**THE MATCHUP**

The Saints begin Sunday what will be a two-game stretch of NFC South contests, starting when they host the defending Super Bowl Champion Buccaneers at the Caesars Superdome. This will be the 60<sup>th</sup> overall meeting (regular season/postseason) between the two clubs since the Buccaneers first joined the NFL as an expansion franchise in 1976. Since 2002, the two teams have battled in the NFC South together as they are the only two clubs in the division to have hoisted a Lombardi Trophy on their shoulders.

New Orleans leads the regular season series 37-21, including two consecutive season sweeps, however the Saints will be looking to eliminate the bad taste from last season's 30-20 NFC Divisional Playoff loss to the Buccaneers as they used that momentum to become World Champions. Head Coach **Sean Payton** is 18-10 against Tampa Bay in the regular season, having won the last five.

The stakes are high in the 4-2 Saints are looking to close in on the 6-1 Buccaneers in a close NFC South race. Upcoming Tampa Bay and Atlanta home matchups would allow New Orleans to make a move and improve their positioning as they seek to win their fifth straight division title.

Resourcefulness has been a theme in the seasons of both the Saints and Buccaneers as they close in on the midway point of the regular season, both clubs fighting significant

injuries on offense, defense and special teams. New Orleans has successfully broken in former Buccaneers signal-caller **Jameis Winston** following the retirement of Drew Brees amid numerous injuries. Despite these losses, Winston is on pace to set a new career-high in touchdown passes, while RB **Alvin Kamara** has served as the heart and soul of the New Orleans offense.

Defensively, the team has retained its identity of an elite run-stopping unit despite attrition. A veteran trio of LB **Demario Davis** (150), S **Malcolm Jenkins** (125) and DE **Cameron Jordan** (166) who have three of the longest current games-played streaks in the NFL have provided an ideal mix with youthful rookie defenders who have made immediate contributions in CB **Paulson Adebo** and LB **Pete Werner**, while CB **Marshon Lattimore** and S Marcus Williams have emboldened the secondary to make plays.

On special teams, New Orleans has managed the temporary loss of K **Wil Lutz** to core muscle surgery, successfully breaking in P **Blake Gillikin** and blocking one kick and one punt. Despite these challenges and not to mention a month-displacement due to Hurricane Ida, Payton, Offensive Coordinator **Pete Carmichael**, Defensive Coordinator **Dennis Allen** and Special Teams Coordinator **Darren Rizzi** have formulated efficient units that rank among leaders in the NFL in both red zone touchdown percentage and opponent red zone touchdown percentage.

## **NEW ORLEANS SAINTS - TAMPA BAY**

### **BUCCANEERS SERIES HISTORY**

The New Orleans Saints and Tampa Bay Buccaneers first met in 1977. New Orleans has posted a 37-21 regular season record vs. Tampa Bay, the club's best winning percentage (.638) vs. an opponent they have played a minimum of seven games against.

#### **In the 58 games of the series there has been:**

- 2,053 points scored by New Orleans, 1,097 allowed.
- A seven-game New Orleans winning streak from 2011-2014.
- A 21-11 record for the Saints in games played at Mercedes-Benz Superdome..
- 24 games decided by double-digits.
- Seven games decided by 21 or more points.
- 33 games decided by seven points or less.
- A 41-point win by New Orleans on December 16, 2012, the club's first shutout against the Buccaneers.
- Since both clubs joined the NFC South in 2002, New Orleans has swept the regular season series seven times, including 2020

**LAST MEETING**

**NFC Divisional Playoff– Tampa Bay Buccaneers 30, New Orleans Saints 20; January 17, 2021 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome –** The Tampa Bay Buccaneers used big plays on defense to advance to the NFC Championship game with a 30-20 victory at the New Orleans Saints. With 4:30 left in the third quarter, Buccaneers safety Antoine Winfield Jr. stripped the ball from Saints tight end Jared Cook and it was recovered by linebacker Devin White at the New Orleans 40. Five plays later, Buccaneers running back Leonard Fournette tied the score 20-20 on a six-yard touchdown pass from Tampa Bay quarterback Tom Brady. The Buccaneers then took control of the game, forcing a New Orleans punt and Tampa Bay kicker Ryan Succop booting a 36-yard field goal for a 23-20 lead. On the next series, White picked off Brees at the New Orleans 48-yard line and returned it 28 yards to the Saints' 20. Brady then capped off a four-play, 20-yard drive that ended with a one-yard rushing touchdown to put Tampa Bay up 30-20 with 4:57 remaining.



## NEW ORLEANS SAINTS-TAMPA BAY BUCCANEERS CONNECTIONS

New Orleans Defensive back **P.J. Williams** and quarterback **Jameis Winston** won two Atlantic Coast Conference championships and one national championship at Florida State University together from 2013-14. Winston was the 2013 Heisman Trophy winner and was the first overall pick in the 2015 NFL Draft by the Buccaneers in 2015, holding passing yardage and touchdown pass franchise records, completing 1,563 –of-2548 passes for 19,737 yards with 121 touchdown passes in 72 games with 70 starts...Williams prepped at Vanguard (Ocala, Fla.) HS... Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton**, Tampa Bay Defensive Coordinator **Todd Bowles** and Defensive Line Coach **Kacy Rodgers** served on the same Dallas Cowboys coaching staff...Saints Special Teams Coordinator **Darren Rizzi**, Bowles and Rodgers also served on the same Miami coaching staff. Rizzi and Tampa Bay Quarterbacks Coach **Clyde Christensen** served on the same Dolphins coaching staff from 2016-18. Bowles tutored Saints linebacker **Demario Davis** when he served as head coach of the New York Jets in 2017 along with Buccaneers Inside Linebackers Coach **Mike Caldwell** and Rodgers (defensive coordinator). Bowles served as defensive coordinator & secondary coach at Grambling State University from 1998-99. Davis and Buccaneers defensive tackle **Steve McLendon** were defensive teammates with the Jets in 2017...Tampa Bay Specialists Coach **Chris Boniol** is an Alexandria, Louisiana native who played at Louisiana Tech and also coached special teams at Louisiana College from 2015-16...Saints Director of Player Engagement **Fred McAfee** played on special teams for Tampa Bay in 1999...Tampa Bay Head Coach **Bruce Arians** served as Saints tight ends coach in 1996...New Orleans Offensive Assistant **D.J. Williams** prepped at Tampa Catholic High School and his father, former Buccaneers quarterback **Doug Williams** is in the club's Ring of Honor...Saints tackle/guard **James Hurst** blocked for Buccaneers running back **Giovani Bernard** at the University of North Carolina...Saints defensive back **C.J. Gardner-Johnson** played at University of Florida, where he played with Buccaneers quarterback **Kyle Trask** from 2016-18...Saints wide receiver/return specialist **Deonte Harris** and Buccaneers long snapper **Zach Triner** were college teammates at Assumption College in Worcester, Mass...Saints linebacker **Kwon Alexander** played for Tampa Bay from 2015-18...Saints running back **Tony Jones Jr.** is a St. Petersburg native who prepped at IMG Academy (Bradenton, Fla.)...New Orleans wide receiver **Tre'Quan Smith** played at the University of Central Florida...Buccaneers cornerback **Ross Cockrell** and Saints fullback **Alex Armah** played together with the Carolina Panthers from 2018-19...Buccaneers practice squad quarterback **Ryan Griffin** played at Tulane for Saints Senior Offensive Asst./Wide Receivers **Curtis Johnson**,

who served as head coach and then played for New Orleans from 2013-14 after signing as an undrafted free agent...Buccaneers linebacker **Kevin Minter** played at LSU and was a high school teammate of Saints cornerback **Bradley Roby** at Peachtree Ridge (Suwanee, Ga.) HS...Tampa Bay running back **Leonard Fournette**, who prepped at St. Augustine (New Orleans, La.) HS and was an All-American at LSU and New Orleans running back **Devine Ozigbo** were teammates in Jacksonville in 2019...Tampa Bay linebacker **Devin White** is a Springhill native who prepped at North Webster HS and played at LSU...Saints secondary coach **Kris Richard** tutored Buccaneers cornerback **Kris Richard** both as secondary coach and defensive coordinator with the Seattle Seahawks. Richard and Buccaneers running backs coach **Todd McNair** served on the same USC coaching staff...Saints quarterback **Trevor Siemian** prepped at Olympia (Orlando, Fl.) ## **DATING GAME**

This week's game against Tampa Bay is being played on Oct. 31. The Saints are They will be looking to improve their record on Halloween to 3-3, having won the last matchup in 2010 on Sunday Night Football in the Superdome over Pittsburgh. The club has faced Atlanta, Washington, the Cardinals, Cleveland and Pittsburgh on this date. Here is a brief look at New Orleans' Oct. 31 games:

**1971** - The Saints fall to Washington 24-14 at R.F.K. Stadium.

**1976** - The Saints fall to Atlanta 23-20 at Atlanta-Fulton County Stadium

**1993** - The Saints erased a 17-7 halftime deficit to score 13 straight second half points to defeat the Arizona Cardinals at Sun Devil Stadium

**1999** - The Saints fell to 1-6, when they lost to the expansion Cleveland Browns 21-16 at the Superdome as WR Kevin Johnson caught a 58-yard hail mary pass in the end zone from QB Tim Couch to give the reborn Browns their first win

**2010** - New Orleans defeats the Pittsburgh Steelers 20-10 at the Superdome on Sunday Night Football as QB Drew Brees tossed touchdowns to WRs Marques Colston and Lance Moore.

## **THE HEAD COACHES**

**Sean Payton** has posted a 156-91 overall record (.632), including a 9-8 postseason mark after the franchise had won only one playoff game prior to his arrival in 2006. Payton holds the club's top victory total and winning percentage. Payton is tied for 21st all-time in National Football League records in victories with Pittsburgh Steelers Head Coach Mike Tomlin, fourth among active coaches. He continues to represent the Saints as the model of stability not only within the NFC South, as he is the longest tenured head coach within the conference, but also among the most accomplished within the NFL. Only Bill Belichick (2000) has been with his team longer than Payton's 15 seasons. Payton is also one of just eight active NFL head coaches to lead a team to a Super Bowl victory. The others are the Tampa Bay Buccaneers' Bruce Arians, Belichick, the Seattle Seahawks' Pete Carroll, the Baltimore Ravens' John Harbaugh, the Dallas Cowboys' Mike McCarthy (Green Bay in 2010), Kansas City's Andy Reid and Tomlin. The 2020 Saints were only the sixth team in National Football League history to have six-game winning streaks in four consecutive seasons and with a nine-game winning streak had won at least nine straight games in two of the past three seasons and had double-digit victory figures and consecutive playoff berths in four straight years for the first

time in team history, also being only the third NFC team since divisional alignment to capture four straight division championships. The Black and Gold qualified for the NFL playoffs for the ninth season (2006, 2009-11, 2013, 2017-20) in Payton's head coaching tenure). Payton earned a degree in communications at Eastern Illinois, where as a quarterback he had 10,665 passing yards, at the time the third-highest total in NCAA Division I-AA history. Payton was inducted into the Eastern Illinois Hall of Fame in 2000 and had his jersey retired in a ceremony in 2010. He received an honorary doctorate from his alma mater in 2013. Payton was born December 29, 1963 in San Mateo, Calif., and raised in Naperville, Ill., Payton has a daughter, Meghan and a son, Connor.

Named the 12th head coach in franchise history on January 8, 2019. **Bruce Arians** is a two-time *Associated Press* National Football League Coach of the Year, earning the award in 2012 (Indianapolis) and in 2014 (Arizona Cardinals). He is the only coach in NFL history to earn the award multiple times in a three-year span with different teams and is one of only 12 coaches in NFL history to win the award multiple times. He spent five seasons as the head coach of the Cardinals (2013-17) in addition to a 12-game stint as interim head coach for the Colts (2012, while head coach Chuck Pagano was being treated for leukemia), compiling a regular season record of 67-44 and 2-2 postseason mark. Spent eight seasons with the Steelers (2004-2011) as an assistant, winning Super Bowls XL and XLIII and then won Super Bowl LV as head coach of the Buccaneers. Also coached on the offensive staffs for the Browns (2001-03), Saints (1996), and Chiefs (1989-1992).

Background: Arians was a college assistant at his alma mater, Virginia Tech (1975-77), Mississippi State (1978-1980, 1993-95), University Alabama (1981-82 with Paul "Bear" Bryant, 1997). He became one of the youngest head coaches in Division I history when Temple hired him in 1983 at the age of 30 (1983-88).

Personal: Born in Paterson, N.J., Arians grew up in York, Penn., and played quarterback at Virginia Tech. He and his wife, Christine, have two children – son, Jake, and daughter, Kristi Anne.

## GAME SUMMARIES

**Saints 38, Packers 3; September 12, 2021 @ TIAA Bank Field (Jacksonville, Fla.)** – Jameis Winston and the hurricane-displaced Saints looked right at home in northeast Florida — no doubt to the delight of fans rebuilding homes and lives back in New Orleans.

Winston passed for five touchdowns, New Orleans intercepted reigning NFL Most Valuable Player Aaron Rodgers twice, and the Saints kicked off the post-Drew Brees era with a strikingly dominant 38-3 victory over the Green Bay Packers.

"We knew that even though some people don't have power, they're going to find a way to watch the Saints," linebacker and captain Demario Davis said. "That's just what this team means to the city — and the city means the same to us."

The game, originally scheduled for the Superdome, was moved while the New Orleans area continues to clean up wreckage left by Hurricane Ida, which struck southeast Louisiana as a Category 4 storm on Aug. 29, 16 years to the day after Hurricane Katrina devastated the same region.

After canceling their final preseason game and practicing two weeks in the Dallas area, the Saints looked as sharp and inspired as any club with such distractions could have hoped.

"That was for the city," Winston said. "We did that for them. We knew how much it would mean to get a great victory for that region. They've been through so much. ... Hats off to them for their resilience, because they motivated us. They inspired us to come out there and ball."

Winston, who led the NFL with 30 interceptions in his last season as a starter with Tampa Bay in 2019, was largely judicious and accurate in going an efficient 14 of 20 for 148 yards without an interception. New Orleans also rushed for 171 yards.

