fourth-and-10 as time wound down in regulation. Quarterback Terry Bradshaw's pass, intended for running back Frenchy Fuqua, ricocheted back toward the line of scrimmage and was scooped up by running back Franco Harris, who rumbled 60 yards into the end zone. The pass was deemed by officials to have been deflected by a defender, Raider safety Jack Tatum, and ruled a reception and touchdown in what remains one of the most controversial plays in NFL history.

All of the scoring came in the second half, with defense dominating the first two quarters on both sides. Quarterback Daryle Lamonica was intercepted on Oakland's first drive and a fumble by running back Marvin Hubbard put the Raider defense on short fields, but the unit held strong on both occasions and halftime came with no score for either team.

The Steelers, making the organization's first postseason appearance in a decade, struck first with a Roy Gerela field goal early in the third quarter. The Raider offense could not get on track against the "Steel Curtain" defense, and Lamonica was removed in favor of Ken Stabler after throwing a fourth-quarter interception.

Pittsburgh tacked on a 29-yard field goal by Gerela with less than four minutes left in regulation and Stabler assumed the controls from the Raider 20-yard line with 3:42 left on the clock. "The Snake" converted a fourth-down play and connected with four different receivers to move the ball to the Pittsburgh 30-yard line. From there Stabler, almost stopped in the backfield, circled left and darted untouched into the end zone to give the Silver and Black their first lead of the day.

On the Steelers' final possession, Bradshaw moved the offense to the 40-yard line but stalled out there, setting up the controversial play that is still debated to this day.

A pair of Marv Hubbard touchdown plunges and four George Blanda field goals helped the Raiders exact a measure of revenge for the previous season's "Immaculate Reception" game with a 33-14 win over Pittsburgh.

Quarterback Ken Stabler's precision passing coupled with a versatile running game, which generated 232 yards on 55 carries, cut through Pittsburgh's "Steel Curtain" defense, while a smothering defense limited running back Franco Harris to just 29 yards on the ground and forced quarterback Terry Bradshaw to throw three interceptions.

The Raiders wasted no time getting on the scoreboard, as the ground attack keyed a 16-play, 82-yard touchdown drive on Oakland's first possession. Hubbard broke off a 20-yard run to put the Silver and Black in scoring range, while Clarence Davis had four carries for 27 yards to set up Hubbard's 1-yard touchdown run over left tackle.

Blanda's first field goal gave the Raiders a 10-0 lead early in the second period, but a 20-yard punt return set up the Steelers in Oakland territory later in the frame. Pittsburgh capitalized and cut the lead to three following Bradshaw's 4-yard scoring toss to Barry Pearson.

The Raiders continued to pound the ball on the ground in the third quarter, racking up yardage and dominating possession, but producing only a pair of field goals. The Pittsburgh offense took to the air in an attempt to make up for lost time, but the game was effectively put out of reach when a Bradshaw pass was picked off by cornerback Willie Brown and returned 54 yards for a touchdown.

Down 23-7, Pittsburgh again tried to move the ball through the air, but Bradshaw was picked off, this time by safety George Atkinson, setting up Blanda's fourth field goal of the day.

Pittsburgh got a late touchdown, but Hubbard's leaping 1-yard touchdown dive over the middle with 19 seconds left in regulation put an exclamation point on an outstanding all-around performance.

An effective running game, led by Larry Csonka's 117 yards and three touchdowns, lifted the Dolphins to a 27-10 victory over the Raiders in front of 75,105 fans at Miami's Orange Bowl. Csonka's effort paced a Dolphin offense that chewed up 266 yards on the



ground, averaging over five yards per rushing attempt.

Miami set the tone early, taking the opening kickoff and embarking on a nine-play, 64-yard drive that included just one pass attempt. Quarterback Bob Griese's 27-yard scamper set up an 11-yard touchdown run by Csonka, giving the Dolphins an early lead.

The Oakland offense failed to get on track, punting twice and missing a field-goal attempt before Miami doubled its lead by virtue of a 2-yard Csonka score. The touchdown capped a drive that included 14 running plays and just two pass attempts, both of which fell incomplete.

The Raiders got back into the contest in the third quarter, as kicker George Blanda booted a 21-yard field goal on the first possession of the second half. On the Silver and Black's next offensive series, quarterback Ken Stabler found receiver Mike Siani three times for 45 yards, including a 25-yard touchdown pass that cut the Dolphin lead to 14-10.

Miami returned to the ground game, running the ball on 11 straight plays to set up a Garo Yepremian field goal in the fourth quarter. The Dolphins defense then held firm on a fourth-and-1 play on the Raiders' next possession, stopping running back Marv Hubbard to turn the ball over on downs.

Csonka struck again late in the final period, scoring on a 2-yard run with 1:49 remaining to close out the game and send the Dolphins to their third straight Super Bowl.



In the closing seconds of a tight contest, Clarence Davis hauled in a desperation toss from quarterback Ken Stabler amidst a "Sea of Hands," giving the Raiders a 28-26 victory over the Miami Dolphins in what NBC Sports play-by-play announcer Curt Gowdy called, "the greatest game I have ever seen."

In an epic contest chock full of individual heroes, Stabler's 293 passing yards and four touchdowns and receiver Fred Biletnikoff's knack for timely receptions to the tune of eight catches for 122 yards, edged out Miami's vaunted running game and 114 yards from running back Larry Csonka.

The Dolphins wasted no time getting on the scoreboard, as Nat Moore returned the opening kickoff 89 yards for a touchdown to stake the visitors to a 7-0 lead. The Raiders drew even in the second quarter, as Stabler tossed a perfect pass to Charlie Smith in single coverage down the middle for a 31-yard touchdown. Miami turned to the ground game on the ensuing possession, driving into Oakland territory and settling for a 33-yard field goal from Garo Yepremian to enter the half with a 10-7 lead.

Oakland briefly took the lead in the third quarter, with Stabler and Biletnikoff hooking up three times, the third of which was a marvelous one-handed touchdown grab just inside the pylon while draped in coverage. The Dolphins quickly retook the lead, as quarterback Bob Griese found a wide open Paul Warfield in the end zone for a 16-yard touchdown after defensive back Nemiah Wilson slipped in coverage.

A memorable fourth quarter began well for Miami, as Yepremian's second field goal increased the Dolphin lead to 19-14. On Oakland's next possession, Stabler's deep pass was caught by a diving Cliff Branch, who having not been touched by a defender, rose to his feet and scampered 72 yards for a touchdown. Running back Benny Malone gave the Dolphins the advantage once again, breaking tackles and ducking under defenders for a 23-yard touchdown.

Behind the swashbuckling Stabler, the Raiders then drove to the Miami 8-yard line with 35 seconds left on the clock. On first-and-goal, the Miami rush closed in on the quarterback and with defensive end Vern Den Herder at his legs, Stabler looped the ball toward the end zone, where Davis outgath a crowd of white jerseys to come down with the football, clutching it to his chest for the game-winning touchdown.



A pair of Franco Harris touchdowns, 21 fourth-quarter points and a stingy Pittsburgh defense ended the Raiders' hopes for an AFC title in Oakland. Quarterback Ken Stabler completed 19 passes for 271 yards, but three interceptions contributed to a second straight championship defeat for the Silver and Black.

A fumbled punt on the game's first possession put Oakland within scoring range, and a 40-yard George Blanda field goal gave the Raiders the early advantage. A strong Pittsburgh ground game put kicker Roy Gerela in field-goal range late in the first quarter, but his 20-yard effort sailed wide left. A second-quarter field goal by Gerela, this time from 23-yards out, drew the game level and an interception by Raider defensive back Nemiah Wilson in the end zone helped preserve the 3-3 tie at the half.

Using an efficient passing attack, the Raiders grabbed the lead midway through the third quarter. Stabler drove the offense to the Steelers' 38-yard line, and connected with receiver Cliff Branch on the left side for a touchdown strike.

The Oakland lead was short-lived, however, as Pittsburgh used seven running plays and a 13-yard completion to drive to Oakland's 8-yard line, from where Harris took it up the middle for a score. On the ensuing drive, Stabler was intercepted by linebacker Jack Ham deep in Raider territory, setting up a 6-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Terry Bradshaw to receiver Lynn Swann.

Oakland cut the lead to 17-13 with a 24-yard field goal by Blanda, but Pittsburgh's J.T. Thomas picked off a Stabler pass to dash the Raiders' hopes late in the game. Harris capped the game with a 21-yard touchdown run shortly after the interception, lifting the Steelers to the organization's first Super Bowl appearance.



The Raiders out-paced a vaunted Cincinnati passing attack, building a significant lead before withstanding a furious Bengal rally to post a 31-28 victory in an AFC Divisional Playoff contest in Oakland.

The Silver and Black offense got off to a fast start, driving into field-goal range

on the first possession of the game, but the Raiders came up empty as George Blanda's 41-yard effort fell short. Blanda would make amends later in the period, booting a 27-yard field goal to give the Raiders a 3-0 advantage.

Capitalizing on a short field following a late first-quarter punt, the Raiders added to their lead when quarterback Ken Stabler found receiver Mike Siani in the middle of the end zone for a 9-yard touchdown completion. Cincinnati got on the board via a 1-yard plunge over right tackle by running back Stan Fritts, but Oakland regained its 10-point advantage with an 8-yard touchdown pass from Stabler to tight end Bob Moore with just two minutes remaining in the first half.

The Bengals were forced to punt on their opening second-half possession, and a 20-yard return by Neal Colzie put the Raiders in scoring position at the Cincinnati 35-yard line. Four plays later, running back Pete Banaszak rumbled into the end zone from 6 yards out to increase the Raider lead. Cincinnati scored on the ensuing possession, as quarterback Ken Anderson orchestrated an 11-play, 91-yard drive that culminated in a Lenvil Elliott 6-yard touchdown run.

In a fourth quarter that saw the Coliseum air filled with footballs, the Raiders re-established a significant lead with tight end Dave Casper's 2-yard touchdown catch from a Stabler, his third scoring pass of the game. Cincinnati worked to get back in the game and, following an interception, scored on a 25-yard pass from Anderson to receiver Charlie Joiner. Anderson led a touchdown drive again on the Bengals' next series, connecting with receiver Isaac Curtis for a 14-yard score.

With the lead cut to three points, Cincinnati had one last chance to score the upset, but a tackle for loss by linebacker Ted Hendricks and three incomplete passes on the Bengals' final drive halted any chance of a come-from-behind triumph for the visitors.

On a frigid, ice-covered synthetic turf field at Three Rivers Stadium, the Raiders' vertical passing game was limited to the tune of a 16-10 defeat in what the NFL Network called one of the top "bad weather" games in league history. A defensive struggle turned into an offensive onslaught in the fourth quarter, with the Raiders falling just short against the defending Super Bowl champion Steelers.

With the temperature reaching just 16 degrees at kickoff, both teams struggled to find the end zone through the game's first three quarters. The Steelers got on the scoreboard first in the second period, turning the first of two interceptions by safety Mike Wagner into a 36-yard field goal by Roy Gerela.

Play on both sides got increasingly sloppy on the slippery turf, as the third quarter featured an interception, three turnovers on fumbles, two missed field-goal attempts and two punts, yet yielded zero points.

Pittsburgh broke through early in the fourth quarter, driving to the Oakland 25-yard line before running back Franco Harris bounced to the left after breaking a tackle and raced up the sideline for the game's first touchdown. Oakland answered back, as quarterback Ken Stabler connected with tight end Dave Casper on three consecutive passes for 46 yards, setting up a 14-yard scoring strike to receiver Mike Siani.

