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ARIZONA CARDINALS VS. OAKLAND RAIDERS



University of Phoenix Stadium | August 12, 2017 | 7:00 PM

THIS WEEK'S PREVIEW

After kicking off the NFL preseason with a matchup against the Dallas Cowboys in the Hall of Fame Game in Canton, OH last week the Cardinals make their 2017 home debut when they host the Oakland Raiders at University of Phoenix Stadium on Saturday.

This week's game begins the Cardinals 12th season at University of Phoenix Stadium. Arizona has sold out all 114 games played (preseason and postseason included) in the first 11 seasons (2006-16) on their home field. A sellout of this week's game would run that total to 115.

Saturday's game marks the 16th all-time preseason matchup between the Cardinals and Raiders - and the fourth preseason meeting in the last six seasons. The game will occur one-year to the day that the Raiders last visited University of Phoenix Stadium.

In last week's Hall of Fame Game vs. Dallas, the Cardinals dropped a 20-18 decision after getting out to an early 15-0 lead following their first two possessions of the game. With few starters playing in the contest, QB Blaine Gabbert made his Arizona debut and completed 11-of-14 pass attempts for 185 yards while leading TD drives on his first two drives. The Cardinals' scoring drives were capped by a pair of rushing TDs by RBs Kerwynn Williams and Andre Ellington. Also standing out on offense were TE Ifeanyi Momah (3 receptions for 48 yards) and rookie RB T.J. Logan (4 rushes for 24 yards). Logan also made a splash on special teams, but suffered a wrist injury late in the game that is expected to keep him out for up to three months.

A pair of Cardinals 2017 draft picks (S Budda Baker and CB/S Rudy Ford) and a rookie free agent (S Ironhead Gallon) led the defensive effort. Ford (6th round pick) and Gallon (rookie free agent) tied for the team lead with nine tackles apiece. Baker (2nd round pick) registered six tackles, a QB hit and a pass defensed.

After Dallas took a 20-18 lead in the fourth quarter, Arizona had a chance to win the game late, but a 32-yard FG attempt missed wide left giving the Cowboys the victory.

Of the 60 Arizona players who appeared in last week's HOF game, 31 were making their Cardinals or NFL debut. Arizona's starters are expected to see their first action of the preseason vs. Oakland this week.

Coming of a 12-4 season in 2016 that saw the Raiders earn their first post-season appearance since 2002, Oakland opens their preseason with its visit to Arizona on Saturday.

Following this week's game vs. Oakland, the Cardinals finish their preseason home slate when the Chicago Bears visit next week. Arizona's final two preseason contests will be in Atlanta (Aug. 26) and Denver (Aug. 31).

THE HIGHLIGHTS

--After taking on the Cowboys in the Hall of Fame Game in Canton, OH last week, the Cardinals host the Oakland Raiders in Arizona's preseason home opener. Former Arizona QB **Kurt Warner** was inducted into the HOF on Saturday, becoming the 13th member of the organization enshrined in Canton.

--Making his Cardinals debut last week, QB **Blaine Gabbert** started the game and completed his first eight pass attempts. He played the entire first half, finishing 11-of-14 for 185 yards and led a pair of TD drives to open the game.

--This week's game features two of the NFL's active points leaders. Cardinals K **Phil Dawson** (1,698) ranks third on that list while Raiders K **Sebastian Janikowski** (1,799) ranks second behind Adam Vinatieri (2,378). Janikowski (414) and Dawson (404) rank 9th and 10th, respectively, on the NFL's all-time list for most career FGs made.

--Saturday's game features three defenders who finished in the top-10 in the NFL in sacks last season. Cardinals LB **Markus Golden** (12.5) tied for 3rd while LB **Chandler Jones** (11.0) and Raiders DE **Khalil Mack** (11.0) tied for 8th.

--Cards GM **Steve Keim** (2014) and Raiders GM **Reggie McKenzie** (2016) have won two of the last three Sporting News NFL Executive of the Year awards.

--During his time as head coach in Jacksonville (2003-11), current Raiders HC Jack Del Rio drafted both Cardinals QBs coach **Byron Leftwich** (2003) and QB **Blaine Gabbert** (2011) in the first round of the NFL Draft.

CARDS-RAIDERS CONNECTIONS

Raiders Connections

Cardinals QB **Carson Palmer** (2011-12), T **Jared Veldheer** (2010-13), C/G **Tony Bergstrom** (2012-15), S **Tyvon Branch** (2008-14) and WR **Jeremy Ross** (2015) played for the Raiders prior to joining the Cardinals. Palmer became just the second QB in team history to top 4,000 yards in a season when he threw for 4,018 yards in 2012. Veldheer (69th Overall) and Bergstrom (95th Overall) were third-round draft picks who played 53 games (48 starts) and 25 games (four starts), respectively, for the Silver and Black. Branch registered three-consecutive 100-tackle seasons (2009-11) and played 75 games (67 starts) for the Raiders.

Cardinals CBs coach **Kevin Ross** coached safeties for the Raiders from 2010-11, and Cardinals LBs coach **Bob Sanders** coached LBs in Oakland from 2013-14.

Cardinals K **Phil Dawson** (1998) and G **John Wetzel** (2013) originally entered the league as a rookie free agents with the Raiders.

Cardinals Connections

Raiders General Manager **Reggie McKenzie** played for the Cardinals from 1989-90, but was placed on injured reserve both seasons.

Raiders WRs coach **Rob Moore** played 77 games (73 starts) for the Cardinals from 1995-99, catching 322 passes for 5,110 yards and 27 TDs. Moore's 1,584 receiving yards in 1997 remain the second most in franchise history.

Cardinals G **Mike Iupati** attended Western (Anaheim, CA) High School.

Arizona Connections

Raiders assistant strength and conditioning coach **Darryl Eto** received his master's degree in exercise and sport science at the University of Arizona, and was the head strength and conditioning coach from 1991-97.

In 2009, Raiders WRs coach **Rob Moore** entered the coaching ranks as a WRs coach at Phoenix Junior College.

Family Connections

Cardinals Director, Football Operations **Matt Caracciolo** is the brother of **Pete Caracciolo**, who works in football operations and handles team travel/logistics for the Raiders.

College/Pro Connections

Cardinals Assistant Head Coach **Tom Moore** (1990-93) was the Assistant Head Coach/Offensive Coordinator for the Vikings while Raiders Head Coach **Jack Del Rio** (LB, 1992-95) and OL coach **Mike Tice** (TE, 1992-93, '95) played for Minnesota.

Cardinals QBs coach **Byron Leftwich** was selected seventh overall by the Jaguars in the 2003 NFL Draft, the first with **Del Rio** at the helm for Jacksonville.

During **Del Rio's** nine seasons (2003-11) with the Jaguars, Cardinals Vice President of Player Personnel **Terry McDonough** held various posts in Jacksonville's personnel department.

Cardinals QB **Blaine Gabbert** played for the Jags from 2011-13, while Raiders QBs coach **Jake Peetz** was on staff.

Raiders Assistant Head Coach – Defense **John Pagano** (1996-97 and 1998-2001) and Cardinals Head Coach **Bruce Arians** (1996 and 2012) and Assistant Head Coach/Senior Offensive Assistant **Tom Moore** (1997 and 1998-2010) coached together in New Orleans and Indianapolis. During the Colts 2012 season, Arians took over head coaching responsibilities from John's older brother, **Chuck**, while he battled leukemia.

Cardinals G **Mike Iupati** (2010-14) and S **Antoine Bethea** (2014-16) were teammates with Raiders WR **Michael Crabtree** (2009-14) in San Francisco,

Cardinals TE **Jermaine Gresham** (2010-14), QB **Carson Palmer** (2003-10) and DT **Frostee Rucker** (2006-11) and Raiders S **Reggie Nelson** (2010-15) and OL **Marshal Newhouse** (2014) were teammates in Cincinnati.

Cardinals G **Kaleb Johnson** (2015) and LB **Josh Byner** (2011-13) were teammates with Raiders T **Kelechi Osemele** (2012-15) in Baltimore.

Cardinals RB **Chris Johnson** and Raiders TE **Jared Cook** were teammates in Tennessee from 2009-2012.

Cardinals DT **Ed Stinson** and Raiders WR **Amari Cooper** were teammates at Alabama during the 2012-13 seasons, helping the Crimson Tide claim an SEC and National Championship in 2012.

Cardinals T **D.J. Humphries** and Raiders LB **Jelani Jenkins** were teammates with the Florida Gators team in 2012. Humphries then played with Raiders T **David Sharpe** during the 2014 season.

Cardinals S **Budda Baker** and Raiders WR **Jaydon Mickens** were teammates at Washington from 2014-15.

CARDS vs. RAIDERS - THE SERIES

This week's matchup between the Cardinals and Raiders marks the 16th time the two teams have met in the preseason. The preseason series between the Cards and Raiders dates back to 1976, a game that was played in Tempe, AZ while the Cards were still based in St. Louis. This week's game marks the ninth meeting between the teams dating back to 2004.