"Drew always preached, it's about the decision, not the result," Winston said, alluding to last season, when he served as a reserve and understudy to Brees in an effort to improve the long-term trajectory of his up-and-down career. "Sometimes the decision is throwing the ball away, sometimes the decision is running, tucking. Sometimes the decision may be taking a sack."

Winston didn't take a sack, but did take off and run for a few key third-down conversions in the first half.

The only risky throw that backfired on him, a deflected pass caught by Packers defensive back Darnell Savage in the end zone — was negated by a contested roughing-the-passer penalty called against edge rusher Z'Darius Smith.

The penalty set up the second touchdown catch of the game by Juwan Johnson, who came in with four career catches and was converted from receiver to a tight end this offseason.

On the day before his 25th birthday, Johnson also converted a screen pass into a 12-yard, first-down gain on fourth-and-7 in the second quarter, when the game was still

in doubt. He capped that drive with a leaping catch in the end zone on fourth-and-two. The two fourth down conversions highlighted a pivotal 14-play drive that consumed 10 minutes.

"You've got to pick your spots where you want to be aggressive and it's a little bit easier on that end of the field," Payton said. "I felt pretty good about the calls."

Green Bay fans seemed to outnumber Saints fans in a crowd announced at 35,242 for what was officially a Saints home game. But they left disappointed in a day that could not have gone much worse for Rodgers, who was pulled with nearly 11 minutes left.

As the time expired, the remaining Saints fans joined in triumphant chants of "Who Dat!" that echoed throughout the stadium.

"This is a good kick in the you-know-where," said Rodgers, who finished 15 of 28 for 133 yards and no TDs. "We felt like we were going to go up and down the field on whoever they have and that obviously wasn't the case."

Opening the third quarter down 17-3, the Packers squandered a chance to trim their deficit when Rodgers' wobbly pass under pressure was intercepted by rookie defensive back Paulson Adebo at the New Orleans 7 early in the third quarter.

On Green Bay's next drive, Marcus Williams intercepted Rodgers' deep overthrow and returned it to the Packers 12, setting up Winston's 10-yard TD to Chris Hogan.

"Every team has a game like this," said Packers running back Aaron Jones, who was limited to 9 yards on five carries. "It's better to get it out now."

### FAST START

The Saints did not punt in the first half.

New Orleans took the opening kickoff for a field goal and led 10-0 after Alvin Kamara took a short forward pitch from Winston as he crossed behind the offensive line, then slipped multiple tackle attempts to squirm into the end zone from 3 yards. That officially went down as Winston's first regular-season TD pass as a Saint, and he helped set it up with a 10-yard scramble on third-and-8.

**Carolina Panthers 26, Saints 7; September 19, 2021 @ Bank of America Stadium** – The Carolina Panthers, a week after their season-opening win over the New York Jets, continued to take advantage of home cooking and handed the Saints a 26-7 defeat on a warm afternoon at Bank of America Stadium.

Carolina quarterback **Sam Darnold** was impressive and efficient throughout the majority of the game, completing 26-of-38 passes for 305 yards with two touchdown passes, one interception and a 99.1 rating. But Darnold wasn't the lone story of the day, as a healthy **Christian McCaffrey** gained 137 total yards from scrimmage and one rushing touchdown.

The Panthers defense seemingly took away most of the Saints' big play abilities, with New Orleans' longest play a 27-yard connection between quarterback **Jameis Winston** and wide receiver **Lil' Jordan Humprey**. New Orleans struggled running the ball (17 carries for 48 yards) and on early downs, resulting in unfavorable situations and production on third down (2-for-11) and losing the time of possession battle 38:32-21:28. **CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE**

Defensively, LB **Demario Davis** led the club with 12 tackles, while a pair of young defensive linemen in DT **Malcolm Roach** and DE **Payton Turner** recorded their first career interception and sack respectively.

The New Orleans special teams units also worked to keep the Saints in the hunt on a day of tough sledding. P **Blake Gillikin** pinned the Panthers back several times, recording a 45.0 net punting average on six punts with a 60-yard punt. WR **Ty Montgomery** had a career-high three coverage stops. Midway through the third quarter, DE **Carl Granderson**, who had made his first career start on defense, blocked a 55-yard field goal attempt by K **Zane Gonzalez** and it was recovered and returned by LB **Zack Baun**. WR/RS **Deonte Harris** returned five kickoffs for a career-high 156 yards, running back a kick late in the second quarter 39 yards.

**Saints 28, Patriots 13; September 26, 2021 @ Gillette Stadium** – Only one brand of football comes to mind when Jameis Winston thinks about the best New Orleans Saints teams of the past.

"Saints football has always been efficiency and physicality up front," he said. "That's all I know. They win up front and they play tough. That's what we did here."

Winston threw two touchdown passes, Malcolm Jenkins returned an interception for a score, and the Saints beat the Patriots 28-13 on Sunday.

A week after a career-low passer rating Winston showed better command of the offense, completing 13 of 21 passes for 128 yards. Taysom Hill ran for a touchdown and Alvin Kamara rushed 24 times for 89 yards and had a receiving TD. He got support from a defense that made Patriots rookie quarterback's life miserable.

Mac Jones entered the day hoping to stretch the field after two games in which the passing attack was mostly underneath. Instead, he found himself under pressure for most of the day and threw three interceptions, two leading to Saints touchdowns. New Orleans sacked Jones three times and hit him 11 times. He finished 30 of 51 for 270 yards and a touchdown.

"I think it just goes back to execution," Jones said. "I can do a better job just sticking to my reads and being patient and letting things develop. I didn't do a good job of that today." Saints safety P.J. Williams returned Jones' first pick of the day 46 yards to set up a 7-yard TD pass by Winston in the second quarter.

Jenkins was the beneficiary of the second INT, snaring a pass bobbled by tight end Jonnu Smith. He returned it 34 yards and put the Saints in front 21-3.

The Patriots cut it to 21-13 following Jones' 22-yard TD pass to Kendrick Bourne with 9:22 left in the fourth period. The Saints responded with a 13-play, 75-yard drive that ate up 6:45 and ended with a 4-yard run by Hill.

Saints coach Sean Payton harped all week on the Patriots' impressive 108-7 record at home (including playoffs) since 2000 when they win the turnover battle. He said having a plus-3 differential Sunday was huge.

"We're mindful of it every week, but it had to be something that was put in our heads every day," he said. "I thought we

took care of the football. I thought that was important." New Orleans overcame an early injury to take a 14-3 lead into halftime.

The Saints' offensive line was already down one starter with center Erik McCoy (calf) ruled out. They lost another early in the first quarter after left tackle Terron Armstead exited with a left elbow injury.

But after going three-and-out on their opening drive, the Saints got efficient, sweeping down the field mixing runs and passes, and a long third-down conversion to get inside the red zone. Winston then put a bow on the 11-play, 69-yard drive with an 11-yard touchdown pass to Kamara. The Saints turned defense into offense for their second score.

The Patriots had third down near midfield when linebacker Kaden Ellis pressured Jones, forcing a pass that was tipped and intercepted by Williams. He returned it 46 yards to the Patriots 9.

Three plays later Winston connected with Marquez Callaway for a 7-yard touchdown.

"There's no magic sauce here," Belichick said. "Just have to go back to work and do better."

**Giants 27, Saints 21; October 3, 2021 @ Caesars Superdome** – The New York Giants spoiled the New Orleans Saints' Dome-coming party as they won a 27-21 overtime game in the Caesars Superdome.

Down 21-10 with 12 minutes to play quarterback Daniel Jones started the comeback by hitting Barkley on a 54-yard scoring play with 6:52 to play. Jones ran it in for the 2-point conversion to make it 21-18. Jones then led the Giants on a late drive to tie the score at 21 when kicker Graham Gano made a 48-yard field goal with 31 seconds to play. The Giants (1-3) won the coin toss and took the ball to start the 10-minute overtime period and marched down the field, ending it with a powerful run by Barkley. Jones finished 28 of 40 for 402 yards with two touchdown passes and one interception. Barkley had 13 carries for 52 yards and the game-winning touchdown.

The loss dropped the Saints to 2-2 and ruined the team's first game in front of a full home crowd in 637 days. The scheduled home opener was moved to Jacksonville because of damage to the area from Hurricane Ida and the team had been training in Dallas until Sept. 24. The Saints had seemed to be in command of the game thanks to their quarterbacks, Jameis Winston and Taysom Hill.

Winston handled the passing-17 of 23 for 226 yards and a touchdown-while Hill took care of the rushing, powering in for two 8-yard touchdown runs.

The loss ruined one of the best games of RB Alvin Kamara's five-year career. He recorded his fourth 100-yard rushing game, carrying a career-high 26 times for 120 yards. Hill finished with 28 yards on six carries and caught two passes for 26 yards.

## GAME SUMMARIES

### **Saints 33, Washington Football Team 22; October 10, 2021 @ FedEx Field**

After Jameis Winston connected with Marquez Callaway on a Hail Mary touchdown on the final play of the first half, Sean Payton recalled a similar play in his first season as New Orleans Saints coach.

15 years ago, his team's Hail Mary in Atlanta overshadowed a halftime performance by country music duo Sugarland. Payton thought to himself: "If there was any halftime entertainment, that's a tough spot to be in."

This one was even sweeter. The Hail Mary was one of Winston's four touchdown passes to help the Saints beat Washington 33-22 for a bounce-back victory.

"Turnovers are going to happen — you just don't want the trickle-down effect to happen," said Winston, who completed 15 of 30 passes for 279 yards and made up for an inexplicable interception on the first possession and a fumble on Chase Young's first sack of the season. "We played efficient football. We made plays when we needed it."

The win came at a cost with two more injuries. Winston took every snap at quarterback for the first time this season, a necessity after Taysom Hill suffered a concussion. Winston completed a 72-yard touchdown pass to Deonte Harris, who departed (hamstring). He also connected with Callaway on the 49-yard Hail Mary TD, found him wide open from 12 yards out early in the fourth quarter and sent Washington fans to the exits with a pass to Alvin Kamara that turned into a 19-yard score. Kamara also had a 23-yard TD run, returned punts in Harris' absence and racked up 151 total yards.

"Any time I'm catching the ball, I love it," said Kamara, who didn't have a reception last week in the overtime loss to the New York Giants. "I think it adds an aspect to our offense. We had an opportunity to do that."

The Saints picked off Taylor Heinicke twice and put some pressure on him a week after not sacking the Giants. Antonio Gibson ran for two TDs, but Washington could not outscore another rough performance by its defense.

### **Saints 13, Seahawks 10; October 25, 2021 @ Lumen Field**

Alvin Kamara and Jameis Winston were the happy beneficiaries of the Seahawks' many mistakes. Then it was rookie Brian Johnson's turn to make sure the Saints got the win they needed to keep pace in the NFC South.

"In a game like this where things are close, things get a little a little ugly towards the end, it builds confidence to be able to come into a game like this and close it out the way we did," Saints DE Cameron Jordan said.

Johnson kicked a 33-yard field goal with 1:56 remaining in his NFL debut, and New Orleans outlasted Seattle 13-10. Kamara carried the load for New Orleans and Winston made a handful of plays when needed, but the Saints escaped Seattle thanks largely to a series of Seahawks blunders, which is sorely missing injured QB Russell Wilson. Two of the Seahawks' biggest mistakes came on New Or-

leans' deciding drive when Seattle was flagged for roughing the passer and jumping offside on a long field-goal attempt. Both penalties gave New Orleans first downs, and Johnson's field goal coming out of the 2-minute warning put the Saints ahead.

Johnson, a rookie, made a PAT and both field-goal tries, connecting from 21 yards in the first half.

"It was tough trying to see what the wind was doing because it was changing constantly throughout pregame and the game itself," Johnson said. "So just stick with my plan I had coming into it and really focusing on just hitting my ball and hitting good contact that will cut through the wind."

Geno Smith made his second start at QB for Seattle (2-5) since Wilson suffered a serious finger injury in a loss to the Rams. The backup hit DK Metcalf for an 84-yard touchdown in the first quarter but went nowhere when the Seahawks had a final chance to tie or win.

Smith was sacked on consecutive plays by Malcolm Jenkins and Demario Davis. On fourth-and-28, Smith was pressured again and his throw to Metcalf fell incomplete. Smith went 12 of 22 for 167 yards — half coming on the TD toss to Metcalf — and was sacked five times as Davis, Cameron Jordan and others made his night uncomfortable. Seattle has lost three straight for the first time since 2011 and fell to 0-3 at home for the first time since 1992. Although both defeats with Smith under center have been by three points, the Seahawks aren't the same without Wilson, who's out until at least mid-November.

"I've been here a long time and if we didn't have Russell, I probably wouldn't have been here a long time because of all the magic he has created over the years," coach Pete Carroll said.

Kamara finished with 10 catches for 128 yards and a 13-yard TD reception late in the first half. It was his fifth career regular-season game with double-digit receptions. He rushed for 51 yards.

Winston was 19 of 35 for 222 yards and added 43 yards rushing. He also made enough plays—thanks to Seattle penalties—to get the Saints in range for the field goal. Seattle appeared to get a stop, but Marquise Blair was called for roughing the passer on a third-down sack after hitting Winston with the crown of his helmet. Kamara then sprinted past a blitz for 12 yards on third-and-10 and the Saints were in field-goal range.

Al Woods jumped offside as Johnson lined up for a 43-yard attempt, allowing New Orleans to burn another 90 seconds off the clock before Johnson made the shorter try.

"We got to get right," Seattle LB Bobby Wagner said.

"We've got to really fix our mistakes, play smarter, make less penalties."

Seattle's Jason Myers missed two field goal attempts — the second into the open end of the stadium after Smith took another costly sack. Myers made a 50-yarder.

Kamara had 21 touches on New Orleans' 39 offensive plays in the first half. He was mostly ineffective on the ground, but Seattle couldn't slow him down in the pass game. He already had 108 yards receiving by halftime. Four of his receptions came on the final drive of the half when his 31-yard catch-and-run out of the backfield set up his 13-yard TD catch and a 10-7 halftime lead.

"Every game has a life of its own, so that was just the flavor of this week, ended up getting a lot of touches," Kamara said.

**Offensive Coordinator Pete Carmichael** - Late father, Pete, served as an assistant coach from 1994-2003 with the Jacksonville Jaguars (1994-99), Cleveland Browns (2000) and Chicago Bears (2002-03).