The Steelers increased their lead, capitalizing on a fumble recovery deep in Raider territory to score on 20-yard pass from quarterback Terry Bradshaw to receiver John Stallworth. Oakland got a 41-yard field goal from George Blanda late in the fourth quarter to cut the deficit to 16-10, and recovered the ensuing onside kick, but receiver Cliff Branch was tackled as time expired to quell Oakland's comeback.

Two fourth-quarter touchdowns, including a Ken Stabler scramble with just 10 seconds left in regulation, helped the Raiders avoid a valiant upset bid by the Wild Card qualifier Patriots in Oakland. Stabler's 233 passing yards, and nine receptions for 137 yards from receiver Fred Biletnikoff, put the Raiders through to the team's fourth straight conference championship game with the win.

New England, the only team to defeat the Raiders during the regular season, scored first via a 1-yard touchdown run by running back Andy Johnson. Oakland got on the board with a 40-yard field goal by Errol Mann later in the opening period. A 31-yard touchdown pass from Stabler to Biletnikoff late in the second quarter gave the Silver and Black a 10-7 lead at halftime.

The third quarter was dominated by New England, as second-year quarterback Steve Grogan engineered two long scoring drives. Grogan connected with tight end Russ Francis for a 26-yard

touchdown pass to cap off a 9-play, 80-yard drive, and running back Jess Phillips scored on a 3-yard run late in the period to give the Patriots a 21-10 advantage.

The Raiders, in danger of being upset at home after a 13-1 regular season, cut the lead to four points with running back Mark van Eeghen's 1-yard touchdown run early in the fourth quarter. Later, facing a third-and-18 from the New England 27-yard line, Stabler was hit as his pass intended for running back Carl Garrett fell incomplete. Patriot defensive lineman Ray "Sugar Bear" Hamilton was flagged for roughing the passer on the play, and the Raiders were given a fresh set of downs. Four plays later, Stabler scrambled left and dove between two defenders into the end zone for the game's winning touchdown.



A solid rushing performance and a stout defensive effort lifted the Silver and Black to a convincing 24-7 victory over arch-rival Pittsburgh in Oakland. The victory snapped a streak of two straight AFC Championship game victories for the Steelers and punched the Raiders' ticket to Pasadena, Calif., for Super Bowl XI.

Oakland's ground attack, paced by running back Mark van Eeghen's 22 carries for 66 yards, accounted for 157 of the team's 220 total yards of offense. The Raider defense was equally impressive, limiting the Steelers to 72 rushing yards and holding receiver Lynn Swann to just three catches.

A 39-yard field goal by Errol Mann staked the Raiders to an early lead in the first quarter. In the second period, linebacker Willie Hall picked off a Terry Bradshaw pass and returned it 25 yards to the Pittsburgh 1-yard line, setting up a short touchdown run by running back Clarence Davis.

Pittsburgh scored their first points on the ensuing possession, as Bradshaw connected on a pair of deep passes to set up a 3-yard scoring run by running back Reggie Harrison. The Raiders pushed the lead to 10 points just before halftime, mixing a strong running game with mid-range passing to set up Stabler's 4-yard touchdown toss to receiver Warren Bankston in the left side of the end zone.

The Raiders extended the lead on the team's second offensive possession of the third quarter, embarking on a 12-play, 63-yard touchdown drive that culminated in Stabler's 5-yard scoring pass to running back Pete Banaszak.

Oakland's defense clamped down for the remainder of regulation, and jubilant Raider fans poured onto the Coliseum field to celebrate as time expired.



The defending Super Bowl champion Raiders, a Wild Card entrant after posting an 11-3 regular-season record, engaged in an epic double-overtime battle with Baltimore at Memorial Stadium, a game that is best remembered for a single pass play, the "Ghost to the Post." Tight end Dave Casper was on the receiving end of three touchdown passes from quarterback Ken Stabler on the day, but it was his late grab to set up the game-tying field goal that earned notoriety in a contest that lasted three hours and 50 minutes.

Running back Clarence Davis put the Raiders up in the first quarter, breaking loose over left guard and scoring on a 30-yard run. The Colts drew even in the second quarter when defensive back Bruce Laird intercepted a Stabler pass and raced 61 yards for a touchdown. A Baltimore field goal gave the Colts a 10-7 lead at halftime.

Stabler took to the air on the Raiders' first possession of the second half, connecting with receiver Cliff Branch for a 41-yard gain before hitting Casper in the end zone from 8 yards out. The Colts retook the lead on the ensuing kickoff, with Marshall Johnson returning Ray Guy's kick 87 yards for a score. The see-saw contest swung in the Raiders' favor later in the third period, as linebacker Ted Hendricks blocked a Baltimore punt to set up Casper's second touchdown catch, a 10-yard toss from Stabler.

Quarterback Bert Jones drove the Colts to Oakland's 1-yard line early in the fourth quarter and running back Ron Lee punched it in for the go-ahead score. Raider running back Pete Banaszak countered with a 1-yard plunge of his own, and the Silver and Black went up once again. A four-play, 73-yard drive capped by Lee's second touchdown run, a 13-yarder, gave the Colts the lead and set up one of the most famous plays in NFL history.

After the teams traded punts on the next four possessions, the Raiders found themselves facing a second-and-10 from their own 44-yard line with the clock winding down. Stabler dropped back to pass, pump faked, and passed to Casper who, running a post pattern, split two defenders and made an over-the-shoulder catch for 42 yards to the Baltimore 14-yard line. Three Banaszak runs brought the ball to the 5-yard line and kicker Errol Mann evened the score with a 22-yard field goal.

Both offenses labored through a scoreless overtime period, with the Raiders driving to Baltimore 13-yard line as the frame closed. Two plays into the sixth period, Stabler, with his 40th pass attempt of the game, fittingly found Casper in the back of the end zone for the game-winning touchdown.

Denver's "Orange Crush" defense and a controversial ruling on what appeared to be a late-game fumble by Bronco running back Rob Lytle, conspired to deny the Silver and Black a second straight Super Bowl berth at Mile High Stadium. On a frigid, 18 degree day, quarterback Ken Stabler passed for 215 yards, including two touchdown tosses to Dave Casper, but Oakland fell short in the team's fifth consecutive conference championship game appearance.

Kicker Errol Mann scored the first points of the game, booting a 20-yard field goal to cap the Raiders' first drive. The Broncos responded immediately, with quarterback Craig Morton connecting with receiver Haven Moses for a 74-yard catch-and-run for a touchdown. After a scoreless second quarter, the stage was set for a compelling second half between the two AFC West rivals.

Raider running back Clarence Davis fumbled deep in Oakland territory early in the third quarter, and the Broncos took over and drove to the 2-yard line. Lytle got the carry and was blasted by Raider safety Jack Tatum, causing what appeared to be a fumble that was recovered by Oakland lineman Mike McCoy. An official had blown his whistle, however, and after a conference, ruled Lytle down and assessed the Raiders with an unsportsmanlike conduct penalty, setting up a first-and-goal from the 1-yard line. On the very next play, Morton pitched to running back Jon Keyworth on the right, who scampered in for the touchdown.

Oakland cut the deficit to 14-10 early in the fourth quarter, as Stabler hit Casper just inside the end zone for a 7-yard touchdown. The Morton-to-Moses connection then gave the Broncos a two-score lead following a Stabler interception, with Moses' second touchdown catch covering 12 of his 168 receiving yards on the day.

The Raiders scored on the ensuing possession, Stabler's 17-yard touchdown toss to Casper capping an eight-play, 74-yard drive, but Denver took over with three minutes remaining and was able to run out the clock to seal the AFC title.

A potent offense and a swarming defense stymied the Houston Oilers and propelled the Raiders to an emphatic 27-7 victory in an AFC Wild Card contest in Oakland. Quarterback Jim Plunkett guided a balanced attack on offense, while cornerback Lester Hayes picked off two passes by former Raider Ken Stabler, returning one for a touchdown in the win.

Houston stumbled out of the gate, as running back Earl Campbell's fumble on the first play from scrimmage was recovered by Raiders safety Mike Davis. Oakland capitalized on the turnover with a 47-yard field goal by kicker Chris Bahr. The Oilers took the lead late in the first period, capping a nine-play, 55-yard drive with a 10-yard touchdown run by Campbell. Plunkett then connected with running back Kenny King for a 37-yard gain in the second quarter, setting up a 1-yard touchdown pass to tight end Todd Christensen.

A scoreless third quarter gave way to a fourth period that would see the Silver and Black dominate on both sides of the ball. Plunkett hooked up with receiver Cliff Branch for a 33-yard completion at the end of the third quarter, setting up a 44-yard touchdown strike from Plunkett to a streaking Arthur Whittington along the right sideline on the first play of the fourth period.

The Raider defense forced punts on the next two Houston possessions, and Bahr added his second field goal of the day, a 37-yarder, to give the Raiders a 13-point lead. Desperate to get back into the contest, Houston took to the air on the ensuing possession. On a third-and-20 play, Stabler's pass was picked off by Hayes, his second of the game, and returned 20 yards for a touchdown to give the Raiders an insurmountable lead.



With the temperature at one degree Fahrenheit at kickoff, both offenses struggled to get started on the frozen turf. With whipping winds limiting the passing game, the first quarter came and went with no score and only two total first downs, both by Cleveland.

The Browns' defense would provide the first score of the game in the second quarter, with defensive back Ron Bolton intercepting a Jim Plunkett pass and returning it 42 yards for a touchdown. The Raiders answered back before halftime, embarking on a 14-play, 64-yard drive that culminated in a 1-yard touchdown run by van



Eeghen to give Oakland a 7-6 lead at the break.

Cleveland promptly retook the lead in the third quarter, driving 48 yards and getting a 30-yard field goal from kicker Don Cockroft. The Browns added another field goal later in the period, making the score 12-7 entering the fourth quarter.

The Raiders opened up the fourth quarter on a steady drive, Plunkett mixing runs and passes all the way down to the Browns' 3-yard line. Oakland gave the ball to van Eeghen on three straight plays, including a 1-yard dive to give the Raiders a slim two-point lead.

Quarterback Brian Sipe and the Browns' offense, known as the "Cardiac Kids" for their propensity for late comebacks, took over with 2:22 left in the game and drove all the way down to Oakland's 13-yard line. Instead of opting for a field-goal attempt, and facing a second down with :49 left in regulation, Cleveland coach Sam Rutigliano called for a pass play, "Red Right 88." Davis cut in front of tight end Ozzie Newsome on the play, tumbling to the ground with the ball and preserving the narrow victory for the Silver and Black.



The Raiders got off to a fast start behind a masterful performance by quarterback Jim Plunkett, and used a ball control offense to upend the Chargers for the AFC title on a slick Jack Murphy Stadium field. Facing a vaunted San Diego passing attack, it was Oakland, led by Plunkett's 14-for-18 passing for 261 yards, which jumped out to a 28-14 halftime lead and held on down the stretch to advance to the Super Bowl for the third time in franchise history.

Oakland wasted no time getting on the scoreboard, as a Plunkett pass glanced off of the hands of intended receiver Kenny King directly to tight end Raymond Chester, who galloped 65 yards into the end zone for the score. The Chargers used their aerial attack to even the score, with quarterback Dan Fouts connecting on a 48-yard touchdown toss to receiver Charlie Joiner.

The Raiders retook the lead on the ensuing possession, as a 48-yard completion to receiver Cliff Branch and a pass interference call set up a 5-yard scoring scamper by Plunkett. Oakland scored again on its next possession, Plunkett finding King with a perfect pass in the end zone for 21 yards, to close out a wild first quarter.