The Raiders hold an 8-7 advantage in the preseason series but the Cardinals have won five of the last seven meetings. Oakland's victory over Arizona last preseason snapped a Cardinals four-game win streak. Including regular season, this week's game marks the eighth meeting between the two teams in the last 10 seasons.

A two-time NFL Coach of the Year (2012, 2014), **Bruce Arians** is in his fifth season in Arizona and 25th season coaching in the NFL. Arians became an NFL head coach for the first time when the Cardinals hired him on January 17, 2013. Arizona has posted a 41-22-1 record under Arians during the regular season. Including his tenure as interim head coach with Indy in 2012, Arians has posted a 50-25-1 regular season record as head coach. Among active NFL head coaches, only Bill Belichick (46) and Pete Carroll (44) have more wins in his last 60 games.

Named the 19th head coach in franchise history on January 15, 2015, **Jack Del Rio** is in his third season with Oakland and his 12th as a head coach in the NFL. The Raiders have posted a 19-13 record in two seasons under Del Rio, including a 12-4 mark in 2016 when they posted their best record since 2000 (also 12-4) and earned their first postseason berth since 2002. Del Rio joined the team after spending three seasons (2012-14) as the defensive coordinator in Denver, which included a trip to Super Bowl XLVIII. Now in his 32nd season in the NFL (including 11 seasons as a player and 21 seasons as a coach), Del Rio served as head coach in Jacksonville for nine seasons (2003-11).

DECORATED DECISION MAKERS

Over the last three seasons, both Cardinals GM **Steve Keim** and Raiders GM **Reggie McKenzie** have been named Sporting News NFL Executive of the Year.

Keim was named Exec of the Year following the 2014 season, when the Cardinals tied a then-franchise record with 11 victories despite the team losing 21 different players to injury. McKenzie is the reigning Exec of the Year, receiving the award following a 2016 campaign in which the Raiders won 12 games and earned their first postseason berth since 2002.

NEW FACES IN 2017

Below is a breakdown of the new faces in Arizona this season:

- The Cards have added 14 veteran free agents, 7 draft picks and 16 rookie free agents this season. In all, 37 of the 90 players (41.1%) on the current roster were not with the Cardinals during the 2016 season.
- Of the 90 players on the Cardinals training camp roster, 46 appeared in at least one game for Arizona last season.

LOOKING FOR A CHANCE IN ARIZONA

An annual part of training camp and preseason is watching to see which undrafted free agents can overcome the odds and make the 53-man roster. The Cardinals have 16 rookie free agents in camp this year that are hoping to follow in the footsteps of players like WR **Jaron Brown**, now in his fifth NFL season. A total of 23 players who entered the NFL as rookie free agents appeared in at least one game for the Cardinals last season.

Some Notable Former Rookie Free Agents

WR Jaron Brown - Has played in 55 games (with 4 starts) in his first four seasons and has 55 receptions for 700 yards and five TDs. Also serves as one of the team's top special teams performers and has 19 career special teams tackles.

DT Josh Mauro - Has appeared in 34 games in three seasons with Arizona, registering 70 tackles, a sack, three passes defended, two forced fumble and a fumble recoveries. Established career highs in games played (15), starts (13) and tackles (42) with Arizona in 2016.

WR Brittan Golden - Now in his fourth season with Arizona, Golden has appeared in 26 games over the last two seasons and recorded 10 special teams tackles. He made his first career start in 2016 and hauled in his first career TD reception last year.

A CHANGE IN ROSTER CUTS

In the past, NFL teams had to trim their rosters from 90 to 75 players prior to the final preseason contest, with final cuts from 75 to 53 players coming in the days after the preseason finale.

In May, NFL owners voted to eliminate the first cut-down period. Now, there will be one cut down following the preseason, from a 90-man roster to a 53-man roster by September 2nd.

ARIZONA GOING INTERNATIONAL IN 2017

In Week 7 the Cardinals will face the Los Angeles Rams in London, England at Twickenham Stadium. It will mark Arizona's first game outside the United States since a 2005 matchup vs. the San Francisco 49ers in Mexico City.

After playing three games to sellout crowds in London each season since 2014, the NFL is expanding to four games in 2017. As such, the league will have played 21 games in the UK since the first regular-season game in London in 2007.



Cardinals History Playing Abroad

• **August 16, 1976 (Tokyo, Japan)** - In a preseason matchup, the Cardinals and Chargers square off in the first-ever NFL game held outside North America. Cardinals prevail 20-10 in front of a crowd of 38,000 fans at Korakuen Stadium.

• **August 6, 1983 (London, England)** - The 1983 preseason saw the first-ever NFL game in England as the Cardinals faced the Vikings in front of 32,847 fans at Wembley Stadium.

• **October 2, 2005 (Mexico City, Mexico)** - The Cardinals and 49ers square off in Mexico City in the first-ever NFL regular season game outside of the United States. Arizona defeated San Francisco 31-14 in front of an NFL-record crowd of 103,467 at Estadio Azteca.

Highlighted by their trip to London in Week 7, the Cardinals will be a well-traveled team in 2017. Arizona will join the Rams, Raiders, Dolphins and Chargers as the only teams that will "travel around the world" at least once this season. A trip around the globe is 25,000 miles.

The Cardinals will travel a total of 30,035 miles this season. Only the Rams (32,600) and Raiders (30,899) are scheduled to travel more miles that Arizona in 2017.

PRESEASON ON NBC 12 NEWS

Beginning with this week's preseason home opener vs. Oakland, all four of the Cardinals remaining preseason games can be seen locally on NBC 12 News (KPNX-TV).

The Cardinals regular radio team of Dave Pasch (play-by-play) and Ron Wolfley (analyst) will be joined by Cardinals reporter/producer Lisa Matthews (sideline reporter) to call the action. Paul Calvisi will join Wolfley and Matthews for the Denver broadcast on August 31.

All four games produced by the Cardinals will be preceded by a half-hour pregame show hosted by 12 News anchor Paul Gerke. Coverage of this week's game from University of Phoenix Stadium will begin with the pregame show at 6:30 p.m. with kickoff to follow at 7:00 p.m.

Cardinals President **Michael Bidwill** and GM **Steve Keim** will join the broadcast as guests during each of the two home games.

In addition, the pregame and game broadcasts will be shown in the Tucson market on KTTU/KMSB-TV (FOX 11) and in the Las Vegas market on KVVU-TV (FOX 5). All four Cardinals produced broadcasts will be replayed on Fox Sports Arizona during the week following each game.

WARNER ENSHRINED IN CANTON

On August 5, the Hall of Fame Class of 2017 - featuring former Cardinals QB **Kurt Warner** - was enshrined into Canton. Joining Warner in the 2017 class was K Morten Anderson, RB Terrell Davis, S Kenny Easley, DE Jason Taylor, RB LaDainian Tomlinson and Cowboys owner Jerry Jones.

Warner became the 13th member of the Cardinals organization enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame - and the second one in the last four years (Aeneas Williams, 2014). This is the HOF group that spent a significant portion of their NFL careers with the Cardinals.

Warner spent five seasons (2005-09) in Arizona, starting 57 of 61 games while leading the Cardinals to their first-ever Super Bowl appearance in Super Bowl XLIII following the 2008 season. He led Arizona to back-to-back NFC West titles in 2008-09 while re-writing the franchise record books in the process.

A two-time NFL MVP and Super Bowl XXXIV MVP, Warner played 12 seasons in the NFL with the Rams (1998-2003), Giants (2004) and Cardinals (2005-2009). He is one of just three QBs in NFL history (Peyton Manning and Craig Morton) to take two different teams to the Super Bowl. Warner was a four-time Pro Bowler (1999-01, '08) and two-time All-Pro (1999, '01).

HART WILL ENTER THE RING

Former Cards QB **Jim Hart** will be inducted into the franchise's Ring of Honor in a ceremony during half-time of the Cardinals-Rams game on December 3rd.

Hart signed with the Cardinals in 1966 as an undrafted rookie free agent out of Southern Illinois and went on to play 18 of his 19 NFL seasons with the team (1966-83). He played more seasons with the Cardinals (18) than any other player in franchise history, and only five players in NFL history have spent more seasons with one club: Jason Hanson (Lions, 21 seasons), Jackie Slater (Rams, 20 seasons), Darrell Green (Redskins, 20 seasons), Jim Marshall (Vikings, 19 seasons) and Bruce Matthews (Oilers/Titans, 19 seasons).



In Cardinals history, only kicker Jim Bakken (234) and wide receiver Larry Fitzgerald (202) have appeared in more games with the team than Hart (199).

The NFC Player of the Year in 1974, Hart owns the Cardinals record for career wins by a quarterback (87) and established franchise career records in pass attempts (5,069), completions (2,590), passing yards (34,639) and touchdown passes (209). He was selected to four consecutive Pro Bowls (1974-77), the most Pro Bowl selections by a quarterback in team history.

Under head coach Don Coryell, Hart led the Cardinals to three consecutive 10-win seasons (1974-76) and back-to-back division titles in 1974 and 1975. He engineered 10 game-winning drives during that three-year span as the team became known as the 'Cardiac Cards.'