**Offensive Assistant D.J. Williams** - Father, Doug Williams, is a veteran of the Washington Football Team's front office, who won Super Bowl XXII as their starting quarterback, the pinnacle of a storied 12-year pro football career, which includes him being in the Tampa Bay Buccaneers Ring of Honor, also working in the Buccaneers front office.

**Vice President/Asst. General Manager-College Personnel Jeff Ireland** – Stepson of Chiefs Hall of Fame linebacker/center E.J. Holub. Grandson of Philadelphia Eagles running back and Chicago Bears personnel exec. Jim Parmer.

**National Scout Terry Wooden** - Brother, JoJo, is Director of Player Personnel for the Los Angeles Chargers.

**Linebacker Demario Davis** - Late cousin Steve McNair was a former standout quarterback for the Houston Oilers/Tennessee Titans (1995-2005) and Ravens (2006-07).

**Quarterback Taysom Hill** - Brother-in-law, David Nixon played linebacker and on special teams for the Oakland Raiders (2009), Houston Texans (2010) and St. Louis Rams (2010-11).

**Linebacker Kaden Elliss** - Father, Luther Elliss was a former first round draft pick of the Detroit Lions in 1995 and played ten years in the NFL and was selected to two Pro Bowls. Younger brother Christian, signed with the Minnesota Vikings after the 2021 NFL Draft and went to training camp with the team.

**Defensive End Cameron Jordan** - Father, Steve, had a prolific 13-year career at tight end for the Minnesota Vikings, with six Pro Bowl selections, being inducted into their Ring of Honor.

**Tight end Juwan Johnson** - Brother George, played defensive end for eight years in the National Football

League with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, Vikings, Lions and Saints.

**Tackle/Guard Andrus Peat** - Father, Todd, played six National Football League seasons with the Phoenix/Arizona Cardinals and the Los Angeles Raiders.

**Wide Receiver Kenny Stills** - Father, Ken Stills was an eighth round draft pick of the Green Bay Packers in 1985 and played for the Packers (1985-89) and Minnesota Vikings (1990).

**Wide Receiver Michael Thomas** - Uncle, Keyshawn Johnson, is a former wide receiver who was the first overall pick in the 1996 NFL Draft by the New York Jets out of Southern California, spending 11 seasons in the NFL with the Jets, Tampa Bay Buccaneers, Dallas Cowboys and Carolina Panthers, earning three Pro Bowls and the Super Bowl XXXVII title.

**Defensive Tackle Shy Tuttle** - Uncle, Perry Tuttle played wide receiver on Clemson's national championship team in 1981, who was a first round pick of the Bills in 1982 and then played three NFL seasons with the Bills, Falcons and Tampa Bay.

**Linebacker Pete Werner** - Father, Greg, played two years in the NFL with the New York Jets and Philadelphia Eagles.

**Senior Scouting Consultant Scott Campbell** - Late father, Marion, played for the San Francisco 49ers (1954-55) and Philadelphia Eagles (1956-61) as one of the league's last two-way players along the line as a two-time Pro Bowl selection and first-team All-Pro (1960), was a defensive assistant with the New England Patriots (1962-63), Minnesota Vikings (1964-66), Los Angeles Rams (1967-68), Eagles (1977-82) and Atlanta Falcons (1969-74) and former head coach of the Eagles (1983-85) and Falcons (1987-89).

**Area Scout Joey Vitt** - Father, Joe Vitt, is a longtime National Football League assistant coach, who served as assistant head coach/linebackers of the Saints from 2006-16 and also had coaching stints with the Seattle Seahawks, Colts, Los Angeles/St. Louis Rams, Kansas City Chiefs and Jets.

**Combine Scout Matt Phillips** - Father, Ted is the president/CEO of the Chicago Bears.

Five members of the 2021 Saints coaching staff have prior playing experience in the National Football League.

Head Coach **Sean Payton** - Played for the Bears in 1987.

Quarterbacks Coach **Ronald Curry** - A seventh round draft pick (235th overall) of the Raiders in 2002 out of the North Carolina and played for the Oakland Raiders from 2002-08, appearing in 76 games with 32 starts, registering 193 receptions for 2,347 yards with 13 touchdowns.

Secondary Coach **Kris Richard** - A third-round draft pick (85th overall) of Seattle in 2002, Richard played in 38 games at cornerback and on special teams with the Seahawks from 2002-04 before finishing his playing career with the San Francisco 49ers in 2005.

Assistant Offensive Line Coach **Zach Strief** - Entered the NFL as a seventh round draft pick of the Saints in 2006 and played for the team for 12 seasons, playing in 158 regular season games with 93 starts, opening 87 contests at right tackle and serving as a five-time offensive captain.

Pass Rush Specialist **Brian Young** - Played in the NFL from 2000-08 with the St. Louis Rams his first four seasons, who originally selected him in the fifth round of the 2000 NFL Draft (139th overall) from Texas-El Paso and final five campaigns with the Saints, playing in 124 games, recording 22.5 career sacks and eight fumble recoveries.

### WINNING STREAKS

Under Payton, the Saints have put together seven winning streaks of at least six games, headlined in 2020 by a nine-game win streak. ### DOUBLE DIGIT WINS

Finishing the 2020 regular season at 12-4, New Orleans has won at least ten games for the ninth time under Payton after posting double-digit win totals only five times from 1967-2005. In 2020, the Saints had the franchise's seventh season of at least 12 wins, five under Payton.

### IN THE NFC SOUTH

The Saints have the best record among NFC South teams since 2006, a time where they've won seven division titles including four straight from 2017-20, the most in division history and are only the third NFC team since 2002 to win a division four straight times. They've posted a 57-34 division mark since 2006 and in 2020 became the first team since the NFC South debuted in 2002 to finish the season 6-0 in the division. New Orleans has joined the 2004-07 Seattle Seahawks and 2011-14 Green Bay Packers to become only the third NFC team since divisional realignment in 2002 to win four consecutive division titles.

### PRACTICE MAKES PERFECT

A spot on the practice squad is another avenue to eventually get onto the active roster and have the opportunity to contribute. The Saints have nine players on their current 2021 53-man roster who moved up to their 53-man roster after being on NFL practice squads, all who spent time on the Saints practice roster before being promoted. Below is an overview of players on the club's current 53-man roster with extensive practice squad experience.

After spending the majority of 2019 on the practice squad, playing in five games with one start, WR **Lil' Jordan Humphrey** appeared in three games with one start in 2020 and posted three receptions for 46 yards with his first career touchdown, while adding a 14-yard grab in the post-season loss to Tampa Bay. Humphrey won a competition for a roster spot in the 2021 preseason, when he ranked second on the team in receiving with seven receptions for 103 yards and two touchdowns to tie for the team lead.

After appearing in three regular season games in 2017 with a four-year catch and posting two receptions for 12 yards and one touchdown in the 2018 NFC Championship game, TE **Garrett Griffin** was elevated to the club's active roster multiple times in 2020, playing in four games with three starts, serving as a blocking presence and has appeared in all six in 2021.

RB **Dwayne Washington** participated on the Saints practice squad briefly in 2018 after spending most of the 2016 and 2017 seasons on Detroit's active roster. Through development, the tailback, in addition to his running skills, has developed into a core special teams player with eight stops.

K **Brian Johnson** was signed as an undrafted free agent who went to training camp with Chicago out of Virginia Tech, starting the season on their practice squad. Signed by New Orleans during the bye, Johnson made his NFL regular season debut on Monday night at Seattle and drilled a game-winning 33-yard field goal with 1:56 remaining.

TE **Juwan Johnson** was signed by New Orleans out of Oregon, where he spent his graduate transfer season following the 2020 NFL Draft as a wideout. Recording four receptions for 39 yards seven contests, Johnson spent the majority of the season on the practice squad. Converted to tight end in 2021, Johnson's taken advantage of his large frame and participation in his first full offseason strength and conditioning program, posting three receptions for 80 yards in the preseason. the season-opening win over Green Bay, Johnson posted three receptions for 21 yards and two touchdowns. Overall, Johnson has six receptions for 64 yards with three touchdowns, tied for the team lead.

After spending the second half of the 2020 season on the practice squad and the 2019 regular season out of football, DL **Christian Ringo** secured a roster spot in the team's 2021 defensive line rotation. Also having practice squad stints with Detroit, Dallas and Green Bay, Ringo has played in 23 games for five teams and recorded 20 tackles, 1.5 sacks and one forced fumble. Ringo has opened all three games on the interior for New Orleans, posting seven tackles (four solo), while plugging the middle for the NFL's third-ranked run defense.

After spending the last six weeks of the 2019 season and the first 16 weeks of the 2020 campaign on the team's practice squad, LB **Andrew Dowell** was elevated to the club's active roster for the regular season finale at Carolina. Ahead is a synopsis of several returning players and newcomers through the draft and free agency to the 2021 Saints offensive line:

**Left Tackle Terron Armstead** - The club's first third round draft choice in 2013 out of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, Armstead impressed scouts by running the fastest 40-yard dash time (4.71) by an offensive lineman in the history of the NFL Scouting Combine. He's opened 89 regular season games and nine postseason contests and has been selected to the Pro Bowl the past three seasons, as well as being selected as the club's 2019 Man of the Year and the team nominee for the NFL's Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award.

**Tackle/Guard Andrus Peat** - A first round selection (13th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Peat was considered one of the top college linemen in 2014. In his first seven seasons, he's played in 80 regular season games with 73 starts, opening a contest at every position except center. In 2020, he opened 13 contests at left guard as he was part of the NFC Pro squad for the third consecutive season.

**Right Tackle Ryan Ramczyk** - The Black and Gold used their second first round selection in the 2017 NFL Draft to

snag Ramczyk out of Wisconsin, viewed by many as one of the best linemen in the entire draft. After opening all 16 games and both postseason contests in 2017 and being selected as a PFWA All-Rookie, he was an AP All-Pro selection at right tackle in 2018, not missing an offensive snap in both postseason contests and all 15 regular games at the right tackle position that he played in. Ramczyk opened all 16 regular season games in 2019 to serve as a dominating bookend to Armstead, earning first-team All-Pro. Opening every contest and playing a key role in blocking for a run offense that averaged over 200 yards per game in a three-game stretch for the first time since 2018 in three contests and finished the season ranked sixth in the league in rushing offense, Ramczyk was the team's 2020 nominee for the NFL's Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award and was selected as a second-team AP All-Pro.

**Center/Guard Erik McCoy** - New Orleans traded up in the second round of the 2019 NFL Draft to select this standout from Texas A&M, who was a three-year starter, anchoring the middle of the Aggies offensive line. In 2018, he was a team captain who paved the way for the SEC's leading rusher and in 2019 was the first Saint in franchise history to start at center in Week One, opening all 16 regular season contests. McCoy opened all 16 contests and both postseason games in 2020 for the NFL's sixth-ranked rushing offense.

**Guard/Center Cesar Ruiz** - The hard-working, talented and intelligent lineman is a perfect fit for New Orleans' culture with the 24th pick in the 2020 NFL Draft out of Michigan. The three-year letterman played in 36 games in college, starting his last 31 including the final 26 at center, earning All-Big Ten in 2019. Ruiz settled in at right guard in the last 15 games, with nine start, as well as both postseason contests. When McCoy suffered a lower leg injury in the first quarter of the season-opening win over Green Bay, Ruiz transitioned over to his natural position, where the Saints did not give up a sack and has started the past four contests in the middle. He returned to right guard on Monday night at Seattle.

**Offensive Lineman Calvin Throckmorton** - This 6-5, 309 pound former four-year starter on the Oregon line was signed as an undrafted free agent in 2020, possessing the flexibility to play all five positions along the offensive line. After spending his rookie season on the practice squad, Throckmorton increased strength in the 2021 offseason and made strides in training camp, securing a roster spot. In his NFL debut in the season opening-win, Throckmorton was called to play right guard following a lower leg injury to McCoy in the first quarter, subsequently starting the past four contests. He then moved into left guard on Monday night at Seattle following a shoulder injury to Andrus Peat.

## OFFENSIVE NOTES

**Tackle Landon Young** - A mainstay at left tackle for his entire college career at Kentucky, Young played in 49 contests with 30 starts in his college career. The Lexington, Ky. native was selected by New Orleans in the sixth round of the 2021 NFL Draft and held up to the competition in training camp to snare a roster spot.

**Tackle/Guard James Hurst** - An eight-year NFL veteran who was signed as a free agent from Baltimore in 2020, Hurst has 106 career regular season appearances with 52 at three different positions on the inside and outside. His versatility came in handy in 2020, as he started two contests at left tackle and one at left guard and the Saints gained over 200 yards rushing each time. Hurst moved into the lineup for three games at left tackle in place of an injured Armstead.

## DEFENSIVE NOTES

### DEFENSIVE DRAFTS

Over the last seven drafts from 2015-21, New Orleans has shown a commitment to defense, spending 18-of-32 picks on that side of the ball. With nine picks in the 2015 NFL Draft, the Saints picked six defensive players, the most taken since New Orleans chose nine in a 12-round selection meeting in 1990. Below is an overview of the defensive players selected by New Orleans from 2015-21 currently with the club:

**Cornerback Paulson Adebo, Stanford (D3-21)** - Selected in the third round (76th overall) of the 2021 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Adebo finished his college career playing in 22 games with 21 starts for Stanford and recording 97 tackles, 34 passes defended and eight interceptions, earning All-Pac-12 honors in both 2018 and 2019. He started in the season opener and became the first Saint to record an interception in his NFL debut since 2002 with a third quarter pick of Packers QB Aaron Rodgers. Adebo posted his second pick of the season in Week 6 at Washington to tie for the team lead.

**Linebacker Zack Baun, Wisconsin (D3a-20)** - Selected in the third round (74th overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft out of the University of Wisconsin, Baun finished his college career with 154 tackles, 15 sacks, two interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, six passes defended, three forced fumbles and a fumble recovery. The Saints were attracted to his playmaking ability that he displayed for the Badgers in 2019, when he ranked second in the Big Ten with a 19.5 stops for loss and 12 sacks (second among Power Five linebackers in both categories). Baun contributed in 13 regular season contests posting eight defensive stops and four coverage tackles and made two special teams stops in the NFC Divisional Playoff loss to Tampa Bay. Baun led New

Orleans with a career-high and team-leading five solo tackles in the season-opening win over Green Bay. Baun tied for the team lead with two special teams tackles in Monday night's win at Seattle.