A second-quarter fumble recovery by linebacker Ted Hendricks led to another Raider score, as running back Mark van Eeghen got into the end zone on a 3-yard run. The Chargers cut the deficit to two scores on the ensuing possession by virtue of an 8-yard pass from Fouts to Joiner, marking the receiver's second touchdown of the day.

After a break-neck scoring pace in the first half, San Diego chipped away at the Oakland lead with a 26-yard Rolf Benirschke field goal to begin the third quarter. The Chargers cut further into the advantage on their next possession, as running back Chuck Muncie capped off a drive by diving into the end zone following a 6-yard sweep around left tackle.

Starting the fourth quarter on offense, the Raiders controlled

the ball for over five minutes on a drive that culminated in kicker Chris Bahr's 33-yard field goal. The Chargers followed with a field-goal drive, but over eight minutes had elapsed and the Raiders took over with less than seven minutes left on the clock. Plunkett expertly engineered four first downs on a 15-play drive that included 14 running plays to close out regulation, ending the game with San Diego's potent offense on the bench.

The Raiders, entering the playoffs as the AFC's top seed in a strike-shortened season after posting an 8-1 record, used an efficient passing offense and a smothering defense to dispatch Cleveland at the L.A. Coliseum, 27-10. Quarterback Jim Plunkett completed 24-of-37 pass attempts for 386 yards and rookie running back Marcus Allen found the end zone twice in the Raiders' first playoff game in Los Angeles.

Kicker Chris Bahr opened the scoring with a 27-yard field goal following a 64-yard toss from Plunkett to receiver Cliff Branch, but two Plunkett interceptions halted any further potential damage by the Raiders in the first quarter. Cleveland tied the game with a 52-yard field goal by Bahr's brother, Matt, but the Silver and Black quickly retook the lead on the ensuing possession, driving 88 yards on just eight plays to set up a pitch to Allen for a 2-yard touchdown.

Cleveland briefly tied the game once again, with quarterback Paul McDonald finding receiver Ricky Feacher for a 43-yard touchdown connection. The Raiders' added a field goal at the end of the second quarter, as Chris Bahr was true from 37 yards out, giving the Silver and Black a 13-10 halftime lead.

The Browns drove to the Raiders 11-yard line on the second half's opening possession, but a fumble by running back Charles White halted their momentum, and the Raiders capitalized with an 89-yard drive that culminated in Allen's second touchdown of the day, a 3-yard run.

The visiting Jets stifled the Raiders' offense and a late touchdown negated 14 third-quarter points from the Silver and Black in an upset at the L.A. Coliseum. Quarterback Jim Plunkett passed for 266 yards and one touchdown, but was intercepted three times as the Raiders dropped a narrow decision.

The Raiders were in position to score first, but a 34-yard attempt by kicker Chris Bahr hit the right upright. The Jets capitalized immediately, with quarterback Richard Todd orchestrating an 80-yard touchdown drive that culminated in a 20-yard scoring pass to receiver Wesley Walker. Los Angeles drove into Jets territory on the ensuing possession, but a Plunkett pass was picked off by cornerback Bobby Jackson at the 12-yard line. The Jets added a 30-yard field goal by kicker Pat Leahy later in the second quarter and entered the halftime break with a 10-0 advantage.

Plunkett got the Raiders on the board immediately in the third quarter, engineering a 12-play, 77-yard scoring drive that was capped by running back Marcus Allen's 3-yard touchdown run. Regaining possession following a partially-blocked punt, Plunkett promptly connected with receiver Malcolm Barnwell for a 57-yard touchdown strike, giving the Raiders their first lead of the game.

The teams traded turnovers early in the fourth quarter, but a 45-yard completion from Todd to Walker put the Jets in scoring position with just under four minutes remaining in the game. From 1-yard out, running back Scott Dierking dove over the top for the go-ahead touchdown with just 3:45 left on the clock.

The Raiders would have two more opportunities on offense, but on both drives Plunkett was intercepted by linebacker Lance Mehl, ending the Silver and Black's first season in Los Angeles.

Coliseum. Quarterback Jim Plunkett guided an efficient offense and an intimidating defense harried quarterback Cliff Stoudt all afternoon, sacking the Pittsburgh signal-caller five times and intercepting him once.

The Steelers got on the board first with a 17-yard field goal by Gary Anderson. On Pittsburgh's next possession, cornerback Lester Hayes picked off a pass from Stoudt and returned it 18 yards for a touchdown. The Raiders added to their lead in the second quarter, with Allen capping off an 80-yard drive with a 4-yard run over right guard for a touchdown, his first of the day. The Los Angeles defense held firm, allowing Pittsburgh to cross midfield just once on their next three possessions, and a 45-yard field goal by Chris Bahr at the end of the half made the score 17-3.

The third quarter belonged solely to the Silver and Black, as a precision passing game and big-play capability on offense dimmed Pittsburgh's hopes. On the half's opening possession, Plunkett promptly guided a scoring drive by moving the Raiders 72 yards on nine plays, culminating in a 9-yard touchdown run by running back Kenny King.

Allen gave Los Angeles a commanding lead on the team's next series, taking a handoff from Plunkett and breaking free up the middle for a dazzling 49-yard touchdown run. Pittsburgh cut into the lead with a long 58-yard touchdown pass from Stoudt to receiver John Stallworth, but running back Frank Hawkins' bull-dozing 2-yard score at the end of the third quarter essentially wrapped up the victory for the Silver and Black.



RAIDERS 30, SEATTLE 14

The Raiders were not to be denied in the organization's fifth AFC Championship game appearance in nine years, getting out to a fast start and cruising to a 30-14 triumph at the L.A. Coliseum in front of 92,335 fans, a championship game record. A stifling defense held Seattle scoreless deep into the third quarter, and the combination of quarterback Jim Plunkett and running back Marcus Allen proved too much for a Seahawk team that had defeated the Raiders twice during the regular season.

Seattle's game-opening drive was halted by a Lester Hayes interception, the first of five picks on the day for the Raiders, and led to a 20-yard field goal by kicker Chris Bahr. In the second quarter, running back Frank Hawkins got into the end zone on a 1-yard



plunge, capping a 61-yard drive. On the team's next offensive series, Plunkett connected with receiver Malcolm Barnwell for 49 yards, setting up Hawkins' second touchdown of the quarter on a 5-yard run around left end. Safety Mike Davis' first of two interceptions came on the ensuing possession, setting up a 45-yard field goal from Bahr and a commanding 20-0 lead at the half.

The Seahawks switched quarterbacks early in the third quarter, going with veteran Jim Zorn, but the results were much the same, as Davis picked off a pass on Zorn's first series under center. Allen broke off a long run on the very next play, picking up 43 of his 154 yards on the day, and setting up his own 3-yard touchdown reception from Plunkett. Seattle finally got on the board with Zorn's 11-yard touchdown pass to running back Dan Doornink, but the final result was not in doubt.

A fourth-quarter field goal by Bahr and a late Seahawk touchdown rounded out the scoring, and the Raiders advanced to the Super Bowl for the fourth time in franchise history.

Running back Marcus Allen rushed for 61 yards and caught five passes for 90 yards, while Seattle running back Dan Doornink carried the ball 29 times for 126 yards in front of 64,910 fans at the Kingdome.

Seattle scored first, capping a nine-play, 93-yard drive with a 26-yard touchdown pass from Krieg to receiver Daryl Turner. The teams traded punts frequently until a fumble by Raiders running back Frank Hawkins led to a short field for Seattle late in the third quarter. A 35-yard field goal by kicker Norm Johnson extended the Seahawks' lead, and the first of two interceptions thrown on the day by Plunkett preserved the 10-0 score at the end of three periods.

Johnson added a 44-yard field goal in the fourth quarter, but the Raiders looked to get Allen going on a drive beginning on their own 22-yard line. Plunkett connected with Allen for two completions for 29 yards before hitting him again over the middle for a 46-yard touchdown catch-and-run.

Looking to hold on to their slim lead, the Seahawks took nearly four minutes off the clock before being forced to punt. Taking over at the 16-yard line with under a minute to go, Plunkett completed two quick passes but his third was intercepted by safety Kenny Easley, sealing Seattle's victory.





Coliseum, 27-20. Running back Marcus Allen rushed for 121 yards and one touchdown, but the top-seeded Silver and Black failed to score in the second half in the upset defeat.

A muffed return on a first-quarter punt set up the game's opening score, a 13-yard pass from quarterback Tony Eason to tight end Lin Dawson. Greg Townsend blocked a punt later in the opening period, but the Raider offense stalled and had to settle for a 29-yard field goal by Chris Bahr.

Los Angeles took the lead in the second quarter, as quarterback Marc Wilson found receiver Jessie Hester in the end zone for a 16-yard touchdown. Defensive lineman Howie Long pounced on a fumble on the Patriots' next possession, and the Raiders capitalized with an 11-yard touchdown run by Allen. On the ensuing series, New England covered 80 yards on a 10-play scoring drive, with James capping the sequence with a 2-yard touchdown around left end. After trading field goals, the teams entered halftime with the Raiders clinging to a narrow 20-17 advantage.

Turnovers continued to plague the Raiders in the third quarter, as an Allen fumble in New England territory led to a game-tying, 32-yard field goal by kicker Tony Franklin. On the ensuing kickoff, returner Sam Seale muffed the kick and then fumbled before Jim Bowman fell on the ball in the end zone for a New England touchdown.

The special-teams touchdown would provide the difference in the game, as the Patriots limited the Raiders to just two fourth-quarter possessions, picking off Wilson for the third time to close out the upset.



Returning to the playoffs after a five-year hiatus, the Raiders used 10 fourth-quarter points to defeat Cincinnati, 20-10, in a game that is perhaps most remembered as running back Bo Jackson's last career appearance on a football field. Quarterback Jay Schroeder passed for 172 yards and two touchdowns on just 11 completions, and running back Marcus Allen gained 140 yards on the ground to lead the Silver and Black.

Art Shell's team drove to the Cincinnati 24-yard line early in the first quarter, but an incompletion on a fourth-and-1 play turned the ball over on downs. A second-quarter field goal gave the Bengals

an early lead, but the Raiders' running game got going on the ensuing possession, as Jackson and Allen combined for 56 yards on five rushing attempts before Schroeder found receiver Mervyn Fernandez in the end zone for a 13-yard strike.

Early in the third quarter, Jackson took a pitch from Schroeder and dashed around right end for 34 yards before being dragged down from behind. It would mark the final play of a short but bright career for the dynamic running back, as Jackson suffered a career-ending hip injury on the play.

Kicker Jeff Jaeger booted a 49-yard field goal to cap a third-quarter drive, but the Bengals pulled even when quarterback Boomer Esiason hooked up with receiver Stanford Jennings for an 8-yard touchdown early in the fourth period. On the ensuing possession, Schroeder orchestrated an 80-yard touchdown drive that was highlighted by a 41-yard scoring pass to tight end Ethan Horton, who made a finger-tip grab on the play.

The Bengals began to drive on their next possession, but Greg Townsend's third sack of the game helped derail their offense. Jaeger's 25-yard field goal with just 19 seconds left on the clock ended Cincinnati's hopes and sent the Raiders to the AFC Championship game for the first time since the 1983 season.

The Bills got off to a fast start, as Kelly connected with former Raider James Lofton for a 13-yard touchdown on the team's first drive. The Raiders answered immediately, getting a 41-yard field goal from kicker Jeff Jaeger on the ensuing possession. A relentless Buffalo offense scored again on a 12-yard touchdown run by Thurman Thomas, and added seven points on an interception return for a touchdown by linebacker Daryl Talley to make the score 21-3.

