The Ravens traveled to Stevenson University in Owings Mills, MD, on Aug. 18 for the final training camp practice that was open to fans. A lottery system was used to assign tickets to the winning fans who were interested in watching the practice at Mustang Stadium. Though tens of thousands of people applied through the Baltimore Ravens' website, only 3,000 were selected. Admission was free of charge, but tickets were mandatory for entrance due to the size of the venue. Over 1,500 children lined up at the conclusion of practice to receive autographs from the players.