**Defensive back C.J. Gardner-Johnson, Florida (D4-19)** Possessing a combination of instincts and speed, this Florida native was a solid value in the fourth round after playing in all 13 games with 12 starts for the Gators in 2018, when he posted 71 tackles, three sacks and four interceptions with two brought back for touchdowns. Gardner-Johnson appeared in all 16 contests with seven starts as a rookie in 2019, recording 46 tackles (35 solo), an interception, eight passes defended, one forced fumble and a fumble recovery. He finished third on the team with 65 stops in 2020. Gardner-Johnson has 13 stops (nine solo), one sack and one pass defended in his virtual role where he's opened all five contests he's played in this season.

**Cornerback Marshon Lattimore, Ohio State (D1a-17)** - The 11th overall selection in the 2017 NFL draft out of Ohio State and the first corner taken possesses all the traits of a lockdown defender. With his agile, fluid style, Lattimore has the ability to shut down the best wide receivers. In 2017 season, he finished with 53 stops, five picks, to lead NFL rookies and the Saints, tying a team rookie record, a club-best 18 passes defended, a forced fumble and a recovery. Lattimore was the first Saints corner selected to the Pro Bowl since 1995 and was selected as *AP* Defensive Rookie of the Year. His five takeaways (two interceptions and three fumble recoveries) in 2018 led the team, adding two more picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win. In the 2020 regular season, he led the cornerbacks with 63 tackles, two interceptions and ten passes defended as he was selected to his third Pro Bowl in 2020. Prior to the start of the regular season, Lattimore was signed by the club to a long-term contract extension. On Sept. 26, Lattimore recorded his first pick of 2021 to close out the Patriots in New England. He was named the Week 6 NFC Defensive Player of the Week, recording a career-high six passes defenses at Washington, the league's highest total since 2017.

**Defensive End Marcus Davenport, Texas-San Antonio (D1-18)** - Davenport joined the Saints with the 14th overall pick in the 2018 NFL Draft after showing potential and production as a pass rusher at Texas-San Antonio. In four seasons, Davenport posted 22 sacks, including 8.5 in 2017 when he captured Conference USA Defensive Player of the Year. Davenport's strength on the line is a valuable asset for the Saints front, playing an important role in the club's packages in 2018, recording 4.5 sacks. Davenport posted six sacks in 13 games. After missing five games with injuries in 2020, Davenport recorded a sack in the season-opening win over Green Bay and returned from Injured Reserve in Week Seven at Seattle.

**Defensive End Payton Turner, Houston (D1-21)** - Selected 28th overall in the first round of the 2021 NFL Draft, the Texas native comes off a senior campaign where he posted 10.5 tackles for loss and five sacks in only five contests. During his four collegiate seasons, Turner notched career totals of 115 tackles (68 solo), ten sacks, 25 tackles for loss, one interception, one forced fumble, ten passes defended and one blocked punt. Turner recorded five tackles and a sack in his NFL debut on September 19 at Carolina.

**Linebacker Pete Werner, Ohio State (D2-21)** - New Orleans selected this three-year starter from Ohio State to compete at the linebacker position. The Indianapolis, Ind. native finished his college career playing in 47 career games with 35 starts, recording 185 tackles (111 solo), 16 stops for loss, four sacks, 11 passes defended, four forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. Werner helped power the Buckeyes to the College Football Playoff championship game as a senior in 2020, when he was voted by Big Ten coaches as a first-team All-Conference selection and a Butkus Award semifinalist, posting 54 tackles, 2.5 stops for loss, one sack and two forced fumbles. Werner made his first career start in Week Three and on Oct. 3 vs. the New York Giants had ten tackles. Leading the team with 13 stops in Week 6 at the Washington Football Team, Werner became the first Saints rookie since 2015 to have back-to-back performances of double-digit stops. He ranks third on the club with 31 stops on the season.

**Free Safety Marcus Williams, Utah (D2-17)** - A three-year starter at the University of Utah, Williams was twice named All-Pac 12 and earned second-team All-American as a junior when he tied for second in the conference with five interceptions. The defender boasts a dangerous mix of speed, fluidity, and instinct that allows him to read offenses and make breaks on the football. His athleticism showed in his rookie season in as he made 70 tackles, four interceptions and six passes defended, adding ten more stops (seven solo) and another pick in the postseason. In 2019, he played in all 15 games with 14 starts, posting 52 tackles (35 solo), the team-high four picks, tied for eighth in the National Football League, 13 passes defended, a forced fumble and two coverage stops. In 2020, he had a club-best-tying three interceptions and is tied for the team lead with two picks in 2021.

**Cornerback P.J. Williams, Florida State (D3b-15)** - Williams' career was initially limited by missing all but two games his first two seasons with a hamstring injury (2015) and a concussion (2016), but he's rebounded to miss only two games with injury since. An experienced starter from Florida State, who developed into one of the nation's top cover corners, in 2019, he made 41 stops, a sack, an interception, three passes defended and one special teams stop, serving as the team's nickel corner for the second

straight season. In the Dec. 22, 2019 win at Tennessee, Williams further showed his versatility by making the switch to safety after Marcus Williams was forced to depart with a groin injury and then starting in Williams' place in the regular season finale at Carolina. In 2020, Williams posted 37 tackles, a club-best two defensive fumble recoveries, one interception, two passes defended and three special teams stops in 15 games. Williams is tied for the team lead with two picks in 2021 and has added seven tackles and three passes defense, playing in all five games with one start.

### IN THE NFL

After ranking 11th in 2020, the New Orleans defense finished the 2020 regular season ranked fourth in the National Football League in opponent net yards per game. Through the first seven weeks of the 2021 season, New Orleans is ranked eighth in the NFL, giving up only 219 total net yards at Seattle on Monday night.

### STOPPING THE RUN

In rush defense, the Saints gave up only 80.2 net yards per

game in 2018, second in the National Football League after giving up 129.4 per game in 2017. The 2019 Saints finished fourth in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game (91.3). 2018-19 marked only the second time they did so in back-to-back seasons in franchise history, joining the 1986-1987 teams. The 2020 Saints were fourth in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per carry.

The Saints produced their most impressive run-stopping effort in several seasons in 2018 and carried it over in 2019 and 2020. In seven straight games in 2018, they didn't surrender 100 rushing yards to an opponent for the first time since 2007 had a seven-game run in 2020. The Saints have not given up 100 yards rushing in their last four regular season contests. Below are the longest streaks in team history the defense has gone without surrendering 100 yards. Between 2017-20 they didn't allow a 100-yard rusher in a 55 straight games (regular season and postseason), the longest streak in NFL history. In holding Buccaneers TB Ronald Jones to nine yards on Nov. 8, New Orleans' efforts produced dominant results as his rushing total was the lowest for a leading rusher in a contest for an opponent during this streak. In Keeping San Francisco RB Jerrick McKinnon to 18 carries for 33 yards (1.8 avg.), New Orleans set the NFL record for the longest streak of keeping individual rushers under 100.

After spending the bulk of the 2019 and 2020 season on the Saints practice squad, Dowell recorded his first career blocked punt on September 26 at New England.

Signed as an undrafted free agent in 2019 out of Wyoming, the height of the 6-5 Granderson, helps in leverage in block units, shown when he blocked a 55-yard field goal attempt on Sept. 19 at Carolina. He recorded a stop in Monday night's win at Seattle.

Gray led the team in 2019 with 17 stops, blocked a punt and recovered a fumble on a muffed punt as he was selected an AP second-team All-Pro. Gray, voted by his teammates as the Saints special teams captain, led the team with two stops in the season opener and is tied for the team lead with five stops in 2021, a team-best five solo.

Heath is a nine-year NFL veteran who signed with New Orleans during training camp after spending the first seven seasons of his NFL career in Dallas and 2020 in Las Vegas, posting 62 career coverage stops.

Montgomery, a seven-year National Football League veteran, was originally a third round pick of the Packers in 2015 out of Stanford. He can play tailback and wideout and also possesses the ability to return kicks. In the season opener against Green Bay, Montgomery downed a punt at the Packers five-yard line and had his first career special teams stop. On Sept. 19 at Carolina, he followed it up with three coverage stops and leads the team with five tackles. Montgomery also contributed on kickoff return in Deonte Harris' absence at Seattle on Monday night and had a 33-yard return.

Washington is a sixth-year NFL veteran who was originally a seventh round draft pick of the Detroit Lions in 2016. In addition to his value in providing dependable depth at the tailback, Washington has excelled on special teams for New Orleans. In his career, he has posted 11 coverage stops and one blocked punt recovery.

Williams, in his seventh season, has continued to add to his versatility the past two seasons, flipping between cornerback and free safety on multiple occasions as well as increasing his contributions to the coverage units, where he posted four regular season stops in 2020 and his first post-season coverage tackle in the NFC wild card playoff win over Chicago.

Harris has made an impact on New Orleans' return game since being picked up as an undrafted free agent in 2019. Harris was signed following the NFL Draft out of NCAA Division II Assumption, where he finished his college career as one of the most prolific returners in NCAA history. In the final game of his college career, he set the NCAA-All Division record for career combined return touchdowns (14).

In 2019, Harris brought back 36 punts for 338 yards (9.4 avg.), ranked first in the NFC and fourth in the National Football League in punt return average, ranked second among rookies, following a 53-yard runback for a touchdown in the first quarter of the Sept. 22 33-27 win at Seattle.

In 2020, despite playing in only nine games due to injuries, Harris showed his abilities to make big plays, averaging 9.3 yards per punt return, 27.3 yards per kickoff return and catching 20 passes for 186 yards and one touchdown. He returned to the active roster from Injured Reserve for the wild card win over Chicago and led the team in receiving with seven receptions for 83 yards. The following week in the NFC Divisional Playoff vs. Tampa Bay, Harris returned a punt 54 yards.

## QUARTERBACKS

### JAMEIS WINSTON

- Winston signed with New Orleans as an unrestricted free agent after the 2020 NFL Draft after starting all 16 games for Tampa Bay in 2019, completing 380-of-626 passes (60.7%) for 5,109 yards with 33 touchdowns and an 84.3 rating, also carrying 59 times for 250 yards with one touchdown. Winston's NFL-high passing yardage total was the eighth-highest total in NFL record books as he became only the eighth passer to reach 5,000 yards in a season. In Week 14 and 15 wins, Winston tossed for 456 and 458 yards, becoming the only player in NFL history to pass for 450 yards in consecutive contests.

- Overall, the Bessemer, Ala. Native has appeared in 82 regular season games with 76 starts, completing 1,659-of-2,710 passes (61.2%) for 20,926 yards with 134 touchdowns, 91 interceptions and an 87.8 passer rating, while adding 1,164 rushing yards and 11 touchdowns. After seeing limited action in 2020, behind Drew Brees and Taysom Hill, Winston secured the starting spot in the preseason, when he completed 16-of-22 passes for 219 yards, three touchdowns, one interception and a 124.8 passer rating.

- Winston's completed 89-of-151 passes for 1,114 yards, 13 touchdowns, three interceptions and a 102.4 passer rating, ranked first in the NFL in touchdown percentage (8.6).

## POWERFUL START

In the Sept. 12 opener vs. Green Bay played in Jacksonville, Fla., Winston had one of the most impressive first starts in a Black and Gold uniform amongst its signal-callers. He passed for 148 yards on 14-of-20 passing

(70.0%) with a 130.8 rating. Winston threw five touchdown passes, with a long of 55 yards on a pass to Deonte Harris. His five touchdown passes tied a career high from when he threw five touchdowns against Philadelphia (11/22/15) as a member of the Buccaneers. He also finished with 37 rushing yards on six attempts. In his first start with the Saints, Winston became the third player since 1950 to throw for five touchdowns in his first start with a team. Winston's 148 passing yards is the fewest yards with five passing touchdowns since 1948. With zero interceptions, Winston became the first quarterback in NFL history to throw five touchdown passes with no interceptions in his first career start with a new team in an opener. Overall, Winston became the seventh quarterback with five touchdowns and no interceptions in an opener, and first since Baltimore QB Lamar Jackson did so at Miami on Sept. 8, 2019. Winston became the 33rd player to start a game at quarterback for New Orleans, and the 11th to win in his first start. The victory was Winston's third career opening day victory and his first career win over Green Bay.

## SAINTS MNF DEBUT

Winston made his Monday Night Football debut as a Saint at Seattle, starting his first contest in the spectacle since 2017 and helped lead New Orleans to a 13-10 win with his gritty play. Completing 19-of-35 passes for 222 yards with one touchdown and zero interceptions, Winston also made plays with his legs when needed, carrying eight times for 40 yards, including successfully converting two fourth down conversions. Winston also helped successfully convert the fourth quarter game-winning drive that ended with a 33-yard field goal with 1:56 left, converting key first down completions to wideouts Marquez Callaway and Tre'Quan Smith. Winston now has a 2-1 record in three Monday night contests with his next scheduled for December 27 vs. Miami at the Caesars Superdome.

## SECOND THROUGH FIVE

In his first five National Football League seasons, Jameis Winston threw for 19,737 yards as a member of this week's opponent, the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, the second-most yards ever by a player from their rookie season through their fifth season.

### TAYSOM HILL

Hill's brought unheralded versatility to the Saints offense and special teams. A constant participant on special teams from midseason in 2017 to midseason in 2020, as well as the backup signal-caller and as a runner and receiver, in 2018, Hill averaged 24.9 yards per return on 14 kickoff returns, had six coverage stops, second on the team, completed a ten-yard pass on a fake punt and blocked a punt. Overall, Hill carried 37 times for 196 yards (5.3 avg.), third on the team, with two touchdowns and completed three of seven passes for 64 yards. The blocked punt that sparked a division-clinching win at Tampa Bay, earning him Week 14 NFC Special Teams Player of the Week. In the postseason, he caught a touchdown, made a special teams tackle and executed a successful fake punt, making significant contributions in all facets as the team advanced to the NFC Championship game for the third time in franchise history.