With the Raider offense stuck in neutral, the Bills added 20 points in the second quarter via two short-yardage runs by Davis and Lofton's second touchdown catch of the game.







Kicker Sebastian Janikowski booted a 24-yard field goal after the Oakland drive stalled out at Baltimore's 6-yard line. The Ravens added short Matt Stover field goals, one each in the third and fourth quarters, and the Raiders were kept out of the end zone for the first time all season in the defeat.

An explosive offense led by quarterback Rich Gannon, receiver Jerry Rice and running back Charlie Garner overwhelmed the visiting New York Jets in an AFC Wild Card contest, 38-24. Rice's nine catches for 183 yards and Garner's 158 rushing yards proved too much for the Jets, who had defeated the Raiders at Network Associates Coliseum the previous week to earn a playoff berth.

The Raiders got off to a fast start in the first quarter, with Gannon leading two long drives that resulted in Sebastian Janikowski field goals. After the two teams traded field goals in the second quarter, the Silver and Black got into the end zone on a 2-yard pass from Gannon to receiver Tim Brown to give the Raiders a 16-3 half-time lead.


The Jets pulled closer on the second half's opening drive, as QB Vinny Testaverde found receiver Wayne Chrebet wide open for a 17-yard touchdown. The Raiders recovered a fumble near the end of the third period, setting up a wild fourth period in which the teams would combine to score 36 points.

Fullback Zack Crockett got the final quarter started with a 2-yard plunge for a score, and a two-point conversion gave the Raiders a 24-10 advantage. A 3-yard toss from Testaverde to fullback Richie Anderson cut the Oakland lead to seven points, but Gannon promptly led a 68-yard scoring drive on the ensuing possession, connecting with Rice for a 21-yard touchdown toss.

The Jets stormed back, as Chrebet hauled in his second touchdown pass of the game from 4 yards out. On the Raiders' next possession, Garner took a handoff and broke free around the right end for 80 yards to set a franchise postseason record and put the game out of reach.



A New England snow storm created a majestic setting at Foxboro Stadium, as the Patriots edged the Raiders in the "Tuck Game," one of the most controversial contests in NFL history.

With less than two minutes remaining in regulation and the Raiders clinging to a three-point lead, cornerback Charles Woodson sacked Patriots quarterback Tom Brady, causing what appeared to be a fumble that was recovered by Raider linebacker Greg Biekert to seal a Raider win. Citing Rule 3, Section 22, Article 2, Note 2 in the NFL rule book, the officials ruled the play an incomplete pass, leading to the game-tying field goal by kicker Adam Vinatieri.

The Raiders built an early lead in the contest, as quarterback Rich Gannon connected with receiver James Jett in the corner of the end zone for a 13-yard score in the second quarter. Two Sebastian Janikowski field goals, from 38 and 45 yards out, gave the Raiders a 13-3 advantage entering the final period.

Brady was efficient in an early fourth-quarter drive, completing nine consecutive pass attempts before scampering into the end zone for a 6-yard touchdown to cut the Raider lead to three points. Brady then led a late-game drive that culminated in Vinatieri's 45-yard, game-tying field goal that came on the heels of the "tuck rule" play.

In overtime, Brady promptly piloted a 61-yard drive that led to Vinatieri's game-winner from 23 yards out.

The Jets drew even late in the second quarter, as quarterback Chad Pennington capped a long drive with a 1-yard touchdown pass to fullback Jerald Sowell to tie the game at the half.

The second half was all Silver and Black, with Gannon connecting with receiver Jerry Porter for a 29-yard touchdown in the third quarter to give the Raiders the lead for good. Gannon and Porter hooked up again later in the third period for 50 of Porter's 123 receiving yards on the day, setting up a 9-yard touchdown pass to receiver Jerry Rice early in fourth quarter.

Two fourth-quarter field goals by Sebastian Janikowski closed out the victory and pushed the Raiders one step closer to the Super Bowl.



The Raiders got out to a fast start and out-lasted Tennessee in the second half to secure the Silver and Black's first Super Bowl berth since the 1983 season. A relentless passing attack, led by quarterback Rich Gannon's 286 yards and three touchdowns through the air, proved too much for the visiting Titans.

Oakland wasted no time getting on the scoreboard, as Gannon took the offense 69 yards on the opening possession and connected with receiver Jerry Porter for a 3-yard touchdown pass to open the scoring. The Titans answered immediately, with quarterback Steve McNair hitting receiver Drew Bennett for a 33-yard touchdown on the ensuing drive. The Raiders went up again on their next possession, Gannon moving the offense swiftly downfield to set up a 12-yard touchdown pass to running back Charlie Garner.

Tennessee cut into the Raider lead with a field goal in the second quarter, and the Titans briefly took the lead by virtue of a 9-yard touchdown run by McNair. The Raiders took the lead back near the end of the first half, capitalizing on a fumble recovery deep in Tennessee territory with a 1-yard scoring pass from Gannon to tight end Doug Jolley. A fumble recovery on the ensuing kickoff gave the Raiders the ball in scoring range once again, and kicker Sebastian Janikowski was true from 43 yards out.

A second Janikowski field goal was matched by McNair's second touchdown run of the game, a 13-yard scamper to make the score 27-24 in Oakland's favor entering the fourth quarter. Gannon began the final period by capping off a 66-yard drive with a 2-yard touchdown run of his own, and closed out the victory by leading the Silver and Black on a time-consuming drive that resulted in fullback Zack Crockett's 7-yard touchdown run. McNair and the Titans moved the ball down to the Oakland 6-yard line, but turned the ball over on downs, and Gannon took a knee as the Coliseum erupted in celebration.

The Raiders' return to the post-season was spoiled by injuries and an efficient Houston Texans team that capitalized on three turnovers and 20 first half points en route to a 27-14 verdict at NRG Stadium.

Quarterback Connor Cook became the first rookie to make his first career start in a playoff game, taking the reins following a season-ending injury to Derek Carr in Week 16 and a shoulder injury to backup Matt McGloin in the regular season finale.

Houston got off to a fast start, opening the scoring with a 50-yard field goal by Nick Novak. On the ensuing possession, Texans defensive end Jadeveon Clowney tipped and intercepted a third-down screen pass from Cook deep in Raiders territory, setting up a 4-yard touchdown run by Lamar Miller and a 10-0 lead for the home team. The Raiders cut the lead to 10-7 later in the first period, as a 37-yard punt return by rookie running back Jalen Richard started the Raiders at the Texan's 38-yard line, initiating a drive the saw running back Latavius Murray grind out 27 yards on four carries, including a 2-yard touchdown run.

The Texans stemmed the tide and took control in the second quarter, getting a 38-yard field goal from Novak before quarterback Brock Osweiler found wide receiver DeAndre Hopkins for a 38-yard gain and a 2-yard touchdown connection to close the half with a 20-7 lead.

Oakland and Houston combined for seven punts in a third quarter that was dominated by defense, and the Texans moved the score to 27-7 with a 1-yard run by Osweiler early in the final period. The Raiders answered with a 75-yard touchdown drive, culminating in an 8-yard scoring pass from Cook to receiver Andre Holmes.

Battling a dwindling clock in addition to the NFL's top-ranked defensive unit, the Raiders' final two drives of the game ended in interceptions for Cook, who finished 18-for-45 passing for 161 yards, one touchdown and three interceptions in his debut start.

1979 - RON MIX

Raiders offensive tackle, 1971; pro football veteran, 1961-1969, 1971

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on July 28, 1979...Played 11 pro seasons, 10 with the Los Angeles/San Diego Chargers and one with the Oakland Raiders...Became the first player to have worn a Raider uniform inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame...Was the second player from the American Football League (AFL) to be enshrined in Canton, following former teammate Lance Alworth...Elected to the AFL All-Star team in nine straight seasons...A nine-time All-AFL selection...Named to the all-time AFL first team, and is one of only 20 individuals who played the entire 10 years of the AFL...Played in 142 career games...Flagged for just two holding penalties in an 11-year career...Played in five of the first six AFL Championship games, helping lead Chargers to 1963 title...Retired after the 1969 season, but returned to football in 1971 following a trade to the Raiders...Played in 12 games with four starts for the Silver and Black...Earned All-American honors in 1959 as a collegiate lineman at USC...Selected by the Baltimore Colts as the 10th overall pick in the 1960

NFL Draft...Also chosen in the first round of the 1960 AFL Draft by the Boston Patriots...Named to the International Jewish Sports Hall of Fame in 1980.

1980 - JIM OTTO

Raiders center, 1960-74; pro football veteran, 1960-74

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 2, 1980...The only All-League center the American Football League ever had (1960-69)...Chosen to Hall of Fame AFL All-Star Team of the Decade...Named the All-American Football Conference center for three more seasons, 1970-72...Started in 210 consecutive league games, most in Raiders history...Including preseason, postseason and all-star games, he played in 308 games as a Raider...Last of the original Raiders...Participated in nine AFL All-Star Games and in the first three AFC-NFL Pro Bowls...During his 15-year career, the Raiders won seven division championships and the AFL Championship in 1967...Twice winner of the Gorman Award (1968 and 1971) as "Player Who Best Exemplifies the Pride and Spirit of the Oakland Raiders"...Selected to AFL-NFL 25-year All-Star Team...Third AFL player inducted into Hall of Fame...Elected to the Hall of Fame in his first year of eligibility...Rejoined Raiders front office in special projects in 1995.



1981 - GEORGE BLANDA

Raiders quarterback/kicker, 1967-75; pro football veteran, 1949-75

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 1, 1981...The first player and one of only two in history to celebrate a Silver Anniversary in pro football, ending his NFL career in 1975 with an all-time high 26 seasons...Set an NFL record with 2,002 points...Completed 1,911 passes in career for 26,920 yards and threw for 236 touchdowns...Played in 224 straight games, 340 overall...Raiders all-time scoring leader with 863 points...Led NFL eight times in extra points scored in a season, including 64 in 1961...Missed only 16 of 959 extra point attempts in 26 years...Kicked 335 field goals, including nine of 50 yards or more...Named 1970 Player of the Year for quarterbacking and kicking feats...Winner of 1970 Gorman Award as "Player Who Best Exemplifies the Pride and Spirit of the Oakland Raiders"...Set Raider single-season scoring record with 117 points in 1968...Played in 11 championship games, seven with Raiders...Played on three AFL Championship teams, one with Oakland and

two with Houston...Named to AFL-NFL 25-year All-Star Team...Chosen for the Hall of Fame in his first year of eligibility.

1984 - WILLIE BROWN

Raiders cornerback, 1967-78, pro football veteran, 1963-78

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on July 28, 1984...Shares Raider all-time lead in interceptions with 39...All-Pro seven times, played in five AFL All-Star Games and four NFL Pro Bowls...Named to All-Time AFL team at cornerback in 1969...Played in three AFL and six AFC Championship Games with Raiders, plus Super Bowls II and XI...Set Super Bowl record with 75-yard interception return for touchdown against Minnesota in Super Bowl XI...Had two other postseason interception returns for touchdowns — against Miami in 1970 and Pittsburgh in 1973...Intercepted at least one pass for a then-NFL record 16 straight seasons...Intercepted 54 passes in career, with 472 return yards, two touchdowns in league play...Tied NFL record with four interceptions against N.Y. Jets on Nov. 15, 1964...Played in 205 games...MVP in 1965 AFL All-Star Game...Winner of 1968 Gorman Award as "Player Who Best Exemplifies the Pride and Spirit of the Oakland Raiders"...Raiders defensive captain for 10 years...Selected to AFL-NFL 25-year All-Star Team...Chosen to the Hall of Fame in first year of eligibility...Originally signed as free agent by Houston Oilers, played four seasons with Denver Broncos...Served as Raiders defensive backfield coach from 1979-88...Head football coach at Long Beach State in 1991 and at L.A. Jordan High School in 1994...Inducted to Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame in 1992 and into Mississippi Sports Hall of Fame in 1994...Rejoined Raiders in 1995 as director of squad development and returned to on-field coaching, tutoring Raider cornerbacks until retiring as a position coach...Currently serves on the football operations staff with the Raiders.