Hart will become the 17th member of the Cardinals Ring of Honor, joining Kurt Warner as the only QBs in the group. The other 15 members are: Charles W. Bidwill, Sr. (Owner), Jimmy Conzelman (Coach), T Dan Dierdorf, HB John "Paddy" Driscoll, HB/DB Marshall Goldberg, WR Roy Green, CB Dick "Night Train" Lane, HB Ollie Matson, HB Ernie Nevers, S Pat Tillman, HB Charley Trippi, CB Roger Wehrli, CB Aeneas Williams, S Adrian Wilson and S Larry Wilson.

ELEVATING THE FRANCHISE

The 2017 season marks 11th since **Michael Bidwill** took over as team President in 2007. During the time, his leadership has transformed the franchise - both on and off the field.

The Cardinals on-field accomplishments during Bidwill's tenure include a four-season stretch that saw the team win more games (41) than in any other four-year span in the franchise's long history.

Highlights of Bidwill's tenure as team President

- The Cardinals have gone .500 or better in seven of 10 seasons (just twice in previous 20 years) and posted four double-digit win seasons (none in previous 20). The team has a 91-77-1 record in 10 seasons under Bidwill, including the postseason.

- Of the team's seven all-time postseason wins, five have come during Bidwill's 10 years as team president. Arizona has played in nine postseason contests since Bidwill took over in 2007. The Cardinals played just seven total playoff games in their entire history prior to his tenure.

- Arizona has appeared in the NFC Championship Game twice in Bidwill's time as president (2008, 2015), including a victory in the 2008 conference title game that led to the franchise's first-ever Super Bowl appearance (Super Bowl XLIII).

- The 2015 season was a banner year for the organization as the team won the NFC West, set a franchise record for wins in the regular season (13) and earned the first postseason bye in team history.

ELEVATING THE CARDINALS INTO PRIMETIME

The Cardinals success under Bidwill has greatly elevated the team's popularity both locally and nationally. Locally, the team established a host of franchise records for the TV broadcasts over the last three seasons. Nationally, the team's exposure is at an all-time high. The Cardinals have played in eight primetime games over the last two seasons, posting a 6-1-1 record in those contests. Arizona played an unprecedented five primetime games during the 2015 regular season and posted a perfect 5-0 record those matchups.

Bidwill also oversaw the team's appearance in the groundbreaking Amazon Original series *All or Nothing: A Season with the Arizona Cardinals*, which chronicled the 2015 Cardinals season. Produced by NFL Films, the eight-episode series was awarded the Sports Emmy for Outstanding Serialized Sports Documentary in May of 2017.



KEIM'S SUCCESSFUL RUN AS GM

Steve Keim was promoted to General Manager on January 8, 2013 after 14 seasons in the Cardinals organization. In four seasons since his promotion, the Cardinals have posted a 41-22-1 record and Keim has developed into one of the league's most highly respected GMs.

Named the 2014 Sporting News NFL Executive of the Year in a vote of NFL coaches and team executives, Keim also earned back-to-back NFL Executive of the Year honors from the editors of Pro Football Talk (2013-14).

The teams put together by Keim during his time as GM have been some of the most successful in franchise history. In 2014 the team tied the franchise record for wins in a season (11) before setting a new mark in 2015 when the Cardinals won 13 games and earned its first-ever postseason bye.

DEALING WITH CHANGES

When he took over as GM in 2013, Keim inherited a team that won five games the previous year and put together a roster that doubled that win total (10-6) in his inaugural season, equalling the best single-season turnaround in franchise history in a 16-game season.

Keim has worked tirelessly to build the Cardinals roster, most notably when the team has been hit hard by injuries. During his first four seasons as GM, Arizona made 819 total roster moves. That total includes a high of 227 in 2016 as the team had 32 different players combine to miss 157 games due to injury, including seven Week 1 starters who landed on IR.

PUTTING TOGETHER AN ACCOMPLISHED ROSTER

- The rosters Keim put together over the last four years produced one of the NFL's top-10 defenses three times and one of the top-10 offenses twice. Arizona and New England are the only two teams in the NFL that have finished the past two seasons (2015-16) with both a top-10 offense and top-10 defense.

- During Keim's tenure, Arizona has established franchise records for wins in a season (13 in 2015), points in a season (489 in 2015), led the NFL in total offense for the first time in team history (#1 in 2015) and led the NFL in sacks for the second time ever (48.0 in 2016).

BIDWILL'S HOME RUN HIRES

In a nine-day span in January of 2013, Cardinals President **Michael Bidwill** hired GM **Steve Keim** (Jan. 8) and head coach **Bruce Arians** (Jan. 17). In the resulting four seasons, the Cardinals won more games (41) than any other four-year span in franchise history.



Keim was one of seven GMs hired in 2013 and is one of just three who still holds his position.

•His 41 wins are more than any head coach in Cardinals history through any four-year span and only four teams – New England (50), Denver (46), Seattle (45) and Kansas City (43) – have more wins than Arizona since 2013.

•In 2014, became just the second coach in franchise history (Don Coryell, 1974) to be named the *Associated Press* Coach of the Year.

•In 2015, Arians led the Cards to their first division title since 2009, their first-ever postseason bye and their second-ever appearance in the NFC Championship Game.

•Under Arians, the Cardinals tied the then-franchise record with 11 wins in 2014 before establishing a new franchise record for wins (13) in 2015.

•In 2015, the Cardinals established a new franchise single-season record with seven road wins. In 2014, Arizona finished the regular season with a 7-1 record at home, the most home wins for the franchise in a season since 1925 (11).

•In the last two seasons the Cardinals have posted the #1 (489 in 2015) and #4 (418 in 2016) single-season point totals in franchise history.

•In 2015, the Cardinals posted the #1 offense in the NFL for the first time in franchise history. Arizona has ranked in the top-10 in both offense and defense in each of the last two seasons.

TWO-TIME COACH OF THE YEAR

Bruce Arians was named the *Associated Press* 2014 NFL Coach of the Year after leading the Cardinals to an 11-5 record and a postseason berth.

It marked the second time in three years Arians was awarded NFL Coach of the Year honors (Indianapolis, 2012). He became the first coach in NFL history to be named Coach of the Year multiple times in a three-year span with multiple teams.

Arians is one of 12 coaches in NFL history to win the award multiple times and the sixth to be honored with multiple teams. He is also one of just six coaches in NFL history to earn AP Coach of the Year honors twice in a three-year span.

In 2012, Arians was named NFL Coach of the Year after serving 12 games as the Colts interim head coach while Chuck Pagano was treated for leukemia. He led the Colts to a 9-3 record and a playoff berth while tying the NFL record for the most wins ever by an interim coach.

NFC coaches, including four straight by Arians and Panthers Ron Rivera (2012-15), have combined to win the last six AP Coach of the Year awards.

HELPING IN HIS HOMETOWN

At a news conference in June of 2017 in his home town of York, PA, **Bruce Arians** pledged \$100,000 toward a \$3 million goal to establish the York City Park Conservancy.

The group, for which Arians will serve as the honorary chair, is tasked with overseeing the preservation of the city's 25 green spaces and parks. That includes Memorial Park, where Arians spent time as a child.

"I know for a fact I wouldn't be here today if it wasn't for (Memorial) Park," Arians said during his speech to announce the initiative. "It's a pleasure to be a part of this initiative. We're going to try to raise as much money and blow that \$3 million (goal) away."



A STELLAR FIRST TWO SEASONS

Now in his sixth NFL season and fifth with the Cardinals, **James Bettcher** is entering his third year as defensive coordinator.

Bettcher's first two seasons as the Cardinals defensive coordinator saw the team become of the NFL's top-ranked units.

The Cardinals featured the NFL's #2 ranked defense in 2016 after having the #5 ranked defense in Bettcher's first season as defensive coordinator in 2015. It is the first time in team history the Cardinals have gone consecutive seasons with one of the league's top-five defenses. The #2 ranking in 2016 is the top defensive ranking in franchise history.



In 2016 the Cardinals finished the season with an NFL-high 48 sacks. It marked just the second time in franchise history (59.0 in 1983) the Cardinals led the NFL in sacks. Arizona also led the NFL with 105 tackles for loss in '16.

BETTCHERS TO THE RESCUE

Along with wife, **Erica**, Cards defensive coordinator **James Bettcher** received the City of Chandler's Life Saver Award earlier this year after helping free a boy trapped under a vehicle in February.

Tauren Meadows, Jr. was riding his bike to school when he was struck and run over by a car, becoming trapped beneath the vehicle. Needing immediate attention, the Meadows received aid from the Bettchers and another bystander. While James and the bystander used a carjack to free the boy, Erica remained by his side, keeping him calm throughout the rescue.



"We really had a great 911 operator that directed us, everything to do and things to check on the young man," James Bettcher said after receiving the honor. "Our first responders, our medical service personnel, our firefighters – those men and women behind the scenes who run two things on a daily basis: to keep us safe and to protect us. That's really, for me, that's what it all represented, and for me, that's what it's really about."