In 2019, Hill carried 27 times for 156 yards (5.8 avg.) with a touchdown, catching 19 passes for 234 yards with six TDs, deflecting a punt and posting two coverage stops. He ranked third on the club in touchdowns and third in receiving TDs. After a multi-threat performance Thanksgiving night at Atlanta, when he deflected a punt and caught and rushed for a touchdown. Hill became the first quarterback to rush for and catch a touchdown in the same contest since Jim McMahon (1983). In a valiant postseason effort vs. Minnesota, Hill led the team in rushing with four carries for 50 yards, caught two passes for 25 yards with a TD and completed a 50-yard pass.

In 2020, Hill contributed on multiple facets, completing 88-of-121 passes (72.7%) for 928 yards with a 98.8 rating, rushing 87 times for 457 (5.3 avg.) yards with eight touchdowns, catching eight passes for 98 yards with a TD and playing on special teams units until Brees' rib injury. Following Brees' injury, November 15, Hill went 3-1 in four starts.

In the 2021 season-opening win, Hill contributed to a 38-3 victory over Green Bay, completing a pass for three yards, rushing twice, including gaining a first down once and playing on special teams. Sept. 19 at Carolina, Hill started at tight end and rushed twice for 16 yards and added one coverage stop. In the September 26 win at New England, Hill carried six times for 32 yards, while his fourth quarter four-yard touchdown run helped seal the win. Oct. 3 vs. the New York Giants, Hill scored two rushing touchdowns for the third time in his career. Overall, he's completed three of four passes for 12 yards, carried 16 times for 77 yards (4.8 avg.) with a club-best three touchdowns, caught three passes for 37 yards and added a special teams stop.

## A DAY FOR FIRSTS

In Brees' absence in 2020, Hill received his first career start on November 22, 2020 vs. Atlanta and completed 18-of-23 passes for 233 yards, while carrying ten times for 51 yard with two touchdowns and a 108.9 passer rating in leading New Orleans to a 24-9 win over the Falcons.

Hill joined Daunte Culpepper as he second player in the Super Bowl era with 40+ rushing yards and 2+ rushing TDs in his first QB start. He became the first Saints signal-caller to rush for 50+ yards and 2+ TDs, since Archie Manning carried seven times for 52 yards and two scores in a 24-14 win over Dallas at Tulane stadium on Oct. 17, 1971.

## VERSATILE VICTOR

Hill followed Head Coach Sean Payton and his coaching staff's game plan in a 31-3 victory over Denver on Nov. 29, 2020 that called for more of a ground-based effort. Completing nine of 16 passes, he also was a key part of a ground game that gained a season-high 229 yards, carrying ten times for 44 yards with two touchdowns of his own on the ground for the second consecutive week himself.

## ON THE RUN

In the December 6, 2021, 21-16 win at Atlanta to punch New Orleans' playoff ticket for the fourth straight season, Hill was a threat both with his arm and legs, completing 27-of-37 passes for 232 yards, his first two career touchdown passes and a 107.0 passer rating. In the run game, Hill carried 15 times for a career-high 83 yards (5.9 avg.), including a career-long 43-yard rush. Hill became the first Saints signal-caller to win his first three career starts at the position, joining Brees as the second Saint to win his first three starts in Black and Gold.

Hill enjoyed the most prolific rushing season in franchise history for a Black and Gold signal-caller in 2020, helping them maintain high seeding status in the NFC postseason race in Brees' absence with his arm, legs and leadership. Hill's 457 rushing yards ranked first all-time in club record books for Saints quarterbacks in a single season, while his rushing touchdown total is first. Hill finished the regular season ranked fifth among National Football League signal-callers in rushing yardage, tied for third in rushing touchdowns.

### TREVOR SIEMIAN

- Siemian brings addition starting experience to the Saints quarterback room in addition to Winston and Hill. Originally a seventh round draft pick in the 2015 NFL Draft by the Denver Broncos out of Northwestern, Siemian has played in 27 career games with 25 starts, completing 498-of-841 passes for 5,689 yards with 30 touchdowns and 24 interceptions.

### IAN BOOK

- Book was the team's fourth round pick out of Notre Dame, where he was the Fighting Irish's winningest quarterback of all time (30 victories). In four seasons in South Bend, Book played in 45 games and completed 728-of-1,141 attempts for 8,949 yards, 72 touchdowns and 20 interceptions, while carrying 360 times for 1,518 yards and 17 TDs.

## RUNNING BACKS

### ALVIN KAMARA

- A talented runner and receiver with a 5-10, 215-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft out of Tennessee, Kamara enjoyed an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranked first on the club and sixth in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage (1,554), second on the team in rushing and receiving, carrying 120 times for 728 yards (6.1 avg.) with eight TDs and a two-point conversion, catching 81 passes for 826 yards (10.2 avg.) with five TDs and a kickoff return for a TD for a club rookie record 14 total scores, tied for second in the NFL. Kamara finished first in the National Football League in yards per carry.

- Kamara was the first Saints offensive rookie selected to the Pro Bowl since Rueben Mayes (1986), as an *Associated Press* second team All-Pro (flex), the clubs' first rookie All-Pro since 1993. He was named *The Sporting News* NFL Rookie of the Year and AP NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year.

- Since entering the NFL in 2017, Kamara ranks third in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage (6,824) behind Ezekiel Elliott (6,973) and Derrick Henry (6,948).

- After signing a long-term contract extension on the eve of the 2020 regular season, Kamara even exceeded expectations as one of the most electric players in the National Football League. He carried 187 times for a career-high 932 yards (5.0 avg.) with 16 touchdowns, tied for first in the NFL. He led all running backs in receiving with a career-high and team best 83 receptions for 756 yards (9.1 avg.) with five touchdowns. Kamara, who was the second Saint to lead the team in both rushing and receiving, currently led the NFL with a franchise-record 21 total touchdowns, was second with 93 first downs and third with a career-best 1,688 total yards from scrimmage, the seventh-highest total in club history.

- Kamara enjoyed a productive start to the season in the season-opening win over Green Bay, when he started and

finished with 83 rushing yards on 20 attempts. He now stands at 3,423 career rushing yards, surpassing Chuck Muncie and Rueben Mayes for sixth place in the Saints' record books. Kamara added eight receiving yards on three receptions, with one receiving touchdown, surpassing Pierre Thomas for the seventh-most receptions in club record books and the most receptions all-time for a Saints running back.

- Through the first seven weeks of 2021, Kamara leads the Saints in rushing and receiving, carrying 114 times for 419 yards and one touchdown and catching 25 passes for 241 yards with four touchdowns for a club-best 660 total yards from scrimmage, ranked eighth in the NFL.

## TOUCHDOWN LEADER

In the Saints' 2020 Christmas Day 52-33 win over the Vikings, Kamara tied the NFL record for total touchdowns and rushing touchdowns, as he carried 22 times for a career-high 155 yards (7.0 avg.), adding three receptions for 17 yards for 172 total yards from scrimmage. The rushing touchdowns record tied the record held by Ernie Nevers of the Chicago Cardinals since Nov. 28, 1929, while for total touchdowns, Kamara joins Nevers, the Cleveland Browns' Dub Jones (Nov. 25, 1951) and Chicago's Gayle Sayers (Dec. 12, 1965). ### MICHAEL THOMAS

• A talented wideout with a 6-3, 212-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the second round of the 2016 NFL Draft out of Ohio State, Thomas had an outstanding rookie campaign, leading the team with 92 receptions for 1,137 yards and a nine TDs. He became the first Saints rookie to break 1,000 yards since Marques Colston (1,038-2006). In 2017, Thomas was New Orleans' receiving leader, making 104 receptions for 1,245 yards with five TDs to rank third in the league and making him only the second player in NFL records, joining Odell Beckham Jr. to have 90 catches in each of his first two seasons, his 196 grabs being the most by a player in in his first two seasons.

**TOPS THROUGH FIVE**

After being hobbled by ankle and hamstring injuries the first half of the 2020 season, Thomas came through in a big way in the team's 24-9 win over Atlanta on November 22 with nine receptions for 104 yards as with 489 career receptions at the end of the day, the total marked the most grabs in a player's first five seasons. With nine grabs for 105 yards on December 6 at Atlanta in his 69th career game, Thomas became the fastest player in National Football League record books to record 500 receptions. After missing nine games, Thomas posted 40 grabs for 438 yards in seven contests. Thomas has spent the first six weeks of the 2021 season on the Reserve/PUP list as he recovers from offseason ankle surgery.

### MARQUEZ CALLAWAY

• After a productive college career on offense and special teams at Tennessee, Callaway joined the Black and Gold as an undrafted free agent in 2020. Appearing in 11 games with three starts, Callaway posted 21 receptions for 213 yards and also made an impact as a gunner and punt returner. He returned 11 punts for 122 yards (11.1 avg.), four kickoff returns for 94 yards (23.5 avg.) and recovered two punts on special teams. In 2021, Callaway looks to build off an impressive all-around rookie campaign.

## Q FACTOR

In the September 26 win at New England, Callaway had four reception for 48 yards and scored his first career NFL touchdown from Jameis Winston.

The Tennessee product product then made a couple of big catches on October 3 vs. the New York Giants, catching two receptions for 74 yards, including a 58-yard grab in the second half.

In the Week Five win at the Washington Football Team, Callaway posted four receptions for 85 yards with a career-high two touchdowns, including a perfectly anticipated 49-yard "Hail Mary" scoring reception from Winston at the end of the first half.

Although Callaway had only three receptions for 32 yards in Monday night's win at Seattle, he saved his best for last with a fourth quarter 13-yard reception that advanced New Orleans to the Seahawks six-yard line and set up a 33-yard field goal.

## DEEP THREAT

With 16 grabs for 254 yards with the three scores, Callaway's 15.9 yards per catch average ranks second on the team and 17th in the NFL.

### TRE'QUAN SMITH

• A talented fourth-year wideout, who was selected by New Orleans in the third round of the 2018 draft out of Central Florida, the 6-1, 210-pounder emerged as one of the Knights' top weapons from 2015-17 and was a key figure in their emergence. During that period, he caught 168 passes for 2,748 yards (16.4 avg.) with 22 touchdowns. In his final campaign for the 13-0 Knights in 2017, Smith appeared in and started all 13 games and hauled in 54 receptions for 1,082 yards (19.9 avg.) and 13 touchdowns.

• Smith recorded five touchdowns apiece in each of his first two seasons and achieved more consistency in 2020, when he posted a career-high 34 receptions for 448 yards (13.2. avg.) with four TDs to rank fourth on the Black and Gold in receiving. He was activated off Injured Reserve for the NFC Divisional Playoff vs. Tampa Bay, where he recorded three receptions for 85 yards (28.3 avg.) with scoring grabs from Drew Brees and Jameis Winston.

• Activated off Injured Reserve for Monday night's win over Seattle, Smith overcame some early struggles to catch an 11-yard pass on New Orleans' game-winning drive to move the Saints into field goal range and also was an asset with his blocking.

## TIGHT ENDS

### ADAM TRAUTMAN

• The Saints were pleased to find the 6-5, 253-pound Trautman available near the end of the third round of the 2020 NFL Draft and made an aggressive trade up to the 105th pick to add him out of the University of Dayton. A converted high school quarterback, the Michigan native moved to tight end as a freshman developed into one of the top offensive player in NCAA FCS football, where he played in 44 games, recording 178 receptions for 2,295 yards (12.9 avg.) and 31 touchdowns. Though 16 regular season contests, Trautman posted 15 receptions for 171 yards with one touchdown while also impressively developing his blocking ability. In his 2021 debut against Green Bay, Trautman caught three balls for 18 yards. In the Week Five win at the Washington Football Team, he added two grabs for 43 yards, including a fourth quarter 32-yard grab.

## DEFENSIVE LINE

### CAMERON JORDAN

•New Orleans' first choice in the 2011 NFL Draft (24th overall) out of the University of California, Jordan enjoyed another standout season in 2019, posting 53 tackles (37 solo) with a career-high 15.5 sacks, to rank third in the NFL in takedowns, three passes defended and one fumble recovery.as he was selected to his fifth Pro Bowl and a second-team AP All-Pro selection. With 94.5 sacks in ten seasons, Jordan's second on the Saints career sack list. He's also proven to be one of the NFL's best run defenders, playing an important role in top five rush defenses in each of the past three seasons.

**CARL GRANDERSON**

•Signed by New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of Wyoming, Granderson posted 17.5 career sacks in college and possesses the perfect body type for a pass rusher. As a rookie, Granderson appeared in eight regular season contests, posting ten tackles and one sack as he moved into the defensive line rotation in December and is expected to see more action in 2020. In 2020, Granderson added 11 tackles, five sacks, ranked fourth on the team, a club-best two forced fumbles and one pass defended as he has seen more extensive time in the club's defensive line rotation as his game experience has continued to increase. On September 19 at Carolina, Granderson received his first start in place of an injured Marcus Davenport and blocked his first career field goal on special teams. In Week Five at

the Washington Football Team, Granderson recorded his first takedown of 2021. In Monday night's win at Seattle, he posted a special teams stop.

**MALCOLM ROACH**

•Signed as an undrafted free agent out of Texas in 2020, the Baton Rouge native has played in all four games with two starts in 2021, posting five tackles (two solo), one interception and one pass defense, helping hold down the interior for the NFL's second-ranked rush defense.

**TANO KPASSAGNON**

• Kpassagnon joined the Saints via unrestricted free agency in the offseason, looking to bring his size, speed and athleticism to one of the most productive lines in the NFL. Formerly a second round draft choice in the 2017 NFL Draft (59th overall) out of Villanova by Kansas City, Kpassagnon spent his first four seasons developing into a pass rushing presence along the Chiefs front. He started 15-of-16 games for Kansas City in 2020, recording 28 tackles (20 solo), one sack and three passes defended while starting all three postseason contests with five tackles (one solo), one sack and one pass defense in the Chiefs' run to Super Bowl LV. For his career, the fifth-year pro has appeared in 65 regular season games with 27 starts, recording 85 tackles (65 solo), nine sacks, seven passes defended, one fumble recovery, two forced fumbles, one special teams stop and a blocked field goal. Kpassagnon has also started six-of-eight postseason contests for Kansas City, posting ten tackles (seven solo), three sacks and two passes defended.