Raiders guard, 1967-82; pro football veteran, 1967-82

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 8, 1987...All-Pro or All-Conference eight times, played in six Pro Bowls and one AFL All-Star Game...Games played (217) is second-most in team history...Missed only one league game in career...207 consecutive league games and starts are both second on Raider list...First player in NFL history to participate in Super Bowls in three different decades (after 1967, 1976 and 1980 seasons)...Holds Raider all-time record with 24 playoff game starts...Offensive team captain for nine years (1973-81)...Only second guard inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame...During 15-year active pro career, the Raiders made 11 playoff appearances, won eight division titles, one AFL Championship, two AFC titles and two World Championships of Professional Football...Named to AFL-NFL 25-year All-Star, NFL 75th Anniversary All-Time and All-Monday Night Teams...Chosen to the Hall of Fame in first year of eligibility...Served as executive director of NFL Players Association from 1983 until his passing in 2008.

1988 - FRED BILETNIKOFF

Raiders wide receiver, 1965-78; pro football veteran, 1965-78

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on July 30, 1988...No. 2 all-time in history of Silver and Black with 589 career catches...Ranked fourth on the NFL all-time receiving list at time of retirement...Also No. 2 among all-time Raiders in receiving yards (8,974) and receiving touchdowns (76)...Also caught 70 passes for 1,167 yards and 10 touchdowns in postseason games, ranking second on all-time NFL list upon retirement...Played in three AFL title games, five AFC Championships and Super Bowls II and XI...MVP of Super Bowl XI with four catches for 79 yards...Held NFL record of 10 straight seasons with 40 or more receptions (1967-76)...Raiders leading receiver for six consecutive seasons (1968-73)...Led NFL in receiving with 61 catches in 1971, then led AFC in 1972 with 58...All-AFL in 1969, All-AFC in 1970, 1972 and 1973...Played in two AFL All-Star Games and four Pro Bowls...Played in 190 games in 14 seasons...Had 21, 100-yard receiving games...Had four, 100-yard receiving games in playoffs...Never played in a losing season with the Raiders...Originally selected in the second round of the 1965 AFL Draft after record-setting collegiate career at Florida State...Named to Walter Camp All-Century Team...Rejoined Raiders as wide receivers coach in 1989...Award in his name goes to nation's top collegiate wide receiver...Was Raiders wide receivers coach from 1989-94, handled quality control from 1995-96 and returned to coach receivers in 1997 until retiring from coaching following the 2006 season.



1989 - ART SHELL

Raiders tackle, 1968-82; pro football veteran, 1968-82

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 5, 1989...All-American Football Conference selection six straight years from 1973-78...All-Pro in 1973, 1974 and 1977...Played in 207 league games, fourth-highest in history of Silver and Black...Selected to play in eight Pro Bowls, second-most of any Raider player, during career which spanned three decades...Played in 23 postseason contests, including eight AFL-AFC Championships and Raider victories in Super Bowls XI and XV...Credited with near-perfect performance in Raiders Super Bowl XI victory over Minnesota, limiting Vikings highly regarded defensive end Jim Marshall to no tackles, sacks or assists during 32-14 win...Played in first 156 games before missing five games due to preseason injury...Launched another streak of 51 straight games...Named to NFL All-Monday Night Team...Originally selected in third round of the 1968 AFL Draft after stellar career as a two-way lineman at Maryland-Eastern Shore...Raiders offensive line coach after retiring as a player in 1982 until 1988, when he became head coach of the Silver and Black...Served as head coach of the Raiders until 1994 and re-joined the Silver and Black as head coach in 2006...Also served as an NFL assistant coach with Kansas City and Atlanta and was the NFL's senior vice president for football operations and development.

1990 - TED HENDRICKS

Raiders linebacker, 1975-83; NFL veteran, 1969-83

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 4, 1990...Played in every game during his 15 NFL seasons, including nine with Silver and Black...Played in 131 consecutive league games with Raiders, 215 in career, most by any linebacker in NFL history...Member of all three Raider teams that won the World Championship of Professional Football (1976, 1980 and 1983)...Intercepted 26 passes for 332 yards and one touchdown while recovering 16 opponents fumbles...Shares NFL record for most safeties in pro career with four...Also shares postseason NFL record for most opponent's fumbles recovered in career with four...Scored three touchdowns in career — on a fumble recovery, interception return and return of blocked punt...Named All-AFC seven times, All-NFC once and played in eight AFC-NFC Pro Bowls...Second round pick in the 1969 Draft by Baltimore Colts...Was a member of Baltimore's Super Bowl V Championship team...Played for Colts before being traded to Green Bay in 1974, then joined Raiders as free agent in 1975...Three-time All-America linebacker/defensive end at the University of Miami...Named to the NFL 75th Anniversary All-Time team in 1994.





1992 - AL DAVIS

Scout, Assistant Coach, Head Coach, League Commissioner, Owner

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 1, 1992...Went from assistant coach of the Los Angeles, now San Diego Chargers, to head coach and general manager of the Raiders, to commissioner of the American Football League and to principal owner and chief executive officer of the Raiders, transforming the failing franchise into pro football's winningest team...In first season in Oakland, team went 10-4 in 1963 with Davis being named Coach of the Year by AP,UPI, Sports Illustrated, The Sporting News and his fellow coaches...Became the first sports figure ever honored by the Chamber of Commerce as Oakland's Young Man of the Year...In 1966, became commissioner of the AFL at 36 and was acclaimed nationally as the driving force who brought on the historic merger between the NFL and AFL...He played a vital role in the development of the game as a participant in the prestigious NFL Competition Committee and the NFL Owners Executive Committee...Has been chosen by a record nine Pro Football Hall of Fame inductees to present them at the Canton, Ohio ceremony — Lance Alworth, Jim Otto, George Blanda, Willie Brown, Gene Upshaw, Fred Biletnikoff, Art Shell, Ted Hendricks and John Madden...Became the first recipient of the NFL Players Association's Retired Players Award of Excellence "for his contributions to the men who played the game" in 1991...As a member of the Executive Committee of the NFL Management Council, Davis was a major factor in achieving a collective bargaining agreement with the players...Was offensive end coach of the Los Angeles Chargers from 1960-62, before being named Raiders head coach/general manager at age 33...He attended Wittenberg College and Syracuse, earning a degree in English while playing football, basketball and baseball in 1950...Named line coach at Adelphi College in New York...His innovative technical football articles, published in the leading coaching magazines, gained him wide acclaim...Went into the U.S. Army, being assigned as head football coach at Ft. Belvoir, Va...There he molded a national power service team and capped one season by defeating Maryland, national collegiate football champions, in a squad game...On the staff of the Baltimore Colts in 1954, at age 24, concentrating on player personnel...During 1955-56, served as line coach and chief recruiter at The Citadel...Then spent three years at USC as line coach and in 1959, was also defensive coordinator.

1997 - MIKE HAYNES

Raiders cornerback, 1983-89; NFL veteran, 1976-89

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on July 26, 1997...Made nine Pro Bowl appearances in pro career...Credited with 46 career interceptions while playing with the Raiders and New England...Totalled 688 yards in interception returns and returned two interceptions for touchdowns in pro career...Tied for Raiders lead with three interceptions in 1988...Played in 43 consecutive games with Raiders before missing action in mid-season in 1986...Led league in return yards in 1984 with 220 yards on six interception returns, including single longest interception return of 97 yards at Miami...Had 13 career interceptions as a Raider...Joined Raiders in midseason 1983, played in final five league games plus three playoff wins...Had interception as Raiders downed Redskins in Super Bowl XVIII...Came to Raiders in trade with New England...Played out option with Patriots in 1982, completing seven seasons with New England...Made 58 consecutive starts with Patriots from 1976-79...Patriots top interceptor from 1976-78...New England's all-time punt return leader with 1,159 yards on 111 returns, a 10.4-yard average...Had two punt return touchdowns as a rookie in 1976, with runs of 89 and 62 yards...Also blocked and returned a field goal attempt for a 65-yard touchdown in 1980...Fifth player and first defensive back taken in 1976 Draft by New England...AFC Rookie of Year...All-Pro in 1978, 1982, 1984 and 1985 and All-Conference eight times...Named to NFL All-Time Team...All-America defensive back as junior and senior at Arizona State...Named MVP in 1976 Japan Bowl and 1973 Fiesta Bowl...Two-year letterman in track, winning conference long jump title one year and runner-up the other...Served as the NFL's vice president of player and employee development.



1999 - ERIC DICKERSON

Raiders running back, 1992; NFL veteran 1983-93



Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 7, 1999...Played 11 NFL seasons and made six Pro Bowl appearances in pro career...Began NFL career as first round pick, second selection overall, by L.A. Rams in 1983...Also played for Indianapolis Colts (1987-91), Raiders (1992) and Atlanta Falcons (1993)...Led Raiders in rushing in 1992 with 729 yards...Played 11 seasons, 146 games...All-America, one of the best college runners in NCAA history...Rushed for 4,450 yards in four seasons at SMU...Holds NFL rookie season records for most rushing attempts — 390; most yards rushing — 1,808; most touchdowns rushing — 18...Set NFL records for rushing yards in a season — 2,105; 100-yard rushing performances — 12; and combined yards from scrimmage — 2,244 in 1984...Retired from NFL ranked third in career rushing yardage — 13,259...Gained a playoff-record 248 yards rushing in 1985 NFC Divisional Playoff Game...In 1987, traded from Rams to Colts in blockbuster deal that also involved the Bills...Recorded a then-record seven consecutive seasons with

1,000 yards rushing...Named NFL Player of the Year, 1984; NFL Offensive Player of the Year, 1986...All-Pro 1983, 1984, 1986, 1987 and 1988...All-NFC 1983, 1984 and 1986...All-AFC in 1987 and 1988.



2000 - HOWIE LONG

Raiders defensive end/defensive tackle, 1981-93; NFL veteran, 1981-93

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on July 29, 2000...Played 13 NFL seasons, all with the Raiders, and made eight Pro Bowl appearances in pro career...Moved into starting role with the Raiders beginning in the fifth game of the strike-shortened 1982 season...Just the second Raider defensive lineman to make a Pro Bowl...First or second team All-Pro choice in 1983, 1984, 1985, 1986 and 1989...Was also named All-AFC four times...In 1985, posted 10 sacks, with at least one in eight games and was selected as Raider Lineman's Club Defensive Lineman of the Year by his teammates...Although he missed much of the 1988 season due to injury, he still managed to record three sacks and intercept the first pass of his career, which he returned 73 yards in a game against Houston...Member of the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 1980s, recorded 84 career sacks, not including 7.5 sacks in 1981 before the sack was an official NFL stat...Raiders second round pick

in 1981 NFL Draft and the 48th player selected overall...Four-year letterman at Villanova and MVP in the 1980 Blue-Gray Game...Has served as a studio host for NFL pregame show on FOX.

