BREAST CANCER AWARENESS GAME

The Baltimore Ravens held their annual Breast Cancer Awareness (BCA) game on Sunday, Oct. 11, against the Cleveland Browns at M&T Bank Stadium. BCA initiatives for the game included the distribution of over 50,000 pink ribbons to fans as they entered the stadium and an on-field ceremony honoring approximately 25 women – a combination of breast cancer survivors and those currently undergoing treatment – prior to kickoff. Additionally, players, coaches, cheerleaders and mascot Poe wore numerous pink items in support of the cause. Various items worn were collected after the game and will be auctioned off at www.nfl.com/auction, with all proceeds benefitting the American Cancer Society.



A CRUCIAL CATCH DAY

In October, the Ravens awarded a \$50,000 *A Crucial Catch* grant to the Family Health Centers of Baltimore (FHCB) in the Cherry Hill and Brooklyn Park neighborhoods. In support of the grant, the Ravens participated in *A Crucial Catch Day* on Tuesday, Oct. 13, at the FHCB facility. Pre-registered women from the surrounding areas learned of ways to reduce their risk of breast cancer and the importance of early detection. They also had the opportunity to receive a clinical breast exam and schedule a mammogram at their local hospital.