• In his Saints debut on September 12, Kpassagnon's sack/forced fumble recovered by Kaden Elliss at the New Orleans two-yard line in the fourth quarter against Green Bay, would keep the Packers out of the end zone for the season-opening win. He added a second sack in the team's win at New England, Sept. 26 to take the team lead for takedowns. Following a sack in Monday night's win at Seattle, Kpassagnon is tied with Demario Davis for the team's sack lead.

• This dependable and sure-tackling defender joined the Saints after a breakout 2017, where he started 16 games for the Jets. Davis posted a team-high and career-high 165 tackles (112 solo) and a career-best five sacks. For his career, the Brandon, Miss. native has appeared in 150 games with 135 starts for the Jets (2012-15, 2017), Cleveland (2016) and Saints, recording 1,049 tackles (696 solo), 29.5 sacks, two interceptions, 42 passes defended, three forced fumbles, five fumble recoveries and 24 special team stops.

• In 2018, Davis opened all 16 contests and led the team with 110 stops (74 solo), five sacks to lead the linebackers, four passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. Davis' abilities to diagnose and tackle played a key role in New Orleans ranking second in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. Participating in the postseason for the first time, Davis led the defense with 22 stops (15 solo), an interception in the NFC Championship and a pass defense. **ZACK BAUN**

• An athletic, sideline to sideline linebacker, possessing the rare combination of pass rush skills and the ability to drop in coverage. After a stellar college career at Wisconsin, Baun played in 15 regular season games in 2020, with three starts at strongside linebacker, posting eight tackles (three solo) and four special teams stops. Overall in his college career, he played in 39 games with 27 starts, all which took place in his final two seasons, recording 154 tackles, 30.5 stops for loss, 15 sacks, two interceptions and three forced fumbles.

• Baun took advantage of a conventional training camp and preseason to gain strength and knowledge of the defense, which was on display when he led the team with five solo tackles in the season opening win vs. Green Bay.

**KADEN ELLISS**

• Kaden Elliss was selected by the Saints with their second of two seventh round draft choices (244th overall) in 2019 out of Idaho. Elliss is a strong, athletic player with coverage, pass rush and run-stopping abilities who bounced back after missing the majority of 2019 (knee). In 2020, he appeared in 15 regular season games and two postseason contests on special teams recording five stops. The son of former NFL standout Luther Elliss, he will look to play a bigger role in 2021 utilizing his strength, speed and size. In the opening win over Green Bay, Elliss's adept recovery in the fourth quarter at the New Orleans two-yard line would keep the Packers out of the end zone for the contest.



PETE WERNER

New Orleans selected this three-year starter from Ohio State to compete at the linebacker position in the second round of the 2021 NFL Draft. The Indianapolis, Ind. native finished his college career playing in 47 career games with 35 starts, recording 185 tackles (111 solo), 16 stops for loss, four sacks, 11 passes defended, four forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. Werner helped power the Buckeyes to the College Football Playoff championship game as a senior in 2020, when he was voted by Big Ten coaches as a first-team All-Conference selection and a Butkus Award semifinalist, posting 54 tackles, 2.5 stops for loss, one sack and two forced fumbles. Werner made his second career start October 3 vs. the Giants and recorded a career-high ten tackles. With 13 stops in the Week Five win at Washington, the Indianapolis native became the first Saints rookie defender to reach double-digit totals in back-to-back games. He's third on the team with 31 stops.

- In the September 26 28-13 win at New England, Lattimore picked off Patriots QB Mac Jones in the game's next to last play to seal the victory.
- In the Week Five win over the Washington Football Team, Lattimore earned NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors, as he recorded a career-high six passes defended, the first time that occurred in the NFL since 2017 and tied for the second-highest total in the league since the 1992 season.

• A standout 2019 campaign by Lattimore resulted in him being voted to the Pro Bowl, the only Saints cornerback to ever be selected multiple times. Lattimore started all 14 games he played in and posted 57 stops, one interception and ranked first on the team with 14 passes defended.

• In 2020, he posted a career-high 62 tackles (52 solo), two interceptions and 11 passes defended as he was voted to the Pro Bowl for the third time. High expectations follow in 2021 as he signed a long-term contract extension to lock up the lockdown corner in the New Orleans secondary.

• After signing a contract extension at the start of the season, Lattimore's posted 18 stops, one pick and ten passes defended.

• After being selected in the second round of the 2017 NFL Draft (42<sup>nd</sup> overall) out of the Utah, this ball-hawking safety has started all 65 games he has appeared in, recording 258 tackles (193 solo), one sack, 15 interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, 33 passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. With a team-leading three interceptions in 2020, Williams' 15 picks since being drafted is tied for seventh in the NFL over that period, tied for third among safeties.

• Williams was a stalwart in the secondary for New Orleans in 2020, recording 59 tackles to ranked fourth on the team (40 solo), three interceptions and seven passes defended, to tied for the team lead in picks, while also recording a career-high nine stops, November 15, vs. San Francisco, topping it with a pick vs. Atlanta, November 22.

- Returning to New Orleans this offseason after six seasons in Philadelphia, Malcolm Jenkins is one of the National Football League's most intelligent and instinctive defensive backs. One of only two safeties in Saints history to be selected as an *Associated Press* All-Pro, Jenkins has played in 189 career games with 181 starts and has career totals of 1,246 tackles (887 solo), 13 sacks, 21 interceptions, with seven returned for touchdowns, 127 passes defended, 16 forced fumbles, nine fumble recoveries, one special teams fumble recovery, one blocked field goal and 44 special teams stops.

- In his 2020 Saints return, Jenkins finished the regular season ranked second on the team with 91 tackles (69 solo), filling up the stat sheet with two sacks, three interceptions to tie a career-high, ten passes defended, reaching double-digits in the category for the seventh consecutive season, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery through the first 16 contests of 2020, playing virtually every defensive snap, after being voted by his teammates as a team captain, Jenkins led the team with four takeaways on the season. His five touchdown passes tied a career-high from when he threw five touchdowns against the Eagles (11/22/15) as a member of Tampa Bay. He also finished with 37 rushing yards on six attempts. Winston earned his first victory as the starting quarterback for the black and gold. The victory is Winston's third career opening day victory and his first career win over Green Bay. **at Carolina (9/19):** Made his second start as a Saint, completing 11-of-22 passes for 111 yards and two interceptions. Winston got the Saints on the scoreboard with his first rushing touchdown of the season with 14:37 remaining in the fourth quarter. Winston eclipsed 20,000 career passing yards against the Panthers. **at New England (9/26):** Made his third start as a Saint, completing 13-of-21 passes for 128 yards and two scores. The win Sunday marks the 18th team Winston has defeated in his career as a starter. **vs. N.Y. Giants (10/3):** Winston completed 17-of-23 passes for 226 and one score on the afternoon, without having a chance to see the field in overtime. Winston's 58-yard completion to Marquez Callaway on the opening drive of the second half was his longest completion as a Saint, regular season or postseason. **NEW ORLEANS SAINTS AT SEATTLE SEAHAWKS**  
**MONDAY, OCTOBER 25, 2021 • LUMEN FIELD**  
**SAINTS POSTGAME NOTES**

- The New Orleans Saints improve their record to 4-2 and put them in sole possession of second place in the NFC South leading into Sunday's NFC South matchup against the 6-1 Tampa Bay Buccaneers at the Caesars Superdome with a 3:25 CT kickoff. The game will be broadcast on FOX (WVUE FOX 8 locally).
- Saints improve their all-time regular season record against the Seahawks to 9-6 and get their third consecutive win against the Seahawks dating back to a 25-20 overtime win at home on October 30, 2016.
- The Saints improve their record on Monday Night Football to 24-22, 17-8 under Head Coach Sean Payton. Payton's overall record on prime time to 35-16. Both New Orleans' and his record improves against Seattle in prime time to 2-1.
- Payton now has a 5-1 regular season record against the Seahawks, 3-1 at Lumen Field.
- With 156 career victories (regular season and postseason combined), Payton has now moved into a tie with Pittsburgh Steelers Head Coach Tomlin for 21<sup>st</sup> all-time in victories.
- The Saints currently have a streak of 310 regular season games without having been shut out, dating back to a 26-20 win at the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on September 6, 2002, at Raymond James Stadium, the longest running streak in the National Football League.
- The New Orleans defense surrendered only 219 yards and ten points and had a season-high five sacks. It marked the third time since Payton became head coach in 2006, that New Orleans surrendered ten or fewer points and had at least five sacks, occurring vs. Atlanta in 2020 and on September 25, 2006 in a 23-3 win over the Falcons to celebrate the reopening of the Superdome.
- The New Orleans Saints had their longest scoring drive of the season. This drive was 19 plays for 86 yards and accounted for a total of 10:16.
- New Orleans improves their road record to 3-1 in 2021 with their third straight road victory. Their 23-5 regular season road record since 2018 is the top winning percentage in the NFL (.821).
- Linebacker **Demario Davis** played in his 150<sup>th</sup> career regular season contest on Monday, having never missed one. He recorded a total of 10 tackles (7 solo), 4 tackles for loss, 2 sacks for the third time in his career and a pass defense that was almost an interception on fourth down on Seattle's final offensive play.
- Davis has 1,048 career tackles, needing 2 more stops to reach 1,050 for his career.
- Punter Blake Gillikin punted six times for 284 yards with a 47.5 gross punting average and 44.3 net with four punts inside the 20-yard line, including one downed at the Seattle one-yard line.
- Defensive back J.T. Gray and linebacker Zack Baun tied for the team lead with two special teams tackles apiece, both of Gray's stops being solo and Baun, one solo and one assisted.
- Strong safety Malcolm Jenkins finished with six tackles (three solo) and a sack on Seattle's final offensive possession.
- Running back Alvin Kamara tallied 179 total yards from scrimmage with 20 carries for 51 yards and ten receptions for 128 yards and one score.
- Kamara reception total of 351 for his career is now the second highest by an NFL player in his first five years passing Ladanian Tomlinson in the contest, only seven behind Roger Craig's 358.
- Kamara is the fastest in NFL history to reach 3,000 rushing and receiving yards in just 66 games.
- Kamara now has 351 career receptions and has surpassed Lance Moore for sixth in receptions for New Orleans Saints all-time. Kamara's 51 rush yards Monday Night

moved him into the top five rushing leaders in Saints history with 3,759 yards, surpassing Pierre Thomas.

- Kamara had first half career highs with 8 receptions for 109 receiving yards.
- Kamara became the first running back with 8+ receptions and 100+ receiving yards in the first half of a game since Brian Westbrook in week 13, 2004 against the Packers.
- Cameron Jordan recorded his first sack of the season in the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter against Geno Smith. Jordan surpassed Steve McMichael and is now tied with Robert Porcher and Ryan Kerrigan for 44<sup>th</sup> all time in sacks with 95.5 career sacks. Seattle signal-caller Geno Smith is the 38<sup>th</sup> player Jordan has sacked in his career.
- DE Tanoh Kpassagnon recorded his third sack of the season and is now tied for the team lead with three with Davis.
- Saints QB Jameis Winston now has a 2-1 record against Seattle, where he's completed 69-of-107 passes (64.5%) for 666 yards with five touchdowns, and one interception. Winston has a winning mark against six of the 28 teams he's opened a contest against. Starting his first Monday night football contest since 2017, having split two in the past, Winston improved his record on Monday nights to 2-1.
- Winston made his sixth start as a Saint, completing 19-of-35 passes for 222 yards and one score. He carried eight times for 40 yards (5.0 avg.) Winston engineered a fourth quarter game-winning drive, where he completed two passes for first downs, helping set up a 33-yard field goal by K Brian Johnson with two minutes left.

## HEAD COACH SEAN PAYTON

(On the outcome...) "It was a good win. Obviously, always a tough place to play on the road, dealing with the noise. I thought our defense really played well after the one explosive [play] early on. We knew it was going to be one of those games that field position was going to be important, ball security was going to be important, and I think preparing in our mind for what we thought the weather was going to be like, maybe it wasn't quite that . . . I never heard of a bomb typhoon, but that kind of gets your attention. For the most part I think we handled the weather. (The) Kicker did a great job. I thought the special teams and kicking game, we did some good things, too."

(On Alvin Kamara's play...) "Do you remember two years ago? Well, two years ago it was kind of a back-and-forth, low-scoring, not much. And in the two-minute drill, we hit him on a screen that put us up, and that was pretty significant. It was Teddy's (Bridgewater) first start, and you're always wanting to get the quarterback going a little bit. They play a lot of zone, and even in the single-safety zone they are really going to be into the hook areas deep, and I thought Jameis (Winston) did a good job, especially in that two-minute drill. That was significant when you can score like that and then start the half with the football. But (we) received a lot of soft zone in that I was asked at the end of the half, why Alvin so much? A lot of that was based on the depth of the underneath coverage. So Jameis was smart enough to keep dumping it to him. Typically (in) a good two-minute drill, there is always an underneath throw or two to the runners, and this was no different. Then it tightened up a little bit more in the second half."

(On the defense bouncing back after giving up a long touchdown early...) "Yeah, listen, man, they're competitive. We knew kind of it was going to be that type of game. I thought, there were a couple drives where they got extended a little bit because of penalties. We knew that crew was calling the most coming into this game, by far, both on offense and defensive fouls. And sure enough, I don't know what the totals were, but there were a lot of fouls called. And that was kind of on par with where they're at. They're first of 17, so we'll get a chance to look at that."

(On if he got an explanation on roughing passer...) "His was not roughing the passer. It was a helmet-to-helmet on the pass rush. So I don't think anyone was looking for that, and Shawn [Hochuli] explained it, and certainly I wasn't looking for it, either. But that's what the foul was."

(On if New Orleans tried to get Seattle to jump on a late field goal attempt...) "No, no, no no. We were fortunate, though. But it wasn't like a hard count or anything."

(On if, because of the tight officiating, he was concerned by the flare-ups between D.K. Metcalf and Marshon Lattimore...) "Yeah, because you don't want to bring 140 people to Seattle from New Orleans and lose because it gets away from you. Everyone's counting on everyone. And I get it. You want to be competitive. I think that's a sign of a team that eventually you know how to win, and to win, and to win, and to win, and that becomes everything. That's becomes everything. More important than anything else, it's leaving with another win. It's a young team. We're still preaching that message, but pretty soon you expect it. But then there's certain things, I've been in tight playoff games where personal fouls like that (cost). Everyone's counting on

you, no different than ball security, really. We're counting on, you're holding the ball. Everyone's counting on you."