2000 - RONNIE LOTT

Raiders safety, 1991-92; NFL veteran, 1981-94



Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on July 29, 2000...Played 14 NFL seasons — including two with the Raiders — and made 10 Pro Bowl appearances in pro career at three positions — cornerback, free safety and strong safety...Named All-Pro eight times, All-NFC six times and All-AFC once, selected to play in 10 Pro Bowls and was named to the NFL's 75th Anniversary Team...In his first NFL season, led a young secondary that helped the 49ers win Super Bowl XVI...Became the second rookie in NFL history to return three interceptions for touchdowns and finished second to Lawrence Taylor for Rookie of the Year honors...In 1986, played 14 games at the free safety position before an injury sidelined him for the final two games of the season...Still led the league with a career-most 10 interceptions, recorded 77 tackles, three forced fumbles and two sacks...During his career with the 49ers (1981-90), Los Angeles Raiders (1991-92) and the New York Jets (1993-94), recorded 63 career interceptions and twice led the league...Surpassed the 1,000-career tackle mark in 1993 and had five seasons of at least 100 tackles...In his 10 seasons with the 49ers, San Francisco won eight NFC Western Division titles and four Super Bowls...In 20 playoff contests (all starts), he recorded nine interceptions, 89 tackles, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery and two touchdowns...San Francisco 49ers first round draft pick and the eighth player chosen overall in the 1981 NFL Draft following All-American college career at Southern California.



2002 - DAVE CASPER

Raiders tight end, 1974-80, 1984; NFL veteran, 1974-84

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 3, 2002...Played 11 seasons in the NFL, seven-and-a-half with the Raiders...During that time, named All-Pro and All-AFC four times and was selected to play in four Pro Bowls...Traded to the Houston Oilers for a first round and two second round draft picks midway through 1980 season, finished the season with 56 receptions and was named to his fifth Pro Bowl...In 1984, after a brief stint with the Minnesota Vikings, returned to the Raiders, finishing his career with 378 receptions for 5,216 yards and 52 touchdowns...Outstanding play contributed to Raiders success and a 32-14 victory over Vikings in Super Bowl XI...Outstanding blocker as well as receiver...Caught the game-winning 10-yard touchdown pass in 1977 double-overtime AFC playoff game...His infamous "Ghost to the Post," in reference to his 42-yard reception, set up the tying field goal at the end of regulation...All-America as an offensive tackle in 1972 and an All-America tight end in 1973 at Notre Dame...Second round pick by the Raiders in the 1974 NFL Draft.

2003 - MARCUS ALLEN

Raiders running back, 1982-92; NFL veteran, 1982-97



Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 3, 2003...The 10th player selected in the 1982 NFL Draft...Played 16 NFL seasons, including 11 with the Los Angeles Raiders...Gained 12,243 yards rushing, 5,411 yards receiving and scored 145 touchdowns...1981 Heisman Trophy winner while at Southern California and NFL Rookie of the Year in 1982...During his 11 seasons with the Raiders, named to the Pro Bowl five times and added a sixth appearance in 1994 as a member of the Kansas City Chiefs...Was the Raiders leading rusher seven consecutive years...Led the Raiders in receptions with 51 in 1987...Named MVP in Super Bowl XVIII when the Raiders defeated the Washington Redskins 38-9 after rushing for 191 yards and scoring two touchdowns, one a then-Super Bowl record 74-yarder...In 1985, named NFL MVP after leading the league with 1,759 rushing yards on 380 carries for a 4.6 yards per carry average and 11 touchdowns...Also caught 67 passes for 555 yards and scored an additional three touchdowns...In 1995, made NFL history when he became the first player in league history to rush for more than 10,000 yards and catch passes for 5,000 more...Completed 12 of 27 passes for 282 yards and six touchdowns during his career...In 15 career playoff games, carried the ball 267 times for 1,347 yards and 11 touchdowns, averaging 5.0 yards per carry...Also added 52 catches for 522 yards and two receiving touchdowns...At the time of his retirement following the 1997 season, held the single-season record for most rushing and receiving yards combined (2,314), second in consecutive 100-yard games and was third in career-combined yardage.



2003 - JAMES LOFTON


Raiders wide receiver, 1987-88; NFL veteran, 1978-93

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 3, 2003...Traded to the Raiders in 1987 and played two seasons for the Silver and Black...Later spent four seasons with the Buffalo Bills and also played for the L.A. Rams and Philadelphia Eagles in final NFL season...Entered NFL as No. 1 draft pick of Green Bay in 1978 and spent eight seasons with Packers...In 16 seasons, caught 764 passes for 14,004 yards — an 18.3-yard average per catch...Recorded more than 50 catches in a season nine times...His 14,004 career reception yardage mark was an NFL-best at the time of his retirement, while his 43 games with 100 or more yards receiving ranked third...First NFL player to score a touchdown in 1970s, 1980s and 1990s...Named All-Pro four times, All-NFC three times and selected to play in eight Pro Bowls...In 1991, at age 35, became the oldest player in league history to record 1,000 receiving yards in a season and recorded a career-best 220 receiving yards in a game against the Cincinnati Bengals...In 13 playoff game appearances, caught 41 passes for 759 yards and eight touchdowns, including a seven-reception game in Super Bowl XXVI...In three of those playoff games, recorded 100-yard plus performances...Won NCAA long jump title as a senior at Stanford...Coached Raiders wide receivers in 2008 after serving in same capacity for San Diego.

2004 - BOB BROWN

Raiders tackle, 1971-73; NFL veteran, 1964-73

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 8, 2004...Played 10 pro seasons, his final three with the Raiders...First round draft pick (second overall) in the 1964 Draft by the Philadelphia Eagles...Named first team All-NFL seven times...Earned NFL/NFC Offensive Lineman of the Year honors three times...Elected to six Pro Bowls — three with Eagles, two with Rams and one with Raiders...Named to the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 1960s...All-NFL seven of his 10 seasons with the Philadelphia Eagles (1964-68), L.A. Rams (1969-70) and Oakland Raiders (1971-73)...Two of the three years he did not make the All-NFL team, he was named second team All-NFL...In 1969, after five consecutive all-league seasons with the Eagles, was traded to Los Angeles and that year the Rams offensive line set an NFL record for protecting the passer...Voted college football's Lineman of the Year in 1963 by the Washington, D.C. Touchdown Club...All-America guard at Nebraska, was also drafted in the first round in 1964 by the Denver Broncos of the then-rival American Football League.



2006 - JOHN MADDEN

Raiders Head Coach/Assistant Coach, 1967-78

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 5, 2006...Assistant coach with Allan Hancock College, 1960-61; head coach with Allan Hancock College, 1962-63; assistant coach with San Diego State, 1964-66; assistant coach with The Oakland Raiders, 1967-68; head coach with the Raiders, 1969-78...Regular season record: 103-32-7...Postseason record: 9-7...Overall record: 112-39-7...His .759 winning percentage during regular season ranks highest among coaches with 100 career victories...One of the youngest head coaches in history when Raiders hired him in 1969 at age 32...AFL Coach of the Year, 1969...Under Madden, Oakland never suffered losing record...Led Raiders to Super Bowl XI...Team won 17 straight games between 1976-77 seasons, one short of NFL record at the time...A leading pro football analyst for NBC after also holding the same position for ABC's "Monday Night Football," Fox and CBS...Retired from broadcasting following the 2008 season.



2009 - ROD WOODSON

Raiders safety, 2002-03; NFL veteran 1987-2003

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 8, 2009...Finished career with the Raiders from 2002-03, leading Oakland to the AFC title and appearance in Super Bowl XXXVII...Played in 238 games with 229 starts in 17 seasons with Pittsburgh, San Francisco, Baltimore and Oakland...Had 71 interceptions for 1,483 career return yards...Also collected 2,362 yards on punt returns...Scored 17 career touchdowns...Holds NFL record with 12 interception returns for touchdowns...A six-time first team All-Pro choice (1989, 1990, 1992, 1993, 1994 and 2002)...One of five active players named to the NFL's 75th Anniversary Team in 1994...Named to the NFL All-Decade Team for the 1990s...Named NFL Defensive Player of the Year in 1993...Earned All-Pro honors as a cornerback, kick returner and safety...Selected to play in 11 Pro Bowls...Played in three Super Bowls with three different teams, including Super Bowl XXX with the Steelers, Super Bowl XXXV with the Ravens and Super Bowl XXXVII with the Raiders...An All-American cornerback at Purdue...The 10th overall pick by the Pittsburgh Steelers in the 1987 NFL Draft...Returned to Raiders as an assistant coach, tutoring defensive backs.

Raiders wide receiver, 2001-04; NFL veteran, 1985-2004

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 7, 2010...Played 20 NFL seasons, including four with the Oakland Raiders...Retired from professional football holding nearly every NFL career receiving record...Selected to play in 13 Pro Bowls...Named first team All-Pro 10 times...Played with the Raiders from 2001-04, helping lead Oakland to two playoff berths, an AFC title and an appearance in Super Bowl XXXVII...Played in 303 games with 284 starts in 20 seasons with San Francisco, Oakland and Seattle...Owner of 38 NFL career records at the time of his retirement...Set the all-time record for receptions (1,549), receiving yards (22,895), touchdown receptions (197), yards from scrimmage (23,540), all-purpose yards (23,546), combined rushing and receiving touchdowns (207) and total touchdowns (208)...Set single-season NFL records in receiving yards (1,848) and touchdown receptions (22)...Also set NFL marks with at least 50 receptions in



2013 - WARREN SAPP

Raiders defensive lineman, 2004-07; NFL veteran, 1995-2007



Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 3, 2013...Played 13 NFL seasons, including his final four years with Oakland...Saw action in 198 career games with 188 starts with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers and Raiders...Totalled 96.5 career sacks, the second most by an interior lineman in NFL history...Named All-Pro four times...Selected to seven straight Pro Bowls from 1997-2003...Part of two NFL All-Decade Teams (1990s and 2000s)...Named NFL Defensive Player of the Year in 1999 after posting 12.5 sacks and four forced fumbles...Set a Tampa Bay franchise record with 16.5 sacks in 2000...Played in nine postseason contests with the Buccaneers, including Super Bowl XXXVII vs. Oakland...Played for the Silver and Black from 2004-07...Started all 58 games in which he appeared for Oakland...Totalled 19.5 sacks, one interception, four forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries with the Raiders...Recorded 10 sacks in 2006...Played three years at Miami (Fla.)...Recipient of the 1994 Lombardi Award, presented annually to the nation's top linebacker/lineman...A first-team All-American selection as a junior...Named Big East Conference Defensive Player of the Year...Selected by the Buccaneers as the 12th overall pick in the 1995 NFL Draft.