EXPERIENCED MENTORS

The Cardinals have two assistant coaches - Assistant Head Coach/Offense **Tom Moore** and Pass Rush Specialist **Tom Pratt** - who are both entering their 39th season as NFL assistants in 2017. The duo has more experience among active NFL assistants than any other coach in the NFL outside of Tennessee's Dick LeBeau (45th season).

Moore (whose first season as an NFL assistant came in 1977 with the Steelers) has mentored 26 different Pro Bowlers and 10 players who went on to earn a spot in the Pro Football Hall of Fame. The only active NFL coach to have coached in Super Bowl I, Pratt also owns the distinction of being the only coach in the league to coach in the NFL in six different decades - the '60s, '70s, '80s, '90s, '00s, and '10s.



105TH SEASON BETWEEN THEM

Combined with their experience coaching in college and in other professional leagues, Moore enters his 53rd year coaching in 2017 and Pratt enters his 52nd.

AZ ONE OF THE BEST UNDER GOODY

When **Harold Goodwin** was named the Cardinals offensive coordinator in 2013, he was handed the reins of an offense that - in 2012 - finished the year as the league's 32nd ranked unit. Things changed quickly under his watch.

In 2015 - his third at the helm of the offense - the Cardinals had the top ranked offense in the NFL for the first time in franchise history. The team also set team single-season records for points (489), TDs (59), TD passes (35), total net yards (6,533), first downs (373) and first downs passing (237).

The Cardinals followed that up by posting the league's #9 ranked offense in 2016. Dating back to the 1970 NFL-AFL merger, it marks just the fourth time in franchise history - and first time since 1987-88 - that the Cardinals of- fense ranked in the top-10 in consecutive seasons.



Offensive Highlights Under Goodwin

- No team in the NFL has scored more TDs over the last two seasons than the Cardinals (109).
- Arizona has ranked in the top-10 in total offense each of the last two seasons (#1 in 2015; #9 in 2016).
- The Cardinals have also ranked in the top-10 in scoring differential in each of the last two years (+176, 2nd in 2015; +56, 7th in 2016).
- Arizona has posted two of the top five single-season point totals in franchise history in the last two seasons (489, #1 in 2015; 418, #4 in 2016).
- The Cardinals have scored 40+ points in a game and NFL-high seven times over the last two seasons. That is as many games as the team scored 40+ points in the previous 19 seasons combined.

GOODWIN MAKES IT 11 IN A ROW WITH ARIANS

Goodwin was named Cardinals offensive coordinator on 1/21/13 after working as the Indianapolis Colts offensive line coach in 2012. Cards head coach Bruce Arians was the Colts offensive coordinator/interim head coach that year.

The 2017 season will be the 11th consecutive year Goodwin has worked under Arians after previous assignments with Pittsburgh (2007-11) and Indianapolis (2012).

MINOR SHAKEUP ON STAFF

The Cardinals coaching staff features a few new faces in 2017 - and a few familiar faces in new positions.

Former NFL QB **Byron Leftwich**, an intern with the Cardinals last season, takes over as QBs coach. **Freddie Kitchens**, the team's QBs coach the last four seasons, will coach RBs. An offensive assistant the last four seasons, **Kevin Garver** was promoted to Assistant WRs coach.

Former Pro Bowl RB **Terry Allen** joins the staff through the Bill Bidwill Fellowship.

TOP-10 OFFENSE & TOP-10 DEFENSE

The Cardinals finished the 2016 season with the NFL's #2 ranked defense and #9 ranked offense. Arizona and New England are the only two teams in the NFL that finished the past two seasons (2015-16) with both a top-10 offense and top-10 defense.

Arizona allowed an average of 305.2 yards per game on defense in 2016, giving them the NFL's #2 overall ranked unit. It marks the second consecutive season the Cardinals have finished in the top-5 in total defense (both seasons under **James Bettcher**) and the third time in the four seasons under Arians that Arizona featured a top-10 defense (2013-6th).

Prior to the 2016 season the Cardinals defense had never finished higher than #3 overall (1994), dating back to the 1970 NFL-AFL merger.

In fact, Fitzgerald's career numbers already surpass those of many receivers that are currently in the HOF. He has more career receptions than 24 of the 25 receivers in the HOF: Swann (336), Hayes (371), Pihos (373), Lavelli (386), Hirsch (387), Fears (400), Warfield (427), McDonald (495), Mitchell (521), Stallworth (537), Alworth (542), Biletnikoff (589), Berry (631), Maynard (633), Taylor (649), Irvin (750), Joiner (750), Lofton (764), Largent (819), Monk (940), Reed (951), Brown (1,094), Carter (1,101) and Harrison (1,102).

He has more career receiving yards than 22 of the 25 receivers in the HOF: Fears (5,397), Swann (5,462), Pihos (5,619), Lavelli (6,488), Hirsch (7,029), Hayes (7,414), Mitchell (7,954), McDonald (8,410), Warfield (8,565), Stallworth (8,723), Biletnikoff (8,974), Taylor (9,110), Berry (9,275), Alworth (10,266), Maynard (11,834), Irvin (11,904), Joiner (12,146), Monk (12,721), Largent (13,089), Reed (13,198), Carter (13,899) and Lofton (14,004).

A Career Full of Accomplishments:

- Franchise career leader in receptions (1,125), receiving yards (14,389), receiving TDs (104), total TDs (104) and 100-yard receiving games (42). His eight 1,000-yard seasons are also a franchise record.
- Led the NFL with 107 receptions in 2016, marking the second time in his career (103 in 2005; tied with Steve Smith) he had done so. He became the first player in NFL history to lead the NFL in receptions at least 11 years apart. Prior to Fitzgerald, the longest span between leading the league in receptions was six by Jerry Rice (1990, 1996).
- Fitzgerald (10) joins Hall of Famer Jerry Rice (13) as the only wide receivers in NFL history to be named to the Pro Bowl at least 10 times.
- Fitzgerald had more receptions in his first 200 career games (1,116) than any player in NFL history.
- One of just five players in NFL history to record at least 1,400 receiving yards in a season four times in their career: Jerry Rice (6), Randy Moss (4), Marvin Harrison (4) and Andre Johnson (4).
- At 28 years, 74 days old, he became the third-youngest player in NFL history to reach 70 career receiving TDs behind only Randy Moss (26 years, 269 days old) and Hall of Famer Jerry Rice (28 years, one day old).
- At 32 years, 97 days old, he became the youngest player in NFL history to reach 1,000 career receptions.
- At 31 years, 102 days old, he became the youngest player in NFL history to reach 900 career receptions.
- At 30 years, 57 days old, he became the youngest player in NFL history to reach 800 career receptions.
- At 30 years, 85 days old, he became the youngest player in NFL history to reach 11,000 receiving yards.
- In 2010, he became the first player in NFL history to record 90+ receptions five times in their first seven seasons.
- During the 2008 postseason, he broke virtually every major playoff receiving record, establishing new single-season marks for receptions (30), receiving yards (546) and TDs (7). His four 100-yard receiving games in the postseason established a new NFL record for consecutive games with 100 yards receiving.
- His 10 TD receptions in nine career postseason games are an NFL record for a player in their first nine career playoff contests.
- With a then franchise-record 103 receptions during the 2005 season, he became the youngest player in NFL history to record a 100-catch campaign when he reached the mark at 22 years, 123 days old.
- Led the NFL in receiving TDs in both the 2008 (12) and 2009 (13) seasons. In addition to his 10 receiving TDs in 2007, he became the first player in franchise history to record at least 10 TDs in three consecutive seasons.
- At 29 years, 44 days old, joined Randy Moss (28 years, 314 days) as the only players in NFL history to reach 10,000 career receiving yards before the age of 30.
- One of just seven players in NFL history to record 14,000+ receiving yards and 100+ TD receptions in their career.

FITZ LEADS AT 33

WR **Larry Fitzgerald** recorded an NFL-high 107 receptions in 2016. It marked the second time in his career (tied Steve Smith for the NFL lead with 103 receptions in 2005) that Fitzgerald led the NFL in receptions.

He became the first player in NFL history to lead the league in receptions at least 11 years apart. Prior to Fitzgerald, the longest span between leading the league in receptions was six by Jerry Rice (1990, 1996).

It marked the fifth time in franchise history a Cardinals player led the NFL in receptions. Fitzgerald is the only player in team history to have done so multiple times. J.T. Smith (91 in 1987), Bobby Joe Conrad (73 in 1963) and Gaynell Tinsley (41 in 1938) also led the NFL in catches.

At 33 years, 123 days old, Fitzgerald became the oldest player to lead the NFL in receptions since Jerry Rice, who was 34 years, 71 days old at the end of the 1996 season when he led NFL with 108 catches. The only other player older than Rice to lead the NFL was Kansas City's MacArthur Lane, who had 66 receptions in 1976 and was 34 years, 271 days at the end of that season.

Fitzgerald has posted the top two single-season reception totals in team history in the last two seasons.