(On his reasoning during the last drive for handing the ball to Alvin Kamara on third-and-10...) "Yeah, well, look. We're right outside the cusp of field goal range, and I knew we'd be getting a soft zone, and I knew we were getting kind of an edge rush defense up the field, and so it was a little gap scheme, a little power scheme, and the idea was maybe to get seven yards and get infield goal range. That honestly was what I was thinking. I knew it was going to be a soft zone, and we felt like the way the ends were rushing, that's different than a screen play, just a gap scheme that would be in the gun. I think that was important, too."

(On adjusting his game plan due to shifting weather...) "We worked all week on a plan, you know, we worked all week on what we like in the run game, what we like in the pass game, and as you get closer to the game, I think you go through in your mind how the game might unfold. We had a playoff game here in '13 where it was windy, wet, and so you just have to pay attention to the now and the present. I can't speak for last night's game, but that seemed damp and windy. This ended up being a little bit better than [that]. As a coach, you prepare for, you're telling them, and so I think overall it was a little bit less of a factor that I would have thought based on what I saw on the weather forecast."

(On the play of Demario Davis...) "Man, I just love the way he leads and plays with enthusiasm. He's really developed into not just run but pass as well. He's someone who has good instincts, can close the cushion on a run or a play in space. He tackles well. He's playing well, and I'm sure when we look at the tape tomorrow, we'll see a lot of good efforts. That was a good hard-fought win. It's tough."

(On the last defensive sequence of the game) "Obviously, when you get a sack in a final drive like that, it is significant. I don't know what the numbers are, but as soon as they're off-schedule, and you can sit at the sticks, it is tough to be a quarterback. It's one of those things you're always wanting to avoid. I thought it was going to be a low-scoring game. We thought about going for it early on. We kicked our first field goal, I think they did the same thing. Points were going to be at a premium tonight. I do not know what the charts say. We just felt like points were going to be important."

## **K BRIAN JOHNSON**

(On his thought process with this being his NFL debut) "Not to think about those things. Not to overthink things. I've just got to go out there and do what I have done plenty of times before. That was kind of my mentality coming into this game."

(On what it was like pregame) "It was tough trying to see what the wind was doing because it was changing constantly throughout pregame and the game itself. Just sticking with my plan that I had going into it, and really focusing on hitting my ball and hitting good contact that will cut through the wind that's giving to be whatever it's going to be out there. Rain, I'm not as concerned about rain as I am wind. I'll focus on the wind more than the rain."

(On if it makes a difference going from one end zone to the other) “I didn’t really notice too big of a difference in one end zone or the other because it was a pretty consistent wind pattern across the whole field. It wasn’t anything too crazy.”

(On how he feels knowing Wil Lutz will most likely return) “I’m looking to take advantage of the opportunities. Some rookies, especially kickers and punters, it takes a year or two to really get into the league. You kind of find your niche. I’m just looking to take advantage of the opportunities I’ve been given.”

## **RB ALVIN KAMARA**

(On if he thought he would have as big of an impact as he did) “I did not know what to expect. All I know is what we game planned for and what we did during the week. Every game has a life in of its’ own self and the flavor of this week ended up getting a lot of touches.”

(On if he enjoyed playing in Seattle) “It’s cool, it’s definitely a nice environment. Every time we come up here, the weather is bad but other than that, it’s cool.”

(On the Seahawks’ effort to stop the run tonight) “They’re a good front, don’t get me wrong. They play hard, the whole defense played hard, but we knew up front it would be a tough game to run the ball. Sometimes you get teams where you line up and you feel like you know what they’re doing. Those are the teams that play the hardest because they do what they do so well. They have Bobby (Wagner), Carlos (Dunlap II), Poona (Ford) in the middle, and a gang of guys. Jamal (Adams) is out there, and they are making plays, coming up, and hitting. You have to stay true and try to stay ahead of the chains. You can’t be discouraged when you get two yards and three yards, it’s going to come.”

## **QB JAMEIS WINSTON**

(On if the game played out the way he thought it would) “Yeah, we wanted to win and that’s what happened. It played out just like we wanted.”

(On how nice it is to lean on running back Alvin Kamara) “I can talk about how great of a player he is and how helpful he is to this offense just in general. (Alvin) is one of the most dominant players in this league so it’s always exciting when you put the ball in his hands and watch the things that he does.”

(On finding Kamara open on the touchdown pass after he initially dropped the snap) “It was a great call and I’m happy that he was able to get in there.”

(On getting offensive linemen Terron Armstead and Erik McCoy back in the lineup) “It was good to get in a rhythm and get (Erik and Terron) back. Those guys are leaders on that line so it’s good to see them have a great game and stay healthy.”



(On the weather conditions) “It wasn’t that bad. It was just a great game. They played good football and we played some good football so it was definitely a tough game.”

(On if they were trying to get more deep passes in this game) “I wish we could’ve hit a few. Like I said, we’re going to continue to get better. I was happy to have Kevin (White) up. He was open on a few of them. Like I said, we’re going to continue to get better and get healthy in that receiver room and just keep working.”

(On getting Mike Thomas back soon) “Absolutely. Absolutely we can’t wait for Mike to get back. But it was good to have (Tre’Quan Smith) back out there playing at a high level. I’m happy that he was able to get in the groove a little bit.”

(On if it was just heat of the moment between him and Tre’Quan Smith on the sidelines) “No, just communication. We had to get on the same page and that’s it.”

(On if there was something that happened on a specific play that led to that interaction between him and Tre’Quan) “No, we were just communicating. Everyone gets to talking. I just wanted it to be me and him. That’s all.”

(On when he decides to run with the ball rather than pass) “I’m always trying to pass. I’m always trying to look down the field and get a completion. It’s not really second guessing, I’m just feeling the situation and assess the coverage to see if I can get the ball down the field and then take off and run.”

(On if he wants run to be the last resort) “Absolutely.”

(On if it takes awhile to get back on the same page with a receiver if they’ve been gone for a while like Tre’Quan Smith has) “I think it’s a feel. This is his first game back. Tough environment to play. Just making sure that everyone hears the play correctly and everyone is on the same page. In terms of talent and execution, he’s just an incredible receiver, so it’s good to get him back. It’s good to get him good experience against a tough defense.”

(On the Seahawks double teaming Alvin Kamara in the second half and if that means other guys will have one-on-one opportunities) “Yeah, we just have to win on the outside and we will. They had a great gameplan in the second half of doubling (Alvin Kamara) and we’re going to have an answer for that.”

## **LB DEMARIO DAVIS**

(On defensive performance) “We take a lot of pride in our defense. We’ve got to be able to play complimentary football. We have a very high standard for our group and there’s no other way that we would take it. Defense on the field with the game on the line. We get excited and we play with a lot of energy in those situations.”

(On the defense getting sacks) “That’s a credit to the cover guys. We can take away the first read, and he has to hold the ball. Credit to the D coordinator and the d-line having a good rush plan for us. And then guys just executing their job. It’s fun to play on defense when you know that all you have to do is do your job and it’s going to work. Guys did their job. I think we were getting pressures early on, but we weren’t getting them to the ground, we’ve got to find a way to get him on the ground. They have a good offensive line. Geno (Smith) was making his reads and doing a good job, we just have to execute there.”

(On guys getting chippy with players on the other team) “Well, first of all, we want to be fundamentally sound. Penalties in between the whistles that’s one thing. But sometimes guys want to be tough on the field and talk after the play, and this is the most physical sport there is. You got seven seconds to be as physical as you want to be, you got to prove it between the whistles. I’m never going to be the guy to talk after the whistles and doing extra because at that point you’re just trying to bully someone. I’ve always been the guy that’s going to bully the bully. And teammates appreciate it when you have their back like that. I try to stay pretty level headed between the whistles and while I’m on the field but I’m always going to have my teammates back, and I think they appreciate it, and it gives them motivation.”

## **DE CAMERON JORDAN**

(On closing out close games) “I think that a game like this, where things are close, things get a little uppity towards the end, it builds confidence to close it out the way we did. In my mind it wasn’t as close as it was, I think that our defense played with a lot of speed, intensity, and the right mindset all game, albeit that one play, or explosive, that they had. DK Metcalf.”

(On getting Marcus Davenport back) “As we get healthier and healthier every week it’s going to become even more abundant. Yes, Marcus (Davenport) came back I was excited. We’ve had enough adversity, I’m getting more and more excited for the next d-lineman coming back. I don’t want to talk about it until it’s there. It’s like trying to open a Christmas present too early, you’ve got to wait your turn.”

(On what this win means going forward) “I hope it’ll just be the win. Other than the confidence we get for the defense finishing out like this. As we get further away from here I hope it tallies up more and more wins. At the end of the year it doesn’t matter how close we came, it matters about the win column. As we try and get to our goal, we have to get more and more W’s (wins).”

## **HEAD COACH PETE CARROLL**

PETE CARROLL: We've come in here a number of times here and really had very similar results that we're not getting the game when we have chance to get the football game that's out there for us. And it's really difficult. Because we're so close to winning games and we haven't been able to do it at home, for sure. Which is a real shock to me. It's a shock that we're not able to do that. But we're still trying to get these games finished properly. And that means you don't make the mistake that give them a chance. You know, you kick the ball, you don't make the penalty. You know, you don't eat the football for losses when you're in the right positions and stuff. So there's things that we can really fix. And we're just a -- it may not look like it from the outside, but from the inside, it feels like it's really close. So we're going to keep hanging and battling. Really good play by our defense tonight throughout the night. And we had this sequence before the half that we just -- it was -- it was a shame. It was a shame that we gave them that. It didn't have to happen and there was a couple things that we needed to do that didn't get done. I mean, you -- everybody could see it, cover the running back. And, fortunately, you know, our guys are hanging together. And they're talking right and they're looking at each other in the eye and they're -- they want to keep battling to make this thing come together. And that's what we're going to keep doing.

### **Q. What did you tell your team in the locker room just after the game now?**

PETE CARROLL: I told them stuff that really pertained to kind of how we've been talking about. We got to get our finish together and we got to do the right things at the end of the game. Kind of like I'm saying to you. It's -- it's -- there's no -- this isn't rocket science. You got to finish the game right and do right at the end. And that's how you become a good finishing club. And we're not right now. There's a lot of things that you can do so you don't put yourself in those close games and close finishes, as well. But when you get there, you got to do the right stuff. And we haven't been able to function the way we needed to. We talked about hanging together and staying connected and making sure that everybody's, you know, on the same page. And do this together the right way.

### **Q. You guys got that great start with a touchdown early. Were you surprised it was that tough going the rest of the way offensively?**

PETE CARROLL: Well, they're really good. And they made it hard on us. We didn't run the ball as well as we wanted to. We stayed after it, kept trying and working it. I was hoping we would pick it up more so in the second half. I think we rushed for, like, 90 yards or something like that. These guys allow 70 yards a game rushing, 70-80 yards a game. They're really good at it. But we needed to stay with it and we did. But not as effective as we needed to be. I wish we would have gotten more done off of the run. We weren't able to do that. Play passes and movement and stuff. But -- yeah, what else?

### **Q. You mentioned eating the football for losses. Geno being at quarterback, do you attribute that to just not being in there often?**

PETE CARROLL: Yeah, I do. Yeah, that's just not being comfortable with the situation. We reminded him, it was -- the time we were on the 23-yard line or something like that -- in great shape and we take a big loss. We just got to find a way to get the ball out and get it going when we're in trouble. It's easy to say, go play quarterback and figure it out. I love Geno and he's busting his ass to do everything he can to help us. But that's the kind of decisions that you make that keep you in the games and give you a chance to win.

**Q. How frustrated are you that some of the same mistakes at the end of the game that have hurt this defense this year --**

PETE CARROLL: Yeah, really frustrating. Really frustrating. We're not cleaning it up. We had a great sequence at the end of the game. We sacked a guy to give the ball back to the offense. But we hit him late. And so -- I haven't seen the play yet, so I don't know what it looks like. But that's the play that you don't do. You make the proper decision not to put yourself in that situation. We get off the field and everybody is going crazy, and they're kicking the ball to the 35 or something instead of getting a whole new start. That play looked like a 25-yard penalty when they marched the thing off. And so, you have to make those choices and the guys have to be clear thinking and not put us in harm's way. Gerald had his taunting thing over there that we can't -- this is the new game. You can't do anything aimed at another player. And I didn't see that one, either. But I was told what happened. And that kind of stuff is going to lose games for you. And they add up.

**Q. Going back to that sequence at the end of the first half, what happened on Kamara's touchdown? It looked like there was nobody within several yards of him.**

PETE CARROLL: Yeah, the whole sequence, we were just out of whack with covering him. There was five different calls in there, different things that happened when we had him manned up. We had some -- we needed to get it done one way or the other. And we tried, tried, tried. We didn't get it done. The second half, the guys made the adjustments, and everything was fine. And we were sharp at it and it wasn't the same thing anymore. But just in that sequence, we couldn't stop it until they got to the end zone with the calls that we made.

**Q. (Question concerning the missed field goal by Jason Myers.)**

PETE CARROLL: No, I think he just missed it. The flight wasn't the same on it. He just didn't hit it quite right. He's a great kicker. We love what he does. He's one game -- look what he did last week. And he's going to win games down the stretch here. And it's just unfortunate. He took it really hard. And, he knows.

**Q. The 53-yard try in the fourth quarter where he's kicking into the open end of the stadium, how much consideration was there to punt there?**

PETE CARROLL: Yeah, there was some. But we felt he kicked the ball far enough. Had a good attitude about it. And, it was a tough kick for sure. The night was not as difficult as we thought, the cyclone bomb or whatever it may be, it didn't go off. That didn't happen. I didn't think it was that big of a factor.

**Q. Did the officials give you an explanation on Blair's penalty on the sack? Was it a helmet hit or was it just late?**

PETE CARROLL: I didn't get any explanation on that one.