2014 - RAY GUY

Raiders punter, 1973-86; NFL veteran, 1973-86

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 2, 2014...First pure punter ever elected to the Hall of Fame...Largely revolutionized the position with his booming kicks, introducing the term "hang time" into the modern-day football lexicon and helping pioneer directional punting...Became the first punter selected in the first round of the NFL Draft when the Silver and Black chose him 23rd overall in 1973...Punted 14 seasons for the Raiders...Played in 207 consecutive games, finishing career ranked third on the team's all-time participation list...Punted 1,049 times for 44,493 yards, averaging 42.4 yards per effort...Also placed 209 punts inside the 20-yard line and had only three punts blocked...Averaged more than 40 yards per punt in 13 of 14 seasons...Named as the punter for the NFL's 75th Anniversary Team in 1994 and selected to the NFL's All-Decade Team for the 1970s...Played in seven Pro Bowls (1973-78, 80) and was named first-team All-Pro six times (1973-78)...Also named second-team All-Pro twice (1979-80)...Posted a career-high 45.3-yard punting average on 69 punts as a rookie in 1973...Led the NFL in punting average three times; 1974 (42.2 avg.), 1975 (43.8 avg.) and 1977 (43.3 avg.)...Also finished second in the NFL in punting three times (1973, 78, 81)...Played on three Super Bowl champion Raider teams, helping the Silver and Black win NFL titles in Super Bowls XI, XV and XVIII...Played in 22 postseason games, averaging 42.2 yards on 111 punts...Had a career-long 77-yard punt against Denver in 1977...Finished his pro career with 619 straight punts without a block...An All-American at Southern Mississippi, averaged 44.7 yards on 200 punts...Also played kicker and safety, recording 18 interceptions in three seasons...Namesake for the Ray Guy Award, presented annually by the Greater Augusta Sports Council to the nation's top collegiate punter.

2015 - RON WOLF

Raiders Personnel Executive/Contributor, 1963-74, 1979-89; AFL/NFL veteran, 1963-2001

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 8, 2015...Top NFL personnel executive for nearly four decades...Along with Al Davis, helped build Raiders into a dominant franchise...In 23 seasons over two stints with the Silver and Black, helped Raiders post winning campaigns in all but six years, claiming 10 division titles, playing in eight AFL/AFC Championship Games and three Super Bowls, including victories in Super Bowls XV and XVIII...Part of a scouting process that saw the Raiders draft eight future Hall of Famers, including Gene Upshaw, Fred Biletnikoff, Art Shell, Ray Guy, Dave Casper, Howie Long, Marcus Allen and Tim Brown...First joined Raiders as a scout in 1963...Left team briefly to work in the American Football League office in 1966, but returned just months later when the AFL-NFL merger was announced...Helped build team that won the AFL title and appeared in Super Bowl II in 1967...Became General Manager of the expansion Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 1976, starting a franchise that reached the NFC Championship Game in just its fourth season...Returned to Raiders in 1979 and was part of a team that made five playoff appearances and won two Super Bowl titles in first seven seasons back with franchise...Joined New York Jets as Personnel Director in 1990...Named Executive Vice President/General Manager of the Green Bay Packers late in the 1991 season...In 1995, helped Packers claim first division title in 23 years...Helped lead the Packers to three straight NFC Central titles and back-to-back appearances in the Super Bowl, including a Super Bowl XXXI victory following the 1996 season.



2015 - TIM BROWN

Raiders wide receiver, 1988-2003; NFL veteran, 1988-2004



Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 8, 2015...Played 17 NFL seasons, including first 16 campaigns with the Raiders...Joined Raiders as the sixth player selected in the 1988 NFL Draft after winning the Heisman Trophy at Notre Dame...Finished career as the most decorated receiver in Raiders history, setting franchise records with 1,070 receptions for 14,734 yards and 99 touchdowns...Finished career with most seasons (16) and games played (240) in franchise annals...Also Raiders all-time leader with 3,272 yards and three touchdowns on punt returns and 14,924 total yards from scrimmage...Racked up 19,443 combined net yards as a Raider...Topped 1,000 yards receiving in a season nine straight times from 1993-2001, and posted four of the top five seasons for receiving yardage in franchise history...Career totals include 1,094 catches for 14,934 yards and 100 touchdowns...Reception total ranked third in NFL history and yardage mark was second in

league record book at time of his retirement...Punt return yardage total of 3,320 is sixth in league history...Only player in NFL history to record at least 75 receptions in 10 straight seasons (1993-2002)...Posted 11 seasons with 50-or-more receptions and recorded a reception in 179 straight games from 1993-2004...Averaged 87 catches and 1,191 yards per season from 1993-2002...Also posted more yards after the catch than any other NFL receiver from 1992-2004 with 4,475...Set an NFL record for wide receivers with 176 straight starts...Selected to play in nine Pro Bowls, including five straight from 1994-98...Named All-Pro twice (1988 and 1997)...Earned All-AFC honors eight times...Garnered first-team All-Pro recognition in 1997 after setting franchise single-season records with 104 catches for 1,408 yards...Broke Gayle Sayers' NFL record for total yardage by a rookie in 1988, racking up 2,317 all-purpose yards (725 rec., 50 rush., 1,098 KR, 444 PR)...Six-time recipient of the Raiders' Commitment to Excellence Award...Led Raiders to three-straight AFC West titles from 2000-02...Started at wide receiver for Raiders in Super Bowl XXXVII...Finished his career with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, playing in 2004.

2016 - KEN STABLER

Raiders quarterback, 1970-79; NFL veteran, 1970-1984

Inducted into Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 6, 2016...Played 15 NFL seasons, including first 10 campaigns with the Raiders...Joined Raiders as a second round draft pick (52nd overall) out of Alabama in 1968...Spent first two seasons on the Raiders' inactive/reserve squad before first seeing game action in 1970...In 10 seasons in Oakland, was named All-Pro twice, All-AFC three times and was selected to play in four Pro Bowls...Remains the franchise's career leader in passing attempts (2,481), yards (19,078) and touchdowns (150)...Named to the NFL's All-Decade Team for the 1970s...Career totals include 184 games played with 146 starts, 2,270 completions on 3,793 attempts, 27,938 passing yards and 194 touchdowns...With the Raiders, racked up 19,078 passing yards on 1,486 completions with 150 touchdowns...Became starting quarterback in 1973 and led Raiders the first of five straight AFC Championship Game appearances...Also led Raiders to seven straight winning seasons and a 69-26-1 regular season record as a starter...Three-time recipient of the Gorman Award (1973, 1974 and 1976), a precursor to the Commitment to Excellence Award...Named Associated Press NFL Most Valuable Player in 1974 after passing for 2,469 yards and an NFL-best 26 touchdowns...Also tabbed for first-team All-Pro honors...Led the league in passing in 1976, piloting the Raiders to the team's first-ever Super Bowl title...Completed 194 passes for 2,737 yards and a league-high 27 touchdowns, setting a franchise record with a 103.4 passer rating...Also led the NFL with a 66.7 completion percentage...Was 12-for-19 passing for 180 yards as the Raiders defeated the Minnesota Vikings, 32-14, in Super Bowl XI...Garnered Pro Bowl honors in back to back seasons twice (1973 and 1974, 1976 and 1977)...Played in 13 career playoff games with 12 starts...Started 11 playoff games with the Silver and Black, posting a 7-4 record as a starter...Totalled 2,398 passing yards with 19 touchdowns in playoff contests and set an NFL record by recording a touchdown pass in 10 consecutive postseason games...Traded to Houston in 1980 and spent the final five seasons of his career with the Oilers (1980-81) and the New Orleans Saints (1982-84)...Served as a color commentator on CBS NFL broadcasts.



1963

Jan. 15—Al Davis named head coach and general manager of Raiders. Feb. 8—Dallas Texans announce move of franchise to Kansas City, becoming the Chiefs. March 28—New York Titans sold to group headed by David (Sonny) Werblin; club becomes the Jets. May 11—AFL allows Oakland and New York to select players from other franchises to provide more competitive balance. Dec. 22—Raiders down Houston, 52-49, to finish one

game out of playoffs with 10-4-0 record, first winning season in club history.

1964

Jan. 17—AFL owners vote to recognize AFL Players' Association, formed just three days earlier. Jan. 29—AFL and NBC sign five-year, \$36-million television contract to begin with 1965 season. June 1—AFL announces establishment of pension and hospitalization plans.

1965

Feb. 1—Construction starts on 54,000-seat Oakland Coliseum; completion date set for Aug. 25, 1966. Aug. 16—AFL awards expansion franchise for 1966 to Miami.

1966

April 8—Al Davis, general manager and head coach of Raiders, named second Commissioner of American Football League, succeeding Joe Foss. John Rauch hired as Raiders head coach. June 8—American Football League and National Football League agree to an alliance that includes common draft and championship game. July 25—Al Davis resigns as league commissioner. Milt Woodard appointed president of the American Football League. Davis rejoins Raiders as managing general partner. Sept. 18—Raiders open 54,000-seat Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum, against Kansas City Chiefs.

1967

Jan. 15—First World Championship Game played, at Los Angeles. NFL champion Green Bay Packers pull away from AFL champion Kansas City in second half to win, 35-10. Jan. 21—AFL All-Star Game held in Oakland. East posts first series win, 30-23. March 14-15—First AFL-NFL common draft held. May 24—Cincinnati awarded AFL expansion franchise. August-September—First preseason games between AFL and NFL held, including Sept. 3 meeting between Raiders and San Francisco 49ers. Dec. 24—Raiders finish season with 13-1 mark, best record in AFL history. Dec. 31—Raiders rout Houston, 40-7, to win AFL Championship.

1968

Jan. 14—In Super Bowl II, Green Bay pulls away from AFL champion Raiders to win, 33-14. Nov. 17—"Heidi" becomes part of sports vocabulary when final minutes of Raiders' 43-32 comeback win over New York are cut off to permit television special to begin on time. Viewers unaware that Raiders score two late touchdowns to win, then voice headline-grabbing displeasure at NBC. Dec. 22—Raiders wallop visiting Kansas City, 41-6, to capture Western Division Playoff. Dec. 29—Raiders fall to New York Jets, 27-23, in AFL Championship at Shea Stadium before 62,627.

1969

Feb. 4—John Madden appointed Raiders head coach to replace John Rauch, who left to go with Buffalo Bills. May 10—Pro football realignment finds Cleveland Browns, Baltimore Colts and Pittsburgh Steelers moving to new American Football Conference as part of 1970 merger. Colts join Boston, Buffalo, Miami and New York in one division. Browns and Steelers join Houston and Cincinnati in another, and Kansas City, Denver, San Diego and Oakland remain in third division. June 1—Veteran AFL player personnel director and administrator Al LoCasale named executive assistant for Raiders. June 26—ABC acquires rights

to televise NFL regular-season Monday night games. Oct. 19—Raiders quarterback Daryle Lamonica sets pro record with six touchdown passes in first half to direct 50-21 win over Buffalo. Oct. 26—Raiders defeat San Diego, 24-12, to equal AFL record of unbeaten games at 15. Dec. 13—Raiders beat Kansas City, 10-6, in regular-season finale and win record-tying third straight AFL Western Division title. Dec. 21—Raiders win playoff, set club scoring mark in 56-7 win over Houston.

1970

Jan. 4—Raiders bow to Kansas City, 17-7, in AFL Championship before record Coliseum crowd of 54,544. March 16-21—Pro football owners meet in Honolulu. Uniform rules adopted, including discarding of AFL's two-point conversion option in favor of the one-point kick, acceptance of the NFL game ball and use of players' names on the back of team jerseys. Dec. 12—Raiders become first AFC club ever to capture four consecutive Western Division crowns with a 20-6 triumph over Kansas City Chiefs. Dec. 27—Raiders win third straight playoff by defeating AFC Eastern Conference runner-up Miami Dolphins, 21-14, at Coliseum.

1971

Jan. 3—Baltimore Colts defeat Raiders, 27-17, in AFC title game at Baltimore's Memorial Stadium. Sept. 26—Raiders commence nine-week unbeaten string by blanking Chargers, 34-0, in San Diego. Dec. 12—Field goal with 1:34 left provides Chiefs 16-14 victory over visiting Raiders to end Oakland string of four division titles.