FITZGERALD SURPASSES 200

In last season's Week 15 game vs. New Orleans - 12 years, 3 months and 6 days after appearing in his first-ever regular season game - WR **Larry Fitzgerald** played in his 200th regular season game.

Fitzgerald became just the second player to appear in at least 200 games with the Cardinals - and first non-kicker to do so. Fitzgerald played in his 202nd game in Los Angeles in the season finale.

MAN OF THE YEAR

Fitzgerald has become known as much for his work off the field as his performance on it. That culminated with him and Giants QB Eli Manning being named co-winners of the 2016 "Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year."



The "Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year" is the only league award that recognizes a player's off-the-field community service as well as his playing excellence. Fitzgerald, Manning and Carolina Panthers tight end Greg Olsen were the three finalists for the award.

In June of 2017, the Professional Football Writers of America named Fitzgerald the recipient of the organization's annual Good Guy Award, which recognizes an NFL player "for his qualities and professional style in helping pro football writers do their jobs."

A STREAK FOR THE AGES

WR **Larry Fitzgerald** had at least three receptions in all 16 games in 2016. He now has at least one catch in 195 consecutive games. In addition to representing a franchise record, that also represents the third-longest streak in NFL history.

JOHNSON'S HISTORIC RUN

RB **David Johnson** posted 100+ scrimmage yards in each of the first 15 games in 2016. In doing so, he joined Barry Sanders (1997) as the only players in NFL history to have 100+ scrimmage yards in at least 15 consecutive games in a single season.

Johnson became the first player in NFL history to do so in each of the first 15 games of a season.

Johnson's 15 consecutive games with 100+ yards from scrimmage is tied with Sanders for the third-longest streak in NFL history overall.

Johnson became just the seventh player since the 1970 merger to lead the NFL in both scrimmage yards and TDs in a season: Arian Foster (2010), Priest Holmes (2002), Emmitt Smith (1995), Marcus Allen (1982), Walter Payton (1977) and O.J. Simpson (1975).

Johnson became just the fourth different player in NFL history with at least 1,200 rushing yards and 800 receiving yards in the same season, joining Pro Football Hall of Famer Marshall Faulk (1998-2000), Le'Veon Bell (2014) and Steven Jackson (2006).

Johnson (2,118 yards; 20 TDs) is the first NFL player since LaDainian Tomlinson in 2006 to put up 2,000+ scrimmage yards and 20+ TDs in a season.

THROUGH 21 CAREER STARTS

Johnson made 21 starts during his first two NFL seasons. He posted 100+ yards from scrimmage in 19 of those contests. The only exceptions were the 2015 and 2016 regular season finales. He had 44 yards in the first quarter in the '16 finale before a knee injury forced him out of the game.

RB **David Johnson** led the NFL with 20 total TDs (16 rushing; 4 receiving) in 2016, becoming the fifth player in franchise history to lead the NFL in TDs and the first since MacArthur Lane (13 in 1970). Sonny Randle (15 in 1960), Bob Shaw (12 in 1950) and Mal Kutner (15 in 1948) also led the NFL in TDs.

STRONG UP FRONT

Arizona's Week 1 starting front five missed a combined 24 games due to injury throughout the 2016 season. However, the group was still able to help RB David Johnson earn All-Pro honors after compiling a franchise-record 16 rushing TDs and 1,239 rushing yards, the first 1,000-yard campaign by a Cardinal since Beanie Wells in 2011.

Arizona's 20 rushing TDs as a team were most since moving to Arizona, while the unit's 5,868 total net yards and 418 points ranked third and fourth, respectively, in team history.

Including postseason, the Cardinals four returning starters on the O-line have combined for 298 games of NFL experience – T **D.J. Humphries** (13), C **A.Q. Shipley** (76), G **Mike Iupati** (113) and T **Jared Veldheer** (96).

Arizona's offensive line will have a different look in 2017. Veldheer, the team's starting left tackle the past three seasons, is moving to right tackle. A 2015 first round pick, third-year lineman D.J. Humphries will take over at left tackle after starting most of last season at RT. His final three starts last season came on the left side after Veldheer was lost for the season due to injury.

Shipley is expected to remain in the starting role at center. At the guard, four-time Pro Bowler Mike Iupati will return on the left side. Second-year lineman **Evan Boehm**, drafted in the fourth round by Arizona in 2016, entered training camp starting on the right side.



DOUBLE-THREAT IN THE BACKFIELD

In addition to his rushing totals, RB **David Johnson** had 80 receptions for 879 yards and four TDs through the air in 2016. Johnson's 879 receiving yards rank as the second-highest season total in team history for a RB.

In 2015, Johnson led Arizona with 814 rushing yards on 196 carries, and his four 100-yard rushing games were the most by a Cardinal in a single season since Stump Mitchell also had four in 1985.

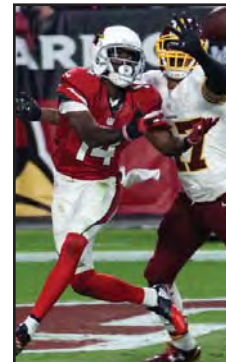

NELSON FLIPS A SWITCH IN 2016

In his first 16 career NFL games (11 in 2015; 1st 5 in 2016), WR **J.J. Nelson** had accumulated 15 receptions for 350 yards and two TDs. Then, in the Cardinals Week 7 matchup at Carolina last season, he began a 10-game stretch in which he became one of Arizona's top offensive threats.



Over the final 10 games in 2016, Nelson hauled in 30 receptions for 517 yards and six TDs while adding two rushes for 60 yards and a TD.

SEVEN TDs IN THE LAST NINE GAMES FOR NELSON

All seven of Nelson's TDs in 2016 (6 receiving, 1 rushing) came in the final nine games. Nelson had more than three times as many TDs in his last nine games (7) than he had in his previous 17 career games (2).

NELSON'S HISTORIC GAME VS. THE DOLPHINS

Nelson had a 56-yard TD run in the first quarter and an eight-yard TD reception in the fourth quarter against the Dolphins in Week 14 of the 2016 season.

The TD run was the first of his career and it tied Bobby Joe Conrad (56-yarder on 9/27/59 vs. Washington) for the longest TD run in franchise history by a wide receiver. Nelson became the first Cardinals WR since Mal Kutner (10/24/48 vs. Boston) to post a rushing TD and receiving TD in the same game.

BIG PLAY J.J.

The fastest player at the 2015 NFL Combine (4.28 40-yard dash), Nelson showed off big-play ability during his first two NFL seasons. His 45 career receptions have gone for 867 yards, an average of 19.3 yards per catch.

His 19.3 yards per reception is the best average in the NFL over the last two seasons (min. 40 receptions). In fact, it is over a full yard better than the next player.

LOOKING TO BOUNCE BACK

WR **John Brown**'s first two seasons with the Cardinals (2014-15) compared to some of the best WRs in the franchise's long history. But an injury and illness plagued 2016 campaign - concussion, sickle cell trait diagnosis, discovery of a cyst on his spine - has him looking to bounce back and return to his form as one of the team's top offensive threats.

In 31 games over his first two years, he registered 113 receptions for 1,699 yards and 12 TDs. In franchise history, only three players had more receptions than Brown in their first two seasons (Larry Fitzgerald-161, Anquan Boldin-157, Frank Sanders-121).

Only two players (Fitzgerald-18 and Sonny Randle-16) had more TD receptions in their first two seasons than Brown (12).

Brown entered the league with a record-breaking season as a rookie in 2014, setting an NFL rookie record with four game-winning TD receptions. In 2015, despite being hampered by a hamstring injury, he totaled 65 receptions for 1,003 yards and seven TDs.

A PRO BOWL TALENT

CB **Patrick Peterson** earned his sixth Pro Bowl selection – fifth at cornerback (Kick Returner, 2011; Cornerback, 2012-16) – last season. In 2015, he was also named first-team All-Pro at corner for the second time in his career (2013, '15).

Peterson joins RBs Jim Brown, Barry Sanders and Emmitt Smith as the only players in NFL history to be chosen to six Pro Bowls before their 27th birthday. He is the only defensive player in NFL history to earn that distinction.

The Cardinals selected CB **Patrick Peterson** with the fifth overall pick in the 2011 NFL Draft, and in his first six NFL seasons, he earned six Pro Bowl selections and was named first-team All-Pro three times. He has proven to be one of the most unique talents in NFL history. A record-breaking punt returner, Peterson’s most important role has been as a shutdown CB.

Peterson has started all 96 games at CB in his NFL career. Despite opposing QBs avoiding his side of the field, Peterson has registered 20 INTs since 2011, tied for third in the NFL during that span among active players.

PETERSON SEALS IT WITH 20TH CAREER INTERCEPTION

Peterson sealed Arizona’s Week 13 win over Washington last year with his 20th career INT. With the Cardinals clinging to an eight-point lead, and the Redskins at the AZ 28-yard line with 48 seconds remaining, Peterson made a diving INT on a Kirk Cousins pass attempt and ended Washington’s comeback attempt. *Only 10 players in franchise history have more career INTs than Peterson.*

A HEALTHY MATHIEU RETURNS

The Cardinals third-round pick (69th overall) in the 2013 NFL Draft, S **Tyrann Mathieu** has developed into one of the NFL’s top defenders. He has appeared in 50 games (41 starts) in his first four NFL seasons, totaling 227 tackles, three sacks, nine INTs (1 returned for TD), 39 passes defended, a fumble recovery and three forced fumbles in his career.