**Q. What did you see on it?**

PETE CARROLL: You guys saw it better than I did. You know more than I do.

**Q. What did you see out of DK tonight? And would you have liked to have seen him more involved after the touchdown?**

PETE CARROLL: Yeah, we -- yes. That was an exquisite play. It was a great throw from Geno. Everything about it was perfect. And that sent a little shock wave to them, too. And they kept going at him a lot and tried to do everything they could to keep him from getting the football.

**Q. The second to rotate the corners. Did you just want to try and let the competition play out there --**

PETE CARROLL: Yeah. I don't have nothing to tell you. I thought those guys played well. Really well. They got challenged a few times down the field. And all in all, the defense did a really nice job tonight. They did a really good job in so many ways. And we had one situation that really screwed up. And I think they had a 20-play drive. They got some fourth down conversions. I think we were 2 out of 15 or something on third down. You know, we have made a big jump and we've turned the corner on a lot of areas on our defense. I think the defense is playing -- go back three or four weeks, we've turned it. And so, we can expect those guys to continue to play really well and be a factor and make 13 points against this -- any NFL team is remarkable. And so, I'm counting on those guys to keep improving.

**Q. On that drive, Jordyn Brooks had that great pass defended where he jumped up in the air and when he recovered the fumble. Just his play tonight?**

PETE CARROLL: Yeah, I don't have enough to give him credit on all, other than the big plays you're talking about. But he continues to play really well. \The running game was really in hand. I don't think -- I don't think Alvin, had -- was over three yards rushing. It was a big night to slow him down. He's a great player. Was he under three? Yeah, that's a fantastic job. And that's four quarters of football against one of the best players in the NFL. And, obviously, we saw the talent in the passing game. We didn't do well there. He got us.

**Q. You mentioned the running game a lot. Could you tell what broke down on the offensive line?**

PETE CARROLL: No. There's nothing to tell you except for these guys are really good and hard to move. And they're really disciplined about it and our guys kept battling and clawing and scratching about it. We did a really nice job to get some other runs other than the downhill runs to complement what he did. But I need to look at the film.

**Q. (Question concerning Russell Wilson)**

PETE CARROLL: Let's say it this way: I've been here a long time. And if we didn't have Russell, I probably wouldn't have been here a long time. Because think of all the magic that he's created in the years. He's got numbers and stats, and fourth quarters, thises and thats, and all of that stuff. One of the winningest quarterbacks in the history of the NFL. And it will be really fun when he comes back and plays football again for us this year. And we owe a tremendous amount. You can see how hard it is. I mean, all of these games; the Rams game, the -- what was the next one?

**Q. The Steelers.**

PETE CARROLL: The Steelers and this one. You know, Russell's a factor. He's a fantastic, positive factor and always has been. And, I mean, those were exactly his time. That's his time. That's when he shines. And so, we miss him. And in the meantime, we're going to keep fighting and clawing, and doing everything we can.

**Q. On the defensive improvements, was it one thing or just the players focusing and getting better?**

PETE CARROLL: No. Line of scrimmage continues to get better. Everybody's really comfortable with what we're trying to get done. The corners are playing more consistently. Kenny has adjusted some stuff to help them. And they've really taken off with it. And, we've had good fortune to have most of the guys out there. We didn't have Darrell tonight. It would have been nice to have him. They've just turned the corner. You've already seen this story. Look at the third downs, guys. The third downs in the last month, okay, it's a month of third downs. It was two conversions and 10, two conversions and 15 or something like that, and then five and 15, and then two and whatever it was tonight. That's fantastic play. Nobody's playing better than that. Nobody's doing better than that. And so, that's going to give us a chance. And we'll have a chance to have a great surge in the second half of the season. And, really, the second half starts Wednesday.

**Q. Did Darrell have a setback pregame or something like that?**

PETE CARROLL: No, he didn't have a setback. He just didn't turn the corner. And he was -- it was such a positive kind of return with, all the good news that he wasn't hurt seriously. But his neck still was sore. And it just didn't -- it didn't go away. So he had a real stiff neck that he couldn't shake yet. He's really frustrated by it. Because he feels pretty darn good, but he just didn't have his mobility and it wasn't -- he couldn't play.

**Q. How's Marquise Blair?**

PETE CARROLL: He got hurt. Marquise got hurt. He hurt his patellar tendon. I'm not going to specific about it. But that's -- check that. He hurt his patellar. And the patellar got -- there's something we got to do there. And I'm not sure exactly what it is. But it's a significant injury.

**Q. Is Tyler okay?**

PETE CARROLL: Yes. As far as I know. I haven't seen him. He's not on any of the reports I have. Brandon Shell just kind of re-aggravated his ankle real late there. Other than that, we don't have anything else.

**Q. On the Woods offsides, you didn't have a field goal block on or anything?**

PETE CARROLL: Yeah, we had a big time field goal block on. We always, we do. And we -- yes, and we took great pride in rushing that with that group. And I don't know, you know, what happened. You know, Al's great and a disciplined football -- as disciplined a football player as we have. And I don't know what happened on that. I haven't talked to him about it.

**Q. Did Damien try to warm up and play pregame?**

PETE CARROLL: Yeah, he couldn't get back. No, he did not work out in pregame. He wasn't ready to do that.

**Q. On releasing Cedric Ogbuehi**

PETE CARROLL: We had to make a spot. And for Rashaad to come up.

**Q. Do you have any more word on when Russell might come back?**

PETE CARROLL: No. No. I don't know. I can't help you on that. I just know he's going to -- whatever he's going to do is better than anybody could ever do. And he'll get that done.

**QB GENO SMITH**

**Q. Geno, what's the mood in the locker room right now?**

GENO SMITH: It's tough. Man, we lost. No one's happy about it. It's another close game for us. We had a chance right there at the end. It's tough. One thing I know about these guys is no one's going to quit. No one's going to point a finger. We're all going to pick up what we need to pick up. And we're all going to get better. You know, find ways to get better and find ways to get a win.

**Q. What's your assessment of the offense tonight?**

GENO SMITH: I think we had spurts where we were really good. And I think we had times where we didn't finish. We were moving the ball. You know, some costly sacks where, you know, kind of put us out of position. A couple penalties that we'd like to not have. But overall, I mean, with the elements and everything else, you know, not to make any excuses, I think we moved the ball pretty well.



**Q. Geno, you mentioned the sacks. Some of those came at some really critical moments. What do you kind of think about those plays when you look back on them and you kind of have those moments come about for you?**

GENO SMITH: Well, I mean, that's part of playing quarterback, honestly. Playing quarterback, you got to put the team in the best position to win. And whatever I got to do to get the ball out or evade a sack, whatever I have to do to not have that happen, that's a part of my job. And I put that solely on my myself, honestly. And I got big enough shoulders, I'll take it all. You can put the blame on my feet. No worry. I know I'm going to do whatever I need to do to make sure that we get a win.

**Q. The third down that took Meyers' field goal out to 53 yards there in the open end, what could you do? That looked like a blitz with no pickup. You're saying --**

GENO SMITH: I would have to go look at the tape to be exact and to give you the best answer. In hindsight, just doing whatever it takes, whatever it takes to get the ball out. That's a part of my job, putting us in the best position to win. And when things like that happen, it's the quarterback's job to make sure it doesn't.

**Q. What was it like handling the ball, throwing the ball in these conditions tonight?**

GENO SMITH: I thought we did fine, honestly. I didn't think about it once. I didn't flinch once. You know, I think I missed one to DK where I put a touch on it and it kind of floated on me. But other than that, I think we were fine.

**Q. You had that great touchdown pass to DK. Honestly, I don't think you threw it to him again until the fourth quarter. Was that something they were doing, the defense, play calling?**

GENO SMITH: Obviously, we want to get the ball to our playmakers. DK is a great player, Tyler's a great player, Gerald and all those guys. We want to get the ball to all those guys. To be honest with you, I can't really pinpoint to you why it happened the way it did. That's something we got to look at and correct. But it happened like that. And we still had a chance at the end of the game. He made a crucial third down at the end of the game. And that's what he does, he's a great player. And so, honestly, man, it's just one of those things where we came up short again. These last three weeks, we've had the ball at the end with a chance to go win and we didn't get it done.

**Q. Geno, the defense gave you -- a recovery fumble gave you a short field. Can you take us through the sequence of that possession?**

GENO SMITH: It was a great job by the defense. It was a great hit. I think it was Ugo who made the hit. It was a great hit. That's what they do, they make plays on defense. They did a great job all night. I feel like we got the ball there. And one thing that I'll say is finishing drives is huge. And then rewarding our defense whenever they do get a turnover like that. We preferably want to get seven. So whatever we have to do to make sure that happens. We all got to watch the tape

and really take ownership and figure out what each individual can do to make sure that gets done.

**Q. Geno, you're not going to be satisfied until you win, obviously, as a competitor. But what can you -- how are you feeling about your control of the offense and your ability to move the pieces when you're out there at the line of scrimmage and in the huddle?**

GENO SMITH: I feel great about it. That's all the hard work throughout training camp and all those things we put a lot of work in. And so, I feel great about what I'm seeing out there and how I'm getting in and out of the huddle. Obviously, there's a lot that I can improve, as well. So for me, it's just focusing on those things, the things that I can improve on. And then just continuing to build.

**Q. Just what's the next step for this team to kind of get back on track?**

GENO SMITH: The sun's going to come up tomorrow and we going to get right. We're going to make sure we do whatever we need to do. Whether it's in the classroom, the weight room. And then when it comes down to executing on the field, we just got to own those moments. We just got to own them. Those are crucial moments and we had chances to really ice the game. And so, we've got to really put that in our mindset just, like, Hey, man, we got to be closers and finishers. And that's something we can really work on.

## **LB JORDYN BROOKS**

(On the feeling in the locker room after that game) Obviously, guys are disappointed, but nobody is pointing a finger. We're sticking together. We're not giving up on ourselves. People outside these walls may be pointing the finger and giving up on us, but we're going to stick together. We're going to figure it out."

(On what it will take to figure it out) "Just lock it in. Just keep doing what we're doing. It was just a play here and there. So we have to go back and watch the film, evaluate ourselves. Each man has to hold themselves accountable; see what they could have done better, and get it fixed."

(On the defense possibly turning the corner over the last few weeks) "I thought we've been playing better these last few weeks. That's just guys communicating. Early on, during the year, we were just having communication problems and it led to this play and that play. I think guys are talking better. The chemistry has grown on that side. We're going to continue to do what we do, and get a win here, soon."

(On his pass breakup in the end zone) "I was pretty much playing the hooks. They had a guy crossing. I felt somebody come behind me, and I just read Jameis' eyes, and got up to get it tipped."

(On whether he thought that play and the fumble recovery were enough to win the game) "I thought we did enough defensively to win. Offensively as well. Like I said, it was just a couple

plays here and there. Both sides, all sides, all phases, can be cleaned up, and we win the game, easily.”

(On the emphasis on finishing) “That’s kind of been the problem the last couple weeks, just not finishing. Like I said, it’s nothing major that’s happening. It’s just about finishing. That’s what we have to do as a collective group. That’s what will make the difference.”

(On how different it is without Russell Wilson) “It’s different. Obviously, Russ is, in my opinion, the best. So, it’s going to be different. But, we’re rallying around Geno. In running the ball, and making plays when we can. Right now, Russ is down, and it’s next man up mentality.”

## **FS UGO AMADI**

(On what happens now) “Where do we go from here? We have to go back to work, get ready for the next opponent. We can’t leave stuff in the past, we have to move forward, get back to what we believe in, and that’s winning.”

(On whether it feels like the defense has turned the corner, specifically on third down) “Definitely. We take pride in that. Last year, that’s where we were hurt the most. That’s a point of emphasis going in to this year. Getting off the field on third down.”

(On whether he thought the forced fumble play had turned the game) “I believe that whenever you get the ball out, and give it back to the offense, that’s always a momentum builder.”

(On whether he knew the ball had come free right away) “Yeah. When I hit him, I was looking back the whole time. I knew that ball was out.”

(On the importance of trust) “When I think of trust, I think it’s everything. Communicating at the snap, trusting your teammates. I feel like that’s never been the issue. We just have to keep harping on it. It just never comes easy. When you’re climbing the mountain, it’s never easy, but when you get to the top, it’s going to be a nice view. Whatever you do in life, there are going to be trials and tribulations.”

(On why Alvin Kamara was so effective as a receiver tonight) “I believe that’s who the quarterback wanted to target; that’s his go to guy. He’s electrifying when he gets the ball. I give kudos to him. That’s his game.”

## **RB ALEX COLLINS**

(On the Saints’ run defense) “They just did a great job of reading the runs and attacking hard down field. Throughout the stretch, we had to switch up our scheme a little bit and attack them harder. I felt that it started to open up towards the end and we started to get a little more yards at the end. They are a great defense, they came to play, and played hard.”

(On how he's feeling after the game) "I'm great, mentally too."

(On how he was feeling throughout the week) "I didn't even feel it. Going out there, I was able to really move how I wanted to and go without any limitations."

(On how difficult it is not being able to finish these close games) "Just like I said earlier, I feel like the optimism is there. We know that we are so close. We are right at the end with these teams. We are playing against some great teams, and it comes down to the wire. We have to keep executing and keep finishing strong. Hopefully the games will start falling our way because we have had a lot of close games. We went to overtime and were tied up in the fourth, so people look at our record and maybe have a different mindset about us. We know that we are one step closer to finishing, executing, and getting those W's."

## **LB BOBBY WAGNER**

(On what message he has for the younger players) "We've got to keep fighting. It's a long season, a lot of games left. We've got to get right. We've got to really fix our mistakes and play smarter, make less penalties. That's the message."

(On how to make sure players aren't trying too hard) "I don't think it's going to be a try too hard type of thing. I think it's more of we're executing, we're making plays. We just had costly mistakes or costly penalties in the wrong moments, so it's being more conscious in those moments to make sure that it's important to be on point."

(On Alvin Kamara) "He just made some good plays. I didn't see all of them because I was guarding somebody else, but it seemed like he just got inside of us and with a guy like that, you just can't let him get inside of us. They made some good plays and some good calls. He executed."

(On how he feels personally) "It sucks. It's not a great feeling. It's not a position that we thought we were going to be in, and it's just back to the drawing board for me."
