COVID-19 SUPPORT AND RELIEF

The Baltimore Ravens are committed to supporting healthcare workers and nonprofits determined to help those in need during the COVID-19 pandemic. Since March, the Ravens have donated over \$2.35 million, including substantial donations to the Maryland Food Bank, the Fund for Educational Excellence, the United Way of Central Maryland and the Baltimore Community Foundation. Just last week, the Ravens announced an additional donation of \$250,000 to the Baltimore Health Corps, which is recruiting, training and employing more than 300 residents who are currently jobless to serve as contact tracers.



The donation provided two meals per day for all emergency and critical-care workers at Union Memorial Hospitals over a four-week span.

STADIUM INVOLVEMENT

The Baltimore Ravens and the American Red Cross hosted an emergency blood drive at M&T Bank Stadium in early June. Nearly 170 people attended the event to support hospitals and prevent blood shortages as hospitals resumed surgical procedures and patient treatments, which were temporarily paused in response to the COVID-19 Pandemic. The Ravens also participated in #LightItBlue and turned M&T Bank Stadium blue in honor of healthcare professionals and essential workers.