Mathieu’s best season came in 2015, when he was named first-team All-Pro at safety and was selected to his first Pro Bowl after registering 89 tackles, a sack, five INTs (one returned for TD), 16 passes defended and a forced fumble in 14 games.

The only thing that has slowed Mathieu - who signed a contract extension in 2016 that will keep him in Arizona through the 2021 season - has been injuries. Three of his four NFL seasons have ended early due to knee and shoulder injuries. In 2016 Mathieu started all 10 games he appeared in before a shoulder injury ended his season.

HIGHLY DECORATED

- Named to his first career Pro Bowl and was named first-team All-Pro by the Associated Press in 2015.
- As a rookie in 2013, earned first-team All-Pro honors from ProFootballFocus.com as a slot CB and was named to the All-Rookie team by the Professional Football Writers of America (PFWA).
- Named NFL Defensive Rookie of the Month (October of '13), NFC Defensive Player of the Month (November of '15) and NFC Defensive Player of the Week (Week 3 of '15) in his career.
- Joins Kwamie Lassiter (November of 2001) as the only players in franchise history to be named Defensive Player of the Month.

SHINING IN PRIMETIME

Mathieu has been at his best while starting all nine of the Cardinals primetime games over the last two seasons. In those nine contests he recorded 53 tackles, six tackles for loss, a sack, three INTs and 10 passes defended.

TOPS IN STOPS

During the 2017 offseason, Arizona signed veteran S **Antoine Bethea**, who spent the previous 11 years with San Francisco (2014-16) and Indianapolis (2006-2013).

In 162 career games (all starts), Bethea has totaled 1,044 tackles according to Stats INC., which leads all active DBs and ranks fifth overall.

In addition to a nose for the ball-carrier, Bethea also has a knack for taking the ball away from opposing offenses. Entering his 12th NFL season, Bethea is tied with Devin McCourty, Joe Haden and Dansby for 16th among active players in career INTs (19). Current teammate CB **Patrick Peterson** stands 15th with 20 career picks. In addition to his INT totals, Bethea has also recorded seven forced fumbles and five fumble recoveries in his career.

A CONSISTENT PRESENCE

Bethea has started all 162 regular season games he has appeared in during his career, and started all 16 games in a season eight times in the past nine years. Including postseason, Bethea has started all 175 games played in 11 NFL seasons.

THE DYNAMIC LINEBACKER DUO

In 2016, the Cardinals offseason trade for **Chandler Jones** and the emergence of 2015 second round draft pick **Markus Golden** resulted in a linebacker duo that wreaked havoc on opposing offenses - and QBs.

Golden (12.5) and Jones (11.0) both reached double-digit sacks in 2016, marking just the third time in franchise history that Arizona had multiple players record double-digit sacks in a season. In 1983, the Cardinals had three players (Curtis Greer, Al Baker and David Galloway) with 10.0 or more sacks. In 1984, two players (Greer and Baker) had 10.0 or more.

Arizona and Seattle (Cliff Avril-11.5; Frank Clark-10.0) were the only teams in the NFL this season that had multiple players with 10.0+ sacks.

Both linebackers earned a spot on the franchise single-season sacks list and it also resulted in the Cardinals leading the NFL in sacks (48) for just the second time in franchise history (59 in 1983).

DANSBY RETURNS TO THE RED SEA

When the Cardinals signed LB **Karlos Dansby**, their 2004 second-round draft pick (33rd overall), to a one-year deal on March 10, he became the first player in franchise history to have three separate stints with the team - 2004-09 and 2013 before returning in 2017.

In seven seasons as a Cardinal, Dansby has totaled 758 tackles, 32.0 sacks, 14 INTs (four returned for TDs), 13 forced fumbles and 10 fumble recoveries in 106 games (99 starts). In six career playoff games with Arizona, he added 51 tackles, an INT, five passes defended, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery.

According to Stats, INC., no active NFL player has more tackles than Dansby, who has totaled 1,317 in 196 games (178 starts) throughout his 13-year career.

GOLDEN'S BREAKOUT SEASON

Second-year LB **Markus Golden** recorded a career-high 2.5 sacks in the 2016 season finale against the Rams to cap off a breakout campaign that ended with a team-high 12.5 sacks.

His 12.5 sacks were the highest total in franchise history for a linebacker and tied for third in the NFL in 2016.

Golden totaled 63 tackles and led the team in sacks (12.5) and tackles for loss (16) while adding 23 QB hits, 19 QB pressures, four forced fumbles, a fumble recovery and two passes defended this season.

A RED HOT START - AND WHITE HOT FINISH

Golden put up two of the longest sack streaks in franchise history in 2016, include the longest streak in team history to open the 2016 campaign. Golden had at least one sack in each of the first five games in 2016. That represents the longest streak in franchise history to begin a season and it tied the second-longest streak in franchise history overall.

Golden followed that up with another streak to end the year, recording at least one sack in each of the final four games. Golden totaled 6.5 sacks over the final six games, including 5.5 sacks in the last three.

JONES THRIVES IN DESERT DEBUT

When the Cardinals completed a trade with the Patriots to acquire Pro Bowl LB **Chandler Jones** in March of 2016, they acquired one of the NFL's premier pass rushers. Jones more than lived up to his billing and was rewarded with a five-year contract with the team in March of 2017.

Jones totaled 57 tackles, 15 tackles for loss, 11.0 sacks, four forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, 14 QB pressures and 22 QB hits during his first season with the Cardinals in 2016.

AMONG THE NFL SACK LEADERS

With 11.0 sacks in 2016, Jones has now recorded double-digit sacks in three of his five NFL seasons - including in each of his last two seasons. Since 2015, when he established a career-high with 12.5 sacks, Jones ranks third in the NFL with 23.5 sacks.

THE FOOT OF PHIL

The Cardinals signed K **Phil Dawson** to a two-year contract during the 2017 offseason, and the 18-year NFL veteran brings 404 career made field goals and 1,698 career points with him to Arizona. Before joining the Cardinals, Dawson spent 14 years (1999-2012) with the Browns and four years (2013-16) with the 49ers.

Only two active NFL players – Adam Vinatieri (Ind) and Sebastian Janikowski (Oak) – have made more field goals and scored more points than Dawson, who ranks 10th and 15th, respectively, in each category in league history.

THE LONG BALL

In Dawson's first 12 NFL seasons, he had just 10 FGs of 50 or more yards. However, in his last six years (since turning 36), he has made 28 FGs from 50+, which ties Ravens K Justin Tucker for the most since 2011. During his four years with San Francisco, Dawson connected on a franchise record 14 field goals from 50+ yards, and he now ranks sixth in NFL history with 38 successful tries from 50+.

ONE OF THE BEST IN THE GAME

The Cardinals sixth-round selection (177th overall) in the 2012 NFL Draft, CB **Justin Bethel** was named to the Pro Bowl as a special teamer for three consecutive seasons (2013-15).

Now in his sixth NFL season (and a Pro Bowl alternate in 2016), Bethel has registered 80 special teams tackles, three blocked FGs and a blocked PAT on special teams.

He has led the Cardinals in special teams tackles each of the last four seasons.

With Arizona holding a 14-10 lead, Cowboys K Dan Bailey lined up for a 35-yard FG attempt with just three seconds remaining in the first half. Bethel came around the end and blocked the kick, preserving the Cards four-point lead.

Just like the attempt in Dallas, Houston was attempting a FG on the final play of the first half. With the Texans leading 17-14, Randy Bullock lined up for a 40-yard attempt with four seconds remaining in the second quarter. Bethel came off the edge to blocked the attempt, and Arizona would come back to win the game by three points (27-24).

9/15/13 vs. Detroit

The Cardinals trailed the Lions 21-19 early in the fourth quarter when Bethel blocked a 47-yard FG attempt by Detroit's David Akers. Two possessions later, Arizona scored the go-ahead TD in the 25-19 win.

Bethel Scores Without Offense

Bethel scored the third TD of his career in 2016, returning his second INT for a TD in as many seasons when he stepped in front of a pass in the Cardinals season finale at the Rams and returned it 66 yards for a TD.

Quarterbacks

QB Blaine Gabbert – Spent the first six years of his NFL career with the Jacksonville Jaguars (2011-13) and San Francisco 49ers (2014-16), totaling 7,351 yards and 38 TDs on 686-of-1,226 passing in 43 games (40 starts). Completed 11 of 14 passes for 185 yards and a 118.8 passer rating in the first half of the Hall of Fame Game vs. Dallas.

QB Trevor Knight – Saw action in 11 games at Texas A&M and 24 at Oklahoma, throwing for 5,856 yards and 44 TDs during his college career. Had a career game against Alabama as a redshirt freshman in the 2014 Sugar Bowl when he completed 32 of 44 passes for 348 yards and four TDs.