1972

March 20-24—Owners move hash marks to 23 yards, 21 inches from sideline, narrowing field-goal angles. Dec. 3—Raiders return to glory by capturing fifth AFC West title in six seasons with 21-19 victory over Chargers in San Diego. Dec. 17—Raiders boast winningest record of 1963-72 10-year period (94-36-10) with 10-3-1 finish. Dec. 23—Controversial pass deflection on fourth down in final 22 seconds provides Pittsburgh with 13-7 playoff decision over Raiders, who had taken 7-6 lead with 1:13 left to play.


1973

Sept. 23—Largest Bay Area crowd to attend a pro game (74,121) fills California Memorial Stadium as Raiders stun Super Bowl champion Miami, 12-7, on four George Blanda field goals. Dolphins win streak stopped at 18. Dec. 16—Raiders down Denver Broncos, 21-17, to capture third consecutive AFC West title and sixth in seven seasons. Dec. 21—Miami's fourth consecutive Super Bowl bid is ended as Raiders defeat world champions, 28-26, at Coliseum in AFC playoffs. Dec. 29—Pittsburgh defeats Oakland, 24-13, and advances to Super Bowl.

RAIDERS IN THE COMMUNITY

The Oakland Raiders Community Relations department is dedicated to making a difference within the community. The department strives to promote the Raiders brand by enriching the lives of others through outreach programs, initiatives, and partnerships. The Community Relations department oversees and supports a variety of community programs, which are primarily focused in the areas of education, health and fitness, youth football, volunteerism and civic involvement. These programs impact tens of thousands of children and families each year.

Each year the Raiders partner with local school districts in an effort to promote the importance of education, academic excellence, and higher learning. In 2016, the Raiders partnered with organizations such as Girls Inc. of Alameda County, the Davis Street Family Resource Center and the Oakland Unified School District to recognize local students and educators for their achievements in the classroom and to promote the pursuit of higher education.



NFL Play 60 is the National Football League's youth, health and fitness campaign. September 3: Final day of preseason training camp for all clubs, as defined in CBA Article 23, Section 9.

September 4-9: In accordance with the 2017 Personnel (Injury) Report Policy, each club is required to file a Practice Report with the NFL Communications department by 4:00 p.m., New York time, (or as soon as possible after the completion of practice) every Wednesday, Thursday and Friday for a regular season Sunday game; Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday for a Thursday game; Thursday, Friday, and Saturday for a Monday game; and Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday for a Saturday game.

September 7: At 12:00 a.m., New York time, the Top 51 Rule expires for all NFL Clubs.

September 7, 10-11: Regular Season opens.

Mid-October: Beginning on the sixth calendar day prior to a club's seventh regular season game (including any bye week) clubs are permitted to begin practicing players on Reserve/Physically Unable to Perform and Reserve/Non-Football Injury or Illness who are for a period not to exceed 21 days. Players may be activated during the 21-day practice period, or prior to 4:00 p.m., New York time, on the day after the conclusion of the 21-day period, provided that no player may be activated to participate in a Week Six game.

2017 IMPORTANT DATES

Mid-October: At any time after six weeks have elapsed since a player was placed on Reserve/Injured or Reserve/Non-Football Injury/Illness, each club is permitted to designate two players for return from either list to the Club's 53-player Active/Inactive List. A player who is "Designated For Return" must have suffered a major football-related injury or non-football-related injury or illness after reporting to training camp and must have been placed on the applicable Reserve List after 4:00 p.m., New York time, on the day after the final roster reduction. A player whom the Club wishes to designate for return is permitted to return to practice for a period not to exceed 21 days. The Club is required to notify the League office that the player has been "Designated For Return" on the first day the player begins to practice. The player cannot be returned to the Active/Inactive List until eight weeks have elapsed since the date he was placed on Reserve.

October 17-18: Fall League Meeting, The Conrad, New York, NY.

October 31: All trading ends for 2017 at 4:00 p.m., New York time.

November 1: Players with at least four previous pension-credited seasons are subject to the waiver system for the remainder of the regular season and postseason.

November 14: At 4:00 p.m., New York time, signing period ends for Franchise Players who are eligible to receive Offer Sheets.

November 14: Prior to 4:00 p.m., New York time, deadline for Clubs to sign their unsigned Franchise and Transition Players, including Franchise Players who were eligible to receive Offer Sheets until this date. If still unsigned after this date, such players are prohibited from playing in NFL in 2017.

November 14: Prior to 4:00 p.m., New York time, deadline for Clubs to sign their Unrestricted Free Agents to whom the "May 9 Tender" was made. If still unsigned after this date, such players are prohibited from playing in NFL in 2017.

November 14: Prior to 4:00 p.m., New York time, deadline for Clubs to sign their Restricted Free Agents, including those to whom the "June 1 Tender" was made. If such players remain unsigned after this date, they are prohibited from playing in NFL in 2017.

November 14: Prior to 4:00 p.m., New York time, deadline for Clubs to sign their Drafted Rookies. If such players remain unsigned after this date, they are prohibited from playing in NFL in 2017.

December 13: Special League Meeting, Four Seasons-Las Colinas, Irving, Texas.

December 31: Week 17.

2018

January 1: Prior to 4:00 p.m., New York time, clubs must provide the Management Council with written notice, signed by the individual club's owner, indicating the amount, if any, of the club's 2017 League Year Salary Cap Room to be credited to the club's 2018 Team Salary.

January 1: Clubs may begin signing free agent players for the 2018 season.

January 1: Option exercise period begins for Fifth-Year Option for First-Round Selections from the 2015 College Draft. To exercise the option, the club must give written notice to the player on or after January 1, 2018, but prior to May 3, 2018.

January 6-7: Wild Card Playoff Games.

January 13-14: Divisional Playoff Games.

January 20: East-West Shrine Game, Tropicana Field, St. Petersburg, Florida.

January 21: AFC and NFC Championship Games.

January 27: Senior Bowl, Ladd-Peebles Stadium, Mobile, Alabama.

January 28: NFL Pro Bowl, Camping World Stadium, Orlando, Florida.

February 4: Super Bowl LII, U.S. Bank Stadium, Minneapolis, Minnesota.

MEDIA INFORMATION

Members of the media are encouraged to carefully review the following procedures, reminded that these are subject to change.

PRACTICE ACCESS & PHOTOGRAPHY/VIDEOGRAPHY GUIDELINES: Accredited members of the media that regularly cover the NFL are welcome to attend the first 30 minutes, or until the “team” portion, of regular-season practices. Photography and videography is allowed, in general, during this window. The team reserves the right to limit photography to certain periods due to competitive-advantage reasons. During any practice open to the media, visiting media should stand at a safe distance and hold all belongings, including bags and video cameras. Tripods are not allowed on the field during practice, for safety reasons.

PRACTICE REPORTING POLICY: Blogging and tweeting from offseason, training camp and regular-season practices are permitted for practices that are open to the public. For all practices that are closed to the public, blogging and tweeting are permitted only within the designated viewing window. Consistent with Super Bowl reporting protocol for practices, the following are general reporting policies for all media, including blogging and tweeting:

- Media may note which players are practicing as well as those who are not.
- Media may report non-strategy and non-game plan observations (e.g. “Wide receiver made a nice catch on the sideline.”)
- Not permitted is any reference to plays run or game strategy. This includes describing formations, personnel groupings (i.e. composition of offensive line) or non-conventional (i.e. “trick”) plays.
- Not permitted is the reporting of which players are practicing with individual units (goal line offense, nickel/dime defense, etc.)
- Not permitted is the reporting of practice injuries until the team has provided an official update.
- Access to the head coach following practice will be provided for comments and injury updates.
- Not permitted is quoting, paraphrasing or reporting comments made by coaches, players or team personnel during a practice session.
- Not permitted are any photo/video transmissions after the designated shooting period has closed.
- Not permitted are wide-view photos/videos of formations and/or personnel groupings (shots must be tightly focused on the player/ball.)
- Not permitted is any audio of quarterback cadence, keywords, audibles, etc.
- All cell phones must be turned to “silent” or “vibrate” mode for practice and all post-practice press conferences.

CREDENTIAL REQUESTS: Credential requests will be honored only for working media on specific assignment for a recognized news or sports organization. Credentials will not be issued to freelance writers or photographers. All single-game requests must be received by 5 p.m. (PT) on the Monday prior to each Sunday home game. All full-season and single-game credential requests must be submitted by an editor or sports director to the media relations department.

PARKING: Every effort will be made to accommodate requests for parking passes, but due to limited space, parking cannot be provided for all credentialed media. Television trucks that provide satellite, uplink or microwave functions will need to make prior arrangements with Erin Exum (exum@raiders.com) of the Raiders’ media relations office.

MEDIA WILL CALL: The media will call booth is located in a kiosk at the base of the ramp between the Coliseum and Arena, adjacent to the “F” parking area, on the north side of the property. Each media member must pick up his/her own individual credential and present corresponding photo identification. Photographers and videographers can retrieve appropriate sideline vests at the booth. Media will call opens four hours prior to the scheduled kickoff.

MEDIA ENTRANCE: The media entrance is clearly marked and is located on the Plaza level. Media credentials will not be honored at any other gate. All media must check in at the media entrance before entering the O.co Coliseum. For security purposes, individuals and their belongings will be searched upon entry into the stadium.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Sideline access for NFL games is limited to photographers and videographers on assignment for recognized news or sports organizations. All field photographers must remain outside the bench areas and outside the yellow border (dots) surrounding the playing field. All media (photographers, videographers and sideline reporters) working on the field during the game must wear a vest that can be obtained at media will call. All vests must be returned at the field tunnel following the game. Credentials will not be provided to “grips” due to on-field space limitations. The photo work room is located on the first floor of the Coliseum, a short distance from the media meal room.

POOL REPORTER: As assigned by the Professional Football Writers of America (PFWA), the Oakland pool reporter for the 2017 season is Vic Tafur of the San Francisco Chronicle.

ON-FIELD POSTGAME INTERVIEWS: All Raiders players and coaches must report to the locker room prior to conducting interviews. Other than network contractual obligations, there are no interviews allowed on the field in the minutes immediately following a home or road game.

MEDIA INFORMATION

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS: The Raiders will open their locker room to media following the NFL's mandatory cooling-off period after each game. Head Coach Jack Del Rio will conduct his postgame news conference in the interview room adjacent to the Raiders locker room. Selected players may also be brought into the interview room following the game. The visiting team's head coach and selected players will be available in the interview room (Oakland A's weight room) located adjacent to the visitor's locker room.

INTERVIEW REQUESTS: The Raiders respectfully ask that all interview requests, for any member of the organization, be submitted through the team's media relations office. Players, coaches or staff should not be contacted by media directly by telephone, e-mail, or via social media, including Twitter.

GENERAL MANAGER REGGIE MCKENZIE INTERVIEWS: Media wishing to request interviews with the Raiders' general manager should contact Will Kiss (wkiss@raiders.com). Interviews are scheduled as time allows.

HEAD COACH JACK DEL RIO INTERVIEWS: Jack Del Rio is available after most practices, as well as after every game. He also will conduct a weekly press conference, usually on Mondays, during the regular season. Those requesting individual interviews should contact Will Kiss (wkiss@raiders.com).

ASSISTANT COACH INTERVIEWS: Assistant coaches are available by request, provided the request is made at least 24 hours in advance to Erin Exum (eexum@raiders.com). During a regular-season Sunday game week, coordinators are only available on Thursdays, while other assistants are only available Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays. Following games, head coach Jack Del Rio is the only coach available for comment.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS: Players are available after games and during practice weeks, and all one-on-one requests should be made through the media relations office. With respect to all players, the Raiders make players available to accredited media early in the week, and open up the locker room to media following practice on Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays.