QB Carson Palmer – In four seasons (2013-16) with the Cardinals, has posted a .669 winning percentage (35-17-1). Only three NFL QBs – Tom Brady (.783), Russell Wilson (.711) and Alex Smith (.672) – have a better winning percentage in that span.

QB Drew Stanton – Improved to 8-5 as a starting QB in the NFL when he started for the injured Carson Palmer (concussion) in Week 5 of 2016 season at San Francisco and threw a pair of TD passes to lead Arizona to a 33-21 victory.

RB Andre Ellington – Only active NFL players with both a rushing and receiving TD of 80+ yards in their career and was one of just six players in NFL history with an 80+ yard TD run and 80+ yard receiving TD in their first two NFL seasons.

RB Chris Johnson – Enters the 2017 season ranked third among active NFL players with 9,537 rushing yards. Since entering the NFL in 2008, ranks top-five in the league with 2,118 rushing attempts (fourth), 9,537 rushing yards (third) and 11,749 yards from scrimmage (fifth).

RB David Johnson – Established a single-season franchise record with 2,118 scrimmage yards (1,239 rushing; 879 receiving) in 2016. Also led the NFL and set a franchise record with 20 TDs in 2016, including a franchise-record 16 rushing TDs. Earned first-team All-Pro and Pro Bowl recognition in 2016.

RB T.J. Logan – One of five members of the Tar Heels offense to be drafted in 2017 after totaling 4,926 all-purpose yards and 27 TDs in 49 games at North Carolina. Posted 2,165 yards and 19 TDs on 398 carries, 663 yards and four TDs on 76 receptions and 2,098 yards and four TDs on 77 kickoff returns.

RB Elijahha Penny – Spent the 2016 season on the Cardinals practice squad after signing with the club as a rookie free agent out of Idaho.

RB James Summers – East Carolina product signed with the Cardinals as a rookie free agent after rushing for 869 yards and seven TDs on 162 carries (5.4 avg.) as a senior in 2016.

RB Kerwynn Williams – Was the club's second leading rusher in 2016 with 157 yards and two TDs on 18 attempts. Totaled 545 yards and three TDs on 98 carries in 21 games with the Cardinals.

Wide Receivers

WR Carlton Agudosi – Signed with the Cardinals as a rookie free agent after totaling 35 receptions for 513 yards (14.7 yard avg.) and two TDs in 45 games at Rutgers.

WR Jaron Brown – Returns from a knee injury that ended his 2016 campaign in Week 7 against Seattle, resulting in the first missed action of his NFL career. Has 55 receptions for 700 yards and five TDs, while adding 19 tackles on special teams, in 55 career games (four starts) for the Cardinals.

WR John Brown – Pittsburg State product endured a year that included sickle cell trait diagnosis and a spine cyst in 2016 after becoming the 13th player in franchise history with a 1,000-yard receiving season in 2015.

WR Marquis Bundy – Anthem, AZ native spent most of last season on the practice squad before moving to the active roster in Week 12.

WR Aaron Dobson – Spent part of the 2016 season with Detroit after appearing in 24 games (13 starts) with 53 receptions for 698 yards and four TDs during his first three years (2013-15) in the league with New England.

WR Larry Fitzgerald – A 10-time Pro Bowler (most in team history), he is the franchise's all-time leader in receptions, receiving yards, TDs and 100-yard receiving games. Joins Hall of Famer Jerry Rice (13) as the only wide receivers in NFL history to be selected to the Pro Bowl at least 10 times. Led the NFL with 107 receptions in 2016 and ranks third in NFL history with 1,125 catches.

WR Brittan Golden – West Texas A&M product scored his first career TD on a nine-yard reception in Week 14 at Miami last season after being elevated from the practice squad in Week 5. Has 13 receptions for 223 yards and one touchdown and 11 special teams tackles in 31 games (one start).

WR Krishawn Hogan – Only NAIA player invited to the NFL Scouting Combine after establishing school records with 4,395 receiving yards and 42 receiving TDs at Marian.

WR Chris Hubert – Split time between the Cardinals practice squad and active roster during the 2016 season but did not play a game.

WR J.J. Nelson – 2015 fifth-round pick matched the team high with six TD receptions in 2016, including four-straight games (Weeks 13-16) with a scoring catch.

WR Jeremy Ross – Fifth-year pro joined the Cardinals in Week 15 last year after playing in four games with Jets earlier in the season. One of 11 active NFL players with a receiving, punt return and kickoff return TD in his career and the league's most recent player to score on a punt return and kickoff return in a single game (12/8/13 at Phi) while with the Lions.

WR Chad Williams – Cardinals third-round pick (98th overall) became the first Grambling State player selected since 2006 after totaling 210 receptions for 3,062 yards and 28 TDs in 47 games.

Tight Ends

TE Gerald Christian – Cardinals seventh-round selection (256th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft re-signed with the club during training camp after appearing in three games with the Bills in 2016.

TE Jermaine Gresham – Two-time Pro Bowler agreed to a four-year contract in March after leading the Cardinals TEs with 37 receptions for 391 yards and two TDs in 2016.

TE Ifeanyi Momah – Appeared in five games and caught two passes for 50 yards in 2016 after being elevated from the practice squad. Placed on injured reserve with a wrist injury in Week 9.

TE Troy Niklas – Cardinals second-round pick (52nd overall) of the 2014 Draft appeared in the first three games of 2016 before suffering a season-ending wrist injury.

TE Ricky Seals-Jones – Appeared in 39 games (31 starts) in three years at Texas A&M, where he had 123 receptions for 1,442 yards and 10 TDs while playing wide receiver. Cousin of Pro Football Hall of Fame RB Eric Dickerson.

TE Hakeem Valles – Elevated to the Cardinals active roster in Week 5 after beginning the 2016 season on the team's practice squad.

Offensive Line

C/G Tony Bergstrom – Appeared in 15 regular season games and both postseason matchups for the Texans in 2016, playing mostly on special teams.

G Evan Boehm – Fourth-round pick from Missouri played in all 16 games last season as a rookie, starting the season finale at RG and playing on special teams in the first 15 contests.

T Will Holden – Arizona's first selection in the fifth round (157th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, appeared in 48 games for Vanderbilt, starting the final 35 games at tackle.

T D.J. Humphries – 2015 first-round pick from Florida started the first 13 games in 2016 (10 at RT, three at LT). Missed last three weeks with concussion. Makes the move from RT to LT entering the 2017 season.

G Mike Iupati – Four-time Pro Bowler started 15 games at LG and was selected as a Pro Bowl alternate in 2016. Has blocked for a 1,000-yard rusher in four of the last five seasons.

T Ulrick John – Started three games at RT for the Cardinals after being signed from the Dolphins practice squad during Week 6. Finished the season on injured reserve with a shoulder injury.

G Dorian Johnson – Cardinals fourth-round selection (115th overall) appeared in 51 consecutive games at Pittsburgh and finished his college career with 40 straight starts. College career included starts at left guard (39), left tackle (2) and right guard (1).

G Kaleb Johnson – Spent the 2016 season on the Cardinals practice squad after signing with the team in Week 4.

T Jonathan McLaughlin – Started 49 games at Virginia Tech and earned third-team All-ACC as a senior in 2016.

C/G Daniel Munyer – Spent time on the Cardinals and Chiefs practice squads during the 2016 season.

T Givens Price – Made his NFL debut in the final series of the 2016 season finale against the Rams after being elevated from the Cardinals practice squad in Week 15.

C A.Q. Shipley – Started at center in all 16 games in 2016, the only Cardinals O-lineman to start every game last year.

G Cole Toner – Made his NFL debut as a FB on David Johnson's one-yard TD run in the fourth quarter at Seattle (12/24). Appeared in the final two games of the 2016 season. Became the first offensive lineman drafted from Harvard since C Matt Birk was taken in the sixth round in 1998.

T Jared Veldheer – Started first 43 games as a member of the Cardinals at LT (40 regular season; 3 postseason) until he was placed on injured reserve after suffering triceps injury in Week 8 of 2016 season. Makes the move from LT to RT entering the 2017 season.

G John Wetzel – Played in all 16 games with eight starts at three different positions (five at LT, two at RG, one at RT) in 2016.

DT Rodney Gunter – Fourth-round pick from Delaware State appeared in all 16 games (one start) and had 18 tackles, two for loss, 1.5 sacks and a fumble recovery in 2016. Has totaled 52 tackles, 2.5 sacks, one fumble recovery and a blocked FG in 32 games (12 starts) during his first two NFL seasons.

DT Josh Mauro – Started 13 of 15 games played in 2016 and had a career-high 42 tackles, 13 tackles for loss, five QB pressures, four QB hits and one pass defended. Has appeared in 34 games (19 starts) since signing with the Cardinals from the Steelers practice squad in 2014.

DT David Moala – Originally entered the NFL last year as a rookie free agent with the Denver Broncos out of Utah State, where he appeared in 21 games (11 starts) and had 58 tackles (28 solo), five sacks, two passes defended, two forced fumbles and two blocked kicks.

DT Robert Nkemdiche – First-round pick from Ole Miss appeared in five games as a rookie in 2016. Was a two-time first-team All-SEC selection and a two-time second-team All-America pick while at Mississippi.

DT Corey Peters – Started 14 of 15 games played in 2016 and had 30 tackles, including eight for loss, while adding 13 QB pressures and two QB hits. Made his Cardinals debut in Week 1 after missing 2015 season with Achilles injury.

DT Olsen Pierre – Inactive for all 16 games last season after making the 53-man roster out of training camp. Signed with the Cardinals as a rookie free agent in 2015 and spent most of that season on the club's practice squad.

DT Frostee Rucker – 12th-year pro played in 13 games (one start) and finished with 25 tackles, six for loss, a forced fumble and one pass defended last season. Has played in 126 career games (58 starts) and totaled 314 tackles, 20 sacks, one INT, 10 passes defended, eight forced fumbles and four fumble recoveries during his NFL career.

DT Ed Stinson – Fourth-year pro from Alabama played four games in 2016, missing time due to a toe injury, and collected six tackles, one QB pressure and one QB hit. Has appeared in 29 games (five starts) with 40 tackles and one sack since entering the league in 2014.

NT Xavier Williams – Made the team as an undrafted free agent in 2015 and has played in 12 career games (one start) with 15 tackles.

LB Alex Bazzie – Joined the Cardinals after brief stints with the Colts and Panthers during the 2017 offseason. A 2016 West Division All-Star for the BC Lions of the Canadian Football League, totaled 92 tackles, 29 sacks, two forced fumbles and eight special teams tackles in 50 career games in the CFL.

\$LB Deone Bucannon – Begins the 2017 season on the PUP list after offseason ankle surgery. Collected a team-high 100 tackles in 13 games last year and has totaled 302 tackles, five sacks, an INT (returned for a TD), 10 passes defended, four fumble recoveries and four forced fumbles in 45 career games.

LB Josh Bynes – Has totaled 209 tackles, 13 tackles for loss, a half sack, one interception, 14 passes defended, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery and 12 special teams tackles in 64 games (28 starts) for the Lions (2014-16) and Ravens (2011-13).

LB Cap Capi – Joined the Cardinals practice squad during Week 5 of the 2016 season after previous stints with the Jaguars, Ravens and Falcons.

LB Karlos Dansby – Cardinals second-round pick (33rd overall) of the 2004 NFL Draft, becomes the first player in franchise history to have three separate stints with the team. Posted his ninth career 100+ tackle season with a team-high 114 for the Bengals in 2016. Has totaled 1,405 tackles, 42 sacks, 19 INTs (including six returned for TDs), 83 passes defended, 11 fumble recoveries and 18 forced fumbles in 196 games (179 starts).

LB Markus Golden – 2015 second-round pick posted a team-high 12.5 sacks (third in the NFL) last year, including at least one sack in the first five and final four games of the season. He and Chandler Jones (11) became the franchise's first double-digit sacks duo since 1984.

LB Zaviar Gooden – Fourth-year pro played in eight total games (seven with Cardinals, one with Lions) and had three tackles and four special teams stops in 2016. Missouri product as collected 30 tackles and 13 special teams stops in 32 games since entering the league in 2013.

LB Tre'Von Johnson – Two-time Weber State team captain played in 46 games and earned All-Big Sky first-team (2016) and second-team (2015) accolades during his four-year career. Totaled 258 tackles, 27 tackles for loss, nine sacks, three forced fumbles and one fumble recovery for the Wildcats.

LB Chandler Jones – Capped his second consecutive double-digit sacks season with 1.5 QB drops against the Rams in Week 17. Paired with Markus Golden to become the team's first double-digit sacks duo since the 1984 season. Has 274 tackles, 53 tackles for loss, 47 sacks, 14 forced fumbles and four fumble recoveries in 71 games (68 starts).

LB Jarvis Jones – Pittsburgh's first-round pick (17th overall) in the 2013 NFL Draft signed with Arizona as an unrestricted free agent in March. Posted a career-high-tying 42 tackles, one sack, one INT, three passes defended, two forced fumbles and a fumble recovery in 14 games last season for the Steelers.

LB Kareem Martin – Appeared in 13 games and collected six tackles, one for loss, and a sack in 2016 after converting to OLB from the D-line in 2015.

LB Haason Reddick – Began in college career as a walk-on cornerback at Temple, where he earned first-team All-American Athletic Conference honors and a Senior Bowl invite as a senior defensive end. First Temple player selected in the first round since Muhammad Wilkerson (Jets, 2011) and the first-ever Owl picked by Arizona (first since 1943).

LB Terence Waugh – Rookie free agent from Kent State who was named to the All-MAC first team last year after leading the Golden Flashes with eight sacks and 15 tackles for loss while also collecting 64 tackles and a forced fumble in 12 games.

LB Philip Wheeler – Veteran linebacker enters his 10th NFL season with the Cardinals after stints in Atlanta (2015-16), Miami (2013-14), Oakland (2012) and Indianapolis (2008-2011). Totaled 554 tackles (366 solo), 6.5 sacks, 15 passes defended, two fumble recoveries, five forced fumbles and 53 special teams stops in 133 career games (66 starts).

LB Scooby Wright III – Former UA standout played the final three games of 2016 with Arizona after signing with the club from Cleveland's practice squad.

Defensive Backs

S Budda Baker – A consensus NCAA All-American in 2016 and two-time first-team All-Pac-12 selection, totaled 200 tackles, 13.5 tackles for loss, 4.0 sacks, five INTs, 24 passes defended and three forced fumbles in 40 games at Washington. Given first name is Bishard, nicknamed Budda by his mother and aunt.

S Antoine Bethea – Three-time Pro Bowler joined the Cardinals as an unrestricted free agent in March after 11 seasons with the 49ers (2014-16) and Colts (2006-13). Has topped 100 tackles nine times in his career, and according to league stats, ranks fifth among all active NFL defenders – and first among defensive backs – with 1,044 career tackles.

CB Justin Bethel – Three-time Pro Bowl special teamer has totaled 62 tackles, three interceptions (two returned for TDs), 15 passes defended, two fumble recoveries and 80 special teams stops in 80 career games. Also has three blocked FGs and a blocked PAT.

S Tyvon Branch – Joined the Cardinals after eight seasons with Oakland (2008-14) and Kansas City (2015), where he totaled 528 tackles, nine sacks, five INTs, 27 passes defended, five fumble recoveries, three forced fumbles, three defensive TDs and 19 special teams tackles in 97 career games (73 starts).

CB Jarell Carter – Rookie free agent was a two-time NCCAA All-American and All-Midwest League selection at Trinity International, where he totaled six interceptions, 156 tackles, 28 passes defended, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery in 36 games (31 starts).

CB Rudy Ford – Arizona's sixth-round pick (208th overall) out of Auburn totaled 275 tackles, 1.5 sacks, 11.5 tackles for loss, five INTs, three forced fumbles and a fumble recovery in 52 games (34 starts) for the Tigers. First Auburn player drafted by the Cardinals since teammate Karlos Dansby (2004).

S Ironhead Gallon – First-team All-Sun Belt selection out of Georgia Southern played in 47 games, not missing an appearance in his final three seasons, and totaling 232 tackles, 16.5 tackles for loss, 4.5 sacks, an INT and a forced fumble. Given name is Deshawntee, was nicknamed Ironhead by his father.

CB Daniel Gray – Played 27 games (19 starts) in three years (2014-16) at Utah State after transferring from Tennessee. Totaled 87 tackles (52 solo), 1.5 tackles for loss, one interception, 10 passes defended and one fumble recovery for the Aggies.

CB Gump Hayes – Transferred from Lackawanna (PA) Junior College to Arizona State, where he saw action at running back and cornerback. In 2016, had 43 tackles, three tackles for loss, three interceptions and nine passes defended in 13 games. Given name is De'Chavon, nicknamed Gump for his speed.

CB Ryan Lewis – Pittsburgh product signed with the Cardinals as a rookie free agent after appearing in 51 career games for the Panthers. Started 12 games as a senior in 2016 and set career highs with 79 tackles (second on team), two interceptions and eight passes defended.

S Tyrann Mathieu – 2015 first-team All-Pro selection ended the 2016 season on injured reserve with a shoulder injury after being named a defensive team captain and had 36 tackles, three tackles for loss, one sack, one interception, three passes defended and a forced fumble in 10 starts.

CB/S Harlan Miller – Started the final two games of the 2016 season and recorded six tackles, one interception, two passes defended and a special teams tackle. Sixth-round pick spent first 15 weeks on practice squad before being elevated to active roster in Week 16.

CB Tramon Williams – 11-year NFL veteran entered the league as an undrafted rookie free agent in 2007 and now ranks fifth among active players with 30 interceptions. The 2010 Pro Bowler played the past two seasons with Cleveland (2015-16) after playing eight seasons with Green Bay (2007-14).
